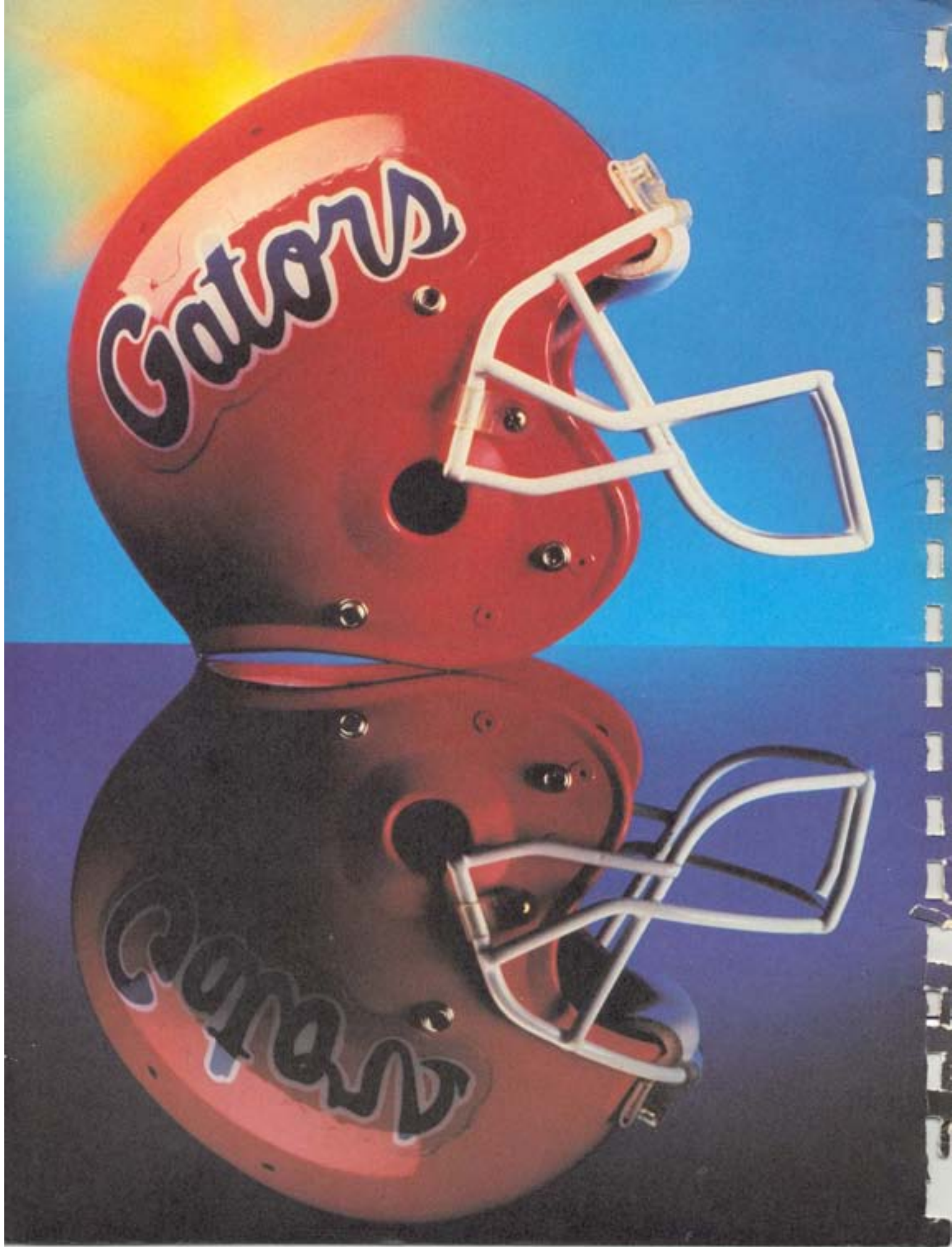


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ON THE COVER

MEDIA INFORMATION



The University of Florida was one of just five schools in the nation that received a special recognition award in 1985 from the Football Writers Association of America for outstanding press box facilities and gameday operation.

The University of Florida Athletic Department is very pleased to supply this preseason publication on the 1987 Gator football team and program. We hope that it will answer many of your questions throughout the next few months. We sincerely appreciate your tremendous interest in the Florida football program. We will do everything possible to meet your many needs throughout the course of the season. This guide will be supplemented with weekly materials throughout the entire season. Please take a moment to review the following information which will assist you throughout the course of the season.

PRESS BOX

ENTRANCE TO PRESS BOX—Enter the Press Box via the Press Elevator that is located midway at the base of the West Stands (press box side of the field). This elevator will go to all levels of the press operation. "Press Will Call" will be located in the press elevator lobby at street level. You will pick up late request credentials and parking passes here.

PRESS BOX LEVELS—There are seven levels in the Florida Field Press Box: 1) President's Deck which houses a lounge for the University President and his guests; 2) Bull Gator Club; 3) Working Press Deck—print media—; 4) Coaches Scouting Booths, Television Networks, Home and Visiting Radio Networks; 5) Photo Deck including Coaching films for both teams; 6) Luxury Box Level; 7) Luxury Box Level.

WORKING PRESS DECK (Level 3)—This level is reserved for print media, and statistical operations. **Telecopier Service** is available on a first-come first-serve basis. We suggest that you let us know in advance what your needs in this area might be on game day.

TELEVISION NETWORKS, RADIO NETWORKS, COACHES BOOTH (Level 4)—This level is reserved for television networks that are doing the game on a live or delayed basis. This level also houses the radio network for Florida and its respective opponent on game day. Each of the coaching staffs has one booth designated for its use. This level also contains the serving and eating areas for media representatives only.

PHOTO DECK (Level 5)—This deck offers a spacious area for all video cameras that are covering the game. This area also will be used for filming by each of the coaching staffs. Security and Game Operation booths are also located on this level.

SIDELINES

The University of Florida follows NCAA and SEC rules regarding media representatives on the sidelines. Photographers are not permitted to shoot between the 25 yard lines and they must wear an armband at all times. No credentials will be issued to free-lance photographers, cut-line writers,

equipment carriers, or radio station representatives except for the two originating networks.

CREDENTIALS

PRESS BOX—All members of the media covering the game in a working capacity must seek appropriate credentials in **advance** from Norm Carlson. We would appreciate receiving these requests as early as possible. Requests for **working** space in the press box and photo passes for the sidelines will be honored from Sports Editors of DAILY Newspapers and Sports Directors of Television Stations **ONLY**. Due to the heavy demand for working space, credentials for radio stations are limited to immediate Gainesville area stations and the two broadcast network crews doing the game. Any radio station seeking in-game and post-game reports can receive them by calling the SID Office in advance to make proper arrangements with our staff. Request for working credentials must be made in advance **in writing** to

MEDIA INFORMATION CONTINUED

Norm Carlson. Spouses, dates, non-workers, and anyone 16 years of age or younger, are not permitted in the press box. Violators will not be tolerated.

SIDELINE CREDENTIALS—Media representatives with gameday sideline credentials must report to the Press Elevator Lobby prior to the game. When you present your game credentials or appropriate letter, a sideline armband will be issued at that time. Your game credential will not gain admittance to the sidelines. You must have a game armband.

PRESS WILL CALL

Game credentials and parking passes not mailed can be picked up at "Press Will Call" in the Press Box Elevator Lobby. Game stand tickets that have been ordered by the media must be picked up at the regular Will Call Window at Gate 2 which is right next to the Press Box Elevator Lobby.

PARKING

Media parking is located on Fleming Field, just outside the north endzone off of University Avenue. You should request your parking credential at the same time you request your game day working credential. If time permits, both of these credentials will be mailed. If time doesn't permit the parking credential to be mailed, you will have to pick it up at the Press Box Elevator Lobby before gaining admittance to the press parking area.

HOTEL ROOMS

The SID office has a limited number of rooms reserved in the area. We would be glad to assist you with a hotel room if you get in touch with us at least a week before the game. Please contact Harriette Peebles and she will do everything possible to assist you.

PRESS BOX SERVICES

Play-by-play, complete halftime and final statistics, coaches quote sheet, defensive stats, and game notes are all regular services on game day. Upon your arrival, you will receive an extensive press folder with game program, flip-card, updated statistics, biographical sketches, and game-day notes. Coach Hall will conduct a conference in the media room in the south endzone 15-20 minutes after the game. His conference can also be heard via an amplified phone hookup in the Press Box. The opponent coach will conduct his press conference outside the opponent locker room located through the southeast tunnel. Florida's SID staff will begin to escort you to the proper areas with around five minutes to go in the game.

TELEPHONES

We strongly encourage you to make sure that your phone needs are met before gameday. Telephone orders should be placed directly with Southern Bell in Gainesville (1-800-257-5400). Remember, you must place separate orders for your phone line and for the appropriate equipment or you must bring the appropriate equipment with you. The SID office will not be able to help you with a phone line and/or equipment on the day of the game. You must take care of these matters as soon as possible. A bank of wall phones are available to the media on level three of the press box (print media and statistical operations). The SID office does have a few other phones that it uses for telecopier services and radio reports. Once again, if you envision deadline problems we strongly encourage you to order your own line as the SID phones, telecopier phones and the wall phones available to the media are in almost constant use for two hours after the game.

FLORIDA-GEORGIA GAME—telephones are extremely limited for this game at the Gator Bowl in Jacksonville. There is only one wall phone in the press

350-4656) as soon as possible to order your line. Remember, you must bring your own phone or order a phone. If you don't take care of your phone needs in advance, you will experience problems on gameday in getting your story sent.

COACH HALL INTERVIEWS

The best time to interview Coach Hall on the telephone is 11:30-noon and 1-1:45 on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday. He is good about returning all calls if you leave a message. He will normally return calls during these time frames. Please coordinate all requests for personal interviews with Coach Hall with Norm Carlson in the SID office. On every Sunday prior to a game the upcoming Saturday, Coach Hall will conduct a conference call at 3:30 p.m. with media representatives. These representatives are asked to make arrangements with Norm Carlson or John Humenik at least one day in advance of the 3:30 p.m. conference call. Every Tuesday, Coach Hall will conduct a press conference at Florida Field. He will do radio and TV interviews from noon until 12:45 in the conference room in the south endzone complex of Florida Field and then conduct a joint press conference for all media representatives in the Yon Hall Dining Room from 1:00-1:30. He will also take part in a SEC teleconference each Tuesday morning at a time to be announced.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS

ALL player interviews must be coordinated with the Sports Information Office at least **one day in advance**. We strongly urge you to conduct your personal interviews on Monday evening and Tuesday prior to the upcoming game. On Monday evening and Tuesday, players requested will be asked to come to the conference room in the south endzone. Monday and Tuesday evenings are also reserved for phone interviews with out of town media. Please call at least one day in advance for phone interviews. A note will then be left on the player's locker and dorm room asking him to return your call. All personal player interviews will conclude on Tuesday. The Florida SID office will also conduct a teleconference with Kerwin Bell and 2-3 other players each Wednesday at a time to be announced. The Yon Hall Dormitory, team locker-rooms and training areas are considered private team areas. These areas are off limits to media representatives unless accompanied by SID office personnel.

PRACTICE

All members of the media are permitted to attend practice. Please call the SID office for clearance. Coach Hall will meet with all interested media at the conclusion of each practice. Players are not available for interviews on the way to practice or returning from practice. Players are also not available for interviews on the practice fields. TV crews are permitted to gather B-roll film on Tuesday during the first three periods after cal and the flex exercise period. This will give you periods of contact work and action. B-roll filming for the rest of the week is limited to cal and flex exercise sessions only. There are no exceptions.

GATOR SPORTSLINE

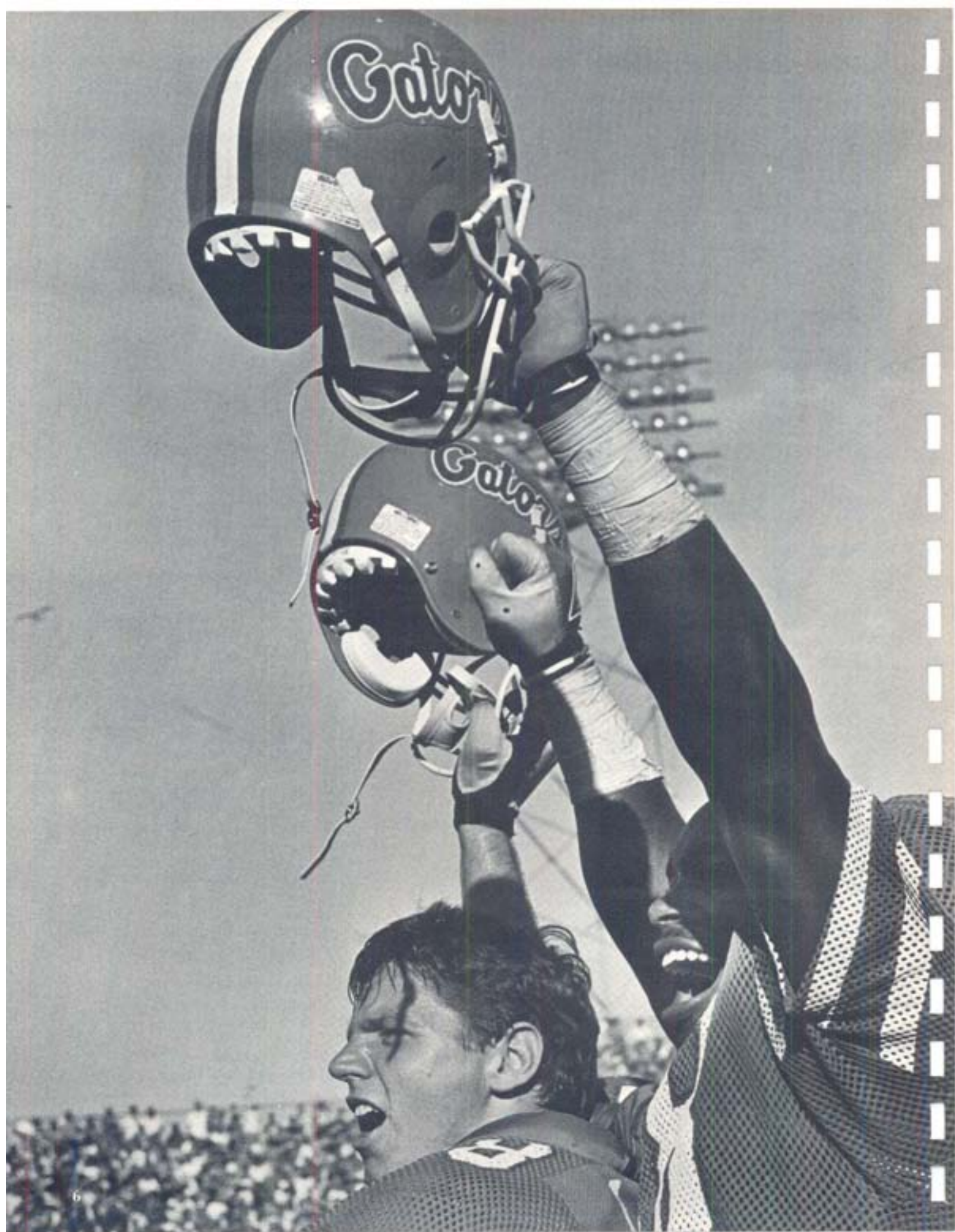
The Florida SID office will tape coach and player interviews for your use throughout the week. The general format of the Sportsline will be: Monday—Florida defensive coach interview about the opponent offense; Tuesday—Coach Hall's comments from his weekly press luncheon; Wednesday—Offensive coach interview about the opponent defense; Thursday—Player interviews; Friday—Player Interviews; Saturday—Coach Hall's post game comments. The Sportsline number will be published in the weekly release material you will receive or by calling the SID office.

VIDEO SERVICE

On a weekly basis, Florida will send satellite interviews of Coach Hall and several players to television stations that desire the service. Please contact David Steel, Network Coordinator, in the Florida Athletic Department, regarding this service in advance. Interviews are taped on Tuesday and sent via satellite on Wednesday. If interested, please call David Steele at 904-392-0664. The SEC office will also be sending a satellite feed of player and coach interviews from all ten conference schools on Wednesday.

1987 PREVIEW ANALYSIS AND ROSTERS



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1987 PREVIEW

Florida's NCAA probation and sanctions came to an end late last fall, but when Galen Hall completed his third spring practice as the Gators head mentor the impact of the 1984-86 probation was quite evident. The actual probation and sanctions were over, but the impact of the lower scholarship signee totals in 1985 and 1986 and an overall scholarship cap of just 75 last fall have left the Gator squad virtually devoid of depth.

Florida was undermanned during much of the 1986 season in which it posted a 6-5 record against a schedule that the NCAA ranked as the toughest in the nation. Florida ended the '86 campaign with just 70 scholarship players and started spring drills with just 57 returning scholarship players. Every area of the squad is short on depth and/or experience, especially on the offensive and defensive lines, linebacker, and wide receiver.

By all accounts, Florida appeared to have had an excellent recruiting year in 1987. The 1987 recruiting season marked the first time since 1982 that Florida coaches were able to recruit without rumors of impending probation or the actual probation sanctions that applied in 1985 and 1986. More-than-likely, many in the new recruiting class will be counted on to contribute this fall. The need of young and inexperi-

enced players to contribute right away, however, is a risky proposition against a schedule that might very well rank as the nation's toughest once again. Gator coaches, however, have no other alternative due to a depth-depleted squad.

Florida's squad in 1987 will be extremely young and inexperienced. Twenty-five new freshmen scholarship signees plus nine redshirt freshmen will represent nearly 40% of the Gators projected 88 man scholarship roster. The 25 new freshmen scholarship signees is just three short of the total freshmen that Florida was able to sign in the combined 1985 and 1986 recruiting years due to NCAA sanction scholarship limits. Furthermore, 21 of the 56 returning scholarship players have seen little-to-no action at the major collegiate level. When the new freshmen join the squad this fall, nearly half of the projected scholarship roster will then be composed of untested junior college transfers, sophomores, redshirt freshmen and true freshmen. To say the least, that's not a positive situation for the Gator coaching staff.

Developing depth throughout the squad, individual improvement, and re-establishing and improving the running game were primary points of focus this spring.

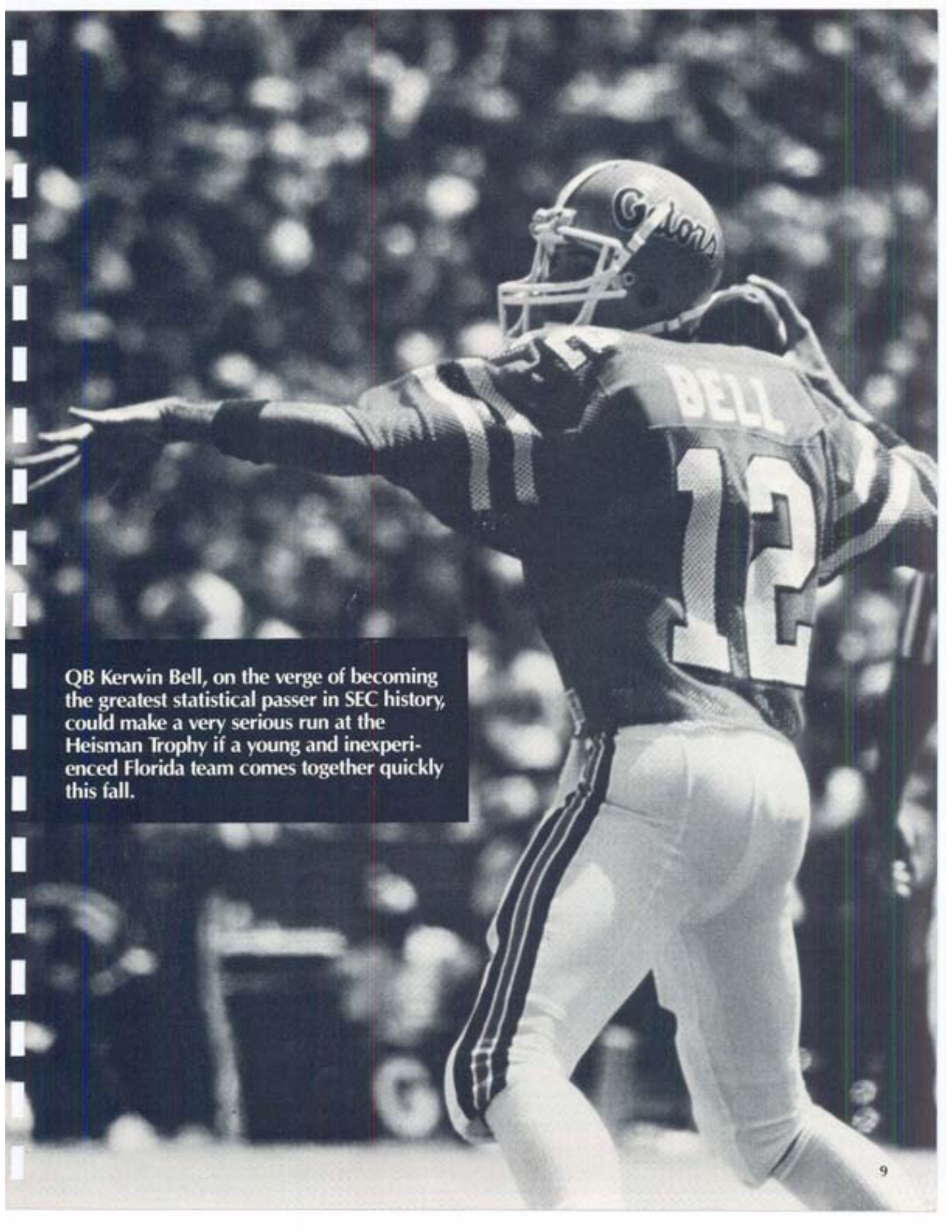
Hall will greet a team in August that returns 40 letterwinners and 13 starters from last year's contingent. Eighteen letterwinners and 7 starters return on offense while 21 letterwinners and 6 starters return on defense. Florida will boast some of the nation's top returning players.

Headlining the list of returnees is QB Kerwin Bell. The 6-3, 210 pounder will be entering his fourth season as the Gators starting QB. Bell is unquestionably one of the nation's top returning offensive performers in 1987. The former walk-on, non-scholarship signal-caller, could break many all-time Southeastern Conference records this fall. He already ranks eighth on the all-time league passing yardage list with 5,816 yards and also ranks fourth in career TD passes with 47. Florida's John Reaves holds the top spot in each conference category with 7,549 yards and 54 TD throws. If Florida and Bell get off to a good start in 1987, the already unforgettable legend of Kerwin Bell in the state of Florida could include a serious run at the Heisman Trophy.

Florida boasts some other top all-star candidates as well in 1987.

Junior offensive tackle David Williams (6-6, 290) appears destined to become one of Florida's all-time great offensive linemen. Senior defensive back Jarvis Williams was a first-team All-SEC and second team (Sporting News) All-America choice in 1986. He's started 33 straight games for the Gators. Senior outside linebacker Clifford Charlton (6-3, 232), a first-team All-SEC choice in 1986, could break all of All-America Wilber Marshall's and Alonzo Johnson's career marks for QB sacks and total tackles for loss. Due to a lack of television exposure Charlton hasn't received national publicity, but there is no doubt among the Gator coaches that he is unquestionably one of the nation's premier linebackers. He will be a serious challenger for the "Butkus Linebacker of the Year Award."

As mentioned above, Florida's 1986 schedule was rated the toughest in the nation by the NCAA. Don't be surprised if the '87 slate earns a top rating as well. Florida faces six squads this fall that appeared in bowl games last season (Miami, Alabama, LSU, Auburn, Georgia, Florida State). Each of those squads is expected to be ranked in most 1987 pre-season Top Twenty listings. What makes the challenge even more demanding, however, is the fact that of those six games, only one (Florida State in the season finale) will be played at friendly Florida Field where the Gators have posted a 30-4-2 record since the start of the 1981 season.

THE OFFENSE

Galen Hall and his offensive staff enter the fall with perhaps the nation's premier quarterback in Kerwin Bell, relatively inexperienced wide receivers and tight-ends and more experience than last season at the running back positions. The offensive line is seeking improved consistency in both the rushing and passing phases of the game.

The staff will be seeking to put more punch into an offense that saw its production fall from an average total of 406.5 yards per game in 1985 to 312.6 in 1986. Inconsistencies, young running backs, and a general lack of depth throughout the unit resulted in the offensive fall-off. The Gator offense managed to score more than 18 points in just three games in 1986. The keys to improving the Gator offense in 1987 will be to continue to improve the running game, replace a pair of veteran offensive linemen and to come up with a big-play receiver now that the sparkling Ricky Nattiel has graduated.

Overall, Hall will greet seven returning starters and 18 lettermen from an '86 offensive unit which saw its run production significantly reduced from previous seasons. The 1984 Gator offense averaged 244.8 yards per game rushing, the '85 squad 140.7 and the '86 contingent 129.6. Improving this phase of the offensive attack was a prime priority this spring.

Key losses from last year are wideouts Ricky Nattiel and Eric Hodges, two-time first-team All-America offensive lineman Jeff Zimmerman, and Frank McCarthy, a two-year starter at center. Nattiel, a speedster who registered over 2,000 career reception yards, had 44 total catches in 1986. The six returning wideouts combined for just 21 total catches in 1986.

QB Kerwin Bell, on the verge of breaking several SEC passing records, and offensive tackle David Williams are the most prominent post-season honor candidates.

RUNNING BACK

This was the least experienced segment of the Florida team in 1986 but it now becomes one of the most experienced heading into the '87 campaign as all top six ball carriers return. Improved productivity is a must if UF is to become better offensively.

Octavius Gould (6-0, 210), who led the Gators in rushing in 1986 as a true freshman with 562 yards, junior Wayne Williams (5-11, 194) and senior James Massey (6-0, 211) return at tailback. Gould, a second-team Football News Freshman All-America selection last fall, had four starts in 1986. He ranked third on the team in receptions with 21. Williams, who opened the year as the starter at tailback, ranked second on the squad in rushing with 340 yards. Massey ranked third in rushing with a total of 206 yards. Gould averaged 3.6 yards per carry, Williams 4.3, and Massey 2.9. Some newcomers could enter the battle for playing time this fall.

Senior Anthony Williams (6-1, 224), a starter in all eleven games in 1986, returns at fullback. He ranked fourth overall on the squad in '86 in rushing with 191 yards (4.9 avg.) and second in receiving with 22 catches. Williams is being pushed by sophomore Cedric Smith (5-10, 214) who had an excellent spring. Sophomore Darryl Perry (6-0, 216) provides further depth.

RECEIVER

This is an area that has been hit hard by graduation. The Gators lost their three top receivers via graduation—Ricky Nattiel, Eric Hodges and Bret Wiechmann. Developing depth and some deep threats are a key this August. Improved productivity at tight-end will also be a priority.

Nattiel in particular will be difficult to replace. He might very well be the most prominent departure from last year's contingent. The 4.3 speedster completed his career as the SEC's ninth all-time leader in career reception yardage with 2,089. His 18 career TD catches ranks as the fifth best total in SEC history. In short, he was one of the finest big-play performers in the nation last year and will be sorely missed by QB Kerwin Bell. Nattiel was a first-round NFL draft selection.

"Combined, the squad's six returning wide receivers had 21 total catches last fall for 311 yards and one TD. The three departing wide receivers (Ricky Nattiel, Eric Hodges, Bret Wiechmann) combined for 71 catches in 1986 for 915 yards and 9 TDs."

Sophomore Stacey Simmons (5-10, 180) came out of spring practice as a projected starter at one of the wide-out positions. Competition for the other starting spot as well as prominent backup roles will continue in August. Sophomore Tony Lomack (5-8, 185) missed most of spring practice with a broken arm while sophomore Darrell Woulard (6-3, 210) missed a good deal of valuable learning time with nagging injuries. Simmons and Lomack were moved to the wide-receiver position midway during last fall. Simmons responded with seven catches on the year while Lomack had one. Woulard had 11 catches in 1986, a total that ranks first among the returning receivers.

Combined, the squad's six returning wide receivers had 21 total catches last fall for 311 yards and one TD. The three departing receivers (Nattiel, Hodges, Wiechmann) combined

for 71 catches in 1986 for 915 yards and 9 TDs.

Junior Willie Snead (6-0, 186), a walk-on transfer from the University of Virginia, and senior Ed Frazier (5-11, 181) are also very much in the picture for playing time. Redshirt freshman Ernie Mills (5-11, 179) was moved from cornerback to wide receiver with a week left in spring drills due to injuries at that post. Because of his speed, a team-best 4.29 in the 40, he showed a good deal of potential. Senior walk-on Gene Lawson (5-10, 170), a former player at Michigan, is another name that could surface this fall. Some incoming freshmen could enter the battle this fall as well. Junior John Spierito (6-0, 183) was moved from free-safety to wide receiver during the spring to provide some further depth.

Florida coaches are hoping for improved productivity at tight-end in 1987. Gator tight-ends combined for just six total catches in 11 games during the '86 campaign. Junior Mark McGriff (6-2, 239) will have to battle to retain the starting nod at tight-end that he held throughout the last half of the season. McGriff must contend with junior Clifton Reynolds

(6-3, 241), redshirt freshman Kirk Kirkpatrick (6-2, 220) and possibly veteran Walter Odom (6-4, 233), who is attempting to regain his eligibility, a development which would be a tremendous plus for the team if it is accomplished. Odom was a starter in 1984 and 1985. JC transfer Kelvin Calhoun (6-4, 260) will enroll at UF this summer, another development which could improve play at this position this fall.

OFFENSIVE LINE

No other area on an offensive football team receives less attention when things are going well and more attention when they aren't than the offensive line. With Florida's nearly 100 yard drop-off per game in total offense from 1985 to 1986, the Gator coaches are well aware that improved consistency in this area is a must if Florida is to become more productive-offensively in 1987. The offensive line, like the defensive line, however, was an area of the squad that was most affected by the NCAA probation and scholarship sanctions. Very, very few quality linemen were signed in 1984, 1985 and 1986. That has severely hurt the depth of this group.

