Season Preview

Looking for its 17th winning season in 24 years of competition, this year's Georgia State softball team will start with the concept of pitching and defense being the cornerstones for success.

In its third year in the Colonial Athletic Association, the team has made two CAA championship game appearances and saw six players earn All-CAA honors in those first two seasons. It is hungry for its first CAA championship and another NCAA postseason berth.

The Panthers return the complete pitching staff that produced 34 wins last year and added the state high school pitcher of the year from Georgia to that staff. The defense set a school record with a .971 fielding percentage and just 56 errors in 64 games. All but the second baseman and one outfielder return to anchor that defense. When it is their turn to step into the batter's box, State should again have a scoring punch with a trio of .300 hitters returning, plus a 10-HR power hitter back for more.

Georgia State returns ten players from last year's squad and welcomes six new Panthers. The ten returnees feature two seniors, three juniors and five sophomores.

Battery

The Panther pitching staff is expected to be a strong point with four returnees and one incoming freshman. "Our pitching staff this year should provide us with a good nucleus to work from," said head coach Bob Heck.

Right-handed senior Ashley Cowan comes off last year with a 2.57 ERA and an 11-9 record, second best on the team just behind junior hurler Madi Gore. "Ashley will provide senior leadership for us in the circle this year," said Heck.

Gore finished the 2007 season with 37 appearances and led the team with a 20-12 record. She was second in the league in innings pitched, strikeouts, wins and appearances. Last season, Gore was ranked 63rd nationally in victories with 20.

Returning junior Chelsey Morgan made 17 appearances last season and picked up two wins. "Chelsey is a steady influence on our pitching staff," said Heck. "She will provide the pitching corps with leadership and experience." Returning with Morgan is sophomore Elizabeth Thomas who made nine appearances and ended the season 1-1 with a 6.16 ERA. "She shows great signs of improvement and should get even better throughout the season," commented Heck.

A newcomer to the pitching staff is right-hander Alicia Mills. Mills pitched 183 innings with 332 strikeouts and 0.19 ERA for Sequoyah High School last season. She was the team MVP for two-time state champion Sequoyah for three years straight and was named the 2006 Gatorade Player of the Year in Georgia. "We are excited for Alicia to be joining us this year, she has great potential to help our team," said Heck.

Behind the plate this year for the Panthers will be freshman Catherine Lee. Lee batted .353 as a senior in 41 games with seven home runs and 37 RBIs at Eastside High School in Covington, Ga. She garnered first-team all-state honors her senior year. "Catherine has been a pleasant surprise," said Heck. "As a freshman she is one of the best catching prospects we have seen at State. She handled the preseason well and will be a true asset to the team." Junior transfer Natasha Berry (see stats with outfielders) will serve as back-up catcher for Georgia State.

Infield

Leading the Panthers on the infield will be senior Jessica Gowin at first base. Gowin was the only player to start in every game (64) for the Panthers last season. She was one of four Panthers with over 200 at bats and produced 48 hits with 10 doubles and five home runs. "She will provide senior leadership on the young infield," said Heck.

Returning at third base is CAA co-Rookie of the Year, Danielle Roddy. "We expect her to pick up where she left off last year," said Heck. The sophomore earned All-CAA first team and All-Rookie team honors and finished nationally ranked in two categories: walks (No. 22) and toughest to strikeout (No. 21). Roddy was second in the CAA in on-base percentage, runs scored and tied for hits. She led the team with a .348 batting average and a .461 on base percentage.

Sophomore Rachel Cunningham played in 63 games her freshman season, and will be anchoring the defense at shortstop this year. She was second on the team in batting average (.316) with 61 hits, 14 doubles and 27 RBIs. She produced 16 multiple-hit games, six multiple-RBI games and was named to the all-CAA all-Rookie team. "Rachel is a very hard worker," said Heck. "She is dedicated to doing her very best."

Sophomore Lily Skelton and freshman Rebecca Roles will also see time in the infield. "Rebecca is a super kid and will be a solid second baseman," commented Heck. Skelton will push for time at third base, while Roles could see time at second. Skelton finished the 2007 season with a team-high and CAA second-best 10 home runs. She started 44 of 52 games played and recorded a team high .524 slugging percentage.

Outfield

Junior Holly Willis will be one of Georgia State's top outfielders. After posting a .301 batting average and producing 44 hits in 2007, Willis will look to be the leader of the Panther outfield in 2008. "Holly has all the tools to be a great outfielder," said Heck. "She has great speed and gets a good jump on the ball." Also returning to the Panther outfield will be sophomore Lauren Fetters who appeared in 44 games last season. At the plate, Fetters produced eight hits, three doubles and a triple.

Junior transfer Natasha Berry, along with freshmen Tiffany Bess and Lauren Jones will also see time in the outfield. Berry played for two years at North Florida Community College in Madison, Fla. While at NFCC, Natasha batted .375 and had 51 stolen bases as a sophomore. Bess batted .328 with 26 runs scored, six doubles, two triples and two home runs during her senior year at Oconee County High School. Jones batted .226 as a senior with four doubles and 15 RBIs at Union Grove High School. Jones earned the team's best defensive player as a sophomore in 2005.

