THE STORYLINE

- The 2023 opener marks the third-ever meeting between Florida and Utah, with the Gators holding a 2-0 series lead.
- UF and UU last faced off in the 2022 season opener, when unranked Florida upset No. 7 Utah, 29-26, behind 274 yards of total offense and three rushing touchdowns by QB Anthony Richardson and a game-sealing pick by LB Amari Burney.
 - » Florida matched its highest-ranked win ever in a season opener (Florida 59, No. 7 Houston 34 - Sept. 20, 1969).
 - » **HC Billy Napier** became the first Gators football coach to defeat a ranked team in his debut.
- Prior to last season, UF most recently played Utah on Nov. 19, 1977 in Gainesville, with Florida winning, 38-29.
 - » Florida's 531 rushing yards in the team's first meeting are the most all-time in a single game.
- Florida is 8-13 all-time in true road season openers including a 6-4 mark in the last 10 dating back to 1956.
- This is Florida's third true road game in a season opener in the last 38 years (1987 at Miami, 2020 at Ole Miss).
- The last time the Gators faced a ranked opponent on the road in a season opener was in 1987 at No. 10 Miami (L, 31-4).
- Florida last opened consecutive seasons against ranked opponents in 1953-54 against Rice in Houston (L, 20-16; L, 34-14).
- The Gators have never won ranked matchups in back-to-back season openers.
- Florida has lost just one season opener since 1990, going 30-1 in that span (2017: No. 11 Michigan 33, No. 17 Florida 17).
- Although UF opens on the road, Florida's 33-straight wins in home openers leads the NCAA (1989: Ole Miss 24, Florida 19).
- Napier embarks on his second season as a head coach, while Utah HC Kyle Whittingham enters his 19th campaign with 228 games under his belt. Whittingham replaced Urban Meyer in December 2004 when the latter left for Florida.
 - » Whittingham is the longest-tenured HC in the Pac-12 and the second-longest at the same school in the FBS.
- The Gators return four starters on offense, four starters on defense and two on special teams.
- Florida is coming off its fifth-straight bowl appearance and eighth in the last nine seasons.
- The Gators played seven opponents in 2022 that were ranked in the CFP Final Top 25 - tied for the most in the FBS - and now eye up the SEC's toughest schedule in 2023, according to CBS Sports.
- 31 different players made their Florida debuts last season, while 24 Gators made their collegiate debuts.
- The Gators' 5.5 yards per carry in 2022 ranked fourth in program history (behind the 2008, 1976 and 2009 seasons).
 - » Florida ended the season ranking sixth in the FBS and fifth in the P5 in YPC.
- Florida's 6.6 yards per play last season was the 10th-highest in school history.
- UF finished the 2022 campaign with 200.2 rushing yards per game - the program's second-straight season over 200.
 - » That output ranked 25th in the FBS, 15th in the Power Five and fifth in the SEC.
- Florida has scored in 436-consecutive games dating back to 1988 - an NCAA record and 55 games longer than any other college football team in the history of the sport.

Telephone interviews should be booked at least one day in advance and are typically limited to the times reserved for general interview sessions. The Communications Office will not give out phone numbers for any student-athletes, and student-athletes may not be contacted directly by phone, text, e-mail, or social media. Members of the media are not permitted in team areas. Team locker room, training room and strength complex are considered private areas. These areas, as well as student-athletes' housing (campus and off-campus) are off limits to media representatives.

ETIENNE + JOHNSON JR. LEAD DANGEROUS RUN ATTACK

- Florida scored its most rushing touchdowns in a season in 12 years in 2022, as the Gators' 29 were the program's fifth-most all-time (2008 - 42, 2007 - 39, 2010 - 31, 2009 - 30).
- In their first seasons as Gators, **RB Montrell Johnson Jr.** (155 carries, 841 yards, 5.4 YPC, 10 TD) and **RB Trevor Etienne** (118 carries, 718 yards, 6.1 YPC, 6 TD) teamed up to form one of the top backfield duos in the country.
- Florida averaged 5.5 YPC and 200.2 rushing YPG, posted eight 200-yard games and eclipsed 100 yards 12 times.
- As a duo, Johnson Jr. and Etienne averaged 5.7 YPC and 120.0 rushing YPG.
- The duo combined for a touchdown in all 12 regular season games, scoring 17 total TDs (rush TDs in 11 of 13 games).
- They were one of 15 RB duos in the FBS to rush for over 700 yards apiece last season, including one of three duos to do so while each averaging over 5.4 YPC.
- Johnson Jr. and Etienne combined for 47 of Florida's 76 explosive rushes (10-plus yards) last season (61.8%).
- Johnson Jr. is one of nine FBS players with 10-plus rushing TDs and 800 yards rushing each of the last two seasons.
- In 2022, Johnson Jr. became the first UF running back to rush for over 800 yards since La'Mical Perine in 2018.
- Johnson Jr.'s 10 rushing TDs last season ranked t-fourth in the SEC and t-24th in the Power Five.
- Etienne's '22 FBS ranks among true freshmen RBs: YPC (fourth - 6.1), TD (T10th - six), rush yards (eighth - 719).
- Etienne had a career-high 129 yards rushing and one TD in Week 13 vs. FSU, marking his second 100-yard rushing game in the final four weeks of the season.
- Johnson Jr. posted back-to-back 100-yard rushing games in Weeks 10-11, including a career-high 161 yards vs. South Carolina in Week 11. He was the first UF RB with consecutive 100-yard games since Jordan Scarlett in 2016.
- Johnson Jr. and Etienne became Florida's first pair of 100-yard rushers in 22 games (9/4/21 vs. FAU) in Week 11.
- Etienne's 85-yard TD rush in Week 11 was the seventh-longest TD rush in school history, and the longest by a UF player since Lamical Perine's 88-yard TD run vs. Auburn in 2019. It was also the second-longest TD run by a freshman in school history, and the tied for the 12th-longest TD rush in the FBS this season.
- Etienne ranked fourth in the FBS among true freshman running backs with 6.1 yards per carry and was one of nine true freshman RBs in the FBS with over 700 rushing yards.
- The trio of Johnson Jr. (841), Etienne (719) and QB Anthony Richardson (654) became the third trio in UF history to eclipse 600 rush yards apiece last year.
- The running back duo of Johnson Jr. and Etienne became the fifth pair of Florida running backs to eclipse 700 yards apiece in a season in 2022.
- Florida boasted three of the top-17 rushers in the SEC in yards per carry last season: Richardson (sixth - 6.3), Etienne (eighth - 6.1) and Johnson Jr. (17th - 5.4). Georgia was the only other team to do so.
- Florida was one of three FBS teams (Oregon, Georgia) with three qualified players averaging over 5.4 YPC.
- Over the last two seasons, 24 FBS RBs surpassed 800-plus yards and 12 RBs eclipsed 10-plus rushing TDs in consecutive years. Johnson Jr. is the only player on either list to accomplish the feats at two different schools.

GATORS RECEIVING NOTES

- 18 different players caught a pass for Florida last season - UF's most since having 21 players do so in 2018.
- Senior **WR Ricky Pearsall** paced UF with 661 receiving yards in 2022, which was the most by a Gator since Kadarius Toney's 984 in 2020.
- Pearsall finished fourth in the FBS with 20.0 yards per catch - the third-highest YPC in a season in program history.
- Pearsall is on the Maxwell Award Watch List for the nation's most outstanding player.
- Pearsall enters 2023 having recorded a reception in 28-consecutive games.
- Of Pearsall's 33 receptions in 2022, 27 went for first downs or touchdowns while 28 were for double-digit yards.
- Pearsall was one of six FBS players with 110-plus rushing yards and 650-plus receiving yards last year.
- Pearsall's 76-yard TD run vs. Eastern Washington was the longest rush by an FBS WR last season and ranks t-10th in the FBS across the last five seasons (third-longest run by a UF wide receiver in the last 25 years).
- Pearsall led UF with four catches for 65 yards in the 2022 Las Vegas Bowl - identical to his 2021 Vegas Bowl output.
- At FSU in Week 13, Pearsall set a career high with 148 yards receiving while his two TDs tied his best.
- Florida finished with two receivers in the top-seven in the FBS in yards per catch in 2022, as Pearsall ranked fourth (20.0) and Justin Shorter ranked seventh (19.9).
- Florida was the only team in the FBS with two qualified WRs averaging over 19.0 yards per catch.
- WR Caleb Douglas** made his first-career start vs. South Carolina in 2022, becoming the first true freshman to start at WR since Kadarius Toney (10/7/17 vs. LSU). Douglas led UF with three receptions and 53 yards.
- Douglas' 53 yards were the most by a UF WR in his first start since Josh Hammond's 72 vs. North Texas (9/17/16).

- In 2022, Florida averaged 420-plus total yards per game for the fifth-straight season.

NO MERTZ, NO SHOES, NO SERVICE

- Florida transfer **QB Graham Mertz** comes equipped with 34 career games played, having started all but one of Wisconsin's 33 games at quarterback to total over 2,000 snaps across the past three seasons from 20-22.
- The Badgers went 19-13 in Mertz's 32 starts at Wisconsin (.594).
- Mertz has completed 460 passes out of 773 career attempts (60.0%) for 5,405 yards and 38 touchdowns against 26 interceptions
- Ole Miss' Spencer Sanders (41) and LSU's Jaydon Daniels (43) are the only active SEC quarterbacks with more career starts than Mertz, who is tied for the third-most alongside Mississippi State's Will Rogers (32).
- Among active SEC signal callers, Mertz ranks seventh in attempts and completions while sitting eighth in yards and passing touchdowns.
- Mertz wields more career games, starts, completions, attempts, yards and touchdowns than six other SEC quarterback rooms: Georgia, Alabama, Tennessee, Texas A&M, Missouri and Vanderbilt.

BUILDING THE FOUNDATION

- Florida brought in a plethora of experience this past offseason, adding 13 players via the transfer portal.
- UF's group of 2023 transfers wields more than 10,000 combined snaps and 123 career starts, helping to fill vital voids at quarterback, offensive line, defensive end and inside linebacker.
- Over 70% of UF's scholarship players are in their first or second year at Florida.
- 93% of the 2023 roster was on campus for the offseason, featuring 27 midyear enrollees (17 HS, 10 transfer).
- Staff attrition was minimal during the 2022-23 offseason, as seven of Florida's 10 full-time assistants returned.
- Despite last year's 6-7 record, Florida outscored its opponents, 384 to 375, including 70-42 off turnovers.
- Florida lost six regular-season games in 2022 by a combined 61 points.

- Additionally, **Devin Moore** was named to the All-State AFCA Good Works Team Watch List in July.
- **RB Trevor Etienne**, **CB Jason Marshall Jr.** and **DE Princely Umanmielen** all represented Florida on the media's Preseason All-SEC Third Team.

SOLID OFFENSIVE LINE PLAY STANDS OUT

- The Gators' 17 sacks allowed in 2022 tied for the 27th-fewest in the Power Five and fourth in the SEC.
- Across the last two seasons (2021-22), Florida has out-sacked its opponents by a plus-29 margin, and the Gators' 31 sacks allowed are tied for the 14-fewest in the FBS (second in the SEC behind Georgia).
- **Austin Barber** ranked as the No. 22 tackle in the FBS in 2022.
- Florida added three experienced offensive lineman out of the transfer portal this offseason in **Micah Mazzucca** (Baylor), **Lyndell Hudson II** (FIU) and **Damieon George Jr.** (Alabama).

OFFENSIVE GRAB BAG

- Over the last five seasons, the Gators rank ninth in the Power Five with 449.9 scrimmage yards per game and 13th in the Power Five with 34.0 points per game, ranking third and fourth in the SEC, respectively.
- Since 2018, UF ranks eighth in the P5 in passing efficiency (152.4) and 12th in TD-INT ratio (2.87).
- Florida out-gained its opponents in 18 of 26 games dating back to last season .
- The Gators totaled 500-plus yards in three of the last 10 games and in 15 of their last 37 games.
- Florida has amassed 400-plus total yards in eight of 13 games this season, as well as 24 times in its last 36 games, and 37 of the last 55.
- UF rushed for over 200 yards 26 times in its last 64 games (41.3%) including 14 times since 2021 and eight in 2022.
- UF scored 30-plus points 39 times in 64 games since 2018 (60.9%), and 30-plus in 26 of the last 40 (65.0%).
- UF scored 40 points 20 times in the last 64 games and six times in 26 games the last two seasons.



LONG-TERM DEFENSIVE TRENDS

- Florida ranks second in the SEC and ninth nationally in sacks since 2018 with 179 - trailing only Clemson (234), Pittsburgh (230), Alabama (206), Miami (186), Ohio State (186), Penn State (182), Marshall (180) and Oklahoma State (180).
 - » Since 1996, UF sits 13th in the FBS with 853 sacks and rank second in the SEC behind Alabama at 878.
- UF has held opponents to a 54.0% passing completion percentage since 1996, which is the seventh-lowest in the FBS and third in the SEC.
- Since 1996, The Gators are fifth nationally in interceptions with 409 and lead the SEC, with the next closest team, Alabama, 17 picks behind.
 - » The Gators recorded an interception in six games last season - No. 7 Utah (1), No. 20 Kentucky (1), USF (2), Missouri (2), No. 1 Georgia (2) and Vanderbilt (1).
- UF's defense has produced 562 turnovers since 2000, leading the SEC and ranking eighth in the country.

DEFENSIVE YOUTH GAINING EXPERIENCE

- Outside of the veteran starters last year for the Gators - Amari Bunrey, Trey Dean III, Ventrell Miller and Rashad Torrence II - six underclassmen returners (second season or fewer) earned starts including five who notched their first career-start.
 - » Those six underclassmen combined for a total of 32 starts last year.
- A total of 10 players made their collegiate debuts in 2022 including Georgia transfer **CB Jalen Kimber**, who made his Gators debut and played in all 13 games.
 - » Kimber's 39-yard interception return TD vs. USF in the second quarter represented Florida's first pick-six since CJ Gardner-Johnson's 30-yard interception return TD against Michigan in the Chick-Fil-A Peach Bowl on Dec. 29, 2018. The pick-six marked Florida's 51st since 1996.
 - » Five players - **LB Shemar James**, **DL Chris McClellan**, **S Miguel Mitchell**, **DL Tyreek Sapp** and **S Kamari Wilson** - made their collegiate debuts in Week 1 vs. No. 7 Utah and appeared in every game.
 - » James started at LB in the season opener, becoming the first Gator true freshman to start a season opener since Marco Wilson vs. Michigan in 2017 and the first true freshman LB since David Reese II vs. South Carolina in 2016.
 - » James finished sixth on the team in tackles (47), t-fourth in sacks (2.0) and sixth in QB hurries (four) while starting four games and appearing in all 13.
 - » James became the 14th UF linebacker to be named to the Freshman All-SEC Team and the first since Antonio Morrison in 2012. It marked UF's eighth-straight year with a Freshman All-SEC player.
 - » Wilson earned his first-career start vs. Eastern Washington. The last true freshman to start for the Gators at safety was Trey Dean III in 2018 vs. Colorado State. Wilson started the final two games of the season at No. 16 FSU and vs. No. 14 Oregon State in the Las Vegas Bowl.
- Six of the 22 turnovers forced by the Gators came from underclassmen - Jalen Kimber (1), Shemar James (1), Jason Marshall Jr. (1), Miguel Mitchell (1), Desmond Watson (1) and Kamari Wilson (1).
- The duo of **CB Jason Marshall Jr.** and **DL Desmond Watson** combined for 23 starts last season.
 - » Marshall Jr. has played in all 26 games in two seasons with 20 starts all-time, which is the most starts by a defensive player on the roster.
 - » Marshall Jr. led the Gators in pass breakups with a career-high eight - tied for 10th in the SEC.
 - » Watson concluded 2022 with 10-straight starts beginning at No. 11 Tennessee.

