THE SERIES

• Savannah State and Georgia Southern have met 11 previous times with 10 of those games having been played at Paulson Stadium. GS has won all 11 previous meetings with SSU, the last an 83-9 win at Paulson Stadium in 2014. The 2013 win (a 77-9 triumph under then-head coach Jeff Monken) was vacated by GS in July due to NCAA sanctions.

• In the previous two meetings between the two teams, GS has outscored the Tigers a combined 160-18.

• The 83 points GS scored vs. Savannah State in 2014 was the highest point total for any FBS team in 2014.

A NEW ERA

• Saturday will mark the first game as head coach for Georgia Southern's Tyson Summers, who came to Statesboro after successful stints as a defensive coordinator at Colorado State and UCF. Summers previously coached in Statesboro for one year, serving as the safeties coach in 2006.

• GS has had pretty good success the previous three times it broke in a new coach. In 2007, Chris Hatcher went 7-4 in his first year. In 2010, Jeff Monken went 10-5 and led the Eagles to the FCS semifinals and in 2014, Willie Fritz led the Eagles to nine wins (one win was vacated), including a perfect mark to win the Sun Belt.

AGAINST THE MEAC

• GS has played 36 games all-time against current teams in the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference, posting a 34-2 mark with 14 wins in a row. Eleven of those wins have come against Savannah State, although one win was vacated.

HOME OPENERS

• Overall, the Eagles are 26-6-1 in home openers with a 26-5 mark at Paulson Stadium since its first game on Sept. 29, 1984 against Liberty. The 2013 home opener, a 77-9 win over Savannah State, was vacated due to NCAA sanctions.

• This will be the seventh time Savannah State serves as Georgia Southern's home opener.

GEORGIA ON OUR MINDS

• Saturday's home opener is the first of seven games in the state of Georgia for the Eagles as they also have a game in two weeks at home against UL Monroe. GS will take on Georgia Tech at Bobby Dodd Stadium in October and will have a Thursday night home TV game against Appalachian State on Oct. 27.

• The Eagles will finish the season with three straight games in the Peach State, welcoming UL Lafayette to town for a Thursday night ESPNU game on Nov. 10 and then will head to the Georgia Dome to play Georgia State on Nov. 19, playing in Atlanta for the second time this season. Georgia Southern's season finale, against Troy, is Senior Night and is set for Dec. 3.

COUNTDOWN TO KICKOFF

- 10 Ten of the 11 games all-time against Savannah State have been played at Paulson Stadium in Statesboro.
- 9 L.A. Ramsby has rushed for a touchdown in **nine** straight games played.
- 8 Senior running back Matt Breida needs 105 yards to pass Tracy Ham for **eighth** place all-time at GS for career rushing.
- 7 The home opener is the first of **seven** games in the state of Georgia for the Georgia Southern Eagles this season.
- 6 Georgia Southern returns **six** starters on both offense and defense this season.
- 5 The Eagles have lost just **five** home openers in 32 previous years dating back to Paulson Stadium's opening in 1984.
- 4 **Four** players who rushed for 600 or more yards last season return for the Eagles this year.
- 3 Since becoming a transitioning FBS school in 2014, the Eagles have dropped just **three** games against non-Power 5 teams: Navy (2014); Appalachian State, Georgia State (2015).
- 2 Georgia Southern has lost just **two** games in 36 contests to current MEAC squads.
- 1 Saturday's game is the **first** game as a head coach for GS coach Tyson Summers.



HEAD COACH TYSON SUMMERS

Tyson Summers is in his first season as the head coach of the Georgia Southern Eagles. Summers, who has ties to Statesboro from his time with the Eagles in 2006, has a coaching career that has spanned almost 15 years and seven schools and has been a part of seven bowl teams.

