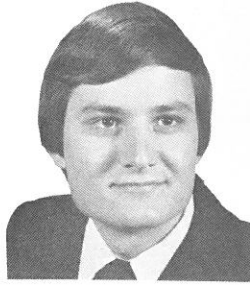

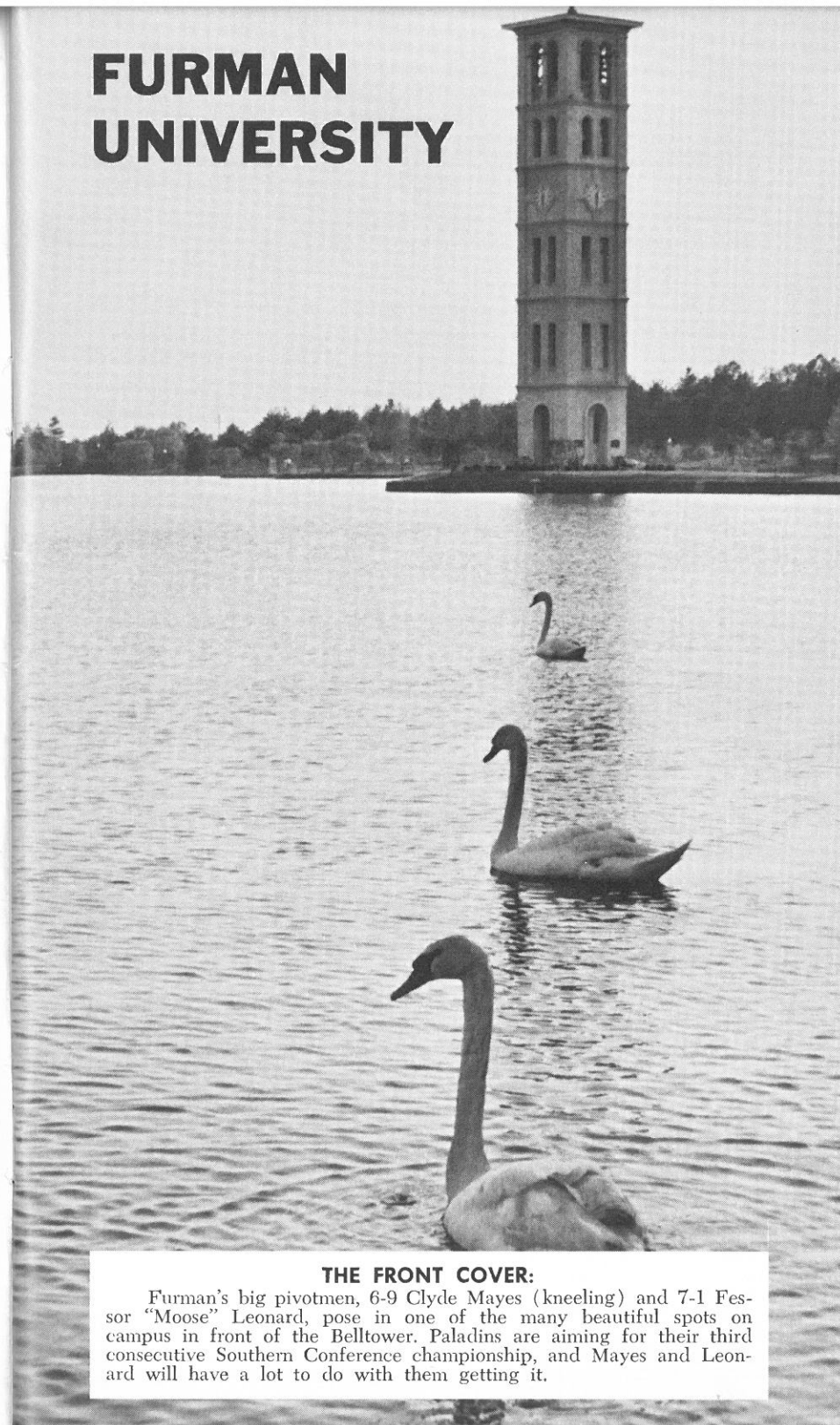

FURMAN FACTS

- Furman University is a private, coeducational college of liberal arts located in Greenville, S. C. Founded in 1826, and located on its present campus in 1958, the University is partially supported by the South Carolina Baptist Convention.
- The University is located on a 750-acre wooded campus six miles north of the city. Campus facilities and activities include a 30-acre lake for swimming, boating, and fishing, an 18-hole golf course, 20 tennis courts, a playhouse for experimental drama, a 2,000 seat auditorium, physical activities center, an athletic building, seven playing fields, a movie series, a lecture series, and a fine arts series.
- Furman offers the Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Music and Bachelor of Science degrees. The graduate division awards the Master of Arts degree with a major in education and the Master of Science degree with a major in chemistry. A Master of Business Education degree is offered jointly by Furman's Department of Business Administration and the Clemson University College of Industrial Management and Textile Science.
- The James B. Duke Library, fully air-conditioned, houses over 215,000 volumes. More than 1,250 periodicals are received regularly and the microfilm and record collections are extensive. New books are now being acquired at the rate of approximately 10,000 per year.
- The faculty, 70 per cent of whom hold earned doctoral degrees, consists of 138 full-time and 9 part-time professors. The student-faculty ratio of 16:1 allows for individual attention and personal relationships.
- Enrollment during the 1974-75 academic year is 2,301, with students from 33 states in the United States and six foreign countries in attendance.
- The Furman University physical plant is valued at over \$29,000,000. Twenty-one major buildings have been completed. Buildings for music and the visual arts will be begun shortly.
- Buildings are reinforced concrete, faced with handmade Virginia brick. The contemporary Williamsburg colonial architecture captures much of the flavor of the Old South, adapted to modern needs and usage.
- The 1973-74 Furman freshman class averaged 1097 on the Scholastic Aptitude Tests.
- Furman is a member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, the Southern University Conference, the Association of American Colleges and the South Carolina Association of Colleges. It is on the approved list of the American Association of University Women and the American Chemical Society, and is a member of the National Association of Schools of Music.
- Students at Furman are eligible to earn college credit by participating in foreign study programs for a term or an academic year. Programs offered include travel to England, Spain, France, Austria, and the Middle East.

