Quick Cap: GREENSBORO, N.C. — The Florida women's swimming & diving team saved its best for last, as the Gators earned seven All-American honors and scored 63 team points on the final day of the 2015 NCAA Championships.

Overall, Florida finished the meet in ninth place with a team score of 129 points. UF has finished in the top-10 at the NCAA meet for 15 consecutive years. Individually, the Gators amassed 15 All-American honors and broke one school record over the course of the three day meet.

UF was led by junior Jessica Thielmann as she earned four All-American accolades. In addition, junior Natalie Hinds picked up three All-American tributes (100 Fly, 100 Free, 400 FR) bringing her career-total to 17.

On the boards, Kahliia Warner, who competed in her first-career NCAA Championships, earned her first-career All-American honor on day one of the championships as she placed sixth in the one-meter dive finals with a score of 321.75.

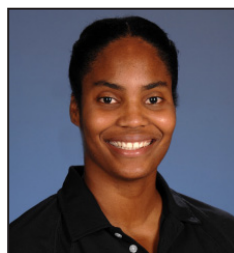

The Florida men have a point total of 204, and join SEC members Georgia (fourth), Auburn (sixth), Alabama (10th), Missouri (12th) Tennessee (14th), and South Carolina (22nd).

The Florida women came in at No. 9 this week (165 points). UF joins SEC foes Georgia (second), Texas A&M (eighth), Auburn (11th) Tennessee (16th), LSU (20th), Missouri (23rd), and South Carolina (24th).

LAST TIME OUT: SEC CHAMPIONSHIPS | 2 / 20 / 16

Three weeks ago, Florida's men won the program's fourth-straight and 37th overall Southeastern Conference Championship. On the women's side, the Gators ended their conference championship in sixth place. Overall, Florida won 11 SEC championships, broke eight school records and registered 11 NCAA 'A' Cuts. UF's 37 SEC team championships ranks second amongst all sports in the history of the SEC (Kentucky Men's Basketball, 45).

WARNER TABBED SEC DIVER OF THE MEET

Senior Kahlia Warner was named the 2016 SEC Diver of the meet at the SEC Championships following a remarkable performance on the one and 3-Meter boards. The Queensland, Australia, native swept both springboards -- marking the first time for a Gator in 30 years. Gator Great Megan Neyer, the last UF diver to accomplish the feat, was on hand to witness to accomplishment live.

HINDS, WARNER GATHER SEC TITLES

Seniors Natalie Hinds and Kahlia Warner totaled three individual SEC Titles for the Gator Women. Warner dove to a pair of titles on the one and 3-Meter springboards while Hinds gathered hers in the pool, taking first place in the 100-Yard Freestyle.

WINNING WAYS

Five Gators accounted for double-digit wins this season between individual and relay events. Natalie Hinds led the group with 40, and Ashlee Linn (22), Kahlia Warner (19), Georgia-Mae Hohmann (15), and Amelia Maughan (10) followed behind.

SWIMMING TO THE POSTSEASON

Nine Gators qualified in 14 individual events and four relay races come competition on Wednesday, eight of which swimmers are returners from last year's meet.

DIVING TO THE POSTSEASON

Senior Kahlia Warner will represent the Gator women on the diving boards this week. Warner, the SEC Diver of the Meet at the 2016 SEC Championships, qualified on all three diving events at the 2016 NCAA Zone Diving Championships in Atlanta.

WARNER SWEEPS AGAIN

Senior Kahlia Warner dove to a pair of wins on the one and 3-Meter boards at the 2016 NCAA Zone Diving Championships for the second time in three weeks. The Queensland, Australia, native had previously swept the springboards at the 2016 SEC Championships in Columbia, Missouri.

A SPECIAL YEAR

The Gators' swim teams aren't only looking to make a run at the 2016 NCAA Championships this season. Rather, they'll have the opportunity to make Olympic trial-qualifying standards with the 2016 Summer Games approaching -- in addition to their NCAA 'A' and 'B' cut standard times.

To this point in the 2016 season, 13 American Gators have already met U.S. Olympic Time Trial-qualifying standards in their respective events (Complete Chart on pg. 13).

DRESSSEL, BALOGH GATHER SEC HONORS: 2/2/16

Two members from the University of Florida men's swimming and diving team -- Caeleb Dressel and Brennan Balogh -- were named Southeastern Conference Swimmers of the Week following UF's 185-115 win over Tennessee on Jan. 30, inside the Allen Jones Aquatic Center in Knoxville, Tennessee. The SEC announced the recognitions on February 2.