FRESH FACES PROVIDE LIFT TO GATORS D

- Joining new defensive coordinator Austin Armstrong are seven defensive transfers this year: **DL Caleb Banks** (Louisville), **EDGE Quincy Ivory** (East LA CC), **DL Cam Jackson** (Memphis), **LB Teradja Mitchell** (Ohio State), **S R.J. Moten** (Michigan), **LB Mannie Nunnery** (Houston) and **Deuce Spurlock II** (Michigan).
- The new Gators bring in a combined 44 starts and over 4,170 snaps played compared to 30 defensive returners with 69 total starts and 8,792 snaps.
- Moten, whose dad played LB for UF from 1982-86, started 10 games in 2022 including the Big 10 Championship.
 - » He has 15 career starts and 1,033 snaps played, which is 10th-highest on the roster and third-most by a defensive player behind Jason Marshall Jr. (1,417) and Mannie Nunnery (1,259).
- Jackson also comes with double-digit career starts (13) on top of 34 games in three seasons at Memphis.
 - » He finished with 41 tackles last season, which would have ranked second among Gator defensive lineman last year behind only Gervon Dexter Sr., a second round pick by the Chicago Bears.
- Twelve rookie defenders also joined the program this season including four cornerbacks, three EDGEs, two defensive linemen, two safeties and one linebacker.
 - » Half of the first-year players were consensus four-star recruits and are all **HC Billy Napier's** recruits.
 - » Five played in the 2023 Under Armour All-American Bowl Game with **EDGE Kelby Collins** earning MVP honors.

TURNOVERS TRENDED IN 2022

- Florida tied for second in the SEC in takeaways (22) and ranked second in turnover margin (+8 / +0.62) last season after ranking 11th and 13th in those respective categories in 2021.
- The Gators produced at least one turnover in each regular-season game including seven with multiple.
 - » In 2021, UF finished the season with only 13 takeaways - the team's fewest in the last 25 seasons.
 - » The last time the Gators produced at least 22 turnovers in a season was in 2019 (23).
 - » Against South Carolina, Florida caused three-consecutive turnovers to start the second half, as USC only ran a total of four offensive plays - the non-turnover play was a zero-yard rush.
 - » The fumble forced on Florida State's opening drive marked the third game in which Florida caused a takeaway on the opponent's opening drive last year.
- Half of the takeaways in 2022 came in the second half with five coming in the fourth quarter.
- Florida opened the season with 12-straight games with a takeaway, marking the Gators' longest streak since having 15-straight games with a takeaway from Oct. 18, 2014 to Oct. 21, 2015 (last-seven games of 2014 + first-eight games of 2015).
- The 22 total takeaways resulted in 70 points for the Gators: nine touchdowns and two field goals.
 - » Seven of the turnovers caused marked career firsts for a group of Gators: **CB Jalen Kimber** (interception vs. USF), **S Miguel Mitchell** (forced fumble vs. Eastern Washington), **CB Jaydon Hill** (interception vs. Missouri), **DB Jadarrius Perkins** (interception vs. UGA), **DL Desmond Watson** (forced fumble vs. USC), **S Kamari Wilson** (forced fumble vs. USC) and **LB Shemar James** (forced fumble at FSU).
 - » Ten of the 22 takeaways were caused by Gators that are returning this season.
 - » The first turnover of the season by the defense was Amari Burney's game-winning interception vs. No. 7 Utah in the opener. Burney was a sixth round draft pick by the Las Vegas Raiders.
- Two returners, **CB Jaydon Hill** (two) and **EDGE Princely Umanmielen** (two), forced multiple takeaways in 2022 for the first time in their careers.

CLIMBING THE (J) HILL

- After missing all of the 2021 season the first four games of 2022 due to injury, **CB Jaydon Hill** started the final nine games for the Gators last year.
 - » Despite missing four games, Hill played 435 total snaps - the 10th most among defensive players, second-highest by a Gators CB, and third-most by a returning defensive player for UF.
 - » His debut vs. Eastern Washington marked 641 days since his last game (2020 Cotton Bowl vs Oklahoma).
- In his second start, he recorded two interceptions including a 49-yard interception return touchdown in the first quarter vs. Missouri.
 - » The first pick marked his first-career interception and first-career touchdown.
 - » His first interception also represented Florida's longest pick-six since Ventrell Miller's 82-yard interception return touchdown vs. Idaho on Nov. 17, 2018.
 - » Hill became the first Florida player with two interceptions and a pick-six in the same game since CJ Gardner-Johnson vs. Michigan in the Peach Bowl on Dec. 29, 2018.
- The second interception late in the third quarter set up a nine-play, 91-yard touchdown drive that put Florida ahead, 24-10, thanks to a nine-yard touchdown pass from Anthony Richardson to Ricky Pearsall early in the fourth quarter.
- Hill's performance vs. the Tigers also earned him his first-career SEC Defensive Player of the Week Honor.
 - » The last Gators DB to earn weekly conference honors was Shawn Davis in 2019 vs. Auburn.

SPECIAL TEAMS CHANGING THE GAME

- K Adam Mihalek's** three 50-yard field goals tied for the most in a season by a UF kicker (sixth to do so) last season (52 yards vs. No. 1 Georgia, 50 yards vs. No. 20 Kentucky, 50 yards at Texas A&M).
 - » His field goal vs. the Bulldogs was Florida's longest since Evan McPherson's 53-yarder on Oct. 10, 2020 vs. Texas A&M. The 52-yarder was tied for fifth-longest in the SEC in 2022.
 - » Mihalek was one of nine FBS kickers with three-or-more 50-yarders last year.
- P Jeremy Crawshaw** averaged 47.94 yards per punt in 35 attempts last season featuring 13 kicks of 50-plus and a season-long of 67 yards vs. South Carolina.
 - » Against LSU, he totaled 112 yards with a long of 62 as both were placed inside the opposing-20 and 50-plus yards, including one that was muffed and recovered by **LS Rocco Underwood** to set up a TD.
 - » In the Las Vegas Bowl, he hit a career-high of four 50-plus-yard punts for an average of 56.5.
 - » Crawshaw has 89 career punts for an average of 45.7 per attempt with 34 going 50-plus yards.
- RB Trevor Etienne** returned three kicks for an average of 33.0 yards vs. LSU including a long return of 47 yards on the game's opening kick.
 - » The return was the Gators' longest since Kadarius Toney's 51 yards vs. Georgia on Oct. 27, 2018.

- The 2023 season-opener features a matchup of two offenses that both averaged 420-plus total yards and 200-plus rushing yards per game last season.
- Florida and Utah boasted top-30 offensive lines in the country in 2022 in terms of fewest sacks allowed. Florida allowed just 17 while Utah surrendered 15.
- The Gators were among the best punting teams in the SEC last year, ranking first with a 43.39 net punt average. Utah ranked near the bottom of the Pac-12 at 39.08.

CROSSING PATHS

- Utah's WR Daidren Zipperer is the younger brother of Gators **TE Keon Zipperer**, who is unavailable due to injury. The Lakeland, Fla. duo competed at Lakeland Senior HS, although Keon graduated one year before Daidren started high school. Daidren is currently a freshman at Utah while Keon is entering his fifth season in Orange & Blue.
- The origin of Florida's legendary 2006 Jump Pass vs. LSU in fact stems from a previous game when head coach Urban Meyer was coaching for Utah in 2003. In a 2003 game between Meyer's Utes and Air Force, Meyer had tight end Ben Moa take a directional snap and proceed with a one-yard pass -- a play that led to a successful two-point conversion and an eventual 45-43 win against Air Force. So when Meyer had Tim Tebow as a freshman, he figured with Tebow's athleticism, he could run a similar play behind center but actually jump.
- While the Gators have zero players on their roster from the state of Utah, the Utes have seven players from the state of Florida: safety Briton Allen, running back Chris Curry, cornerback Elijah Davis, running back Jaylon Glover, running back Mike Mitchell, wide receiver Mycah Pittman and wide receiver Daidren Zipperer.

Second Season

Billy Napier enters his second season with the Gators after being named the 29th head coach in program history on Nov. 28, 2021.

During his first year at Florida, Napier established a new culture that emphasizes teamwork, toughness and discipline, setting a sturdy foundation for the future of Florida Football.

It didn't take long for Florida's culture shift to become evident. The Gators finished the 2022 regular season ranked fourth in the SEC in total penalty yards (584) and penalty yards per game (48.7), and eighth in total penalties (78). Napier's emphasis in playing disciplined football translated into a distinctive improvement from the 2021 season when the Gators ranked 13th in the conference with 104 penalties.

The turnover battle was another area where the Gators saw improvement in 2022. Florida finished ranked tied for eighth in the nation in turnover margin (8), giving up the football only 14 times while producing 22 takeaways during the regular season. The Gators outscored their opponents 70-42 points off turnovers during the 2022 campaign.

Florida's rushing attack took the nation by storm during Napier's first year at the helm. The Gators finished the 2022 regular season as the third-most productive rushing offense in the nation and best in the conference in yards per carry (5.84). Florida ran the ball for an average of 213.7 yards per game in 2022, which ranked 16th in the FBS and third in the SEC.

At the forefront of the Florida's mighty ground offense was the running back duo formed by freshman Trevor Etienne and Louisiana transfer Montrell Johnson Jr, who averaged 5.7 yards per carry and 120.0 rushing yards per game, while combining for a touchdown in all 12 regular season games and scoring 17 total touchdowns. They were one of only 15 running backs duos in the FBS to rush for over 700 yards apiece in 2022.

Johnson Jr. finished the 2022 campaign ranked tied-for-fourth in the SEC in rushing touch-

downs (10) and became the first UF running back to rush for over 800 yards since La'Mical Perine in 2018. Meanwhile, Etienne ranked fourth in yards per carry (6.1), tied for 10th in touchdowns (six) and eighth in rushing yards (719) in the FBS among true freshmen.

The efficiency by Florida's running offense reflected an offensive line that allowed only 13 sacks in the regular season, ranking tied for second-fewest in the SEC and 16th in the FBS.

The offensive line was anchored by Louisiana transfer O'Cyrus Torrence, who finished as the top-rated guard in the nation at 88.0, according to Pro Football Focus.

Torrence became first Gators offensive guard to be named a Consensus All-American, and the fifth lineman in Florida history. He was named a First Team All-American by Sporting News, Associated Press, American Football Coaches Association and Walter Camp, and to the second team by the Football Writers Association of America. He was also named to the AP All-SEC First Team.

Torrence, who Napier recruited out of high school to play at UL, never allowed a QB hit or sack in 3,065 career snaps, including zero QB hurries or penalties in 698 snaps and 11 games started with the Gators in 2022.

Napier played a key role in the development of Anthony Richardson into the one of the hottest quarterbacks in college football. Richardson, who was ultimately drafted fourth overall in the 2023 NFL Draft, finished the 2022 season ranked fifth in the FBS among qualified quarterbacks in yards per carry (6.3) and was the only quarterback with two 400-yard games and two 100-yard rushing games in the season. Additionally, he was one of only five FBS players with over 2,500 passing yards and 650 rushing yards in 2022.

On the opposite side of the ball, the Gators continued their long-term defensive trends under Napier.

The Gators rank fifth nationally in interceptions with 409 and lead the SEC since 1996, while holding opponents to a 54.0 passing completion percentage, which is the seventh-lowest in the FBS and third in the SEC in that that span.

The Gators recorded an interception in six games during Napier's first season, the first of which secured a victory against No. 7 Utah—Napier's first game as Florida's head coach, to make him the only Florida head coach to defeat a ranked opponent in his first game.

Napier's emphasis on a new culture also became evident in the classroom. The Gators set a new Southeastern Conference record with 62 UF football players placing in the 2022 SEC Fall Academic Honor Roll. The team also set a squad record with a 3.30 team GPA for the 2023 Spring semester.

In spite of a 6-7 record during Napier's first season at the helm, UF outscored its opponents 29.5-to-28.8 points per game and a total of 384 to 375. Florida lost their six regular-season games by a total of only 61 combined points. Five of those games were lost by 10 points or less and three by only one score.

During his first season as Florida's head coach, Napier delivered a total 10 Gators to the NFL via the NFL Draft and free agency. Drafted were QB Anthony Richardson (Rnd. 1, Pick 4, Indianapolis), DT Gervon Dexter (Rnd. 2, Pick 22, Chicago), OL O'Cyrus Torrence (Rnd. 2, Pick 28, Buffalo), LB Ventrell Miller (Rnd. 4, Pick 19, Jacksonville), WR Justin Shorter (Rnd. 5, Pick 15, Buffalo) and LB





Amari Burney (Rnd. 6, Pick 26, Las Vegas). The six picks were tied for fourth highest by a school that year and tied third in the SEC. Additionally, four other Gators were tabbed as undrafted free agents.

Louisiana (2018-21)

Napier spent four seasons at Louisiana and finished with a record of 40-12, a perfect 16-0 mark against members of the Sun Belt West Division, four consecutive West Division titles, four straight bowl appearances, a share of the Sun Belt title in 2020 and 2021 Sun Belt Conference Champions.

A two-time Sun Belt Conference Coach of the Year (2019 & 2021), Napier took the Ragin' Cajuns to unprecedented heights when the team broke into the national rankings in 2020 for the first time in the modern era. The team finished the campaign ranked No. 15 in the AP Top-25, No. 16 in the USA Today/Amway Coaches Poll and No. 19 in the College Football Playoff, Louisiana's highest rankings in all three polls.

In 2021, he led the program to their first conference championship title since 2005 and only the second time in program history. Napier concluded his final season with a 12-1 record, the most single-season wins in school history after setting it with 11 in his second year. The 12 straight wins also set the program record for consecutive victories, as the previous record was eight in 1976.

Napier led Louisiana to its fourth straight Sun Belt Conference Championship game with a 24-16 victory over Appalachian State to finish with a career record of 28-7 against conference opponents. Louisiana became the first team in conference history to make all four conference championship games.

Napier's Louisiana team produced two 2022 NFL Draft picks in safety Percy Butler and tackle Max Mitchell, who were both drafted in the fourth round by the Washington Commanders and the New York Jets, respectively.

The 2020 Louisiana Sports Writer Association Coach of the Year, Napier navigated Louisiana through a season heavily impacted by COVID-19 and claimed a share of the Sun Belt Conference Championship, its third-straight West Division title and its second-straight bowl victory, a 31-24 win over UTSA in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl. The Ragin' Cajuns also advanced to its third consecutive Sun Belt Championship game, but was canceled due to COVID-19.

Napier's team broke into the national rankings for the first time in the modern era following its week one upset at No. 23 Iowa State, marking the first win over a ranked opponent on the road and only the second time in program history. He concluded non-conference matchups at Louisiana with a record of 13-5, as three of the losses came against ranked opponents - No.1 Alabama, No. 16 Mississippi State and No. 19 Texas.

Both the offense and defense continued to flourish in 2020 under Napier's watch. Offensively, the team ranked 29th nationally in scoring offense (33.6) and 43rd nationally in total offense (421.5), while the defense ranked 31st in scoring defense (22.0) and 33rd in total defense (355.4).

Napier coached Louisiana to 14 Sun Belt All-Conference selections, led by First Team selections Elijah Mitchell and Chris Smith. Mitchell wrapped up his stellar career ranking fifth in career scoring (276), fifth in career rushing touchdowns (41) and sixth in career rushing yards (3,267) before being drafted in the sixth round by the San Francisco 49ers.

Smith additionally earned First Team All-America honors from CBSSports/247Sports, Pro Football Focus and Second Team All-America honors from the FWAA, marking the second consecutive season that a Ragin' Cajun earned All-America honors under Napier.

In just the second season (2019) under Napier, the program set the all-time single season victories (11) at the time and second-straight trip to the Sun Belt Championship Game after clinching the league's West Division title with a 53-3 victory over Troy. The 11 victories also marked the first double-digit win season in program history and the first of three consecutive 10-plus win years by Napier. He was voted the program's first Sun Belt Coach of the Year, becoming the third Louisiana coach to earn the distinction of top coach and the first since 1993 in their respective conference.

Napier coached three 2020 NFL Draft picks in Raymond Calais (RB), Kevin Dotson (G) and Robert Hunt (G), tying the program record for draft selections in a year. Hunt became the third-highest pick in team history as he was selected 39th overall by the Miami Dolphins. A First Team All-American selection by the Associated Press, USA Today, Sports Illustrated, Pro Football Focus and a Second Team All-American by Sporting News, Dotson was drafted in the fourth round by the Pittsburgh Steelers. Calais was tabbed by the reigning Super Bowl Champions, Tampa Bay Buccaneers in the seventh round.

In Napier's first season at the helm, the Ragin' Cajuns (7-7, 5-3) won the 2018 Sun Belt Conference West Division Championship, advancing to the inaugural conference championship game. Louisiana accepted an invitation to the AutoNation Cure Bowl, its first bowl trip since 2016.

Arizona State (2017)

Prior to his stint at Louisiana, Napier was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Arizona State in 2017.

