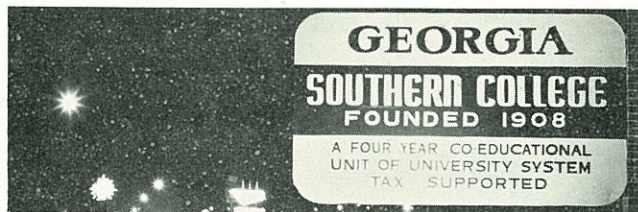
Memo to Press, Radio and Television

GEORGIA SOUTHERN COLLEGE

Statesboro, Ga.

Georgia Southern College, a co-educational institution and a member of the University System of Georgia, is located in Statesboro, Georgia on Highway 301. The college offers its students academic programs on the undergraduate and graduate level and activities that provide an atmosphere that is truly mid-twentieth century: lively and logical.

The Georgia Southern student body comes basically from Georgia, but there is good representation from twenty-three other states and fifteen foreign countries. Over 200 students are from Florida and over 100 from South Carolina.

Student life at Georgia Southern is touched pleasantly with good South Georgia weather and a location that is nestled midst some of the best looking pine trees found in this part of the state. Reactions following a visit to Georgia Southern are varied and nice. But one that has remained first and foremost is "It's got one of the loveliest campuses I've ever seen."

Georgia Southern is pleased with its physical appearance and setting. That is a very important part of a successful campus.

It too is pleased with the many active ideas that take place here. The students feel the challenge of change here in Statesboro. That's what higher education is all about. Georgia Southern College has moved into a top-ranking position in Georgia as a place to be when it comes to higher education. Right now it ranks as a residential college in the University System of Georgia, out of twenty-six units.

The College began its sixty-one year history in 1908 as the First District Agricultural and Mechanical School. Fourteen years later in 1923 it became the Georgia Normal School and in 1929 was named South Georgia Teachers College.

In 1939 it was re-named Georgia Teachers College and for the next twenty years achieved a record and a reputation as one of the outstanding teacher training institutions in Georgia. In 1959, however, the name changed once more to Georgia Southern College.

J. I. CLEMENTS

Director of Athletics

At the head of Georgia Southern College's booming athletic program is the school's athletic director, J. I. Clements.

During his 22-year tenure at GSC, Clements has led the Eagle baseball squad through 19 seasons with a remarkable 309-192 won-lost record and brought the school into national prominence. His teams have reached the NAIA College World Series four times and were national champions in 1962. They won second in 1960 and 1968 and third in 1964.

Since his retirement from coaching at the end of the 1968 season, Clements has served as athletic director and business manager for the GSC athletic department. In this capacity he is one of the busiest men connected with sports on the GSC campus. Clements handles all matters pertaining to spectator control and ticket requests for any of the Eagles' athletic matches.

Clements, a native of Ray City, Ga., received his bachelor and masters degree from Eastern Kentucky University. In his days of competition Clements worked under former Southern "Mr. Basketball", J. B. Scarce, as a standout baseball and basketball player at Norman College.

Clements is also well-known over the nation as the NAIA's "Coach of the Year" in 1963 and as a member of the United States Olympic Baseball Committee.

He is married to the former Reba McClure and they have two children, Carroll, 26, and Janna, 22.



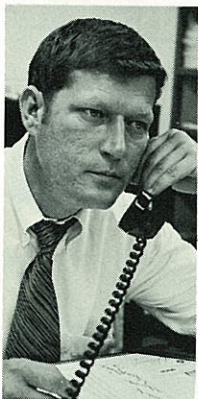
J. E. ROWE

Head Basketball Coach

J. E. Rowe had an illustrious career as an athlete at Georgia Southern College.

J. E. Rowe will have an illustrious career as a coach at Georgia Southern College.

One of the above statements, the first one, has already come true and the second statement is well on its way to becoming fact as the affable Rowe begins his first season as the head basketball coach at GSC. Rowe is taking the reins this year from former pro, Frank Radovich, after serving three years as his assistant and chief recruiter.

