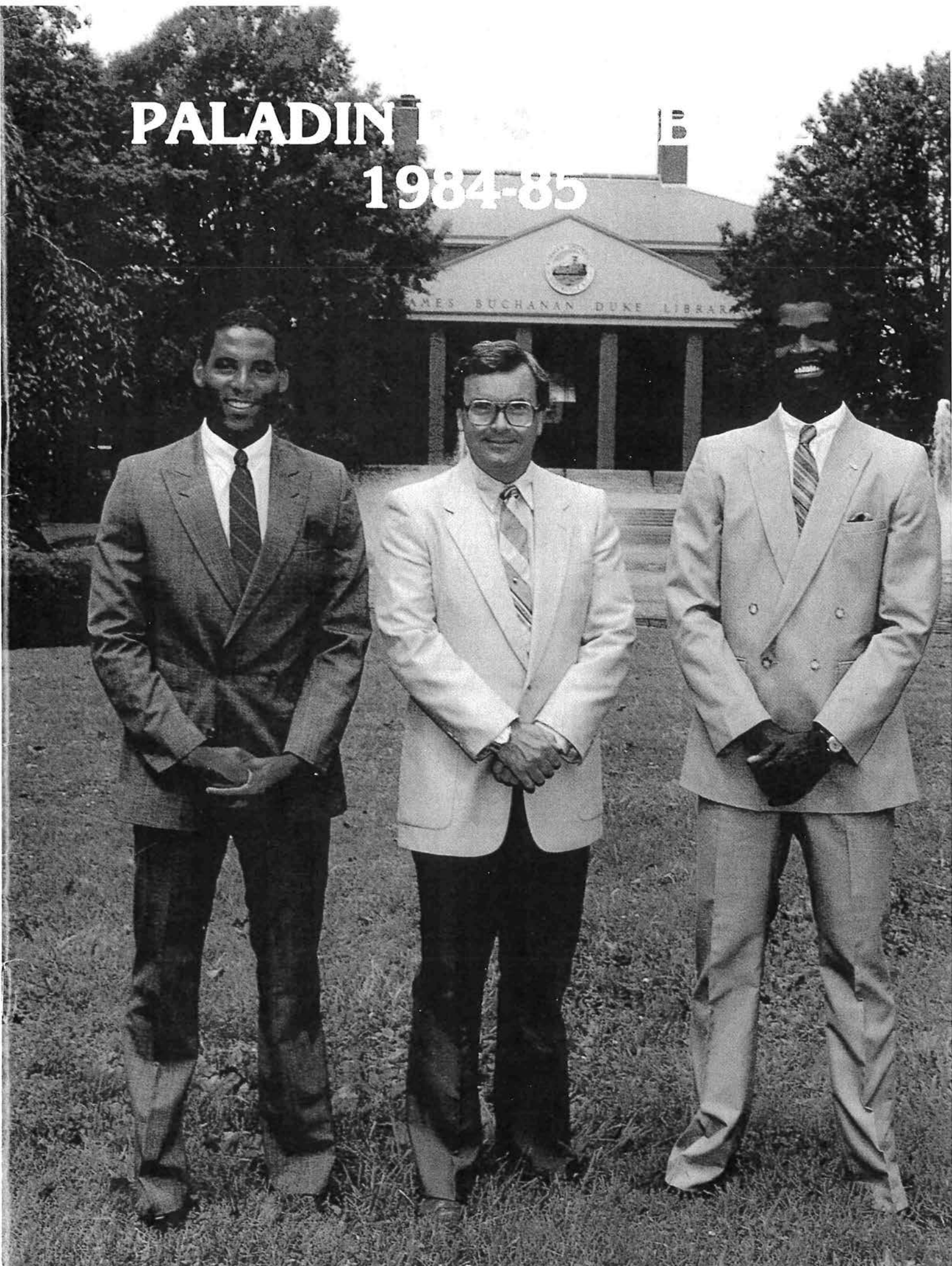

## MEDIA INFORMATION

**PRESS ROOM:** Furman working press facilities are located just off the playing surface, near the home bench at Memorial Auditorium. The press room is equipped with a telecopier and three phone lines, as well as a copier for disseminating game statistics. Programs, statistics and fact sheets are available in the press room, as well as drinks and sandwiches.

**PRESS ROW:** Working press space is provided along the main scorers' table, with overflow press and/or statistics crews located along the end lines.

**PRESS PASSES:** All applications for working credentials should be directed to the Sports Information Director and are issued on an individual game basis. Passes not furnished by return mail must be picked up in person at the press entrance to the Auditorium, located at the rear of the facility.

**BROADCAST RIGHTS:** Permission to broadcast must be secured at least two weeks in advance from the Sports Information Director. Furman University operates a "trade-out" voice coupler for Southern Conference teams which is available to non-conference teams through a nominal rights fee. Prior arrangements must be made for the phone. Each station will be allocated three spaces on press row.

**SCOUTING:** Passes for scouting purposes should be requested at least two weeks in advance. Each organization will be allocated one seat on a space available basis.

**PHOTOGRAPHERS:** Photo passes are limited to working press photographers only.

**PARKING:** Press parking is very limited at Memorial Auditorium and is located at the rear of the facility. If the designated area is full, parking passes may be used at other auditorium lots.