The 2008 schedule features match-ups against five NCAA Tournament teams of last year (Georgia, Georgia Tech, Florida State, N.C. State and Hofstra) and five nationally ranked teams including Georgia Tech (17), Georgia (25), Florida State (34), North Carolina State (35) and Auburn (41). The squad aims to win both the CAA regular season and tournament title, but must overcome six-time CAA champion Hofstra (41-15) and last season's runner-up James Madison (38-16) during the 21-game CAA slate to do so. With its excellent home facility and hosting three February tournaments, Georgia State will have a two-to-one home game advantage in this year's schedule.

The Panthers look to improve on their 34-win season in 2007 and return to the four-team Colonial Athletic Association Tournament for the third consecutive season. With the leadership of 10 veterans and the addition of six newcomers, Georgia State is setting goals to challenge for the championship.

Head Coach

Robert E. "Bob" Heck

One person will forever be known as the founder, architect and icon of Panthers' fast-pitch softball.

Georgia State's living legend of softball, Bob Heck, took the program from slow-pitch to fast-pitch status 23 years ago and has continued the growth pattern ever since. When the normal called for two years to take a program into NCAA fast-pitch, Bob Heck said he could do it in one year. Two years ago, when Georgia State moved to the Colonial Athletic Association and some sports needed time to grow, Bob Heck stepped up to the challenge and won the regular-season title in his first year and advanced to the tournament championship game.

The enthusiastic octogenarian begins the 2008 season with 1,101 games coached in 20 seasons as the head coach at Georgia State with 581 career victories. He has been voted the Coach of the Year in the previous Atlantic Sun Conference and the current CAA.

The Formulative Years

The World War II vet began in 1981 as a volunteer assistant coach with Georgia State's slow-pitch softball team. In 1984, he served as the head coach of the slow-pitch team, but the NCAA did not recognize this as a sport. In the spring of 1985, Georgia State was playing NCAA fast-pitch softball, thanks first and foremost to Bob Heck's efforts.

All the team had in 1985 was a rough, over-used Recreation Department field, no locker rooms, no practice facilities and no scoreboard. In other words, it was as basic as basic could have possibly been.

Year by year, Bob Heck took his theme: "The ladies deserve the best place to prepare and play, so I will do whatever I can to provide that for them."

For Bob Heck that meant coming up with most of the money and providing his own extra financial support to put in a fence, to move the playing field to a new area, to upgrade the playing surface and grounds, to put up a beautiful scoreboard, to put in dugouts with bathrooms, to build a stadium with concrete stands and arm-chair seats, to build a concession stand and press box, and to build a state-of-the-art year-round, indoor practice facility with batting and pitching cage. The facility has locker rooms, a training room, a video room, a game room, a weight room, and restroom facilities. It is no wonder the scoreboard, the field itself and the team house are all aptly named in his honor.

Unlike most softball coaches, he has been a diligent groundskeeper in maintaining his field as well as any professional landscaper. Now, he has help with that. He has actually planted, maintained and manicured, cut the grass, painted the lines, and rolled out the tarp. Bob Heck Field is recognized as an excellent facility and hosted the 2006 CAA Championship.

