AIR FORCE (1-1) vs. ARMY (0-2)

The Falcons host service academy rivals Army West Point, Wednesday (Nov. 13) at 6:30 p.m. MT in Clune Arena. A live stream will be provided by the Academy's Falcon Vision broadcast team. Live stats and a radio broadcast will also be available.

THE SERIES

-The Falcons and Black Knights will be meeting for the 20th time

-Army leads the all-time series, 11-8

-Air Force is 4-4 when playing Army at USAFA

-The series began in 1985

-Air Force won the last meeting, 71-60, at West Point.

LAST TIME THEY MET

The Falcons beat Army, 71-60, on November 21 in Christl Arena, West Point, New York, marking Air Force's first win against the Black Knights in 10 seasons. Briana Autrey had the highlight performance with 22 points, two assists, two blocks and two steals. Autrey's hustle-defense turned the tide in favor of the Falcons on several occasions while her penetrating style of offense drew five fouls. She led the Falcons in free throws, shooting 8-9 (.890) from the line.

Riley Snyder had the second most points with 15. She shot 5-11 from the field and was 4-6 in free throws. Classmate Haley Jones also contributed with six points and four rebounds.

Team captain Kaelin Immel dropped 14 points for the Falcons, shooting perfect (4-4) from the field in the first half, and 5-6 from the free throw line on the game. Co-team captain Venessannah Itugbu made her presence known, recording eight rebounds on the game, seven of which were on the defensive side of the ball.

Air Force wraps up a three-game home stretch against the University of San Diego, Saturday (Nov. 16) at 2 p.m. MST, in Clune Arena. The game will mark the fourth meeting between the programs with San Diego remaining unbeaten in the four-game series.

Air Force downed the New Jersey Institute of Technology, 68-48, in front of more than 1500 rowdy "Field Trip Day" fans, Friday afternoon in the Falcons' home opener at Clune Arena. Sophomore forward Riley Snyder led the Falcons with a 19-point showing as Air Force handed NJIT their second loss in as many tries this season.

Snyder, a 2018-19 Mountain West All-Freshman selection, set the pace for the Falcons in scoring, dropping nine points in the opening three minutes of action. Junior teammate and co-team captain Kaelin Immel put up 18-points on the game, 13 of which were in the second half. Immel also added four assists and two blocks to her stat line. Snyder had a highlight performance at the free throw line, shooting a perfect 6-6 on the day. She also added four boards, two assists and two steals to the stat sheet.

Junior co-team captain Emily Conroe and sophomore guard Haley Jones collected 10 rebounds apiece- Conroe collected six on the offensive side while Jones snagged six on the defensive side. Both were just a bucket away from double-double performances with Jones scoring nine points and Conroe tallying eight. Freshmen Allyah Marlett and Nikki McDonald made their presence known in the paint, collecting seven and six rebounds, respectively, while scoring three and five points, respectively. All seven of Marlett's boards were on the defensive side of the ball.

Freshman guard Kamri Heath, who paced the Falcons in scoring in the season opener, tallied a team-high five assists and a game-high four steals while scoring two points on the game. Freshman teammate Grace Hess scored four points and tallied two assists, bringing Air Force's freshman scoring total to 14 points.

FRESHMEN SHOW OUT IN SEASON OPENER

Freshman guard Kamri Heath scored a game-high 16 points in her collegiate debut as Air Force fell to No. 20/18 Arizona State in the 2019-2020 season opener. Heath, who didn't miss a field goal in the first 18:30 of the game, along with freshmen teammates Allyah Marlett and Grace Hess combined for 29 points on their opening night. Marlett dropped eight points and collected eight rebounds while Hess recorded five points.

WELCOME BACK

The Falcons return four starters and six letter winners from the 2018-19 campaign, highlighted by junior scoring leader Kaelin Immel (13.2 ppg). Joining Immel is Air Force's leading rebounder, Emily Conroe (6.2 rpg/10.5 ppg) and Mountain West All-Freshman selection, Riley Snyder (10.0 ppg). Sophomores Briana Autrey and Haley Jones, who made significant contributions in their freshman season, round out the Falcons' key returners. Immel and Conroe, along with lone senior Sarah Pierce, will share team captaincy in the 2019-20 campaign.

GAME NOTES

2018-19 SEASON RECAP

Air Force finished the 2018-19 campaign with an overall mark of 8-22 and a 4-14 Mountain West record to finished 10th in the league. The Falcons eight wins marked head coach Chris Gobrecht's most single-season wins since taking the helm four seasons ago. Air Force checked the box on several feats during the season --beating Army for the first time in a decade, downing Colorado State for the first time in 13 meetings, setting the program's modern-era record for the largest margin of victory with an 85-37 win over Fairleigh Dickinson and winning four-straight home games for the first time since 2007.

