HEAD COACH LAUNI MEILI



Launi Meili has been the head coach of the U.S. Air Force Academy's rifle program since 2007. She came to USAFA from the University of Nebraska, where she coached for five years.

"Coach Meili brings a wealth of experience

as not only a proven NCAA Division I head coach, but a world-class competitor as well," said former Associate Athletics Director for Programs Col Billy Walker.

"We were very impressed with her understanding of the Academy and our mission to produce leaders of character and how intercollegiate athletics contributes to that mission. I'm quite certain Coach Meili will develop us into one of the elite programs in the country," said Walker.

For the past 13 seasons, Meili has elevated the Academy's rifle program to a national-competitive level. Seven teams have appeared in the NCAA Rifle Championships, finishing in the top eight each year. In 2019, the rifle team placed third in the nation, and won the air rifle national title. For the first-time, since the 2013 formation of the Patriot Rifle Conference, the rifle team won the 2019 conference title. They were the 2020 runner up team. Since 2013, 11 cadet-shooters have earned all-conference honors. Under Meili, the program has amassed 11 All-Americans, 53 times. In November 2019, the rifle team won the President's Trophy for a total of seven times.

Air Force had one cadet-athlete, David Higgins (Class of 2016), make the 2016 U.S. Olympic Smallbore Team. Spencer Cap (Class of 2019) made the 2016 Junior Olympic Team and Ryan Jacobs (Class of 2017) made the 2016 U.S. National Team. Nate Peterson qualified for the Rifle National Junior Team in 2019, while he and Peter Fiori competed at the ISSF World Cup in Suhl, Germany.

Prior to Air Force, Meili was the head coach at Nebraska, where she led the all-women Cornhuskers to a No. 2 national ranking in the 2004-05 season. The team finished fifth at the NCAAs in 2007. While at Nebraska, she coached 21 All-Americans, an NCAA individual champion and placed seven women on the U.S. Development team. In addition, Meili led Nebraska to a pair of Great American Rifle Conference Championships, while earning coach of the year honors in 2006.

As a shooting competitor, Meili shot for the U.S. Shooting team for 10 years. In that time, Meili

participated in two Olympic Games, two Pan American games and a World Championship. During her career, she produced three world records, three Olympic records, a world team championship and the Olympic Gold medal in Barcelona in 1992, becoming the first American woman to ever win gold in smallbore.

She also placed 11th in air rifle in Barcelona after finishing sixth in air rifle and seventh in three-position rifle at the 1988 Olympics in Seoul. She remains the only woman to compete in both events at two Olympics. Meili is also a seven-time national champion in three-position rifle, setting three world shooting records and numerous national records in her outstanding shooting career.

After retiring from competitive shooting in 1992, Meili spent 10 years coaching junior and elite level shooters and instructing athletes at shooting clinics and camps nationwide. She served as assistant coach for the U.S. National Rifle Team from 1997 to 2000 and is helping to coach the residents at the Olympic Training Center. Meili helped produce the International Coach Certification Program, the highest level of coaching credential recognized by USA Shooting and the National Rifle Association. During the 2004-05 season, Meili was recognized for her outstanding achievement to the sport by being inducted into the International Shooting Hall of Fame. In 2014, Meili was the inaugural ISSF Junior Cups coach, a new Championship series featuring competitions for junior athletes in Olympic and Youth Olympic events, with the competitions held in Suhl, Germany.

Meili earned her master's degree in sports psychology from the University of Idaho in 2001. She also holds a bachelor's degree in nutrition and exercise physiology from Eastern Washington University. She has written "Rifle: Steps to Success", published by Human Kinetics in 2008. She has also created the "mental training workshop" taught to athletes, coaches, and business personnel in the U.S. and Japan.

A native of Spokane, Wash., Meili and her husband, Kevin Geddes, have a son, Bryce Owen.

"Over the last few years we've made it onto the national stage. I'm proud of the team and all they have accomplished together and individually. While we've been in the top five as a team, we have had four team members make the U.S. National Team, with three shooting in World and International competition representing not only USAFA, but the United States. We are heading in the right direction and will continue to improve as our incoming classes continue to get stronger and stronger."

ASSISTANT COACH DAVE JOHNSON



David Johnson begins his third season with the U.S. Air Force Academy as assistant rifle coach. Before coming to the Academy, he was the interim executive officer at USA Shooting, Director of Operations, and National Rifle Coach. Johnson was USA Shooting's National Rifle Team Coach from 2002 to 2012. During that time, he helped the team earn five Olympic medals in the 2004, 2008, and 2012 Olympic Games, along with several open and junior World Championship titles.