HINDS TABBED SEC SWIMMER OF THE WEEK: 1/26

Senior Natalie Hinds was named the SEC Swimmer of the Week following a four-win performance in UF's 192-108 win over the No. 10 Auburn Tigers on Jan. 23. Hinds, a Midland, Texas, native, swam to a first-place finish in the 50-Meter freestyle after clocking a U.S. Olympic Trial-qualifying time of 26.10. The American sprinter added top finishes in the 100-Meter freestyle (57.03), 100-Meter butterfly (1:02.06) and 400-Meter freestyle relay (3:54.03).

WARNER NAMED SEC DIVER OF THE WEEK | 10/20

Senior diver Kahlia Warner was named SEC Diver of the Week on Oct. 20. It was Warner's fourth time receiving the recognition, and first of the 2015-16 season. The Queensland, Australia, native, gathered the honor following a two-day double dual against No. 6 Texas and No. 14 Indiana. After sweeping the 1 and 3 meter boards with Zone Standard scores of 293.25 and 324.10, the 2015 All-American took home a first-place finish off the platform on Saturday (259.58) -- marking her third Diving Standard on the weekend.

SMITH NAMED SEC DIVER OF THE WEEK | 10/13

Freshman Sam Smith was named the SEC Diver of the Week following an outstanding performance against Minnesota on Oct. 10. Smith posted a first-place mark against Minnesota over the weekend with an NCAA-qualifying standard score of 351.60 off the one-meter. Later off the three-meter, Smith added to his accomplishments with a second-place showing -- diving to a score of 392.70.

NEW FACES TO THE ROSTER

The Gator men welcome nine true freshmen, two redshirt freshman who joined the program last year in January, and two transfers -- one from the University of Virginia, and one from the university of Michigan. On the women's end, Florida welcomes 10 true freshman to the 2015-16 roster.

DRESSSEL NAMED TO U.S. NATIONAL TEAM

For the first time in his career, sophomore Caeleb Dressel was named to the U.S. men's national team. There, he joins fellow standouts and former Gators Ryan Lochte, and Conor Dwyer.

PHILLIPS 66 NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS REVIEW

Sixteen members from the University of Florida men's and women's swim team represented the Gators in San Antonio at the 2015 Phillips 66 National Championships from Aug. 6-10. In addition, three former Gators also took part in the five-day competition.

A LONG WAYS FROM HOME

There are nine Gators on both the men's and women's rosters (18 total) who haven't always called Gainesville home. Rather, they come from overseas and all across the globe.

2015 FINA WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS REVIEW

Five current Gators and 11 former UF swimmers participated in the 2015 FINA World Championships in Kaza, Russia. Former Gator Ryan Lochte led the pack with a pair of gold medals (200m IM / 400m medley relay) and on silver (800m freestyle).

FLORIDA SWIMMING AND DIVING TRADITION

The Florida swimming and diving program has a remarkable winning tradition. Head Coach Gregg Troy, now in his 19th season at the helm of the Gators, leads a program whose history includes: five national championships, 133 NCAA Titles, 53 SEC Championships, 44 SEC Swimmer of the Year recipients, nine SEC Diver of the Year recipients.

FLORIDA SWIMMING AND DIVING TRADITION

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IT RUNS IN THE FAMILY

The men's and women's teams have several family connections:

- Redshirt sophomore Dalton Goss and freshman Miranda Goss are brother and sister.
- Senior Justin Kaisrlik and freshman Morgan Kaisrlik are brother and sister.
- Junior Taylor Katz and newcomer Alex Katz are brother and sister.
- Redshirt senior Austin Manganiello and red-shirt sophomore Blake Manganiello are brothers.
- Sophomore Mark Szaranek is the older brother of newcomer Jack Szaranek.
- Emiro Goosen is the younger brother of former Gator Levar Goosen.
- Sophomore Ben Kennedy is the son of former Gator, Patrick Kennedy, who was a member of the schools only two men's NCAA Championship Titles (1982,1983).

STEPHEN O'CONNELL CENTER

The multipurpose Stephen C. O'Connell Center, named for a former University of Florida president, features a main arena covering more than 3.6 acres and containing 292,000 square feet. In addition to the main arena, there is a practice court, two weight rooms, a natatorium, an indoor track, a private gymnastics arena, dance studio, martial arts studio and several classrooms.

HEAD COACH GREGG TROY

As head coach of the men's and women's swimming teams, Gregg Troy has created an atmosphere of consistency and excellence over his 19 years at the helm. He has guided the Gators to 31 NCAA event titles, 148 SEC event titles, more than 350 SEC Academic Honor Roll selections and more than 900 All-American honors.

