PARKING

Spaces are usually ample on weekday evenings and on the weekends at the Law School lot and other areas near the Tennis Complex. There is no charge or pass required.

COMMUNICATIONS OFFICE

The communications office is located on the third floor of Ben Hill Griffin Stadium, along Gale Lemerand Drive directly across from the Stephen C. O'Connell Center. Enter the stairwell to the left of Gate 1 of Ben Hill Griffin Stadium.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

All photographers MUST check in with a UF Communications staff member on site for designated photo locations prior to **EVERY** match. Photographers are welcome to photograph from the stadium stands, but **MUST** receive permission to photograph on the courts. Only accredited photographers or those persons on special assignment will be allowed access to the court.

Admission is free to all regular season matches so no credentials are needed to obtain entrance into Linder Stadium at Ring Tennis Complex. Only working press will receive game notes, statistics and box scores, and be permitted to sit in the press box.

Ring Tennis Complex is located on SW 2nd Avenue on the University of Florida campus, down two blocks from the west wall of Ben Hill Griffin Football Stadium. 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RING TENNIS COMPLEX



The Gator men's tennis program has always been the benefactor of one of the nation's top tennis facilities. In 1999, though, thanks to the additional generous contributions of Dr. Alfred A. Ring, the entire facility underwent a complete facelift that has turned it into one that is unlike any other in the country.

Ring has made substantial contributions over the last several years to bring the complex to its current elite status, funding several major projects.

Linder Stadium at Ring Tennis Complex was completed in 1999 following a \$1.7 million renovation project. The focal point of the project was a new building adjacent to the courts that serves as home to the men's and women's teams.

The main building of the complex encompasses 5,620 square feet and includes coaches' offices for the men's and women's teams, as well as a training room and locker rooms for both players and coaches. There is

also a conference room, as well as a reception area and a 3,000 square-foot courtyard. The complex has a locker room for opposing teams, bringing the total building area to 7,163 square feet. The complex features a 1,000-seat grandstand overlooking six main lighted courts, in addition to a second row of nine courts. The second row combines six outdoor courts and the three covered courts in the Ring Pavilion, giving Florida a total of 15 regulation courts. The courts, which were re-surfaced in the summer of 2006, are made of a hard court surface similar to the type of court found at the US Open.

The grandstand is highlighted by a two level, 12-seat press box and features six brand new electronic scoreboards over each of the six courts, and a large consolidated scoreboard, all of which were added in January 2017. Concessions and restrooms are conveniently located beneath the grandstand. Palm trees and a lush green landscape that surround the

attractive complex easily makes it one of the most inviting tennis environments for both the spectator and the competitor.

Even prior to the latest renovation, the complex has received national attention for its splendor. The NCAA selected the University of Florida as the host for the 1989, 1990, 1993, 1999 and 2003 NCAA women's championships. Florida also played host to the NCAA Region III Qualifying Tournament in both 1995 and 1997, as well as men's and women's regionals every year since 1999. The courts have also seen some of the state's premier prep talent as the University of Florida and Gainesville have frequently served as hosts for the Florida State High School Championships. Competition continues at the complex through the summer months with sessions of the Gator Tennis Camp, which attract some of the top young talent in the region to Gainesville.



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PERRY INDOOR TENNIS FACILITY



In December 2012, the lavish \$1.5 million addition to the Alfred A. Ring Tennis Complex was finished and the University of Florida became one of just two universities in the state with indoor tennis capability. Thanks to the generous contributions of Nancy Perry, The Charles R. and Nancy V. Perry Indoor Tennis Facility is a 22,800-square foot area that is ventilated and features three courts (with regulation space around them), state-of-the-art surfacing and lighting, plus a small area for fans to watch matches.

The Perry Facility replaced the covered pavilion that was built nearly 25 years ago.

University of Florida Athletic Director Scott Stricklin announced Adam Steinberg as the men's tennis head coach on June 23, 2023. Steinberg came to Gainesville after nine seasons as the head coach of the Michigan men's program.

Steinberg becomes the 11th head coach of the Florida Gators after accumulating an overall record of 582-287 (.711) in 32 seasons as a head coach at four different Division I programs. He has guided his teams to 21 NCAA Tournament appearances, including four quarterfinals appearances, and brought Pepperdine University their first and only men's tennis national championship in 2006. Since then, Steinberg has been the leader of Michigan's men's tennis program for the past nine seasons, recording five seasons of at-least 20 victories.

Since leading Michigan to its biggest turnaround in school history during the 2016 season, Michigan is 172-64 (.729) over nine seasons, has qualified for the NCAA Tournament seven consecutive years and is coming off back-to-back quarterfinal appearances for the first time in program history. With Steinberg at the helm (2014-23), the Wolverines have enjoyed the winningest stretch in program history, as the 2021 Big Ten Coach of the Year and 2022 ITA Midwest Coach of the Year has produced the second, third and fourth most wins in a single season. This year, Steinberg coached ITA Senior of the Year Ondrej Styler to the NCAA Singles national championship, the farthest run by a Wolverine since 1987.

During his tenure in Ann Arbor, Steinberg has coached 21 All-Big Ten selections, including 15 first team and six second team. Additionally, six different Wolverines have earned ITA All-American honors a total of nine times. His players have been just as strong off the court, as 48 Academic All-Big Ten honors have been received by 20 different Wolverines.

Steinberg's background also includes 12 years as a head coach at Pepperdine University (2002-14). There, he compiled a record of 282-105 (.729) and won the 2006 National Championship, two WCC regular season titles and 10 WCC Tournament championships. The 2006 Intercollegiate Tennis Association National Coach of the Year and a seven-time West Coast Conference Coach of the Year, Steinberg guided the Waves to 10 NCAA Tournament appearances, including five Sweet 16 appearances, one Elite Eight trip and two Final Four appearances.

Eleven of Steinberg's players at Pepperdine were named ITA All-Americans 27 times (13 in singles, 14 in doubles), and a Wave student-athlete was named WCC Player of the Year in 12 of his 13 seasons. In addition, he tutored 32 All-WCC first-team selections in singles and 18 first-team doubles pairs.

Steinberg, has also made coaching stops at Alabama, Northwestern and St. John's. Prior to taking the helm at Pepperdine, he was the head coach at Alabama (1998-02), where he posted an overall record of 69-57 (.548) and led the Crimson Tide to four NCAA Tournament appearances.

