THE STORYLINE

- Florida opens its 12-game regular season with their first meeting vs. FAU since 2015 and fourth matchup all-time.
- The Gators are 3-0 all-time against the Owls: 2015: W, 20-14 [OT] | 2011: W, 41-3 | 2007: W, 59-20
- Florida has out-scored FAU by a combined 120-37 margin while out-gaining the Owls, 1,221 yards to 820 yards.
- Florida's Dan Mullen and FAU's Hagerty Family Head Football Coach Willie Taggart meet for the second time as head coaches. Mullen won the previous meeting, 41-14 in 2018, when Taggart was the head coach at Florida State.
- UF owns the longest-active home-opener winning streak in the FBS with 31-straight wins (last loss, 1989: 24-19 vs. Ole Miss), losing just one season opener (2017) since 1990.
- Florida boasts a 345-110-13 (.751) all-time record at The Swamp, holding the second-highest home winning percentage in the nation since 1990 with a 164-31 (.841) record. UF has outscored opponents 37.8-15.8 on average (+22.0) since 1990.
- No. 13 Florida is ranked inside the top 13 of the AP preseason poll for the third-straight season and has been ranked inside the preseason top 25 in five out of the last six years.

MULLEN'S OFFENSE REMAINS BREATH OF FRESH AIR

- Florida's 35.9 points per game since the start of the 2018 season ranks seventh among Power Five programs and 12th in the FBS. From 2015-17, UF ranked 110th nationally and averaged just 23.1 points per game.
 - » 2020: 39.8 ppg (best since 2008, seventh-highest all-time) | 2019: 33.2 ppg | 2018: 35.0 ppg -- all tops since 2008.
- The Gators have scored 40-plus points 13 times under Mullen (UF had 12 40-point outings in 101 games from 2010-17).
- The Gators have 14 games of 500-plus total yards in Mullen's 38 games as head coach, equaling its total from the 115 games comprising the 2009-17 seasons. UF has nine games of 500-plus total yards against SEC teams under Mullen, two more than it had from 2008-17.
- Florida has improved its total offense (ypg) in every season under Mullen, averaging more than 426.7 ypg each year and culminating with 509.8 ypg in 2020 -- the top program mark since 2001 and ninth-best in the nation last season.
 - » 2020: 509.8 ypg | 2019: 430.5 ypg | 2018: 426.7 ypg | 2015-17: 338.0 ppg | 2010-14: 339.6 ypg
- Florida has averaged 399+ ypg in SEC play in each of Mullen's three seasons, while the program's best such mark from 2010-17 was 354.9 ypg in 2016.
 - » 2020: 513.5 ypg (highest since 2001) | 2019: 414.0 ypg | 399.6 ypg
- Each of the last three years, UF eclipsed its combined totals from 2016 and 2017 for 30-plus-yard touchdowns.
 - » 2020: 10 pass, 0 run | 2019: 7 pass, 5 run | 2018: 9 pass, 6 run | 2016-17: 5 pass, 2 run
- Florida's passing offense improved by more than 77.0 ypg from both 2018-19 (+87.3) and 2019-20 (+77.8).

Select student-athletes will be available Monday at the weekly press conference, and post-practice availability sessions. Freshmen are not available for interviews until they appear in a game. All student-athlete interviews will conclude Wednesday during game weeks.

There will be weekly availabilities for coordinators and select student-athletes after practice. Additional assistant coaches are available upon request.

Telephone interviews should be booked at least one day in advance and are typically limited to the times reserved for general interview sessions. The Communications Office will not give out phone numbers for any student-athletes, and student-athletes may not be contacted directly by phone, text, e-mail, or social media. Members of the media are not permitted in team areas. Team locker room, training room, and strength complex are considered private areas. These areas, as well as student-athletes' housing (campus and off-campus) are off limits to media representatives.

- The Gators had four representatives on the Media and Coaches Preseason All-SEC Team: defensive lineman **Zachary Carter** (first team), defensive back **Kaiir Elam** (first), linebacker **Ventrell Miller** (second) and wide receiver **Jacob Copeland** (third). **Elam was also named a second-team Preseason All-American by AP, CBS Sports & 247Sports.**
- Carter, Elam and Miller all garnered preseason recognition for the second-straight season after receiving second team honors at their respective positions in 2020.
- Carter played in all 12 games in 2020 and led the Gators in sacks (5.0) and tackles-for-loss (9.5).
- Elam was named to the Coaches All-SEC First Team and AP Second Team as a defensive back in 2020 after finishing with 39 tackles (28 solo), 11 pass breakups and two interceptions.
- Miller led Florida with 88 tackles in 2020 and played in 11 of 12 games.

- In 2020, Florida logged the **10th season in school history in which it averaged 300-plus passing yards per game** (2019, 2001, 2000, 1998, 1996, 1995, 1994, 1993, 1991).
- Florida also posted the ninth 4,000-yard passing season in school history (2001, 2000, 1998, 1996, 1995, 1994, 1993).

2020 RECORD-SETTING OFFENSE SENT GATORS TO ATL

- The Gators made their first SEC Championship Game appearance since 2016 and earned a third-consecutive New Year's Six bowl berth. This was the **second time in school history that Florida appeared in three-straight New Year's Six bowl games**, with the other occurrence being a four-year run spanning the 1993-96 seasons.
- Florida's SEC Championship Game appearance was the 13th in program history -- tied for the most in history.
- The Gators **led the nation in passing offense for the second time in program history**, as they averaged 378.6 passing yards per game (which also ranks fourth in SEC history). The only other Gators team to average at least 361 passing yards per game was the 2001 Gators (405.2) -- also the only other team in school history to lead the nation in passing offense.
- UF ranked eighth nationally with a **176.41 passer rating, which broke the school record** of 171.8 set by the 1995 Gators.
- Florida recorded six games of 400-plus passing yards in 2020, joining the 2001 Gators (seven times, including the 2002 Orange Bowl) as the only other team in school history with six such outings in a season.
- Florida finished the season **ranked ninth nationally in total offense** (509.8 yards per game), marking its **highest national finish since 2009**, when it finished sixth with an average of 457.9 total yards per game.
- Florida posted seven games of 500-plus total yards for the fourth time since 1990, with the other teams being the 2007 Gators (seven times), 2001 Gators (eight times), and 1995 Gators (nine times). The only other Gators team since 1990 to have seven of those outings against Power Five opponents was the 1995 Gators (also seven).
- Florida eclipsed 600 total yards at Ole Miss (642 - a school record for total yards against an SEC team) and against LSU (609), marking the fifth time in school history it had multiple 600-yard games in a season. The 2020 Gators, 2001 Gators, and 1996 Gators were the only ones to post two such games against SEC teams.
- Of the 15 FBS teams that averaged at least 480 total yards per game last season, Florida ran the third-fewest plays per game (70). The only teams who averaged less were Alabama (69.4) and BYU (66.6).
- The Gators were tied for **eighth nationally with an average of 7.28 yards per play, finishing with the third-highest average in program history**. Only the 1995 Gators (7.40) and 2001 Gators (7.36) had higher averages. It also marks UF's first top-10 finish since 2009, when it ranked third with an average of 6.97 yards per play.
- Florida's **39.8 points per game ranked 13th nationally and seventh in school history**. It marked the program's **highest scoring average since 2008**, when the Gators averaged 43.6 points per game.
- Florida **scored five offensive touchdowns in eight games against SEC opponents for the first time ever**.

GATORS FEATURED WIDEST PASSING DISTRIBUTION IN FBS

- Florida's 46 touchdown passes led the nation by four**, marking the fifth time in school history the Gators led the FBS in touchdown passes (41 in 1993; 43 in 1994; 48 in 1995; 42 in 1996).
- UF's 46 touchdown passes were the **second-highest season total in school history** behind the 1995 Gators (48).
- Florida's 17 touchdown receptions by tight ends led the FBS by three behind BYU (14) and Miami (11).
- Florida was the **only FBS team featuring six players with at least three receiving touchdowns**.
- Florida was **one of four FBS teams featuring six players with more than 20 receptions and 225 receiving yards**.
- Florida, Alabama, and SMU were the only FBS teams featuring **four players with more than 20 receptions and 400 yards, and at least three receiving touchdowns** (Jacob Copeland, Trevon Grimes, Kyle Pitts, Kadarius Toney).
- The Gators were **one of eight FBS teams featuring seven players with multiple touchdown receptions**.

ACTIVE HISTORICAL STREAKS

- UF has **scored in 410-consecutive games -- which is an NCAA record**. The Gators broke Michigan's record of 365-consecutive games (1984-2014) against LSU on Oct. 7, 2017.
- UF has 10-consecutive games of 400-plus total yards for the first time since at least 1981. UF also has at least seven-straight 400-yard outings against SEC teams for the first time in school history.
- UF has **finished with fewer than 10 penalties in 32 consecutive games**. Dating back to the start of 2019, UF has been charged with five or fewer penalties in 15 of their 25 games, including nine of the last 14.
 - » The Gators were consistently among the most penalized teams in the SEC during the 2010s, finishing dead last in the league in 2011, 2012, 2013, and 2016.
- Since 2008, Florida and Alabama are the only FBS teams that have not lost to a team which finished the season with a losing record. Florida's last such loss was against Mississippi State (3-9) in 2004.