Troy has tutored over 75 Olympians and has coached athletes to more than 155 U.S. and international records. He served as the 2012 USA Men's Olympic Swim Team head coach in London. That same year he was inducted into the American Swimming Coaches Association Hall of Fame

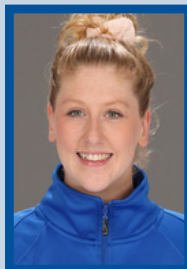

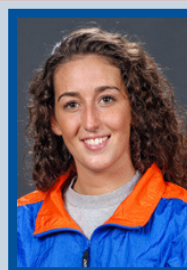

To convert a metric time achieved in a 25-meter racing course to an equivalent time for a 25-yard racing course: (a) transform the achieved metric time into seconds; (b) carrying the calculation out to five decimal places, multiply the transformed time in seconds by the appropriate following conversion factor; (c) drop, without rounding, all units smaller than a hundredth of a second; and (d) finally, transform the resultant value in seconds back into minutes and seconds to obtain the converted time.

GAINESVILLE, Fla. -- Both the men's and women's swimming and diving teams captured their sixth straight Pinch A Penny All Florida Invite titles Sunday night inside the Stephen C. O'Connell Center Natatorium in Gainesville, Florida. Following three days of championship format competition, the men's team finished with 1,080 points, respectively, while the women tallied 1,056.

The Florida women shined early, taking the top two spots in the opening 1,650 freestyle. Senior Jessica Thielmann won the event, swimming to a time of 16:47.09, while junior Autumn Finke finished runner up (16:47.610). The Gator women finished Sunday's competition taking first place in 6-of-6 events while posting a pair NCAA 'B' cuts in the process.

On the men's side, the Gators took first in three individual events and one relay. FLORIDA VS. MINNESOTA | OCT. 10

MINNEAPOLIS -- The University of Florida men's and women's swimming and diving teams added three swimmers to their list of NCAA Division I "B" standard qualifiers, and four divers posted new qualifying standards in a dual meet at Minnesota on Saturday afternoon.

Those marks helped the No. 1 Gator men to a 174.50-125.50 victory over the Golden Gophers, while the top-ranked Florida women settled for an extremely rare 150-150 tie.

For the men, sophomore Caleb Dressel hit the "B" cut in the 100-yard backstroke, clocking a time of 47.83, only finishing behind teammate Jack Blyzinskij, who already owns a "B" cut time from earlier this season.

Freshman diver Samuel Smith won the men's 1-meter diving completion with a qualifying standard score of 351.60. Redshirt senior Zach Hernandez's score of 304.28 was just over the qualifying standard as well, and good enough for sixth place in the event.

Hernandez (347.55) and Smith (392.70) also bettered their previous 3-meter diving standards to take sixth and second, respectively.

On the women's side, senior Natalie Hinds hit the "B" cut in the 50-yard freestyle, touching in 22.85 seconds to collect a victory for the Gators. Redshirt sophomore Georgia Hohmann posted a "B" cut time of 1:58.17 to lead Florida's sweep of the top four spots in the 200-yard backstroke race.

Senior Emily Mosher became the fourth Gator diver with a qualifying standard this year, as she took fifth in the 3-meter dive competition with a score of 310.80. Mosher also nabbed a 1-meter diving qualifying standard, scoring 281.33 in a sixthplace finish.

In addition to Mosher's performance in the 3-meter dive, senior Kahlia Warner (340.35) and freshman Teya Syskakis (313.35) better their original qualifying standards en route to third- and fourth-place finishes.

Florida's men and women will return to action next Friday (Oct. 16) and Saturday (Oct. 17), when they compete against Texas and Indiana in Austin, Texas.

WOMEN AT VANDERBILT | OCT. 8

NASHVILLE, Tenn. -- The top-ranked University of Florida women's swim team scored a 193-69 victory over Vanderbilt on Thursday night inside the Centennial Sports Complex Natatorium in Nashville, Tennessee. The Gators (1-0 overall, 1-0 SEC) took 13-of-16 events to secure the top position in the SEC-opening dual.

The quartet of redshirt sophomores Georgia-Mae Hohmann and Paige Scheriger, junior Alyssa Yambor-Maul, and senior Natalie Hinds jumped out to a quick lead in the opening 400 medley relay. The group took first place with a time of 3:45.20.

Hinds shined throughout the night, scoring 40 total points off two individual wins and pair of relay victories. The Midland, Texas, native swam a time of 1:49.56 in her 200 freestyle, while touching out at the 54.93 mark in the 100 fly to secure both individual victories. She teamed up with Yambor-Maul, freshman Mollie Pulte, and sophomore Amelia Maughan in the 200 free relay to finish the night. The foursome combined for a first-place-finishing time of 1:35.06.

