WOMEN'S TENNIS RECORD BOOK



UPDATED THROUGH THE 2023-24 SEASON

Division I Highlights

1998-99 - Junior NADINE LYNN defeats No. 72 Nadine Kenzlemen of Colorado, the first Top 75 win for a USAFA singles player.

1999-2000 - A 5-2 victory over No. 83 Utah at the MWC Tournament is the team's first Division I Conference win.

2000-01 - Senior KRISTEL CHUNTRARUK splits sets with the 1999 NCAA Div. I Singles Champion and No. 1 player in the nation, Zuzana Lesenarova of the University of San Diego.

- Junior BROOKE PARSONS defeats No. 73 Anneliese Rose (Florida Int'l) and No. 106 Sanja Hanson (Colorado State).

2001-02 - Senior BROOKE PARSONS defeats No. 41 Paulina Janus (UNLV), No. 46 Irina Tereshenko (Texas Tech), No. 58 Becky Varnum (Notre Dame), No. 76 Yanick Dullens (Denver), No. 96 Lindsey Hedberg (San Diego State) and No. 106 Kristen Stubbs (Virginia Tech).

- PARSONS posts the best record in the Mountain West Conference at No. 1 singles (6-1).

- PARSONS becomes first USAFA player to participate in the Riviera All-American, also invited in doubles with partner LAURA NIGRO.

- Doubles team of PARSONS & NIGRO defeats the No. 1 doubles team from No. 13 Notre Dame, No. 15 UNLV, No. 22 San Diego State, No. 38 BYU, No. 44 Southern Methodist, No. 64 Richmond and No. 75 Virginia Tech.

- USAFA posts its first wins over nationally ranked teams - No. 44 Southern Methodist and No. 57 Texas Tech.

- First time in USAFA history that a singles player (PARSONS #11), a doubles team (PARSONS/NIGRO #13) and the team (#13) receive a Central Regional Ranking.

2002-03 - Junior LAURA NIGRO defeats No. 46 Irina Tereshenko (Texas Tech), No. 50 Renate Stoop (Boise State), No. 82 Sandy Lukowski (New Mexico) and No. 138 Annette Bryntesson (Oklahoma State).

- Senior HEATHER SHELBY defeats No. 72 Gyorgyi Zsiros (UNLV) and No. 76 Yanick Dullens (Denver).

- USAFA defeats nationally ranked Texas Tech (No. 61).

2003-04 - Senior LAURA NIGRO defeats No. 72 Gyorgyi Zsiros (UNLV) and No. 81 Dita Haverlandova (San Diego State).

- NIGRO is invited to play in the Riviera All-American, along with doubles partner, GINA BLACK.

- NIGRO & BLACK defeat the NCAA doubles semi-finalists of 2003 (Missouri) and 2004 (New Mexico).

2004-05 - Junior KAT BUSHEY wins the MWC Sportsmanship Award.

2005-06 - Senior KAT BUSHEY and freshman CHRISTINE ABAYAN upset the No. 1 doubles seed and advanced to the quarterfinals of the Central Region Tourney

- Beat two nationally ranked teams from BYU and set a new school record with 29 wins.

2006-07 - Senior KELLY MORGAN wins 24 overall singles matches, the most by a Falcon since Gina Black won 26 during the 2002-03 campaign.

2007-08 - Freshmen CHRISTEN MONREAL (21) and SARAH CASSMAN (20) became the first pair of freshmen to win 20 overall singles matches in the same season since Air Force moved to Division I.

2008-09 - Air Force won the doubles point vs. nationally ranked #21 TCU and # 57 Texas Tech.

2009-10 - Air Force finished the 2009-10 season with a 16-12 record, the best since Coach Gidley's initial season in 1998-99 when they went 20-10. Gidley also led Air Force to two MWC wins, the most in a season since 2003

- Freshman MELISSA CECIL posted 28 overall singles wins, the most by a Falcon in the Division I era and the most since Laura Simmons won 31 during the 1994-95 season.

- Five Falcons won at least 20 overall singles matches in one season for the first time in program history.

- Junior SARAH CASSMAN became the first Falcon to win at least 20 overall singles matches in three straight seasons since moving to Division I.

- Sophomore TAHLIA SMOKE became USAFA's first female tennis player to achieve a Division I national Ranking at #102.