Steinberg began his coaching career at St. John's University from 1989-95. In six seasons with the Red Storm, he posted a dual-match record of 76-23 (.768) and led the program to a Big East title in 1991. Steinberg was an assistant coach at St. John's for the 1989-90 season and spent two seasons at Northwestern (1996-97).

He enjoyed a successful collegiate tennis career at Penn State (1984-88), where he served as team captain his senior season. He received his bachelor's degree in marketing from Penn State in 1989.

A native of New York, Steinberg and his wife, Casey, have two daughters, Mia and Billie.

Mat Cloer takes on his second season as Florida's Associate Head Coach in 2023-24 and his first under Head Coach Adam Steinberg. In his first season with the Gators, the Orange and Blue tied for eighth place in the SEC, despite coaching three players to all-SEC honors and 2 players to All-American honors

Cloer boasts 16 years of collegiate-level coaching experience, previously serving as the USTA Player Development National Coach. Cloer was hired by previous Gators Head Coach Bryan Shelton, with the two's connection dating back over 25 years to when Cloer was a young player.

Named a National Coach with USTA Player Development in April 2017, Cloer worked primarily with one of the top American players in Mackenzie McDonald, who is currently 60th in ATP rankings. He served as the supplemental lead and helped with road support for tennis players Chris Eubanks, Kevin King and former Gator Sekou Bangoura. Cloer also provided coaching support for top women tennis players such as Whitney Osuigwe, Usue Arconada, Ashlyn Krueger and Katrina Scott, and coached Danielle Collins in 2019 to her first Grand Slam Semifinals at the Australia Open.

During his tenure with USTA Player Development, Cloer served as the point of contact for collegiate coaches and players, aiding these student-athletes in summer and post-collegiate training opportunities and helping them transition from college tennis to professional tennis. Additionally, he was in charge of putting together developmental plans, scheduling tournaments and developing relationships with coaches and players.

"My family and I are really excited for the opportunity to be back in college tennis," Cloer said. "I'm extremely humbled and grateful to learn and work with Coach Shelton and his staff, and help keep moving the program forward. Coach Shelton has built an incredible culture and it's going to be a lot of fun working to bring the world's top student-athletes to Gainesville to develop their games on and off the court and continue to compete for championships."

Before his time with USTA Player Development, Cloer spent four seasons as an assistant head coach with NC State, where he helped lead the Wolfpack to three NCAA Tournament appearances. NC State also finished in the top-35 of the ITA end-of-the-year team rankings from 2012-15. During his stint, Cloer coached six All-ACC First Team selections, three NCAA doubles teams qualifiers and three All-ACC Academic members.

Prior to working at NC State, Cloer was the assistant coach for his alma mater, Florida State, for three seasons (2008-11) and a volunteer assistant for the Seminoles from 2006-08. Cloer helped lead FSU to two-consecutive Sweet 16s as well as an NCAA Tournament appearance in every season. Named the South Region Assistant Coach of the Year in the 2009-10 season, Cloer put together two top-10 recruiting classes, coached four NCAA Tournament singles and doubles qualifiers, two All-Americans, six

All-ACC First Team members and five players ranked in the ITA top 50 singles rankings.

In addition, Cloer served as the Head Academy Professional at the Cary Tennis Park in North Carolina, running day-to-day operations for the park.

As a player, Cloer earned many accolades and was one of the best collegiate tennis players to attend Florida State, becoming the first player in FSU's history to earn All-American status. A three-year captain of the Seminoles, Cloer led the team to three NCAA Tournaments, including a quarterfinals appearance in 2005. A two-time ACC Player of the Year, Cloer was the recipient of the esteemed ITA National Arthur Ashe Leadership and Sportsmanship Award the same year. Ranked as high as No. 11 in singles, Cloer qualified for three NCAA Singles Championships and won the 2003 ACC Indoor Doubles title. In 2016, he was inducted into the Florida State University Athletics Hall of Fame for his career as a Seminole.

Cloer received a Bachelor of Education in Sport Management in 2006 from Florida State. He is married to his wife, Lauren, and the couple has four children: Kaes (11), Kamdyn (9), Koen (8) and Kenna (2).

Scott Perelman was promoted to Assistant Coach from Volunteer Assistant Coach prior to the 2023-24 season, after over 10 years in his previous role. Over that time, Perelman coached 14 different Gators to All-American Honors.

Perelman joined the Florida men's tennis staff in August of 2012 as the Volunteer Assistant Coach. Perelman spent three seasons in the same role at the University of North Carolina from 2010-12 before joining the Gators.

Perelman joined the Gator staff with over 20 years of collegiate coaching experience, in addition to serving as the personal coach for ATP professional Chris Woodruff from 1993-99.

In 2022, Perelman assisted the team to an NCAA Quarterfinals appearance, a third-consecutive SEC regular season championship and an SEC Tournament title. In addition, sophomore Ben Shelton won the program's second-straight NCAA Singles title, finishing the year as the No. 1-ranked player and earning Florida's first ITA National Player of the Year award. Perelman helped coach both Ben and Sam Riffice to four All-American honors as they advanced to at least the singles and doubles quarterfinals of the NCAA Individual Championships. The team collected 26 wins as Florida became the first SEC school to win three-consecutive SEC regular season championships all with an undefeated 12-0 record. The 2022 team totaled four players with All-SEC honors - Andy Andrade, Sam Riffice, Ben Shelton and Duarte Vale - while Nate Bonetto was named to the All-Freshman team. During the 2022, the Gators etched their names in the record books as Andrade broke the all-time singles record with 134 career wins and Vale ranks second in history with 208 overall career wins. The team also put up record academic numbers in the spring semester as they put together an 3.79 GPA.

In 2021, Perelman assisted a program which won its first national championship in school history with a 4-1 win over Baylor at the USTA National Campus in Orlando. In addition to the NCAA title, the 2021 squad won the SEC title and junior Sam Riffice was crowned as the NCAA Singles Champion. For the second time in three years, Florida went undefeated in SEC play and undefeated at home overall.

During the 2013 season at Florida, the Gators finished with a 15-11 overall record, No. 16 national ranking and the third seed in the Southeastern Conference Tournament. Florida also earned a berth in the NCAA Tournament and hosted an NCAA Regional for the sixth-straight year. UF faced 13 teams ranked in the top 25 and had six wins against teams ranked in the top 20. In 2014, Perelman helped lead the Gators to a 17-10 season, including a trip to the NCAA Round of 16.

In Perelman's first season as an assistant at UNC in 2010-11, the Tar Heels posted an 18-7 record with a 7-3 mark in ACC regular season play. The following season, Carolina played one of the top schedules in the country and posted a 16-8 record and a second-place finish in the ACC at 9-2. Last season, the Tar Heels finished 15-8 and finished second in the ACC at 9-2 for the second year in a row.