Putting Georgia State softball on the map

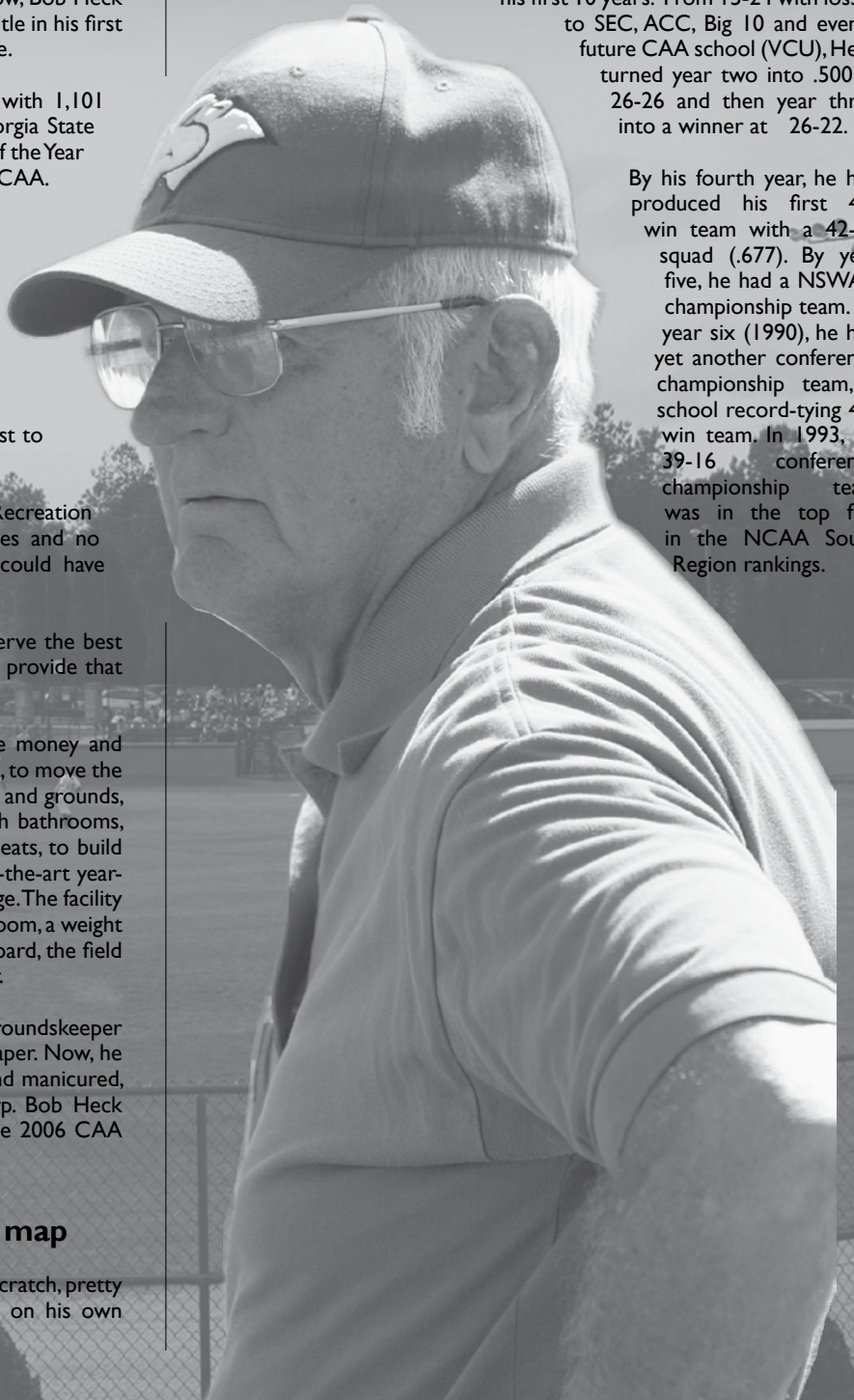
Remember, he started a college Division I program from scratch, pretty much by himself. He has recruited his student-athletes on his own

merits. He has scheduled all the top schools and has a philosophy of being willing to play anyone, anywhere, anytime.

He has guided the fledging program from the NSWAC (New South) through its growth into the TAAC (Trans America) and then the A-Sun (Atlantic Sun). In 2005-06, the school moved into the Colonial Athletic Association (CAA).

The first season was his only losing record in his first 10 years. From 15-24 with losses to SEC, ACC, Big 10 and even a future CAA school (VCU), Heck turned year two into .500 at 26-26 and then year three into a winner at 26-22.

By his fourth year, he had produced his first 40-win team with a 42-20 squad (.677). By year five, he had a NSWAC championship team. In year six (1990), he had yet another conference championship team, a school record-tying 42-win team. In 1993, his 39-16 conference championship team was in the top five in the NCAA South Region rankings.



In just his 10th year, he had built a team that was ranked in the Top 25 in the nation, and No. 3 in the South rankings, and earned an NCAA Tournament bid. Ironically, he lost a 2-1 game to UCLA in the tournament and that school stole his top pitcher of two years away. That pitcher that Heck first recruited, Kaci Clark, went on to an outstanding professional softball pitching career. Coach Heck was named the conference Coach of the Year in that 1994 season.

By 1995, his 30-win team marked the eighth time in the short 11-year history he had a team hit the 30-win plateau.

After 14 successful years as State's head coach, Bob Heck actually thought he wanted to retire. That worked out for three years, before Georgia State convinced him to come back in 2001 and coach some more.

Bob Heck showed he is still as competitive and successful as ever. He led the 2005-06 team into its first year in the Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) and was picked to finish fifth by the league's coaches. It should not have been a surprise when he led the team to the regular season championship and the No. 1 seed on its home field. His team lost the CAA championship game. That team set a record for most home runs at Georgia State and the top pitcher, Elizabeth Hyman, set a new school record for strike outs in leading the CAA. Heck coached the CAA Pitcher of the Year and the CAA Rookie of the Year in being named the CAA Coach of the Year. He produced an Academic All-American, Meghan McCoy, as well.

In 2006-07, Heck guided his team back to the championship game of the CAA Tournament with another 30-win season as five players earned All-CAA recognition. This team set 11 school records, including the best defense the school had ever had.

Heck has now coached 20 seasons of his "second career" and given his signals from the third base box for 1,101 games. He has led his teams to five conference championships and has advanced to seven other championship games before bowing out during his tenure.

During his career at State, Heck has had 43 student-athletes earn first team all-conference recognition and 23 more earn second team honors.