Napier guided the Sun Devils' offense to the 14th highest-graded offense in the FBS according to Pro Football Focus - including the 10th highest-graded passing attack in the nation. ASU was ranked 54th in the nation in total offense last season and 86th in the passing game the season prior. The offensive turnaround (+40 positions) was the eighth-largest in the FBS and ASU was one of just three programs to move from outside the Top-50 to inside of it in just one season. The 76-spot swing in the passing game rankings was the third highest in all of the FBS..

ASU developed one of the elite red zone scoring teams in the nation under Napier, tied for first nationally in converting on 95.83 percent of its red zone appearances (46-of-48) with the only two "blemishes" against the Sun Devils coming when the team took a knee late in the fourth quarter. ASU was 11th nationally in red zone touchdown scoring rate with 36 touchdowns on those 48 attempts (75.00).

Ball security was another notable facet of Napier's offense. The Sun Devils turned the ball over just 11 times in 2017, which ranked 12th nationally after finishing 82nd in the country a year ago with 21 turnovers.

Alabama (2011, 2013-16)

Napier's first experience in the SEC came at Alabama in 2011 and he later returned to Crimson Tide from 2013-17 as the wide receivers coach.

He was instrumental in helping Nick Saban and Alabama achieve a 63-7 record in five seasons (2011, 2013-2016), two National Championships (2011 & 2015) and was part of the great run of 26 consecutive wins from 2015-2016. In 70 games at Alabama, the Crimson Tide offense averaged 6.27 yards per play and 36.4 points per game. Napier coached three first round draft picks in Amari Cooper, Jerry Jeudy, Amari Cooper and Calvin Ridley while in Tuscaloosa.

In 2016, Napier's wide receiver corps were led by junior ArDarius Stewart, a third-round pick by the New York Jets in 2017 and Ridley. Stewart snagged in a team-leading eight touchdowns and 864 yards while Ridley totaled a team-high 72 receptions. Napier also helped develop wide outs Gehrig Dieter (Kansas City) and Cam Sims (Washington), both who were NFL free agent signees.



After recruiting Ridley to sign with the Crimson Tide, Napier coached him to a freshman-record and team-leading 89 catches for 1,045 yards and seven touchdowns in 2015 along with being named a USA Today Freshman All-American.

Napier played a vital role in Cooper's historical campaign in the 2014 season. He became Alabama's first Biletnikoff Award winner and caught a school- and SEC-record 124 passes for a UA-record 1,727 receiving yards and 16 touchdowns. Cooper led the country in receptions (124), was second nationally in receiving yards (1,727), receiving touchdowns (16) and catches per game (8.9) while ranking third in yards per game (123.4). A Heisman Trophy finalist and unanimous first team All-American, Cooper smashed all of the Tide's career receiving marks with 228 receptions, 3,463 yards and tied the SEC record with 31 receiving touchdowns.

In his first season as the Crimson Tide's receivers coach in 2013, Napier built a deep and talented group of wide outs. Alabama had four players with at least 32 receptions, led by Cooper's 45 catches for 736 yards.

The 2011 season marked the first year for Napier on the Alabama staff as he served as an offensive analyst, helping the Crimson Tide win the 2011 BCS national championship. The Tide ranked 16th in scoring offense, 30th in total offense and 17th in rushing offense in 2011.

Colorado State (2012)

After a year at Alabama, Napier served as the assistant head coach and quarterbacks coach at Colorado State in 2012 for former Florida head coach Jim McElwain.

Injuries forced Napier to go deep down the bench looking for quarterbacks during his one season in Fort Collins. The Rams saw three quarterbacks play significant snaps as the starter with Garrett Grayson going down early in the season and M.J. McPeck followed two weeks later, forcing redshirt freshman Conner Smith into action. The trio combined to throw for 2,520 yards and 17 touchdowns in 2012 as Colorado State won three of its final five games.

Clemson (2003-04, 2006-10)

Before his first stretch at Alabama, Napier spent seven years in two different stints at Clemson. During Napier's final two seasons at Clemson he was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.

At the age of 29, he became the youngest coordinator in the nation and in Clemson history. In his first season as Clemson's coordinator, the 2009 Tigers scored a school-record 436 points and collected 54 touchdowns (third-most in school history), averaged 5.73 yards per play (fourth best) and finished as the ACC Atlantic Division champions. Quarterback Kyle Parker was named a Freshman All-American and nine players Napier coached from 2009-10 went on to have careers in the NFL.

He also served as Clemson's recruiting coordinator from 2006-08. In those three seasons, he compiled two top-25 recruiting classes, according to Rivals.com, and in 2008, his class was tabbed as the second-best in the nation by ESPN.com. Known to his peers as a top recruiter, Napier signed several players who went on to the NFL, including Kavell Conner, Crezdon Butler, Brandon Thompson and Marcus Gilchrist.

Napier was the 2007-08 tight ends coach at Clemson, helping lead the Tigers to two bowl games and a prolific offense.

The 2007 season featured a 9-4 record and the ACC's highest-scoring offense. In his first year back with Clemson (2006), Napier worked primarily with the Tigers' tight ends but also was responsible for the punt team and assisted in several special-teams capacities. The 2006 Tigers led the ACC in total offense, rushing and scoring offense, advancing to the Music City Bowl.

Clemson averaged 410.9 yards per game and 32.7 points, more than doubling its opponent's totals. Tight end Hunter Thomas started all 11 games for the Tigers, averaging 19.1 yards per reception. Michael Palmer, who Napier coached for three seasons, went on to the NFL. He also worked with the special teams units, helping develop the 2009 ACC Player of the Year and a unanimous All-American, C.J. Spiller.

He began his coaching career as an offensive graduate assistant at Clemson in 2003-04. The Tigers won nine games, including the Peach Bowl against Tennessee. The following season, Napier was a graduate assistant on defense, and gained his first experience with recruiting off the field.

Background

As a player, Napier was a four-year letterwinner and two-time All-Southern Conference selection as the starting quarterback at Furman. The Paladins won two conference championships and in 2001, Napier's junior year, advanced to the Division I-AA national championship game, losing to Montana.

He completed 64.8-percent of his career passes, setting a school record. As the team captain during a record-setting senior season, Napier amassed 2,475 passing yards, also a Furman record, and was a finalist for the Walter Payton Award, given annually to the nation's most outstanding FCS offensive player.

Napier grew up in Chatsworth, Georgia, and graduated from Murray County High School in 1998. He is married to the former Ali Gunn and the couple has a daughter, Annie, and sons, Sammy and Charlie. He earned his Bachelor's degree in health & exercise science from Furman in 2002.

Second Season

Rob Sale enters his second season with the Gators as Florida's offensive coordinator and offensive line coach.

Sale joined the Gators prior to the 2022 season after serving as the New York Giants' offensive line coach in 2021.

During his first year as Florida's offensive coordinator and offensive line coach, Sale directed a powerful run offense. The Gators finished the 2022 regular season as the third-most productive offense in the nation and best in the conference in yards per carry (5.84). Florida ran the ball for an average of 213.7 yards per game in 2022, which ranked 16th in the FBS and third in the SEC.

The efficiency by Florida's running offense reflected an offensive line mentored directly by Sale, co-offensive line coach Darnell Stapleton that allowed only 13 sacks in the regular season, ranking tied for second-fewest in the SEC and 16th in the FBS.

The offensive line was anchored by Louisiana transfer O'Cyrus Torrence, who finished as the top-rated guard in the nation at 88.0, according to Pro Football Focus.

Torrence became first Gators offensive guard to be named a Consensus All-American, and the fifth lineman in Florida history. He was named a First Team All-American by Sporting News, Associated Press, American Football Coaches Association and Walter Camp, and to the second team by the Football Writers Association of America. He was also named to the AP All-SEC First Team.

Torrence, who Sale and Head Coach Billy Napier recruited out of high school to play at UL, never allowed a QB hit or sack in 3,065 career snaps, including zero QB hurries or penalties in 698 snaps and 11 games started with the Gators in 2022.

In addition to Torrence finishing as PFF's No. 1-rated guard in college football during the 2022 season, Austin Barber ranked as the No. 22 tackle in the FBS and was placed on the College Football News Freshman All-America First Team.

Sale's offensive line unit delivered two NFL products via the 2023 NFL Draft and free agency during his first year at Florida. Torrence was drafted by Buffalo in the second round, while tackle Richard Guraige was signed by the Bills as an undrafted free agent.

In total, Florida's offense produced four NFL players during Sale's first season as UF's coordinator.

A 15-year collegiate coaching veteran, Sale spent three seasons at Louisiana (2018-20) as the Ragin' Cajuns offensive coordinator and offensive line coach under Napier.

Sale's unit produced three NFL Draft picks out of Louisiana, including Robert Hunt and Kevin Dotson in 2020, and Max Mitchell in 2022.

In 2020, the Ragin' Cajuns offense ranked third in the Sun Belt Conference in points per game (33.6), fifth in yards per game (421.5), third in yards per play (6.3) and fourth in rushing yards per game (213.0).

In 2019, Sale's offense set numerous school records, including total yards (6,918), touchdowns (69), rushing yards (3,604), rushing touchdowns (42) and passing touchdowns (27).

In his first season coaching the Louisiana offense, three players rushed for more than 700 yards each. Trey Ragas logged 1,149 yards and nine touchdowns, Elijah Mitchell led the Sun Belt with 16 touchdowns and ran for 985 yards of his own, while Raymond Calais tallied 754 yards and seven scores.

Prior to Louisiana, Sale was the offensive line coach/running game coordinator at Arizona State in 2017, when the Sun Devils averaged 31.9 points, 427.6 total yards and 179.9 rushing yards a game.

In 2016, Sale served as the offensive line coach at the University of Louisiana Monroe. That season, the Warhawks ranked third in the Sun Belt with 181.3 rushing yards per game and allowed just 19 sacks.

Prior to ULM, Sale was the offensive line coach at Georgia in 2015, when the Bulldogs averaged 375

yards a game. The offensive line — led by All-SEC first-team offensive tackle John Theus — helped the team rush for more than 190 rushing yards per game.

Sale spent three seasons at McNeese State serving as the offensive line coach for the Cowboys from 2012-13 before being elevated to co-offensive coordinator in 2014. In his final season, the Cowboys offense averaged 32.4 points, 396.5 total yards and 221.9 rushing yards a game.

From 2007-11, Sale gained his first college coaching experience as a strength and conditioning assistant and offensive analyst at Alabama. He began his coaching career as the offensive line coach at Catholic High of Pointe Coupee in New Roads, La. in 2006.

Sale played in 35 games with 25 starts, including 13 at right guard as a senior in 2002, at LSU. As a junior, he started at both center and guard when the Tigers won the SEC title. During his sophomore season, he started the final five games of the regular season and the Peach Bowl at left guard.

Sale is a native of Monroe, La. He and his wife Amanda have two sons, Tripp and Briggs.

First Season

Austin Armstrong enters his first season with the Gators after being hired as Florida's defensive coordinator prior to the 2023 season.

Prior to Florida, Armstrong spent two seasons as the defensive coordinator and inside linebackers coach at Southern Miss. During his first season in 2021, Armstrong was the youngest defensive coordinator in the FBS.

The Southern Miss defense, known as the Nasty Bunch during Armstrong's tenure, ranked sixth in the Sun Belt in scoring defense (23.5 ppg), a mark that ranked 45th nationally in 2022. The Golden Eagles were third nationally in tackles for loss per game (8.3), fifth in sacks (3.38) and seventh in interceptions (17). USM was also third in fourth down conversion defense (.231).

During his first year as the Southern Miss defensive coordinator, USM ranked No. 42 nationally in total defense (385.5), besting their mark by 18 spots from the season before. His defense also ranked in the top 10 in the country in first downs allowed (No. 2), fumbles recovered (No. 4), red zone defense (No. 6) and defensive touchdowns (No. 7) while finishing at No. 15 in turnovers gained and No. 24 in passing yards allowed.

The Golden Eagles held their opponents to under 100 yards rushing in seven games (out of 24 games) during Armstrong's tenure and registered the program's first shutout since 2017 in a 37-0 win over Grambling in 2021.

Seven USM defenders earned All-Sun Belt recognition in 2022 with linebacker Shantrell Latham and defensive back Malik Shorts named to the first-team and defensive back Jay Stanley garnering third-team recognition while defensive lineman Jalen Williams, linebacker Daylen Gill, linebacker Averie Habas and defensive back Natrone Brooks earned honorable mention honors. Four of his defensive players earned honorable mention All-Conference USA in 2021, including defensive lineman Josh Carr, linebackers Santrell Latham and Hayes Maples, and defensive back Malik Shorts.

Armstrong spent the 2020 campaign as the inside linebackers coach at Louisiana, where the Ragin' Cajuns were nationally ranked and the defense held three top-five national rankings through the end of the regular season, including No. 2 in passes intercepted (15), No. 3 in defensive passing efficiency (96.27) and No. 4 in passing yards allowed per game (166.9), in addition to ranking No. 31 in total defense (347.8).

Armstrong returned to Lafayette after spending the 2019 season at Georgia where he worked as a defensive quality control coach, assisting coach Kirby Smart's squad as they climbed as high as No. 3 in the national rankings. The Bulldogs finished the 2019 season with a 12-2 record and a win in the Allstate Sugar Bowl in New Orleans.

Armstrong also served as a defensive graduate assistant coach with the Ragin' Cajuns for the 2017 and 2018 seasons. Louisiana claimed its first of back-to-back Sun Belt Conference West Division championships in 2018, played in the

Sun Belt's inaugural football championship game and earned a berth in the AutoNation Cure Bowl in Orlando, Fla.

Prior to his first stint in Lafayette, Armstrong was an assistant defensive line coach at West Georgia (Div. II) for the 2016 season. He earned his bachelor's degree from Huntingdon College in Montgomery, Ala., in 2014, after playing linebacker for the Hawks for four seasons.

Armstrong is married to the former Tiffany Taylor.

Second Season

Sean Spencer enters his second season as Florida's co-defensive coordinator and defensive line coach.

During his first year at Florida, Spencer coached and mentored defensive tackle Gervon Dexter Sr., a second-round selection in the 2023 NFL Draft.

Dexter, who started in every game for the Gators in 2022, finished season with 55 tackles, 4 TFLs, four quarterback hurries, 2 sacks, 1 interception, and a pass breakup.

Also under Spencer's mentorship, junior Princely Umanmielen led the team in sacks (4.5), TFLs (9.5) and ranked second in quarterback hurries (5). Umanmielen made jump in his third season with the Gators, improving his tackles-for-loss by 8.0 and sacks by 3.0 along with 22 more tackles.

Umanmielen concluded his first season under Spencer ranked tied-for-16th in tackles-for-loss in the SEC and seventh TFL yards with 60.

Another significant contributor to Florida's defense out of Spencer's room was Tyreek Sapp, who finished the season with 20 total tackles, 0.5 tackles for loss and two quarterback hurries.

Meanwhile, freshman Chris McClellan produced a promising first year under Spencer. He recorded 23 tackles and 2.5 sacks. His 23 tackles ranked the third-most in the team among first-year players.

Spencer's unit contributed to a Florida defense that produced 22 takeaways during the 2022 season, ranking tied for first in the SEC. Those takeaways factored into a turnover margin (8) that ranked eighth in the nation.

The Gators continued their long-term defensive trends in 2022. Florida ranks fifth nationally in interceptions with 409 and lead the SEC since 1996, while holding opponents to a 54.0 passing completion percentage, which is the seventh-lowest in the FBS and third in the SEC in that that span.

A veteran of more than 20 years at the collegiate and professional levels, Spencer joined the Gators after spending two seasons (2020-21) as the New York Giants defensive line coach.

Spencer made an immediate impact to the Giants defense during his first season in 2020. That year,

the defensive front registered 40 sacks, the most sacks since the 2014 season when they tallied 47.

Under Spencer's guidance, the line helped the defense rank 12th in the NFL, allowing 349.3 yards per game in 2020. It was their best defensive finish since 2016, when they were 10th in the league by allowing 339.7 yards per game. The Giants' rushing defense ranked 10th, allowing 111.4 yards per game, also their best figures since 2016 when they were tied for third at 88.6 rushing yards per game.

Prior to the Giants, Spencer spent six seasons (2014-19) at Penn State, where he was also associate head coach and run game coordinator his final two years (2018-19).

The Nittany Lions' line was traditionally one of the best in the nation under Spencer. In 2019, Penn State had 45 sacks, the seventh-highest total in the country and third-highest in the Big Ten. It was Penn State's fifth consecutive season with at least 40 sacks, the first such streak for the Nittany Lions since team sacks were recorded in 1988.