In each of Perelman's three years at North Carolina, the team advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament, including a Round of 16 appearance in 2012.

After lettering in tennis for four years as an undergraduate at Ball State University from 1973-77, Perelman began his coaching career with assistant coaching and administrative coaching positions at various colleges and tennis clubs.

In 1982, Perelman became the men's and women's head tennis coach at the University of Kansas in what was then the Big Eight conference. Perelman led the Jayhawk women to a 19-6 record and a second place finish in the Big Eight in the 1986 season.

Perelman became Director of Tennis at Kansas in 1988, while continuing to coach the Kansas men's tennis team through 1992. In his decade at the helm, the men's tennis team won the Big Eight title twice -- in 1987 and 1988. Over his last three years, Perelman went 49-27 and finished second in the Big Eight in each year. Overall, Perelman held an 86-52 mark as women's coach and a 135-99 record as the men's coach in Lawrence.

Throughout his time at Kansas, Perelman was in charge of Scott Perelman's Jayhawk Tennis College, which grew from 18 campers in 1983 to over 400 in 1992, the final year of the camp.

In 1992, Perelman left Lawrence for Knoxville, Tenn., where he took the post of associate head men's tennis coach at the University of Tennessee. During the 1992-93 season, the Volunteers reached the finals of the Intercollegiate Tennis Coaches National Indoor Championships. Standout singles performer Chris Woodruff won the 1993 NCAA Individual Singles Championship, the only University of Tennessee player to ever accomplish the feat.

When Woodruff turned professional the next year, Perelman agreed to become his coach. Under Perelman's tutelage, Woodruff won the 1997 Canadian Open and reached ATP rankings of No. 29 in singles and No. 60 in doubles. Woodruff and Perelman remained a coaching/player tandem until 1999.

After a short assistant coaching period at the University of Toledo, Perelman became the director of tennis at Sylvania Country Club in Sylvania, Ohio in 2002.

Perelman and his wife, Cindy, have one son, Sam.







JAMES SHAFFER - 1961

One All-America Honor

Shaffer advanced to the quarterfinals of the 1961 NCAA Championships before losing a hard-fought battle to California's William Hoogs, 9-7, 6-3. Shaffer's two points did give the Gators a tie for 10th place in the team standings. The southpaw from St. Petersburg, Fla. was a member of the Junior Davis Cup team. Shaffer won the SEC freshman individual title and posted a 46-12 varsity record. He was SEC individual titlist at No. 1 singles in 1961 and 1962, the first Gator to accomplish that feat. Currently, Shaffer is an attorney with his own law firm, James A. Shaffer, P.A., Inc., in St. Petersburg.



and Mac Claffin in the fourth round, 9-7, 6-4 before losing a 5-7, 7-5, 7-5 decision to Haroon Rahim and Jeff Borowiak of UCLA in the quarterfinals. The Gators finished in sixth place. Neely came to Florida from Tampa as the 1965 National Junior Champion. His career record as a Gator was 58-4 while playing No. 1 singles, including 24-0 in his junior year. In his three years of varsity play, Neely never lost an SEC dual match at No. 1 singles. He won the SEC singles title in 1967 and 1969 and also claimed the doubles title in 1968 and 1969. Neely is the former tournament director for the Atlanta WCT Peachtree Grand Prix event. He has also been the circuit coordinator for the USTA and head tennis coach at the University of Alabama. Neely now owns and operates a tennis academy in Atlanta.

BILL TYM - 1963

One All-America Honor

Tym advanced to the quarterfinals of the 1963 NCAA Championships before losing to eventual champion Dennis Ralston of USC, 6-2, 6-3. Tym's two points gave the Gators an 18th-place finish in the team standings. The native of Lake Valhalla, N.J. captured the SEC individual title as a sophomore and junior at No. 2 and No. 1 singles, respectively. His career record was 41-9. Tym served as head men's coach at Vanderbilt from 1987-1996. He is a past president and former executive director of the United States Professional Tennis Association.



JAMIE PRESSLY - 1969

One All-America Honor

Pressly advanced to the fifth round of the 1969 NCAA Championships before falling to Rice's Mike Estep, the eventual runner-up, 6-0, 2-6, 6-4. Pressly helped the Gators to a sixth-place team finish. The West Palm Beach native compiled a career record of 60-3 while playing No. 2, 3 and 4 singles. Pressly won SEC individual titles at No. 2 (1967 and 1968) and No. 3 (1969). He also teamed with Paul Lunetta to win the SEC No. 3 doubles title in 1969. Pressly, whose brother David was a Gator standout in the mid-1970's, was the top graduate from the University of Florida Law School in 1971 and is currently practicing in his own law firm of Pressly & Pressly with David in West Palm Beach.



ARMISTEAD NEELY - 1968-69

Two All-America Honors

Neely advanced to the singles quarterfinals of the 1968 NCAA Championships and also teamed with former Gator head coach Steve Beeland to advance to the quarterfinals of the doubles competition, where they fell to tennis great Stan Smith and Bob Lutz of USC, the eventual champions, 6-3, 6-2. Neely led the Gators to a fifth-place finish. Neely advanced to the quarterfinals of the 1969 NCAAs before dropping a 3-6, 9-7, 8-6 decision to Arizona's Brian Cheney. He again joined forces with Beeland to defeat Stanford's duo of Paul Gerken



DAVID BLAIR - 1993

One All-America Honor

Blair won the 1993 NCAA doubles title with Mark Merklein, 5-7, 6-2, 6-1 over Stanford's Chris Cocotos and Michael Flanaga. Blair and Merklein became the first Gators to win an NCAA tennis title of any sort. Arguably the best doubles player in Florida history, the Gainesville, Fla. native finished his career with 76 doubles wins, the second-most in UF history. He also compiled a 29-12 doubles slate as a



senior, the fourth-highest win total in Division I tennis in 1993. Blair and Merklein, with 25 wins in 1993 and 21 in 1992, became the only UF combination to win over 20 matches in more than one season. Blair was also a member of the 1993 SEC Academic Honor Roll.

