## FLORIDA FIELD PRESS BOX

The Florida Field Press Box consists of four decks: Starting from the bottom and going to the top (by elevator) they are (1) Photo Darkroom and Western Union, (2) Radio and Photographers, (3) Press and (4) Photo. Here they are in detail:

**PRESS DECK:** There are 48 seats on the front row and 47 on the back row. Each reporter has 34 inches of desk space and an adjustable, swivel chair that is bolted to the floor. There are no windows on the press deck. A public address system operated exclusively for the press box gives all official information, including statistics on individual plays. **WOMEN AND CHILDREN NOT ALLOWED.**

**RADIO DECK:** There are five ample-sized, acoustically tiled radio booths with glass windows that may be opened or closed, depending upon the desire of each announcer. The front row of each radio booth will seat four people very comfortably and five in a slight pinch. The back row seats three and is adapted for engineering equipment. Each radio booth may receive the press box PA announcements by headphones.

**PHOTOGRAPHY DECK:** This is a large open-front area at the very top of the press box. It has ample table space both in front of the cameraman and behind him. **WOMEN AND CHILDREN NOT ALLOWED.**

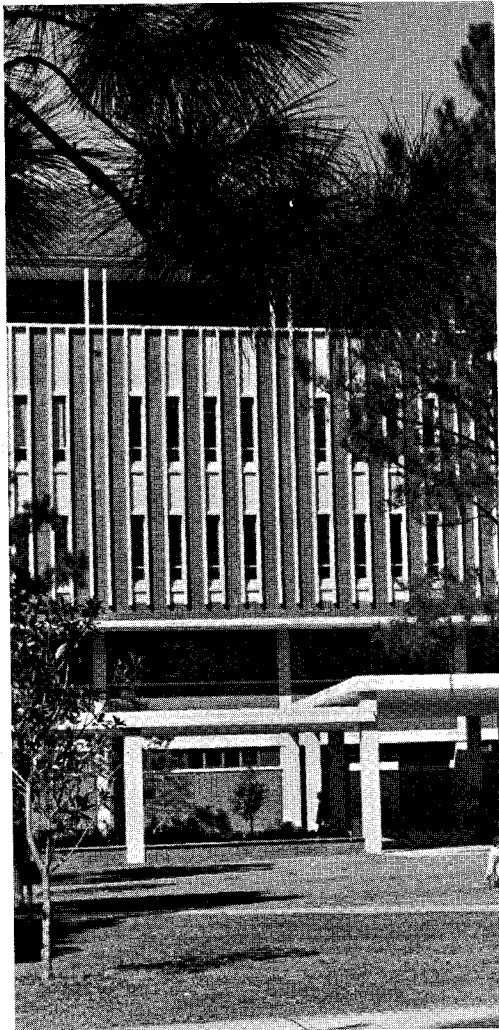

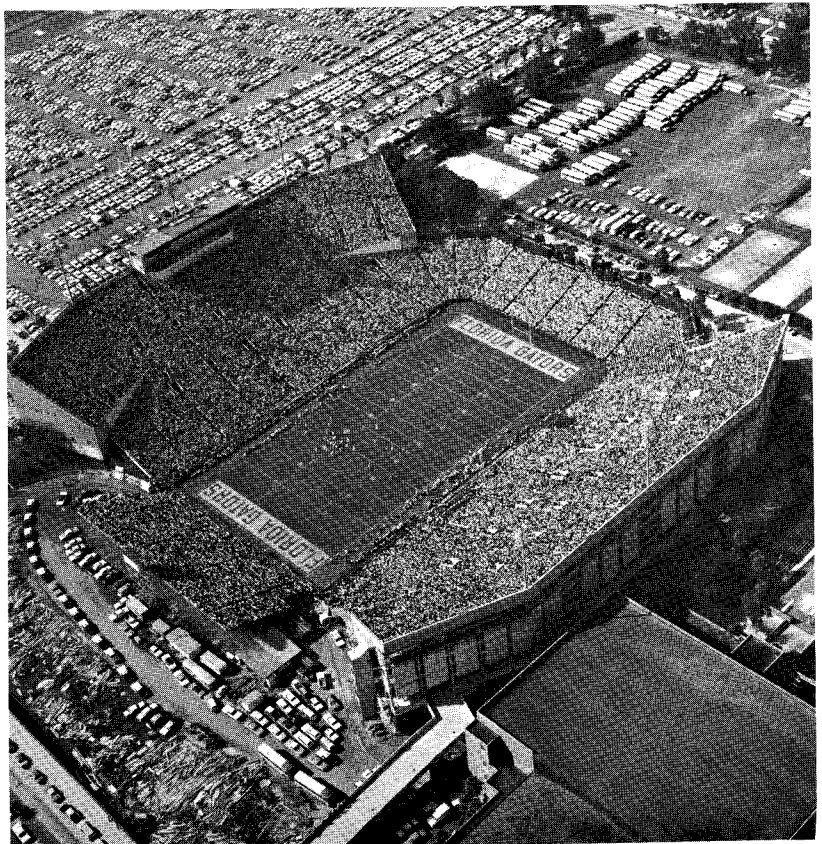

The University of Florida is one of the largest land-grant institutions in the South with a faculty of 2000 and a student body of more than 20,000. Extensive building and modernization in the last ten years has resulted in a physical plant valued at approximately 160 million dollars.

In addition to numerous special research projects in the various schools and departments, the University has established a number of independent laboratories. These agencies carry on continuous basic research in the fields of engineering, nuclear physics, agriculture, forestry, business, economics, public administration, communications and statistics, making significant contributions to private industry and government research.

