PRESS BOX: Furman working press facilities are located atop the home stands at Paladin Stadium. The fifth level houses space for sportswriters, home and visiting radio, home and visiting coaches, and public address. The top (roof) level is reserved for home and visiting game video and television. Only working press, coaches, and game administration personnel with valid credentials will be admitted to these two levels.

PRESS PASSES: All requests for working press credentials should be directed to the SID. Passes not furnished by return mail must be picked up in person at the "Press Will-Call" window located on the ground floor of the press tower.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Photographers must secure sideline passes from the sports information director and adhere to a working area designated as "any area along the sidelines (except between the 30-yard lines) and beyond the end zones."

PARKING: Media parking is located near the press tower.

SERVICES: Game programs, flip cards, and statistics are provided at every Furman home game. A meal and drinks will also be served prior to every contest. Post-game interviews will be conducted in separate defined locations outside each team's locker room. Internet connections are available in the press box for users utilizing 802.11B or later wireless technology.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS: The best time to interview players in person is before practice, at approximately 3:10 p.m. Phone interviews will be arranged at the player's convenience, but it is asked that all player interviews (in-person or via-phone) be arranged through Hunter Reid at Timmons Arena (864) 294-2061.

COACHES' INTERVIEWS: The best time to interview coach Lamb or any member of the football coaching staff is between 11:00 a.m. and Noon, Tuesday-Thursday, and between 2:45 p.m. and 3:15 p.m., Monday-Thursday. Please call Diane Miller (864) 294-2120 or Hunter Reid (864) 294-2061 to arrange all interviews.

A member of the Furman athletics staff since 1985, Hunter Reid is now entering his 21st year as sports information director.

As Furman's SID, Reid oversees publicity efforts for the school's 17 intercollegiate sports, with direct responsibility for football and baseball.

Hired by Dick Sheridan as an assistant in 1985, he was named SID in 1986 by athletics director George Bennett and added the title of assistant athletics director in 1989.

Reid graduated from Presbyterian (S.C.) College in 1983 with a degree in history and business administration after

serving as PC's SID for four years. In addition, he served as sports editor of the school's newspaper, The Blue Stocking. A one-year stint at Winthrop (S.C.) University followed before he joined the Furman staff.

Reid, 44, a native of Madison, Ga., is married to the former Jeanne Symmes, also of Madison, and is the father of a son, Alexander Symmes Reid, 23 months. The couple also have two dogs, Saul, a low maintenance Boxer, and Jinx, a Jack Russell Terrier that respects no authority but her own.



HOW TO GET TO FURMAN UNIVERSITY

From Asheville, N.C., and points northwest: Take I-26 to Hendersonville, N.C., then U.S. 25 south. Stay on U.S. 25 business to Furman University exit.

From Charlotte, N.C., and points northeast: Take I-85 to Greenville. Take I-385 to North Pleasantburg Drive (Route 291). Follow 291 six miles north to U.S. 25 business and U.S. 276. Proceed three miles north to Furman University exit.

From Atlanta, Ga., and points southwest: Take I-85 to U.S. 25 (White Horse Road). Proceed 12 miles north to Duncan Chapel Road. Turn right and drive .8 mile to campus gate on your left. From Columbia, S.C., and points southeast. Take 1-26 to 1-385. Take North Plesantburg Drive (Route 291) six miles north to U.S. 25 business and U.S. 276. Proceed three miles north to Furman University exit.

In addition all home game broadcasts will be available inside Paladin Stadium via transmitter at 105.9 FM.

Chuck Hussion, the "Voice of the Furman Paladins" and the director of athletic sales and promotions, is back for his 13th season. Hussion has been honored three times as Georgia's Sportscaster of the Year while at WCNN radio and WSB radio in

In addition to his work at Furman, Hussion's experience includes radio play-by-play announcer of Georgia Tech baseball, basketball, and football and University of Georgia basketball and baseball. He has also delivered play-by-play for numerous regional collegiate baseball telecasts, including the Southeastern Conference Baseball Tournament in Hoover, Ala., for Comcast/ Charter Sports Southeast (CSS).

A native of Grafton, W. Va., Hussion earned a bachelor's degree in political science from West Virginia University and in December of 2005 was awarded a master of science degree in integrated marketing communications from WVU.