MARK MERKLEIN - 1993, 94

Four All-America Honors

Merklein became the first two-time national champion in Florida history after polishing off top-seeded Wayne Black of USC 6-2, 6-7, 6-4 in the 1994 NCAA singles final. Merklein had teamed with David Blair to claim the NCAA doubles title in 1993. Merklein's performance in the 1994 NCAAs was dominance personified. He lost just one set in the entire tournament, at one point winning 11 in a row. He had three wins on tiebreakers in the NCAAs and compiled a 13-1 record in tiebreakers for the 1993-94 season. Merklein was the first Florida player to gain All-American status in both singles and doubles, and his four All-America honors are the most of any Gator player. He finished his brilliant career atop the school career charts in singles (112) and overall (190) wins, while ranking second in doubles victories (78). Merklein also established a then school season standard with his 38 singles wins in 1993-94. He helped Florida win its first outright SEC title since 1969. Merklein is currently playing professional tennis and represented the Bahamas at the 2000 Olympics.



DYLLAN FITZGERALD - 1994

One All-America Honor

A native of Benoni, South Africa, Fitzgerald staked his claim as one of the best doubles players in UF history after combining with Mark Merklein for a 12-8 record and a No. 7 ranking in the final 1993-94 Rolex-ITA poll. Fitzgerald and Merklein defeated Texas Christian's Paul Robinson and David Roditi 6-7, 7-6, 6-4 in the NCAA first round before losing to Stanford's Chris Cocotos and Michael Flanagan 6-3, 1-6, 6-2. Fitzgerald and Merklein had defeated the nation's No. 1 and No. 2-ranked doubles teams earlier in the season.





ALL-AMERICANS

DAMON HENKEL - 1994, 95, 96

Three All-America Honors

Henkel became the first player in Gator history to earn three All-America honors in singles in his career. His final ranking of No. 9 after a 31-12 campaign in 1996 earned him that distinction. The 31 singles victories tied for the then second-best seasonal mark in Gator history and included 19 victories over ranked foes. In 1995, Henkel posted a 26-18 mark and ended the year ranked No. 19 in the country. His first All-America honor in 1994 followed a 24-4 year which included an upset of 12th-ranked Brandon Coupe of San Jose State in the second round of the NCAA Tournament. The first Gator to garner All-America recognition in three straight seasons, Henkel was chosen the 1996 Region III ITA/Senior Player of the Year and was one of eight finalists for the National ITA/Senior Player of the Year. His 102 career singles wins ranks fourth in the UF record books and his 169 career overall wins (102 singles, 67 doubles) also rank seventh on UF's all-time list. Henkel became the first player in Florida history to win 20 or more matches in all four seasons as a Gator when he beat Vanderbilt's Chris Groer on March 23, 1996. He left Florida as just the second player in school history to win 100 career singles matches and also was just the second player in UF history to win 30 singles matches in a single season.



JUSTIN O'NEAL - 1997, 99, 01

Three All-America Honors

O'Neal became UF's first freshman All-American after an impressive rookie season in 1997 and followed that up with All-America honors in both 1999 and 2000. He set the then-school record for most singles wins by a Gator freshman with 28 in 1997 and ranked 16th in singles in the final rankings. O'Neal was named the Region III Rookie of the Year and was one of eight finalists for National Rookie of the Year. He was also chosen second-team All-SEC, the first UF freshman to earn all-league honors since 1984. In 1999, O'Neal became just the second player in UF men's tennis history to receive All-America,



All-SEC and SEC Academic Honor Roll recognition in the same season. He was ranked 17th in singles in the final ITA rankings and reached the round of 16 at the NCAA Championships. He was named the 2000 SEC Player of the Year as a senior, and the Region III Senior Player of the Year by the ITA after finishing the year ranked 13th in singles. O'Neal graduated as the winningest player in UF history in career singles, doubles and total wins.

JEFF MORRISON - 1999, 00

Four All-America Honors

Morrison captured the 1999 NCAA singles title and received All-America recognition in both singles and doubles (with Nathan Overholser) in both 1999 and 2000. Morrison, who was also named the ITA National Player to Watch and the 1999 SEC Player of the Year, was a first-team All-SEC selection in singles and doubles. He set the Gator single-season record with 47 singles victories. Morrison ranked second in singles and ninth in doubles (with Overholser) in the final ITA rankings. He became the first player in UF history to win 30 or more singles matches in back-to-back seasons. Morrison was the 2000 SEC Tournament MVP helping the Gators to the league title. He finished the 2000 season ranked No. 1 in the ITA singles rankings and is the second winningest player in UF history, behind only O'Neal.




NATHAN OVERHOLSER - 1999, 00

Three All-America Honors

Overholser was named All-American in singles in 1999 and All-American in doubles (with Jeff Morrison) in both 1999 and 2000. Overholser, who was named All-SEC in both singles and doubles for three straight years from 1999-2001, graduated at UF's career doubles win leader. Overholser, David Blair and Justin O'Neal are the only Gator men's tennis players to ever receive All-America, All-SEC and SEC Academic Honor Roll recognition in the same season (2000). Overholser finished both the



1999 and 2001 seasons ranked in the ITA Top 50 for singles and each of his four seasons ranked in doubles, including Top 10 finishes in 1999 and 2000.



JANNE HOLMIA - 2003

One All-America Honor

Holmia was an All-American singles player, as well as being voted SEC Freshman of the Year and ITA National Rookie of the Year, during his first year on the collegiate level. He ended the season ranked No. 6 in the nation. He posted 34 singles victories, tied for the fifth-best single season win total in school history, and highest ever for a freshman. He also fared well in doubles play posting at least a .500 record with three different partners. He made it to the second round of the NCAA Tennis Championships, before a back injury forced him to retire from the match.

HAMID MIRZADEH - 2003, 04, 05

Five All-American Honors

In 2005, Mirzadeh became the only five-time All-American in school history by garnering the distinction in singles and doubles for the second straight season to go along with his 2003 singles honor. He finished his senior season ranked No. 16 in singles and No. 9 in doubles with Greg Ouellette. He and Ouellette were seeded fifth in the NCAA doubles draw, while he also earned an at-large spot in singles. As a junior, he finished the year ranked No. 11 in the nation after advancing to the quarterfinal round of the NCAA men's tennis championship singles draw for the second straight season. That year, he became the only player in the nation to earn a spot in the quarterfinals of both the singles and doubles NCAA competition as he and teammate Chris Brandi made it to the round. Mirzadeh was a four-time first-team All-SEC selection. Throughout his collegiate career, Mirzadeh was also a success in the classroom having earned SEC Academic Honor Roll honors as a sophomore, junior, and senior. In 2004, he was named the Co-SEC Scholar Athlete of the Year.