IMPROVING EACH SEASON

Air Force women's basketball has shown steady signs of progress each season under Chris Gobrecht. The improvement came this season despite carrying 10 underclassmen and only one senior on the roster.

CLASS OF 2022 CONTRIBUTES IMMEDIATELY

Air Force's freshmen (now sophomores) accounted for two starting positions and the topthree scoring positions on the roster. Snyder, Jones and Autrey accounted for 43-percent of the team's total scoring, while Autrey led the team with 76 assists on the season (2.5 apg), and Jones had the second most rebounds (176/5.9 rpg) and steals (49/1.3 spg) on the team.

A LOOK AT WHAT'S TO COME

Falcon fans will have several opportunities to catch the women's basketball team in home-court action as the Falcons host five non-conference contests in Clune Arena on the season, four of which are during the month of November. Air Force opens a three-game home stint against the New Jersey Institute of Technology on Friday, November 8th, followed up by a service academy rivalry game against Army, Wednesday, November 13th. The home stint is brought to a close against San Diego University, Saturday, November 16th.

Following a road game against in-state rival Northern Colorado (Nov. 19), the Falcons return home to host Portland, November 23.

A LOOK AT WHAT'S TO COME

Air Force will play Navy in the second service academy rival game of the season, November 27, in Annapolis, Maryland. Following the Navy contest, the Falcons will head south to take on the perennial powerhouse Tennessee Volunteers, December 1st, in Knoxville, Tennessee.

The Mountain West slate is opened with an early-season contests against the Wyoming Cowgirls (Dec. 4), and Nevada Wolfpack (Dec. 7). The game against Wyoming will mark the first-of-nine Mountain West games hosted at the Academy. Air Force visits the non-conference slate for the last time in a three-game stint, starting with a game at Long Beach State (Dec. 18), followed by a visit to Cal State Fullerton (Dec. 21) and concluding with Nebraska-Wesleyan (Dec. 30) in Clune Arena.

The Falcons open the New Year and the remainder of the Mountain West schedule hosting UNLV, January 4th. Air Force will conclude league play against Colorado State at the Academy, Feb. 27, before heading to the Mountain West Conference Tournament, March 1-4, hosted by UNLV in Las Vegas, Nevada.

NEW ADDITIONS

Air Force has added Hillary Carlson and Caitlyn Sears to the coaching staff in place of Claire Fitzpatrick and Rynae Rasley, respectively. Fitzpatrick took an assistant coach position at Holy Cross while Rasley took the head coaching job at the Air Force Prep School.

Carlson spent two seasons as an assistant coach at Central Washington University prior to joining the Falcons. Before beginning a career as a coach, Carlson played professional basket-ball for two seasons. She began her career playing in Oeiras, Lisbon, Portugal for Quinta dos Lombos Athletic Club in 2011, and played her second season with SEABL in Melbourne, Australia for Nunawading Basketball Club. As a player at the University of Wyoming, Carlson was a three-time All-Mountain West Conference selection, earning first team honors as a senior where she averaged 17.3 points and 7.2 rebounds per game. She set the conference record for blocks in a game with 10 against Nevada as a junior.

Sears brings six years of collegiate-level coaching and recruiting experience to the Air Force staff. She has had assistant coaching stints at Southern Utah, Utah Valley and Ottawa University. Sears was a four-year women's hoops letter winner at Southern Utah University, earning All-Summit League honors after a prolific senior season with the T-Birds.

Along with the new coaching staff, Air Force welcomed five freshmen to roster; Sophia Berardi, Kamri Heath, Grace Hess, Allyah Marlett and Nikki McDonald.






40th Season as Head Coach 5th Season at Air Force

Chris Gobrecht will enter her fifth season as the head women's basketball coach at the Air Force Academy in 2019. With a track record of 39 years of head coaching experience, Gobrecht was entrusted by the previous Air Force Director of Athletics, Jim Knowlton, to lay the foundation and build the program to reach new heights.

In May 2018, Gobrecht signed a five-year contract extension with Air Force athletics under director Col. Jennifer Block, extending her service as head coach through the 2022-23 season. Gobrecht was originally hired on

Ápril 14, 2015 and was the first hire of then-Air Force Director of Athletics Jim Knowlton. Gobrecht came to

the Academy from Yale, where she served as head coach from 2005-15.

A proven winner and program builder, Gobrecht has coached at programs in the Pac-12 and Atlantic Coast Conference. During her 10 seasons at Yale she restored the program's status as one of the premier women's basketball programs in the Ivy League. Gobrecht has 39 years of head coaching experience, all at the Division I level, and has a career record of 561-574 (.494) which ranks

among the nation's top 30 active coaches. Gobrecht is the winningest coach alltime for two schools, Washington and Yale.

