Photo and Video Policy:

- Do not fire your camera until AFTER the golfer has made contact with the ball.
- Those with "inside the ropes" access MUST remain within ONE-ARM'S LENGTH of the ropes at all times.
- If an official or golfer asks you to move, do so quickly and without discussion.
- When around a tee box, ensure you are not on the teeing surface.
- Avoid moving around the putting green while golfers are hitting from the fairway.
- When greenside, avoid being directly in the player's line of vision.
- When players are on the green, limit movement to a minimum to avoid distracting players.
- DO NOT ask players to pose during a competitive round.
- Rule violations may result in loss of access.

JC DEACON

Head Coach - 12th Season

Entering his 12th season as head coach of the Florida Gators in 2025-26, J.C. Deacon looks to expand on the success of his first ten seasons with the Orange and Blue.

Deacon's Gators continued their success once again in the 2024-25 campaign and was named the Southeast Region Coach of the Year as Florida was both a National Championship Semifinalist and SEC Champions, all for the second time in three seasons. UF also won the NCAA Bremerton Regional to conclude a five win campaign along with a pair of medalist honors from Ian Gilligan (6th collegiate win) and Luke Poulter (first collegiate win).

Florida won two of the three postseason tournaments (SEC Championship & NCAA Regional) as the last time UF won both a team conference and regional title in the same season was 2011. It was also the fourth time both have been done in a season in program history - 1989 & 1992.

The victory at the regional was second under Deacon with the first being in 2018 for a total five team titles this season. It also marked the 32nd tournament title under him in 11 seasons. This was the third straight season of four-plus wins under Deacon and the seventh season of multiple wins, including the last five consecutive.

In the last four years, Florida has won the NCAA National Team Championship, NCAA Individual Championship, four NCAA Championships appearances, two NCAA Championship Semifinal Appearances, NCAA Regional Team Championship, two SEC Team Championships, three SEC Final Appearances, SEC Individual Championship, 19 tournament titles and 13 individual titles.

In the final round of stroke play at the national championship, Florida tied for the lowest-round (-8) of the day and second-lowest of the tournament with top-seeded Arizona State (-14). The final round produced a 72-hole score of 9-under 1143, its lowest score by par at the National Championships since 26-under in 2001, when Florida won the team title. The last time UF shot 9-under in a round at nationals was round four in 2006. Both Matthew Kress (T9, -3) and Gilligan (T13, -2) each earned NCAA All-Tournament Team and All-American status with their performances.

The Gators earned a spot in match play at nationals for the second time in three seasons and defeated No. 6 Texas 3-2 in the quarterfinals after rallying down 2-0 and winning the final three matches. It was Florida's fourth win in championship match play.

Florida reached SEC Match Play Finals for the third time overall and in the last four years (2022 & 2023) by defeating the No. 6 ranked Oklahoma Sooners 3-2 in the quarterfinals and the No. 1 seed, No. 2 ranked and the reigning SEC and National Champion Auburn Tigers, 3.5-1.5 in the semifinals. The Gators defeated Texas A&M 4-1 in the finals for the program's 17th conference title, ranking No. 2 among men's golf programs. It was also the 10th match play win in the SEC Championship, ranking second-most in the conference behind Vanderbilt's 13.

At the NCAA Bremerton Regional, Florida had a final round of 3-under 285 for a 54-hole score of 28-under 836 after a 16-under round two, which was the sixth lowest round by par and lowest at a regional since a 17-under final round in 2018. The final tournament score by par of 28-under is tied for eighth lowest all-time and third-lowest at an NCAA Regional in program history. Florida's 28-under par was the third-lowest in regional play this year - Auburn 32-under and Florida State 29-under, who both played on their home course.

Defending home turf for the sixth consecutive year, UF swept the 48th Gators Invitational behind Gilligan's sixth collegiate win, including defeating National Champion Oklahoma State. The victory was the 31st overall and 16th sweep (team and individual title) at the home tournament as Florida had an all-underclass-

men lineup competing.

The second individual title was captured by redshirt-sophomore Luke Poulter at the Schenkel Invitational. He led all three rounds and became the sixth Gator to win the tournament, joining Andy Bean, Matt Every, Phil Hancock, Steve Scott and Bank Vongvanij.

Heading into postseason play, the Orange and Blue defended its team title at the Calusa Cup behind a final round of 17-under, tied for third all-time in program history by par. The win marked the third consecutive year UF has won the final regular season event (2024 Calusa Cup & 2023 Augusta Hakskins Award Invite). The final round of 271 tied the lowest round by score this season as the -17 was the season-low score by par in a round. Also the final team score of 17-under also set a new tournament record for the Calusa Cup.

Following Florida's SEC and National Championship titles, the Gators featured a new look lineup while three First-Team All-Americans - Fred Biondi (NCAA Individual Champion), Ricky Castillo and Yuxin Lin - all departed. Returning from the championship teams was John DuBois and Matthew Kress.

After a shaky fall, the Gators responded with five wins in the spring to total six on the season. Florida recorded consecutive seasons with six wins for the first time since 1973-74 and 1974-75. UF ended the spring portion of the season with five tournament wins and a 4th place finish at the Southern Highlands Collegiate, that featured Ian Gilligan winning medalist honors and earning an exemption into the PGA Tour's 2024 Shriners Open in October.

The Orange and Blue have now claimed 27 team titles under head coach J.C. Deacon in 10 seasons. It marked the seventh season under Deacon UF has won multiple tournaments in a year and fourth of three-plus. Six tournament wins in a season is tied for the most under Deacon, which came last season and included an SEC and National Championship.

The new look Gators left their mark in the postseason. At the SEC Championship, UF was led by true freshman Jack Turner, who posted a team-best T2 finish in his first conference tournament start. The performance ties the second-best finish by a Gator true freshman at the SEC Championship with Camilo Villegas, who placed T2 in 2001. Vanderbilt and Florida meet for the third straight season in match play at SECs with the Commodores edging out the Gators 3-2 in extra holes in the quarterfinals.