CHRIS BRANDI - 2004

One All-American Honor

Chris Brandi teamed with Hamid Mirzadeh in 2004 at the top of the doubles line up as he earned All-America honors for the first time in his collegiate career. Brandi and Mirzadeh reached the quarterfinal round of the NCAA championship doubles draw in May. Brandi became the 14th student-athlete at Florida to earn the recognition.



He was also honored by the ITA as the Southeast Region ITA Rookie of the Year.

JESSE LEVINE - 2007

Two All-American Honors

In 2007, Jesse Levine became the 16th student-athlete at Florida to earn All-American recognition as he did so in singles and doubles as a freshman. Levine was the number three seed in both the singles and doubles (with Greg Ouellette) draws and advanced farther than any freshman in the country in the singles draw with a run to the quarterfinals. In addition, he and Ouellette also advanced to the quarterfinals of the doubles draw. Levine completed his freshman season in Gainesville with a 24-1 overall mark to become the first Gator since 1976 to end a year with one loss or less. He was also the first player nationally to enter the NCAA singles draw undefeated since 2001 (Fresno State's Peter Luczak). Levine finished the season ranked third in both the singles and doubles polls and was named the ITA National Rookie of the Year and the SEC Freshman of the Year, as well as being named to the All-SEC First Team.



GREG OUELLETTE - 2005, 07, 08

Five All-American Honors

Greg Ouellette completed his Gator career as the second five-time All-American in school history. As a freshman in 2005, he earned the recognition in singles and doubles play before accomplishing the feat again as a junior in 2007. In 2008, he finished his career by earning All-America honors in singles. Ouellette had 110 singles wins, which ranked as the fourth-highest in Florida history. He also had 71 doubles wins and his 181 combined victories were the fifth-highest by any Gator. Ouellette was the No. 2 seed in the 2008 NCAA singles draw, as he was appearing in the event for the fourth-straight year. He finished the season ranked fourth nationally in the ITA poll and was named the SEC Player of the Year. He was also an All-SEC first-team selection for the fourth-consecutive time. In 2007, he advanced to the Round of 16 in the draw for the second time in his career. He also paired with Jesse Levine in the doubles' draw, where the two were the number three seed and advanced to the quarterfinal round. In 2005, he advanced farther than any freshman in the country in the NCAA singles' draw by making his way into the quarterfinal round. He finished his first season with an overall record of 39-10, which was the third-highest win total on UF's all-time singles season chart and the best by a Gator freshman. He and senior Hamid Mirzadeh were seeded fifth in the NCAA doubles bracket, which earned them All-America status. Ouellette was selected as a first-team All-SEC representative and was named the SEC Freshman of the Year.



ALEXANDRE LACROIX - 2010, 11

Four All-American Honors

Alexandre Lacroix became the fifth player in Florida history to receive four All-America honors, garnering recognition in both singles and doubles in each of his final two seasons at UF. He finished his career as the school's all-time leader in overall wins (214) and doubles victories (104) and tied for fourth all-time in singles wins (110). He finished his senior season ranked No. 8 in the country in singles and held the No. 12 doubles ranking with partner Sekou Bangoura Jr. In 2011, Lacroix earned first-team All-SEC honors for the third year in a row and was named the 2011 SEC Tournament MVP after leading the Gators to their fourth SEC Tournament title. He was also named the ITA Southeast Region Senior of the Year after competing at No. 1 singles and doubles in every dual match for the second season in a row. He finished the 2010-11 campaign with a 36-11 singles record and a 29-16 doubles mark, totaling 65 wins for the second-straight year, tied for the fifth-highest single-season total at Florida.



SEKOU BANGOURA JR. - 2011

One All-American Honor

Sekou Bangoura Jr. earned the first All-America honors of his career after reaching the semifinals of the 2011 NCAA Doubles Championship with partner Alexandre Lacroix. The duo finished with a 13-9 doubles record for the year in the No. 1 doubles position, ending the season ranked 12th in the country. In addition to his All-America honors, Bangoura Jr. was named First Team All-SEC, posting a 17-8 record in singles play during dual matches in the spring. He finished with a 31-13 overall singles record during his sophomore season in 2010-11 and compiled a 21-14 record in doubles action. His 52 combined wins tied for the 11th-most in a single season in UF history. Bangoura Jr. ranked 44th nationally in the final ITA singles rankings, reaching a career-high singles ranking of 28th in January 2011.



ANTOINE BENNETEAU - 2010

One All-American Honor

Antoine Benneteau earned All-American honors in doubles alongside Alexandre Lacroix in 2009-10. The pair compiled a 31-8 record together, becoming just the second tandem in program history to reach 30 doubles wins together in a single season while maintaining a top-10 national rank throughout the season. Benneteau, who also earned second-team All-SEC honors for the second straight year, appeared at No. 1 doubles in every dual match of the season, tallying a 19-6 record. Benneteau and Lacroix won the ITA Southeast Regional Championships during the fall season, advancing to the quarterfinals of the ITA National Indoor Championships. With 23 singles wins as well, Benneteau posted a combined 54 victories in 2009-10, which marked the eighth-highest total in UF history.





ALL-AMERICANS

STEPHANE PIRO - 2013

One All-American Honor

Stephane Piro earned his first All-American honors in 2012-13, garnering recognition in doubles with partner Bob van Overbeek. The pair compiled a 15-10 overall record together after pairing up midseason and ranked No. 16 in the final ITA rankings. The duo played at the No. 1 doubles position for the final 17 dual matches. They earned an at-large bid into the NCAA doubles championship and won a tight three-set match against Pepperdine's Francis Alcantara and Finn Tearney in the opening round. In the Round of 16, the Gator duo beat seventh-ranked Jarryd Botha and David Vieyra of Alabama in straight sets to advance to the Quarterfinals and earn All-American status. Piro and van Overbeek were knocked out by No. 4-ranked Jarmere Jenkins and Mac Styslinger of Virginia. Piro, in his first season competing at Florida, played No. 1 singles in the final 10 matches and earned an at-large bid into the NCAA singles championship.



BOB VAN OVERBEEK - 2013

One All-American Honor

Bob van Overbeek earned All-American honors in doubles alongside Stephane Piro in 2012-13. The pair compiled a 15-10 overall record together after pairing up midseason and ranked No. 16 in the final ITA rankings. The duo played at the No. 1 doubles position for the final 17 dual matches. They earned an at-large bid into the NCAA doubles championship and won a tight three-set match against Pepperdine's Francis Alcantara and Finn Tearney in the opening round. In the Round of 16, the Gator duo beat seventh-ranked Jarryd Botha and David Vieyra of Alabama in straight sets to advance to the Quarterfinals and earn All-American status. Piro and van Overbeek were knocked out by No. 4-ranked Jarmere Jenkins and Mac Styslinger of Virginia. Van Overbeek finished his Florida career ranked 10th in career victories (168), eighth in career singles wins (85) and sixth in career doubles wins (83).