Joining him with color commentary this year will be Gordon Higgins, who for the past 12 seasons has served as sidelines analyst on the network. Higgins is an award winning sports broadcaster who lives in Talmo, Georgia. He currently serves as director of community relations and athletics for the Hall County School System in Gainesville, Ga. He is also a former high school football coach in Decatur and Gainesville Ga.

All-America and three time All-Southern Conference offensive lineman Corey Stewart begins his first season as sidelines analyst for the network. Stewart is a 2006 Furman graduate and works in the Atlanta area. He started 33 games for the Paladins in his four-year career.

For the 13th consecutive year Furman baseball coach Ron

Smith will serve as the Chick Fil A Cherrydale Point Paladin Tailgate Show co-host along with newcomer Dwight Covington outside Paladin Stadium. Nine-year Furman broadcast team veteran Dave Cohen and former Furman offensive lineman Ed Patterson will handle pre-game festivities at Chick Fil A Cherrydale Point. Cohen also handles the Lowes Home Warehouse halftime and post game highlights shows.

Also returning are spotters Clint Hill, who begins his third season as part of the Furman broadcast team and former Furman basketballer Julius Van De Laar, who this summer served a television internship with local station WSPA, Channel 7.

he 2005-06 athletic year proved to be another solid campaign for Furman's 17-sport intercollegiate athletics program as Paladin teams won four Southern Conference championships and secured four NCAA Tournament bids. In addition, Paladin student athletes compiled an impressive share of individual accomplishments, thereby adding to the school's national distinction for athletic and academic excellence.

Furman claimed SoCon regular season championships in men's and women's tennis and also added tournament crowns in both sports. In addition, football and women's golf earned NCAA atlarge tournament bids.

All told, three Furman student-athletes earned All-America honors and two landed SoCon Tournament Most Valuable Player accolades. Furman also produced one player and coach-of-theyear, and Paladin student-athletes captured two of the seven post-graduate scholarships awarded by the SoCon for 2005-06.

The year's highlights include...

FOOTBALL


The Furman Paladins kicked off the 2005-06 athletic year in impressive fashion by posting an 11-3 record, NCAA I-AA playoff appearance, and No. 3 final national ranking.

The Paladins opened the season in dramatic fashion by edging Jacksonville State, 37-35, on the game's final play. After seeing its seven-game series winning streak snapped the following week at Western Carolina, Furman bounced back by winning six straight, including a 44-41 double overtime decision over Hofstra and a 34-31 victory over Appalachian State in Greenville. Furman also knocked off arch-rival The Citadel, 39-31, in triple overtime in Charleston for its sixth win in the last seven games against the Bulldogs.

Two weeks later Furman saw its winning streak snapped with a 27-24 loss at Georgia Southern, but the Paladins rebounded by closing the Southern Conference season with a pair of impressive wins, including a 34-31 triumph over Wofford and 56-35 rout at

Furman edged a game Nicholls State squad 14-12 in NCAA I-AA first round playoff action at Paladin Stadium and then hit the road for a quarterfinal round clash at Richmond, where the Paladins closed out the Spiders, 24-20, with a dramatic defensive stand on the game's final possession. The next week Furman saw its season end with a 29-23 setback against Appalachian State in Boone, N.C.

Keying Furman's success was senior quarterback Ingle Martin,

who broke his own school single season passing record with 2,959 yards and 20 touchdowns while directing the most productive offensive in school history (470.0 ypg). Martin also led the Southern Conference in punting, averaging 43.2 yards per attempt.

The Paladins' outstanding campaign generated a number of individual honors, including 13 All-SoCon selections. On the national scene three Paladins - Martin, center Corey Stewart, and offensive guard Patrick Covington - landed All-America citations, and fullback Jerome Felton was named to the I-AA.org national all-star team.

In May, the Green Bay Packers selected Martin, Furman's 2005-06 Male Athlete-of-the-Year, in the fifth round of the National Football League Draft.

WOMEN'S SOCCER

Under the direction of first year head coach Andrew Burr, Furman's women soccer team produced another in a long line of successful seasons, going 14-6-2 overall and 7-1-2 in Southern Conference action, good for a second place regular season finish.

The Lady Paladins' shook off a 2-4 start by winning 12 of their final 16 matches, including a 1-0 decision over nationally 10thranked Ohio State and dramatic 4-3 double overtime triumph over UNC Greensboro that saw Furman overcome a 3-0 deficit. Down the stretch the Lady Paladins notched eight shutouts in their final 11 matches before falling in the tournament championship match.