BIG HOLES TO FILL ON OFFENSE

REPLACING KYLE TRASK

- **Kyle Trask** finished fourth in the Heisman Trophy voting in 2020, joining Steve Spurrier (1966 winner), Danny Wuerffel (1996 winner; 3rd in 1995), Rex Grossman (2nd in 2001), and Tim Tebow (2007 winner; 3rd in 2008) as the only top-four Heisman finishers in school history.
- Trask accounted for **94.3% of Florida's passing offense** in 2020 with 4,543 yards through the air.
 - » Trask was also responsible for **70.8% (4,333 yards) of Florida's total offense** last season.
 - » Incumbents Emory Jones (221 yards, 4.9%) and Anthony Richardson (27 yards, 0.6%) accounted for just 5.5% of the Gators' passing attack in 2020.
- Trask's **43 touchdown passes led the nation by two**, broke Danny Wuerffel's 24-year-old school record of 39, and tied him for third on the SEC single-season record list. The only SEC players with more in a season were LSU's Joe Burrow (60 in 15 games in 2019) and Missouri's Drew Lock (44 in 13 games in 2017).
- Trask was responsible for **46 touchdowns** (43 passing, 3 rushing), tying him for **sixth on the SEC single-season record list** and putting him in **second in school history** (Tim Tebow - 55 in 2007).
- Trask **finished second nationally in passing yards per game** (356.9), breaking Rex Grossman's school record (354.2 in 2001) and ranking third on the SEC single-season record list.
- Trask **set a single-season school record with five 400-yard passing games** and recorded four of the top-12 single-game passing performances in school history last season (474 [twice] vs. Georgia and LSU - 1st / 433 at Tennessee - 11th / 416 at Ole Miss - 12th).
- Trask's **4,283 passing yards last year broke Rex Grossman's single-season school record** (3,896 in 2001), ranked second on the SEC single-season record list, and was one of six 4,000-yard seasons in SEC history.
- UF career ranks: 68.9% completion percentage (1st), 168.53 passing efficiency (2nd), 69 touchdown passes (6th), 7,386 passing yards (8th), 552 completions (eighth), 813 pass attempts (10th).

REPLACING PITTS, TONEY & CO.

- Departed wide receivers **Kadarius Toney** (21.7%) and **Trevon Grimes** (13.0%), and tight end **Kyle Pitts** (16.9%) combined to account for 51.6% of Florida's receiving yardage in 2020.
- Pitts became the **second player in school history (fourth in SEC) to win the Mackey Award** and became the **eighth unanimous first-team All-American in school history**.
- Pitts finished his career as **Florida's all-time leader for receiving yards by a tight end** (1,492) and ranked second in school history for career receptions by a tight end (100).
- Despite only playing eight games in 2020, Pitts amassed 770 receiving yards and 12 touchdowns on 43 catches.
 - » Pitts' **12 touchdown receptions were tied for third in the FBS** and tied for seventh on Florida's single-season record list - **eclipsing the school record of seven by a tight end**.
- Pitts and Toney became the **fourth duo in Gators history with 10-plus touchdown receptions** apiece.
- Toney finished fifth in the SEC and 28th among all FBS players in all-purpose yards per game (130.8), in addition to being one of 25 FBS players and one of six SEC players with 12-plus total touchdowns. His 10 touchdown receptions were tied for seventh in the FBS.
- Toney and Grimes each had a **touchdown catch in four straight games** last year, joining them with Percy Harvin (2008), and Dallas Baker (2005-06) as the only Gators since 2002 to do so.

FLIPPING THE DEFENSIVE SCRIPT

- Despite some defensive woes, **Florida's 120 sacks since 2018 rank first in the SEC and third nationally**.
- After ranking 74th in the FBS in points allowed per game (30.8), 83rd in total defense (428 ypg), and 96th in pass efficiency defense (148.0) in 2020, the Florida defense welcomes grad transfers **Daquan Newkirk** (Auburn), **Tyrone Truesdell** (Auburn), and **Antonio Valentino** (Penn State) to an experienced front seven.
- The grad-transfer trio joins preseason honorees **Zachary Carter** (first-team All-SEC), **Kairi Elam** (first-team All-SEC), and **Ventrell Miller** (second-team All-SEC) in a revamped 2021 Gators defense.
- Florida returns three of the team's top-four leading tacklers in 2020 in Miller (88), **Mohamoud Diabate** (69), and **Amari Burney** (52), -- as well as nine of the top 15 tacklers and 15 of the top 22 from last season.
 - » The Gators return 33 players with at least one tackle last season.
 - » Those 33 returners combined for 64% of the team's tackles in 2020 (547 of 855 total tackles).
- Valentino earned Honorable Mention All-Big Ten honors in 2020, starting all nine games with 14 tackles (five solo), 4.5 TFLs, 3.5 sacks, one forced fumble, two QB hurries, and one pass breakup.
- Newkirk tallied 40 tackles, 5.0 TFLs, and 2.5 sacks and one forced fumble across 30 career games at Auburn, including 28 tackles (eight solo), 3.0 TFLs, and 1.5 sacks in 2020.

- Dan Mullen's 29-9 record through 38 games is the third-best start in school history behind only Steve Spurrier (30-8) and Urban Meyer (31-7).
- In 2020, UF beat four SEC opponents by at least 20 points for the first time since 2008 (seven times).

Offensive Upticks Continued in Mullen's Second Act

- Florida recorded seven games of 500-plus total yards in Mullen's first two seasons. In 75 games from 2012-17, UF had six 500-yard outings.
- Florida recorded 14 games of 400-plus total yards in Mullen's first 26 games as head coach. In the program's 50 games from 2014-17, UF had 400-plus yards just 14 times.
- The Gators had eight games of 400-plus total yards in 2019, their most such games in a season since 2008 -- Mullen's final year as O.C. -- when they did it 10 times.
- UF scored 40-plus points nine times in Mullen's first 26 games (three in 2019, six in 2018). In the 8 games spanning 2011-17, Florida scored 40 points on nine occasions.
- UF scored 105 offensive touchdowns in Mullen's first 26 games. In the three seasons prior to his arrival (2015-17), the Gators scored 93 offensive touchdowns in 38 games.

Mullen Revived Florida's Offense in Debut Season

- The Gators finished in the top 100 in scoring offense for the first time since 2014. They had not finished higher than 96th in total offense since 2010 (when they were 83rd), and their only passing offense to rank higher than 85th following the 2009 season checked in at 79th (2016).
- Florida's averages in each of the following categories were also its highest since 2009: scoring offense, total offense, rushing offense (and average), touchdown-interception ratio, passing touchdowns, and scrimmage touchdowns.

- Here is a look those massive improvements:

- Florida also had its most games of 500-plus total yards (four), 400-plus total yards (six), and 350-plus total yards (10) since 2009, when it had five, six, and 10, respectively.

- Mullen joined Stanford's Chuck Shaughnessy (1-7-1 in 1939; 10-0 in 1940) and Auburn's Gus Malzahn (3-9 in 2012; 12-2 in 2013) as the only other head coaches in history to win 10 games in a debut season at a current Power Five program after inheriting a team that won less than five games the year prior.
- Oversaw the second-highest wins turnaround in school history (4-7 to 10-3 / +6), with it only being behind the 1980 Gators, who went 8-4 following a 0-10-1 campaign in 1979.

In Perspective: Mullen's Mississippi State Turnaround

- Mullen took over in Starkville with the Bulldogs coming off a 4-8 season and a nine-season stretch from 2000-08 in which they went 37-69 and made just two bowl appearances.
- The Bulldogs went 69-46 overall, 33-39 in SEC play, and made eight bowl games in Mullen's nine seasons as head coach. Of his losses, 34 (or 74 percent of them) were to ranked opponents.

- Mullen made Mississippi State one of 11 FBS programs to produce six different 1,000-yard rushers from 2009-17. The others were: Auburn (9), Nevada (7), Alabama (6), Army (6), Baylor (6), Boise State (6), Georgia Tech (6), Navy (6), Ohio State (6), and Wisconsin (6).



DAN MULLEN - FLORIDA HEAD COACH

- Mississippi State produced 26 NFL Draft picks in Mullen's tenure, including a pair of first-rounders. From 1996 through 2008, MSU had 27 NFL Draft picks.
- Seven of MSU's top nine (and all of its top four) highest total offense per game season averages were produced with Mullen as head coach
- MSU broke over 112 game, season, and career school records under Mullen.

In Perspective: Mullen Takes Mississippi State to No. 1

- Mullen led Mississippi State to a 9-0 start in 2014, allowing the Bulldogs to secure the No. 1 ranking in the Associated Press Top 25 for a five-week stretch from Oct. 12 through Nov. 9.
- MSU held the No. 1 ranking until after a 25-20 loss at No. 4 Alabama on Nov. 15.
- Since 2001, only 16 FBS programs -- predominantly "blueblood" schools -- have been ranked No. 1 in the AP Top 25. **And 11 of those 16 were ranked No. 1 in the AP Top 25 at least five weeks:** Alabama, Clemson, Florida, Florida State, LSU, Miami, Mississippi State, Oklahoma, Ohio State, Oregon, and Southern California.
- Since 2013, only six FBS programs have been the No. 1 team in the AP Top 25.**

In Perspective: Mullen as Florida's O.C.