FLORENT DIEP - 2014

One All-American Honor

Florent Diep earned All-American honors in singles in 2013-14. The Paris, France native compiled a team-best 31-17 overall singles record during his senior campaign and ranked No. 35 in the final ITA rankings. Diep played at the Nos. 1 and 2 singles positions for the final 17 dual matches and boasted a 10-4 record in the top two spots. Diep earned an at-large bid into the 2014 NCAA singles championship and won a tight three-set match against Elon's 36th-ranked Cameron Silverman in the opening round of 64. In the Second Round, Diep defeated Virginia Tech's 20th-ranked Amerigo Contini in three sets to advance to the Round of 16 and earn All-American status. Winning a rematch against Vanderbilt's No. 21 Gonzales Austin advanced Diep to the NCAA Quarterfinals. The Florida senior was then knocked out by No. 39 Denis Nguyen of Harvard. Diep finished his Florida career with 70 overall singles wins.



DIEGO HIDALGO - 2016

Two All-American Honors

Diego Hidalgo earned All-American honors in singles and doubles in 2015-16. The Guayaquil, Ecuador native compiled a 31-13 overall singles record during his senior campaign and ranked No. 10 in the final ITA rankings. Hidalgo played at the No. 1 singles position for the entire 2016 season and amassed a 17-6 record in dual matches, including a 13-5 record against ITA-ranked opponents. Hidalgo finished his Florida career with 64 overall singles wins. Along with fellow-senior Gordon Watson, the duo garnered their first double All-American recognition. The tandem compiled a team-best 29-8 record and a 16-6 dual match record at the No. 1 doubles position, including a 13-4 record against ITA ranked opponents. The pair ended the 2016 season ranked No. 3 in the final ITA rankings after spending 14 weeks as the No. 1 doubles



team in the nation. The Gators earned an automatic bid into the 2016 NCAA Doubles Championship and advanced to the Round of 16. Hidalgo ended his career in the Orange and Blue with 64 overall doubles wins. Hidalgo's combined 60 wins in the 2015-16 season ranks sixth all-time in the Gator men's tennis record books.

GORDON WATSON - 2016

One All-American Honor

Gordon Watson earned his first All-American honors in 2015-16, garnering recognition in doubles with partner Diego Hidalgo. The pair compiled a team-best 29-8 record during 2016 with a 16-6 dual match record at the No. 1 doubles position. The tandem ended the 2016 campaign No. 3 in the final ITA rankings after a 13-4 record against ITA ranked opponents and spent 14 weeks as the No. 1 doubles team in the nation. The Gator duo earned an automatic bid into the 2016 NCAA doubles championship and advanced to the Round of 16. Hidalgo and Watson's 29 doubles wins in 2016 is tied for third in the Florida record books for a single-season win total in doubles. Watson completes his Florida career with 182 overall career wins, good for fifth all-time and fourth all-time with 88 career doubles wins in the Gator history books.





2023-24 Florida Men's Tennis

ALFREDO PEREZ - 2017, 2018

Four All-American Honors

Alfredo Perez earned his fourth career ITA All-American honor in 2018 when he earned All-America honors in both doubles and singles for the second straight season. In 2018 Alfredo posted a 24-15 overall singles record with a 14-11 dual match record that helped him earn his second straight First Team All-SEC honor. In the singles tournament, he advanced to the Round of 16 and ended the year ranked No. 14. In doubles, he and Johannes improved upon their breakout 2017 season with an equally impressive 2018 campaign. The duo got things started in the fall of 2017 when they won the ITA All-American National Championship before posting a 20-9 overall doubles record and an 11-7 record in dual matches. The duo advanced to the NCAA Elite Eight of the Doubles Championship and helped lead the team to the Elite Eight of the dual championship tournament. They concluded the 2018 season ranked No. 2 in the country. In 2017 Alfredo went 26-11 in singles as a sophomore, including a 17-7 record at No. 1 singles in dual matches. Perez concluded his sophomore campaign being ranked No. 10 in the ITA-Rankings. During his sophomore season in doubles, Johannes and Alfredo posted a 22-1 overall record and a 14-6 dual record at No. 1 doubles. The two defeated a team-high seven ranked opponents throughout the season. In the fall the pair won the ITA Southeast Regional and National Indoor Intercollegiate Championship consolation title. Perez and Ingildsen finished the season ranked No. 6 in the ITA Doubles rankings and advanced to the Round of 16 in the NCAA Tournament.



JOHANNES INGILDSEN - 2017, 2018

Two All-American Honors

Johannes Ingildsen became a two-time Doubles ITA All-American with partner Alfredo Perez in 2018. The duo followed up their 2017 All-America honor with another strong season that saw them ranked as the No. 1 duo in the country for much of the year. Johannes and Alfredo improved upon their breakout 2017 season with an equal-



ly impressive 2018 campaign. The duo got things started in the fall of 2017 when they won the ITA All-American National Championship before posting a 20-9 overall doubles record and an 11-7 record in dual matches which helped him earn Second Team All-SEC honors. The duo advanced to the NCAA Elite Eight of the Doubles Championship and helped lead the team to the Elite Eight of the dual championship tournament. They concluded the 2018 season ranked No. 2 in the country. In 2016 Johannes and Alfredo posted a 22-1 overall record and a 14-6 dual record at No. 1 doubles. The two defeated a team-high seven ranked opponents throughout the season. In the fall the pair won the ITA Southeast Regional and National Indoor Intercollegiate Championship consolation title. Perez and Ingildsen finished the season ranked No. 6 in the ITA Doubles rankings and advanced to the Round of 16 in the NCAA Tournament.