Furman was paced by midfielder Andre'a Morrision, who scored 15 goals and added four assists. A two-time All-SoCon and league all-tournament selection, the former 2003 league player-of-theyear honoree rounded out a stellar career by capturing a prestigious SoCon Renaissance Agencies Post-Graduate Scholarship, as well as Furman's Edna Hartness Female Athlete-of-the-Year honor for 2005-06. The Kernersville, N.C., product graduated in June with a 3.50 grade point average in health and exercise science.

Goal keeper teammate Andie Hinshaw from Raleigh, N.C., took home a SoCon Post-Graduate Scholarship sponsored by Sony Corporation before graduating with a 3.80 grade point average in Spanish and political science.

The Lady Paladins' impressive classroom credentials also included the work turned in by defender Erin Sanders, who captured Furman's Elizabeth Blackwell Academic Achievement Award. The Charlotte, N.C., native and health and exercise science major recorded a 3.86 GPA during her Furman tenure.

WOMEN'S TENNIS

Furman's Lady Paladin tennis team continued its dominating run this decade by going 19-7, winning the program's eighth consecutive SoCon championship (and 14th overall), and earning its seventh NCAA Tournament berth in eight years.

After starting the season 2-5, the Lady Paladin netters reeled off 17 wins in their final 19 matches, including 12 straight during one run before falling to Kentucky in NCAA Tournament play. The 2006 season also featured nine consecutive decisions over SoCon foes — including six shutouts — to extend the program's league regular season match winning streak to 70. The dominant run through league competition was further underscored by the fact that the Lady Paladins dropped only four of the 63 individual matches contested during the regular season.

Leading the way for Furman was freshman Laura Gioia, a Tampa, Fla., product who posted a 13-10 record at No. 1 singles en route to capturing SoCon Freshman-of-the-Year honors. Junior Bonnie Baird from Raleigh, N.C., racked up the team's best singles record by going 18-4 at No. 5 singles and earning league tournament MVP accolades. Overall the Lady Paladins dominated the allconference team with three of the six singles selections and two of the three all-conference doubles teams.


Debbie Southern was named SoCon Coach-of-the-Year for the fourth consecutive year and ninth time in her career, and also shared Furman's J. Lyles Alley Coach-of-the-Year honor.

MEN'S TENNIS

Furman's men's tennis team fashioned an outstanding 2006 campaign, going 20-11, winning its seventh Southern Conference regular season title and 12th league tournament championship, and making its second NCAA Tournament appearance.

Playing its usual rugged non-conference schedule against the likes of Florida, Alabama, Florida State, Georgia Tech, Georgia, Tennessee, and Wake Forest, Furman started the campaign 1-6 before rallying to go 19-5 over the final 24 matches, including 13-1 during one stretch before falling at nationally top-ranked Georgia in NCAA Tournament action.

Furman posted an 8-1 regular season record against league

foes and clipped Appalachian State (4-0), College of Charleston (4-1) and Chattanooga (4-2) to capture SoCon Tournament title in Charleston, S.C.

Freshman Andy Juc from Moldova, Russia, paced the Paladin attack at No. 2 singles, going 18-10 and earning SoCon Tournament MVP honors. Overland, Mo., senior and No. 1 singles performer Ben Pauluhn, meanwhile, received the league's Buddy Hartsell/Don Bunch Sportsmanship Award.

Veteran head coach Paul Scarpa was named co-recipient of Furman's J. Lyles Alley Coach-of-the-Year honor.

BASEBALL

Furman's baseball team authored another chapter of success in 2006 by posting a 32-23 overall record and 16-11 Southern Conference third place regular season finish. The 32 wins matched the most victories in school history, and the Paladins' third place finish flew in the face of a consensus preseason No. 7 pick by league coaches and sports information directors.

Season highlights included a 5-4 win over ACC regular season/ tournament champion and College World Series participant Clemson, a pair of victories over Coastal Carolina, Penn State, and Miami of Ohio, a 5-4 decision over West Virginia, and series wins over arch-rival The Citadel, Georgia Southern, and Western Carolina. In addition, on May 16 Furman played South Carolina at Greenville's new West End Field in front of 6,155 fans largest crowd to ever witness a Paladin baseball contest.