Johnson began shooting in 1972 at the Langley Junior Rifle Club in Virginia, and continued behind the firing line through his high school graduation in 1982. Dedicated to education, he attended West Virginia University, where he earned his bachelor of science in finance in 1986. After graduation, Johnson was commissioned in the U.S. Army

Reserves as an Infantry Officer. His military career included a two-year assignment to the U.S. Army Marksmanship Unit and as a coach in the Army's World Class Athlete Program.

As assistant coach, he brings a multitude of experience as an athlete and coach with him. During Johnson's career as a rifle athlete, he was a multiple Pan American Games and World Cup medalist, a USA National Champion, and 1983 NCAA Individual Champion. Johnson helped lead his WVU rifle team to three National Championships. He was a member of the 1992 U.S. Olympic Team, finishing 11th in air rifle and 21st in three-position rifle.

Johnson's first full-time coaching assignment was as head coach of University of Alaska-Fairbanks from 2000 to 2002, where he led the team to three individual and two NCAA Team titles.

"I was honored to join the staff at the U.S. Air Force Academy and be back in the NCAA arena," said Johnson. "The program, facilities, staff, and student-athletes are world-class. Being part of the mission of developing our future leaders for the U.S. Air Force is natural for me coming from my military experience. Coach Meili and the USAFA have built a great program.

"I could not be happier that we were able to convince Dave to come back into collegiate shooting," said Launi Meili, head rifle coach at Air Force. "He has more experience and knowledge of the sport than any coach in the U.S. He was not only successful as an athlete in NCAA and international competition, but as a coach, his athletes have produced more medals and titles than any other in more than 40 years.

While at the Academy, Johnson's coaching experience helped to bring the rifle team to a national level of competition. Two of his teams have been to the NCAA Rifle Championships. In 2018-19, Air Force won the Patriot Rifle Conference Championships, placed third in the nation, and won the national Air Rifle Championship title. Air Force also won back-to-back President's Trophies in the matches against the service academies.

In December 2018, while at the two-day Winter Air Gun Championships, Casper Schadler earned a third-place ranking in the men's junior air rifle. On Day 2, Logan Ogden won the bronze medal for the same event. At the 2019 National Junior Olympic Shooting Championships, sophomore Nate Peterson earned a bronze medal for his accomplishment in the 10m Men's Air Rifle. In the 50m Three-Position Rifle, Peter Fiori won the championship title. Both qualified for the ISSF World Cup in Suhl, Germany.

FALCON RIFLE RANGE

The Air Force Academy athletic program and rifle team opened the Falcon Rifle Range in February 2014. The Falcons moved into the state-of-the-art facility following a year-long construction and renovation, with the final completion of the facility in January 2014 in time to host the Nevada rifle team on Feb. 1.

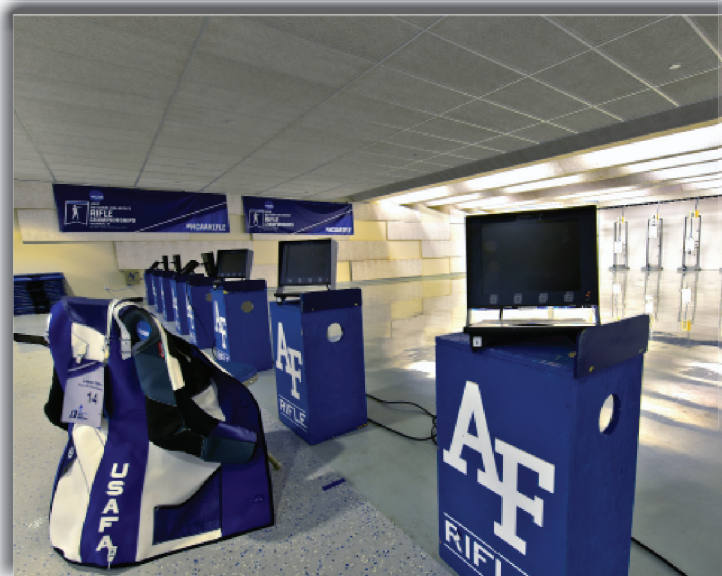
Renovations to the range included 16 points, all equipped with the most advanced Megalink electronic target system. The backstop is made of granulated rubber, which helps to reduce noise and lead-dust contamination. The old range consisted of 10 points, and with the addition of six points allow Air Force to host the NCAA Rifle Championships in the future.

The range features a viewing area of the entire firing line. Positioned directly above the viewing area are two TV screens, which display the athletes' targets and their scores. Spectators are able to follow the action during the competition. The team room is also available for spectators to relax and watch the competition on two 60" plasma TVs.

The facility accommodates the coaches' office, gun-smithing room, an armory, and separate male and female locker rooms.