A broad program in medical education, research and patient care is being carried out in the University's J. Hillis Miller Health Center. Encompassing the Colleges of Dentistry, Medicine, Nursing, Pharmacy, and Health Related Professions, the Health Center is housed in a 30 million dollar facility.

## HISTORICAL STATEMENT

In 1853 the foundation work of the present University of Florida was laid in Ocala when a small private school, East Florida Seminary, was opened. Florida Agricultural College was established at Lake City in 1883, and by 1905 six colleges were at least in part state supported. With the passage of the Buckman Act in 1905, the University of Florida was established in Gainesville. There have been six presidents: Dr. Andrew Sledd (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-28), Dr. John J. Tigert (1928-47), Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947-53), Dr. J. Wayne Reitz (1955-67), and Stephen C. O'Connell (1967- ).

## LOCATION

Gainesville is located in north-central Florida, about equi-distant—60 miles—from the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico. It is 72 miles southwest of Jacksonville, 120 miles northwest of Orlando and 150 miles southeast of Tallahassee, capital of Florida.

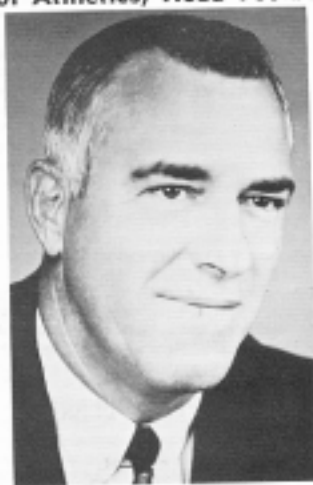

# RAY GRAVES

Director of Athletics, Head Football Coach



RAY GRAVES

Little needs to be said of Ray Graves' football coaching ability other than mere presentation of facts concerning his record at the University of Florida.

(1) Florida finished in the Southeastern Conference first division four times in 27 years prior to Graves takeover in 1960. Graves has fielded nine Gator teams with seven winding up in the first division.

(2) Florida's three highest SEC finishes have come under Graves, second in 1960 and 1966 and tied for second in 1964 while playing the toughest schedule in Gator history.

(3) Graves has compiled the best nine-year record in Florida history, with a 61-30-3 mark.

(4) Florida owns only four wins in history over teams which finished in the nation's top ten, all four under Graves. These came over Penn State (1962), Alabama (1963) and LSU (1964 and 1965).

