THE KICKOFF

Georgia State ventures to New England for the first time ever as the Panthers play at Colonial Athletic Association foe Rhode Island Saturday for a 1 p.m. contest at Meade Stadium.

Both teams are in search of their first victory of the season. Georgia State fell to 0-6 with last Saturday's 44-21 loss to No. 17/14 New Hampshire. The Rams are 0-5 after falling to Brown, 17-7.

With GSU's reclassification to the Football Bowl Subdivision and move to the Sun Belt Conference in 2013, this fall marks the Panthers' first and only season of CAA Football, but GSU does not count in the CAA standings.

WILSON STRETCHES THE FIELD

Junior wide receiver Albert Wilson caught touchdown passes of 54 and 47 yards against New Hampshire, giving him 13 career TD catches, including seven of 40 yards or more.

Earlier this season, Wilson caught an 84-yard touchdown pass from Ben McLane on the Panthers' third snap against UTSA for the longest play from scrimmage in Georgia State history.

Wilson, from Port St. Lucie, Fla., has a hand in the three longest plays from scrimmage in GSU history with touchdown catches covering 78 and 64 yards last season against South Alabama. Add his 97-yard kickoff return against Alabama in 2010, and he has been involved in four of the five longest plays in Panther annals (Darren McCray had a 96-yard kickoff return vs. Campbell in 2010).

Including the kickoff return, Wilson's 14 career touchdowns have covered an average of 49.1 yards. He averages 18.8 yards for his 83 career receptions.

He also had non-scoring receptions of 51 yards vs. Campbell in 2010, 55 and 54 yards vs. Jacksonville State in 2011 and 50 yards vs. St. Francis in 2011, giving him nine receptions of 50 yards or longer in his career, five of them for touchdowns.

HUBBARD IN TOP THREE IN FCS

Georgia State punter Matt Hubbard owns the third-best punting average in FCS, averaging 46.29 yards per kick. Fifteen of his 28 punts have travelled 50 yards or more, including his amazing 80-yard boot against South Carolina State.

The Panthers net punting average of 41.52 is the second-best mark in FCS.

Because of GSU's reclassification to the Football Bowl Subdivision, Hubbard and the Panthers do not qualify for NCAA rankings in FBS or FCS. The top individual averages in FCS belongs to Tony Epperson of Weber State at 48.00 and Bobby Wenzig of Alabama State at 46.88, while the top net punting average is Hampton at 41.69.

Hubbard's career average stands at 43.6.

THE DONALD

Senior running back Donald Russell ranks third in the CAA in rushing at 90.3 yards per game. He averages 5.8 yards per carry.

Russell has topped 100 yards in three of the Panthers six games this season. Most recently, he had 107 yards rushing and four catches against William and Mary. That followed 119 yards rushing and five receptions for 51 yards vs. Richmond for a career-high 170 all-purpose yards.

Russell opened his senior season by rushing for 120 yards on just 12 carries against South Carolina State. Against SCSU, Russell raced 52 yards on his first carry of the season, and he matched that with a 52-yard run against Richmond. Those are his longest runs for the Panthers but not the longest of his career; he had a 79-yard scamper as a freshman at Kentucky in 2009.

Russell is the Panthers' career rushing leader with 1,207 yards and 10 touchdowns. Last season, the transfer from Kentucky became the first 100-yard rusher in school history when he gained 136 yards against South Alabama. He added a career-high 146 yards in the 2011 finale against Campbell.

OH-BOY

Senior tight end Emmanuel Ogbuehi (pronounced oh-BOY-ee) turned in the most productive game of his career against New Hampshire. He caught four passes for 76 yards against the Wildcats, both career highs, highlighted by a 26-yard touchdown pass from Ben McLane.

QUARTERBACK CAROUSEL CONTINUES

Many of Georgia State's struggles on offense can be traced to lack of stability and consistency at the quarterback position. In two plus seasons, the Panthers have started five different quarterbacks, including two this season.

Both starters this season are redshirt freshmen in Ben McLane and Ronnie Bell.

McLane, from Snellville, Ga., and Brookwood High School, started GSU's first four games before giving way to Bell in game five. Bell, from Fayetteville, Ga., and Sandy Creek High, showed positive signs in his first start, completing 13 of 26 passes for 157 yards against William and Mary and converting eight third downs with passes or runs. But after Bell struggled in the first half against New Hampshire, McLane took over for the second half and completed 10 of 19 passes for 169 and two touchdown passes.

LUTZ TAKES OVER KICKING DUTIES

Wil Lutz is the latest true freshman to take on a prominent role for the Panthers. After handling kickoffs for GSU all season, he added field goal duties against William and Mary. The Newnan, Ga., native put both of his kickoffs into the end zone for touchbacks and booted a 37-yard field goal on his only attempt. That is the longest field goal for GSU this season.

WHAT IS THIS STUFF?

Saturday's game at Rhode Island will mark just the fourth game in Georgia State history to be played on natural grass.

The Panthers first three games on natural grass have been GSU's three FBS games: at Alabama's Bryant-Denny Stadium in 2010, at Houston's Robertson Stadium in 2011 and at Tennessee's Neyland Stadium earlier this season. The game at Tennessee was also the first time the Panthers played a game in the rain.