DR. GORDON W. BLACKWELL

President, M. A., Ph. D., LL. D., L. H. D.



A Furman graduate, Dr. Gordon W. Blackwell became the university's eighth president on February 1, 1965.

Since becoming President, Dr. Blackwell has led the Furman administration and student body into closer week-to-week dialogue through an open-door policy concerning students and faculty. Students now serve on most administrative and faculty committees as well as on committees of the Board of Trustees and Advisory Council. Academic innovations have resulted in a thoroughly revised curriculum and academic calendar.

Blackwell's teaching career began at Furman, where he served as professor and chairman of the Sociology Department from 1937-41. He was a member of the faculty of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill for a short time before serving two years during World War II as a community organization specialist in the Office of Civilian Defense.

After the war he taught further at Chapel Hill, becoming Kenan Professor, the most prestigious in the University. He was also Director of the Institute for Research in Social Science for 13 years. For two summers he was visiting professor at Columbia University and lectured at Oxford University in England in 1955.

At the time of his election to the Furman presidency, he was president of Florida State University, Tallahassee, where he served for four and one-half years. Prior to assuming this position, he was chancellor of the Women's College of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro for three and one-half years.

Blackwell graduated *summa cum laude* in 1932, and was captain and number one man on the tennis team for three years, editor of the literary magazine, and president of the band. He received the Master of Arts degree from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1933, and the Ph. D. degree from Harvard University in 1940.

Born in Timmonsville, S. C., Dr. Blackwell is married to the former Elizabeth Blair Lyles. Sons, Gordon and Randy, are Furman graduates and were Furman varsity basketball players. The Blackwells also have two daughters, Blair (Mrs. Charles Cooper) and Millie (Mrs. W. D. Yarborough).

J. LYLES ALLEY, M. A.

Director of Athletics



One of the foremost figures in Furman Athletic history, J. Lyles Alley is in his 17th year as the Paladins' Director of Athletics. However, his role in the Furman University athletic program reaches back over a period of nearly 30 years as an athlete, coach, and administrator.

As a student, Alley lettered in basketball, football, baseball, and track, and was named Furman's most valuable football player in 1932 when the Paladins rolled to an 8-1 mark. Altogether, Alley won 12 letters before graduating in 1933.

After a 12-year separation, the Spartanburg, S. C., native returned to Furman in 1945 to assume the position of head basketball coach and within 10 years Furman University had become a familiar name throughout the nation. Under his guidance, Furman produced its first two All-Americans, Frank Selvy in 1954 and Darrell Floyd in 1956.

His teams were national scoring champions, 1953-56, setting records each time, and his 1951-52 team was voted the nation's most improved. His 1952-53 team still holds the record for most victories by a Furman team with 21 triumphs.

In 1957, Alley assumed the duties of athletic director as well as basketball coach, and continued the dual position nine years before relinquishing his coaching position in order to devote fulltime to his duties as Director of Athletics.

In recognition of his many contributions to Furman and the State of South Carolina, Alley has been honored with membership in the state's Athletic Hall of Fame. However, all of his contributions are not in the past. Under Alley's leadership, Furman is currently enjoying new peaks in athletic morale and looks to go higher.

JOHN WEST, M. ED.
Associate Director of Athletics



In only two years John West has established himself as one of the nation's most capable young administrators. Through his promotional efforts, Furman football attendance has reached an all-time high during the past couple of seasons.

Before concentrating his efforts on the administrative end of athletics, West was one of the nation's most successful track coaches at Furman and the University of South Carolina.

The Memphis, Tenn. native coached the Paladin track teams to unprecedented heights during the mid-sixties before going to the University of South Carolina in 1968. His 1971 team at South Carolina had the first undefeated dual season in the history of the University with a perfect 6-0 record including a victory in the prestigious Penn Relays.

West attended Louisiana State University and graduated from East Texas State University, where he was one of the nation's fastest sprinters with a 9.4 clocking in the 100-yard dash.

A much sought after banquet speaker and member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, West holds a Master's degree from Memphis State University and coached at Fraysure High School (Memphis) and Union University (Jackson, Tenn.) before coming to Furman.

West married the former Charlotte Dickerson of Greenville, Tex., and they have three children, DeAnn, 14, John, 12, and Elizabeth, 10.

DR. FRANCIS W. BONNER, M. A., PH. D.

