Florida HC **Jon Sumrall** is the **only** coach in FBS history to make **four** conference championship game appearances at two schools (Troy & Tulane) in his first **four** years as a head coach. He is also the **first** coach in FBS history to WIN a conference title at multiple schools in his first **four** seasons, combining for **three** conference titles. Since 2022, Sumrall's **18** road wins are tied for the **most** in the FBS alongside Ryan Day and Dan Lanning, while his **14-2** record in road conference tilts ranks **third** behind Day and Lanning. He ranks **sixth** in the FBS in wins (**44**) since 2022 and sixth in win percentage (**.786**) among active coaches (more on pages 10-11). Florida's **66** points in Week 1 were the most ever by a UF head coach in his debut, and the most by a Sumrall team since Oct. 5, 2024 vs. UAB (71).

Florida's 66 points were powered by QB **Aaron Philo**, who set career highs in passing touchdowns (**three**), total touchdowns (**four**), completion percentage (**76.2%**) and passer rating (**223.8**), the latter of which ranked **third** all-time in a UF season opener (min. 15 attempts). Philo is one of **eight** FBS players with 250+ pass yards, a completion % over 75.0%, three passing TDs and a 220+ rating.

THE STORYLINE

- Fresh off scoring the most points (66) by a Florida head coach in his UF debut, **HC Jon Sumrall** looks to improve to 2-0 as the Gators take on Campbell for the first time in program history.
- Sumrall's 45-point margin of victory in Week 1 vs. FAU (66-21) was the fourth-largest all-time in a UF head coaching debut, topping both Steve Spurrier (50-7 in 1990) and Urban Meyer (32-14 in 2005).
- Florida scored its fifth-most points (66) in a season opener and most since 1994 vs. New Mexico State (70) - most in any game since 2021 vs. Samford (70). UF's 66 points were its most vs. an FBS team since 2001 vs. Vanderbilt (71).
- Florida totaled its most yards in a season opener (624) since 2020 vs. Ole Miss (642) and most in any game since 2021 vs. Samford (717). Florida did not attempt a punt for the first time since Oct. 2, 2022 vs. Eastern Washington.
- UF ranks fourth in the FBS in passing efficiency (230.82), sixth in scoring offense (66.0) and 14th in total offense (624.0).
- The Gators scored on their first six offensive drives of the season, totaling 38 points on nine explosive plays. Florida finished with 16 explosive plays in Week 1 (nine passing, seven rushing).
- Florida's 16 explosives were its most since Sept. 21, 2024 vs. MSU. Florida had 16-plus in four of 50 games from 2022-25.
- With a win, Sumrall would become the first UF head coach to start 2-0 since Jim McElwain in 2015, and the 12th to start his UF tenure with back-to-back victories alongside Steve Spurrier (5-0) and Urban Meyer (4-0).
- Florida is 25-1 across 26 contests against FCS opponents since 1981, most recently defeating LIU, 55-0, in the 2025 season opener. The Gators' lone FCS loss during that span came against Georgia Southern in 2013.
- The Gators have outscored their opponents in those 26 games by an average margin of 39.3 points (1,279-256).
- Florida has eclipsed 450 total yards in five-straight FCS games while rushing for over 150 yards in nine in a row.
- The Gators have totaled 400-plus yards and 200-plus passing yards in 10-straight games vs. FCS teams since 2014.
- Florida reps the nation's No. 3 special teams unit, No. 5 running back room and No. 9 wide receiver group (Phil Steele).
- As Florida's first returning 1,000-yard rusher since 1992, **RB Jadan Baugh** opened his draft year with 14 carries for 160 yards (11.4 YPG) and three rushing touchdowns for the second-highest rushing total and scoring output of his career.
- Each of Baugh's two-highest rushing totals have come in his last two games, combining for 426 rushing yards (213.0 YPG) and five rushing touchdowns vs. Florida Atlantic (160) and Florida State (266).
- Baugh is looking to become the first-ever Gator to rush for 1,000 yards in back-to-back seasons (more on page 3).
- WR Vernell Brown III** set a career high with 117 receiving yards in Week 1 while catching his first-career touchdown en route to the first 100-yard receiving game of his career (more on page 5).
- Florida has won 36 of their last 46 games in The Swamp dating back to 2018, outscoring opponents by 761 points in that span for an average of 16.5 PPG while putting up 447.8 YPG. Florida is 17-30 away from home in that time.
- The Gators are 9-2 in their last 11 games in The Swamp dating back to 2024, outscoring opponents by 164 points in that span for an average of 14.9 PPG while totaling 414.4 YPG. Florida is 2-9 away from home in that stretch.
- The 2026 opener was The Swamp's 19th-straight sellout and UF's fifth-largest crowd for a home opener (90,295).
- Florida's all-time, NCAA-record scoring streak currently sits at 474-consecutive games dating back to 1988.

- BAUGHLIN' BELLOW: BEST BACK IN CFB -

- As Florida's first returning 1,000-yard rusher since Errict Rhett in 1992, junior All-SEC **RB Jadan Baugh** is fresh off one of the best seasons in team history after carrying 220 times for 1,170 yards, eight touchdowns and 5.3 YPC while pacing all SEC running backs with 33 catches and 210 receiving yards.
- In Week 1, Baugh rushed for 160 yards and three touchdowns for his sixth-career 100-yard performance, marking just the fourth three-TD, 150-plus-yard rushing game by a Gator since 1996. Jeff Driskel last accomplished the feat vs. Vanderbilt in 2012 while Fred Taylor did so twice in 1997 (S. Carolina, Vandy).
- Driskel and Baugh are the only two players in program history to accomplish the feat in under 20 carries.
- The feat has been accomplished just five times by an SEC player since the start of 2025, including just twice under 20 carries. Baugh is the lone SEC player to have accomplished the feat this season.
- Baugh has logged 415-straight touches and 363-consecutive rushes without a fumble entering Week 2. In 2025, Baugh led all FBS players with 220 rushes without a fumble and 40 targets without a drop.
- Baugh has gone 68-straight carries over more than two full games without a negative rush, with just one negative rush (-2) in the last four games spanning 85 carries for 583 yards and six touchdowns.
- Baugh's nine missed tackles forced and 120 yards after contact ranked third and fifth in the FBS in Week 1, the latter equating to 75.0% of his rushing yardage. Baugh also posted four explosive runs (18, 25, 12, 61).
- Baugh boasts 1,314 yards after contact in his career, equating to 65.6% of his career rushing yards (2,003).
- Entering Week 2, here are Baugh's SEC/FBS rushing ranks: TDs (1st/2nd), YPG (1st/4th), YPC (2nd/17th).
- Baugh ripped off a career-long rush of 61 yards in the third quarter followed by his third rushing TD of the game to hit 2,000 career rushing yards – the 20th Gator to do so (eighth in three years or less).
- Baugh's three rushing TDs were his most in a game since rushing for five TDs in his first-career start vs. Kentucky in 2024 (tied program record). Baugh now boasts 21 career touchdowns (18 rushing).
- Baugh passed 2,000 career rushing yards on his 367th-career carry in Week 1 as the 10th-quickest in team history – one faster than Earnest Graham (368), who reached 2,000 in the 2002 opener vs. UAB.
- Baugh has rushed for 522 yards across his last three games for an average of 174.0 YPG.

- THE BAUGCARRIER'S RECORD YEAR -

- As UF's 10th 1,000-yard rusher (12th 1,000-yard season) in program history and first since Kelvin Taylor in 2015, Baugh ran for a career-high 266 yards in Week 14 of 2025 – the most all-time by a Gator vs. FSU and second-most in UF history behind Emmitt Smith's 316 yards vs. New Mexico in 1989. Needing the seventh-fewest attempts (198) of any Gator to eclipse 1,000 rush yards, Baugh's 1,170 rush yards ranked seventh in UF history and were the most since Ciatrick Fashion's 1,267 yards in 2004.
- Baugh's 91.4 PFF Grade for HandsFumble ranked second in the entire FBS and first in the SEC.
- Baugh finished with 10 total touchdowns (eight rushing, two receiving) and 1,380 scrimmage yards, the latter ranking third in the SEC and 12th in the FBS through conference championship weekend in 2025.
- Baugh was the first UF underclassman to rush for 1,000 yards and the third Gator to do so vs. FSU.
- Baugh ranked third in the SEC and 15th in the FBS in net rush yards in 2025.
- Baugh was one of three FBS players (only in SEC) with 30+ catches, 1,100+ rush yards and two receiving TDs.
- Baugh had five more catches (33) than any SEC running back through conference championship weekend.
- Baugh's 65 missed tackles forced ranked eighth in the FBS and third in the SEC behind Kewan Lacy and Ahmad Hardy. His 35 explosive rushes ranked t-12th in the FBS and second in the SEC.
- Baugh ranked third in the SEC in rush YPG and 14th in yards per carry (11th among running backs).
- By rushing for a career-high 266 yards in Week 14, Baugh became the first Gator to rush for 200 yards in a game since Ciatrick Fashion in 2004 (210). His 266 yards sit second all-time in program history.
- Baugh delivered a five-touchdown game in his first-career start vs. Kentucky in 2024 and tied the school record for the most in a game (Trey Burton vs. UK in 2010, Tim Tebow vs. South Carolina in 2007).