FELDER HONORED IN THE CLASSROOM

Senior outside linebacker Akeen Felder is one of 147 student-athletes who have been named as candidates for the 2012 NFF National Scholar-Athlete Awards, and semifinalists for the 2012 William V. Campbell Trophy, which recognizes the top football scholar-athlete in the nation.

A native of Perry, Ga., Felder earned his degree in sociology in 2012 and is now working a minor in hospitality management. He has been named to the Dean's List and Athletic Director's Honor Roll and serves on the GSU Student-Athlete Advisory Committee. On the field, Felder has played in every game in GSU history and served as the Panthers' special teams captain in 2011.

WOODARD MANS THE MIDDLE

Perhaps the most improved player on the Georgia State defense is noseguard Terrance Woodard. The junior from Ocilla, Ga., is the Panthers' leading tackler with 41. He also has two tackles for loss, one sack, two pass breakups and a fumble recovery at Tennessee.

HONORS & RECORDS FOR PUNTER HUBBARD

Georgia State punter Matt Hubbard had a record-breaking night in the Panthers' season opener against South Carolina State. Hubbard averaged an eye-catching 62.2 yards on five punts, easily the best single-game average in GSU history, highlighted by a school-record punt of 80 yards.

Hubbard's average is better than both the NCAA FBS and FCS single-game records for punting average in a game with a minimum of five punts. However, because Georgia State is in the process of reclassifying from FCS to FBS, marks achieved by GSU players during the 2012 and 2013 seasons do not count as NCAA records.

The current FCS record for punting average in a game, with a minimum of five punts, is 61.5 yards, set by Eddie Johnson of Idaho State versus Cal Poly in 2002. The FBS record of 60.4 is shared by two players, Lee Johnson, BYU vs. Wyoming, 1983, and Quinn Sharp of Oklahoma State vs. Nebraska, 2010.

The sophomore from Peachtree City, Ga., was named CAA Football Special Teams Player of the Week -- the first such honoree in GSU history -- and FCS National Special Teams Player of the Week by the Sports Network. He was also recognized as FCS National Punter of the Week by the College Football Performance Awards.

In addition to the 80-yarder, he also had boots of 58, 59, 55 and 59 yards.

HEY JOE

Georgia State's third-leading tackler is true freshman linebacker Joseph Peterson with 29 hits.

Peterson, from Dothan, Ala., has started four game at middle linebacker. In his debut against South Carolina State, he was the Panthers' second-leading tackler with eight hits, including a tackle for loss. After that performance, he served as a game captain for the Panthers' game at Tennessee and made nine tackles against the Vols. He added 10 tackles against UTSA.

As a senior at Dothan High, Peterson was a first-team all-state in Class 6A by the Alabama Sportswriters Association. He made 112 tackles, including eight tackles for loss and four sacks. On offense, he ran for 669 yards and 12 touchdowns.

SIX TRUE FRESHMEN SEE ACTION

Six true freshmen have seen action for the Panthers this season, including four on defense, one receiver/return specialist and one kicker.

Two true freshmen have started on defense in Joseph Peterson, one of the Panthers' leading tackler with 29, and outside linebacker Bryan Williams, the younger brother of former GSU tight end Arthur "Bully" Williams who saw his first action against Richmond and then made his first start at William and Mary.

Two other freshmen are playing on the defensive line in tackle Joe Lockley of Portal, Ga., and defensive end Melvin King of Hinesville, Ga. Lockley, an honorable mention all-state selection at tiny Portal High, is perhaps the strongest player on the team, and against Tennessee, he came up with an interception on a tipped ball.

Avery Sweeting of Brunswick, Ga., is beginning to earn playing time as a wide receiver and kickoff returner.

Freshman kicker Wil Lutz, a walk-on from Newnan, Ga., is handling kickoffs for the Panthers and booted his first field goal at William and Mary.

RUNNING WITH PURPOSE

Junior wide receiver Albert Wilson leads the CAA in all-purpose yards, averaging 130.7 yards per game.

Wilson is the Panthers' leading receiver with 27 catches for 491 yards and five touchdowns. He also averages 9.0 yards on punt returns and 21.1 yards on kickoff returns.

Running back Donald Russell is sixth in the league with 111.2 all-purpose yards per game. He is Georgia State's top rusher (542 yards) and second-leading receiver (14 catches for 125 yards).

Wilson is GSU's career leader with 2,926 all-purpose yards (117.0 per game), while Russell is second at 1,373 yards.

28 AND COUNTING

Junior right tackle Grant King, who entered the season as the only returning starter on Georgia State's offensive line, is also the only current player who has started all 28 games in the Panthers' brief history. The Columbia, S.C., native was a member of GSU's first recruiting class in 2009.

Just two other Panthers have played in all 28 games: linebackers Akeen Felder and Robert Ferguson.

GSU VS. FBS

Georgia State has played one FBS program in each of its first three seasons, including two from the powerful Southeastern Conference.

Most recently, the Panthers fell to Tennessee, 51-13, at historic Neyland Stadium, on Sept. 8, 2012.

In the inaugural season of 2010, Georgia State played at defending national champion and 10th-ranked Alabama (l. 63-7), and last year the Panthers faced Houston and its record-setting quarterback, Case Keenum (l. 56-0).

