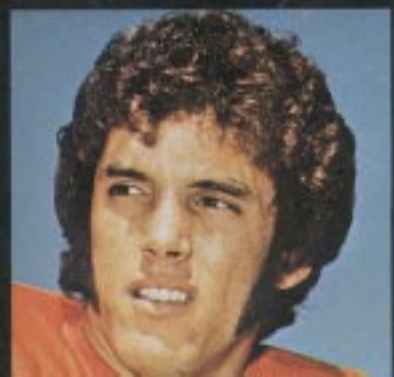

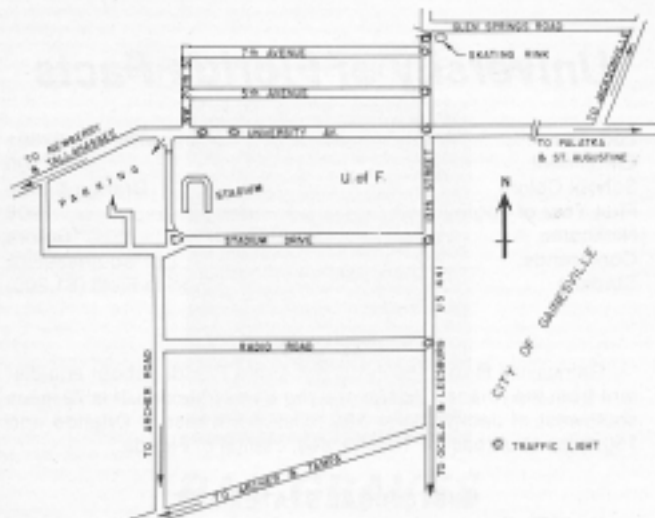

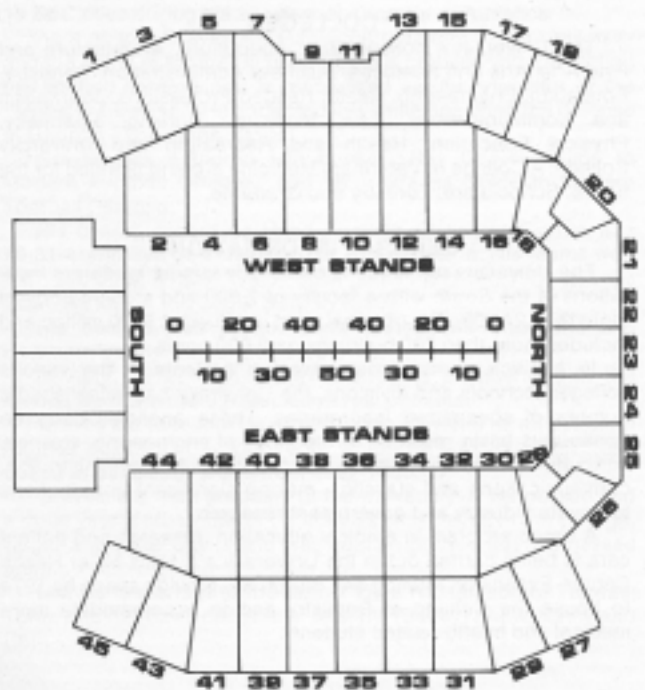

### LOCATION

Gainesville is located in north-central Florida, about equidistant from the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico. It is 72 miles southwest of Jacksonville, 120 miles northwest of Orlando and 150 miles southeast of Tallahassee, capital of Florida.

### HISTORICAL STATEMENT

In 1853 the foundation work of the present University of Florida was laid in Ocala when a small private school, East Florida Seminary, was opened. Florida Agricultural College was established at Lake City in 1883 and by 1905 six colleges were at least partially state-supported. With the passage of the Buckman Act in 1905, the University of Florida was established at Gainesville. There have been six presidents: Dr. Andrew Sledd (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-28), Dr. John J. Tigert (1928-47), Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947-53), Dr. J. Wayne Reitz (1955-67) and Stephen C. O'Connell (1967- ).

### COLLEGES

The University's colleges are: Agriculture, Architecture and Fine Arts, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Dentistry, Education, Engineering, Health Related Professions, Journalism and Communications, Law, Medicine, Nursing, Pharmacy, Physical Education, Health and Recreation and University College. A College of Veterinary Medicine is being planned for the future. Schools are: Forestry and Graduate.

### GENERAL INFORMATION

The University of Florida is one of the largest landgrant institutions in the South with a faculty of 2,500 and student body of more than 24,000. The physical plant is valued at \$200 million and includes more than 700 buildings on 2,000 acres.

In addition to numerous research projects in the various colleges, schools and divisions, the University has established a number of specialized laboratories. These agencies carry on continuous basic research in the fields of engineering, science, agriculture, forestry, business, economics, public administration, communications and statistics, making significant contributions to private industry and government research.

