BRONCO GAME NOTES

DAY GAME: For the first time in six years, the Boise State football team will play a home game during the month of October in the afternoon. The Broncos' match-up against San Diego State is the first afternoon kick since squaring off against UNLV, Oct. 20, 2012. That start time was also 1:30 p.m.

OPPONENT BYE WEEKS: Boise State is playing a game against an opponent coming off a bye for the second time in as many weeks, the first time this has happened for the Broncos since 2004. That season the Broncos caught Tulsa and Fresno State coming off byes in back-to-back weeks, and each game resulted in a Boise State victory.

Boise State, which defeated Wyoming last week, is 31-3 against teams coming off a scheduled bye week since joining what is now the Football Bowl Subdivision in 1996. The only three losses during that time came against Wisconsin in 1997, Arkansas in 2000 and Air Force in 2014.

THREE RECEIVERS IN TOP 100: The Broncos' trio of Sean Modster (19th; 96.3 yards per game), A.J. Richardson (54th; 78.3) and John Hightower (97th; 64.3) each rank in the top 100 nationally in receiving yardage. The Broncos are one of only five schools in the country with three receivers in the top 100, a list that also includes Hawaii, Texas Tech, Washington State and West Virginia.

WIN THE TURNOVER MARGIN, WIN THE GAME: Boise State has won 17-consecutive games when it is plus one or better in turnover margin, the third-longest active streak in the country. The top mark belongs to San Diego State (24), and Oklahoma has the second-longest streak (20).

BRONCOS IN THE POLLS

ONE OF THE VOTERS: Boise State head coach Bryan Harsin is one of 65 voters in the 2018 Amway Coaches Poll.

17 YEARS IN THE RANKINGS: By opening the 2018 season ranked in the national polls, Boise State extended its streak of consecutive seasons with at least one week in the rankings, a mark that now stands at 17. Boise State has been ranked for at least one week in either the AP or the Coaches Poll every season since 2002.

PRESEASON RANKINGS: Boise State opened the 2018 season ranked No. 22 in both the AP and Coaches Polls, marking the seventh time in the last 10 seasons that the Broncos were ranked to open the year. It is, however, the first time Boise State opened a season ranked since 2015.

SUCCESS WHEN RANKED: Boise State has an all-time record of 105-17 (.861) when ranked in the top 25 of the AP Poll, the Coaches Poll or the College Football Playoff Poll. A complete history of the Broncos in the rankings can be found on page 31.

MOUNTAIN WEST NOTES

KINGS STAY KINGS: Boise State captured its third Mountain West title in six seasons this past season, beating No. 25 Fresno State, 17-14, in the conference championship game at Albertsons Stadium.

The title ties Boise State with Colorado State (1999, 2000, 2002) and San Diego State (2012, 2015, 2016) for the most Mountain West crowns among current members, while BYU, TCU, and Utah still remain tied for most overall at four apiece.

CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIPS: The Broncos have played in four conferences all time, and have won multiple conference championships in each: six in the Big Sky (1970-95), two in the Big West (1996-2000), eight in the WAC (2001-10) and three in the MW (2011-Present).

CONFERENCE TITLES: Boise State's 2017 Mountain West Championship was its 13th since joining what is now known as the Football Bowl Subdivision in 1996, more than any school in the country during that time. Only Florida State (11), Oklahoma (11) and Ohio State (10) have won 10-or-more since the Broncos joined FBS.

The Broncos have won 19 conference championships all-time, including three in the Mountain West, eight in the WAC, two in the Big West and six in the Big Sky.

SENIOR SUCCESS: The Broncos' 2017 senior class was the 19th-straight group that will leave Boise State with at least one conference title. Of those 19 senior classes, 17 left with multiple championships, including 11 with three-or-more. The last senior class without a league championship was the 1998 group.

This year's seniors will be the 20th-straight with at least one conference title.

CONFERENCE DOMINANCE: Over the past five years, Boise State has posted a regular-season record of 31-9 (.775) against its Mountain West counterparts. The winning percentage ranks tied for eighth nationally with Appalachian State. Only Ohio State (39-3; .929), Alabama (36-4; .900), Clemson (35-5; .875), Wisconsin (35-7; .833), Oklahoma (37-8; .822), Northern Illinois (32-8; .800) and Arkansas State (31-8; .795) have a better league record over the course of the last five years.

SERIES HISTORY

Boise State is 3-2 all-time against San Diego State, including a mark of 1-1 when playing at Albertsons Stadium.

The Broncos won last year's meeting in San Diego (31-14; Oct. 14), and also won the last home game played against SDSU. In 2014, the coldest game played in Boise State history (nine degrees at kickoff), the Broncos won 38-29, coming back from a 20-0 deficit.

TEAM NOTES...

NO PICKS THROUGH FOUR GAMES: For the first time in Boise State's FBS Era (1996-Present), the Broncos have not thrown an interception through the first four games of the season (160 attempts). There had been four previous seasons (2003, 2006, 2009, 2010) in which the Broncos had thrown just one pick through the opening four games, while in 2010, Boise State only had that one interception over the opening six games.

PROTECTING THE BALL: Through the first six weeks of the season, Boise State is one of five teams leading the country with just two turnovers lost. Both of the Bronco turnovers came via fumble, with one being a muffed punt, and, as noted above, Boise State quarterbacks have not thrown an interception over the first four games.

100 MINUTES OF DOMINANCE: While Boise State and San Diego State have met just twice since 2014, all but around 25 of the 120 minutes of game action in those meetings have been dominated by the Broncos.

In 2014, San Diego State jumped out to a 20-0 lead with 7:33 remaining in the second quarter at Albertsons Stadium, but in the 97:33 of game time since, Boise State has outscored the Aztecs, 69-23, including 38-9 the rest of the way in that 2014 meeting (a 38-29 Bronco win), and outgained them by a 688-479 margin. The Broncos have also limited the Aztecs' rushing attack to just 160 yards on 56 carries (2.9 yards per attempt) over that span.

WHO STEPS UP WITH THE BIG PLAY?: While Boise State will want to get its offense rolling more this year against the Aztecs than it did last season, what won't change is looking for a player who will make a game-changing play. In last year's meeting, two Broncos helped break the game open in the first quarter, as Avery Williams returned a punt 53 yards for a touchdown for the opening score, and nickel Kekaula Kaniho scooped up a Christian Chapman fumble and took it 34 yards to the house to give the Broncos a 14-0 lead less than 10 minutes into the game.

GAME NOTES

BRYAN HARSIN NOTES...

THE HARSIN ERA: The 2018 campaign marks Boise State's fifth under head coach Bryan Harsin, a former Bronco quarterback and assistant coach. Harsin, who is 45-13 over his Boise State tenure, has led the Broncos to three 10-win seasons and two Mountain West titles, most recently going 11-3 and capturing the conference crown in 2017. In his first season at the Bronco helm in 2014, Harsin guided the pro-gram to a 12-2 mark, which included the school's first outright Mountain West Championship since joining the league in 2011 and the school's third victory in the Fiesta Bowl.

HARSIN HITS 50 (WINS): Boise State football head coach Bryan Harsin has 52 wins through his first five-plus seasons as a head coach. Harsin has won 74 percent of his games (52-18; .743) at Arkansas State (2013) and Boise State (2014-present).