- USAFA posted its first-ever shutout over a Mountain West opponent, defeating New Mexico, 7-0.

2010-11 - Air Force posted its second consecutive 16-win season, producing the best two-year period for wins (32) since the 1999 and 2000 seasons (34).

- Senior CHRISTEN MONREAL became the team's first two-time MVP since Kat Bushey in 2006.

- USAFA posted a 12-match winning streak, the longest since moving to Division I in '96.

- For the first time in program history, the Falcons won three Mountain Region awards. Assistant coach NICK DARGENE was named the Assistant Coach of the Year, CHRISTEN MONREAL won the Cissie Leary Sportsmanship Award and SARAH CASSMAN won the Arthur Ashe Leadership Award.

2011-12 - Air Force posted the most wins in one season (17) since 1999.

- USAFA's three conference wins are the most since moving to Division I in 1996

- Three Falcons earned all-conference honors, another Division I milestone.

- CHRISTINE MOLINA won the Cissie Leary Sportsmanship Award for the Mountain Region.

2012-13 - Air Force defeated in-state rival Colorado (4-3) for the first time ever

- HANNAH DAKE won the national Arthur Ashe Leadership Award

- Air Force posted its fourth consecutive winning season, a first since moving to Division I

- Three Falcons (CHRISTINE MOLINA, HANNAH DAKE and MELISSA CECIL) earned all-Mountain West honors for the second straight year

- MELISSA CECIL set new Division I school records with 89 overall career doubles and 165 overall combined (singles and doubles) wins

2013-14 - Air Force posted a 17-9 record, its fifth consecutive winning season and tying the second-most wins in one season since moving to Division I in 1996.

- NATASHA RIZVI'S 51 overall wins (28 doubles, 23 singles) were the second-most in the program's Division I history (Borke Parsons had 52 in 2001-02)

- TIFFANY TRAN earned her first all-conference selection

Division I Highlights

2014-15 - Air Force posted an 18-9 record, its sixth consecutive winning season. The Falcons defeated a pair of nationally-ranked teams, beating No. 66 Kansas State and No. 69 Utah State. The team's 18 wins are the second-most in the Kim Gidley era, the fifth most in the history of the program, third most in the Division I era (1996-present) and most since Air Force was 20-10 in 1998-99 in Gidley's first season as head coach.

Air Force defeated No. 68 Florida State in a dual match.

- NATASHA RIZVI became the winningest player in Division I history and finished her career with 170 combined wins. She earned all-conference honors in singles and doubles.

- TRACY LANDRAM earned all-conference honors in doubles.

- CHLOE FORLINI set the all-time school record for wins in a season, posting a 33-9 record this season. Forlini set the Division I record when she reached 29 wins and set the all-time mark with her 33rd win.

2015-16 - Air Force finished the season 13-12 overall. The Falcons were the eighth seed in the 2016 Mountain West Women's Tennis Championships with a 1-4 mark. The Falcons clinched their seventh straight winning season, a first at the Division I level.

- CHLOE FORLINI earned all-Mountain West selection for singles, won the Arthur Ashe Award for leadership and service and was a National Strength and Conditioning Award winner.

- Head Coach Kim Gidley won the USPTA National College Coach of the Year Award and the Intermountain Coach of the Year Award.

2016-17 - Air Force finished the season 20-10 overall and was the seventh seed in the Mountain West championships. The Falcons beat No. 10 Colorado State and No. 2 Fresno State to advance to the conference semifinals for the first time in school history. The team's 20 wins set a new school record for the Division I era and was the third-most ever in school history.

- Senior CHLOE FORLINI, sophomore ELIZABETH BARNICKEL and freshman TJ FUMAGALLI were each named all-Mountain West in 2017. Forlini and Fumagalli earned the honor for singles while Fumagalli and Barnickel earned the honor in doubles. Forlini notched a 32-12 overall singles record this season, including a 20-8 dual record at No. 1 singles. Fumagalli and Barnickel played No. 1 doubles and posted a 22-4 mark this spring.

- Chloe Forlini became the winningest player in school history. Forlini posted 198 career combined wins to surpass the record of 170 set by Natasha Rizvi from 2011-15. She is No. 1 in school history in career singles wins with 108. She surpassed the record 88 set by Sarah Cassman from 2007-11. Forlini ended her career with a 108-41 singles record and a 90-46 doubles mark. She was 32-12 overall in singles this season and is the first player in school history to post two 30-win seasons. She had a then-school-record 33 singles wins in 2015.