FINAL SEASON FOR CURRY

Georgia State head coach Bill Curry announced during preseason camp that the 2012 season will be his last on the sideline. Curry was named GSU's first head coach on June 12, 2008 and has guided the program through its infancy. The former head coach at Georgia Tech, Alabama and Kentucky is entering his 20th season as a collegiate head coach. He will remain at Georgia State as a special assistant to Director of Athletics Cheryl L. Levick and President Mark Becker.

YEAR ONE OF FBS TRANSITION

Season three of Georgia State football marks another significant milestone for the program as the Panthers begin their two-year transition to the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) and the Sun Belt Conference while playing their first and only season of CAA Football.

The Panthers will play a full CAA schedule this fall but are not eligible for the CAA championship or the FCS playoffs. In 2013, Georgia State will play a full Sun Belt schedule but will not be eligible for the conference title or for postseason bowl games until 2014.

DANNY BOY

Junior Danny Williams caught at least one pass in the first 23 games in Georgia State history. He missed the Tennessee game due to injury, and then he had his consecutive games streak broken when he played sparingly against UTSA while still recovering and did not manage a catch. He rebounded with four receptions against Richmond.

After two-plus seasons, Williams has a GSU-record 94 career receptions for 1,251 yards (second in GSU annals) and eight touchdowns.

Williams led GSU in receptions (54), receiving yards (649) and touchdown catches (5) during the inaugural season of 2010. Last season, he had 30 catches for 485 yards and two scores.

He also owns the Panthers' single-game record for receptions (11 vs. Old Dominion in 2010). He has four of the eight 100-yard games in GSU history.

BILUKIDI IS GSU'S FIRST NFL PLAYER

Former Georgia State defensive lineman Christo Bilukidi continues to make GSU history as he launches his career in the National Football League.

Last spring, he became the first Panther to be drafted by the NFL when he was selected in the sixth round of the 2012 NFL Draft by the Oakland Raiders.

After earning a roster spot with the Raiders, he saw action as a backup defensive tackle in the Raiders' season-opening loss to the San Diego Chargers on Monday Night Football.

Bilukidi is the first former Georgia State athlete in more than 20 years and just the second ever to play in a regular-season game in one of the four major sports leagues. The only other Panther to do so was basketball player Lanard Copeland, who spent time with the NBA's Philadelphia 76'ers and

Los Angeles Clippers, last playing in a regular-season game for the Clippers on Nov. 30, 1991 with a four-minute stint against the Charlotte Hornets.

Bilukidi's teammate last year, linebacker Jake Muasau, signed a free agent contract with the New York Giants but was waived during final cuts.

A third senior from last year's squad, safety Brandon Jones, was actually the first GSU football alumnus to play in a professional game when he appeared in the Arena Football League, playing for the Tampa Bay Storm.

Georgia State actually had an alumnus in professional football long before the school had a football team. Former GSU soccer player Keith Gispert, a standout for the Panthers from 1996-98, was a kicker in the Arena League for the Chicago Rush and Georgia Force from 2003-07.

HOGAN PULLS DOUBLE DUTY

Junior inside linebacker Mark Hogan was the first scholarship football player in Georgia State history when he enrolled in January 2009. In 2001, he achieved another first as the football program's first two-sport athlete. Hogan played for the GSU baseball team last spring as a left-handed hitting outfielder. He saw action in 42 games and had the team's top batting average (.319) and on-base percentage (.448) with two home runs and 13 RBI.

Hogan also found time in the spring to earn his bachelor's degree in finance and is now pursuing a second degree.

SIX GRADUATES

This year's Georgia State team features six student-athletes who have already earned a degree from GSU.

Two of the graduates are actually juniors in terms of eligibility. Offensive lineman Michael Davis graduated last spring in real estate and has begun work on his MBA. Linebacker Mark Hogan graduated in finance and is now completing a second major in managerial sciences.

Senior linebacker Akeen Felder is working on a minor in hospitality management after graduating in sociology. Running back Rosevelt Watson also graduated in sociology and is now completing a second major in math education, and running back Malcolm Smith graduated in film and video and is completing a second major in computer information systems. Senior offensive lineman Kam Cheatham graduated in business economics and is pursuing a second degree in hospitality management.

NFL FACILITIES

Georgia State is one of just nine Division I programs to play its home games in the same facility as an NFL team. The others are Miami, Pittsburgh, San Diego State, Temple, Tulane, USF, Tennessee State and UMass.

FREE FOOTBALL

In Georgia State's first two seasons of football, five of the Panthers 22 games were decided in overtime. In the inaugural season of 2010, the Panthers split a pair of overtime games. Last season, Georgia State played three straight overtime games, including a double-overtime victory of South Alabama. All but one were played at the Georgia Dome.

Mark Hogan, Jr. was GSU's first scholarship football player when he enrolled in January 2009. His father, Mark, Sr., played for Curry at Tech from 1982-85. Mark, Jr., spent the spring 2009 semester as a team of one, working out by himself.

The father of redshirt freshman safety Nick Henderson, Steve Henderson, played for Curry at Georgia Tech in the early 1980s.