- GATORS GROUND GAME GUIDE -

- Led by Baugh, Florida's running back unit ranks No. 5 in the FBS entering the season per Phil Steele, behind Missouri, Texas, Louisville and Miami: *"HC Jon Sumrall feels like he has four starters with redshirt freshman **Duke Clark**, **Evan Pryor**, who started at Cincy, and **London Montgomery**, who started at East Carolina."*
- Eight Gators (five RBs) had a carry in Week 1, as Clark had a career-high 65 yards on eight carries while scoring his first-career TD on a 10-yard grab. **RB Byron Louis** set career highs with four carries and 16 yards rushing while catching a 32-yard pass for his first-career reception in his second-career game.
- Florida has run for over 100 yards in seven-straight games and 200 yards in back-to-back contests.
- The Gators added a combined 53 career games, 399 rush attempts, 2,188 rush yards, 19 rushing touchdowns, 48 receptions and 403 receiving yards to the roster with Pryor and Montgomery.
- Factoring in the rest of the UF running back room, Florida returns 85 games played, 780 carries, 4,146 rush yards, 35 rushing touchdowns, 87 receptions, 660 receiving yards and five receiving touchdowns.

- LET THE KIDS PLAY -

- Florida has produced an SEC-best **14** Freshman All-SEC honors since 2022 while pacing the league with **12** Freshman All-SEC nods since 2023. As a result, the Gators boast a league-high **115** Freshman All-SEC accolades all-time. In 2025, **WR Vernell Brown III** earned **three** sets of Freshman All-SEC honors at wide receiver, return specialist and all-purpose. He is the first player to collect **three** separate Freshman All-SEC honors since 2022 (Barrion Brown - Kentucky) and one of **five** players all-time to accomplish the feat.

- REBUILDING THE OFFENSIVE LINE -

- Highlighted by the departures of two-time All-American C Jake Slaughter (Second Round) and OT Austin Barber (Third Round) via the NFL Draft, Florida is replacing three of five starters on the offensive line.
- Slaughter became Florida's first-ever First Team All-American center in 2024, and earned AA honors again as a Rimington Trophy finalist in 2025 thanks to the fourth-best grade among FBS centers (78.9). He was the SEC's top-graded center in pass blocking, sitting second in overall grade and run blocking.
- Entering the 2026 season, 11 Gators owned a combined 180 career games played including 69 starts.
- Florida's Week 1 starting O-line consisted of **LT Bryce Lovett**, **LG Knijeah Harris**, **C Harrison Moore**, **RG TJ Shanahan Jr.** and **RT Emeka Ugorji**.
- Moore, Shanahan Jr. and Ugorji all made their first starts as Gators.
- The Gators did not surrender a sack or QB hurry while allowing just four TFLs against FAU in Week 1.
- Florida ranks sixth in the SEC and 19th in the FBS in pass blocking (87.3) and sixth in the SEC and 40th in the FBS in run blocking (67.0) entering Week 2.
- Shanahan Jr. (85.1), Harris (84.8), Ugorji (84.7) and **LT TJ Dice Jr.** (83.3) graded as Florida's top-graded pass blockers in Week 1 while Dice Jr. (73.2), **RT Daniel Pierre Louis** (65.1) and Harris (63.6) led in run blocking.
- Moore played the most snaps (58) while finishing with 100% efficiency with zero QB hurries or pressures, followed by Shanahan Jr. (47) and Harris (43).
- Across the last 17 games, the Gators have allowed 82 tackles for loss and 27 sacks.
- Florida's only returning starters on the offensive line this season were senior **LG Knijeah Harris** (12) and senior **RT Caden Jones** (10), who combined for 22 starts during the 2025 campaign.
- Harris' streak of 26-consecutive starts in Orange & Blue is the longest-active streak on the UF roster.
- Florida entered 2026 with 58 combined career starts and 119 games played among projected starters on the O-line (Harris, Lovett, Moore, Ugorji and Shanahan).
- Florida has allowed 96 sacks in 51 games since 2022, which ranks sixth in the SEC.

- LOOK BACK ON LAST YEAR'S PROTECTION -

- UF's offensive line allowed 20 sacks in 12 games last season (fifth in SEC), with one sack or less in six games.
- Entering the 2025 season, Florida's offensive line boasted 223 combined games played, which ranked 11th in the FBS and fourth in the SEC behind Auburn (236), Texas A&M (235) and Mississippi State (227).
- The Florida O-line also entered with 109 career starts, which ranked 14th in the FBS and fifth in the SEC.
- In 2025, Florida ranked second in the SEC and 15th in the FBS in run blocking, per PFF.
- The Gators finished the regular season ranking sixth in the SEC with 20 sacks allowed in 12 games.
- Florida allowed one or zero sacks in six of 12 games last season (six sacks in last five weeks combined).
- Florida gave up one sack at Ole Miss in Week 12, who entered the matchup with 21 sacks on the season.
- Florida allowed zero sacks and three TFLs in Week 6 vs. Texas, who had a season-low six QB pressures.
- OL Kamryn Waites**, **OL Bryce Lovett** and **OL Roderick Kearney** did not allow a sack all season.

- THE TIGHT END ROOM -

- The 2026 UF tight end room returns junior **TE Amir Jackson**, who caught three passes for 29 yards and one touchdown in 12 games last season, as well as sophomore **TE Micah Jones** (one game played).
- To fortify the unit, the Gators welcome transfers **TE Luke Harpring** (Georgia Tech), **TE Lacota Dippre** (James Madison) and **TE Evan Chieca** (New Haven).
- Jackson drew his first-career start in Week 1, catching his lone target for 14 yards.
- Harpring (19 yards) and Jones (six yards) also hauled in their only targets.
- Harpring caught 16 passes for 201 yards in 17 games over two seasons at Georgia Tech (2024-25), highlighted by 13 receptions for 158 yards during the 2025 campaign.
- After playing defensive line at Charlotte in 2024, Dippre hauled in 17 catches for 192 yards and three touchdowns in 14 games to help James Madison to the 2025 College Football Playoff.
- Across two seasons at New Haven (2024-25), Chieca totaled 43 catches for 334 yards and five touchdowns in 20 games. Chieca logged 31 receptions for 255 yards and four scores in 10 contests last season.



- A TRUE FRESHMAN RECEIVER FOR THE AGES -

- **WR Vernell Brown III** finished last season leading UF in receptions (40) and receiving yards (512), becoming the first UF true freshman in program history to lead the Gators in both categories.
- Brown III totaled 106 more yards than the next-closest Gator (J. Michael Sturdivant - 406) and seven more receptions than any other UF player despite playing in just 10 games.
- Among FBS true freshmen, Brown III ranked fourth in receptions (40), fourth in receiving yards per game (51.2), fifth in receiving yards (512) and 11th in yards per catch (12.8).
- Brown III was one of two FBS true freshmen with 40+ catches, 12.0+ YPC and 50.0+ YPG (Andrew Marsh, Mich.).
- Brown III finished top-32 among SEC players in receiving YPG (23rd), catches (24th) and receiving yards (31st).
- In Week 7 at Texas A&M, Brown III and **WR Dallas Wilson** became the first two true freshman wide receivers to start in the same game in program history.
- Despite missing the final four games to injury, D. Wilson tied for the team lead with three receiving TDs in just four games. *That made Florida the only FBS team to be led by true freshmen in catches, yards and TDs.*
- Brown III became the third true freshman wide receiver to start on opening day for the Gators in Week 1 of the season, joining Antonio Callaway (2015) and Percy Harvin (2006).

- RECEIVERS REPORT -

- UF's receiving unit ranks No. 9 nationally and No. 3 in the SEC behind Texas and Tennessee (Phil Steele).
- Florida returns its leading receiver in **WR Vernell Brown III** in addition to **RB Jadan Baugh**, **WR TJ Abrams**, **WR Dallas Wilson** and **TE Amir Jackson**. The first-four players all caught 10 or more passes last year.
- A strong transfer class fortified the unit: **WR Eric Singleton Jr.** (Auburn), **WR Bailey Stockton** (Georgia Tech), **WR Micah Mays Jr.** (Wake Forest), **WR Jaylen Lloyd** (Oklahoma State) and **WR Ace Ciongoli** (Indiana).

- Brown III set a career high with a team-best 117 receiving yards while catching his first-career touchdown en route to the first 100-yard receiving game of his career.
- Brown III's 117 yards were powered by three explosive plays (49, 33, 18), which accounted for 100 yards alone.
- Brown III caught his first-career touchdown reception in his 11th career game, scoring on a 49-yard touchdown grab on UF's opening drive of the season.
- Brown III's 49-yard touchdown reception marked Florida's longest since WR J. Michael Sturdivant hauled in a 57-yard touchdown grab vs. Ole Miss on Nov. 15, 2025.
- After Brown III, Florida's top receivers were Wilson (3-47-0), Stockton (3-20-1) and Mays Jr. (2-15-0) while Abrams catch his lone target for a career-long reception of 63 yards.
- In 117 total snaps played by both Brown III and D. Wilson from 2025-26, Florida has averaged 8.2 yards per play for a total of 955 yards, 39 first downs and seven touchdowns.
- Stockton increased the UF lead to 14-0 with a 12-yard touchdown catch from Philo, marking his second-career touchdown reception and first since the 2024 season.
- Stockton and Philo connected for their first touchdown since playing together at Prince Avenue Christian School in 2022, marking their 40th-career TD connection together (39 in high school).
- Singleton Jr. was the active NCAA Division I leader in consecutive games with a reception (36) prior to being held without a catch in Week 1.
- Across three seasons at Georgia Tech (2023-24) and Auburn (2025), Singleton Jr. amassed 2,002 receiving yards, 12 receiving touchdowns and one rushing touchdown for averages of 55.6 YPG and 12.4 YPC.
- Singleton Jr. has caught at least 48 passes with 500-plus receiving yards and three-plus touchdowns in each of the last three seasons (2023-25), totaling a career-high 58 receptions last season across 12 games.
- Playing 26 games at Georgia Tech (2023-25), Stockton caught 38 passes for 439 receiving yards and one score over the last two seasons.
- Also with 26 prior career games under his belt (2023-25), Mays Jr. tallied 34 receptions, 520 receiving yards and four touchdowns across the last two seasons at Wake Forest.
- Lloyd played in two games at Oklahoma State last season after recording 19 catches for 492 yards and three touchdowns in two seasons at Nebraska (2023-24).
- D. Wilson is the only UF true freshman receiver in team history to catch three touchdowns in his first two games, and the first Florida receiver (any year) to do so in his first two games since Carlos Alvarez in 1969.