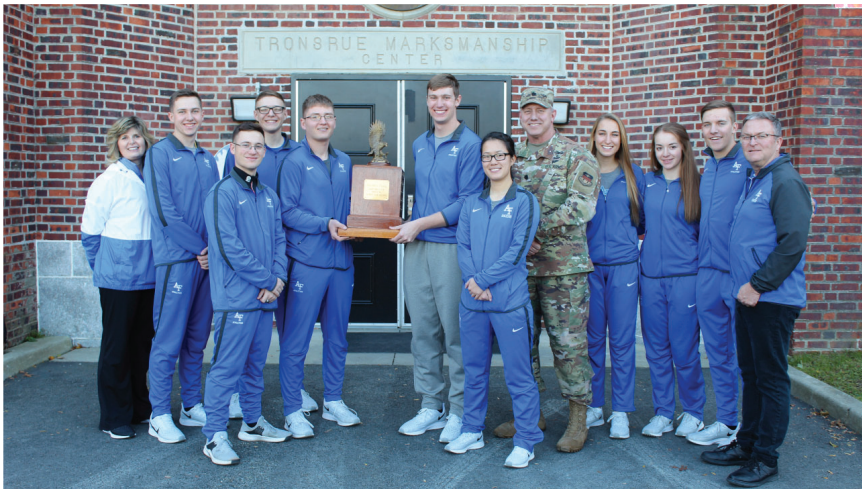

NCAA college rifle was founded in 1980. Prior to NCAA sponsorship in 1980, a collegiate rifle championship was held yearly by the National Rifle Association. From 1980 to 2004, the championship consisted of 120 shots by each competitor in smallbore, and 40 shots per competitor in air rifle. Since 2005, the championship has consisted of 60 shots for both smallbore and air rifle, equaling a total of 120 shots per team member. In 2014, Meredith Carpentier, air rifle, finished 13th with 588 points. She was the only AFA qualifier for the NCAA Championships. The team's 2016 national finish (fourth) was the school's highest national ranking since 2012 (water polo finished fourth). In 2019, the rifle team won the national Air Rifle championship title and the team finished third overall in the nation. The rifle team became the only Academy team ever to win a Division I national title.

The first of the annual President's Trophy Matches was contested in 1998 against Air Force, Army, Navy, Coast Guard and U.S. Merchant Marine service academies. In 1998, Army West Point was the host site for the event, as Navy won its first of seven titles with a score of 7601. The Black Knights were the runner up, followed by the Falcons with scores of 7384 and 7535, respectively, the Coast Guard finished fourth with a 7198, using the 120/40 shot scoring system.

In 1999, the Midshipmen hosted the event in Annapolis and won the second of their four-consecutive titles with a score of 7641.

In 2001, the Knights could not compete. 2002 was the first time all five academies were represented in the match (overall scores for USMMA are not available). The Knights set the record with a 7698 (120/40).

Prior to 2003, scoring for the match was based on the 120/40 shot scoring system for both smallbore and air rifle. The new system was implemented in 2004 with a 60/60 shot system for both rifles. Scores identified are based on the five-counter method.

In the 22-year history of the President's Trophy Match, Army has won the title eight times, while Air Force has six wins, five consecutive from 2014 to 2018, and Navy has seven titles. In 2018, the match was held in Annapolis.

The Match is held annually in November, and is rotated between Colorado Springs, West Point and Annapolis.

2007 was head coach Launi Meili's first year with the Air Force rifle program. Air Force finished third (5666).

In 2016, Air Force set a new President's Trophy Match record with a score of 5858. The previous record (5839) was set in 2015 by Air Force. The Falcons' are 36-22 in the service academy matches. 2018 was the fifth time the team has presented the President's Trophy to the USAFA Cadet Wing. Photo update not available.

Two Falcons honored as All-Conference

In February, the sixth-ranked Falcons got ready for Patriot Rifle Conference Championships in Fort Worth, Texas. On Feb. 14, Air Force defeated Alaska, 4666 to 4622 at the TCU Rifle Range. On Feb. 15, conference opponents TCU, Air Force, Ohio State, Alaska and UTEP took to the line for shoulder-to-shoulder competition in smallbore and air rifle. TCU swept the smallbore championships with a leading score of 2340. Air Force had the second-best score of 2314, followed by the Buckeyes' 2310, Nanooks' 2296, and UTEP's 2264. The following day was the air rifle team championships. Air Force had a strong showing in the match, but TCU had a 21-point lead on the Falcons and went on to win the match with 2388 points. The Falcons followed with 2367 points, the Buckeyes had a 2359, Nanooks had a 2343, and UTEP finished with 2319 points.

Following two-days of championship shooting, Air Force finished second in the conference with a 4681. TCU was the PRC team champions with a score of 4728, and OSU finished third with a 4669, Alaska was fourth with a 4639 and UTEP finished fifth with a 4583.