In addition, redshirt freshman defensive lineman McClain Head is the nephew of Tony Head, a running back at Tech when Curry was an assistant coach in 1976.

ANOTHER FAMOUS FATHER

Sophomore cornerback Brent McClendon is the son of former Chicago Bears running back Willie McClendon. The elder McClendon starred at Georgia, where he was the 1978 Southeastern Conference Player of the Year. Brent's older brother, Bryan, also played at Georgia and is now the running backs coach for the Bulldogs.

**Game 1: Aug. 30, 2012 • 7:30 p.m. (CSS)

Richard Cue was just too much for Georgia State in Thursday's 2012 season opener. The South Carolina State quarterback threw for 300 yards and three touchdowns as the Bulldogs defeated the Panthers, 33-6 in front of 18,921 at the Georgia Dome.

Georgia State scored on its first possession of the second half, getting a 25-yard field goal from Matt Ehasz to get to within 14-6. But the hosts never got closer.

On the ensuing drive, Cue, who a year ago threw for just 900 yards in nine games, completed all three of his pass attempts, including a 13-yard touchdown toss to Tyler McDonald that put the Bulldogs up 21-6.

In between two Georgia State drives-one that ended on a punt and the other when Ehasz's 36-yard field goal attempt was wide right-Nick Belcher kicked a pair of field goals from 20 and 27 yards, the last of which capped a 17-play drive and made it 27-6 with just under six minutes to play.

"Obviously a huge disappointment," said Georgia State coach Bill Curry. "We have a good football team and we'll continue to work very hard. We will not concede anything. (South Carolina State) played well, did a lot of things well, better than we did. We'll learn from it, go back to work and we'll be a good football team this year. We'll go back to work tomorrow morning and keep working until we perform the way we can."

A late touchdown pass helped South Carolina State build a 14-3 halftime lead. With 40 seconds left in the second quarter, Cue led the visiting Bulldogs on a two-play drive, culminating in a 22-yard touchdown toss to McDonald. The junior wide receiver made a great catch, then tight-roped the sideline and reached the end zone.

Georgia State, kicking off its third season and final one under coach Bill Curry, had cut the deficit to 7-3 on a 36-yard field goal by Matt Ehasz. But the Panthers couldn't capitalize after Cue was intercepted for the second time in the half, this time by Brent McClendon with 5:40 to play in the second. Ehasz's 24-yard attempt hit the right upright to keep it a four-point game.

"We had plenty of chances. We had a good chance coming out during the second half," said Curry. "When we get in the red zone, we have to score. And we just didn't do that."

South Carolina State struck first. On a third-and-seven deep in their own territory, the Bulldogs got a 73-yard touchdown connection from Cue to Lennel Elmore to make it 7-0 just 54 seconds into the game.

Georgia State had a pair of record-breaking plays in the opening half. Senior running back Donald Russell (120 yards on 12 carries) tied teammate Kelton Hill for the fourth-longest run from scrimmage in the Panthers' three-year history with a 52-yard scamper midway through the first quarter. That gave the Panthers the ball at the South Carolina State 32-yard line, but the drive stalled after three short runs and an incompletion on fourth-and-two.

Punter Matt Hubbard bested his own school record with an 80-yard punt that pinned South Carolina State to its two-yard line. Hubbard's previous best was a 64-yarder against Texas-San Antonio in October, 2011.

That set up the Panthers' defense, which came up with a big stop on third-and-two to force a punt.

Redshirt-freshman Ben McLane, making his first collegiate start at quarterback, came through with his first big play, hooking up with Danny Williams for a 20-yard completion. It allowed Ehasz to boot his field goal with 6:33 left until halftime.

McLane struggled in his debut but was under heavy pressure the entire night. He completed just 7 of 15 passes for 54 yards and was sacked five times.

"We'd told him that this would be faster than anything he'd seen. But he will adjust in time," Curry said of McLane. "I'm not sure he really got a fair chance to show what he can do"

Hill relieved McLane on a number of possessions, and the redshirt-junior was 7 of 13 for 76 yards.

Late in the game, Georgia State was driving when Parris Lee fumbled, Dominique Mitchell recovered and returned it 68 yards for a touchdown and a 33-6 cushion.

Playing just its third game ever against a Football Bowl Subdivision opponent, Georgia State (0-2) fell, 51-13, at Tennessee (2-0) at Neyland Stadium.

"We fought and scratched every step of the way," said GSU head coach Bill Curry. "Are we playing the error-free football we need to, no. But we're playing with a lot of effort and we'll learn from this experience."

"We showed much more grit and determination this game than last week, and we'll show more next week and the next week," he added.

Tennessee's Tyler Bray completed 18 of 20 passes for 310 yards and four touchdowns, three of them to Justin Hunter, who finished with eight catches for 146 yards.

"Tennessee's execution in the passing game was superb," said Curry. "We were taught some painful lessons by a great receiving corps and a potentially great quarterback. He was really delivering the ball in rhythm."

Despite the final score, the Panthers had bright spots in all phases.

Quarterback Ben McLane, the redshirt freshman playing just his second college game before 87,821 fans, was 18-for-41 for 146 yards. He converted three fourth downs with runs, and he scored the Panthers' only touchdown on a 12-yard scramble.