Vice President and Provost
Faculty Chairman of Athletics



One of the most respected men in the Southern Conference, Dr. Bonner was elected President of the Conference last January. He has served as Faculty Chairman of Athletics since January of 1968. Dr. Bonner came to Furman as an associate professor of English in 1949, and was named Dean of the University in 1961. Two years later he was named Vice President of the University. He has been a member of Furman's Faculty Committee on Athletics since 1953 and is one of the most loyal Paladin sports fans.

A native of Lanett, Ala., Dr. Bonner received his B. A. and M. A. degrees from the University of Alabama and his Ph. D. from the University of North Carolina.

Prior to coming to Furman, Dr. Bonner taught at the University of Alabama, was head of the English department of the Marietta, Ga., High School, and was a graduate instructor at North Carolina.

"WE WANT THREE"

1974-75 OUTLOOK

The cry around the Furman campus seems to be for a third straight Southern Conference Championship. The Paladins have already won three titles in Coach Joe Williams' first four years. Two of them have come in the last two seasons.

The feeling is that Furman could have a better basketball team than last year but not necessarily end up with a better record. It would be hard enough to top last year's 22-9 anyway, but when you spice 1974-75 with the kind of schedule the Paladins have, wins may be harder to come by.

The Paladins are coming off of their biggest victory season ever (22) and a berth in the Eastern Regionals. Three starters are back to continue the task, including big post men Clyde Mayes and Fessor Leonard. Craig Lynch at wing helps form a front line that would be hard for anyone to top.

Both 6-9 Mayes and 7-1 Leonard blossomed last year as bonafide All-America candidates and, as seniors, should receive their due this season. Both are two-time All Southern Conference players.

Mayes would have to be considered the foundation of the squad, as he was selected both Southern Conference and South Carolina Player of the Year in 1974. Nicknamed "Marvelous" by Furman fans and teammates, he averaged 17.3 scoring and 13.0 rebounds a game last year.

Leonard is a finesse player — smooth around the basket and also effective with the 20-foot jumper. He combines a feather-soft touch with great strength and is the owner of a 52 per cent career field goal shooting accuracy. "Moose" returns with a 15.3 per game scoring average and 7.7 in rebounds.

"Both players are also great intimidators on defense," says Williams. "Having them in the middle enables us to play an effective pressure defense. Moose has worked with the weights since last season and his jumping ability has improved. Clyde is unquestionably one of the great players in the country."

The 6'6" Lynch will take the wing spot. He started 28 of the 31 games last year and had a 9.8 scoring average, chipping in with 5.4 rebounds a game.

There is a great deal of competition at the point, where Ed Kelley graduated. Two outstanding newcomers, 5'10" Steve Green and 5'10" Ronnie Smith, are the top candidates, but Green will probably get the starting nod.

Williams also lists the "second guard" slot, vacated by Bruce Grimm who transferred to Providence, as a highly competitive position. Two-year letterman Michael Hall, a senior, is the pre-season favorite after playing in 25 games last year. His primary asset is his defensive play, but he is also a good enough shooter.

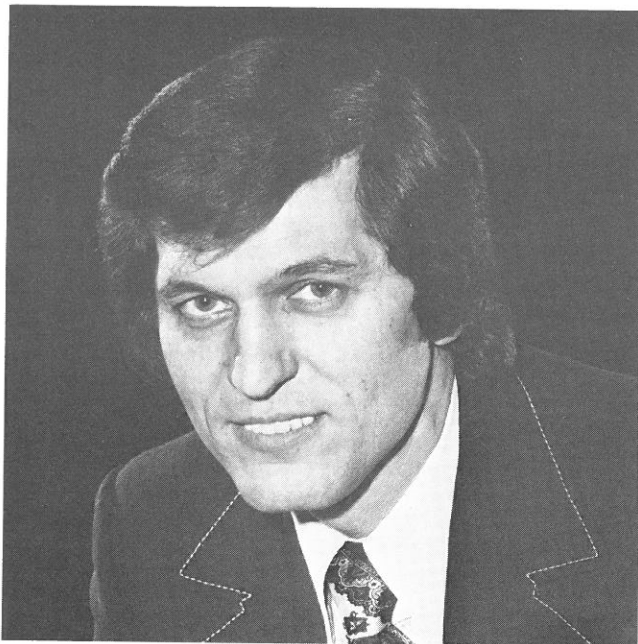
Another senior, Baron Hill, will also play a great deal here and swing to the point, too. Sophomore John Cottingham, a good ball-handler and passer, will probably play more after seeing limited duty last year. Jim Powers, a high school teammate of Smith, is an outstanding shooter who will play.

Jeff Deal, a 6'7" transfer from Anderson Junior College, will play a back-up role at post behind Mayes and Leonard, as will 6'7" Bill Prevost. Freshman Bill Williams, 6'6", will back Lynch at wing. Carmegys Murray, a non-letterman junior, will sub at the point.

"We'll miss Grimm early in the season," said Williams of his guard who had a 14.4 scoring average before transferring. "But we hope to make up for the loss with a more team-oriented offense and a more consistent pressure defense.

"I think we do have a few question marks. We have a tough schedule, and we have to fit a few pieces together. But by tournament time we will be tested and should have a good club."

HEAD COACH JOE WILLIAMS, M.A.



On a March day in 1970, Dr. Gordon Blackwell, president of Furman University, made a statement: "We are not expecting miracles," he said. "We are confident that our basketball program will be further strengthened." The occasion was the coming of Joe L. Williams, creator of a basketball power at Jacksonville University, to Furman.

