• **CREDENTIALS** - Credentials for Georgia home games must be requested through an online procedure, are issued for working media only and should be requested as early as possible due to space limitations and significant demand. Requests are honored from sports editors of DAILY newspapers, network affiliate television station sports directors, and websites that have a corresponding publication and/or affiliation with a nationally recognized media entity/network. Requests from weekly newspapers and radio stations will be accepted only from those who will be attending games in a WORKING capacity and will be filled on a space available basis. Non-workers are not permitted in the press box. Credentials will be mailed if time permits; or left at the Press Will-Call booth at Gate 9A on the South side of the stadium or at the East End will call behind the East end zone. Online requesting information may be obtained by email: khuff@sports.uga.edu.

• **FOOTBALL PRACTICE** - Georgia football practices are open to media and photographers/videographers for a designated period of time on designated days. The sports communications office can provide details (706-542-1621).

• **INTERVIEWS**

• **SUNDAY TELECONFERENCE** - Coach Richt will be available to the media each Sunday afternoon following a Saturday game via telephone conference call. Media wishing to talk with Coach Richt should call the sports communications office for details.

• **TUESDAY MEDIA CONFERENCE** - Coach Richt hosts a weekly media conference each Tuesday before a Saturday game. Several players are also available for interviews. Details may be obtained from the sports communications office. Press conference notes and quotes will be posted on our website -- georgiadogs.com.

• **PLAYER INTERVIEWS** - Players are available for interviews in person and by telephone, if time permits, until after practice on Wednesdays. The best times to visit with players in person are at the Tuesday media conference, or Monday, Tuesday, or Wednesday, following practice. Interview requests should be made ahead of time to determine best day and time.

• **POST-PRACTICE MEDIA SESSION** - Coach Richt hosts a media session on Wednesday following practice. Practice notes are posted on georgiadogs.com after every practice.

• **POST-GAME INTERVIEWS** - Members of the media desiring to visit either locker room after the game will be escorted by Sports Communications representatives to the playing field with five minutes on the game clock.

• **PLAYER ROOMS, LOCKER ROOM, WEIGHT ROOM AND TRAINING ROOMS** -- Players' dorm rooms, locker room, weight room, and training room are only open to players, coaches, and staff.

• **PHOTOGRAPHERS** - The University of Georgia follows guidelines established by the NCAA Rules Committee and the SEC regarding sideline control which ensures the sideline as a working area.

1. Each photographer is required to wear an armband at all times.
2. Armbands must be secured in the Photo Hospitality Area located in the

3. No photographers are permitted in the bench area, on the playing field, or in the 12-foot area between the limit line and sideline after kickoff.
4. Cutline writers, messengers, and equipment carriers are not permitted in the sideline armband area.
5. Tripods are not permitted on the sideline.

• **PHOTOGRAPHERS' HOSPITALITY AREA** - A photographers' hospitality area is located in the Lumpkin Media Center on field level behind the Georgia dressing room in the southeast tunnel. A full pre-game meal will be served in this area to all photographers approximately 90 minutes prior to kickoff. Armbands must also be picked up at this location. Internet hookups, wireless internet and phones are available in this area.

• **PRESS BOX** - The Georgia Press Box is located in the South Side Club level of Sanford Stadium. Best entrances to the press box are through Gates 6 or 9A.

• **MEDIA SERVICES** - Complete individual and team statistics, running play-by-play and post-game coaches' quotes are provided all working media. A pre-game meal is available to working media in the press box approximately 90 minutes before kickoff.

• **STADIUM PRESS BOX SMOKE/TOBACCO FREE POLICY** - In accordance with University of Georgia policy, the Georgia Athletic Association has declared all areas of Sanford Stadium as smoke/tobacco-free.

• **TELEPHONES/INTERNET** - The Georgia Press Box and Photographers' Media Center are equipped with hard-wired internet hookups, wireless internet, and telephones for use by the media at no charge.

INTERNET/PHONE SERVICE AT GEORGIA-FLORIDA GAME

Wireless service will be provided free of charge in the press box. Please check your gameday information packets for access and technical information. A technical rep will be on hand during the game to trouble shoot any wireless problems you may have.

There will be five pool phones available in the press box. To order a line please call Jason Morrill at (904) 633-6125 (jmorill@smgjax.com).

• **FTP FEEDS**

All Georgia games are televised live by a national network. Post game sound-bites from the Georgia locker room will be posted on our ffb site after every game as quickly as possible. The Tuesday FTP service will feature practice footage and interviews with Georgia coaches and players on the upcoming opponent. FTP information and schedules can be secured from Karen Huff in the sports communications office (khuff@sports.uga.edu).

collegepressbox.com is the official media website for Division I football. Access and download weekly game notes, quotes, statistics, media guides, headshots, logos and more for each conference and its member schools. Login information to accredited media can be applied for by sending an e-mail to: password@collegepressbox.com.

• **SEC online** - The SEC operates a media-only website at www.secsportsmedia.com, where all football information is available. Media members must register on the site to gain access.



• **SEC Network** - The SEC and ESPN have signed a 20-year agreement through 2034 to operate the multiplatform SEC Network, which airs content 24/7 and includes more than 1,000 live events in its programming schedule. Now in its second year, the SEC Network will air approximately 45 football games, over 130 men's and women's basketball games, 75 baseball games and events from across the SEC's 21 sports in 2015-16.

• **SEC Championship Game** - The 2015 SEC Champion will be crowned December 5 at the Georgia Dome in Atlanta. The contest will feature the Eastern and Western Division champions.

• **College Football Playoff** - The 2015 season will mark the second College Football Playoff, which will determine the national champion for the NCAA Division I Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS). Under the playoff system, four teams -- selected by a 13-member committee -- will play in two semifinal games, with the winners advancing to the Championship Game, played this year at the University of Phoenix Stadium in Glendale, Ariz.

ulldog fans can follow their favorite team throughout the 2015 season on the Georgia Bulldog Radio Network from IMG Sports, which will feature one of the nation's best-known flagship stations, an affiliate list that ranks among the country's largest, and production supplied by the premier college sports marketing and radio production company in America.

IMG provides radio network production for more than 50 major college athletic programs in the SEC and other prominent conferences. Day-to-day management of the network will be overseen by the company's "Georgia Sports Properties" staff in Athens, which also

handles the sales and marketing of Bulldog sports.

The network flagship is Atlanta's News/Talk 750 WSB and 95.5 FM. Additionally, every SEC football game will be carried live on Sirius XM Radio as part of a broadcast & marketing agreement between the SEC and the satellite radio provider.

Scott Howard

The voice of **Scott Howard** has become synonymous with Georgia athletics. He returns for his 22nd season behind the microphone at both Georgia football and basketball games. Howard began his association with Bulldog football as a color analyst alongside the late Larry Munson in the 1993 season. In 2007 he broadcasted play-by-play action in all of Georgia's road football games, and the next season he became the program's primary radio voice by the third game.

Howard has served as the Georgia basketball team's primary play-by-play reporter since the 1997 season. A 1984 UGA graduate, he also announced Georgia baseball games from 1990-96.

Eric Zeier

One of Georgia's greatest quarterbacks ever, Zeier begins his eighth season as a color analyst on the network. By the end of his senior season in 1994, he held 67 school passing records and 18 marks in the Southeastern Conference. Zeier played in the NFL from 1996 to 2001 with the Cleveland Browns, Baltimore Ravens, Tampa Bay Bucs, and Atlanta Falcons.

In addition to his broadcasting duties, Zeier is a Regional Vice President for Bank of America.

Loran Smith

A native of Wrightsville, Ga., Smith continues his long association with the Georgia Network as co-host of the popular pre-game "Tailgate Show."

A former Bulldog MVP and track captain, Smith has had varied responsibilities with the UGA Athletic Association over the years, including assistant sports information director, business manager of athletics and executive director of the Georgia Bulldog Clubs.

Neil Williamson

A UGA graduate and veteran of more than 35

years of sports broadcasting in Georgia, Williamson co-hosts the Network's "Tailgate Show" with Loran Smith and also hosts halftime and post-game programs. "Hondo" has been part of the Bulldogs broadcast team since 1993. In his everyday job, Williamson is Director of Marketing for Cox Media Group's Atlanta radio cluster.

Chuck Dowdle

Longtime TV sports anchor Chuck Dowdle serves not only as the in-game sideline reporter, but also as host of the post-game Locker Room Show with head coach Mark Richt. He is also host of the "Inside Georgia Football with Mark Richt" weekly television show. Dowdle retired in 2009 after 25 years as Sports Director/Anchor at WSB TV in Atlanta. Before returning to his hometown, he served in a similar capacity for WPLG TV in Miami, also announcing Dolphins and University of Miami football games, as well as Fort Lauderdale Strikers pro soccer games.

Tony Schiavone

Entering his 11th year as a member of the UGA Football radio crew, Tony Schiavone is the on-air engineer/producer. He is currently the sports director and midday web producer at WSB Radio in Atlanta, as well as the play-by-play announcer for the Atlanta Braves' AAA affiliate in Gwinnett County. Before joining WSB, Schiavone began his broadcasting career in minor league baseball in Greensboro, N.C., before serving as a TV host in professional wrestling for nearly 20 years. The Virginia native also serves as the on-air engineer for all of Bulldog basketball radio broadcasts.

Entering his 15th season as Georgia's head coach, Mark Richt looks to build on a record-setting season in 2014 with veterans across the board and a new-look offensive coaching staff.

"The spring was good for us in that we established how we're going to go about our business this year," Richt said. "We hopefully learned how to block and tackle better, how to handle our fundamentals better, and how to have better decision-making throwing and catching. I think it was a good spring and a good start toward our fall camp. ... We've got to start playing football to see how things are going to go, but I know we're on the right track the way we're doing things."

The Bulldogs will be seeking a new offensive rhythm under first-year coordinator Brian Schottenheimer, who brings to Athens an extensive NFL background. Georgia also has new coaches in letterman Thomas Brown (running backs, with Bryan McClendon shifting to receivers) and Rob Sale (offensive line).

"I can assure you that Coach Schottenheimer is a great teacher and that he knows what he's doing," Richt said. "I'm real comfortable with what he and our offensive coaches are bringing to the table."

Defensive coordinator Jeremy Pruitt established an emerging defense in his first year and will look to continue to improve this season. Pruitt has a strong nucleus returning from last year and got a rare influx of talent for spring drills to begin building rotations and depth.

Here is a look at this year's Bulldogs (excluding the freshmen, who reported in the summer):

QUARTERBACKS

Richt and Schottenheimer will continue to assess

the options at signal-caller during the 2015 preseason camp.

Two contributors

from the previous season, **Brice Ramsey** (6-3, 213, RSo.) and **Faton Bauta** (6-3, 215, Jr.) battled for the starting spot during spring drills.

Ramsey was the first quarterback off the bench in 2014 – including the entire second half of the Belk Bowl – and finished 24-of-39 for 333 yards and three touchdowns in eight appearances. Bauta saw action in three games a year ago, tallying 48 passing yards on 4-of-5 attempts and adding 17 yards and two touchdowns on the ground. Georgia also has a third option in **Sam Vaughn** (6-3, 189, RFr.).

RUNNING BACKS

With tailback Todd Gurley – the 10th overall pick by the St. Louis Rams in the 2015 NFL Draft – missing seven games last season, rookie **Nick Chubb** (5-10, 220, So.) rose unexpectedly to a starring role. He played in all 13 games, starting in the final eight, and finished with 1,547 yards and 14 rushing touchdowns. By season's end, Chubb trailed only Herschel Walker for the most yards rushing by a freshman in UGA history.

Chubb will be joined by a healthy **Keith Marshall** (5-11, 212, Jr.), who played in just three games in 2014 due to leg injuries. **Sony Michel** (5-11, 212, So.) and **Brendan Douglas** (5-11, 215, Jr.) will provide additional depth at the position. Michel tallied 553 all-purpose yards and six touchdowns last season, while Douglas ran for 230 yards and two touchdowns. **A.J. Turman** (6-0, 204, RSo.) turned heads during spring drills and rushed for 106 yards and two touchdowns in the G-Day Game.

The Bulldogs also return two lettermen at the fullback position, **Quayvon Hicks** (6-2, 251, Sr.) and **Christian Payne** (6-1, 232, So.). In 2014, Hicks contributed in all 13 games, including 85 yards and two scores on nine attempts. **Glenn Welch** (6-3, 280, RSo.) and **Cameron Faulkner** (5-11, 231, RSo.) give the Bulldogs additional options.

WIDE RECEIVERS

Georgia must replace its leading receivers from the past two seasons in Chris Conley (a third-round draft pick of the Chiefs) and Michael Bennett. However, **Malcolm Mitchell** (6-1, 195, Sr.) elected to stay

a final year and will be aided by a deep

receiving corps. Mitchell was Georgia's third-leading receiver with 31 catches for 248 yards and three scores last season. In his career, Mitchell has more

than 1,400 yards receiving and 11 touchdowns.

The Bulldogs also will have help from **Justin Scott-Wesley** (5-11, 201, Sr.), **Reggie Davis** (6-0, 170, Jr.), **Kenneth Towns** (6-3, 202, Jr.), **Isaiah McKenzie** (5-8, 170, So.), and **Shakeneth Williams** (6-1, 197, So.). Scott-Wesley has been a go-to target on key scoring plays and will look to continue a healthy comeback from his 2013 knee injury. On his career, he has 25 receptions for nearly 500 yards and four touchdowns.

Clay Johnson (6-1, 172, Jr.), **Ben Souther** (6-2, 207, Sr.), **Steven Van Tiflin** (6-1, 195, RFr.), **Matt Price** (6-0, 190, RFr.), **Charlie Hegedus** (6-2, 208, Jr.) and **Colter Creswell** (6-3, 190, Jr.) give Georgia more depth.

TIGHT ENDS

Jeb Blazeovich (6-5, 248, So.) emerged as a strong contributor for the Bulldogs during his freshman campaign in 2014, tallying 18 catches for 269 yards and two scores, with an average of nearly 15 yards a reception. He will be joined by veteran **Jay Rome** (6-6, 250, Sr.), who has more than 300 receiving yards in his career.

In addition, Georgia will take a look at **Jared Chapple** (6-4, 232, Jr.), **Jordan Davis** (6-4, 235, RSo.), and **Jackson Harris** (6-5, 247, Fr.). Davis played in six games in 2014 and registered three catches for 66 yards. He also saw significant snaps in spring drills, along with Harris, who early enrolled in January.

OFFENSIVE LINEMEN

Sale inherited a solid group of veterans, as only one starter was lost from the 2014 squad. That lineman was center David Andrews, who was chosen as the Bulldogs' MVP.

The Bulldogs return both starting tackles in **John Theus** (6-6, 303, Sr.) and **Kolton Houston** (6-5, 285, Sr.) and both starting guards in **Greg Pyke** (6-6, 313, Jr.) and **Brandon Kublanow** (6-3, 282, Jr.), though Kublanow is also getting a

also had 17 quarterback hurries and three forced fumbles.

Lorenzo Carter (6-6, 242, So.) quickly emerged as a top player for the Bulldogs with his 41 tackles, including seven for a loss and 4.5 sacks. **Davin Bellamy** (6-5, 241, RSo.) also added strength to Georgia's defensive attack in their 2014 appearances.

Johnny O'Neal (6-2, 240, Jr.) and **Shaun McGee** (6-3, 235, RSo.) boast valuable experience, while **Chuks Amaechi** (6-3, 230, Jr.) transferred from Western Arizona College and got a taste of the system during spring drills. **Tommy Long** (6-2, 228, Jr.) is also in the mix.

INSIDE LINEBACKERS

Georgia lost two of its defensive centerpieces in NFL draft picks Amarlo Herrera and Ramik Wilson, who led the team in tackles and received All-SEC honors, as well as special teams standout Kosta Vavlas.

Tim Kimbrough (6-0, 226, Jr.) is the only returner to have played in all 13 games last season. He led the backups with 32 tackles. **Reggie Carter** (6-1, 228, Jr.) and **Ryne Rankin** (6-1, 218, Jr.) each saw time in 12 games. Carter tallied 28 stops and Rankin, who was a mainstay on special teams for Georgia, had six. The Bulldogs could also look at Floyd on the inside.

Jake Ganus (6-2, 227, Sr.), a transfer from UAB, and **Natrez Patrick** (6-3, 248, Fr.), an early enrollee, impressed during spring drills. **Detric Bing-Dukes** (6-0, 230, RFr.), **Ridge Underwood** (6-2, 227, Jr.) and **John Huff** (6-1, 220, Sr.) provide additional options.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

Pruitt's secondary saw considerable improvement during his first season as defensive coordinator. The Bulldogs, who had just seven interceptions in 2013, surpassed that number by the sixth game of 2014 and tallied 16 by the end of the year.

Gone is Georgia's anchor in the backfield, All-SEC and NFL pick Damian Swann, which means there is an opportunity for young players to step up. Behind Swann, **Quincy Mauger** (6-0, 200, Jr.) had 51 tackles and co-led the team with four interceptions, fourth best in the conference. Also returning in the safety spot is **Dominick Sanders** (6-0, 189, So.), who had a breakout freshman season, playing in all 13 games and recording 34 stops, three interceptions and a 54-yard fumble recovery.

Devin Bowman (6-0, 182, Sr.), **Malkom Parrish** (5-10, 188, So.) and **Aaron Davis** (6-1, 190, RSo.) all return for Georgia at the cornerback position. Davis had 40 tackles, an interception and a fumble recovery, and Parrish added another 17 stops. Bowman finished the year with 19 tackles and a 63-yard interception returned for a touchdown. **Tramel Terry** (6-0, 195, RSo.),

who had six tackles and a pick last year, could see time at safety and corner.

The Bulldogs also have **Reggie Wilkerson** (5-11, 181, RSo.), **Shattle Fenteng** (6-2, 187, Jr.), **Kennar Daniels-Johnson** (6-2, 192, Sr.), **Devin Gillespie** (5-10, 182, Jr.), **Javonte Nelson** (5-11, 198, Sr.), **James Davis** (5-11, 199, Sr.), **Jesse Jones** (6-0, 191, Sr.) and **Jonah Guinn** (6-0, 196, Jr.) back in the mix.

Two early enrollees – **Johnathan Abram** (6-1, 200, Fr.) and **Jarvis Wilson** (6-2, 190, Fr.) – worked into the rotation in spring drills. Wilson, in fact, notched an interception in the G-Day Game.

SPECIALISTS

The Bulldogs return three key starters on special teams, all of whom have contributed previously.

Placekicker **Marshall Morgan** (6-3, 194, Sr.) finished the season hitting 16 of 21 field goals and 67 of 68 extra points. Morgan also handled kickoffs, with 31 of his kicks resulting in touchbacks. Backing up Morgan is **Patrick Beless** (5-9, 166, Sr.).

Thanks to the Bulldogs' high-octane offense, **Collin Barber** (6-2, 208, Sr.) was not called on to punt often. Barber accounted for 34 of Georgia's 43 punts in 2014 and averaged 39.3 yards per effort. Thirteen of his punts resulted in fair catches and five of them stretched beyond 50 yards.

Thomas Pritchard (5-10, 165, Jr.), **Will Cowart** (6-3, 197, RFr.) and **Tanner Stumpe** (5-8, 161, RFr.) also are vying for playing time. Pritchard and Bauta likely will handle the holder duties.

Nathan Theus (6-3, 238, Sr.) controlled the responsibilities at snapper in 2014. **Trent Frix** (6-0, 209, Jr.), **Matt Herz-wurm** (6-0, 225, RSo.) and **John Courson** (5-11, 189, RFr.) give Georgia depth at the position.

Isaiah McKenzie became the first Bulldog in the modern era to return both a punt and a kickoff for touchdowns in the same game. On the year, he averaged 12.1 yards on 19 punt returns, including two touchdowns, and 28 yards a return on 11 kickoffs. **Reggie Davis** also took 12 punts for a nearly 8-yard return average and three kickoffs for 16.3 yards a return.

Junior free safety Quincy Mauger

look at center. **Hunter Long** (6-4, 303, Sr.), **Isaiah Wynn** (6-2, 278, So.), **Dyshon Sims** (6-4, 293, So.), **Lamont Gaillard** (6-2, 305, RFr.) and **Kendall Baker** (6-6, 310, RFr.) also are vying for reps.

Georgia additionally returns **Aulden Bynum** (6-5, 276, RSo.), **Jake Edwards** (6-4, 273, RFr.), **Michael Scullin** (6-2, 285, RSo.), **Thomas Swilley** (6-3, 301, RSo.), **Billy Seward** (6-3, 270, RSo.) and **Alex Essex** (6-5, 269, RFr.).

DEFENSIVE LINEMEN

The defensive line has some holes to fill with the departures of Ray Drew, Mike Thornton and Toby Johnson. However, several key playmakers will be back in action on the Bulldogs' defensive front this season.

Tackle **Sterling Bailey** (6-3, 282, Sr.) and end **Josh Dawson** (6-4, 273, Sr.) played in every game of 2014 and set themselves up for big senior campaigns. Bailey tallied 27 tackles last season. Dawson had 17 tackles, including a sack and four for loss. His finest moment came in the form of a fumble recovery for a touchdown in the Tennessee game.

The Bulldogs will see the return of nose **Chris Mayes** (6-4, 323, Sr.) and **John Atkins** (6-4, 300, RSo.). Atkins recorded nine tackles and a pass breakup in his 10 appearances last year, while Mayes added seven and one for a loss in his eight outings. **James DeLoach** (6-3, 284, Sr.) saw snaps throughout the spring at tackle, along with **Keyon Brown** (6-3, 247, RFr.).

The line got an added boost with the addition of two early enrollees – **Michael Barnett** (6-4, 255, Fr.) and **Jonathan Ledbetter** (6-4, 265, Fr.). Barnett was sidelined due to shoulder surgery, but Ledbetter established himself as a threat during the spring. His brother, **Joseph Ledbetter** (6-4, 235, RSo.), moved to end in the spring.

OUTSIDE LINEBACKERS

The Bulldogs will enjoy a 100 percent rate of return of lettermen at the outside linebacker position. **Jordan Jenkins** (6-3, 253, Sr.) had 70 tackles, five sacks, two forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries in 2014 as a mainstay on the Bulldog defense. **Leonard Floyd** (6-4, 231, Jr.) proved himself a major pass-rushing threat with a team-best six sacks among his 55 stops. He

Five Bulldogs Selected In 2015 Draft

Georgia had five players selected in the 2015 NFL Draft, including Todd Gurley who went to the St. Louis Rams as the 10th overall pick. Chris Conley (3rd Rd., 76th, Chiefs), Ramik Wilson (4th Rd., 118th, Chiefs), Damian Swann (5th Rd., 167th, Saints) and Amarlo Herrera (6th Rd., 207th, Colts) were the other four Bulldogs taken.

First Up In The SEC

Vanderbilt served as Georgia's first SEC opponent five times in the 1950s, including the season-opening opponent in 1952 and 1956. This year, the Bulldogs open their SEC schedule at Vandy on Sept. 12.

Also, the Bulldogs will be facing Alabama for the first time in the regular season since 2008. Georgia last played the Crimson Tide for the 2012 SEC Championship in Atlanta.

Turnover Margin

In 2014, Georgia ranked fourth nationally in Turnover Margin at +16 or 1.23 per game. This was the fourth best in school history. Georgia's 1980 national championship team led the country. That team finished +23 during the regular season (2.09 per game) and that still ranks fifth best in NCAA history.

2015 Bulldog Storylines

New Leader On Offense

Georgia led the SEC and was eighth nationally in Scoring at 41.3 points/game in 2014. With the departure of offensive coordinator Mike Bobo to become the head coach at Colorado State, the Bulldogs hired **Brian Schottenheimer** from the St. Louis Rams in January 2015 to lead the offense. Bobo took over the Bulldogs' play calling at the end of the 2006 season and was named the offensive coordinator before the 2007 season.