Pulte, a newcomer to the program, stepped up in the 100 freestyle, gathering the top finish after touching the wall at 51.75. The Troy, Michigan, native also posted a runner-up finish in the 50 freestyle (24.17).

No divers were present in Thursday's tilt with Vanderbilt as the Commodores do not have a diving program.

With the win, the Gators will travel to seventh-ranked Minnesota on Saturday with an unblemished record. The women are set to join the divers along with the men's team for an 11 a.m. ET non-conference dual at the Jean K. Freeman Aquatic Center in Minneapolis.

FLORIDA VS. TEXAS, INDIANA | OCT. 17

AUSTIN, Tex. -- The University of Florida men's and women's swimming and diving teams wrapped up Day Two competition at the Lee & Joe Jamail Texas Swimming Center in Austin, Texas. Today's competition was swum in a short course format.

The Gator men wrapped up Day Two competition with a series-sweeping win over Indiana while falling to the defending National Champion Texas Longhorns. Caeleb Dressel highlighted the weekend by taking down former club teammate and defending NCAA 100 Yard butterfly champion, Joseph Schooling, on Friday night, in just one of his three wins on the weekend.

While swimming a number of strong races, NCAA 'B' cuts, and season-best times, the Florida women surrendered a pair of losses to Texas and Indiana in their final day of competition, falling to Texas, 155-105, and Indiana, 142-120.

Jack Blyzinskij posted UF's first win during Saturday's competition, coming in the 100 backstroke (47.04). Caeleb Dressel added to the wins column with a first-place finish in the 50 free -- touching out with a time 19.36. Later in the 100 free, Dressel gathered a runner-up finish in the 100 free, coming in at the 43.70 mark.

In the 200 medley relay, the quartet of Blyzinskij, Dressel, Mark Szaranek, and Corey Main posted a second-place finish, coming in with a time of 1:29.00. Szaranek added on in the 400 IM -- finishing second overall with a time of 3:50.60.

Arther Frayler, Pawel Werner, and Main also posted a runner-up finishes throughout the day. Frayler finished second in the 1,000 free (9:07.21), Werner in the 200 freestyle (1:37.08), and Main in the 200 backstroke (1:44.79).

On the women's side, Natalie Hinds gathered UF's first win of the day, touching out with a first-place time of 22.90 in the 50 freestyle. In the ensuing race, Hinds posted her second win on the day in the 100 freestyle (49.32).

Jessica Thielmann, Ashlee Linn, and Hannah Burns each gathered runner-up finishes. Thielmann came in second in the 1,000 free (9:55.24), Linn in the 200 free (1:48.49) the 100 back (55.31), and the 200 back (1:57.13), and Burns in the 400 IM (4:18.97).

The Gator women ended on a strong note, gathering the top finish in the 400 freestyle relay. The foursome of Linn, Mollie Pulte, Georgia-Mae Hohmann, and Hinds teamed up on 3:23.35 first-place finish.

The Orange and Blue will return to action on Friday, October 30, when they host SEC-rival Georgia inside the Stephen C. O'Connell Center in Gainesville, Florida.

GEORGIA (LCM) | OCT. 30

GAINESVILLE, Fla. -- Four members from the University of Florida men's and women's swimming and diving teams swam to U.S. Olympic Trial-qualifying times in Friday's matchup with the Georgia Bulldogs inside the Stephen C. O'Connell Center in Gainesville, Florida. The Bulldogs came away with wins on both ends, but the Gators didn't go away easy -- swimming to four U.S. Olympic Trial-qualifying times, 12 wins, and seven career-best performances.

Friday's competition opened up in the diving well where the Gators took 3-of-4 boards. Senior Kahlia Warner nearly rewrote the record books at UF with a dominating performance off the three-meter. Warner posted a career-best six-dive mark of 373.28, just missing Monica Dodson's mark of 373.85 from 2011. Warner, a Queensland, Australia, native, also posted a runner up finish off the one-meter (290.70).

On the men's side, newcomer Sam Smith -- who's already met his NCAA Diving Standards on all three boards -- swept the one and three-meter diving events ahead of Georgia's Ian Forlini. Smith dove to a score of 345.44 off the one-meter and later took gold off the three-meter with a score of 381.30.

In the pool, senior Natalie Hinds led the UF women with three individual wins and one as a member of UF's 400-meter freestyle relay victory. Hinds' individual performances came in the 50-meter freestyle (26.61), 100-meter freestyle (57.72), and 100-meter butterfly (1:02.41) while the Midland, Texas, native, teamed up with freshman Mollie Pulte, sophomore Elisavet Panti, and senior Ashlee Linn to win the 400-meter freestyle relay (3:54.09).