Moving to NCAA Regional play in West Lafayette, Florida entered round three in the final advancing spot by four-shot. The Gators shot a final round of 2-under to take 3rd and make the cut by 12 strokes. Through the first hour-and-half in the final rounds, teams battled rainy and cold conditions. Florida put together great start and setup for success when the rain stopped, with a combined 1-under on the first hole (#10) and was even-par on counting scores through the first five holes in the rain. Florida made a charge in the final nine holes after finding itself 1-over at the turn and only a four-shot advantage over Indiana, who had just teed off its round. The Florida separation began with a trio of birdies from Parker Bell, John DuBois and Ian Gilligan. Then Jack Turner put the Hoosiers and Mississippi State's comeback efforts out of reach with a birdie on six to go up by 10 shots and into fourth place.

At the NCAA National Championship, Florida concluded with an 11th-place finish and battled for back-to-back match play appearances. An important 1-under 287 third round helped advance Florida to the final round of stroke play for the third consecutive season. The Gators started the day in eighth, and in the final match-play spot with a one-shot advantage. The Orange and Blue continued its streak of five straight top-11 finishes after winning the national title - 1974: 2nd, 1994: 3rd, 1969: T5 and 2002: T11.

It was a historic season for Deacon and the Gators in 2022-23 that led to the program's fifth National Championship and 16th SEC Championship. Both were first

for Deacon as he capped off the season being named Division I Dave Williams National Coach of the Year, a career first and only the second Gator head coach to receive the honor and third overall in program history and first since 2004 when Buddy Alexander received the recognition. He was also tabbed the SEC Coach of the Year.

Florida captured a national title for the first time in 22 years last week as the Gators swept NAAs with Fred Biondi winning the NCAA Individual Championship. It was the third UF golfer (Nick Gilliam 2001, Bob Murphy 1966) to achieve the honor and second time in 30 years the program swept both titles. Florida is one of seven schools to achieve the mark twice.

In nine seasons, Florida has won 21 total events and medalist honors under Deacon. The Gators won the NCAA team title, individual title and conference title in the same season for the first time in program history.

UF reached match play at nationals for the first time in program history after Deacon led the Gators to its best finish in the match play era (2009) last year in 10th. Florida played in the fourth round of stroke play for the fifth time in program history and third with Deacon. It was also the second consecutive season to clinch a spot in the final 18.

Florida finished stroke play in 2nd with a score of 1118 (-2), its lowest all-time at Grayhawk and first under par team score at the NAAs since 2006. The 1,118 was the lowest round score at the National Championships in program history. A final round of 279 (-1) marks the third consecutive under round after back-to-back 2-under 278s in round two and three. The 2-under performance by UF is the best round at the NCAA Championships since the opening round in 2007.

Florida made its 56th NCAA Championship appearance this year, ranking fifth most in the country. The Gators have advanced out of regionals six times under Deacon and the last two years. UF has qualified for regionals every season with Deacon at the helm.

A third round comeback at Bath Regional saw Florida erase a seven shot deficit led by a trio of rounds in the 60s by Yuxin Lin (66, -5), John DuBois (69, -2) and Ricky Castillo (69, -2) to earn a spot at Grayhawk.

In his ninth season, Deacon guided Florida to a SEC Championship Title for the first time in 12 years. The Gators got revenge and defeated No. 1 Vanderbilt 3-1-1 at Sea Island after falling 3-2 in 2022. Senior John DuBois, the 2022 SEC Individual Champion, sank a 15-footer for the match-clinching point.

Florida claimed six team titles and six individual titles this season, the most all-time under Deacon. The six team wins was the most since seven in 2003-04 as it was the sixth time the Gators have won at least six events in a season. The six medalist honors tied the program record in a season and only the third time in Florida history, the others were in 1989-90 and 2010-11.

Prior to the postseason, the Orange and Blue won four regular season tournaments, including the season opener and finale. At the Augusta Haskins Award Invite, Florida finished 39-under par, to tie second all-time in program history by par and only three shots away from the record (-42) set under Deacon at the 2018 NCAA Regional.

At the VyStar Credit Union Gators Invitational, Florida won its home event for the fourth straight year under Deacon and the 29th time overall in the tournament's 46th occurrence.

Deacon saw four golfers (Fred Biondi, Ricky Castillo, John DuBois and Yuxin Lin) all earn PING All-American honors, tied for the most selections by a school this year and tied the Florida record. It was the seventh time the Gators had four selections with the last time being in 2006. Biondi, Castillo, Lin and Quentin Debove were also selected to the PING All-Region Team. The trio of Biondi, Castillo and Lin collected All-SEC honors with Matthew Kress collecting freshman team recognition.

Success was also obtained off the course with Fred Biondi, Quentin Debove and John DuBois being named GCCA All-American Scholars, which marked the third consecutive years with multiple honorees under Deacon and most selections in a single season in program history.

After a bumpy fall in the 2021-22 season, Deacon got the Gators regrouped for a dominant spring. The second half of the season started on a strong note with winning back-to-back tournaments victories at the Sea Best Invitational and the VyStar Gators Invitational. The victory at Sea Best marked the fifth time in the spring opener and third time under Deacon.

At the Gator, Florida won the 45th annual event for the 28th time in program history and third under Deacon. The Gators shot 28-under (812) to win by 12 strokes over No. 3 Oklahoma State. Fred Biondi finished 14-under at 196 to tie the tournament record while he claimed his first collegiate medalist honor. The record was last set by Camilo Benedetti in 2001 as he tied for second in tournament score and tied third all-time in tournament score by par in three rounds. A native of Sao Paulo, Brazil, he set career bests in low round (63), tournament score and finish on the weekend. Biondi became the 16th UF golfer to be the individual champion at the invite as his birdie on 18th concluded the career outing and brought the crowd at Mark Bostick to their feet.