The Gators lost **over 90%** of their passing with the departure of DJ Lagway as well as just **over 50%** of their receiving, but were able to return **77.8%** of their rushing attack.

Despite some of the losses, Florida was still able to retain their leading rusher, Jadan Baugh, and their leading receiver, Vernell Brown III. Baugh represented **over 70%** of Florida's rushing attack while Brown III was the only receiver to crack 500 receiving yards.

- AARON IT OUT UNDER CENTER -

- Junior transfer **QB Aaron Philo** (Georgia Tech) started in Week 1 while sophomore **QB Tramell Jones** saw action in the fourth quarter. The duo leads UF's QB room of **QB Will Griffin**, **QB Aidan Warner** and **QB Aaron Williams**.
- Florida's five-man QB room entered 2026 with two combined career collegiate starts (any level) and 16 games played, which ranked as the fifth- and- sixth-fewest totals among P4 teams heading into Week 1.
- Florida's two QB starts were tied for the third-fewest in the SEC alongside Tennessee, sitting ahead of only Alabama (0) and Vanderbilt (0).
- Philo made his first-career start as a Gator in Week 1 after playing in eight games (one start) at Georgia Tech from 2024-25. He finished 16-of-21 (76.2%) for 275 yards and three touchdowns for a 223.8 rating.
- Philo set career highs in passing touchdowns (three), total touchdowns (four), completion percentage (76.2%) and passer rating (223.8). His 223.8 rating ranked third all-time in a UF season opener (min. 15 attempts).
- Philo is 14th in the FBS in passer rating, 18th in pass TD and 26th in comp. percentage, sitting top-six in the SEC in each category. He is one of eight FBS players with 250+ pass yards, 75.0%+ comp., 3+ pass TD and a 220+ rating.
- Philo broke 1,000 career yards with the longest TD pass of his career and his first as a Gator (49 yards).
- Philo threw two TD passes on Florida's first two drives, marking his first-career game throwing multiple TDs.
- Jones Jr. was 4-of-5 for 68 yards, one TD and a 260.2 rating in Week 1 while tying his career-long pass (32).
- As a result, Florida posted over 300 passing yards after hitting that mark in 10 of 50 games from 2022-25.
- Jones played in two games as a true freshman in 2025 against LIU and Kentucky, completing 21 of 35 passes (60.0%) for 191 yards and two touchdowns.

- THE GRAHAM LEGACY -

- Gator legacy (son of Earnest Graham) player **LB Myles Graham** became the leader of the UF defense after a strong 2025 sophomore season. He will anchor a LB unit ranked No. 18 in the FBS this season (Phil Steele).
- In Week 1, Graham led UF with a career-high 10 total tackles (four solo) on top of 0.5 TFL and four stops.
- He had a team-best 84.0 PFF tackling grade, pacing all SEC linebackers as he did not miss a tackle.
- Graham started all 12 games in 2025 and led the Gators with a career-high 76 tackles, tackles-for-loss (7.0), stops (36) and QB hurries (seven) while ranking second in pass breakups (four) and fifth in sacks (2.0).
- Graham became the first UF linebacker to pace the team in tackles since 2021 (Mohamoud Diabate).
- Graham finished the regular season 10th in the SEC in tackles - the highest by a UF linebacker since 2020.
- He was one of four players in the SEC to post 75-plus tackles and 7.0-plus tackles-for-loss in the regular season.
- Graham's four pass breakups were tied for the second most among FBS linebackers.
- His 36 stops were the fifth most in the SEC among linebackers during the 2025 regular season.

- LINEBACKER LOWDOWN -

- **LB Jaden Robinson** has posted 50-plus tackles in back-to-back seasons on top of 7.5 TFL and 5.5 sacks.
- Wielding 38 games and 17 starts, Robinson opened 2026 with four tackles to total 110 in his career.
- Owing 26 games played (two starts) **LB Aaron Chiles** made the start in the season opener and had three tackles, two pass breakups and one quarterback hurry.
- Behind the veteran trio is the future of the linebacker room in pair of sophomores in **LB Ty Jackson** and **LB Myles Johnson**. The two were both consensus four-star recruits with Jackson the No. 1- and Johnson the No. 11-ranked inside linebackers by ESPN. They were special team starters last year as true freshmen.
- In Week 1, Johnson had 1.0 tackle-for-loss (-4 yards) and one fumble recovery, both career firsts and coming on the same drive, which stopped FAU on UF's 1-yard line.

- INTO THE WOODS -

- Last season, true freshman **JACK Jayden Woods** finished with the No. 1 freshman EDGE grade in the SEC en route to earning SEC All-Freshman Coaches' and PFF All-Freshman Team honors.
- After playing in all 12 games with three starts and tying for a team-high 3.5 sacks as a true freshman, Woods began the 2026 season with four tackles (three solo), the third-most in a single game for him.
- He was the first Gator true freshman since Johnnie Church in 1992 to lead or co-lead the team in sacks.
- In SEC play alone, Woods tallied 19 tackles, 11 stops, 2.0 TFLs, 1.5 sacks, two QB hurries, one interception, one fumble recovery and one forced fumble.
- In Week 12 vs. Ole Miss, Woods' logged his first-career interception to become the first UF true freshman with a pick since Myles Graham vs. Tulane in 2024, and the first in SEC play since Jordan Castell vs. Arkansas in 2023.
- He was the first UF true freshman with an interception and fumble recovery in the same season since 2011.
- In 2025, Woods became the first Florida true freshman to start on the DL since Jabari Zuniga in 2016.



- DEFENSIVE LINE DIGEST -

- Entering the 2026 season, Florida's defensive line unit ranked No. 30 in the FBS (Phil Steele).
- Florida returned each of its top three in sacks from last season in **JACK Jayden Woods**, **DL Kamran James** and **DL Brendan Bett**, in addition to five of its top six players in tackles for loss.
- In Week 1, the D-line posted 34 tackles, seven QB hurries, four TFLs, three PBU's, two forced fumbles and two sacks.
- After missing most of fall camp, James logged 2.0 TFLs, 1.0 sack, one forced fumble & one QB hurry vs. FAU.
- Bett was one of three Gator D-linemen to have a pair of QB hurries in Week 1 as the unit had seven combined.
- Bett tallied 1.0 TFL of -10 yards and one forced fumble which was a 4th-down stop on the UF 1-yard line.
- Woods (3) and Bett (4) combined for seven starts last season while playing in all 12 games.
- James played in all 37 games at Florida from 2023-25. He owns 76 tackles (44 solo), 8.5 TFLs and 5.5 sacks.
- In 2025, James tied for first on the team in sacks (3.5) with Woods while ranking fourth in TFL (4.5).
- Bett finished third in sacks (3.0) and fifth in tackles-for-loss (4.0).
- Now back healthy, five-star junior **LB LJ McCray** looks to return to form after playing all 13 games as a true freshman in 2024. He appeared in just one game (vs. USF) during the 2025 campaign.
- McCray returned to the field after one-full year (364 days) and had two tackles with one pass breakup at the UF 4-yard line to prevent an FAU touchdown pass.
- As a freshman, McCray tied for second on the team with five QB hurries on top of 13 tackles and 1.0 TFL.
- All four players will be heavily involved in the unit as will fifth-year senior transfer **DL Emmanuel Oyejadejo**.
- Oyejadejo's UF debut in Week 1 featured a pair of tackles and quarterback hurries with one pass breakup.
- At Jax State in 2025, Oyejadejo started all 14 games and led the team with 3.5 sacks on top of 6.5 TFL and 41 tackles.
- Florida also brought in senior transfer **DL DK Kalu** (Baylor), who played 11 games (seven starts) from 2024-25. Kalu played eight games (six starts) last season, totaling 10 tackles and 0.5 TFL.
- Kalu's 68.4 tackle grade ranked second among Baylor defensive linemen in 2025.
- Rounding out Florida's linebacker unit are several returners in fifth-year senior **JACK Kofi Asare** (12), fifth-year senior **DL Jamari Lyons** (12), sophomore **DL Jeremiah McCloud** (11) and sophomore **DL Joseph Mbatichou** (9). All four players played at least nine games in 2025 while Asare and Lyons saw action in all 12 contests.
- McCloud had a career-high eight tackles in the season opener vs. FAU to go with two quarterback hurries and one pass breakup, the latter forcing a turnover on downs on a 4th-and-2.
- Asare totaled 19 tackles (10 solo), 2.5 TFLs and 1.0 sack in his first season as a Gator in 2025 after posting 30 tackles (11 solo), 5.5 TFLs and three sacks the year prior at UMass in 2024.
- Playing in his fifth season vs. FAU in Week 1, both of Lyons tackles went for a loss including 1.0 sack.
- Returning back to the fold in 2025, Lyons logged 18 tackles and 1.0 TFL.
- Playing as a true freshman in 2025, McCloud appeared in 11 games and tallied 13 tackles, 0.5 TFL, two pass breakups and one QB hurry.