Conference leaders: The Falcons' Peter Fiori was the smallbore runner up and advanced to the championship finals with a score of 584. In the Finals match, Fiori scored a 456.1 outscoring three of TCU's top finalists and took home the conference smallbore individual title; his second smallbore title of his Academy career.

In the air rifle, Fiori was ranked seventh with a score of 592 to earn the second all-conference honor of his career. His PRC aggregate score for the two days was 1176. Fiori is also the third-ranked PRC shooter in the nation, with an 1177.364.

All-conference honors also went to Logan Ogden in air rifle and aggregate scoring. Ogden is the sixth-ranked conference shooter in the nation with an 1173.182.

NATHAN PINE, DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



Nathan Pine is in his second year as the Director of Athletics at the Air Force Academy, where he started in February 2019. Pine came to the Academy from Holy Cross, where he was the director of athletics from 2013-18.

He is making a significant impact at Air Force athletics. Air Force finished 2018-19 as the top service academy for the eighth straight year in the Learfield IMG Director's Cup standings. Air Force finished 67th nationally with 339.5 points which ties for the second-best showing in school history. The Falcons finished second in the Mountain

West behind Boise State to secure a top-three finish for the fourth straight year.

Air Force had record-breaking fundraising numbers this past year, including number of donors and dollars raised, as well as the re-branding of the Falcon Athletic Fund.

Formerly known as the Falcon Pride Club, the Falcon Athletic Fund is the fundraising arm of Air Force Athletics. The Falcon Athletic Fund was refreshed and re-branded and will continue to be responsible for generating the philanthropic resources required to provide a first-class, transformational experience for 1,000 cadet-athletes across 27 intercollegiate sports.

During his tenure as athletics director at Holy Cross, the athletic department saw unprecedented growth in fundraising. The Crusader Athletics Fund more than doubled in four years and raised over \$2-million during the 2017-2018 academic year. The CAF surpassed \$2-million for the second year in a row and brought in over \$1-million in each year of Pine's leadership, after having never reached that milestone previously. Holy Cross also received two of the largest gifts in the history of the College (\$32.5 million and \$20 million respectively), directed toward athletics facility improvements. Construction on the \$95 million Luth Athletic Complex began in December of 2015 and was completed in the spring of 2018. Pine also orchestrated broader regional and national exposure for the College from television and marketing efforts, along with significant branding and alumni outreach. He introduced a renewed sense of enthusiasm and excitement around athletics to Holy Cross along with a focused vision on improving the student-athlete experience, team and individual competitiveness and significant facility upgrades.

Pine championed the priority of academics at Holy Cross and student athletes achieved at the very highest levels of Division I during his tenure, tying nationally for first place in 2014 and third place in 2015 in NCAA Graduation Success Rate (GSR). Additionally, Holy Cross led the nation with 75 percent of its teams earning NCAA Division I Academic Progress Rate public recognition awards in the 2017 report. Student athletes combined for a 3.12 or higher GPA in each of the nine semesters under his leadership, highlighted by a record 3.26 average GPA in the spring of 2018. In addition, 338 Holy Cross student athletes were recognized on their league Academic Honor Rolls in 2017-2018.

Pine improved football scheduling, adding long-term home and home series with Harvard and Yale, while spearheading the efforts to bring the 2016 showdown with Fordham University to Yankee Stadium. Additionally, he scheduled several BCS opponents beginning with a 2017 game at UConn (Holy Cross' first BCS foe since 2002) and future contests with Syracuse and Navy. In 2015, Pine hired Bill Carmody as the head men's basketball coach, a move which quickly energized the program. In Carmody's first season, the Crusaders won the Patriot League title in dramatic fashion and then went on to win their first NCAA Tournament game in 63 years in the First

Four. He made a number of other notable coaching hires at Holy Cross.

To improve operational effectiveness, Pine reorganized the department's senior staff and recruited an impressive administrative group.

Pine was active at the national level and represented Holy Cross and the Patriot League as a member of the NCAA Division I FCS Football Committee and the NCAA Division I FCS Athletic Director's Association Executive Committee. He worked at the league level with the other athletic directors and the conference office to maximize the student-athlete experience and generate additional exposure and revenue for the Patriot League and Holy Cross.

Pine joined the Crusaders after serving as the deputy director of athletics at the University of Maryland. In addition to sport supervision of men's basketball, men's soccer, women's soccer and baseball, he oversaw all of the external support units and revenue generation for Maryland's athletic department, including development, marketing, media relations, ticket operations and video services. Pine was also responsible for negotiating the majority of the department's business contracts, including the multimedia partnership with CBS Collegiate Sports Properties and the Under Armour all-apparel deal, community engagement and the M Club (former letter winners organization) as well as the athletics merchandising and eCommerce operations.