That season, Spencer's linemen were also significant contributors to Penn State's run defense, which finished first in the nation by allowing only 2.6 yards per carry. The Nittany Lions also finished fifth in the country and first in the conference in yards per game with 95.0 in 2019.

In 2015 and 2018, Penn State led the nation in sacks, first with 50 and then with 47. Additionally, the Nittany Lions ranked fourth in the country with 8.2 tackles for loss a game in 2018. That year, the defense was a frequent fixture in the opposition's backfield, leading the country in sacks (3.62) for the second time in four years and ranking fourth in tackles for loss (8.2).

In 2017, the line helped the defense finish in the top 25 in FBS in scoring defense (7th; 16.5), sacks (7th; 3.23), rushing defense (14th; 118.0), total defense (17th; 329.5), takeaways (23rd; 25) and tackles for loss (25th; 7.2).

The line played a pivotal role in Penn State's Big Ten Championship run in 2016, when the defense finished seventh in FBS in tackles for loss (8.1) and 19th in sacks (2.86).

In 2015, the defensive line not only paced a unit that led the FBS in sacks (3.54 a game) but was sixth in tackles for loss (8.2) and 14th in total defense (324.5).

Spencer led a unit that in 2014 helped Penn State finish third in the FBS rushing defense (100.5) and second in total defense (278.7).

Prior to Penn State, Spence spent three seasons (2011-13) at Vanderbilt. During his tenure, the defensive lines helped the Commodores finish in the top 25 in the nation in total defense all three years. Vanderbilt recorded 28, 31 and 28 sacks under Spencer, with the defensive line posting 42.5 tackles for loss in 2013.

Spencer coached the Bowling Green defensive line in 2009-10 and had two stints at Massachusetts, also coaching the defensive front in 2001-03 and in 2007-08. He also has coached at Hofstra (2006), Villanova (2005), Holy Cross (2004), Trinity College (1998-2000), Shippensburg (1996-97) and Wesleyan (1995).

Spencer was a three-year starter at safety at Clarion (Pa.) University where he earned a bachelor's degree in political science in 1995.

Spencer is a native of Hartford, Conn. He and his wife Allyson have a daughter, Alysia.

Jabbar Juluke enters his second season with the Gators as Florida's associate head coach – offense / running backs coach.

During his first year leading Florida's running backs room, the Gators finished the regular season as the third-most productive rushing offense in the nation and best in the conference in yards per carry (5.84). Florida ran the ball for an average of 213.7 yards per game in 2022, which ranked 16th in the FBS and third in the SEC.

At the forefront of the Florida's mighty ground offense was the running back duo formed by freshman Trevor Etienne and Louisiana transfer Montrell Johnson Jr, who averaged 5.7 yards per carry and 120.0 rushing yards per game, while combining for a touchdown in all 12 regular season games and scoring 17 total touchdowns. They were one of only 15 running back duos in the FBS to rush for over 700 yards apiece in 2022.

Johnson Jr., who Juluke recruited out of high school to play at UL, finished the 2022 campaign ranked tied-for-fourth in the SEC in rushing touchdowns (10) and became the first UF running back to rush for over 800 yards since La'Mical Perine in 2018. Meanwhile, Etienne ranked fourth in yards per carry (6.1), tied for 10th in touchdowns (six) and eighth in rushing yards (719) in the FBS among true freshmen.

Prior to Florida, Juluke spent the four previous years (2018-21) on Head Coach Billy Napier's staff at Louisiana, which included four straight Sun Belt West Division titles, a share of the Sun Belt title in 2020 and 2021 Sun Belt Conference Championship.

Juluke coached two running backs that were drafted in back-to-back years (2020-21). Eli Mitchel by the San Francisco 49ers and Raymond Calais by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Mitchel was named First Team All-Sun Belt in 2020 and led Louisiana in rushing, with 141 carries for 878 yards and eight touchdowns. His yardage total was third in the league and 23rd nationally, while his eight rushing scores were the fifth

most in the Sun Belt and tied for 41st nationally. Mitchel finished his career ranked fifth in career rushing touchdowns (41) and sixth in career rushing yards (3,267) and set the program record for most rushing yards in a bowl game after tallying 127 yards and a touchdown in the 2020 SERVPRO First Responder Bowl.

The 2019 FootballScoop Running Backs Coach of the Year, Juluke led the Ragin' Cajuns to its best rushing season in program history in 2019, setting school records in total rushing yards (3,604) and rushing touchdowns (42). Louisiana finished the season ranked third nationally in yards per rush (6.28), rushing touchdowns (42) and sixth in total rushing yards.

Prior to a season at Texas Tech (2017), he was the running backs coach at LSU in 2016. Juluke tutored one of the nations top running backs in Leonard Fournette who was the No. 5 overall selection in the 2017 NFL Draft. He also worked with Derrius Guice that season, pushing the sophomore to 1,428 yards and 11 touchdowns while being named to the All-SEC First Team with Fournette.

He began his collegiate coaching career at Louisiana Tech, where he spent two seasons (2014-15) as the running backs coach. Juluke helped the Bulldogs win the Conference USA West Division title in 2014. He also heavily involved in recurring efforts and helped land three 2017 NFL Draft picks in wide receivers Carlos Henderson (Denver Broncos), Trent Tylor (San Francisco 49ers) and safety Xavier Woods (Dallas Cowboys).

Juluke arrived at Louisiana Tech following nine years as the head coach at Edna Karr High School in New Orleans. Juluke was regarded as one of Louisiana's top high school coaches during that time as he compiled an 80-39 record that was capped by a perfect 14-0 mark and a Class 4A state title in 2012.

Juluke guided Edna Karr to seven district titles and two state runner-up finishes during his tenure. He boasted a 49-8 record over his final four

seasons alone which featured three appearances in the state championship game. Most impressively, Juluke helped over 70 of his players earn college football scholarships during his head coaching career.

Prior to his stint at Edna Karr, Juluke served as the defensive back coach and special teams coordinator at O.P. Walker High school for one season (2002). Juluke coached linebackers at St. Augustine High School in 2000 and 2001 after serving as the wide receivers coach for Brother Martin High School in 1999.

Juluke began his coaching career as the defensive coordinator for Frederick Douglas High School from 1996-98.

As a player, Juluke helped guide Southern University to an 11-1 record and a Black National Championship in 1993. In addition to his time as a standout safety for the Jaguars, Juluke also lettered one season with the men's basketball program during the 1994-95 campaign. He earned his bachelor's degree in sociology from Southern in 1999.

Juluke is a native of New Orleans. He and his wife, Denise, are parents to three children – Jahmad, Jamari and Dyrius Smith.

efficiency three years in a row from 2017-19.

The Tigers allowed only 11 passing touchdowns in 2017 and nine in 2016.

In 2014, LSU's secondary led the SEC in total defense, pass defense and pass efficiency defense. LSU allowed an SEC-best 10 passing touchdowns that year.

The Tigers limited opponents to 15 touchdown passes and ranked second in the league in yards allowed per attempt and third in the conference in completion percentage at 56.0 percent in 2013.

As a unit in 2012, Raymond's first year back with the Tigers, LSU's secondary combined for 15 interceptions and helped the Tigers rank No. 11 nationally in pass efficiency defense.

Raymond coached 16 Tigers who were picked in the NFL Draft, including four first rounders. Additionally, his unit at LSU produced seven first team All-Americans during his time at LSU, and a Jim Thorpe Award winner in Grant Delpit in 2019.

Raymond spent 2011 season as the secondary coach at Nebraska. In his one season with the Cornhuskers, Raymond coached a Nebraska secondary that featured the 2011 Big Ten Defensive Back of the Year in Alfonzo Dennard. Raymond's secondary helped Nebraska rank No. 18 in the nation in pass defense in 2011.

Prior to Nebraska, Raymond served as the cornerbacks coach for two seasons at Utah State. Raymond coached Curtis Marsh, who earned All-WAC honors and later went on to become a third-round pick in the NFL Draft.

Raymond served on the LSU staff for three years from 2006-08 before taking the job at Utah State.

During his three years on the LSU staff from 2006-08,

Raymond was part of two BCS bowl victories, including a 38-24 win over Ohio State in the BCS National Championship. LSU's defense ranked No. 3 nationally in both 2006 and 2007 as the Tigers combined to post a 23-4 record during that span.

Prior to joining the LSU staff in 2006, Raymond coached at the high school level for three years in his hometown of New Iberia. Raymond was the defensive coordinator at New Iberia High School in 2003 and then held the same position at Westgate High School in 2004-05.

Raymond was a three-year starter in the secondary for the Tigers from 1989-91. He capped his LSU career with 185 tackles and eight interceptions. Following his career with the Tigers, Raymond spent six seasons in the NFL — three with the New York Giants and three with the Detroit Lions. In 90 games in the NFL, Raymond started 60 times and intercepted 11 passes to go with 258 tackles.

Raymond, who earned his undergraduate degree from LSU in 1993, is a native of New Iberia, La. He has four children — Cody, Ariel, Christopher and Madison.

Corey Raymond enters his second season with Florida as assistant head coach — defense / secondary.

During his first season with the Gators, Raymond's unit contributed heavily to a Florida defense that produced 22 takeaways during the season, ranking tied for first in the SEC. Those takeaways factored into a turnover margin (8) that ranked eighth in the nation.

Raymond's room accounted for six of nine interceptions in the season with cornerback Jaydon Hill tying the team high with two.

After missing the 2021 season due to an injury and the beginning of the 2022 campaign, Hill started the final nine games for the Gators during Raymond's first year at Florida. In his second start against Missouri, he recorded two interceptions that included a 49-yard interception return touchdown, becoming the first Florida player with two interceptions and a pick-six in the same game since CJ Gardner-Johnson vs. Michigan in the Peach Bowl on Dec. 29, 2018. His performance vs. the Tigers also earned him his first-career SEC Defensive Player of the Week Honor.

In addition to his two interceptions Hill finished the 2022 campaign with 24 total tackles, 0.5 tackles for loss two pass breakups and two fumble recoveries.

Florida's younger cornerbacks also logged a promising campaign under Raymond's guidance.

Georgia transfer Jalen Kimber kicked off his UF career with an electrifying 39-yard interception return touchdown against USF, representing Florida's first pick-six since CJ Gardner-Johnson's 30-yard interception return touchdown against in the Chick-Fil-A Peach Bowl in 2018.

Jason Marshall Jr., who started all 13 games in 2022, led the Gators in pass breakups with a career-high of eight, which was tied for 10th in the SEC.

The Gators continued their long-term defensive trends in 2022. Florida ranks fifth nationally in interceptions with 409 and lead the SEC since 1996, while holding opponents to a 54.0 passing completion percentage, which is the seventh-lowest in the FBS and third in the SEC in that that span.

Corey Raymond, who played six years in the NFL, spent 10 seasons at LSU where he coached defensive backs (2012-17) and cornerbacks (2018-21) prior to Florida.

LSU's secondary under Raymond's guidance was consistently among the best in the SEC, most recently leading the conference in interceptions in 2019 and ranking second in 2020. LSU also ranked second in the SEC in pass defense

Jay Bateman enters his second season with the Gators, coaching the inside linebackers.

During his first year at Florida, Bateman delivered two NFL Draft picks, including Ventrell Miller who was picked in the fourth round by the Jacksonville Jaguars, along with Amari Burney who was selected by Las Vegas in the sixth round.

Burney had a breakout season in his final campaign with the Gators, contributing in a multitude of ways. The St. Petersburg, Fla. native ranked tied for first on the team in interceptions (two), second in sacks (4.0) and tackles for loss (9.0), tied for second in forced fumbles (two), tied for second in pass breakups (4) and fourth in tackles (79). Burney's 79 tackles ranked tied for 18th in the SEC, while his 9.0 tackles for loss ranked tied for 20th.

Burney was one of five FBS linebackers with at least 4.0 sacks, two INTs and two forced fumbles. He was also one of three SEC defenders to have forced four-plus turnovers in 2022.

Burney's signature play of 2022 happened during the first game season, however. He sealed a 29-26 season-opening victory over No. 7 Utah with his third-career interception, which came in the endzone with 0:17 remaining in the fourth quarter. The victory marked UF's highest-ranked victory in a season opener in program history.

Meanwhile Miller, one of the most vocal leaders on team during the 2022 campaign, finished his last season as a Gator with the fifth-most tackles in the team (71). His 71 tackles ranked tied for 26th in the conference.

Bateman's unit contributed to a Florida defense that produced 22 takeaways during the 2022 season, ranking tied for first in the SEC. Those takeaways factored into a turnover margin (8) that ranked eighth in the nation.

The Gators continued their long-term defensive trends in 2022. Florida ranks fifth nationally in interceptions with 409 and lead the SEC since 1996, while

holding opponents to a 54.0 passing completion percentage, which is the seventh-lowest in the FBS and third in the SEC in that that span.

A 25-year coaching veteran, Bateman arrived in Gainesville after spending three seasons as North Carolina's co-defensive coordinator and safeties coach (2019-21).

Upon his arrival in Carolina in 2019, Bateman helped engineer major improvements in the Tar Heel defense, which was one of the nation's top five most improved units in total defense, scoring defense and rushing defense that year.

Bateman's aggressive style was evident in the 36 sacks the team produced in 2020, the most for a Carolina defense since 2000 and tied for fifth nationally. The scoring defense, total defense and rushing defense all ranked in the Top 35 nationally of teams that played at least 10 games that season. The unit produced a first-team All-America in linebacker Chazz Surratt.

During his time with the Tar Heels, Bateman helped develop two NFL Draft picks, including Surratt who was picked in the third round by the Minnesota Vikings in 2021, along with Jason Strowbridge who was selected in the fifth round by the Miami Dolphins in 2020.

Prior to UNC, Bateman spent five seasons (2014-18) as Army's defensive coordinator.

Army won 29 games during Bateman's tenure, including three bowl games during his last three seasons, which included two Top-10 finishes in total defense. Bateman was one of five finalists for the 2018 Broyles Award and a semifinalist in 2016.

In 2018, Bateman led Army's defense to finish eighth nationally in total defense (295.5 ypg) and 10th in scoring defense (17.7 ppg).

The Black Knights finished third in the nation in red zone defense and 14th in passing defense in 2017.

In 2016, Bateman guided a defense that ranked fourth nationally in total defense (291.5 ypg), sixth in passing defense (170.2 ypg) and 18th in rushing

defense (121.2 ypg). The Army defensive unit also ranked 16th in scoring defense, allowing 19 points per game, while increasing its interception total from six in 2015 to 17 in 2016.

Prior to Army, Bateman spent three seasons as the defensive coordinator at Ball State (2011-13). His 2013 defensive unit ranked ninth nationally in turnovers gained with 31 and 12th in turnover margin at +0.9.

Bateman's defensive unit at Ball State produced an NFL Draft selection in Jonathan Newsome, who was selected in the fifth round by the Indianapolis Colts in 2015.

Bateman spent five seasons as the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Elon (2006-10) prior to Ball State. At Elon, Bateman coached Chad Nkang who was drafted by the Jacksonville Jaguars in 2007

He also made stops at Lehigh (2005) and Richmond (2004). Bateman gained head-coaching experience at Siena College. He led the program from 2000-03 after spending one season as an assistant coach on staff.

Bateman began his coaching career in 1997, spending two years on staff at Hampden-Sydney. Bateman is a 1995 graduate of Randolph-Macon.

Bateman is a native of Richmond, Va. He and his wife Heather have two children, Bea and CJ.

WIDE RECEIVERS

Tenth Season (first with Napier)



Billy Gonzales, who coaches the wide receivers, enters his 10th season with the Gators after returning to Florida in 2023 for a third.

He spent the 2022 season at Florida Atlantic as their wide receivers coach after spending four seasons in the same role for the Gators from 2018-21. In 2020, despite UF losing three receivers to the NFL Draft, the position group continued to shine under Gonzales. Florida receivers combined to catch 189 passes for 2,716 yards and 28 touchdowns.

In the passing attack, Florida's 46 touchdown passes led the nation by four. Florida was the only FBS team featuring six players with at least three receiving touchdowns and was one of four FBS teams featuring six players with more than 20 receptions and 225 receiving yards. The Gators were also one of eight FBS teams featuring seven players with multiple touchdown receptions.