- During Mullen's four seasons as the Gators offensive coordinator (2005-08), UF ranked 3rd in passer rating (155.9), 8th in scoring offense (36.3), 15th in total offense (418.9), 21st in rushing offense (185.6), 39th in passing offense (233.2).
- Coordinated an offense that ranked 4th nationally in points per game (43.6--also fourth in school history) and 15th in yards per game (445.1), eventually helping the Gators win the 2009 BCS National Championship Game.
- Coordinated a Gators offense that scored 41 points to rout Ohio State--which had the nation's top scoring defense--in the 2007 BCS National Champ. Game.
- Coordinated the 2007 offense to 457.2 total yards per game -- 8th in UF history.
- Helped Chad Jackson garner Biletnikoff Award semifinalist status after he set UF's single-season record with 88 receptions in 2005. Jackson led the SEC and ranked 6th nationally in receptions.
- Also in 2005, center Mike Degory was named a Rimington Trophy finalist.

In Perspective: Mullen's Quarterbacks Track Record

- In 2002 at Bowling Green, Mullen helped Josh Harris account for the 2nd-most total touchdowns (41) among FBS players and 3,213 total yards.
- In 2004 at Utah, Mullen helped Alex Smith account for the second-most total touchdowns (42) among FBS players, and amass 3,604 total yards.
- Smith finished fourth in the 2004 Heisman Trophy voting and was the No. 1 pick in 2005 NFL Draft.
- In 2007, Mullen helped Tim Tebow account for the 2nd-most total touchdowns (55 -- an SEC record) among FBS players, and amass 4,181 total yards.
- Tebow was the first quarterback in FBS history to pass for 20+ touchdowns and rush for 20+ touchdowns in a season (2007), and his 2007 season remains the

only one in history of more than 30 passing and 20 rushing touchdowns.

- Tebow won the Heisman Trophy in 2007 (first-ever underclassman winner).
- Tebow's numbers dipped slightly in 2008, but he still ranked 7th nationally in total touchdowns (42) and accounted for 3,419 total yards.
- In 2014, Mullen helped Dak Prescott finish tied for fifth nationally in total touchdowns (42) in 2014, in addition to totaling 4,470 yards (3,449 pass / 986 rush / 35 receiving).
- Prescott was eighth in the Heisman voting and a Maxwell Award finalist in 2014.
- Prescott's rushing production dipped in 2015, but he increased his passing production and finished the season ranked 15th nationally in passing yards (3,793). He also ranked 11th nationally with 39 total touchdowns.
- In 2016, Mullen helped first-year starter Nick Fitzgerald, a redshirt sophomore, tie for 14th nationally with 37 total touchdowns. Fitzgerald also ran for 1,375 yards--ranking 3rd among FBS quarterbacks.
- In 2017, Fitzgerald accounted for 2,766 yards (1,782 passing, 984 rushing) and 29 touchdowns (15 passing, 14 rushing) despite missing nearly all of the Egg Bowl and Mississippi State's bowl game due to a gruesome ankle injury.
- Much of Florida's offensive success in 2018 could be attributed to Feleipe Franks' turnaround, which Mullen engineered. Franks finished the year tied for 17th nationally in touchdown-interception ratio, and his 24 touchdown passes (to six interceptions) were the highest season total since Tim Tebow threw 30 en route to the 2008 national title. Franks threw nine touchdowns and eight interceptions, and ranked 99th nationally with a 113.31 passer rating in 2017.

Todd Grantham - Defensive Coordinator (4th season)

- **The Mullen Connection:** defensive coordinator under Mullen at Mississippi State for the 2017 season.
- Developed 44 NFL Draft picks in his collegiate coaching career.
- Coached UF's defense to 65 takeaways in his three seasons, a total which tied for 11th among all FBS teams.
- Coached the Gators to an SEC-leading 49 sacks in 2019 (ranked fifth in FBS), a total which led the league by 12.
- Helped Jonathan Greenard lead the SEC in sacks (9.5) and TFLs (15.5), after which he was a third-round 2020 NFL Draft pick.
- Coached UF to +12 turnover margin in 2018 (tied 7th in FBS).
- Helped defensive end Jachai Polite tie the school record and lead all of FBS with six forced fumbles in 2018. Polite also finished eighth nationally with 11 sacks.

Wesley McGriff - Secondary (1st season)

- **The Mullen Connection:** coached against Mullen at Auburn (2016, 2019-21), Ole Miss (2012, 2016-18) and Vanderbilt (2012).
- McGriff coached Auburn defensive backs Noah Igbinoghene (1st rd.) and Daniel Thomas (5th rd.) into 2020 NFL Draft picks.
- Auburn's pass defense improved from No. 7 in the SEC in 2018 (prior to his arrival) to No. 3 during his final season in 2020.
- Coached Ole Miss linebacker Mohamed Sanogo to a 112-tackle season in 2018 -- one of two Rebel defenders to eclipse the 100-tackle threshold over the previous 12 seasons.
- Orchestrated a 2017 Ole Miss defense that saw Breeland Speaks (2nd rd.) and Marquic Haynes (4th rd.) become NFL Draft picks while combining for 14.5 sacks.

David Turner - Defensive Line (3rd season)

- **The Mullen Connection:** defensive line coach for Mullen's first season (2009) and three others (2013-15) at Mississippi State.
- UF tied for the SEC lead and tied for seventh nationally with 35 sacks in 2020 while ranking second in the SEC with 73 TFLs.
- Coached Tedarrell Slaton into a fifth-round 2021 NFL Draft Pick.
- Helped defensive linemen account for 19 of UF's SEC-leading 49 sacks in 2019, with three sacks and seven tackles for loss coming from third-round 2020 NFL Draft pick Jabari Zuniga.

John Hevesy - Running Game Coordinator / Offensive Line
(4th season)

- **The Mullen Connection:** member of Mullen's coaching staff for entirety of his 9-season tenure at Mississippi State (2009-17). Also worked with Mullen when both were assistants at Florida (2005-08), Utah (2003-04), and Bowling Green (2001-02).
- Coached the offensive line that anchored one of the most-prolific offenses in the nation in 2020, ranking eighth in yards per play (7.28) and ninth in yards per game (509.8)
- Co-ordinated Florida's 2018 offense to its best numbers since 2009 in numerous categories, including rushing offense (213.2 yards per game - 27th in FBS) and rushing average (5.3 yards per carry - tied 18th in FBS).
- From 2009-17, Mississippi State's rushing offense ranked 20th nationally (201.0 yards per game). The Bulldogs ranked 92nd (131.4 yards per game) in the prior 9-year stretch.
- Helped make Mississippi State one of 11 FBS programs to produce six different 1,000-yard rushers from 2009-17.
- Member of Florida's coaching staff for both 2006 and 2008 BCS National Championship Game wins. (Assistant offensive line coach for entire tenure, added tight ends in 2008).

Greg Knox - Running Backs / Special Teams Coordinator
(4th season)

- **The Mullen Connection:** member of Mullen's coaching staff for entirety of his 9-season tenure at Mississippi State (2009-17). Knox coached running backs all nine years and took over as special teams coordinator in 2014.
- Coached running backs Dameon Pierce and Malik Davis to 4.7 yards per carry apiece in 2020 with the duo combining for 67 receptions for 752 yards
- Oversaw the development of kicker Evan McPherson, who went on to be selected in the fifth round of the 2020 NFL Draft
- Coached Lamical Perine to a dual-threat season in 2019, which led to his selection in the fourth round of the 2020 NFL Draft.

Billy Gonzales - Passing Game Coordinator / Wide Receivers
(4th season)

- **The Mullen Connection:** member of Mullen's Mississippi State staff from 2013-17 (receivers coach all four seasons, co-OC final three). Also worked with Mullen when both were assistants at UF (2005-08), Utah (2003-04) and Bowling Green (2001-02).
- In 2020, Florida was the only FBS team featuring six players with at least three receiving TD.
- Oversaw the development of first-round NFL Draft pick Kadarius Toney in 2020 as he registered 984 receiving yards with 10 TD.
- Developed the only FBS receiving corps featuring eight pass catchers with 20-plus receptions, 250-plus yards, and a touchdown in 2019.
- Helped 11 different Gators catch a touchdown pass in 2018 (first time since 2009), followed by 10 Gators with a receiving touchdown in 2019.
- Co-ordinated UF's 2018 offense to its best numbers since 2009 in numerous categories, including passing touchdowns (28 - tied 23rd in FBS).
- Notable NFL Receivers Coached: Odell Beckham Jr. - LSU --> Giants / Browns; Percy Harvin - Florida --> Four teams; Jarvis Landry - LSU --> Dolphins / Browns; Louis Murphy - Florida --> Five teams
- Coached Mississippi State receivers to 18 100-yard games, and Fred Ross Jr. to a 1,000-yard season in 2015.
- Helped seven Gators become NFL Draft picks as receivers coach from 2005-09, a stint that saw UF win two national titles.
- Helped Utah's 2004 offense rank 3rd nationally (499.8 yards), coaching wide receiver Paris Warren to a 1,000-yard season.
- Coached Eugene Baker to consecutive seasons of 1,200-plus yards at Kent State, including the nation's 3rd-highest total (1,549 yards) in 1997 and 9th-highest total (1,215) in 1996.