- Freshman TJ Fumagalli set three program records. She surpassed the program record for singles wins in a season with 40, breaking the record of 33 set by Chloe Forlini in 2015. Fumagalli had a record 80 combined singles and doubles wins. She was 40-3 overall in singles, including an undefeated 29-0 mark this spring

in duals, becoming the first player in school history to record an undefeated regular season. Fumagalli was 40-11 overall in doubles, including a 24-5 mark this spring. She was a combined 80-14 overall and 53-5 in singles and doubles.

- The doubles team of freshman TJ Fumagalli and sophomore Elizabeth Barnickel reached 86th nationally in the ITA rankings this season. The pair played No. 1 doubles for the Falcons and finished the season 22-4 this spring. They are the first Air Force team to ever be ranked nationally in doubles. There are 1,200 doubles teams eligible for the national rankings and being in the top 90 puts the Falcons duo in the top two percent of the country.

2017-18 - Air Force posted a 14-7 overall record, finishing sixth in the Mountain West Conference regular season. In the national ranking polls, Air Force checked in at No. 89, several positions ahead of service academy rivals, Army West Point and Navy.

- TJ FUMAGALLI earned team MVP, becoming just the second sophomore to earn MVP at the Div. I level.

- Fumagalli earned All-Mountain West honors in singles with a 24-15 record. She finished with a No. 106 national ranking.

- Fumagalli and junior ELIZABETH BARNICKEL earned All-MW in doubles, going 23-8. They finished with a No. 52 national ranking.

- Barnickel earned the team's Fighting Falcon award.

- Freshman ASHLEIGH HARVEY won the Nuke' Em Award with a 22-7 singles and 20-6 doubles record.

- Freshman MEREDITH JONES earned the team Iron Bolt Award for excellence in strength and conditioning.

- Junior MEREDITH LASKEY earned the team's Most Improved Award.

2018-19 - Posted 22-3 overall record, including 4-1 mark in Mountain West play, tying for first in the MW Mountain Division.

- Tied school record for wins and set new Div. I era record.

- First-ever Mountain West title by a women's team in Air Force history.

- First-ever win over Nebraska and a Big Ten Conference team.

- First-ever win over Creighton and a Big East Conference team.

- First-ever win over Boise State.

- First-ever road win at Wyoming.

- Junior TJ FUMAGALLI earns third All-Mountain West singles and doubles honors, the first at Air Force to do so.

- Fumagalli earns team MVP honors.

- Senior ELIZABETH BARNICKEL becomes Air Force's all-time career wins leader with 203 overall wins.

- Fumagalli and KRISTIN KERRIGAN win ITA Mountain Region Fall Doubles Title, the first-ever in program history.

- Fumagalli and Kerrigan are first-ever at Air Force play in Oracle ITA Fall Championships.

- KIM GIDLEY named MW Women's Tennis Coach of the Year.

- Fumagalli earns third All-MW Singles and Doubles honors, the first ever at Air Force to do so.

- Freshman Kristin Kerrigan earns All-MW Doubles.

- Junior NADEEN LIEBERMAN earned Fighting Falcon award.

- Fumagalli, Lieberman, Kerrigan, MEREDITH JONES and ASHLEIGH HARVEY earned 20/20 Awards for 20 singles and 20 doubles wins.

2019-20 - Posted a 10-4 record in dual matches. The .714 win percentage is the second best in the Mountain West era.

- The Falcons earned a dominant 6-1 win at Colorado, for its first-ever win in Boulder.

- The Falcons also played two top-10 ranked opponents in #4 Florida State and #7 Texas.

- The Falcons closed out the season by winning six in a row by a combined score of 34-3.

- Head coach Kim Gidley earned her 300th career win against Colorado.

- Senior TJ Fumagalli was named 2020 Mountain West Player of the Year, the first in Academy history for the program. Fumagalli capped off the greatest career by an Air Force women's tennis player by posting an overall record of 39-13, going 19-8 in singles and 20-5 in doubles. She was ranked in doubles for the fourth time in her career, going 11-3 in doubles with partner Nadeen Lieberman. Fumagalli and Lieberman earned two wins over ranked opponents. Fumagalli graduates as Air Force's record holder in 11 of 12 categories. She finished with 228 career wins (next closest at 203).