Harsin needs five more victories to give him 50 at Boise State, and his 45 victories with the Broncos are currently fifth-most for a head coach since Boise State became a four-year football playing institution in 1968. Only Chris Petersen (2006-13; 84), Tony Knap (1968-75; 71), Jim Criner (1976-82; 59) and Dan Hawkins (2001-05; 53) boast more wins as a head coach.

HEAD COACHES AT ALMA MATER: Bryan Harsin is one of only 22 head coaches in the country currently serving at his alma mater. Of the 22, five are in the Mountain West: Troy Calhoun (Air Force), Harsin, Nick Rolovich (Hawai'i), Jeff Tedford (Fresno State) and Matt Wells (Utah State).

DODD TROPHY WATCH LIST: Head Coach Bryan Harsin is the only head coach from the Mountain West - and from the Group of Five - on the Dodd Trophy's preseason watch list.

GAME NOTES

FIGHTING BACK INTO THE POLLS: Boise State rose one spot to No. 24 in the Amway Coaches Poll this week, but remained on the outside looking in in the Associated Press Poll, topping the “Receiving Votes” group.

Since joining the FBS in 1996, Boise State has returned to the AP Poll after being dropped in the same season four times. Previous returns to the poll in the same season came in 2007, 2012 (twice), and 2015.

In 2007, the Broncos were dropped from the poll following a 24-10 loss at Washington on Sept. 8, but returned at No. 21 ahead of a Nov. 3 matchup with San Jose State following a six-game winning streak.

In 2012, the Broncos returned to the AP Poll twice after being dropped. The 3-1 Broncos were dropped from No. 24 to unranked following a 32-29 win at New Mexico on Sept. 29, but spent just a week on the outside, returning at No. 24 following a 40-14 rout at Southern Mississippi. Boise State got as high as 19th in the poll before falling out once more following a 21-19 loss to San Diego State on Nov. 3, before returning at No. 24 following two wins ahead of a Dec. 1 matchup with Nevada.

In 2015, the Broncos went from No. 20 to unranked following a 35-24 loss at BYU on Sept. 12, but, following four-straight wins, returned at No. 25 for a week before dropping a 52-26 decision at Utah State on Oct. 16.

WIN NO. 200 SINCE 2000: Sept. 29’s victory at Wyoming was Boise State’s 200th since the start of the 2000 season, making the Broncos the co-winningest team in college football since 2000, with Oklahoma (also at 200). Ohio State is next at 198 wins since 2000.

SUCCESS IN CONFERENCE OPENERS: Saturday in Laramie, the Broncos improved to 8-for-8 in Mountain West openers since joining the conference in 2011. The game at Wyoming was also just the third time that the Broncos have opened Mountain West play on the road.

The Broncos’ previous Mountain West openers on the road came in 2011 (a 63-13 win at Colorado State) and 2012 (a 32-29 win at New Mexico).

CONFERENCE RECORD: Since 2000, Boise State is a national-best 125-16 (.887) in conference play. Since joining the FBS in 1996, the Broncos have played in three leagues: the Big West (1996-2000), WAC (2001-10) and Mountain West (2011-Present). Over the campaigns in those three conferences, the Broncos have posted an all-time record of 135-25 (.844). Boise State went 5-3 in Mountain West play in 2015, just the second time since 1998 - when Boise State went 2-3 in the Big West - that the Broncos lost three conference contests in a season. It was also just the fourth time since 2001 - Boise State’s first year in the WAC - that the Broncos lost multiple conference games (also went 6-2 in WAC play in 2001).

MW SUCCESS: Since joining the Mountain West for the 2011 season, Boise State has lost just 11 conference games, with only three of those 11 losses being by more than seven points. Outside of a 28-14 loss to Air Force (Sept. 27, 2014), a 52-26 loss at Utah State (Oct. 16, 2015), and a 28-17 loss at Fresno State (Nov. 25), the Broncos’ other eight Mountain West losses have come by a combined 30 points. Boise State’s four Mountain West losses from 2011-13 were by a combined seven points: TCU in 2011 (36-35); San Diego State in 2012 (21-19); Fresno State (41-40) and SDSU

GAME NOTES

(34-31, OT) in 2013. After last year's 44-19 victory over Air Force, which evened the all-time series with the Falcons at 3-3, no Mountain West team has a winning record against the Broncos.

DEFENDING THE CROWN: Boise State will aim to win back-to-back Mountain West titles for the first time in 2018. The Broncos last won consecutive conference titles with a WAC three-peat from 2008-10. Following its first two Mountain West titles (2012, 2014), the Broncos went 6-2 and 5-3 in conference play the following seasons (2013 and 2015, respectively).

SERVING UP A 50-BURGER: Boise State's 56 points Sept. 1 at Troy marked the first time it had put a 50-burger on an opponent in a season opener since beating Weber State, 56-7, in the 2007 lid-lifter. The last time that the Broncos had scored at least 50 in an opener against an FBS team was in a 65-7 win over Idaho (then in the Sun Belt) in 2004.

ACTUALLY, MAKE IT A 60-BURGER: Boise State topped (no pun intended) its 50-Burger at Troy by serving up a 60-Burger to UConn on Sept. 8, beating the Huskies, 62-7. It marked the first time since a 63-14 win at Wyoming on Nov. 22, 2014, that the Broncos had hit the 60-point mark.

It was also Boise State's first 60-point performance at home since beating Southern Mississippi, 60-7, on Sept. 28, 2013.

SEASON OPENERS WHEN RANKED: The 2018 campaign was the ninth in which Boise opened ranked in the Associated Press Poll (2005, 2007, 2009-13, 2015, 2018). After Sept. 1's 56-20 win at Troy, the Broncos are 6-3 over nine season openers while ranked, including a 3-3 mark in such contests away from Albertsons Stadium.

The win at Troy was the first for the Broncos in a true road opener while ranked. The previous three true road openers while the Broncos were ranked resulted in losses (2005 at Georgia, 2012 at Michigan State, 2013 at Washington), while the two victories prior to Saturday at Troy came on neutral fields (2010 vs. Virginia Tech in Landover, Md., and 2011 vs. Georgia in Atlanta).

BRONCO IMPROVE IN SEASON OPENERS: Boise State is 36-10 all-time in season openers after Sept. 1's win at Troy, including a mark of 11-7 when opening a season in its opponent's stadium. The Broncos' last season opener on the road also came against the Sun Belt, when the Broncos knocked off Louisiana (45-10), on Sept. 3, 2016.

BOISE STATE VOTED TO CAPTURE MOUNTAIN DIVISION (AGAIN): The preseason Mountain West predicted order of finish was released on July 24, and, voted to win the Mountain Division for the sixth-straight season was, you guessed it, Frank Stallone.

The announcement extended Boise State's run of being voted the preseason favorite to win the Mountain West (2011-12) or the Mountain Division (2013-present) every year since joining the conference ahead of the 2011 campaign. This preseason, the Broncos received all 22 first-place votes, top-ping the Mountain Division with 132 points. They were followed, in order, by Wyoming (92 points), Colorado State (82), Utah State (78), Air Force (52), and New Mexico (23).