(5) Since the formation of the SEC in 1933 Florida's five best records have been 8-3 (1952), 9-2 (1960 and 1966), 7-3 (1964) and 8-2 (1966), the latter four by Graves' teams.

(6) Graves' first team at Florida won more games (9) than any in Gator history. His 1966 team matched this.

(7) Under Graves the Gators have played in four bowl games in the past nine seasons. They are 1960 and 1962 Gator Bowl, 1965 Sugar Bowl and 1967 Orange Bowl.

As Athletic Director Graves has seen the Gator's competing in eight intercollegiate sports, total a winning percentage a shade above 70 per cent, winning the SEC all-sports crown five of the past six years.

Graves is a 1943 graduate of the University of Tennessee.

This energetic, enthusiastic speaker and recruiter came to Florida after 13 years as an assistant football coach at Georgia Tech, where he had been assistant head coach under Bobby Dodd from 1957-60.

Graves has the unusual record of having seen 14 players directly in his charge become all-Americans during his career as an assistant coach.

In addition to coaching at Tech, Graves was line coach at Tennessee from 1944-45 and a scout for the Philadelphia Eagles in 1946.

A star center during his playing days, Graves was named captain of his high school, college and professional (Eagles) teams.

His bowl record as player and coach matches any in the country. He played on Tennessee teams in 1939, 1940 and 1941 which went to the Orange, Sugar and Rose Bowl, respectively.

As an assistant coach at Tennessee and Georgia Tech, he helped guide teams that played in the Orange Bowl twice, Sugar Bowl three times, Gator Bowl twice, and Cotton and Rose Bowls once each.

He is married to the former Opal Richardson of Tazwell, Tenn. and they have three lovely daughters, Becky, 24, Kathy, 21, and Beth, 18.

## EUGENE (GENE) ELLENSON

**COACHING DUTY:** Assistant Head Coach and Head Defensive Coach.

**AGE:** 48.

**COLLEGE DEGREE:** University of Georgia (1943).

**ATHLETIC BACKGROUND:** First string guard on Georgia's great bowl teams of 1942 (Orange Bowl) and 1943 (Rose Bowl). Played with professional Miami Seahawks during their brief history (1947).

**COACHING BACKGROUND:** Line coach, Miami High, 1947-49. Assistant line coach, University of Miami, 1950. Head coach, Fort Jackson, S. C., 1951. Assistant line coach, University of Miami, 1952-55. Head Defensive Coach, University of Miami, 1956-58. Head Defensive Coach, University of Florida, 1960. Offensive line coach, University of Florida, 1961-62. Head Defensive Coach, University of Florida, 1962 Gator Bowl and 1963 season. Only three times has an Ellenson-coached defense finished the season out of the nation's top ten, during his years at Miami or Florida.

**SERVICE RECORD:** Much-decorated hero of World War II who fought in many battles in European Theatre, including Battle of the Bulge. Won Bronze Star and Purple Heart and rose to rank of captain.

**MARITAL STATUS:** Married to former Jeanne Center of Springfield, Mass., has two children; Donna Sue (18), and Mark (12).



## EDWARD (ED) KENSLER

**COACHING DUTY:** Offensive Line Coach.

**AGE:** 41.

**COLLEGE DEGREE:** University of Maryland (1952).

**ATHLETIC BACKGROUND:** Played tackle, guard, center and linebacker for great Jim Tatum-coached teams at Maryland. All Atlantic Coast Conference in 1951 and voted Maryland's most outstanding defensive lineman. Played in 1952 Chicago All-Star football game.

**COACHING BACKGROUND:** Washington & Lee (1952), VMI (1953), University of Maryland (1954-55), University of North Carolina (1956-60), University of Miami (1961-63), Line coach at each school.

**COACHING DUTY:** Head Offensive Coach, Offensive Backfield Coach.

**COLLEGE DEGREE:** University of Tampa (1952).

**ATHLETIC BACKGROUND:** Quarterback regular at Tampa, All-Service Quarterback for Parris Island Marines in 1954, received the honor over several who had earned all-America in college.