"He did a lot of great things today, and he also did some truly freshman things," Curry said of McLane, who at times had trouble handling the shotgun snaps.

Albert Wilson caught eight passes for 74 yards, and Donald Russell added 68 yards on the ground on 15 carries.

On defense, the GSU defensive line came up with a pair of turnovers as Terrance Woodard recovered a fumble and Joe Lockley grabbed an interception on a tipped ball.

Punter Matt Hubbard was impressive again, averaging 44.8 yards on eight punts, and placekicker Christian Benvenuto booted field goals of 32 and 30 yards.

Georgia State trailed just 7-3 after one quarter. After Tennessee took the opening kickoff and drove 78 yards on 13 plays, the Panthers answered with a long drive of their own, moving 60 yards on 14 plays for a field goal.

Facing third-and-25 on their own 25-yard line following a clipping penalty, McLane found Wilson for 24 yards to the 49. GSU then converted the fourth-and-one as McLane rambled seven yards up the middle on a quarterback keeper.

After Russell ran 26 yards before he was tripped up a the three, the Panthers had to settle for a 32-yard field goal by Christian Benvenuto.

Tennessee began its next possession in great field position at the GSU 39 after a 61-yard kickoff return by Cordarelle Patterson, but after one first down, the Panther defense held on three straight plays and forced a 38-yard field goal attempt, which Michael Palardy missed.

The GSU defense forced a three-and-out on the Vols' next possession, but a 35-yard punt return but UT in business again at the GSU 40, and this time, Bray needed just two plays, hitting Hunter for 21 yards and then tight end Mychal Rivera for the 19-yard touchdown and a 14-3 lead with 11 minutes left in the half.

But the Panthers cut the deficit to 14-6 late in the second quarter as Benvenuto booted his second field goal from 30 yards with 5:31 left in the half. The drive started after Woodard recovered a fumble at the UT 41.

McLane's fourth-quarter touchdown was a 12-yard run on fourth-and-seven to cap a 12-play, 80-yard drive.

The Panthers played much of the game without two of their top three receivers. Danny Williams did not play due to the lingering effects of an ankle injury he sustained last game. Jordan Giles left the game with a shoulder injury after catching two passes for 34 yards in the first quarter.

Georgia State fell to UTSA, 38-14, Saturday night at the Georgia Dome. Albert Wilson had three 100-yard receiving games a year ago. Saturday, the Georgia State wide receiver got his first in 2012. Wilson caught six passes for 150 yards and two touchdowns for the Panthers.

Georgia State remained winless at 0-3, while UTSA improved to 3-0.

Wilson, a junior, helped the Panthers take their only lead of the game early in the opening quarter. Ben McLane hooked up with Wilson for an 84-yard touchdown on State's third play from scrimmage. The play accounted for the longest play from scrimmage in school history, surpassing Wilson's 78-yard touchdown catch from Kelton Hill against South Alabama last October.

UTSA answered with consecutive scoring drives to take a 10-point lead late in the opening quarter. Four plays after an 84-yard kickoff return by Kenny Harrison, UTSA got a five-yard touchdown run from Evans Okotcha to go up 10-7. Roadrunners quarterback Eric Soza then completed four of five pass attempts, including a five-yard touchdown toss

to Aaron Grubb in the corner of the end zone to make it a 17-7 game.

Soza was 17-of-24 for 206 yards, and 10 different receivers caught passes.

"Great throws gave the guys some opportunities, but the receivers took advantage of those opportunities," said UTSA coach Larry Coker. "Your quarterbacks make your receivers look good and your receivers make your quarterbacks look good."

After a 13-play Panthers' drive ended with a blocked field goal attempt, UTSA got four plays of at least 14 yards during a 10-play drive and Okotcha dove in from a yard out to push the lead out to 24-7 with 5:31 left until halftime.

"You got to give a lot of credit to Texas San Antonio, they made a lot of plays," said Georgia State coach Bill Curry. "But our players fight hard, we fight hard to the final whistle."

The Panthers, playing their second home game of the season, were shorthanded in several areas as starters sat out with injuries. Defensive tackle David Huey, cornerback Demarius Matthews and wide receiver Jordan Giles all missed the game due to injury, and starting wide receiver Danny Williams was limited by an ankle injury.

The injury problems continued during the game. McLane, making his third collegiate start, left in the second quarter with an injury to his left wrist. McLane returned to guide the Panthers on their final possession of the half, then had an ice pack on his arm and sat out the entire second half.

"Well he...his left hand is numb. He's a tough guy so he didn't tell us that," Curry said. "He got hit on the forearm, that was why we took him out the first time."

After GSU turned the ball over on each of its first two possessions, backup quarterback Ronnie Bell provided a spark for the Panthers late in the third quarter. Bell had an 11-yard scramble on third-and-seven, then connected with Wilson for a nine-yard completion on fourth-and-six. Bell found Wilson again, this time wide open streaking toward the end zone, for a 25-yard touchdown that cut the deficit to 38-14.

"We had to go with Ronnie [due to McLane's injury], and he did some great things," said Curry.