A native of Tifton, Georgia, Summers returns home from Colorado State, where he served as the Rams' defensive coordinator and safeties coach in 2015. Under his tutelage, the Rams defense ranked 20th in the country in passing defense, giving up just 186.3 yards per game heading into the Arizona Bowl. After dropping two overtime games early in the season, the Rams closed the regular season on a four-game win streak, with three of those victories coming on the road.

Prior to his work at CSU, he spent three seasons at UCF, where he served as defensive coordinator in 2014 for a unit that ranked among the best in the nation.

In his first full season as a defensive coordinator in 2014, Summers, 36, guided the top defense in the American Athletic Conference, and one that ranked in the top 10 among FBS schools in total defense (5th, 298.5 ypg), rushing defense (6th, 104.3 ypg), scoring defense (9th, 19.2 ppg) and red zone defense (6th, 71.4%). Summers' defense helped UCF to a 9-4 record, a second consecutive American Athletic Conference title and a berth in the Bitcoin St. Petersburg Bowl. The Knights held six opponents under 100 rushing yards and nine under 200 passing yards.

Three of Summers' defensive players earned first-team all-conference honors, while three more garnered second-team honors. That included cornerback Jacoby Glenn, who was The American's Co-Defensive Player of the Year and UCF's first Associated Press All-American (second team) since it joined the FBS level in 1996. Glenn signed as an undrafted free agent with the Chicago Bears in 2015.

Under Summers' leadership, linebacker Terrance Plummer earned back-to-back first-team All-American Athletic Conference honors in 2013 and 2014. He also was a two-time national defensive player of the week his final two years at UCF.

Summers was hired at UCF as a defensive assistant coach in 2012, and earned the title of linebackers coach one month later. For the 2014 Tostitos Fiesta Bowl and that spring season, he was named interim defensive coordinator before being promoted to full-time defensive coordinator in April when spring camp concluded.

Summers helped call the plays in UCF's upset victory over high-powered Baylor in the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, capping an unforgettable season for the Knights. The win enabled UCF to set a school record with 12 victories overall and achieve a program-high by being ranked No. 10 in the final AP Top 25 Poll. Plummer was named Defensive MVP of the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, along with his first-team all-conference honors.

In 2012, Summers tutored three Knight linebackers into consistent a group that led UCF to a Conference USA East Division crown, a Beef 'O' Brady's Bowl win and a 10-4 record. Plummer, in his first year as the Knights' middle linebacker, went on to rack up 108 tackles with seven for loss. On the outsides, Ray Shipman broke out in just his second full season as he amassed 91 tackles. Previously a running back, Jonathan Davis was named the team's Most Improved Defensive Player, capping off the year with 99 tackles, including nine for a loss.

Summers' tenure at UCF came after a five-year stint at UAB that began in December 2006. He served as the Blazers' linebackers coach and added the roles of safeties coach and co-special teams coordinator in the final season of his tenure.

In his first year working with the UAB safeties in 2011, Summers helped mentor Jamie Bender in his senior season as he led the Blazers with 119 tackles. Bender also posted 7.5 tackles for loss, two interceptions, six break-ups and four forced fumbles. He was voted on to the All-C-USA Second Team for that performance. On special teams, UAB ranked 17th in the nation by allowing just 4.71 yards per punt return, while freshman kicker Ty Long was named a 2011 Freshman All-American by Phil Steele's College Football Preview.

In Summers' first year at UAB, linebacker Joe Henderson was named to the All-C-USA Second Team. In 2008, Henderson climbed up to the first team thanks to a team-high 87 tackles as well as 12.5 tackles for loss, and went on to play for the BC Lions of the CFL from 2010-11. With a new wave of linebackers under Summers' control in 2010, Marvin Burdette paced the Blazers with 114 tackles en route to All-C-USA Honorable Mention accolades. While Summers was with UAB, kicker Swayze Waters was an All-C-USA First-Team pick in 2007 and 2008, and appeared in NFL preseason games highlighted by a stint with the Pittsburgh Steelers in 2011.