Veteran Offensive Line, New Coach

The Bulldogs return four starters on the offensive line from a squad that won 10 games and averaged 257.8 rushing yards per game, which led the SEC and ranked 11th nationally last year. LT **John Theus**, LG/C **Brandon Kublanow**, RG **Greg Pyke** and RT **Kolton Houston** are all expected in Georgia's lineup after only three-year starting C David Andrews graduated. **Isaiah Wynn** and **Dyshon Sims** will also provide depth after earning playing time last year as true freshmen. The unit will be led by new offensive line coach **Rob Sale**. Sale replaces Will Friend who joined Mike Bobo to Colorado State. Friend is now the offensive coordinator for the Rams.

Rushing Attack

The Bulldogs finished with 38 rushing touchdowns last season, which ranked second in school history. The 1971 team holds the mark with 39. Georgia returns four out of its top five rushers from 2014, including **Nick Chubb**. Chubb started the Bulldogs' last eight games and finished with 1,547 yards and 14 rushing touchdowns to help Georgia tally 70 touchdowns (10th nationally). Chubb was named a Freshman All-American and the consensus SEC Freshman of the Year. In addition, 2015 sophomore **Sony Michel** got his first career start alongside Chubb in the Belk Bowl win and completed the year with 410 yards and five scores.

Replacing Tackling Machines

There were two constants at the top of the defensive statistic pages over the last two seasons in ILBs Ramik Wilson and Amarlo Herrera. The 2014 seniors combined for 470 tackles over the last two years, including Wilson's SEC-leading 133 stops in 2013 and Herrera's team-leading 115 tackles last year. Wilson was selected by the Kansas City Chiefs in the fourth round of the 2015 draft while Herrera was taken by the Indianapolis Colts in the sixth round. **Reggie Carter** and **Tim Kimbrough** were backups at ILB last year. Starting OLBs **Jordan Jenkins** (70 tackles, 9.5 tackles for loss, five sacks) and **Leonard Floyd** (55 tackles, 8.5 tackles for loss, six sacks) ranked third and fifth in tackles last year and are also slated to return.

Year Two Under Pruitt

The 2015 season will mark the second year under defensive coordinator Jeremy Pruitt. The Bulldogs ranked fifth in the SEC in Scoring Defense at 20.7 points a game. Georgia finished with a +16 turnover margin and that ranked fourth nationally. Pruitt will have six starters back from a defense that posted two shutouts and held #23 Missouri and #9 Auburn to a combined seven points.

Non-Conference Success

Under the direction of Mark Richt, Georgia owns a 56-11 record against teams from outside the Southeastern Conference. They are 39-2 at home since 2001. The Bulldogs completed 2014 with a 4-1 non-conference mark, including their 37-14 win over #20 Louisville in the Belk Bowl.

In 2015, three of Georgia's four regular season non-conference foes will come to Sanford Stadium. The slate features Louisiana-Monroe at home for the season opener (Sept. 5), Southern University (Sept. 26) and Georgia Southern (Nov. 21) in Athens and a meeting with Georgia Tech in Atlanta in the regular season finale on Nov. 28.

The Bulldogs are 3-0 all-time versus Louisiana-Monroe (formerly Northeast Louisiana) but have never opened up against the Warhawks. Georgia has never faced Southern University out of Baton Rouge and has a 5-0 edge all-time against Georgia Southern, including a 45-14 win over the Eagles last time the teams met in 2012. The Bulldogs have won 12 out of the last 14 games over Georgia Tech and hold a 64-38-5 edge in the overall series.

Dogs In The Super Bowl

For the 14th consecutive year, Georgia had at least one former player in the Super Bowl. The Bulldogs and LSU have the SEC's longest streak of a former player being on a team that advanced to the Super Bowl. This year it was Demarcus Dobbs from the NFC champion Seattle Seahawks. Additionally, former Bulldog Travis Jones is on the Seahawks staff as an assistant coach. Dobbs has been in the league four years and been in two Super Bowls, including with the San Francisco 49ers in the 2014 Super Bowl. The last Bulldog to be on a Super Bowl championship team was Chris Clemons in 2014. Georgia is the only school to have produced three Super Bowl MVPs: S Jake Scott, Miami, SB VII; RB Terrell Davis, Denver, SB XXXII; WR Hines Ward, Pittsburgh, SB XL.



Potential For High-Power Offense Again

Seven starters return from the record-setting offense of 2014. For the 10th time in school history and first time since 2002, Georgia led the SEC in Scoring Offense. The Bulldogs tallied 537 points last year and averaged 41.3 points per game, both school records, and finished eighth nationally in Scoring Offense. The Bulldogs return the SEC leader in scoring touchdowns in sophomore TB **Nick Chubb** along with the SEC leader in overall scoring in senior PK **Marshall Morgan**. This year, Georgia will debut a new offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach in Brian Schottenheimer.

Loaded Backfield For Bulldogs

The Bulldogs led the SEC and ranked 11th nationally with an average of 257.8 rushing yards a game in 2014. Georgia established the highest average since the 1987 team (274.5). Also, the Bulldogs set a school record pace by averaging 6.04 yards a rush. The former record was 5.64 by the 1992 squad.

Georgia's current depth at tailback includes **Nick Chubb**, **Sony Michel**, **Keith Marshall** and **Brendan Douglas**.

Chubb started the final eight games for the Bulldogs and earned national awards after six of those games. He became the 12th Bulldog in school history to reach 1,000 yards rushing in a season and finished second in the SEC in both yards/game (119.0) and total rushing yards (1,547).

Chubb finished the season going for more than 100 yards in eight consecutive games. He is the first Bulldog to accomplish that feat since Herschel Walker in 1982. For the year, Chubb led the SEC in scoring lead (TDs) averaging 7.4 points a game (14 rushing, two receiving). At 1,547 rushing yards on the year, Chubb tied for fourth best in school history with Garrison Hearst (1992).

Michel contributed a 6.4 average totaling 410 yards and five touchdowns in eight games with one start. Douglas and FB **Quayvon Hicks** also finished with 315 yards and four touchdowns last year and will return. Marshall was limited to 12 carries in the first three games as he was recovering from a knee injury. He looks to return to the healthy form he displayed as a freshman in 2012 when he averaged 6.5 yards a carry, registering 759 yards and eight scores.

Veteran Line Returns

For the first time since 2000, Georgia went an entire season with the same offensive line. Four of those five Bulldogs return in 2015. The unit featured sophomore **Brandon Kublanow** at LG, redshirt sophomore **Greg Pyke** at RG, junior **John Theus** at LT, senior David Andrews at C and senior **Kolton Houston** at RT. Andrews was the lone member of last year's line that graduated and signed a free agent contract with the New England Patriots.

Houston returns in 2015 after being granted a sixth year from the NCAA. He has been a member of the program since 2010 but saw his first action since 2013. Theus is the starting LT after starting 22 games at RT during his first two seasons.

The Bulldogs tallied an SEC-best 38 rushing touchdowns. That was one shy of the school record set by the 1971 Georgia team. UGA also led the SEC in Rushing Offense with 3,365 yards for an average of

258.8 yards per game. Also, Georgia's quarterbacks finished with a completion percentage of 67.4, which established a school record for a season.

Quarterback Battle To Watch

All eyes will be on the quarterbacks this fall after senior Hutson Mason graduated and offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach Mike Bobo left to be the head coach at Colorado State. Brian Schottenheimer was hired in January from the St. Louis Rams to take over Georgia's offense and coach the quarterbacks.

The quarterback corps include redshirt sophomore **Brice Ramsey** and junior **Faton Bauta**. Ramsey served as the primary backup last year, appearing in eight games and was 24-of-39 for 333 for three touchdowns and two interceptions. He played the entire second half in leading Georgia to a victory over #20 Louisville in the Belk Bowl after Mason was sidelined. Bauta has appeared in six career games over the last two seasons. He is 4-for-5 for 48 yards with no touchdowns or interceptions. Plus, Bauta has 10 rushes for 46 yards and two scores.

This will be the second straight year Georgia will have a new starting quarterback under center. Mason took over in 2014 following Aaron Murray, who became an SEC record holder as a starter from 2010-13. Murray had four straight seasons of 3,000 yards passing.

Looking For Leaders At Receiver

Georgia's top returning options at receiver include senior **Malcolm Mitchell**, along with sophomore tight end **Jeb Blazevich**. The senior duo of Michael Bennett and Chris Conley combined for 73 catches, 1,061 yards and 12 touchdowns in 2014. Conley is now with the Kansas City Chiefs. Mitchell aims for a full season after appearing in nine games with three starts last year. He missed almost all of 2013 with a knee injury. Last season, Mitchell had 31 catches for 248 yards and three touchdowns.

The coming season will provide an opportunity for a bigger role for sophomore **Isaiah McKenzie**, junior **Reggie Davis** and junior **Kenneth Towns**, who all had six catches each last year. Senior **Justin Scott-Wesley** will also be in the mix at receiver this year. Along with Blazevich, Georgia is well-stocked at tight end with the return of senior **Jay Rome** and redshirt sophomore **Jordan Davis**, along with 2015 January enrollee **Jackson Harris**.



Year Two Of The Pruitt Era

Georgia enters its second season under the direction of defensive coordinator/secondary coach Jeremy Pruitt. In 2014, the Bulldogs led the SEC and finished fourth nationally with a +16 turnover margin. That figure was the fourth best in school history and best since 1982. This was a dramatic improvement from 2013 when the Bulldogs finished the year with a -7 turnover margin.

Overall, Georgia improved five spots to finish No. 5 in the SEC in Scoring Defense allowing 20.7 points per game. The Bulldogs scored 110 points off 29 turnovers in 2014. The defense scored four of those touchdowns and three of the four Georgia defenders who scored return (DE **Josh Dawson** - fumble recovery vs. Tennessee; DB **Devin Bowman** - 63-yard interception return vs. Vanderbilt; DB **Dominick Sanders** - 54-yard fumble return vs. Arkansas; 2014 senior STAR Damian Swann - 99-yard fumble return). Swann was a fifth round pick in the 2015 NFL Draft by the New Orleans Saints.

2014 Review Of The Defense

The Bulldogs allowed 20.7 points/game. Georgia posted a pair of shutouts (Troy, @ #23 Missouri), held Missouri out of the Red Zone and kept then #9 Auburn to seven points and one trip to the Red Zone (drive ended in an interception). Missouri, the SEC East champion, was shut out by the Bulldogs in Columbia. This was the first time the Tigers had been shut out since 2002.

Georgia's defensive staff underwent a complete overhaul after the 2013 season. This marked the first time since 1964 (*Vince Dooley's first year*) that the Bulldogs had an entirely new defensive staff.

Dog Duo Delays NFL Plans

OLBs **Jordan Jenkins** and **Leonard Floyd** made the decision to return to the Bulldogs instead of bolting for the NFL. These decisions immediately bolstered Georgia's backbone on the defense for the coming year. Both were considered early round picks, but will now serve as the Bulldogs leading linebackers. Jenkins is the top returning tackler with 70 tackles, including 9.5 tackles for loss and five sacks, and finished with a team-high 24 quarterback pressures. Jenkins also had two forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries in 2014. Floyd led the team with six sacks and finished fifth on the club with 55 stops, including 8.5 tackles for loss, and had 17 pressures and three caused fumble.

Lorenzo Carter is among the other linebackers to watch. Playing in 13 games and starting five, Carter had 41 tackles with seven tackles for loss and 4.5 sacks.

Secondary Creating Turnovers

Georgia's secondary accounted for 15 of the team's 16 interceptions, six forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries last year. The Bulldogs return a majority of their secondary, losing only Damian Swann and Corey Moore (now with the Houston Texans).

Isaiah McKenzie had three return TDs as a freshman in 2014.

Quincy Mauger tied for the team lead in INTs with four while DB **Dominick Sanders** had three picks in his first season. Along with Mauger and Sanders, Georgia's returning secondary include senior **Devin Bowman**, redshirt sophomore **Aaron Davis** and sophomore **Malkom Parrish**.

Early Enrollees Add Depth To Defense

Seven of the eight early enrollees for the Bulldogs play defense. **Jonathan Ledbetter** (Tucker), **Natrez Patrick** (Mays), **Michael Barnett** (Woodland - S.C.), **Chuks Amaechi** (Arizona Western College), **Jarvis Wilson** (Tupelo - Miss.), **Johnathan Abram** (East Marion - Miss.) and **Jake Ganus** (UAB) make up the crew on defense.

Ganus comes to the Bulldogs as a senior transfer after leading

the Blazers with 70 tackles, including 16.5 tackles for loss and six sacks, in 2014. Ganus tallied 156 stops playing a prominent role on the UAB defense as a freshman and sophomore in 2012-13.

The Bulldogs' Front

A position to keep an eye on would be the defensive front. Georgia lost captain Mike Thornton (now with Pittsburgh Steelers) and Ray Drew (now with Miami Dolphins), along with Toby Johnson (now with Tennessee Titans), from last year's squad. Senior **Sterling Bailey** returns to the lineup after recording 27 tackles last year and is the only veteran with extensive experience. He has played in 29 games with 10 starts. In addition, senior **Josh Dawson** has appeared in 38 games with five starts and finished last year with 17 stops.

Morgan Moving Up Record Books

Senior PK **Marshall Morgan** along with senior P **Collin Barber** have served as the primary specialists since 2012. Morgan has a chance to end his career as Georgia's all-time scoring leader.

Currently, Morgan ranks fourth in school history with 315 points. The Georgia record is 412 set by Blair Walsh (seventh nationally all-time). Morgan (177) is closing in on the Bulldog career PAT mark held by Walsh (184).

Morgan led the SEC in 2014 for scoring with 115 points. He is the 11th Bulldog to claim an SEC scoring title (first since Brandon Coutu, 2005). Morgan set the SEC record at #24 South Carolina last year, hitting his 19th and 20th straight FGs. In the Georgia Tech game, he had an eventful performance featuring six points, a 28-yard run on a fake field goal attempt, a tackle on a kickoff and the first kick of his career blocked. Morgan also set school records in PATs and PATs attempted in 2014, going 67-for-68. He helped Georgia set a school record with 537 points last year. That mark, along with a 41.3 average for the Bulldogs, led the SEC.

In his career, Barber has punted 123 times for an average of 41.5. Twice in 2014, the Bulldogs did not have to punt in a game (@ UK, vs. Charleston Southern).

Aiming For Better Returns

Georgia averaged 22.4 yards on kickoff returns and 10.5 on punt returns in 2014. Rising sophomore **Isaiah McKenzie** made history by becoming only the 12th player in NCAA FBS history to have a punt return and a kickoff return for a touchdown in the same game in the win at Kentucky. He finished tied for second nationally with three return touchdowns last season. McKenzie went 90 yards on the opening kickoff to give the Bulldogs an early 7-0 edge against Kentucky. He was the first Bulldog to start a game with a KOR TD since 1988 when Tim Worley raced 93 yards against Ole Miss. Then in the third quarter versus UK, he added a 59-yard punt return for a touchdown, marking his second of the year. In the win over Arkansas, McKenzie had three KOR for 93 yards, including a 48-yarder.

In the punt return game, sophomore **Reggie Davis** and McKenzie combined for 325 yards on 31 returns and two touchdowns last season. Also, McKenzie had a 52-yarder for a touchdown against Troy. In the SEC, McKenzie ranked among the top five for most of the season in both categories. He finished at a 28.1 average in kickoff returns and a 12.1 average in punt returns.

Head Coach Mark Richt came to Georgia with the goal of taking the lid off a program that had not won an SEC title in 20 years. After 14 seasons between the hedges, he's demonstrated what that means by winning two SEC Championships (2002, '05), five SEC Eastern Division titles and tied for another, and his 136-48 record is fifth best in the country in winning percentage among active coaches (.739). And his emphasis on graduation has come to fruition as 292 Bulldog players have earned their degrees during his tenure.

Richt was named SEC Coach of the Year in both 2002 and 2005. His record against non-conference teams is 56-11 and his teams are 46-15 when playing in an opponent's home stadium.

Richt is also one of only seven coaches in history to win two SEC championships (2002, 2005) in his first five years, and one of only seven head coaches in SEC history to record four straight 10-win seasons (2002-05). The respect

he has nationally was demonstrated in 2010 when Richt was named to the American Football Coaches Association Board of Trustees. He is also the 2013 recipient of the Stallings Award, given for commitment to humanitarian and community service efforts.

The excitement produced by Richt's teams on the field has been matched by many other aspects surrounding the program. Richt has generated an atmosphere of excitement and unity among the Georgia people. Georgia supporters and fans became impressed with his sincerity, openness, family values, and the casual and genuine way he carried himself. They liked his ideas on building a football program, his commitment to discipline, and the importance he placed on standards of excellence on and off the field.

And they liked the way he refused to set limitations on what would be a satisfactory season. "I like to set our goals high," he said. "I never want to put a ceiling on what we can accomplish."

Richt also had a reputation for developing quarterbacks at FSU and that has continued at UGA. David Greene was named SEC Freshman of the Year in 2001 and in '02, Greene led the SEC in passing efficiency and was the consensus choice for All-SEC first team. By the end of his career, Greene had become the SEC's all-time leading passer (11,528 yards) and set the NCAA Division I-A record for career victories by a starting QB

with 42. D.J. Shockley followed Greene in 2005 and led the SEC in passing efficiency. Matthew Stafford came next (2006-08) and set the Georgia record for season total offense in 2008 (3,499 yards) and finished third in career passing yardage (7,731).

In 2010, Aaron Murray finished second nationally in passing efficiency among freshman quarterbacks and in 2012 set the school record for most TD passes in a single season with 36. In 2013, Murray set four SEC career records: Passing yards (13,166), Total Offense (13,562), TD passes (121), and completions (921). He is the only QB in SEC history to throw for more than 3,000 yards four consecutive years.

The NFL is also looking Georgia's way on a regular basis. Seventy-seven of Richt's players have been chosen in the NFL draft over the last 14 years including eight chosen in 2002 and 2013 -- the most Georgia players ever selected in a single year.

Mark Richt Year by Year

2014: Nationally ranked in the top 15 for much of the year, the Bulldogs made their 18th consecutive appearance in a bowl game including all 14 seasons under Richt. Georgia led the SEC and ranked among the top 10 nationally in scoring at 41.3 points a game and finished third nationally in turnover margin at +16. The 'Dogs finished #9 in both polls.

2013: Besieged by injuries to numerous starters, the 'Dogs still managed to defeat two Top 10 teams (South Carolina and LSU) along with rivals Tennessee, Florida (for the third straight season), and Georgia Tech (for the 12th time in 13 years). Georgia also earned its 17th consecutive bowl invitation.

2012: In racing to the SEC Eastern Division title, Richt's teams defeated rivals Tennessee, Florida, Auburn, and Georgia Tech all in the same season for the second straight year. In the 32-28 loss to #2 Alabama in the SEC title game, the third-ranked 'Dogs came within a few yards and a few seconds of earning a trip to the BCS national title game. UGA defeated Nebraska, 45-31, in the Capital One Bowl.

2011: Georgia won ten or more games for the





seventh time in Richt's 11 years. The 'Dogs defeated rivals Tennessee, Florida, Auburn, and Georgia Tech all in the same season for the first time since 1981.

2010: With the loss of several key players during the season, the Dogs had the first losing season in the Richt era but still managed victories over rivals Tennessee and Georgia Tech.

2009: Georgia upset #7 Georgia Tech in the regular season finale and then won its fourth straight bowl game to complete the season at 8-5.

2008: Georgia finished with a 10-3 mark and number ten final national ranking—the sixth time in seven years the Bulldogs won ten or more games and also finished among the nation's top ten teams in the final national polls.

2007: One of the youngest teams in the country, was 4-2 after six games but won the last seven in a row including victories over rivals Florida, Auburn,

and Georgia Tech to finish 11-2. The 'Dogs defeated 10th ranked Hawai'i in The Allstate Sugar Bowl and finished No. 2 in the final AP poll and No. 3 in the coaches poll.

2006: After starting out 5-0, his 2006 team struggled through the middle of the schedule, but rebounded to defeat three top 20 teams in a row: #5 Auburn, #16 Georgia Tech, and #14 Virginia Tech in the Chick-fil-A Bowl. He was chosen to coach the 2007 Hula Bowl game in Hawaii.

2005: Picked to finish third in the SEC East, his 2005 team exceeded all expectations with a 10-2 regular season finish and SEC championship defeating third-ranked LSU in the title game. He was elected 2005 SEC Coach of the Year by the

SEC Coaches.

2004: His 2004 team finished 10-2, won a third straight bowl game, and finished in the nation's top six in the final national rankings for the third consecutive season. Along the way in '04, the 'Dogs defeated defending national champion LSU, Georgia Tech for the fourth straight time and upended Florida for the first time since 1997. DE David Pollack became the most decorated defensive player in Georgia history with a third straight first-team All-America selection and was recipient of the Lombardi, Bednarik, Lott, and Hendricks Trophies.

2003: Richt led the 'Dogs to the SEC title game for the second time in a row in '03, defeated Purdue in the Capital One Bowl, and had the 'Dogs in the top ten again with a final USA Today/ESPN Coaches ranking of 6th and a final AP ranking of 7th. Richt's team ranked 2nd nationally in Scoring Defense (14.5 ppg), 4th in Total Defense (276.86 ypg), 6th in Passing Defense (174.5 ypg), and 14th nationally in Turnover Margin (+.79).

2002: The Bulldogs went 13-1, won its first SEC title in 20 years, defeated Florida State in the Nokia Sugar Bowl, and finished the season with a No. 3 national ranking. Georgia's championship run was a complete team effort, with the Dogs winning five games by a touchdown or less. Among Richt's team were three first-team All-Americans and eight first-team All-SEC performers. Richt himself was a consensus choice as SEC Coach of the Year and was a finalist for the Bear Bryant National Coach of the Year Award. In addition, the '02 Bulldogs led the SEC in both scoring offense (32.2 ppg) and scoring defense (15.1 ppg).

2001: By the time his inaugural season in 2001 came to a close (8-4), he had become the first Georgia coach since H.J. Stegeman in 1920 to win eight games in his inaugural season. He had also handed Tennessee its only regular season defeat (in Knoxville on national television) and beaten arch rival Georgia Tech (for the first time since 1997).

The Road To Athens

Richt's career as a Bulldog began as a Christmas present that actually came the day after most gifts had been opened. On Dec. 26, 2000, he was named head coach at the University of Georgia after serving on the staff at Florida State for 15 years—the last seven as offensive coordinator.

Richt, a 1982 graduate of the University of Miami, coached the quarterbacks for 14 seasons at FSU. As offensive coordinator, he developed offenses that were among the most prolific in college football history while becoming one of country's most respected coaches.

Under Richt's direction, the FSU offense had been a national leader. In his seven years as offensive coordinator, the Seminoles finished in the nation's top five in scoring offense on five occasions, top 12 in total offense five times, and top 12 in passing offense five times. His 2000 offense finished the regular season ranked first nationally in total offense (549.0 ypg), first in passing offense (384.0 ypg), and third in scoring offense (42.4 ppg).

Richt sent six FSU quarterbacks into the NFL between 1987 and 2000. In addition to Weinke (Carolina Panthers), Washington Redskin Casey Weldon was the runner-up for the Heisman Trophy

in 1991. His teammate at FSU, Brad Johnson (now Richt's brother-in-law), was a Pro Bowl selection for Washington in 2000 and led the Tampa Bay Bucs to the Super Bowl title in 2003. Other Richt pro proteges include Danny Kanell (New York Giants), Danny McManus (Kansas City Chiefs) and Peter Tom Willis (Chicago Bears).

A native of Omaha, Nebraska, Richt played QB for the Miami Hurricanes under Howard Schnellenberger. He spent most of his career at Miami as a backup to former Buffalo Bills star Jim Kelly. In one of Richt's years at Miami, his QB teammates included Kelly, Vinny Testaverde, Bernie Kosar,

Building a Family

Richt married Katharyn in 1987. They have four children. Two came along the usual way — Jon and David. But two came in a very special way.