"I was ready to come off the bench and into the game and go out there to the best I can be," Bell said. "I think I showed we have a good backup quarterback, as well as a good starting quarterback, and that I can lead the team if the situation needed me to"

Georgia State's defense came up big on a pair of fourth quarter possessions. UTSA drove from its own 18 to the Panthers' two-yard line, but couldn't get any further. The 19-play drive was stymied when Soza was tackled for a loss on fourth-and-goal. On UTSA's next drive, CheRod Simpson was stopped on a fourth down run from the eight-yard line.

"Both (the offense and defense) fought hard the whole game," Curry said. "As I've said repeatedly, we have a gummy bunch, but we're not doing what we have to do. We fight, scratch, bite and it's not enough. But we will continue. The players are responding, the players are giving effort."

UTSA looked poised to put the ball in the end zone on the game's opening possession. Aided by a 47-yard run by David Glasco II in which the tailback broke an initial tackle, the Roadrunners got to the State five-yard line. But linebacker Jarrell Robinson made a great tackle in the backfield on third-and-two and UTSA settled for Sean Ianno's 26-yard field goal.

Georgia State fell to Colonial Athletic Association foe Richmond, 35-14, at the Georgia Dome. Donald Russell rushed for 119 yards for the Panthers.

The Panthers fell to 0-4 overall playing in their first and last Colonial Athletic Association opener (the program moves to the Sun Belt Conference in 2013). Richmond improved to 3-1, 1-0 CAA.

"This process is very frustrating because we do so many things to hurt ourselves," said State coach Bill Curry. "If we simply play our very best all the time we should be a really good football team."

Russell, a senior, went over the 100-yard mark for the second time this season and fourth time in his GSU career. He added five receptions for 51 yards for a total of 170 all-purpose yards on 29 touches.

Russell matched his longest run at GSU with a 52-yard scamper late in the second quarter. That got the Panthers to the Richmond 28 and set up Georgia State's lone score. Russell later caught a 14-yard pass from Ben McLane and followed that with a five-yard run on third-and-three. After an incompleton, McLane connected with Albert Wilson, who broke through one tackle and found the end zone to make it a 21-7 game.

The GSU defense forced a punt to give the Panthers the ball with 40 seconds left in the half.

But McLane was intercepted by Cooper Taylor on a tipped ball, and that allowed the Spiders to once again make it a three-touchdown game. John Laub found Stephen Barnette for a 32-yard hook up to the GSU eight-yard line. Georgia State appeared to have prevented a touchdown with three consecutive goal-line stops, but after the stop on fourth-and-goal was erased on a defensive offsides penalty, Laub pounded his way into the end zone for a one-yard score on an untimed down to put the Spiders up 28-7.

"We had some work excellent goal line work but hurt ourselves again so there was all of that," Curry said. "We fought the daylights out of them...but after a valiant goal line stand we gave them five downs. But we're going to keep pushing and working until we get everybody the same page. That's what has to happen next. A lot of good things are happening, but we got to have more."

Wilson, who entered the contest leading the CAA with 158.7 all-purpose yards per game, didn't get to add to that total in the first quarter. The junior suffered an apparent hip bruise but returned for Georgia State's first promising drive of the half, catching a 13-yard pass on the opening play from scrimmage. The Panthers got to the Richmond 13-yard line, but four straight incompletions, including one intended for Wilson and tipped out of the back of the end zone on fourth-and-10, turned the ball over on downs.

Richmond jumped on top with a pair of long drives in the opening half.

The Spiders picked up the game's first points, capping a 13-play, 83-yard drive with a touchdown midway through the opening quarter. Junior wide out Ben Edwards, who came into the day second in the CAA averaging 116.3 all-purpose yards per game, caught three passes for 26 yards, while Kendall Gaskins had three carries for 19 yards, including a one-yard score that made it 7-0.

After a Georgia State punt, the visitors marched 71 yards in 14 plays, getting quarterback John Laub's one-yard touchdown sneak to go up 14-0 with 13:35 left in the half.

Laub made it 21-0 when he found Stephen Barnette for a completion across the middle, and Barnette out-ran safety Demazio Skelton for a 49-yard touchdown.

Richmond grabbed a 35-7 cushion midway through the third when Laub capped an eight-play drive with a tumbling, six-yard touchdown run.

Georgia State had a chance to cut into the lead late in the third, but Matt Ehasz was wide left on a 38-yard field goal attempt. The Panthers finally scored again with under a minute to play. Led by backup quarterback Ronnie Bell (91 passing yards, 31 rushing yards on the day), the Panthers drove 70 yards on eight plays, and Russell capped his big day with a two-yard touchdown run on a direct snap with 43 seconds left.

"It was a Donald Russell day," Curry said. "You just see how valuable he is, you just have to keep giving it to him when he's full speed. I'm really pleased with Ronnie Bell. I think Ronnie Bell made a statement about his ability."

Wilson wasn't the only one hobbling for the Panthers. Both starting center Michael Davis (ankle injury) and backup Ronald Martin (knees) left with injuries, forcing guard Tim Wynn to play center for much of the second half.

"There was some circumstances that were outside our control. We lost both our centers (and) Tim had to play center without having done it in two years," Curry said.

Georgia State fell at William and Mary, 35-3, at Zable Stadium as the Panthers were undone by seven turnovers.