While it is true that no deity has reigned over basketball fortunes during the four years since the pronouncement, folks would agree that a criteria for greatness has been achieved by Joe Williams, head coach. The proof follows . . .

ITEM: In only four years, Williams has become Furman's second-winningest head coach at 74-41, and the Paladins' most successful tournament coach ever. Prior to his arrival, Furman had never won a Southern Conference championship, but now it has three.

ITEM: Last year's 22-9 record represented the most wins ever for a Furman team and Williams saw his team go to the Eastern Regionals for the third time in four years.

ITEM: Williams has gone seven consecutive seasons without fielding a loser, stretching back to his Jacksonville days. In his nine-year head coaching career, he has been associated with a losing team just once and that was the first season that his Jacksonville team entered the NCAA university division.

ITEM: Williams has won 62 per cent of his games in collegiate head coaching while compiling an impressive 166-101 lifetime record. In the last five years, his record has been 103-43 for a 70 per cent victory rate.

In his unique, soft-spoken manner, Joe Williams has made a habit of transforming sputtering basketball programs into national powers and has done it quickly. First came the Jacksonville Miracle, where Williams turned

the Dolphins from small-college also-rans into a team that would meet UCLA for the national championship in 1970. Only six years before the 1969-70 record of 27-2, Jacksonville had barely managed a winning season against NAIA competition.

Following his stunning year (1970) with the Dolphins, Williams again surprised the basketball world with the announcement that he was leaving Jacksonville to return to Furman, where he had served as an assistant coach during the 1963-64 season. "I had always wanted to return to Furman," said Williams. "It is a unique school and I felt that I could make Furman a winner."

In his very first year, Williams made good on his promise, as he guided the Paladins to a 15-12 record and to their first Southern Conference Championship. What has happened since? Well, each year Furman basketball has improved still: 17-11, 20-9, and finally 22-9.

An overtime upset by East Carolina in 1972 prevented Furman from taking the league title in Williams' second year, but that bad memory has been erased now, what with conference championships in each of the past two seasons. In 1972-73, Williams was tabbed Southern Conference Coach of the Year.

A native of Morton, Miss., Williams graduated from Durant High School (Oklahoma) in 1952. He entered Southern Methodist University the next fall and played freshman football and basketball for the Mustangs. He then transferred to Oklahoma City before returning to SMU, where he obtained his Bachelor of Arts Degree in 1956.

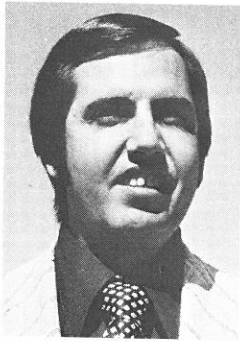
After an army hitch, Williams entered Tulane University and did graduate work in English. He received his masters degree from Florida State in 1968.

Williams began his coaching career at Terry Parker Junior High School in Jacksonville in 1960 and a year later went to Ribault High. The following season (1962-63) he guided the Florida State freshmen to an 11-7 mark in his first attempt at college coaching. The next season he joined the Furman staff as an assistant to head coach Lyles Alley, where he remained for one year before moving on to the head job at Jacksonville in 1964. His record with the Dolphins was 92-60.

Williams is married to the former Dale Mahoney of Jacksonville, and they have two sons: Joey, 9, and Patrick, 7.

BOB DOTSON, M.A.

Assistant Coach



When Coach Joe Williams speaks of his "right hand man," the person to whom he is referring is assistant coach Bob Dotson. A top recruiter and an excellent game tactician, Dotson is in his seventh full season on the Paladin staff.

The 33-year old Louisville, Ky., native joined the Paladin staff in September of 1968, and served as head freshman coach his first two seasons.

The following year he was promoted to varsity assistant where his responsibilities have increased each year. Along with his coaching and recruiting duties, the personable Dotson also has a large role in forming the Furman radio network.

Dotson did his prep coaching at Louisville's Butler High School where he compiled a 28-21 mark for two seasons. In the six seasons prior to Dotson's arrival, Butler had not had a winning campaign and had finished with a disastrous 3-18 record the previous year, but Dotson took the Bears to the regional finals in his first year, and was tabbed Coach of the Year in the Sixth Region.

A graduate of Lindsey Wilson Junior College and Western Kentucky University, Dotson holds a Masters Degree in mathematics. He and his wife, Bobbie, have no children.

JOHN JONES, B.S.

Assistant Coach



A former Georgia state high school coach-of-the-year, John Jones is in his fourth year at Furman. His main responsibilities are recruiting and scouting, as well as working with the Paladin Junior Varsity squad.

The versatile Jones has an excellent athletic background in high school and college as well as the professional ranks. A native of Mobile, Ala., he attended Alabama State College where he played basketball and baseball.

Following graduation, he played in the Philadelphia Phillies' farm chain until he was forced to retire due to an arm injury.

After his baseball career was cut short, Jones began a high school coaching career which culminated with the Georgia high school championship in 1971. During his three years at Carver High School, Jones won 73 games while losing only 14 times. All three years he was named Coach of the Year in the Columbus-Phenix City area.

Jones developed a number of outstanding high school players, including 7-1 center Fessor Leonard, who is currently a member of the Furman varsity team.

Coach Jones and his wife Mattie have one son, Fernez, 7.

STEVE YODER, B.A.

Assistant Coach



The most recent addition to the Furman staff is energetic Steve Yoder, who is in his second year as assistant coach. Regarded as one of the top high school coaches in Indiana before making the step into the college ranks, the 34-year-old Yoder compiled a six-year mark of 105-35.