While Georgia State has moved into the CAA, Coach Heck has also played, and often won, against some of the NCAA's bigger schools, who have much larger budgets. In just the past nine years for example, Heck has built the Georgia State program to a level where it has wins over schools in major conferences like SEC schools Arkansas, Auburn, Georgia, Kentucky, South Carolina; Big Ten schools Iowa, Michigan State, Purdue; ACC schools Boston College, Georgia Tech, Maryland, North Carolina, Virginia Tech; Big East schools Pittsburgh and St. John's; and the Big 12's Iowa State. He believes in playing anyone who will play him and challenges his team to rise to the competition. He is an avid teacher of the fundamentals of the game.

Life Before Georgia State

Before softball and Georgia State entered into Bob Heck's life, he had a remarkable life that showed his dedication, devotion and service. As a young man, World War II interrupted his classroom education for three years of service to his country in the U.S. Navy and an education in the reality of the world.

Coming out of the service in 1946, Bob began an education path that earned a college degree from the University of Georgia. Studious Bob then earned a master's degree from Emory, and yet another master's degree in business from Georgia State.

His early jobs including being a high school teacher at Druid Hills High in Atlanta for five years, serving as the head coach of the track team and

the assistant coach for the football team.

In 1957, Heck put his master's in business to good use and began a career as a national bank examiner with the Controller of the Currency's office for 10 years. He moved on up to the Federal Reserve, the arm of the government that oversees the nation's banking system and manages the supply of money, credit, and interest rates.

All the while he had his "day job" for 35 years, Bob stayed busy as a high school football referee for 25 years and was a high school basketball official for five years.

For most normal folks, this biography might end here with a nice retirement package, a little golf, some travel and "the easy life."

But, for Bob Heck, life was just beginning and this is where Georgia State and softball became the biggest beneficiaries of his remarkable life.

Honored off the fields

The ever-generous Heck is also known in other ways. Georgia State University honored him in 2005 with its Sparks Award and asked him to serve as the head of the university-wide fundraising campaign. He has generously helped other collegiate softball programs in the metro Atlanta area with his donations and his time.

Heck is one of the eight Founding Life Members of the Georgia State Department of Athletics by contributing at least \$100,000 to the athletics department in a three-year pledge. He is respected by his First United Methodist Church and serves on its Board of Stewards among his other lifelong service with that church.

Born in Charleston, S.C., Robert E. Heck's family has proven to be the hundreds of young ladies he has tutored in softball and nurtured into adult life, as well as the hundreds of people he has touched in the Georgia State community and the city of Atlanta.

His leadership, dedication, commitment and passion for Georgia State and the sport of softball most likely will never be equaled. But, his commitment will always be remembered.

Third Season Alma Mater: Furman

Kelly Van Houten, an assistant coach for the Georgia State softball program the last two years, has been promoted to associate head coach, announced Panthers' head coach Bob Heck earlier this fall.

Van Houten, who works with the team's hitters and infielders, originally joined the program for the 2005-06 season and has helped the Panthers to consecutive winning seasons, including the 2006 Colonial Athletic Association regular-season title in Georgia State's first season in the league.

Last spring, she helped guide Georgia State to a 34-win campaign, which marked the third-highest win total in school history, and a third-place finish in the CAA. Panther infielders Danielle Roddy, Mary Kathryn Branam and Nichole Griffin earned all-conference honors, and Roddy was the CAA Co-Rookie of the Year.

Van Houten came to Georgia State after two years as an assistant coach at Campbell (2003-05) and two years as a graduate assistant coach at Belmont (2001-03).

"I'm very grateful for this opportunity and for the faith that Coach Heck and the Georgia State administration have shown in me," said Van Houten. "Georgia State softball has a lot of potential, and I'm excited to have more responsibility and more ownership of the program. We've gotten better each year, and we're looking forward to continued improvement this season.

"I've learned so much from Coach Heck. What he has done for Georgia State and for the sport of softball is amazing, and it's a great honor to coach with him."

A native of Raleigh, N.C., Van Houten was a standout shortstop at Furman, where she lettered four years (1998-01) and still ranks among the school's career leaders in assists. She earned a B.A. degree in political science as well as a B.S. in health and exercise science in 2001. She added a masters in sports administration from Belmont in 2003.

"Kelly has a very bright future in coaching," said Heck, who has compiled 581 victories in two decades at the helm of the Georgia State program. "She's a hard worker who is very well respected by our student-athletes. Having her as associate head coach will be a tremendous asset to our program."

A business management major, McGirr graduated with a bachelor of science degree from Columbus State in 2003. She served as captain of the softball team during her two seasons with the Cougars, was voted Best Defensive Player and earned the Coach's Award her senior year. In 2005, she graduated with a master of business administration from Columbus State.

A native of Warner Robins, Ga., McGirr adds a wealth of knowledge to the Panther program, as she played almost every position on the field during her collegiate career.

YEAR IN REVIEW

2007 YEAR IN REVIEW

For the second consecutive season the Georgia State softball team advanced to the championship game of the CAA Softball Championships. Garnering its 13th season with 30 or more wins in school history, State finished the year with a 34-30 overall record and was 11-9 in league play, placing the team third in the CAA standings. Five players earned All-CAA awards at the end of the year.