Biondi's first collegiate victory turned into a breakout season as he won his second tournament at the Calusa Cup along with two runner-up finishes, including at the NCAA Palm Beach Regional. He ended his season being named a PING First Team All-American, Haskins Award Finalist, All-SEC First Team, GCAA All-American Scholar, PING All-Region Team and two-time SEC Golfer of the Week.

At the 2022 SEC Championships, another Gator won his first collegiate title with John DuBois being crowned the individual champion. He became the 25th Gator in program history to win the title, the most by any SEC School. He joins the list of names such as Tommy Aaron, Steve Melnyk, Brian Gay, Camilo Benedetti, and volunteer assistant coach Billy Horschel. It marks the third UF golfer to win in the last five tournaments and third under Deacon - Alejandro Tosti (2017) and Andy Zheng (2018).

The Gators advanced to the SEC match play finals for the first time since the format was added in 2017. UF knocked off No. 6 Georgia (3-1-1) in the quarterfinals and No. 2 Texas A&M (3-1-1) in the semifinals. Florida finished runner-up for the 13th time in program history and first since 2010.

UF took care of business at the NCAA Palm Beach Regional with 3rd place performance, advancing to its

55th NCAA Championship and fifth under Deacon, only missing it twice under him. At Grayhawk and the NCAA Championships, Deacon helped rally the Gators late in round three on the back nine to make the top-15 cut. Florida concluded its run only seven strokes from making match play for a 10th place finish, marking the highest under Deacon and best since 2007 - a 9th place outing.

Deacon and the Gators returned to competition in a three-tournament fall schedule that featured SEC only play to combat the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. Florida touted a new lineup that featured at least three newcomers in each tournament, recording its best finish at the Vanderbilt Legends Collegiate where a 24-under par score put the team in a tie for fourth place. Deacon lit the fire for the Gators heading into the winter hiatus, responding with back-to-back first place finishes in their first two tournaments, including the second straight win at the Gators Invitational.

The Gators qualified for their 54th NCAA Championship in program history after a gutsy final round in the Cle Elum Regional propelled the team into fifth place. Florida would see its season come to an end after three rounds of stroke play at the Championship, with Ricky Castillo qualifying individually for the final day of stroke play and ultimately finishing 12th in the field.

Deacon oversaw an incredible freshman duo in Joe Pagdin and Tyler Wilkes. Pagdin was named the 2021 SEC Freshman of the Year and the pair were both names to the SEC All-Freshman Team. In addition, Ricky Castillo earned a spot on the Second-Team All-SEC. Castillo and Pagdin were both named to the Division I PING All-Region Southeast Team.

Under Deacon, the Gators were trending upwards before the 2019-20 season abruptly ended due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Following a challenging fall campaign, Florida opened the spring with three-straight top-five finishes. Of those finishes, Deacon's squad captured the team title at the VyStar Gators Invitational by an impressive 18 strokes, giving the Gators their first team win at Mark Bostick Golf Course since 2011.

Deacon oversaw the best one-two combination in the nation with junior John Axelsen and freshman Ricky Castillo. Both players received recognition at the national and league level following their outstanding play. Castillo was named the 2020 Phil Mickelson Outstanding Freshman Award honoree and SEC Freshman of the Year. He also earned a spot on the All-SEC First Team, NCAA Division I PING All-America First Team and appeared on the Ben Hogan Award Final Watch List. Alongside Castillo, Axelsen also earned First Team All-American and All-SEC First Team honors.

The Gators ended the 2018-19 season at the NCAA Regional in Pullman, Washington. Florida tallied four top-five finishes and seven top-10 finishes. Their best came at the Florida Gators Invitational where they finished in second place, just one stroke off the winner Vanderbilt. The Gators' arguably-best performance came in the last event of the regular season at the Robert Kepler Invitational, hosted by Ohio State. The Gators finished third with four Gators inside the top 25. Sophomore John Axelsen earned PING All-Region honors at the conclusion of the season.

The 2017-18 season brought another individual conference champion and All-American under Deacon's reign in sophomore Andy Zhang. The Gators notched three titles, five top-5 and eight top-10 finishes throughout the season. They won the NCAA Regional in record-breaking fashion. After sitting at 25-under and five clear of the field entering the final round, Florida was chasing history. The team needed to shoot 12-under-par to tie the record for strokes under par.

The Gators shattered that mark, shooting a final-round 271 (-17), the lowest single round to par in program history. By the end of the tournament, they were 42-under-par to set the new program record by five strokes en route to winning the event by 12 shots. All five Gator players finished 2-under or better in the tournament, the only school in the field to accomplish the feat. Florida won the regional title for the first time since 2011 and fifth time overall.

The Gators advanced to the 54th NCAA Championships in program history and the third time in four seasons the team has made it under Deacon.

During the 2016-17 season, the Gators tallied five team victories, nine top-5 finishes and 11 top-10 finishes en route to earning a national seed in the program's 53rd appearance in the NCAA Tournament. Individually, Florida had four players finish atop the leaderboard

including Alejandro Tosti's victory at the SEC Championships. Florida also had nine top-5 finishes and 21 top-10 finishes in 2016-17.

Deacon saw two of his golfers in Sam Horsfield and Tosti garner national honors as the pairing were both named to the Golfweek and PING All-America Teams. Tosti was placed on the Golfweek First Team, PING second team and All-SEC honors. Horsfield garnered honorable mention honors from Golfweek and PING and All-SEC honors. Gordon Neale was also named to the All-SEC team while Andy Zhang made Freshman All-SEC.

During its second season under his guidance, the team notched two victories, nine top-5 finishes and 11 top-10 finishes on its way to the NCAA Championships, the program's 52nd appearance in the event. They improved in every postseason tournament, finishing tied for third at the SEC Championship, tied for second at the NCAA Regional and 15th at the NCAA Championships. Individually, Deacon saw his players capture four victories, four runner ups and 22 top-10 finishes.