During the high school years at Plymouth (Ind.) High, he led the Pilgrims to two regional titles, three sectional championships, three conference crowns and missed going to the state finals in 1970 by a

single point. His most outstanding seasons came in 1970 when Plymouth had a 23-4 record and in 1973 when they were 22-2.

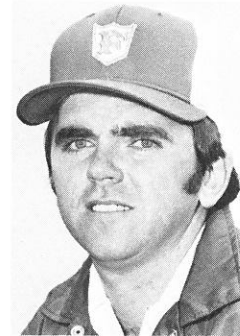
Yoder graduated from Illinois Wesleyan College in 1962 after playing four years of baseball and two years of basketball. He served as freshman basketball coach his last two years of college.

Following graduation, Yoder taught school for three years at Glen Elley Junior High (Ill.) before returning to his hometown of Plymouth, where he served as an assistant for two years prior to being named head coach.

Yoder and his wife Joanie have four children: Wendy, 12; Dan, 10; Amy, 7; and Michael, 4.

JAY SHOOP, B.S.

Trainer



Jay Shoop has become one of the most indispensable members of the Furman family since his arrival in 1970. A graduate of East Tennessee State, where he earned a double major in health and physical education, Shoop has rapidly become one of the top trainers in the South.

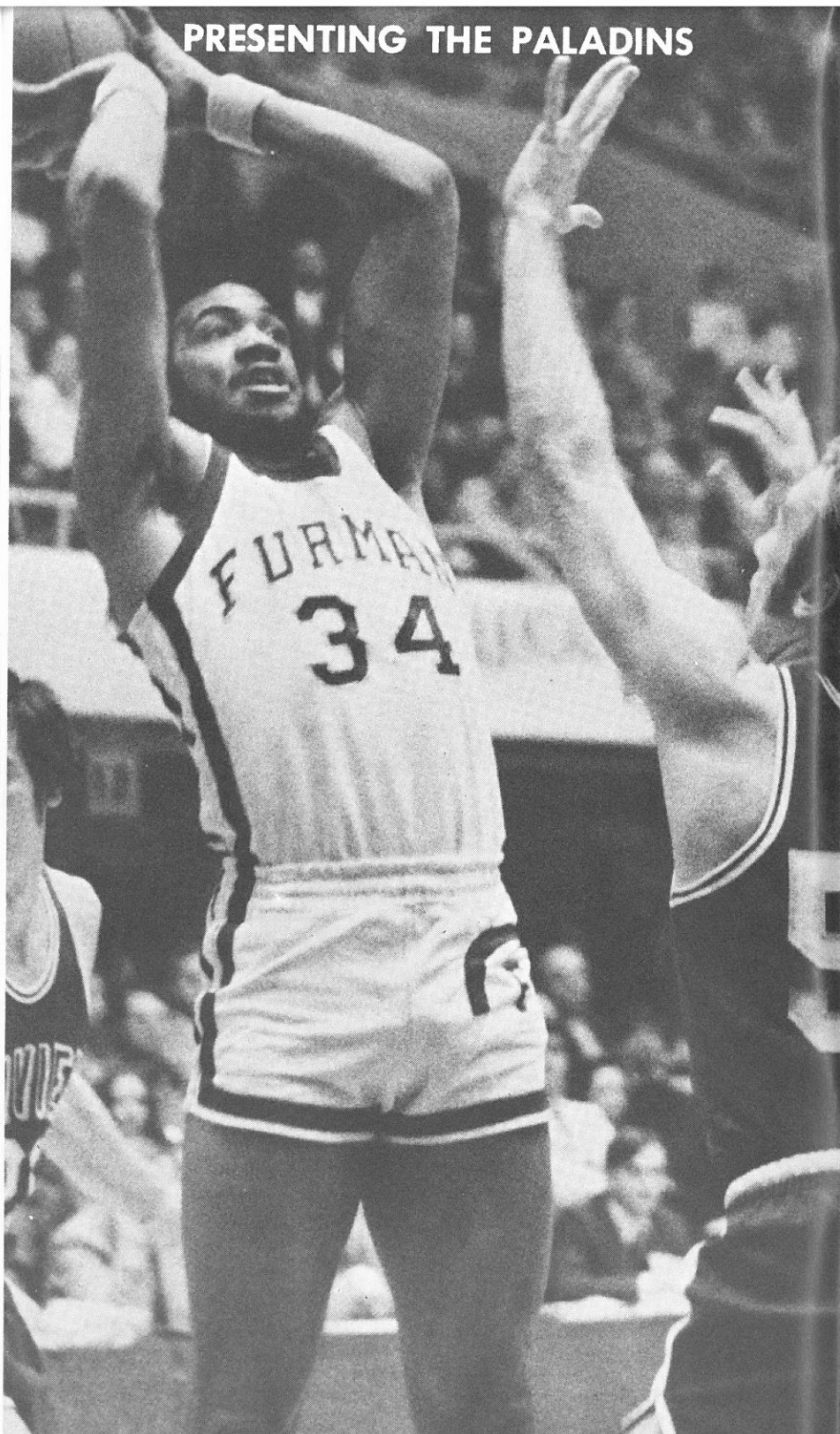
The Wise, Va., native has a thorough background in physical training, serving as assistant trainer at East Tennessee for three years. He has also worked in five summer training camps with the NFC At-

lanta Falcons and one summer with the Detroit Tiger baseball farm club at Bristol, Va.