GAME NOTES

On the other side of the conference, Fresno State topped the West Division poll, receiving 16 first-place votes for 126 points, followed by San Diego State with six first-place votes and 116 points. UNLV (78 points), Nevada (72), Hawai'i (45), and San Jose State (25) rounded out the poll.

RYPIEN, WILLIAMS HEADLINE PRESEASON ALL-MOUNTAIN WEST HONORS: Senior quarterback Brett Rypien (Offensive Player of the Year) and redshirt sophomore CB/KR/PR Avery Williams (Special Teams Player of the Year) were announced as two of the three Mountain West preseason award recipients at the start of the Mountain West Football Media Summit on July 24.

Rypien is the second Boise State player to ever be named the Mountain West's Preseason Offensive Player of the Year (Kellen Moore, 2011), while Williams is also the second to be named the conference's Preseason Special Teams Player of the Year (Mitch Burroughs, 2012). Together, they are the first Broncos to earn a preseason Mountain West individual honor since Burroughs' recognition.

EIGHT BRONCOS NAMED TO PRESEASON ALL-MOUNTAIN WEST TEAM: Boise State had a program-record eight players named to the Preseason All-Mountain West Team in July. The previous record for the program since joining the Mountain West was in its inaugural season in the conference (2011).

Quarterback Brett Rypien, running back Alexander Mattison, and offensive linemen Ezra Cleveland and John Molchon represented the Boise State offense, while the trio of cornerback Tyler Horton, defensive tackle David Moa, and STUD Curtis Weaver were voted to the defensive team. CB/KR/PR Avery Williams was voted the team's return specialist.

PLENTY OF BRONCOS ON PRESEASON WATCH LISTS: The summer months ahead of the college football season are dominated by #WatchListSZN, during which the array of postseason awards release their preseason candidates.

This preseason, the Broncos had 10 athletes named to 16 different award watch lists, led by quarterback Brett Rypien, who was named to six. Rypien was named a preseason candidate for national player of the year honors such as the Maxwell Award and Walter Camp Award, in addition to quarterback of the year awards as the Davey O'Brien Award, Unitas Golden Arm Award and the Manning Award, in addition to the Wuerffel Trophy.

Defensive stalwarts Tyler Horton and David Moa were named to three lists apiece, each landing on the Bronko Nagurski Trophy list. Horton, a senior cornerback, was also included on the lists for the Jim Thorpe Award and Bednarik Award, while Moa was a candidate for the Outland Trophy and the Polynesian Player of the Year award.

More Broncos named to award watch lists for 2018 included: tight end John Bates (Mackey Award), nose tackle Sonatane Lui (Polynesian Player of the Year), MLB Tyson Maeva (Polynesian Player of Year), running back Alexander Mattison (Doak Walker Award), safety Kekoa Nawahine (Jim Thorpe Award, Polynesian Player of the Year), STUD Curtis Weaver (Ted Hendricks Award), and CB/KR/PR Avery Williams (Paul Hornung Award).

BRONCOS IN THE NFL

There are currently 15 Broncos on National Football League rosters (as of Sept. 9), and 12 teams have at least one former member of the Boise State football team on their roster.

At least one Bronco has been selected in the NFL Draft in each of the last nine seasons, and 22 players have been drafted during that time - including eight in the first two rounds.

GAME NOTES

AMONG THE MOST 10-WIN SEASONS: This season, Boise State will seek its 16th 10-win campaign since joining Division I-A (now FBS) in 1996. The Broncos' current mark of 15 10-win seasons since 1996 ranks second in the country only to Ohio State, which has won 10 games 17 times over that span.

Last year's 11-3 campaign marked Boise State's third 10-win season in four years, a stretch which includes marks of 12-2 (2014) and 10-3 (2016). The Broncos had a run of seven-straight 10-win seasons from 2006-12, highlighted by undefeated campaigns in 2006 (13-0) and 2009 (14-0).

BOISE STATE'S BOWL STREAK AMONG BEST IN THE COUNTRY: Another streak of Boise State's that ranks among the best in the nation is its run of 16-straight bowl appearances. That streak, extended by last year's trip to the Las Vegas Bowl, is tops among "Group of Five" schools and is surpassed by only five "Power Five" schools. Florida State, Georgia, LSU, Oklahoma and Virginia Tech have each played in at least 17-straight bowl games entering 2018.

COACHING CHANGES: The Boise State coaching staff made three changes this past offseason, promoting a graduate assistant and adding two new faces. Spencer Danielson, who served as a defensive graduate assistant in 2017, was promoted to full-time assistant coach and will oversee Boise State's STUDs after the NCAA passed legislation allowing for a 10th full-time assistant position.

Chad Kauha'aha'a joined the Boise State staff as the defensive line coach after spending the past three seasons at Oregon State, including the past two as associate head coach. Kauha'aha'a, oversaw the defensive line for all three seasons at Oregon State, in addition to the outside linebackers from 2016-17.

The third addition to the Bronco staff was Jeff Popovich, who oversees the cornerbacks. Popovich, who has 12 seasons of experience in the collegiate coaching ranks, spent the last two seasons in the NFL with the Indianapolis Colts, serving as assistant to head coach Chuck Pagano, a former Boise State assistant coach (1987-88), in 2016, before moving to a defensive quality control position in 2017.

COORDINATOR CONTINUITY: Boise State enters the 2018 season with its three coordinators intact from a season ago, as Zak Hill (offense), Andy Avalos (defense), and Kent Riddle (special teams) form the triumvirate once again. Notably, with Hill entering his second season as offensive coordinator and Avalos his fourth in charge of the defense, Boise State will carry over the same offensive and defensive coordinators for a second-straight season for the first time since Robert Prince and Pete Kwiatkowski oversaw the Bronco offense and defense, respectively, from 2012-13.

Hill, who served as co-offensive coordinator with offensive line coach Scott Huff in 2016, took sole possession of the role in 2017 after Huff's departure to Washington.

AMONG THE GREATEST: Boise State boasts the fourth-best all-time winning percentage amongst the Football Bowl Subdivision. The Broncos' all-time record at the four-year level through Sept. 29 is 440-166-2 (.725). Notre Dame (911-324-42; .7298) is first on the all-time list, with Michigan

ESTABLISHING A LEGACY: The Broncos are the winningest football program in the country since 2000, with an overall record of 200-39 (.837). Ohio State (198-41; .828), Oklahoma (200-45; .816), LSU (180-56; .763) and Alabama (183-60; .753) round out the top five. For the complete top 15, see page four.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS: The Broncos were one of only five schools in the country to receive the NCAA's Public Recognition Award in football for ranking in the top-10 percent nationally in APR from 2010 through 2014. Joining the Broncos were Clemson, Duke, Northwestern and Rutgers. Additionally, center Mason Hampton was a two-time CoSIDA Academic All-American (2016-17) and a finalist for the William V. Campbell Trophy in 2017, given annually to the top football scholar-athlete in the country. Boise State also had 36 team members named to the Fall 2017 Academic All-Mountain West list, marking the seventh-straight year in which Boise State has led the MW in all-academic selections.

DEFENSE...

BUT FOR ONE PLAY: Boise State's defense was stout against Wyoming in the conference opener, but, as any coach will tell you, one play can make the difference. The Broncos, after holding Wyoming to minus-15 rushing yards in the first half, only ended up yielding 81 to the Cowboys on the ground for the game, but it was one play, a 75-yard scoring run by Nico Evans on the first play from scrimmage of the second half, that turned what would've been a dominant line into an average one.