Under Deacon's coaching, Sam Horsfield cleaned up the awards season, winning the Phil Mickleson Award and SEC Freshman of the Year while also being named First Team Ping All-America, GCAA All-Freshman Team, PING All-Southeastern Region Team, All Nicklaus Team, and All-SEC. Deacon also saw Gordon Neale be named a Ping All-America Honorable Mention and named to the First-Year SEC Academic Honor Roll, Alejandro Tosti named to the PING All-Southeastern Region Team, and four Gators make the SEC Academic Honor Roll.

In Deacon's first season at the helm, the 2014-15 squad placed fourth at the NCAA Regional Championship en route to qualifying for the NCAA Championships for the 51st time in school history. On the way to the postseason, Florida collected seven top-10 finishes, including four runner-up performances. UF combined for 34 top-25 finishes and 14 top-10 finishes, with three Gators placing in the top five multiple times.

In his initial year with the program, Deacon coached J.D. Tomlinson to spots on the PING Honorable Mention All-America Team, PING All-Southeast Region Team and second team All-SEC and led Alejandro Tosti to a place on the Freshman All-SEC Team. Under his watch, five Gators were named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll, one was selected to the SEC First-Year Academic Honor Roll and two were chosen as Cleveland Golf/Srixon All-America Scholars.

Prior to his head coaching debut, Deacon served as an assistant coach at his alma mater, UNLV. A collegiate player for the Rebels from 2001-05, Deacon joined the UNLV staff in the spring of 2011 and helped the 2013 squad advance to match play at the NCAA Championships, where it tied for fifth. A pair of Rebels, Kevin Penner (2012 & 2013) and Derek Ernst (2012), earned All-America honors on his watch. Five Rebels collected a total of eight spots on the All-Mountain West Men's Golf Team under his guidance, with Ernst winning the 2012 Mountain West Conference individual title and Penner picking up the victory in 2013.

As a student-athlete, Deacon helped UNLV to a Mountain West title in 2002 by tying for second in the individual contest. He competed in the 2002 and 2003 NCAA Championships and was a member of the Golf Coaches Association of America All-American Scholar Team and the Academic All-Mountain West Team in 2004. Deacon graduated from UNLV with a bachelor's degree in communications in 2005 and has returned to the state where he completed high school. Deacon, who attended IMG Academy, graduated from St. Stephen's Episcopal School in Bradenton.

Deacon played professionally on the Gateway Tour and Canadian Tour. He was a U.S. Amateur semifinalist in 2005 before capturing two Minor League Golf Tour Titles in 2007, taking top honors at the Emerald Hills Classic and the Miami Shores Shootout.

Deacon played in 35 events over a three-year span (2008-10) on the Canadian Tour and made 17 cuts. His best finish came at the 2008 Saskatchewan Open, where he shared a spot for fourth place.

Deacon became the Gator men's golf team's 15th head coach when he replaced legendary Gator head coach Buddy Alexander in the summer of 2014.

Deacon and his wife, Jessi, have two daughters, Dylan and Sydney and a son, Ripp. He also has a brother Jeff and sister Gillian. His parents are Jennifer and Cam Deacon.

two runner-up finishes, including at the NCAA Palm Beach Regional. He ended his season being named a PING First Team All-American, Haskins Award Finalist, All-SEC First Team, GCAA All-American Scholar, PING All-Region Team and two-time SEC Golfer of the Week.

At the 2022 SEC Championships, another Gator won his first collegiate title with John DuBois being crowned the individual champion. He became the 25th Gator in program history to win the title, the most by any SEC School. He joins the list of names such as Tommy Aaron, Steve Melnyk, Brian Gay, Camilo Benedetti, and volunteer assistant coach Billy Horschel. It marks the third UF golfer to win in the last five tournaments: Alejandro Tosti (2017) and Andy Zhang (2018).

The Gators advanced to the SEC match play finals for the first time since the format was added in 2017. UF knocked off No. 6 Georgia (3-1-1) in the quarterfinals and No. 2 Texas A&M (3-1-1) in the semifinals. Florida finished runner-up for the 13th time in program history and first since 2010.

UF took care of business at the NCAA Palm Beach Regional with 3rd place performance, advancing to its 55th NCAA Championship. At Grayhawk and the NCAA Championships, the Gators rallied in round three on the back nine to make the top-15 cut. Florida concluded its run only seven strokes from making match play for a 10th place finish, marking the highest since 2007 - a 9th place outing.

He recently served as the volunteer assistant coach for the last four seasons (2017-2020).

Hart, a 2003 UF Hall of Fame inductee, was member of the Gator golf team from 1987 to 1990. Over his four years, Hart was the Southeastern Conference Freshman of the Year (1987), a three-time first-team All-SEC selection and a four-time All-American.

He is one of five Gators in program history to be a four-time All-American and was the first of eight to earn SEC Freshman of the Year Honors.

In his senior season (1989-1990), Florida shot just two strokes away from claiming the National Championship, falling to an Arizona State team led by Phil Mickelson.

Hart went on to have a decorated professional career which included two PGA Tour victories at the 1996 RBC Canadian Open and the 2000 Honda Classic.

That year, he would rise to 21st in the World Rankings, his highest ranking on the Tour.

Prior to the 2023-24 campaign, Head Coach J.C. Deacon announced the promotion of Dudley Hart to Associate Head Coach on Aug. 31, 2023.

In the spring of 2024, Hart enrolled back in classes and completed his degree requirements, earning his bachelor's degree in history.

The Gators continued their success once again in the 2024-25 campaign as Florida was both a National Championship Semifinalist and SEC Champions, all for the second time in three seasons. UF also won the NCAA Bremerton Regional to conclude a five win campaign along with a pair of medalist honors from Ian Gilligan (6th collegiate win) and Luke Poulter (first collegiate win).