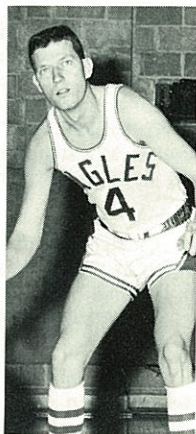


Although Rowe lists Jacksonville, Fla. as his home, he attended Fitzgerald High School in Fitzgerald, Ga. where he played both basketball and baseball. After graduation, he went to Brewton-Parker College at Mt. Vernon via a basketball-baseball scholarship. While with the Barons Rowe was selected All-State in both sports. Again, Rowe was honored as he came to Georgia Southern College on the dual scholarship and was again All-State in basketball, and first team All-American in baseball.

Rowe graduated from GSC in 1961 and signed a pro contract with the New York Mets and spent a year in the pro ranks with the Mets and the Los Angeles Dodger organization. His first coaching venture was as an assistant basketball coach at Atlanta's Druid Hills High. After one year, he was named head cage coach at Avondale High in Decatur. Rowe coached at Avondale from 1963 until 1967 and carried his teams to the state AAA tournament two of the four years, picking up "Coach of the Year" honors in '64. Several of Rowe's players signed major college scholarships. GSC's 6-2 guard, Steve Buckler, played under Rowe during his high school days.

Rowe's high school coaching record was 81 wins and 29 losses before he returned to his alma mater as an assistant in 1967.

He is married to the former Diane Keene of Claxton, Georgia and has three children; Lisa 6; Barbara 4; and Jay 2.



JERRY FIELDS

Assistant Coach

Jerry Fields, a former graduate assistant with East Tennessee State University, has become the new assistant basketball coach at GSC, filling the place vacated by Rowe.

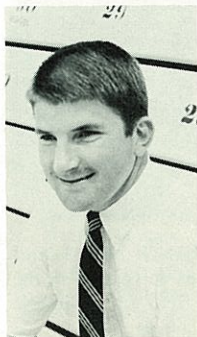
Fields is a native of Saltville, Va. and graduated from ETU in 1965 where he played varsity basketball for one season. He has served as an assistant coach at Vero Beach, Fla. and also at Ft. Pierce. Freshman Basketball Coach



David Patton, 30, is serving his second year at GSC as freshman basketball coach. Patton, a 1962 graduate of GSC, played four years of basketball for the Eagles and was a letterman three times. He was captain of the squad his senior year. After graduation, he served as head basketball coach at Wilkinson County High School, assistant basketball coach at Abraham Baldwin Junior College, head coach at Osborn High in Marietta and before coming here, as assistant basketball coach at DeKalb College. He is married to a former Miss Reflector at Georgia Southern, Becky Reddick, and has a 2 year old son, Jody.

MICKEY COBB

Trainer

Georgia Southern athletes have had a lot to thank Mickey Cobb for since he first took over the position of head trainer in 1965. He has established an excellent medical centre in the Hanner Gym and is always on hand to attend to the athletes' aches and pains.



This will be his fourth term with Georgia Southern.

Prior to taking up his present appointment he was a student trainer here before graduating in 1964.

He did his masters work at Indiana University where he was associated with Hoosier athletic teams. He was also head trainer at De Pauw University.

BOB WILLIAMS

Sports Publicist

Robert M. (Bob) Williams, Jr. is beginning his second year as Georgia Southern's Sports Publicist. Bob is a 1968 graduate of Effingham County High School in Springfield, Ga. (his hometown) and attended the University of Georgia for one year as a journalism major. He transferred to Georgia Southern last year to assume the duties of the Sports Publicist and became an English major with a journalism minor. Now a junior, Bob has five year's experience in the newspaper sports writing field, having previously served as sports editor and later editor, of his hometown weekly, The Springfield HERALD and as a sports staff writer for the Savannah MORNING NEWS and EVENING PRESS. After graduation, Bob plans to remain in the field of journalism, either in the newspaper field or in public relations.



ATHLETICS AT GEORGIA SOUTHERN COLLEGE

Georgia Southern College athletics possess a long and prestigious history with the development of athletics at GSC (formerly Georgia Teachers College) taking place nearly forty years ago.

The Department of Intercollegiate Athletics is now administered through the Department of Physical Education and Recreation. Dr. Douglas Leavitt is chairman of this division housed in the \$1.6 million Hanner Fieldhouse opened in 1969.