Shoop maintains an up-to-date training room, and is always available to Furman athletes from his campus apartment. In addition to serving as trainer for the entire athletic department, Shoop also oversees four student trainers and handles all travel arrangements in football and basketball.

A REVIEW OF LAST YEAR

22-9 . . . The best basketball record that Furman University ever produced is what happened last year. A second straight Southern Conference title, a trip to the Eastern Regionals and still another step closer to gaining the national prominence expected of the Paladins. That is what happened for Coach Joe Williams' team in 1973-74.

The Paladins performed consistently the entire season, never losing more than two games consecutively and even building up an eight-game winning streak at one point. The ability to "come back" became characteristic of Furman throughout the season. It was first displayed after the Paladins dropped an overtime decision to Minnesota in the second game of the year, then bounced back to win four in a row. Included in that string was a 69-62 win at Davidson.

After a loss to Clemson in the finals of the Poinsettia Classic, Furman won three more before incurring a January slump that saw the Paladins lose to Davidson, Jacksonville and Clemson in a five-game span. But still the Paladins had not lost consecutive games. However, it was at this point that Williams instituted training rules in an attempt to improve performance.

The first casualties of the training reformation were Fessor Leonard and Michael Hall, both of whom were placed on a two-game suspension for curfew violation. Furman then won four straight (two without Leonard and Hall) to give itself a 14-5 mark. But there was a confidence against the top teams that was missing and back-to-back encounters with North Carolina and N. C. State to come.

It was here that Williams found a turning point in Furman basketball fortunes and, oddly, it was a 26-point defeat to North Carolina (95-69) that showed it to him. The head man commented afterward that his team "had learned to play with the best teams in the country." Early in the North Carolina game Furman had trailed 34-10 and appeared headed for an embarrassing defeat. However, the following 10 minutes saw the Paladins outscore UNC 30-10 to cut the margin to four points, 44-40, and although the Tar Heels eventually won going away, the foundation was set.

After another loss to top-ranked N. C. State, the Paladins reeled off three straight victories over Southern Conference foes before facing their first big test of new-found confidence when they hosted Jacksonville in the final game of the regular season. A 71-61 triumph over the Dolphins sent Furman into the Southern Conference Tournament, where it continued a string of wins that would eventually reach eight, the most consecutive wins for a Furman team since 1953-54.

The conference title allowed the Paladins to meet 10th-ranked South Carolina, a heavy favorite, in the NCAA Tournament. With the Gamecocks holding a 12-point lead with just 14 minutes remaining in the game, Clyde Mayes and Bruce Grimm led a comeback that saw Furman pull off a 75-67 upset and earn the right to meet Pittsburgh in the Eastern Regionals.

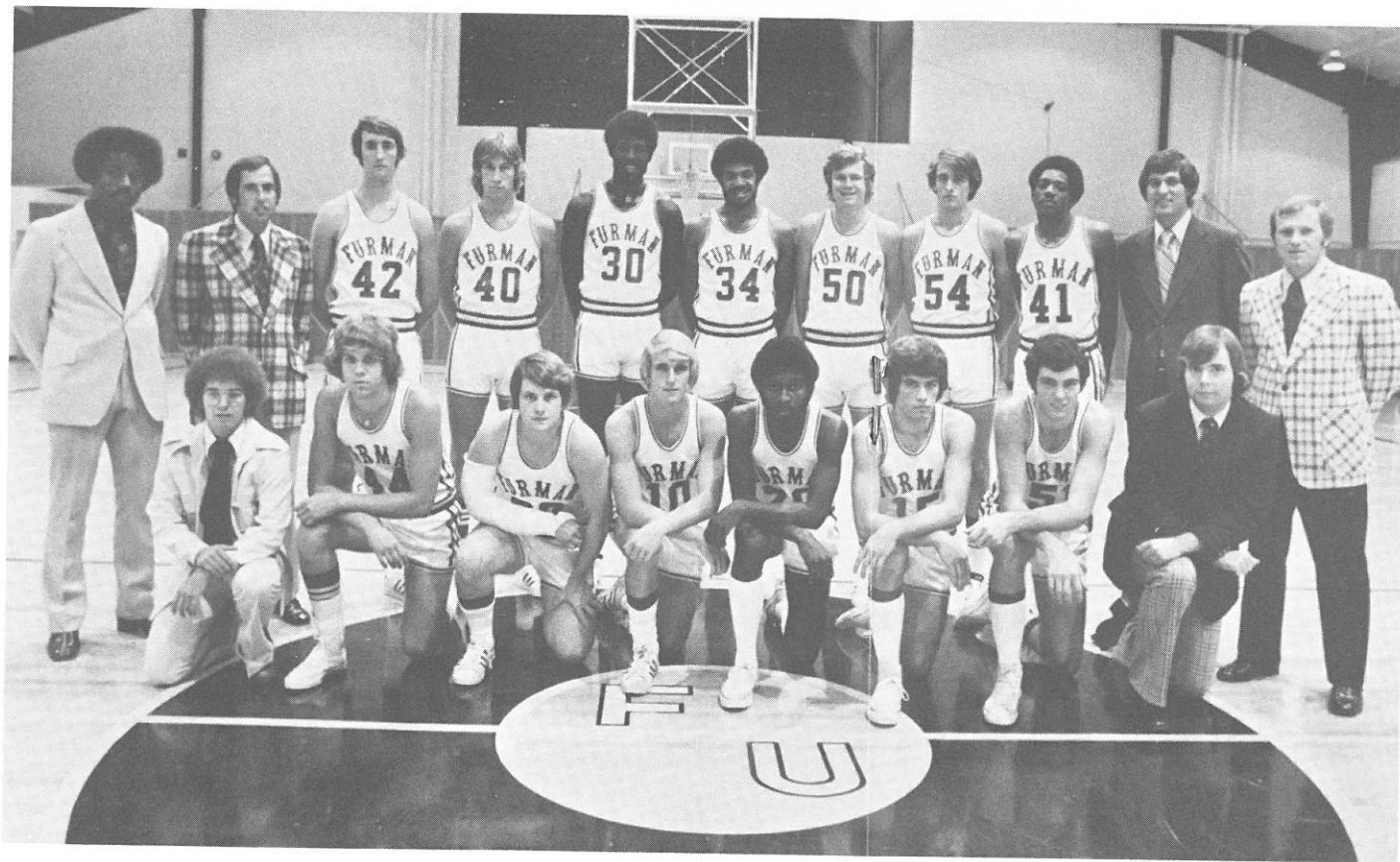
Furman lost the two games in the Regionals to Pittsburgh (81-78) and Providence (95-83) but, as Joe Williams said after the South Carolina win, "It has been a very gratifying season regardless of how we do in Raleigh (Regionals). Just when it would have been the easiest for us to give up in the game against North Carolina, we refused to roll over. I am proud of this team for being here."