- TACKLING THE PROBLEM HEAD ON -

- Florida missed 8.6 tackles/game in 2025 after averaging 11.0 (2024), 9.6 (2023) and 10.1 (2022).
- Florida ranked 19th in the FBS in tackling grade (85.4) with the program's best mark since 2014 (26th, 90.9) while finishing inside the top-40 FBS teams for the first time since 2016 (31st, 83.1).
- The Gators missed 104 tackles, the team's lowest since 2017 (102), according to Pro Football Focus.

- A LOOK BACK AT THE 2025 GATORS DEFENSE -

- Florida finished the 2025 regular season ranked 15th in redzone defense (75.0%, second in SEC), 41st in fumbles recovered (seven) and 47th in takeaways (17).
- UF had the 13th-best tackling grade (86.2) and No. 43 run defense grade (86.4) in the FBS in the regular season.
- UF allowed 13 passing touchdowns, tied for 22nd-fewest in the FBS and fifth in the SEC during the regular season. The 13 total TD passes allowed were Florida's fewest since 2016 (eight).
- Florida has forced a turnover in 10 of 12 games including a streak of eight in a row during the 2025 campaign. The only games the defense did not get a takeaway was vs. USF and Tennessee in 2025.
- Florida forced 40 takeaways from 2024-25 - UF's most in a two-year period since 2018-19 (49).
- Florida was one of 10 FBS teams and the only SEC team to shut out their opponent in Week 1 of the 2025 season.
- UF delivered a season-high six sacks vs. a Texas O-Line that had only allowed three all season to that point.
- Florida racked up an astounding 35 QB pressures on Texas and QB Arch Manning, the most pressures against the Longhorns in the Sarkisian era, topping the previous record by Georgia in Austin in 2024 (28).

- A THORN IN THE SIDE -

- Florida's second-highest graded defender from last season was rising senior **S Bryce Thornton**.
- Thornton started the 2026 season with three tackles and one pass breakup - one of Florida's nine vs. FAU and his fourth in his last six games.
- He started 11 games and led the Gators in pass breakups (seven) and fumble recoveries (two) in 2025.
- Thornton was second on the team in tackles (56), third in solo tackles (31) and third in interceptions (one).
- Last season, Thornton recovered two fumbles (returning one for a TD) in Week 1 vs. LIU to become the first Gator with two in a game since Gervon Dexter Sr. vs. FAU in the 2021 season opener.
- With 33 career games played highlighted by 22 starts at safety from 2023-26, Thornton has racked up 134 tackles (71 solo), 8.0 TFL, 1.5 sacks, 15 pass breakups, four interceptions and two forced fumbles.

- SAFETIES FIRST -

- S Bryce Thornton** headlines a UF secondary unit that ranks No. 37 in the FBS entering the season (Phil Steele).
- In Week 1, Thornton started alongside senior transfer **S DJ Coleman**, who played 35 games with 12 starts at safety at Baylor from 2023-25.
- Coleman earned Florida's first takeaway of 2026 season with an interception on the season's opening drive.
- It marked the third interception of Coleman's career and his first in Orange & Blue.
- Coleman allowed one catch on four targets for the second-lowest reception percentage (25.0%) in the secondary.
- Florida has logged an interception in 10 of its last 11 games dating back to last season, totaling 12 INTs in that span.
- The Gators have recorded a takeaway in 23 of their last 26 games since the start of 2024.
- Last season at Baylor, Coleman started 11 games and had 46 tackles (30 solo), 6.5 TFLs, four pass breakups, two interceptions and one forced fumble. He owns 89 career tackles, 8.0 TFLs and nine pass breakups.
- Sophomore **S Lagonza Hayward** will be key in the secondary after playing 11 games as a true freshman along with Kentucky transfer **S Cam Dooley**
- Dooley and Hayward each recorded a pair of tackles in the season opener.
- In 128 defensive snaps in 2025, Hayward logged 12 tackles (seven solo), 3.5 TFLs, 1.0 sack and two QB hurries.
- Playing shorthanded in the victory vs. Mississippi State in 2025, Florida's secondary featured an unexperienced group composed of true freshmen **CB Ja'Vari Flowers**, **CB Ben Hanks III** and Hayward, as well as walk-on **S Alfonzo Allen Jr.** Allen Jr. played in six games with three starts and totaled 34 tackles in 2025.
- The group ended MSU's Blake Shapen's FBS-best, 21-game passing touchdown streak.
- Allen Jr. made his first-career start as well as his season debut and led the Gators with a career-high 15 tackles and tied for a team-best five stops. He finished with the most tackles by a Gator in a single game since 2021.
- Hayward tied for a team-high 2.5 TFLs and had six tackles, as his final was a third-down stop in the fourth.

- CORNERBACK CORNER -

- Florida returns 2025 starters **CB Dijon Johnson** and **CB Cormani McClain** for their senior seasons.
- Johnson intercepted FAU's Veltkamp in the second quarter for his second-career pick and UF's second of the game, giving UF multiple INTs for the first time since Oct. 4, 2025 vs. Texas (two), and for the first time in a season opener since Sept. 4, 2021 vs. FAU (two).
- Johnson had the best coverage grade of the UF secondary and did not allow a catch in two targets.
- With 30 career games and nine starts to his credit, Johnson has totaled 41 tackles (27 solo), 2.0 TFLs, four pass breakups, two interceptions and one fumble recovery.
- McClain has 17 career games played (10 starts), 40 tackles (22 solo), 2.5 TFLs, four pass breakups and two picks.
- Playing 10 games with six starts last season, McClain had a career-high 18 tackles while nabbing one interception.
- Sophomores **CB Ben Hanks III** and **CB J'Vari Flowers**, as well as fifth-year senior transfer **CB Jordy Lowery** (East Carolina), will figure into the cornerback rotation.
- In Week 1, Hanks III earned the start along veterans Clark (NB), Coleman (S), McClain (CB) and Thornton (S), and was one of two underclassmen (Woods) to start on defense.
- Hanks III had four tackles and one pass breakup, and in just four games played he has 12 tackles, 4 PBUs and one INT.
- Hanks III played in three games in 2025 with his lone start in the season finale victory over FSU, posting two tackles, two pass breakups and his first-career interception - which he returned for 48 yards.
- Despite not being a full-time defensive player until the second half of the 2025 season, Flowers compiled 17 tackles, four pass breakups and 0.5 TFL while playing in all 12 games and making two starts as a true freshman.
- In the season finale vs. FSU, Hanks III and Flowers represented UF's first pair of true freshmen to start at cornerback in the same game since 2017 vs. FSU (Marco Wilson and CJ Henderson). They played all 66 snaps.



- SPECIAL TEAMS MAKEOVER -

- Florida replaced all three of its first-string specialists via the transfer portal this offseason after seeing P Tommy Doman, K Trey Smack and LS Rocco Underwood depart, all earning starting rolls in the NFL.
- The Gators owned the SEC's longest field goal (Smack -56 yards) and punt (Doman - 71 yards) during the 2025 regular season, marking the only FBS team to lead both categories inside their conference.
- Smack concluded his Gators career as one of the program's all-time best with his name scattered throughout the record book and earned All-SEC Coaches' Third Team honors.
- From 2023-25, Smack made a program-record 10 field goals from 50-plus yards (second-most in the FBS).
- Replacing Florida's single-season and career punting average records, Doman finished solidly in his lone season in the Orange & Blue as he was named to the PFF 2025 All-SEC Team.
- Doman's 4.52 hang time led all FBS punters and was the second-highest graded punter (92.2) in the FBS while sitting at No. 1 in the SEC, per Pro Football Focus.
- As the 2024 Mannely Award Winner and a four-year starter at long snapper, Underwood earned All-SEC Coaches' Third Team and PFF All-SEC Third Team nods while being a Mannely Award Semifinalist in 2025.
- The Gators welcome junior **K Patrick Durkin** (Tulane), senior **P Alec Clark** (Tulane) and fifth-year senior **LS Carter Milliron** (Louisiana) as transfers to fill their primary specialist roles in 2026.
- In Week 1, Durkin's first lone field goal attempt resulted in a career-high and current SEC long of 53 yards.
- He was also perfect on extra points (7) and in nine kickoffs booted eight touchbacks (64.9 average).
- In his career, Durkin is 28-of-32 on field goal attempts (87.5%) and 66-of-67 on extra-points attempts (98.5%). He improved to 9-of-11 from 40-plus yards and 5-of-7 from 50-plus yards in his career.
- Tulane's primary kicker in 2025, Durkin made 25 of 28 field goals (89.3%) highlighted by a pair of 52-yarders.
- Durkin kicked off 80 times for 5,110 yards (63.9 avg) and 69 touchbacks while going 41-of-42 on extra points.
- Durkin went 4-of-6 from 50-plus yards, tying for third in the FBS in 50-plus-yard attempts made.
- Meanwhile, Clark has spent each of the last two full seasons as the primary punter at Tulane (2025) and Marshall (2024), combining to play all 27 of his team's games from 2024-25. He also spent 2023 at Marshall.
- In 2025 at Tulane, Clark logged 48 punts featuring a long of 70 yards for a career-best 46.5 yards per punt, ranking second in single-season program history.
- In Week 1, Clark's UF debut was only as the holder as he did not punt, marking the first time Florida did not punt in a game since Oct. 2, 2022 vs. Eastern Washington. The last time Florida did not punt vs. an FBS opponent was in 2013 vs. Kentucky, and prior to that in the 2011 season opener vs. Florida Atlantic.
- From 2022-24 at Louisiana, Milliron played long snapper in all 40 of the Cajuns' games. He then played the first four games of the 2025 campaign before redshirting, giving him 45 career games played at the position.
- K Liam Padron** (Texas A&M), **P Miller Fealy** (Southwestern Oklahoma) and **LS Hunter Solwold** (Washington) were also added via the portal to add depth alongside returners **K Brandon Rabasco**, **P Nicholas Inglis** and freshman **LS Lincoln Anderson**, who will handle snaps on field goals and extra points.
- Anderson started at long snapper in Week 1, becoming first UF true freshman long snapper in a season opener since Ryan Farr in 2015. Padron also made his UF debut and made an extra point, while Rabasco made his collegiate debut, smacking a pair of touchbacks in his two kickoff attempts.