A broad program in medical education, research and patient care is being carried out in the University's J. Hillis Miller Health Center. Expansion totaling \$42 million will provide space by 1974 to house the College of Dentistry and to accommodate more medical and health related students.

## DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



## RAY GRAVES

When Ray Graves stepped down as Head Football Coach at the University of Florida on December 30, 1969 he completed a decade unmatched by any previous Gator coach.

As Director of Athletics Graves provides the leadership to keep the UF athletic program in the position it attained during the 1960s, a period in which Gator athletic teams won a shade under 70 percent of their contests and captured the Southeastern Conference All-Sports Championship five times.

Graves has seen Florida athletic teams, competing in nine intercollegiate sports, won two national championships (golf) and 15 SEC titles during his 13 years as Director of Athletics.

As a coach, Graves left many contributions to the University and the game of football in general. He is credited with perfecting the shifting defense and is recognized as the originator of the "Monster Defense." He perfected this while coaching the defense at Georgia Tech in the 1950s.

Graves has authored two books, "Ray Graves Guide to Modern Football Offense" and "Ray Graves Guide to Modern Football Defense."

His overall record as Head Football Coach at Florida was 70-31-4 with five bowl teams, four of which won. His teams won the 1960-1962 & 1969 Gator Bowl games and the 1967 Orange Bowl. He lost in the Sugar Bowl in 1966.

His decade also produced 14 football All-Americans and Heisman Trophy winner Steve Spurrier.

In April, 1972, Graves was elected to membership in the Florida Sports Writers Association Hall of Fame.

Graves came to Florida in 1960 after 13 years as an assistant football coach at Georgia Tech, where he was assistant head coach under Bobby Dodd from 1957-1960.

Graves is a 1942 graduate of the University of Tennessee and a three year football starter for the Vols who played in the Orange, Sugar and Rose Bowls and was captain of the 1941 Tennessee team.

Graves is married to the former Opal Richardson of Tazwell, Tenn. and has three daughters, Mrs. Bill (Becky) Shaw, Kathy and Beth.

## HEAD FOOTBALL COACH DOUGLAS ADAIR (DOUG) DICKEY

Doug Dickey, a 1954 graduate of the University of Florida, returned to his alma mater as Head Football Coach on December 30, 1969, bringing with him credentials as one of the nation's finest football coaches.

In nine seasons as a head coach he has compiled a record of 62-31-5, had five bowl teams, two Southeastern Conference championship teams and was named the league's coach of the year two times.

Dickey, 41, began his head coaching career at the University of Tennessee in 1964 and after an initial rebuilding year his teams ran up five consecutive seasons of eight or more wins, the only team in the nation to accomplish this over this period.

Dickey has spent most of his life on college campuses, having been born in Vermillion, South Dakota, home of South Dakota State University, where his late father, Dallas Dickey, was a speech professor. The Dickeys later moved to Louisiana State University and then on to the University of Florida.

Dickey went to high school in Gainesville and attended the University of Florida, where he played quarterback and guided the Gators to the 1953 Gator Bowl crown.

His coaching career began in 1954 at St. Petersburg (Fla.) H.S., continued at Fort Carson, Colorado (1955-56), University of Arkansas (1957-63) and then to Tennessee and, eventually, Florida.

Dickey is married to the former Jo Ann Beville and they have four sons, Don 18, Danny 17, David 15, and Darrell 11, and a daughter, Jaren Ann 6.

Gator football fans remember Jimmy Dunn as the 137-pound quarterback who led UF teams from 1956-58, ran 76-yards for a touchdown to upset Georgia, 7-6, in '58 and stood out as one of the finest punters for accuracy in the school's history.

While not picking up much weight along the way Dunn has, none-the-less, moved up the coaching ladder rapidly. He joined Coach Dickey's original Tennessee staff in 1964 as an offensive assistant, and was in charge of the Vol offense for four seasons. He is regarded as one of the brightest young coaches in football, a prime head coaching candidate of the future.

Mention the name Knotts in North Carolina and they will tell you of an entire clan which played football for Duke University. One of the finest was Doug Knotts, an All-American prep athlete in Albemarle, N.C. who starred for the Blue Devils as a center and tackle from 1952-55.

Knotts joining Coach Dickey's staff came in 1965. He took over the defense following the 1966 season and his troops have been among the nation's best the past few seasons.

Knotts is known as a "tough but fair" coach who has a close relationship with his defensive players.

Ken Hatfield was not only a great football player at Arkansas, leading the Razorbacks to two bowl games and leading the nation in punt returns in both his junior and senior seasons, but was a campus leader who was elected president of his senior class in 1964.

Hatfield was twice named to the Southwest Conference all-star team and all-academic team and was first team Academic All-America his senior year.