Outside of that 75-yard burst, Wyoming managed just six yards on its remaining 23 carries of the contest.

AMONG THE NATION'S TOP DEFENSES: Through the opening month of the season, Boise State ranks 26th in the country and second in the Mountain West in total defense, yielding just 322.3 yards per game. Sept. 29's win at Wyoming also marked the second time in four games this year that the Broncos have held an opponent to under 300 yards of total offense, as the Cowboys managed just 295. The first such occasion came Sept. 8, as Connecticut totaled just 193 yards of offense.

WALKER RETURNS TO THE THRONE: Boise State's Turnover Throne burst onto the national scene as the Broncos forced four turnovers in the season opener at Troy, and the throne got some love Sept. 29 at Wyoming, as Jalen Walker made his second appearance after recovering a muffed snap on a Cowboy punt attempt in the first half. It was Walker's second fumble recovery of the season, as he fell on his first one in the season opener at Troy (Sept. 1). The total is tied for third nationally, along with fellow cornerback Tyler Horton.

PIERCE ON THE PROWL: Junior safety DeAndre Pierce, a season after breaking out with 83 tackles and being named All-Mountain West Honorable Mention, continues to spark the Bronco defense, leading the team in tackles (23) this year and recording his first-career sack Sept. 29 at Wyoming.

GAME NOTES

Pierce, the son of former NFL standout and current Arizona State assistant coach Antonio Pierce, opens his junior season with 12 tackles in Sept. 1's win at Troy, and picked up five more at Wyoming, including a sack in which he came in untouched on a blitz from the secondary.

SACK ATTACK: Boise State matched its season-high with five sacks in the win at Wyoming, as Jabril Frazier, Chase Hatada, Tyson Maeva, DeAndre Pierce and Curtis Weaver all brought down Cowboy quarterback Tyler Vander Waal.

Through the opening month of the season, the Broncos rank ninth in the FBS and lead the Mountain West with 3.50 sacks per game (14 total). Frazier and Durrant Miles lead the Bronco defense at 3.0 sacks apiece.

BOUNCING BACK AFTER GIVING UP 40: Boise State, which has only given up 40 points to a team in regulation five times in the Bryan Harsin Era (2014-present), and six times overall (including a 47-44 triple-overtime loss at Washington State in 2017), continued its trend of bouncing back defensively with Sept. 29's 34-14 win at Wyoming.

After Sept. 15's 44-21 loss at Oklahoma State, Boise State held Wyoming to just 14 points, the fourth-straight time that the Bronco defense had yielded less than 20 points in the game following an opponent scoring 40. The Broncos are also now 6-0 in the game after an opponent has hit 40.

FRAZIER HEATS UP: After going without a sack over the first two games of the season, redshirt senior STUD Jabril Frazier has heated up, racking up 3.0 sacks and 4.0 tackles-for-loss over Boise State's last two contests. The 3.0 sacks through four games already has Frazier halfway to his 2017 total of 6.0, and he's only 2.5 TFL away from his total of 6.5 from a year ago.

HORTON EARNS CONFERENCE, NATIONAL RECOGNITION: Senior cornerback Tyler Horton was rightly heralded following his outstanding defensive performance in Sept. 1's 56-20 victory at Troy. After de-flecting a pass that led to a Bronco interception, and returning two fumbles for touchdowns, Horton was named the Mountain West Defensive Player of the Week for the second time in his career on Sept. 3, as well as being named the Bronko Nagurski National Defensive Player of the Week on Sept. 4.

HORTON BRINGS THE CHAOS: Horton reigned as the supreme King of Chaos in Sept. 1's victory at Troy, not only returning a pair of fumbles for touchdowns but also creating the Broncos' first takeaway by deflecting a screen pass that ended up picked off by linebacker Tony Lashley.

Horton, a preseason candidate for the Bednarik Award, Bronko Nagurski Trophy and Jim Thorpe Award in 2018, became one of just five players all-time in FBS history to record two fumble returns for touchdowns in a single contest at Troy. His first score came in the third quarter, as he plucked a loose ball caused by Kekoa Nawahine and winded his way 55 yards to the house, while his second came on an 11-yard return in the fourth quarter.

For his career, Horton now has four defensive touchdowns, as his first came on an 85-yard pick-six against Washington State on Sept. 10, 2016, and the second on a 21-yard fumble return against Air Force on Nov. 18, 2017.

KINGS OF CHAOS

GAME NOTES

PLENTY RETURNING ON DEFENSE: Boise State returns 10 starters and plenty in reserve on a defense which ranked 22nd in the country last season allowing just 332.6 yards per game.

A key loss from the defense from a year ago was redshirt junior linebacker Leighton Vander Esch, the team's leading tackler (141) and the 2017 Mountain West Defensive Player of the Year. Vander Esch, who led or shared the team lead with four forced fumbles and three interceptions, chose to forego his final season of eligibility in 2018 and entered the NFL Draft, where he was selected 19th overall by the Dallas Cowboys.

Returning the The Blue, however, are 10 starters which includes 2017 All-Mountain West selections STUD Jabril Frazier (33 tackles, 6.0 sacks, 6.5 tackles-for-loss in 2017), defensive tackle David Moe (21 tackles, 2.0 sacks) and defensive end Durrant Miles (33 tackles, 2.0 sacks, 6.0 TFL) up front.

Adding depth up front is STUD Curtis Weaver (33 tackles, 11.0 sacks, 13.0 TFL), who was named to the All-Mountain West First Team and to the Freshman All-America Teams of USA TODAY and the FWAA.

First-team All-Mountain West pick Tyler Horton (two interceptions, two fumble recoveries, 11 pass breakups) teams up with Avery Williams (two interceptions, eight pass breakups) at the corners, while safeties and All-Mountain West picks Kekoa Nawahine (108 tackles, 4.5 TFL, three interceptions) and DeAndre Pierce (83 tackles, 4.0 TFL, one interception) man a young and talented secondary which also features sophomore nickel Kekaula Kaniho (6.5 TFL, two defensive touchdowns).

At linebacker, 2017 All-Mountain West Honorable Mention Tyson Maeva (84 tackles, 2.5 TFL) will anchor the group.

VANDER ESCH GOES FROM BRONCO TO COWBOY: Redshirt junior linebacker Leighton Vander Esch capped one of the greatest seasons by a Boise State player by entering the 2018 NFL Draft and being selected 19th overall by the Dallas Cowboys. With that selection, Vander Esch became the fifth Bronco all-time to be selected in the first round of the draft, joining Ryan Clady (Denver Broncos, 2008), Kyle Wilson (New York Jets, 2010), Doug Martin (Tampa Bay Buccaneers, 2012) and Shea McClellin (Chicago Bears, 2012). At No. 19, Vander Esch matched McClellin for the second-highest a Boise State player has been drafted, seven spots behind Clady, who was taken 12th.

Vander Esch finished the 2017 college season with a team-high 141 tackles, also leading or sharing the team lead in interceptions (three) and forced fumbles (four). He was voted the Mountain West Defensive Player of the Year and was named Defensive MVP of the Mountain West Championship Game as he tied a career high with 16 tackles, and made the game-sealing interception, in Boise State's 17-14 win over No. 25 Fresno State.