- Kim Gidley Named 2020 USPTA National Coach of the Year and 2020 USPTA Intermountain Coach of the Year.

- The season ended before conference play due to Covid-19.

Division I Highlights

2020-21 - - Air Force posted a 12-7 record in 2020-21 for its 12th consecutive winning season, the longest active streak of any team at the Academy.

- The Falcons tied a program record with four conference wins.
- The Falcons defeated Nevada for the first time and won its second straight against Wyoming for the first time ever.
- Only the third time in Div. I history (23 years) to have two singles players named to the Mountain West All-Conference Team in Singles.
- Meredith Jones and Sydney Fitch were 2 of 88 players named to the 16 Team in Singles.
- Sydney Fitch is only the second sophomore in the 23 years at the Division I level to be named All-Conference in Singles.
- In the fall, the Women's Tennis Team was one of just two teams (out of 27 programs) at the Air Force Academy that had a 100 percent Graduation Success Rate released by the NCAA.
- Head Coach Kim Gidley extended her school record of wins by a women's tennis coach at Air Force with 321 wins.

2021-22 - - Air Force finished at 17-8, earning its 13th-straight winning season, the current longest active streak among USAFA's 27 intercollegiate sports.

- Six wins against conference opponents marks the most in program history.
- The Falcons, after opening nonconference duals with a 7-0 record, got off to a 3-1 start in league play with a pair of road wins against New Mexico and Nevada, then claimed a 4-2 victory over Wyoming.
- Both of the Falcons' All-Mountain West selections, Vivian Glozman and Karina Chao went 22-1 on court one in doubles, finishing third all-time in dual doubles wins for a single season; Glozman's unblemished 19-0 dual singles mark was good for sixth all-time in dual singles wins; Chao's 35 combined doubles wins for 2021-22 claimed third in the category.
- Air Force's season came to a close in the Mountain West quarterfinal round, falling 4-3 to UNLV.
- Six Academic All-Mountain West selections marks a program record (Alex Kuo, Hailey Stelse, Sydney Fitch, Karina Chao, Isabella Flodin, Vivian Glozman).

2022-23 - - The Falcons (12-12, 6-4 MW) knocked off both reigning regular-season and conference tournament champions on the way to the program's first-ever appearance in the title round of the Mountain West Championships, in which the Falcons fell to UNLV, 4-1.

- Air Force's 4-3 victory over No. 49 San Diego State (Mar. 26) stands as the women's tennis' second ever all-time top-50 win.
- Air Force finished conference play 10-0 as a team earning the doubles point in a best-of-three-sets format - a streak which extended to 12 straight with a pair of team wins in the Mountain West tournament against Colorado State and San Jose State in the opening two rounds.

2023-24 - Air Force, in its inaugural season under head coach Taylor Hollander, finished 1-18 in dual play. As a whole, the Falcons went 11-36 (234) and 20-62 (244) in dual doubles and singles, combining for an overall 31-80 (.279).

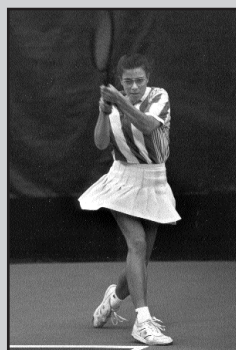

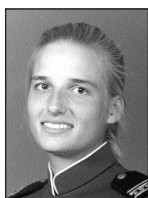

AFA's Simmons earns national title

Falcon freshman stuns top seed

RANCHO CORDOVA, Calif. — Laura Simmons said she brought no expectations to the NCAA Division II national tournament.

She brought back to Air Force the women's tennis singles championship.

Simmons, a freshman from Spring, Texas, claimed the title Thursday by stunning top-seeded Chan Dixon of Valdosta (Ga.) State, 6-3, 7-6 (7-1), at the Grid River Racquet Club.

She is the first Falcon to win a national singles championship.

"Going into the tournament, I really didn't know what to expect," Simmons said. "I just tried to play as well as I could. It was harder playing in California because the air was so heavy, it made it a slower game.

"I'm just very excited about winning the tournament."