After being a feared power for many years in the NAIA (National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics) Georgia Southern's Eagles are now well on their way to becoming a known power in the larger NCAA (National Collegiate Athletic Association) College Division. In their first season in the NCAA, the 1969 basketball Eagles not only landed a berth in the Southeastern Regional Tournament, but were asked to host the event in the newly-opened fieldhouse. The Southerners lost to Stetson in the championship game.

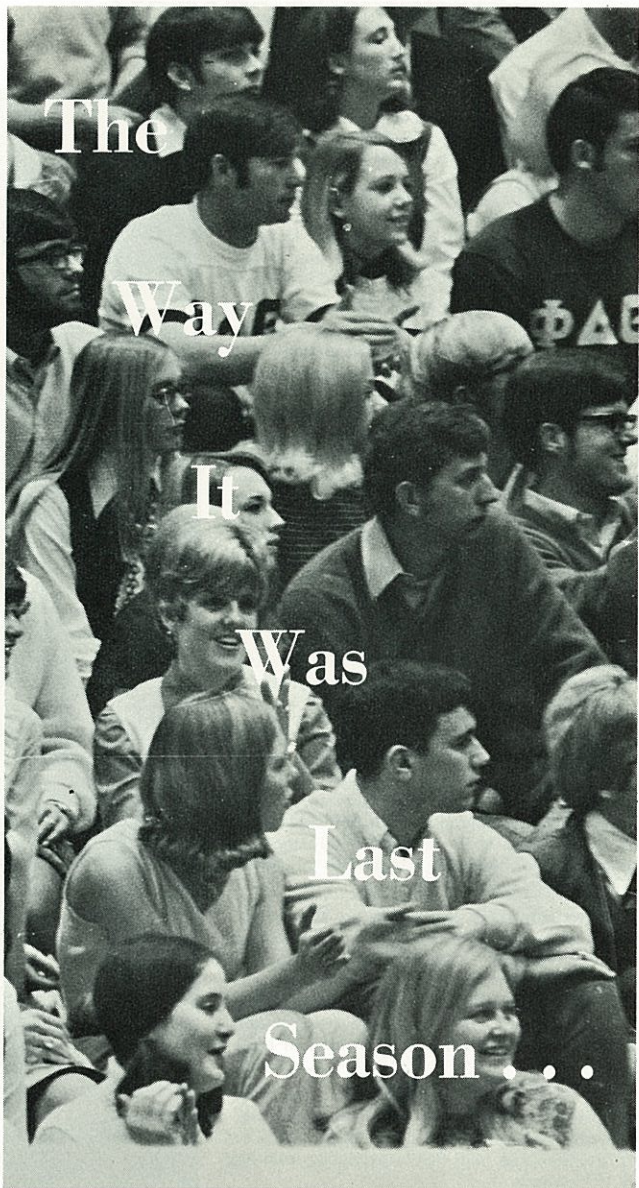
During NAIA affiliation, the baseball Eagles went to the college world series four times, winning once, taking second twice and third once. Over 27 years of baseball competition the Eagles have amassed an overall 451-285 won-lost record under the direction of present athletic director, J. I. Clements and now coach Bill Spieth.

Southern's basketball squad has a record of 548 wins and 266 losses over the 36-year history of the roundball sport here. Two of the college's players have been named All-American, Chester Webb in 1955 and Jimmy Rose in 1965 and 1966. The Eagles now boast of several All-American freshmen who have the capabilities of future college A-A honors.

Golf, tennis and gymnastics are three more sports that have brought honor to Georgia Southern. The GSC linksmen went to the national tourney last year and finished second and the Southern gymnasts have gone to the nationals for the last six years. The Eagles have established themselves as dominant powers in each of these sports.

A cross-country program is also well established here at GSC with the "Harriers" defeating many major colleges in their runs. For the first time, GSC will field a swimming team for the 1970 season.





1969-70 REVIEW

Georgia Southern College will long remember the 1969-70 basketball season.

A lot of things happened, most of them good.

The accomplishments included:

--The Eagles' debut into NCAA competition.

-- A host's role for the NCAA South Atlantic Regional tournament.

-- Championships in the Roanoke and Mercer Invitationals.

-- The official opening of the new \$1.6 million Hanner Fieldhouse.

The Eagles responded with an impressive 17-6 record in their first full season of NCAA competition and moved to the finals of the NCAA South Atlantic Regional tournament before bowing to Stetson, 93-86. A victory would have sent GSC to the national tournament.