The Riggins, Idaho, native finished the season ranked 14th in the country with 10.1 tackles per game, and fifth in the country with 6.5 solo tackles per game.

HORTON'S GOT IT COVERED: Senior cornerback Tyler Horton is ready for a big final season with the Broncos, coming off of a 2017 campaign in which he was named to the All-Mountain West First Team ahead of being voted to the 2018 Preseason All-Mountain West Team.

GAME NOTES

Last year, Horton picked off two passes, and recovered two fumbles, one of which he returned 21 yards for a touchdown against Air Force (Nov. 18). The Fresno, Calif., native also led the Broncos with 11 passes defensed, which also tied for fourth in the Mountain West.

This preseason, Horton's name has gained some steam with national awards, as he has been named to the watch lists for the Bednarik Award, Bronko Nagurski Trophy, and the Jim Thorpe Award, the latter of which is given annually to the nation's top defensive back.

RAPTORS ALWAYS HUNT IN PAIRS: After Boise State's victory over Wyoming last Oct. 21, head coach Bryan Harsin referred to STUDs Jabril Frazier and Curtis Weaver as the defense's "velociraptors," in that opposing defenses couldn't key in on defending one without the other breaking through from a different angle. That nickname proved true as the pair combined for 17.0 sacks, with Weaver (11.0) ranking 13th in the country and leading the Mountain West, and Frazier (6.0) ranking fifth in the conference.

Ahead of 2018, each Bronco was named to Athlon Sports' Preseason All-Mountain West Team, while Weaver was named to the Watch List for the Ted Hendricks Award, and Frazier to the Reese's Senior Bowl Watch List.

Last season, STUD Curtis Weaver became the first freshman in Mountain West history to be named to the conference's defensive first team. In addition to his sack totals, he scored a defensive touchdown, a 55-yard fumble return at Washington State (Sept. 9), and against Nevada made his first-career interception.

Frazier, meanwhile, bounced back very well from an injury-plagued late 2016 and offseason of rehabilitation, ranking second on the team in sacks (6.0), tackles-for-loss (6.5) and forced fumbles (two) in 2017.

One unique way in which Frazier's superb play boosted the Bronco defense is through his "assists," as each of his forced fumbles, coming on strip sacks at Washington State (Sept. 9) and against Air Force (Nov. 18), resulted in a Bronco scoop-and-score touchdown, as Curtis Weaver and Tyler Horton respectively converted.

WILLIAMS LOOKS TO FOLLOW BREAKOUT FIRST SEASON: Redshirt sophomore cornerback Avery Williams will aim to improve this season upon his eye-opening first year of action, in which he electrified the Boise State faithful with his play on defense and special teams.

Williams was named to the All-Mountain West Second Team as a return man, after leading the conference in punt return average (11.2 ypr) and punt-return touchdowns (two), and ahead of the 2018 season was named the loop's Special Teams Player of the Year. On his first-career touch last Sept. 2 against Troy, Williams returned a punt 81 yards for a touchdown, and followed with a 53-yard touch-down return Oct. 14 at San Diego State.

On defense, Williams broke into the starting lineup at cornerback on Oct. 6 at BYU, and went on to finish the season with two interceptions, 45 tackles, and eight passes defensed.

LYLE SMITH



Lyle Smith, the "Father of Boise State Football," head football coach from 1947-67 and Boise State Athletics Director from 1967-81, passed away the morning of July 26, 2017, at the age of 101.

Smith came to Boise Junior College in 1946 as basketball coach and assistant football coach. In 1947, he became head coach of the BJC football program and didn't lose a game until his fourth season.

His 1958 team won the National Junior College championship.

Smith retired from coaching after the 1967 season. In his 20 years as the head football coach at BJC; he compiled a 156-25-6 record, a winning percentage of .842.

Smith continued to lead Boise State as AD until his retirement after the 1980-81 academic year. Smith guided Boise State's transition from a junior college power to a highly-successful NCAA Division I athletic program.

In his honor, a statue was erected at the southwest corner of Albertsons Stadium. He was present for its unveiling prior to the 2016 season.

GAME NOTES

The multi-threat Bronco was also recognized nationally this preseason by being named a candidate for the Paul Hornung Award, given annually to college football's most versatile player.

BRINGING THE BOOM FROM DEEP: Adding power to the Bronco secondary are the starting safeties, juniors Kekoa Nawahine and DeAndre Pierce. Last season, the pair combined for 191 tackles, 8.5 tack-les-for-loss, and four interceptions, with Nawahine being named to the All-Mountain West Second Team, and Pierce All-Mountain West Honorable Mention.

Nawahine showed a nose for the ball with three picks, which he returned for a combined 64 yards, and a fumble recovery for 14 yards, while Pierce had a 46-yard interception return of his own.

READY TO CREATE MORE TURNOVERS: Last year, Boise State's defense forced 26 turnovers, a stark contrast to its 2016 total of nine, which was a program-record low. In 2017, it took just five games for the Broncos to exceed that number, and the team went on to force multiple turnovers in nine of 14 games.

THE MOA CONSTRICTOR: Redshirt senior defensive tackle David Moa, nicknamed "The Moa Constrictor," returns to The Blue for his final season after being named to the All-Mountain West Second Team last year.

Moa, who finished the season with 21 tackles, 2.0 sacks, and 3.5 tackles-for-loss despite heavy double-teams, was key in occupying multiple blockers which allowed Bronco STUDs and defensive ends to flourish, as Curtis Weaver, Jabril Frazier, and Durrant Miles combined for 19.0 sacks.

This summer, Moa was named a candidate for the Bronko Nagurski Award, Outland Trophy, and the Polynesian College Football Player of the Year each for the third consecutive campaign. It is the second-straight year in which he has been named a candidate for the Bronko Nagurski Award, Outland Trophy, and Polynesian Player of the Year award.

PLENTY OF DEPTH TO CONTRIBUTE: Boise State also brings back a good amount of talent in its reserves from a year ago and this season's newcomers. Junior nose tackle Sonatane Lui (18 tackles, 2.5 TFL, two fumble recoveries in 2017), junior defensive end Chase Hatada (12 tackles, 1.0 sack, 2.5 TFL), and STUD Sam Whitney (21 tackles, 1.0 sack, 1.5 TFL) are tabbed to contribute yet again in 2018, while being joined up front by freshmen Scale Igiehon at nose tackle.

Linebackers Desmond Williams (30 tackles, 2.0 sacks, 3.0 TFL, one forced fumble) and Riley Whimpey (17 tackles, 1.0 TFL) return after productive first seasons of action in 2017, while in the secondary, redshirt sophomore Jalen Walker will provide depth after making his first-career start in last year's Las Vegas Bowl, along with safety Jordan Happle, who made 15 tackles last season and picked off a pass at the Las Vegas Bowl.

OFFENSE...

RYPIEN EXTENDS RECORD: Rypien recorded his 18th-career 300-yard passing game at Wyoming, going for 342 yards on 28-for-42 passing. The Bronco signal-caller made Boise State history Sept. 15 at Oklahoma State with his 380-yard passing performance, as it was the 17th 300-yard

The performance at Wyoming was also Rypien's fifth-straight 300-yard passing performance, a Bronco record. The streak dates back to last year's Las Vegas Bowl against Oregon, while he's also become the first Bronco quarterback to begin a campaign with four 300-yard performances.