Florida won two of the three postseason tournaments (SEC Championship & NCAA Regional) as the last time UF won both a team conference and regional title in the same season was 2011. It was also the fourth time both have been done in a season in program history - 1989 & 1992.

The victory at the regional was the first since 2018 for a total five team titles this season and the third straight season of four-plus victories.

In the final round of stroke play at the national championship, Florida tied for the lowest-round (-8) of the day and second-lowest of the tournament with top-seeded Arizona State (-14). The final round produced a 72-hole score of 9-under 1143, its lowest score by par at the National Championships since 26-under in 2001, when Florida won the team title. The last time UF shot 9-under in a round at nationals was round four in 2006. Both Matthew Kress (T9, -3) and Gilligan (T15, -2) each earned NCAA All-Tournament Team and All-American status with their performances.

The Gators earned a spot in match play at nationals for the second time in three seasons and defeated No. 6 Texas 3-2 in the quarterfinals after rallying down 2-0 and winning the final three matches. It was Florida's fourth win in championship match play.

Florida reached SEC Match Play Finals for the third time overall and in the last four years (2022 & 2023) by defeating the No. 6 ranked Oklahoma Sooners 3-2 in the quarterfinals and the No. 1 seed, No. 2 ranked and the reigning SEC and National Champion Auburn Tigers, 3.5-1.5 in the semifinals. The Gators defeated Texas A&M 4-1 in the finals for the program's 17th conference title, ranking No. 2 among men's golf programs. It was also the 10th match play win in the SEC Championship, ranking second-most in the conference behind Vanderbilt's 13.

At the NCAA Bremerton Regional, Florida had a final round of 3-under 285 for a 54-hole score of 28-under 836 after a 16-under round two, which was the sixth lowest round by par and lowest at a regional since a 17-under final round in 2018. The final tournament score by par of 28-under is tied for eighth lowest all-time and third-lowest at an NCAA Regional in program history. Florida's 28-under par was the third-lowest in regional play this year - Auburn 32-under and Florida State 29-under, who both played on their home course.

Defending home turf for the sixth consecutive year, UF swept the 48th Gators Invitational behind Gilligan's sixth collegiate win, including defeating National Champion Oklahoma State. The victory was the 31st overall and 16th sweep (team and individual title) at the home tournament as Florida had an all-underclassmen lineup competing.

The second individual title was captured by redshirt-sophomore Luke Poulter at the Schenkel Invitational. He led all three rounds and became the sixth Gator to win the tournament, joining Andy Bean, Matt Evers, Phil Hancock, Steve Scott and Bank Vongvanij.

Heading into postseason play, the Orange and Blue defended its team title at the Calusa Cup behind a final round of 17-under, tied for third all-time in program history by par. The win marked the third consecutive year UF has won the final regular season event (2024 Calusa Cup & 2023 Augusta Haskins Award Invite). The final round of 271 tied the lowest round by score this season as the -17 was the season-low score by par in a round. Also, the final team score of 17-under also set a new tournament record for the Calusa Cup.

Hart was announced as an assistant coach for Team USA at the 2024 Arnold Palmer Cup where Gators Ian Gilligan and Maisie Filler will be apart of his team.

Following Florida's SEC and National Championship titles, the Gators featured a new look lineup while three First-Team All-Americans - Fred Biondi (NCAA Individual Champion), Ricky Castillo and Yuxin Lin - all departed. Returning from the championship teams was John DuBois and Matthew Kress for the 2024-25 season.

After a shaky fall, the Gators responded with five wins in the spring to total six on the season. Florida recorded consecutive seasons with six wins for the first time since 1973-74 and 1974-75. UF ended the spring portion of the season with five tournament wins and a 4th place finish at the Southern Highlands Collegiate, that featured Ian Gilligan winning medalist honors and earning an exemption into the PGA Tour's 2024 Shriners Open in October.

The new look Gators left their mark in the postseason. At the SEC Championship, UF was led by true freshman Jack Turner, who posted a team-best T2 finish in his first conference tournament start. The performance ties the second-best finish by a Gator true freshman at the SEC Championship with Camilo Villegas, who placed T2 in 2001. Vanderbilt and Florida meet for the third straight season in match play at SECs with the Commodores edging out the Gators 3-2 in extra holes in the quarterfinals.

Moving to NCAA Regional play in West Lafayette, Florida entered round three in the final advancing spot by four-shot. The Gators shot a final round of 2-under to take 3rd and make the cut by 12 strokes. Through the first hour-and-half in the final rounds, teams battled rain and cold conditions. Florida put together great start and setup for success when the rain stopped, with a combined 1-under on the first hole (#10) and was even-par on counting scores through the first five holes in the rain. Florida

made a charge in the final nine holes after finding itself 1-over at the turn and only a four-shot advantage over Indiana, who had just teed off its round 1's. The Florida separation began with a trio of birdies from Parker Bell, John DuBois and Ian Gilligan. Then Jack Turner put the Hoosiers and Mississippi State's comeback efforts out of reach with a birdie on six to go up by 10 shots and into fourth place.

At the NCAA National Championship, Florida concluded with an 11th-place finish and battled for back-to-back match play appearances. An important 1-under 287 third round helped advance Florida to the final round of stroke play for the third consecutive season. The Gators started the day in eighth, and in the final match-play spot with a one-shot advantage. The Orange and Blue continued its streak of five straight top-11 finishes after winning the national title - 1974: 2nd, 1994: 3rd, 1969: T5 and 2002: T11.

It was a historic season for Hart and the Gators in 2022-23 that led to the program's fifth National Championship and 16th SEC Championship. He was also named the 2023 Jan Strickland Outstanding Assistant Coach of the Year. Hart is only the second Gator to receive the award in program history, joining John Handrigan in 2015. This marks the first time in program history that Florida has won the national assistant and head coach of the year awards as J.C. Deacon received it for the first time in his career.