Hatfield began his collegiate coaching career at Army in 1966, being assigned to West Point while a member of the U.S. Army. He joined Coach Doug Dickey at Tennessee in 1968 as assistant freshman coach and moved rapidly up to head freshman coach, then varsity pass receiver coach.

In addition to coaching the Florida secondary Hatfield is active as advisor to the campus Fellowship of Christian Athletes chapter.

Don Breaux joined the Gator coaching staff in January of 1973 as coach of the wide receivers. As such, he will work primarily with the overall passing game.

Breaux started his coaching career at FSU, where he tutored the quarterbacks and wide receivers in 1966 and 1967. The last time FSU beat Florida in football Breaux coached the two athletes most involved, quarterback Kim Hammond and split end Ron Sellers.

He also served as offensive backfield coach at Arkansas from 1968-71 and coached the running backs for the Houston Oilers in 1972.

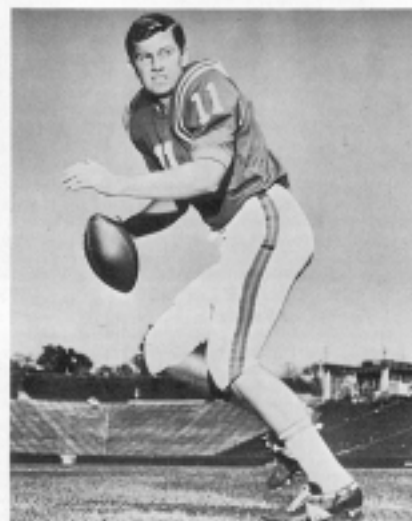

## 1973 UNIVERSITY OF FLORIDA FOOTBALL OUTLOOK

Coach Doug Dickey's Gators will be improved in every phase of the game in 1973 and will face a most demanding schedule with a team which will feature solid defense, good kicking and an offense headed by one of the nation's top backs in Nat Moore.

Florida started nine sophomores and two freshmen in 1972 and went 5-5-1 against a schedule described as the SEC's toughest. The Gators were only beaten by more than one touchdown in one game, a 24-7 loss to Alabama.

The Gators will be a more mature football team in 1973 with 39 lettermen returning. They lost only one offensive starter and three on defense.

"We have good quality in our squad," says Coach Dickey. "We have some big play people and some depth in players who can make winning plays. I think Florida football has arrived at a point where we can look the best teams in our league in the eyes. Now we must find the winning edge against this calibre of competition. This is what we did not do in 1972."

The 1972 Gators lost to Auburn, 26-20, Georgia, 10-7, and tied LSU, 3-3, in addition to the loss to Alabama. These teams, plus Mississippi, are all on the 1973 schedule and must be played in a row.

"The winning edge for us rests in a lot of areas," Dickey says. "Areas such as conditioning, development of skills, luck on injuries to key people and breaks over the course of a season. Our schedule is very demanding and I believe there will be several close games in 1973."

Moore is the key to the Florida offense. He came to the Gators as a junior college basketball star who had played only two

seasons of football in his life and had not played in two years. He wound up the year breaking the school rushing record and having veteran SEC observers call him the most dangerous back in conference history.

The senior tailback from Miami gained 845 yards on 145 carries and led the team in pass receiving with 25 for 351 yards. He scored 78 points and most of his 13 touchdowns came on long, spectacular bursts. His scoring jaunts included trips of 60 yards against Alabama, 46 against FSU and Ole Miss, 52 against Auburn, 49 against Georgia and 26 against Mississippi State.

"I doubt if there is a better all-around offensive back in the country," Dickey says of Moore. "He can do everything, run, catch, block, return kickoffs, cover punts . . . whatever you want done he does in a super fashion."

David Bowden is the Florida quarterback, a slippery 5-10, 168-pound junior who led the SEC in passing as a sophomore. Bowden hit on 108 of 229 passes for 1481 yards and a dozen touchdowns in 1972.



**Nat Moore 60 For TD Vs. Alabama**

Florida started five sophomores in the interior offensive line last season and should be improved here with a year's experience and the return of tackle Kris Anderson, a pre-season All-SEC choice in 1972 who missed most of the year with a knee injury.

"We have not been happy with the overall performance of our wide receivers," Dickey says. "We need to be improved in this area and I hope we are, based on the spring practice work of Lee McGriff, Glenn Sever, Hollis Boardman and Joel Parker."

Defensively, Florida should be pretty stout. A secondary which led the Gators to a school-record 23 pass interceptions in 1972 returns with a genuine All-America candidate in safety Jim Revels, who intercepted three passes for a return of 118 yards and one TD, recovered two fumbles and caused six more last year.