**COACHING BACKGROUND:** Backfield coach at Hillsborough High School in 1957. Backfield coach at Tampa in 1958-59-60-61. Head Football Coach at Tampa from that time until February of 1964 when he joined Gator staff.

**OTHER NOTES ON PANCOAST:** Veteran of United States Marine Corps, 1953-54-55-56. Stationed at Parris Island and spent good portion of time as Drill Instructor.

**COACHING DUTY:** Defensive Backfield Coach.

**AGE:** 40.

**ATHLETIC BACKGROUND:** Four-sport letterman at Miami Edison HS from 1944-47. Three year regular for Florida, playing offensive end and defensive halfback. Leading Florida pass receiver as a sophomore in 1949.

**COACHING BACKGROUND:** Assistant Coach, Gainesville High (1952), Assistant Coach, Lake City (1953), Head Coach, Lake City (1954-61), with an overall record of 44-22-14. Joined Florida staff in 1961 as a Graduate Assistant. Defensive Interior Coach in 1962. Offensive Line Coach in 1962 Gator Bowl and for 1963 season.

# GATOR ALL-AMERICANS



1928 — DALE VANSICKLE, End.

A spectacular end on a great 1928 team that was the nation's high scoring champions (336 points). He was Florida's first All-American. Now an actor and stuntman in Los Angeles. He is president of The Motion Picture Stuntman's Association.



1958 — VEL HECKMAN, Tackle.

One of the greatest tackles in the University of Florida's history. Chosen in 1958 on the All-American team by Football Writers' Association for Look Magazine. Picked on the AP and UPI SEC first team. Also received many other honors. Now Head Football Coach at Lakeview of Winter Garden.



1956 — JOHN BARROW, Guard.

One of Florida's All-time greats. Was selected All-American by Football Writers' Association for Look Magazine. Chosen as SEC lineman of the year by Atlanta Touch-down Club. Made AP and UPI SEC first team. Landed INS All-South first team, plus other honors. Now a star lineman in the Canadian Football League.



1952 — CHARLIE LaPRADD, Tackle.

He was an outstanding performer on Florida's first bowl team in history. He aided the Gators to a Gator Bowl championship, following the 1952 season. Now President of St. John's River Junior College.

**1964 — LARRY DUPREE, Fullback.**

Considered by most experts to be the finest running back in Gator history. Team captain who was an exceptional leader and perfect example of the unselfish, modest team man. Presently City Manager for Macclenny, Florida.



**1965 — BRUCE BENNETT, Safetyman.**

Defensive Captain, came to Florida as All-American High School product from Valdosta, Ga. First string safety on United Press International All-American team. In 1964 made second string Associated Press All-American. Rated by SEC coaches as the league's best safetyman. All-SEC as junior and senior. Holds career school record in pass interceptions with 13, tied for most interceptions (3) in one game. Now playing in the Canadian Football League.



**1965 — LYNN MATTHEWS, End.**

Finest defensive end in era of Coach Ray Graves at Florida and perhaps the best in Gator history. Three year regular who had uncanny knack of coming up with the big play at the right moment. Selected by National Enterprise Alliance (NEA).



**1965 — CHARLES CASEY, End.**

Was the SEC's leading receiver until records were broken by Florida's Richard Trapp. Casey caught 58 passes for 809 yards, eight TDs his final season of 1965.