In 2019, Gonzales' mentorship played a crucial role in allowing Florida to reach its second consecutive New Year's Six bowl. The Gators made a name for themselves as one of the best-receiving teams in UF history, recording 33 passing TD's over the course of the season – the most since 2008. Florida's pass offense averaged 300.8 yards per game, ranking 16th nationally.

Florida was the only FBS team featuring eight pass catchers with 20-plus receptions, 250-plus yards, and a touchdown. Nine different players also finished with 150-plus receiving yards, something no Gators team has achieved since at least 1990. Additionally, seven Gators had multiple touchdown receptions for the first time since 2007.

Overall, ten Gators had at least one touchdown catch during the season, and 11 Gators had one in 2018 -- marking the first time since 2000 and 2001 that 10 different Gators caught a touchdown in consecutive seasons.

Florida amassed 425-plus total yards six times in 2018, tying the 2009 Gators for the most games of over 425 yards in a season since 2008 (eight times). The Gators finished with 350-plus total yards 10 times in 2018, which tied the 2007 and 2009 Gators for the second-most times UF did that in a season since the start of 2005. Billy Gonzales is the only person to coach on all four of those staffs.

Over his five seasons at Mississippi State, the Bulldogs recorded 18 100-yard receiving games, including a

school-record seven in 2015. Five times in his tenure, MSU posted multiple 100-yard receiving games in the same game, something that had only been done five times in MSU history prior to his arrival.

Gonzales arrived in Starkville following a one-year stint as co-offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach at Illinois.

Prior to coaching the Fighting Illini, Gonzales served as the passing game coordinator and wide receivers coach at LSU. During his time in Baton Rouge, Gonzales helped the Tigers to the 2012 BCS National Championship game and the 2011 SEC Championship.

Prior to his stint at LSU, Gonzales coached under Urban Meyer at Florida. During his time as wide receivers coach, the Gators' high-octane offense translated to two BCS national championships in 2006 and 2008.

During that span, Gonzales and Florida produced seven All-SEC wide receivers.

During his two seasons (2003-04) at Utah as wide receivers coach and co-special teams coordinator, Gonzales saw the Utes to a 22-2 record and two bowl wins, including a 35-7 thrashing of Pittsburgh in the 2005 Fiesta Bowl. The Utes' offense averaged 499.8 yards and 45.3 points per game, each ranking third in the country in their respective categories. Under Gonzales' watch, three Utah receivers were first-team All-Mountain West.

Gonzales was at Bowling Green for the 2001-02 seasons, serving as wide receivers coach and co-recruiting coordinator.

Prior to a full-time coaching job with the Golden Flashers, Gonzales spent two years as a graduate assistant at the school from 1995-96. He earned his master's degree from Kent State in sports administration.

Gonzales broke into the coaching profession in 1994 at MacMurray (Ill.) as wide receivers coach. A four-year letterwinner at Colorado State including two years as starting wide receiver, Gonzales helped the Rams to a 9-4 record during the 1990 season and a win over Oregon in the Freedom Bowl. Gonzales and his wife, Julie, have two children, Cole and Caylynn.

Russ Callaway enters his second season with the Gators and his first as Florida's tight ends' coach.

An experienced coach at the collegiate and NFL levels, Callaway's resume includes stints with the New York Giants, LSU, Alabama and Samford.

Callaway joined the Gators after spending the 2021 season with the New York Giants, serving as an offensive assistant, and the 2020 season as a senior offensive assistant and analyst at LSU.

He spent five seasons at Samford where he served as the Bulldogs' offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach from 2016-19, while also coaching the wide receivers from 2015-17.

As a unit in 2018, Samford's offense led the FCS in passing yards per game (392.7). The offense also ranked fourth in the FCS in total offense (515.9 ypg.), and eighth in both red zone offense (.898) and in first downs (298). Meanwhile in 2017, the Bulldogs' offense led the SoCon and ranked fifth in the FCS in passing yards per game (33.4 ypg.).

In 2016, Callaway's offense ranked third among all FCS schools in passing offense, averaging 349.4 passing yards per game. The offense also ranked sixth in the FCS in red zone offense (90.2%), 11th in team passing effi-

ciency (155.24), 12th in scoring offense (35.1 ppg.) and 14th in total offense (446.2 ypg.).

During his time with Samford, Callaway mentored quarterback Devlin Hodges, who earned the Walter Payton Award for the top offensive player in all of FCS football in 2018. Hodges passed for an FCS-record 14,584, breaking the old record set by Steve McNair.

Prior to Samford, Callaway spent two seasons on staff at Murray State, where he worked with the wide receivers, while also serving as the recruiting coordinator.

Callaway joined the Racers after winning back-to-back BCS National Championships as a defensive analyst on Nick Saban's staff at Alabama. In his role at UA, Callaway assisted defensive coordinator Kirby Smart with the inside linebackers.

Callaway played collegiately as a quarterback at Valdosta State, where he was a two-time team captain. He joined the Blazers in 2007, helping the team to the school's second National Championship.

Callaway graduated from VSU in 2010 with a degree in business management.

Callaway and his wife, Taylor, and have one daughter, Maris Faye Callaway, and one son, Samuel Ingram Callaway.

Callaway is the son of veteran coach Neil Callaway.

EDGE

Second Season

Mike Peterson enters his second season with the Gators as an assistant coach, coaching the edge position.

During his first year at Florida, Peterson mentored sophomore Antwaun Powell-Ryland Jr., who started the last five games of the season and recorded 23 total tackles with 5.5 TFL, 3.0 sacks, two forced fumbles, one quarterback hurry and one pass breakup.

Powell-Ryland Jr. was one of only seven SEC defenders to have forced three fumbles in the season, which ranked tied for first in the league. He became the first Gator to force three fumbles in a season since Jonathan Greenard in 2019. He was also one of three SEC linebackers to force three-plus fumbles and finish with 6.0 or more tackles for loss.

In 2022, Peterson also coached Brenton Cox Jr., who led the team in tackles through the first seven games of the season and ranked third in the SEC and fifth in the nation in tackles for loss. Cox Jr. was signed as an undrafted free agent by the Green Bay Packers in 2023.

Prior to Florida, Peterson spent the six seasons (2016-21) at South Carolina as an outside linebackers / defensive ends coach.

During his time with the Gamecocks, Peterson developed two NFL Draft picks in Kingsley Enagbare (fifth round, 2022) and D.J. Wonnum (fourth round, 2020).

In 2020, he coached Enagbare to a first-team All-SEC selection and the conference leader in sacks and forced fumbles.

While under Peterson's tutelage, Wonnum wrapped up his Gamecock career ranked ninth with 29.5 tackles for loss. He was a second-team All-SEC selection in 2019.

Peterson is credited with the development of Bryson Allen-Williams, who logged 10 tackles for loss in 2018 despite playing in just nine games, and finished his career 10th on the school's all-time list with 27.5 tackles for loss.

In 2017, Peterson was instrumental in the development of Wonnum, who ranked tied for seventh in the SEC in tackles for loss with 13.0, while leading the team with 6.0 sacks.

With Peterson's mentoring, Darius English turned in his finest season in South Carolina in 2016, garnering 9.0 sacks to move him into both the single-season and career (15.0) sacks top-10 lists in school history while earning second-team All-SEC accolades.

A member of the Florida 1996 National Championship team, he played linebacker for Steve Spurrier from 1995-98. His senior year, he served as a team captain and earned First-Team All-SEC and All-America honors. Peterson was inducted into the University of Florida Athletic Hall of Fame in 2011.

He was selected in the second-round (36th pick overall) in the 1999 NFL Draft by the Indianapolis Colts. Peterson earned second-team All-Pro honors in 2005 and finished his career with 883 tackles, 21.5 sacks and 19 interceptions in 196 career games. A graduate of Santa Fe High School, he played 14 years in the NFL with the Colts (1999-02), Jacksonville Jaguars (2003-08) and Atlanta Falcons (2009-12).

After retiring from the NFL, he returned to Florida in 2013 where he finished his degree while working as undergraduate assistant coach on the strength and conditioning staff. Upon graduation, he was named to a full-time position as a strength and condition coordinator.

Peterson and his wife established the Mike Peterson Foundation in 2004. The foundation was constituted in an attempt to support and benefit under-served youth and socio-economically challenged families in Peterson's hometown of Alachua and his NFL cities of Jacksonville and Atlanta.

Since its inception, the Mike Peterson Foundation has already served over 50,000 youth and families through several community events and programs, most notably the Top Dog Readers Club literacy program at the Grove Park Elementary School in Atlanta.

A Gainesville native, Peterson attended Santa Fe High School in Alachua.

Peterson and his wife, Chantal, have two sons; Mike Jr. and Gavin.

Peterson is the older brother of former Chicago Bears running back Adrian Peterson.

DARNELL STAPLETON

OFFENSIVE LINE

Second Season

Darnell Stapleton enters his second season as Florida's offensive line coach.

During his first year as Florida's offensive line coach, Stapleton worked alongside offensive coordinator and offensive line coach Rob Sale and contributed heavily toward a powerful run offense.

The Gators finished the 2022 regular season as the third-most productive offense in the nation and best in the conference in yards per carry (5.84). Florida ran the ball for an average of 213.7 yards per game in 2022, which ranked 16th in the FBS and third in the SEC.

The efficiency by Florida's running offense reflected an offensive line mentored directly by Stapleton and Sale that allowed only 13 sacks in the regular season, ranking tied for second-fewest in the SEC and 16th in the FBS.

The offensive line was anchored by Louisiana transfer O'Cyrus Torrence, who finished as the top-rated guard in the nation at 88.0, according to Pro Football Focus.

Torrence became first Gators offensive guard to be named a Consensus All-American, and the fifth lineman in Florida history. He was named a First Team All-American by Sporting News, Associated Press, American Football Coaches Association and Walter Camp, and to the second team by the Football Writers Association of America. He was also named to the AP All-SEC First Team.

Torrence never allowed a QB hit or sack in 3,065 career snaps, including zero QB hurries or penalties in 698 snaps and 11 games started with the Gators in 2022.

In addition to Torrence finishing as PFF's No. 1-rated guard in college football during the 2022 season, Austin Barber ranked as the No. 22 tackle in the FBS and was placed on the College Football News Freshman All-America First Team.

Stapleton's offensive line unit delivered two NFL

products via the 2023 NFL Draft and free agency during his first year at Florida. Torrence was drafted by Buffalo in the second round, while tackle Richard Gouraige was signed by the Bills as an undrafted free agent.

Stapleton joined the Gators staff after spending the 2021 the season with Napier at Louisiana, where he helped the Ragin' Cajuns to a Sun Belt Conference championship.

Stapleton's unit blocked for 2021 Sun Belt Conference Championship Game MVP Levi Lewis, who compiled 2,646 yards of passing, the second-best in the league, threw the third-most touchdowns in the conference (19) and ranked fifth with 203.5 passing yards per game through 13 games.

On the ground, Louisiana's offensive line helped the Ragin' Cajuns to 31 rushing touchdowns and 2,496 rushing yards, ranking 14th and 24th respectively in the nation, while placing second and third in the conference in 13 games.

Prior to Louisiana, Stapleton spent four seasons at Sam Houston State, where he was the offensive line coach and the run game coordinator from 2017-20. In 2019, the Bearkat offensive line produced a pair of All-Southland Conference selections in first teamer Colby Thomas and third teamer Tyler Edwards, who help running back Donovan Williams finish second in the Southland in rushing with 925 yards and 14 touchdowns.

From 2014-17, he served at the offensive line coach at Bucknell University.

In 2016, Stapleton coached Julián Davenport, who captured First Team All-America honors from the Associated Press, American Football Coaches Association, Walter Camp Foundation and STATS. Also a four-time All-Patriot League selection, Davenport became Bucknell's first NFL Draft pick since 1969 when he was taken in the fourth round by the Houston Texans.

The offensive line coach at Pace University for six months prior to joining the Bucknell staff, Stapleton completed two years as a graduate assistant at Rutgers, working closely with an offensive line that ranked in the top 10 nationally in fewest sacks allowed in 2012. The Scarlet Knights went

to two bowl games during Stapleton's tenure, which also included a Big East title.

Stapleton joined the Rutgers program in 2005 after two playing years at Hudson Valley Community College. He started all 25 games at center during his two years at Rutgers, earning recognition as a finalist for the Rimington Trophy as a senior. Stapleton anchored an offensive line that blocked for future NFL Pro Bowl running back Ray Rice.

Stapleton graduated from Rutgers in 2007 with a degree in business and labor relations.

Stapleton was a member of the Pittsburgh Steelers from 2007 to 2010 and was on the squad that won Super Bowl XLIII at the conclusion of the 2008 campaign. He started 18 games on the offensive line during his time in Pittsburgh, including the Super Bowl. Overall, he played in 26 career games with the Steelers.

Stapleton's coaching career started in 2011 with the New York Sharks, a women's professional football team. He followed that stint with one season coaching both the offensive and defensive lines at Montclair Kimberly Academy. The squad posted a 9-2 mark, surpassing the program record for wins by three.

Stapleton has coached three NFL Draft selections in O'Cyrus Torrence (2023, Florida), Max Mitchell (2022, Louisiana) and Julien Davenport (2017, Bucknell).

Stapleton is a native of Union Township, NJ.

Mark Hocke enters his second season as Florida's Associate Head Coach/Director of Football Strength and Conditioning.

Prior to Florida Hocke (Pronounced: "Hockey") spent all four seasons (2018-21) at Louisiana with Napier, which included four straight Sun Belt West Division titles, a share of the Sun Belt title in 2020 and 2021 Sun Belt Conference Champions.

Prior to Louisiana, Hocke spent the 2017 season at Texas A&M where he served as the Football Strength and Conditioning.

Prior to Texas A&M, Hocke spent one season as the co-associate head football strength and conditioning coach at Florida State where he served under head football coach Jimbo Fisher and strength coach Vic Voloria. The Seminoles won the final five games of the 2016 season on their way to a 10-3 record that included a 33-32 win over Michigan in the Orange Bowl.

He also served as the head strength and conditioning coach at the University of Georgia in 2015, where he directed a 15-person staff that trained a pair of All-SEC honorees in offensive lineman as the Bulldogs finished the year with a 10-3 record, which included a win over Penn State in the Gator Bowl.

STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING ASSISTANT

Alex Watkins enters his second season with the Gators after being named as a strength and conditioning assistant ahead of the 2022 season. Watkins spent two seasons (2020-21) at Mississippi State as a strength and conditioning coach after serving as the assistant director of athletic performance for football at UAB in 2019. Watkins was the head of strength and conditioning for football at Texas Southern from 2016-18 and the head of the department for Stillman College from 2014-16. Watkins played defensive line for the University of Alabama from 2007-11 and was part of two National Championship teams in 2009 and 2011. Following his collegiate career, he signed as a free agent with the Tennessee Titans in 2012 and also the Calgary Stampeders of the Canadian Football League (CFL) a year later.

WHAT HAPPENED: Senior linebacker Amari Burney's diving interception of red-hot Cameron Rising's pass into the end zone with just 17 seconds remaining preserved a pulsating victory for the host Gators over the seventh-ranked Utes in what was a classic of a 2022 season opener Saturday night at Spurrier/Florida Field. The game marked the debut of Coach Billy Napier, who became the first coach in UF history to knock off a ranked opponent in his first game with the Gators. It wasn't easy, but against the defending Pac-12 champion Utes it wasn't supposed to be, either. Florida had to come from behind four times and had the will, firepower and weapon to do it behind sophomore quarterback Anthony Richardson. The 6-foot-4, 235-pound Richardson lived up to his preseason Heisman Trophy hype by passing for 168 yards and rushing for 106 and a career-best three touchdowns, including the go-ahead score with 1:25 to go that capped a clutch and poised drive of 14 plays and 75 yards over 4:57. He gave the Gators their three-point margin, but still left plenty of time for Rising, a junior and veteran, to give his team a chance. And he did. Rising (216 yards and 1 TD passing, 115 yards and 1 TD rushing) moved the Utes from their 25, with the big play his 29-yard run to the UF 19 on third-and-7. Three plays later, Rising faced a second-and-goal from the 6 and looked to force a low throw into traffic. Burney was part of that traffic and took a nose dive to cradle the ball, secure the victory and send the "Swamp" into hysterics. Richardson scored on runs of 2, 45 and the game-winning 2 yards. The Gators also got 76 yards and a touchdown from tailback Montrell Johnson, the sophomore who came to UF with Napier from the University of Louisiana. Johnson more than made up for an opening-drive fumble (his team's only turnover of the night) that set up a Utah touchdown and early 7-0 lead. From there, the game became a back-and-forth affair with seven lead changes. Both teams finished with well over 400 yards of total offense, with Utah getting 115 yards and a score from tailback Tavion Thomas and nine catches for 105 yards and a score from tight end Brant Kuithe. Of Florida's 451 total yards, 283 came on the ground, while the Gators converted seven of 13 third downs and scored touchdowns on all three red zone possessions.