Running Backs



Thomas Brown, a former Georgia tailback who coached Heisman Trophy runner-up Melvin Gordon at Wisconsin in 2014, was named the new running backs coach at UGA on February 16, 2015.

At Wisconsin in 2014, Gordon posted the second-best season ever by a running back with 2,587 rushing yards and 32 total touchdowns. He and sophomore Corey Clement combined to run for 3,536 yards to break the single-season Football Bowl Subdivision record for rushing yards by teammates that had been set the year before by Gordon and James White (3,053 yards).

The Badgers posted the two most prolific rushing performances in the country in 2014 with a school-record 644 rushing yards vs. Bowling Green and 581 vs. Nebraska, and their average of 6.91 yards per rushing attempt ranks as the fourth-best mark in FBS history.

Prior to joining the Wisconsin staff, Brown served as the running backs coach at Marshall in 2013 and at UT Chattanooga in 2012. He spent the 2011 season as an assistant strength and conditioning coach at UGA.

At Marshall, he helped direct Conference USA's second-ranked rushing offense which averaged 205.9 rushing yards per game (ranked 24th nationally). The Herd won the C-USA East Division title with a 7-1 record and defeated Maryland, 31-20, in the Military Bowl. Brown guided RB Essray Taliaferro to a 1,000-yard season that saw him average 5.2 yards per carry and score 10 touchdowns while amassing 1,140 rushing yards. Marshall was one of just seven FBS teams to boast three running backs that rushed for at least 500 yards in 2013 -- along with Wisconsin -- and was the lone program outside the Power Five conferences to accomplish the feat.

A native of Tucker, Ga., Brown starred at Tucker High School before enrolling at Georgia and helping the Bulldogs to the 2005 Southeastern Conference championship. He finished his career as the fifth-leading rushing in Georgia history with 2,646 career yards and led the Bulldogs in rushing in 2004 and 2005. For his career, Brown averaged 5.0 yards per carry and scored 25 touchdowns. He was elected by his teammates as the permanent offensive team captain in 2007.

He was selected in the sixth round of the 2008 NFL Draft by the Atlanta Falcons and spent the 2009 season with the Cleveland Browns before retiring to pursue coaching opportunities.

Brown earned his bachelor's degree in speech communications from UGA. He and his wife, Jessica, have two children, Orlando and Tyson.

Mike Ekeler, linebackers coach at Southern Cal in 2013, was named Inside Linebackers Coach at Georgia on Feb. 6, 2014. He also coordinates the defensive special teams.

In his first year, he was part of a staff that led the ‘Dogs to improvement in several categories from the year before including points per game (29.0 to 20.7), total defense (375.5 to 337.2 yards per game), passing yards allowed (227.4 to 170.4, second best in the SEC), average yards per catch (13.4 to 10.9), and was second in the SEC in passing efficiency defense (105.8). In 2015 he coached two NFL draft choices: Ramik Wilson (4th round, Chiefs) and Amarlo Herrera (6th round, Colts).

Ekeler had previously served as linebackers coach and co-defensive coordinator at Indiana (2011-12). A native of David City, Nebraska, he had served as linebackers coach at Nebraska for three seasons (2008-10) under head coach Bo Pelini. During his three years in Lincoln, the Cornhuskers won or shared the Big 12 Conference North Division title all three seasons.

As Nebraska’s linebackers coach, he was involved with some of the nation’s most successful defenses. In 2010, Nebraska was third nationally in pass efficiency defense, fifth in pass defense, ninth in scoring defense and 11th in total defense. In 2009, the Cornhuskers led the country in scoring defense and pass efficiency defense, were seventh in total defense and ninth in rushing defense. He coached NFL draft picks Lavonte David, a two-time All-American, Phillip Dillard and Cody Glenn.

Ekeler had worked as a graduate assistant at LSU (2005-07) and also at Oklahoma (2003-04). Oklahoma played for the BCS title in both of Ekeler’s seasons at Oklahoma posting a two-year record of 24-3. While at LSU, the Tigers led the SEC in six defensive categories and ranked nationally in four in 2006. The 2007 LSU team finished 12-2 and won the BCS National Championship marking the third time in five years that Ekeler had been part of a team playing for the BCS title.

Ekeler graduated from Blair High School in Blair, Neb., where he played both wide receiver and linebacker winning the state championship his junior year. He played linebacker for Bill Snyder at Kansas State from 1991-94 and was named team captain in 1994. He was the only player appointed captain by Snyder during the coach’s initial 17-year head coaching career at Kansas State.

Ekeler earned his Bachelor’s degree in social sciences from Kansas State in 1995. He and his wife, Barbie, have a son, J.J., 13, and daughters Cameryn, 12, Abigail, 10, and Bella, 6.

Tight Ends / Offensive Special Teams Coordinator



John Lilly was named tight ends coach at UGA on Jan. 24, 2008, after serving as tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator at Florida State University from 1998-2007. He added the duty of Offensive Special Teams Coordinator in 2014. Lilly, a native of Beckley, West Virginia, is a 1990 graduate of Guilford College (N.C.).

During his seven seasons at UGA the Bulldogs have won 64 games, including four bowl victories and two SEC East titles. He's been part of an offensive staff that led Georgia to the 2014 SEC scoring offense title (41.3 ppg) and three straight record-setting seasons: Total Yards in a Season (6,547 in 2012, 6,294 in 2013, 5,964 in 2014); Average Yards / Game (467.64 in '12, 484.2 in '13, 458.8 in '14); and Most TDs in a Season (72 in 2012, 58 in '13, 70 in '14).

Lilly called the plays for Georgia during the team's 37-14 win over Louisville in the 2014 Belk Bowl. Under his direction, the Bulldogs tallied 492 total yards of offense, including over 300 yards rushing, on a Cardinal defense that was ranked 10th nationally (308.5 yds/game).

At UGA, he's coached several star TE's including Arthur Lynch (2009-13), a first-team All-SEC performer and fifth-round draft pick of the Miami Dolphins; 2011 AFCA All-American, Mackey Award finalist, and fourth-round draft choice of the Cincinnati Bengals Orson Charles; and Aron White, named the Most Outstanding Offensive Player in the 2009 Advocare V100 Independence Bowl. Lilly has also headed up the Bulldogs' punt team since his arrival in Athens and in 2009 the unit, led by Consensus All-American and Ray Guy Award winning Punter Drew Butler, was first in the nation in Net Punting with an average of 41.95 yards per punt. In 2010 Georgia finished fourth nationally in Net Punting with a 40.6 yard average. He also works with the Bulldog kickers including current Vikings kicker Blair Walsh and UGA All-SEC first team kicker Marshall Morgan.

Lilly's tight ends at FSU were a productive part of the Seminole offense. In 2006, his charges recorded 38 catches, the most receptions as a group since 1990 and second-most receptions in FSU history by the tight end position. In 2006, he coached Brandon Warren, the first tight end in school history to receive freshman All-America honors and only the third tight end ever at FSU to receive All-America recognition. In 2005 and '06 his tight ends registered back-to-back seasons with 30 or more catches for the first time since 1990-91.

Under Lilly's direction, four of FSU's recruiting classes between 2002 and 2007 were ranked in the top four in the nation. Prior to being named recruiting coordinator and tight ends coach, Lilly served as a graduate assistant (1996-97) and videographer (1995) at FSU. He was an assistant coach at Northwest Guilford High School in Greensboro, N.C., from 1991-94.

Lilly played quarterback, wide receiver and special teams for Guilford and was named recipient of the Golden Helmet Award as the ideal Guilford College player as a senior. He was a Dean's List student all four years at Guilford and was chosen team captain as a senior.

Lilly is married to the former Cheryl Brown of Tallahassee, Fla. They have one daughter, Allison Catherine, 6; one son, Caleb Jackson, 4; and Abigail Christine, born April 2, 2015.

A former wide receiver for the Bulldogs, Bryan McClendon was named wide receivers coach, Assistant Head Coach and Passing Game Coordinator in 2015 after serving from 2009-2014 as running backs coach. He also served as Recruiting Coordinator in 2014-15.

Since joining the full time staff, Georgia teams have won 54 games and two SEC Eastern Division titles. During his tenure, the Bulldogs won three Southeastern Conference Eastern Division titles (2002, '03, '05), two SEC championships (2002, '05), and played in four bowl games (2003 Nokia Sugar, '04 Capital One, '05 Outback, '06 Nokia Sugar), winning three of them.

McClendon's career blossomed in 2005, when the Bulldogs won the SEC championship. The Atlanta, Ga., native caught 35 passes, six going for touchdowns. He caught the game-winning TD pass in the closing minutes against Georgia Tech, and then blocked a punt in the SEC Championship game, which led to the Bulldogs' third TD in the 34-14 victory over LSU.

Following his Georgia career, McClendon signed a free agent contract with the NFL's Chicago Bears.

He graduated in December, 2005, with a degree in Recreation and Leisure Studies. He is the son of former Georgia tailback Willie McClendon, 1978 SEC Player of the Year and running back for the Chicago Bears.

Jeremy Pruitt

Defensive Coordinator / Secondary



Jeremy Pruitt, defensive coordinator at national champion Florida State in 2013, was named Defensive Coordinator at Georgia on January 14, 2014. He was greeted with the challenge of reconstructing the entire defensive staff, the first time the Georgia program had undergone such a change since 1964.

In his first year leading the defense, the Bulldogs improved in several categories from the year before including points per game (29.0 to 20.7), total defense (375.5 to 337.2 yards per game), passing yards allowed (227.4 to 170.4, second best in the SEC), average yards per catch (13.4 to 10.9), and was second in the SEC in passing efficiency defense (105.8).

As defensive coordinator/defensive backs coach at FSU, Pruitt was part of a coaching staff that led the Seminoles to an undefeated season and 2013 BCS National Championship. The FSU defense ended the season ranked first nationally in scoring defense (12.1 ppg), second in team passing efficiency defense (93.77), third in total defense (281.4 ypg), and 18th in rushing defense (124.8 ypg). He was a finalist that year for the Broyles Award which goes annually to the nation's top assistant coach.

Pruitt was named FSU defensive coordinator in December, 2012, after serving the previous three seasons (2010-12) as Alabama's defensive backfield coach. In each of his three seasons as secondary coach, the Crimson Tide ranked in the top 10 nationally in pass efficiency defense, top 15 in pass defense and top five in both total defense and scoring defense.

A former Alabama defensive back, Pruitt originally joined the Crimson Tide staff in 2007 as director of player development. He had previously served as an assistant coach at Hoover (Ala.) High (2004-2006), as an assistant under his father, Dale Pruitt, at Fort Payne (Ala.) High and Plainview (Ala.) High, and as defensive backs coach at the University of West Alabama, (1999).

In 2012, Alabama ranked No. 7 nationally in pass defense (173.64 ypg) and No. 7 in pass efficiency defense (103.72) while also leading the nation in total defense (250.00 ypg), rushing defense (76.36 ypg) and scoring defense (10.93 ppg). In 2011, Alabama led the nation in pass defense (111.46 ypg) pass efficiency defense (83.69 ypg), rushing defense, total defense and scoring defense on its way to winning the BCS National Championship.

Pruitt's 2011 secondary at Alabama produced three first team All-Americans and NFL draft picks in Mark Barron (No. 7, Tampa Bay), CB Dre Kirkpatrick (No. 17, Cincinnati), and CB DeQuan Menzie (fifth round, Kansas City).

In 2012, Pruitt's secondary overcame the loss of three NFL Draft picks to become one of the best in the nation, led by All-America cornerback Dee Milliner, who had 51 tackles and was a finalist for the Jim Thorpe Award and Bronko Nagurski Trophy.

In 2013 at FSU, Pruitt coached two players who were taken in the first three rounds of the 2014 NFL Draft: safety Terrence Brooks (3rd round) and cornerback Lamarcus Joyner (2nd round), who was also a Jim Thorpe Award finalist.

Pruitt and his wife Casey have two sons: Jayse, 19, and Ridge, who was born June 1, 2015.

Tracy Rucker

Defensive Line / Associate Head Coach



Tracy Rucker, one of the state of Georgia's greatest college football players of all time, was named defensive line coach at the University of Georgia on January 28, 2014, and added the title of Associate Head Coach in 2015.

In his first year, he was part of a staff that led the 'Dogs to improvement in several categories from the year before including points per game (29.0 to 20.7), total defense (375.5 to 337.2 yards per game), passing yards allowed (227.4 to 170.4, second best in the SEC), average yards per catch (13.4 to 10.9), and was second in the SEC in passing efficiency defense (105.8).

Rucker came to UGA after three years as defensive line coach with the NFL's Tennessee Titans. He is a former Auburn All-America defensive tackle, 1988 Outland Trophy and Lombardi Award winner, and was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2004.

Rucker coached three years with the Titans (2011, '12, '13). In 2012, they ranked 10th in the NFL in sacks (39). In his first season with the Titans, DT Karl Klug led all NFL rookie tackles with seven sacks, ranking fourth among all NFL DT's.

An 18-year veteran of college coaching, Rucker spent time with five programs and helped a number of players reach All-American honors.

He joined the Titans after spending two seasons (2009-10) at Auburn as the defensive line coach. As a coach, he helped develop Nick Fairley into the Lombardi Award winner (given to the NCAA's best defensive lineman or linebacker) and an AP All-American as a part of Auburn's 2010 national championship winning team. In 2009, he coached Antonio Coleman, who led the SEC in tackles for loss (16.5) and sacks (10.0). Rucker spent one year at Ole Miss (2008) and mentored Greg Hardy (8.5 sacks) and Peria Jerry. The Rebel defense led the SEC and finished fourth in the country with 39 sacks.

Rucker worked five seasons (2003-07) at Arkansas during which time Jamaal Anderson earned a first-round selection in the 2007 NFL Draft after a 14-sack season. The 2005 Razorback unit ranked second in the SEC in sacks with 29 and was fourth in rushing defense.

Rucker spent one season with Conference USA champion Cincinnati in 2002. He served as DL coach at Troy from 1997-2001 during which time he coached DeMarcus Ware and Osi Umenyiora. He spent three years at West Alabama from 1994-96 as the defensive line coach and as the defensive coordinator at Auburn (Ala.) High School for one season.

He concluded his career by playing one year for the Orlando Thunder of the World Football League. As a coach, Rucker spent two summers working with NFL (Indianapolis, 2001; Tampa Bay, 2006) as a part of the NFL's Minority Internship Program.

Rob Sale was named offensive line coach at the University of Georgia on January 10, 2015, after serving as the co-offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at McNeese State in 2014.

Sale joined the McNeese staff in February, 2012, as offensive line coach and was promoted to co-offensive coordinator in the summer of 2014. Prior to serving on the McNeese staff, he held positions as strength and conditioning assistant coach and offensive analyst from 2007 to 2011 at the University of Alabama. While at Alabama, the Crimson Tide won two national titles in 2009 and 2011.

He had launched his coaching career in 2006 as the offensive line coach at Catholic High of Pointe Coupee in New Roads, La. Sale is a native of Monroe, La., played high school football at Neville High School and college football at LSU where he was a three year starter in the offensive line.

Three of the five starting linemen earned All-Southland Conference honors - Arinze Agada (1st team), Quentin Marsh and Nick Gorman (honorable mention). Agada was named the SLC's Offensive Lineman of the Year, earned SLC All-Academic Lineman of the Year, was named a FCS ADA Academic All-Star, earned first team All-Louisiana honors, and was named to four postseason All-America teams (Associated Press, Sports Network, College Sports Madness, Beyond Sports Network).

As a player at LSU, he played in 35 games with 25 starts, including all 13 games in his senior year of 2002 at right offensive guard. As a junior he saw starting action at both center and guard when the Tigers won the SEC title and he played left guard as a sophomore, starting the final five regular season games as well as the Peach Bowl. In high school he was an all-state selection as both a junior and a senior at Neville. Sale earned his degree from LSU in 2003.

In his first year, he was part of a staff that led the 'Dogs to improvement in several categories from the year before including points per game (29.0 to 20.7), total defense (375.5 to 337.2 yards per game), passing yards allowed (227.4 to 170.4, second best in the SEC), average yards per catch (13.4 to 10.9), and was second in the SEC in passing efficiency defense (105.8).

Sherrer, who served as Director of Player Development at Alabama for three years prior to joining the South Alabama staff, coached defensive backs for the Jaguars. The 2013 South Alabama defense ranked second in the Sun Belt Conference in total defense (384.3 yards per game) and second in scoring defense (25.2 points per game).

At Alabama, Sherrer's responsibilities included assisting Crimson Tide student-athletes with academics, community outreach and their personal lives. During his tenure, UA posted a 35-5 (87.5%) mark while winning the BCS national title in 2011 and 2012 and the 2012 Southeastern Conference championship.

Prior to joining the staff at Alabama, Sherrer was an assistant at Hoover (Ala.) High (2005-09) including serving as defensive coordinator the final three. The Buccaneers claimed the state 6A championship in 2005 and 2009, and advanced to the title game in two other years. While Sherrer was on the staff, the Buccaneers posted a 61-12 (83.6%) record.

Sherrer was also the DB coach at Spain Park (Ala.) High School (2001-04), where he helped the Jaguars win 16 games his last two seasons. He began his career as an assistant at Tuscaloosa County (Ala.) High (1996-97). Sherrer helped lead the Wildcats to the state 6A championship in his second year on the staff and they would go 21-6 (77.8%) during his tenure with the program.

He was also a graduate assistant at Alabama from 1998-2000, assisting on defense while also helping to coordinate scout teams, video breakdown and on-campus recruiting. The Tide won the 1999 SEC title and played in the Orange Bowl that season, also participating in the Music City Bowl during that three-year span.

Sherrer was a tight end for the Crimson Tide from 1993-95, during which time Alabama recorded a 29-7-1 overall mark while winning the SEC West Division title twice. In 1994, the Tide put together a 12-1 record with a 24-17 victory over Ohio State in the Citrus Bowl to end the year.

He is a 1996 graduate of Alabama with a degree in physical education, and he earned his master's degree in higher education administration from the school in 2000. Sherrer and his wife Carrie have twin sons, Kaleb and Kyle.

In his three years at UGA he has worked with 18 All-SEC players (seven first team) and 15 players selected in the NFL draft. Penn State won seven games decided by 10 points or less in 2011 and won 22 such games between 2005-11. His efforts were recognized with his 2002 selection as Master of Strength and Conditioning Coach. He also was chosen the 1997 National Collegiate Strength and Conditioning Coach of the Year.

During his tenure at Penn State in the weight room, he coached 124 All-Big Ten players, 81 NFL draft picks including 17 first rounders. The Nittany Lions earned 16 post-season bowl invitations during that time.

Twenty-five of his former graduate assistants have become college or professional level strength coaches or personal trainers.

Thomas spent two seasons at the U.S. Military Academy, the second as the head of the strength and conditioning program in 1990-91. A Muskingum College graduate, he started at defensive tackle for two years and at offensive guard for two seasons and was an All-Ohio Valley Athletic Conference first-team pick and a second-team Division II All-American. He was inducted into the Muskingum College Hall of Fame in October 2008.

Thomas spent two years as a graduate assistant football and strength coach at Toledo. At the University of the South (1986-89), he coached football and served as a strength coach in football and baseball.

John Eason

Director of Player Development



John Eason, who came with Mark Richt to Georgia as receivers coach and assistant head coach in 2001, was named Director of Football Operations in February, 2009, and Director of Player Development in February, 2010. A former wide receivers coach at Florida State and offensive coordinator at South Carolina, he also served as Associate Head Coach at UGA from 2005-08.

Eason is an integral part of the staff that in the last 14 years has led Georgia to 136 victories, two SEC championships, five SEC Eastern Division titles, nine bowl victories, and seven top ten finishes in the final national polls including No. 4 in 2012, No. 2 in 2007 and No. 3 in 2002.

In 2002, the Bulldogs finished as the SEC's top scoring (32.14 ppg) and pass efficiency (138.91) offense and in 2005, led the SEC in passing efficiency (144.0) and was second in scoring offense (29.5 ppg). Eason also coached Georgia's all-time career pass receiving leader and first team All-SEC performer Terrence Edwards, along

with fellow All-SEC receivers Fred Gibson, Reggie Brown, Mohamed Massaquoi and NFL first-round draftee A.J. Green.

Eason, who has a Ph.D. degree (1987) in Educational Administration from FSU, also served as an assistant professor in the Department of Human Service and Wellness at Central Florida in 1999-2000. In addition, he was offensive coordinator and associate head coach of the Toronto Argonauts of the Canadian Football League during the 2000 season while on leave from UCF.

Eason served as offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach at South Carolina from 1995-98 following 12 years as wide receivers coach at FSU from 1981-94. During his tenure at FSU, the Seminoles won one national title (1993) and eight bowl games. In his 12 seasons, Eason coached seven wide receivers who received All-America recognition including three first-team selections.

With bachelor's and masters degrees from Florida A&M, Eason also served as an Assistant to the Athletic Director for Academic/Student Affairs during a tenure at FSU which actually began in 1981.

After graduating from Florida A&M, Eason played one season with the Oakland Raiders (1968) in which they won the AFL Western Division title. While at FAMU, Eason set the school record for most touchdowns receiving, highest punting average, and longest punt. He was named to the All-Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference team in 1966-67, was named the SIAC Player of the Year, and to the American Football Coaches Association Small College All-America Team.

He is married to the former Vanessa Long of Tallahassee, Fla. They have two children, Amanda and Michael.

Brett Greene joined the Georgia Athletic Association as Director of Video Operations in January 2011, after serving nine years in the video department of the NFL's Jacksonville Jaguars. Greene oversees all video software and equipment in Georgia's state-of-the-art Butts-Mehre football facility.

Greene supervises all of the video and computer needs for the Georgia football program as well as the filming and editing of all practices and games with the XOS Thunder System. This technology allows the coaches to view any play or sequence at the click of a button. Video is merged with key data, such as down and distance, to provide coaches with a complete analysis of every play. He is also responsible for online game exchange, all recruiting videos, and production of highlight videos

Under Greene's direction, the video department has streamlined the network in order for coaches and players to have open access to watch video. Today, a Bulldog player can easily view all of his reps or study tendencies of an opponent, and coaches have instant access to recruiting film online in order to evaluate prospects.

Additionally, Greene has been a key developer of Georgia Football's first recruiting mobile app called, "The Georgia Way", where visitors can get an inside look at the program through content produced by the Football Staff. Another initiative under Greene's direction is the implementation of iPads for use by all coaches and players to view practice and game video. Georgia was also among the first programs to move to an all-digital playbook in the 2013 season.

Greene oversees a staff of six people, which includes one full-time assistant and five student workers. At the 2015 conference of the Collegiate Sports Video Association, Greene and his staff took home an Ultimate SAVVY Award, which goes to the best overall video from among three categories: motivational, highlight and recruiting.

A native of Jacksonville, Fla., Greene worked closely with NFL head coaches Tom Coughlin, Mike Smith, and Jack Del Rio while with the Jaguars.

The No. 12 Georgia Bulldogs handed the No. 16 Clemson Tigers a 45-21 loss in front of an electric Sanford Stadium crowd of 92,746 and a nationally televised ESPN audience.

Clemson scored first to take a 7-0 lead. The Bulldogs then answered on their second drive of the game when Todd Gurley rushed 23 yards to the end zone for the touchdown to tie the game at 7-7. After a Hutson Mason rushing touchdown, Clemson responded with a pair of touchdowns that put the Tigers up by a score of 21-14. Georgia responded emphatically when Gurley took the ensuing kickoff and tied a school-record with a 100-yard return for a touchdown that made it a tie game at 21-21.

The Bulldogs opened the second half with a 27-yard field goal by Marshall Morgan to take a 24-21 lead. On Georgia's first drive of the fourth quarter, Gurley scored his third touchdown of the game on an 18-yard rush that put the Bulldogs up 31-21 with just over 10 minutes left in the game.

The Georgia defense continued to stymie the Tiger offense, forcing Clemson to punt on its next drive. Nick Chubb took the first play of the drive 47 yards into the end zone for his first career touchdown, putting Georgia up 38-21. After another three-and-out by the Tigers, Gurley took the handoff from Mason and rushed 51 yards for his fourth touchdown of the game. The Bulldogs maintained possession for the final 5:24 of the game to seal the 45-21 win.