State opened its campaign hosting three tournaments in February for the third consecutive year: the Georgia State First Pitch Classic, the Panther Invitational (formerly Lady Panther Invitational) and the Georgia State Spring Showdown. The Panthers dropped three of four at the First Pitch Classic then traveled to Auburn and fell in the mid-week non-conference match up.

Hosting the second tournament, Georgia State went undefeated with 39 runs scored and a perfect 4-0 record while using a comeback to down Furman 9-7 in the championship game. The Panthers ended the weekend with a 5-4 mark and their first home tournament title. State took two games in a mid-week doubleheader against Georgia Southern. Senior co-captain Mary Kathryn Branan played against her sister, Elizabeth, and went 5-7 with three runs batted in and a stolen base.

State then hosted its final tournament of the year, winning both games on the first day to run its season-best winning streak to eight games. The second day was cancelled due to inclement weather, preventing a championship and consolation game. After dropping two games at Kennesaw State, the Panthers ended the month of February with a 9-6 record.

At the Florida State Invitational, Georgia State won two of the first five games. The wins came against Appalachian State and Syracuse; two opponents the Panthers lost to last year. State fell to No. 25 Florida State, Maine and in bracket play, No. 21 Georgia.

The Panthers entered Sunday's Silver Bracket with a renewed focus. After beating Western Carolina, Georgia State avenged the earlier loss to Maine with a win in the Silver Bracket title game and acquired its first winning record at the Florida State Invitational since 2000. On March 24, the Panthers opened their CAA schedule at George Mason and swept the three game series with 31 hits and 18 runs scored.

Hosting Hofstra on April 6, State split the doubleheader but fell in the series finale. Freshman designated player Lily Skelton powered a grand slam over the center field fence on the first day. The Panthers moved to 25-20 overall and 5-4 in league action. After dropping two one-run games to Drexel and splitting a twin bill with Western Carolina, the team needed to win their final three conference series to play in the CAA Softball Championships.

The Panthers hosted eventual fourth place UNC Wilmington on April 21 and won two of three with Gore picking up both wins. State needed to win that series in order to keep its playoff hopes alive. Next, the Panthers faced No. 20 Georgia Tech, losing the doubleheader with early leads in both games at home.

State traveled to Towson for the second crucial series and took the first two games of the three game series. The Panthers were one out away from clinching a playoff spot when Towson rallied to tie and win in extra innings. That loss caused State to wait another week to clinch a playoff spot.

In the final series of the year, the Panthers claimed the third seed with doubleheader wins over Delaware and ended the regular season with a 32-28 overall record and 11-9 in the CAA.

At the 2007 CAA Softball Championships, a four-team tournament in Hempstead, N.Y., the Panthers opened with a 1-0 win over James Madison. Sophomore Madi Gore pitched the shutout win. State fell to top-seeded Hofstra on its home field 1-0. By defeating James Madison again, 2-1, State earned a berth into the championship game against Hofstra. Hofstra took the crown with a 3-1 victory.

One of the leaders for the Panthers was CAA co-Rookie of the Year Danielle Roddy. Roddy led the conference with 43 walks which was a team high and school record. She had team highs of .348 batting and 70 hits with 13 doubles and 21 RBI. Roddy was ranked nationally in three categories, the highest at No. 21 in toughest to strikeout, and received CAA Player of the Week honors on February 20. She was also named to the All-CAA first team and All-Rookie team. Other players receiving league honors include Mary Kathryn Branan, Nichole Griffin, Gore and Rachel Cunningham. Branan was selected to the first team batting .299 with a CAA second best 17

doubles. She was sixth in the CAA in runs scored, hits and runs batted in. Griffin was a second team selection with a team high and CAA second best 46 RBIs. She saw the plate 207 times and batted .295 with 15 doubles and nine home runs. Griffin was named CAA Player of the Week on March 7.

Gore earned second team honors with a league second best in innings pitched, strikeouts, wins and appearances. She became the sixth Panther to win 20 games with a 20-12 record. Gore had a 2.48 ERA with five shutouts and 173 batters retired. Cunningham joined Roddy on the All-Rookie team and was second on the team with a .316 batting average. She had 14 doubles and 27 RBIs. Cunningham led the CAA in assists with 146. Nikki Bradford also received recognition during the season, garnering two Rookie of the Week awards.

Georgia State set many new school records in the 2007 season, totaling 11. The pitchers only gave up 123 walks; allowed 483 hits; tied runs allowed with 238 and had the lowest ERA at 3.16. The team hit 96 doubles, 265 RBIs and had 506 hits on 1773 at bats. The Panthers waited for 209 walks but struck out 341 times. State fielded a school best .971, which led the CAA.

Individually, MK Branan's 17 doubles placed her third in a season and 42 career doubles is third all time. Griffin's 15 doubles places her fifth for a season. She hit nine home runs, tying her total from 2006 and placed her fourth in career home runs with 18. Griffin drove home 46 runners placing her third for a season.