**SERVICES:** Game programs, complete statistics, pregame information and running play-by-play are provided at every contest. Post-game interviews of both teams' coaches will be conducted in the press room, with visiting coaches available first. A 10-minute "cooling off period" will be observed before the locker rooms are opened for members of the news media.

**PLAYERS & COACHES INTERVIEW POLICY:** The Sports Information Office and basketball coaching staff are eager to assist the media with interviews of players, coaches and other members of the athletic staff. To help in this endeavor, it is requested that media representatives contact the Sports Information Office for all player interviews. Coach Davis should be contacted directly for interviews, along with members of his staff. The Sports Information Office will arrange all other interviews at places and times convenient to both parties. Media cooperation is appreciated.

**BEST TIME TO REACH COACH DAVIS:** The basketball office is open 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday throughout the year. The staff prepares for daily practice sessions each afternoon, and Coach Davis requests that members of the media not call after 1 p.m. The most convenient time to reach Coach Davis or other members of his staff is **9 a.m. to noon at 803/294-2170.**



## **DR. JOHN E. JOHNS** **University President**

Dr. John E. Johns has served Furman University as its president since 1976, earning a reputation for diligence and dynamic leadership.

In addition, Dr. Johns has been a strong supporter of Paladin athletics. He is a close friend of the Furman athletic staff.

A 1947 Furman graduate, Johns returned to his alma mater after serving six years as president of Stetson University in Deland, Fla. Johns had been a member of the Stetson faculty and staff since 1948. During his tenure at Stetson, Johns earned the rank of full professor in the Department of History and Political Science, serving

as department chairman. He also served as business manager at Stetson, as well as Vice President for Finance prior to being promoted to president of the university.

A native of Ozark, Ala., Johns received the Distinguished Flying Cross after serving in the Army Air Corps during World War II. A cum laude Furman graduate, he received the Bradshaw-Feaster Medal for General Excellence as an undergraduate. He earned his master's and doctorate degrees from the University of North Carolina and holds honorary degrees from Rollins, William Jewell, Furman and Stetson.

Johns is married to the former Martha Mauney of Shelby, N.C., also a Furman graduate. The couple has three sons. Both the President and Mrs.



Johns have been recognized for community service and contributions to higher education.

## **DICK SHERIDAN** **Director of Athletics**

Head football coach since 1978 and currently serving his second year as Director of Athletics, Dick Sheridan has compiled a remarkable record in both areas.

Sheridan became Director of Athletics at Furman in August 1983, and the North Augusta, S.C., native has earned a reputation for hard work on behalf of all the athletic teams at the university.

Once a successful basketball coach in his own right at the high school level, Sheridan is well aware of the accomplishments of the Paladin basketball program and its illustrious history.

"Everyone in the athletic department takes great pride in the outstanding tradition which our basketball program has been fortunate enough to enjoy," Sheridan says. "The fine achievements of Furman teams have reached sports

fans all across the United States, and that kind of recognition benefits not only the basketball program, but the entire athletic department."

Sheridan's record as head football coach is unmatched in Furman history. Under his leadership, Furman has won four consecutive Southern Conference championships as the 1984 season began, and his career won-lost record midway through the 1984 season was 53-19-2.

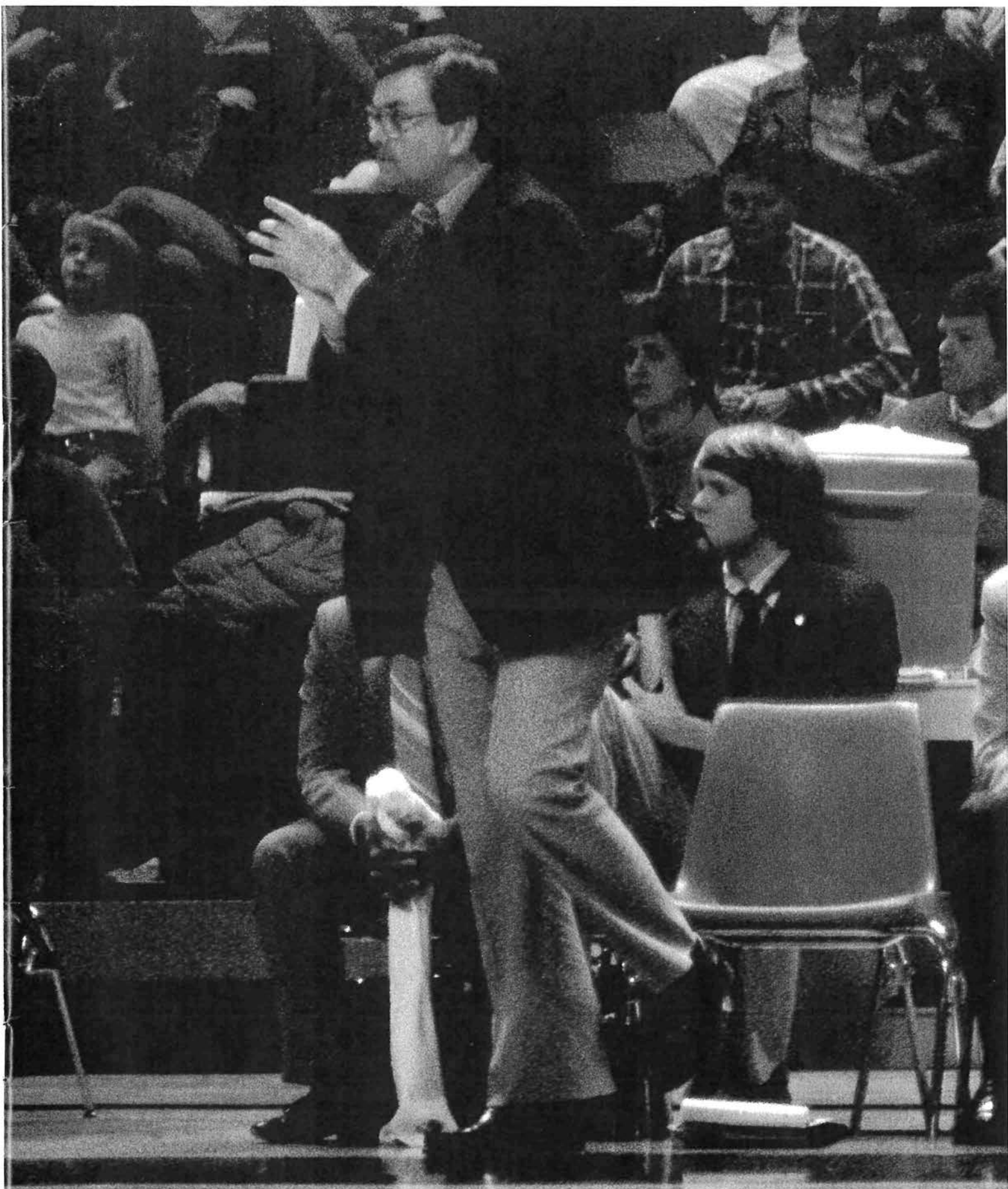
As athletic director, his accomplishments are equally impressive. He has actively participated in a rapid upgrading of women's athletics, with significant steps taken in scholarship development and revenue production aimed at improving all of Furman's 17-sport program.