Fueling Furman's success was a record setting offense that

featured a school season record .324 batting average. Led by senior shortstop and SoCon Player-of-the-Year A.J. Davidiuk (.362 , 11 HR, 48 RBI), and senior first baseman Case Cassedy, (.366, 7 HR, 58 RBI), Furman banged out a program record 52 home runs and scored 410 runs, also a new school standard. Cassedy, who cracked a Furman record 23 doubles, was named national hitter-of-theweek after hitting for the cycle in a 17-11 romp over Appalachian State and delivering the game winning hit versus Clemson.

Following the season Davidiuk was selected by the San Diego Padres in the 29th round of the MLB Draft, and senior left-handed pitcher Ryan Hodinka, who posted a staff leading 9-2 record in 2006, signed a free agent contract with the St. Louis Cardinals.

urman University, long noted for its consistent combination of athletic and academic excellence, boasts an impressive number of former student-athletes now in professional sports. In fact, Furman currently counts 33 products competing at the professional level — the most of any Southern Conference member school.

From the National Football League (NFL), to the Ladies Professional Golf Association (LPGA) Tour, to Major League Soccer (MLS), to the Professional Golf Association (PGA) Tour, former Furman student-athletes have distinguished themselves and their alma mater.

Furman's NFL connection consists of linebacker Orlando Ruff '99, recently of the Cleveland Browns, wide receivers Isaac West '05 of the Pittsburgh Steelers and Brian Bratton '05 of the Baltimore Ravens, free safety Cam Newton '05 of the Atlanta Falcons, and quarterback Ingle Martin '06, a recent fifth round draft selection of the Green Bay Packers.

Furman's representatives on the PGA Tour include Brad Faxon '83, who as a senior captured the Fred Haskins Award as the nation's top collegiate golfer, and Matt Davidson '04. Winner of nine professional tournaments and more than \$8 million in career earnings, Faxon has twice represented the United States in Ryder Cup competi-

Few collegiate women's golf programs have produced more outstanding professionals than Furman, which boasts 10 former Lady Paladins on the LPGA Tour, including Hall-of-Famers Betsy King '77 (1995 inductee) and Beth Daniel '78 (1999 inductee). From 1989-94, King, Daniel, and former Tour star Dottie Pepper '87 combined to capture Rolex LPGA Player-of-the-Year honors five times — a span of dominance rarely equaled by alumni of any college or university in all of professional sport — and in an eight-year stretch from 1987-94, the trio took home the LPGA's Vare Trophy (lowest stroke average) six times. All told, Furman graduates, have earned 19 Solheim Cup invitations and claimed 90 tournament titles over the years, including 10 major


championships.



wner of a 21-6 record the last two seasons and the fifth best mark (56-21) in NCAA I-AA this decade, the Furman Paladins will attempt to extend the program's excellence this fall. With 42 lettermen and 14 starters returning off last year's 11-3 squad that literally came within a step of advancing to the national championship game, Furman will look to use the program's recent success as a catalyst for the 2006 campaign.

"Despite the disappointment in the way our season ended last year, there's a lot of confidence in our program right now based on the what we've accomplished the last two seasons," says head coach Bobby Lamb, who enters his fifth campaign as coach of the Paladin program. "That confidence was evident in spring practice because it was apparent we are better at several positions than we were at the end of last season. Based on that, I think we have a chance to have another successful year."

Among the Paladins' 14 returning starters are eight defensive regulars, plus two experienced offensive linemen, the squad's two top wide receivers, and what many believe is the premier fullback in NCAA I-AA.

Furman's graduation losses, however, were significant in quality and include record setting quarter-

back/punter Ingle Martin, a fifth round draft selection of the Green Bay Packers, a trio of threeyear starters in the offensive line, including All-American guard Patrick Covington and center Corey Stewart, and All-Southern Conference tight end John Rust. In addition, the Paladins graduated a pair of veteran tailbacks in Brandon Mays and Daric Carter, plus All-America linebacker William

Despite the losses and some needed work in taking care of the football and forcing turnovers after ranking 100th in NCAA I-AA in turnover margin (18 gained, 28 lost) a year ago, it appears Furman, which finished the 2005 campaign ranked No.3 nationally and has made six trips to the playoffs in the last seven years, again has the potential to be a force in NCAA I-AA this fall.