Summers coached the safeties at GS in 2006 a year after serving as a graduate assistant for Georgia in 2005. That season, the Bulldogs won the SEC title and earned a berth in the Sugar Bowl which was played in Atlanta after Hurricane Katrina displaced the bowl. Summers worked with the secondary and witnessed three UGA defensive backs being selected in the NFL Draft: Tim Jennings (second round, first-team All-SEC), DeMario Minter (fifth round, first-team All-SEC) and Greg Blue (fifth round, first-team All-American).

During the 2004 season, Summers was a G.A. at Troy, which reached the postseason and the Silicon Valley Classic, and in 2003, he helped guide the defensive backs at Presbyterian College. Summers earned his first coaching position at Tift County (Ga.) High where coached the defensive backs in 2002.

A four-year letterwinner at Presbyterian College, Summers earned preseason All-South Atlantic honors as a linebacker in 1999 and was selected as team captain as a senior. He received his bachelor's degree in political science from PC in 2002.

Summers is married to the former Beth King, and the couple has three sons, Jake, Walker and Anderson.

- Became the ninth member of the 3,000-yard rushing club at GS against Georgia State last season ... Now has 3,108 yards for his career ... Sits in ninth place all-time at Georgia Southern.

- Was one of only four players with two of rushes of 80 yards or longer last year ... Led the FBS in 60-yard runs (5) and was tied with Florida State's Dalvin Cook in 70-yard runs (4).

- Racked up 1,608 yards rushing and a Sun Belt-leading 17 rushing TDs.

- Had big games in 2015 against Western Michigan (176 yards), The Citadel (164 yards), Idaho (184 yards), ULM (149 yards), Texas State (205 yards) and South Alabama (187 yards) with long scoring runs of 70, 87, 83, 66, 48 and 75 yards.

- Breida finished 10th in the country last season, averaging 128.3 rushing yards per game, and averaged 7.9 yards per carry, tops in the country (min. 100 rush) for the second year in a row ... His 8.68 yards per carry average in 2014 (171-1,485) also ranked first nationally (FBS) and set a new Eagles' single-season record ahead of Adrian Peterson's 7.52 average (257-1,932) from 1998. His average of 7.92 (203-1,608) yards per carry last year bumped Peterson's number down one spot to third place at GS.

- Needs 105 yards to pass Tracy Ham for eighth place all-time at GS for career rushing ... Needs 792 rushing yards to move into third place all-time.

- Has 14 games with 100 yards or more rushing and 12 rushing scores of 50 yards or more.

- Breida's 1,608 rushing yards in 2015 ranked fifth on the GS single-season list.

- Breida has led both the nation and Sun Belt in rushing yards per carry the past two years, finishing at 8.7 in 2014 and 7.9 in 2015.
- As a sophomore, he had more rushing touchdowns of 50 yards or more than anyone in the nation (7) and had the second-highest rushing touchdowns in the league with 17.

ELLISON AND UPSHAW ... UPSHAW AND ELLISON

DYNAMIC DUO LEADS EAGLE OFFENSE ONCE AGAIN

• Georgia Southern features one of the nation's top quarterback duos in seniors Kevin Ellison and Favian Upshaw. While Ellison has started 25 of the past 27 games, it's the quarterback who is hot and moving the chains who gets the call. In last year's GoDaddy Bowl victory over Bowling Green, Upshaw ran for 199 yards and four touchdowns to earn MVP honors of the game, but it was Ellison who ran for 134 yards and two scores and passed for 105 more to help lead the Eagles to a road win at Idaho.

• The combo of Ellison and Upshaw had the most rushing yards of any full-time quarterback duo in the FBS last year with a combined 1,291 yards. Ellison ran for 708 yards and eight TDs while Upshaw tallied 583 yards and six scores.

THE KOREAN CONNECTION

• The Eagles have the rare distinction of having two Korean-born players on its roster in Andy Kwon and Younghoe Koo.