Two-year starting center Frank McCarthy and Jeff Zimmerman, the only two-time first-team All-America offensive lineman in Florida history, have graduated and leave big shoes to fill in the Gator interior. Zimmerman was a third-round selection in the NFL Draft. Junior David Williams (6-6, 290), a second-team All-SEC and first-team Football News Sophomore All-America selection in 1986, has the potential to become the finest offensive lineman in school history. He's expected to become a prominent post-season honor candidate. He missed the entire spring after undergoing back surgery but is expected to be 100% by August.

Also back in 1987 are guards Bob Sims (6-5, 267), a senior, and junior Charlie Wright (6-5, 265). Both transferred from junior colleges to Florida last year and eventually earned starting positions. Senior Jimmy Davis (6-6, 279), who has a dozen starts to his name as a guard over the course of the past two seasons, moves to tackle.

Sophomore Richard Starowsky (6-0, 275) had a good spring and inched ahead of Wright at the strong-guard position at the close of spring drills. Sophomore Chris Birch (6-3,

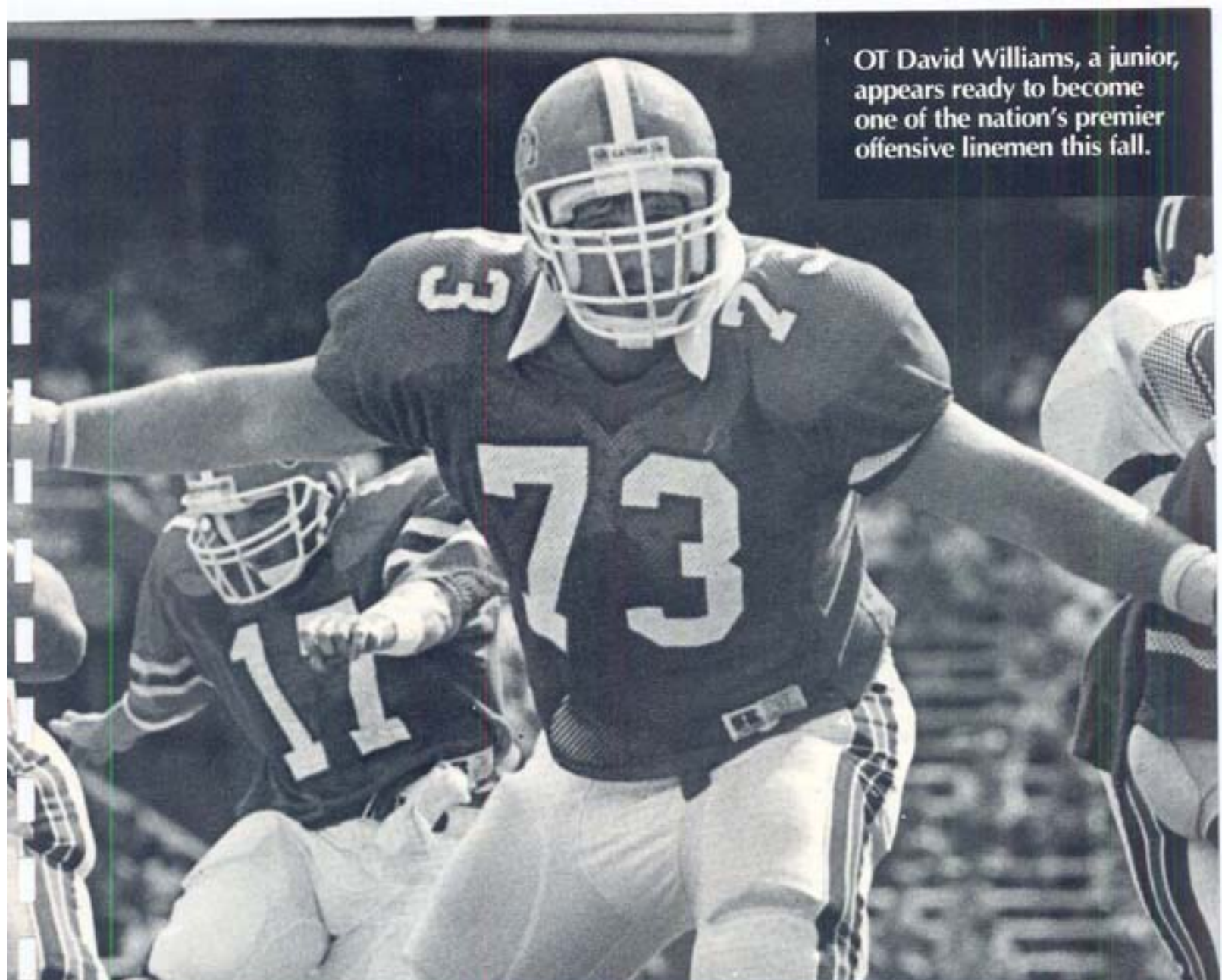
240) and junior Kevin Sills (6-3, 283) are the other primary backups at guard. Sophomore John Durden (6-6, 270) worked with the first-unit at offensive tackle due to Williams' back surgery. He and sophomore Brad Hatcher (6-4, 268) are the top backups at tackle. Durden showed steady progress this spring.

The battle to replace two-year starter Frank McCarthy at center should continue into fall practice camp. Junior Tracy Daniels (6-1, 245) and redshirt freshman Chris Bromley (6-4, 245) staged a spirited competition for that position this spring with Daniels holding a slight edge going into August. Sophomore Robert Laskey (6-3, 252) provides the additional depth.

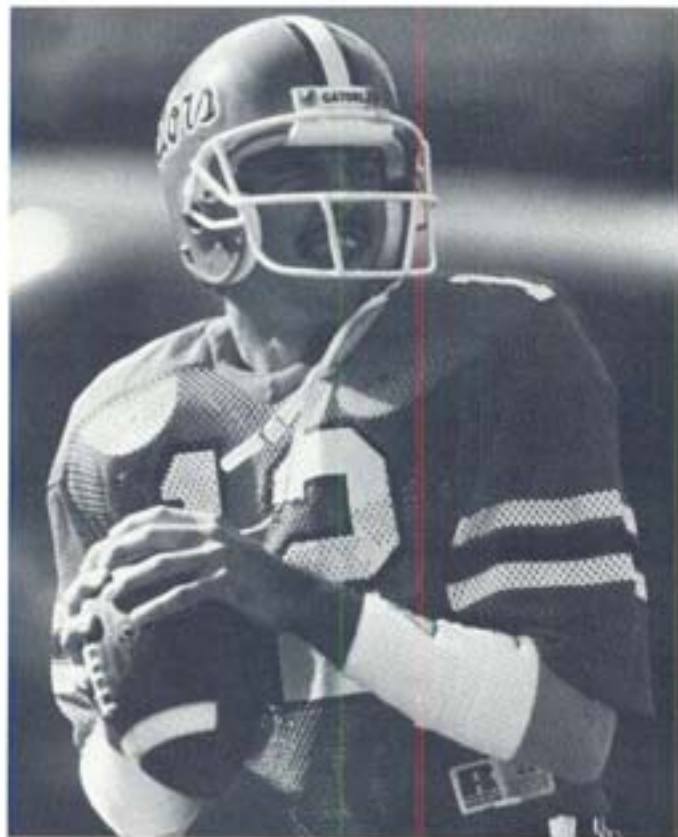
QUARTERBACK

He will enter the 1987 season with a legitimate shot at earning All-America honors and serious Heisman Trophy consideration.

Bell, a former walk-on from tiny Day, Florida, has become a legend among Gator followers over the course of the past three seasons. He earned "SEC Player of the Year" honors in 1984 as a freshman and then followed that year with a superb 1985 campaign that saw him throw for nearly 2,700 yards and 21 TDs. By the conclusion of the 1986 season he had thrown for over 5,800 yards and his 47 career TD passes

were the most ever for a QB at the conclusion of his junior year of eligibility in SEC history. His 47 career TD passes is the sixth best total for a QB at the conclusion of his junior season in NCAA history. In short, Kerwin Bell has achieved a great deal, but due to NCAA sanctions that kept the Gators off of television in 1985 and 1986 the nation has not had an opportunity to see him and to hear his rags-to-riches story. Florida can appear on TV in 1987 and if Bell and the Gators get off to a good start, then he could indeed make a serious run at some of the nation's premier awards.

Senior walk-on Pepe Lescano will enter August camp as the squad's top backup at quarterback due to the decision of Rodney Brewer, Bell's top backup in each of the last three seasons, to pursue a career in professional baseball. An

incoming freshman could enter the picture as a primary backup candidate.

THE DEFENSE

If Florida is to maintain its place among the annual defensive leaders in the Southeastern Conference there must be several players who step forward this fall to provide depth which is sorely lacking at this point. Overall, six starters and 21 lettermen return from last year's unit.

Only three defensive interior linemen have seen extensive playing time—tackles Henry Brown and Rhondy Weston and middle guard Jeff Roth. Outside linebacker Clifford Charlton is a definite All-American candidate, but he is the lone returnee with solid and extensive playing time at any of the four linebacking positions. Both starters at the inside linebacking positions last year, Scott Armstrong and Arthur

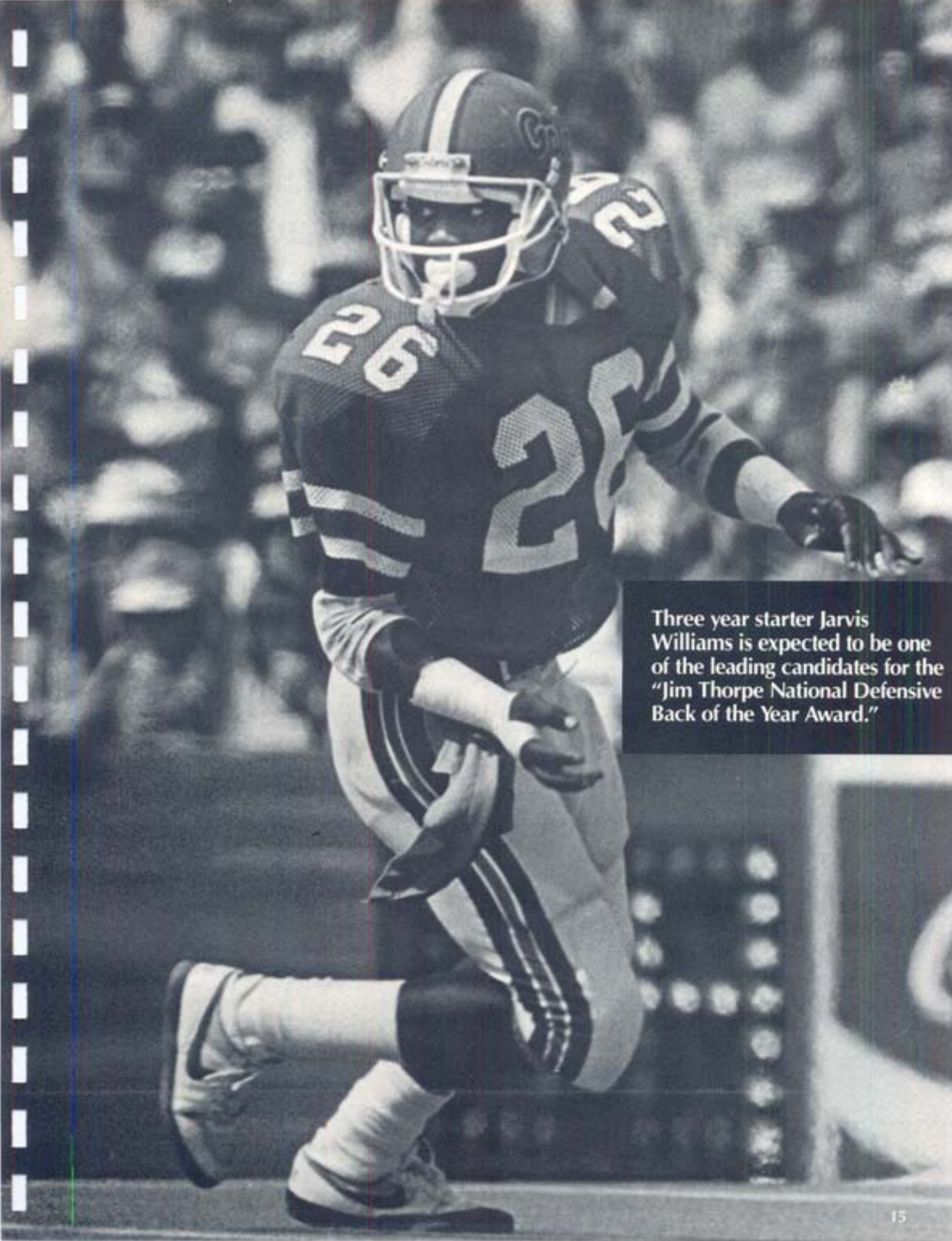
White have departed. Also gone is steady first-team All-SEC tackle Keith Williams and strong-safety Adrian White, a first-team All-SEC and second-team All-America selection last fall.

The strength of the defensive unit appears to once again be the defensive secondary. All-SEC and second-team All-America selection Jarvis Williams has started 33 consecutive games. Senior cornerback Ricky Mulberry and free-safety Louis Oliver also return.

Florida has ranked second, first, first, and third respec-

tively in total defense in the SEC during the past four seasons. The 1986 Gator stop-troops ranked third in the SEC and 16th overall in the nation in total defense giving up just 291.8 yards per game. The unit was solid throughout the season and superb in the last half of the campaign. The Gator defense gave up just six total TDs in the last six games of the season and surrendered only 13 total points in the second half in the final four combined games. If the Florida defense is to maintain the type of success it has become accustomed to in recent years, it will take a lot of quality playing time from new faces in the lineup.

SECONDARY

This was the strength of the defense last fall and it's expected to be once again in 1987 with three returning starters. The '86 secondary gave up just four TD passes the entire year, none in the final six games of the campaign. Opponent quarterbacks combined to post only a 91.8 passing efficiency rating vs. this unit over the course of the year. There was only one departure from this group, but he's a big loss—strong safety Adrian White, a first-team All-SEC and second-team All-America selection last fall. White was selected in the second round of the NFL Draft by the Super Bowl Champion N.Y. Giants.

The top returnee is Jarvis Williams (6-0, 198), a three-year starter at cornerback. Williams, a first-team All-SEC and second-team Sporting News All-America choice in 1986, is just four interceptions shy of establishing a new Florida career record in that category. Williams is generally regarded as one of the nation's premier returning defensive backs and he's expected to be a prime candidate for the nation's top

defensive back award, the Jim Thorpe Trophy. Williams spent virtually the entire spring at strong-safety. He's expected to see a majority of time at that spot this fall. He will, however, see duty at cornerback in certain situations.

Mulberry, who underwent knee surgery after spring practice but is expected back, will start at one corner position.

Sophomores Tony Jones (5-11, 182) and Kerry Watkins (5-11, 193) will continue their battle for the other starting cornerback post this August. Louis Oliver, a former walk-on, returns as a starter at free-safety. The 6-2, 214 pound junior could become a post-season honor candidate. Oliver saw a good deal of playing time at strong-safety as a freshman in 1985 and he could see some action there this fall as well. Junior Dwayne Glover (6-0, 185) and redshirt freshman Richard Fain (5-11, 186) will be the primary backups at safety. Glover is one of the secondary's most versatile players. He was used extensively as a fifth back in passing situations last fall and will probably see action this fall at both the free-safety and cornerback positions. Junior Bill Lang (6-0, 193), senior walk-on Steve Loden (6-0, 181), sophomore walk-on Keith Howard (6-1, 180) and freshman walk-on Kurt Young (5-8, 167) are other backups.

OUTSIDE LINEBACKER

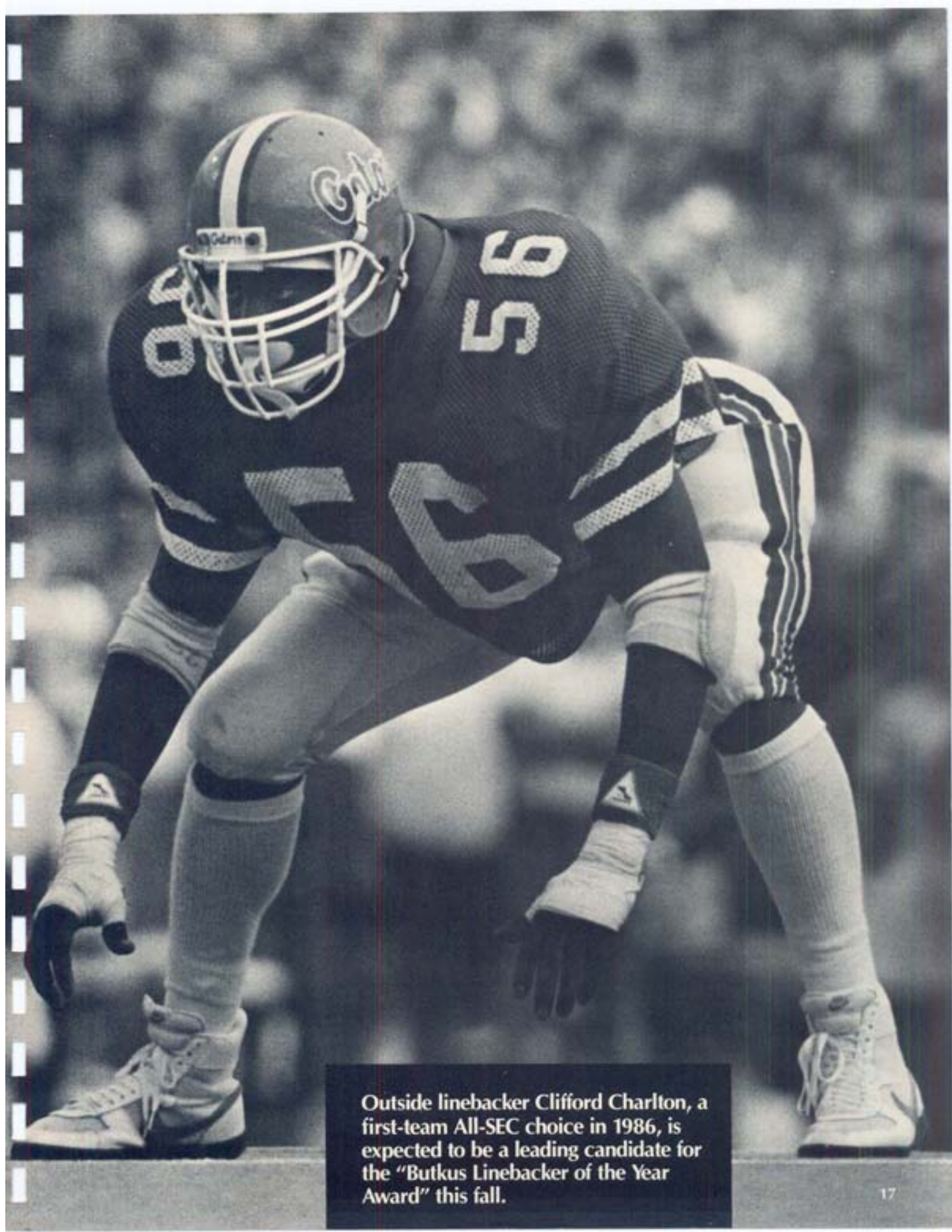
This has become a "name position" at Florida in recent years with the likes of All-Americans Wilber Marshall and Alonzo Johnson. Get ready to add senior Clifford Charlton to that list. Charlton (6-3, 232) a first-team All-SEC choice in 1986, is a definite candidate for All-America and "Butkus Linebacker of the Year" honors. Charlton could break Florida career records for QB sacks and total tackles for loss despite the fact that he will complete his career as a two-year starter whereas All-Americans Johnson and Marshall started for four and three years respectively. He's an explosive defensive force who registered 23 total tackles for loss in 1986, a figure topped only by Marshall's total of 27 in 1981.

Ron Moten (six starts) and Steve Stipe (5 starts) split time at the other OLB post last year and have both departed. The only other player on the roster with a decent amount of playing time is sophomore Jason Lamberth (6-4, 232). Lamberth underwent knee surgery this spring but he is expected back this fall.

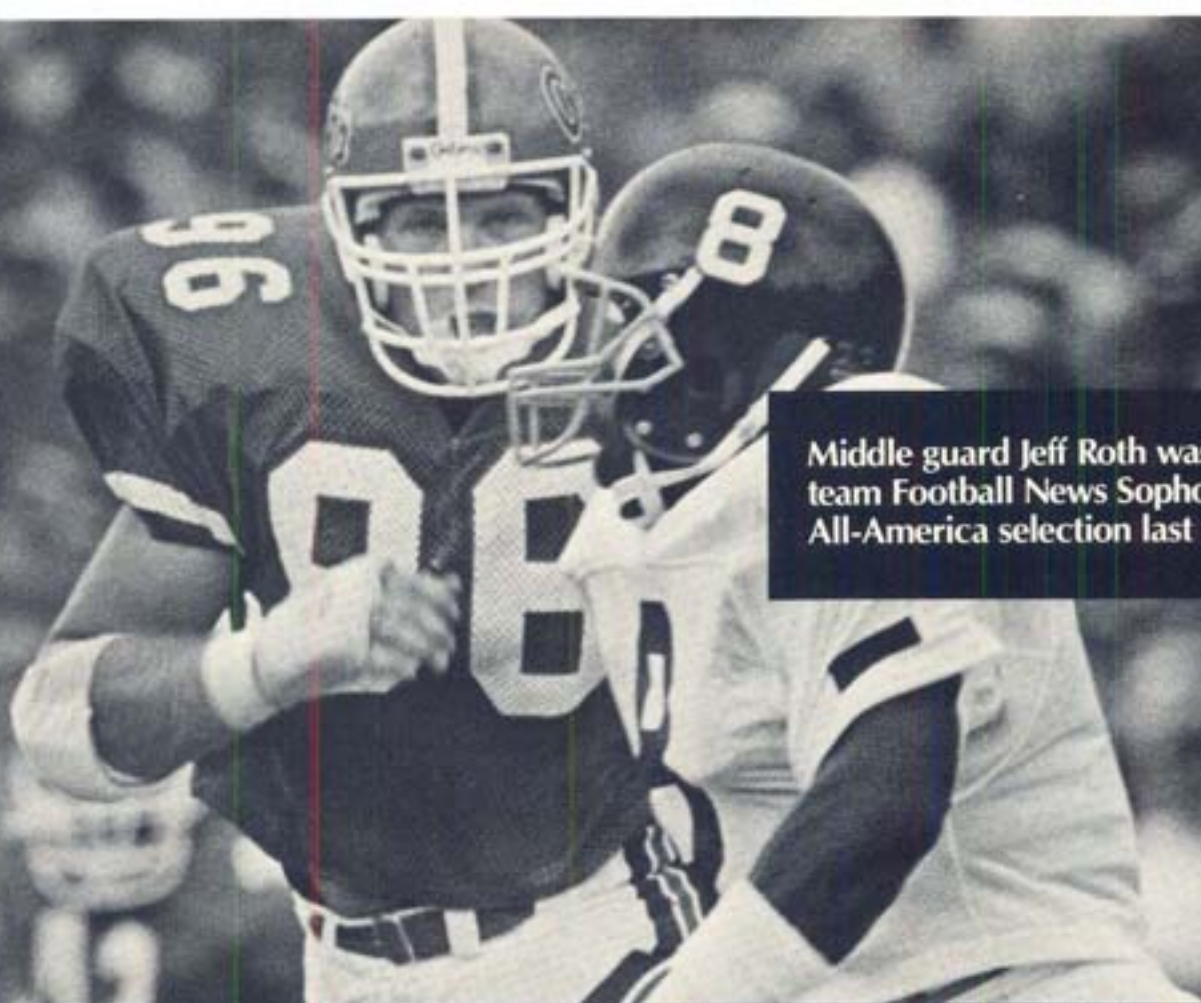
Junior College transfer Jeff Reuter (6-3, 226), senior Reggie Corlew (6-0, 230), a converted fullback, redshirt freshman Huey Richardson (6-5, 227), a former prep all-America, freshman walk-on James Speer (6-1, 220), and junior walk-on Owen Bartruff (6-1, 191), a late spring move from the secondary, came out of spring practice as the leading candidates for playing time at the two outside linebacker positions. Incoming freshmen could also enter the picture this August.

INSIDE LINEBACKER

Departures have hit this position heavily. Scott Armstrong graduated while Arthur White is academically ineligible, wiping out the 1986 starting duo at these most important

Sophomore Pat Moorer (6-1, 217), a walk-on last fall who ended the season ranked eighth on the squad in tackles with 74 and earned All-SEC Freshman Team honors, will battle senior Gerold Dickens (6-1, 227), a medical redshirt last fall, for one starting job this fall. Junior Todd Gatlin (6-2, 225) and redshirt freshman Mark Murray (6-3, 220) enter August in a

nip-and-tuck battle for the starting nod at the other inside linebacking starting spot. Moorer, Dickens, Gatlin and Murray surfaced as the top four inside linebackers during the spring.

Back-up help at the two inside linebacking positions will come from junior Joey Nicoletto (6-4, 224), JC transfer Greg Baldwin (6-3, 216), and freshmen Brent Ellis (6-2, 226) and Raji Gordon (6-0, 215), a walk-on. Incoming freshmen could enter the picture in the battle for playing time as backups this August.

DEFENSIVE INTERIOR

Like on offense, the interior line on defense has been significantly damaged by the NCAA scholarship limits. Lack of depth is evident throughout the entire group.

The Gators head into the fall with only five players who have seen any playing time on the defensive line—tackles Henry Brown (6-3, 245), a senior, and junior Rhondy Weston (6-5, 255), junior middle guard Jeff Roth (6-4, 250), senior tackle Pat Pinner (6-3, 255), a converted quarterback, tight-end, and offensive guard, and sophomore middle guard Webbie Burnett (6-2, 234). Burnett was Roth's backup last fall but spent the entire spring at inside linebacker. He'll move back to middle guard this fall. Gone is All-SEC tackle Keith Williams, the backbone of the defensive interior group for the past two seasons.

Brown is a three year letterwinner who has seen time at both tackle and middle guard during his career. Weston, a second-team Football News Sophomore All-America selection

last fall after ranking fourth on the squad in total tackles with 96, has the potential to challenge for high national awards as does junior middle guard Jeff Roth. Roth was a first-team Football News Sophomore All-America selection in 1986. Senior Pat Pinner and sophomore Webbie Burnett are the only other players on the entire defensive line who have seen any action at the collegiate level.

Redshirt freshman Doug Evans (6-6, 250), a converted outside linebacker who missed much of spring practice with a shoulder injury, sophomore walk-on Mark Seager (6-4, 255), and redshirt freshman Doyce Jackson (6-3, 227) are the

other top candidates for playing time at tackle. Seager showed a good deal of progress this spring. If Evans can make the move to tackle he could be a diamond-in-the-rough. Despite his size (6-6, 250), he ran an eye-catching 4.67 in the 40 this spring. Florida recruited defensive linemen quite hard last year and several of them could have an opportunity to see extensive playing time this fall.

Behind Roth at middle guard there is very limited depth. Webbie Burnett saw duty on 198 plays at middle guard last fall but spent the entire spring at inside linebacker. Two walk-ons, sophomore Richard Chaison (6-2, 230) and freshman Mike Thatcher (6-2, 240) ended the spring battling for the backup spot to Roth.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Junior walk-on John David Francis (5-10, 155) and senior walk-on Robert McGinty (6-2, 187) loomed as the probable final competitors when spring practice opened to replace graduated placekicker Jeff Dawson, who was 13 of 15 on field goal attempts last season and a combined 30 of 38 during the past two years. Senior walk-on Ron Finger (6-0, 170), however, had a solid spring and now makes this battle a three-man race heading into August. McGinty, a walk-on transfer from Auburn, is best remembered for his 51-yard field goal vs. Auburn last fall, keeping the Gators within striking distance in a game they eventually won, 18-17.

Jamie McAndrew (6-2, 190), who punted for a 38.2 average last year as a true freshman, returns. Francis provides the backup.

Sophomore Kerry Watkins, who averaged 23.0 yards per kickoff return last fall, appears on the verge of becoming one of the most dangerous return men in collegiate football. He will also take on added duties as a punt returner this season now that Ricky Nattiel has graduated.

GALEN HALL COMMENTS ON THE 1987 SEASON

SPRING PRACTICE

"The effort and competition among players made it a worthwhile, productive spring although the lack of depth was an obvious handicap. We came out of spring drills with a better football team."

AREAS OF CONCERN

"Lack of depth of talent at virtually every position on the team is a major concern. We started spring practice with 58 scholarship players and wound up with about 44 after injuries. We need for players to establish themselves at the line of scrimmage, at inside linebacker, wide receiver, tight end and in the kicking game."

GENERAL FEELINGS ON THE 1987 TEAM AND SEASON

"We have a chance to be much like the 1986 team in terms of fielding first teams on offense and defense which can compete each Saturday. There are areas where we will be improved because of additional experience, such as running back. Obviously, we need to avoid injuries. It is vital that young players come out of the pack and contribute."

"The schedule is again extremely demanding with Miami, Alabama, LSU and Auburn on the road, Georgia at Jacksonville and home games against FSU and a pair of SEC teams who play us tough every year, Kentucky and Mississippi State. We look forward to the challenge."

THE WIDE RECEIVERS

"For the first time since I've been here we are without Ricky Nattiel, a great game-breaker. We are striving to come up with a good balance in our receiver rotation to give us speed and possession-type receiving. We believe Stacey Simmons, Ed Frazier, Willie Snead, Darrell Woulard, Ernie Mills and Tony Lomack will get the job done for us."

THE TIGHT ENDS

"This was an improved position in the spring. The added experience for Mark McGriff and Clifton Reynolds helped them in all areas and redshirt freshman Kirk Kirkpatrick had some fine moments. If Walter Odom is eligible it will help us a great deal."

THE OFFENSIVE LINE

"David Williams missed spring work after back surgery and we anticipate his return. This is a key to our hopes as he is an exceptional tackle with the potential to be a nationally prominent player in 1987. Our line improved during the course of the spring and we enter the fall with very close competition at one guard (Richard Starowesky and Charlie Wright), at center (Tracy Daniels and Chris Bromley) and with redshirt freshman John Durden moving into position to challenge for a great deal of playing time at tackle. Bob Sims appears set at quick guard and Jimmy Davis starts out on the first unit at tackle."