Garrick McGee - Quarterbacks (1st season)

- **The Mullen Connection:** coached against Mullen in the SEC during his tenure at Arkansas from 2008-11; McGee and his UAB staff were also invited to Mississippi State campus to talk football with Mullen and his staff during Mullen's tenure with the Bulldogs.
- Transitions into the role of quarterbacks coach in 2021 after serving as a defensive analyst during the 2020 season.
- Served as the head coach at UAB from 2012-13 and as the offensive coordinator at Illinois (2016-17), Louisville (2014-15), Arkansas (2008-11) and Northwestern (2004-07).
- McGee's 2018 Missouri offense ranked 13th nationally in total offense (481.8 ypg) and 18th nationally in scoring (36.6 ppg).
- McGee's Louisville offense averaged 28.7 points per game and 416.1 yards per game in 2015, a year after the Cardinals scored 30+ points eight times and passed for 3,276 yards with McGee as offensive coordinator.
- Helped Arkansas to final rankings of No. 12 in 2010 and No. 5 in 2011 during his two years as offensive coordinator for the Razorbacks.
- McGee's 2011 Arkansas offense led the SEC in total offense and ranked No. 29 nationally at 438.1 yards per game, while scoring 40+ points on six occasions.
- Spent two seasons in the NFL with the Jacksonville Jaguars (2000-01).

Chris Harry's Quick Slant

WHAT HAPPENED: Quarterback Kyle Trask passed for 416 yards and six touchdowns, with four of those scores going to beastly junior tight end Kyle Pitts, as the fifth-ranked Gators outgained, outscored and outlasted the host Rebels to win their 2020 season and Southeastern Conference opener Saturday at Vaught-Hemingway Stadium in Oxford, Miss.

Trask, who immediately vaulted into the early Heisman Trophy conversation, was masterful in guiding an offense that cranked out 642 yards, including 196 on the ground, for the most ever amassed by a Florida team against a league opponent. Trask staked his team to a 28-14 halftime lead by hitting 18 of 25 for 241 yards and four scores, with TDs to Pitts bracketing the first and last of those touchdowns, including a 16-yarder with just five seconds to go before intermission. Two plays out the locker room, Trask dropped and bombed a 71-yard scoring strike to Pitts to give the Gators a 21-point cushion. The Rebels never got closer than 14 after that, with UF adding a trio of consecutive field goals from junior Evan McPherson, including a 55-yarder that marked the third-longest in program history.

When Trask hit Pitts for a 17-yard touchdown with 5:14 left, he joined last year's Heisman winner, LSU's Joe Burrow, as the only QBs in league history to throw six touchdowns in an SEC opener. Florida wasn't the only team on the field to put up fat offensive numbers, which is something that figures to concern UF defensive coordinator Todd Grantham. The Rebels totaled 613 yards -- the third-most ever gained against the Gators -- with quarterback Matt Corral, once a UF commitment, finishing 22-for-31 for 395 yards, three touchdowns and one interception.

WHAT IT MEANS: The Gators have a win in their SEC opener for the second straight season and now have now started 1-0 in league play 15 of the last 16 seasons, dating to 2005. It's always good to not have to play catch-up in the SEC East. Even better when considering the 10-game SEC schedule.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: Hard to believe there's a better tight end in the country than Pitts, but Trask is the guy who was throwing him the ball and, boy, was he good at it. There's a reason he was named the preseason All-SEC First Team quarterback. He finished 30 of 42 for 416 yards, with those half-dozen touchdowns, no interceptions, and a whopping QB rating of 201.8. The six TDs fell one shy of the school and SEC record of seven, with UF's jointly held by Terry Dean (1994 vs. New Mexico State) and Doug Johnson (1997 vs. Central Michigan), and the conference's shared by another six players.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: Pick any number of numbers from the Florida offensive box score. We already mentioned Trask tying Burrow's SEC opener touchdown record, so how 'bout Pitts' four touchdown receptions tying the single-game school record set previously by Ike Hilliard against Tennessee in 1995 and Jack Jackson against New Mexico State in 1994.

WHAT HAPPENED: Fifth-year senior quarterback Kyle Trask continued his torrid start to the 2020 season, as did sidekick tight end Kyle Pitts, for that matter, as the third-ranked Gators took care of business against the Southeastern Conference East Division rival Gamecocks with a win Saturday before a socially distanced crowd of 15,120 at Spurrier/Florida Field. Trask completed 21 of his 29 throws for 268 yards, four touchdowns and one interception, piling on his fat numbers from a week ago when he passed for 416 yards and six TDs without a turnover in a win at Ole Miss. Pitts, the 6-foot-6, 240-pound matchup nightmare, caught four passes for 47 yards and two scores, as the featured threat in an offense that ended up with just 348 yards because of a bizarre fourth quarter dominated by the Gamecocks. South Carolina scored on the game's first possession on a 75-yard march over 12 plays. Florida countered with a 75-yard scoring march of its own, capped by a 2-yard run by junior tailback Dameon Pierce. The UF defense forced a punt on USC's second possession, and Trask again marched the Gators to the end zone, this time finding Pitts for the first of his two scores. The Gamecocks answered, but only after Trask was hit and fumbled for his first turnover of the season. South Carolina's Collin Hill hit wideout Shi Smith for a 4-yard TD to tie the game at 14-all. From there, Florida dropped 24 unanswered points -- a field goal from Evan McPherson, plus Trask touchdown tosses to Pitts (again), redshirt freshman wideout Trent Whittemore and 57-yard catch-and-run from senior wingback Kadarius Toney -- to lead 38-24 late in the third quarter. Hill, who completed 28 of 47 passes for 211 yards and two TDs, worked the Gamecocks for 10 straight points to make it 38-24 with just over 10 minutes left, and had a chance for more. South Carolina got the ball back with 8:11 to go needing a pair of touchdowns, but the Gamecocks took their sweet time in marching all the way to the UF 4 with less than a minute to play. Hill's fourth-and-goal pass attempt to cut the lead in half fell incomplete with 48 seconds left, sealing the deal for the home team.

WHAT IT MEANS: Two games, two victories, and both in league play. The Gators will be no worse than one of two unbeaten SEC East teams by day's end (Tennessee defeated Missouri early Saturday, as well), with three-time reigning division champ Georgia slated for a big game tonight at home against Auburn.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: South Carolina held the ball for 11:12 of the fourth period and ran 29 plays to Florida's 10 and outgained UF 99-9 in the period. Of those Gators plays, three of them were kneel-downs to run out the clock on the final possession of the game.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: Florida (2-0, 2-0) is back on the road, with the Gators heading to Texas A&M. The Aggies (1-0) began the day ranked 13th, but with a date at No. 2 Alabama, the preseason favorite to win the league. UF is 1-1 against A&M since the Aggies entered the league, with both teams winning on the road. The Gators were victorious at College Station in 2012, with a 20-17 come-from-behind win over Johnny Manziel and the Aggies in what was A&M's first-ever game as a member of the SEC.

WHAT HAPPENED: Junior Seth Small kicked a 26-yard field goal as time expired Saturday and the 21st-ranked Aggies upset the No. 4 Gators in a game devoid of defense at Kyle Field. Senior quarterback Kellen Mond, making his 37th career start, passed for 338 yards and three touchdowns, while tailback Isaiah Spiller shredded the Gators for 174 rushing yards and two more scores. But it took the Aggies' defense to make the play that changed the course of the outcome. The score was tied at 38 when Florida quarterback Kyle Trask, already with 312 yards, four touchdowns and no interception, took over with 3:40 remaining and a chance for the game-winning drive. After hitting senior tailback Malik Davis for 23 yards to near midfield, Davis fumbled the ball away two plays later and the Aggies recovered at the UF 48. Mond needed eight plays to move his team 40 yards, hitting a big third-and-8 completion (a troubling trend on the day against the UF defense) to wideout Chase Lane for 16 yards to the UF 19. On the next play, Spiller rushed 11 yards to the 8 and, after an A&M timeout, basically gave Small an extra point to win the game. Mond finished 25 of 35 against a UF defense that yielded 543 yards and an astounding 12-for-15 conversions on third down. Trask was 23-for-32, but was denied a chance at a game-winning drive. Florida finished with 402 yards of offense, but just 90 on the ground, compared to A&M's 205. The Aggies trailed 38-31 with just over six minutes left, but got a 51-yard scoring bomb from Mond to wideout Caleb Chapman to tie the game, then the turnover that turned the game. A&M started the day 0-7 against teams ranked in the top five during Coach Jimbo Fisher's three seasons since bolting from Florida State. In those games, the Aggies had been outscored by an average of 19.1 points, including last weekend's 28-point loss at No. 2-ranked Alabama. They're now 1-7

WHAT IT MEANS: The Gators will be chasing the winner of Saturday's game between Tennessee and Georgia, both of which began the day unbeaten and tied with the UF atop the SEC East. (Update: Georgia won 44-21). The defeat wasn't a death knell to their hopes of winning division (not with dates against the Volunteers and Bulldogs down the road), but in the bigger, College Football Playoff picture, a loss to a team that was steamrolled 52-24 at Alabama last week won't help the Gators pass the eye test down the line; if it comes to that. There's also the more closer-to-home issue of that defense, which will be under serious reevaluation.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: Mond and Spiller accounted for 515 of their team's 543 yards. That's 94.8 percent.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: The Aggies averaged 7.3 yards per snap. The Gators averaged 7.2, but 18 fewer plays, and thus nearly 170 fewer yards.