Lily Skelton blasted 10 home runs tying the second place record in a season. Roddy accumulated 43 walks this season a new school record. Alison Bradford garnered 32 walks moving her up to third in a season and with a career total of 71 etched third all-time. Gore collected 20 wins this season, tying her for third in Panthers' history for a season and 220 innings pitched for fifth in a season.

Head Coach Bob Heck upped his win total at Georgia State to 581 in 20 seasons. The Panthers return eight players in the 2008 season, including CAA co-Rookie of the Year, All-CAA First Team and All-Rookie Team member Roddy. Returnees include seniors Ashley Cowan and Jessica Gowin, juniors Gore, Chelsey Morgan and Holly Willis and sophomores Cunningham, Lauren Fetters, Lily Skelton and Elizabeth Thomas.

PANTHER PROMISE

The blueprint for academic and personal success for Georgia State student-athletes is PANTHER PROMISE.

Panther Promise was developed in 2005 to assist student-athletes with concerns that are unique to the Division I student-athlete and tailored to fit the unique environment of Georgia State University.

Panther Promise is an extension of the services provided by PASS-Program for Academic Support Services. Through PASS and the Athletic Learning Lab, Georgia State's student-athlete development

staff arranges tutoring in a wide range of courses, offers academic advisement and provides access to computers and a convenient place to study.

Other components of Panther Promise are the NCAA's CHAMPS/Life Skills program and the Panther Den, which offers a variety of services in conjunction with the University's Counseling Center to address the challenges that face the Georgia State student-athlete.

The McElroy Files



MARY MCELROY DIRECTOR OF INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS

3RD YEAR

Now in her third year as Director of Athletics, Mary McElroy has brought tremendous optimism, organization and leadership as well as a tireless work ethic to Georgia State University athletics.

Hired in July of 2005 by President Carl Patton, McElroy is leading the Panther program to unprecedented heights in every area by transforming the department, guiding the University in its move to the Colonial Athletic Association, and perhaps most important, raising the expectations for Georgia State athletics.

Her accomplishments in just two short years include dramatic increases in athletics fundraising, the hiring of former National Coach of the Year Rod Barnes as men's basketball coach, the completion of a feasibility study for the addition of football and the subsequent launch of a fundraising campaign for the sport, numerous facilities upgrades, strong academic performance by Panther student-athletes, and a smooth transition to the higher level of competition in the CAA.

The former Marine Corps Captain, 1987 graduate of the Naval Academy and 2000 graduate of Georgia Tech's MBA program has been recognized by her peers. In August 2006, the National Association of Collegiate Women Athletic Administrators (NACWAA) named McElroy as the NCAA Division I-AAA Administrator of the Year.

McElroy's vision for Georgia State to be "the student-athlete's first choice" is being realized as the program grows in stature within the CAA and on the national level.

BUILDING THE PROGRAM

McElroy has reshaped and reenergized the athletic department and now has it poised for progress and consistent achievements. One of her first major accomplishments was to develop and implement the Strategic Plan that established the athletic department's vision and defined the pathways to those objectives.

McElroy further mandated the development of the department's Policies and Procedures Manual, which outlines operational procedures to keep the department functioning efficiently. Every unit within the department knows its methods to carry out the plan. Every team within the program understands what is expected and has a plan to meet the intended goals. Every student-athlete understands the expectations and support systems available to achieve success.

Her first year saw record development for financial support. Just under one million dollars was raised and earmarked for scholarship endowments, while support was maintained for the operating budget that increased due to boarder travel requirements in the CAA. Under McElroy's leadership, the department added assistant coaches and support staff to better serve the student-athletes.

McElroy has created new revenue streams with a new partnership with ISP Sports that immediately resulted in a 200 percent increase in sponsorship revenues. She also inked a department-wide apparel agreement with Adidas. A new partnership with XOS Technologies, Inc. has enhanced the athletics' department website and improved the services provided to Georgia State fans.

While improving every existing sports program, McElroy has also focused on the potential addition of a Division I football program for Georgia State.

In response to a directive from President Patton and as a result of interest expressed by alumni, staff and students, a feasibility study was completed in 2006 to effectively gauge the interest and financial obligations of adding football. An unprecedented fundraising campaign is now underway as Georgia State football moves closer to becoming a reality.

GROWING FACILITIES

Nowhere has McElroy's vision been more evident than in Georgia State's growing and improving facilities as she seeks to provide first-class venues that will benefit student-athletes and fans alike.

A two-year, \$5-million plan for the development of Panthersville Athletics Complex is nearing completion and will ultimately result in a new soccer venue, tennis courts and locker room facilities. Phase I was completed in Fall 2006 and Phase II will be complete in 2008. Upgrades are ongoing for the softball and baseball facilities already located at Panthersville, which will become the home for all of Georgia State's outdoor athletic teams except track and field.

At the Georgia State Sports Arena, a video board has been added, along with numerous other amenities and a renewed emphasis on customer service to enhance the gameday experience for Panther fans.

ACADEMICS ALWAYS FIRST

Working within the framework of NCAA guidelines, Georgia State student-athletes are challenged to excel in the classroom and are provided with a support system to meet the challenges of balancing academics and athletics.