Sheridan came to Furman in 1973 as an assistant football coach under Art Baker. He served five years as offensive coordinator before assuming the head coaching responsibilities.

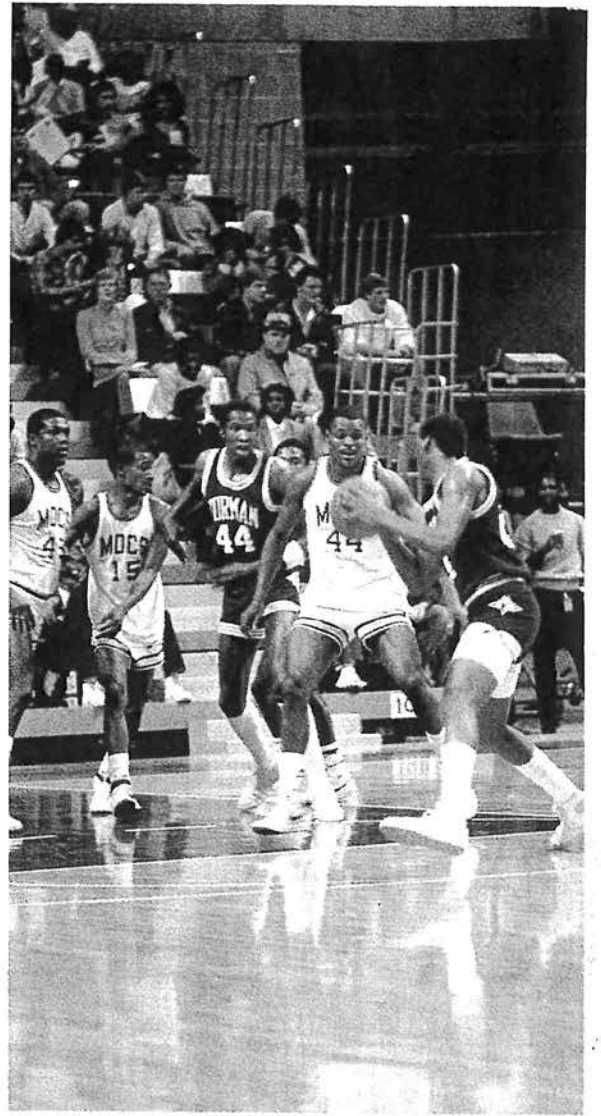
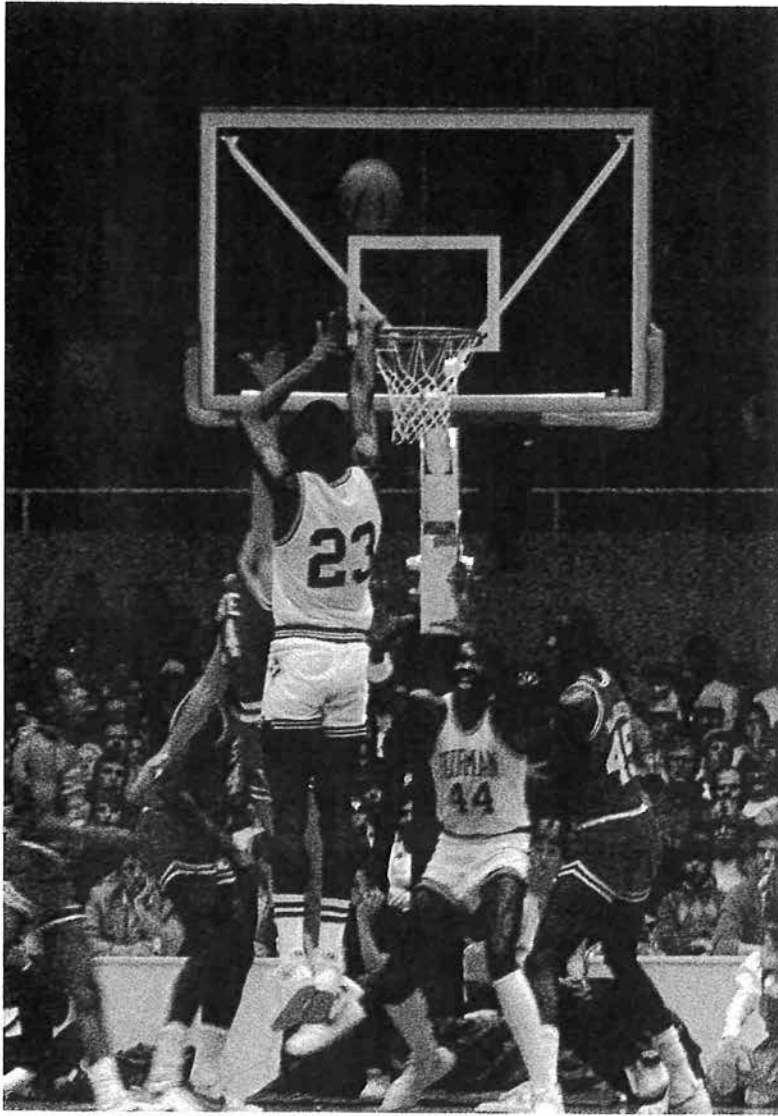
A 1964 graduate of the University of South Carolina, Sheridan earned a