DEFENSE

2005 was not a great year for Furman's defense. In fact, according to Lamb, the success the team fashioned a year ago, highlighted by a 34-31 regular season triumph over eventual national champion Appalachian State, was achieved despite less-than-stellar defensive play — an assertion underscored by the fact that the Paladins slipped in every conference defensive statistical ranking following a stellar, senior laden 2004 campaign. Those struggles, it is hoped, will be history this fall due to the return of eight starters and a reinvigorated defensive front under new direction.

"We were very average — at best — on defense last year," says Lamb. "That fact provided us with a lot of motivation in spring practice because everybody saw how poor we were and how much better we need to be. It raised the competition level at virtually every position. From a defensive standpoint, right now we're way ahead of where we were at this point last year, and we're deeper at virtually every position on that side of the football."

DEFENSIVE LINE

Furman returns nine lettermen and all four starters along its defensive front, and that's good news for an area that may hold the biggest key to the team's improvement this fall. In addition, several young players and a transfer appear poised to make an impact and provide much needed depth.

Headlining the list of returning starters will be end Roy Ravenell (6-2, 255, Sr.), who is looking to return to the form he displayed in 2004 when he racked up six and a half sacks en route to capturing All-America honors. Furman's most experienced defensive player with 30 career starts, he notched 71 tackles and a pair of quarterback takedowns last year on a unit that managed just 15

Set to join Ravenell at the other end slot will be Wallace Artis (6-4, 267, Jr.), who started the first four games at defensive tackle in 2005 before making the switch to end, where he displayed steady improvement and potential as a pass rusher as evidenced by his team leading four sacks. He finished the campaign with 60 tackles, including 10 tackles-for-loss.

The interior of the Paladin defensive front will be anchored by nose guard Wesley Bray (6-2, 278, Sr.), Furman's strongest player (555-pound squat, 475-pound bench press, and 346-pound hang clean) who is entering his third season of starting duty after registering 44 tackles a year ago.

The aforementioned increased competition for playing time on defense is probably best reflected by the fact that Jeff Fambrough (6-0, 273, Sr.), a starter at tackle in the final nine games last year, will likely serve as a backup nose guard this fall. Fambrough's move should clear the way for a trio of highly regarded second year players to emerge, including Ricky Jones (6-3, 264, So.), Justin Brown (5-11, 280, R-Fr.), and Corey Ray (6-1, 280, R-Fr.) — all of whom turned in solid spring practices. Brown, in particular, could be a difference maker this fall according to first year defensive line coach Roberto Pinilla.

Experienced depth was in short supply at defensive end in 2005, but that shouldn't be a problem this season as the two positions now boast five players with quality experience. Gaines Burnett (6-1, 245, So.), a strong, versatile young performer with good speed, will provide backup duty to Ravenell and Artis after racking up 23 stops, including four-for-loss, as a true freshman last year. Also expected to push for playing time behind Ravenell will be Jay Jay Mars (6-1, 244, 50.), who sports big play ability, and Paul White (6-2, 232, So.), who earned starts in the Paladins first four games a year ago.


The Paladin defensive front should also benefit from the addition of transfer nose guard Sam Wilson (6-2, 285, Tr.-Fr.), who joined the program in June following one season at Southern Mississippi.

LINEBACKERS

The graduation of two-time All-America and 2004 Defensive Player-of-the-Year linebacker William Freeman is Furman's biggest loss on defense, but one that should be overcome by the return of six lettermen and two starters, including an all-conference performer.

Gary Nelson (6-1, 218, Jr.) returns at strong side linebacker after tallying 76 tackles in 13 starts a year ago. The owner of 18 career starts, he will be backed up by highly regarded Philip Morris (6-1, 234, R-Fr.).

2005 All-SoCon selection Andrew Jones (5-11, 232, Jr.), is back to man the middle linebacking post after racking up 129 stops, 13 tackles-for-loss, and three and a half sacks in his first season as a starter. A hard-nosed, durable playmaker, his presence will be a major plus for the Paladin defense this fall.

Expected to take over for Freeman at weak side linebacker will be Brandon Williams (6-1, 236, So.) and Clifton Dortch (6-1, 218, Jr.). Williams, Furman's 2005 Freshman-of-the-Year, is coming off a 50-tackle campaign a year ago, and Dortch is a two-year letterman with quality experience. Another promising young linebacking prospect is Hunter Twitty (6-0, 221, 50.).