Linn also had a strong showing in the 100-meter backstroke, swimming to a first-place finish with a time of 1:03.43.

On the men's side, the Gators were led by sophomore Caeleb Dressel, who swam to a pair of wins and a third place finish. Dressel's individual events opened in the 50-meter freestyle race, where he met a U.S. Olympic Trial-qualifying time of 22.73. The Green Cove Springs, Florida, native, also came through with a first-place time in the 100-meter freestyle, touching out at the 51.61 mark, edging second-place Trice Michael by 1.3 seconds.

Other notable wins were had by senior Corey Main in the 100-meter backstroke, where he and Jack Blyzinskyj had a 1-2 showing -- and both touched the wall with U.S. Olympic Trial-qualifying time standards. Main came in first with a time of 56.90 while Blyzinskyj followed close behind (57.15).

Freshman Jan Switkowski gathered UF's final U.S. Olympic Trial-qualifying time in the 200-meter butterfly, swimming to a first-place time of 2:01.08.

BUCKEYE INVITE | NOV. 20-22

COLUMBUS, Ohio -- The University of Florida men's and women's swimming and diving teams ended the Buckeye Invitational on a high note Sunday night, sweeping the competition field for a pair of wins inside the McCorkle Aquatic Pavilion on Columbus, Ohio. Throughout Day Three competition, the Gators accounted for 13 wins, 13 US Olympic Trial-qualifying times, three NCAA 'A' cuts, and 26 'B' cuts.

Senior Natalie Hinds and sophomore Jan Switkowski each punched their tickets to the 2016 NCAA Championships with a pair of 'A' cut and event-winning times to highlight their individual swims on Sunday. Hinds earned hers in the 100 freestyle (47.75) while Switkowski's came in the 200 butterfly (1:42.08). The Orange and Blue accounted for wins in 8-of-14 events in tonight's finals session, which was swum in short course yards.

Seniors Jessica Thielmann and Arthur Frayler put together a pair of first-place swims in the 1,650 freestyle. Thielmann touched out with a time of 15:56.32 while Frayler came in at the 14:52.12 mark. Both times currently lead the country.

Junior Jack Blyzinskyj kept things rolling in the 200 backstroke for the men's squad, swimming to a first-place time of 1:41.96.

Sophomore Caeleb Dressel also gave the Orange and Blue a solid effort -- this one coming in the 200 butterfly where the Green Cove Springs, Florida, native posted the nation's top time and brought home a first-place finish with a time of 42.54.

During Sunday's preliminary session, the Gators posted wins in 5-of-8 events while registering 13 US Olympic Trial-qualifying times (complete chart below). Florida's first-place times came from Dressel (100 free) and Switkowski (200 butterfly), junior Georgia Hohmann (200 back), and seniors Corey Main (200 back) and Hinds (100 free).

Gator Relays:

The men's 400 freestyle relay group of Dressel, Switkowski, and seniors Pawel Werner and Main guaranteed themselves a spot at the 2016 NCAA Championships with an 'A' cut time of 2:50.45 in the 400 freestyle relay. Their first-place mark currently leads the country and ranks third all-time in UF history.

The women's quartet of freshman Mollie Pulte, sophomore Elisavet Panti, and seniors Ashlee Linn and Hinds nearly hit an NCAA 'A' cut in the 400 freestyle relay. The foursome touched out with a time of 3:16.46, hardly missing the 'A' cut standard of 3:16.15. Despite missing the 'A' cut, the group's finish leads all collegiate times in 2015.

Platform Competition:

In the diving well, the Florida women went 5-7 off the platform. Senior Kahlia Warner led the bunch with a season-best mark of 272.63. Senior Delaney Dye (255.83) and freshman Abigail Howell (240.75) also dove to season-best scores off the platform.

Senior Zach Hernandez led the Florida men on the platform, diving to a score of 317.63 and finished sixth overall. Freshman Dalton Goss (296.55) followed behind in seventh.

SOUTH CAROLINA | NOV. 6

GAINESVILLE, Fla. -- The University of Florida men's and women's swimming and diving teams picked up a pair of wins over South Carolina on Friday night inside the Stephen C. O'Connell Center in Gainesville, Florida. The UF men extended their win streak against the Gamecocks to eight meets with a 178-115 decision while the women notched a 165.5-126.5 victory to remain a perfect 19-0 in the all-time series between the two schools.