QUARTERBACK

"We believe Kerwin Bell has proven what a great quarterback he is, and that he will continue to do this in 1987. He is a genuine Heisman Trophy candidate. We lack depth and it is possible an incoming freshman could get in the battle for the second unit job."

THE RUNNING BACKS

"This was our least experienced area last season. Our players gained experience under fire and they improved, and continued to improve in the spring. We enter fall practice with a close battle at tailback between Octavius Gould and Wayne Williams, and at fullback with Anthony Williams and Cedric Smith, who had an outstanding spring. There are others who could get in the scrap and help us."

OFFENSIVE SUMMATION

"There is no question we need to get more punch in our running game. Last season we didn't have the balance we'd like, but I believe we will get closer to a balanced attack this year. If everybody continues to improve and does their job, Kerwin Bell has proven he knows how to make the winning plays on offense."

THE OUTSIDE LINEBACKERS

"This is an inexperienced group with only Clifford Charlton having played a high number of downs. Jason Lamberth lettered last season but missed spring work with knee surgery. None of the others here have played at this position. We believe Charlton is an All-American and that newcomers like Jeff Reuter and Huey Richardson will become top young players."

THE INSIDE LINEBACKERS

"Again, a very inexperienced area with both of last year's starters gone. There are close races at both spots with Todd Gatlin and Mark Murray at strongside and Pat Moorer and Gerold Dickens at weakside."

THE DEFENSIVE LINE

"There isn't an area of our team with less experience. We have five veteran scholarship players to fill nine positions, which is what you must have to go three-deep from tackle to tackle against our tough schedule. Our first teamers are good players in Henry Brown and Rhondy Weston at tackles and Jeff Roth at middle guard. Pat Pinner and Webbie Burnett played some last season. This is an area where as many as five freshmen could be playing very quickly."

THE SECONDARY

"This should be a strong point again this season, just as it was a year ago. Jarvis Williams is moving to strong safety, and could also play cornerback if needed, and he is an All-America candidate. Louis Oliver is a gifted free safety. If Ricky Mulberry completely recovers from knee surgery he will be solid at one corner and the battle between Tony Jones and Kerry Watkins for the other starting corner's job should be a good one. Dwayne Glover can play several positions and will probably get as much playing time as the starters. Steve Loden, Bill Lang and Richard Fain will all help us."

DEFENSIVE SUMMATION

"Much like last season, we need to stay healthy and get progress out of young players. Our defense got better and better last year, and it wouldn't surprise me to see that happen again in 1987 as young talented players gain experience to help the veterans."

THE SPECIAL TEAMS

"The lack of numbers has caused us to play fewer first or second team players on special teams. We are really dependent on the walk-on players who are filling in here. The placekicking job is wide open between Ron Finger, John David Francis and Robert McGinty. Jamie McAndrew returns as the number one punter."

THE SEC RACE

"I will go along with the consensus that Auburn and LSU are the co-favorites. Alabama and Georgia should be right there in the thick of it, and Tennessee and Ole Miss are close. This is the best league in college football, in my opinion, and I don't believe any SEC team should ever count on beating any other. It's a struggle every week in our league."

GATOR COACHES AND PLAYERS



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HEAD COACH GALEN HALL

As the media and fans have gotten to know Florida head football coach Galen Hall over the past three years the reaction has been the same. He is described as low-key, laid-back, honest, unassuming, a good ole boy and the media's favorite tag of "unflappable."

All of the above paint an accurate picture; however, in these days of the terms "intense" and "work-a-holic" being used to symbolize the characteristics of a successful coach, you might wonder how the Gator head man gets the job done in a fashion which makes him one of the nation's winningest coaches.

His record of 23-6-1 is the seventh best in the nation over the past three years and his 9-2-0 mark against the Gators' four traditional rivals—Auburn, Georgia, FSU and Miami—is by far the best in that category in school history.

Neal Anderson, former Florida tailback and the school's career rushing record-holder, said it best in an interview following the 1985 season.

"Coach Hall doesn't shout and scream, and he is never negative," said Anderson. "He is a patient teacher who prepares you to play relaxed and confident football. He believes the players will play hard and he has made football a positive experience. It is fun."

Hall's football philosophy is reflected in the manner in which he handles his team.

"Football is very important to those who are playing the game, but it is not the ultimate thing in your life," he says. "You need to keep in perspective the fact it is not a life-and-death matter or World War III. There must be self-sacrifice and discipline in order to achieve athletic success, but there must also be fun in playing the sport."

Hall's peer group in coaching and athletic administration believe he has one of the sharpest minds in the game.

"There probably isn't a better 'X-and-O' coach in college football," says Anderson. "He knows the game, knows how to attack defenses and has the calm presence of mind to be able to think under pressure during the course of the game. He is a great Saturday coach."

Hall's leadership qualities go back to his high school days in Williamsburg, Pa., where he was a star in football, basketball and baseball.

"He was a good, quiet leader and not a showboat," says his mother, 73-year-old Grace Hall. "He was a strong competitor but not one who wanted to be in the limelight taking any credit."

Hall stories are legend in the Williamsburg area, stories like the one about a major league baseball tryout when he hit seven of 25 pitches over the fence.

"That is absolutely true," says Williamsburg High head basketball coach Don Appleman. "He was a great baseball prospect, but decided to play college football."



Hall was a highly-recruited 195-pound quarterback who chose Penn State over Southern California. He grew to 215 pounds by his sophomore season in college and more closely resembled a linebacker than a quarterback.

As a sophomore Hall threw a 19-yard touchdown pass to beat Bear Bryant's Alabama team, 7-0 in the 1959 Liberty Bowl. As a junior he led the Nittany Lions to a 42-19 win over Oregon State in the 1960 Liberty Bowl.

Hall ended his senior season in another bowl game, the 1961 Gator Bowl against Georgia Tech, and that game resulted in one of the favorite tales told by current Penn State athletic director Jim Tarman, who was the sports information director at the time.

"We only had the football for two possessions early in that Gator Bowl game and were already behind, 9-0," says Tarman. "Tech got a touchdown on a long return, and a safety when Galen intentionally downed a pass attempt out of our end zone."

"Joe Paterno was our offensive coordinator up in the press box and he saw Galen as he walked back up the field."

"Joe said something like 'What the #%&c*\$ is going on down here?' to Galen, who looked him right in the eye and said 'Coach, don't worry about it, we've got them right where we want them.'"

Quarterback Hall, who had figured out the Tech defensive scheme in the first two Penn State possessions, went on to throw three TD passes and earn game MVP honors in a 30-15 triumph.

Hall is not exactly compared with Johnny Carson on delivering one-liners, but he does have a dry sense of humor, often throwing out a joke in such a matter-of-fact manner that you must be paying close attention to get it.

For example, he once told a player that his rules on length of hair were simple: "Nobody can have hair longer than mine," he said. Hall, of course, is bald but the player had to think about it before doubling over in laughter.

He refuses to take himself seriously, and more often than not he is the target of his own sense of humor. Take his "heartworm pill" story, for example.

"Our dog got heartworms and the vet gave us some pills," he tells friends. "I was taking vitamins, too, and somehow Elaine handed me a pill for the dog, which I thought was a Vitamin E for me. Before she could stop me I took the pill.

"The last time we went to the vet the dog still had heartworms, but I didn't."

Hall is a pragmatic person, who, when asked to describe himself by one member of the media, replied "I'm a realist and an optimist."

"He's just a great guy who is so real and natural that people who don't know him well can't believe it," says his

extroverted wife Elaine. "They look at him and wonder 'can this fellow be for real?'"

When Hall graduated from Penn State in 1962 he went on to a brief career in the NFL, playing for the Washington Redskins in 1962 and the New York Jets in 1963.

He spent two seasons at West Virginia (1964-65) as offensive backfield and ends coach, and then went to Oklahoma, where he was to work with the Sooner offense for 18 years before joining the Gator staff in the spring of 1984.

At Oklahoma, Hall was not in the limelight despite a record of success matched by few, if any, offensive assistant coaches in college football. In 11 seasons as offensive coordinator for the Sooners they won two national championships, nine Big Eight titles, led the nation in rushing four times, were second three times, third twice and fourth once, the lowest ranking any of his offenses recorded during the period.

He developed Heisman Trophy winners Steve Owens and Billy Sims, All America running backs Joe Washington, Elvis Peacock and Eddie Hinton, and wide receivers Tinker Owens, Billy Brooks, Steve Zabel and Al Chandler, all of whom went on to play in the NFL.

After 18 seasons at Oklahoma, following the 1983 season, Hall decided it was time to move on for a variety of reasons. He was married to the former Elaine Hatch in January of 1984, and they wanted to start a new life together, and the itch to become a head coach reached him.

"I thought it would be good to diversify my coaching background," he says. "Spending 18 years in the same system tends to make people think you can only coach a certain style of offense or team. I looked at Florida as an opportunity to grow and gain experience in a good program so that would benefit me somewhere down the road when a head coaching position might come open in college or

professional football."

Mike Shanahan, the ex-Gator offensive coordinator, had worked under Hall as a graduate assistant at Oklahoma and he recommended him to Coach Charley Pell when he left for the Denver Broncos. It turned out to be a tremendous blessing for both Hall and the Gators.

The great achievements of the past three seasons are history. What does Hall look for in the future?

"We want to field a disciplined team which plays hard, but has fun playing the game," he says. "We want players who graduate from Florida and represent the school and its athletic program with class. If we can manage that, we will win more than our share of games over the long run."

"Right now we are still in a position of having very limited depth due to the 75-scholarship cap during NCAA sanctions. We are fortunate in having a good walk-on program to help offset some of this, and we hope to stay injury free and play with the pride the last three Florida teams have shown.

"This is a difficult position to be in, but we're confident our football program has come out of it stronger than it was before. I believe the future for Florida football is bright."

For Galen Hall, who wants to accentuate the positive and eliminate the negative, the challenge is a big one. He has always been a winner, however, and those who know him best believe this will continue to be the case.

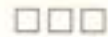

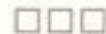

offensive and defensive lines in 1976, was the Defensive Coordinator and offensive line coach in 1977, and then served as Head Coach and Athletic Director at Kings Mountain from 1978-82 season. In 1983 he joined the UF staff as a graduate assistant coach, a role he served for each of the next two seasons before being elevated to full-time status in January of '85.

Florida Coaching Notes: As a graduate assistant in 1984 he coached Tim Newton, a middle guard who gained All-SEC and second team All-America honors. Newton was drafted by the Minnesota Vikings in 1985 and made the NFL squad and started as a rookie. In 1985 Brooks assisted with the defensive line, a unit that played a big role in helping the defense lead the SEC in total defense and finish 17th in the nation in rushing defense. In 1986, Jeff Roth was named a first-team Sophomore All-America selection by *The Football News*. Florida ended the year ranked 16th nationally in total defense.

Academic and Athletic Background: Graduated from Alleghany High School in Sparta, N.C. in 1969. Years at Florida: Joined the Florida Athletic Department in the spring of 1982 as the Director of High School Relations. After serving in that post for nearly a year, he was named the Gators' defensive line coach in February of 1983. Fifth year on staff.

Coaching Experience: Served as Head Coach and Athletic Director at LaSalle High in Cleveland during the 1962-63 academic year. In 1963 he moved to Coral Gables High School in Florida where he served as defensive coach

from 1962-1973. During that tenure, Coral Gables won 102 games, lost just nine and tied one while registering two national championships. His defensive unit registered nine shutouts in 13 games during the 1967 national championship season. He joined the University of Kentucky coaching staff in 1973, handling the outside linebackers in '73 and '74, the inside linebackers in 1975 and the defensive line from 1976-81.

Florida Coaching Notes: Florida finished third in the SEC in

rushing defense (132.5 yds. per game) in 1983. Only two of the Gators 12 opponents that fall managed to outrush Florida. In 1984, only one of 11 opponents managed to show a rushing advantage on the Gators. Florida led the SEC in rushing defense in 1984 (121.5) and ranked 15th in the nation in that category. Only one back gained over 100 yards rushing the entire season. Florida permitted just three rushing TD's the entire season and did not allow a rushing TD in the final five games of the season. In 1984, MG Tim Newton was a consensus All-SEC and 2nd team All-America selection. Newton was selected in the 6th round of the NFL Draft by Minnesota. In 1985, Florida ranked 17th in rushing defense and in only one game did a back rush for more than 100 yards. UF ranked first in the SEC in total defense. DT Keith Williams was a second team All-SEC and HM All-America selection. In 1986, Keith Williams was a first-team All-SEC and a HM All-America selection. Florida ranked 16th in the nation in total defense.

Academic and Athletic Background: Attended Benedictine High in Cleveland before moving to the University of Miami (Fla.) for college. He was a two-year starter for the Hurricanes at offensive guard and linebacker during the 1958 and 1959 seasons before graduating in the spring of 1960.

Personal Notes: Born in Cleveland, OH on May 28, 1938. A college teammate of former Kentucky head coach Fran Curci.

He was named Big Eight Coach of the Year in 1982 after leading the Wildcats to a 6-4-1 regular season record and the school's first ever bowl appearance (Independence Bowl). He compiled a 4-3 record vs. intrastate rival Kansas, the most wins for a Kansas State head coach vs. Kansas in school history.

Florida Notes: In 1986 Scott Armstrong was selected to play in Blue-Gray All-Star Game. Pat Moorer was named to the SEC All-Freshman Team. Gator defense ranked 16th in the nation in total defense. Armstrong was selected in the NFL Draft by the Dallas Cowboys.

Academic and Athletic Background: He was a three sport standout at Galena Park High School in Galena, Texas in the early 1950's. He played at Tyler Junior College in Texas for two seasons (1952, 53) before enrolling at the University of Houston where he was a defensive back in 1954 and 1955. He graduated from Houston in 1956 with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Physical Education.

Personal Notes: Born James Howard Dickey on March 22, 1934 in Galena Park, Texas. Married to the former Inez Philpot of Galena Park, Texas. The couple has three children (Debbie, Jim, Darrell).

Florida Notes: In 1983, Florida ranked third in passing offense in the SEC and Dwayne Dixon was a first team all-SEC choice. Dixon caught 47 passes that season, the most for a Gator receiver since 1969. In 1984, Florida averaged 16.1 yards per reception and the receivers turned in big play after big play (22 passing plays went for 20 or more yards and eight went for 40 or more yards). Florida had 16 scoring pass plays in 1984, the most for a Gator team since 17 in 1971. In 1985, Florida ranked first in the SEC and 11th in the nation in passing offense (265.8 yds per game). UF established a new school record for average yards per pass attempt (9.6) and tied a school record for the most TD receptions in a season (24). Gator receivers accumulated 2,924 yards, the second highest seasonal total in school history. Ray McDonald was drafted in the seventh round by the New England Patriots. In 1986, Ricky Nattiel was a consensus first-team All-SEC choice and a Sporting News second-team All-America choice. Nattiel concluded his career with 2,086 receiving yards, the second best total in UF history and 9th best on the all-time SEC list. Nattiel participated in the Hula Bowl and was drafted in the first round of the NFL Draft by the Denver Broncos.

Academic and Athletic Background: Graduate of DeKalb (Illinois) High School in 1971. He received a BS Degree in History from Eastern Illinois in 1975 and earned a Masters at Northern Illinois in 1979. He lettered in football, basketball and baseball in high school and in football and baseball in college. He started on '74 Eastern Illinois contingent that finished third in NCAA II baseball championships.

Personal Notes: Born Michael William Heimerdinger on Oct. 13, 1952 in DeKalb, Ill. Married the former Kathie Baker of Stafford, VA on June 12, 1976, and they have one daughter, Alicia, and a son, Brian.

Coaching Experience: Began his coaching career at Miami of Ohio in 1974 as receivers coach. Served in that capacity for two seasons before taking over as quarterback coach in 1976 at Miami. Joined the University of Kentucky staff in 1977 as tight end and wide receivers coach. He held that post from 1977-81. Joined the University of Kansas staff as

tight end and receivers coach for the 1982 season and then was named the head coach at Kentucky State University in December of 1982 and he held that post until joining the Florida staff in February of 1984.

Florida Notes: In 1984, the Gators outrushed 10 of 11 opponents. They ranked 12th nationally in rushing offense (244.8). Neal Anderson (916), John L. Williams (793) and Lorenzo Hampton (693) rushed for a combined total of 2,402 yards, the most ever for a trio of backs in a season in UF history. Anderson's 916 yards was the second best seasonal rushing total in school history. Anderson and Williams were both second team All-SEC choices while Anderson also received HM all-american honors. Eight times over the course of the season a Gator back rushed for more than 100 yards. Lorenzo Hampton was a first round selection in the NFL draft by the Miami Dolphins. In 1985, Neal Anderson and John L. Williams received All-SEC and HM All-America honors. Anderson became the school's all-time leading rusher with 3,234 yards and his '85 total of 1,034 marked just the second time in school history that a back rushed for more than 1,000 yards in a season. Williams ended his career as UF's third all-time leading rusher with 2,409 yards. His 92 career receptions and 44 seasonal catches in 1985 set new school records. Anderson and Williams participated in the Blue-Gray and Senior Bowl all-star contests. Williams was drafted in the first round by Seattle while Anderson was selected in the first round by the Super Bowl Champion Chicago Bears. Their selection marked the first time since 1971 that two backs from the same team were selected in the first round of the NFL draft. In 1986, Octavius Gould was named a second team Freshman All-America by the Football News.

Academic and Athletic Background: Graduated from Harlan (KY) High School in 1969 where he earned four letters in football and was named to the all-state team his senior season. Matriculated to Eastern Kentucky University where

he also earned four letters in football and was named the squad's outstanding offensive back as a senior in 1972. Selected to "Outstanding College Athletes of America" 1970-72. Received a BS in Education in 1973.

Personal Notes: Born on Jan. 6, 1951 in Harlan, Ky. He and his wife, Anita, have one child, Jessica. He is an active member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

Center Phil Bromley and OT Lomas Brown were consensus first team All-SEC selections. Brown was also a consensus All-American while Bromley garnered 2nd team honors. In addition, Brown was named the recipient of the Jacobs Trophy as the SEC's top blocking lineman, the first UF player so honored. His entire offensive line was named "National Offensive Player of the Week" after an extremely impressive performance vs. Auburn in a 24-3 Gator win. Eight times over the course of the season a Gator back rushed for 100 or more yards. Lomas Brown was a first round NFL choice of the Detroit Lions, OT Crawford Ker went in the third round to Dallas and OG Billy Hinson went in the fifth round to Denver. All three made NFL rosters. In 1985, Florida outrushed 7 of 11 foes on the season. OG Jeff Zimmerman was a consensus All-SEC choice who was also named a first-team All-American by the Sporting News and Walter Camp Football Foundation. In 1986, Zimmerman once again earned first-team All-America honors. He became the first offensive lineman in school history to earn first-team All-America honors twice. Zimmerman played in the Blue-Gray and Senior Bowl all-star games. Zimmerman was selected in the third round of the 1987 NFL Draft by the Dallas Cowboys.

Academic & Athletic Background: Graduate of Tampa Jefferson High (1962), where he was a lineman. Played for Florida from 1964-66 as a lineman graduating in 1966 with a BSPE degree.

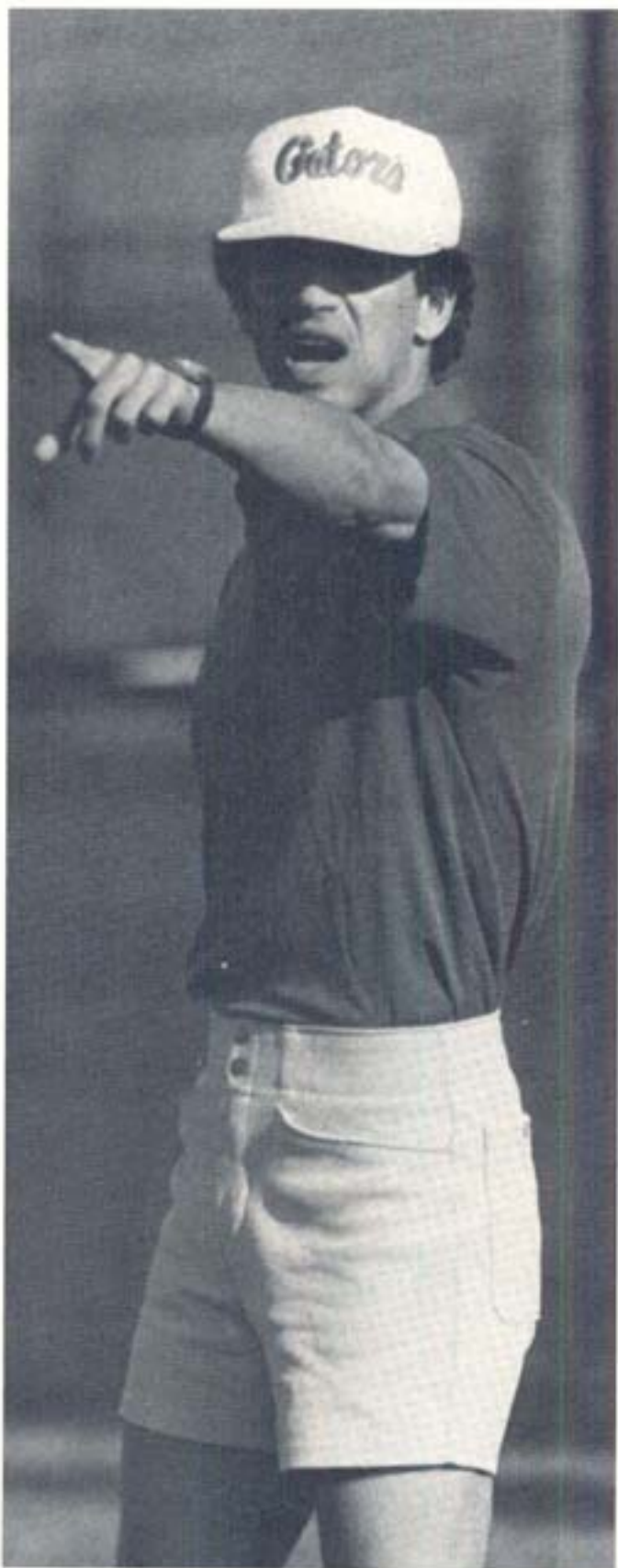

Sherrill left Washington St. at the conclusion of that year to go to Pitt but the Cougar's newly appointed coach, Warren Powers, kept Yaralian as his secondary

coach. When Powers left Washington State to take the head job at Missouri in 1978, Yaralian also departed for the Big Eight school. In 1981 and 1982 Missouri led the nation in fewest yards allowed per pass and in 1982 the Tigers led the country in total pass defense, surrendering just 123 yards per game.

Florida Coaching Notes: Florida led the SEC in pass defense in 1983 (151.2 yds. per game) and ranked 12th nationally in that same category. Free-safety Tony Lilly was a first-team All-SEC choice and a 3rd round selection of the Denver Broncos of the NFL. CB Bruce Vaughan made the Tampa Bay Bandit roster. In May of 1985, CB Ricky Easmon signed with Dallas Cowboys as a free-agent and made the NFL team's roster. The '85 Gator secondary permitted just three TD passes on the season, none in the last six games of the campaign. UF ranked second in the nation in fewest TD passes allowed for the season. UF's 19 total interceptions in 1985 ranked as the 14th best total in the nation and the Gator passing defense was ranked 2nd in the SEC (159.8 ypg). CB Jarvis Williams was a second team All-SEC and HM All-America selection. CB Curtis Stacy participated in the Japan Bowl All-Star game. In first year as Defensive Coordinator (1986), UF ranked 16th in the nation in total defense (291.8 ypg) and fourth in the nation vs. the pass (117.0 ypg). Florida gave up just four TD passes during the year, the fewest in the nation, and none in the last 27 quarters of play. Opponent QBs registered just a combined 91.8 efficiency rating vs. UF defense. Defensive backs Jarvis Williams and Adrian White were first-team All-SEC and second team All-America choices. White was selected in the second round of the '87 NFL Draft by the Super Bowl Champion NY Giants.

Academic and Athletic Background: Attended Inglewood (Calif.) High School. Attended El Camino Junior College from 1970-72, winning All-California and All-American JUCO honors for the 1971 season as a defensive back. He then transferred to Nebraska, starting in the Huskers' defensive secondary for two seasons (1972, 1973). Earned a BS Degree in Physical Education in 1974. Played one season of pro ball with Green Bay Packers, starting five game in 1974.

Personal Notes: Born in Syria, but calls Inglewood, Calif. home. Born Feb. 5, 1952. The 34 year old coach married the former Lorraine McCormick of Hermosa Beach. The Yaralians' have two sons; Blake and Garrett.

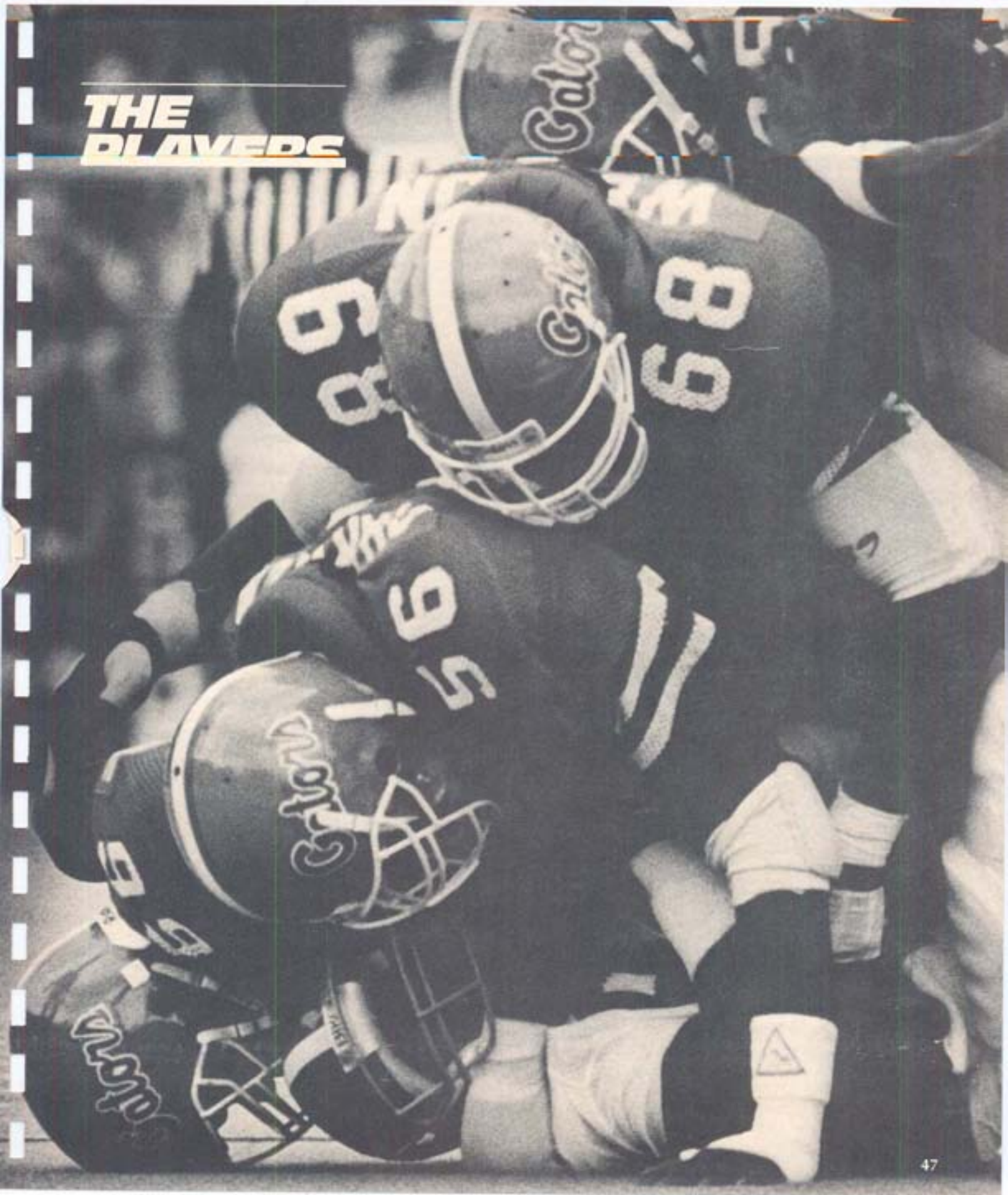

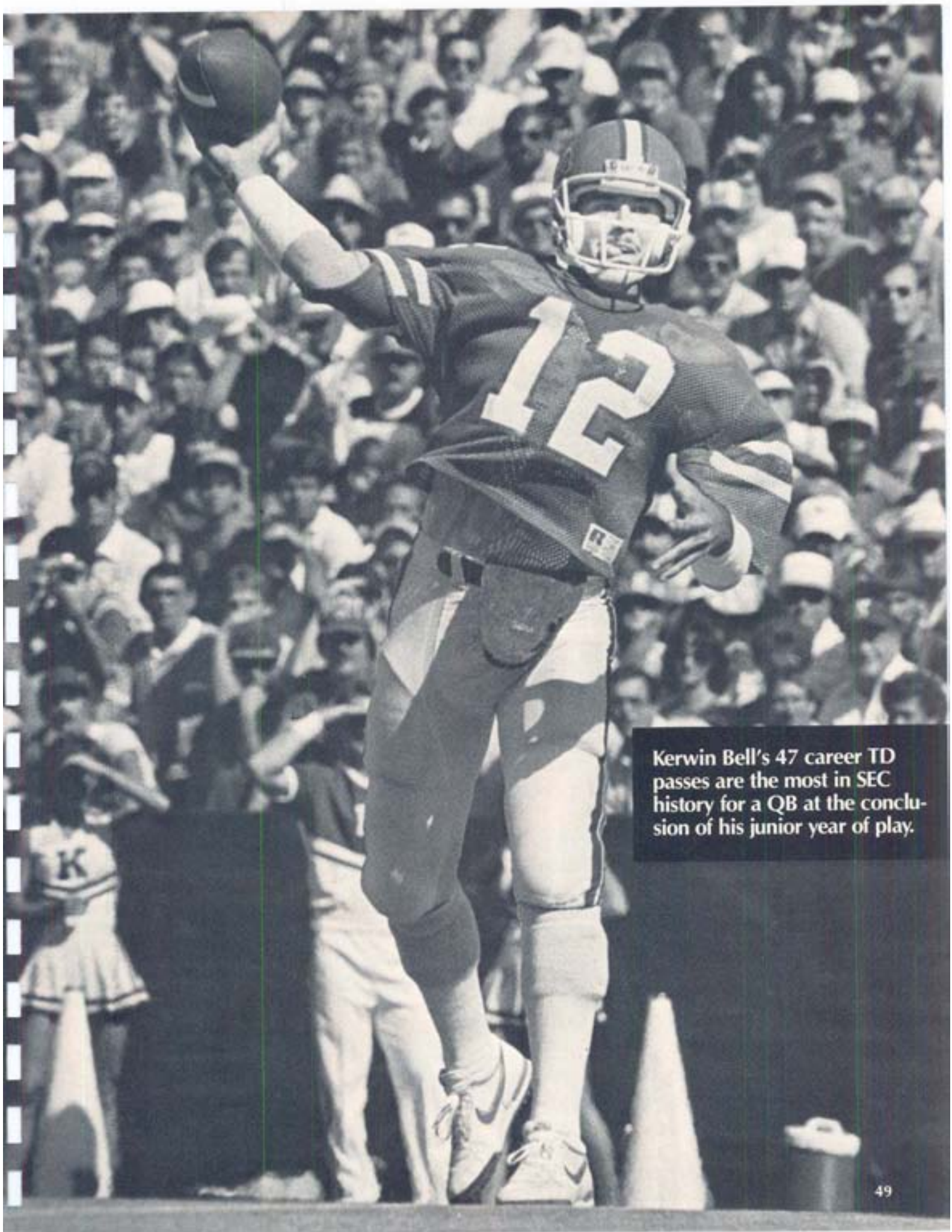



- He's in an excellent position to become the all-time leading passer in SEC history by the conclusion of the 1987 season. He will enter the season with 5,816 career passing yards, a total that ranks third in Florida history and eighth in the SEC. The Florida and SEC record is held by John Reaves (7,549).
- His 47 career TD passes already ranks second on the Florida list and fourth best on the all-time SEC chart. The record is held by John Reaves (54).
- His 47 career TD passes are the most in SEC history for a QB at the conclusion of his junior season. The 47 scoring strikes is the sixth best career total for a QB at the conclusion of his junior year in NCAA history.
- He was the only QB in the nation to finish in the top four in passing efficiency in each of the 1984 and 1985 seasons.
- His 37 total TDs during his freshman and sophomore years in 1984 and 1985 tied a SEC record for the most TD passes thrown by a QB in his first two seasons of play.
- He has thrown four of the nine longest TD passes in UF history (75, 82, 83, and 96 yards).