- RETURN GAME STRONG -

- Vernell Brown III** was one of two true freshmen (Malachi Toney) and one of 18 FBS players with five 20-yard punt returns during the 2025 season.
- In Week 2 of last season, Brown III's 40-yard return was the longest by a Gator since 2022.
- Brown III finished with 11 punt returns for 139 yards highlighted by a long of 40 yards and 12.6 yards per return.
- Brown III also returned seven kicks for 122 yards, a long of 26 yards and 17.4 yards per return.
- East Carolina transfer **RB London Montgomery** returned five kicks for 114 yards last season, featuring a long of 53 yards and an average of 22.8 yards per return.

- GRAB BAG: THE REST OF WEEK 1 -

- HC Jon Sumrall** is now 4-1 in season openers as a head coach highlighted by four-straight wins, with the lone loss coming against No. 21 Ole Miss in his head coaching debut at Troy in 2022. Sumrall's teams have outscored opponents by a 199-82 margin in season openers, equating to a point differential of 23.4 PPG.
- A total of 31 Gators made their UF debuts while 10 made their collegiate debuts in Week 1.
- Florida exceeded 500 yards of offense after hitting that mark in eight of 50 games from 2022-25.
- Florida scored 40-plus points after reaching that threshold in nine of 50 games from 2022-25.
- Florida scored 50-plus points after reaching that threshold in two of 50 games from 2022-25.

Jon Sumrall was named the 31st head football coach in program history, Athletic Director Scott Stricklin announced Nov. 30, 2025.

Sumrall, who brings extensive coaching and playing experience in the Southeastern Conference, joins the Gators after engineering rapid turnarounds at two different programs and guiding his teams to championship game appearances in every season he has served as a head coach. Sumrall is known for his energy, leadership, program-building skills and consistent results.

"Jon Sumrall is a proven winner and an exceptional leader who has built successful programs at every stop," Stricklin said. "He brings tremendous energy, strong recruiting relationships across our footprint, and a philosophy rooted in toughness, discipline and player development. Jon will cultivate a daily culture of competitiveness, accountability and winning that drives success on the field and throughout our program. He fully understands the expectations at the University of Florida, and we're excited to welcome him and his family to Gator Nation."

"Not many coaches win big at two different non-Power programs, and even fewer do it as quickly as Jon has," Stricklin said. "He joins rare company—coaches like Urban Meyer, Brian Kelly and Willie Fritz—who've delivered immediate success at multiple stops. Jon's track record of rapid turnarounds speaks directly to his leadership and the culture he establishes."

Despite only returning four starters this season, Sumrall guided No. 17 Tulane to a spot in the College Football Playoff at No. 6 Ole Miss after winning the American Conference Championship 34-21 over No. 24 North Texas.

The Green Wave currently own a record of 11-2 (7-1) and a clinched spot in the conference championship in back-to-back seasons. Sumrall has now made four conference championship game appearances in his first-four years as a head coach, becoming the only coach in FBS history to do so at two different schools.

Tulane placed a league-leading 13 on the 2025 American All-Conference Teams led by Special Teams Player of the Year, kicker Patrick Durkin, who was the first in program history to earn the honor.

Sumrall, 43, has developed a reputation as one of college football's top young coaches during his tenures at Troy and Tulane and currently owns the fifth-highest winning percentage among active FBS coaches (43-12, .782), trailing only Ryan Day, Dan Lanning, Kirby Smart and Curt Cignetti.

He is also widely regarded as a strong recruiter with deep ties throughout the Southeast, including Florida, Georgia, Alabama, Louisiana and Tennessee. Sumrall has earned consistent praise for his talent identification, player development and ability to connect with student-athletes and their families.

"The University of Florida is one of the premier programs in college football, and it's an incredible honor to serve as the head football coach," Sumrall said. "I believe in building a team rooted in toughness, accountability and a relentless competitive spirit. Florida has everything necessary to compete at the highest level—the resources, the support, the tradition and the passion of Gator Nation. My family and I are excited to get to work."

"One of my first priorities will be to assemble an incredible staff, including an offensive coordinator who understands that, at Florida, having an explosive offense isn't optional – it's mandatory!"

In his first season as Tulane's head coach, Sumrall guided the Green Wave to their third straight American Athletic Conference Championship Game and a bowl appearance versus Florida. His team finished first or second in the conference in 10 statistical categories, including leading the league in third-down conversions (52.5%), defensive touchdowns (6), completion percentage (65.6%), scoring offense (37.2) and pass-efficiency defense (111.65). Tulane led the nation in defensive touchdowns and produced a league-high 18 all-conference selections.

As the head coach at Troy in 2022 and 2023, Sumrall engineered one of the nation's most impressive program turnarounds—leading the Trojans to back-to-back Sun Belt championships, consecutive 12-win seasons and multiple national rankings. He was named conference Coach of the Year and twice was a finalist for the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year award.

Troy's 23 victories across the 2022–23 seasons were tied for the third most nationally, trailing only Georgia, Michigan and Washington. Troy and Michigan were the only two programs to win conference titles in both seasons.

Sumrall was a three-year letterwinner at middle linebacker at Kentucky from 2002–04. He led the Wildcats with 72 tackles his redshirt-junior year. A standout off the field as well, he was named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll and selected to the Frank G. Ham Society of Character. After earning his finance degree in 2005, he served as a graduate assistant at Kentucky during the 2005 and 2006 seasons under Rich Brooks.

He spent five seasons at the University of San Diego beginning in 2007, including two years as defensive coordinator, before returning to Tulane for a three-year stint as defensive coordinator. Sumrall served as assistant head coach at Troy from 2015–17, then spent four seasons in the SEC—at Ole Miss in 2018 and at Kentucky from 2019–20 and again as co-defensive coordinator in 2023—before becoming Troy's head coach.

A two-time all-Alabama selection and four-year letterwinner at Grissom High School, Sumrall was inducted into the Huntsville-Madison County Hall of Fame in 2023. He is married to the former Ginny Nixon, also of Huntsville, and they have four children: Sam, Sadie, Stella and Selah.

Sumrall's approach aligns with Florida's emphasis on excellence—athletically, academically and personally. He is known for building strong relationships with student-athletes, fostering team-first cultures and assembling high-performance staffs aligned with his vision.

- Jon Sumrall has made four conference championship game appearances in each of his first four years as a head coach. He is the only coach in FBS history to do so at two different schools.
- Sumrall is also the first coach in FBS history to win a conference championship at multiple schools in his first four seasons as a head coach, winning three total titles in that span.
- Sumrall is the third coach in FBS history to reach a conference title game in each of his first four seasons.
- Sumrall is tied for the sixth-most wins (44) among FBS head coaches since 2022 behind only Kirby Smart (52), Ryan Day (49), Curt Cignetti (47), Dan Lanning (47) and Kalen DeBoer (46). He is tied with Marcus Freeman (44) in that span.
- Sumrall (.786, 44-12) has the sixth-highest winning percentage among current FBS head coaches behind only Ryan Day (.883, 83-11), Dan Lanning (.870, 47-7), Kirby Smart (.855, 118-20), Curt Cignetti (.799, 147-37) and Lane Kiffin (.788, 41-11).
- Sumrall is one of three active SEC head coaches to have played in the SEC (Kirby Smart, Clark Lea). Sumrall and Smart are the only active SEC coaches to assume their positions with prior playing and coaching experience in the SEC.
- Sumrall's 18 road victories are tied for the most in the FBS since 2022 alongside Ryan Day and Dan Lanning.
- Sumrall is 14-2 all-time in road conference tilts, which is third-best in the FBS since 2022 behind only Ryan Day (15-2) and Dan Lanning (15-2).
- Sumrall has a career record of 30-4 in October, November and December for an .882 win percentage.
- Winning at least nine games in every season as a head coach, Sumrall is currently averaging 10.75 wins per season – and counting.
- Sumrall's teams have ranked inside the top-30 in the FBS in yards per completion in every season of his tenure: 23rd (2025), seventh (2024), 28th (2023) and 18th (2022).
- Sumrall's defenses racked up 97 takeaways in his four seasons from 2022-25, which was more than any FBS team since 2022.
- Across his four seasons as a head coach from 2022-25, the 159 total sacks by Sumrall's teams rank second compared to all FBS programs in that span, trailing only Penn State (163).
- Sumrall's teams have finished inside the top-30 in the FBS in takeaways every season: 2025 (25, ninth), 2024 (22, 27th), 2023 (23, 20th) and 2022 (27, eighth).
- Never finishing outside the top-35 in the FBS, Sumrall's squads have posted a plus-25 turnover margin in his four seasons: 2025 (+8), 2024 (+7), 2023 (+5), 2022 (+5).
- Sumrall's starting quarterbacks have finished with a passer rating above 138.0 in every season of his tenure: 2025 (139.0), 2024 (166.67), 2023 (146.90) and 2022 (138.78).
- In four seasons from 2022-25, Sumrall's starting quarterbacks have a 78-to-31 TD-to-INT ratio.
- Three of Sumrall's four seasons have seen a running back eclipse 1,100 rushing yards while wideouts have combined for five 700-yard seasons highlighted by a 1,000-plus-yard campaign by Mario Williams in 2024.