"I'm thrilled to bring Chris Gobrecht to the Academy to lead our women's basketball program," Knowlton said. "She is a proven winner and has turned around every program she's led and done it the right way. To get someone of her caliber to the Academy makes me very excited about the future of the program."

"After meeting with Chris during her visit to the Academy, I know our women's basketball program will be in great hands," said USAFA's 19th Superintendent, Lt. Gen. Michelle Johnson. "Chris embodies the values our Academy stands for and her passion for leading young people is unmistakable."

"It is hard to put into words what the opportunity to build the women's basketball program at the Air Force Academy means to me and my family," Gobrecht said. "I am honored to be asked to lead the outstanding young women who make the choice to prepare themselves for service to their country as officers in the Air Force, and I am dedicated to their experience on the court producing success in competition as well as contributing greatly to their accomplishments towards the overall mission of the Academy.

Through her first two seasons, Gobrecht laid the foundation for building the program towards new heights. In the 2016-17 season, Air Force doubled its win total from the previous season. Then-freshman Mariah Forde led the Mountain West freshmen in scoring, averaging 11.0 points per game. The Falcons have improved in scoring, rebounding, blocked shots and free throw percentage in each passing year under Gobrecht's quidance.

In the 2017-18 campaign, Coach Gobrecht and the Falcons continued on the path upwards as Air Force's five wins in conference became the most in the Mountain West era, surpassing the previous mark of four wins, set in 2005-06 and 2007-08. Air Force's signature win came in the regular season home finale, posting a 57-47 win over then-first place Wyoming. In addition to winning four of the last six games of the season, Air Force smashed five team records, highlighted by a staunch defense that only allowed 62.3 ppg in the regular season and 59.7 pp in league action, setting new team records in each respective category. The Falcons held opponents below 60 points 11 times on the season, testament to the progression of the defense under Gobrecht and staff. Air Force's 2017-18 season also yielded six new individual school records including the program's first-ever Mountain West Freshman of the Year in Kaelin Immel, who set four program-records highlighted by the most-ever points scored by an Air Force freshman in the Div. I era.

Gobrecht's Falcons continued trending upward in the 2018-19 season, averaging 60.1 points per game in regular season and Mountain West play alike, an average mark 4.4 points more than last season's averages and 12.7 more points per game than in her inaugural campaign at Air Force. Gobrecht and a young squad made up predominantly of freshmen and sophomores checked the box on numerous milestones to include the team's first win against Army in over a decade and ending a 13-game losing streak to in-state rivals Colorado State. Under Gobrecht's guidance, freshman standout Riley Snyder, who averaged 10 points per game on the season, was added to the Mountain West All-Freshman team. She is the third freshman since the 2017-18 season to earn the honor.

Prior to coming to Air Force, Gobrecht built Yale's program up to become an annual contender for the Ivy League championship over her last six seasons. She coached the Bulldogs to 56 wins from 2012-14 which tied for the second-most wins in a four-year stretch and most since the class of 1980 won 57 games. Under Gobrecht's leadership, Yale has also recorded the top two marks for most Ivy League wins in a four-year span with 34 Ivy victories set by the Class of 2013 and 33 wins set by the Class of 2014.

During her tenure at Yale, Gobrecht coached 27 players that earned Ivy League postseason awards, including two Ivy League Rookies of the Year, five All-Ivy first team honorees, three All-Ivy second team honorees, six All-Ivy honorable mention players, five All-Ivy rookie team players and seven Ivy League academic team honorees. Prior to Gobrecht's arrival at the school, a Bulldog player had not earned All-Ivy League first team accolades since the 1997-98. Gobrecht has also coached two players who competed on the international level.

Yale posted its sixth straight top-four finish in the Ivy League standings in 2014-15 with a 7-7 mark in Ivy play, while posting an overall mark of 13-15. Gobrecht became just the second coach in program history to record 100 victories at Yale with a victory at Columbia on Jan. 31, 2014. She was 117-162 (.419) in her 10 seasons at the school.

HEAD COACH

The Bulldogs enjoyed their most successful season under Gobrecht's leadership in 2011-12, finishing with a 16-12 record and an 8-6 mark in Ivy League play in a season that included Yale's first-ever meeting with the nation's top-ranked team (No. 1 Baylor, Nov. 22, 2011). It was their winningest season since a 16-10 finish in 1993-94 and the third straight season with at least eight Ivy League victories. The season included several milestones, including Gobrecht's 500th career victory which happened on Feb. 10, 2012, against Cornell.