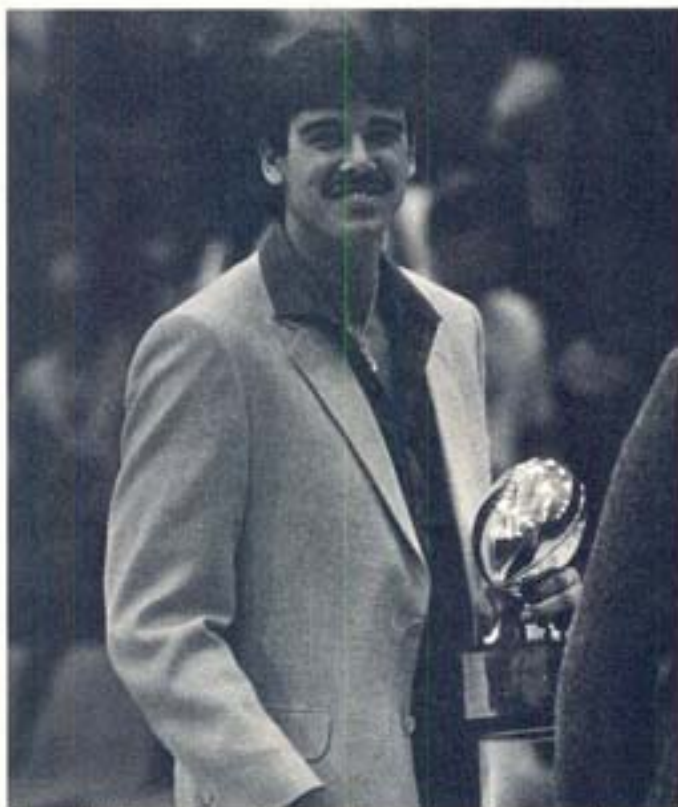

SERIES INFORMATION

Florida and Miami will be meeting for the 49th time with the Gators leading the all-time series, 25-23. The two schools first met in 1938 and they have battled every season since that original encounter with the exception of 1943 when Florida did not field a team.

This year's contest will mark the 26th time that the two schools have met in Miami. Florida has won 14 of the past 25 meetings in Miami, including a 35-20 win in 1985. Nineteen games have taken place in Gainesville with Miami holding an 11-8 edge in those contests. Four other games have been played at other locations around the state; 1958 and 1959 in Jacksonville, 1976 in Orlando, and 1984 in Tampa.

Since 1980, the two schools have opened every season vs. each other with the exception of 1986.

Twenty-four of the 48 games in this series have been decided by a touchdown or less. Last year's 23-15 win by Miami at Gainesville marked the Hurricanes smallest margin of victory during their perfect 11-0-0 regular season. Miami's Jimmy Johnson is 2-1 in three prior games with Florida while Gator head mentor Galen Hall is 1-1 in two prior encounters with Miami.

This year's game will be the last time the two state schools meet until 1992. Florida's decision to reduce the annual series structure came about as a result of the SEC's move to add a seventh league game to each school's conference schedule effective in 1988 and UF's desire to play some games in other parts of the country. UF would not have been able to play outside the south without an adjustment to its normal annual schedule with the addition of a seventh SEC game.

SERIES INFORMATION

Florida will be taking on Tulsa for the fifth time when the Golden Hurricanes invade Florida Field on September 12th for the Gators home opener. Florida has won three of the four previous games in the series.

The two schools have met three times during the regular season (1948, 1949, 1979) and once in a bowl game (1952). The 1948 game was played in Gainesville with the Gators posting a 28-14 win. In 1949, Florida traveled to Tulsa and came away with a 40-7 victory. In 1979, Tulsa came into Florida Field and posted a 20-10 win to spoil the Gators annual Homecoming contest. That was the last time that Florida has lost a Homecoming game.

In 1952, the two squads battled in Jacksonville in the Gator Bowl with Florida posting a 14-13 win. That game ranks as one of the milestones in Florida football history because it represented the school's first-ever bowl game win and first-ever bowl game appearance.

As mentioned above, this contest will mark Florida's home opener. The Gators will be trying to keep alive a streak that has seen them go unbeaten in their last 15 home openers (12-0-3). Florida hasn't lost a home opener at Florida Field since suffering a 38-0 defeat to Alabama in 1971.

SERIES INFORMATION

Florida and Alabama were charter members of the SEC when it was formed in 1932 but the two schools have met just 21 total times on the football field. Eight of those 21 meetings, however, took place from 1916-31 before the SEC was formed and began play in 1933. Overall, Alabama leads the series standings with a record of 16-5. The two schools met in 1904 with the Tide posting a 29-0 win. Florida does not recognize that contest in its official records, however, as the school uses 1906 as its first season of official intercollegiate action. Prior to that campaign, Florida

considered its squad a club-sport contingent.

Florida and Alabama have battled 13 times since the SEC began play in 1933, and Alabama shows a 11-2 in those contests. The Crimson Tide has won the last eight meetings with Florida. The Gators haven't posted a victory over Alabama since 1963 when they engineered a stunning 10-6 win in Tuscaloosa, a victory that ranks as one of the greatest in UF history. The win over the highly ranked Alabama squad led by QB Joe Namath became even more significant as time passed for it was one of only two setbacks that the legendary Paul "Bear" Bryant suffered at Tuscaloosa. Bryant posted an incredible 72-2 mark at Tuscaloosa. After the Florida setback in 1963, Bryant did not lose another game at Tuscaloosa until 1982, a streak of 57 straight wins.

The two schools have battled just six times in Gainesville with Alabama posting wins in all six games, including shutouts in 1930, 1971, 1979. When Alabama appeared at Florida Field in 1971 it represented the first visit by the Crimson Tide to Gainesville since 1949. Overall, Alabama has posted seven shutout victories in the series.

Florida will meet the Crimson Tide at Legion Field in Birmingham this year due to construction at Alabama's Bryant-Denny Stadium in Tuscaloosa. The game will represent Florida's first appearance in Birmingham since 1931 when the Gators suffered a 41-0 setback to Alabama.

Florida's Galen Hall suffered a 21-7 setback to the Tide in last year's game at Florida Field. Hall has had success vs. Alabama, however. As a sophomore QB at Penn State in 1959, he passed for a 19 yard TD off a fake field goal attempt for the game's only score as the Nittany Lions defeated Alabama 7-0, to capture the Liberty Bowl in Philadelphia.

Florida and Mississippi State will be
meeting for the 42nd time. The Gators

The two schools first met in 1923
and have met every year since the
1962 season. Florida has dominated
play in recent years winning 19 of the
past 25 meetings. Mississippi State's
16-10 win in Starkville last year
snapped a four game Florida win
streak in the series.

Mississippi State will come into the
contest at Florida Field this year
having lost ten straight contests in

Gainesville. The Bulldogs haven't won
at Florida Field since 1965. Gaines-
ville has been the site of 21 games in
this series with the Gators showing a
13-7-1 record in those contests. Six
games have been played in Starkville
with each squad winning three times.
Ten games have taken place in
Jackson, MS with Florida showing a
6-4 edge in those games.

This will be Mississippi State's first
visit to Florida Field since a 27-12
defeat in 1984. That contest marked
Galen Hall's debut as Florida's head
coach. Hall has met the Bulldogs
three times in his Gator coaching
career and shows a 2-1-0 record.
Mississippi State's Rocky Felker is
1-0 in his prior meetings with Florida
after posting a 16-10 win in Starkville
in his initial year at the helm last fall.

One of the highest scoring games in
SEC history took place between these
two squads when Florida posted a
wild 47-35 win in Jackson in 1969.

These two squads will square off for the 34th time when they battle in Baton Rouge. LSU holds a 17-13-3 edge in the series standings. LSU holds an 8-6-2 advantage since the two schools became annual SEC foes in 1971.

This is a series that has confounded experts in recent years. Tiger Stadium

in Baton Rouge and Florida Field in Gainesville have earned reputations as extremely tough places for visitors to win, but in this series in recent years each school has been more successful at the opponent site. 1979 is the last time that the home team has won a game. In LSU's last four appearances at Florida Field it has posted a 24-7 win in 1980, a 24-13 victory in 1982, a 21-21 tie in 1984 and a 28-17 win in 1986. Since the start of the 1981 season, the Gators have posted a combined 30-4-2 record at friendly Florida Field. Two of the four losses and one of the two ties have come vs. LSU. Florida has also been quite successful at Tiger Stadium in Baton Rouge, winning each of its last three appearances (24-10 in 1981, 31-17 in 1983, and 20-0 in 1985). Overall, LSU shows a 8-5-3 record in the 16 games it has played at Florida Field throughout the series and a 9-8-0 mark in series games at Tiger Stadium.

Current Florida Athletic Director Bill Arnsparger was the head coach at LSU from 1984-86. He made his head collegiate coaching debut at Florida Field in 1984 and posted a 21-21 tie vs. the Gators. In 1985 at LSU, Florida defeated the Tigers 20-0, the only setback LSU would suffer during the regular season. In 1986 at Gainesville, Arnsparger's Tigers walked off the field with a 28-17 victory.

This will be the first meeting between the Gators and the Titans. Cal State Fullerton is a member of the PCAA (Pacific Coast Athletic Association).

Cal State Fullerton is one of the youngest universities and athletic departments in the nation. Classes were first offered in 1959 but enrollment has grown to over 23,000 in less than thirty years. The school's first football team was not fielded until

1970. The Titans have claimed national championships in seven different sports during their short history.

The Cal State Fullerton contest will represent the first game Florida has played against a west coast contingent since the Gators tied Southern Cal in Los Angeles, 19-19, in 1983. The game will represent the first visit of a team from the west coast to Florida Field since Southern Cal made the long journey in 1982. The Gators defeated the Trojans, 17-9, before an ABC-TV audience. Overall, this is the 11th game UF has played against a squad from the west coast in its history. Four of the 11 games have been scheduled on the west coast.

The game will mark Cal State Fullerton's second ever meeting with a SEC foe. Just weeks before its Oct. 10th game with Florida, the Titans will face LSU in Baton Rouge on Sept. 12.

SERIES INFORMATION

Florida will be meeting Temple for the third time in its football history when the two schools battle at Florida Field in Gainesville on October 17th, but the game will represent the first meeting between the schools in nearly 50 years.

Florida met Temple in back-to-back seasons in 1937-38 with Temple posting wins in both contests. In 1937, Temple edged the Gators, 7-6, in a game played in Philadelphia. In 1938, the two squads squared-off in Gainesville in the season finale with the Owls posting a 20-12 win.

Over the last 40 seasons (since

1947) there have been only five games at Florida field vs. teams from the northeastern part of the nation. Florida has won or tied all five of those contests. The last meeting at Florida Field vs. a team from the northeast was Rutgers in 1985 with the two squads battling to a 28-28 tie. The last time that Florida suffered a defeat at Florida Field vs. a squad from the northeastern part of the nation was in 1946 when another Philadelphia area contingent, Villanova, posted a 27-20 win over the Gators in Gainesville. That game in 1946 also represented the last time that a Philadelphia area team has played at Florida Field.

In recent years two former Temple Owls have received a great deal of national attention. Running back Paul Palmer was the runnerup to Miami's Vinny Testaverde in the 1986 Heisman Trophy balloting while former defensive lineman Joe Klecko has achieved All-Pro status with the New York Jets.

SERIES INFORMATION

This is one of the oldest and most competitive series in the SEC. Florida and Auburn have met 63 previous times with the Tigers holding a 34-27-2 edge in the series standings. The 63 meetings with Auburn ranks as the second most vs. an opponent in UF history. Only the 64 meetings with Georgia ranks ahead of Auburn in this category in the Gator record book. The two schools first met on the football field in 1912 and have met every year since the 1945 campaign.

The two teams have met at eight different sites (Gainesville, Auburn, Montgomery, Mobile, Columbus, GA, Jacksonville, Tampa, Miami) over the years. Since 1950, however, the game has alternated between the two campuses. The home field has been important in this series as the Gators show a 17-6 edge in games played at Florida Field while the Tigers show a 20-4-1 winning mark in games played at Auburn. Auburn hasn't won in Gainesville in its last seven trips. When Florida defeated the Tigers in 1985, 14-10, it represented just the fourth time the Gators had posted a win in 25 games that have been played at Auburn. That win ranks as one of the most memorable in Florida history for it vaulted the Gators to their first-ever number one ranking in a wire service poll.

Florida will enter the game with a current three game winning streak in the series including last year's come-from-behind 18-17 victory in which the Gators scored 18 points in the fourth quarter to overcome a 17-0 deficit. Galen Hall is 3-0 in three previous meetings with the Tigers while Auburn's Pat Dye is 2-4 in six prior games with Florida. Six of the past eight games in this series have been decided by seven or fewer points.

SERIES INFORMATION

This is truly one of the nation's premier games and rivalries. The two schools have met 64 previous times with Georgia holding an overall 40-22-2 edge in the series. The 64 meetings with Georgia represents the most times that Florida has met an opponent in its football history.

The two schools first met in 1915. They have met every season since 1930 with the exception of 1943 when Florida did not field a team. This contest has been played in Jacksonville every year since 1933 with the exception of 1943.

Since 1961 (26 games) this contest

has been decided by seven or fewer points 15 times. Georgia's Vince Dooley is 15-7-1 in 23 prior meetings with Florida while the Gators' head mentor, Galen Hall, is 2-1 in three prior engagements with Georgia. When Georgia defeated Florida in 1985, 24-3, it marked Galen Hall's first defeat in 17 games as the Gator head coach. That defeat also knocked Florida from its first ever number one national wire service ranking, an honor it had achieved after a 14-10 win at Auburn the previous week. Hall posted a 27-0 win vs. Georgia in his initial outing in this series in 1984 and a 31-19 victory last year. The 31 points Florida put on the board last year represented the most points a Vince Dooley coached team had given up in this series in the 23 years that he had been at the Georgia helm in this annual battle.

Georgia has dominated the series in recent years winning 11 of the past 15 meetings. Florida, however, has posted wins in two of the past three contests. Georgia's best winning streak in the series is seven games (1941-42, 1944-48) while Florida's best sustained streak is four games which it has achieved twice (1955-58, 1960-63). If Florida defeats Georgia this year, it will mark the first time since 1962-63 that the Gators have managed to post back-to-back wins over the Bulldogs. Georgia's Vince Dooley has never lost to Florida in back-to-back seasons during his long reign as the Bulldog mentor.

SERIES INFORMATION

This game traditionally marks the end of the SEC schedule for Florida. The two schools first met in 1917 in Lexington and have played 37 total times with Florida holding a slim 20-17 edge in the series standings.

Florida has dominated play in recent years, winning six of the past seven encounters and 16 of the last 21 meetings. Florida and Kentucky have met every year since 1967 with the Gators showing a 14-5 edge in the win-loss column since that season. Florida has won 12 of the 16 games

that have taken place in Gainesville while Kentucky shows a 10-7 edge in the 17 contests that have been held in Lexington. Four games (1926, '27, '31, '49) were played at other sites with UK showing wins in three of those contests (1926, '31, '49).

Although Florida has won six of the past seven games, several have been very hard-fought especially in recent years. In 1984 at Lexington, Florida's Adrian White intercepted a Kentucky pass near the goal-line late in the game to preserve a 25-17 win that gave the Gators a 5-0-1 league record and their first ever first place finish in the SEC standings. In 1985, UF's Jeff Dawson kicked a last second field goal to give the Gators a 15-13 win. Last year, Kentucky posted a 10-3 win at Lexington, a loss that eliminated Florida from bowl consideration. In the last three combined games (1984, '85, '86), Florida has managed to cross the Kentucky goal-line just twice (once in 1984 and 1985). Thirty of the 43 total points the Gator offense has managed in the past three seasons have come via the field goal.

Galen Hall, who was named Florida's new head coach in the locker room after the Gators' 25-17 victory in 1984, is 2-1 in three prior meetings with Kentucky while UK's Jerry Claiborne is 2-5 in seven previous encounters with Florida.

SERIES INFORMATION

Florida-Florida State has quickly developed into one of the premier rivalries in the entire nation. The two state schools first met on the gridiron in 1958 with Florida posting a 21-7 victory. The Gators and Seminoles have met every year since that initial

contest with Florida now holding a 22-6-1 lead in the series standings.

Florida State's first win in the series came in 1964, 16-7, in the first meeting between the two schools in Tallahassee. The first six contests of the series were held in Gainesville. Since 1964, the site for the annual game has alternated between the two campuses with Tallahassee the site in even-numbered years and Gainesville the host in odd-numbered years.

The Gators show a 13-3-1 edge in the 17 games in the series that have been played at Florida Field in Gainesville and a 9-3 ledger in the 12 games that have taken place in Tallahassee. Since 1979, this game has been the regular season finale for both schools.

Florida currently holds a six game win streak in this series, including last year's come-from-behind 17-13 win at rain drenched Doak-Campbell Stadium in Tallahassee. The Gators' current six game win streak in this series comes on the heels of a four game win skein by Florida State from 1977-1980. Gator head mentor Galen Hall is 3-0 in three prior meetings with Florida State while Seminole head coach Bobby Bowden is 4-7 in 11 previous confrontations with Florida. Bowden has chalked-up four of the six total wins that Florida State has registered in the series.

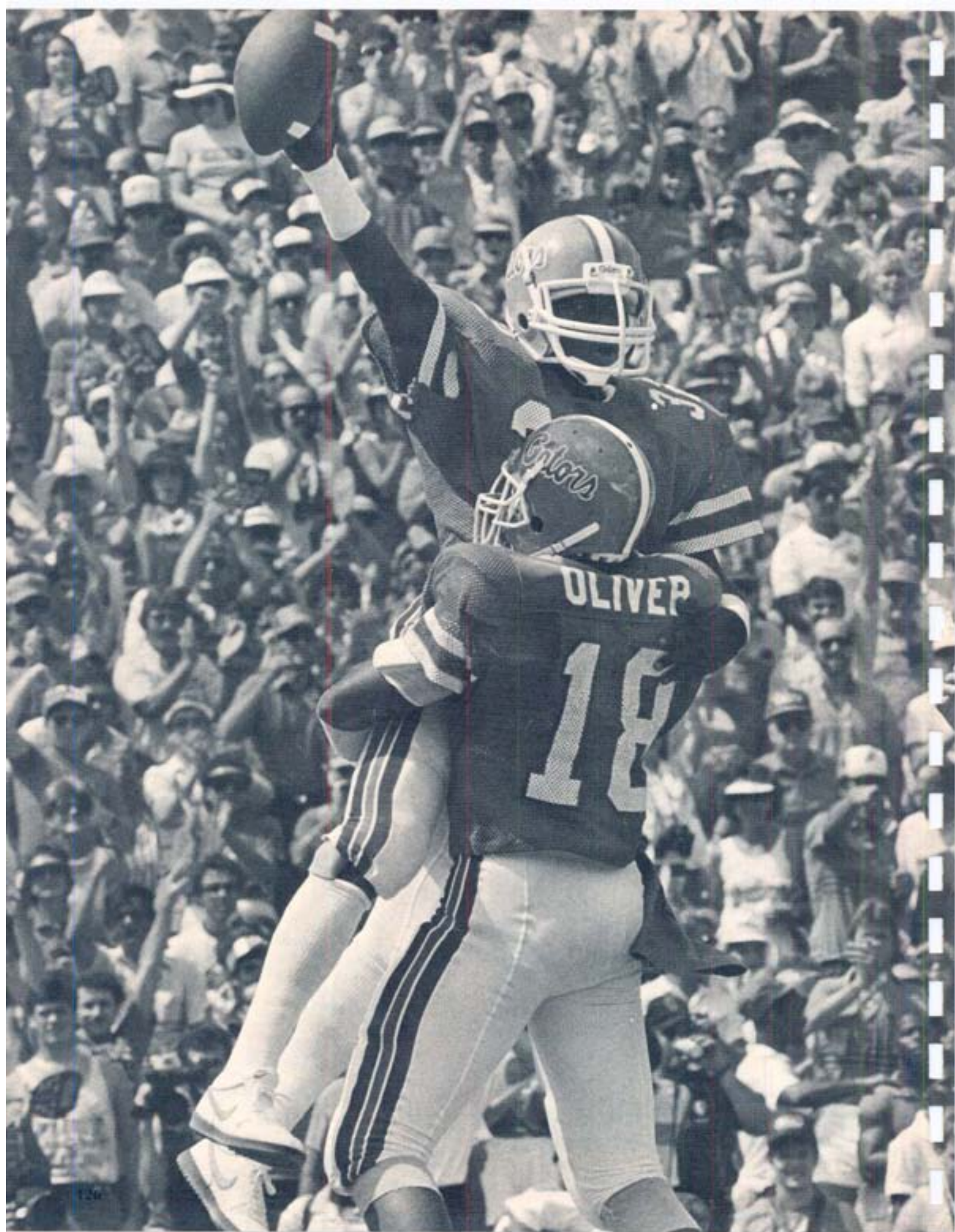

THE 1986 SEASON IN REVIEW



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1986 GATOR NOTEBOOK

GENERAL SQUAD NOTES

- Florida posted its 6-5-0 record against a schedule that the NCAA ranked as the toughest in the nation.
- Florida's Div. IA opponents compiled a 64-29-3 record in 1986 (excluding contest against Florida) for a percentage of .682, a mark that ranked as the best in the nation.
- Seven teams on the Gator '86 slate were ranked in the nation's Top Twenty during the course of the year (Miami, Alabama, Mississippi State, LSU, Auburn, Georgia, Florida State).
- Florida faced six squads in 1986 that received post-season bowl invitations (Miami, Alabama, LSU, Auburn, Georgia, Florida State).
- Florida faced only one team in 1986 (Kent State) that finished the season with a losing record. Kent State was 5-6.
- The '86 Gator squad was just the 5th team in school history to post wins over Auburn and then Georgia on back-to-back weeks.
- The '86 Gator contingent was just the 4th squad in UF history to post wins over Auburn, Georgia and Florida State in the same season.
- Florida posted wins in three of its four contests vs. rivals Auburn, Georgia, Florida State and Miami. Only Miami was able to register a win.
- Florida suffered a 23-15 setback to Miami but that contest represented the smallest margin of victory that Miami registered vs. its 11 regular season opponents in 1986.
- Overall, the '86 UF squad faced seven teams (Miami, Alabama, Mississippi State, LSU, Auburn, Georgia, Florida State) that were ranked in the nation's top 20 at some point during the 1986 season.
- With its 17-14 win over Florida State in the season finale, Florida raised its record to 9-2-0 in 11 head-to-head meetings with the Gators four rivals (Auburn, Georgia, Florida State, Miami) since Galen Hall became head coach.

Hall's 9-2-0 record in this category, a winning percentage of 82%, is by far the best record a Gator coach has achieved in this department in his first three years at the helm. Ray Graves was 7-4-1 in his first three years as UF's head coach vs. these four rivals while Doug Dickey was 6-6 and Charley Pell 2-10.

- Florida was the only team in the nation that faced five teams ranked in the top 17 in the final AP regular season poll. The Gators faced Miami (1), LSU (5), Auburn (10), Alabama (13) and Georgia (17).

ODDS AND ENDS

- Tickets for all six UF home games were completely sold out prior to the start of the season. It marked the first time in school history that the entire home schedule was sold out prior to the season opener. Furthermore, it marked the first time in state of Florida history that any sports organization, collegiate or professional had sold all of its home games prior to the start of the season. Florida averaged 74,372 (a new school record) per game at Florida Field in 1986, a figure that ranked 10th in the nation.
- The Florida football program has ranked among the most successful in the nation over the course of the past few seasons.
 - Florida's record since the start of the 1984 season is 24-7-2 (.757)—6th in nation.
 - Florida's record since the start of the 1983 season is 33-9-3 (.766)—6th in nation.



Cornerback Jarvis Williams was a main cog in a defensive secondary that led the nation in the category of fewest touchdown passes allowed for the season (4).

- Florida's record since the start of the 1982 season is 41-13-3 (.745).
- Florida's 18-2-2 record during the 1984-85 seasons was the second best winning percentage (86.36%) in the nation during that two-year time frame.
- Florida's record from the 1983-85 seasons was 27-4-3 (83.82%)—the second best in the nation for that three year time frame.
- Florida, BYU and Nebraska and Ohio State were the only 1A schools in the nation to win at least nine games in each of the 1983, 84, and 85 seasons.
- Florida was the only team in the nation to finish in the top six in final AP national rankings in each of the 1983, 84 and 85 seasons.
- Florida was the only team in the nation to finish in the top five in the final AP national rankings in each of the 1984 and 85 seasons.
- Florida and BYU were the only teams in the nation (IA) to suffer four or fewer combined losses over the course of 1983, 85, and 85 seasons.
- Florida 10 combined wins in SEC play during the 1984-85 seasons was the best in the league. Florida is 13-5-1 in its last 19 SEC games.
- Florida's 27-4-3 record during the 1983-85 seasons marked the best three year victory total in school history.

FLORIDA FIELD NOTES

- The Gators have compiled the following recent achievements at Florida Field:
 - A 30-4-2 record at home since the start of the 1981 season (36 home games). UF was 6-0 at home in 1981, 5-1 in '82, 6-0 in '83, 5-0-1 in '84 and '85, and 3-3-0 in '86.
 - A 21-3-2 record at home over the last 26 games.
 - A 19-1-2 record against non SEC opponents at Florida Field since the start of the 1981 season.
 - A 21 game unbeaten record from the mid-season 1982 until a loss to Miami in the second game of 1986.
 - An 11-3-1 record at Florida Field vs. SEC opponents since the start of the 1981 season.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

- Florida's defense ranked fourth in the nation vs. the pass, giving up an average of just 117.0 yards per game.
- Florida gave up an average of 291.8 yards per game in total offense, a figure that ranked 16th nationally and third in the SEC.
- Florida gave up just four TD passes during the entire 1986 season. It gave

up no TD pass in the last 27 quarters of play in '86.

- Florida led the nation in the fewest TD passes allowed during the 1986 season with four.
- The UF defense has given up just four total TD passes in the last 17 games (none in the final six games of '85 and four during the entire '86 season).
- Opponent quarterbacks registered a combined passing efficiency rating of just 91.8 vs. the Gator defense in 1986.
- In the last four contests of the 1986 season (Auburn, Georgia, Kentucky and Florida State) the UF defense permitted just 13 total points to be scored on it during the second half (13 total points in 16 quarters of action).
- During the last six games of 1986, the Gator defense gave up just 71 total points, an average of just 11.8 per game.
- In the last six games of the year, UF's defense gave up just six total touchdowns.
- UF forced 26 turnovers in 1986 (16 interceptions and 10 fumble recoveries). Florida forced 31 fumbles during the year but recovered just 10.

