GSU HOSTS NORTH FLORIDA IN FINAL NON-CONFERENCE HOME GAME

Georgia State (2-4) plays host to its final non-conference opponent as the North Florida Ospreys (2-5) come to Atlanta for a Saturday afternoon game at 2 p.m. in the GSU Sports Arena. Listen live on the Panther Radio Network or watch on ESPN3.

GSU split last weekend's game in its Thanksgiving Classic, topping Howard 65-58 on Saturday and falling to Charlotte 83-71 on Sunday.

North Florida will come to Atlanta after making a school-record 18 3-point baskets in its 74-72 win over Towson in Jacksonville. The Ospreys are 2-5 with losses to Nebraska, Purdue and Florida State in a rugged non-conference schedule. First-year coach Derrick Gibbs begins after a 17-year assistant career at Miami, Charlotte, Charleston and Wofford.

Last year, Georgia State won the season opener at UNF 72-59, thanks to its defensive efforts that yielded 28 forced turnovers and 18 steals. The Panthers converted that defense into 34 points off turnovers. In 2015-16, GSU is averaging 10.7 steals per game, top 50 in the NCAA statistics, while forcing 19.2 turnovers per game.

Head coach Sharon Baldwin-Tener begins her sixth season at Georgia State with a revamped roster that has nine new players, plus 6-foot-3 transfer Neeshama Oliver from Georgia sitting out. Injured 6-foot-2 junior forward Haley Gerrin is recovering from an injury and has resumed action, while junior transfer PG Erica Norwood becomes eligible in just over three weeks on Dec. 20.

GSU has started nine different players and played all 13 that are currently dressed out as evaluation time is underway. No player has started all six games. Ten players have logged 55 or more minutes over these first six games as the coaches evaluate. Then, when another becomes ready in December, the coaches will finalize what shape the roster is in for the 20 Sun Belt Conference games that begin on Dec. 30.

- GSU has nine new players this season: two NCAA transfers, three JUCOs and four freshmen.
- Makeba Ponder, who tied the GSU record with 69 3-pointers last year, made 12 on season in six games.
- Coach Sharon Baldwin-Tener is in her 6th year at GSU, her 17th as head coach, with 255 career wins.
- Georgia State opens with three of its four games on the road and plays 15 road games this season.
- GSU has only two seniors: Morgan Jackson and Ashlee Cole, both good 3-point shooters.
- GSU played 10 players or more in every game: Norwood (eligible Dec. 20) and Oliver (NCAA transfer year.)

**TESTING, ONE, TWO, THREE, TESTING....**

Georgia State will continually be testing the players and changing line-ups all game and through the start of Sun Belt Conference play with the combination of new players, injured players and second-semester eligible players. What you see now isn't necessarily what you'll see the next half, the next game, or the next game during the learning curve as the players get tested in game situations.

In the first six games, GSU has started 9 different players and played all 13 who are dressed out now. Not a single player has started all six games.

Who starts a game right now is kind of meaningless, since who finishes has been different in every game. The experimentation has seen coach Baldwin-Tener actually have four freshmen and a sophomore forward on the court at some times. Then, two more players will be worked into the rotation in the next month.

There is no substitute for game experience, so Georgia State is testing everyone under fire right now to get that experience and see which ones respond to the challenges the best.

The newcomers logged 123 minutes in the opener, scored 38 points with 21 rebounds. In game two, they played 136 minutes, scored 45 and netted 23 boards. In game 3, it was 129 minutes, 56 points, 27 rebounds. In game 4, it was 111, 40 and 24. You get the drift now.

As the saying goes, "this team has a lot of potential, but potential means you haven't actually done anything yet."

So, the testing of the patience of the coaches continues while the testing of the players and grading continues for now. Many of the younger players have come from state championship and winning programs and know what it takes to win, so their fight and effort have been good in practices and early games.

DEFENSE WINS

Georgia State has a history of pressure defense and ball steals under Coach Baldwin-Tener.

In 2014-15, The team had some good moments with 468 turnovers forced (15.6) per game and 261 steals made (8.7 per game).

GSU held seven opponents under 60 points and that was almost a guaranteed method for a win.

The Panthers have run the pattern to **26 wins in the last 31 games when keeping the opposing team below the 60-point line.** The first one in 2015-16 was holding Howard to 58 points.

Georgia State limited the opponents to 41 percent field-goal shooting and 32 percent 3-point shooting for the 2014-15 season.

In 2014-15, Georgia State scored 454 points off the turnovers of the opponents (15.7 per game).

To start 2015-16, GSU is averaging 10.7 steals per game and forcing 19.2 turnovers.

TRIO OF RECRUITS SIGNED NOV. 12

Georgia State has announced the signing of a trio of highly-touted high school winners from three states on Wednesday to National Letters of Intent.

Jada Lewis signs as a 1,000-point, all-state guard from state champion McEachern High School in Powder Springs, Ga. Shaquanda Miller-McCray joins as a 6-3 post player, capable of triple-triple games from Crestwood High in Sumter, S.C. Jaylyn Harrison comes as a deft outside shooter and passer from powerhouse Colonial High School in Orlando, Fla.

The 5-foot-7 Lewis heads into her senior season with two-time state champion Indians. Lewis was first-team all-state last year as a junior and is already a 1,000-point scorer with her senior season set to begin soon. Lewis set a school record with 10 3-point baskets in a game and has made 153 treys in her three years. She is the career assist leader with 340 (almost four per game) and second all-time in scoring (1,039). Lewis is also a defensive force with 221 career steals. She is ranked the No. 87 overall prospect by ESPN Basketball, the No. 27 best at her position.