• Koo, who made seven field goals and had 45 touchbacks last season, was born August 3, 1994 in Seoul, South Korea, to parents Seungmae Choi and Hyunseo Koo. He was raised in Ridgewood, New Jersey, before signing with Georgia Southern in 2013.

• Kwon, whose birth name is Nam Kyu Kwon, was an all-conference offensive lineman last year at center and was born less than two months later, also in Seoul. He was born on September 30, 1994 to Bruce Kwon and Anna Moon and hails from Suwanee, Georgia.

GETTIN' IT DONE IN THE CLASSROOM

• Of the 24 seniors on the 2016 roster, 11 Eagles will be playing the season as college graduates. They are, in alphabetical order: **Jake Abraham, Jonathan Battle Jr., Montay Crockett, Sean Gaddy, Nardo Govan, Tre Griffin, BJ Johnson III, Rayquan Sam, Nick Sewak, Mike Summers Jr. (Georgia Tech) and Favian Upshaw.**

• Four more seniors - **Matt Breida, Ken Butler Jr., Ironhead Gallon** and **Summers (Master's)** are slated to graduate in December and six seniors are on track to graduate in May 2017. Four more seniors are scheduled to finish next summer.

• In addition, three juniors - **Myles Campbell, Ukeme Eligwe** and **Ryan George** - are slated to graduate in May 2017. Junior **Matt Flynn** and sophomore **George Johnson Jr.** are and are scheduled to graduate next summer.

UPSHAW LEADS HANDFUL OF TRANSFERS

• Senior **Favian Upshaw** (FIU) is one of 19 collegiate transfers on the 2016 GS roster. In addition to Upshaw, others who have transferred from FBS schools include **Ukeme Eligwe** (Florida State), **Mike Summers Jr.** (Georgia Tech) and **Jake Edwards** (Georgia).

HAVE A FIELD(S) DAY

• Sophomore running back **Wesley Fields** has been described as a hybrid between Matt Breida and L.A. Ramsby and was the third cog in a dynamic backfield that led the nation in rushing yards per game last season.

• A threat to go the distance, on the goal line and in the passing game, Fields had a standout freshman campaign for the Eagles. The Americus, Georgia, native rushed for 682 yards and seven touchdowns on 101 attempts, averaging 6.8 yards per carry. He also had four receptions for 105 yards and one touchdown, including a 60-yard scoring reception against New Mexico State.

• For his efforts, he was named to the All-Sun Belt Newcomer Team and was named the Offensive MVP of the GoDaddy Bowl after rushing for 75 yards and a touchdown while also catching a 17-yard pass in the Eagles' 58-27 win over Bowling Green.

THEY CALL HIM IRONHEAD

• Senior linebacker **Deshawntee Gallon** has wreaked havoc on opponents the past two-plus seasons, amassing 125 tackles and four blocked kicks.

• Nicknamed "Ironhead" by his father, Shawn, at a young age, Gallon earned honorable mention All-Sun Belt

honors last season after recording 81 total tackles (39u, 42a) with 1.5 sacks, two blocked kicks, 4.5 tackles for loss, two quarterback hurries and three pass breakups.

CONTINUE THE JOURNEY

- Georgia Southern, the FCS's winningest team with more than 50 games played, posted a .718 winning percentage and 294 all-time wins to go along with its unprecedented six national championships.
- The University announced its acceptance of an invitation to join the Sun Belt for the 2014-2015 academic year on March 27, 2013 and began its transition with the 2013 season.
- In 2014, the Eagles were bowl eligible and won the Sun Belt Conference championship with a perfect conference mark, but were denied their appeal for a bowl due to being in the final transitional year.
- In their second year, the Eagles won nine games, including the GoDaddy Bowl over Bowling Green in the program's first NCAA postseason bowl game.