INDIVIDUAL NOTES

- WR Ricky Nattiel finished his career in fine fashion.
 - He ranked 6th on the all-time Florida reception list with 117.
 - He ranked second on the all-time Florida reception yardage list with 2,086 yards. He became just the second player in Florida history to go over the 2,000 mark in career receiving.
 - His 18 career TD receptions ranked third on the all-time UF list.
 - He became just the eleventh player in SEC history to accumulate more than 2,000 yards in career receiving. Nattiel ended his career ranked 9th on the all-time SEC yardage list with 2,086.
 - His 18 career TD receptions ranked as the 5th best total in SEC history.
 - He averaged 17.8 per catch in his Florida career, the fourth best average per catch (min 100 receptions) figure in SEC history and the all-time best at the University of Florida (min of 100 catches).
- Jarvis Williams' four interceptions in 1986 gave the junior cornerback 10 in his career, a mark that ranks third on the school career list. Bruce Bennett (1963-65) is tops in career interceptions with 13.
- QB Kerwin Bell completed his junior year with the following career achievements:
 - His 5,816 career passing yards ranked 3rd on the all-time UF list



Florida ranked 16th in the nation in total defense in 1986. It was especially impressive over the last half of the season as it surrendered just six total TDs in the last six games of the year.

- and eighth on the all-time SEC list.
 - His 47 career TD passes ranked 2nd on the all-time school list and 4th on the all-time SEC list.
 - His 47 career TD passes ranks as the most for a QB at the conclusion of his junior year in SEC history.
- OLB Clifford Charlton stamped himself as one of Florida's all-time great linebackers.
 - His 23 total tackles for negative yardage (11 QB sacks and 12 other tackles for loss) in 1986 ranked as the second best seasonal total in that category in school history, trailing only the record of 27 set by All-America linebacker Wilber Marshall in 1986.
 - His 11 QB sacks in 1986 ranked as the second best seasonal total in that department in school history.
- OT Jeff Zimmerman, a Walter Camp All-America selection, became the first offensive lineman in Florida history to gain first-team All-America distinction twice. He had also achieved that honor in 1985. Zimmerman joins QB Steve Spurrier, WR Wes Chandler, OLB Wilber Marshall, and OLB Alonzo Johnson as the only two-time first-team All-Americans in Gator history.

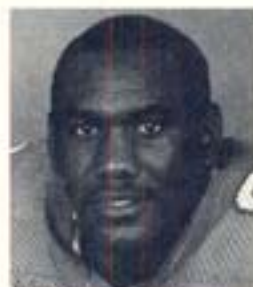

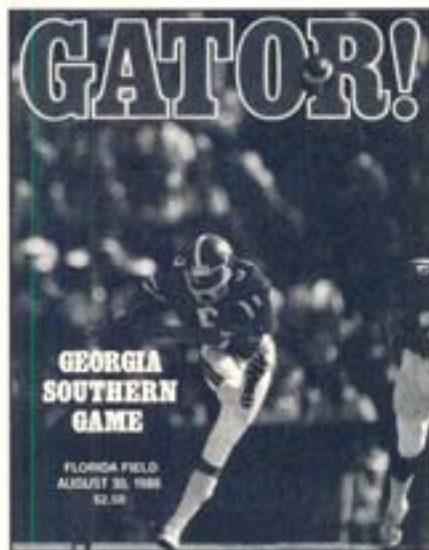

Defending Division I-AA national champion Georgia Southern came into Florida Field dreaming of a David-over-Goliath slaying.

Several young Gator running backs and the play of the offensive line, however, shot that dream full of holes as the 13th-ranked Florida Gators defeated Georgia Southern, 38-14, before 74,221 rain-drenched onlookers.

Florida's offense, which finished with 418 total yards, got started early. On the first possession, Kerwin Bell directed a five-play, 67-yard drive. On a third-and-11 play at the GS 16, Bell escaped a fierce rush, broke a couple of tackles and scored his first rushing touchdown since his freshman year. The 16-yard run came less than 1:30 into the game.

UF wasn't able to tally any more points in the opening period, but it was able to establish some new running backs. With NFL first-round draft picks Neal Anderson and John L. Williams both gone after brilliant four-year Gator careers, a new group of

ball carriers were handed the Gator running duties. Sophomore tailback Wayne Williams led the way with 93 yards on 14 carries, including an 8-yard second quarter touchdown run which put the Gators up 21-0 late in the first half.

"I was very pleased with our running game," said coach Galen Hall. "I know it was a question mark in many people's mind, but I was pleased with the entire unit's performance."

Florida's rushing attack accounted for a total of 258 yards. In addition to Williams' totals, freshman tailback Octavius Gould had 71 yards on 15 carries. Two other first year players—Tony Lomack and Cedric Smith—had 43 and 13 yards, respectively.

Quarterback Kerwin Bell, who finished 14 of 23 for 160 passing yards, tossed three touchdown passes. His first came to favorite target Ricky Nattiel with 9:53 left in the first half to make it 14-0.

Bell directed a 68-yard drive as the rain began to fall at Florida Field on UF's second possession of the second half. Jeff Dawson kicked a 28-yard field goal with 2:36 remaining in the third quarter to make it 24-0. UF extended its lead to 31-0 on an early fourth quarter drive with Tony Lomack (43 yards on 4 carries) doing most of the damage. The drive was capped by a Bell-to-Eric Hodges 9-yard scoring pass.

GSU's Tracy Ham, a Gainesville area native, directed a pair of Eagle scoring drives in the fourth period narrowing the margin to 31-14. Ham finished with 107 rushing yards and 93 passing yards.

UF added one more score on a 53-yard drive capped by Gainesville native Darrell Woulard's one-yard pass reception from Bell late in the contest.

GAME NOTEBOOK

- The 74,221 fans on hand represented the fifth largest crowd in Florida Field history. The figure also set an opening-day record surpassing the 73,907 which attended the 1983 UF-Miami opener.
- This win extended UF's unbeaten streak at Florida Field to 21 games. The Gators' record at home since the start of the 1981 campaign leaped to 28-1-2.
- Kerwin Bell's three TD passes marked the sixth time in his career that he had thrown three scoring passes in a game.

- UF's 258 rushing yards surpassed the squad's 1985 single-game high of 255 yards set against Virginia Tech.
- Freshman punter Jamie McAndrew, who joined the program just days prior to this game, averaged 40.3 yards on 3 punts, including a 48-yarder.
- UF's new tailback trio of sophomore Wayne Williams and freshmen Octavius Gould and Tony Lomack combined for 207 yards on 33 carries for a sparkling 6.3 average.
- GSU's Tracy Ham (107 yards) became just the fifth player in 35 games to gain over 100 yards rushing against the Gator defense.
- Eight UF players made their first career starts at the Division I level. In addition, five true freshmen played in the win over Georgia Southern. As a contrast, in 1985 only two true freshmen saw duty during the year.
- UF's secondary extended its streak of not allowing a passer to complete a touchdown pass to seven games.

It was billed as the battle of Heisman Trophy hopefuls; Florida's Kerwin Bell vs. Miami's Vinny Testaverde. The dream match-up of offensive fireworks never got untracked, however, as the two team's punishing defensive units controlled one of the hardest hitting games at Florida Field in recent years.

Third-ranked Miami's 23-15 win over UF snapped the Gators' impressive 21-game unbeaten streak at Florida Field before a record crowd of 74,875.

UM (2-0) jumped out to a 7-0 advantage with a five-play, 50-yard drive on its third possession. Fullback Melvin Bratton scored on a 25-yard run with 7:33 remaining in the first quarter.

The Gators came back to dominate play in the second period adding three field goals by kicker Jeff Dawson (32, 38 and 41 yards). Dawson's final kick came with just five seconds remaining in the first half. Florida's offensive unit smartly utilized two time

outs and some clutch sideline catches by Bret Weichmann (3 receptions for 26 yards on the drive) to keep alive the 14-play, 52-yard possession. UF led 9-7 at intermission.

In the first half Miami gained 114 yards of total offense compared to 110 for the Gators. Testaverde, who threw two interceptions, was just 3 of 11 for 39 yards.

In the third period, Miami took advantage of one of four Gator fumbles during the game, recovering a Bell fumble after a sack at the Hurricane 40-yard line. UM then needed just five plays to drive 60-yards for a 13-9 advantage. Bratton's second touchdown of the game, this one coming from 20-yards, gave UM the lead at 9:07 at the third quarter. It was a lead Miami wouldn't surrender. Mark Seeling then added a 35-yard field goal late in the quarter extending UM's advantage to 16-9.

As had been the case earlier, a Gator turnover aided the 'Canes on their final score. On its first possession of the fourth quarter, UM's offense had stalled and was forced to punt from its own 30-yard line. Seeling's 45-yard punt, however, was fumbled by UF returner Ricky Nattiel and recovered by Miami at the UF 19. Two plays later, Testaverde connected with Mike Irvin for a 15-yard touchdown pass with 11:12 remaining.

Rodney Jones' second career TD reception, a one-yard pass from Bell with 7:11 left, ended the scoring. Bell finished 16 of 30 for 137 yards and one touchdown. He was, however, sacked 6 times losing 56 yards in the process.

GAME NOTEBOOK

- The 74,875 who turned out for the Florida-Miami game set a new single game record at Florida Field.
- This loss snapped the Gator's impressive 21-game unbeaten streak dating back to a 1982 24-13 loss to LSU. The defeat was also the first non-SEC defeat at Florida Field since Miami beat the Gators at the end of the 1980 season.
- UF lost four fumbles in this game, the most by a Gator squad since the 1979 Mississippi State game.
- Junior cornerback Jarvis Williams played an outstanding game against the 'Canes. His performance included 2 interceptions, a fumble recovery and several punishing tackles.
- Miami's eight point win would be the smallest victory margin it posted

during its unbeaten 11-0 season.

- The Gator defense held Miami's Vinny Testaverde to several personal career lows, including yardage (163), completion percentage (48%), and total completions (12). His previous single game low for passing yardage was 217.
- After two contests, UF opponents were converting just 24% of their third down conversions (6 of 25).
- Kerwin Bell's fourth quarter TD pass to Rodney Jones was the 41st of his career tying him with Vanderbilt's Whit Taylor for fourth in the SEC record books. Bell now stood just 13 shy of the SEC and school marks held by John Reaves (54, 1969-71).

For a second consecutive game, the Gators faced a top-five nationally ranked team at Florida Field and were unable to hold back a strong second half performance by the visitors.

Alabama's 21-7 Southeastern Conference win gave UF its second straight home loss after having gone 21 consecutive home games without a defeat. Florida held the strong up-perhand in the first thirty minutes of play, but led only 7-0 at the half. Linebacker Ron Moten returned a first quarter interception 52-yards to the Alabama 1-yard line. One play later, Wayne Williams ran it in for the only score of the first half.

The Crimson Tide captured the momentum of the game in the third period with an impressive exhibit of ball control offense. In the quarter, Alabama ran 26 plays compared to UF's five while outgaining the Gators 162-20. During the 14-point period Alabama held the ball for more than 13 minutes of the stanza.

Bama took the second half kickoff

and went 71 yards in 11 plays. Shula's 23-yard pass to Greg Richardson put the Tide at the UF 14. Three plays later, Shula hit Bobby Humphrey for a 10-yard scoring pass.

Humphrey, however, did most of his damage on the ground as the game's leading rusher with 114 yards on 24 carries. For the afternoon, Alabama outrushed the Gators 225-42.

Alabama then put together a masterful 91 yard, 15 play possession to make it 14-7. David Casteal capped it with a 4-yard touchdown run.

UF's Kerwin Bell (22 of 36, no touchdowns) threw for 235 yards but was chased out of the pocket all afternoon. He was sacked three times in the second half and threw one interception which led to Alabama's third touchdown late in the fourth quarter. The final scoring drive lasted 3:36 and covered 52-yards. Humphrey's one-yard touchdown run came with three minutes remaining in the game.

Alabama (4-0) upped its national ranking to number three in the country after the win. UF dropped to 1-2, its slowest start since 1979.

GAME NOTEBOOK

- The 74,685 crowd was the second largest ever at Florida Field trailing the UF-Miami contest (74,875) held just two weeks prior to this game.
- Kerwin Bell moved closer to passing UF's 1966 Heisman Trophy winner Steve Spurrier for third on the all-time UF career passing list. Bell finished this contest with 4,833 career yards. Spurrier (1964-66) wrapped up his three year career with 4,848.
- UF's special teams registered some impressive numbers in the game. Alabama, which was leading the SEC in punt returns and kickoff returns going into the game, returned four punts for just 13 yards and two kickoffs for just 42 yards. In addition, punter Jamie McAndrew averaged 42.5 yards on six punts.
- Offensive tackle Jeff Zimmerman participated in all 64 offensive snaps and was selected by the Gator coaching staff as the "Offensive Player of the Week." Keith Williams (13 tackles, 2 sacks, 1 caused fumble) and Clifford Charlton (14 tackles, two sacks) were selected "Defensive Players of the Week."

- Alabama's victory was its eighth straight against UF dating back to 1964.
- Thru 3 games, UF's offense had outscored its opponents 37-7 in the first half. In the second half, however, UF had been outscored 51-23. In those three games, UF had not scored a TD in the third quarter.
- In back-to-back losses to Miami and Alabama, UF registered just 101 net rushing yards.
- The 21-7 loss marked the first time since 1979 that UF had lost two straight at home. It was also the first two game losing streak for the Gators since 1983 losses to Auburn (28-21) and Georgia (10-9).
- Junior cornerback Jarvis Williams (three interceptions in last two games) now had 9 career interceptions to rank 4th in Gator history.

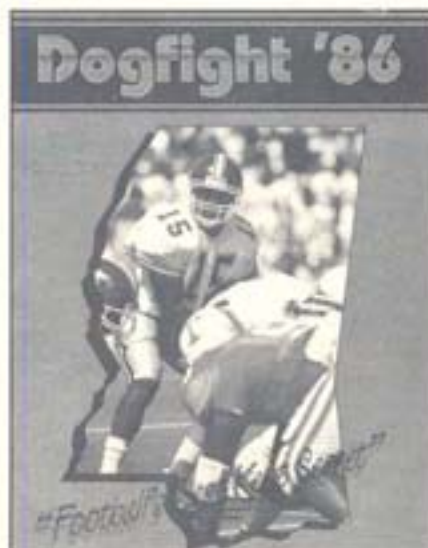

Florida was virtually eliminated as a title contender for the Southeastern Conference football championship as it bowed to the Mississippi State Bulldogs, 16-10, before a Scott Field crowd of 38,625.

UF fell to 0-2 in the SEC and 1-3 as the Gators' offense continued to struggle for a third consecutive week. In the history of the SEC, no team had ever won the championship with two losses. MSU improved to 3-1 and 2-0 under first-year coach Rocky Felker.

MSU took advantage of four Florida turnovers and used a pair of second half field goals to pull out the win.

The Gator offense gained just 207 yards while the Bulldogs picked up 399 yards. MSU senior all-purpose quarterback Don Smith did most of the damage scampering for 104 yards on 24 carries and passing for 158 yards on 14 of 20 passes.

Midway through the third period with the score tied at 10, two MSU

drives inside Florida territory set-up field goals of 38 and 27 yards by Artie Cosby.

Despite the four lost fumbles, Florida still had several opportunities to pull the game out. However, the Gator offense was unable to put together a consistent drive. With 3:07 to play, Florida had a first down at the State 39. Three pass plays netted minus six yards, however, and the Gators were forced to punt.

UF's only touchdown of the game came from the defense. Late in the first quarter, facing a second-and-one at the MSU 29, Smith attempted a screen pass to one of his backs, but the ball bounced in the air and cornerback Adrian White grabbed it and ran untouched into the endzone for his second career interception. At 7-0, it would be the Gators only lead.

A Smith 1-yard run and a Cosby 36-yard field goal in the second quarter gave the Bulldogs a 10-7 lead at intermission. Trailing 10-7, the Gators then tied the score when place-kicker Jeff Dawson hit a 33-yard field goal with 8:03 to play in the third quarter.

Cosby's two second half field goals, one from 38 yards and the other from 27, closed out the scoring.

GAME NOTEBOOK

- UF's three-game losing streak was the club's longest since 1979. In addition, it was the first time since that year that UF had lost its first two conference games.
- Freshman tailback Octavius Gould became the first true freshman to start for the Gators on offense or defense since Neal Anderson got a start against Kentucky in 1982. Gould finished as the Gators' leading rusher with 72 yards on 18 carries.
- UF quarterback Kerwin Bell moved into third place on the all-time UF pass yardage list with 4,933. A first quarter completion in this game moved him past 1966 Heisman Trophy winner Steve Spurrier.

- Adrian White's first quarter interception for a TD was the first off of Smith in 74 attempts. It was also the first TD interception return for UF since 1981.
- For the first time in four games, UF found itself trailing at intermission 10-7. Coming into this game, the Gators had outscored its 1986 opponents 37-7 in the opening half.

Despite their best offensive performance thru five games, the Gators lost their fourth in a row in a 28-17 SEC setback to the visiting LSU Tigers.

LSU continued its outstanding play when visiting Florida Field extending an unbeaten streak that dates back to 1976.

UF outgained the Tigers 367-309 in total yards but lost junior quarterback Kerwin Bell for several weeks with a strained left knee ligament. With UF behind 21-17 late in the third quarter, Bell had directed a 50 yard drive to the LSU 35. After an 18-yard pass reception to Ricky Nattiel to the LSU 17, Bell was injured. A few plays later, Florida's James Massey fumbled at the LSU two.

Louisiana State had taken the opening kickoff and driven 60-yards for the first score on just six offensive plays. The drive was kept alive when LSU fullback Garland Jean Battiste's fumble inside the 20 was ruled dead be-

fore he actually lost control. The Tigers took advantage of the call and scored three plays later.

Later in the quarter, LSU went 78 yards on seven plays, scoring on a 39-yard flea-flicker play from Tom Hodson to receiver Wendell Davis. The play gave LSU a 14-3 advantage following a 20-yard field goal by UF's Jeff Dawson. The Gators then rallied with a pair of touchdowns for a 17-14 advantage. LSU, however, jumped ahead again 21-17 just prior to intermission.

UF's defense shut out LSU in the second half, but the Gators' offense also went scoreless for two quarters and surrendered a TD on an interception return. Two drives of eight plays for 70 yards and 14 plays for 70 yards resulted in no points for UF. One drive ended with an interception in the endzone and the other with a fumble at the two. Tiger defender Greg Jackson produced the only score of the second half with a 24-yard interception return with 3:01 left to play. Jackson's return gave LSU its final margin of victory.

The win upped LSU to 2-1 while UF fell to 1-4 and 0-3 in the conference.

GAME NOTEBOOK

- Before departing with a knee injury, Kerwin Bell tossed three interceptions giving him 8 in three games against the Tigers. Bell did complete 17 of 26 attempts, however, for 219 yards and 1TD.
- Florida's 80-yard scoring drive in the second quarter capped off by a Bell-to-Anthony Williams 10-yard pass was the first offense-generated scoring drive by the Gators since the club's season opener against Georgia Southern.
- LSU's Florida Field win gave the Tigers a 4-0-1 mark in its last five visits to Gainesville. It continued the "Visiting team" domination in this series. The last home victory had been notched by LSU with a 20-3 win in 1979 in Baton Rouge.
- The loss marked the first time UF had lost four games in a row since 1979.
- UF had the ball first and goal three times in this contest and came away with only three total points. Turnovers also proved to be the team's undoing as the club registered seven turnovers (5 interceptions, 2 fumbles).
- The loss dropped UF to 28-4-2 at home since the start of the 1981 season.

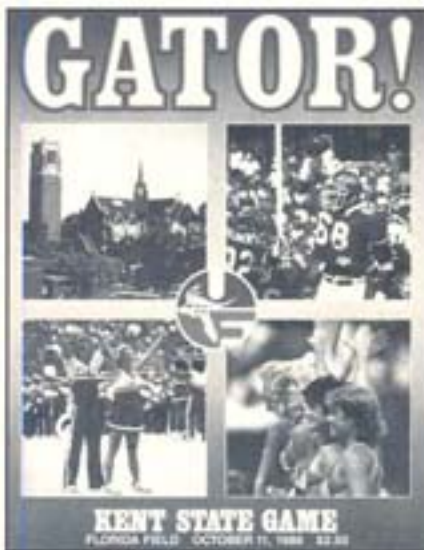

Home-cooking finally proved to be palatable for the Gators in 1986 as they posted a 52-9 Homecoming win over the Kent State Golden Flashes.

Rodney Brewer, making his first collegiate start since replacing the injured Kerwin Bell, took advantage of the opportunity completing 13 of 16 passes for 230 yards and two touchdowns. The totals included an 8 of 8 performance in the first quarter.

The Gators started early and never looked back while scoring on eight of their first 10 possessions. UF scored in every quarter, snapping a four-game losing streak which included three straight defeats at Florida Field.

The 537 yards of total offense, also included a season-high of 306 rushing yards. Led by Freshman Octavius Gould (three touchdowns) and junior Dwayne Ferguson, the Gators tallied their best point output since 1984.

Gould, who carried the ball 21 times for 81 yards, notched the first of

his three touchdowns with a 7-yard run with 3:57 gone in the first quarter.

James Massey's 5-yard run, a Brewer to Anthony Williams 12-yard scoring play and another Gould run gave the Gators a 28-3 halftime lead. Kent's only scoring drive of the first half ended with a 27-yard field goal.

In the third quarter, the Gators picked up where they left off scoring on their first possession of the second half. Brewer connected with Ricky Nattiel for a 60-yard touchdown pass. Gould later added his third touchdown to end a 75-yard drive late in the third quarter. UF now led 42-3.

Jeff Dawson added a 30-yard field goal midway through the fourth quarter. Wayne Williams ended Florida's scoring with a 9-yard run with 4:45 to play.

The Gator defensive unit also played well. Kent State didn't gain a first down until its fifth possession of the game and totaled just 12 on the afternoon. Kent State was also held to just 1 of 12 conversions on third down.

GAME NOTEBOOK:

- The 73,718 which attended this homecoming contest represented the third largest homecoming crowd since the Gators started the tradition in 1923. Since that year, UF held a 43-19-1 mark in those games, including seven wins in a row.
- Several offensive numbers logged in this game were among the best in recent years. The 573 total yards of offense was the 6th best ever for UF. The 59 rushing attempts were the most since the 1981 Florida State game. The 53 points were also the most since a 63-21 victory against Tulane in 1984.
- Ricky Nattiel (4 receptions for 93 yards) continued to move up on the all-time Gator pass reception list. Thru this game, he had 96 in his career, fourth on the all-time Gator list. During this game he passed Wes Chandler and John L. Williams. With 1,810 career yards Nattiel moved closer to becoming the second receiver in Gator history to register 2000 receiving yards. Carlos Alvarez (1969-71) ranked first with 2,536 yards.
- Gould's 3 TDs marked the first time a Gator back had three rushing scores in a game since Neal Anderson did it against Tulane in 1983.
- Kerry Watkins' 48-yard kickoff return in the second quarter was the Gators' longest since a Nattiel 50-

yard return against Syracuse in 1984.

- The win gave UF a 19-1-2 mark at home against non-SEC opponents since the start of the 1981 season.
- Rodney Brewer made his first collegiate start at QB in this game. It broke a string of 27 consecutive starts by Kerwin Bell since the beginning of the 1984 season.
- Nine different players rushed the ball for the Gators in this game. In addition, 9 different receivers registered at least one pass reception.

Florida put a win in the books, avenging a 28-28 tie against the Scarlet Knights the previous year in Gainesville.

Heroes of the day in the 15-3 victory before 36,781 fans in Giants Stadium were the members of the Florida defense and placekicker Jeff Dawson, who aided the UF cause with three field goals giving the Gators a 9-0 lead by early in the third quarter.

The win improved Florida's record to 3-4 on the season while Rutgers fell to 3-2-1.

Freshman tailback Octavius Gould (Brown Mills, NJ) returned to his home state and rushed for 102 yards on 28 carries. His performance proved to be the highlight on a Gator offensive unit that gained 325 yards of total offense.

UF's defense, however, controlled much of the action holding the Knights to 230 yards and only a 38-

yard field goal by Doug Giesler. Florida's opportunistic defensive unit stopped Rutgers offensive threats thanks to three interceptions, one fumble recovery and two sacks.

The Gators wasted little time putting the Scarlet Knights behind, taking the opening kickoff and driving 58-yards for a Dawson 36-yard field goal. Gould contributed the big play on the possession with a 34-yard run.

With 1:32 remaining in the first quarter, Dawson added a 33-yard three-pointer. The Gators took that 6-0 advantage into the locker room. Dawson's 34-yard field goal 1:51 into the second half gave UF a 9-0 lead.

After Rutgers' only score of the day on Giesler's field goal midway through the third quarter, UF drove 69-yards on nine plays for the only touchdown of the game. Rodney Brewer, making his second start for the injured Kerwin Bell, passed to Ricky Nattiel for a 36-yard touchdown. Brewer finished the game 12 of 19 for 160 yards with one touchdown and one interception.

GAME NOTEBOOK:

- Octavius Gould, who earlier in the year became the first true Gator freshman to start since Neal Anderson in 1982, registered UF's first 100-yard rushing performance of 1986. It was also the first 100-yard game by a first-year player since Anderson accomplished it in a 197-yard effort against the Kentucky Wildcats in 1982.
- Gould's 28 carries proved to be more than an average busy afternoon. The total represented the fifth highest single-game effort in Gator history. Anderson holds the mark with 33 attempts against UK in that 1982 contest.
- As a starter for two games, Rodney Brewer had registered solid enough totals to rank first in the Southeastern Conference in passing efficiency. Brewer had completed 25 of 35 passes for 390 yards, three TDs and one interception.
- Florida cornerback Jarvis Williams' interception in the fourth quarter was the 10th of his career, tying him for third on the all-time list with Bruce Vaughan and Alvin Cowans. Bruce Bennett (1963-65) topped the list with 13.

- The injury bug continued to haunt UF. In addition to preseason All-Americans Kerwin Bell and Jeff Zimmerman (hamstring) missing this game, senior wideout Brett Wiechmann suffered a broken arm on a pass reception.
- Florida had now won 21 consecutive games in which a Gator back rushed for 100 or more yards.
- Since the start of the 1983 season, UF had held the rushing advantage in 30 games. In those 30 games, the Gators had posted a 26-1-3 record.
- Thru 7 games, the defensive unit had limited opponent quarterbacks to a lowly combined efficiency rating of just 94.4. The UF defense had given up just four TD passes in the course of 13 games.
- When Jeff Zimmerman failed to start against Rutgers due to a pulled hamstring, it marked the first time in 29 games that he had missed a starting call.

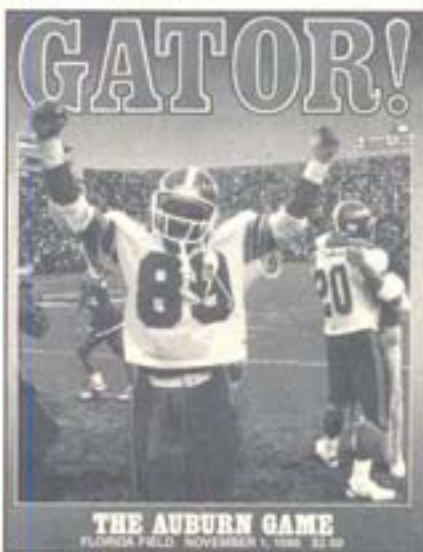

Simply stated this game will always be remembered as "THE COMEBACK."

Quarterback Kerwin Bell, who had missed nearly one month of action since sustaining a knee injury against LSU on October 4, came off the bench to rally Florida from a 17-0 fourth quarter deficit. When it was all said and done, Bell had engineered a miraculous 18-17 win to defeat fifth-ranked Auburn before an amazed 74,521 crowd at Florida Field.

UF (4-4, 1-3 in the Southeastern Conference) extended its winning streak to three in a row while knocking the Auburn Tigers (7-1, 3-1) out of contention for a national championship. It was the Tigers' seventh straight loss in Gainesville.

Bell entered the game, replacing starter Rodney Brewer, with 5:27 remaining in the first half. At that point, UF trailed 14-0 and had fallen victim to turnovers. After their first six possessions they had turned the ball over five times.

Auburn used its nationally-ranked

rushing attack to do most of its damage. On its second possession, Auburn drove 88 yards on 15-plays to take a 7-0 lead with 5:50 left in the opening period. Senior tailback Brent Fullwood, the game's leading rusher with 166 yards on 21 carries, picked up 60 of those on 6 attempts.

After a second Brewer fumble at the Florida 11, Auburn then needed just three plays to extend the lead to 14-0 early in the second quarter on a Fullwood 11-yard touchdown run. Kicker Chris Knapp later added a 31-yard field goal with 14 seconds to play in the third quarter to make it 17-0 before the Gators awakened and started on the road to an unbelievable fourth-quarter comeback. Knapp's field goal was set up by Bell's second interception and the final of seven Gator turnovers on the day.

With 12:09 remaining in the fourth quarter, Bell finally sparked the Gators offense driving UF 79 yards on 10 plays. He tallied UF's first points with a one-yard quarterback sneak.

On its next possession, Florida moved to the Auburn 24, before the drive stalled due to a quarterback sack of Bell. Robert McGinty, an Auburn transfer, then connected on a 51-yard field goal to make it 17-10 Auburn with 7:10 remaining. It was McGinty's first Gator field goal.

The biggest UF defensive play of the day then came on Auburn's next possession. Auburn had chewed up more than five minutes on its possession while driving to the UF 36. Fullback Reggie Ware, however, fumbled the ball when hit at the line and UF's Webbie Burnett recovered at the 34.

Bell then directed a masterful 7 play, 66-yard winning touchdown drive using the two-minute offense. Ricky Nattiel, playing with a separated shoulder, caught a 5-yard loft pass in the corner of the endzone to trim the Auburn lead to 17-16 with 0:36 remaining. Bell then converted a two-point conversion run for what many will remember as the greatest comeback in Florida football history.

Twenty years from now, it's likely that more than the 74,000-plus who were in attendance will claim to have witnessed "THE COMEBACK."

GAME NOTEBOOK:

- The Gators closed out their 1986 home schedule before the third largest crowd in Florida Field history (74,521). In the six-game schedule, UF averaged a school record 74,538 while drawing 447,231 fans to Flor-

ida Field. The previous mark was set in 1985 (73,127).