With Savannah's Roger Moore leading the way, the Eagles cracked the century circle three times, and they did it when it counted most -- for the old grads.

GSC plastered Columbus College 112-83 in the homecoming game at Hanner Fieldhouse.

It was also a year when Moore, a steady 6-6 center, thrust himself into the NCAA Small College All-America picture. Although he failed to make the 'dream' team, Moore became the 17th Georgia Southern player in history to score more than 1,000 career points. He finished with 1,200 points and ranks 10th among all-time GSC scorers.

Moore also grabbed his 1,000th rebound during the 1969-70 season. He ended his GSC career with 1,048 total rebounds.

Perhaps the most gratifying victories during the 1969-70 season came against Oglethorpe's Stormy Petrels, an arch-rival of the Eagles. GSC shellacked the Petrels three times -- 73-57, 85-51 and 85-67. That, in itself, made the Eagles' year.

Four of the five GSC starters averaged in double figures, led by Moore's 19.4 standard. Senior forward John Norman ended his GSC career with a fine 16.5 norm, forward Philip Sisk hit at a 14.1 clip and guard Steve Buckler tossed in points at a 17.4 rate. The other starter, Savannah's Eugene Brown, averaged 9.5.

Led by the five high-scoring starters, the Eagles averaged a fine 87.1 points for 23 games, and limited an array of tough NCAA Small College foes to 77.7 per contest.

Twice during the year GSC was pushed to double overtime before tasting the sweetness of victory, and twice the Eagles played single overtime games to win.

It was 73-72 in two overtimes against Carson-Newman; 84-74 in a couple of overtimes against Fort Valley State; 83-73 in overtime against Roanoke College and 95-93 in overtime against Georgetown.

GSC lost five of its first eight games, bowing to Louisiana Tech (80-77) in the opener, High Point (93-91), Eastern Kentucky (97-79), East Carolina (88-71) and Old Dominion (99-95).

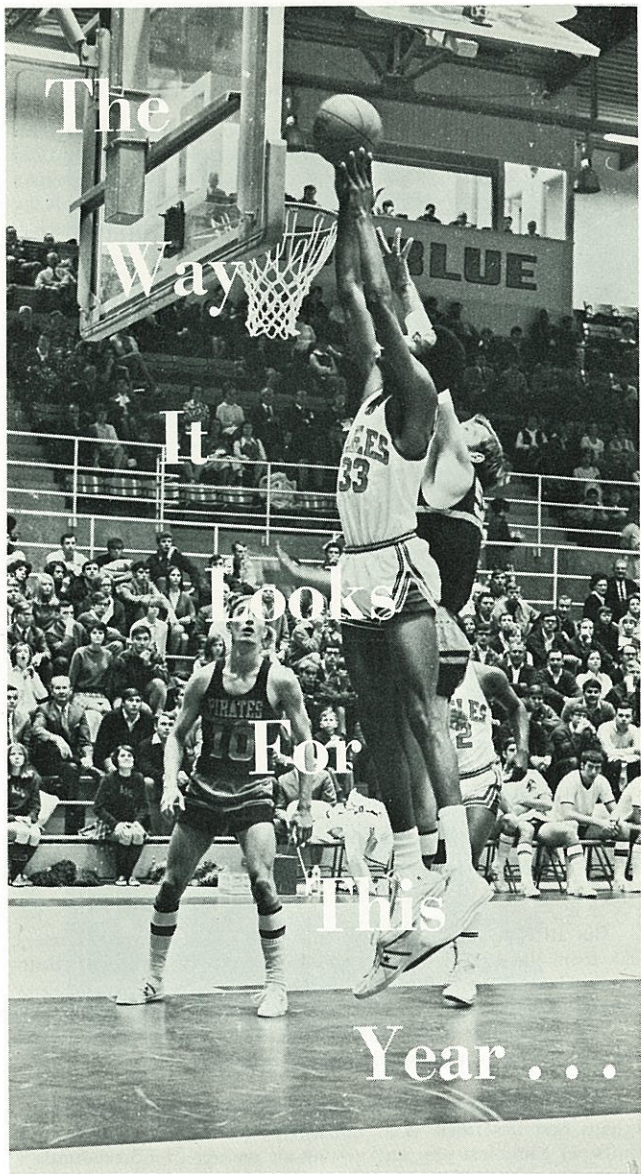
After the five setbacks, coach Frank Radovich's crew "sucked it up," as coaches say, and reeled off 14 consecutive victories before losing to Stetson in the NCAA South Atlantic finals.