UP NEXT: The Gators (2-1, 2-1) return home to facing reigning national champion LSU (1-2, 1-2), which Saturday was stunned at unranked Missouri, 45-41, in a game that was moved from Baton Rouge to Columbia due to Hurricane Delta. The Tigers are a shadow of the team they were last year with Heisman Trophy winner and No. 1 overall draft pick Joe Burrow, what with 14 players taken in the NFL draft, but still quite talented and formidable, regardless of their two losses, including those 600-plus yards passing surrendered in a season-opening home loss against Mississippi State.

WHAT HAPPENED: Florida started slow offensively, but its defense held firm until a scoring surge late in the second quarter gave the Gators a two-score lead they extended with a pair of touchdowns in the third quarter. UF carried its 34-7 lead into the fourth quarter, and never allowed Missouri to get closer than 24 points en route to its 10th consecutive home win. Until mop-up duty late in the game, the only touchdown scored against the Gators came when redshirt senior quarterback Kyle Trask was hit on a throw, which led to a wounded duck of a pass and a 59-yard interception return touchdown by Missouri's Jarvis Ware. The pick-six put Missouri up, 7-6, a little over two minutes into the second quarter, as the Gators settled for a pair of field goals (both made by redshirt junior backup kicker Chris Howard) on their first two drives, despite some explosive passing plays from Trask to junior tight end Kyle Pitts and running backs Malik Davis and Dameon Pierce. Florida's offense got on track late in the second quarter, as a 36-yard pass from Trask to redshirt sophomore wide receiver Jacob Copeland drove the Gators to Missouri's 24-yard line. Then senior all-purpose athlete Kadarius Toney delivered his latest video game-esque escape for an 18-yard touchdown run. Missouri faced a third-and-1 on the ensuing drive, and Brenton Cox Jr. recovered a fumbled exchange between Tigers quarterback Connor Bazelak and running back Tyler Badie, giving the Gators the ball at the Missouri 30-yard line with 1:15 remaining. They only needed seven seconds, as Trask found Toney for a 30-yard touchdown reception on the very next play, securing a 20-7 half-time lead. Florida faced a fourth-and-1 at Missouri's 31-yard line on its opening drive of the second half, which Trask converted himself with a 15-yard run. Toney capped the 8-play, 75-yard touchdown drive with a 16-yard touchdown run on the next play, making it 27-7. The Gators kept the ball on the ground for much of their next drive, which transfer receiver Justin Shorter capped with a 2-yard touchdown reception, the first of his collegiate career. Trask delivered his fourth touchdown pass of the night on an 18-yard connection with Trevon Grimes midway through the fourth quarter. The Texas native became the first Gators quarterback in history to throw at least four touchdown passes in four consecutive games, and brought his season total up to 18 (read on for more on how remarkable that feat is).

WHAT IT MEANS: Florida shook off the rust in its first game since a tough loss at Texas A&M on Oct. 10, and shored up some of the defensive issues it displayed through the first three outings this season. Most importantly, the Gators generated some momentum heading into next week's highly-anticipated rivalry matchup.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: The Florida defense. The unit entered the night ranked near the bottom of the FBS in rushing and passing defense, but until Missouri's final two drives – by which time Florida built a 41-10 lead – the Gators allowed just 172 total yards. Florida also limited Missouri to just three conversions on 15 third-down attempts (20 percent). The last time UF held its opponent to 20 percent or worse on third downs when it faced at least 15 was last year's rout of Vanderbilt, a game in which the Gators finished with the exact same 3-for-15 stat line on third down.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: 18. Trask's touchdown total through four games this season – which set an SEC record for touchdown passes in the first four games of a season. Entering Saturday's games, the FBS leader was UCF's Dillon Gabriel, who threw 19 touchdowns. In five games.

WHAT HAPPENED: Quarterback Kyle Trask and the eighth-ranked Gators spotted their rival a two-touchdown lead in the first quarter, but Trask and friends quickly flipped the script and bombarded the fifth-ranked Bulldogs with an offensive barrage that made a mockery of the Southeastern Conference's top-rated defense and put Florida in control in the race for the East Division title. Trask passed for a career-high 474 yards and four touchdowns, all coming in the first half, as the Florida offense flattened Georgia, which came in allowing only 300 yards per game, to the tune of 571 total yards for the Gators' first win in the series since 2016. UGA tailback Zamir White went 75 yards on the first play from scrimmage to put the Bulldogs ahead just 12 seconds into the game. After a UF three-and-out, UGA marched 61 yards in six plays with Stetson Bennett hitting Marcus Rosemy-Jacksaint with a 32-yard touchdown pass to go up 14-0 barely four minutes in. From there, the rest of the half was all Gators, as UF outgained UGA 433 yards to just 44 in taking a 38-21 lead into the locker room, including a gorgeous 14-yard touchdown reception by a leaping Trevon Grimes with just 11 seconds to play in the half. Trask also had touchdown strikes of 14 yards to wideout Justin Shorter, 25 yards to tight end Kyle Pitts, who later left the game following a vicious helmet-to-helmet strike from UGA's Lewis Cine (ejected), and 25 yards to Pitts backup Kemore Gamble, but also a pick-6 that temporarily put his team down 21-14. Not for long, though. Junior running back Dameon Pierce had a 2-yard rushing TD in the first quarter and sophomore Evan McPherson kicked field goals of 50, 51 and 34 yards, the last coming with 1:19 to play. Bennett completed just five of his 16 passes for 78 yards, one touchdown and an interception and eventually was benched for redshirt freshman D'Wan Mathis, who marched the Dogs to a touchdown with a 25-yard dart to Kearis Jackson to close within 41-28 late in the third quarter. That would be it for the Dogs, though. The two UGA quarterbacks completed only 9 of 29 passes for just 112 yards, two touchdowns and three interceptions. The Dogs' inability to sustain offense with either QB allowed the Gators to win despite scoring just six points after halftime.

WHAT IT MEANS: Florida has a spot in the driver's seat to the Southeastern Conference East Division title. The Gators now hold a one-game lead on the second-place Bulldogs, as well as the all-important head-to-head tiebreaker, with the rest of the other division teams at least two games back. The win was UF's first over UGA since 2016 (and first in three tries for Coach Dan Mullen), meaning the Dogs now lead the series 52-43-2.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: Hmm. Guess we'll go with Trask, whose season numbers now show 125 completions in 182 attempts (that's 68.7 percent) for 1,815 yards, 22 touchdowns (with four in each of the last four games) and three interceptions. That TD total is one shy of the record-setting mark LSU's Joe Burrow established through five games a season ago. Burrow went on to win the Heisman Trophy.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: In each of the last four meetings, Florida fell behind by double digits in the opening period. In 2017, in what turned out to be Coach Jim McElwain's final game, UF trailed 21-0 in the first quarter on the way to a 42-7 loss. In 2018, it was a 10-0 deficit in 36-17 loss. In 2019, again 10-0 in a 24-17 loss. It was 14-0 this time, but the outcome was way different. Also, for the first time since 2005, the team that rushed for the most yards did not win. Georgia out-gained Florida 165-97 on the ground Saturday, starting with that 75-yard blast on the first snap, but what Trask did through the air was enough to snap the 14-game streak for the dominant running team.

The Quick Slant

WHAT HAPPENED: UF quarterback Kyle Trask continued his assault on the Florida (and Southeastern Conference) record book, throwing for 356 yards and six touchdowns Saturday night — his sixth straight game with at least four TD strikes — to lead the sixth-ranked Gators past the Razorbacks at Spurrier/Florida Field. In facing grad-transfer and former teammate Feleipe Franks, the QB who beat him out twice (2018 and '19), Trask completed 23 of his 29 throws, with TD strikes of 9, 23, 21, 33, 5 and 11 yards, the combination of which gave him 28 on the season, which broke the six-game SEC mark, set by Alabama's Tua Tagovailoa in 2019. Florida scored on its first possession, with Trask hitting Trevon Grimes (6 catches, 109 yards, 2 TDs), but Franks answered almost instantly by lofting a gorgeous 47-yard strike to Mike Woods (2 catches, 129 yards, 2 TDs) on the Razorbacks' fifth snap. The Gators, though, scored touchdowns on their last four possessions of the half to open a 35-14 lead at intermission, with Trask going to the locker room with 281 yards and five TDs. Arkansas tailback Treton Smith's 83-yard touchdown run cut the lead to 14 points lead, but the margin soon was padded (and then some) by backup quarterback Emory Jones' 1-yard run, Trask's early fourth-quarter pass to tight end Keon Zipperer (3 catches, 47 yards, 2 TDs) and a 35-yard fumble return by defensive lineman Zach Carter — all coming within six minutes — that quickly made it 56-21 with inside 13 minutes left. The Gators outgained the Hogs in total offense with 593 yards to 458. Of that Arkansas total, 212 yards came on a trio of scoring plays.