The Panthers have responded with their highest cumulative grade point average ever. The student-athlete population, which numbers nearly 250, achieved a grade point average of 2.87 for the Spring 2007 semester to boost its combined cumulative mark to 2.93. Both figures exceed the corresponding marks for the overall student body.

Under the Academic Progress Rate established by the NCAA, Georgia State has had no teams penalized, two teams with perfect scores, and four teams with APR scores in the top 10 percent in the nation. Eight teams had scores higher than the Division I average in the respective sport for 2005-06.

On the field of competition, the student-athletes have responded against the tougher level of play as well, achieving solid winning percentages across the 16 teams. Athletics highlights in the first two years include CAA team titles in men's and women's golf, and men's tennis.

PRIOR TO GEORGIA STATE

McElroy's athletic management career began in 1992 where she worked her way up to assistant athletic director at the Naval Academy. She was Senior Woman Administrator and oversaw compliance for 29 sports. She also served a stint as Director of Alumni Services at Navy.

From June 1999, until her appointment at Georgia State, McElroy served on the athletic management team at Georgia Tech. After first serving as Director of Compliance, she left Georgia Tech as Senior Associate Director of Athletics and Senior Woman Administrator. She was the primary administrator for men's and women's basketball, men's and women's tennis and softball, while overseeing the compliance staff, supervising game operations for basketball and assisting with football game management.

McElroy was appointed to the NCAA Management Council in 2005, and was a member of the NCAA Volleyball Committee. For the Atlantic Coast Conference, McElroy served on several committees, including the Softball Committee, of which she was the chair, as well as the Women's Basketball Committee, the Head Trainer's Committee, the Senior Women's Administrators' Committee, and an Ad Hoc Committee on student-athlete welfare.

As a member of the CAA, McElroy was reappointed to the NCAA Management Council in October 2006 and was elected to serve on the Board of Directors for the NACWAA, also in October 2006. She chairs the CAA Awards Committee and serves on the CAA Executive Committee.

McElroy has been called upon to be a guest speaker at various events, including the Mercer University Adult Education program, the NCAA Institute for Ethnic Minority Females, the Atlanta Sports Hall of Fame, the NCAA Gender Equity and Issues Forum, and most recently, the 2007 convention of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA).

When the NCAA Women's Final Four was played in Atlanta in 2003, McElroy played a key role in planning and staging the event as the tournament manager. She was also on the Atlanta Local Organizing Committee for the NCAA Men's Final Four in Atlanta in 2002 and again in 2007.

As a student at the Naval Academy, McElroy played varsity basketball in the Colonia Athletic Association. She was a captain of the club softball team and now stays active athletically in local softball leagues.

A native of Great Mills, Md., she is married to a fellow Naval Academy graduate, Terry ('86) and they have two sons, Darrin (17) and Austin (13).

Commissioner Thomas E. Yeager has guided the CAA since its inception in 1983. The CAA now sponsors 22 sports with the addition of a 12-team football league in 2007. The conference has made its presence known nationally in men's basketball with four teams advancing to post-season play for the past three years.

In women's basketball, the CAA had three teams earn NCAA Tournament berths for the first time and four squads advanced to post-season play for the second straight year.

The conference also excels in many other sports. Delaware became the first CAA team to reach the Final Four of the NCAA Men's Lacrosse Championship in 2007. A league-record four men's soccer teams earned NCAA berths in 2006, with Towson and Old Dominion reaching the round of 16.

CAA member institutions are also committed to excellence in the classroom. The Colonial Academic Alliance was created in 2002 by the league's presidents with the goal of expanding their partnership to all aspects of university life outside of intercollegiate athletics. Among the programs already established are an undergraduate research conference, coordination of study abroad programs and granting visiting academic status to student-athletes traveling to an away contest so that they have access to libraries, academic resource centers and computer labs.

In 2002, two faculty members from CAA institutions were awarded academia's most coveted distinction- the Nobel Prize. John B. Fenn, a research professor in the Department of Chemistry at Virginia Commonwealth, received the Nobel Prize for chemistry, and Vernon Smith, a professor of economics and law at George Mason University, shared the Nobel Prize in economic sciences.

From all-star athletes to Nobel Prize winning faculty, the CAA takes great pride in producing performers who stand out both on the playing field and in the classroom.

In 2006-07, the CAA had six ESPN the Magazine Academic All-Americans and more than 1,600 of 4,000 student-athletes received the Commissioner's Academic Award after posting at least a 3.2 grade point average while lettering in a varsity sport.

CONTINUES SUCCESS IN CAA

After a long relationship with the Atlantic Sun Conference (formerly the Trans America Athletic Conference), the Panthers made a dramatic move to the Colonial Athletic Association for the 2005-06 season - one year earlier than planned.

Under the guidance of third-year Director of Athletics Mary McElroy, a former NCAA student-athlete herself, Georgia State is making huge strides in its new league, capturing three league championships and battling for others in several sports.

Over the past nine years, Georgia State has accumulated 23 conference championships, 24 NCAA bids, 20 conference Coaches of the Year, 15 conference Players of the Year and eight All-Americans.