Junior Jack Blyzinskyj had a strong showing for the Orange and Blue early on, taking first in the 100-yard backstroke with a time of 46.21. In addition to improving his NCAA 'B' cut time, the Weston, Massachusetts, native also tied California's Ryan Murphy for the fastest 100-yard backstroke time in the country. Blyzinskyj also swam to top times in the 400 freestyle relay (2:56.67) and 200 medley relay (1:27.46), and a second-place showing in the 100-yard butterfly (48.77).

Newcomer Jan Switkowski also had an impressive night, swimming to first-place times in all four of his races and posting two of the country's top times. The Lublin, Poland, native got things started in the 200 medley relay (1:27.46), before posting the nation's top time in the 200-yard freestyle (1:34.81). Switkowski went back-to-back in rewriting the national top-times charts after touching out at the 1:45.07 mark in the 200-yard IM.

On the women's side, UF was led by senior Natalie Hinds who gathered a trio of top finishes. The Midland, Texas, native opened the meet by anchoring the first-place 200-yard medley relay team to a win (1:43.74). Hinds then got it done individually with a win in the 200-yard freestyle (1:49.29) before teaming up in a relay format to win the 400-yard freestyle relay (3:23.11).

Freshman Hannah Burns had a strong outing on Friday night, swimming to a pair of wins with season-best times in the 100-yard breaststroke (1:04.23) and 500-yard freestyle (4:55.96).

In the diving well, senior Kahlia Warner dove to a pair of wins off both the one and three-meter boards. The Queensland, Australia, native dove to a season-best score of 312.90 off the one-meter to open things up -- nearly matching the UF school record of 328.30. Warner wrapped up on the three-meter with a first-place score of 351.30, besting the second-place finishing score by nearly 40 points (312.01).

On the men's side, newcomer Sam Smith shined again, diving to the top finish on the one-meter with a score of 320.92. Smith also led UF off the three-meter with a runner-up showing (387.61). Senior Zach Hernandez finished third after posting a career-best performance off the three-meter, diving to a mark of 370.95.

FLORIDA STATE | JAN. 2

GAINESVILLE, Fla. -- The fourth-ranked University of Florida men's and 11th-ranked women's swimming and diving teams swept the Florida State Seminoles on Saturday night inside the Stephen C. O'Connell Center in Gainesville, Florida. The men's team scored a 188-109 win over the 24th-ranked Seminoles while the 11th-ranked Florida women registered a 200-93 victory.

The Orange and Blue had a fast start to the meet, taking wins in their first seven races before allowing a Florida State victory. Those seven wins included a pair of relay crowns in the 400-meter medley relay, the women's 800-meter freestyle (Jessica Thielmann), the men's 1500-meter freestyle (Arthur Frayler), the men's (Mitch D'Arrigo) and women's (Lindsey McKnight) 200-meter freestyles, and the women's 100-meter backstroke (Georgia-Mae Hohmann).

Tonight's meet was swum in a long course format (50-meter pool) where participants had the opportunity to qualify for their respective country's Olympic Trials. Caeleb Dressel was the lone American to hit a U.S. time standard, respectively, but that didn't stop multiple Gators from hitting the U.S. standards which are still comparable to their own home country's standards.

Hohmann in both the 100-meter (1:02.72) and 200-meter (2:13.06) backstrokes, Jan Switkowski in the 200-meter butterfly (2:01.30), Caeleb Dressel in the 100-meter butterfly (54.18), and Mark Szaraneck in the 200-meter IM (2:05.92).

Outside of the time trials, the Gator women were led by Hohmann and Natalie Hinds who each won all four of their events. The Florida men received a four-win performance from newcomer Jan Switkowski who gathered top finishes in all four of his respective races. Caeleb Dressel also had a strong outing, taking wins in three of his four events.

In the diving well, Senior Kahlia Warner led the way with a pair of wins off the 1-Meter (318.00) and 3-Meter (348.98) while Delaney Dye and Emily Mosher finished 2-3 off both boards behind her.

Dalton Goss took fourth in the men's 1-meter event, pacing the Florida divers with a score of 299.70. Sam Smith was Florida's top finisher off the 3-Meter after diving to a second-place mark of 376.80. Zach Hernandez finished close behind in third (346.28).

Associate Head Coach Martin Wilby on the Day:

"It's always hard when you come back after break so tonight was a good evaluation point and we were able to evaluate everyone tonight so it was a good opportunity.

"A lot of our swimmers were able to go home for break and take a few days to clear their minds from swimming. We'll be back for Auburn and the SEC Championships in just a few weeks here so they're ready to be back in the swing of things.

"Beating a rival is always exciting and good for the fans, but from a coaching standpoint we took this win ultimately as an opportunity to see where we're at and what we need to improve on as we approach the postseason."