WHAT IT MEANS: The Gators, with a comfortable lead in the SEC East Division, inched closer to their goal of winning the East and clinching a first berth in the league championship game since 2016. With its lone loss coming on the road at No. 5 Texas A&M, Florida also remains in the mix for a potential first berth in the College Football Playoff, but that is chatter for another (and later) day.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: This space, it seems, could be reserved for Trask every week (more on him below), but we'll single out his counterpart, instead, given the juicy pregame storyline. Franks (unfortunately) was booed when he took the field for the first Arkansas drive and took out his frustration after that big early touchdown throw, pointing at the UF bench as he sprinted down the field with his teammates. Franks finished 15 of 19 for 250 yards, two touchdowns, no interceptions and was sacked three times.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: Trask not only broke the SEC record for most TD passes through six games, but also became just the fourth FBS quarterback over the last 25 seasons to throw at least four in his first six games, joining Hawaii's Colt Brennan (nine straight in 2006), Texas Tech's Graham Harrell (six in '07) and Toledo's Logan Woodside (six in '16). On the home front, Trask, who had his second six-TD game of the season (matching his output from the season-opening win at Ole Miss), also joined Danny Wuerffel and Tim Tebow as the third QB in Florida history to throw for at least 25 touchdowns in consecutive seasons. Wuerffel had 35 in 1995 and 39 in '96, while Tebow had 32 in 2007 and 30 in '08. For the season, Trask has completed better than 70 percent of his attempts and thrown just three interceptions.

WHAT HAPPENED: Quarterback Kyle Trask threw for 383 yards and three touchdowns and the sixth-ranked Gators shook off a slow start with a run of 24 consecutive points over the two halves to claim a victory over the winless Commodores in their Southeastern Conference game Saturday at Dudley Field/Vanderbilt Stadium. Trask threw touchdown passes of 27 yards to wingback Kadarius Toney, 34 to wide receiver Trevon Grimes and 2 to tight end Kemore Gamble. The latter two scores, along with a field goal from Evan McPherson and 1-yard run by tailback Dameon Pierce, accounted for the Florida scoring run of two-dozen straight. After a Vandy TD closed the margin to 14 points late in the third quarter, UF backup quarterback Emory Jones fired a 30-yard catch-and-run TD to Gamble to take the margin back out to 21 points with less than seven minutes to go, allowing the Gators to leave Nashville with their 15th straight road win in the series. Vanderbilt scorched UF for 138 first-quarter yards and led 10-7 on a 16-yard touchdown pass from freshman Ken Seals to Chris Pierce Jr. and 25-yard Pierson Cooke field goal. That's when Florida went on its 24-point roll, starting with a tying field goal by McPherson of 33 yards. Trask and the Gators then drove to touchdowns with 49 seconds to go in the first half, when Grimes made a terrific catch between two defenders, and Pierce finished a 75-yard march to start the second half that included a fourth-and-1 gamble by UF coach Dan Mullen from his own 34-yard line. Trask's 2-yard score to Gamble pushed the Gators in front 31-10 with 2:55 to go in the third period. Vandy temporarily cut the lead back to 14, but Florida answered with a six-play, 99-yard touchdown drive to ice the game. Trask finished 26 of 35, with completions to nine different receivers and no interceptions, as UF rolled up 586 yards of total offense. With the three touchdown passes, he ran his season's total to 31 through seven games, which was one shy of Texas Tech's B.J. Symons' NCAA record of 32. Trask tied both Texas Tech's Graham Harrell (2007) and Tulsa's David Johnson (2007) for the second-most scoring throws after seven games. For Vandy, Seals completed 22 of 34 passes for 319 yards, two scores and one interception for a Vandy unit that totaled 406 yards.

WHAT IT MEANS: A fourth straight win and a step closer to clinching the program's first berth in the SEC Championship Game since 2016. The Gators maintained their one-game-plus lead over Georgia in the SEC East Division, with the "plus" being the all-important head-to-head tiebreaker edge, courtesy of UF's 44-28 defeat of the Bulldogs earlier this month. Florida can wrap up the East's title-game bid by winning two of its last three games, no matter what Georgia does.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: With superstar tight end Kyle Pitts sidelined for a second straight week since going into concussion protocol, Gamble stepped up with a trio of big plays. After snaring his second TD of the season late in the third quarter, Gamble added a 35-yard reception to get his team off their own 1-yard line, then five plays later had a 30-yard catch-and-run for a score on a pass from backup quarterback Emory Jones. Gamble had three catches for 66 yards and the two TDs.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: UF has scored at least 35 points in nine straight games, including seven consecutive SEC games. Those are both school records, which is pretty impressive given the numbers Steve Spurrier and Urban Meyer put up back in the day.

WHAT HAPPENED: Quarterback Kyle Trask welcomed back Kyle Pitts by throwing the man-child tight end a trio of touchdown passes, but it was Kadarius Toney's 50-yard punt return just before halftime that turned momentum and awakened the sixth-ranked Gators for a run of 27 consecutive points Saturday on the way to beating the Wildcats at Spurrier/Florida Field. Trask, a Heisman Trophy front-runner, completed 21 of 27 attempts for 256 yards, no interceptions, and scoring tosses to Pitts of 56, 2 and 7 yards. Evan McPherson kicked a pair of field goals and the UF defense, after a shaky first half, forced three second-half turnovers and limited the Wildcats to just 46 total yards over the final two periods. The Gators, winners of five straight, actually trailed 10-7 late in the first half and had been virtually dominated as far as time of possession by a Wildcats' offense that was controlling the clock behind an effective running game that kept Trask off the field. But with just over a minute to go in the half, Kentucky was forced to punt from its end zone. Florida's return team retreated to the left side of the field, as if the ball was headed that way, with most of the the Kentucky coverage team following. The ball, though, was headed up the right side of the field, where Toney caught it basically unencumbered, then ran the play back for the TD that started the Florida scoring onslaught. Pitts, out the last two weeks after suffering a concussion and facial wound in the Nov. 7 win against Georgia, caught five passes for 99 yards. Offensively, the Gators were held to just 418 yards (more than 100 below their average), but the defense held the Wildcats, ranked last in the Southeastern Conference in total offense, to 221 yards, including just 62 through the air.

WHAT IT MEANS: Make that 33 wins in the last 34 meetings in the series, but of far greater significance was the Gators' nudging that much closer to their first SEC East Division title in four years. UF needs to win just one of its final two games to put a wrap on the title. Florida could lose both of its final two games and still get to Atlanta, if second-place Georgia, which takes on South Carolina later Saturday, loses one of its final two games, but the Gators have starry-eyed goals that go behind just a league championship and the only thing that can get them there is more victories.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: Offensive players usually wind up in this space, but sophomore linebacker Mohamoud Diabate, the 6-foot-3, 221-pounder from Auburn, Ala., was spectacular in finishing the game with six tackles, including a half-sack, plus a third-quarter interception (and 14-yard return) that set up Pitts' third touchdown reception that basically put the game away.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: Kentucky ran 41 plays (to Florida's 21) and possessed the ball for 23 minutes, 23 seconds (to UF's 6:37) in the first half and still trailed 14-10 at the break because of Toney's timely punt return. The numbers weren't nearly (or as as oddly) lopsided in the second half. UF ran 41 plays over 20:04 to UK's 16 and 9:56 on the way to outscoring the Cats 20-0 after the break.

WHAT HAPPENED: Quarterback Kyle Trask padded his Heisman Trophy resumé, passing for 433 yards and four touchdowns Saturday, but more importantly the sixth-ranked Gators clinched a spot in the Southeastern Conference Championship Game for the first time in four seasons by beating the Volunteers at Neyland Stadium. Trask, the fifth-year senior, basically put the game away by working for a pair of long touchdown drives (80 yards and 75 yards) bridging the first and second half to open a 17-point lead against an offensively challenged Tennessee team. Trask went on to complete 35 of 49 throws, with TDs of 4, 2, 17 and 12 yards to pull within one of 1996 Heisman winner Danny Wuerffel for the most touchdown passes in a single UF season (39). The Gators got an early field goal from sophomore Evan McPherson, then surrendered a 96-yard scoring drive to freshman quarterback Harrison Bailey, making his first career start, and trailed 7-3 until Trask found his rhythm. He was five of six for 64 yards, hitting senior wideout Trevon Grimes for his first of two touchdown catches, to start a run of 28 straight points that put the Gators in command. Trask found senior wingback Kadarius Toney with 33 seconds to go in the first half, then Grimes again just 1:29 into the second to open a 24-7 lead. He added a fourth TD to sophomore Jacob Copeland early in the fourth quarter to make it 31-7. UF finished with 452 yards of offense, with only 21 on the ground. UT had 334 yards for the game and eventually replaced Bailey, who went 14 of 21 for 111 yards and a score, with sophomore J.T. Shrout (12 of 21, 121 yards, 1 TD), who threw a scoring pass with 27 seconds to go. The loss was the Vols' sixth straight, with all of them by double digits.