The No. 9 Georgia football team dropped a 38-20 game to the Florida Gators at EverBank Field in front of 83,004 fans and a nationally televised CBS audience.

Georgia scored first, taking a 7-0 lead after a 39-yard touchdown run by Nick Chubb. The Bulldogs looked to add to their lead after Jordan Jenkins recovered a fumble on the next Florida drive, but Marshall Morgan was unable to connect on a 39-yard field goal.

The Gators answered on the next drive, scoring on a fake field goal that made it a 7-7 game. After a three-and-out by Georgia, Florida scored on its next drive. A 44-yard run set up a two-yard touchdown run that made it a 14-7 lead after the extra point. The Florida scoring run continued with a touchdown on the opening drive of the second half and a field goal on the next drive, as the lead was extended to 24-7. A Nick Chubb fumble and a three-and-out ended the Bulldogs' next two offensive drives, and Florida took advantage. The punt after the three-and-out was returned to the Georgia 26 to set up a touchdown that made the score 31-7.

Georgia put together a nine-play, 68-yard touchdown drive to make the score 31-7. Hutson Mason completed a 10-yard touchdown pass to Chubb, but the Bulldogs were unable to convert the two-point attempt. Another long drive got Georgia down to the Florida two-yard line, but the offense turned it over on downs and gave the Gators the ball. A 65-yard Florida touchdown on that drive gave them a 38-13 lead.

The Bulldogs added a Brendan Douglas touchdown from the one-yard line with three seconds left in the game, making the final score 38-20.

No. 17 Georgia defeated Kentucky 63-31 at Commonwealth Stadium in front of crowd of 60,152 and nationwide audience on ESPN.

The Bulldogs built a 21-0 first-quarter lead. Isaiah McKenzie returned the opening kickoff 90 yards for a score just 11 seconds into the contest. Six minutes later, Hutson Mason hit Chris Conley on a 15-yard touchdown pass. Georgia later added an 18-yard scoring run by Nick Chubb to cap a season-best 91-yard scoring drive.

After Kentucky pulled within 21-10 in the second quarter, Mason drilled a 23-yard touchdown pass to Malcolm Mitchell for a 28-10 edge. The Wildcats scored to make it 28-17, but the Mason-Conley connection worked again on a 4-yard scoring pass for a 35-17 lead. Kentucky found the end zone just before halftime as the Bulldogs led 35-24 at the break.

The Bulldogs methodically pulled away with 21 third-quarter points to go up 56-24. Mason hit Jeb Blazevich on a 10-yard scoring pass, McKenzie returned a punt for a 59-yard touchdown, and Sony Michel had a 23-yard scoring run. The No. 13 Georgia football team earned a 37-14 win over the 20th-ranked Louisville Cardinals in front of a crowd of 45,671 and a nationally-televised ESPN audience in the Belk Bowl at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte, N.C.

Georgia struck first, taking a 7-0 lead on a nine-play, 60-yard drive in the first quarter. Nick Chubb got the drive started by breaking off a 20-yard run. The Bulldogs caught a break when Louisville was called for a personal foul that gave Georgia a fresh set of downs. On 2nd-and-14, Hutson Mason connected with Chris Conley for a 45-yard touchdown that gave the Bulldogs a 7-0 lead after the Marshall Morgan PAT.

The Cardinals answered on the next drive, going 84 yards on nine plays to tie the game at 7-7. The touchdown was scored on an 11-yard pass from Kyle Bolin to Gerald Christian.

Both offenses were quiet over the next several possessions. Georgia retook the lead after a nine-play, 43-yard drive led to a 41-yard field goal and gave UGA a 10-7 lead.

On the next Georgia drive, Mason hit Sony Michel for 32 yards and a first down. Four plays later, Chubb raced 31 yards into the end zone for a touchdown that put the Bulldogs up 17-7 with just under seven minutes to go in the half.

Dominick Sanders intercepted a Louisville pass on the following possession. Georgia cashed in with Morgan field goal from 22 yards just two minutes later. Louisville had a pair of chances late in the half, but the Georgia defense shut the Cardinals down and took a 20-7 lead into halftime.

The Bulldogs added a touchdown with 6:38 left in the third quarter that made it a 27-7 game. Starting at their own three-yard line, Chubb broke off a Georgia bowl record 82-yard run that set the Bulldogs up at the Louisville 15. Michel finished the drive, rushing for the final 15 yards and the score on two carries. Louisville answered with a touchdown drive of its own, going 70 yards in 10 plays. The drive was capped off by a six-yard touchdown run by Brandon Radcliff that cut the lead to 27-14 with just under two minutes left in the third.

Georgia worked its way down to the Louisville 36-yard line, but went for it on 4th-and-10. Ramsey's pass was incomplete, allowing Louisville to take over on downs. Damian Swann intercepted Kyle Bolin on the first play of the next drive.

The run game took over on the ensuing Georgia drive, picking up 23 yards before Ramsey connected with Kenneth Towns for 14 yards and a first down. The Bulldogs put together a 43-yard drive that took 4:13 off the clock and was capped off by a 41-yard field goal by Morgan that gave the Bulldogs a 30-14 lead. With the field goal, the Bulldogs set a single-season record in points scored this season (537).

The defense remained aggressive on Louisville's next drive, forcing a three-and-out on a drive that amassed just one yard. Nick Chubb carried the load on the final Georgia drive, accounting for all 45 yards and the touchdown that sealed the 37-14 win.

Louisville looked to score on its last possession, working its way down to the Georgia 10, but Carter burst through the line for a sack to end the game.

NOTEWORTHY...

- This was the Bulldogs' 50th appearance in a bowl game and extended Georgia's number of consecutive appearances in a bowl to 18, a school record.
 - The Bulldogs reached double digits in wins for the 21st time in school history and for the ninth time under coach Mark Richt.
 - The senior class finished with a 40-14 overall record.
- The Bulldogs broke a school record for points scored in a season with 537 points in 13 games, eclipsing the old mark of 529 set by the 2012 squad in 14 games.
- Freshman tailback Nick Chubb tallied a Belk Bowl and SEC bowl record of 266 yards on 33 carries. He was named Belk Bowl MVP for his efforts.
 - Georgia started the same five players (John Theus, Brandon Kublanow, David Andrews, Greg Pyke, and Kolton Houston) on the offensive line in all 13 games this season.
 - Tight end coach John Lilly assumed play-calling duties during the game after offensive coordinator Mike Bobo was hired as the head coach at Colorado State earlier in the month.

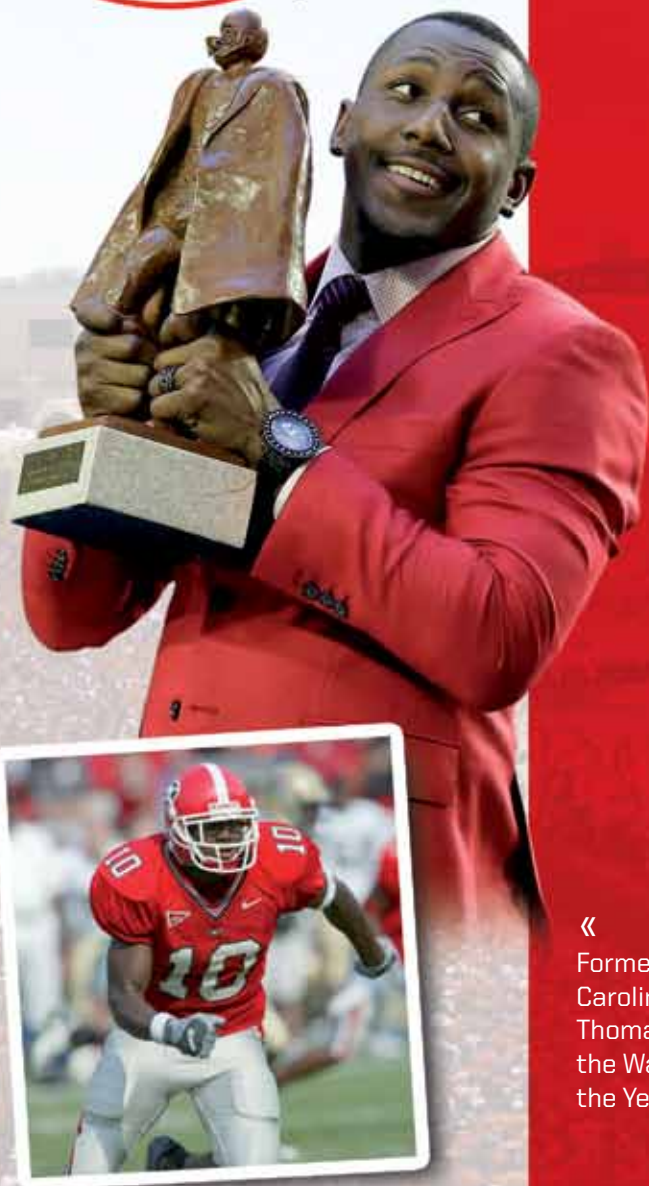

- » Georgia has more combined recipients of the NCAA and National Football Foundation Post-Graduate Scholarship, NCAA Top Eight Award, and Academic All-America honors than any university in the South.
- » Georgia is the only school to have three different Super Bowl MVPs: Jake Scott of the Miami Dolphins, Terrell Davis of the Denver Broncos and Hines Ward of the Pittsburgh Steelers.
- » SI.com ranked Athens, Ga., as the second-best sports town in the country and Athlon chose Athens as the No. 2 city in the SEC.
- » A total of six National Football Foundation National Scholar-Athletes played in Super Bowl XLIV, including the Saints' Jon Stinchcomb. Matt Stinchcomb, Jon's brother, won the Campbell Trophy in 1998 as college football's top scholar-athlete, and he played in Super Bowl XXXVIII for the Oakland Raiders - the first overall and just the second Campbell Trophy honoree to play in the Super Bowl.

BUTTS-MEHRE HERITAGE HALL



Georgia's \$40 million expansion and renovation of Butts-Mehre Heritage Hall makes it one of the nation's top facilities. Named for coaches Wallace Butts and Harry Mehre, Butts-Mehre Heritage Hall is the nerve center of the UGA Athletic Association. The building houses the players' headquarters, including the locker room, the weight room, the sports medicine training room and meeting rooms. In addition, it includes football coaches' offices and meeting rooms,

historical displays for all UGA athletic teams and the administrative offices of the Athletic Association.

Additionally, the building displays exhibits and artifacts celebrating Georgia's academic and athletic excellence. The second floor includes the Larry Munson Trophy Room, named in honor of Georgia's legendary former radio broadcaster.

And if your brother needs a lift, tell him to 'Pound the G,' too. We're chasing greatness and setting a high standard on energy and enthusiasm."

Hocke and his staff members are headquartered in the state-of-the-art William K. Holmes Family Weight Room and employ a program with some of the most progressive equipment in the

country. The spacious weight room, in conjunction with the adjacent Woodruff Practice Fields and Nalley Multi-Purpose Room, allows for the most efficient workout sessions.

Another integral part of the program is the Leon Farmer Award (pictured below at left). Given in honor of Athens businessman Leon Farmer, who was a major contributor in the funding of the Butts-Mehre expansion, the award is presented annually to the player whose dedication to the strength and conditioning program results in a significant contribution to the football team.

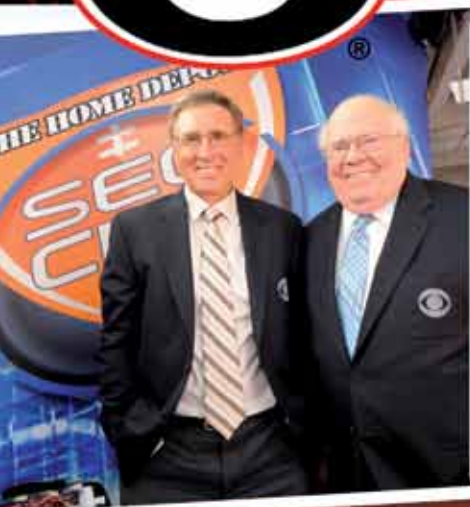

BULLDOGS IN THE SPOTLIGHT



In the spotlight...that's the Bulldogs.

Representatives of newspapers, radio and TV stations, internet sites and magazines are regular visitors to Georgia's games and practices. Bulldog student-athletes are covered by daily newspapers throughout the Southeast, including all the major dailies in the state of Georgia and Chattanooga, Tenn.

Live television, sidelines packed with photographers and videographers and full press boxes are staples at Georgia. The Bulldogs' regular-season and bowl games in recent years have been broadcast by CBS, FOX, ESPN, ESPN2, ESPNU, ABC, SEC Network, CSS and FSN. Moreover, Georgia's G-Day Game in 2009 was shown nationally on ESPN and additional G-Day Games have been televised by the SEC Network. Georgia now averages all 12 regular-season games per year on TV, most of which are national broadcasts. ESPN's GameDay made stops in Athens in 2008 and 2013.

Georgia alums can be found in several electronic media outlets today, including David Greene, David Pollack, Matt Stinchcomb and Maria Taylor, who have duties for ESPN and the SEC Network, as well as D.J. Shockley with the Big 10 Network, Marcus Stroud with Fox Sports South, Hines Ward with NBC and Dominique Wilkins with the Atlanta Hawks.



Georgia was chosen as one of the Football Writers Association of America's "Super 11" sports communications departments five out of six years and is the only school to earn the distinction five straight seasons.

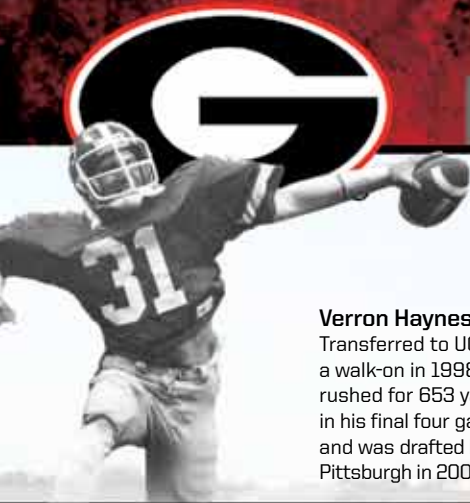

Son of former UGA Defensive Coordinator Erk Russell, Russell was a three-year letterman (1978-79—80) at UGA.

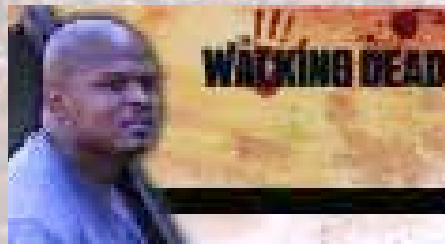
J.T. Wall

Miles earned his scholarship and a defensive end starting position on the 1980 national championship team. He is currently Georgia's Director of Life Skills, and he was chosen as the Athletic Association's 2006-2007 Dewey Dean Employee of the Year.

Richard Tardits
From France, Tardits showed up for spring practice in 1985. By the time his career had ended in 1988 he had become Georgia's all-time career quarterback sack leader with 29.

Billy Bennett
Bennett became the NCAA's all-time leader in field goals, the SEC's top career scorer and UGA's all-time leader in extra points. All told, Bennett finished with 29 NCAA, SEC and UGA records.

Brandon Coutu
While at UGA, Brandon Coutu was the first Georgia kicker to end up over 80% for career field goal accuracy. His 58-yarder against Louisiana-Monroe set the Georgia record for the longest field goal without a tee.



IronE Singleton
IronE (formerly Ron) was an Atlanta native who walked on at Georgia in 1998. While at UGA, he majored in Speech Communication and Theater, leading to roles in such projects as "The Blind Side" and "The Walking Dead."

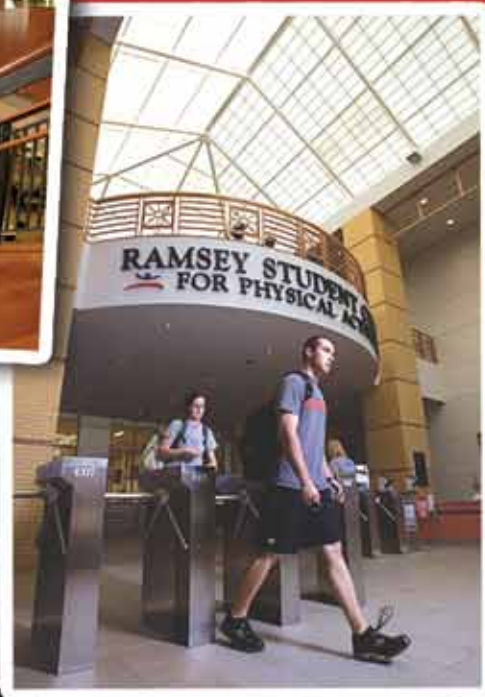

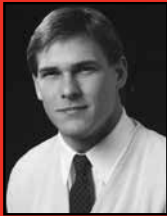

Georgia's two-time All-America and Academic All-America roverbak Terry Hoage probably best characterized the ideal of the

student-athlete. For his achievements both on and off the field, Hoage became Georgia's first recipient of the NCAA Top VI Award at the NCAA convention in January, 1984.

The Top Six Award is presented annually to student-athletes who have achieved athletic success, shown leadership qualities and displayed academic prowess.

He set a school record with 12 interceptions during the 1982 season. He placed fifth in the 1983 Heisman Trophy balloting — the highest finish ever for a defensive back at that time.

Hoage maintained a 3.7 grade point average in Genetics.

One of the most decorated players in Georgia football history, Matt Stinchcomb, was honored with the 1998 NCAA Top

A two-time All-America OT, two-time Academic All-America, and national Academic All-American of the Year in 1998, Stinchcomb also was a two-time member of the AFCA Good Works Team recognizing outstanding community service. A finalist for the Rotary Lombardi Award, he received post-graduate scholarships from the NCAA, National Football Foundation, and won the Burger King Scholar-Athlete of the Year for Division I-A. He graduated with a 3.96 grade point average in business.

A semifinalist for the 2002 Lombardi Award, Stinchcomb was named to the Walter Camp All-America team and the Verizon/CoSIDA Academic All-America squad. A first-team All-Southeastern Conference selection by the AP and the SEC Coaches, he anchored the Bulldog line in leading Georgia to a record-setting 13-1 record, SEC title and Sugar Bowl victory.

He was the male student-athlete representative to the University's athletics board of directors. He held a 3.75 grade point average in microbiology.

Billy Payne, president and CEO of the Atlanta Committee for the Olympic Games, (ACOG) received the Theodore Roosevelt

The award is presented annually to a distinguished citizen who is a former college athlete and has exemplified the ideals and purposes of college athletics by demonstrating a continuing interest and concern for physical fitness and sport.

Payne, a three-year letterman for the Bulldogs (1966-68), graduated from Georgia in 1969 and earned his law degree from the University in 1973. After a successful law practice in Atlanta, he began his work of bringing the Olympic Games to Atlanta in 1988.

Lyons was chosen to present the acceptance response in behalf of all Silver Anniversary winners at the 1996 NCAA convention, a group which included football legends Joe Theisman of Notre Dame and Jack Youngblood of Florida and track great Marty Liquori of Villanova.

Since beginning his medical practice full time, Lyons has become one of the nation's leading physicians in the field

**1986 NCAA SILVER ANNIVERSARY AWARD
FRAN TARKENTON, QB (1958-60)**



Fran Tarkenton, All-America quarterback at Georgia and All-Pro with both the Minnesota Vikings and New York Giants of the NFL, became the Bulldogs' first recipient of the prestigious NCAA Silver Anniversary Award in 1986.

A native of Athens who first played in Sanford Stadium as part of the Athens YMCA's youth games prior to Bulldog contests, Tarkenton was a two-time first-team All-Southeastern Conference selection and led Georgia to the 1959 SEC Championship.

After throwing four touchdowns in his first NFL game, Tarkenton enjoyed an illustrious 18-year pro career and was named the league MVP in 1975. When he retired from the NFL in 1978, Tarkenton was the league's all-time leader in passing attempts (6,467) completions (3,686), yardage (47,003) and touchdowns (342). Vikings coach Bud Grant said Tarkenton was "the greatest quarterback ever to play the game."

The same year Tarkenton received the NCAA's Silver Anniversary Award, he was also inducted into the NFL Hall of Fame. The following year, 1987, Tarkenton was enshrined into the College Football Hall of Fame as well.

Nothing like being "Between the Hedges" at Georgia's Sanford Stadium

With a \$25 million expansion completed in 2003 and another \$8 million in 2004, Sanford Stadium added a second upper deck on the north side and 27 new north side SkySuites bringing the new stadium capacity to 92,746—the ninth largest on-campus stadium in the country.

Named for the late Dr. S. V. Sanford, former president of the University and Chancellor of the University system, Georgia's Sanford Stadium celebrated its 75th anniversary in 2004. An overflow crowd of 30,000 saw the stadium's first game on October 12, 1929, when Yale University made its only trip South. Georgia won the now famous game when a young sophomore end from Macon, Vernon "Catfish" Smith, scored all 15 of the Bulldogs' points. Final score, Georgia 15, Yale 0.

Through the years, the stadium has experienced various expansion

projects. In 1940, lights were added to the field level paving the way to the first Sanford Stadium night game, a 7-7 tie between Georgia and Kentucky on October 26, 1940.

Eventually, the East end of the stadium was enclosed, more lights added, and the capacity increased to 82,122. The 1991 project cost the University Athletic Association \$3.7 million and enclosed the West end. The price tag was rather hefty, considering that the original price to build the stadium was a mere \$360,000.

Legendary Sanford Stadium added yet another chapter to its history by hosting the medal round of the 1996 Olympic men's and women's soccer competition, watched via television by over 3 billion people around the world.

DR. STEADMAN V. SANFORD

Born August 20, 1871, Dr. Steadman Vincent Sanford joined the Georgia faculty in 1903 and instantly became one of the University's most popular people. He founded the Henry W. Grady School of Journalism in 1921, served as University Dean from 1927-32, and held the post of University president and chancellor until 1935 when he was named chancellor of the entire University System of Georgia. He also held the position of faculty chairman of athletics while on the UGA faculty. He was the force behind the construction of Sanford Stadium in 1929 and was termed many times as "the best friend of athletics." He was largely responsible for persuading the Bulldogs of Yale to make their first trip ever south of the Mason-Dixon line to play the dedication game of Sanford Stadium in 1929. He died September 15, 1945.

Bullpups vs. Baby Jackets

For 60 years, Thanksgiving Day was a special day in the history of the Georgia - Georgia Tech rivalry. It was on that day that the Georgia and Georgia Tech freshman football teams, and in later years the junior varsity teams, met at Tech's Grant Field. The game, played from 1933 to '93, annually benefited the Scottish Rite Children's Hospital and became a nationally-recognized event.

During those years, freshmen were ineligible and each school played an annual freshman or junior varsity schedule. As such, many who would become the greatest players for both schools were showcased in this annual game.

Among the many who played in the annual classic were legendary Georgia players like Fran Tarkenton, Bill Stanfill, Frank Sinkwich, and Charley Trippi and Tech greats like Ray Beck, Buck Martin, Pepper Rodgers and Kim King.

The charity game had its origin in 1930 when teams representing the northern and southern divisions of the old Southern Conference played an all-star game. In 1933, Georgia coach H.J. Stegeman and Tech coach William Alexander convinced a group of Atlanta businessmen to serve on a committee for the purpose of selling tickets to a freshman game between the two schools. The proceeds were designated to Scottish Rite. The Governor's Cup was presented each year to the winning team.

The game became a southern tradition and prospered for decades. However, scholarship and roster limitations caused discontinuation of the game in 1993; but in 1994, a "Legends Game" was held to maintain the tradition of the game.

The NCAA, at the schools' request, agreed to recognize the varsity rivalry and beginning in 1995, the Children's Healthcare of Atlanta annually presents the Governor's Cup to the winning team.