WHAT IT MEANS: Napier went 40-12 and won the 2021 Sun Belt Conference championship at Louisiana. He inherited a team that went 6-7 last season, but now has expectations after beating a ranked opponent in an opener for only the third time program history and for the first time since 1982. Meanwhile, the Gators extended their FBS-record streak of season-opening home wins to 33, but it's who they beat that made the feat all the more impressive and almost certainly will vault UF into next week's Associated Press Top 25 just in time for another big-time challenge that will have bigger-picture ramifications in the Southeastern Conference.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: The 2022 Gators were always going to be about Richardson and nothing occurred Saturday night to think otherwise. He had some fabulous moments (without a turnover, no less) and will have plenty more, as the UF coaching staff continues to open things up for him and let him play.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: The highest-ranked team Florida had ever defeated in an opener was No. 7 in Houston back in 1969 (the first year of Reaves-to-Alvarez). Openers over the last 30-plus years had been against overmatched directional schools. As for a showdown like this one, basically 53 years in the making, ask the largest opening-day crowd (90,799) in Florida history of it was worth the wait.

UP NEXT: The Gators (1-0) will ride this high into next week's start to the SEC schedule when Eastern Division foe and 20th-ranked Kentucky (1-0), which handled Miami-Ohio 37-13 in its opener, rolls into town. The Wildcats, under Coach Mark Stoops, return a boatload of players from the program's second 10-win team over the last four seasons, which happen to be UK's only double-digit victory campaigns of the last 44 years. Kentucky has beaten UF two of the last four meetings, including last year's 20-13 win at Lexington, after losing 31 straight in the series from 1987-2017. The 1-2 start to the Florida season very likely is the most difficult first two games for any team in FBS classification.

WHAT HAPPENED: Cornerback Keidron Smith returned an Anthony Richardson third-quarter interception 65 yards for the go-ahead score and Matt Ruffolo kicked a 26-yard game-sealing field goal with 1:25 to play, as the 20th-ranked Wildcats manhandled the 12th-ranked Gators on both sides of the ball in the second half on the way to their victory Saturday night in the Southeastern Conference opener for both teams at Spurrier/Florida Field. UK quarterback Will Levis passed for 202 yards and accounted for a touchdown each rushing and passing. Tailback Kavosiey Smoke had 14 carries for 80 yards and wide receiver Dane Key caught three passes for 83 yards and a score, including a 55-yarder in the first half. Richardson, the hero in last week's upset of seventh-ranked Utah, struggled all night against the UK defense, finishing with just 14 completions on 35 attempts for 143 yards, no touchdowns and two interceptions. The Wildcats also bottled up Richardson's threat to run, limiting him to just four yards on six carries. They dared "AR" to beat them and he had no answers, as the Gators finished with only 279 yards of total offense, just 91 after halftime, and went 4-for-16 on third. The Gators had a 16-7 first-half lead, thanks to a couple of Adam Mihalek field goals, a Trevor Etienne touchdown run and two-point conversion catch, plus a safety on a bad snap on a UK punt attempt. The Wildcats, though, cut the margin to 16-13 at the half after turning a Richardson interception into a 2-yard TD run by Levis. UK tied the game on a short field goal from Ruffolo in the third quarter, then took the lead on Smith's interception with 3:25 to play in the period. After the pick-6, the Gators had three possessions to make up for the miscue and tie the game, but those three possessions ended with a punt and back-to-back surrenders on downs.

WHAT IT MEANS: It's tough to start the conference season with a defeat, and it's even worse against a division opponent. After that record run of 31 straight losses in the series, the Wildcats have defeated the Gators three of the last five. Didn't take long for the euphoria of that season-opening upset of the Utes last week to give way to reality, what with Kentucky a near-unanimous preseason pick to finish second in the SEC East. The Gators (and their QB) have lots of work to do.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: Levis ran away with his QB duel against Richardson, but it was the Kentucky defense, which repeatedly thwarted and confused Richardson, that decided the game.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: Kentucky has now beaten Florida in back-to-back seasons for the first time since 1976-77. That would be 45 years. On the other sideline, Kentucky coach Mark Stoops won his 61st game with the Wildcats, breaking the previous program record held by the legendary Paul "Bear" Bryant.

UP NEXT: The Gators (1-1, 0-1) will step out of league play with a third straight home game, this one against South Florida (1-1, 0-0), as part of the two-for-one home-and-home-and-home series arrangement (UF played at USF in '21). The Bulls, from the American Athletic Conference, opened their season by getting blasted at home, 50-21, by No. 25 Brigham Young, but handled FCS opponent Howard 42-20 Saturday night in Tampa. The game will mark the third meeting between Florida and USF.

WHAT HAPPENED: USF kicker Spencer Shrader missed a 49-yard field goal with 23 seconds left and the 18th-ranked Gators got out of Spurrier/Florida Field with a victory in a game Saturday night that easily could have gone the mega-underdog Bulls' way. The snap on the game-tying kick attempt from Bryce Bernard was just fine, but holder Andrew Beardall fumbled the exchange and Shrader didn't get a clean swing at the ball, which was wide to the right and short. It was the second fortuitous snap for Florida in three plays. Two snaps earlier, USF was at the UF 18 with 44 seconds to go — with a chance to win the game with a touchdown — but Bulls center Brad Cecil grounded a snap past quarterback Gerry Bohanon for a 14-yard loss that, eventually, made Shrader's field goal all the longer, all the more difficult. Florida survived despite two second-half interceptions by sophomore quarterback Anthony Richardson, the first leading to a South Florida touchdown (and two-point conversion) that cut the Gators' lead to just three, and the second coming on a throw into the end zone on a first-and-goal from the USF 5 and the home team trailing 28-24. The Bulls, though, gave the ball right back when Bohanon overthrew his intended receiver and defensive back Tre'Vez Johnson made a diving interception at the USF 28. Four Trevor Etienne runs later the Gators were in the end zone and leading 31-28 with 5:05 to play, setting up the final frantic drive. The Bulls came as 24-point underdogs and with just one win over an FBS team in 21 tries the last three seasons. They left having out-gained the Gators in total offense 402 yards to 329, including 286 on the ground, led by tailback Brian Battie's 17 carries, 150 yards and one score, plus another 102 on 15 carries and a score from Bohanon. Richardson had a second straight uneven game, finishing 10 of 18 for 112 yards, no touchdowns and the two interceptions, and only rushed seven times for 24 yards. UF, though, still ran for 217 yards and three scores, led by sophomore Montrell Johnson Jr.'s six carries and 103 yards. Florida twice trailed in the first half, but rallied back and even opened a 24-10 lead late in the second quarter after sophomore cornerback Jalen Kimber returned a Bohanon interception 39 yards for a score. The Bulls, though, scored the next 18 points, bridging the halves with a Shrader 49-yard field goal with 10 seconds to go and then capitalizing on a Richardson interception on UF's opening second-half possession. Linebacker Dwayne Boyles went 37 yards on the return to set up a six-yard scoring run by Bohanon that was followed by a two-point conversion that closed the UF lead to 24-21. The Gators, meanwhile, went without a first down on its first three possessions after intermission, which allowed the Bulls to surge in front with an 11-play, 51-yard drive finished off by a 1-yard run by tailback Michel Dukes for a 28-24 lead with 11:14 to go. Then came the crazy final 11-plus minutes.

WHAT IT MEANS: A second win. That's pretty much it. It certainly wasn't the confidence-building kind of night Richardson and the Gators needed after last week's home loss to Kentucky.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: It's clear, after Richardson's big night in the season-opening upset of then-No. 7 Utah, that defenses are not going to let the Florida quarterback beat them on the ground, so the Gators might as well lean on those three very talented tailbacks to eat up rushing yards. Johnson, the sophomore transfer who followed Coach Billy Napier from Louisiana, Etienne, the collegiate rookie, and Nay'Quan Wright, the redshirt sophomore coming off season-ending foot surgery, combined for 20 carries, 196 yards (that's 9.8 per attempt) and each scored a touchdown.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: The Gators have gone their first three games of the season without a touchdown pass (versus four interceptions). We'll get back to you on the last time that's happened. Actually, we'll get back to you when we find out the last time they went 12 consecutive quarters during any season without a touchdown pass.

UP NEXT: Florida (2-1) steps back into Southeastern Conference play next weekend with a trip to Knoxville, Tenn., where the Volunteers (3-0) will get their latest crack at trying to reverse a maddening series trend for the Rocky Top faithful. UF has won 16 of the previous 17 against UT, dating to the 2005 season, with the lone loss coming in 2016. The Vols, who last week won at No. 18 Pittsburgh, massacred Akron 63-6 Saturday night to stay unbeaten.

Hooker completed 22 of 28 passes for 349 yards and two touchdowns and rushed 13 times for 112 yards and another score, all the while bamboozling the Gators in operation of Coach Josh Heupel's breakneck-pace offense to near perfection. Hooker was great, but Florida's sophomore quarterback Anthony Richardson was really, really good on the way to the best game of his young career. Much maligned for his struggles the last two weeks, Richardson bounced back to complete 23 of 41 passes for a career-high 439 yards and his first two touchdowns of the season. Richardson, who became just the sixth QB in Florida history to throw for at least 400 yards in a SEC game, also rushed 17 times for 62 yards and two touchdowns, but the Gators' high-powered running game was held to just 141 yards as they basically were forced to play catch-up all day against a Tennessee offense that never punted and only stopped itself via two fumbles and a late give-away on downs while trying to run out the clock. The Vols scored touchdowns on four consecutive drives bridging the two halves, the first coming on a 99-yard march that culminated with a 2-yard Hooker-to-Bru McCoy go-ahead touchdown pass with seven seconds to go in the period that completely flipped the game's tenor and momentum in the home team's favor. The score made it 17-14, Vols, who got the second half kickoff and 73 yards to a touchdown and 21-14 lead. Then came drives of 62 and 87 yards drive (that latter after a killer Richardson fumble deep in UT territory), all in succession, to surge in front 38-21. A 5-yard scoring run by Florida's Montrell Johnson Jr. closed the margin to nine (A 2-point attempt failed), but after a failed onside kick the Vols ran clock before turning the ball over on downs with just 1:11 left. Richardson took UF 71 yards in seven plays, hitting Ricky Pearsall for a 3-yard score to make it 38-33 with 17 seconds to go. The Gators, who actually out-gained the Vols in total yards with 594, then recovered the ensuing onside kick and Richardson got the offense to the UT 39 for one last play. Under duress in the pocket, Richardson had a Vols defender grab his ankles, taking any zip he had to heave the ball into the end zone. Instead, the pass is well under-thrown and intercepted by defensive back Kamal Hadden as time expired.

WHAT IT MEANS: The Gators have to feel better about what Richardson was able to do in a wickedly hostile environment. That will be the positive takeaway. On the other side, the defense has a lot of work to do. Meanwhile, UF is winless through two games in SEC play and, for now, is tied with South Carolina at the bottom of the East Division standings. Tennessee snapped Florida's five-game winning streak in the series and won for just the second time since 2005 and just the ninth time dating to their 37 meetings since 1976. So, for at least the next 12 months, the Gators' mastery of the Vols will be in a pause.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: Hooker certainly will surge into the Heisman Trophy conversation, as the Volunteers remained unbeaten, with an open date ahead to soak in all the feels before an Oct. 8 trip to LSU, followed by what likely will be the most hotly anticipated meeting with rival Alabama since Peyton Manning wore an Big Orange No. 16 jersey.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: UF is 0-2 in SEC play for the first time since 1986 when the on-probation Gators started their conference schedule with a 21-7 home loss against Alabama and 16-10 road defeat at Mississippi State.

UP NEXT: Florida (2-2) steps back out of conference with a home game against Eastern Washington (2-2) for a Saturday noon game. The Eagles lost 50-31 at home against Buffalo on Saturday and were obliterated 70-14 two weeks ago at Oregon in their only crack against an FBS opponent this season.

WHAT HAPPENED: Sophomore quarterback Anthony Richardson passed for 240 yards and two scores in not quite three quarters of work and wide receiver Ricky Pearsall had a 76-yard touchdown run on an end-around to highlight the demo job done by the Gators on Sunday against the FCS-classified Eagles in a game that was pushed back 24 hours due to the threat last week of Hurricane Ian. Backup redshirt freshman quarterback Jalen Kitna, in his first collegiate action, had a hand in a trio of touchdown drives and also threw the first TD pass of his career. The Eagles, out of the Big Sky Conference, took the opening kickoff and marched to a 44-yard field goal from Seth Harrison and 3-0 lead not quite six minutes into the game. The Gators, though, answered instantly with Richardson dropping a 75-yard touchdown bomb to Justin Shorter on their first play from scrimmage. That started a run of 52 unanswered points for the home team, their most to date in five games under Coach Billy Napier. For the afternoon, Florida totaled 666 yards of offense, which tied for the seventh-most in program history, versus EWU's 411. Richardson, who exited the game for a half-dozen plays in the second quarter after an awkward-landing pass attempt, hit eight of his 10 throws and also had an interception on a deep ball thrown into double coverage. Kitna finished 8-for-12 for 152 yards, with a 62-yard scoring strike to true freshman Caleb Douglas. Reserve tailback Lorenzo Lingard's 11-yard touchdown run with 11:53 to play put the Gators up 52-3. Eastern Washington was led by quarterback Gunner Talkington, who went 24 of 37 for 250 yards and threw a 28-yard touchdown pass midway into the fourth quarter for the Eagles' first trip into the end zone. They added a second TD with 3:17 to go when backup QB Kekoa Visperas ran 25 yards up the middle of the UF defense to wrap the game's scoring.

WHAT IT MEANS: So far this season it's been win one, lose one, win one, lose one, win one. As such, the Gators are back above .500, with all three of their victories out of Southeastern Conference play. UF has now won 15 consecutive regular-season non-league games, dating to the 2018 season-opening 53-6 victory over Charleston Southern. The Gators' last non-conference defeat in a regular season was a 38-22 loss at Florida State on Nov. 25, 2017.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: Decent debut for Kitna, the son of 18-year NFL veteran Jon Kitna, who played his college football at Central Washington in Ellensburg, Wash., about 160 miles from Cheney, Wash., home to EWU. The younger Kitna, who was born in Tacoma during his father's days with the Seattle Seahawks, got the call because Jack Miller III, the transfer from Ohio State, remained out with a thumb injury suffered during the preseason. Miller was listed as "questionable" for the game, but did not dress out. He should be available if needed next week.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: OK, so it's not staggering in the least, but the Gators improved to 22-1 against FBS teams since 1981, with the lone loss the 2013 debacle against Georgia Southern, a 26-20 loss on the way to the program's first losing record in 34 years.

UP NEXT: The Gators (3-2, 0-2), with a short week, return to SEC play next Saturday, with another noon game, this one against Missouri (2-3, 0-2), which threw a nasty scare into No. 1-ranked Georgia before falling 26-22 Saturday night at Columbia. The winner of the UF-Mizzou game will climb out of the SEC East winless cellar.