In 2010-11, Gobrecht guided the Bulldogs to their first-ever appearance in the Women's National Invitational Tournament (WNIT). The Bulldogs finished with a 14-15 overall record, which, until 2011-12, was Yale's highest win total since the 2001-02 season (14-13). Gobrecht coached the Bulldogs to the biggest win in program history, a 91-85 win over then-No. 14 Florida State. It was Yale's first win over a nationally ranked opponent in the program's 38-year history. She followed that historic victory by guiding the Bulldogs to a 10-4 finish in Ivy League play, which matched the most wins for Yale in League play (10-4, 1988-89). The 2010-11 Ivy League season included Yale's first sweep of Harvard since the 1993-94 season, which helped the Bulldogs finish in second place in the Ivy League standings for the first time since 1988-89, clinching the Ivy League's automatic berth in the WNIT.

After posting a 3-24 mark in her first season with the Bulldogs, Gobrecht led the team to 12 wins in the 2006-07. The nine-win improvement was one of the best in Division I that season. The 2006-07 season was highlighted by a six-game winning streak and a 15-point victory over a Marist squad that would reach the Regional Semifinals (Sweet 16) of the NCAA Tournament. Yale was also the only Ivy League team to defeat league champion Harvard.

Though the 2008-09 team was hampered by a multitude of injuries, Gobrecht led her team to an 11-17 record and a landmark victory over North Carolina State, Yale's first win over an Atlantic Coast Conference opponent. Gobrecht also reached a milestone 450th career coaching win last season.

Prior to coaching at Yale, Gobrecht was the head coach at her alma mater, Southern California, where she posted a 93-108 record in seven seasons. She became the 33rd active coach to reach the 400-win mark during her time with the Women of Troy. She reached the milestone with a victory over Pepperdine on Dec. 4, 2002. Gobrecht took over a struggling Florida State program in 1996 for year, leading the school to a 5-22 record before going to USC.

Gobrecht coached the University of Washington from 1986-96. In 11 seasons at Washington, her teams went to the NCAA Tournament on nine occasions. The Huskies reached the NCAA Regional Semifinals four times during her tenure, and advanced to the Regional Finals (Elite Eight) in 1990. She won at least 16 games every year at Washington, including eight 20-win campaigns (six consecutive), and is the Huskies' all-time winningest coach with a 243-89 record. Washington won three conference championships and finished second four times during her tenure. A two-time Pac-10 Coach of the Year, Gobrecht led Washington to a school-record 28 wins and a number-three national ranking in 1989-90. The Huskies were the only team to beat eventual NCAA Champion Stanford that season. In lieu of her success with the Huskies, the University of Washington announced Gobrecht as one-of-seven individuals along with one team to be inducted into the Husky Hall of Fame in October 2018.

Gobrecht began her Division I coaching career with a struggling Cal State Fullerton program in 1979-80. She coached the Titans for six seasons, posting an 84-92 record. She led Cal State Fullerton to an 18-12 record in her third season on the job. In the 1984-85 season, Gobrecht's last with Cal State Fullerton, the Titans posted a 19-11 record and made their first appearance in the WNIT, making her a finalist for national Coach of the Year honors.

She served as an assistant for a USA Basketball select team that played in Czechoslovakia and Italy in 1990. In addition, six of Gobrecht's former players have played professionally in the WNBA and ABL.

Her coaching career began in 1978 at Santa Fe Springs (Calif.) High School, where her team went 20-4 and made the CIF AAA playoffs. The next year, Gobrecht led Pasadena City College to a 25-5 record, a conference championship and second place in the state junior college tournament.

A Toledo, Ohio, native and a graduate of Huntington Beach (Calif.) High School, Gobrecht earned a bachelor's degree in public affairs from USC in 1977. Then known by her maiden name of Chris Geiger, she was a three-year starter for the Women of Troy from 1974-76 and also played two seasons of volleyball at USC. After graduation, she spent a year volunteering in the Peace Corps, where she worked as an English teacher at St. Mary's College in Apia, Western Samoa.

Chris and late husband, Bob Gobrecht, have two children, Eric and Madeline. Eric is a graduate of the U.S. Air Force Academy and a graduate of the Air Force's flight school. A Major, he is a pilot stationed at Beale AFB, CA. In October 2011, Eric married Catherine Cheney, a 2010 graduate of Yale. Mady graduated from Yale in 2011 after four standout seasons on the women's basketball team. She married Greg Moviel, a 2007 graduate of Vanderbilt University, in 2015. Grandson, Mack, born to Mady and Greg in May of 2018, is the newest addition to the family. Mady is currently a registered nurse serving at Memorial Hospital in Colorado Springs.