Dr. Charles Herty (Georgia), 1892

Herty was Georgia's first coach, but in those days he was referred to as the "trainer." Commonly known as the father of Georgia football, he was a member of the University's faculty working as a professor in the chemistry department. Herty was a graduate of Georgia and received his Ph.D. at John Hopkins University. While at the Baltimore school he saw a different version of the sport of Rugby, referred to as football. Herty returned to Athens in the fall of 1891 as a member of the faculty. He gathered some students and told them of the games that he had seen. Herty initiated the formation of a team by helping the students prepare a field of play or "gridiron". The University's Glee Club contributed the princely sum of \$50.00 to finance the removal of rocks and the filling of holes on the field. Goal posts were set up and Herty became the first coach of a Georgia football team. Herty later earned national fame as a scientist in the development of the turpentine and pine pulpwood industry. Georgia's football field was later renamed in his honor.

Ernest Brown (Georgia), 1893

Brown was a Georgia graduate student who volunteered to coach the Bulldogs during the 1893 season. Brown led the Bulldogs to a 2-2-1 season, and also played halfback that season.

Robert Winston (Georgia), 1894

Winston was an Englishman and former Rugby player and coach who had coached Yale, Amherst, Rochester and Syracuse prior to arriving in Athens in the fall of 1894. Winston was Georgia's first "paid coach" and was known to put Georgia's players through some rigorous training prior to the season. He coached Georgia to a 10-8 win over Auburn and four other victories during that 5-1-0 season.



Glen "Pop" Warner (Cornell), 1895-1896

Warner is a name that is synonymous with the game of football. Warner, a Cornell graduate, came to Athens in September of 1895. He was signed to a \$34-a-week salary for ten weeks in his first season and received an increase to \$40 for his second season. He coached the Bulldogs, then known as the Red and Black, for two seasons, and led Georgia to one of its three undefeated seasons—4-0 in 1896. Warner later went on to coach at the Carlisle Indian School, where he coached the legendary Jim Thorpe, and later at Pittsburgh and Stanford.

Charles McCarthy (Brown), 1897-1898

McCarthy, a Brown University graduate, became Georgia's fifth head football coach and was almost the school's last. McCarthy inherited a fine Georgia team from Warner, including an outstanding quarterback named Richard "Von" Gammon. Gammon was critically injured in a game against Virginia, and died later that day. Although many called for the abolishment of football, the sport survived after a plea to state government officials by Gammon's mother. In 1898 McCarthy coached the Georgia squad to victories over Tech and Vanderbilt, but suffered a controversial and disputed 18-17 loss to Auburn.

Gordon Saussy (Cornell), 1899

Saussy was a former Cornell player who came to Athens from Savannah and at the age of 26, coached Georgia for one season. During the 1899 season his Bulldogs defeated both Georgia Tech and Clemson and played Auburn to a controversial 0-0 tie. The Tigers led 11-6 with a minute to play when the contest was disrupted by an unruly mob that prevented the official conclusion of the game. Saussy went on to become Mayor of Savannah and Chairman of the State of Georgia Bicentennial Celebration (1933), bringing President Roosevelt to Savannah. He was awarded the first Lucas Trophy by the City of Savannah and later brought to Savannah Dr. Charles Herty, the father of pulp paper production and Georgia's first coach. Dr. Herty was living in Saussy's home when he passed away.

E.E. Jones (Princeton), 1900

Jones succeeded Saussy at the helm of Georgia's program but didn't fare much better. He was a Princeton graduate that came to Athens on the recommendation of university benefactor Arthur Poe. His team finished 2-4, lacked offensive output, and was outscored 159 to 28 in their six contests.

Billy Reynolds (Princeton), 1901-1902

Reynolds came to the University from the University of North Carolina, where he had coached the previous four years. Reynolds, a Princeton graduate like his predecessor, inherited a below average team, but in two seasons he was able to turn the Georgia program around. After a woeful 1-5-2 season in 1901, his 1902 squad went 4-2-1, with victories over Alabama and Auburn.

M.M. Dickinson (Georgia), 1903, 1905

Dickinson came to UGA at the turn of the century as a transfer from Mercer University. While at Georgia he played football and baseball on the 1900, 1901 and 1902 teams. In football he was a halfback and baseball a catcher. He was captain of the 1901 baseball team. After graduation he coached both sports at the University in 1903, leading the football team to a 3-4 record with wins over Tech and Auburn. He played professional baseball in the Texas League in 1904 and returned to Athens in 1905 to coach football and baseball. The 1905 team won only one game against Dablonga, 16-12, and lost five. Dickinson left Athens in 1905 and entered the newspaper business, where he worked until his death in 1950.

Charles A. Barnard (Harvard), 1904

Barnard, a native Bostonian, was none too popular with his players and became more and more unpopular to fans as his team lost five consecutive games after their opening 52-0 win over Florida.



W.S. "Bull" Whitney (Syracuse), 1906-1907

Whitney was a Syracuse graduate that came to the University in 1906 from North Carolina A & M where he had gone undefeated the previous season. He did not achieve the same success, however. During the 1906 season, the forward pass was legalized. Whitney tried to take advantage of this new play, but it was an errant pass that led to Georgia's first defeat of that season. His 1906 team went 2-4-1 and was part of the "Ringer" controversy in the 1907 Tech game that forced his vacating the coaching duties to interim coach Branch Bocock who coached the final three games of that season. Whitney was very superstitious and would not reveal his starting lineup until just before kickoff.

Branch Bocock (Georgetown), 1908

Bocock was a Georgetown graduate and former player who took the reins of the Georgia program after Whitney. Bocock worked in the law office of Judge Hamilton McWhorter, and it was McWhorter that allowed Bocock to leave the office in the afternoons to train the Georgia team. Bocock led Georgia to a 5-2-1 record in 1908. Perhaps his biggest coaching win was when his Georgia team upset Auburn 6-0 in 1907 when he was the interim coach after Whitney left Georgia after the Tech game.

J. Coulter and Frank Dobson (Brown), 1909

Coulter and Dobson served almost as "co-coaches" of the Georgia team in 1909. Coulter, a Brown University graduate, had no previous head coaching experience and was unable to get the Georgia offense in gear. So he hired Frank Dobson, a Roanoke, Va., native who had assisted John W. Heisman at Tech. He inserted several trick plays into the Georgia offense, and they became the talk of Athens, but that still didn't prevent UGA from going 1-4-2. Dobson moved on to Clemson in 1910, where he was its first paid football coach and also the school's baseball and first basketball coach.

W.A. Cunningham (Vanderbilt), 1910-1919

Cunningham gave the Georgia program what it had so desperately needed at that juncture in its history—continuity and a winner. Until Cunningham, a Vanderbilt graduate, arrived in Athens, the Georgia coaching post had been held by 13 coaches in 18 years. Cunningham was hired by Dr. Steadman Vincent Sanford and remained coach for nine years. He coached Georgia's first All-American, Bob McWhorter, and the legendary George "Kid" Woodruff. He led Georgia





to seven winning seasons, and an overall record of 43-18-9. Cunningham entered the Army when the United States entered World War I, and came back to coach one more year, before re-entering the Army where he reached the rank of General.

Herman J. Stegeman (Chicago), 1920-1922



Stegeman was a 1919 graduate of the University of Chicago, where he played under the legendary Amos Alonzo Stagg. He was sent to Athens by the Army to install a physical training program for the University's R.O.T.C.

students. Stegeman also doubled as an assistant under W.A. Cunningham and later assumed his role as head coach of the program in 1920. Stegeman was the coach of the original "Bulldogs" of 1920 that went 8-0-1 and won the Southern Conference Championship. Stegeman coached two more years and had a 20-6-3 career mark at the helm of the Georgia program. Stegeman's contributions to the University were not solely limited to coaching the football team. He also coached baseball, basketball, track, and held the positions of Athletic Director and Dean of Male Students. Stegeman remained at Georgia for 18 more years as Athletic Director and Dean of Male Students. Stegeman Coliseum on the Georgia campus is named in his honor.

George Cecil "Kid" Woodruff (Georgia), 1923-1927



Woodruff, a captain and star on the 1911 Georgia team, returned to his alma mater in 1923 as its head football coach. Woodruff introduced the Notre Dame "Box 4" shift offense to southern football. He had witnessed the effectiveness of the offense when the Fightin' Irish destroyed

Tech 35-7 in 1923. He decided that he wanted to implement the same system at Georgia. Woodruff brought three of Rockne's disciples, Frank Thomas and Harry Mehre, and later Jim Crowley to tutor the Georgia men about the finer points of the most popular offense of the day. Woodruff, an extremely successful businessman from Columbus drew a salary of only a dollar per year, and Georgia got more than its money's worth from him. Woodruff's 1927 squad went 9-1 and won the Southern Conference Championship, and he went on to compile a 32-16-1 record over his five seasons at the helm. His most notable accomplishment might be that he gave three legendary coaches their start in the profession: Thomas of Alabama, Mehre of Georgia and Ole Miss and Crowley of Michigan State and Fordham. The football practice fields behind the Butts-Mehre building are named for Woodruff.

Harry Mehre (Notre Dame), 1928-1937



Mehre came to UGA as an assistant coach on the recommendation of Knute Rockne. Mehre took over

the head coaching duties in 1928 and led Georgia to a 59-34-6 record in his ten years as coach. He was a master at getting his team prepared for the big game, and perhaps none bigger than Georgia's 15-0 victory over Yale in the dedication game of Sanford Stadium in 1929. Mehre was the only coach in the country to knock off Yale five straight times when Yale was at its height. These victories over Yale and other eastern schools brought Georgia to national prominence. Mehre also led the Bulldogs to a 7-7 tie against the "Seven Blocks of Granite," undefeated Fordham, and knocked them out of the Rose Bowl. Mehre left Georgia in 1937 to assume the head coaching duties at Ole Miss where he remained for eight seasons and compiled a 39-26-1 record. Mehre left Ole Miss in 1945 and became a soft drink wholesaler and football analyst for the ATLANTA JOURNAL for 22 years. The Butts-Mehre Heritage Hall on the University of Georgia campus is named for him.

Joel Hunt (Texas A&M), 1938

Hunt came to the University in the winter of 1938 and remained for only one season. He was a star player at Texas A&M and won that school's award for being the top athlete in 1929 when he scored 19 touchdowns for the Aggies. After serving an assistantship at LSU he came to Athens and guided the Bulldogs, captained by Quinton Lumpkin, to a 5-4-1 record in the 1938 season. Hunt never captured the favor of Georgia's fans and alumni and left Athens after just one season. Perhaps Hunt's greatest accomplishment was leaving a little-known line coach behind to succeed him, Wally Butts. Hunt went on to coach at the University of Wyoming and later returned to LSU.

Wally Butts (Mercer), 1939-1960



Butts came to the University as an assistant under one-year head coach Joel Hunt and remained for 22 years at the head of Georgia's program. He was known as the 'Little Round Man' to most of the fans, but as a bona fide coaching genius to others in the profession. He led the Bulldogs to previously unparalleled success with six bowl appearances, four SEC championships, 140 victories and an undefeated season in 1946. He was known as an advocate of the passing game and brought that to the forefront of offensive thinking in Southern collegiate play. He coached a Heisman winner (Frank Sinkwich, 1942), a Maxwell award winner (Charley Trippi, 1946), and the "Peerless Pilot" Francis Tarkenton. Butts resigned in 1960, but stayed on at Georgia as Athletic Director until his retirement in 1963. He later went on to a highly successful career in the insurance business until his death in 1973. The Butts-Mehre Heritage Hall on the University of Georgia campus is named in his honor.

Johnny Griffith (Georgia), 1961-1963

Griffith was a former Bulldog player and member of the undefeated 1946 team, and succeeded the legendary Butts by taking the reins of the Georgia program on January 6, 1961. Griffith was known



Vince Dooley (Auburn), 1964-1988



Dooley is the most successful coach in Georgia history. He guided the Bulldogs to over 200 victories in a quarter century at the helm of the Georgia program and is one of the best known and most highly regarded coaches in the country. He was hired in January 1964 by then Athletic Director Joel Eaves to bring life back to the Georgia program and succeeded beyond all expectations. His teams became known for their outstanding toughness, sound fundamentals, and finding a way to win en route to a career record of 201-77-10. He became only the ninth coach in NCAA Division I history to win over 200 games. The Bulldogs won one national championship (1980) and six SEC Championships under his direction. He took his teams to 20 Bowl games and coached a Heisman Trophy winner (Herschel Walker, 1982), a Maxwell Award Winner (Walker, 1982), an Outland Award Winner (Bill Stanfill, 1968), 40 First Team All-Americans and 10 Academic All-Americans. He was named NCAA National Coach of the Year by every major poll in 1980 and by Chevrolet-WTBS in 1982. A former president of the American Football Coaches Association, Dooley was named SEC Coach of the Year seven times and NCAA District Coach of the Year on six occasions. During his tenure, seven of his players earned the prestigious National Football Foundation post-graduate scholarship and 11 former players received the equally-coveted NCAA post-graduate scholarship. Seventy-seven of his players earned Academic All-SEC recognition. He holds the unique distinction of being inducted into the Sports Hall of Fame in two different states, Georgia and Alabama. Dooley is a 1994 inductee into the National College Football Hall of Fame.



**Ray Goff (Georgia),
1989-1995**

Goff succeeded Vince Dooley in 1988. He was a former player and All-SEC quarterback under Dooley from 1973-1976, and captain of the Southeastern Conference Champions in 1976 when he was named SEC Player of the Year. After serving three years as an assistant coach at South Carolina, he became one of Dooley's assistants at Georgia from 1981-1988. In seven seasons, Goff coached the Bulldogs to a 46-34-1 record, four bowls (with victories over Arkansas in the 1991 Independence Bowl and Ohio State in the 1993 Citrus Bowl), and an eighth place national ranking following the 10-2 campaign in 1992.



**Jim Donnan (N.C. State),
1996-2000**

In Jim Donnan's five years as head coach, he compiled a 40-19 overall record including 25-15 in SEC play (5-6 in '96, 10-2 in '97, 9-3 in '98, 8-4 in '99, and 8-4 in 2000). The eight wins or more in four straight seasons set a school record. And for the first time in school history, the Bulldogs won four bowl games in four consecutive seasons (def. Wisconsin, 33-6, in '98 Outback Bowl; def. Virginia, 35-33, in '98 Peach Bowl; def. Purdue, 28-25, in 2000 Outback Bowl; and def. Virginia, 37-14, in the 2000 Oahu Bowl).

Under his direction, Georgia also finished in the nation's top 20 a school-record four consecutive seasons — 10th in '97; 14th in '98, 16th in '99, and 17th in 2000. In addition, Georgia set two home game attendance marks averaging 85,618 per game in 1998 and in 1999 and 2000 sold out every home game for an average of 86,117 in 1999 — fifth best in the country — and 86,520 in 2000. A native of Burlington, N.C., and graduate of N.C. State, Donnan came to Georgia following a record-setting run at Marshall. In his six years with the Thundering Herd, Donnan's teams won 64 games, one national championship (1992), three national runner-up finishes (1991, '93, '95), and earned five consecutive trips to the post-season playoffs. He was named national 1-AA Coach of the Year twice (1992, '95). He had previously been the architect of Oklahoma's high powered offenses from 1985-89 where the Sooners won 49 games in those five years including 27 straight Big Eight contests and the 1985 national championship. He was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2009.

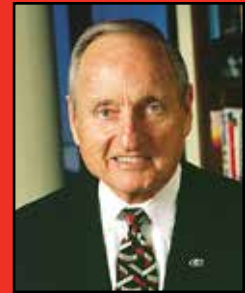

**Vince Dooley
The University of Georgia
Director of Athletics, 1979-2004**

There may be no more decorated director of athletics in the country than Georgia's Vince Dooley who served as head football coach at UGA from December, 1963, to Jan. 1, 1988, and as Director of Athletics from 1979-2004. He was a man of great foresight in times of charting the future, stability in times of change, and vision in critical times that shaped the path of college athletics.



His national stature is evident by his most recent honors: 2010 Bear Bryant Lifetime Achievement Award; 2004 James J. Corbett Memorial Award presented annually by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA), the highest honor one can achieve in collegiate athletics administration; the 2004 John L. Toner Award presented annually by the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame for superior administrative abilities and outstanding dedication to college athletics; 2005 Francis J. "Reds" Bagnell Award Contributions to the Game of Football by the Maxwell Club; and the 2004 Contributions to College Football Award presented by National College Football Awards Association and ESPN. He was also selected to the Georgia Trend Magazine Hall of Fame in 2004 and was named by the magazine one of the Top 100 Georgians of the Century in 2000.

Under his watch as athletic director, Georgia teams won 20 national championships (ten in his final six years) including an unprecedented four during the 1998-99 year (women's swimming, gymnastics, men's tennis, men's golf). During Dooley's tenure Georgia athletic teams won 78 SEC team championships and numerous individual national titles in both men's and women's sports. In the annual Directors' Cup national all-sports competition, Georgia teams earned top ten finishes in five of his final seven years as Director of Athletics.

He was also a standard-bearer for academic excellence. Under his leadership, more than 100 Georgia student-athletes were named first team Academic All-America, more than 50 received NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarships, seven were named recipients of the SEC's Boyd McWhorter Scholar-Athlete of the Year award, seven NCAA Top Eight Award winners, three NCAA Woman of the Year recipients, two Walter Byers Award winners, and well over \$275,000 was awarded to the University's general scholarship fund through performances by Georgia student-athletes.

Bob McWhorter, HB
Lexington, Ga. - 1913
(Parke Davis, NY Herald)**

Georgia's first All-American, he was a four-time All-Southern halfback and the first person to captain both the football and baseball teams at UGA. McWhorter earned Phi Beta Kappa honors while attending the university. He declined pro baseball offers to study law at the University of Virginia. McWhorter was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1954, the State of Georgia Sports Hall of Fame in 1964, and the UGA Circle of Honor in 1996. Bob McWhorter, one of Georgia's most revered athletes, died June 29, 1960. UGA's McWhorter residence hall is named in his honor.



**#18 David Paddock, QB
Brooklyn, N.Y. - 1914
(Parke Davis, NY Herald)**

The University of Georgia's second All-American, the New York native played quarterback and captained the 1914 UGA football team. He played under Coach Alex Cunningham and was a teammate of Georgia's first All-American Bob McWhorter. Paddock, a member of the 1914 All-Southern team and the Georgia all-time team, is the only player in school history to have a petition circulated by the student body requesting that he play for the Bulldogs.



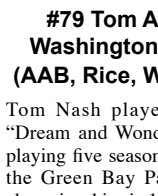
**Joe Bennett, T
Statesboro, Ga.
1922 (Walter Camp)
1923 (NEA, Billy Evans)**

Joseph Bennett, Jr. made the first team as a freshman, was a four-year starter at tackle for the Bulldogs and captain of the 1923 squad. Coach H. J. Stegeman's 1920-22 teams were outstanding and Joe Bennett's play was a major reason why. During his playing days Georgia compiled a record of 25-9-4 and Bennett was selected to the All-Southern first team in 1922 and 1923. He is also a member of Georgia's all-time team. Bennett also starred on the Georgia basketball team from 1922 to 1924. After leaving the university he became an executive with Coca Cola in Atlanta and Los Angeles. Joe Bennett was inducted into the State of Georgia Sports Hall of Fame in 1984.



**I.M. (Chick) Shiver, E
Sylvester, Ga.
1927 (AP)**

Ivy M. Shiver captained both the football and baseball teams in 1927. Shiver was selected to the Associated Press All-America first team at end and was also an exceptional punter. He served as ends coach at Georgia from 1928-1936 while pursuing a pro baseball career. After retiring from baseball Shiver enjoyed a successful career in coaching at the junior college and high school levels. He served as president of the Georgia Athletic Coaches Association and was voted an Honorary Life Member in the Georgia Athletic Coaches Association in recognition of his contributions to the Association and to the coaching profession. He was inducted into the State of Georgia Sports Hall of Fame in 1966.



**#79 Tom A. Nash, E
Washington, Ga.- 1927
(AAB, Rice, Walter Camp)**

Tom Nash played on the 1927 "Dream and Wonder" team before playing five seasons in the NFL for the Green Bay Packers, winning championships in 1929, '30, and '31. Nash returned to the university in 1943 as an assistant line coach. He later became the head coach at Washington High School and the principal of the elementary school. Nash also played Double A and Triple A baseball. Tom Nash, Sr. was inducted into the State of Georgia Sports Hall of Fame in 1972.



**Herb Maffett, E
Atlanta, Ga., 1930 (NY Sun)**

Herbert Maffett was a four year starter at end for the Bulldogs from 1927 to 1931. He played both offense and defense. Legendary coach Wally Butts said that Maffett was one of the greatest ends he ever coached at UGA. Maffett was voted captain of the 1930 football team after leading the Bulldogs to a 15-0 victory over Yale in the 1929 Sanford Stadium dedication game. He is a member of the Georgia Bulldog Hall of Heroes and the State of Georgia Sports Hall of Fame.

**Ralph (Red) Maddox, G
Calhoun, Ga.- 1930 (INS)**

Ralph Maddox became recognized as the University of Georgia's eighteenth All-American 32 years after his playing days were over. Former Georgia publicist Dan Magill uncovered information that indicated that Maddox had made the International News Service All-American team in 1930. However, this honor had never been recorded. Unfortunately, Maddox was not able to enjoy this recognition of his accomplishments. He was killed during the Normandy Invasion of World War II.



**#13 Vernon "Catfish" Smith, E
Macon, Ga.
1931 (AP, Rice, Collier)**

Vernon Smith entered the University of Georgia in 1928 after a stellar career as a high school athlete. He was an All-Southern end from 1929-1931 and captained the 1932 Southern Conference Championship team. He also played basketball and baseball while attending UGA. Smith later coached ends and baseball for the University of Georgia, the University of South Carolina, and the University of Mississippi. In 1979, Smith, a member of the Georgia all-time team and State of Georgia Sports Hall of Fame, was inducted into the National College Football Hall of Fame.



**#26 John Bond, HB
Toccoa, Ga.- 1935
(All-American Board of FB)**

While attending UGA, Bond participated in both football and track for the Bulldogs. Captain of the 1935 football team, Bond led a class that went 21-9 from 1933-1935. He was also very involved with groups and organizations on campus. Bond served as president of the Campus Y.M.C.A., and the "G" Club, and held memberships in prestigious organizations like Sphinx, Gridiron, and Scabbard and Blade. In the 1935 Pandora, Bond was voted the most popular young man on campus. After graduation, he attended the State Medical College at Augusta and later served as surgeon in World War II. Bond was inducted in to the State of Georgia Sports Hall of Fame in 1992.



**#25 Bill Hartman, FB
Thomaston, Ga.
1937 (All-American Board
of Football)**

Inducted into the National College Football Hall of Fame in 1984, Hartman earned All-America honors at UGA in 1937 before playing two seasons with the Washington Redskins. In 1938, while filling in for Redskins tailback Sammy Baugh, he completed 13 consecutive passes against Brooklyn. He returned to Georgia in 1939 under head coach Wally Butts as backfield coach and served in that capacity until 1956. Hartman also served as volunteer kicking coach for the Bulldogs from 1970 to 1994. He was inducted in to the State of Georgia Sports Hall of Fame in 1981 and the UGA Circle of Honor in 1999.



**#21 Frank Sinkwich, HB
McKees Rock, Pa./
Youngstown, Ohio
1941 (AP, CP, UP, AAB, Col-
liers, Look,
Liberty, Esquire, Post, Time,
Spt. News)
1942 (AP, UP, CP, INS, NEA,
Colliers, Look, Liberty, Post,
Time, Spt. News, Walter
Camp)**

A unanimous All-American selection in 1942, Frank Sinkwich was the University of Georgia's first Heisman Trophy winner that same year. In his junior and senior seasons, Sinkwich captained the Bulldogs to bowl victories over Texas Christian (Orange Bowl) and UCLA (Rose Bowl). He also led Georgia's "Point-A-Minute" Freshman team to an undefeated season in 1939. Sinkwich was a first round selection in the NFL draft and enjoyed two All-Pro seasons with the Detroit Lions. He was inducted in to the National College Football Hall of Fame in 1954, the State of Georgia Sports Hall of Fame in 1964, and the UGA Circle of Honor in 1996.