Buster Faulkner enters his first season as offensive coordinator for Florida in 2026.

Instrumental in a trio of national titles runs at Georgia (2021, 2022) and Valdosta State (2007), Faulkner comes to the Gators after serving as the offensive coordinator at Georgia Tech the past three seasons (2023-25). He comes equipped with 14 years of experience as an offensive coordinator alone, also coaching the tight ends at Georgia Tech after three seasons at Georgia as an offensive quality control coach (2020-22). Faulkner was also named the 2025 FootballScoop Offensive Coordinator of the Year.

In addition to his national championship success, Faulkner boasts six collegiate conference titles and four division crowns, while claiming a high school state championship as both a coach and a player.

Collectively across his three seasons at Georgia Tech, Faulkner's offense ranks first in the ACC in rushing (197.8), second in total offense (437.7), third in passing efficiency (144.1) and fifth in scoring offense (31.0). The Yellow Jackets have surrendered the fewest sacks in the conference in all three years of his tenure, allowing 34 total in that span – three fewer than any other ACC team and good for third in the entire FBS. Georgia Tech also ranks 14th and 18th nationally in rushing offense and total offense since 2023, respectively.

The elite output from Faulkner's Yellow Jacket offense has come with tremendous consistency. Faulkner has directed a Georgia Tech offense ranked in the top half of the ACC in rushing, total offense, scoring and passing efficiency in each of his three campaigns. As a result, Georgia Tech improved from a 5-7 record the year prior to Faulkner's arrival to achieve consecutive, seven-win seasons from 2023-24 upon his arrival, culminating with a 9-3 campaign and t-second-place finish in the ACC in 2025.

Faulkner produced five or more All-ACC honorees on the offensive side of the ball in every season with the Jackets for a grand total of 17 selections, featuring 2025 first team quarterback Haynes King. Under Faulkner's guidance, King led the ACC while ranking third nationally in total offense (329.0 YPG) and was named ACC Quarterback of the Week five times in 11 games this season. King holds status as the only power-conference player in the nation this season, and just the fifth since 1956, to average at least 240 passing yards and 80 rushing yards per game.

In 2024, guard Keylan Rutledge became Georgia Tech's first non-specialist to earn first-team All-America honors in 10 years. That same year, King turned in another ultra-impressive season as the orchestrator of Faulkner's attack, becoming the first FBS quarterback in the last 70 years with 2,000 passing yards, 10 touchdown passes, a 70% completion percentage and two or fewer interceptions in a season. That came on the heels of a 2023 campaign in which running back Jamal Haynes became Tech's first 1,000-yard rusher in six years, while King was one of two Power Five players with at least 2,800 passing yards, 700 rushing yards, 25 touchdown passes and 10 rushing touchdowns.

Prior to Georgia Tech, Faulkner won two national titles in three seasons as an offensive quality control assistant for quarterbacks at Georgia (2020-22). While in Athens, Faulkner played a significant role in constructing and fielding one of the college football's top offenses. In his three seasons, UGA quarterbacks combined to rank third in the SEC in both passing efficiency (158.6) and passing yards per game (283.1), with the former sitting eighth in the FBS, and fourth in the conference in touchdown-to-interception ratio (2.97). On top of that, Georgia gave up the fewest number of sacks (45) in the SEC for the 11th-best mark in the country.

In 2022, the Bulldogs finished among the top five nationally in scoring (41.3 ppg) and total offense (501.1 YPG). Georgia quarterback Stetson Bennett IV finished fourth in voting for the 2022 Heisman Trophy in Faulkner's final year on staff.

Prior to his three-year stint at Georgia, he spent 10 seasons as offensive coordinator at Southern Miss (2019), Arkansas State (2016-18), Middle Tennessee (2011-15) and Murray State (2010). His 14 seasons as a coordinator also includes a season as OC at Valdosta State in 2008. Faulkner coached quarterbacks at Central Arkansas in 2009 and at Valdosta State in 2007, and was a graduate assistant at Georgia in 2006. Along the way, Faulkner mentored eventual NFL Draft Picks at Southern Miss, Middle Tennessee and Murray State.

As a native of Atlanta, Faulkner was a 2005 graduate of Valdosta State where he starred under center from 2001-03. Passing for 7,100 yards and 64 touchdowns to power the Blazers to a 47-6 combined record, Faulkner collected first team all-conference and honorable mention All-America honors in 2002 prior to transferring to Texas A&M-Commerce for his senior season. He set 10 school records in his lone year at Commerce, throwing for 2,861 yards and 16 scores.

Faulkner was a three-year starter at quarterback at Parkview High School in Lilburn, Ga. and led the Panthers to the 1997 Georgia 4A state championship – the first state title in school history. In 2024, he and his son, Harrison, became the first father-son duo to both win Georgia high school state championships as starting quarterbacks when Harrison led North Oconee to the 4A state title. Faulkner and his wife, Tia, also have two daughters, Hadley and Haisley.

Brad White enters his first season as defensive coordinator for Florida in 2026.

White spent the previous eight seasons on staff at Kentucky, highlighted by his last seven as defensive coordinator/outside linebackers coach. During his time in Lexington, the Wildcats made six bowl appearances while ranking among the top-20 FBS teams in both scoring defense (22.1) and total defense (344.1) under his tutelage from 2018-2025. Across seven NFL Drafts while at Kentucky (2019-24), White developed 14 NFL Draft picks and six selections in the top-two rounds on the defensive side of the ball.

Over the course of White's Wildcats tenure, Kentucky evolved into one of the top defenses in the entire SEC. Led by White, Kentucky strung together seven-consecutive, top-45 FBS defenses from 2018-24, featuring four top-25 defenses in 2018, 2019, 2021 and 2022. In 2024, the Wildcats finished sixth in the FBS in red zone defense (70.8%) and 21st in passing defense (183.7). That was followed by a pair of 2025 NFL Draft picks in April, headlined by first-rounder Maxwell Hairston, who became the highest-drafted defensive back in program history.

Kentucky posted one of its top rush defense seasons ever in 2023, holding opponents to 113.1 rush yards per game to rank second in the SEC and 17th in the FBS. That same year, White's defense ranked fifth in the SEC and 19th nationally in sacks (35) while sitting fourth and 28th tackles for loss (85), respectively. The Wildcats also produced the third-most takeaways in the conference (18).

That elite showing came on the heels of a truly historic 2022 defensive performance in which the Wildcats finished seventh in the FBS in passing defense (170.8), 11th in total defense (311.4) and 13th in scoring defense (19.2). Each of those statistics ranked among the top three in the SEC.

In 2021, White's UK defense was third nationally in fourth-down defense (27.8%), 20th in run defense (121.5) and 26th in both scoring defense (21.7) and total defense (340.1). The year prior in 2020, UK ranked inside the top six of the SEC in nearly every defensive category featuring a league-best pass defense (224.6) and number of takeaways (22).

The 2019 campaign saw White take the reins as defensive coordinator and for the first time since 1979, Kentucky did not allow more than 30 points in a single regular-season game. The Wildcats ranked 13th nationally in scoring defense and 21st in total defense.

Capped off by a 10-3 record and Citrus Bowl victory in his first year on staff in 2018, White used his NFL experience to guide senior linebacker Josh Allen to one of the greatest individual seasons in team history. Racking up 88 tackles, 21.5 tackles for loss and 17 sacks, Allen was named National Defensive Player of the Year, a Unanimous First Team All-American and SEC Defensive Player of the Year on top of sweeping every major, national defensive award: Bronko Nagurski Award, Chuck Bednarik Award, Ronnie Lott IMPACT Trophy and Jack Lambert Award. As a result, Allen was the seventh overall pick in the first round of the 2019 NFL Draft.

Prior to Kentucky, White coached with the Indianapolis Colts for six seasons (2012-17) as the outside linebackers coach (2015-17), assistant linebackers coach (2014) and defensive quality control coach (2012-13). While on staff, White and the Colts made three-straight playoff appearances (2012-14) and claimed back-to-back AFC South Titles in 2013 and 2014.

As a native of Portsmouth, R.I., White graduated from Wake Forest in 2004 where he was a three-year starter at linebacker. Across 35 career games, he totaled 227 tackles, 19.0 tackles for loss, 4.0 sacks and eight passes defended. White was a three-time Academic All-Atlantic Coast Conference selection and was named to the 2004 CoSIDA Academic All-District III team.