- Florida's win left the Gators with a 30-4-2 record at home since the start of the 1981 season and a 21-3-2 mark at home over the previous 26 contests.
- QB Kerwin Bell, the SEC's fourth leading all-time TD passer with 43, came off the bench to register an 18 of 31 performance for 182 yards in just two-and-a-half quarters of play.
- Robert McGinty's fourth-quarter 51-yard field was his first as a Gator since transferring from Auburn. It was also the sixth longest in Florida history. Ironically, McGinty's last three-pointer came "against" the Gators in 1984, a 24-3 Auburn loss at Florida Field.
- Linebacker Pat Moore, a non-scholarship player, became the first true freshman to start on the Florida defense since Alonzo Johnson started 10 of 11 games during 1981.
- During the game, Ricky Nattiel became just the sixth Florida player to record 100 career receptions.
- Bell's 43 career TD passes ranked him second on the all-time UF list trailing only John Reaves (54, 1969-71).
- Brent Fullwood's 166-yard rushing effort was the eighth best day ever for an opponent RB.

The 18-17 win over Auburn went down in the Gator annals as perhaps Florida's all-time greatest comeback. Trailing 17-0 in the fourth quarter, QB Kerwin Bell returned from an injury to engineer the dramatic comeback. With the Gators down 17-10 and less than two minutes remaining, the UF defense forced an Auburn fumble. Several plays later, Bell hit WR Ricky Nattiel (left photo), who was playing despite a slightly separated shoulder, with this big pass to give the Gators a first-and-goal at the five. Two plays later Bell and Nattiel hooked up for a TD pass with just 36 seconds remaining. Bell then scrambled into the endzone for a two-point conversion run to cap the unbelievable comeback and set-off a wild celebration at Florida Field.

The Gators pulled off their second come-from-behind win in as many weeks as they continued their late-season push for a bowl invitation.

Trailing 16-3 midway through the second quarter, the Kerwin Bell-to-Ricky Nattiel connection awakened for three touchdown passes and keyed a 31-19 win over the 19th-ranked Georgia Bulldogs in front of 81,957 in Jacksonville's Gator Bowl.

Just one week earlier, remember, the Gators had been trailing 17-0 early in the fourth quarter before Bell engineered a miraculous 18-17 victory against Auburn. In this game Florida started a little earlier in its comeback while avenging a 1985 loss to Georgia just four days after UF had earned its first-ever number one national ranking.

Georgia scored on its first four possessions of the game, including a 68-yard drive on its first drive of the afternoon. Tailback Lars Tate (chosen Georgia MVP in the game) rambled in from 1-yard to give the Bulldogs a 7-0

advantage with less than six minutes gone in the game. Bulldog kicker Steve Crumley added three of his school-record four field goals on the Dog's net three possessions while the Gators could muster only a 23-yard Jeff Dawson field goal. Crumley's 45-yard field goal with 7:50 remaining in the first half gave Georgia a 13-point advantage.

Bell, however, making his first start since the LSU game when he went out with a knee injury, was again ready to lead a UF comeback. He finished the game 20 of 31 for 272 yards and three touchdowns, all of which came to his favorite receiver, Ricky Nattiel. Bell was sacked just one time in the game and was selected the game's MVP.

Trailing 16-3, Bell completed five straight passes in a drive capped by an 8-yard scoring play to Nattiel with 2:14 left in the first half to make it 16-10 at intermission.

After Crumley's last field goal of 43 yards with 5:23 left in the third quarter made it 19-10, Florida notched three unanswered touchdowns to seal the victory.

Georgia gained 185 yards in the first half but was stifled by a hard-hitting Gator defensive unit which limited them to just 58 yards and four first downs in the entire second half.

A Bell-to-Nattiel 9-yard score trimmed the lead to 19-17, before tailback James Massey's 3-yard touchdown run on the first play of the fourth quarter gave the Gators a 24-19 lead. The Florida defense continued to shut down Georgia and Bell added one more score as Nattiel streaked deep into the Georgia secondary for a 42-yard touchdown with 5:34 remaining.

GAME NOTEBOOK

- Florida's win accomplished a rare double; defeats of Auburn and Georgia on back-to-back weeks. It represented just the fifth time in school history in 33 tries that a Gator squad had beaten Auburn and then Georgia on back-to-back weeks. Galen Hall became the first Gator coach to do it twice in a career having done it earlier in 1984.
- In three games against Georgia, Kerwin Bell (61 of 97) had tossed for 858 yards and 5 touchdown passes. Dating back to the fourth quarter of the Auburn game, Bell had hit on 31 of 48 passes for 408 yards and four touchdowns.
- The 31 points scored against Georgia were the most points scored by a

Gator squad against Georgia since Vince Dooley's arrival in Athens in 1964 (23 meetings).

- Florida wide receiver Ricky Nattiel tied a school game record with three touchdown catches on the afternoon.
- Nattiel became just the second Gator receiver to go over 2,000 yards for his career. His 2,032 yards trailed only Carlos Alvarez (2,563, 1969-71).
- Nattiel now was also third on UF's all-time TD reception list with 17 touchdown passes. He trailed only Carlos Alvarez (19) and all-time leader Wes Chandler (22) on that list.
- Bell's 46 career touchdown passes ranked him fourth on the all-time SEC list. It left him just 8 short of the school mark held by John Reaves (54).
- The hard-hitting Florida secondary continued to hold-on to its tough reputation. Georgia's James Jackson was limited to just 4 completions on 15 attempts. In a 15-game stretch dating back to 1985, the UF secondary had allowed just four passing touchdowns.

The Kentucky Wildcats ended UF's late-season push for a bowl bid with a 10-7 upset during a near-freezing afternoon at Commonwealth Stadium.

UF, boasted from back-to-back come from behind second half wins over Auburn and Georgia in previous weeks, appeared to be on-the-way to another dramatic win. From their own 17-yard line, the Gators started their last possession with one minute remaining in the game. Following three pass completions by Kerwin Bell, however, receiver Ricky Nattiel fumbled away the last reception after being hit by Tony Mayes at the UK 32.

The light-drizzling rain and brisk temperatures had helped stall the Florida offensive unit for most of the afternoon. The Gators held the ball for less than 19 minutes while gaining just 241 total yards.

Trailing 10-3, UF started its last possession after a UK punt to the UF 17-yard line. Kerwin Bell, miracle

worker in two previous wins but just 4 of 21 coming into this drive, completed passes to Eric Hodges (17 yards), Darrell Woulard (15 yards) and Nattiel (15 yards) before the game-ending turnover.

Kentucky had taken a 7-3 lead into halftime on a Mark Higgs 1-yard run near the end of the first quarter. UK had registered a 70-yard drive late in the second quarter but a Joe Worley 42-yard field goal attempt was missed. Earlier Worley had missed from 51-yards. Florida's only first half score, was a 22-yard field goal by Jeff Dawson. Dawson's three-pointer in the second quarter came after UF had failed to convert on a first-and-goal at the UK two following a 65-yard passing play from Bell to Darrell Woulard.

After a scoreless third quarter, Kentucky added a fourth quarter 34-yard field goal by Worley to cap a 13 play, 58 yard possession.

UF had another scoring opportunity after a 49-yard kickoff return by Kerry Watkins to the UK 49, but after advancing to the 30-yard line, UF stalled on a 4th-and-sixth play.

Kentucky's ball control offense held the ball for 79 plays on the afternoon keeping the Gators off the field. In the second half, the Gators' drives could generate just four punts, a change of possession and the game-ending fumble.

GAME NOTEBOOK

- This loss ended UF's late-season push for a bowl invitation. The Gators had posted five straight wins to recover from a 1-4 start.
- The Kentucky win snapped a UF six-game winning streak against Kentucky dating back to 1980. It was the Gators' first loss in Lexington in five appearances.
- The loss proved a sharp contrast to the Gators' last visit to the bluegrass state. In 1984, UF had clinched its first-ever SEC first-place finish with a 25-17 victory. After the game, UF's Galen Hall was named the new head coach in a lockerroom celebration.
- Thru this game, the UF defense had not allowed a passing touchdown in 23 quarters of play.
- The 3-point output by UF was the club's lowest of the 1986 campaign. For the game, Kentucky held the ball for 41:02 compared to the Gators' 18:58 total.

- During the second half of the Gators final three SEC contests, UF out-scored Auburn, Georgia and Kentucky 39-9.

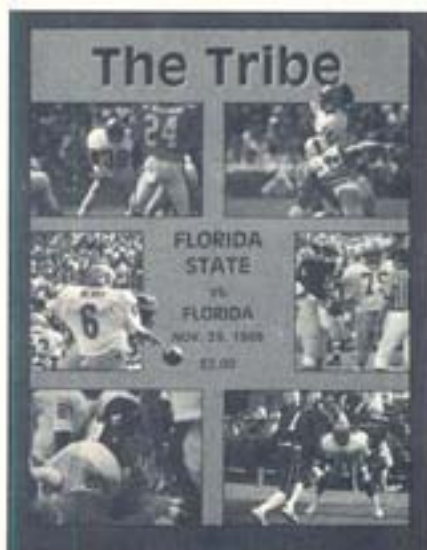

As one state sportswriter put it, "This game was fit for ducks." Amidst driving rain on a muddy field, UF registered a 17-13 comeback win against intrastate rival Florida State in front of a school-record crowd of 62,307 at Doak-Campbell Stadium.

The victory, keyed again by the fourth quarter heroics of the Kerwin Bell to Ricky Nattiel combination, marked UF's sixth straight win against FSU dating back to 1981. UF also avoided its first losing season since 1979 while finishing at 6-5 after a slow 1-4 start.

Trailing 13-10 late in the fourth quarter, Bell and Nattiel took control of the game to lead UF to its third fourth-quarter come-from-behind win in four games. Nattiel concluded his career by hauling in an 18-yard touchdown pass from Bell to climax the comeback.

FSU was nursing a 13-10 lead late in the fourth quarter when FSU kicker

Derek Schmidt was called in to attempt a 46-yard field goal. Schmidt's kick was blocked, however, by UF safety Louis Oliver and the Gators recovered on their own 40-yard line.

Sophomore Wayne Williams, the Gators' leading rusher with 51 yards, picked up 39 yards on the winning drive on six carries. From the 18-yard line, Bell then found Nattiel in the end zone for the winning score with 3:50 left in the game.

The opening minutes of the game saw an FSU missed field goal and a pair of turnovers by the two teams before UF would open the scoring with 4:56 left in the first quarter. Freshman Octavius Gould's 8-yard run gave UF a 7-0 lead. On the ensuing kickoff, FSU's Keith Ross set-up a Seminole field goal with a 71-yard kickoff return to the Florida 20-yard line. The 'Noles, however, managed just one yard on three plays and settled for a 36-yard field goal by Schmidt with 2:06 left in the opening period.

After a 19-yard field goal by UF's Jeff Dawson with 10:18 remaining in the half, FSU went to its leading rusher Sammie Smith (116 yards). Smith dominated a 73-yard touchdown drive which ended with his 1-yard run at 3:37 of the second quarter. The drive had been kept alive by a pair of third-and-long completions by FSU quarterback Danny McManus.

GAME NOTEBOOK:

- The win extended UF's domination in this intrastate series to 22 wins in 29 games, including a current-six game winning streak dating back to 1981.
- All-SEC receiver Ricky Nattiel closed his four-year career by catching the winning touchdown pass for the second time in three games. Nattiel finished his UF career with 18 touchdown receptions; good for third on the UF all-time list trailing only Carlos Alvarez and Wes Chandler. His 2,086 yards also ranked second in school history, as well as ninth overall in SEC history. Nattiel's fourth quarter TD reception was his eighth of the 1986 season.

- The game was marred by penalty flags (22 for 181 yards), including a school record 15 penalties for 116 yards by FSU.
- All-SEC linebacker Clifford Charlton finished the year with 23 tackles for losses, the second best total in that category in school history.
- In the last four games of the year, the UF defense allowed just 13 second-half points. That effort helped keep the Gators within striking distance for three fourth-quarter wins.

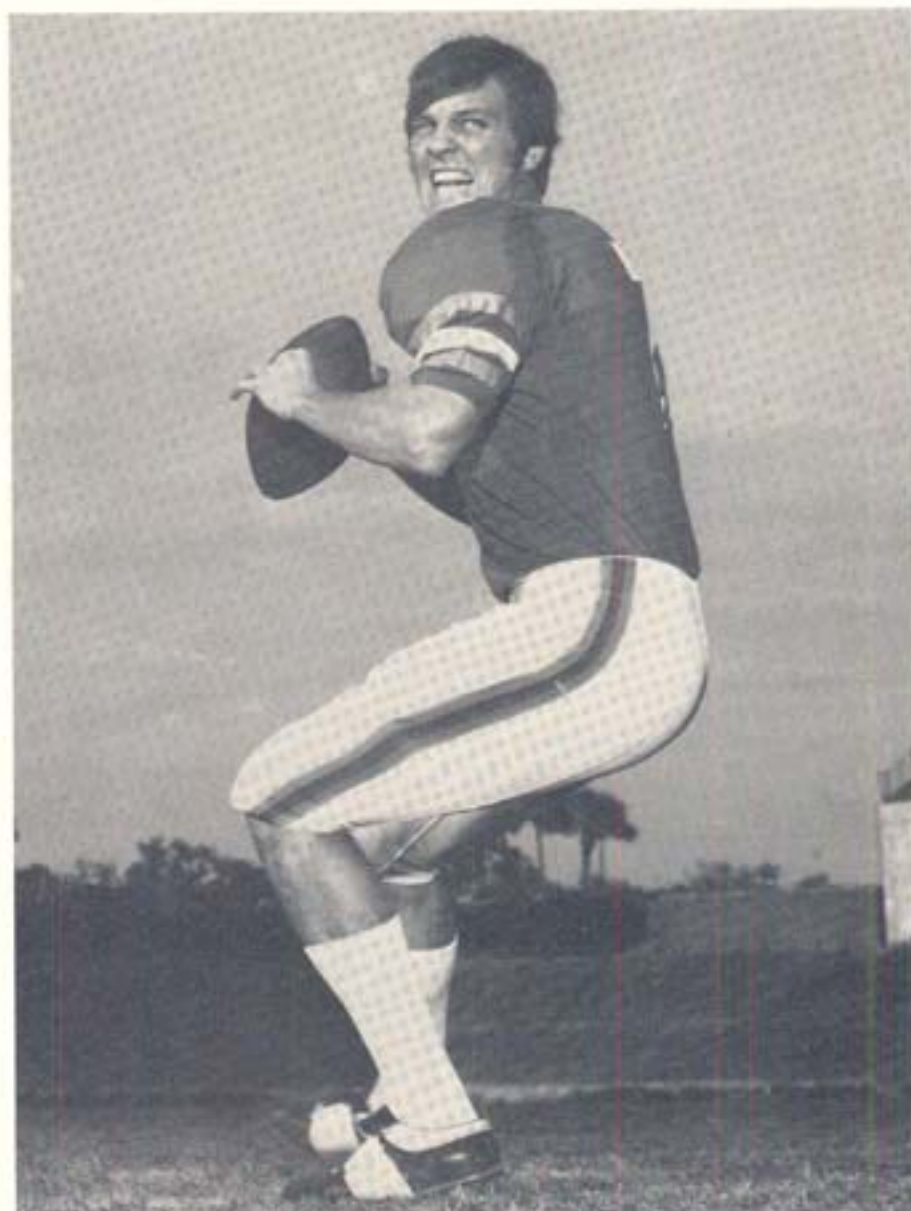

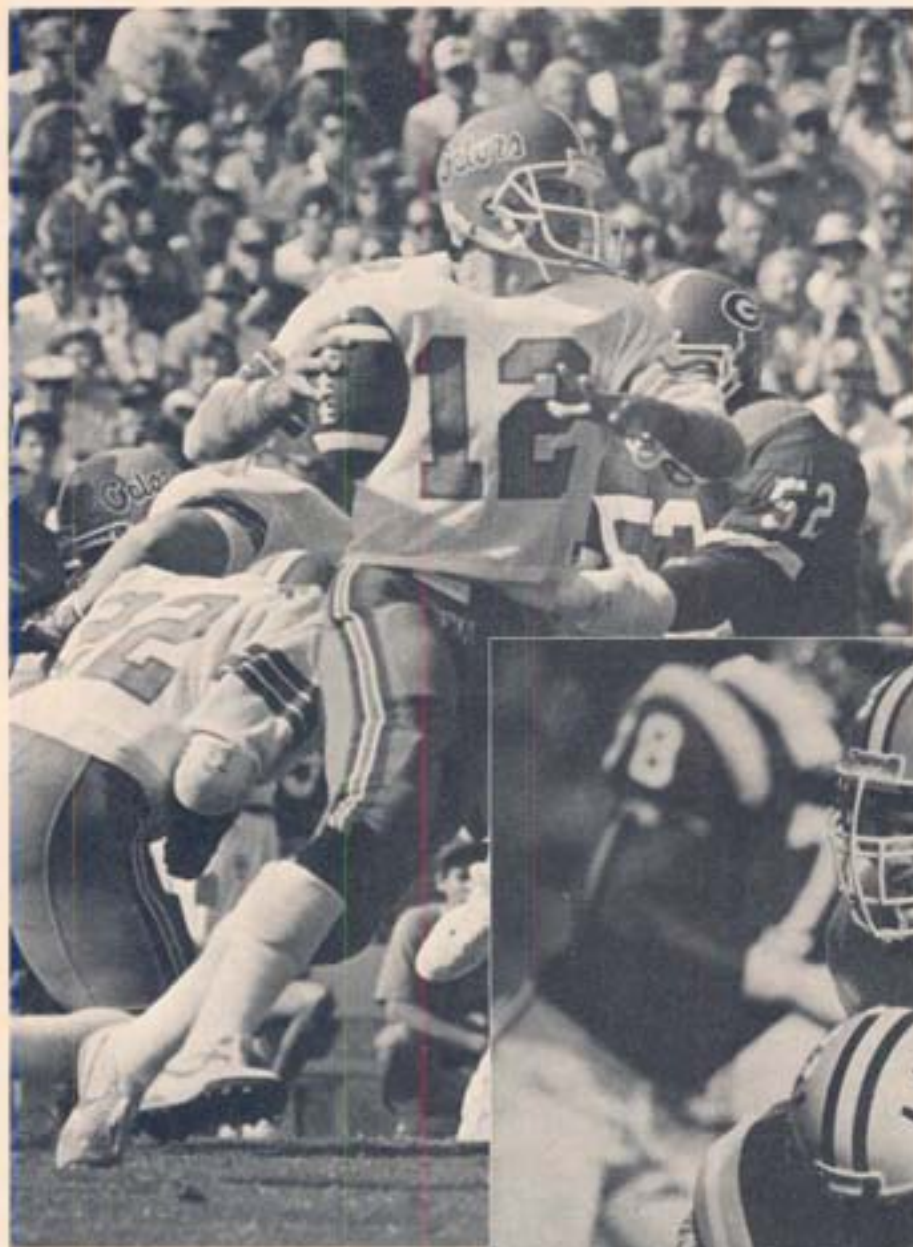

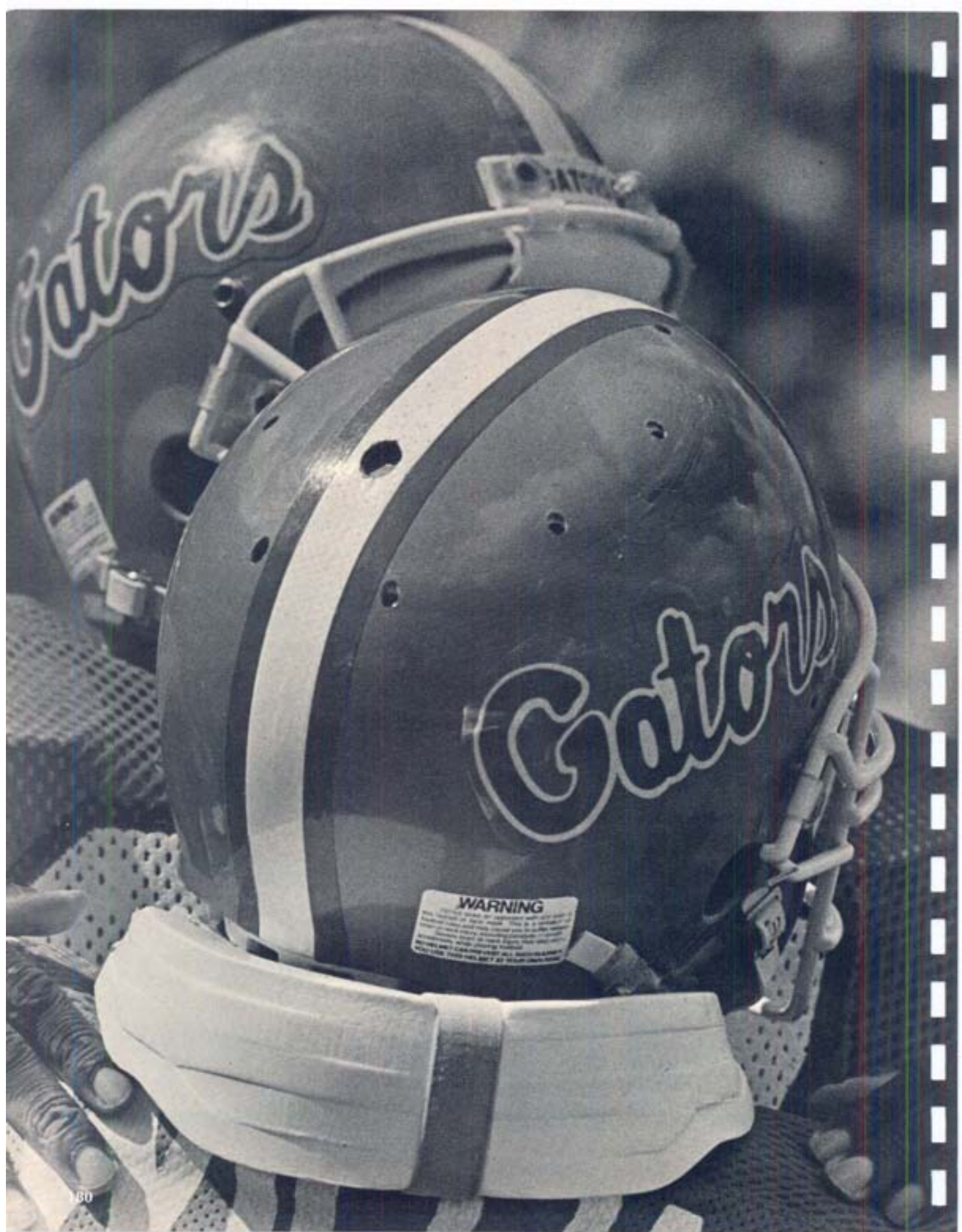

HISTORY AND TRADITION



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FOOTBALL HISTORY AND TRADITION

Florida, a charter member of the prestigious Southeastern Conference, started football in 1906 against Rollins on a baseball field located immediately north of the current Florida Field. That area is now called Fleming Field, used during the week for soccer and intramurals and on football weekends for parking.

The Gators won, 6-0, and went on the following year to record a 4-0-1 mark behind the running of a halfback named Willie Shands, who eventually became an important state senator for whom the Shands Hospital and Clinics at UF are named.

The finest of the early teams at Florida were under the tutelage of U.S. Army Major James A. Van Fleet, head coach and senior officer of the school's ROTC program. The Van Fleet teams in 1923-24 attracted national attention to the Gator football program for the first time.

In 1923 Florida tied Georgia Tech, the ruler of Southern football, 7-7, in Atlanta. The Jackets came from be-

hind late in the game to earn the deadlock.

In the final game of that season Florida recorded one of the most shocking upsets of the year, beating Alabama and Wallace Wade in Tuscaloosa, 16-6, as All-Southern back Edgar Jones scored every point for the Gators.

Florida was 6-1-2 that season and 6-2-2 in 1924, recording 7-7 ties against both Georgia Tech and Texas, two of the national football powers, and losing to Army, 14-7, at West Point.

Florida's 1928 team led the nation in scoring on the way to an 8-1 record, losing its final game, 13-12, on a wet field in Knoxville, Tenn. to Tennessee.

The 1930's produced great individual talent at Florida. Walter (Tiger) Mayberry was an All-SEC halfback who was later to lose his life in World War II as an often-decorated Marine

went on to become president of Blair Radio and TV, a nationwide firm. His favorite target was end Forrest (Fergie) Ferguson, an all-star athlete who died years later as the result of wounds suffered in the invasion of Normandy during World War II.

Bob Woodruff brought the Gators to solid football status as the head coach of the 1950's. He produced the first bowl team in 1952, All-America linemen like Charlie LaPradd, John Barrow and Vel Heckman and a reputation for hard-nosed defense.

Ray Graves came out of the decade of the 1960's as the winningest Florida coach of record. He was 70-31-4 with five bowl teams, four of which won. His only losing bowl team lost by two points to Missouri in the 1966 Sugar Bowl, 20-18.

That decade also produced Heisman Trophy winner Steve Spurrier, a record-setting passer, as was quarterback John Reaves in 1969, who smashed five national marks and still holds most passing and total offense records for the Gators.

The teams of Doug Dickey from 1970-78 went to four bowls. His 1973 team was the second Gator edition ever to defeat Auburn at Auburn and went on that year to beat Georgia, FSU and Miami in the same month, a rare feat for Florida.



The 1984 Gator squad posted an overall 9-1-1 record and was ranked third in the final AP ranking. The Sporting News and the New York Times declared the squad national champions. Florida's 5-0-1 mark in SEC play marked the first time in school history that a Gator squad finished with the best record in SEC play.

Dickey's top players included All-Americans Jack Youngblood, defensive end; Wes Chandler, wide receiver; Sammy Green and Ralph Ortega, linebackers, and SEC rushing king Jimmy DuBose.

Charley Pell's rebuilding job began in 1979 and his last four Florida teams

went to bowls, averaging eight wins a season against one of the nation's most demanding schedules. Pell's 1983 team secured the school's then highest final ranking ever with a No. 6 finish. Wilber Marshall, a linebacker, was named "National Defensive Player of the Year."

The top players of the Pell era (1979-84) were WR Cris Collinsworth, LB David Little, DT David Galloway, LB Wilber Marshall, and OT Lomas Brown. All were first-team All-America selections.

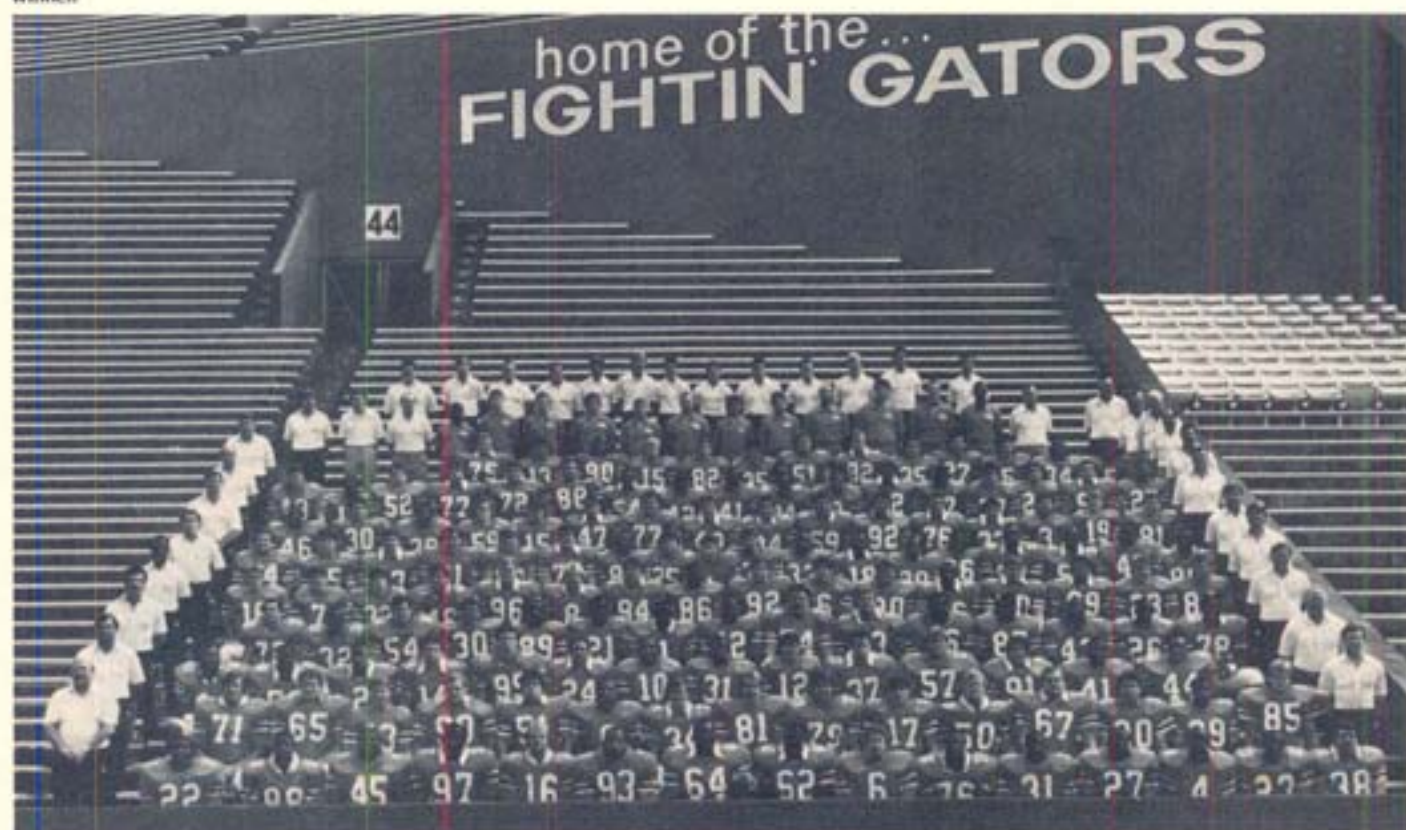
Galen Hall was named interim coach after the first three games of the 1984 season. He proceeded to win the next seven games, and when the squad defeated Kentucky, 25-17, to clinch the school's first-ever first place finish in the SEC standing, he was named the new head coach in the lockerroom after the game in Lexington. The squad closed out the banner year with a 27-17 win at Florida State to cap a 9-1-1 season. In the final regular season wire rankings, Florida was ranked third in the nation, the best regular season ranking in school history. The '84 squad was named the national champion by the N.Y. Times and the Sporting News.