## JENE DAVIS Head Basketball Coach

Now in his third season as head basketball coach at Furman, Jene Davis has the Paladin program moving steadily upward in the Southern Conference race.

When Davis took the Furman job in 1982, he inherited a cupboard that was almost bare. How did he respond? By abruptly upgrading the schedule and bringing in six outstanding freshmen in time for his second season.

In year two, he posted an upset victory over a fine Stetson team and made it to the semifinals of the Southern Conference Tournament for the second year in a row. In addition, the Paladins improved their conference record by three games.

Afterwards, Davis was named to an assistant coach position at the United States Olympic Trials, the first such selection ever extended to a college head coach from the state of South Carolina. At the trials, Davis helped select a team that has been called the

finest in Olympic history.

At the same time, he was successful in recruiting the state's "Mr. Basketball", 6-5 swingman John Castile of Columbia, along with two other highly-regarded additions in 6-7 Gary Churchill of Mundelein, Ill., and junior college transfer Pat Suttle of LaFayette, Ga.

Davis has built a program geared to the future. Of the squad's 12-man preseason roster, 10 team members are either freshmen or sophomores. With youth comes enthusiasm, a quality that should be heightened by this year's home schedule.

In 1984-85, the Paladins will host the best assortment of major college powers ever to visit Memorial Auditorium playing surface. Included along with a full slate of Southern Conference opponents on the 15-game home slate are Atlantic Coast Conference powers Clemson and Wake Forest, Florida State from the Metro, Missouri Valley Conference school Bradley and Eastern Kentucky from the Ohio Valley.



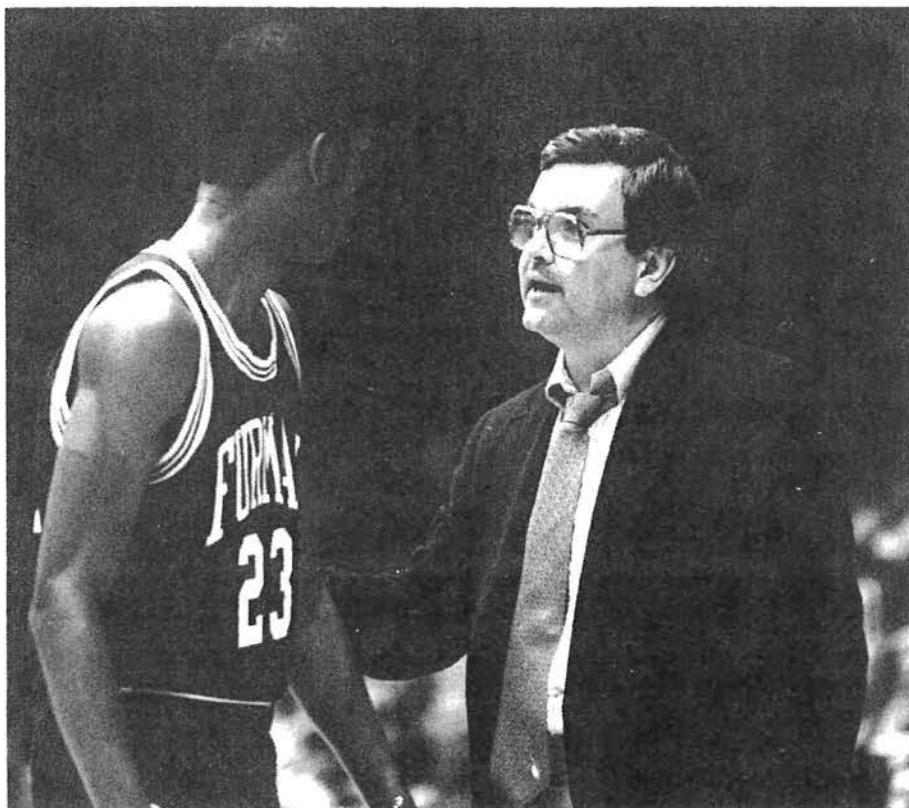
Davis is of the opinion that full realization of his players' talents is only possible if they are afforded the opportunity to match their own talents against the best. That philosophy should also leave the Paladins well-prepared for the conference schedule.