Prior to his time at Maryland, Pine spent three years at the University of California at Berkeley, where he oversaw all aspects of the major gift program and development staff for athletics. Pine led the university's athletics fundraising capital campaign, an unprecedented \$500 million effort.

Pine also spent four years at the United States Military Academy, where he was a key member of the athletic senior leadership team. He was responsible for all business initiatives for Army and oversight of the external operations areas for athletics. Pine also represented Army's interests in the coordination and execution of the contract extension with CBS Sports for the 2010-2018 Army-Navy football games, and he oversaw all elements of the Army-Navy sponsorship rights.

Pine began his career in the athletic department at Oregon State University, where he was instrumental in the growth of annual fundraising and the renovation of Reser Stadium during his five-plus years in Corvallis following graduation.

A native of Eagle Point, Ore., Pine received his bachelor's degree in marketing and international business from Oregon State University, and a master's degree in education from the University of California at Berkeley. He and his wife, Stephanie, reside in Colorado Springs with their two dogs, Deuce and Lola.

FALCON ATHLETICS FACILITIES

Few schools in the country have an athletic program as extensive as the Air Force Academy's.

The goals of the athletic program are to enhance the physical conditioning of all cadets, to develop the physical skills necessary for officership, to teach leadership in a competitive environment and to build character. There are three subdivisions of the athletic program: intercollegiate athletics, intramurals and physical education.

The intercollegiate program has 17 men's and 10 women's NCAA-sanctioned teams, facing some of the top competition in the nation. Men's teams are football, baseball, basketball, ice hockey, cross-country, fencing, golf, gymnastics, indoor and outdoor track, lacrosse, rifle, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, water polo and wrestling. The Academy fields women's teams in basketball, cross-country, fencing, gymnastics, rifle, indoor and outdoor track, swimming and diving, soccer, tennis and volleyball. In addition, the Academy sponsors two non-NCAA programs; boxing and cheerleading.

The majority of the Academy's men's and women's programs compete at the NCAA Division I level in the Mountain West Conference. The Falcons compete in this conference against teams from Boise State, Colorado State, Fresno State, Hawai'i (football only), Nevada, New Mexico, San Diego State, San Jose State, UNLV, Utah State and Wyoming. All sports also compete against non-conference opponents, including many nationally ranked teams.

The football team competes annually for the Commander-in-Chief's Trophy, which

is emblematic of service academy football supremacy. The Falcons have won the trophy 20 times, which is more than any other academy.

The USAFA Cadet Field House is one of the most impressive buildings in the country. It's a modern, versatile structure with seemingly endless uses. The \$5.6 million building is five stories high and 396 feet by 426 feet, the size of three football fields laid side by side. The structure is divided into three areas--basketball arena, ice hockey arena and multipurpose area. The three sections have a combined seating capacity of more than 9,000.

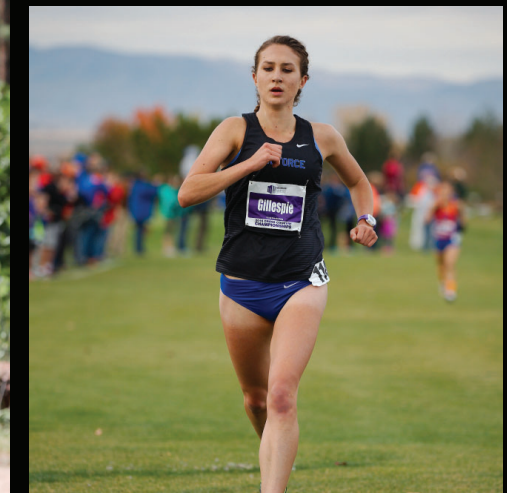
Clune Arena seats 5,858. The Cadet Ice Rink has a seating capacity of 2,470, while the multipurpose area seats 1,000 fans for track and field competitions.

The \$4.1-million renovation to the Cadet Track Stadium, the outdoor home of the Air Force track and field team, was completed in the fall of 2011 and is one of the premier track and field facilities in the nation. The Holaday Athletic Center, a \$15.5 million completely donor funded indoor training facility, was completed in

July 2011. The Cadet Fitness Center, a \$9.5 million, Military Construction project, home of the Air Force Academy's fencing practice facility and aerobics/weight lifting facility that contains a nearly 33-foot climbing wall, opened in May 2012.

DAVID HIGGINS: THE WILD CARD

David Higgins - the dark horse!

The underdog!

The wildcard!

In the past few weeks since qualifying for the U.S. Olympic Team in Men's Prone Rifle, the Air Force Academy senior with the self-deprecating sense of humor has heard them all.