Hall led Florida to another banner

season in 1985. The Gators opened the season with an eight game unbeaten streak to stretch UF's two-season unbeaten mark to 18 consecutive games. When Florida defeated Auburn, 14-10, in the eighth week of the season, UF was ranked first in the weekly Associated Press rankings, the first time in school history that the Gators held that lofty status. Florida finished with a second straight 9-1-1 season. The Gators were ranked 5th in the final AP ranking.

The period of 1983-85 ranks as the most successful in school history. During that time frame, Florida was the only school in the nation to finish in the top six in the final AP ranking in each of those respective seasons. Florida's 27-4-3 record during that time frame represented the second best winning percentage (83.8%) in the nation.

Since it began playing football in 1906, the Gators have had 27 first team All-Americans, a Heisman Trophy winner in Steve Spurrier (Florida is just one of 30 schools in the nation that can claim a Heisman recipient), 15 bowl teams, and numerous other regional and conference honors. Those achievements have all provided the base for a proud football tradition at Florida.



The 1985 UF squad posted a 9-1-1 record and was ranked fifth in the final AP poll. Its 5-1-0 mark in SEC play tied for first in the league standings. After its 14-10 win at Auburn, it became the first squad in school history to be ranked number one in the nation in a wire service poll.

"The Birth of a Nickname"

Reprinted from Florida Times-Union August 2, 1948

"A Jacksonville lawyer 'christened' the University of Florida's football team 41 years ago when he gave a pennant-designing firm in Charlottesville, Va., the suggestion of 'The Alligators.'

"Austin Miller, who has practiced law here since shortly after his graduation from the University of Virginia in 1910, yesterday recalled the circumstances surrounding the choice of a name for Florida University's athletic teams. It happened in the fall of 1907, a year after the University of Gainesville had fielded its first team.

"Miller, a native of Gainesville, was enrolled in the University of Virginia at the time and was visited by his father, Phillip Miller, a Gainesville merchant. The elder Miller, who died nine years ago, then owned and operated a combination drug store and stationery store in Gainesville, a popular rendezvous for university students.

"While in Charlottesville the father decided to order some pennants and banners for the University of Florida from the Michie Company, which was engaged in the manufacture of such items. The Millers went to the firm, where they were shown samples of pennants which featured the Yale bulldog, the Princeton tiger and other school emblems. When the manager asked for Florida's emblem, the Millers realized, the new school had none.

"Austin Miller said the name 'Alligators' occurred to him as a suitable emblem, both because the Michie manager said no other school had adopted it and because the alligator was native to this state. 'I had no idea it would stick, or even be popular with the student body,' Miller said. 'We wanted to get the Michie firm started on the pennants as quickly as possible, though, so they would be available in time for the opening of the 1908 school term.'

"The Michie manager complicated the 'christening' when he told young Miller he'd never seen an alligator

and didn't believe he could design one. The law student volunteered to find a suitable picture of a 'gator. After much search, he said, he located a picture of one in the library of the University of Virginia.

"The first appearance of the alligator emblem, Miller recalled, was in his father's Gainesville store in 1908. The Michie firm had supplied Millers' with the blue banners measuring six by three feet, showing a large orange alligator, and also with several different types of smaller banners and pennants. Some of them showed the alligator lying down, some rampant, while others included only the alligator's head."

OT Lomas Brown started every game for the Detroit Lions for the second consecutive year in 1986. He was a first round choice of the Lions in 1985.



RB Neal Anderson, a first round draft pick in 1986, led the Chicago Bears with 19 special team tackles. He rushed for 146 yards in a backup role behind Walter Payton.



WR Cris Collinsworth had another excellent year for the Cincinnati Bengals in 1986. He led the squad in receptions with 62 for 1,024 yards and 10 TD catches.



Scot Brantley has started 69 of the past 73 games at linebacker for the Tampa Bay Bucs. He ranked second on the squad in tackles in 1986 with 127.



WR Wes Chandler, a four-time Pro Bowl selection, ranked second on the San Diego Charger squad in 1986 in receptions with 56 for 874 yards. Chandler was a first round NFL draft selection in 1978.



Dan Fike started all 16 games at offensive tackle in 1986 for a Cleveland Brown team that came within one game of winning the AFC title and playing in the Super Bowl.



DT David Galloway missed some action early in the season with an injury but recovered to post 70 tackles and 5 QBS in 1986. Galloway was a second round choice of the Cardinals in 1982.



James Harrell started 15 of 16 contest for the Detroit Lions at linebacker in 1986. He ranked second on the squad in tackles with 109.



RB Lorenzo Hampton, a first round draft selection in 1985, led the Miami Dolphins in rushing in 1986 with 803 yards. He also ranked second on squad in receptions with 61 for 446 yards.



FB James Jones of the Detroit Lions rushed for 903 yards in 1986, a total that was the sixth best in the NFC and the eighth best in the NFL. He also had 54 receptions and was named the Lions' Co-Offensive MVP for the third straight season. Jones was a first round draft choice in 1983.



Alonzo Johnson, a second round draft choice in 1986, started 10 games as a rookie linebacker for the Philadelphia Eagles and registered 71 total tackles during the season.



Crawford Kex, in his second year with the squad, started all 16 games at offensive guard for the Dallas Cowboys in 1986.



Safety Tony Lilly was a mainstay in the defensive secondary for the AFC Champion and Super Bowl participant Denver Broncos in 1986.

Wilber Marshall, a first round draft choice of the Chicago Bears in 1984, established himself as one of the premier linebackers in the NFL in 1986. He was named All-Pro after registering 105 tackles and five interceptions from his OLB post.



David Little started all 16 games at inside linebacker for the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1986. He was the squad's third leading tackler with 89.



Middle Guard Tim Newton ranked third on Minnesota Vikings in tackles in 1986 with 92. He made the NFL All-Rookie Team in 1985.



Vito McKeever (left) started eight games in the defensive secondary for the Tampa Bay Bucs in 1986. His three interceptions led the squad. Mike Mularkey (right) of the Minnesota Vikings was the squad's second tight-end in 1986. He had 11 catches for 89 yards and two TDs.



WR Nat Moore, Miami's all-time leading receiver, had 38 receptions for 431 yards in 1986 with 7 TDs.



John L. Williams, a first round draft selection in 1986, had a fine rookie campaign with the Seattle Seahawks. He gained 538 yards rushing and also had 33 catches from his fullback post.

FLORIDA BOWL HISTORY

Florida's first bowl trip came after the 1952 season as the Gators headed to the Gator Bowl in Jacksonville to face Tulsa on January 1, 1953.

Powered by the running of Rick Casares and J. (Papa) Hall the Gators edged the Golden Hurricanes, 14-13, as Tulsa senior Tom Minor missed the first PAT attempt of his career. Gator All-America tackle Charlie LaPradd was the game's defensive hero.

Quarterback Jimmy Dunn and All-SEC end Dave Hudson led Florida back to the Gator Bowl in 1958 where they lost to Mississippi, 7-3. Ray Graves' first Florida team returned to the Jacksonville classic after the 1960 season and knocked off Baylor, 13-12, behind the running of Don Goodman and quarterback Larry Libertore.

One of the biggest upsets in Gator Bowl history took place in 1962 when heavily-favored Penn State was soundly beaten by the Gators, 17-7, led by quarterback Tom Shannon and a stout defense.

In 1966 Florida fell behind Missouri, 20-0, in the Sugar Bowl and rallied for 18 points in the final quarter behind quarterback Steve Spurrier. Each Gator touchdown was followed by a two-point conversion attempt and all of them failed.

Spurrier became the first player from the losing team to be named the game's most outstanding player in the history of the Sugar Bowl. He broke six bowl records in the contest.

The Gators got back on the winning track the following year in the Orange Bowl, beating Georgia Tech, 27-12, behind Heisman Trophy winner Spurrier. It was Bobby Dodd's final game as Tech's head coach and Florida made it an unhappy night for him. Larry Smith set a bowl record by running 94 yards for a touchdown for the Gators, almost losing his pants on the way.

In Ray Graves' final game as Florida's coach he watched his young team beat SEC champion Tennessee, 14-13, in the 1969 Gator Bowl. Florida's defense was superb with a blocked punt by Steve Tannen resulting in one TD and an interception setting up the other.

In 1973 the Tangerine Bowl was

played in Gainesville due to construction at the Orlando stadium site. It was 27 degrees when the game started and Miami of Ohio loved every minute of it en route to a 16-7 upset. Florida nearly pulled a major upset next season, leading Nebraska 10-0 and scoring an apparent TD on a 26-yard run by Tony Green, only to have it ruled out-of-bounds. The Huskers came back in the Sugar Bowl to win 13-10. Florida's stars were All-America linebackers Ralph Ortega and Glenn Cameron, defensive end Preston Kendrick, the game's most outstanding defensive player, and running back Green.

The Gators returned to the Gator Bowl in 1975 and were soundly beaten

in the rain by Maryland, 13-0. In 1975 powerful Texas A&M routed Florida, 37-14, in the Sun Bowl.

Charley Pell's first bowl team at Florida came in 1980 and the Gators played outstanding football in the Tangerine Bowl to whip Maryland, 35-20, behind All-America wide receiver Cris Collinsworth, the game's most valuable player. All-America David Galloway was the most outstanding defensive player of the contest.

In the cold of Atlanta, Ga. in the 1981 Peach Bowl the favored Gators were stunned by West Virginia's underrated Mounties, 26-6.

On New Year's Eve of 1982, the Gators took a 17-7 halftime lead against Arkansas in the Bluebonnet Bowl before losing 28-24. Wide receiver Dwayne Dixon was named Florida's MVP while catching three TD passes.

The 1983 squad, making its fourth consecutive bowl appearance under Pell, defeated Iowa 14-6. The win earned the Gators a No. 6 final ranking (then the best finish in UF history).

The 1984 and 1985 teams, unquestionably the finest in school history after posting 9-1-1 seasons, were unable to participate in bowl games due to NCAA sanctions.

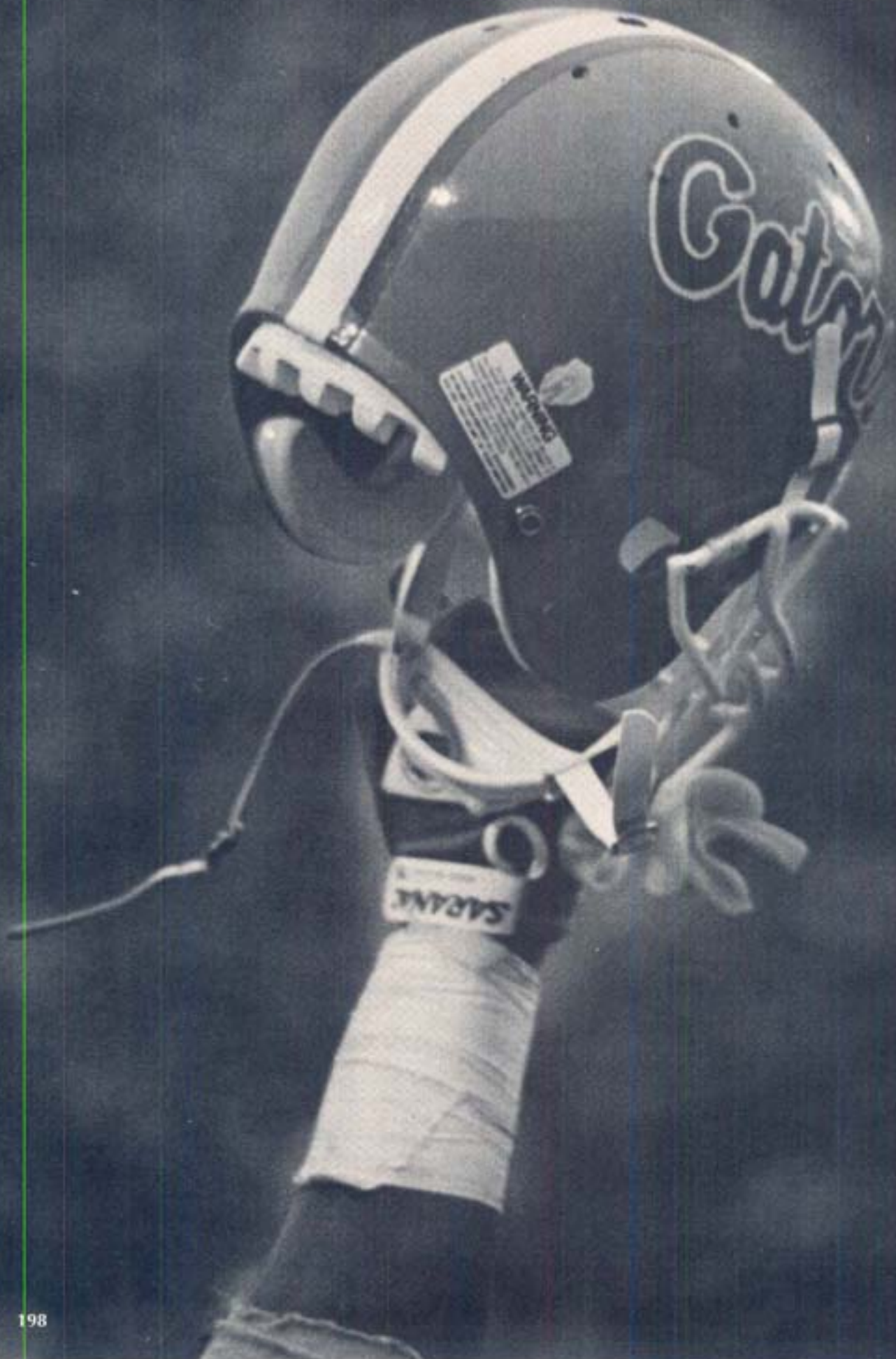

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THE UNIVERSITY OF FLORIDA

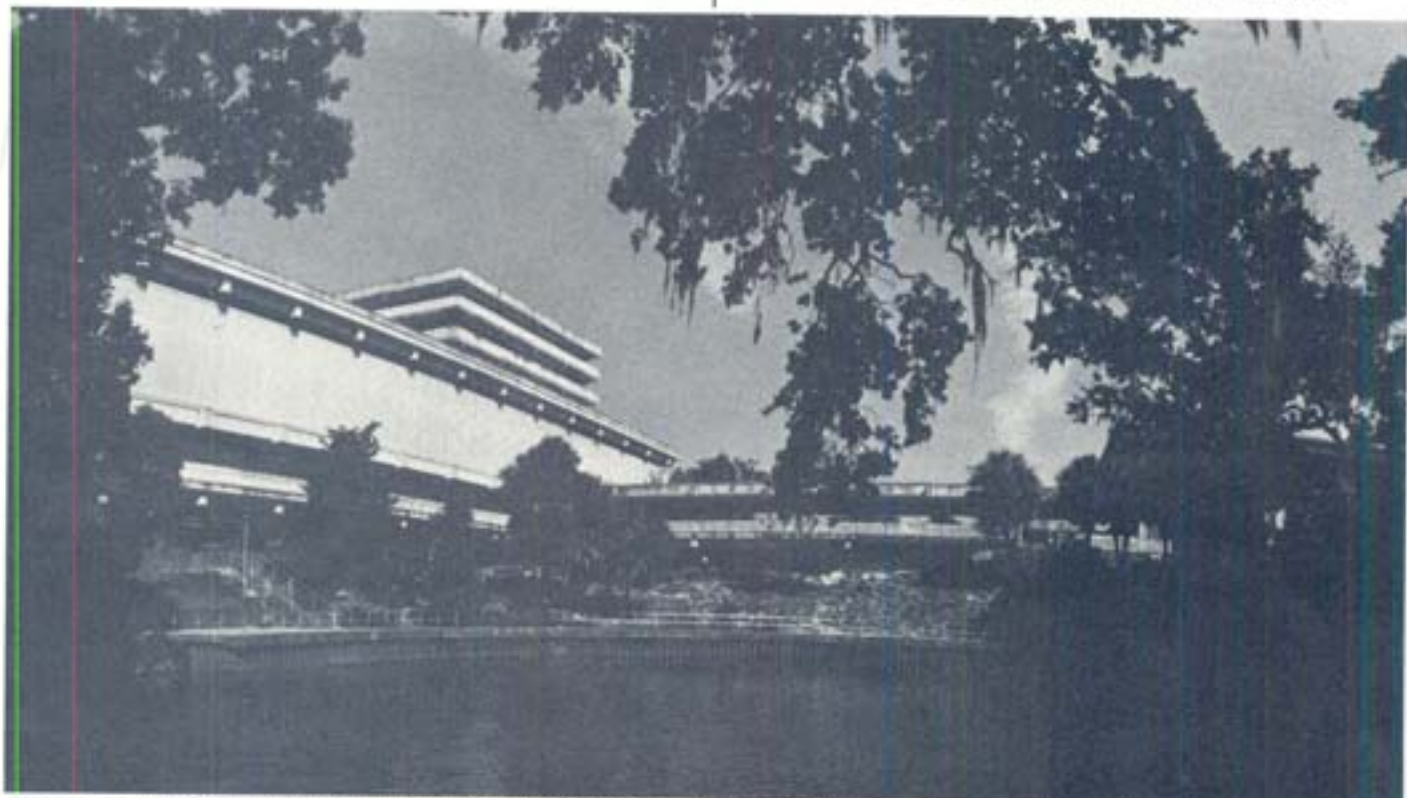
The Century Tower that stands near the center of the campus commemorates the 100th anniversary of the University of Florida which was celebrated in 1953. Although it was not officially established as the University of Florida until 1906, the University traces its beginnings back to 1853 when the Florida Legislature appropriated state funds for the support of the East Florida Seminary located in Ocala. Following the Civil War the seminary was moved to Gainesville. In 1906 the seminary was consolidated with the state's land-grant Florida Agricultural College to become the University of Florida. The University's present day College of Liberal Arts and Sciences had its roots in the East Florida Seminary. Thus the establishment of the seminary as a state supported institution in 1853 is recognized as the founding date of the University.

A land-grant university with a distinguished record of developing Florida agriculture into a national leader through research and extension services, the University of Florida has become one of America's truly distinctive universities. Now

expanded into virtually every academic discipline, the University of Florida, along with Ohio State and the University of Minnesota, offers more academic programs on a single campus than any of this country's other universities, public or private. More than 100 majors are offered in over 50 undergraduate degree programs. The Graduate School coordinates programs in some 87 academic departments that offer 106 master's and 60 doctoral degree programs. Professional degrees are offered in Dentistry, Law, Medicine and Veterinary Medicine. Florida is one of only three universities in the nation housing a law school, a medical school, a veterinary school, and an engineering school on the same campus. The University of Florida today is among the nation's leading research universities as categorized by the Carnegie Commission on Higher Education.

THE UNIVERSITY OF FLORIDA was admitted in 1985 to the Association of American Universities (AAU), the most prestigious organization in higher education. Headquartered in Washington, D.C., the AAU is composed of North America's finest higher education institutions, 54 of them in the U.S. and 2 in Canada. Those universities judged to be preeminent in graduate and professional education and research are invited to membership in the AAU and must receive a three-fourth's vote of the body, which includes Harvard, Yale, Princeton, Stanford, MIT, Berkeley, Michigan, Southern California, and Columbia among others. UF now joins its sister institutions—Duke, North Carolina, Rice, Texas, Tulane, and Vanderbilt—as the outstanding universities in the South.

As a complete university, with freshmen through post-doctoral programs, the University of Florida is able to offer many opportunities to the undergraduate student. A student planning to continue in graduate or professional schools can study in libraries and laboratories equipped to prepare students for entrance to almost every known advanced

degree program. Students can begin their research as early as they desire, even as freshmen, while studying alongside graduate and professional students. The University of Florida ranks among this nation's top 25 universities in the number of its bachelor's degree graduates who have gone on to earn advanced degrees.

University of Florida students—numbering more than 35,500 in the fall semester of 1986—come from every county in the state, from almost every state in the Union, and from more than 102 foreign countries. Admission to the University is a competitive process. More than 85 percent of the entering freshman class each year achieve scores above the national mean on the standard entrance examinations taken by college-bound high school seniors. The University of Florida ranks in the top half of one percent among all colleges and universities in the total number of National Merit and Merit Achievement Scholars in the entering freshman class.

Approximately one-third of the University's students are freshmen or sophomores and about 45 percent are juniors or seniors, with about one-half of the latter group being transfer students from the Florida public community colleges. Graduate students account for about 14 percent of the enrollment with the remaining students enrolled in the Colleges of Dentistry, Law, Medicine, and Veterinary Medicine. Although the first co-ed was enrolled in 1924, the University of Florida was principally for men until 1947. Today the ratio of men to women on campus is around 56 to 44. Minority students make up approximately 12 percent of the total enrollment.

A distinguished faculty numbering more than 3,400 has been assembled from major universities throughout the world to provide instruction and counseling for University of Florida students. Twelve faculty members have been selected for membership in the National Academies of Science and/or Engineering or a counterpart in a foreign country. A very small sampling of honored faculty includes Pulitzer Prize winners in editorial writing and poetry, co-inventor of the jet engine, pioneer in and writer of the leading textbooks on econometrics, winner of the National Science Teacher Association top award for leadership, three winners of NASA's top award for research, one of the four charter members of the Solar Hall of Fame, winner of the Smithsonian Institution's award for conservation, winner of the American Chemical Society's award as polymer scientist of the year, an art faculty with 80 percent of its members listed in *Who's Who in American Art*, and the winner of the Academy of Pharmaceutical Sciences achievement award for the advancement of industrial pharmacy.

In summary, the University of Florida is a residential campus, with rich resources available because of its size, that provides a learning and living environment for the whole person and an institution that puts the interests of the individual student above everything else.


SETTING AND ENVIRONMENT

The University of Florida is located in Gainesville, a city of 85,000 situated in north central Florida, midway between the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico. The city is known as an agricultural and small industrial center.

In addition to a moderate climate, Gainesville offers many other advantages to students of the University. Swimming and boating accommodations are available at nearby springs and rivers, and the lakes in the vicinity abound in freshwater fish, while the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico are within a two-hour drive.

MARSHALL CRISER PRESIDENT

Since becoming the eighth president of the University of Florida (1984), Marshall Criser has led the University to record levels of achievement, including public and private support, quality of students and faculty, and research funding and activities. Election to membership in the Association of American Universities in July 1985 is the high point of the University's accomplishments.

His efforts to enhance quality undergraduate education while maintaining excellence at the graduate and professional levels have been recognized by the Board of Regents, the state legislature, and with public and private support that includes the largest private gift ever received by a university in Florida.

President Criser earned his Bachelor of Science in Business Administration in 1949 and Juris Doctor degree in 1951 on this campus. As a student, he was named to the University's Hall of Fame because of his leadership in student political parties and the Army ROTC program, his presidency of Florida Blue Key and Sigma Nu social fraternity, as well as being chairman of homecoming and business manager of the yearbook.

After graduation and serving in the Army, he became one of the state's most prominent attorneys while being involved in education, business, professional and civic activities.

President Criser's past activities include being a member of the Governor's Transportation Advisory Committee, director of Citizens for Better Transportation, member of the Governor's Committee to Study Land Sales Industry, and founding chairman of the Florida Installment Land Sales Board. He was a director of the Florida Chamber of Commerce and president and member of the board of governors of Good Samaritan Hospital in West Palm Beach. He is a long-time member of the Council of 100 and was its chairman in 1979-81.

In addition, President Criser has served on several public



and private boards, including the Bell South Corporation, City Fed Financial Corp., Flagler Systems, Inc., Perini Corp., Shands Hospital, and College Football Association.

A member of the Board of Regents of the State University System in Florida from 1971 to 1981, President Criser was chairman four of the ten years he served. In that position, he worked with the state legislature to establish such programs as Quality Improvement, Eminent Scholars and the Florida Academic Scholars. His accomplishments on the Board were recognized with the E. T. York Higher Education Award.

Other honors include the Distinguished Alumnus Award from the University of Florida and the College of Law Trustees Award. He has been recognized by his selection to the Board of Governors and presidency of the Florida Bar and membership in the House of Delegates of the American Bar Association.

President Criser and his wife, Paula, have six children and one granddaughter.

BILL ARNSPARGER ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

Success, integrity, leadership, and expertise. For many years those traits have been synonymous with the name Bill Arnsparger. These are the primary traits and characteristics this highly successful man now brings to his new post as Director of Athletics at the University of Florida.

Arnsparger assumed his duties as Florida's Director of Athletics in January of 1987 after completing a very successful three-year reign as head football coach at LSU. During this period, he led the Tigers to a combined record of 26-8-2, the best winning percentage for a new head coach in his first three years in school history. Arnsparger had a sparkling 13-3-2 record vs. SEC schools and led the 1986 Tigers to their first SEC championship since 1970. In both 1984 and 1986 he led LSU to Sugar Bowl appearances and was named "SEC Coach of the Year."

"The years I was privileged to coach at LSU were something that I will always treasure and be thankful for," stated Arnsparger in accepting the Florida AD post. "However, I had reached a point in my professional life where I felt the need and drive to pursue other interests in athletics. I have always admired the University of Florida and the combined excellence of academics and athletics that it possess. That admiration was reinforced when I had the opportunity to talk further with university administrators. When I was given an opportunity to join this fine university, I accepted with a great deal of zeal and enthusiasm. I will do everything I can to provide the leadership that is necessary to further build upon the foundation of athletic excellence in each and every phase of our department."

Arnsparger's leadership has made him a winner throughout his 40-year involvement with athletics. His success at LSU is the latest chapter in what has been a career dominated by achievement and attainment.

Arnsparger came to LSU in 1984 from the Miami Dolphins of the National Football League, where he was a highly skilled and successful assistant to Don Shula from 1970 to '73, and from 1977 to '83. During those years, Arnsparger was widely known for having one of the brightest minds in the game. With Arnsparger as the defensive coordinator, the Dolphin defense became one of the best in the NFL.

His professional coaching career began with the NFL's Baltimore Colts, when Shula hired Arnsparger in 1964. He remained in Baltimore until 1970, when Shula was named head coach of the Dolphins and took Arnsparger with him to the American Football Conference team.

At Baltimore, Arnsparger coached in the 1964 NFL championship game against the Cleveland Browns. Then, in 1968,



Baltimore beat Cleveland for the NFL title but lost to the New York Jets in Super Bowl III in Miami, Florida.

With the Dolphins, Arnsparger participated in four Super Bowls—VI vs. Dallas Cowboys (New Orleans, La.), VII vs. Washington Redskins (Los Angeles, Calif.), VIII vs. Minnesota Vikings (Houston, Texas) and XVII vs. Washington Redskins (Pasadena, Calif.).

Arnsparger was named head coach of the New York Giants in 1974 and remained there until 1976, when he rejoined the Dolphins as an assistant coach.

His coaching career began at his alma mater, Miami (Ohio), in 1950, where as an assistant he coached in the Salad Bowl in Phoenix, Ariz., the forerunner of what is now the Fiesta Bowl.

Following that one year at Miami (Ohio), Arnsparger served three years as an assistant at Ohio State (1951-53), eight years at Kentucky (1954-61), and two years at Tulane (1962-63).

Arnsparger, a native of Paris, Ky., attended Kentucky in the mid-'40s, and after a stint in the service, transferred to Miami (Ohio). Although he was ineligible to play because of his transfer from Kentucky, Arnsparger was on the Miami team which played in the 1947 Sun Bowl in El Paso, Texas.

At Miami (Ohio), Arnsparger lettered as a tackle in 1948 and '49, playing under coaches George Blackburn ('48) and the legendary Woody Hayes ('49). Hayes was head coach at Ohio State when Arnsparger was an assistant there.

The 60-year-old Arnsparger (he was 60 on Dec. 16), a 1950 graduate of Miami (Ohio), was inducted into the school's Athletic Hall of Fame in 1976. The Oxford, Ohio school has long been known nationally as the "Cradle of Coaches." Arnsparger received his BS in Education and a Master of Education in (MED) School Administration.

Arnsparger and his wife Betty Jane (B.J.) have two children—David, 21, and Mary Susan, 18. Both are students at the University of Florida.

ATHLETIC PROGRAM

The University of Florida, a charter member of the prestigious Southeastern Conference, is fast developing a national reputation for across-the-board athletic excellence that ranks among the best in the nation.

Over the course of the past few years, a talented and dedicated coaching staff has achieved a great deal.

- ★ Florida's combined men's and women's programs was ranked among the five most successful in the nation in each of the 1983-84 and 1984-85 athletic years.
- ★ Florida's 37 total SEC titles since the start of the 1979-80 athletic year represents the most league crowns for a conference member during that period.
- ★ Florida led all SEC schools in the number of league championships claimed with six during the 1986-87 athletic year (women's golf, women's tennis, women's swimming, men's cross-country, men's indoor track, men's outdoor track).
- ★ Florida has led the SEC in the number of league championships claimed in a given athletic year in each of the past four seasons.
- ★ The Florida program has claimed at least one national championship in six of the past seven years.
- ★ During the 1984-85 year, six Gator teams finished the season ranked among the top three in the nation in their respective sport. Seven Gator contingents finished the year ranked in the top ten during the 1985-86 year. Five Gator squads were among the top six teams in the nation in their sport during the 1986-87 year.



The Gator basketball team played in its fourth consecutive post-season tournament in 1987 while making its first-ever NCAA Tourney appearance on the way to posting a school record 23 wins. Florida advanced to the NCAA's final round of 16 before bowing to Syracuse, the eventual national runnerup.