FASTEST TO 1,000: Brett Rypien hit another program milestone in Sept. 15's loss at Oklahoma State, as his 380 passing yards brought his season total to 1,047 and made him the fastest Boise State quarterback to hit the 1,000-yard mark in a season.

The previous fastest quarterback to 1,000 yards was Kellen Moore in 2011. Moore, who had 995 passing yards through the first three games that season, hit the 1,000-yard mark with his first pass of the fourth game of the season, a 15-yard toss to Tyler Shoemaker.

NO INTS FOUR GAMES IN: Boise State quarterbacks have not thrown an interception through the first four games of this season, setting the best such start in the program's FBS Era (1996-present).

The Broncos had gone the opening three games of a season without throwing an interception two previous times since joining FBS in 1996 (2003, 2006), while in 2009 and 2010, Bronco quarterbacks had only thrown one pick through the first four games.

HELPING THE DEFENSE: The Bronco offense has helped the defense in a key way through the first four games this season: by protecting the ball. While the offense has only been responsible for one turnover (a Brett Rypien fumble late at Oklahoma State), with the other being a muffed punt at Troy, the lack of giveaways has prevented Bronco opponents from starting drives with good field position.

Through the opening four games, only one opposing drive has begun in Bronco territory, and that was an Oklahoma State drive that opened on the Bronco 7 after a blocked punt. In each of the four games, here is the average starting field position for the Boise State opponent: Troy (own 29), Connecticut (own 23), Oklahoma State (own 32), Wyoming (own 24).

MATTISON SHOWS OFF HIS HOPS (AGAIN): Junior running back Alexander Mattison showed off his athleticism a few times last year as he hurdled defenders in multiple games. He pulled the feat once again at Wyoming, hurdling a would-be tackler then plowing ahead into the end zone for a 13-yard touchdown to open the game's scoring.

The highlight-reel run featured in Mattison's 57-yard game, and for the season he leads a stable of Bronco backs with 281 rushing yards and four touchdowns.

HIGHLIGHT-REEL CATCHES: This season has been one for highlight-reel catches already for Boise State receivers. Sept. 15 at Oklahoma State, wide receivers John Hightower and A.J. Richardson made a couple of highlight-reel scoring grabs, as Hightower laid out to haul in a 31-yard touchdown pass down the sideline, putting the Broncos up 7-0 on the Cowboys. In the third quarter, Richardson, running the same route along the sideline, reached up and made a spectacular one-handed catch, gathering the ball

GAME NOTES

in then walking the tightrope along the sideline over the final five-to-seven yards for the score, helping the Broncos cut the Cowboy lead to 20-14.

Sept. 29 at Wyoming, the two struck again. First, it was Richardson catching a 21-yard touchdown pass in the second quarter between two defenders and holding on despite taking a hard hit. Later in the quarter, Hightower, despite losing a shoe on the play, made a falling-down, one-handed catch along the sideline for 31 yards to the 1.

RECEIVER ROULETTE: Boise State's receiver corps has resoundingly answered its preseason skeptics, if the first three games of this season are any indication. One major question mark hovering over the group was who would step into the role left by Cedrick Wilson, who caught 83 passes for a program single-season record 1,511 yards and seven touchdowns last season?

Through four games, five Bronco receivers have hauled in at least 10 passes, with redshirt senior Sean Modster leading the way with team highs of 24 receptions, 385 yards and two touchdowns. Five receivers have caught at least one touchdown, with A.J. Richardson (18 catches for 313 yards) and John Hightower (14 catches for 257 yards) leading the way at three apiece, and Modster and Akilian Butler (12 catches for 101 yards) each hauling in two. Sophomore CT Thomas has one touchdown grab among his 14 catches.

Additionally, Modster, Hightower and Richardson have each posted a 100-yard receiving game already this season, with Richardson leading the team at two. Modster posted career highs in catches (seven), receiving yards (167), and touchdowns (two) in the season opener at Troy, while Hightower went for 119 yards and a touchdown on five catches, while also rushing for a 55-yard score Sept. 8 against Connecticut. Richardson, on the strength of his 74-yard touchdown catch, finished the Connecticut game with exactly 100 receiving yards on three catches, and racked up 113 yards and a score on six catches at Wyoming (Sept. 29).

The receivers have also demonstrated the ability to break off big plays, as Richardson (74 yards), Hightower (67), Modster (54), and Thomas (53) each have at least one catch of over 50 yards.

GETTING THE TIGHT ENDS GOING: Just as the receivers have helped fuel the offense, the Bronco tight ends have begun getting into the flow of things. Redshirt sophomore John Bates, a preseason John Mackey Award candidate, has made five catches this season, including a 24-yard touchdown reception Sept. 8 against Connecticut. Redshirt senior Chase Blakley, meanwhile, made a career high six receptions for 30 yards Sept. 15 at Oklahoma State, including his first-career scoring grab.

Against the Cowboys, Bates and Blakely combined for 10 catches for 79 yards and a score, with Bates hauling in four passes for 49 yards to complement Blakely's career day.

A HISTORIC NIGHT FOR OFFENSE: Boise State's 818 yards of total offense Sept. 8 against UConn not only set the program's single-game record, it blew away the previous best of 742 yards set in 2011 against Colorado State.

GAME NOTES

The Broncos racked up 514 yards of offense by halftime, and even tied the single-game Mountain West record of 822 yards with just over a minute left in the contest before taking a knee twice to drop down to 818 yards at the final gun.

Boise State's output included 400 rushing yards, the sixth-highest single-game total in program history, as well as a per-carry rushing average of 8.88 yards, the program's fourth-highest single-game mark.

PLENTY OF OPTIONS IN THE GROUND GAME: The Broncos showed off plenty of depth and talent in the run game against UConn, as the team rushed for 400 yards, the sixth-highest single-game total in program history.

Junior Alexander Mattison led the way with his sixth-career 100-yard rushing performance, carrying 11 times for 115 yards and two touchdowns. Freshman Andrew Van Buren saw his first extended action of the season, gaining 75 yards on 13 carries and scoring his first-career touchdown.

The team rushing performance was supplemented by receiver John Hightower's 55-yard touchdown run, backup quarterback Chase Cord's 41 yards over two carries, and 35 yards over seven carries from safety-turned-running back Skyler Seibold.

A GLIMPSE INTO THE FUTURE: While Bronco fans have been spoiled by four seasons of Brett Rypien's excellence, they can't be blamed for getting excited for the future as redshirt freshman quarterback Chase Cord has impressed in two cameo appearances.

Late in Sept. 1's win at Troy, Cord made his Boise State debut, and what a debut it was. On just his second snap, Cord ran the read option, kept it himself, found daylight and sped 44 yards for the Broncos' final touchdown of the night. Cord's 44-yard run was the longest by a Bronco quarterback since Grant Hedrick broke off a 49-yard carry against Nevada on Oct. 19, while Cord's run was the longest scoring run by a Bronco signal-caller since Hedrick's 50-yard touchdown dash on Sept. 8, 2013 against UT Martin.