Defensive ends Ricky Browne and Preston Kendrick, tackles John Lacer, David Hitchcock, David Starkey and Clint Griffith,

linebacker Ralph Ortega and defensive backs Wayne Fields and Tyson Sever are other tested veterans with proven ability.

The kicking game will be handled by Buster Morrison and John Williams. Morrison averaged 38.4 per kick last season as a sophomore and came on very strong late in the year. Williams took over the field goal work in midseason as a freshman, hitting on five of nine including a 47-yard effort against Kentucky and a clutch 31-yarder in a driving rain with 2:10 left to tie LSU.

Dickey is concerned about lack of depth at running back and linebacker. Senior Vince Kendrick is an excellent fullback who carried 121 times for 591 yards in 1972, but there are no proven runners behind him or Moore.

Florida lost two of their three linebackers, returning only Ortega. Sophomore Sammy Green and junior Glenn Cameron are

the leading candidates but here again there is little in the way of proven performers.

Dickey believes Alabama and Georgia have physically stronger teams than the Gators, that LSU and Auburn probably have better team speed and quickness and that the schedule of 7 conference games in a row will be most difficult.

He does concede, however, that his Gators have a better chance against these types of teams than they have had in the past.

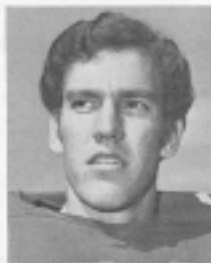

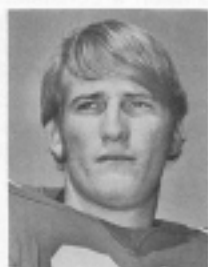

## FERGIE FERGUSON AWARD

The Forest K. (Fergie) Ferguson Award is given in memory of one of Florida's finest athletes, one of the great all-time ends to wear the uniform of the Fighting Gators. The Award is made annually in the form of a beautiful trophy, which remains in the permanent possession of the University of Florida, and is given to the football player selected as the Gator's most valuable senior each year. The winning player is announced at the annual spring banquet, and he is then invited to return to the campus to receive the award at the following Homecoming.

First to win the award was Malcolm Hammack, outstanding fullback on the 1954 eleven. Others were Center Steve DeLaTorre of the 1955 squad, and Larry Wesley, tackle on the 1956 team, Jim Rountree, 1957 halfback, Jimmy Dunn, 1958 quarterback, Asa Cox, 1959 guard, Pat Patchen and Vic Miranda, 1960, Jim Beaver in 1961, Sam Holland in 1962, Jimmy Morgan and Hagood Clarke in 1963. Larry Dupree in 1964, Charles Casey in 1965, Steve Spurrier in 1966, Richard Trapp in 1967, Guy Dennis and Larry Smith in 1968, Steve Tannen in 1969, Jack Youngblood in 1970, John Reaves in 1971 and Fred Abbott in 1972.

### About Fergie Ferguson

Fergie came to Florida in the fall of 1938 after having been a star end for the Stuart (Fla.) High School. He became a starting end for the Gators as a sophomore, and from that time wrote several records into the books. Fergie was also a track and boxing star, and his javelin throw of 203 feet, 6½ inches won him a National AAU championship in 1942. Fergie became a second lieutenant in the U. S. Army, and was severely wounded in the Normandy landing of 1944. He so distinguished himself that he was awarded the nation's second highest medal for gallantry in action. He died of war wounds ten years after the landing.

## FLORIDA FIELD PRESS BOX

The press box at Florida Field consists of four decks: Starting from the bottom and going to the top (by elevator) they are (1) President's Deck, which houses a lounge for the President of the University and his guests. This deck also has Western Union facilities. (2) Radio Deck. (3) Working Press Deck. (4) Photo Deck.

**WORKING PRESS DECK:** There are 48 seats on the front row and 47 on the back row. Each reporter has 34 inches of desk space and an adjustable chair. This deck also contains the outside PA announcer's position and the controls for operating the electric scoreboard.

Admission to the Working Press Deck is limited strictly to members of the press covering the football game. No VIPs are allowed on this deck, nor children or non-working women. Requests for credentials must be made with the Sports Publicity Office at least a week in advance, in writing.

Priority system for seats on this deck is based on (1) Reporters filing copy for Sunday editions (2) Daily newspapers who do not have Sunday editions. (3) Others wishing to cover the game.

**PHOTOGRAPHY DECK:** This is a large open-front area at the top of the press box. Most space is unreserved, however, some areas are reserved for game film and television show crews, other television and still cameramen.

No VIPs will be admitted to this deck and children and non-working women will not be admitted. At the request of working photographers this will be strictly enforced.

Please note: As per SEC rules, armbands must be worn on sidelines.

**DARKROOM:** A modern, air-conditioned darkroom is located at field level, Southeast corner just under the ramp to Yon Hall.