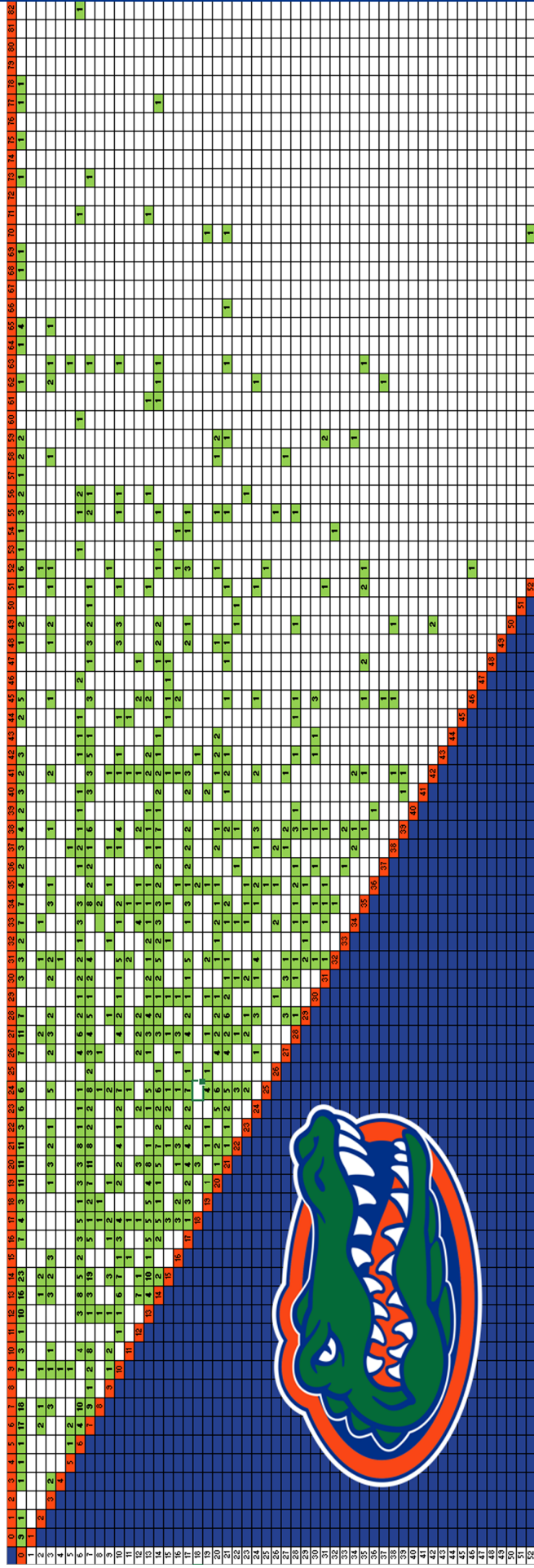
White and his wife, Kate, have four children, Julia, Lincoln, Hudson and Lydia.

- Florida is 7-0 all time on this date: 2015 vs. East Carolina (31-24), 2009 vs. Troy (56-6), 1998 vs. Northeast Louisiana (now ULM) (42-10), 1992 vs. Kentucky (35-19), 1987 vs. Tulsa (52-0), 1981 vs. Furman (35-7), 1970 vs. Duke (21-19).
- All games were in Gainesville, except Florida's 1970 matchup against Duke, which was played as a neutral-site game in Jacksonville, Fla.
- In 2015 against East Carolina, Florida defeated the Pirates, 31-24, in a hard-fought battle. Will Grier threw for two touchdowns, including a 32-yard strike to DeAndre Goolsby and another to Demarcus Robinson. Kelvin Taylor led the Gators on the ground with 55 yards and one touchdown. The Florida defense was the difference, holding ECU to -13 net rushing yards. Jalen Tabor added a clutch 39-yd pick-six late in the third quarter to give Florida a 10-point advantage. Joey Ivie recorded three sacks, including a strip sack recovered by Alex McCalister with less than 30 seconds remaining.
- In 2009, the Gators dominated Troy behind a stellar performance from Tim Tebow who totaled 237 yards and four touchdowns in the air to go along with 71 yards and one touchdown on the ground. The Gators totaled 291 rushing yards, while backup quarterback John Brantley saw significant playing time completing 10-12 passes for 135 yards and one touchdown.

- Also in that matchup, Riley Cooper led the Gators with five receptions for 82 yards and one touchdown, while Deonte Thompson caught two passes for 39 yards, with both receptions going for touchdowns. The Florida defense held Troy to 139 total yards and limited quarterback Levi Brown to 66 yards on 8-of-24 attempts and one interception. Janoris Jenkins recorded the interception and added two tackles for loss.
- Florida defeated Northeast Louisiana (now known as ULM), 42-10, in 1998. Quarterback Jesse Palmer threw for 292 yards and four touchdowns, including a 65-yard pass to Travis Taylor. Travis McGriff had a standout performance with six receptions for 116 yards and two touchdowns, including a 39-yard touchdown on the first play of the drive. Terry Jackson led the rushing attack with 16 carries for 117 yards and one touchdown. Tony George and Dock Pollard recorded interceptions for the Gators as the defense held Northeast Louisiana to 148 yards on offense.
- Doug Johnson made his season debut in the game following offseason shoulder surgery.

- In 1992, the Gators opened the season at home against Kentucky with a 35-19 win. Shane Matthews threw for 340 yards and four touchdowns, while Erict Rhett led the rushing attack with 33 carries for 194 yards and a touchdown. Harrison Houston led the receiving corps with seven receptions for 119 yards and two touchdowns. Florida more than doubled the amount of first downs Kentucky had, 30-14, while the Gators defense limited Kentucky to 263 total yards and an impressive 1-for-11 conversion rate on third down.
- In 1987, Florida cruised to a 52-0 victory over Tulsa. Emmitt Smith received a large opportunity due to injuries in front of him on the depth chart. Smith ran for 109 yards and two touchdowns on 10 carries. His 66-yard touchdown run gave the Gators a surge of momentum. Kerwin Bell threw for 148 yards and a touchdown, which was caught by Walter Odom, who led the team with four receptions for 60 yards. Florida tight ends combined for eight receptions for 153 yards and two touchdowns. By comparison, Gator tight ends had totaled just six catches and one touchdown during the entire the previous season. The Gators totaled 319 yards on the ground while the defense held Tulsa to 163 total yards on offense.
- "The outcome doesn't shock me that much. When you play against the kind of athletes that Florida has, you have to bring bigger bullets." – Tulsa HC George Henshaw
- In 1981, the Gators defeated Furman, 35-7. The Gators were coming off a season-opening loss to Miami. Despite the final score, the Gators were outplayed in several ways by the Paladins. Furman outgained Florida, 276-163, on the ground and 338-329 in total yardage. Florida was able to capitalize on Furman's mistakes and hold the Paladins on defense. Bruce Vaughn returned an interception 33 yards for a touchdown, while Wilbur Marshall recorded four sacks and recovered a fumble that set up a Florida touchdown. Florida capitalized on Furman's five turnovers (two interceptions, three fumbles) to secure the victory.
- In 1970, Florida beat Duke, 21-19, in the season opener. The Gators were able to secure the win with a 67-yard punt return by Carlos Alvarez in the third quarter which would be enough for a Florida victory. It was Alvarez's first collegiate punt return. Florida had a 14-3 advantage heading into halftime with John Reaves throwing two touchdown passes, one being a 46-yard pass to Alvarez, and the second being a 37-yard TD pass to Mike Rich. Duke was able to score 13 points in the final quarter, but it was not enough to complete the comeback. Duke was able to drive within the Florida 10-yard line three times, and the Florida 30-yard line twice in the first half, but only came away with three points as they fumbled on two of the drives and missed two field goals.
- This was Doug Dickey's coaching debut as head coach at Florida.

What Happened

Quarterback Aaron Philo passed for 275 yards and three touchdowns, while junior tailback Jadan Baugh rushed for 160 yards and three scores, as the Florida Gators broke the seal on the Jon Sumrall era with a 66-21 defeat of Florida Atlantic in the season opener Saturday night before a sold-out house at Spurrier/Florida Field.

Sumrall, the 31st head coach in the program's 120-year history and the eighth this century, watched his Gators offense crank out 624 total yards (343 passing, 281 rushing) and his defense force a pair of turnovers and three times turn the Owls away on fourth down. It was far from perfect, though, with FAU finishing at 396 yards of offense and 25 first downs, but the performance and energy at the "Swamp" felt a lot different than the malaise of the previous four seasons under Sumrall predecessor Billy Napier.

Philo, the transfer who followed offensive coordinator Buster Faulkner from Georgia Tech, completed 16 of 21 passes, with touchdown tosses of 49 yards to Vernell Brown III, 12 yards to fellow Tech transfer Bailey Stockton and 10 yards to reserve tailback Duke Clark before giving way to backup Tramell Jones Jr. late in the third quarter with the Gators up 52-21. Baugh, whose 1,170 yards in 2025 marked the seventh-highest single-season total in UF history, got his '26 campaign off to a fantastic start in carrying just 14 times, but amassing the second-highest total of his career. Baugh scored on runs of 12, 7 and 6 yards, while also breaking off a 61-yard dash to set up his final TD.

FAU quarterback Caden Veltkamp completed 34 of 52 passes for 276 yards and accounted for a TD each running and throwing. He also was picked off twice.

Brown, the junior and third-generation Gator, caught six passes for 117 yards and scored the first touchdown of his career — and his team's first of the season — on a dazzling 49-yard catch-and-run on UF's first possession. Three Florida possessions in, the Gators led 17-0 before the Owls got on the board with an Ethan Ervin 1-yard run that capped a 75-yard march that featured five first downs, including a pair of fourth-down conversions.

Philo's 3-yard scoring run pushed the UF lead to 24-7, but was canceled out by another long drive (78 yards) with his counterpart, Veltkamp, running in from seven yards out on third-and-goal to make it 24-14.