WHAT IT MEANS: The Gators are headed to the conference championship game for the first time since 2016, but they don't have the 2020 SEC East Division all to themselves. Not yet, anyway. Georgia can still claim a share of the division title with a win next week and a loss by UF in its regular-season finale. That's a conversation for another time (one Florida's coaches, players and fans rather not have, of course), but in the interim all the team's goals (and dreams) appear to be alive. The Gators have won six in a row and put themselves in position for a shot at the College Football Playoff.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: Got to go with Kyle again. And Kyle. That would be Trask and Kyle Pitts, the remarkable UF tight end, of course, who hooked up for seven receptions for 128 yards. On defense, junior linebacker Ventrell Miller had an excellent game, finishing with 12 tackles, including two for loss, with a sack and a pass breakup.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: No one is going to mistake this Florida team for one that is particularly good at running the ball (or likes to), but at halftime the Gators had one yard rushing against the No. 9 defense in the SEC at stopping the run. Part of that bad number was the two sacks Trask took (just the ninth and 10th of the season), but the Vols were surrendering 161.1 yards per game on the ground coming. Florida had 19 yards on 17 attempts, with Copeland gaining 17 on his only carry of the game on an end-around. The UF tailback stats looked like this: Dameon Pierce 5 carries, 5 yards; Nay'Quan Wright 4 carries, 2 yards; Malik Davis 2 carries, zero yards.

The Quick Slant

WHAT HAPPENED: Incredible efforts from redshirt senior quarterback Kyle Trask and senior Kadarius Toney were not enough on Saturday night for the Gators, who fell at Spurrier/Florida Field for the first time in their last 13 home games. After Florida's first drive of the game stalled deep in LSU (4-5) territory and ended on downs at the 1-yard line, a 24-yard scamper by redshirt junior running back Malik Davis put the Gators back inside the LSU 10-yard line. Trask lumbered into the end zone for a 1-yard touchdown run and put the Gators ahead, 7-0. LSU promptly responded with an 11-play, 75-yard touchdown drive of its own and tied the game. The Tigers took the lead two possessions later, as Trask threw his first interception in his last 181 attempts and LSU's Eli Ricks returned it 68 yards for a touchdown and a 14-7 lead. It looked as though Florida would quickly even the score, with Trask hitting senior receiver Trevon Grimes for a 50-yard strike at the LSU 15. The ensuing play resulted in an unbelievably bizarre interception, as a wild pass from Trask along the sideline deflected off Toney's hand, an LSU defender's helmet, and into the hands of LSU's Jay Ward, who was on both knees along the sideline. Florida's defense forced a three-and-out, but the offense once again stalled in the red zone and settled for a 23-yard field goal by junior kicker Evan McPherson, making it 14-10. After forcing another three-and-out, Florida took the lead and went 66 yards – with 22 coming on a dazzling 22-yard catch and run by Toney – in less than three minutes to take a 17-14 lead on a 19-yard touchdown pass from Trask to redshirt sophomore receiver Jacob Copeland. LSU retook the lead just before halftime after a busted coverage resulted in a wide-open Kayshon Boutte and a 34-yard touchdown. As the Gators took over with 33 seconds left and tried for a late score, Trask was sacked and stripped. The turnover set up a 39-yard field goal by LSU, which put the Gators in a 24-17 hole. LSU added another field goal after taking its opening drive of the second half down to Florida's 1, only to see a holding penalty knock it off the goal line. The Gators book-ended an LSU three-and-out with a pair of touchdown drives. Trask set the first up with a 49-yard strike to Toney, then dove over the line and into the end zone for his second rushing score. The second touchdown drive saw Trask hit Copeland for 40 yards, Davis for 20, and then Toney on a screen pass from nine yards out which produced the quarterback's 40th passing touchdown of the season, breaking a 24-year-old school record. A nine-play, 84-yard touchdown drive put LSU back in front, 34-31, early in the fourth quarter, after which Florida's offense punted after three plays on consecutive possessions. As the fog thickened, Florida's offense found life and drove inside the LSU 10-yard line, but lost ground on an intentional grounding penalty. Florida settled for a game-tying field goal from McPherson. And after a key third down stop on LSU's ensuing drive, an unsportsmanlike conduct penalty gave the Tigers new life and set up Cade York's eventual game-winning field goal from 57 yards out. Taking over at his own 25-yard line with 23 seconds left, Trask connected with Grimes for 15 yards, then hit Toney for gains of 18 and nine yards to set McPherson up for a game-tying field goal attempt from 51 yards out. The kick sailed just left of the upright. Trask finished with 474 passing yards, matching his career-high total from the win over Georgia, which ranks second on the school's single-game record list. Florida finished with 609 total yards, its second-highest total of the season, but surrendered 418 yards to the Tigers.

WHAT IT MEANS: Florida was already assured itself a spot in the SEC Championship Game with its victory at Tennessee last Saturday, but the Gators' College Football Playoff hopes took a devastating blow, as a loss to an undermanned 4-5 LSU team will be impossible for the committee to overlook.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: Toney blew away the career-high 108 receiving yards he had at Tennessee last week with nine catches for 182 yards (both career highs) and a touchdown. The senior also ran for 56 yards on three carries and had an 11-yard punt return to give him 249 all-purpose yards. Toney's 182 yards were five shy of the No. 10 spot on Florida's single-game record list, which is currently occupied by Wes Chandler (187 against North Carolina in 1976).

STAGGERING STATISTIC: Trask breaking Danny Wuerffel's school record for passing touchdowns in a season isn't astonishing because of the fact he actually broke the record. The way offenses are trending nationally, given how there are anywhere from 13, 14, or even 15 games in a season, and the fact postseason stats count toward records made it a matter of time before someone eclipsed Wuerffel's fabled record. Trask's breaking of the record is extraordinary because of the fact he only needed 10 games to do it. Even Wuerffel needed 12 to set the record of 39 back in 1996. There are only four quarterbacks in SEC history to throw 40 touchdown passes in a season, and all of them needed at least 13 games to reach their totals of 60 (Joe Burrow for LSU last year), 44 (Drew Lock for Missouri in 2017), 43 (Tua Tagovailoa for Alabama in 2018), and 40 (Andre Woodson for Kentucky in 2007), respectively. Even counting Wuerffel's three touchdowns from the 1997 Sugar Bowl rout of Florida State (bowl statistics were not counted in season records until 2002), Trask is still on his way to the most remarkable passing season in program history.

Chris Harry's Quick Slant

WHAT HAPPENED: Tailback Najee Harris tallied 245 yards of all-purpose offense and scored five touchdowns, four in the first half, as the top-ranked Crimson Tide opened a fat lead at intermission and fended off a second-half Gators rally Saturday night to win the 2020 Southeastern Conference Championship Game at Mercedes-Benz Stadium in Atlanta. Harris rushed for 179 yards and two TDs and caught another five passes for 67 yards and three scores. Bama quarterback Mac Jones threw for a SEC title game record 418 yards and five TDs, hitting superstar wide receiver DeVonta Smith for 15 catches, 184 yards and two scores. The Brown/Harris/Smith trio keyed a Tide offensive onslaught that gashed the Gators for 605 yards. UF was led again by fifth-year senior quarterback Kyle Trask, who passed for 408 yards and three touchdowns, plus rushed for a score, but his unit (462 yards, only 54 on the ground) just could not keep pace with the Tide. Alabama took the opening kickoff and went 70 yards in seven plays and needed less than three minutes to do it. It was a harbinger of things to come. The Tide had six first-half possessions and scored touchdowns on five of them. The lone outlier? It came with the game tied at 7-all when UF defensive back Trey Dean III intercepted Jones on the Tide's second possession. At the end of a 17-yard return, Jones fumbled the ball back on a vicious blindside hit from by wideout from Bama wideout John Metchie. On the very next snap, Jones found Smith running wide open on a crossing route for a 31-yard touchdown and 14-7 lead. Harris, who opened the scoring with an 8-yard touchdown run, caught TDs of 7, 23 and 17 yards from Jones, the last coming with six seconds to go before halftime, as the Tide went 78 yards in 54 seconds after the Gators seemingly grabbed some late-half momentum on a Trask TD run with 1:09 to go. The Tide led 35-17 at halftime, but Trask struck for a 50-yard touchdown pass to Trevon Grimes five plays into the third quarter and the UF defense came up with back-to-back stops -- the first on downs, the second forcing the Tide's first punt of the game with 5:22 remaining -- to further the comeback attempt. A 12-play, 80-yard drive was capped by a 3-yard scoring run by Nay'Quan Wright made it 35-31 with 18 seconds left in the third quarter. Harris, though, added his fifth touchdown on a 3-yard run, then on the ensuing series Trask was sacked by Will Anderson Jr., and fumbled the ball away. That set up a Tide field goal and 14-point lead with 9:53 remaining. The Gators, 17-point underdogs coming in, cut that margin in half when tailback Dameon Pierce scored on a 1-yard run with 6:33 left, leaving matters to the Florida defense. Alabama needed just four plays to go 66 yards, with Jones firing what seemed to be a 15-yard put-away TD to Smith with 4:59 left. Trask, though, hit tight end Kyle Pitts with a 22-yard score and added a two-point conversion run with 2:09 left to draw within six points. The Tide recovered the ensuing onside kick and ran all but the final 16 seconds off the clock. Trask finished 26-for-40 of and ran his season's touchdown-pass total to 43. Senior wingback Kadarius Toney caught eight passes for 153 yards and a score, while Pitts hauled in seven balls for 129 yards and the TD.