Florida captured a national title for the first time in 22 years last week as the Gators swept NCAAs with Fred Biondi winning the NCAA Individual Championship. It was the third UF golfer (Nick Gilliam 2001, Bob Murphy 1966) to achieve the honor and second time in 30 years the program swept both titles. Florida is one of seven schools to achieve the mark twice.

He helped lead the Gators to its fifth National Championship in program history and first in 22 years last week as Florida also swept NCAAs with Fred Biondi winning the individual title. It was the third UF golfer (Nick Gilliam 2001, Bob Murphy 1966) to achieve the honor and second time in 30 years the program swept both titles. Florida is one of seven schools to achieve the mark twice.

UF reached match play at nationals for the first time in program history and its best finish in the match play era (2009) last year in 10th. Florida played in the fourth round of stroke play for the fifth time in program history and second with Hart. It was also the second consecutive season to clinch a spot in the final 18.

Florida finished stroke play in 2nd with a score of 118 (-2), its lowest all-time at Grayhawk and first under par team score at the NCAAs since 2006. The 118 was the lowest round score at the National Championships in program history. A final round of 279 (-1) marks the third consecutive under round after back-to-back 2-under 278s in round two and three. The -2 performance by UF is the best round at the NCAA Championships since the opening round in 2007.

Hart helped guide Florida to its 16th SEC Championship and first in 12 years. The Gators got revenge in a rematch and defeat of No. 1 Vanderbilt 3-1-1 at Sea Island. The conference championship was Hart's second overall as he won one in 1989 as a player.

The Gators won the NCAA team and individual title and conference title in the same season for the first time in program history.

Florida claimed six team titles and six individual titles this season. The six team wins was the most since seven in 2003-04 as it was the sixth time the Gators have won at least six events in a season. The six medalist honors tied the program record in a season and only the third time in Florida history, the others were in 1989-90 when Hart was on the team and in 2010-11.

Prior to the postseason, the Orange and Blue won four regular season tournaments, including the season opener and finale. At the Augusta Haskins Award Invite, Florida finished 39-under par, its second all-time in program history by par and only three shots away from the record (-42).

At the VyStar Credit Union Gators Invitational, Florida won its home star for the fourth straight year and the 29th time overall in the tournament's 46th occurrence.

Hart saw four golfers (Fred Biondi, Ricky Castillo, John DuBois and Yuxin Lin) all earn PING All-American honors, tied for the most selections by a school this year and tied the Florida record. It was the seventh time the Gators had four selections with the last time being in 2006. Biondi, Castillo, Lin and Quentin Debove were also selected to the PING All-Region Team. The trio of Biondi, Castillo and Lin collected All-SEC honors with Matthew Kress collecting freshman team recognition.

Success was also obtained off the course with Fred Biondi, Quentin Debove and John DuBois being named GCAA All-American Scholars, which marked the back-to-back years with multiple honorees and most selections in a single season in program history.

Dudley Hart was named the next assistant coach for the Gators on September 15, 2021.

After a bumpy fall in the 2021-22 season, Hart got the Gators regrouped for a dominant spring. The second half of the season started on a strong note with winning back-to-back tournaments victories at the Sea Best Invitational and the VyStar Gators Invitational. The victory at Sea Best marked the fifth time in the spring opener and third time under Deacon.

At the Gator, Florida won the 45th annual event for the 28th time in program history. The Gators shot 28-under (812) to win by 12 strokes over No. 3 Oklahoma State. Fred Biondi finished 14-under at 196 to tie the tournament record while he claimed his first collegiate medalist honor. The record was last set by Camilo Benedetti in 2001 as he tied for second in tournament score and tied third all-time in tournament score by par in three rounds. A native of Sao Paulo, Brazil, he set career bests in low round (63), tournament score and finish on the weekend. Biondi became the 16th UF golfer to be the individual champion at the invite as his birdie on 18th concluded the career outing and brought the crowd at Mark Bostick to their feet.

Biondi's first collegiate victory turned into a breakout season as he won his second tournament at the Calusa Cup along with