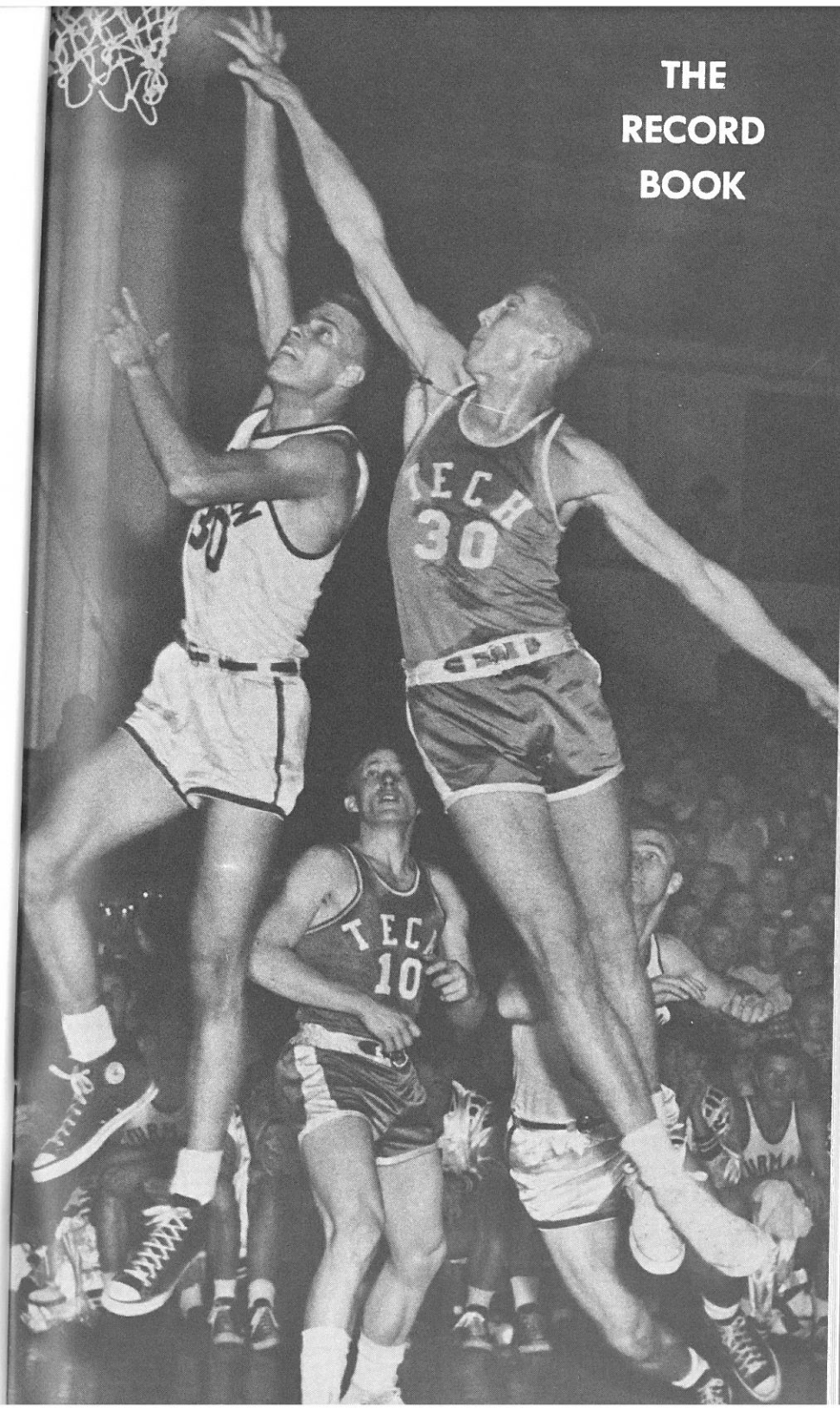
THE POINSETTIA CLASSIC

Cage Success Not New To Furman

Some call it "tradition." Others refer to it as a "rich heritage." Call it what you like, but successful basketball is not new at Furman University. While some feel that the current edition of the Paladins could develop into one of the finest in the school's history, it will have to go far to surpass some of the team and individual performances of the past.