MCCLAIN KESSLER - 2018

One All-American Honor


McClain Kessler earned his first career ITA All-American honor in 2018 when he earned the award in doubles. McClain teamed with Duarte Vale to go 23-16 overall and 13-13 in dual matches. McClain and Duarte got things rolling in the fall when they won 12 of their first 13 matches and upset the No. 1 doubles team from Wake Forest in the ITA All-American Championship. McClain's 2017 fall success helped propel him and Duarte to a season-high ranking of No. 5 in the spring. McClain and Duarte earned a spot in the NCAA Doubles Championship where they upset a nationally seeded duo from TCU before advancing to the NCAA Elite Eight. McClain ended the 2018 season ranked No. 22 in doubles with Duarte. McClain, the 2018 team captain, was also recognized by the ITA with the Rafael Osuna Sportsmanship Award and the Arthur Ashe Leadership and Sportsmanship Award as well as by the SEC by earning a spot on the Community Service Team



DUARTE VALE - 2018, 2020, 2021

Three All-American Honors

Duarte Vale earned his first career ITA All-American honor in 2018 when he earned the award in doubles. Duarte teamed up with McClain Kessler to go 23-16 overall and 13-13 in dual matches. McClain and Duarte got things rolling in the fall when they won 12 of their first 13 matches while also upset the No. 1 doubles team from Wake Forest in the ITA All-American Championship. Duarte's 2017 fall success helped propel him and McClain to a season-high ranking of No. 5 in the spring. Duarte and McClain earned a spot in the NCAA Doubles Championship where they upset a nationally seeded duo from TCU before advancing to the NCAA Elite Eight. Duarte ended the 2018 season ranked No. 22 in doubles with McClain. after a shortened season due to the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, 20 singles players and 10 doubles pairs were awarded the prestigious honor as Vale received All-American singles recognition. Duarte posted a team-high 27 overall singles wins (27-4) in 2020, while finishing the season with an impressive 14-2 dual singles record and 4-0 mark in SEC competition. Vale asserted his singles dominance from the very beginning, as the Cascais, Portugal native won three consecutive singles titles in the fall at the Seahawk Invite, Southern Intercollegiate Championships and ITA Southeast Regional Championships. Ranked as high as No. 11 in the nation in singles, Vale carried his performance into the spring, tallying a 10-2 mark at the No. 3 position while holding a 4-1 record over ranked opponents. Vale was key in a number of matches for UF, including clinching the Gators' comeback win over then-No. 6 Wake Forest at ITA National Team Indoors in Madison, Wis. In the historic 2021 season, Vale served as one of the team captains, along with All-American Sam Riffice, and helped the men's team to its first ever national championship after the Gators defeated Baylor, 4-1, in the finals. Vale played at No. 1 singles for the entire season, boasting a 26-7 overall singles record, a 17-6 dual singles record and a 10-2 conference record. Vale made it to the Round of 32 in the NCAA Tournament as the No. 5-seed, defeating





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Virginia's Jeffrey Von Der Schultenburg in the Round of 64 by scores of 6-1 and 6-0. Vale also helped lead the team to a 26-2 overall record and an undefeated SEC record of 12-0 to claim the regular season SEC title. Vale was named First Team All-SEC for his efforts.

OLIVER CRAWFORD - 2019, 2020

Three All-American Honors

Oliver Crawford earned his first All-American honor in 2018-2019, garnering the recognition in singles. After an impressive rookie campaign in which Crawford earned the 2018 SEC Freshman of the Year and ITA Southeast Region Rookie of the Year awards, he began his sophomore season ranked in the top-20 of ITA singles players. Crawford played all 29 matches at the No. 1 position for the Gators and amassed a 16-8 record, including 14 wins over nationally ranked opponents. The Spartanburg, S.C. native's ranking continued to rise and he finished the season with a career-high ranking of No. 7. Crawford earned the No. 8 seed into the NCAA Singles Championships and recorded straight set wins over two Pac-12 opponents in the opening rounds (UCLA's Govind Nanda and USC's Tanner Smith) to advance to the round of 16 and earn All-American status. Crawford was knocked out by William Blumberg of North Carolina, but finished the season with 25 singles wins. He was a first-team All-SEC selection for the second straight season and a member of the SEC and NCAA All-Tournament teams. He was also honored by the ITA as the National and Southeast Region Player to Watch. After a shortened season due to the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, 20 singles players and 10 doubles pairs were awarded the prestigious honor as Crawford added All-American singles recognition while also earning his first doubles honor. Crawford went 11-4 overall in singles and 13-3 in doubles for the 2019-20 season. Ranked as high as No. 3 throughout the fall, the Spartanburg, S.C. native compiled an 8-3 dual singles record at the top spot, including a 6-2 mark over ranked opponents, and 3-1 record in SEC play. Crawford additionally earned Division I UTR/ITA National Player of the Week honors on Mar. 3 for his



solid performance throughout the season. Crawford and Riffice went 9-2 together at the top spot for the Gators, finishing 3-0 in SEC play, as the pair opened the season on a six-match win streak that included a top-five win over Columbia's Jack Lin and Jackie Tang - who were also named ITA All-Americans. The tandem reached a career-high ranking of No. 13 prior to finishing ranked No. 14, as the duo also won the consolation doubles draw of the ITA All-American Championships in the fall.

SAM RIFFICE - 2019, 2020, 2021, 2022

Six All-American Honors

In 2019, Sam Riffice became the seventh freshman at Florida to earn All-American recognition, fifth in singles play. Riffice, who earned an at-large bid into the singles draw, advanced further than any freshman in the country with a run to the quarterfinals. As the lower seed in every match he played, the Orlando native earned straight set victories over Johannes Schretter of Baylor and Daniel Cukierman of USC to earn his All-American status and the opportunity to play the No. 2 seed in the Round of 16, his highest ranked opponent of the season. Riffice pulled off the biggest upset of the tournament with a thrilling three-set win over Ohio State's JJ Wolf and was the first Florida player to advance to the singles quarterfinals since 2014. Riffice completed his freshman season with a 26-11 singles mark and was tied for a team-high 19 dual wins. He also went 10-0 in SEC singles play to become the first Gator since 2007 to go undefeated in their rookie season. He finished the season ranked 23rd in the singles poll and was named the ITA Southeast Region Rookie of the Year and the SEC Freshman of the Year, as well as earned Second-Team All-SEC and SEC All-Freshman accolades. After a shortened season due to the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, 20 singles players and 10 doubles pairs were awarded the prestigious honor as Riffice added All-American singles recognition while also earning his first doubles honor. Riffice produced a solid sophomore campaign prior to the season's end, finishing