"It's kind of funny that everyone's been, 'Out of left field, Higgins for the Olympics!' and I was like, 'I thought I had a chance the entire time!'" he said with a jokingly exasperated sigh. "Maybe I was the only one who believed in me, but I thought hey, I came in third for World Championships, I'm pretty decent nationally. I honestly thought I had a shot at Olympic Trials, but everyone else is 'Higgins out of left field! Out of nowhere! Higgins the wildcard!' And I'm 'Okay...whatever...'. It was kind of enjoyable to hear all of that!"

And yes, maybe he is the, well, all those things, but there's no denying the points he racked up at the U.S. Olympic Team Trials for Smallbore. By the conclusion of Day Two of the three-day Trials, Higgins was well back in second place, 11.3 points behind two-time Olympic medalist and ranked-sixth-in-the-world Matt Emmons.

"So I was sitting in second and Emmons is up about 11 points and I kind of thought it's doable, but the probability is low," Higgins said. "I was just like 'Let's go in there, crush it, do your best...and you'll probably come out second. That's just how it's going to be, but still go out and give it your all.' With the possibility of this being the last quad for Prone, I figured this might be my last Prone match ever since I wasn't going to be able to shoot Nationals, so this was probably going to be it, so go out and enjoy it. Enjoy Prone. So I just went out there, shot a great match, and then went into the Final just enjoying it. I guess I had already come in

first before the Final, but I didn't know that going into the Final, so I was like let's just go enjoy that and crush it. I went in, won the Final - which was great - but honestly, it was after it was all over when I found out that I won. And at first it wasn't so much that I won, it was just great that the match was over because the stress was gone! It was a very stressful match. Three days of that? It's a very hard selection."

On the final day of Qualification, Higgins had shot a personal best of 629.5, 12.7 points ahead of Emmons, who did not qualify for the day three Finals. This left Higgins untouchable entering the last Finals of the match and secured him the Olympic Team nomination.

Higgins, 21, first discovered his love for shooting when he was four or five, shooting a BB gun at his grandparent's house. Once in the eighth grade, he got dialed into the high-power scene in Louisiana and shot high-power matches nearly every weekend with Olympic Development Team member Michael Liuzza. He told Higgins if he wanted to shoot in college, he should switch to smallbore and air. Higgins confesses he didn't really start shooting the international game until about four years ago, but it's not like he just came out of left field... dang-it!

"I was good at high power. We shoot 600 yards in high power and I loved reading the wind," Higgins said. "It's kind of fun if there's a wind switch and you just catch it, and you're still shooting tens at such a distance. I was good at reading the wind in high power and in all honestly, it all just came over so naturally in smallbore. It's just kind of cool when there's wind, you can be a shade off and you're not pointed at the middle, but the shots are still going in the middle. There's a lot you can do in Prone. It's very accurate. I feel like airguns shoot on top of each other so some people might argue that it's the most precise event in the sport. I argue that it's Prone because we're still trying to put them on top of each other, but there's a lot more variables that we're trying to control. I enjoy that aspect of it."

Higgins would eventually enroll at the Air Force Academy to be coached by Olympic medalists Launi Meili and Mike Anti.

"I came [to the Air Force Academy] because I thought they're the best coaches in NCAA shooting - still do," Higgins said. "Now that we're looking forward to Rio, they've been talking about how I should approach it. Coach Meili is big on visualization, having me visualize matches or parts of matches every night in my head before I go to sleep. She's kind of the fuzzy side of shooting whereas Coach Anti is more the technical side. She's got me being big on visualization, controlling emotions, that kind

of stuff, whereas Coach Anti is kind of big on making sure the gun is ready to go. They kind of fill in the gaps with each other very well - how I should approach Rio, and that I should approach these World Cups like practice Olympics. I need to get in my head 'This is it; this is the match. This is all there is. 60 shots here today, whether that's the Rio World Cup or the Munich World Cup.'"

"We've got a little bit of work to do, not just with his training, but he's an Air Force cadet and he graduates June 2, then gets commissioned to the Marine Corps. We're going to have to do some coordination with the Marines to make sure he can get some training time before the Olympics, but I think he'll be ready," Anti said.

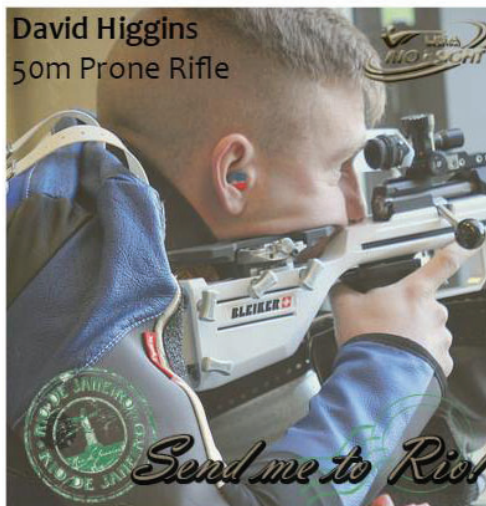
The Marines have deferred Higgins' training until after the Olympics, so he can focus on graduation and developing a training plan with the help of Meili and Anti. He's even receiving guidance from 2012 Prone Rifle Olympian, Eric Uptagrafft.