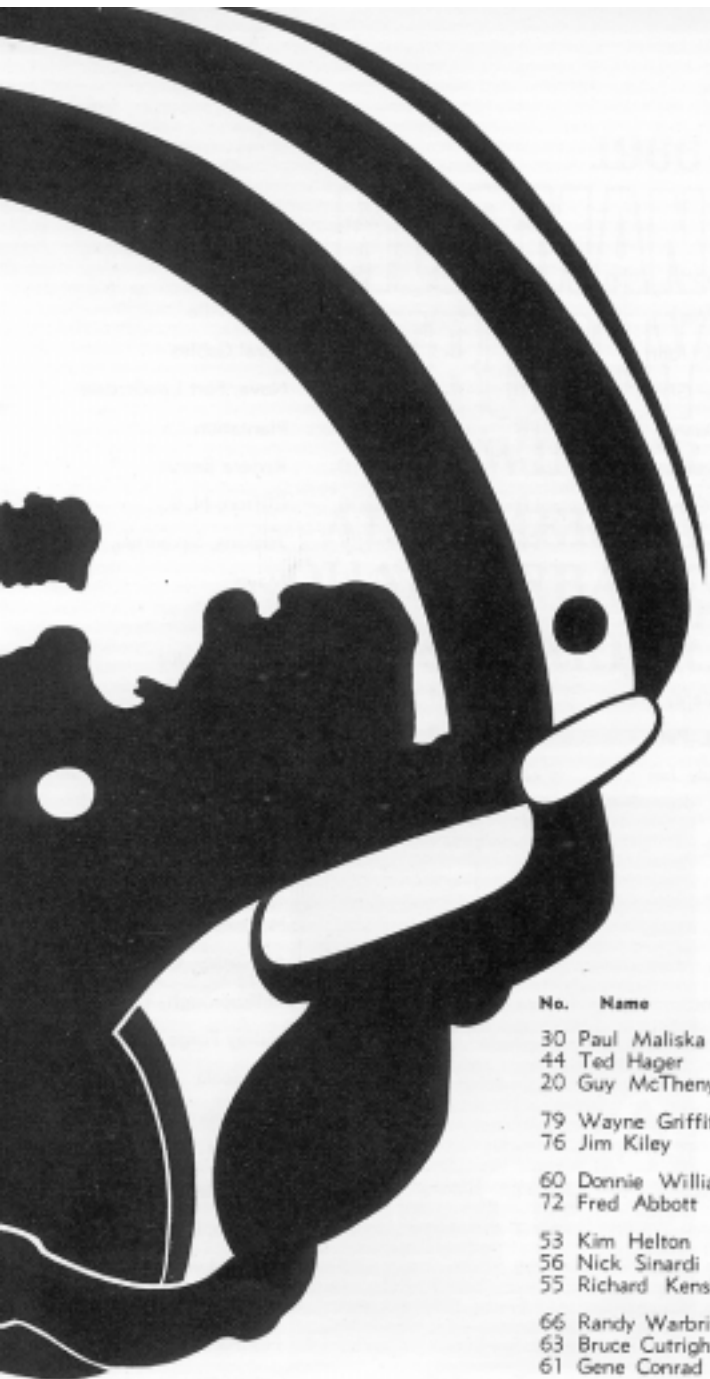

**JACK LEE (Jack) ECKDAHL, NO. 5**

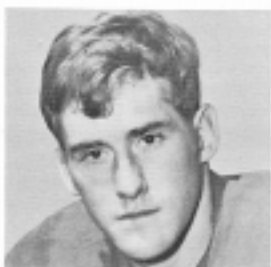

## GUY McTHENY, NO. 20

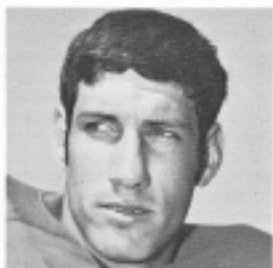

### "MILLER RECALLS CHRISTENING OF UF TEAMS AS 'ALLIGATORS'"

"A Jacksonville lawyer 'christened' the University of Florida's football team 41 years ago when he gave a pennant-designing firm in Charlottesville, Va., the suggestion of 'The Alligators.'

"Austin Miller, who has practiced law here since shortly after his graduation from the University of Virginia in 1910, yesterday recalled the circumstances surrounding the choice of a name for Florida University's athletic teams. It happened in the fall of 1907, a year after the University of Gainesville had fielded its first team.

"Miller, a native of Gainesville, was enrolled in the University of Virginia at the time and was visited by his father, Phillip Miller, a Gainesville merchant. The elder Miller, who died nine years ago, then owned and operated a combination drug store and stationery store in Gainesville, a popular rendezvous for university students.