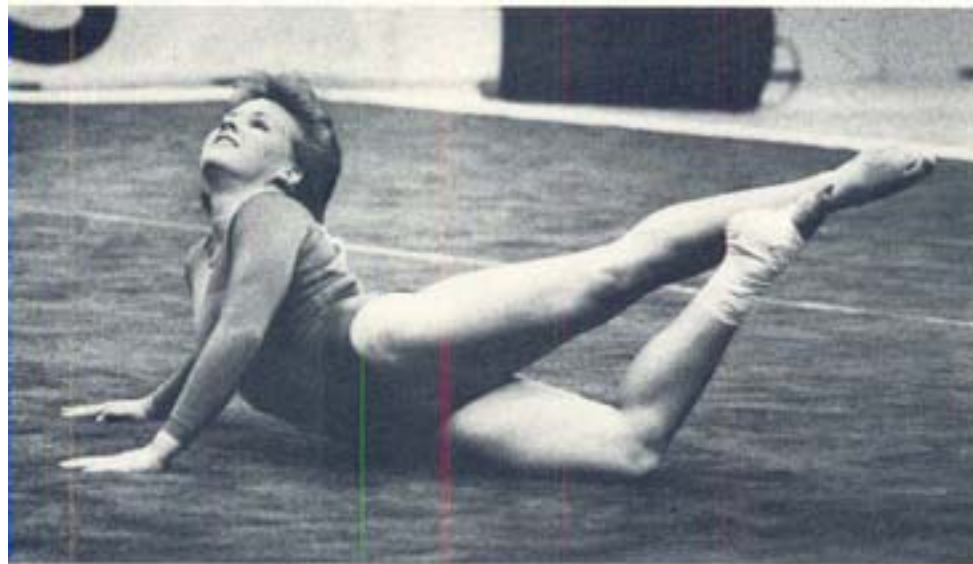

The Lady Gator gymnast finished sixth at the NCAA Championships in 1987 after claiming the NCAA Southeast Regionals and finishing second at the SEC's. Florida is one of only three schools in the nation that has participated in each of the six NCAA Gymnastic Championships held this decade.



The Lady Gator golfers, winners of the national title in 1985 and 1986, captured their fifth SEC title in the past seven years during 1987. They finished third at the NCAA's. They have never finished lower than fifth at the national championship since 1982. The men were selected to participate in the NCAA Championship for the fifth consecutive year.



Florida appeared in the annual SEC Baseball Tournament for the tenth time in the past eleven years in 1987. During the past eleven years, Florida has appeared in more SEC Baseball Tournament Championships than any other conference school.



Florida's swim program continued to distinguish itself in 1987. The men's squad finished third in the nation and the women third while also claiming their sixth SEC title in the past seven years. The men have finished among the nation's top five teams in each of the last nine NCAA Championships while the women have finished in the top three in each of the past six national championships.



The Gator grid squad has compiled the seventh best combined record in the nation since the start of the 1983 season.



The women's tennis team compiled a sparkling 29-1 dual meet record in 1987, captured their seventh SEC title in the last eight years, and advanced to the semifinals at the NCAA Championships in May. The men finished fourth at the SEC's and were ranked in the nation's top 25 for the entire year.



Florida's men's track team turned in its most spectacular year in school history during 1986-87 as it captured the school's first-ever "SEC Triple Crown" in winning league championships in cross-country, indoor track and outdoor track. They finished 15th at the NCAA Outdoor Championships. The women tied for second at the SEC Indoor Championships and finished third at the league outdoor championship. They finished 11th at the NCAA Indoor Championships and 13th at the NCAA Outdoor Championships.

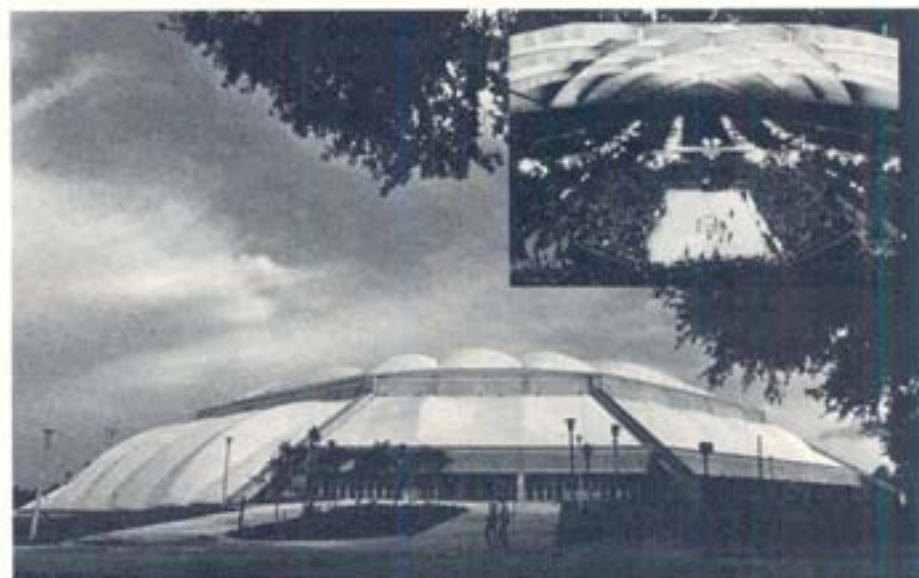
ATHLETIC FACILITIES

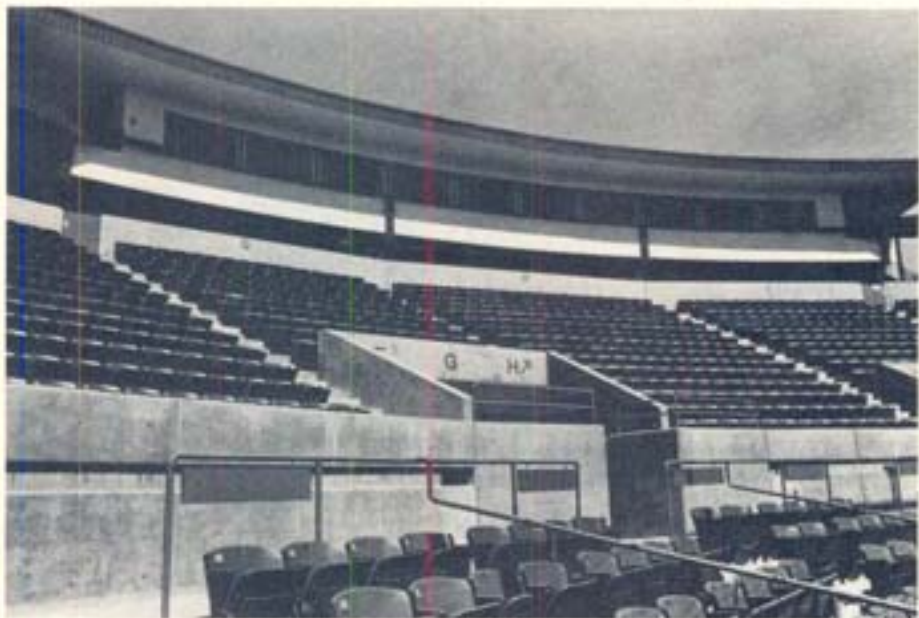
The University of Florida has assembled a very impressive group of athletic facilities over the course of the last several years. Combined, the facilities now give Florida one of this nation's most impressive athletic physical plants.

Since 1979, nearly \$50 million have been earmarked for facility improvement, development, and expansion. In this decade, Florida Field has been expanded to 72,000, the beautiful multifunctional O'Connell Center became a reality, and a new track and a new tennis stadium were completed this past spring. Currently, a new baseball stadium is being built, a swimming warmup pool located adjacent to the O'Connell Center is under construction, the University's new golf clubhouse is scheduled for completion in the summer of 1988, and feasibility studies for additional expansion of Florida Field are being conducted.

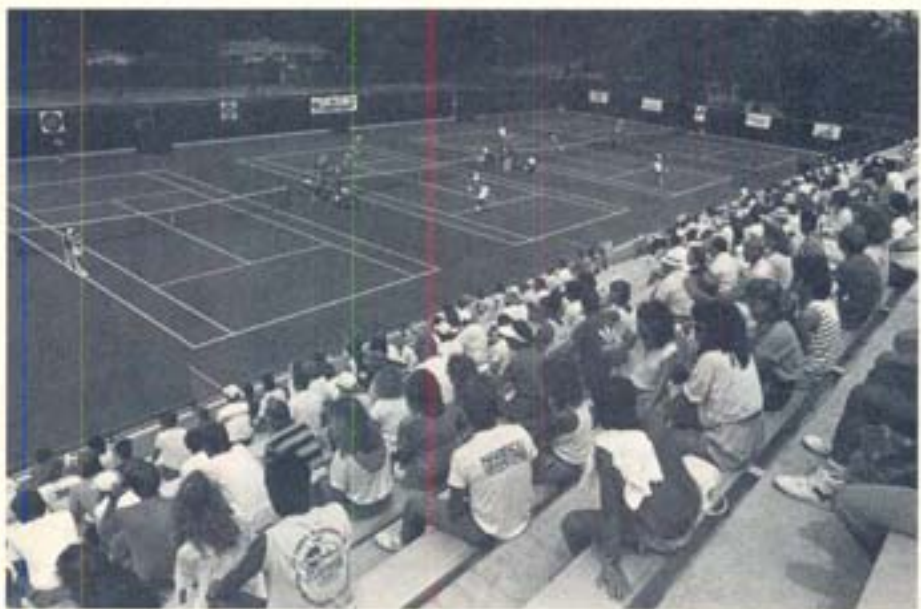
Facility expansion and improvement have clearly demonstrated the University of Florida's strong commitment and dedication to its entire athletic program.

The multi-functional O'Connell Center (center photo) is home to Florida's nationally respected basketball, swimming, gymnastics, indoor track, and volleyball programs.

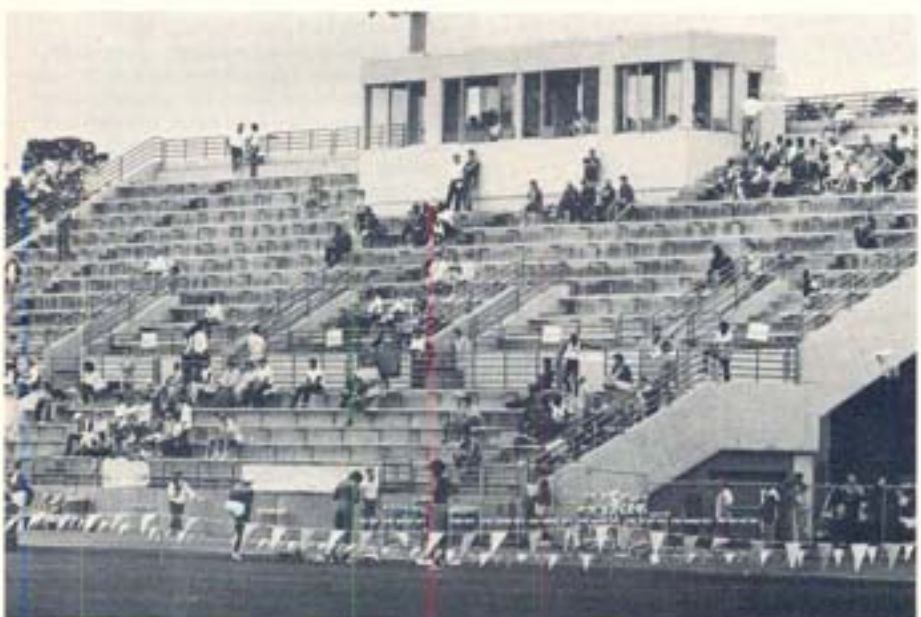




A new baseball stadium, to be in place for the 1988 season, will be modeled after Fresno State's Beiden Field. The stadium will feature seating for 3,500, as well as a 45-seat press box.



At the Varsity Tennis Courts, a recently-completed 1,100 seat stadium welcomed the 1987 SEC Men's Tennis Championships this past May. In addition, six center courts were added, giving Florida a 14-court complex, larger than any other SEC school.



A 1,500 seat stadium was added at Percy Beard Track this spring. Combined with the recently resurfaced track, patterned after the Los Angeles Coliseum (site of the 1984 Olympic Games), Florida is now capable of hosting national and international competition. In fact, the USA/TAC National Junior Track & Field Championships will be here next June.

Now in his 12th season at the University of Florida, Jeremy Foley was named Senior Associate Athletic Director in January of 1987 after serving as Associate Athletic Director for Business Affairs since 1981. He was named an Assistant A.D. in 1980 after serving as Director of Ticket and Game Operations since 1979. He came to Florida in 1976 as an intern in the ticket office and was named Ticket Manager in 1977. Foley served as Interim AD in the fall of 1986.

Second in command in the Florida athletic administration, Foley is responsible for the supervision of the entire athletic department in the athletic director's absence, assisting in the planning, leadership and supervision of the entire intercollegiate athletic program. Foley also assists in coordinating the efforts of the Athletic Board of Directors with the professional staff and works closely with Athletic Director Bill Arnsparger and Gator coaches in the area of future scheduling in both football and basketball.

In Foley's tenure as Associate Athletic Director he was responsible in eliminating a three-quarters of a million dollar debt. He served as chief financial officer for the UAA with responsibility for \$12 million annual budget and was involved in capital improvement projects exceeding \$22 million in value along with assisting in the issuance of \$9 million in tax exempt bonds. Foley's also been a driving force in all capital improvement projects.

Born in Washington, D.C., but calls New London, N.H., home, Foley received his undergraduate degree in 1974 from Hobart College in Geneva, N.Y., where he also coached and scouted for the tradition-rich lacrosse program. He earned his master's degree in sports administration from Ohio University in 1976.

The first athletic director for women's sports at Alabama, Lawler built the program into one of the most successful women's programs in the country. In her final year at Alabama (1984-85), the Tide ranked as the ninth most successful Division I women's program in the nation.

A native of Middleville, Michigan, Lawler served as a consultant to the Southeastern Conference Office, assisting with the transition of women's sports into the conference.

Also active on the national level, Lawler is a member of the NCAA Recruiting and Special Events Committees. She is also an active member of the Collegiate Directors of Athletics, the Council of Collegiate Women Athletic

Does it work? At the University of Florida the answer is an unequivocal ... yes.

"One of the very special qualities the University of Florida offers student-athletes is the Office of Student Life," says Head Coach Galen Hall, "whose trained advisers and counselors are a priority item so that the University can live up to its responsibility of assisting young people as they deal with the unique pressures of participating in college athletics."

"This office is based on the theory that student-athletes are our most important concern and is dedicated to exhausting every way possible to insure their success."

The proof of that responsibility lies in the numbers.

Since the Office of Student Life was created in 1979 as the first office in the nation devoted entirely to helping solve the special needs and requirements of the student-athlete, Florida has had impressive success.

From 1979-86, Florida had more Academic All-Conference football players than any other school in the SEC. From 1979-86 Florida had more all sport Academic All-SEC selections than any other school in the conference. From 1982-86 seven Florida student-athletes were honored with NCAA Post graduate Scholarship awards, the third highest total for a university in the nation during that time period.

Florida also was honored on the national level with Cris Collinsworth

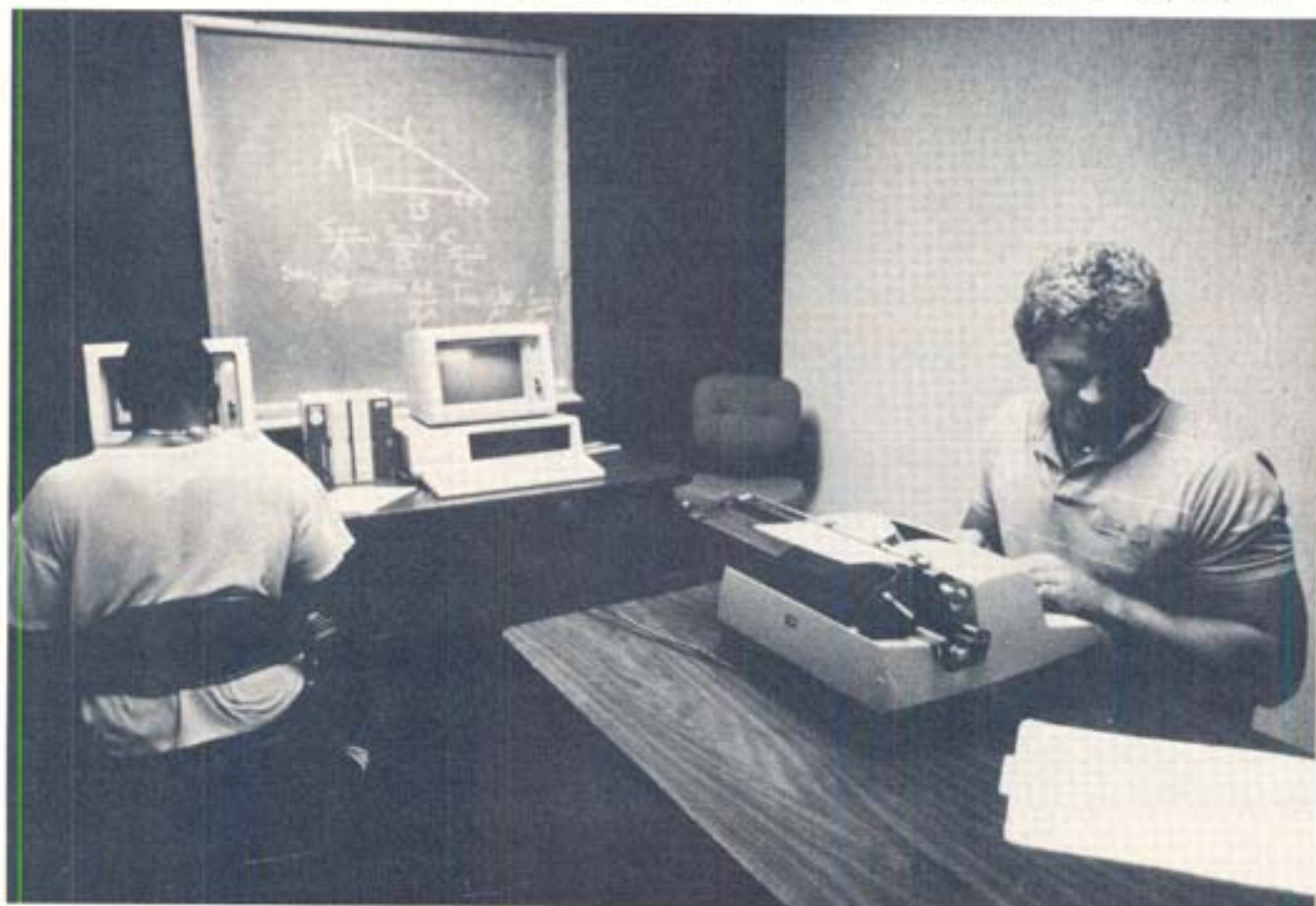
in 1980 and Gary Rolle in 1984 chosen to the Academic All-America team, while Rolle was just one of 11 players in the nation selected for the prestigious National Football Founda-

tion Scholar-Athlete Award in 1984.

"We're proud of our past achievements, but we are dedicated to getting even better in every aspect of our commitment to assist the student-athlete in all phases of his college life," says academic counselor Tom Williams. "We're in the Yon Hall Athletic Dorm which makes us very accessible for student-athletes. If the student-athlete has a question, we can answer it right away and correct the problem before it grows."

Achieving this type of success begins early. From aiding the transition from high school to college as a freshman, to choosing a major as a sophomore, through the career advisement period as a junior, until

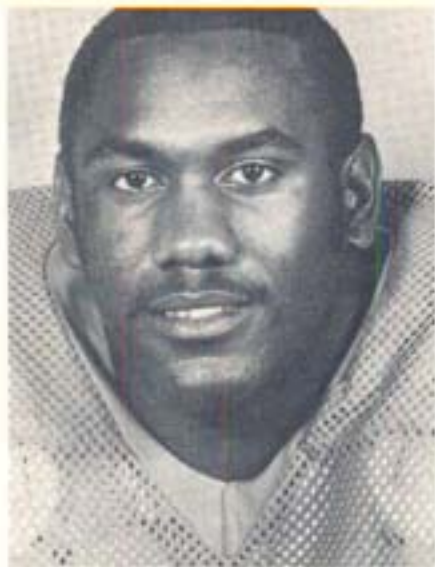


dedicated to the personal growth and academic development of the student-athlete.

"When an athlete steps into our office we're not here to talk about athletics," says Williams. "We're here to talk about academics or any personal problems that might be distracting. And that's a healthy situation. Basically, our program is working and that's the bottom line."



UF wide receiver Bret Wiechmann was a recipient of the NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship Award in 1986. He became the 12th Gator student-athlete to be so honored by the NCAA since 1968 and the seventh since 1982. Florida's seven total honorees for this award since 1982 represents the third highest total for a Div. IA school in the nation.



RB Neal Anderson and WR Ricky Nattiel, both first round selections in the NFL Draft, received their degrees in four years. Anderson was a first-round selection of the Chicago Bears in 1986 and Nattiel a top choice in 1987 by the Denver Broncos.

HEALTH CARE

Prevention. Precaution. Surgery. Rehabilitation.

"All those words mean one thing to me," says Gator head trainer Chris Patrick. "Success. Everything has a bearing on the other. It all must work together. We have to provide the best medical care possible. Our goal has always been to provide care for our people as opposed to taking care of them. Our job is made easier with the outstanding support groups and great facilities we have."

It's Florida's sports medicine staff's responsibility to care for and provide prevention and rehabilitation of injuries for each Gator on the squad. And

hat job is done in one of the finest facilities in the country—the 26,200 square foot Ben Hill Griffin, Jr. Athletic Training Center.

The impressive facilities at the University of Florida also includes one of the finest teaching hospitals in the country—Shands/VA Medical Center located on the Florida campus. Recognized as a leader in the field of sports medicine, the staff, headed by Dr. Pete Indelicato, provides quick, accurate evaluations and expert treatment for injuries to Gator players.

"We have a tremendous amount of resources at our disposal at the University of Florida," says Dr. Indelicato. "We can very quickly determine the degree of the injury, treat it, start the rehabilitation and get the player back on the road to full recovery."

"We're very sensitive to preventing injuries, but the system we have established here recognizes that we

are prone to injuries and with our program we are able to minimize the amount of time a player is away from the field."

Florida's sports medicine staff's main objective isn't reacting to inju-

ries, but preventing the occurrence of injuries. It's mandatory for each player to wear knee braces at practice as a precaution to prevent an unfortunate injury, as well as the normal routine of taping ankles before every practice and game.

The job also is made easier and more efficient since the Florida sports medicine staff is completely computerized. This allows the staff to keep up-to-date records and accurate data in the rehabilitation of injuries.

"Prevention, that's the main objective of our sports medicine staff," says Patrick who directs an outstanding and professional staff. "We are very sensitive to preventing injury. And if there's an injury we see that each Florida athlete receives the finest care in the country."



STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING PROGRAM

There is no magic formula guaranteeing success. There is no magic formula to produce the nation's 10th most successful program since 1982. It takes dedication and a commitment to excellence. It's a year-round commitment with no shortcuts.

At the University of Florida, success begins with the 26,300 square-foot Ben Hill Griffin, Jr. Athletic Training Center with its 5,650 square foot strength and conditioning area.

"Simply the best in the country—bar none," says Head Coach Galen Hall. The ultra-modern, fully-mirrored weight room includes numerous Nautilus machines, Universal machines, plus the normal complement of free weights.

comprehensive year-round strength and conditioning program which runs on seven, six-week cycles. The Florida football team will go through three cycles during the season. The first cycle runs from mid-August through the first of October. The second cycle will last until mid-November with the third semester allowing the Gator squad to be at their peak at Bowl time. The final four cycles run through the offseason.

The entire strength and conditioning cycle is designed with the use of a computer which prepares individual programs for each player. Having a completely computerized system gives Florida a decisive advan-

tage since the computer is able to implement and chart each player's own specific seven, six-week cycle program. The computer is able to evaluate 400 players and design a program in just a matter of two or three minutes tailored to each individual athlete and monitoring his progress for maximum results.

The results have been "awesome."

Nearly 80 players on the '86 squad bench pressed more than 300 pounds compared to only 35 in 1981. Nearly 60 players leg pressed more than 750 pounds in '86 compared to only 17 in 1981 and 70 players ran under 5.0 seconds in the 40-yard dash compared to only 43 in 1981. The average Florida football player tips the scales at 225 pounds and measures 6-1/4 compared to 6-1/4 and 204 pounds in 1981.

Bigger, stronger and faster.

"Our results on the field, and in the weight room are a reflection on the players," says Tuten. "Because of their desire and hard work we're a powerful and quick football team. But we still haven't reached our potential. We can be faster, stronger and bigger."

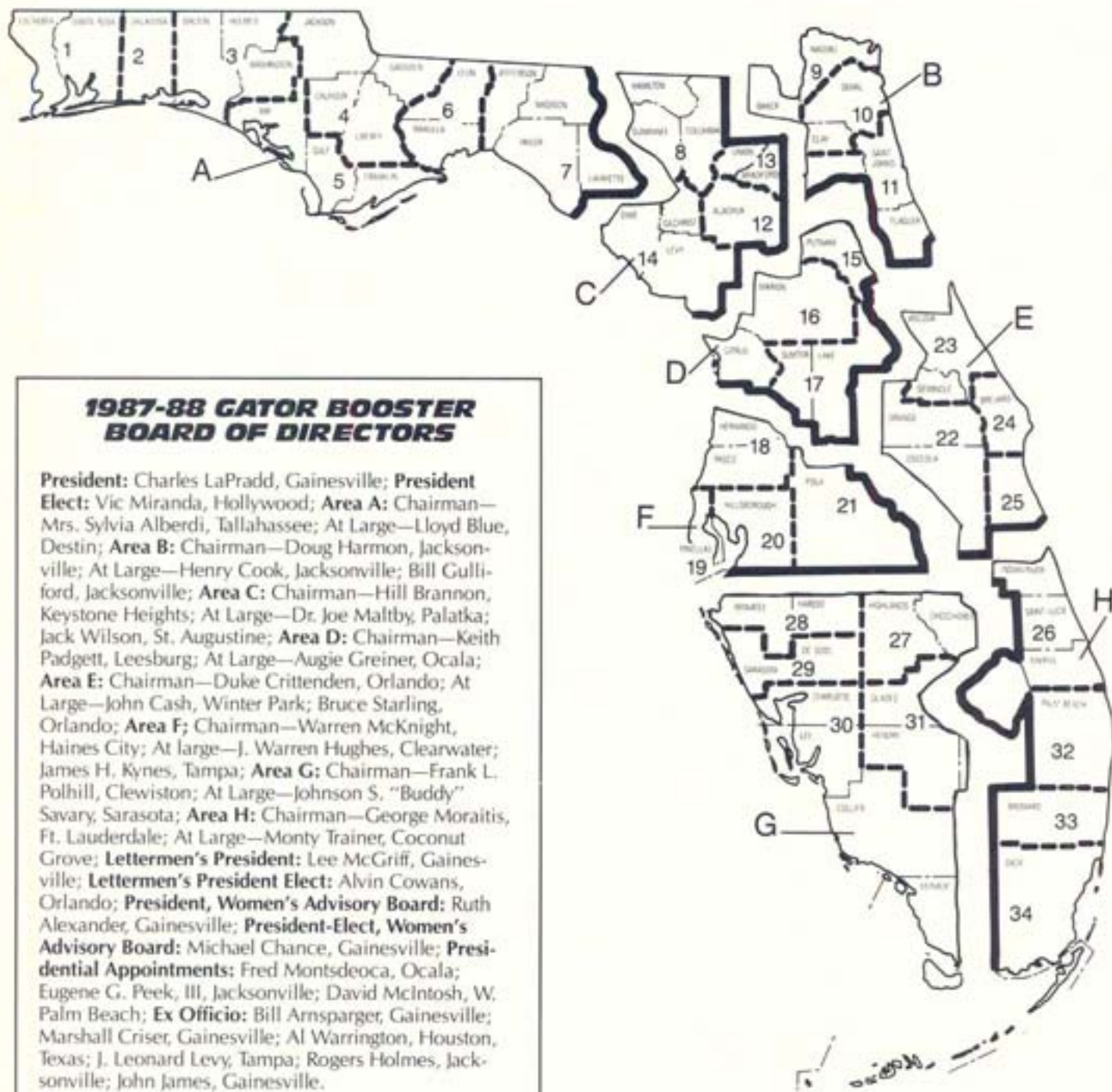

FLORIDA FIELD

Like the rest of the Florida athletic program, Florida Field has moved into the national spotlight in recent years. The completion of the south endzone project in August of 1982 raised the seating capacity of Florida Field to over 72,000 and gave the Gator football program one of the nation's top collegiate stadiums. Since that time, Florida has ranked in the top 15 nationally in attendance for five consecutive years.

The 18,000 new seats, concourses encircling the entire stadium, new restrooms, new concession stands and a beautiful new athletic training center located beneath the stands in

the south endzone are all part of a master plan to develop athletic facilities at Florida that are second to none. The Ben Hill Griffin, Jr. Athletic Training Center, the luxury skyboxes and a spacious new press box combined to make Florida Field the premier collegiate stadium in the state of Florida.

The original stadium consisted of the lower half of the current stadium, which was constructed in 1930 and dedicated at the Alabama contest that season. Seating capacity was 21,769. The entire stadium was constructed entirely below ground. In 1950, over 11,000 seats were added on the west side and another 7,000 were provided by bleachers on the east side. The additions brought seating capacity to 40,116. Additional bleacher seats were added during the 1950's, bringing capacity to 46,164 by 1960. In December of 1965, construction started on further additions that added over 10,000 permanent seats on the east side and temporary bleachers were moved from the east side to the south endzone, providing a total capacity of 62,800 (56,164 permanent). The latest installment to Florida

Field enclosed the south end of the stadium.

Florida's fantastic fans were honored this past January when the National Cheerleaders Association named the Gator faithful the most participative home crowd in collegiate athletics.



Florida has ranked in the top fifteen nationally in attendance in each of the past five seasons. In 1986, UF ranked tenth in the nation, averaging 74,372 per home game at Florida Field. All six 1986 home games were sold-out prior to the start of the season, the first time in state history that any sports team—collegiate or professional—could make that statement. Florida also holds the state record for number of season ticket holders (62,000). Demand for additional season tickets is quite heavy. Nearly 5,000 requests for season tickets for 1987 had to be denied. Preliminary studies are being conducted to perhaps enlarge Florida Field by enclosing the north end of the stadium. Such construction would raise seating capacity to more than 85,000.



Thanks in large part to their loyal following, the Gators have compiled a sparkling 30-4-2 record at friendly Florida Field over the past six seasons.