"He's just giving me advice leading up to the Olympics because he's been there before. He says, 'You're good, you don't need to go faster better, stronger. Just continue what you're doing because it's successful.' I'm also trying to learn as much as I can from [Prone Rifle Olympic teammate Michael] McPhail. I plan on shadowing him, sitting behind him on the scope, seeing how he plays the wind and everything."

And though he knows many may think he's [insert surprised sports cliché here] because he's only shot a few international matches, inside he feels like a veteran shooter - he's been shooting domestically with some of the best in the world.

"It's hard to make teams here with the U.S. guys at the top: McPhail, Emmons, Uptagrafft. And it's very hard to make Prone teams. I haven't felt like I was below the level of any of the World Cups this quad, I just feel that there are so many good prone shooters in the U.S. that it's hard to make teams. I never felt like I was below the quality of shooter to go World Cups or those kind of matches. I don't know if I have any expectations on me for Rio except my own expectations. I'm trying to shoot 630s - or right around there - and that's kind of been my goal. I know I can do it. It's not like I'm pressured to do it, it's just whether it all falls into place. As long as I'm doing my job, everything will fall into place."

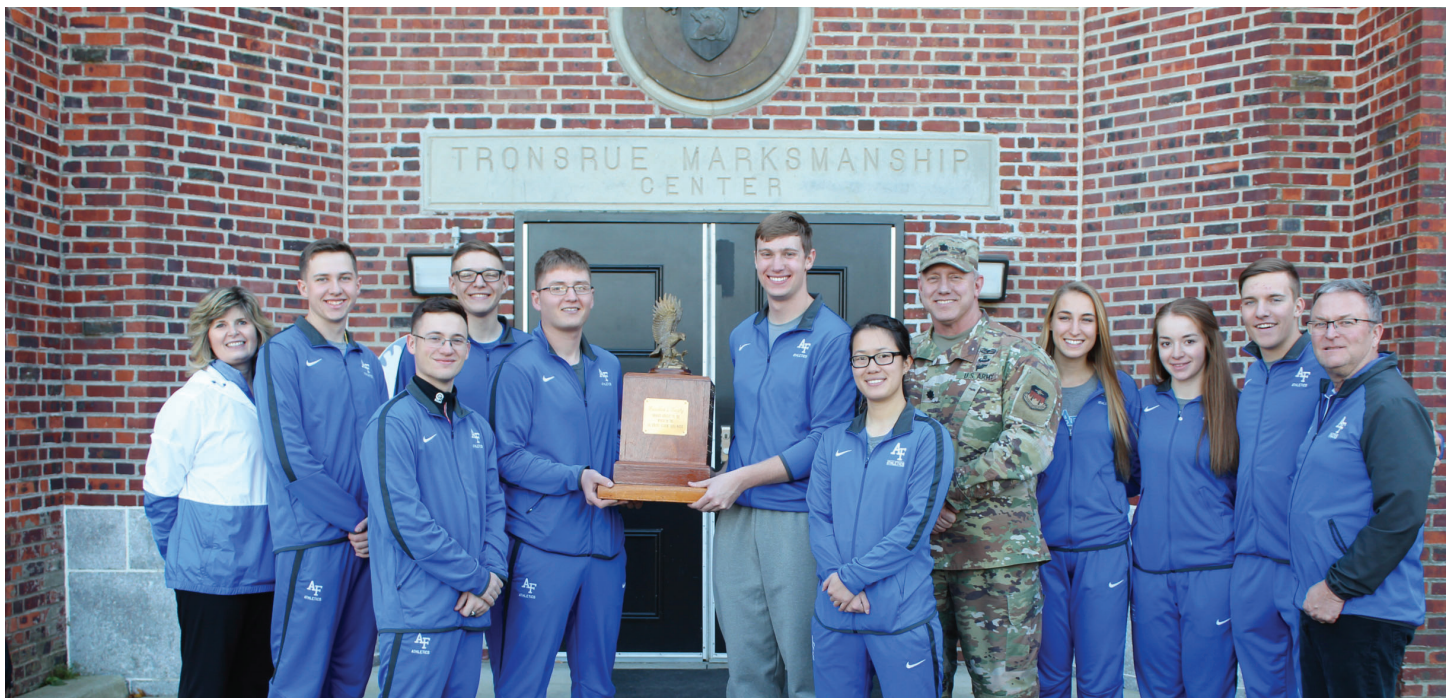

ABOUT THE ACADEMY

The United States Air Force Academy offers a four-year program of instruction and experience designed to educate, train and inspire men and women to become officers of character, motivated to lead the United States Air Force in service to our nation. Each cadet graduates with a bachelor of science degree and a commission as a second lieutenant in the Air Force.