Included in the long win streak was a 103-58 conquest of Armstrong State, a new rival from Savannah, and a revenge win over Old Dominion, 86-79.

When the last GSC goal was sunk, it marked the end of a three-year reign for Radovich, who will return to college this year in search of a doctorate degree.

Radovich, who took over for J. B. Scearce in 1968, put together three winning years -- 13-11, 18-7 and 17-6.

When the Eagles take the floor this season under new head coach J. E. Rowe, it'll be a rebuilding year. Moore and Norman, of course, are gone, and it'll take two pretty good 'horses' to fill their shoes.



1970-71 PREVIEW

Georgia Southern's 1970 basketball Eagles will play this season with a handicap that's a rarity--a serious lack of height. And in basketball, a good big man is oft the key to a good season. GSC Head Coach J. E. Rowe knows his problem and he knows what he has to do to overcome it.

"I honestly believe we can compete," Rowe said during preseason drills in the Hanner Fieldhouse. "We'll have to hustle and we'll be much smaller than the majority of the teams we'll play. We'll have to shoot well, run well, block off the boards well and rebound when we can."

Rebounding is a most important part of the game played with the bouncing ball--and for the past three years Georgia Southern never had that problem. Roger Moore, who would have been a senior and a four-year starter for the Eagles, had to leave school due to academic problems.

His contributions will be missed. Roger, a 6-6 native of nearby Savannah, played like a 6-10 man with his reach and jumping ability. He averaged 19.4 points a game and 13.5 rebounds. But Roger isn't the only one Rowe will miss. Forward John Norman, who was a rugged 6-7 forward, is gone with a degree. He was close to Moore with 16.5 points a game and 12.1 rebounds.

"I don't even like to think about losing those two," Rowe says. "But the season is there and we have to. I think we'll be pretty fair."

But all isn't lost and Rowe realizes this. He has three starters back from the 1969 team that finished with a 17-6 record. Both guards, Gene Brown and Steve Buckler, return as well as hustling forward Phil Sisk, a 6-5 senior from Atlanta. Brown is a 6-0 senior and was recruited along with Moore from Beach High. Gene averaged 9.5 last season and he's the playmaker.

Buckler averaged 17.4 per game and he's the shooter. Sisk is perhaps best described as a "consistent" performer, scoring 14.1 points per game last year and getting an average of 7.3 rebounds a game.

After those three, Rowe's problems begin to grow. Junior Charlie Gibbons has the inside role of the man to replace Moore. Rowe said this three weeks prior to the season and Gibbons, at 6-7, is the tallest man on Southern's roster. He played last season when Moore, Norman, or Sisk came out. His average was only 3.8 and four rebounds per game. Gibbons' big problem will be his weight, only a spindly 180- pounds.

Rowe's other guards are 5-8 Tommy Bond and Darryl Humble, a 5-10 transfer junior from St. Petersburg Junior College, where he averaged 20.0 points per game. Rowe gives him a chance at starting.

Mike Stokes could get the other forward slot opposite Sisk vacated by Norman. The 6-3 junior played two years at Gainesville Junior College where he was selected to the National Junior College All-American team. He scored 57 points in one game and Rowe likes him.

Rowe also has high praise for transfer Greg Hawver, a 6-3, 177-pounder from New Smyrna Beach, Fla. He averaged 27.0 points a game for Daytona Beach Junior College last year and Rowe calls him a "good shooter."

The ninth Eagle is sophomore guard Denis Francis, a 6-0 guard from Yonkers, N. Y. He's up from the GSC freshman team where he scored 20 points a game. "He shows definite promise," Rowe says of Francis, "and has a very good chance of becoming a very fine varsity guard."

You put them all together and you could come up with a very interesting team.

"We have to play them one at a time and not let this height thing bother us," Rowe said. "Our schedule is tough but we haven't lost one yet. It'll be a struggle everytime out. We just won't have the ability to blow anyone off the court. We expect every game to be a close game.

"But we will play to win," Rowe says.

That is Georgia Southern College Basketball.