BACK AND BETTER THAN EVER

- Georgia Southern lost its top receiving threat in **BJ Johnson III** last season when he went down with a broken clavicle against Idaho. Originally feared to be lost for the year, Johnson progressed quicker than anyone expected and returned to the field against Troy on Nov. 14, missing just four games. The senior has 49 receptions for 760 yards and three touchdowns in his career.

HOME-GROWN TALENT

- There are 84 players on the Georgia Southern roster who are from the state of Georgia.

HIRING BRIGHT AND SUCCESSFUL COACHES

- Since Paul Johnson left Georgia Southern in 2001, the Eagles have had seven head coaches, including new head man Tyson Summers. GS has produced some of the brightest names in coaching, including three FBS head coaches:

HELMET TECHNOLOGY

When Georgia Southern started preseason camp in 2013, it joined an elite group of collegiate football teams employing the Helmet Impact Telemetry System (HITS), which measures and records every hit to the head during practices and games.

With funding from the Office of the Vice President for Research and Economic Development, Georgia Southern has equipped 40 helmets with the Riddell HITS system. There are six sensors inside each helmet that measure the severity of a hit to the head.

A typical impact in football lasts about 15 milliseconds, and in that instant, measurements from the sensors will be transmitted in nearly real-time to a laptop computer being monitored on the sidelines of all practices and games.

If a hit reaches a certain threshold, a pager worn by a graduate research student and the head athletics trainer will receive a notification and will follow with appropriate action and attention. If they display any unusual behavior, a clinical evaluation will be conducted to see if it is safe for him to continue playing or not.

Each impact is time stamped and can be synchronized with game video so coaches, athletics trainers and researchers can better evaluate the hits.

Less than two dozen schools are using the system around the country. Other schools to use the HITS system in their football programs include Virginia Tech, North Carolina and Oklahoma, putting GS at the forefront of concussion prevention in college football.

I LOVE L.A.

- While a lot of the attention is thrust on **Matt Breida** and his numbers, **L.A. Ramsby** helps form one of the top rushing groups in the country.
- Originally recruited as an option quarterback, the redshirt junior was moved to running back and ran for 691 yards and 12 touchdowns in 2014 as the Eagles led the FBS with an average of 381.1 rushing yards per game.
- His legal name is Alfred Ramsby Jr., but is nicknamed L.A. - for Little Al (his father is Alfred Ramsby Sr.).
- The Cincinnati, Ohio, native scored at least one touchdown in the final 10 games of the 2014 season, and scored a touchdown in the final nine games of 2015.
- Ramsby has rushed for 1,511 career yards and scored 25 touchdowns thus far.

EAGLE ANALYTICS

- Georgia Southern finished 2014 - its first year in the FBS and final year of transition from the FCS - with a bowl eligible 9-3 record, but had its bowl waiver request denied by the NCAA. One of those wins (ULM) has since been vacated by the NCAA due to sanctions.
- GS joined only Nevada (1992) and Marshall (1997) to win a conference title in their first year of FBS play, and became the **first** to go undefeated in conference play in winning the title.
- Georgia Southern's 18-7 mark is the best two-year FBS start since Marshall posted a 22-4 mark in 1997 and 1998. One of those wins was vacated by the NCAA, however, due to sanctions (ULM, 2014).
- In two-plus seasons at the FBS level, the Eagles have recorded 109 rushing touchdowns and 9,292 rushing yards, the most in the FBS over the past two seasons ahead of Navy's 8,642 yards and 98 touchdowns.
- Last season, an FBS-high four Eagle players rushed for 600 yards or more.
- The past two years, Georgia Southern has led the country in rushing at 381.1 (2014) and 363.0 (2015) yards per contest, which were the second and fourth-best totals, respectively, since 1997.