WHAT HAPPENED: Redshirt sophomore cornerback Jaydon Hill intercepted two passes, returning one for a score, and his defensive mates (after a tough afternoon at times) bowed up for a late-game stop to seal the outcome and allow the Gators to come away with their first Southeastern Conference victory under Coach Billy Napier in Saturday's homecoming game at Spurrier/Florida Field. Sophomore tailback Montrell Johnson Jr. rushed for a third-quarter score as part of second-half UF ground game assault of 212 yards. Sophomore Anthony Richardson and junior Ricky Pearsall paired for a 9-yard scoring toss with 11:10 to play in what proved to be the decisive score on a day the Gators passed for just 66 yards against a Mizzou defense that threw a nasty scare at No. 1 Georgia a week earlier. A 37-yard field goal by Adam Mihalek in the first quarter and Hill's 49-yard pick-six had Florida up 10 early in the second quarter, but the Gators were unable to muster anything on offense (and missed a pair of long field goals) in finishing with just 66 yards on 18 first-half plays. With Florida flailing, the Tigers were able to erase the 10-0 deficit and tie the game at the break on a 5-yard scoring run from Cody Schrader and 28-yard field goal by Harrison Mevis 20 seconds before halftime. An 82-yard UF drive ended with Johnson's 3-yard score at the 6:55 mark of the third and after Hill intercepted Mizzou's Brady Cook (22 of 30, 220 yards, 0 TD, 2 INT) inside the UF 5, the Gators responded with a nine-play, 91-yard drive capped by Richardson's on-the-move dart to Pearsall in the back of the end zone. Back came the Tigers, though, converting on third-and-22 and third-and-15 on the way to an 18-yard touchdown run by Nathaniel Peat that drew the visitors within seven with six minutes to go. After Richardson's tip-ball interception with 2:57 left, Mizzou reached the UF 48, but Cook's fourth-down slant (under pressure from linebacker Ventrell Miller) for wideout Tauskie Dove fell incomplete with 1:17 to go. Florida was out-gained in total yards 370-297 and gave up nine of 17 third-down situations, yet still managed to come away with the victory.

WHAT IT MEANS: A first win in SEC play for the Gators (against the still-winless Tigers), who climbed out of the East Division cellar and inched their way up to a momentary spot in fourth place with five conference games to go. It was also Florida's SEC win since beating Vanderbilt 42-0 on Oct. 9, 2021, breaking a run of six straight defeats.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: Hill would be the obvious choice, right? The guy missed all last season with a knee injury, suffered another knee injury in the offseason and made his UF debut just last week, announcing himself with seven tackles and two interceptions in his two games. But the Gators, with all their problems on third down, don't win Saturday without the inspired play from Miller, the sixth-year senior who's battled injuries of his own this season. Miller finished with 11 tackles, 10 of them solos and two of them for loss, and had the QB pressure on Missouri's final play that helped clinched the win.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: The 66 first-half yards for the Gators marked the team's fewest in a half since gaining just 61 against Missouri in the 2014 homecoming meeting at the "Swamp." UF lost that one 42-13, despite eventually out-gaining the Tigers 283-119 in yards from scrimmage.

UP NEXT: Florida (4-2, 1-2) will be home again, for the fifth time in the first six games of the season, to face No. 25 LSU (4-2, 2-1), which was manhandled at home by No. 8 Tennessee 40-13 in another league noon game Saturday. The Gators have lost three straight in their series against the Tigers.

WHAT HAPPENED: Quarterback Jayden Daniels led the Tigers to long touchdowns on their offense's first six possessions, as LSU rolled to a big lead and closed out the Gators with a late field goal in their Southeastern Conference showdown Saturday night at Spurrier/Florida Field. Daniels completed 23 of 32 passes for 349 yards and three touchdowns, while rushing for 44 yards and three more TDs. He was on the finishing/scoring end in some facet as LSU scored touchdowns on consecutive drives of 75, 73, 75, 83, 75 and 88 yards — in great part by converting eight of its first nine third-down situations — over the first three quarters to take a 42-21 lead into the fourth. On the first snap of that period, though, UF sophomore quarterback Anthony Richardson took off for an 81-yard touchdown run to draw his team within two scores. The Florida defense forced its first punt of the game on LSU's next possession and UF went 80 yards in 11 plays, with freshman tailback Trevor Etienne making it 42-35 on a 1-yard run with 5:18 to go. It was up to the Gators to make another stop and they appeared to do just that when Daniels, under pressure, threw down the middle of the field and was intercepted by cornerback Jason Marshall Jr. The pressure came from rushing defensive tackle Gervon Dexter Sr., who was flagged for roughing the passing, giving the Tigers an automatic first down at the UF 46. Nine plays and 17 yards later, Damian Ramos kicked a season-long 47-yard field goal to make it a 10-point lead with 1:52 remaining and ice the game. LSU finished with 528 yards of total offense, compared to 395 for Florida, and went 5-for-5 when in the red zone, with all of those scores TDs. Richardson completed 15 of 23 throws for 185 yards with one TD, that one coming on a 51-yard strike to Justin Shorter on the game's second offensive play. UF had leads of 7-0, 14-7 and 21-14 before LSU scored four unanswered TDs to seize command of the game.

WHAT IT MEANS: UF and LSU were probably viewed externally at about the same place, as far as their respective rebuilding situations. It would seem UF coach Billy Napier has a tougher rebuild on his hands, as the Gators have now lost three of their first four SEC games for the first time since 1986 and clearly have issues on the defensive side of the ball.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: Daniels, the transfer from Arizona State, finished with 393 yards of total offense and had a hand in all six Tigers touchdowns. He also had some tremendous on-target throws and was a step ahead of the UF pass rush all night.

UP NEXT: Florida (4-3, 1-3) is idle next week and will be back on the field Oct. 29 for its annual rivalry game against No. 1 and defending national champion Georgia (7-0, 4-0). The Bulldogs, also off next week, beat up Vanderbilt 55-0 at home Saturday and will take a three-game winning streak against the Gators into the 100th all-time meeting between the two charter SEC programs.

WHAT HAPPENED: Quarterback Stetson Bennett passed for 316 yards and two touchdowns, the tailback duo of Kenny McIntosh and Daijun Edwards combined for 196 rushing yards and four scores, and the top-ranked Bulldogs' vaunted defense gave Anthony Richardson and company fits Saturday in routing the Gators in the 100th meeting of their storied Southeastern Conference rivalry at Jacksonville.

Short touchdown runs in the first quarter by Edwards and McIntosh were followed by Bennett scoring throws of 73 yards to tight end Brock Bowers and seven to wide receiver Ladd McConkey in the second, as UGA opened a commanding 28-3 halftime lead, with UF limited to a career-best 52-yard field goal from Adam Mihalik. The scoreboard wasn't the only thing that was lopsided at intermission. The Bulldogs out-gained the Gators 346 yards to 84 in total offense, while forcing a half-dozen UF punts (compared to a combined four over the previous four games). UF, though, gave the fans in its half of TIAA Bank Field reason to stick around, thanks to a 75-yard drive to a 3-yard touchdown run by tailback Trevor Etienne, followed by a forced McIntosh fumble and defensive recovery that led to a 26-yard Mihalik field goal and made the score 28-13 midway through the third quarter. On the Bulldogs' ensuing possession, Bennett was intercepted by linebacker Amari Burney, further igniting the UF side, with the energy going next level when Richardson fired a 78-yard touchdown strike to Xavier Henderson that made it a one-possession game, 28-20, with 3:31 to go in the third. That was as close as it got, though. Georgia answered with a 78-yard drive, capped by Edwards' second rushing TD, a 22-yard run up the middle that made it 35-20 with 35 seconds left in the period. Then, after turning Florida away on downs, the Bulldogs drove to a 4-yard McIntosh scoring run, keyed by a Bennett-to-Bowers completion of 29 yards on fourth-and-7 to set up what amounted to the put-away touchdown. When it was over, the Bulldogs had cranked out 555 yards of offense -- the most ever by a Georgia team in the series (surpassing the previous high of 505 in 1976) -- versus 371 for the Gators. Richardson completed 18 of 37 passes for 271 yards and one score, was held to just 19 yards on 11 rushing attempts, was sacked three times and hurried all game. The UF ground attack, averaging 212.6 yards per game coming in, was limited to 100 yards on 34 carries by a defense ranked No. 2 nationally, including fourth against the run.

WHAT IT MEANS: Georgia's recent dominance in the series now shows five wins over the previous six meetings by an average of 22 points. Meanwhile, the Gators have dropped four of their first five SEC games for the first time since the 1979, the first under Charley Pell, that finished 0-10-1.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: Take your pick of Bulldogs, but what an X-factor Bowers is for that offense, whether he's lined up tight or split out. He finished with five catches for 154 yards and the long TD.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: The Bulldogs' 25-point halftime lead marked the largest at the break in the series for either team since 1996. Florida was up 34-0 on Georgia that year on the way to a 47-7 victory. That UF team was ranked No. 1, as well, and went on to win the national title.

UP NEXT: Florida (4-4, 1-4) hits the SEC road with a trip to face Texas A&M (3-4, 1-3). The Aggies took a three-game losing streak into Saturday night's road game at 15th-ranked Ole Miss. Meanwhile, Georgia and No. 3 Tennessee will play next week at Athens, Ga., for what could be the SEC game of the year (and a possible College Football Playoff preview).

WHAT HAPPENED: Quarterback Anthony Richardson passed for two touchdowns and ran for a couple more, including a 60-yard dash, as the Gators snapped a two-game losing streak with a Southeastern Conference road victory against the depleted Aggies in front of more than 97,000 at Kyle Field. The game was a first-half shootout, featuring six lead changes, but UF dominated after intermission, getting an especially inspired performance from a defense that had taken its share of criticism in giving up more than 40 points and 500 yards in consecutive losses (at home against LSU and against top-ranked Georgia in Jacksonville) the last two weeks. Against the undermanned Aggies, who had six players out with flu and down another 11 due to injury, the Gators erased a 24-20 halftime deficit by outscoring the home team 21-0 on Richardson touchdown tosses of 19 yards to Ja'Quavion Fraziers and 12 yards to Caleb Douglas in the third quarter, plus Montrell Johnson Jr.'s 5-yard, put-away scoring run with 1:21 to play. The seven possessions of the first half all ended in scores, including Richardson's electrifying and untouched 60-yard run up the right sideline, with A&M tailback Devon Achane's 2-yard TD run with a minute left before intermission putting A&M ahead; for the last time, as it turned out. The Florida defense forced the first A&M three-and-out to start the second half and Richardson, who completed 17 of 28 passes for 201 yards, took possession after a 28-yard punt return by Xzavier Henderson, and needed just two plays to get the Gators in the end zone on a beautiful back-shoulder fade pass that Fraziers hauled in with one hand at the left-front pylon. After that, it was basically all Florida the rest of the way. UF finished with 492 yards of total offense, including 291 on the ground, while A&M, which had to turn to backup quarterback Haynes King (23 of 45 for 279 yards, 1 TD) after Conner Weigman was scratched due to the flu, finished with 413 yards. The overwhelming majority of those yards (read on) came before halftime.

WHAT IT MEANS: With their fifth win of the season, the Gators snapped a five-game SEC road losing streak (their previous last away victory in league play was 2020 at Tennessee). More importantly to the here and now, Florida needs just one win in its last three games to become bowl eligible, which has been a stated goal for Coach Billy Napier in his first UF season. The Gators also snapped their pseudo-hex of games against Coach Jimbo Fisher, winning for just the second time in 10 cracks (eight at Florida State, two at A&M) against their former cross-state nemesis.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: Credit to UF's co-defensive coordinators, Patrick Toney and Sean Spencer, for whatever adjustments they made at halftime. The Aggies scored 24 points in the first and rolled up 307 yards of total offense, averaging more than nine yards a play while punting just once. In the second half, the Florida defense held A&M to no points, a measly 106 yards, forced five punts, a pair of turnovers and also turned the Aggies away on downs deep in their own territory in the fourth quarter. The Gators came into the game ranked 130th in the country (out of 131 FBS teams) in third-down conversion defense, surrendering a whopping 52 percent. The Aggies converted their first three third-down chances, but went 1-for-10 the rest of the way.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: A&M, which began the 2022 season ranked No. 6 in the country and a trendy pick to reach the College Football Playoff, has lost five straight games for the first time since 1980. That was way back when the Aggies were part of the Southwest Conference (32 years from joining the SEC). A&M needs to win its final three games to avoid missing a bowl game for the first time since 2008.

UP NEXT: Florida (5-4, 2-4) will play its final home game (and celebrate its annual "Senior Day") against SEC East foe South Carolina (5-3, 2-3) on Nov. 12 at "The Swamp." The Gamecocks, who trampled the Gators 40-17 last season at Columbia, broke into the Associated Press Top 25 last weekend but lost at home to Missouri. USC is on the road later Saturday night at league-winless Vanderbilt.

WHAT HAPPENED: At last, Billy Napier got a wire-to-wire rout — in a Southeastern Conference game, no less — as the UF offense and defense had their finest all-around performances of the season in Saturday's plucking of the Gamecocks at Spurrier/Florida Field, giving the Gators' first-year coach a sixth victory and making his team bowl eligible. Sophomore quarterback Anthony Richardson only passed for 112 yards, but tossed a pair of scores and rushed for another. The Gators absolutely manhandled the Gamecocks on the ground, cranking out 374 yards rushing, including 281 in a first half when UF scored touchdowns on its first three possessions and eventually built a 24-0 lead. At one point, the Gators had three players with at least 100 yards rushing, but Richardson, with 102 yards, was sacked for a 6-yard loss, and what would have been a historic note was suddenly for naught. No matter. Sophomore Montrell Johnson Jr. carried 24 times for a career-high 161 yards and a touchdown. Richardson had 96 yards on 15 attempts. The running play of the day, however, came from freshman Trevor Etienne (8 carries, 100 yards) who took an inside handoff late in the first quarter, broke the line, hit the second level and sped for an 85-yard touchdown run that represented the program's longest play from scrimmage since 2018. Etienne's score put the Gators up 21-0, with Adam Mihalek's 28-yard field goal with just over six minutes to go in the first half making it 24-0. USC got on the board late with just inside two minutes to go in the half when punter Kai Krueger hit a wide open Dakereon Joyner on a fake, with Joyner racing 48 yards for a touchdown. The ensuing two-point conversion failed. Midway through the third quarter, 415-pound nose tackle Desmond Watson stripped Gamecocks tailback Jaheim Bell on a stuffed run into the line for a turnover at the USC 12. Richardson capitalized with a 3-yard touchdown toss to sophomore tight end Jonathan Odom to go up 31-6, his second scoring pass of the day (along with a 15-yarder to wideout Ricky Pearsall in the first quarter). Johnson finished the scoring with an 8-yard run with 6:02 left. For the game, UF finished amassed 515 yards of offense, while holding USC and quarterback Spencer Rattler (8 of 16 for 145 yards) to just 237 total yards, only 44 on the ground, and forcing three turnovers. The Florida defense has now gone six consecutive quarters without surrendering a touchdown (after shutting out Texas A&M in the second half last weekend). The Gamecocks played without their top running back, MarShawn Lloyd (556 yards, 9 TDs), who missed the game with a deep thigh bruise. Doubtful he would have made much of a difference.

WHAT IT MEANS: Being bowl eligible was a stated goal by Napier in his first season of this rebuild. No, the Gators aren't going to a New Year's Six game, but they're now assured of those all-important handful of extra holiday-season practices and, if they can build on these back-to-back wins, could end up at a cool venue. Somewhere like, say, Nashville for the Music City Bowl, Memphis for the Liberty Bowl or, closer to home, the Gator Bowl in Jacksonville. There's already some buzz about a potential matchup against Notre Dame.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: Etienne's touchdown was the longest by a UF freshman running back since John L. Williams ripped off an 86-yarder against West Texas State on Oct. 16, 1982, a homecoming game the Gators won 77-14. He officially got his first 100-yard game on his eighth carry, which came early in the fourth quarter. UF gets two more years (at least) with Travis's little brother who is well on his way to playing his way out of big bro's shadow.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: UF was thisclose from playing a fourth straight game without committing a turnover. Alas, with 1:14 to play, senior Nay'Quan Wright fumbled at the South Carolina 9 and thus stopped a run of 51 consecutive possessions without a turnover. That's a significant development (and a reason for UF's improved offensive numbers the last few weeks), considering how turnovers undermined the offense during the first half of the season. The Gators' last turnover before Wright's fumble came on the next-to-last possession (a Richardson interception) of their 24-17 home win against Missouri on Oct. 8.

UP NEXT: Florida (6-4, 3-4) goes to Vanderbilt to close out the SEC slate with a noon game. The Commodores (4-6, 1-5) began Saturday not only winless in league play this season, but on a 26-game conference losing streak, only to upset Kentucky 24-21 earlier in the day at Lexington. UF has an eight-game winning streak over Vandy, dating to 2014, and has won 30 of the previous 31 in the series, dating to 1989. South Carolina (6-4, 3-4) finishes the season — get this — at home against No. 5 Tennessee and at No. 12 Clemson.