Sept. 8 against UConn, Cord saw extended time after Rypien punched out following the opening drive of the second half. Over his nearly two quarters of work, Cord completed 4-of-5 passes for 56 yards and a touchdown, and ran for 41 yards over two carries.

This season, Cord has rushed six times for 103 yards and a score, and is 5-for-6 passing for 59 yards and a touchdown.

MATTISON GOING FOR BACK-TO-BACK 1,000-YARD CAMPAIGNS:

Junior running back Alexander Mattison aims to become the sixth Bronco running back since 2001 to record back-to-back 1,000-yard seasons. With a 1,000-yard season in 2018, he would join the list that features Brock Forsey (2001-02), Ian Johnson (2006-07), Doug Martin (2010-11), Jay Ajayi (2013-14), and Jeremy McNichols (2015-16).

Through four games in 2018, Mattison leads the Broncos with 281 rushing yards and four touchdowns, averaging 4.8 yards per carry.

Last year, Mattison, despite various nagging injuries, rushed for 1,086 yards and 12 touchdowns and averaged 5.1 yards a carry, being named

All-Mountain West Honorable Mention. His season was highlighted by a career-best 242 rushing yards and three touchdowns, including a 70-yard scoring run, in Boise State's 59-52 overtime win at Colorado State on Nov. 11.

He also made his mark in the passing game, catching 28 passes for 284 yards and a score.

This year, Mattison was named to the Preseason All-Mountain West Team in addition to the preseason watch list for the Doak Walker Award, given annually to college football's top running back.

1,000-YARD RUSHERS: It was well established last season that when Alexander Mattison eclipsed 1,000 yards rushing that Boise State had extended its streak of consecutive seasons with such a performance to nine, tied with Auburn for the longest in the nation. However, per research done by Louisiana Tech, it was discovered that this streak is tied for the sixth-longest in the history of college football. North Carolina (12; 1973-84), Texas (11; 1995-2005), Wisconsin (10; 1993-2002 and 2005-14) and USC (10; 1972-81) are the only schools that have put together longer streaks than the Broncos' current one.

STEADY STABLE BEHIND MATTISON: Alexander Mattison will have a cadre of backs behind him ready to share the load on the ground, including one new face and another moving over from the defensive side.

Redshirt sophomore Robert Mahone returns after running for 115 yards and a touchdown in 2017, and he's joined by redshirt senior Skyler Seibold, who moves to the offense after spending the previous four seasons as a defensive back and special teams ace. Joining this crew will be freshman Andrew Van Buren, a West Hills, Calif., native and prep standout at Chaminade Prep.

A WELL-EARNED CATCH FOR COLLINGHAM: Redshirt junior tight end Garrett Collingham made the first catch of his career Sept. 1 at Troy, an 11-yard grab that converted a third down for the Broncos. While it may be just one catch, it represented quite the journey for Collingham, a local prep standout at Boise's Rocky Mountain High School, as he began his career with the Broncos as a quarterback before moving to punter, then to wide receiver, then to linebacker and special teams in 2017.

Collingham saw game action on special teams last year, making two tackles, before moving to tight end to begin 2018.

NEW FACES ON THE TIGHT END FRONT: With the graduations of Jake Roh and Alec Dhaenens in 2017, the Broncos started 2018 with some fresh faces in the mix at tight end.

Redshirt junior Chase Blakley, who suffered a season-ending injury early last season at Washington State (Sept. 9), will return to lead the group, alongside 2018 John Mackey Award preseason candidate John Bates, who made three catches in his first season of action a year ago. The group will be joined by another Bronco switching from defense to offense, as Garrett Collingham moves over to tight end from his previous spot at linebacker. Key run-blocker Matt Pistone will also add to Boise State's big packages and help clear the way for the Bronco backs.

GAME NOTES

SHUTOUT STREAK: Boise State has not been shut out in 257 consecutive games, the ninth-longest active streak in the country and the 15th-longest streak in NCAA history. The last shutout came on the road against No. 15 Washington State, Sept. 27, 1997 (58-0). The loss to the Cougars is one of only two shutouts the Broncos have suffered since becoming a four-year institution in 1968.

SPECIAL TEAMS...

BLOCK THAT PUNT!: A game after surrendering two blocked punts, Boise State's special teams turned things around at Wyoming by blocking a punt, and forcing a muffed snap on a second.

Jalen Walker's pressure helped cause a muffed snap in the first quarter, as Wyoming punter Tim Zaleski dropped the ball as he prepared to punt. Walker ended up recovering the fumble to set up the Broncos at the Cowboy 24. In the second quarter, John Hightower broke through and blocked Zaleski's punt, which was recovered just past the line of scrimmage by Skyler Seibold at the Cowboy 43. That play set up a Haden Hoggarth field goal that put the Broncos up 24-0.

HOGGARTH THE PAT SPECIALIST: Redshirt senior kicker Haden Hoggarth, a transfer from Bethune Cookman, was named All-Mountain West Honorable Mention for his solid debut campaign with Boise State in 2017, knocking down 18-of-23 field goal attempts and going a perfect 57-of-57 on PATs.

Over the first four games of this season, Hoggarth has kicked 23 PATs, with eight in each of the team's first two contests. He is also 4-for-7 on field-goal attempts, including a career-long 44-yarder in Sept. 8's win over UConn.

THE TWO-PUNTER (!) SYSTEM: Boise State utilized a two-punter system in 2017, with Quinn Skillin, a transfer from Wagner, and Joel Velazquez sharing the duties.

Skillin had a fine game at Wyoming, averaging 43.2 yards over four punts with a long of 55, and for the season is averaging 39.0 yards a punt. Velazquez has punted twice, averaging 35.0 yards.

QB BRETT RYPIEN

#RYPITGOOD: Rypien is off to a phenomenal start to his senior season in 2018, ranking in the national top 15 in completions per game (27.0, third), passing yards per game (347.3, fourth), completion percentage (70.1, 11th), passing yards (1,389, 13th), passing touchdowns (12, 14th), and passing efficiency (171.6, 14th).

With 12 touchdown passes, he is also one of two passers in the country with at least 12 against zero interceptions. Alabama's Tua Tagovailoa, with a 14-0 touchdown-to-interception ratio, is the other.

Rypien is currently the FBS' active career leader in passing yardage at 11,265, and is just 1,426 yards shy of becoming the Mountain West's all-time leader (San Diego State's Ryan Lindley is the all-time leader at 12,690). With his performance Sept. 1 at Troy, Rypien eclipsed the 10,000 career passing yards mark, becoming just the second Boise State quarterback (along with Kellen Moore) and fifth Mountain West quarterback to do so.

Sept. 29 at Wyoming, Rypien passed BYU's John Beck (2003-06) into third place on the Mountain West's all-time passing yards list, and, with his 18th-career 300-yard passing performance, passed Beck for second all-time in Mountain West history. He is just two back of the benchmark of 20 set by BYU's Max Hall (2007-09).

MOVING UP IN THE RECORD BOOKS:

Rypien has continued his march up the Boise State record books, surpassing Kellen Moore (2008-11)'s record of 16-career 300-yard passing games on Sept. 15 (Rypien is now at 18), and sitting second all-time at in passing yards, completions, and attempts. Sept. 1 at Troy, Rypien passed Tony Hilde (1993-96) into second place in career attempts, currently sitting at 1,325, while remaining in second in passing yards (11,265) and completions (843). He trails Moore in all three categories.