AUBURN (LCM) | JAN. 23

GAINESVILLE, Fla. -- In a battle among four of the top teams in College Swimming, the fourth-ranked University of Florida men's swimming and diving team and 11th-ranked women's squad split a head-to-head dual against SEC-rival Auburn on Saturday afternoon inside the Stephen C. O'Connell Center in Gainesville, Florida. The Gator women upset the 10th-ranked Tigers, 192-108, while the men came up just nine points short in a close fall to the seventh-ranked Auburn men's team, 154.5-145.5.

The Gator women tallied wins in 13-of-16 events while the men's team registered seven throughout the day. In addition to the wins, seven Gators posted U.S. Olympic Trial-qualifying times in nine separate long-course events (complete list below).

Senior Natalie Hinds was responsible for one of those Olympic Trial-qualifying times on the women's end after taking first place in the 50-meter freestyle (26.10). It was only fitting that Hinds, on Senior Day, would go on to win all four of her respective events as she closed out her career in the O'Dome. The Midland, Texas, native posted additional top finishes in the 100-Meter freestyle (52.03), 100-Meter butterfly (1:02.96), and her last as a member of the 400-Meter freestyle relay team (3:54.03).

Seniors Jessica Thielmann and Ashlee Linn also left the O'Dome on a high note following Senior Day. Thielmann gathered wins in the 800-Meter freestyle (8:50.26) and 400-Meter freestyle (4:21.96), while Linn was victorious in the 200-Meter IM (2:20.50) 400-Meter relay quartet alongside Hinds.

On the Men's side, the Gators jumped out to a fast start in the individual events with a strong showing in the 1,500-Meter freestyle from senior Arthur Frayler. The Fort Washington, Pennsylvania, native clocked a season-best time of 15:49.53.

Sophomore Caeleb Dressel and senior Corey Main helped keep the Gators in contention, teaming up for five wins on the day. Main took top finishes in the 100-Meter backstroke (56.54) and 400-Meter freestyle relay with a time of 3:24.01. Dressel, who was also on the 400-Meter relay quartet, added first-place showings in the 100-Meter (50.49) and 50-Meter freestyle with a season best mark of 22.49.

In the diving well, the Florida women took the spotlight with a 1-2 finish off the 1-meter in addition to the Top-3 spots off the 3-Meter. Seniors Emily Mosher and Kahlia Warner went 1-2 off the 1-meter and traded places on the 3-Meter. Delaney Dye had a strong showing off the 3-Meter, finishing third overall.

Senior Zach Hernandez (361.95) posted a runner-up finish off the men's 3-Meter springboard while redshirt-sophomore Dalton Goss dove to a personal best off the 1-Meter (310.95) to highlight the men's side.

SECC CHAMPIONSHIPS | FEB 16-20

COLUMBIA, Mo. -- The University of Florida men's swimming and diving team brought home their fourth consecutive and 37th overall Southeastern Conference Championship on Saturday night behind four individual and four relay crowns throughout the week. The program's 37 SEC Championship titles rank second amongst all sports in the history of the SEC (Kentucky Men's Basketball, 45).

Outlasting second-place Auburn (1,223) and third place Georgia (1010), the Gators registered (1,275) team points. Caeleb Dressel, who shattered UF, SEC, and American records throughout the week, led all scorers with 96 individual points in addition to his 248 as a member of UF's relay teams.

It wasn't only Dressel that got it done this week for the Gators though. Florida was strong in all events, capturing individual victories in the 50 and 500-Yard Freestyle and the 100-Yard Butterfly. In addition, the Orange and Blue won four relay titles this week, taking wins in the 200 and 400-Yard Medley relays, and the 200, and 800-Yard Freestyle relay events.

On the women's side, the Gators ended their conference championship week in sixth place, with a team score of 754 points UF's women won three SEC titles throughout the week, as Kahlia Warner dove to gold-medal finishes on the one and 3-Meter, and Natalie Hinds swam to a first-place finish in the 100-Yard Freestyle (47.35).

Overall, Florida won 11 SEC championships, broke eight school records and registered 11 NCAA 'A' Cuts as each team will now prepare for next month's NCAA Championships in Atlanta, Georgia.

TENNESSEE | JAN. 30

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. -- The University of Florida men's and women's swimming and diving teams had a strong finish to the 2016 regular season as the No. 3 men and No. 9 women each posted wins over a pair of ranked Tennessee squads on Saturday inside the Allen Jones Aquatic Center. The Florida men took a 185-115 decision over UT's 12th-ranked men's lineup while the Florida women came away with a 170-130 decision over the 13th-ranked Lady Vols.