**#41 George Poschner, E
Youngstown, Ohio
1942 (Look)**

George Poschner was an All-SEC end for the University of Georgia from 1939 to 1942. However, his greatest distinction comes from his service in the Army during World War II. Poschner received The Bronze Star, Purple Heart and the Distinguished Service Cross for extraordinary service to his country. George Poschner was inducted into the State of Georgia Sports Hall of Fame in 1982.

**#39 Mike Castronis, T
Jacksonville, Fla.
1945 (INS)**

One of Georgia's most beloved players and coaches, Mike Castronis wore many hats during his care as a player, coach and administrator at the UGA. He was an All-SEC lineman from 1943-45 and stayed on as a graduate assistant in 1946. After, a successful career as a high school coach, Castronis returned to the university in 1961 as head coach of the freshman team and coached the varsity offensive linemen from 1962-63. He later served as head freshman and JV coach under Vince Dooley.





#62 Charley Trippi, TB
Pittston, Pa.
1946 (AP, UP, INS,
NEA, Colliers, Life,
Look, Post, Walter Camp)



Still regarded by many as the greatest all-around athlete ever to play at Georgia, he was named the game's outstanding player after rushing for 130 yards in the 1943 Rose Bowl victory over UCLA. After the war, he returned to college and in 1946 led the 'Dogs to an 11-0 record, SEC championship, and victory over North Carolina in the Sugar Bowl. As a senior he led the SEC in scoring with 84 points and finished with 1,366 yards total offense. He won the Maxwell Award as the country's most valuable player and was runnerup for the Heisman Trophy. Following his collegiate career, he led the NFL's Chicago Cardinals to the world championship as a rookie. He has been inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame, Pro Football Hall of Fame, Rose Bowl Hall of Fame, and State of Georgia Sports Hall of Fame. He is one of only four Georgia players to have his jersey retired.

#28 Herb St. John, G
Jacksonville, Fla., 1946
(NCAA Guide)



Herb St. John was a four-time All-SEC selection for the Bulldogs from 1944 to 1947. After his senior season, St. John was named to play in the 1944 and 1946 Blue-Gray All-Star game. He went on to play two years of professional football. In 1948 he began his pro career with the Brooklyn Dodgers and played for the Chicago Hornets in 1949.



#55 Dan Edwards, E
Gatesville, Texas
1947 (Coaches)

Dan Edwards was captain of the 1947 Gator Bowl team. During his years in Athens the Texas native's career was characterized by big plays. He is

remembered best for the 67-yard touchdown pass he caught from Charley Trippi in the 1947 Gator Bowl. Edwards went on to play nine seasons in the NFL and CFL. Upon retiring Dan Edwards returned home to Gatesville, Texas and started a successful oil company.



#18 John Rauch, QB
Philadelphia, Pa.
1948 (Rice, AAB)

Johnny Rauch started 45 consecutive games at QB from 1945-48, including four straight bowl games. Rauch led Coach Wallace Butts' Bulldogs to a

36-8-1 record during that four year span. As a senior, he was selected as the SEC Player of the Year. After his playing career, Rauch embarked on an ultra-successful coaching career. He became head coach of the Oakland Raiders in 1966 and led the team to the Super Bowl in 1967. In three seasons under Rauch's leadership the Raiders posted a record of 33-8-1. He was inducted into the State of Georgia Sports Hall of Fame in 1979.



#56 Harry Babcock, E
Ocala, Fla.
1952 (Post, Collier)

An All-America and All-SEC end for the Bulldogs, Harry Babcock led the conference in receptions in 1951. He had 80 career receptions at UGA between 1950-52

and finished his career with 1,199 receiving yards. He was the first player selected in the 1953 NFL draft (San Francisco 49ers) and was inducted into the Georgia Sports Hall of Fame in 1992. He passed away in 1996.

#12 Zeke Bratkowski, QB
Danville, Ill.
1952 (Coaches);
1953 (Focus)



All-America QB in 1952 and '53, he was the nation's leading college passer in 1952 and the nation's leading punter in '53. Two-time SEC passing champion (1,824 yards in '52 and 1,461 yards in '53) who set numerous UGA passing records. Had 4,836 career passing yards before 14-year NFL career with the Chicago Bears, Los Angeles Rams, and Green Bay Packers including two Packer Super Bowl champion teams. He was inducted into the State of Georgia Sports Hall of Fame in 1980.



#50 Johnny Carson, E
Atlanta, Ga., 1953
(FWAA, Paramount News)

Johnny Carson was a four-letter athlete at UGA lettering in football, golf, basketball and baseball. In 1953 Carson led the

nation in receiving with 46 receptions and was a first round selection in the 1954 NFL draft by the Washington Redskins where he played from 1954-59. Carson is a member the Georgia all-time team and was inducted into the State of Georgia Sports Hall of Fame in 1957.



#60 Pat Dye, G
Blythe, Ga.
1959 (FWAA-Look)
1960 (FB News)

A two-time All-American, Pat Dye helped lead Georgia to the 1959 SEC championship and 1960 Orange Bowl victory over Missouri (14-0). He is a member of both the Georgia and Alabama Sports Halls of Fame. Dye played two seasons in the Canadian Football League before being hired as an assistant coach for the University of Alabama. Dye's greatest success came as head coach at Auburn from 1981-1992. During his tenure the Tigers won four Southeastern Conference titles.



#10 Fran Tarkenton, QB
Athens, Ga., 1960 (AP)

Raised in Athens, Ga., Tarkenton led Georgia to the 1959 SEC championship and Orange Bowl victory over Missouri (14-0) as a junior. In his 1960 senior season, he led the SEC in total offense

(1,274 yards) and in passing offense (1,189 yards). He was also named an Academic All-American. After graduation, Tarkenton played 18 seasons in the National Football League with the Minnesota Vikings and New York Giants and set numerous NFL passing records

during his career. He led the Vikings to the Super Bowl three times: 1973, 1974, and 1976. When he retired following the 1978 season at age 39, Tarkenton had gained 47,003 yards passing and threw 342 TD passes as a professional. He held NFL records with 3,686 completed passes and 6,467 attempted passes. He has been inducted into both the College and Pro Football Halls of Fame.

#79 Jim Wilson, T

Offensive tackle "Big Jim" Wilson was described by head coach Vince Dooley as "the strongest player I've ever seen." He helped lead Georgia to a 1964 Sun Bowl victory over Texas Tech before being taken in the fourth round of the 1964 NFL draft by the San Francisco 49ers. He played four seasons in the NFL retiring due to a spinal condition. He was inducted into the State of Georgia Sports Hall of Fame in 2001.

#70 Ray Rissmiller, T

Winner of the 1964 Jenkins Award as Georgia's best lineman, Ray Rissmiller was an all-star tackle for the Bulldogs. He helped lead Georgia to a 1964 Sun Bowl victory over Texas Tech before being taken in the second round of the 1965 NFL draft by the Philadelphia Eagles. He was an accomplished singer. Rissmiller released his first single "Big Ray" on GRC Records. Scott Rissmiller, Ray's son, also played tackle for Georgia from 1988-1992.

#76 George Patton, DT

"General" George Patton was captain of the 1966 SEC Championship team. A three-time All-SEC selection, Patton won the Jenkins Award and the J.B. Whitworth Award as the Bulldogs' best lineman. He also played quarterback—a lifelong dream—in the 1966 Cotton Bowl victory over Southern Methodist. Patton played one season in the NFL with the Atlanta Falcons. He was inducted into the State of Georgia Sports Hall of Fame in 1991.

#63 Edgar Chandler, OG

He died in 1992 after a long illness at the age of 46.

Also an Academic All-American, Hughes played quarterback at Georgia before being switched to safety in 1965. As a quarterback in 1964, he helped lead Georgia to a 7-3-1 record, the school's first winning season since 1960. After being switched to safety, Hughes played a huge role in leading the Bulldogs to a 10-1 record in 1966, including an SEC championship and Cotton Bowl victory. Hughes went on to play in the NFL with the New York Giants as a safety and later took coaching positions at Georgia and Vanderbilt.



**#50 Tommy Lyons, C

1970 (Sports Extra)**

Lyons was a three-year starting center for the Bulldogs from 1968-1970. He helped Georgia to an 8-1-2 season and an SEC championship in 1968, and was named team captain in 1970. He was twice named to the Academic All-SEC team and received NCAA and National Football Foundation post-graduate scholarships. In 1971, he became an NFL standout guard with the Denver Broncos and started 49 consecutive games before suffering a broken leg in 1975. While in the NFL, Lyons earned his medical degree from the Colorado Medical School. He was the winner of the 1996 NCAA Silver Anniversary Award, and in 1999, he was inducted as a member of the UGA's Circle of Honor which recognizes those student-athletes who have exhibited excellence in athletic performance and personal achievement. He was inducted into the State of Georgia Sports Hall of Fame in 1987.

"Moonpie" was a three-year letterman (1974-75-76) who helped lead the 'Dogs to three consecutive bowl games (Tangerine, Cotton, Sugar) and the 1976 SEC Championship. He was drafted by the Cincinnati Bengals in the fourth round of the '77 NFL draft. He played with the Bengals from 1979-85 which included the 1982 Super Bowl. He finished his career with the Seattle Seahawks in 1986-87. He was inducted into the State of Georgia Sports Hall of Fame in 2001.

From 1966-1968, Stanfill led the Bulldogs to a 25-6-2 record, two SEC championships in '66 and '68, and trips to the Cotton ('66), Liberty ('67), and Sugar ('68) Bowls. In 1968, he was a consensus All-American, Academic All-American, team captain, and recipient of the Outland Trophy, presented annually to the nation's most outstanding lineman. Stanfill went on to an All-Pro career in the NFL with the Miami Dolphins from 1969-1976. He was a starter on the Dolphins 1972 and 1973 Super Bowl championship teams and still holds the team record for career quarterback sacks (67.5). Stanfill was inducted into the National College Football Hall of Fame in 1998 and State of Georgia Sports Hall of Fame in 1984.



**# 13 Jake Scott, SAF

Scott was one of the leaders of the 1967 Liberty Bowl team and also helped the Bulldogs to the 1968 SEC championship which included an 8-0-2 regular season and a trip to the Sugar Bowl. Scott led the SEC in interceptions in 1967 and '68, and also led the SEC in punt returns and punt return yardage in '68. He still holds the Georgia record for career interceptions and return yards with 16 for 315 yards. Scott went on to a brilliant professional career including five consecutive Pro Bowl appearances from 1971-75. During his six years with the Miami Dolphins, he played in three Super Bowls and was named Super Bowl VII MVP in 1972. Scott played his final three NFL seasons with the Washington Redskins and was inducted into the State of Georgia Sports Hall of Fame in 1986.



**#60 Steve Greer, DG
Greer, S.C., 1969

Greer was a three-year standout defensive right guard from 1967-1969. He helped lead the Bulldogs to the 1968 SEC championship. Greer earned All-America honors in 1969 and received the Atlanta Touchdown Club's Alexander Memorial trophy in 1970 which recognizes the outstanding lineman of the year in the South. After graduation, Greer played professional football in Canada for the Toronto Argonauts.



**#66 Royce Smith, OG

Smith was a three-year starter at offensive guard for the Bulldogs from 1969-1971. He earned All-SEC honors as a sophomore and junior before becoming an All-American his senior season. Smith was named team captain in 1971 and helped the Bulldogs to a 10-1-0 record that season and a trip to the Gator Bowl, where Georgia defeated the University of North Carolina. Smith received the Jacobs Blocking Trophy in 1971 as the best blocker in the SEC. Smith was drafted by the New Orleans Saints in the first round of the 1972 NFL draft and later joined the Atlanta Falcons where he played two seasons.



**#74 Craig Hertwig, OT
Macon, Ga.- 1974 (AP)**

Hertwig, also nicknamed "Sky" by his fellow teammates for his 6-8 frame, surprisingly did not become a starter for Georgia until his junior year. But after moving to offense in 1972, he made an immediate impact. During Hertwig's tenure on the Georgia line, the Bulldogs garnered a collective record of 20-14-1 with visits to the Peach ('73) and Tangerine (1974) Bowls. In 1974 Hertwig was honored with the William Jenkins Award that recognizes the team's most outstanding lineman and also the J.B Whitworth Award that goes to the lineman of the year. Hertwig was drafted in the third round by the NFL Detroit Lions in 1975.

**#63 Randy Johnson, OG
Rome, Ga.
1975 (AP, UPI, Coaches,
Walter Camp, Family
Weekly, Kodak)**

A three-year letterman (1973-74-75), he was elected the team's offensive captain in 1975 after helping the Bulldogs to a 9-2 regular season record and berth in the Cotton Bowl. All-SEC first team in 1974 and '75. In 1976, he was drafted by the Seattle Seahawks where he played in '76 before going to the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in '77 and '78.



**#67 Joel Parrish, OG
Douglas, Ga.

FB News, Kodak, Playboy)**

After being drafted to play professional baseball for the Los Angeles Dodgers out of high school, Parrish decided to return to football to join the Bulldogs from 1973-1976. Known for his great speed at 232 pounds, Parrish was selected pre-season All-SEC as a senior and helped lead Georgia to an SEC championship and a berth to the Sugar Bowl. Parrish received the award for most outstanding lineman in the SEC by the Atlanta Touchdown Club in 1977. After graduation, Parrish played professionally for the Toronto Argonauts in Canada.



**#44 Ben Zambiasi, LB

Zambiasi was a standout linebacker for the Bulldogs and led the team in total tackles for three straight years (1975-77). In those three years, Zambiasi recorded 465 tackles- 247 solo- and earned All-SEC honors his sophomore through senior seasons. He helped lead the Bulldogs to a 10-1 regular season mark and an SEC championship in 1976. Zambiasi was an Academic All-American in 1976 and received the 1977 William Jenkins Award as Georgia's top lineman. Also that year, Zambiasi was given the Wallace Butts Memorial Award and the Wallace Butts Family Scholarship given annually to the player who best combines athletic and academic skills. Zambiasi went on to play professionally for the Canadian Football League's Hamilton TigerCats from 1978-1991. In that time, he was named runner-up CFL Rookie of the Year ('78), CFL Defensive MVP ('79), and All-CFL for five straight seasons.



**# 9 Allan Leavitt, PK
Brooksville, Fla.
1976 (FB Digest)**

Leavitt, a place-kicker from 1973 to 1976, is most remembered for his kick against Georgia Tech in the final regular season game of 1976. Tied 10-10 with 9 seconds remaining, and needing a win to remain in contention for the national championship, Leavitt hit a 33-yard field goal in drizzly, dreary weather to win the game. Leavitt is second in the UGA record book for most field goals over 50 yards in a career (6) and ranks first in Career PAT's with 125. After graduation, he went on to play in the NFL for three years with the Atlanta Falcons and the New York Giants.





#66 George Collins, OG
Warner Robins, Ga.
1977 (Sporting News)

As an offensive guard for the Bulldogs, Collins was selected to the Birmingham News pre-season All-SEC team in 1977 and as the best offensive lineman in the SEC. Collins was a two-year starter and was part of Georgia's 1976 SEC championship team. Following his senior season, he was selected to play in the East-West Shrine Game in California and the Senior Bowl in Alabama. After graduation, Collins was drafted by the NFL St. Louis Cardinals, where he played for five seasons before moving to Jacksonville to play for the Bulls in the USFL.

#42 Bill Krug, ROV
Washington, D.C.
1977 (Playboy)



Krug, who played a position known as a "rover", lettered at Georgia from 1975-1977. He received All-SEC honors all three years and helped lead his team to a 10-2 record in 1976 and a trip to the Sugar Bowl. During this season, he was named Defensive Player of the Week by Sports Illustrated for his performance in Georgia's 21-0 victory over Alabama. In 1977, Krug was a pre-season All-American selection by Playboy and Southeastern Football magazine, and was named to the Atlanta Journal-Constitution "Deep South Best 11" list.

#5 Rex Robinson, PK
Marietta, Ga.
1979 (Playboy, 1980 (UPI, FWA, Playboy, FB News, NEA, Walter Camp)



After missing his first extra point attempt as a freshman for the Bulldogs, Robinson went on to convert his next 101 consecutive PAT's, the second best ever in NCAA history. Robinson lettered at Georgia from 1977-1980 and was a member of the 1980 National Championship team. His 101x102 Career PAT mark is best in school history and his 15x17 field goals in 1978 is second best in the UGA record book. Robinson was the leading scorer for the Bulldogs his sophomore and junior years and is most remembered for his last second field goal against Kentucky in 1978 to secure Georgia's 17-16 come from behind victory. Robinson was drafted to play in the NFL for the Cincinnati Bengals in 1981.

#19 Scott Woerner, CB
Jonesboro, Ga.
1980 (UPI, Kodak, Walter Camp, FB News)



Lettering at Georgia from 1977-1980, Woerner set the school record for most punt return yards in a career, tied for second on all-time Georgia list for 13 career interceptions, and led the nation in 1980 in punt return average. He was the only defensive player in the SEC to be listed in the top ten in All-Purpose Yardage in 1980, and was selected "Defensive Player of the Week" by Sports Illustrated for this performance against Clemson. Woerner went on to play for the Atlanta Falcons who drafted him in the third round of the 1981 NFL draft. He signed with the Philadelphia Stars (later the Baltimore Stars) of the USFL in 1982 where he became First Team All-USFL as a safety.



#34 Herschel Walker, TB - Wrightsville, Ga.
1980 (AP, UPI, Kodak, FWA, Walter Camp, FB News, Spt. News, NEA); 1981 (AP, UPI, Kodak, FWA, Walter Camp, FB News, Sporting News, NEA, Playboy)

Perhaps the most decorated player in Bulldog history, Walker led Georgia to a three-year record of 33-3-1, a national championship in 1980, three SEC titles, and three consecutive Sugar Bowl appearances. He won the Heisman Trophy in 1982 after finishing second as a sophomore and third as a freshman. He set the NCAA freshman rushing record in 1980 with 1,616 yards. At the end of his college career, Walker held 10 NCAA rushing records, 15 SEC marks, and 30 Georgia records. After three seasons with the Bulldogs, Walker went on to a long and successful professional career. He played with the New Jersey Generals of the USFL before moving to the NFL to play with the Minnesota Vikings, Philadelphia Eagles, New York Giants, and the Dallas Cowboys. In 1999, Walker was named by CBS as the College Offensive Player of the Century and was named to the Walter Camp Football Foundation All-Century First Team. He was inducted into the National College Football Hall of Fame in 1999, and The State of Georgia Sports Hall of Fame in 2000.



#14 Terry Hoage, ROV
Huntsville, Texas
1982 (AP, Kodak, Walter Camp, Sporting News, NEA, UPI) ; 1983 (NEA, UPI, Kodak, FWA, Walter Camp, FB News, Sporting News, Playboy)

A two-time consensus All-American, Hoage played a key role in Georgia's four year record of 43-4-1 from 1980-83, including one national championship, three SEC championships, and four major bowl appearances. He finished fifth in the 1983 Heisman Trophy balloting- at that time the highest finish ever by a defensive back. In addition to being a two-time Academic All-American, Hoage was named a recipient of an NCAA and National Football Foundation Post Graduate Scholarship Awards. He went on to a 13-year career in the NFL highlighted by membership on the Washington Redskins Super Bowl Championship team in 1992. Hoage was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in Dec., 2000, and elected to the UGA Circle of Honor in 2001.



#87 Jimmy Payne, DT
Athens, Ga.
1982 (Playboy, Walter Camp)

A three-time All-SEC performer, Payne led Georgia in sacks three of his four years, including the 1980 National Championship season. He combined great size and speed that allowed him to contribute as a linebacker and as a defensive tackle. Payne's 28 career sacks and 12 single season sacks in 1981 still both rank second in the all-time Georgia record book. Payne went on to play several years for the Buffalo Bills of the National Football League. He died in 1998 after a long illness at the age of 38.



#90 Freddie Gilbert, DE
Griffin, Ga.
1983 (UPI)

A two-time All-SEC performer and four-year starter, Gilbert was part of Georgia's greatest four-year period in school history posting an overall record of 43-4-1 from 1980-83). He helped lead the 'Dogs to the 1980 national championship, three SEC championship, and four major bowl games. Gilbert helped solidify Georgia's defensive line with the uncanny ability to put pressure on opposing quarterbacks. His 26 career sacks still rank fourth in Georgia's all-time record book. He went on to play with Herschel Walker in the U.S.F.L. in 1983 before returning to the NFL's Denver Broncos.



#5 Kevin Butler, PK
Stone Mountain, Ga.
1983 (FB News)
1984 (Kodak, UPI, FWA, Walter Camp, FB News, Sporting News, NEA)

A two-time All-American, and four time All-SEC member, Butler is Georgia's all-time leading scorer with 353 points (122 PAT's, 77 field goals). During Butler's tenure at Georgia, he helped lead the 'Dogs to a 38-8-2 record, two SEC titles, and berths in two Sugar Bowls, one Cotton Bowl, and one Citrus Bowl. Butler also holds the school record for most field goals in a career and longest field goal (60 yards). He set the NCAA record with 27 multiple field-goal games. Butler went on to a stellar NFL career with Chicago Bears (1985-1995) and the Arizona Cardinals (1996- 1997) of the NFL including the 1985 Super Bowl championship Bears team. He ended his professional career with 1,208 points, sixth-most in the NFL history among kickers. Butler was recently named to the Consensus College Football Team of the Century and was elected to the College Football Hall of Fame in 2001.

#31 Jeff Sanchez, SAF
Yorba Linda, Calif.
1984 (Kodak, UPI, FWA, Walter Camp)



A two-time All-SEC member, Sanchez helped solidify Georgia's secondary from 1982-1984. Sanchez came to Georgia by way of Fullerton Junior College, where he was a two-time Junior College All-American. He finished second in the nation in interceptions in 1982 with nine (behind teammate Terry Hoage). Sanchez also had two interceptions against three different opponents his junior season. He missed 1983 with an injury but came back strong his senior year and led team in interceptions and was third in tackles.



#64 Peter Anderson, C
Vineland, N.J.
1985 (AP, UPI, Kodak Sporting News)

A two-year starter, Anderson provided a lot of versatility to Georgia by playing every position on the offensive line. Playing against Clemson his senior year, Anderson recovered a fumble in the end zone for a touchdown, a rarity for an offensive lineman. He made Georgia history when he became the first Vince Dooley-coached player to be named a permanent captain at mid-season (a tradition that was usually reserved for after the season).



**#19 John Little, SAF

A two-time All-American, Little replaced Georgia legend Terry Hoage at roverbuck. One of his most outstanding performances came against Clemson in 1985 on national television as he intercepted two passes in the fourth quarter to preserve a Bulldog victory. Besides being a two-time Academic All-SEC selection, Little was one of a few players selected by the College Football Association to record a television spot that centered around the importance of obtaining an education.

**#79 Wilbur Strozier, OT
LaGrange, Ga.
1986 (Football News)**



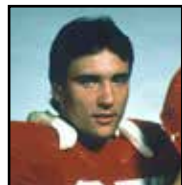
One of Georgia's most versatile players in history, he was a standout at defensive tackle, tight end, and finally, as an offensive tackle. After moving to offensive tackle, Strozier developed into one of the Bulldogs' most consistent offensive linemen, starting all but one game his junior and senior seasons. Following his college career, Strozier played with the Denver Broncos and Seattle Seahawks of the NFL.

**# 38 Tim Worley, TB
Lumberton, N.C.
1988 (Kodak, Walter
Camp, FWA)**



A consensus All-American his junior year, Worley completed his three year career with 2,038 rushing yards on 353 attempts (5.8 avg.) and 27 touchdowns, and 22 receptions for 221 yards and two touchdowns. He led the SEC in rushing in 1988, accumulating a career-high 1,216 yards on the ground. He was selected in the first round of the 1989 NFL draft by the Pittsburgh Steelers.