Davis is no stranger to success, having come to Furman after four years with Coach Bob Knight at Indiana University. During Davis' years on the IU staff, the Hoosiers won three Big Ten championships, one NIT title and once NCAA championship. The Hoosier program is recognized nationally for its fundamental soundness, and no less of an authority than Knight himself said, "Of all the assistant coaches who have worked for me, Jene Davis is by far the most qualified to take a head coaching position."

Davis began his coaching career in 1969 at Linden McKinley High School in Columbus, Ohio, compiling a 57-11 record as junior varsity coach before moving to Capital University in 1973 as assistant coach.

Davis returned to McKinley in 1975 as head coach and guided his four teams to an 82-18 mark, including two state championships. The second state championship team, in 1977, finished 26-0 and was ranked second nationally by **Basketball Weekly**. He was Ohio High School Coach of the Year in 1977 and was named the state's Coach of the Decade in 1980.

Davis and wife Jaime have two sons, Jason and Alex.





## **AL DANIEL** **Assistant Coach**

Now in his fifth season on the Furman coaching staff, Al Daniel has distinguished himself both as a fine player and outstanding coach for the Paladins.

Highly regarded for his recruiting talents, Daniel spends much of the year searching for outstanding student-athletes, who will excel within Furman's stringent academic environment. He is a living example of the positive benefits of a Furman education.

A two-time All-Southern Conference performer for the Paladins, Daniel is a member of the school's 1,000-point club. He was named the Poinsettia Classic Most Valuable Player in 1977 and was drafted by the San Antonio Spurs following his senior season. Al

spent two years at Anderson College before transferring to Furman.

He finished his career with 1,122 points in only 59 games for a 19-point average. One of his career highlights was a 29-point performance against North Carolina in Furman's 83-70 upset victory at the 1979 North-South Doubleheader. In his final college game, Daniel scored a career-high 31 points against Appalachian State in the Southern Conference Tournament.

A Saluda, S.C., native, Daniel was named to both the regular-season and conference tournament all-star squads in each of his two seasons with the Paladins. He holds four school records for performances in the league tourney.

In addition, Daniel's younger brother, Mel, also attended Furman on a basketball scholarship, finishing his



career as the sixth-leading point-producer in Furman history.

A 1979 Furman graduate, Daniel is single.

## **DAVE HANNERS** **Assistant Coach**

Dave Hanners, serving his second season on the Furman staff, learned much of his basketball knowledge by playing under one of the game's great teachers, Dean Smith, at the University of North Carolina.

Coupled with Coach Davis' work under Bob Knight at Indiana, Hanners' being on the Paladin staff gives Furman an indirect input from two men who are almost universally regarded as the finest college coaches in the United States.

Hanners came to Furman in 1983 after a three-year stint at the University of North Carolina at Wilmington. He holds a bachelor's degree in education and a master's degree in English from North Carolina at Chapel Hill, where he played four years under Smith and earned All-ACC academic honors in

1976. He was a member of two Atlantic Coast Conference championship teams at UNC.

At Walnut Ridge High School in Columbus, Ohio, Hanners won all-state, all-district and all-city honors before signing with the Tar Heels at the conclusion of his senior season.

He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant on Smith's staff at North Carolina, before taking over as head coach at the University School of Milwaukee in Wisconsin in 1978. He then served one year as head coach at Westover Senior High School in Fayetteville, N.C., before joining the staff at UNC-Wilmington.

A 1976 UNC graduate, Hanners is single.





## **GREGG NIBERT** **Assistant Coach**

Gregg Nibert brings a very detailed knowledge of basketball in the state of South Carolina to his first season on the Furman staff.

Named assistant coach at Furman in September, Nibert comes to Furman from Presbyterian College in Clinton, S.C., where he worked under head coach George 'Butch' Estes for three seasons. After the Blue Hose went 12-16 during Nibert's first year on the staff, PC followed with records of 21-12 and 25-6 the past two years.

Nibert also worked with Estes at Rice University in Texas.

"We were looking for someone who had good relationships with South Carolina high school coaches," head

coach Jene Davis said at the time of Nibert's hiring, "and we feel like Gregg fits that description very well."

"For the past three years at Presbyterian, Gregg has developed a great working relationship with the coaches in the state. He had a great rapport with the players there, where he had a lot of responsibilities at the college level."

A native of Grove City, Ohio, Nibert is a 1979 graduate of Marietta College in his home state. He holds a master's degree from the University of South Carolina in educational administration.

At Marietta, Nibert was a three-year basketball letterman, earning Most Valuable Player honors his senior year and Most Improved as a junior.

"I'm very excited about the opportunity to work with Coach Davis, and I feel as if our basketball program is



on the verge of some really big accomplishments," Nibert says.  
Nibert 27, is single.

## DAVIS BUILDING A MODEL PROGRAM AT FURMAN

Furman head coach Jene Davis is very concerned about the reputation of college athletics in America, and among the more important aspects of his philosophy is the emphasis on academics which he has instilled in his staff and players.