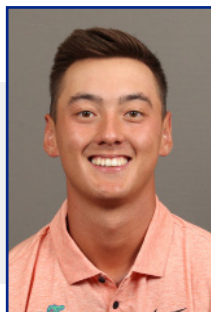

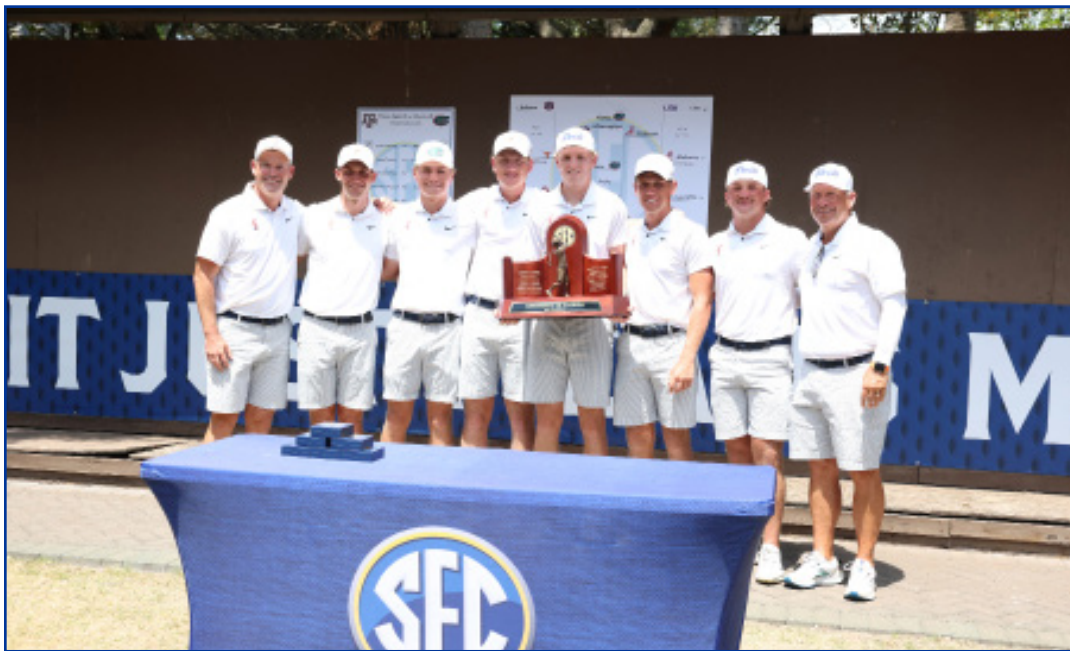

Overcoming a two-shot deficit with two holes remaining, the Gators captured their third team title by one stroke at the 96th Annual NCAA Championships. UF, which shot a final-round 283 for a total of seven-under par 1,145, played par golf on the two most difficult holes on the course to grab the title. Georgia Tech finished runner-up with a six-under 1,146 and North Carolina placed third at 1,147. The one-stroke victory was the closest margin in the NCAA Championships since 1984. Individually, junior Guy Hill was the Gators' top finisher, firing a final-round 69 (-3) to finish in a four-way tie for third with a tournament total of one-under par 287. Sophomore Chris Couch, who made a four-foot par putt on the 18th hole in the last round to clinch the team title, finished tied for seventh with an even-par 288. The Gators captured their fourth national title by firing a 13-under final round of 275 at the 2001 NCAA Championships hosted at Duke University Golf Course in Durham, N.C. Four Florida golfers turned in under-par rounds in the final 18 holes, including senior Nick Gilliam, whose final-round 71 gave him a total 186 and the individual medal. Gilliam became only the second Florida golfer to win the title, joining Bob Murphy, who took the crown in 1966. Florida's school-record total of 1,126 was 18 strokes better than runner-up Clemson, the third-largest margin of victory since the NCAA Championships moved to four-round play in 1968. The win completed an incredible turnaround after the Gators shot an opening-round 296 to put them in a 13th-place tie, 16 shots from the lead. Florida then shot 10-under 278 on the second day to move into second place and finished the third round at 11-under, 277, to pull into a first-place tie with Arizona heading in the final 18 holes. The Gators also featured one of the two golfers tied for the individual runner-up spot. Junior Camilo Benedetti shot a 9-under to finish at 279 to tie with Jamie Elson from Augusta State.

Senior Fred Biondi, just three days removed from winning the NCAA individual title, provided the clinching point Wednesday night to secure the Florida Gators the team crown at the 2023 NCAA Championships at Grayhawk Golf Club. But Biondi, whose par on the 18th hole locked up the program's fifth national title, was quick to point out in the emotional post-match euphoria that the spotlight did not deserve to be on him. And everybody on hand soaked in the program's first title in 23 years, especially Coach J.C. Deacon, assistant and UF alum Dudley Hart and Biondi's four teammates, who collectively stared down yet another high-intensity match-play challenge — their third in two days — before finishing off a 3-1 victory over Georgia Tech. About an hour earlier, the fifth-seeded Yellow Jackets seemingly had command of their overall match against the No. 2 seed, leading three of the four individual matchups still in contention before the Gators made their move. It wasn't a comeback along the lines of Tuesday night's rally from a 2-0 deficit against Florida State in the semifinals, but it showed a lot of moxie. Senior Yuxin Lin posted Florida's first point with a par putt on No. 15 to finish a lopsided 4&3 victory against Cristo Lamprecht. At that point, however, Tech led one match by a stroke and the three other matches were tied. It wasn't that long before the Yellow Jackets seemingly grabbed momentum across the course, with leads in three of the four matches still out with the entire field through at least 12 holes.

Then things changed. The Jackets were poised to make it 1-1 when Bartley Forrester stood over a three-foot putt on 17 that would have closed his match against redshirt freshman walk-on Matt Kress, who lost the first hole of the day and played from behind their entire match. Forrester, though, watched his "gimme" do a U-turn and hop out, drawing Kress within a stroke with a hole to play. The mistake proved costly, as Kress hit a great drive and stuck his second shot at 18 to two feet for birdie. The win there tied their match and sent it to sudden death before eventually being decided on the 20th hole when Forrester made bogey and Kress, after duck-hooking a drive into the desert, made double. By then, though, Kress' teammates had seized control of the overall match. By taking Forrester into extras, Kress gave the Gators time to settle in. In the time Kress was rallying for extra golf, senior John DuBois tied his match with Connor Howe at No. 15 and eventually won it with a par at 18 to Howe's bogey to push the Gators to a 2-1 advantage. By then, both Biondi, teeing off at 18, and Ricky Castillo, at 17, had surged to 1-up leads in their individual matches, with the Gators needing only one of them to close out to clinch. Biondi, from São Paulo, Brazil, hit a great tee shot, followed by a solid approach to the front of the green, then and lagged his putt to within two feet. It was close enough that Tech's Hiroshi Tai, already lying four, conceded to give Biondi the hole and the Gators the NCAA championship. Indeed, it was a fitting finish for the talented senior quartet of Biondi, Castillo and DuBois, along with Lin, the transfer from USC, who together grew not only as golfers but teammates with a purpose they put before their individual achievements.

When it comes to success after college, the University of Florida golf program demonstrates this as well as any university in the country. More than 63 Gators have gone on to play professionally on the PGA Tour, Web.com Tour (formerly Nationwide Tour) and Champions Tour (formerly Senior PGA Tour). Former UF golfers have amassed over \$135 million in winnings.

Since 1957, when Doug Sanders, Dave Ragan and Pat Schwab entered the ranks, Gator alumni have hoisted the trophies for numerous tournaments, including three of the four majors. Andy North won the U.S. Open twice (1978, 1985). Mark Calcavecchia won the British Open in 1989 and Tommy Aaron took home the coveted green jacket from the 1973 Masters tournament.