Simmons trailed 5-2 in the second set.

"She is very dangerous when she is down in a match," said AFA head coach Bob Swanson. "The whole tournament, she played consistently and did not make very many unforced errors. All tournament, and especially in the last match, she never gave up and that has been her trademark all season."

Simmons earned rookie-of-the-year honors in Division II and in the Midwest Region. She finished with a 30-5 record and was ranked as high as fifth in the national poll.

She did not drop a set in her three matches at nationals. In each match, she needed to win a tiebreaker.

Air Force finished fifth in the team competition.

Simmons is the fourth AFA all-American in tennis. Susan Wheeler and Layla DeStaffany won the 1989 national doubles championship. Monica Davis also earned 1989 all-America honors.

Hannah Dake Wins 2013 National Arthur Ashe Sportsmanship and Leadership Award

2014 Air Force Academy graduate Hannah Dake was named the recipient of the Intercollegiate Tennis Association's national Arthur Ashe Leadership and Sportsmanship Award for the 2012-13 academic year. After winning the Mountain Region award, Dake was on the national ballot with 11 other regional winners.

The Arthur Ashe Award recognizes outstanding individuals in all divisions at the regional and national level. In August the national winners were honored during a special ceremony hosted by the United States Tennis Association during Arthur Ashe Kids' Day inside Ashe Stadium in Flushing Meadows, N.Y., prior to the start of the U.S. Open. This award, which dates back to 1982, goes to NCAA Divisions I, II and III, NAIA and Junior College men's and women's players who have exhibited outstanding sportsmanship and leadership as well as scholastic, extracurricular and tennis achievements.

"Hannah's Arthur Ashe Award is the biggest honor a player can receive," said Air Force head coach Kim Gidley. "We are so proud of Hannah for her outstanding representation of the women's tennis program and the Air Force Academy. It is so great to see that Hannah's efforts on and off the court have been recognized and I know she will continue to serve and be a leader as she embarks on her Air Force career. For a coach, this is as big as it gets."

Dake, last year's team MVP, led the Falcons with 25 doubles wins and was second with 20 singles wins as a senior. Her 25 wins with fellow senior Melissa Cecil were the most by an Air Force doubles team in one season since Kat Bushey and Christine Abayan had 29 in 2005-06. She is ranked No. 3 on the school's career list with 82 overall doubles wins and 152 combined (singles and doubles) victories in the Division I era (since 1996). She also earned her first all-Mountain West selection last season.

Off the court, Dake was involved with her squadron as well as several community activities. She served as a squadron superintendent, monitoring the accountability of over 100 cadets, and as an assistant flight commander during basic training. In the community, Dake and her teammates volunteered for many local activities, including several events at Skyway Elementary School as well as the Salvation Army, Habitat for Humanity, Humane Society and the Marion House Soup Kitchen.

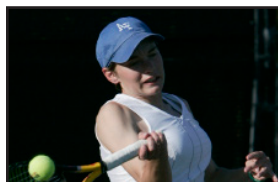

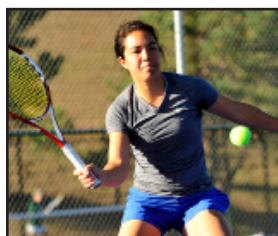

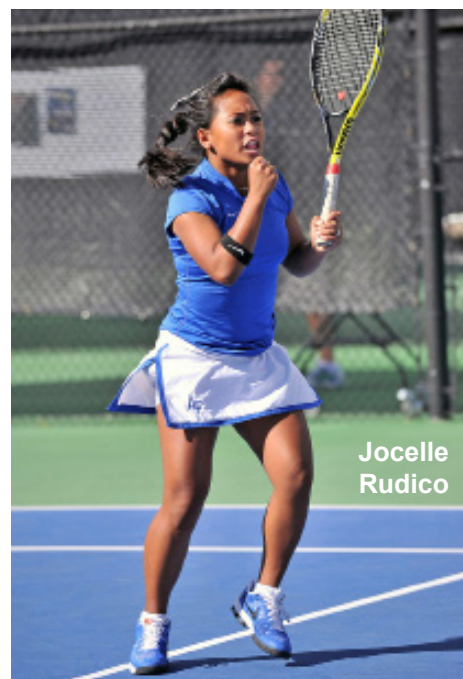