SECONDARY

Furman's secondary appears to be poised for improvement despite the loss of a pair of regulars. The optimism is based on the fact that the Paladins return an all-conference player at

cornerback, a two-year starter at strong safety, and another veteran who sports noteworthy experience, including some starting duty.



In 2005 Holmes began the season in a backup role but quickly supplanted a senior on the way to earning 12 starts and racking up 56 tackles along with a team high four interceptions and 11 pass deflections. His backup will be John Castleberry (6-1, 190, R-Fr.).

The graduation of Maurice Duncan at right cornerback has paved the way for William Middleton (5-10, 190, So.) to move into the starting lineup. He should be pushed for action by Masharn Austin (5-8, 172, So.), who used an impressive spring practice to elevate his bid for action after sitting out the entire 2005 campaign with a torn anterior cruciate ligament.

The safety positions will be manned by a pair of veterans. Andrew Thacker (6-1, 198, Jr.), the Paladins' most experienced defensive back with 22 career starts, will move from free safety to strong safety to make room for Jeremy Blocker (6-0, 187, Sr.), a three-year letterman with three career starts. Thacker, who two years ago was named SoCon Freshman-of-the-Year, was credited with 66 tackles while Blocker registered 56 stops and a pair of interceptions a year ago.

Rico Scott (5-11, 206, Jr.) and Thomas Twitty (5-11, 204, So.) are expected to provide backup duty at safety.

OFFENSE

With quarterback Ingle Martin at the helm and operating behind one of the best offensive lines to ever wear the purple and white, Furman averaged a school season record and Southern Conference leading 470.0 yards per game a year ago featuring some of the most balanced offensive numbers in program history.

With only five offensive starters returning, Furman, according to Lamb, may be hard pressed to match last year's stellar production, but it might be unwise to assume the Paladins will suffer too much of an offensive dropoff, especially when considering Furman welcomes back its two starting wide receivers, two regulars along its offensive front, and one of the nation's premier fullbacks.

"We lost a number of outstanding players on offense, including Ingle Martin, Patrick Covington, Corey Stewart, and John Rust," said Lamb. "That amount of experience is difficult to replace, but we have a nice corps of returnees who played key roles in our success the last two years. We'll look to build on that."

OFFENSIVE LINE

Furman's offensive line returns two starters and eight lettermen. Gone are both guards, including All-America right guard Patrick Covington and all-conference left guard Brian Laggis, and All-America center Corey Stewart, who graduated with 105 career starts and over 7,000 snaps among them. Given those departures, clearly one of the biggest rebuilding jobs in the program this fall will be along the interior offensive line, but the last two decades have shown veteran assistant coach Clay Hendrix to be a master developer of talent — an assertion underscored by Furman's seven All-America offensive linemen selections this decade.

"We are in search of a center and two guards, and we feel we made progress there in the spring, but it's very difficult to replace the amount of experience we lost at those positions," said Lamb.

Headlining the list of returnees along the offensive line is right tackle John Kivett (6-3, 278, Sr.), one of the unit's most athletic players who garnered first team All-SoCon honors a year ago after earning starts in 13 of the Paladins' 14 games. Expected to provide backup duty will be Andrew Thornburg (6-3, 280, Sr.), a versatile three-year letterman who has nearly 600 career

snaps, but who has battled injuries for much of his career. Last year he started in three games before being sidelined with an injured shoulder.

At left tackle Joel Bell (6-7, 305, So.) will move into the starting lineup after 2005 regular Scott Shuford (6-3, 285, Jr.) made the switch to left guard in the spring. Bell, who possesses a tremendous upside and who is blessed with excellent size and leverage, captured SoCon Freshman-of-the-Week honors after making the first start of his career at right tackle (for a sidelined John Kivett) in the Paladins' 44-41 double overtime win over Hofstra a year ago. Expected to work as his backup will be Thomas Slaughter (6-4, 275, So.).

Shuford's move to left guard will add 14 games of starting experience to the interior line. His backup will be Tyler Haynes (6-2, 300, R-Fr.), one of the Paladins' highly regarded line prospects.

The center position could be manned by either two-year letterman Reggie Goolsby (6-1, 282, Jr.), a physically strong performer and one of the unit's best technicians, or David Menocal (6-2, 275, So.), who earned his first career start a year ago in the win over Sanford. It will be Menocal if Goolsby, owner of 206 career snaps, ends up starting at right guard. Should Goolsby remain at center, three-year letterman Adi Filipovic (6-2, 276, Gr.) could be the top candidate to start at right guard, with Heath Cockburn (6-2, 292, R-Fr.) set to provide backup.