Since Furman started playing basketball at the turn of the century the Paladins have enjoyed more than moderate success. During the early years, Furman's reputation was primarily regional, and in the early 1930's that reputation reached a peak under coach A. P. "Dizzy" McLeod.

During the 1930-32 seasons, the Paladins rolled to 49 victories against only five defeats, compiling 17-2 marks in 1930 and 1931, and a 15-1 record in 1932. In each of the three seasons, the Paladins swept the State Championship in South Carolina. Among the stalwarts on those great teams were Bill Wells, Truett Wakefield, Red Watson, Swede Ohlsen, and Ernie Southern as well as current Furman Director of Athletics J. Lyles Alley.

The Paladins never reached such heights again before World War II, but soon after the conclusion of the conflict Furman reached a peak never before attained by the Baptist School. Coach Lyles Alley assumed coaching duties during the 1945-56 season and the Paladins rolled to a 15-4 mark.

After a disastrous 3-20 mark in 1951, the Paladins had a reversal of form the next season and put together to an 18-6 mark. At the conclusion of the year, Furman was named the country's most improved team.

The following year the Paladins posted a 21-6 for their best record in modern history.

While the Furman team as a whole was gaining national recognition, it was the unbelievable performances of Frank Selvy that really brought the nation's eyes upon Greenville and Furman. Selvy became the most prolific scorer in the history of college basketball during the 1953-54 campaign as he averaged 41.7 points per contest.

On Saturday, February 13, 1954 Selvy astounded the basketball world when he scored 100 points in a single game against Newberry College. The Corbin, Ky., native was selected All-America as a junior and senior to become Furman's first player to be so honored.

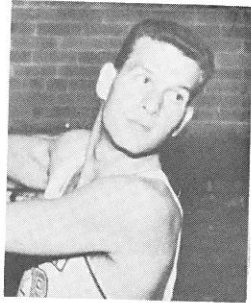
However, the second was not far behind. In 1954-55 a lanky junior named Darrell Floyd took over where Selvy had left off as he averaged 35.9 points a contest to earn All-America honors. During that season, the Paladins averaged 95.3 points a game for the highest scoring average in the nation.

While Furman did not enjoy such success in the following years, the Paladins were still not without their moments of glory. Ten years to the day after Selvy had shocked the world with his 100 point performance the unheralded Paladins celebrated the event by stunning the fourth ranked Davidson Wildcats 70-55.

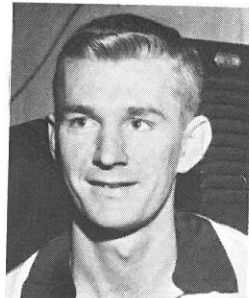
Furman showed that it was intent on maintaining its cage heritage four years ago when the Paladins once again surprised collegiate fans by luring Joe Williams away from Jacksonville, where he had just finished second in the NCAA tournament.

During Williams' first season, the Paladins captured their first Southern Conference basketball crown and, with two championships since, it is obvious that Furman's future is as bright as its past.

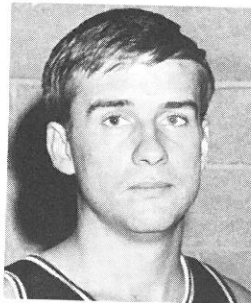

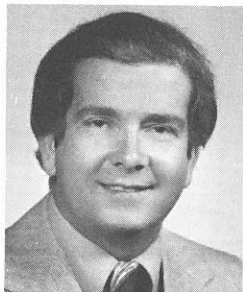

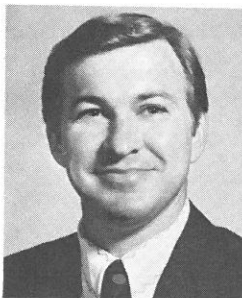
The Paladin Club is an organization of alumni and friends of Furman University. It exists for the primary purpose of elevating athletics through contributions to its scholarship programs.

While there are important tangible benefits such as priority on season football and basketball tickets, informative periodicals, special parking at home games, and golf course privileges (depending upon level of membership), the most rewarding benefit is the feeling of satisfaction that members derive from knowing they are helping worthy student athletes achieve

Bowman of Louisville, and they have a daughter, Jessica, one-year old.

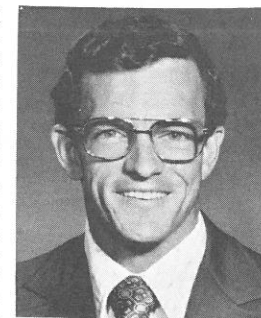

ORIGIN OF THE PALADIN

Furman University athletic teams were known by different names until the 1960 school year. The baseball team was "Hornets," the football team "Hurricanes," and the basketball team "Paladins."

The basketball team was dubbed "Paladins" by a Greenville sportswriter in the 1930's and the name stuck. When it was decided in 1960 to consolidate all athletic teams under one name, the popular choice was "Paladins."

"Paladin" is derived from Count Palatine, one of the twelve knights who comprised the bodyguard and inner circle of Emperor Charlemagne.