- The Eagles have also led the nation in touchdowns on the ground the past two seasons (55 in 2014, 54 in 2015). Those totals were tied for the second-best and the fourth-best totals, respectively, since 1997 and the best amongst "Group of 5" teams:

 - Georgia Southern (2014) - 55

- Georgia Southern's 7.1 YPC in 2014 and its 6.5 YPC last year ranked as the second- and ninth-highest averages, respectively, over the past 20 seasons in FBS. The 7.1 average was the second-best amongst teams in "Group of 5" leagues (Nevada, 7.4 YPC, 2009) while the 6.5 YPC average was the fourth-best during that span. The two averages are top two ever for any Sun Belt member.
- GS led the country last season with six of the top 20 rushing single games in FBS. No other team in the FBS had three (Oregon and Air Force each had two).
- Dating back to the Sun Belt's formation in 2001, GS has had three of the top five single-game rushing totals in the history of the SBC and the Eagles are just two full seasons in the league.
- GS hasn't just set Sun Belt records in rushing yards, touchdowns and yards per carry, but have done so by a significant margin in each category:

BREAKING DOWN BARRIERS

- Football operations is a critical position within a staff, a catch-all post that serves as the head coach's right-hand man, or in this case, woman. **Cymone George**, who handles the role as the Director of Football Operations for the Eagles, is responsible for taking care of all the travel arrangements, meals for the players and staff, and all the day-to-day operations of the football team.
- George is in a unique position as she fills a job usually held by men. She is one of seven women to hold the position of director of football operations at an FBS school (128 schools), joining Danielle Bartelstein (Virginia Tech), Amanda Gilpin (UTSA), Heather Henderson (Florida Atlantic), Sarah Lawless (UConn), Lois Manin (Hawaii) and Diane McPheeters (Baylor).

GEORGIA SOUTHERN FOOTBALL TRADITIONS

• Georgia Southern has a rich tradition in the college football world, winning six Division I-AA national titles, but also has traditions that make the program unique.

Yellow School Buses

• When the football program was resurrected in 1981, the team needed a way to travel to practices and games. Operating on a shoestring budget didn't allow for transportation back then, let alone any luxurious travel. The Bulloch County Board of Education stepped in with a deal the University couldn't refuse: GS would only pay \$1 each for two yellow school buses. The football team still uses the buses to this day, taking them to practices and using them on game day, as well.

Beautiful Eagle Creek

• When Georgia Southern resurrected the football program in 1981, traditions and spirit needed resurrection as well. So legendary head football coach Erk Russell created his own. Inspired by the gnat-infested drainage ditch that cut across the field between what was then the team's locker room and practice fields, Russell convinced his players that its stagnant water was actually "Beautiful Eagle Creek," a source of "magical" waters.

Freedom's Flight

• In what has become one of the most popular traditions at GS, "Freedom," a male American Bald Eagle, takes flight before each home football game. Freedom is a Southern Bald Eagle that was found knocked out of the nest in Maitland, Florida. Only weeks old and appearing like a "brown ball of fuzz", it was discovered that the young eagle had an injury to its beak and suffered from an infection. Rushed to the Florida Audubon Center for Birds of Prey, Freedom made a complete recovery from the infection but the injury to the beak was permanent, preventing his release into the wild.

• With the permission of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, GS acquired Freedom in 2004. Through the Georgia Southern University Center for Wildlife Education and Lamar Q. Ball Jr. Raptor Center, thousands of visitors young and old are embraced by the Power of Freedom.

• Under the supervision of Steve Hein, Director of the Center for Wildlife Education, Freedom is on the sidelines of all GS home games, and select road games.

• The Georgia Southern University Athletic Foundation (GSUAF) closed out a record-breaking year in June.

• The main fund raising arm, the Eagle Fund, which is the Foundation's annual fund that directly benefits student-scholarships, grew over 25 percent from the previous fiscal year. With a goal of \$1.2 million, the Eagle Fund successfully generated nearly \$1,457,973 during the 2015-16 fiscal year, which is also a 55 percent increase from the 2013-14 fiscal year.

• Memberships to the Foundation's Eagle Fund have also steadily increased over the last two years with an increase of 16 percent, reaching record numbers.