Last year, State's student-athletes hit the books hard as well with 106 earning the CAA Commissioner's Academic Award and two earning *ESPN The Magazine* Academic all-district recognition. The 2006-07 season also saw State's teams combine for 45 all-Conference picks.

Volleyball led things off in the fall. The Panthers remained in contention for a CAA postseason tournament berth and finished tied for seventh at the conclusion of the regular season.

Men's and women's cross country finished third in their league championship meets, while the soccer teams posted big conference wins in their third seasons.

In 2006, the basketball teams battled well during the winter in one of the most competitive leagues in the country as the CAA's men's RPI ranked 8th nationally out of 32 conferences and the women's was 9th out of 31. The men's team won its second straight first-round league championship contests in upset fashion on a play that was No. 1 on *SportsCenter's Top Plays*. Early in the season, Panthers' head coach Lea Henry notched her 200th victory as mentor of the women's team and senior Kelcey Roegiers-Jensen was named female Student-Athlete of the Year.

Women's tennis saw three players record 20+ win seasons as the Panthers won a CAA Tournament game for the first time in advancing to the league semifinals.

Track & Field: a record 13 entrants earned NCAA Region bids. The women placed 3rd while the men were 8th at the CAA Championships and the 4x100m and 4x400m teams were CAA champions

GEORGIA STATE FACILITIES

Georgia State University has several fine athletic facilities that its student-athletes call home. While men's and women's basketball and women's volleyball compete at the Georgia State Sports Arena in downtown Atlanta, most of the Panthers' athletic teams host their competitions at the Georgia State University Panthersville Recreation and Athletics Complex, located about 10 miles from campus in DeKalb County. The complex includes the home facilities for the sports of men's and women's soccer, baseball, softball, and men's and women's cross country.

Men's and Women's tennis programs compete at nearby Piedmont Tennis Center in Piedmont Park. Piedmont Park is a 189 acre stretch of land located in Midtown, north of the city center and just five minutes from Georgia State's campus. The Piedmont Tennis Center boasts 12 lighted hard courts nestled in the backdrop of Atlanta's skyline.

Most recently, an ambitious long-term development project began on Wednesday, June 28, 2006 with an official ground breaking ceremony for the new Panthersville Athletics Complex. The focus of the project is to bring most of Georgia State's outdoor athletic programs into one full-use facility.

The multi-year project will include two soccer fields and a tennis complex that will have six indoor courts and four outdoor courts and a new locker room facility. Parking lots, walking areas, and lighting will also be added to enhance the newly developed athletic complex.





The Georgia State Sports Arena serves as the "Home of the Panthers" for both men's and women's basketball, volleyball and the Athletic Department offices. The Arena is just one block from the State Capitol and Underground Atlanta, as well just two blocks from Peachtree Street. In 2005, the athletic offices received an uplift to its offices and locker rooms.

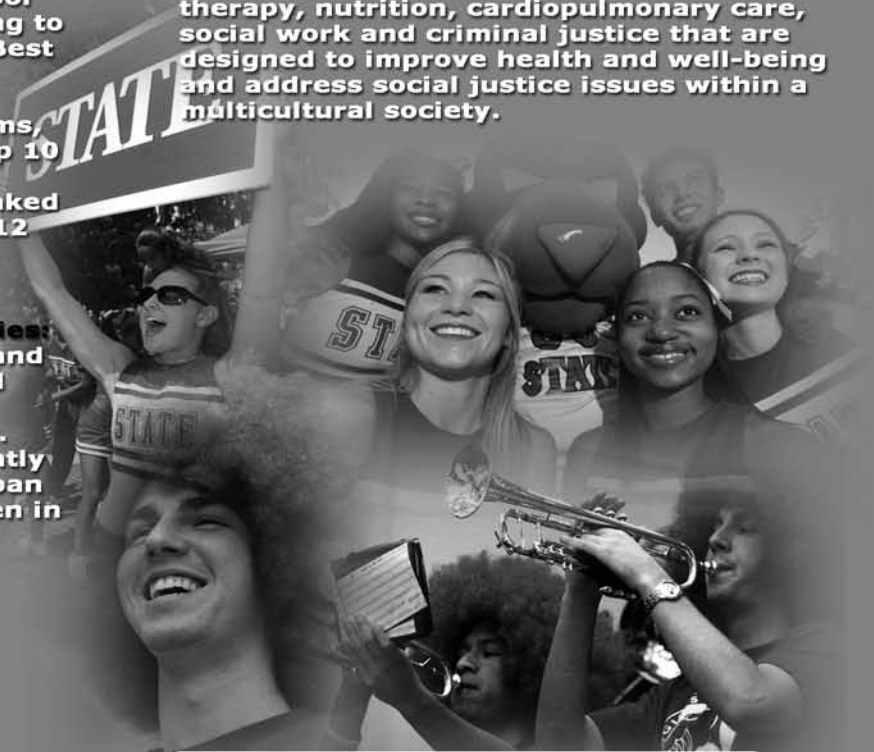