Donald Russell had 134 yards rushing and receiving and Ronnie Bell showed play-making ability in his first start at quarterback for Georgia State, but William and Mary scored 28 points off GSU turnovers. The Panthers (0-5) hurt themselves with four interceptions and three lost fumbles.

"We work on ball security over and over and over, but if you turn the ball over that many times, you have no chance," said GSU head coach Bill Curry. "We have individuals who are showing good things, but our team has got to come together and do all the things that it takes to win."

Russell recorded his second straight 100-yard rushing effort and third this season with 107 yards on 21 carries, and he added four catches for 27 yards. Bell completed 13 of 26 passes for 157 yards and helped the Panthers convert eight of 14 third down plays, but the redshirt freshman had four interceptions and a lost fumble on a sack.

Keith McBride led the Tribe with 163 yards rushing and two touchdowns, while quarterback Raphael Ortiz also scored twice for the Tribe, who managed 312 yards rushing, including 204 in the second half as the GSU defense wore down.

Georgia State jumped in front first. After forcing William and Mary to punt on its first possession, the Panthers took over and moved 62 yards on 11 plays to set up a 37-yard field goal by freshman Wil Lutz, his first career three-pointer.

The Tribe looked to answer with a field goal attempt of their own, but the 45-yard attempt by Drake Kuhn was wide right. GSU forced the field goal attempt when Robert Ferguson chased W&M quarterback from the pocket and John Kelly tracked him down for the Panthers' first sack of the season.

The GSU defense came up with another big play early in the second quarter with a fourth-down stop of quarterback Raphael Ortiz at the Panther 44-yard line. But the Panthers gave the ball back two plays later on a rare fumble by Donald Russell at the William and Mary 44 yard. The Tribe turned that miscue into a scoring drive, capped by Keith McBride's 11-yard run that put William and Mary ahead, 7-3, with eight minutes remaining in the second quarter.

The Panthers then drove to the W&M 33 on their next possession before Bell was intercepted. GSU forced a punt and looked to take over with about 90 seconds left in the first half and trailing just 7-3. But Albert Wilson could not corral a bouncing punt, giving the Tribe possession at the GSU 11, and William and Mary punched it into the end zone on Ortiz's one-yard run for a 14-3 halftime lead.

Still trailing just 14-3 after a William and Mary punt early in the third quarter, Bell drove the Panthers from their own three-yard line all the way to the Tribe 36. On second down, he was sacked, leading to a fumble that the Tribe recovered at midfield and then converted into a touchdown four plays later.

The Panthers had another excellent scoring chance late the third quarter after driving from their own 19 to a first down at the Tribe 16. On first-and-10, backup center Ronald Martin, subbing for the injured Michael Davis, snapped the ball over Bell's head for a 25-yard loss. On third-and-35 at the 41, Bell's pass was intercepted in the end zone.

Despite putting up its best offensive performance of the season, the Georgia State football team dropped a 44-21 decision to Colonial Athletic Association foe No. 17/14 New Hampshire Saturday at the Georgia Dome.

GSU fell to 0-6 on the season, while New Hampshire, ranked No. 17 in the FCS Coaches Poll and No. 14 by the Sports Network, improved to 4-2 overall and 2-1 in the CAA with the win. UNH head coach Sean McDonnell earned his 100th career victory in his 14th season with the Wildcats.

Redshirt-freshman quarterback Ben McLane came off the bench and led the Panthers with 169 passing yards and two touchdown passes. Junior receiver Albert Wilson had 105 receiving yards, including touchdown catches of 54 and 47 yards.

UNH put up 624 total yards of offense on 83 plays as Wildcat quarterback Andy Vailas passed for 252 yards and four touchdowns in the win. Nico Steriti led all rushers with 126 yards and scored three touchdowns.

"We had a chance to drive up and down the field, but stopped ourselves repeatedly. When we did start to drive, it was too little too late," said GSU head coach Bill Curry. "Once again, the tendency, when the defense made a great play or had a turnover, we almost immediately found a way to turn the ball back over. That's just simply a matter of poise. There is no excuse and no explanation."

New Hampshire got on the board first on a 26-yard touchdown pass to Harold Spears that capped a four-play drive with 13:35 left in the first period. Mike MacArthur's kick attempt was good and gave UNH a 7-0 lead.

GSU tied the game on its first drive when starting quarterback Ronnie Bell connected with Wilson for a 54-yard touchdown pass that capped a six-play, 77-yard drive.

A GSU fumble at its own 28 yard line allowed the Wildcats to put together a 21-yard touchdown drive capped by an eight-yard pass from Vailas to Steriti for the score. A successful field goal attempt gave the Wildcats a 14-7 lead with 12:22 left in the second quarter.

The Wildcats struck again with 8:54 left in the first half when Steriti ran the ball seven yards for his second score of the period, giving UNH a 21-7 lead.

New Hampshire took advantage of a GSU turnover, scoring a touchdown with 14:34 left in the third period that extended the UNH lead to 28-7.

The Wildcats scored another touchdown with 3:14 left in the third quarter and followed with a 43-yard field goal by MacArthur to extend their lead to 38-7 with 40 seconds left in the third quarter.