Baugh then finished three consecutive UF drives with touchdowns bridging the two halves, as the Gators surged to a 52-14 advantage. After Veltkamp's second throwing TD made it 52-21 with 4:21 to go in the third quarter, Philo finished a 79-yard drive by scrambling to hit Clark in the end zone on the quarterback's final play of the night. UF had seven touchdown drives of at least 75 yards.

Jones played two series, hit four of five throws and tossed a 6-yard touchdown pass to tight end Micah Jones with 25 seconds to go to give the Gators their highest-scoring game since beating Samford 70-52 in 2021 near the end of Dan Mullen's tenure.

What it Means

An encouraging, feel-good start (before an appreciative, success-starved crowd of 90,275) to the Sumrall era.

In the Spotlight

Take your pick. Any of the stat-busters on offense would qualify, but give the nod to Sumrall, who has pushed all the right buttons since coming from Tulane, which he led to both an American Conference championship and berth in the College Football Playoff last season. Before that, he won two Sun Belt Conference championships in two seasons at Troy. He knows how to do this.

Staggering Statistic

The Gators scored touchdowns on their first two drives of a game for the first time since 2023 when they did it in a 49-7 defeat in the second game. It was a good sign. UF's 66 points marked the most scored by the Gators in a season opener since beating New Mexico State 70-21 to start the 1994 season under Coach Steve Spurrier.

Up Next

Florida (1-0) is back at home for another "buy" game when the Gators face FCS-classified Campbell (1-0) next Saturday night at the Swamp. The Camels opened their season in Week 0 with a 49-37 defeat of East Tennessee State. They were scheduled to play No. 24 Western Carolina on Saturday on their home campus in Buies Creek, North Carolina, but the game was postponed due to weather and rescheduled for Sunday at 11 a.m. Campbell began playing football in 2008 and is a member of the Big South Conference.

WEEK 2: HONORARY MR. TWO BITS

THE LEGEND OF MR. TWO BITS

It all started in 1949 at Florida Field, when George Edmondson looked at the crowd around him as the Gators were playing The Citadel. Fans were booing the team and George would not stand for it. He jumped up and got the fans cheering, and so began the legend of Mr. Two Bits.

For 60 years, Gators fans from all across the world became eternally grateful for the man who started every Gators home football game with the phrase “Two-Bits, Four-Bits, Six-Bits, a Dollar. All for the Gators, Stand Up and holler!” George Edmondson led the cheer in his trademark yellow shirt with an orange and blue tie from 1949 until retiring from the role at the end of the 2008 season. Coincidentally, Florida’s home finale that season came against The Citadel, providing a unique symmetry to Edmondson’s decades of leading Florida fans in the Mr. Two Bits cheer.

Upon his retirement, Florida mascots Albert and Alberta continued the pregame Two Bits tradition until 2013 when UF began inviting celebrities to perform the role. Errict Rhett was the first honorary Mr. Two Bits, and multiple Gator Greats have gone on to fill that role since.

... Alachua County Public Schools Teacher of the Year, **Barbara Brock**. Florida’s Chris Harry details her selection as Week 2’s honorary Mr. Two Bits below.

GAINESVILLE, Fla. – Barbara Brock has taught in a classroom for more than two decades, but she didn’t get there the conventional way.

She was raised as a military brat whose undergrad degree in business at Mary Washington University and master’s in education from Grand Canyon eventually led to cobbling together a start-up in a museum store in Fredericksburg, Virginia, selling science-related toys.

“When people go to museums, they spend a lot of time in the stores,” Brock said.

And the products on sale in those stores foster learning.

Eventually, the classroom called. Brock took her science to the school and wound up at High Springs Community, a K-through-8th just north of Gainesville, where she excels at it. In January, Brock was named Alachua County Public Schools Teacher of the Year – she was the middle school finalist, alongside Katie Dawson (Meadowbrook Elementary) and Ryan McNickle (Buchholz High) – and with the honor comes a very unique perk.



In 2022, the same year Brock came to the area, the University Athletic Association began partnering with the Alachua County School System by inviting its annual teacher honoree to be the honorary “Mr. Two Bits” at a Florida football game.

Brock gets her turn Saturday when the Gators (1-0) take on Campbell (2-0) at Spurrier/Florida Field.

A couple weeks ago, her principal ducked into the classroom, along with a camera crew. The sight was not particularly unusual, what with High Springs often doing in-house promos with their teachers. This time, though, the principal handed Brock a cell phone. On the other end was the unmistakable voice of UF legend Steve Spurrier, who extended the “Two Bits” invite.

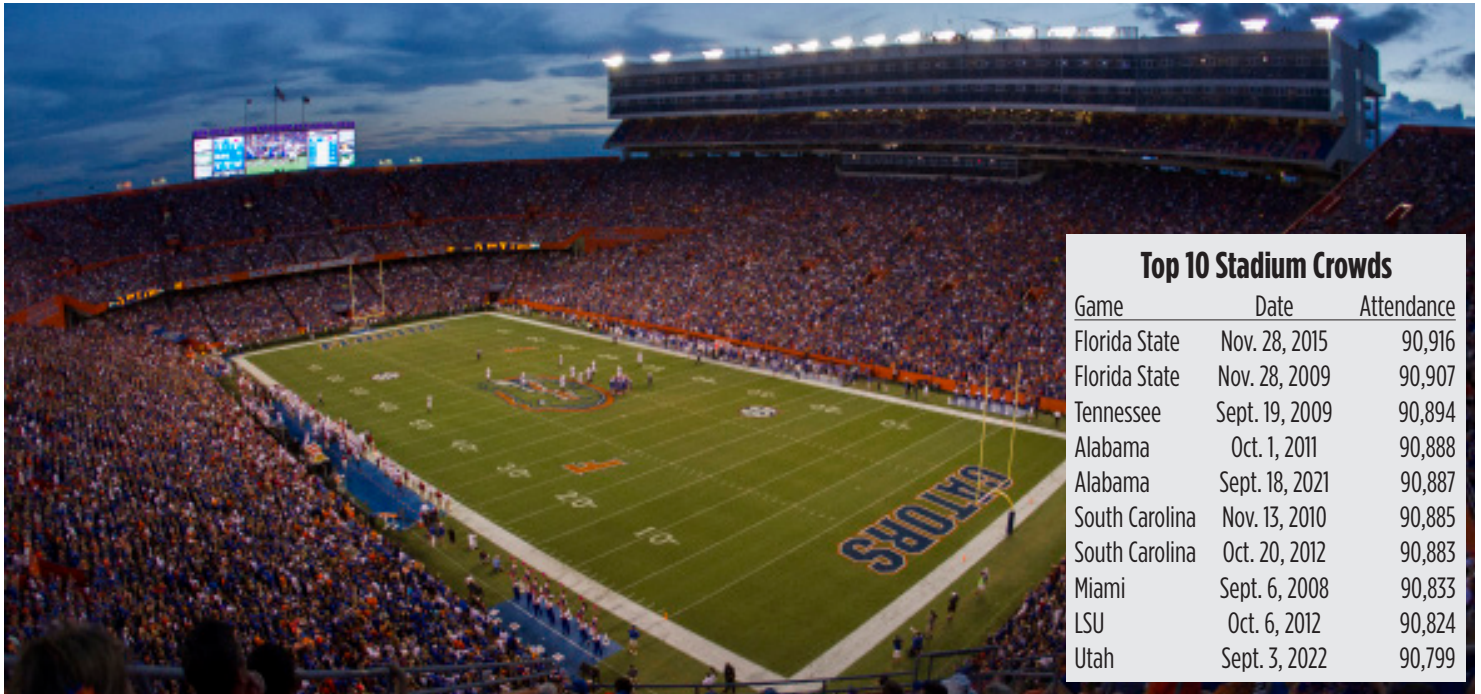
Her cheering students immediately began tossing Two Bits tips her way.

“I’m learning. I’m studying,” Brock said of the customary George Edmondson routine. “I’m a bit of a ham, so they know that.”

Come late Saturday afternoon, upwards of 90,000 at the “Swamp” will know it, too.

“I’m a teacher, so I love an audience,” Brock said. “But that’s a lot of audience.”

June 9, 1992. Once The Gainesville Sun hit newstands that Tuesday, Ben Hill Griffin Stadium's fitting nickname came to life.

Steve Spurrier, entering season three as Gators head coach, called writer Mike Bianchi the day prior and pitched him the storyline. It was seven months after the Gators ended the 1991 regular season with consecutive wins over Kentucky (which clinched an undefeated SEC record and the first league title in school history) and a thrilling 14-9 defeat of No. 3 Florida State, snapping a four-game losing streak to the Seminoles. It also gave UF a perfect 12-0 home record under Spurrier.

"The 'Swamp' is where Gators live," Spurrier told Bianchi. "We feel comfortable there, but we hope our opponents feel tentative. A swamp is hot and sticky and can be dangerous."

Initially, the UF athletic department didn't embrace the nickname. No posters, bumper stickers or marketing campaigns were put together right away. But Spurrier continued to use it. Then he and then-UF communications director Norm Carlson did some research. Turns out, in 1930, UF President John J. Tigert selected the location for the school's football stadium and described the area as a "swampy depression." The school hired engineers to drain the area and install pipes that funneled water down the hill along North-South Drive and dumped it into what is now known as Graham Pond.

Needless to say, the nickname caught on, and Spurrier delivered the perfect quote for the athletic department to utilize once it eventually did embrace the moniker: "The 'Swamp' is a place where only Gators get out alive."