WHAT HAPPENED: Quarterback Mike Wright threw three touchdown passes to three different receivers and the Vanderbilt defense completely neutralized the Gators' high-powered rushing attack Saturday in a stunning Southeastern Conference upset defeat of the Gators at FirstBank Stadium. The loss was UF's first in the series since 2013 and just the second over the last 31 games, dating to 1989. Wright fired TD tosses of 10 to wideout Jayden McGowan in the second quarter, then seven to Gavin Schoenwald and 28 to Ben Bresnahan, both tight ends, in the third quarter to open a 28-12 lead. Along the way, though, UF did its part in aiding the Commodores, who came in as 22.5-point underdogs having just last week snapped a 26-game SEC losing streak. While Vandy was building its lead, Florida was committing three personal-foul penalties, plus a killer defensive holding call on an incomplete third-down play, all of which came back to haunt the Gators. There was more. Return man Jason Marshall Jr. muffed a punt that caromed into the end zone and was recovered by the Commodores for a special teams TD. And then there was Anthony Richardson's late third-quarter interception (a forced pass while he was being taken down for a sack) that set up the third Wright TD and put the Commodores in front 28-12 with 11 seconds left in the third period. After that pick, Richardson bounced back, firing a 74-yard touchdown pass to wideout Daejon Reynolds (8 catches, 65 yards, 2 TD) with 12 minutes left, but the Gators missed a second attempt at two-point conversion to keep Vandy's lead at 10. Still, UF had a shot to make things interesting when Marshall intercepted Wright with 6:32 to play at the Vandy 5, but the Gators failed on the sudden change even to get a first down, giving the ball back on downs to the Commodores, who padded the lead with a 27-yard field goal from Joseph Bulovas with 4:38 left. Richardson answered, though, driving Florida 75 yards in seven plays, hitting Reynolds for a 16-yard on fourth down with 3:13 left. After a failed onsideline kick attempt, the Gators forced a punt and got possession at their own 9 with 46 seconds left. Richardson threw his team to the Vandy 34, but his Hail Mary attempt on the game's final snap sailed out of the back of the end zone. Wright finished 10 of 16 for 108 yards, the three scores and a pick, while senior tailback Ray Davis carried 30 times for 122 yards for a Vandy ground game that went for 175 yards. Richardson hit 25 of 42 for 400 and three scores, but rushed only four times for 25 yards. The Florida running game, averaging 225.3 yards coming in (2nd in the SEC, 3rd nationally) and 6.1 yards per game (first and second, respectively), was stonewalled to just 45 yards on 21 attempts (2.1 per carry). UF sixth-year senior linebacker Ventrell Miller, the heart and soul of the Florida defense and locker room, was ejected from the game in the second half due to a targeting call and thus will be disqualified from the first half of the Gators' next game. A pretty big one. Read on.

WHAT IT MEANS: The charge to finish strong and secure the most attractive bowl game hit a Music City wall. The UF coaches will need to do a deep dive into what exactly went wrong (or what Vandy did right) with the running game. The Commodores now trail in the all-time series 11-43-2.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: Vandy's defense earlier this season gave up 495 yards against FCS opponent Elon, and three other times surrendered at least 500 yards against an opponent. The Commodores came into the game allowing 164.3 yards rushing per game, which ranked 91st in the country, but the Gators finished 119 yards under that figure, with tailbacks Montrell Johnson Jr. and Trevor Etienne combining for just 41 combined yards on 14 carries.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: Vanderbilt, which beat Kentucky on the road last week, has its first two-game winning streak in SEC play since Nov. 17 and 24 of 2018, when the Commodores finished the season with a 36-29 win over Ole Miss and 38-13 thrashing of rival Tennessee on the way to posting a 6-6 record that got them a berth in the Texas Bowl against Baylor. The win also ended Vandy's 12-game home losing streak.

UP NEXT: Florida (6-5) will wrap the 2022 regular season Friday night with its first road game at rival and 19th-ranked Florida State (7-4) since 2018. The Gators own a three-game winning streak against the Seminoles, with the 2020 game at Tallahassee canceled due to COVID after the SEC opted for an all-league schedule for its teams. Billy Napier will be the third different UF coach (joining Dan Mullen and interim Greg Knox) to face FSU in the series' last three meetings. The Seminoles, who defeated Louisiana 49-17 Saturday, moved into the Associated Press Top 25 two weeks ago and will be ranked when the teams play for the first time since 2016. UF leads the series 37-26-2.

WHAT HAPPENED: Florida State RB Trey Benson scored on a 17-yard run with 4:06 left to play as the host Seminoles withstood a late rally by the Gators to win 45-38 on Friday night at sold-out Doak Campbell Stadium in Tallahassee. The Gators (6-6) fell behind 38-24 after three quarters, but a 1-yard TD run by Montrell Johnson Jr. and a 45-yard scoring dash by Trevor Etienne tied the game 38-38 with 7:41 remaining. The No. 16-ranked Seminoles (9-3) answered with a seven-play, 65-yard drive that ended with Benson's TD run. Benson rushed for 111 yards and three scores. Still, the Gators drove to FSU's 26 on their final possession, but on fourth-and-12, QB Anthony Richardson faced immediate pressure and had to throw the ball into the end zone, where it fell incomplete. The combined 83 points are the most in the rivalry's storied history, which dates to 1958. FSU scored 17 unanswered points in the third quarter, capped by a 6-yard TD pass from QB Jordan Travis to Kentron Poitier that put the Seminoles ahead 38-24. The turnaround stunned the Gators after a back-and-forth first half. Richardson, despite a UF receivers corps missing five regulars due to injury, threw three TD passes in the opening half, and K Adam Mihalek booted a 41-yard FG as Florida entered halftime with a 24-21 lead. Richardson connected with WR Ricky Pearsall for a pair of scores, the first a 52-yard strike in the first quarter 16 seconds after FSU scored the game's first TD. Richardson added a 12-yard TD pass to TE Jonathan Odom later in the quarter to put Florida up 14-7. FSU responded this time with a 29-yard touchdown run by Travis, who escaped a heavy rush and danced his way down the sideline. Once again, Richardson found Pearsall, this time for a 43-yard TD that put the Gators back in front, 21-14, with 9:25 left before halftime. Pearsall finished with five receptions for a career-high 148 yards and two scores. However, the Seminoles answered with another spectacular run by Travis. The Gators blitzed on third-and-10 with FSU at their 11, and Travis avoided four defenders in the backfield, broke from the pocket, and raced to the 1-yard line where he was ruled down. Travis scored on the next play as FSU tied the game 21-21 with 5:44 to play in the first half.

WHAT IT MEANS: Florida's three-game win streak over the Seminoles is over. FSU had not beaten the Gators since 2017. The Gators lost their final two regular-season games on the road at Vanderbilt and Florida State, giving first-year coach Billy Napier a 6-6 record in his first regular season. The Gators will try to win a bowl game to finish on a positive note.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: The quarterback matchup between Florida's Anthony Richardson and FSU's Jordan Travis was worth the price of admission. Richardson threw three touchdowns in the first half and was 5 of 7 for 151 yards at the break. However, Richardson threw 11 consecutive incomplete passes at one point in the second half to finish 9 of 27 for 198 yards, 3 TDs and 1 INT. He added 41 yards on 10 carries. Travis completed only 43 percent of his passes (13 of 30, 270 yards, 1 TD), but he did not toss an interception and was exceptional with his feet. Travis rushed 15 times for 83 yards and two TDs. The Gators finished with 460 yards of total offense, FSU had 497.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: In the troublesome third quarter for the Gators, they managed minus-2 yards of total offense on their first three drives of the second half (nine plays). The Seminoles gained 162 yards on their first three drives, each ending with a score.

UP NEXT: The Gators, who became bowl eligible by beating South Carolina at home two weeks ago, now must wait to hear their postseason destination next weekend. They finished the regular season 6-6 for the second year in a row and will need a bowl win to finish with a winning record.

WHAT HAPPENED: Oregon State quarterback Ben Gulbranson threw for 165 yards and posted touchdowns both rushing and passing, tailback Deshaun Fenwick ran for 107 yards, and the 17th-ranked Beavers completely dominated the Gators on both sides of the ball Saturday during a 30-3 rout in the Las Vegas Bowl at Allegiant Stadium. The lone Florida highlight came with 37 seconds left when Adam Mihalek kicked a 40-yard field on a fourth-and-23 to avert what would have been the first scoreless performance by a UF team since 1988. Instead, the Gators increased their NCAA record of not being shutout to 436 games. As far as the good, that was about it, as Florida exited the 2022 season and first under Coach Billy Napier with a 6-7 record. Gulbranson threw a 15-yard score to wideout Silas Bolden and ripped a 7-yard scoring run, both in the third quarter, as the Beavers turned a 10-0 halftime lead into a 23-0 bulge seven minutes into the third quarter. They easily finished things off from there against a Florida team that went west without 21 players who appeared in games this season, including quarterback Anthony Richardson, sixth-year line-backer and defensive leader Ventrell Miller and first-team All-America guard O'Cyrus Torrence, all of whom opted out of the game after declaring for the NFL Draft. Minus Richardson, the Gators turned to junior Jack Miller III, the Ohio State transfer, for the first start of his collegiate career. It was a rough one. Miller completed 13 of 22 passes for 180 yards and was under pressure (four sacks) throughout the game against an aggressive Oregon State defense, and with no semblance of a rushing attack to lean on, as the Beavers limited the Gators to a season-low 219 yards of total offense (only 39 on the ground). At one point, spanning its four offensive possessions that bridged the second and third quarters, UF ran 15 plays over those four series and totaled zero yards. The Gators, though, had a chance to score early, even take the first lead, when Miller drove the offense to a first down at the OSU 36, but after a 5-yard run came a 1-yard rushing loss and back-to-back false-start penalties that ultimately led to a missed 52-yard field goal by Mihalek. The Beavers took advantage right away with an eight-play, 65-yard drive, the big hit being a 36-yard completion from Gulbranson to Bolden (6 catches, 99 yards, TD) and the final play being slot receiver Tyjon Lindsay's 8-yard TD run on an end-around. Miller and UF had another promising drive stall in the OSU territory, turning the ball over on downs at the Beavers' 35 early in the second quarter. Ten minutes later, Everett Hayes booted a 27-yard field goal to make it 10-0 with 4:32 to go in the half. Oregon State had a chance to make it 13-0, but Hayes' 33-yard attempt on the final play before intermission was blocked by UF's Jordan Young. Instead, the Beavers took the second half kickoff and went 64 yards in 10 plays, including a successful fake punt and a couple more UF penalties, with Gulbranson hitting Bolden for a 15-yard touchdown and 17-0 lead. That score started an Oregon State run of three straight possessions that ended in touchdowns, as the Beavers finished with 353 yards of offense, went 7-for-12 on third down and did not turn the ball over.

WHAT IT MEANS: A tough one to go out on, obviously. But equally obvious was that the Gators were handcuffed as far as their ability to be competitive, given the amount of defections and turnover on both sides of the ball. As such, for the first time in 43 years Florida has back-to-back losing seasons, a stat that speaks to the roster issues inherited by Napier and his staff just over a year ago. The 1978 Gators went 4-7 in the final season under Coach Doug Dickey and 0-10-1 in the first under Charley Pell. This is just the third sub-.500 season for the program since 1980, joining 2013 (under Will Muschamp), '17 (Jim McElwain) and '21 (Dan Mullen). The Gators have now lost three straight bowl games for the first time since the end of the 2002-04 seasons.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: The Beavers, who three weeks ago capped the regular season with a huge win over rival and ninth-ranked Oregon, finished off just the third 10-win season in the program's 129-year history and could very well end up sniffing the Associated Press Top 10 in the final rankings.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: Tailbacks Montrell Johnson Jr. and Trevor Etienne combined to carry 19 times for 28 yards. That's 1.47 yards per attempt. Johnson and Etienne came into the game averaging 5.7 and 6.4 per carry, respectively, on the season.

UP NEXT: The offseason, starting with Wednesday's early signing day, which is expected to yield a top-10 2023 class. After that, Napier's program will go right into Phase 1 of what he calls "The Journey," which means evaluations and goal-setting meetings that will soon give way to offseason conditioning when the players return from holiday break in January.

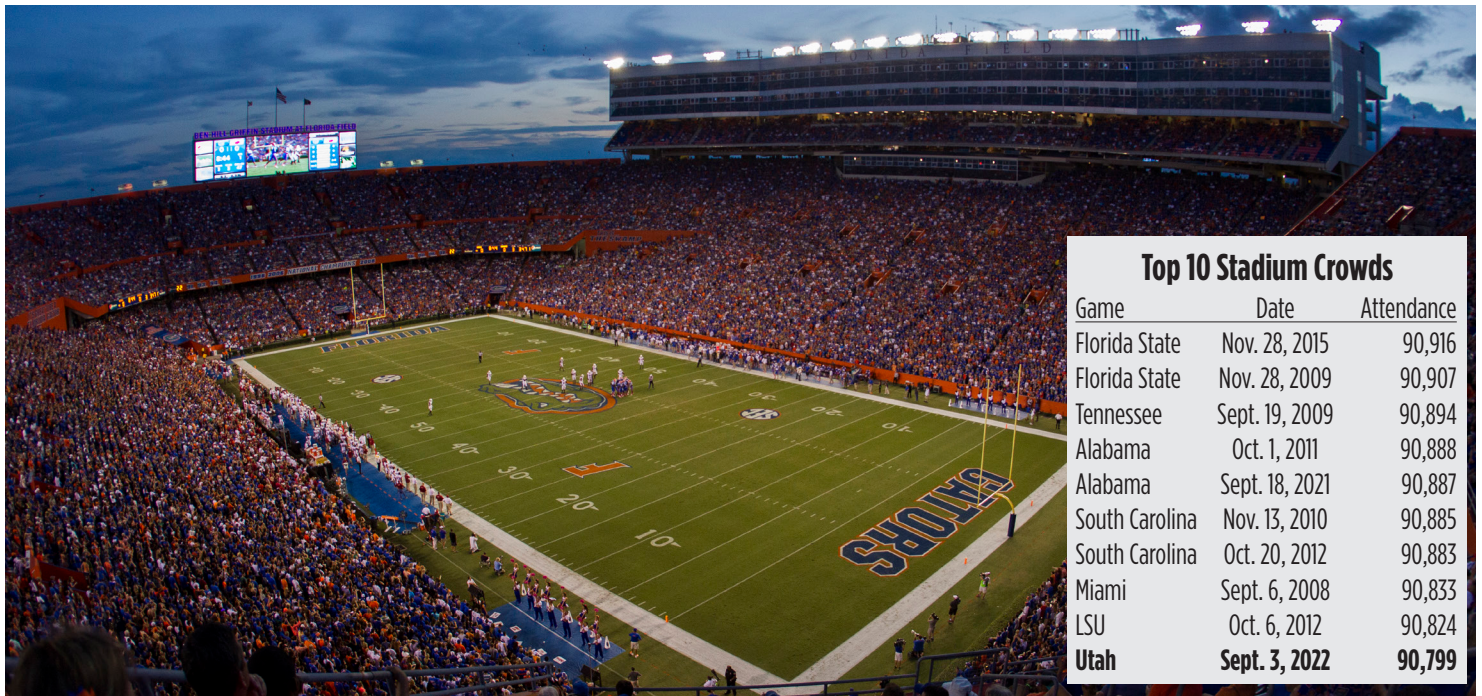

June 9, 1992. Once The Gainesville Sun hit newstands that Tuesday, Ben Hill Griffin Stadium's fitting nickname came to life.

Steve Spurrier, entering season three as Gators head coach, called writer Mike Bianchi the day prior and pitched him the storyline. It was seven months after the Gators ended the 1991 regular season with consecutive wins over Kentucky (which clinched an undefeated SEC record and the first league title in school history) and a thrilling 14-9 defeat of No. 3 Florida State, snapping a four-game losing streak to the Seminoles. It also gave UF a perfect 12-0 home record under Spurrier.

"The 'Swamp' is where Gators live," Spurrier told Bianchi. "We feel comfortable there, but we hope our opponents feel tentative. A swamp is hot and sticky and can be dangerous."

Initially, the UF athletic department didn't embrace the nickname. No posters, bumper stickers or marketing campaigns were put together right away. But Spurrier continued to use it. Then he and then-UF communications director Norm Carlson did some research. Turns out, in 1930, UF President John J. Tigert selected the location for the school's football stadium and described the area as a "swampy depression." The school hired engineers to drain the area and install pipes that funneled water down the hill along North-South Drive and dumped it into what is now known as Graham Pond.

Needless to say, the nickname caught on, and Spurrier delivered the perfect quote for the athletic department to utilize once it eventually did embrace the moniker: "The 'Swamp' is a place where only Gators get out alive."