GATORS' AMATEUR SUCCESS

The U.S. Amateur Championships is the oldest and one of the most prestigious tournaments in the country – one day older than the U.S. Open. The Amateur has been a match-play championship with the exception of an eight-year period from 1965-72, when it was stroke play.

Four Florida players have etched their names on the Havermeier Cup. Bob Murphy was the first Gator to win the U.S. Amateur when he took the title in 1965. Steve Melnyk followed by claiming the championship four years later. Fred Ridley went on to win the title in 1975, before Bubba Dickerson became the fourth Gator to win the U.S. Amateur in 2001. Former head coach Buddy Alexander was also a past winner, having taken the trophy in 1986. During his tenure at Florida, he was the only active college coach to own a U.S. Amateur title.

Gator Billy Horschel was one of the highlights of the 2006 Championship, firing an 18-hole tournament and USGA record 60 in the first round at Chaska Town Course in Chaska, Minn., en route to claiming the individual medal for the stroke-play portion of the tournament. He was the first golfer to bring the medal back to Gainesville since Brian Gay captured the top spot in 1993. Horschel collected two solid match-play wins before dropping a wild third-round match to eventual semifinalist Ryan Yip.

T.J. Vogel saw success during the summer of 2012 in amateur play. Vogel won the U.S. Amateur Public Links Championship at Soldier Hollow Golf Course in Midway, Utah. With the victory, he received an invitation to the 2013 Masters Tournament and shot the second-lowest score of the amateurs in the field.

In the last two summers, a Florida Gator has been victorious at the Western Amateur, including a sweep in 2024 with Parker Sands winning the Junior and Ian Gilligan the Amateur. Gilligan was crowned the champion after winning a marathon 29-hole match against teammate Jack Turner as Florida has three of the four semi-finalists that year. Incoming freshman Trevor Gutschewski won the 2025 Junior and Zack Swanwick earned medalist honors.

At the 2025 U.S. Amateur, the Gators had nine current players competing which was the most among the field.

GATORS IN THE RYDER CUP

The Ryder Cup, now an international competition between the best golfers from Europe and the United States, has been contested 40 times over 80 years. Founded on pride rather than prize money, the Ryder Cup has featured 10 Gator golfers who have competed on 16 different Ryder Cup teams.

The first Ryder Cup was held in 1927, at the Worcester Country Club, in Worcester, Mass., where the team from the United States defeated the team from Great Britain, 9.5-2.5. Since that first Ryder Cup, there have been only two occasions that have caused the event to be cancelled or postponed. The breakout of World War II caused the cancellation of the 1939-45 matches, while the terrorist attacks on the United States in September of 2001 caused the postponement of the matches until the following year. Ryder Cup matches are now played during every even-numbered year, alternating venues in the United States and Europe.

The current Ryder Cup format was adopted in 1979, when the event expanded from the Great Britain/Ireland team to allow players from all European nations to compete.

MARK BOSTICK GOLF COURSE

Florida boasts one of the finest overall facilities in all of collegiate golf, most recently completing a \$600,000 renovation in August of 2014.

Since 1962, the Mark Bostick Golf Course (formerly the Gainesville Golf and Country Club) has been home to the Gators. The Florida golf program moved into a new era in 2001, when it began playing on a full-renovated course. While improvements and additions have been made over the years, the \$1.8-million clubhouse renovation and a \$4-million course renovation in 2001 were the first full-scale renovations in 20 years.

The University of Florida hired Jacksonville-based architect Bobby Weed to head up the renovation. With the help of an experienced staff, he constructed a challenging course for collegiate golfers.

Par at the course remained 70 after the renovation, but the yardage was increased to 6,701.

Some holes changed only slightly, keeping some familiarity, while others were completely redesigned to challenge golfers day-in and day-out. Both the men's and the women's golf teams host tournaments at Mark Bostick Golf Course in the spring of each year.

The Mark Bostick Golf Course plays host to the annual Gator Invitational and Gator Women's Golf Invitational, in addition to the yearly Gator Golf Day, where alumni and current PGA and LPGA Tour players return each year to give their time and money to continue the winning tradition of the UF golf program. The course has also hosted the Southeastern Conference Championship, as well as various state tournaments.

Course facts:

- Located less than a mile from campus, the University Golf Course and the Guy Bostick Clubhouse (home of the men's and women's golf teams) are situated on 110 acres of heavily tree-lined, softly rolling terrain.
- A \$1.1-million clubhouse was completed in the summer of 1998 on the site of the original clubhouse, thanks to a donation from former UF student and Gator Booster Guy Bostick.
- The course went through a \$4-million renovation in 2001, which included new tees and fairway surfaces, 140-plus bunkers, triple-row irrigation and a newly designed practice facility for the teams.
- In the summer of 2008, the University Athletic Association spent \$1.8 million for renovations on the interior and exterior of the clubhouse. The updated clubhouse features renovated locker rooms for both UF teams with wooden lockers and a new team lounge area. New offices were added for the UF golf coaches and the pro shop, while the snack bar and public locker rooms were renovated and expanded. The new entryway features trophy cases that display UF golf championship trophies and highlight the program's success.
- The Chris M. Kane Golf Practice Complex opened in the spring of 2012. The 56-by-32 foot state-of-the-art facility features fitness and club fitting/repair rooms, a putting lab and two separate covered hitting bays equipped with the latest swing analysis equipment.
- The course went through a \$600,000 renovation in the summer of 2014, which included an overhaul of the putting greens, sand traps and team practice areas. The course now features state-of-the-art greens of Ultradwarf, a new turf that has become the standard for Florida putting surfaces. The renovation also resulted in re-sanded greens and friendlier shots at the flag, thanks to the removal of some trees in decline, plus some heavy-trimming of branches throughout the course.