The 6-foot-3 Miller-McCray has already been a two-time Class AAA all-state honoree for coach Tony Wilson as she heads into her senior season. She was close to averaging a triple-triple during her junior season at Crestwood, as she averaged 9.8 points per game, 12 rebounds per game and 9.1 blocked shots per game. There have been individual games along the way where she did have triple-triple games with double figures in all three categories for the 25-win Crestwood team that was state runner-up.

The 5-foot-4 Harrison comes from the same school as current Georgia State freshman Astaja Tyghter. Harrison's first three years in high school have seen her average 7.7 points a game, 2.7 assists a game, and 2.3 steals a game on a team of coach Cindy Richardson that finished No. 2 in the state last season. A good outside shooter, Harrison has made 116 3-point baskets heading into her final years and has scored 671 points. Her rising totals include 236 assists and 199 career steals, along with 242 rebounds. The powerful Colonial teams have been three-time district champions and two-time regional champions.

FREE-THROW SHOOTING

In 2014-15, GSU shot 72.3 percent (386 of 534), 2nd best Sun Belt. The school record for a season is 72.6 by the 1990-91 team (379 of 522).

So what happened in the opener at Kennesaw State when GSU could made just 13 of 25 (52.0%)? At Tenn. Tech, GSU made 17 of 25 (68%). Against Morehead, the Panthers hit 10 of 13 (77%). At Alabama, it was a putrid 50 percent on 9 of 18. The season is just 64.2%, meaning more work has to be done.

2015-16 NCAA CHANGES

The NCAA Playing Rules Oversight Panel announced changes in June for the 2015-16 season.

The NCAA Rules that will effect women's basketball include:

- The game is now 4 10-minute quarters instead of 2 20-minutes halves, which is more like professional basketball and international basketball.
- Teams will no longer shoot the one-and-one free throws after six fouls in a half, but instead will shoot two free throws on the fifth foul of each quarter and continue in that quarter.
- In the final 59.9 seconds of a half or overtime, teams may call a timeout and then advance the ball to the 28-foot line in the front court by their bench. It will also be moved to that spot after a timeout on a made basket, rebound, or steal if the player does not dribble or pass the ball. As always, teams shoot at the basket furthest from their bench to start the game, making this second-half rule in front of their bench.
- Teams now have 4 timeouts per half instead of 5. Each team has 3 30-second and 1 60-second timeout per half. If a team doesn't use a time out in the first half, they lose 1 30-second timeout for the second half.
- All told there are now 7 "media" timeouts instead of the previous 8 (at 16-, 12-, 8- and 4-minute marks) and are now one in each quarter and the three breaks between the quarters.
- The 10-second backcourt time will not be re-set if the defense knocks the ball out of bounds in a proper way (i.e. not a kicked ball) or held ball.
- Coaches have a maximum 15 seconds to substitute a new player after a foul out of a player.
- The 5-second closely guarded call has been eliminated (only in the men's game for now).
- Officiating will focus on the rules that encourage freedom of movement in the post area and physical play in the post area. Bench decorum and behavior will be quickly disciplined and enforced.
- The women will continue to use the 30-second shot clock as they always have, while the men's game will move from 35 seconds (since 1993-94) to that 30-second clock this year.
- In an effort to improve fan experience, bands or amplified music may be played during any dead-ball situation in women's basketball.

But, the Sun Belt teams did schedule one another in 1978-79 and again in 1980-81 before Georgia State left the league after five years. It returned to the Sun Belt in 2013-14 as a full member in 12 sports.

COACH SHARON BALDWIN-TENER

Sharon Baldwin-Tener, named GSU's head coach in April of 2010, has known how to win as both a collegiate player and collegiate coach.

In her sixth season at GSU, the recruiting has put some pieces in place for a solid future.

She picked up her 200th career win as a head coach on Dec. 29, 2010 vs. Mississippi Valley State (91-65) and guided GSU to the 500th all-time win in school history on Jan. 9, 2011 in a win over Hofstra (84-70).

In eight years, she turned the East Carolina women's basketball program around, winning 126 games, while earning postseason bids to the NCAA and WNIT tournaments. The Lady Pirates won the C-USA Tournament in 2007.

Atlanta is a homecoming for Baldwin-Tener as she played her prep ball in Smyrna and her college ball at both Kennesaw State and Georgia. She was an assistant coach at Georgia and a head coach at Life University in Marietta

Those eight years at ECU followed the 2001-02 season when she was the Atlantic Sun Conference Coach of the Year in her only season at Mercer.

She first gained notice as the NAIA National Coach of the Year at Life University, where she began that program with a final No. 7 ranking in its first year and produced a team ranked No. 1 in the national polls in her second season (2001). Her assistant coaching career was highlighted by being named the Naismith National Assistant Coach of the Year (1997) while she was in her seventh and final year at Georgia under head coach Andy Landers. Baldwin-Tener enjoyed a successful playing career at both the high school and collegiate levels. At Wills High School (merged with Campbell High) in Smyrna, Ga., she averaged 21 points per contest as a senior and was named the 1985 Georgia Class 4A State Player of the Year.

Baldwin-Tener earned a bachelor's degree from Georgia in 1991 and completed her master's of education in 1997, also at Georgia. She and her husband, Matt, have two children: Luke (11, Feb. 4, 2004) and Samantha (10, Oct. 28, 2005).