"While in Charlottesville the father decided to order some pennants and banners for the University of Florida from the Michie Company, which was engaged in the manufacture of such items. The Millers went to the firm, where they were shown samples of pennants which fea-

tured the Yale bulldog, the Princeton tiger and other school emblems. When the manager asked for Florida's emblem, the Millers realized, the new school had none.

"Austin Miller said the name 'Alligators' occurred to him as a suitable emblem, both because the Michie manager said no other school had adopted it and because the alligator was native to this state. 'I had no idea it would stick, or even be popular with the student body,' Miller said. 'We wanted to get the Michie firm started on the pennants as quickly as possible, though, so they would be available in time for the opening of the 1908 school term.

"The Michie manager complicated the 'christening' when he told young Miller he'd never seen an alligator and didn't believe he could design one. The law student volunteered to find a suitable picture of a 'gator. After much search, he said, he located a picture of one in the library of the University of Virginia.

"The first appearance of the alligator emblem, Miller recalled, was in his father's Gainesville store in 1908. The Michie firm had supplied 'Miller's' with blue banners measuring six by three feet, showing a large orange alligator, and also with several different types of smaller banners and pennants. Some of them showed the alligator lying down, some rampant, while others included only the alligator's head.

"With the first display of the new banners and pennants in Gainesville, the name 'Alligators' to describe the football team 'caught on' Miller recalled and, now contracted to 'Gator.'"

# ATHLETICS AND ACADEMICS

University of Florida basketball is conducted within the academic framework, as an integral part of the overall composition of this institution.

He also has complete charge of the athletic tutoring program and keeps up with the progress of the athletes throughout the school year.

He came to Florida in 1957 and joined the faculty as an assistant professor of English. He took over the job of Athletic Counselor in 1958 and is still in the English Dept.

## DR. WILLIAM MOORE ACADEMIC COUNSELOR

Another vital cog in the Florida Athletic Department is Dr. William Moore, who is Head Professor of Logic and Director of Counseling for the University College program. Dr. Moore is in charge of the balancing of class hours and scheduling of classes for members of the basketball team.

He currently serves as the faculty representative on the Student-Athletic Council and is co-author of the book **Applied Logic** and others.