16-4 overall in singles and 14-3 in doubles. In the fall, the Orlando, Fla. native reached the singles finals of the ITA All-American Championships in Tulsa, Okla., becoming the first Gator to finish national runner-up since Daniel Courcol in 1992. Riffice reached a career-high ranking of No. 4 throughout the dual season, as he recorded an 11-3 record in singles, with a 9-2 mark at the No. 2 position, and 3-1 record through SEC competition. Crawford and Riffice went 9-2 together at the top spot for the Gators, finishing 3-0 in SEC play, as the pair opened the season on a six-match win streak that included a top-five win over Columbia's Jack Lin and Jackie Tang - who were also named ITA All-Americans. The tandem reached a career-high ranking of No. 13 prior to finishing ranked No. 14, as the duo also won the consolation doubles draw of the ITA All-American Championships in the fall. Riffice was also named the ITA National & Southeast Region Player to Watch in 2020. In the historic 2021 season, Riffice served as one of the team captains, along with All-American Duarte Vale, and helped the men's team to its first ever national championship after the Gators defeated Baylor, 4-1, in the finals. Riffice was also the third Gator to win the NCAA Singles Title after beating the No. 1 and No. 2-seeds in back-to-back days to secure the championship. Riffice is just the eighth player in the 21st century to earn a team and singles national championship in the same season. Riffice also helped lead the team to a 26-2 overall record and an undefeated SEC record of 12-0 to claim the regular season SEC title. He was named First Team All-SEC for his efforts. After his senior year campaign in 2022, Riffice became the program's leader in both singles All-American honors with four and total All-American honors with six after being named an ITA All-American in singles and doubles his last season. Making his third singles and second doubles appearance in the NCAA Individual Championships, the Gator would end his career with a solid tournament run that solidified his All-American Status. Coming in as unseeded in singles, Riffice needed to make it to the quarterfinals to earn All-American honors, and he did just that. Collecting singles wins over No. 9 Cannon Kingsley (OSU), No. 49 Garrett Johns (Duke), No. 29 Ronnie Hohmann (LSU) and No. 39 Inaki Montes



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de la Torre (UVA), Riffice joined teammate Ben Shelton in the NCAA Semifinals, as the Gators made up half the remaining players. In doubles, Riffice and teammate Ben Shelton came into the draw as a 5-8 seed, making it to the quarterfinals with victories against No. 9 Juan Pablo Grassi Mazzuchi and Matias Soto of Baylor and No. 17 Justin Boulais and James Trotter of Ohio State. The Gators' first national ITA Arthur Ashe Leadership & Sportsmanship Award winner finished his career with a total of 99 singles wins and 78 doubles victories, while putting together a 25-7 singles record (12-0 in conference) and 20-9 doubles record in his final season. Riffice earned First Team All-SEC honors and was just the second Gator to be named the SEC Scholar-Athlete of the Year since Hamid Mirzadeh in 2004. He helped lead the team to its third-consecutive SEC regular season title with an undefeated 12-0 record, making it the first time any conference school has put together three undefeated seasons in a row while winning back-to-back-to-back conference titles in SEC history. After winning the regular season championship, Riffice and the Gators brought home yet another trophy after claiming the SEC Tournament title for the first time since 2016.

BEN SHELTON - 2022 **Two All-American Honors**

In 2022, sophomore Ben Shelton received the No. 1 overall seed into the singles draw, eventually winning the singles title in his NCAA Individual Championship debut. Shelton defeated six players in the top-60 of ITA rankings, including four in the top-20 during his incredible run. In the finals, Shelton took on sixth-ranked player August Holmgren of San Diego, winning the match in three sets to give the Gators back-to-back singles titles. In doubles, Shelton and teammate Sam Riffice came into the draw as a 5-8 seed, making it to the quarterfinals with victories against No. 9 Juan Pablo Grassi Mazzuchi and Matias Soto of Baylor and No. 17 Justin Boulais and James Trotter of Ohio State. Shelton completed his sophomore season with a team-high 37 singles victories and 27 of those coming against ranked



opponents. Ending the year on a 10-match win streak, the Gainesville native took home the program's first ITA All-American singles title in October and became the youngest Gator to be named the SEC Player of the Year. Shelton totaled 24 doubles wins on the season, with 12 coming against ranked teams. His 18 dual-match doubles wins ties for the team lead, while his 20 dual-match singles wins ranks second on the team. Shelton went 10-2 in SEC singles and 14-2 at the No. 1 position. Named the program's first ITA National Player of the Year for ending the season ranked No. 1 in the nation, Shelton earned First Team All-SEC honors and was named to the SEC All-Tournament Team as the Tournament MVP after clinching the SEC Tournament title. In addition, the Gator helped the team win its third-consecutive regular season conference championship with an undefeated 12-0 record, the first time any conference school has accomplished this feat.

WILL GRANT - 2023 **One All-American Honor**

In his final season as a Gator, Will Grant claimed an All-American honor for his doubles play with partner Axel Nefve. The pair entered the rankings at No. 31 on Feb. 28 and soared up to as high as No. 4 in the nation. Leading Florida from the top doubles position, Grant and Nefve went 16-12 overall with 11 ranked victories, while finishing 14-8 in dual play. Additionally, the duo was most dominant in SEC play where they would end 8-3 in conference. Grant and Nefve claimed the No. 5-8 seed in the NCAA Doubles Championship, securing their All-American status. In the tournament, the Florida tandem reached the round of 16 after dispatching Southern Cal's No. 13 Stefan Dostanic/Bradley Frye for the second time this season. Grant would finish as the No. 7 pairing in the country. The 2023 co-captain was also recognized on the All-SEC second team, All-SEC Community Service Team and the SEC Spring Academic Honor Roll.



AXEL NEFVE - 2023 **Two All-American Honors**

Axel Nefve earned two ITA All-American honors in his final collegiate season with the Florida Gators. After a stellar career at Notre Dame, Nefve transferred to the Orange & Blue as a graduate student for the 2022-23 campaign. Immediately stepping in with a veteran presence, Nefve commanded the No. 1 doubles and singles position. Beginning the season ranked No. 34, the Delray Beach, Fla. native finished with a 23-16 record and improved to No. 28 in the nation. Across the year, Nefve faced 23 ranked opponents and amassed seven ranked victories. The lefty earned an at-large selection into the NCAA Singles Championship and battled past both No. 7 Antoine Cornut-Chauvinc (FSU) and No. 40 Jonas Ziverts (Arizona) in three sets to reach the round of 16 for all-american status. In doubles, Nefve paired up with Will Grant and entered the NCAA Doubles Tournament as the 5-8 seed to earn all-american status. The Florida tandem were ranked as high as No. 4 during the season and brought down 11 ranked pairs, while finishing 16-12 together. During the NCAA Doubles Tournament, Grant/Nefve defeated No. 13 Dostanic/Frye (USC) to reach the round of 16. In addition to his ITA All-American honors, Nefve was named to first team All-SEC and the SEC first-year academic honor roll.