COURSE OF STUDY

Cadets are exposed to a balanced curriculum that provides the knowledge, skills and responsibilities essential to a career Air Force officer. The entire USAFA experience is integrated and mapped to achieve a set of desired outcomes in every graduate.

The core academic curriculum includes courses in basic sciences, engineering, social sciences and humanities. Cadets take additional elective courses to complete requirements for one of 32 major areas of study. About 50 percent of the cadets complete majors in science and engineering; the remainder graduate in the social sciences and humanities. Some of the most popular majors include management, aeronautical engineering, foreign area studies, history, behavioral science, civil engineering, astronautical engineering, electrical engineering and engineering mechanics.

FACULTY COMPOSITION

The majority of the Academy's faculty members, more than 500 total, are Air Force officers. They are selected primarily from career-officer volunteers who have established outstanding records of performance and dedication. Each has at least a master's degree and more than 55 percent have doctorates or other terminal degrees in their field of study.

About 30 percent of the faculty are civilians who bring great depth of disciplinary and educational expertise and provide academic stability and continuity.

Faculty members are intensely focused on cadet learning as an integral part of their officer development. The Air Force Academy has been ranked No. 1 in the nation for the most accessible and involved faculty for four years in a row.

To provide greater contributions by a diverse faculty, the Academy has several distinguished visiting professors and endowed professors who serve one or more years. Officers from other services, as well as officers from allied countries are also members of the faculty. Distinguished civilian and military lecturers

also share their expertise with the cadets during the academic year.

ATHLETIC PROGRAM

The Academy's athletic program is designed to improve physical fitness, teach athletic skills and develop leadership qualities. To achieve its goals, the Academy offers some of the most extensive physical education, intramural sports and intercollegiate athletic programs in the nation. Cadets take at least three different physical education courses each year.

MILITARY EDUCATION AND TRAINING

An air, space and cyberspace-oriented military education, training and leadership program begins with basic cadet training and continues throughout the four years. Seniors are responsible for the organizational leadership of the cadet wing, while juniors and sophomores seek to develop team and interpersonal leadership and instructional skills. Cadets are projected into as many active leadership roles as possible to prepare them to be effective Air Force officers.

Fundamental concepts of military organization -- drill, ethics, honor, Air Force heritage and physical training -- are emphasized the first summer during basic cadet training. Freshmen then study the military role in United States society as well as the mission and organization of the Air Force. Sophomores receive instruction in communication skills and juniors study the combat and operational aspects of the Air Force.

The Academy offers courses in flying, navigation, soaring and parachuting, building from basic skills to instructor duties. Some cadets may fly light aircraft with the Cadet Flying Team.

Summer training for cadets is divided into three, three-week training periods. There are a variety of programs available and each cadet is required to complete two training periods each summer with leave during the other period. All new cadets take six weeks of basic cadet training in their first summer.

Combat survival training is a required three-week program during cadets' second summer. For other second-summer training periods, cadets have options such as working with Airmen in an operational unit at an Air Force installation, airborne parachute training, soaring or basic free-fall parachute training.

During their last two summers, all cadets are offered leadership training as supervisors or

instructors in the summer programs listed above.

Extracurricular activities also are an integral part of the education program. The cadet ski club, drum and bugle corps, cadet chorale and forensics are a few of the programs available.

NOMINATIONS

HISTORY OF THE ACADEMY

In 1948, a board of leading civilian and military educators was appointed to plan the curriculum for an academy that would meet the needs of the newly established Air Force. The board determined that Air Force requirements could not be met by expanding the other service academies and recommended an Air Force Academy be established without delay.

In 1949, then Secretary of the Air Force W. Stuart Symington appointed a commission to assist in selecting a site and on April 1, 1954, President Dwight D. Eisenhower authorized creation of the United States Air Force Academy. After considering 580 sites in 45 states, the commission narrowed the choice to three locations. The summer of 1954, Secretary of the Air Force Harold Talbott selected a site near Colorado Springs, Colo. Colorado contributed \$1 million toward purchase of the property.

In July 1955, the first Academy class entered interim facilities at Lowry Air Force Base, Denver, while construction began. It was sufficiently completed for occupancy by the cadet wing in late August 1958. Initial construction cost was \$142 million. Women entered the Academy on June 28, 1976, as members of the class of 1980.