All of the seniors who have played at Furman in Coach Davis' two seasons have either graduated or are completing their degree requirements. Davis is extremely proud of their prospects for a bright future.

Two recent Furman graduates are currently employed in the banking industry. Tommy Doughton (Class of '84) works for Wachovia Bank in Winston-Salem, N.C., while Randy Morris '84 is at Bankers Trust in Greenville.

Mel Daniel '83, who finished his playing career before Coach Davis came to Furman but graduated during his tenure, is also employed locally, at Southern Bank. The same circumstances apply to William Hanks, who works for Union Camp Corporation in Morristown, Tenn.

George Singleton will complete his degree requirements next spring after he returns from Valladolid, Spain, and his first season in the European professional leagues. Floyd Creed '84 is now an assistant coach at Furman.

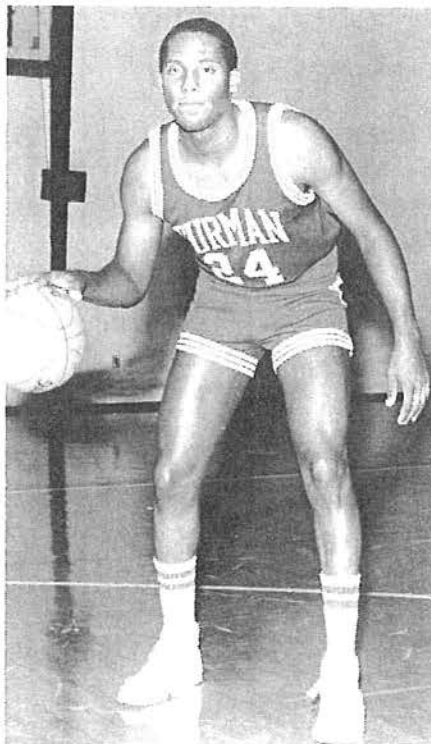
Phil Thomas '84 is employed by Liberty Life in Mauldin, S.C., while Jimmy Holleman '83 is employed by C&D Sporting Goods in Mt. Airy, N.C.

To Coach Davis and his staff, success is simply a matter of individual attention coupled with fundamental development, both in the classroom and on the court. At a school with the academic reputation which Furman enjoys, this approach fits right in with the university's ideals and policies.

"We approach basketball at Furman as if it were a classroom situation," Davis says. "Our coaching staff is our faculty. Our coaches are dedicated to a program of total development on and off the court for each player."

To see the Davis approach at work, just visit the Furman campus and look at how his basketball players take an active role in student life.

Take senior Kevin Bryant, for instance. A political science major who will enroll in law school next fall, Bryant is an active member of the Student League of Black Culture (SLBC). In

one of the year's most visible on-campus events, Bryant was featured on the same program as the Rev. Jesse Jackson when the former Democratic candidate for President visited Furman this fall.

Davis wants his players to mature by means of a systematic process. His staff is dedicated to making better basketball players of the young men who enroll at Furman. Foremost, however, Paladin cagers are encouraged to excel in the classroom. The staff is always available to assist in academics or offer advice in the area of personal and social development that each young man experiences when he attends college.