**# 87 Troy Sadowski, TE
Chamblee, Ga.
1988 (Walter Camp)**



A four-year starter, Sadowski played an instrumental role in helping Georgia to a 33-13-2 record from 1985-88 with appearances in the Sun, Hall of Fame, Liberty, and Gator Bowls. Sadowski primarily cleared running holes for many of Georgia's great backs. When called on to catch the ball, Sadowski responded with 42 career receptions for 493 yards, 11.7 average with four touchdowns. Sadowski was drafted by the Atlanta Falcons and went on to a lengthy NFL career with several teams.

**# 5 Garrison Hearst, TB
Lincolnton, Ga.
1992 (Kodak, AP, Walter
Camp, FWA, Football
News, Sporting News,
UPI)**



A consensus All-American, Hearst led the Bulldogs in rushing each of his three seasons. As a junior in 1992, he carried 228 times for 1,547 yards and 19 TD's and caught 22 passes for 324 yards and two TD's. His 1,910 all-purpose yards in '92 was second best in SEC and school history. He finished third in the 1992 Heisman Trophy balloting and won the Doak Walker award which goes

annually to the country's outstanding junior or senior RB. Hearst stands second on Georgia's career rushing list with 3,232 total yards. He was the first round draft choice of the Arizona Cardinals in 1993.



**#73 Bernard Williams, OT
Memphis, Tenn.
1993 (Playboy, FB
News)**

A dominating offensive lineman who anchored Georgia's line from 1991-1993. Williams started at left tackle for the Bulldogs in all but two games in his last three seasons after switching from defense following his freshman year. He paved the way for Georgia record-setting tailback Garrison Hearst and quarterback Eric Zeier. He was the first round draft choice of the Philadelphia Eagles in 1994.



**#10 Eric Zeier, QB
Marietta, Ga.
1994 (AFCA Coaches,
Playboy)**

The most prolific QB to ever play at Georgia, Zeier finished his career with 67 school records and 18 SEC marks. In four years, he set the all-time SEC career passing record with 11,153 yards, which was later broken only by Peyton Manning. Zeier's best game came against Southern Miss his junior season, where he threw for 544 yards on 47 attempts, completing 30 passes and accounting for four touchdowns. Zeier became Georgia's first quarterback in 34 years to be named to the American Football Coaches Association Coaches All-American first team. He was selected by the Cleveland Browns in the 1995 NFL draft and later played for the Baltimore Ravens, Tampa Bay Bucs, and Atlanta Falcons.



**#79 Matt Stinchcomb, OT
Lilburn, Ga.
1997 (AFCA Coaches)
1998 (AFCA Coaches,
Playboy, AP, Walter
Camp, FB News, Sport-
ing News)**

A two-time All-American, Stinchcomb was a three-year starter for the Bulldogs who started 32 consecutive games and was a finalist for the Rotary Lombardi Award in 1998 which goes to the nation's top lineman. He finished his academic career with a 3.96 grade point average majoring in business. Besides being a two-time Academic All-American, Stinchcomb received several academic and community service awards including the 1998 NCAA Top Eight Award, 1999 GTE Football Academic All-American of the Year; 1998 AFCA National Good Works Team (one of 11 players nationally); NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship; National Football Foundation Post-Graduate Scholarship; and the Woody Hayes National Scholar-Athlete Award. Stinchcomb was the first round draft choice of the Oakland Raiders in 1999.

**#4 Champ Bailey, CB/WR
Folkston, Ga.

News)**



Considered the most versatile player at Georgia since the in-

He was a semi-finalist for national defensive player of the year by *Football News*.

Boss was a major part of the 2002 defense that finished first in the SEC and fourth nationally in scoring defense (15.4 ppg) and led 'Dogs to a 13-1 record, SEC and Nokia Sugar Bowl Championships, and final national ranking of No. 3.

After setting the Georgia record for career QB sacks in 2004 with 36, he was named the SEC Player of the Year by the league coaches and the Associated Press SEC Defensive Player of the Year for the second time.

A graduate of North Miami Beach H.S., Miami, Fla., Jean-Gilles was a consensus All-America and All-SEC first team selection in 2005 and started 40 career games for the Bulldogs. FRANK SINKWICH

1942 Heisman Trophy Winner

In 1942, Frank Sinkwich became Georgia's first Heisman Trophy winner after leading Georgia to an 11-1 record, SEC championship, and victory over UCLA in the Rose Bowl.

It was the culmination of a great college career highlighted by the Heisman Trophy and All-America selection two consecutive years. In his three-year career (1940-42), Sinkwich rushed for 2,271 yards, passed for 2,331, and accounted for 60 touchdowns—30 rushing and 30 passing.

Born in McKees Rock, Pa., Sinkwich was an outstanding high school star at Cheney High School in Youngstown, Ohio. In his record setting senior season with the Bulldogs, Sinkwich gained 795 yards rushing and set the SEC passing record with 1,392 yards, a mark that stood for eight years. He set the SEC total offense record of 2,187 yards that same season. Sinkwich led Georgia to another SEC record — 4,725 yards of team total offense. Although playing with two sprained ankles, he scored Georgia's only TD in 9-0 victory over UCLA in the Rose Bowl.

In 1941, Sinkwich set an SEC rushing record with 1,103 yards which stood for eight years, and gained 713 yards passing for a new SEC total offense record of 1,816 yards. He led Georgia to a 40-26 victory over TCU in the Orange Bowl New Year's Day in 1942 with a performance still considered by many as the best in all bowl history. Sinkwich gained 139 yards, completed 9 of 13 passes for 243 yards and three touchdowns — a total offensive effort of 382 yards. That season, Sinkwich played from the third game on with a broken jaw in a protective mask.

Sinkwich was All-Pro with Detroit in 1943-44, but a knee injury received in the Air Force game in 1945 ended his playing career. He was inducted into the National Football Hall of Fame in 1954.

In a rare gathering of former UGA superstars, Walker was joined by the other three former Bulldogs who have retired jerseys: #40 Theron Sapp, #62 Charley Trippi, and #21 Frank Sinkwich.

CHARLEY TRIPPI

1946 Maxwell Award Winner
Jersey Retired in 1947

Charley Trippi is still regarded by many as the greatest all-around athlete ever to play for the University of Georgia.

Trippi began earning Hall of Fame distinction as a sophomore by leading the Bulldogs to a 9-0 victory over U.C.L.A. in the 1943 Rose Bowl game in which he was named the game's outstanding player after rushing for 130 yards.

Born Dec. 14, 1922, in Pittston, Pa., Trippi was a unanimous All-America selection in 1946 after leading Georgia to a perfect 11-0 record, SEC championship, and victory over North Carolina in the Sugar Bowl game. His senior season, he led the SEC in scoring with 84 points and finished the year with 1,366 yards total offense (744 rushing and 622 passing). He was runnerup for the Heisman Trophy in '46 and won the Maxwell Award, given annually to the most valuable player in the country.

He signed with the Chicago Cardinals following his collegiate career and in his rookie season, led them to the world championship. In the championship game, he scored twice on a 44-yard rush and 75-yard punt return. He played with the Cardinals for nine seasons.

Following his playing career, Trippi was selected to the National College Football Hall of Fame, National Pro Football Hall of Fame, Rose Bowl Hall of Fame, and State of Georgia Sports Hall of Fame. He is one of only four Georgia players to have his jersey retired.

Trippi became a regular halfback on the 1942 SEC championship team that finished 11-1 and earned the Rose Bowl invitation. He gained 1,239 total yards (672 rushing on 98 carries and another 567 passing completing 30 of 58).

He spent 1943-45 serving in the Air Force, but following his discharge, he returned to Georgia to play the final six games of the 1945 season. One of his most memorable performances was leading the 'Dogs to a 33-0 victory over Georgia Tech—a game in which he set the SEC record for yards gained passing (323) and also total offense (384 yards on 323 passing and 61 rushing). Against Florida that same year, he set the SEC record for rushing in a single game with 239 yards. In his junior season, he led Georgia to a 20-6 victory over Tulsa in the Oil Bowl at Houston, Jan. 1, 1946.

Trippi was also an All-America baseball player in 1946 and played with the Atlanta Crackers in 1947. He later served as an assistant coach at Georgia (1958-62) and with the St. Louis Cardinals.

He will always be known as "The Drought Breaker" for his great touchdown against Georgia Tech in 1957. His score was the difference in a 7-0 Georgia victory which ended an eight-year losing streak to the Yellow Jackets. But that single score sometimes overshadows a great career at Georgia which included being named All-SEC in 1958 and his election as team captain.

He was drafted by Philadelphia in 1960, and was in the lineup when the Eagles defeated Vince Lombardi's up-and-coming Green Bay Packers in the NFL championship game. He was traded to Pittsburgh in 1963 and responded by rushing for over 500 yards and helping the Steelers to the eastern division title.

**Glenn "Pop" Warner
Inducted in 1951**

Glenn "Pop" Warner began his coaching career at Georgia compiling a 7-4 record in 1895 and '96. He went on to coach at several other schools recording 319 career victories.



**Bob McWhorter
Inducted in 1954**

Bob McWhorter, who was inducted into the Hall in 1954, was Georgia's first All-American (1913). He was All-Southern four consecutive years (1910-13).



**Frank Sinkwich
Inducted in 1954**

Frank Sinkwich was Georgia's first Heisman Trophy winner in 1942 and led UGA to wins in the Rose and Orange Bowls. He earned All-America honors in 1941 and 1942. He was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1954.

**Charley Trippi
Inducted in 1959**

Named All-American in 1946 Charley Trippi captained Georgia's undefeated, untied Sugar Bowl championship team of 1946. He went on to a great career in the NFL as a halfback with the Chicago Cardinals where he earned All-Pro honors in 1947. He played on their 1947 NFL championship team as well.



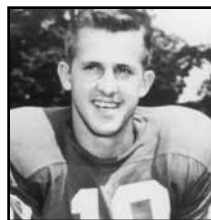
**Vernon "Catfish" Smith
Inducted in 1979**

Vernon "Catfish" Smith, who was inducted in 1979, was the star of the 1929 Georgia-Yale game which dedicated Sanford Stadium. He scored all 15 points in that game won by the Bulldogs, 15-0. He later went on to All-America honors for the Bulldogs in 1931.



**Bill Hartman
Inducted in 1984**

Bill Hartman, inducted in 1984, captained the Bulldogs in 1937 when he was named All-SEC and All-America. After playing with the Washington Redskins, Hartman served on the Georgia coaching staff with Wally Butts and as a volunteer kicking coach under Vince Dooley.



**Fran Tarkenton
Inducted in 1987**

Fran Tarkenton, inducted in 1987, was an All-American quarterback who led Georgia to the SEC championship and Orange Bowl victory in 1959. He went on to an All-Pro career in the NFL with the Minnesota Vikings and New York Giants and still holds several pro passing records.

**Vince Dooley
Inducted in 1994**

Vince Dooley coached the Bulldogs for 25 years (1964-88) leading UGA to a consensus national championship in 1980 and another national title recognized by one poll in 1968, six SEC titles (1966,'68,'76,'80,'81,'82), 20 bowl games and 201 victories.



**Wally Butts
Inducted in 1997**

Wally Butts coached the Bulldogs from 1939-60 leading Georgia to a 22-year record of 140-86-9, six bowl games, four SEC championships, a consensus national championship in 1942 and another national title recognized by some polls in 1946.



**Herschel Walker
Inducted in 1999**

Herschel Walker was inducted into the Hall of Fame in December, 1999. He was a three-time consensus All-America, 1982 Heisman Trophy winner, and led Georgia to three SEC titles (1980-81-82) and the 1980 national championship.



**Bill Stanfill
Inducted in 1998**

Bill Stanfill was inducted in December, 1998, and was a consensus All-American and winner of the Outland Trophy in 1968. He went on to an All-Pro career with the Miami Dolphins winning two Super Bowls.



**Terry Hoage
Inducted in 2000**

Terry Hoage was a two-time consensus All-American and Academic All-American (1982-83) and finished fifth in the 1983 Heisman Trophy Balloting. He went on to a 13-year NFL career.



**Kevin Butler
Inducted in 2001**

An All-American in 1983 and 1984, Kevin Butler became the first kicker ever inducted into the Hall of Fame. He is most remembered for his 60-yard field goal with 11 seconds left to beat Clemson, 26-23 in 1984. He went on to a record setting career with the Chicago Bears including a 1986 Super Bowl Championship.



**John Rauch
Inducted in 2003**

Rauch started every game at QB for four years (1945-48) and his 4,044 career passing yards set an NCAA record. He led UGA to two SEC titles (1946 and '48) and was a first team All-American in '48.



**Jim Donnan
Inducted in 2009**

Jim Donnan posted a 40-19 record at UGA from 1996-2000 including four consecutive eight-win seasons, four top 20 finishes, and four straight bowl victories (1997-2000). He previously coached six years at Marshall University where he won a national championship 1992.



**Jake Scott
Inducted in 2011**

An All-America safety in 1968, Scott led the SEC in interceptions, punt returns and punt return yardage and was named the SEC Player of the Year. He went on to an all-star NFL career with the Miami Dolphins and Washington Redskins in which he played in three Super Bowls including his selection in 1972 as the MVP of Super Bowl VII.





Fans everywhere remember freshman sensation Herschel Walker leading the 1980 Georgia Bulldogs to a perfect 12-0 record and the undisputed national championship. However, most don't realize that over the more than 100-year history of Georgia football, five Bulldog teams have actually been declared national champions at season's end by at least one of the national polls recognized by the National College Football Hall of Fame and included in the official NCAA Football Record Book.

Two of those, 1980 and 1942, were consensus selections being chosen by at least half of the recognized polls. Three other Georgia teams — 1927, 1946, and 1968, were recognized by polls such as the Williamson, based on a power ratings system, and the Litkenhous, a difference-by-score formula.

The Consensus National Champions

1980 - Vince Dooley's 1980 national championship team was the most compelling after a perfect 12-0 record, including a 17-10 victory over Notre Dame in the Sugar Bowl. Freshman sensation Herschel Walker helped the Bulldogs ascend the polls after being virtually unranked before to the season.

Georgia had moved up to number two after defeating South Carolina, 13-10, in a battle of top 10 teams in the season's eighth game. The next week, it appeared Georgia's run was over when Florida led the 'Dogs, 21-20, with 90 seconds to play and UGA set for a final possession on its own seven yard line. But quarterback Buck Belue, on third down and 10, hit receiver Lindsay Scott on a 93-yard TD pass with 1:04 to play to lift the 'Dogs to a 26-21 victory. The next day, Georgia was elevated to number one in the polls.

After victories over Auburn and Georgia Tech in the final two regular season games, Georgia met perhaps the most storied program in college football history—Notre Dame—in the Sugar Bowl. Led by Walker's two touchdowns, Georgia defeated the Irish, 17-10, to lay claim to its undisputed national crown. Virtually every major poll declared the Bulldogs No. 1 after a season in which Georgia was the only undefeated, untied Division I-A team in the country.

1942 - In 1942, James Wallace Butts of Milledgeville, Ga., molded what was regarded as the Bulldogs' most powerful team in the first fifty years of Georgia football. Georgia was led by All-Americans Frank Sinkwich, who would win the Heisman Trophy following the season, and end George Poschner along with a young back named Charley Trippi who would years later be called perhaps the greatest all-around athlete ever to play for the Bulldogs.

Georgia knocked off nine consecutive opponents and ranked No. 1 in the nation. But Auburn ambushed the 'Dogs in Columbus, 27-13. Georgia, however, came back to win a Rose Bowl bid by blanking previously unbeaten Georgia Tech in Athens, 34-0, in the regular season finale. Georgia then edged U.C.L.A., 9-0, in the Rose Bowl to finish the season 11-1. In the final polls, Georgia was declared national champion in six polls recognized by the NCAA—DeVold, Houlgate, Litkenhous, Williamson, Poling, and Berryman.

The other three....

1927 - Georgia's famous "dream and wonder team" of Coach George "Kid" Woodruff won its first nine games, including the Bulldogs' first win ever over Yale, a college football power of the 1920's, in New Haven, Conn. It ranked No. 1 in the nation with one regular season game remaining. However, Georgia Tech spoiled the perfect season by upsetting the 'Dogs in the rain, 12-0, in Atlanta. But the '27 'Dogs were still voted number one in two final recognized polls — Boand and Poling. This team marked the culmination of five year's work by Woodruff who had brought in several Knute Rockne proteges to install the Notre Dame box formation: line coach Harry Mehre; Jim Crowley, one of the four horsemen; and Frank Thomas. All later became great head coaches (Mehre at Georgia and Ole Miss, Crowley at Fordham, and Thomas at Alabama).

1946 - The 1942 juggernaut was dismantled by the events of World War II. But Charley Trippi and several of his Rose Bowl teammates returned to school in 1946 and led Georgia to a perfect 10-0 regular season and 20-10 victory over North Carolina in the Sugar Bowl. But despite Georgia's perfect record, Notre Dame was declared national champion by the majority of the polls; however, the Bulldogs were voted No. 1 in the final Williamson poll.

1968 - In 1968, another of Vince Dooley's teams went through the regular season undefeated, but tied twice, finishing 8-0-2 and earning an invitation to the Sugar Bowl. Despite suffering a 16-2 loss in the bowl game to Arkansas, Georgia was still voted No. 1 in the Litkenhous poll.

Some that came close....

Several other Georgia teams have flirted with a national title. Following the 1980 national championship season, Georgia had a magnificent run that produced three straight teams that had a shot at winning the national title—1981, '82, and '83. Two of Mark Richt's teams also came close.

1981 - Despite an early season loss to Clemson, 13-3, in which the 'Dogs had nine turnovers, Georgia fought its way back to a No. 2 national ranking by winning the final eight regular season games. But a loss to Pitt in the Sugar Bowl in the final 20 seasons extinguished any chance at a second consecutive national title.

1982 - Led by Heisman Trophy winner Herschel Walker, Georgia marched through the 11-game regular season undefeated and untied and was ranked No. 1 heading into the bowl games. But second-ranked Penn State upended the Bulldogs, 27-23, in the Sugar Bowl to claim the national crown.

1983 - One of Georgia's favorite teams, the defensive-minded Bulldogs headed into the bowl games with a 9-1-1 record but faced undefeated, untied, and second-ranked Texas in the Cotton Bowl classic at Dallas. Despite being heavy underdogs, Georgia's defense stymied the Longhorns and the opportunistic offense scored a touchdown with 3:22 to play to give the 'Dogs a 10-9 upset. The nation's top-ranked team also lost that day but the final polls ranked Georgia fourth.

2002 - Head coach Mark Richt's second team won more games than any team in UGA history--13--and won Georgia's first SEC championship in 20 years. Only a 7-point loss to Florida in Jacksonville kept the Dogs out of a shot at the national championship game. The 13-1 Bulldogs, after defeating FSU in the Nokia Sugar Bowl, still finished the season ranked No. 3 in all major polls.

2007 - Although not selected for the national championship game, the 'Dawgs finished 11-2 with a No. 2 final national ranking.

And some others that had a shot....

1976 - The SEC champion 'Dogs finished 10-1 in the regular season and went into the bowl games ranked fourth but had a shot by playing No. 1 Pitt in the Sugar Bowl. But the Panthers, led by Heisman Trophy winner Tony Dorsett, defeated Georgia, 27-3, to claim the national crown.

1971 - Sophomore quarterback Andy Johnson led Georgia to nine straight victories before undefeated Auburn ended the 'Dogs hopes of a national title with a 35-20 victory in Athens. Despite the loss, Georgia still finished 11-1 by beating Georgia Tech in the final regular season game and defeating North Carolina in the Gator Bowl.

1966 - Georgia soundly defeated SMU in the Cotton Bowl but could not overcome a single regular season defeat to Miami by a single point as the 'Dogs finished the season 10-1 and ranked No. 4.

The Arch

The historic Arch which sits on the edge of North campus was installed in 1864. For years, freshmen were forbidden to walk under the Arch. Violators risked punishment from upper classmen. Once rigidly enforced, the tradition of hazing of freshmen became passe'. However, many freshmen, learning of the tradition during orientation or from other sources, still choose to honor the century-old tradition.

The "G"

In 1963 after becoming the Bulldogs' Head Football Coach, Vince Dooley redesigned the football uniform choosing a red helmet with a black "G" on a white background as the dominate feature of the new uniform for the 1964 season.

He discussed with his staff that a forward-looking "G" would be an appropriate emblem for the helmet of the Georgia team. Dooley had just hired John Donaldson, former Georgia player from 1945 to 1948, as backfield coach. John was keen on the idea of a new image and volunteered his wife, Anne, who had a BFA in commercial art when UGA to design a logo for the new Georgia helmet with the general specifications Dooley had outlined. Dooley accepted Anne's original "G" which fit his vision for a forward look to Georgia's new emblem.

Since the Georgia "G" though different in design and color was similar to Green Bay's "G", Coach Dooley thought it best to clear the use of Georgia's new emblem with the NFL team. Athletic Director Joel Eaves called for permission which was granted. However, since its inception in 1961, the Green Bay "G" has been redesigned several times and now looks like Georgia's original 1964 "G." Georgia is proud that the Packers apparently liked the special nuances of the Bulldogs' forward-looking "G."

Georgia's oval "G", eventually replacing Georgia's old block "G" as the official UGA symbol, has stood the test of time. It made its first appearance in the opening game in 1964 and was an immediate hit with the Georgia fans, especially after Dooley's first three teams were so successful—highlighted by the 1966 SEC Championship.

"Silver Britches"

Silver Britches were an innovation of Coach Wally Butts, who took over as head coach in 1939. The handsome pants, complimented by a bright red jersey, made for a striking uniform. Through the years, fans referred to the Bulldogs' silver britches in their chants and on banners, but the phrase really caught on in the early fifties with a cheer, banners, and colorful vests that proclaimed "Go, You Silver Britches." Coach Vince Dooley re-designed the uniform when he came in 1964 and used white pants; however, he re-instituted the silver britches in 1980 just prior to what turned out to be Georgia's national championship season.



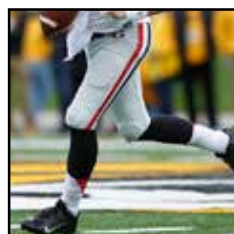

The Chapel Bell

The ringing of the chapel bell after a Georgia victory is a tradition that continues even though freshmen are no longer ordered to do the chore. In the 1890's, the playing field was located only yards from the Chapel and first-year students were compelled to ring the bell until midnight in celebration of a Bulldog victory. Today students, alumni, and townspeople still rush to the Chapel to ring the bell after a gridiron victory.

"Glory, Glory"

Among the University's oldest and most lasting traditions is the school fight song, "Glory, Glory" which is sung to the tune of "The Battle Hymn of the Republic." It was sung at games as early as the 1890's, but arranged in its present form by Georgia's immortal musician-composer Hugh Hodgson in 1915. There have been many Bulldog songs through the years and at least two collections dating back to 1909 have been published, but none have enjoyed more acceptance than "Glory, Glory."

"How 'Bout Them Dogs"

This is a slogan of recent vintage, but one that has become a battle cry of Bulldog fans probably because of its obvious grammatical faux pas. It first surfaced during the mid to late 1970's especially during the 1978 season when the Bulldogs posted several remarkable, come-from-behind victories. It gained national attention and exposure when Georgia won the national championship in 1980. A major wire-service used the phrase in its story of Georgia's victory over Notre Dame and many newspapers picked it up in glaring headlines across the country proclaiming "How 'Bout Them Dogs!"

"Bulldogs"

Many oldtimers say Georgia acquired the nickname, "Bulldogs," because of the strong ties with Yale whose nickname is "Bulldogs." Georgia's first president, Abraham Baldwin, was a Yale man and the early buildings on campus were designed from blueprints of the same buildings at Yale. However, the first references to the nickname "Bulldogs" actually came in the 1910's (1911-20) by Atlanta newspaper writers covering both football and baseball games. Although used occasionally during the previous decade, the nickname began to be consistently used around 1920.