TIGHT END

Furman tight ends have garnered All-SoCon honors every year since 1999, and last year the Paladins sported one of the best in John Rust, who racked up 33 catches for 455 yards and three touchdowns.

The loss of Rust to graduation has left Furman with one of its biggest positional challenges, especially from a receiving production standpoint, but notable experience is present in his likely replacement, Brad Bell (6-2, 238, Sr.). A physical, three-year letterman, Bell has only eight career receptions, but his blocking ability may actually prove to be more vital this year with the Paladins' expected increased emphasis on a more traditional option style attack.

He will be backed up by a pair of promising second year players, Chris Truss (6-4, 245, R-Fr.) and Larry Hedden (6-5, 243, R-Fr.).

WIDE RECEIVERS


Furman's wide receiving corps produced solid numbers in 2005, especially when compared to 2004, when its two starters, Isaac West and Brian Bratton, turned in gaudy numbers en route to finishing as the school's No. 1 and No. 2 all-time leading receivers. With both starters back this season, the Paladins wideout should be a source of strength and improvement in the offense according to Lamb.

"We were pretty good at wide receiver a year ago but no where near as explosive as we were in 2004," said Lamb. "With Justin Stepp and Patrick Sprague coming back along with Ryan McKie and a couple of young guys like Keiron Williams and R.J. Webb, we will have a nice blend of experience and improved big play potential. I think we can generate a lot of excitement in the passing game this year."

Flanker Justin Stepp (5-11, 188, Sr.) earned all-conference honors after registering 46

receptions for 676 yards and a league leading eight touchdown catches a year ago, including a game winning 8-yard reception on the final play of a 37-35 season opening victory over Jacksonville State. Heady and consistent, he caught a career high 11 passes for 143 yards in a 24-20 NCAA I-AA quarterfinal playoff game win at Richmond and is poised for a campaign that could see him finish ranked among the program's alltime leaders by season's end.

Atsplitend Patrick Sprague (6-1, 191, Jr.) returns after catching 26 passes for 347 yards and three scores in 2005, including a game winning 6-yard touchdown grab with 31 seconds left in a 34-31 regular season win over Appalachian State. He also had a clutch 22-yard reception to set up a touchdown in the first overtime period in an eventual 39-31 triple overtime win at The Citadel.

Ryan McKie (6-0, 185, Jr.), who caught seven passes for 176 yards a year ago, heads into the preseason as Stepp's backup, and Garrett Inman (6-4, 203, Jr.) will compete for action at split

Two second year players blessed with tremendous speed and athleticism who could make significant splash this year include R.J. Webb (6-3, 205, R-Fr.) and Keiron Williams (5-11, 178, R-Fr.).

QUARTERBACK

Undoubtedly the biggest concern surrounding Furman's football team this year is the quarterback position following the graduation of Ingle Martin, one of the nation's best signal callers the last two years. In 2005 he threw for a school record 2,959 yards and 20 touchdowns and in just two years set new school career passing yardage (5,751 yards) and total offense (6,277 yards) standards.

In addition to his statistical exploits, Martin displayed big play ability and strong leadership — two qualities important to any team and whose impact is not lost on Lamb, a former standout Paladin quarterback in the 1980s.

"Ingle could not only make plays that were designed but could also make plays that weren't designed by scrambling out of the pocket. Our pass-run ratio the last two years was due in large part to his abilities, and his leadership was a big factor in our success. That said, we are very excited about Renaldo Gray (6-0, 230, Jr.) and what he gives us. He is a big, strong quarterback with a very strong arm. He is also a good runner, and we will try to take advantage of that part of his game in a more traditional Furman style, option offense. I think we will be fine offensively."

Gray served as Martin's backup a year ago but took full advantage of his limited playing time, most pointedly with a brilliant second half performance against The Citadel. With Furman trailing

the Bulldogs 21-7 after three quarters and Martin forced to sideline with leg cramps, Gray stepped in to engineer the Paladins on a pair of fourth quarter touchdown drives, including a 30-yard scoring strike to make it 21-14 and later an 11-play, 64-yard drive that netted the game tying score with just 48 seconds left in regulation. He scored the go-ahead touchdown on a 1-yard plunge in the first overtime and directed Furman to the game winning score in the third overtime to complete the 39-31 victory.