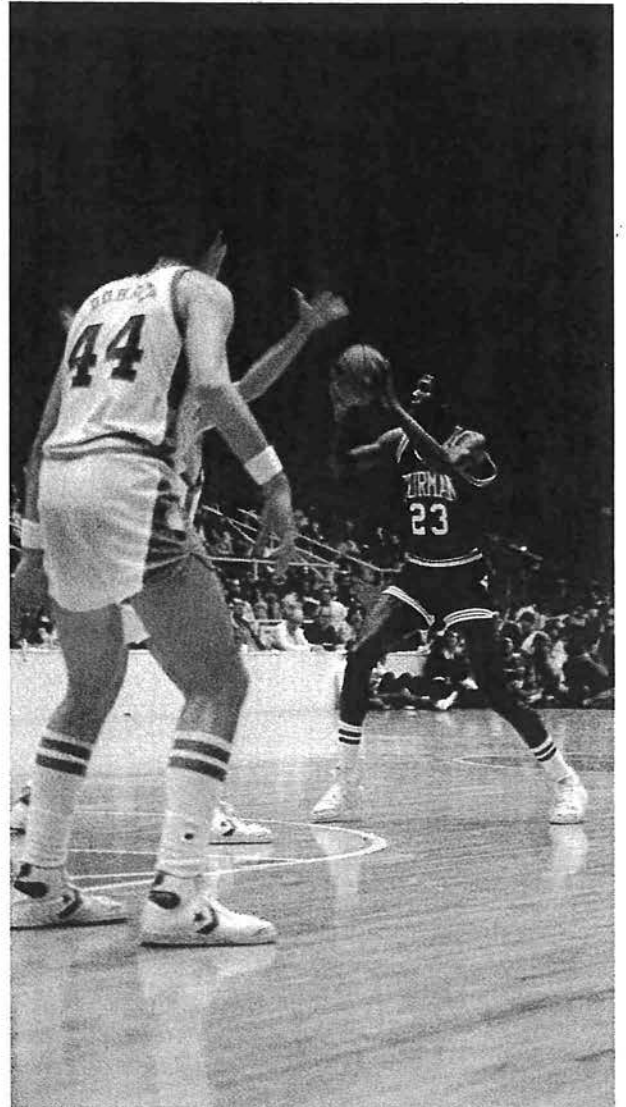
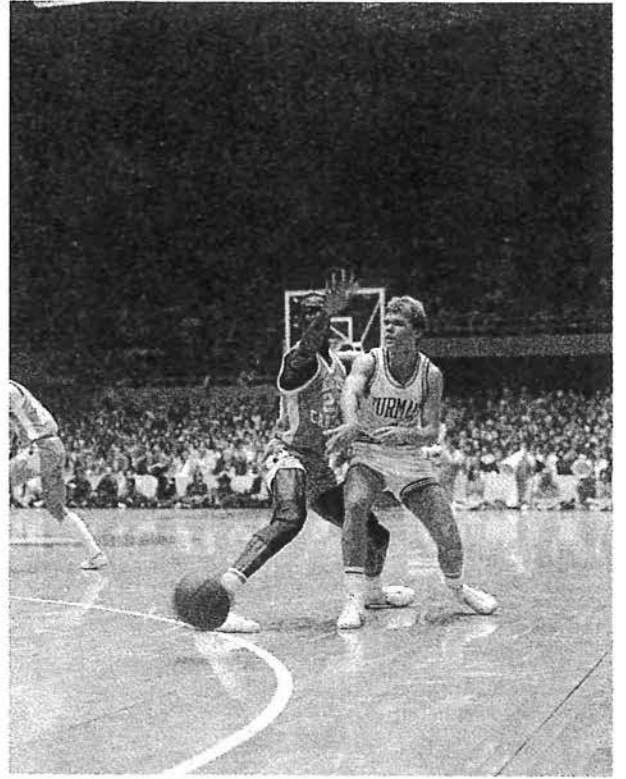
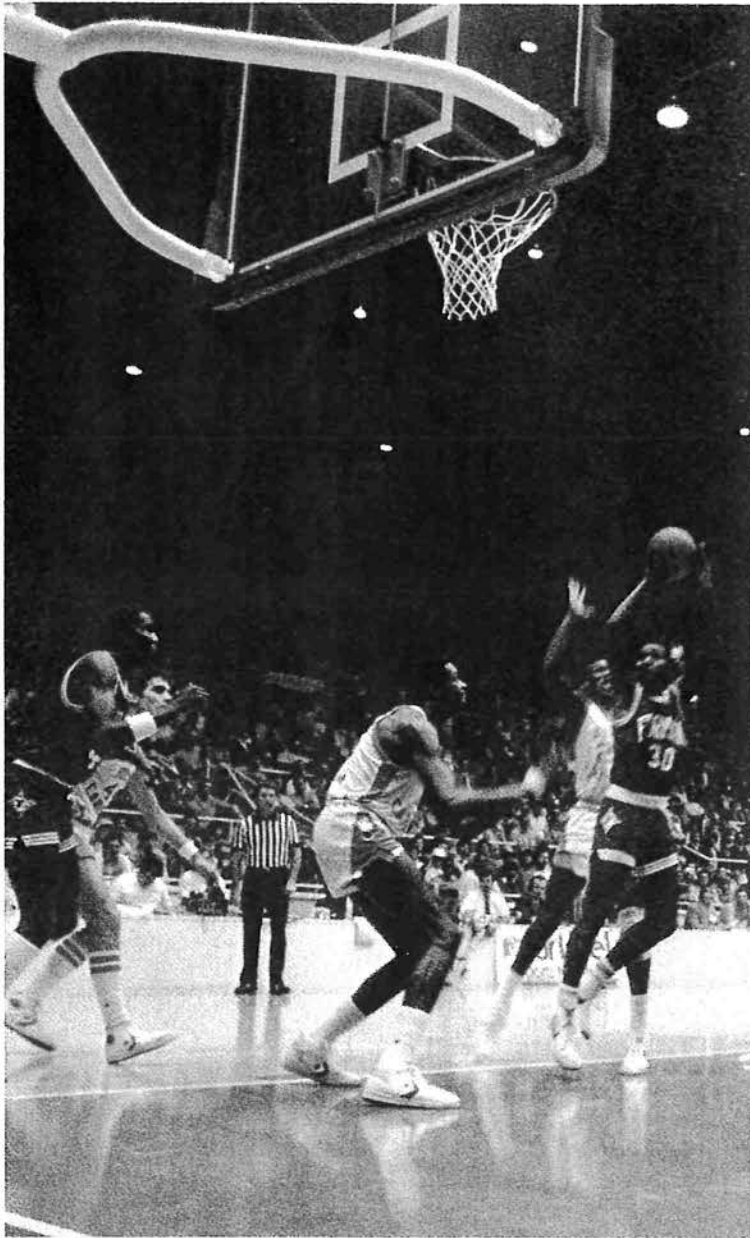
College athletics can become a demanding way of life for Furman students, who must uphold strict standards both on the court and in the classroom, but the Davis approach is particularly effective at a school of Furman's academic heritage.

"Our staff works closely with our players to give them as much academic support as is necessary," Davis notes. "One of the biggest lessons I learned at Indiana was that our primary goal is to see our players graduate. The football program at Furman under Dick Sheridan has done a tremendous job with 99 out of 101 seniors graduating, and we expect to achieve similar success in basketball over the years."