On Nov. 3, 1920, Morgan Blake of the Atlanta Journal wrote about school nicknames and said "The Georgia Bulldogs would sound good because there is a certain dignity about a bulldog, as well as ferocity." After a 0-0 tie with Virginia in Charlottesville on Nov. 6, 1920, Atlanta Constitution writer Cliff Wheatley used the name "Bulldogs" in his story five times. Gene Hinton also used the term "Bulldogs." The nickname seemed to be off and running.

"Between The Hedges"

A reference to Sanford Stadium that dates to the early 1930's. The famous Chinese privet hedges that surround Sanford's playing field were only one foot high when the stadium was dedicated in 1929 and were protected by a wooden fence. It was natural for a clever sports writer, referring to an upcoming home game, to observe "that the Bulldogs will have their opponent 'between the hedges.'" At least one old-timer says the phrase was first coined by the legendary Atlanta sportswriter Grantland Rice.

"Lone Trumpeter"

Seven minutes before kickoff in Sanford Stadium, the Bulldog Nation directs its attention to a lone trumpeter standing in the upper deck of the southwest corner of the stadium. The soloist is recognized and begins to play the first 14 notes of "The Battle Hymn of the Republic." The Battle Hymn solo was originally composed in 1987 as a student project by Jeff Simmons and became a part of the pre-game traditions in 2000. Each year, 25-30 members of the Redcoat Band audition for one of the 4-5 soloist positions.



Although the University of Georgia is now known as the home of Uga, the pure white English bulldog, several mascots led the Red and Black before Frank W. Seiler provided the current lineage beginning in 1956.

The Goat, Feb. 22, 1892

Georgia's mascot for its first football game against Auburn, February 22, 1892 in Atlanta, Ga., was a goat. Old newspaper clippings indicate that the goat wore a black coat with red U.G. letters on each side. He also had on a hat with ribbons all down his high horns, and the Auburn fans yelled throughout the game "shoot the billy-goat."

Trilby, 1894

In 1894, Georgia's mascot was a solid white female bull terrier owned by a student, Charles H. Black, Sr., of Atlanta. Trilby, named after a novel by George Du Maurier, served as the campus pet and mascot for Chi Phi fraternity.

Disputing stories speculate the origin of the Bulldog nickname, and the story of Trilby provides yet another opinion: "...every day Trilby took herself down to old Herty field with her master for football practice. She ran signals with the best of them and became an accustomed figure on the athletic field...One morning, Trilby failed to appear for her breakfast and after a frantic search she was finally discovered proudly washing the faces of her newborn family, 13 white puppies...Late one dusky fall afternoon, Trilby appeared for a grid workout and scampering after her came her 13 children, darting through players' legs, barking and pace. 'Well,' suggested one of the players, 'Trilby has brought us a name, Bulldogs.' ...Every time a game was played on Herty Field, the boys would floss Trilby and her 13 offerings up with red and black ribbons, and so attired they have gone down in history as perhaps the first 'sponsors' in southern football." —Ruth Stanton Cogill (Atlanta newspaper)

"After the rein of Trilby and her family, chaos developed in the mascot department at the university. Many games had several, depending on which alumnus got his dog to the game first." —AJC, Nov. 18, 1962

1940s



Mr. Angel

Mr. Angel, 1944-46

Mr. Angel, a brindle and white colored English Bulldog owned by Eastman, Ga., physician, Warren Coleman, filled a void during some of the war years. There was no mascot roaming the sidelines and Coleman took Mr. Angel to games and stood with him on the sidelines. His picture on the field and with the Georgia cheerleaders appears in the 1945 and '46 UGA annual, the Pandora.

Butch, 1947-50

Butch was a brindled English bulldog owned by Mabry Smith of Warner Robins, Ga. He was spotted by students who were attending the 1946 Georgia-Georgia Tech game in Athens, and the canine appeared to be suited for the mascot position. Smith agreed to loan Butch to the University during the football season along with a female puppy named Tuffy. The female died of a heart attack following the Georgia-Kentucky game in 1948, but Butch continued to serve. Spending the off-season at Smith's home in Warner Robins, Butch was tragically shot in the summer of 1951 by a policeman after the dog escaped from his pen and was found roaming the streets. Butch is buried behind Smith's business along Watson Boulevard.

In 2004 plans for a marker honoring Butch in his hometown were put into motion by longtime Warner Robins resident Guy Fussell.

1950s



Mike

Mike, 1951-55

Butch was succeeded by Mike, another brindled English bulldog, owned by C. L. Fain. Mike lived in the field house on campus and died of natural canine causes in 1955. As his master's thesis, Gene Owens of Fort Worth, Texas, cast the bronze statue of Mike which is located at the entrance of Memorial Hall.

1956 - Uga Takes the Field

In the last 100 years of intercollegiate football, Georgia's UGA has established himself as the nation's most well-known mascot. The line of pure white English bulldogs, which epitomizes everything Georgia, has been owned by the Frank W. "Sonny" Seiler family of Savannah, Ga., since Uga I first graced the campus in 1956.

Through the years, Uga has been defined by his spiked collar, a symbol of the position which he holds. He was given his name, an abbreviation for the university, by William Young of Columbus, a law school classmate of Seiler. Each of the Uga mascots is awarded a varsity letter in the form of a plaque, identical to those presented to all Bulldog athletes who letter in their respective sports.

As determined and published by the *Pittsburgh Press*, the University of Georgia is the only major college that actually buries its mascots within the confines of the stadium. Ugas I, II, III, IV, V, VI, VII and VIII are buried in marble vaults near the main gate in the embankment of the South stands. Epitaphs to the dogs are inscribed in bronze, and before each home game, flowers are placed on their graves. The memorial plot attracts hundreds of fans and visitors each year.

For the past 20 years, UGA's jerseys have been custom-made at the beginning of each season from the same material used for the players' jerseys. Old jerseys are destroyed.

UGA's on-field home is a permanent air conditioned doghouse located next to the cheerleader's platform, providing comfort in the heat of August and September. The custom-made doghouse is a gift from the Bahamian Bulldog Club of Nassau, Bahamas, through the courtesy of Fred Hazlewood.



1960s

Uga I, 1956-66 — “Hood’s Ole Dan”
Record: 53-48-6



The current Uga line of solid white English bulldogs began with Uga I, Hood’s Ole Dan, born Dec. 2, 1955, in Columbus. Uga I was given to Cecelia Seiler by a friend, Frank Heard of Columbus and appeared in his first game in the 1956 home opener. As recalled by Sonny Seiler, “...his original red jerseys were made by Cecelia. It was necessary to take up children’s t-shirts to fit the dog in the right places. There is no telling how many of these jerseys he wore out. During the early games in Athens, especially the hot ones before he had a dog house, the large green hedges that surround Sanford Stadium afforded welcomed shade in the heat of battle. Unfortunately, the hedges constantly tore these jerseys and new ones had to be made.” **Epitaph: Damn Good Dog**

Uga II, 1966-72 — “Ole Dan’s Uga”
Record: 42-16-3



Uga I was succeeded by his son, Ole Dan’s Uga at an impressive pregame ceremony at Homecoming, 1966. With the Georgia Redcoat Band lining the field, Uga II was led to the center of the field by Charles Seiler, son of Sonny and Cecelia. The student body erupted in a cheer that was picked up by the entire stadium, “Damn Good Dog!” Uga II had an impressive reign as Georgia participated in five bowl games and won two SEC championships. **Epitaph: Not Bad for A Dog**

Uga III, 1972-80 — “Seiler’s Uga Three”
Record: 71-32-2



Born Oct. 9, 1972, Seiler’s Uga III was present for Georgia football’s finest moment as Herschel Walker took the Bulldogs to the 1980 national championship. He led Georgia to six bowl games in nine years and closed out his career in ultimate fashion winning the 1980 NCAA championship. Uga III retired on the 100th football game of his career, marking the season-opener of the 1981 season. He died just weeks later. **Epitaph: How ‘Bout This Dawg**

Uga IV, 1981-89 — “Seiler’s Uga Four”
Record: 77-27-4



Uga IV was perhaps the most active of all the Georgia mascots, standing as the only one to attend a bowl game every year of his service (1981-89). He took over for Uga III in the 1981 season opener and over the next nine seasons, led Georgia to a record of 77-27-4. The highlight of his career was his personal appearance at the Heisman Trophy Banquet with Herschel Walker in New York on December 9, 1982. Uga IV was escorted through the banquet hall by the president of the Downtown Athletic Club, and was earlier photographed with Herschel by photographers from across the country. The proud bulldog donned his game jersey for the outing and added the formal touch of a collar and black tie. Uga IV was the first mascot invited to the Heisman Banquet. Declared “Dog of the Decade” by Vince Dooley in 1991, Uga IV was posthumously awarded the highest honor available to University of Georgia mascots — the Georgia varsity letter. **Epitaph: The Dog of the Decade**

1980s

Otto, 1986 — “The Substitute”
Record: 3-1



Although Otto was not pure white like his father, he was called upon to fill in for his younger brother, Uga IV, who injured ligaments in his left hind knee when jumping off a hotel bed before the Vanderbilt contest. In four games during the 1986 season, Otto led the team to a 3-1 record and also co-mascotted (along with Uga IV), a victory over in-state rival Georgia Tech. After winning his first two games, fans cheered, “2-and-0 with Otto!” Dooley, serving as head coach during Otto’s brief tenure, favored the substitute the most. “I have always had a great affection for those who came off the bench and performed, and he did that and had a great time,” Dooley said. Otto is buried in the Seiler’s backyard.

1990s

Uga V, 1990-99 — “Uga IV’s Magillicuddy II”
Record: 65-39-1



In the first game of 1990, Uga V officially began his reign as the Georgia mascot taking over from his father Uga IV, who passed away at his home in Savannah on Feb. 26, 1990. Uga V was the last pup sired by Uga IV and was born on March 6, 1990. Named in honor of one of the greatest Bulldogs, Dan Magill, former Assistant Athletic Director for Public Relations and longtime tennis coach and sports information director. Surprisingly, the Seiler family became aware that Uga IV’s mate was expecting only 10 days before the litter was due. This notice came a week after Uga IV had passed away at his home in Savannah from kidney failure. There were only three pups in the litter and the last one born on March 6 was the only solid white male. Uga V had been perhaps the most well known of all the Bulldog mascots, highlighted by his appearance on the cover of the April 28, 1997, *Sports Illustrated* which declared him the nation’s best college mascot. Rocketing to stardom, he also appeared in Clint Eastwood’s “Midnight In The Garden

Of Good And Evil” — filmed in his hometown of Savannah, Ga. Uga V also presided over Georgia’s most successful collective sporting effort in department history as the Bulldogs claimed four NCAA team titles during the 1998-99 season — women’s swimming and diving, women’s gymnastics, men’s tennis and men’s golf — and placed second in the Directors’ Cup race. He died on Nov. 22, 1999, just over two months after his retirement. **Epitaph: “Nation’s Best College Mascot” — Sports Illustrated**

Uga VI, 1999-2008 - “Uga V’s Whatchagot Loran”

Record: 87-27

In 2007, Uga VI became the winningest mascot in school history and owned a record of 87-27. The fall of 2008 would have been his 10th season after Uga VI reigned over more games than any other mascot with 114. He died on June 27, 2008. In his last game, the Bulldogs defeated Hawai’i 41-10 in the Allstate Sugar Bowl in New Orleans on Jan. 1, 2008. Georgia finished the season ranked second in the AP poll.

The pregame passing of the bone ceremony from Uga V to his heftier and friskier son, Whatchagot Loran, took place at the 1999 Georgia-South Carolina contest. Only a year old at his coronation, Uga VI stands as the biggest of all the Uga mascots weighing in at 65 pounds — 20 pounds heavier than his father.

His first season climaxed in a magnificent come from behind victory over Purdue at the Outback Bowl in Tampa. The comeback from a 25-point deficit marked an unprecedented feat in Georgia annals and the largest comeback in collegiate bowl history.

The 2000 season ended in Hawaii, but due to the distance and a quarantine rule, Uga VI missed the O’ahu Bowl, marking the first time the Georgia mascot had missed the postseason game since the 1969 Sun Bowl.

Alongside first-year head coach Mark Richt, Uga VI saw his third consecutive 8-4 season, which included a 26-24 win at then-No. 6 Tennessee for the Bulldogs’ first win in Knoxville since 1980.

Uga VI and Georgia experienced their best season in two decades as the 2002 Bulldogs won a record 13 games (to only one loss), and topped Arkansas to win the program’s first league title since 1982. And Uga VI roamed the sidelines as the Bulldogs defeated Florida State in the 2003 Nokia Sugar Bowl, 26-13.

The 2006 season marked the 50th anniversary of the Uga legacy of mascots at UGA. Georgia returned to Atlanta, Ga. to defeat Virginia Tech in the Chick-fil-A Bowl on December 30, 2006 to end the season with a 9-4 record.

In 2007, Uga VI passed Uga IV (77-27-4) for the most wins of any bulldog in school history.

Epitaph: A Big Dog For A Big Job, And He Handled It Well

Uga VII, 2008-2009 - “Loran’s Best”

Record: 16-7

The seventh in the Uga line of Georgia mascots was introduced to the Georgia people on Aug. 30, 2008, during pre-game ceremonies of the Bulldogs’ season opener against Georgia Southern.

“Loran’s Best” officially became “Uga VII,” when he was introduced for the first time to the Sanford Stadium crowd prior to kickoff of the Georgia vs. Georgia Southern game. He was escorted onto the field by members of the Frank W. “Sonny” Seiler family of Savannah who have owned the continuous line of mascots since Uga I took up the mantle in 1956.

Uga VII passed away unexpectedly on Nov. 19 of heart-related causes. It was the Thursday before the final home game of the 2009 season and the Bulldogs did not have a live mascot at the game. Instead, a wreath was placed on UGA VII’s doghouse, and the players wore a special UGA VII decal on their helmets to remember him. “Russ,” the five-year-old half brother of Uga VII, served as the Bulldog mascot for the Georgia Tech game in Atlanta and helped his squad to a 30-24 win. He was the first substitute mascot since “Otto” in 1986. “Russ” also served as the mascot in the 2009 bowl game. **Epitaph: Gone Too Soon**

Uga VIII, 2010 - “Big Bad Bruce”

Record: 4-2

Born Sept. 12, 2009 in Savannah, Ga., Uga VIII is the grandson of Uga VI. He carries on the tradition of more than 60 years of all-white bulldogs bred by Frank “Sonny” Seiler and family.

Uga VIII was named in honor of Dr. Bruce Hollett from the University’s School of Veterinary Medicine. Dr. Hollett has been a long time caregiver for the famed line of English bulldogs. UGA VIII served six games in the 2010 season before he became ill and missed the AutoZone Liberty Bowl. He passed away with lymphoma on February 4, 2011. **Epitaph: He Never Had A Chance**

Uga IX, 2012-Present - aka “Russ,” 2009-2012 Record: 16-9

Total Current Record: 44-19

Uga IX, formerly “Russ,” the half-brother of Uga VII, served as an interim Bulldog mascot for a total of 25 games. He worked nine games during the 2009 and 2010 seasons after Uga VII and VIII passed away. He roamed the sidelines at all 14 games during the 2011 season. He then served for two wins at the beginning of the 2012 season before being promoted as Uga IX prior to the Florida Atlantic game on Sept. 15, 2012. His time as mascot has included the 2011 and 2012 SEC Eastern Division championships, three road wins at Georgia Tech and a victory over Texas A&M in the 2009 Independence Bowl in Shreveport, La. He completed 2012 with a 12-2 record and a win over Nebraska in the Capital One Bowl. In 2013, he finished with an 8-5 record before the Bulldogs completed the 2014 season with a 10-3 mark, capped by a victory over 20th-ranked Louisville in the Belk Bowl.

Southeastern Conference

The Southeastern Conference, now into its 83rd storied year of athletic achievements and academic excellence, has built perhaps the greatest tradition of intercollegiate competition of any league in the country since its inception in 1933.

Since its formation, the SEC achieved both stature and stability by designating governing/voting power to the presidents of the member institutions. They have determined the policies of the conference and, through the years, this involvement has been the principal source of strength in the evolution of the SEC. Throughout its history, the SEC has provided leadership on the vital issues facing intercollegiate competition. In 1993, the member institutions adopted The Principles of Gender Equity. Committed to increasing the quantity and quality of women's athletic opportunities, each school will provide at least two more women's intercollegiate programs than the number of men's.

On July 1, 2012, the conference expanded to 14 teams, welcoming Missouri and Texas A&M. It was the first expansion in the SEC since 1992 when Arkansas and South Carolina came into the SEC. The four schools join charter members Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, LSU, Ole Miss, Mississippi State, Tennessee and Vanderbilt to form the current membership. The addition of Arkansas and South Carolina allowed for the SEC to split into divisional play and have the nation's first-ever Division I football conference championship game in 1992.

SEC schools began athletic competition with one another almost 100 years ago as members of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association. Seven institutions (Alabama, Auburn, Georgia, Georgia Tech, North Carolina, Sewanee and Vanderbilt) attended the SIAA organizational meeting of faculty representatives, called by Dr. William L. Dudley of Vanderbilt, in Atlanta on Dec. 22, 1894.

The first football game in the Southeast was played April 9, 1880, on the ground now called Old Stoll Field at the University of Kentucky. Kentucky A & M (now UK) organized a team and in November 1881, played Transylvania College in a three-game series. By 1895, 11 current SEC members were playing football.

The administration of women's athletics officially came under the auspices of the conference office on Sept. 1, 1984. The SEC currently regulates nine men's sports and 12 women's sports: Men - baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, swimming, tennis and track (indoor and outdoor); Women - basketball, cross country, equestrian, golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis, track (indoor and outdoor) and volleyball.

Since 1990, the SEC has won 160 national team championships for an average of more than six per year. In 2013-14, ten SEC schools placed in the top 40 of the NACDA Director's Cup rankings.

Redcoat Band



The University of Georgia Redcoat Band is considered by many to be the "heart" of the Bulldog Spirit. The 440-member component of the Hugh Hodgson School of Music was the first SEC band to receive the prestigious Sudler Trophy for long-term musical and visual excellence in 2000. Dr. Michael C. Robinson is the Director of Athletic Bands and the Director of the

11th edition of the Redcoat Band. Other directors include Director of Bands Dr. Cynthia Johnston-Turner, Associate Director of Bands Jaclyn Hartenberger, and Assistant Directors of Bands Brett Bawcum and Rob Akridge.

An administrative staff is vital to the operation of the Redcoat Band. UGA alumnus Tom Wallace prepares the band's musical arrangements while alumnus John Cypert oversees the scoring and instruction for the UGA Drumline. The auxiliary units of the band (Georgettes, Majorettes, Flagline, and Feature Twirler) are under the leadership of Coordinators Ashley Clark and Cassie Moates. Rebecca Yarbrough, Redcoat Band Administrative Assistant, oversees all office matters. The Properties Crew Chiefs, Matt Eady and Anna Schmidt, are responsible for the band's logistical concerns. Kappa Kappa Psi, a band service fraternity, undertakes many projects serving the entire band program.

The talented students of the Redcoat Band are the key to the organization's success. Being a Redcoat requires an academic background of significant accomplishment and a great deal of talent and preparation in one's area of performance specialty. Redcoats commit themselves to 6 to 8 hours of rehearsal per academic week while maintaining some of the highest grade-point averages at UGA. Though some 25% of its members are music majors, most are pursuing degrees from many of the other academic disciplines at the university. The uniquely diverse student population that makes up the Redcoat Band contributes to an organization of which Georgia supporters can be justifiably proud. Its colorful presence, limitless school spirit, and exciting music and motion are a part of what makes college football so special to Bulldog fans.

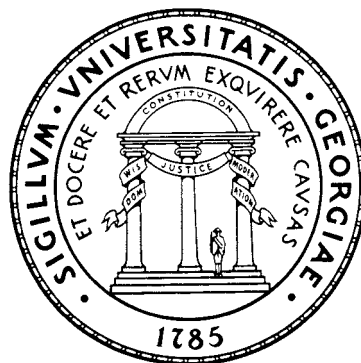

2015 GEORGIA BULLDOGS

Jere W. Morehead became the University of Georgia’s 22nd President on July 1, 2013. Prior to becoming President, he served UGA in many key administrative roles, including Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost, Vice President for Instruction, and Associate Provost and Director of the Honors Program.

President Morehead is the Meigs Professor of Legal Studies in the Terry College of Business, where he has held a faculty appointment since 1986. He is a co-author of several books and book chapters, including *The Legal and Regulatory Environment of Business*, and he has published scholarly articles on legal topics ranging from export controls to jury selection. He has served as editor-in-chief of the *American Business Law Journal* and previously held several other editorial board positions with the *ABLJ*.

Athens native and University of Georgia graduate Greg McGarity was named Director of Athletics at UGA on August 13, 2010, after serving 18 years in the athletic department at the University of Florida.

Since that time, McGarity has injected a program of imagination and innovation into the Georgia Athletic Association with emphasis on exploring

new ideas and initiatives designed to move the organization forward in all areas of competition, academics, and service.

Among the many initiatives are a nutrition program for all sports, greater emphasis on customer service as well as community service, scoreboard upgrades enhancing the in-game experience for guests and patrons in all sports, and development of leadership programs fostering staff development. In addition, he has encouraged the experimentation of new ideas such as moving volleyball competition to Stegeman Coliseum and helping bring a sold-out concert (Jason Aldean, 65,000) to Sanford Stadium for the first time in stadium history. He was also instrumental in development and implementation, along with Nike, of a new brand identity program which brings consistency in use of colors, logos, lettering and numerals to Georgia sports teams.

McGarity oversees a 21-sport athletics program supported by a budget of \$99 million. Since he became Director of Athletics, UGA teams have won national championships in women's swimming and diving (2013-14) and equestrian (2014) and SEC championships in men's tennis (2011, '13, '14, and '15), women's tennis (2013), women's tennis SEC Tournament ('14), women's swimming and diving (2011, '12, '13, '14, and '15), men's tennis SEC Tournament (2012 and '13), and two SEC eastern division titles in football (2011 and 2012). During that time 18 different Georgia teams have been ranked in the nation's top 20 and 10 in the top ten. Georgia's standing in the Learfield Director's Cup, which annually measures athletic teams success in NCAA championships, has improved from 20th in 2011 to 10th in 2013 and is consistently in the top 20.

McGarity has also been a standard bearer for academic achievement. Since his arrival, Georgia student-athletes have been the recipients of eight NCAA Post Graduate Scholarships, 21 CoSIDA Academic All-American awards, three NCAA Top Ten honors, three SEC Boyd McWhorter SEC Scholar-Athletes of the Year, and two SEC Brad Davis Awards.

In addition, he has been at the forefront of facility expansion and renovation. Recently completed are a \$12 million Foley Field (baseball) facility renovation, and new scoreboards/video boards at baseball, softball and soccer. New sound systems in Stegeman Coliseum and Sanford Stadium have also been installed to improve the fan experience, as well as improved rest rooms and concessions stands. In addition, a new Indoor Athletic Facility is scheduled to be constructed adjacent to the Butts-Mehre Building, which will provide a facility for all sports to use.

McGarity was appointed as the athletic director's representative to the SEC Executive Committee in 2013. He served on the NCAA Division I Football Issues Committee from 2012-14. McGarity is also currently serving on the NCAA National Letter of Intent Football Recruiting Group, SEC Fan Experience Working Group, and the U.S. Tennis Association Athletic Director's Advisory Group.

McGarity was a letterman on the 1973 Bulldog tennis team and following

graduation began his professional career at UGA. After serving as a student assistant from 1973-77, he held positions as assistant sports information director and head women's tennis coach (1977-81), administrative assistant (1982-88), and assistant athletic director for facilities and event management (1988-92).

McGarity is married to the former Sheryl Holland, who graduated from UGA in 1976 with a Bachelor of Science degree in education. They have one son, Alex, a graduate of the University of Florida and the University of Georgia.