HANNER FIELDHOUSE

In 1964 the funds for a new athletic complex at Georgia Southern were allocated by the State Board of Regents . . . an amount totaling a little less than \$700,000.

With only this meager sum with which to work, a wise administration decided to sit on this allotment and, as they expected, it grew and grew.

Now, in 1969, the complex is completed at a total cost of a little over a million dollars over the original sum.

The seating capacity of the new structure, deemed the Hanner Fieldhouse, is approximately 6,000 consisting of 4,000 permanent seats and some 2,000 roll away seats.

The lighting of the new facility is a unique type of mercury vapor bulbs which do not distort color. The candle power of these lamps is sufficient for color filming and television without the aid of other lighting.

The floor in the new gymnasium is a composition called "Tartan" flooring manufactured by the 3-M Company. Georgia Southern is one of only five colleges in the South that employs this new compound, and reports from other schools have all been favorable.

The new flooring is a very resilient compound and one of its best traits is the fact that it reduces the problem of "shin splints" and bruises, common basketball injuries.

The Fieldhouse also boasts basketball goals that can be raised and lowered with the turn of a key, and the finest gymnastic equipment available.

The locker rooms, with approximately 4,000 lockers, have been called the finest anywhere in Georgia and the floors of the varsity dressing room are covered wall to wall with royal blue carpeting.

The Hanner addition is much more than a basketball court, for the new building houses several modern classrooms, two complete suites of offices, and of course, another outstanding feature, an olympic swimming pool.

The pool is an eight lane collegiate pool . . . exceeding all the standards for inter-collegiate swimming competition. The natatorium also boasts a fifteen foot diving area, rounded corners, and chipped marble walls.

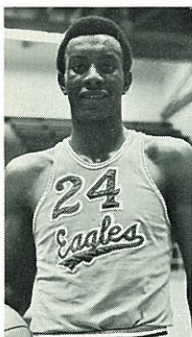

After a rather ho-hum season last year (1-16), GSC frosh coach, David Patton, is more than eager for the new season to get under way. Talent is abundant on this year's Baby Eagle squad.

The first to sign pacts with Georgia Southern were two boys from Springfield Central High School in Springfield, Ga., Richard Wallace and Tommy Palmer. Palmer, from Springfield, is a 5-10 guard who averaged 34 points per game in leading the Central Panthers to an undefeated season.



"Palmer is a tremendous ball handler," stated Rowe, "and he can 'whirl dribble' with the best of them."

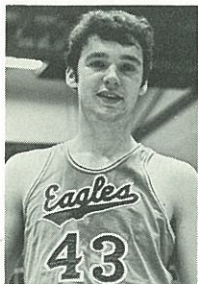

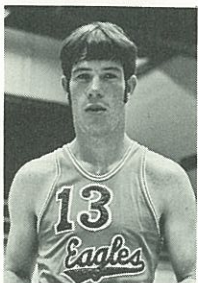
While trekking through the mountains of Kentucky, Rowe was lucky enough to find another outstanding prospect in 6-1 Doug Jones, of Cannel City.



"Doug was All-District and All-Region his senior year and he was one of the finest basketball players in that area. We were lucky to get him," stated Rowe.

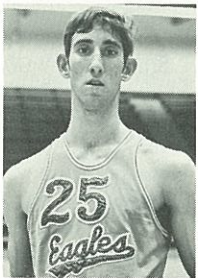
Jones averaged 27 points per game while Trimble and Castle averaged 10 and 26 respectively.

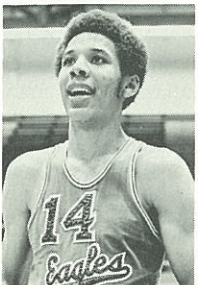
"I was really impressed with Mike the first time I saw him," remarked Rowe. "He will turn out to be one of the best big men we have seen in a long time."

Capping Coach Rowe's recruiting for the year was the signing of the number two high school scorer in the country, All-American Johnny Mills, of Laurens, S. C.



"Practically every school in the country wanted Johnny--and we got him," beamed an elated Rowe after the signing of Mills. "Without a doubt, Johnny will make his mark on the record books here at Georgia Southern."

Mills averaged 42 points per game in high school highlighted by a one-game scoring spree of 74 points which earned him a write-up in Sports Illustrated magazine. Coaches Rowe and Patton were present when Mills pumped in 57 points in one game.