"Á lot of questions about Renaldo were answered in the Citadel game and the performance he delivered in that victory," added Lamb. "Everybody on our team knew he could run our offense because he performs like that every day in practice."

Backup quarterback duties will be handled by Arthur Williams (6-1, 195, So.) and Jordan Sorrells (6-1, 205, R-Fr.).

RUNNING BACKS

In production terms, Furman's backfield ranked among the deepest and most prolific in NCAA I-AA a year ago, accounting for 34 touchdowns and much of the team's 246.9 rushing yards per game. That type of production will be hard to top, but the Paladins' plan to return to a more traditional option-style offensive attack this fall is as much an endorsement of the returning backfield personnel as anything, and in terms of overall ability, there is plenty on hand for 2006, though experienced depth will not be a commodity like it was last season.


Headlining the Paladin backfield will be one of the most dominant players in I-AA in fullback Jerome Felton (6-0, 248, Jr.). Recently rated as the best fullback in the country by Matt Dougherty of The Sports Network, Felton followed up a 300-yard, 10-touchdown freshman campaign two years ago by rushing for a team leading and Furman fullback record 940 yards and 18 scores in 2005 en route to capturing all-conference honors. A bruising, powerful runner, underrated receiver, and solid blocker, Felton is a player defenses must account for on every snap and a talent Furman will try to deploy as much as possible.

"We'll turn to Jerome Felton a lot this year and try to get him as many carries as we can," said Lamb." We'll obviously use him at lot at fullback but also as the feature back at times. Our plan is to get him involved in as many plays as we can."

Among his top performances a year ago was a 20-carry, 105-yard outing that included a $multiple\,tackle\,breaking\,31-yard\,touchdown\,run\,against\,Appalachian\,State\,in\,NCAA\,l-AA\,semifinal\,AA\,semifina$ playoff action.

Overshadowed by Felton but set to also see quality playing time at fullback this year is Brantley Kendall (5-10, 227, So.).

In 2005 Furman employed a trio of tailbacks with great success, combining for 2,064 rushing yards and 13 touchdowns. In addition, Paladin tailbacks accounted for 44 receptions for 461 yards and four scores. While the graduation of Brandon Mays and Daric Carter (703 yards, 8TDs, 35 rec., 418 yds., 4TDs), are significant, this year the position will primarily feature the abilities of one back, Cedrick Gipson (5-9, 198, Jr.). A two-year letterman, Gipson was central in the Paladins' tailback production the last two campaigns, rushing for 745 yards and 713 yards, respectively, and 12 touchdowns. An instinctive, quality runner who has averaged a solid 5.9 yards per carry in his career, he

should again flourish in the Furman offense and contend for all-conference honors this fall.

With tailback ranking among the most physically demanding positions on the field, Furman will look to Stephone LaFrance (6-2, 217, R-Fr.) and Mark Standridge (5-9, 197, R-Fr.) to provide depth.

Furman special teams were pretty good in 2005 but improvement will be sought in some


The Paladins welcome back two-time All-SoCon placeckicker **Scott Beckler (6-2, 188, Jr.)**, who last year tallied a school season record 97 points by converting 14-of-24 field goals and 55-of-57 PATs. Beckler's 2005 campaign included a solid start that saw him knock down 12 of his first 16 field goal attempts before a late season slump took some of the shine off a record setting campaign.

Production that will be hard to match will be at punter, where Ingle Martin averaged a SoCon best 43.2 yards per punt en route to capturing All-America honors. Two players likely to compete for the job this fall include Arthur Williams (6-1, 195, So.), who averaged 39.0 yards on three kicks a year ago, and Patrick Sprague (6-1, 183, So.), who has no collegiate punting experience.

The Paladins return snapper **Thomas Slaughter (6-4, 275, So.)** after a flawless inaugural season of work but must find a new holder following the graduation of three-year letterman Brian Stone.

Furman's performance last year on punt and kickoff returns and other specialty teams produced mixed results. **Justin Stepp (5-11, 188, Sr.)** gives the Paladins an experienced punt return man after leading the SoCon with an 8.4 yards per return average in 2005, but Furman will look to improve on last year's kickoff return average of just 19.7 yards per attempt through **William**

Middleton (5-10, 190, So.), who averaged 22.0 yards on 32 returns in his first season of work.