WHAT IT MEANS: The Gators were denied a ninth league title, while the Tide won their 28th. That's 15 more than the next-closest team (Georgia) in the SEC. Florida's second straight loss dropped it to 7-6 in all-time SEC title games, with a 4-6 mark against Bama, including 1-4 versus Coach Nick Saban, who will roll the Tide into the College Football Playoff next month.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: Harris came into the game with 27 receptions on the season and zero touchdown catches. He grabbed three TD passes in the first half alone. With 1,263 yards rushing and 27 total touchdowns on the season, Harris certainly deserves to join his buddies, Jones and Smith, in the Heisman conversation. In fact, don't be surprised if Jones, Smith and Harris give the Tide three players among the top Heisman vote-getters. That would be a first since Ohio State did it in 1973, when Penn State's John Cappelletti won the award.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: Of Alabama's 605 yards from scrimmage, Harris and Smith accounted for 420 of them. That's 69.4 percent of the offense, all of it keyed by Jones, of course.

The Quick Slant

WHAT HAPPENED: A record-breaking season for redshirt senior Kyle Trask and the No. 7-ranked Gators ended on a sour note Wednesday night, as the No. 6 Oklahoma Sooners took advantage of several Florida miscues and ran away with the Goodyear Cotton Bowl inside AT&T Stadium in Arlington, Texas.

Oklahoma opened the game with a 5-play, 79-yard touchdown drive punctuated by a 27-yard touchdown pass from Spencer Rattler to Marvin Mims. Two plays into the ensuing Florida drive, Trask threw an interception in the flat, which Tre Norwood returned 45 yards for a touchdown. The next two Florida drives ended with interceptions, and Oklahoma added a field goal on its second offensive possession to make it 17-0 just prior to the midway point of the opening quarter.

Florida fought back and pulled within four, thanks to a pair of takeaways from its defense. A forced fumble by sophomore linebacker Kris Bogle and recovery by junior defensive back Trey Dean III turned into the first of two field goals from junior kicker Evan McPherson. Following a defensive stop, Florida utilized both Trask and redshirt sophomore quarterback Emory Jones on a 16-play, 88-yard touchdown drive, which the latter finished with a 1-yard scoring run. After another forced fumble and recovery, the Gators made it 17-13 with McPherson's second field goal of the night.

The misfires ended there for the Oklahoma offense, as the Sooners scored touchdowns on five of their next seven drives and added a field goal on a six to take a 48-13 lead just after the 11-minute mark of the fourth quarter. Florida added a late touchdown on a 6-play, 89-yard touchdown drive engineered by true freshman quarterback Anthony Richardson.

WHAT IT MEANS: Florida finishes the season 8-4 overall, with losses in each of its last three games. Wednesday night marked the Gators' third straight New Year's Six Bowl appearance.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: Jones and true freshman quarterback Richardson both had some impressive moments. The former took over the offense in the third quarter, finishing with 146 total yards (86 passing, 60 rushing) and a rushing touchdown. Richardson came in late in the fourth quarter and racked up 42 rushing yards on three carries and threw a 27-yard touchdown pass to redshirt junior receiver Jordan Pouncey. The two are in line to battle for the 2021 starting job, unless Trask elects to return for another season, a decision he can certainly still make.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: 35 points – Oklahoma's margin of victory. Not only was it Florida's second-largest defeat in a bowl game (only behind a 62-24 loss to Nebraska in the 1996 Fiesta Bowl), the Cotton Bowl was just the fifth time in the last 30 seasons the Gators were beaten by more than 30 points.

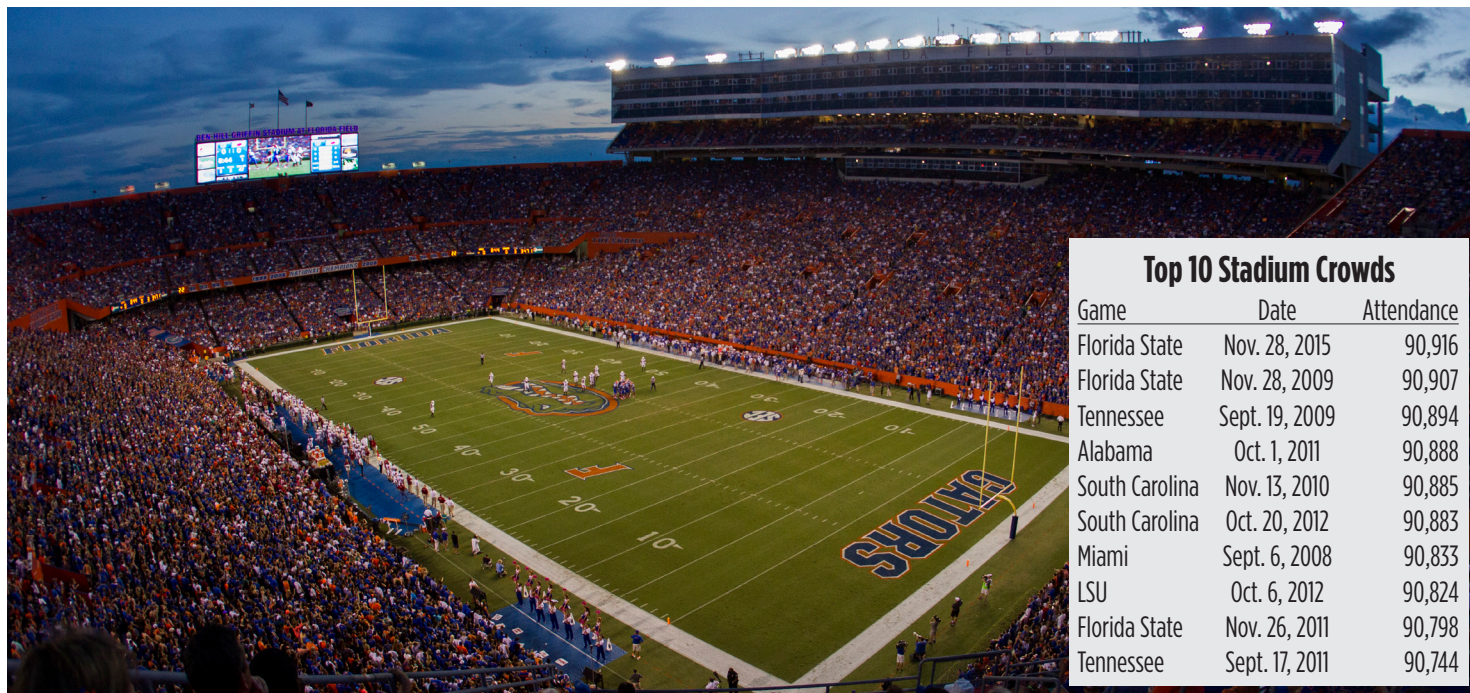

June 9, 1992. Once The Gainesville Sun hit newstands that Tuesday, Ben Hill Griffin Stadium's fitting nickname came to life.

Steve Spurrier, entering season three as Gators head coach, called writer Mike Bianchi the day prior and pitched him the storyline. It was seven months after the Gators ended the 1991 regular season with consecutive wins over Kentucky (which clinched an undefeated SEC record and the first league title in school history) and a thrilling 14-9 defeat of No. 3 Florida State, snapping a four-game losing streak to the Seminoles. It also gave UF a perfect 12-0 home record under Spurrier.

"The 'Swamp' is where Gators live," Spurrier told Bianchi. "We feel comfortable there, but we hope our opponents feel tentative. A swamp is hot and sticky and can be dangerous."

Initially, the UF athletic department didn't embrace the nickname. No posters, bumper stickers or marketing campaigns were put together right away. But Spurrier continued to use it. Then he and then-UF communications director Norm Carlson did some research. Turns out, in 1930, UF President John J. Tigert selected the location for the school's football stadium and described the area as a "swampy depression." The school hired engineers to drain the area and install pipes that funneled water down the hill along North-South Drive and dumped it into what is now known as Graham Pond.

Needless to say, the nickname caught on, and Spurrier delivered the perfect quote for the athletic department to utilize once it eventually did embrace the moniker: "The 'Swamp' is a place where only Gators get out alive."