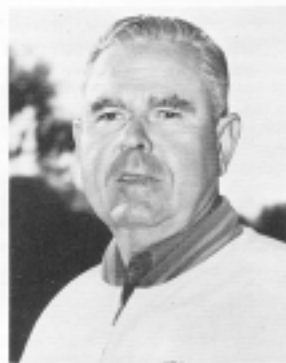

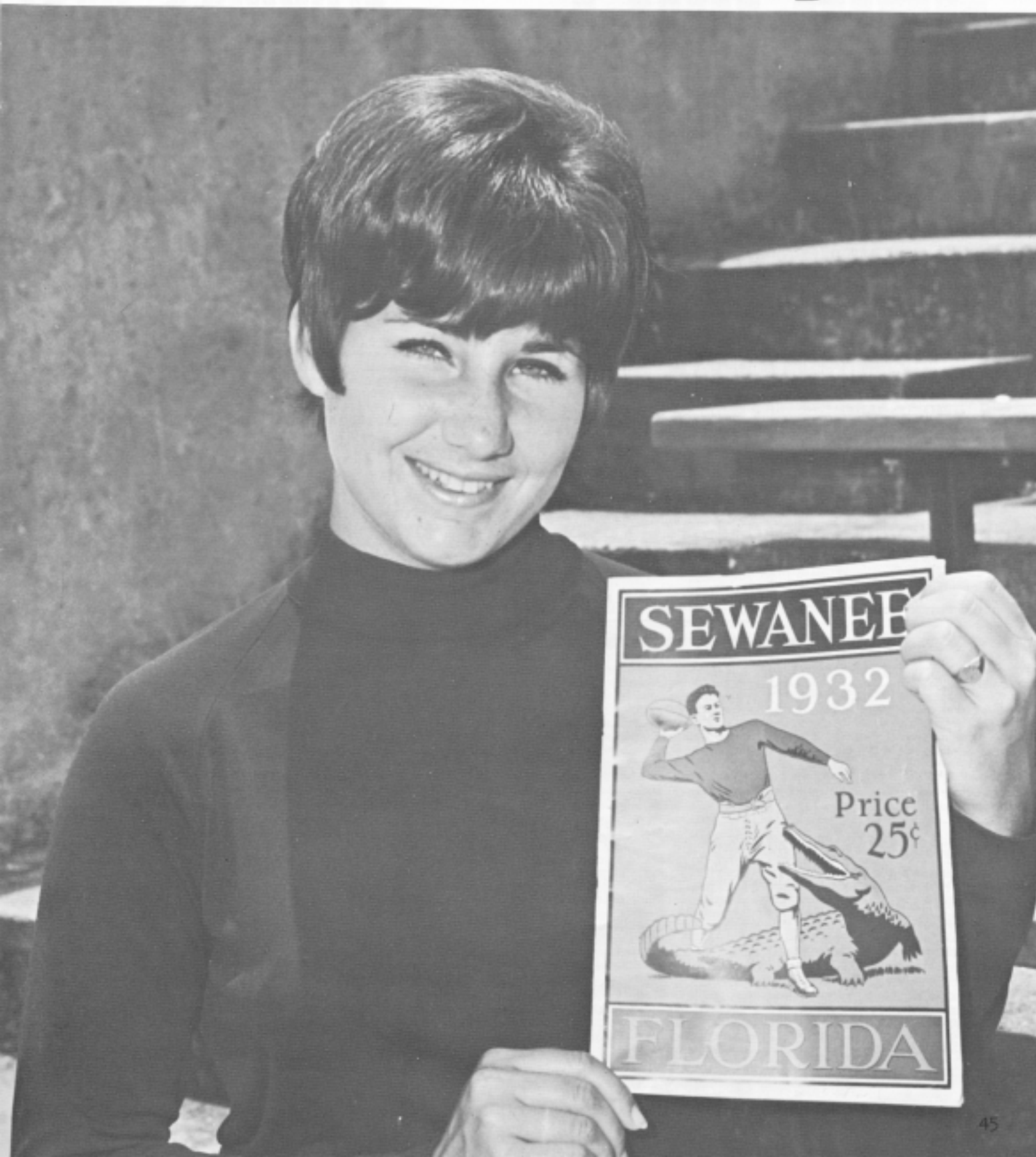

## FERGIE FERGUSON AWARD



The Forest K. (Fergie) Ferguson Award is given in memory of one of Florida's finest athletes, one of the great all-time ends to wear the uniform of the Fighting Gators. The Award is made annually in the form of a beautiful trophy, which remains in the permanent possession of the University of Florida, and is given to the football player selected as the Gator's most valuable senior each year. The winning player is announced at the annual spring banquet, and he is then invited to return to the campus to receive the award at the following Homecoming.

First to win the award was Malcolm Hammack, outstanding fullback on the 1954 eleven. Others were Center Steve DeLaTorre of the 1955 squad, and Larry Wesley, tackle on the 1956 team, Jim Rountree, 1957 halfback, Jimmy Dunn, 1958 quarterback, Asa Cox, 1959 guard, Pat Patchen and Vic Miranda, 1960, Jim Beaver in 1961, Sam Holland in 1962, Jimmy Morgan and Hagood Clarke in 1963, Larry Dupree in 1964, Charles Casey in 1965, Steve Spurrier in 1966, Richard Trapp in 1967 and Larry Smith & Guy Dennis in 1968.

### About Fergie Ferguson

Fergie came to Florida in the fall of 1938 after having been a star end for the Stuart (Fla.) High School. He became a starting end for the Gators as a sophomore, and from that time wrote several records into the books. Fergie was also a track and boxing star, and his javelin throw of 203 feet, 6½ inches won him a National AAU championship in 1942. Fergie became a second lieutenant in the U. S. Army, and was severely wounded in the Normandy landing of 1944. He so distinguished himself that he was awarded the nation's second highest medal for gallantry in action. He died of war wounds ten years after the landing.