HIGH POWERED ATTACK:

In Brett Rypien's 40 starts, Boise State has scored 1,455 points, an average of 36.4 per game. The statistics ranks fifth nationally amongst quarterbacks, behind Oregon's Justin Herbert (42.3), Penn State's Trace McSorley (40.9), UCF's McKenzie Milton (40.6) and West Virginia's Will Grier (38.2).

ALBERTSONS STADIUM / THE BLUE



Albertsons Stadium - and Lyle Smith Field - is the home of Boise State football and the annual Famous Idaho Potato Bowl.

Smith, who passed away in July of 2017 at the age of 101, is the undisputed father of Bronco football, who from 1946-67 built one of the top junior college programs in the country. When he retired from his head coaching position to become the athletic director, Smith had a record of 156-25-6 (.850).

Completed during the summer of 1970 at a cost of \$2.2 million, what was originally known as Bronco Stadium had a seating capacity of 14,500. Since that time the stadium has expanded four times to its current capacity of 36,387.

Boise State established a first in 1986 by installing the first blue AstroTurf in the country. The second blue AstroTurf field was installed in 1995, with the third going in prior to the 2002 season. The first Blue FieldTurf surface was installed in 2008. A second Blue FieldTurf field was installed prior to the 2010 season, making a total of five different blue fields at the stadium.

Boise State's was the first collegiate stadium to have the entire field produced in a special color.

Since 1986, Boise State is a combined 178-37 on The Blue, a winning percentage of .828. And since 2000, Boise State has gone 109-7 at home (.940), the highest winning percentage in the country during that time.

Overall, since the construction of Albertsons Stadium in 1970, Boise State is 261-54 (.829), the highest winning percentage of any stadium in the country built before 1980.

UNIFORMS



Boise State unveiled a new look for the 2017 season, the first time the Broncos had overhauled their Nike uniforms since 2011.

Included in the new slate are blue, orange and white, and the jerseys feature new stripes on the sleeves and “Blue Collar” on the inside of the neck.

The uniforms are from the Nike Vapor Untouchable line, with stretch woven material, a seamless front and shoulders and laser perforation fabric instead of mesh. The uniforms combine materials and science designed for speed and comfort for the players, based on four core principles – fit, durability, weight and core body temperature.

Bryan Harsin, a former Boise State quarterback, assistant coach and offensive coordinator, is entering his fifth season as the head coach at his alma mater. Harsin boasts a record of 42-12 at Boise State, an average of more than 10 wins per season. Overall, he is 49-17 as a head coach – including one season at Arkansas State – and has led his programs to bowl games in each season as a head coach.

In his debut season Harsin led his alma mater back to where it rose to national prominence. Boise State went 12-2 in 2014, winning its first outright Mountain West Championship and capping the campaign with a 38-30 victory over Arizona in the 2014 VIZIO Fiesta Bowl.

The victory in the Fiesta Bowl was the third such win for the Broncos in the previous nine seasons. Harsin, serving as offensive coordinator in the first two Fiesta Bowl victories, has been a part of each of the school's three appearances in the game.

The team's victory in the 2014 Sports Authority Mountain West Football Championship marked Boise State's first outright league title since joining the conference in 2011, and the first overall since 2009. The only alumnus to lead the Broncos as head coach in the history of Boise State, Harsin has now won a conference championship as a student-athlete, assistant coach and head coach.

Boise State captured another MW title in 2017, Harsin's second in four seasons, capping the championship year with a 38-28 victory over Oregon in the Las Vegas Bowl. The Broncos concluded the year at 11-3 overall and ranked No. 22 in both the Associated Press and Coaches Polls.

The Broncos have been ranked in the top 25 in each of Harsin's four seasons, climbing as high as No. 13 in each poll in 2016, Boise State's highest ranking since finishing eighth and sixth in the AP and Coaches Polls, respectively, in 2011.

In 2015, the Broncos went 9-4, climbing as high as No. 20 in both the AP and Coaches Polls. Boise State capped the 2015 campaign with a 55-7 victory over Northern Illinois in the San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl, the fifth-largest margin of victory in the history of bowl games. In 2016, Harsin guided the Broncos to a 10-3 record and an appearance in the Motel 6 Cactus Bowl.

The Broncos' four-consecutive bowl appearances under Harsin runs the school's streak to 16, tied for the nation's sixth-longest streak.

For his efforts in 2014, Harsin was named a finalist for the Paul "Bear Bryant" National Coach of the Year Award, the Eddie Robinson National Coach of the Year Award and the Dodd Trophy, given annually by the Bobby Dodd National Coach of the Year Foundation. He was also named the nation's top first-year head coach by the Football Writers Association of America. Harsin was a candidate for the Dodd Trophy in each of his first three seasons at Boise State, and in 2016 Harsin was once again named to the watch list for the Bryant Award.

Harsin was named head coach, Dec. 11, 2013. A graduate of Capital High School in Boise, he played quarterback for the Broncos from 1995-99. Following his graduation from Boise State with a degree in business management, Harsin coached running backs and receivers at Eastern Oregon in 2000.

The former Bronco letterwinner began his coaching career at Boise State as a graduate assistant in 2001, before taking over the tight ends as a full-time assistant coach from 2002-05. When Chris Petersen was hired as head coach in 2006, Harsin assumed the role of offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. Harsin was Petersen's offensive coordinator for five of his eight seasons as head coach (2006-10), and was named a finalist for the 2009 Broyles Award, awarded annually to the nation's top assistant coach. Boise State went 61-5 during his tenure as offensive coordinator.

With Harsin on staff, Boise State has won 10 conference championships.

Harsin and his wife Kes have two daughters, Devyn Lynn and Dayn Mykena, and a son, Davis.

Including the 2018 season, the Boise State coaching staff boasts a combined 108 years of previous experience - more than a century - with the Broncos, including 40 years in the program as student-athletes and 68 years as assistants.

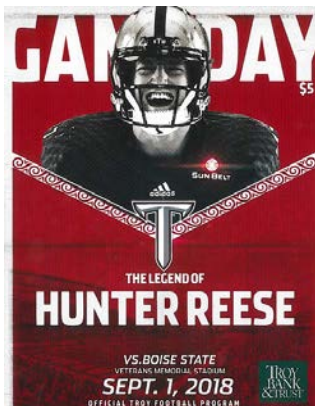

Justice Hill ran for 123 yards and a touchdown, and Tylan Wallace had five catches for 105 yards for the Cowboys (3-0). Boise State's Brett Rypien passed for 380 yards and three touchdowns, but was sacked seven times and pressured throughout the day. Jordan Brailford had three sacks, Jarrell Owens had two and Devin Harper had 1.5. Oklahoma State held the Broncos (2-1) to 34 yards rushing on 31 attempts.

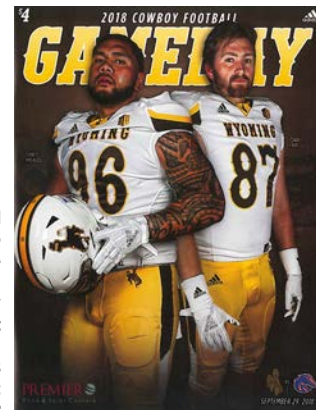