"Furman is not a school for everyone," Davis admits. "Our academic standards make that obvious. Not every talented basketball player is suited for our approach to basketball. However, an intelligent, hard-working individual will thrive in our climate of mutual cooperation and dedication toward daily improvement."

## PALADINS SEEK CONTINUED IMPROVEMENT IN DAVIS' THIRD YEAR

Furman head coach Jene Davis spent his first two years refueling a program that had been left dormant, and he enters his third season optimistic that success is right around the corner.

The Paladins finished the 1983-84 campaign 12-17 against a very different schedule, improving their Southern Conference record significantly in the process, from 4-12 in '82-83 to 7-9 last year.

Most notable among the departees is center-forward George Singleton, now plying his trade for the Valladolid, Spain, squad in Europe after setting school records for blocked shots (269) and shooting percentage (.572) during his career. He was the second selection of the Los Angeles Lakers in the NBA draft before opting for the European offer.

Despite the loss of Singleton and four others, Davis thinks this year's team can be better than his second Paladin edition.

"We will be a team of 10 freshmen and sophomores on our roster. Age-wise, we will be very young," he admits. "However, with these players, we have the nucleus of a team that will contend for the conference title."

"We are looking for some consistency from the players who were freshman last year. Four of those five kids had outstanding individual games at various points in the season, and if we can get some consistency from them, it should improve our team tremendously."

One welcome returnee is sophomore guard David Conrady, who missed the entire 1983-84 season due to a nerve problem in his lower right leg. A member of the all-freshman team in the league two years ago, he is fully recovered and should boost the squad's backcourt situation immeasurably.

The squad's three returning starters are forward Noel Gilliard, guard Shawn Reid and swing man Kevin Bryant. The first two started almost every game, while Bryant started slightly more outings than then-freshmen Herman Sims and Eric Moore.

Gilliard averaged 11.5 points and 5.3 rebounds and should be a strong contender for all-conference honors this season. Reid led the team in assists

with 87, averaging 12.2 points and 2.7 rebounds and earning a slot on the all-freshman squad in the league.

"Last year, we could have and should have won 16 games with a little more poise," Davis says hopefully. "If we can develop better poise and stronger leadership, as I believe we will, hopefully we will win those games this time around."

## A GREAT TRADITION

Basketball has always been something special at Furman University, a school with a remarkable tradition of excellence on the hardwood.

From the opening tip at the dawn of the century, through a Golden Era of scoring champs and first-round draft choices in the 50's, right up to the present, Furman has enjoyed a national reputation unusual for a school of its size.

Furman is where a shy Kentuckian named Frank Selvy matriculated prior to rewriting the national scoring records. Furman is where Darrell Floyd led the country's point-producers the year after Selvy's graduation.

In fact, Furman is the place where Selvy scored 100 points in a single game, the only major college player ever to do so, on the night of February 13, 1954. He later served as head coach of his alma mater after a fine pro career.

Although two All-Americans played for Furman during the 1960's, the 70's saw a great revival of the school's fortunes in the basketball world. Between 1971 and 1980, the Paladins won the Southern Conference and advanced into the NCAA playoffs no less than six times.

Among the highlights of that period were an NACC tournament upset of highly-regarded South Carolina in 1974 and a two-game sweep of North Carolina and N.C. State on consecutive nights at the 1978 North-South Doubleheader. The Paladins unabashedly knocked the Tar Heels off again the following year.

Few schools of any size can claim six NCAA tournament teams in the past 15 years, let alone one with 2,500 students. Likewise, it is pertinent to note that three Furman graduates have been drafted in the first round of the NBA draft. First Selvy, then Floyd, and in 1975 Clyde Mayes was the opening selection of the Milwaukee Bucks.



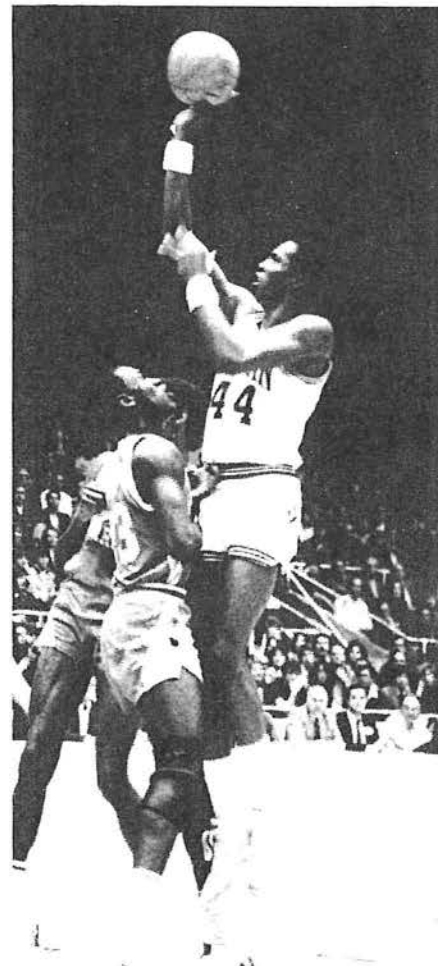

The saga of Furman basketball is full of outstanding individuals and winning teams.

When head coach Jene Davis and his players talk about regaining the top spot in the Southern Conference, it should surprise no one familiar with the conference's history. Basketball excellence is as much a part of Furman's tradition as the historic Bell Tower that casts a reflection across its lake.