McLane connected with Emmanuel Ogbuehi with 26-yard touchdown pass with 13:52 left in game that cut the UNH lead to 38-14.

"I was able to get away from the safety. (Ben) McLane just saw me over the middle, and I made the catch," said Ogbuehi after the game.

The Wildcats added a final touchdown at the 13:32 mark in the fourth quarter, but the Panthers answered when McLane found Wilson in the end zone with a 47-yard TD pass that cut the UNH lead to 44-21 with 4:51 left to play in the game. That was the 13th career touchdown catch for Wilson, including seven of 45 yards of longer.

HEAD COACH BILL CURRY

BILL CURRY is the architect and builder of GEORGIA STATE UNIVERSITY FOOTBALL as the program's first head coach.



An Atlanta native and former head coach at Georgia Tech, Alabama and Kentucky, Bill Curry was introduced on June 12, 2008, eight weeks after the football program was officially launched on April 17.

Curry spent more than two years developing, directing and promoting the football program in preparation for Georgia State's inaugural season. When his Panthers took the field for the first time in 2010, the city of Atlanta and the football world took notice. Not only did his fledgling squad post a winning record at 6-5, but the program exceeded all expectations in terms of attendance, excitement and media exposure.

Curry announced in August that the 2012 season would be his last on the sideline. He will remain at GSU as a special assistant to the President and Director of Athletics.

Curry brought to Georgia State his 17 years of experience as a head coach in the Southeastern Conference and the Atlantic Coast

Conference—including Coach of the Year awards in both leagues—as well as an All-Pro playing career in the National Football League, and, most recently, national notoriety as a college football analyst for ESPN.

In the NFL, he participated in three Super Bowls and two Pro Bowls and was part of three championship teams (1965, 1966 and 1970). As a center, Curry snapped the ball to legendary quarterbacks Bart Starr and Johnny Unitas, and he played for two of the most highly-regarded coaches in professional sports history in Vince Lombardi and Don Shula. His college coach, Georgia Tech's Bobby Dodd, is an icon in Southern football annals.

Curry's 10-year playing career as a center included stops with the Green Bay Packers (1965-66), Baltimore Colts (1967-72), Houston Oilers (1973) and Los Angeles Rams (1974). He served as President of the NFL Players Association.

Curry entered the coaching ranks as offensive line coach at Georgia Tech in 1976. He then spent three years as an NFL assistant with the Packers (1977-79) before returning to his alma mater as head coach in 1980.

Curry took over a Georgia Tech program in transition, moving from independent status to the Atlantic Coast Conference while in need of facilities upgrades. His first two seasons were highlighted by a stunning 3-3 tie against No. 1-ranked Notre Dame in 1980, in which the Yellow Jackets' quarterback was a freshman walk-on named Ken Whisenhunt, who is now the head coach of the Arizona Cardinals, and a 24-21 victory at fourth-ranked Alabama the following year.

Curry's teams also scored a pair of victories over nationally-ranked Georgia teams as well as a win over 13th-ranked Clemson that snapped a 20-game ACC winning streak.

Curry's rebuilding efforts culminated in 1985, when he led Tech to a 9-2-1 season for the school's highest win total in two decades and its first bowl victory in 13 years, defeating heavily-favored Michigan State in the All-American Bowl. For his efforts, he was named ACC Coach of the Year.

Curry compiled a record of 20-11-3 over his final three seasons at Georgia Tech before moving to Alabama in 1987. He posted a three-year record of 26-10 with the Crimson Tide, capped by the 1989 SEC title and Sugar Bowl berth.

In addition to being selected SEC Coach of the Year in 1989, Curry received the national coaching accolade named for his beloved mentor, the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Award.

Curry then spent seven seasons at Kentucky (1990-96), highlighted by a berth in the 1993 Peach Bowl. At the time, that marked the Wildcats' fourth bowl berth in 40 years.

Through every stop, Curry has carried an indelible reputation for integrity and class, and he has been guided by the ideal that the education and well-being of the student-athlete is paramount.

In 2007, he was recognized by the American Football Coaches Association with the Amos Alonzo Stagg Award, which honors someone "whose services have been outstanding in the advancement of the best interests of football."

In 2008, he received the President Gerald R. Ford Legends Center Award, which is presented annually to someone who has played the center position at the collegiate

or professional level, has made extraordinary contributions to his team during his football career and has proven to be an exemplary citizen, philanthropist or leader in the business or football community.

Curry is a member of the State of Georgia Sports Hall of Fame and the Atlanta Sports Hall of Fame.

Curry also serves at Georgia State as a Distinguished Executive Fellow in the Robinson College of Business.

He is the author of the book, "Ten Men You Meet in the Huddle: Lessons from a Football Life," published in 2008.

Curry attended College Park High School in the Atlanta area before going on to Georgia Tech, where he earned his B.S. degree in Industrial Management in 1965.

He is married to the former Carolyn Newton of Atlanta, a graduate of Agnes Scott College who earned her master's degree and Ph.D. from Georgia State. Bill and Carolyn have two children and five grandchildren.

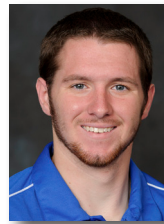