The Gator men (6-4, 2-2 SEC) opened their day with the 200-yard medley relay, which turned into a close race as the Orange and Blue edged the Volunteers by .04 seconds. The quartet of junior Jack Blyzinskyj and sophomores Mark Szaraneck, Jan Switkowski, and Caeleb Dressel touched out with a time of 1:26.27.

Dressel continued to shine throughout the meet as he paced the Florida men and finished with four wins. The Green Cove Springs, Fla. Native added top finishes in the 100-yard breaststroke (53.07), 50-yard freestyle (19.41), and 200-yard IM (1:46.40).

Mitch D'Arrigo kept the lead with a first-place showing in the 1,000-yard freestyle, posting a time of 9:04.77, which currently ranks 12th nationally. Arthur Frayler finished shortly behind in second-place (9:04.88).

The Florida men, who now own an eight-year winning-streak over the Vols and a 23-20 lead in the all-time series, would finish the afternoon taking wins in 11-of-14 swimming events.

On the women's side, the Gators (5-5-1, 4-1 SEC) found their groove early, taking wins in three straight races following a close second-place finish in the opening 200-yard medley relay.

Senior Jessica Thielmann found success in those early wins, posting the 11th-fastest national time in the 1,000-yard freestyle this season (9:47.50). The Newcastle, England, native also posted an additional win in the 500-yard freestyle (4:49.53) later on.

Senior Natalie Hinds, the returning SEC Swimmer of the Week, had a strong showing on Saturday, swimming to a pair of wins in addition to a runner-up finish. The Midland, Texas, native took her first victory by .01 seconds in the 50-yard freestyle over Tennessee's Faith Johnson, edging Johnson with a time of 22.48. Hinds later went on to win the 100-yard freestyle, touching out at the 48.72 mark -- just .15 seconds ahead of Johnson.

The Orange and Blue wrapped up Saturday's competition with wins in 10-of-14 swimming events while lengthening their all-time dual lead over Tennessee to 28-2.

In the diving well, the Gators were led by Senior Kahlia Warner who won both the one and 3-meter events with scores of 344.40 (3-meter) and 292.88 (1-Meter). Newcomer Samuel Smith had a pair of top-3 finishes, coming in third off the 3-meter (310.50) and second off the 1-meter (358.88).

ZONE DIVING CHAMPIONSHIPS | MARCH 7-9

ATLANTA -- Senior Kahlia Warner and freshman Sam Smith dove their way to the NCAA Championships as the University of Florida diving team capped the third and final day at the 2016 NCAA Zone B Diving Championships in Atlanta. Today's competition was dove from the platform event inside the McAuley Aquatic Center on Georgia Tech's Campus.

Warner led the Florida women with an NCAA-qualifying performance for the third-straight day. The Queensland, Australia, native posted a prelims score of 254.45 in her first five dives and bettered the mark in the finals with a 267.90 to finish sixth overall (522.35).

Senior Delaney Dye dove her final collegiate meet this afternoon and finished on a high note, placing 17th overall in the finals with a 10-dive total of 442.15.

Newcomer Abigail Howell rounded out the divers on the women's end and nearly made the finals cut in just her first go-around at the Zone Diving Championships. The Clermont, Florida, native finished 19th overall among the field of 30, posting a five-dive score of 216.20.

On the men's side, all three Florida men had a strong preliminary showing and qualified for the platform finals. Smith, who qualified for the NCAA meet on the 1-Meter on Tuesday, led the pack. The Knoxville, Tennessee, native ranked third in the prelims (352.90) and finished sixth overall in the finals (677.05).

Senior Zach Hernandez capped his collegiate career with a strong showing in today's finals. His mark of 288.45 in the prelims ranked 13th among the 23-man field. Later in the finals, he posted a six-dive score of 309.7 to hold a 13th-place position with a 12-dive score of 598.15.

Redshirt sophomore Dalton Goss held a 15th-place position through the prelims (287.55) and totaled a score of 564.35 through 12 dives in the finals to finish 17th overall.

Florida Diving Head Coach Dale Schultz on the Afternoon:

"I couldn't be prouder of this group of seniors than I am right now. They've worked so incredibly hard and overcame adversity to finish out their careers on a high note. Each one of them had the opportunity to compete at a high level and qualify for the finals this week and Kahlia Warner in particular was fortunate enough to qualify on all three boards as we approach the NCAA Tournament.

"I'm really proud of Zach [Hernandez], Emily [Mosher], Delaney [Dye], and Kahlia [Warner] with the effort they showed all year and in their ability to lead by example.

"Kahlia and Sam each had outstanding days today and each will be moving on to the NCAA Tournament. We're looking forward to their dives throughout the week. It's been a long week for everyone and right now we need to rest up a bit and then we'll get back to work."
