AZTEC GOLF

The 2004-05 season marked the seventh consecutive appearance for the Aztecs in the NCAA regionals and their second appearance in the NCAA championships in the past three years. There is an air of excitement surrounding the 2005-06 campaign, as the Aztecs are looking to validate their NCAA appearance and national recognition once more.

"Going to nationals really changes the coaching style, team expectations and what you believe your players should be putting into the game," said head coach Ryan Donovan. "This year we should expect to win tournaments, go to regionals and return to nationals. But this year, we can't just go to the nationals just to make an appearance, like we did last year—we have to make the trip to nationals to win it."

"Our appearance at the NCAA championships should become a tradition and we should expect to win," Donovan added.

Yet, if the Aztecs are going to make another run at nationals, Donovan believes the team must rely on its intense work ethic, which has already produced two appearances in the finals over the past three years. Moreover, the team's success must rely on the experience and competitiveness of its players.

Top of the Class

With the graduation of three of its five golfers from a year ago, the Aztecs will depend on its two seniors, Andrew Scott and Josh Warthen, to provide leadership and experience for the team.

"After going to nationals last season, and knowing that it's their last year, they [Warthen and Scott] know they have to set up and become

leaders of this year's team to represent San Diego State and our golf program," said Donovan. "I'm confident that they'll represent our program, as they're the types of players who improve their game every year."

Last year, Scott led the team in stroke average (72.33), set the school record for the lowest 54-hole score (205) and tied then senior Aaron Choi for the most top five finishes with four.

Warthen, in his first year as a transfer from Allen Hancock College, has steadily improved over the course of his stay at SDSU. Warthen has held the third lowest stroke average of 72.85 and tied Scott, during the fall for the lowest 18-hole score of 66, joining an elite group of San Diego State golfers who have shot 66 or under.

Yet, the pressure for the team's success will not be exclusively placed on the shoulders of Scott and Warthen, as a majority of the team consists of juniors and sophomores, all vying for a position on the regular tournament rotation roster.

Junior Jason Puterbaugh (Carlsbad, Calif.) and sophomores Chad Moscovic (Stockton, Calif.) and Aaron Goldberg (Encinitas, Calif.) have already proven themselves to be reliable and consistent players for the Aztecs.

Last year Puterbaugh finished with the fourth most even par rounds on the team and Moscovic finished with over 50 percent of his rounds counted towards the team's final score. Goldberg, who is coming off an injury which kept him out last season, ended his 2003-04 freshman season with a tournament win during the US Intercollegiate at Stanford and finished with four top 20 individual finishes.

"This is a team that is very competitive, and they understand that if they're not working harder than the next guy, they're not going to play," said Donovan. "These guys are, and will be working hard, pushing each other to play and improve."

"After getting a taste of going for the national title last year, I think that will motivate the team to play even harder."

Transfers

This year the San Diego State golf program will also be looking at incoming transfers to provide more depth to the team, especially sophomore David Palm. Palm played for No. 17 Georgia Southern last season.

"[Palm] will probably be one of the top players coming in and I have high expectations for him," Donovan said.

Palm, who helped lead the Eagles to a 13th place finish during last year's NCAA championships as a freshman, has already won a collegiate tournament and finished the season ranked in the top 150 nationally. Donovan believes that

Palm will provide the team with experience in regional and national play, as well as raw talent to help propel the team to the NCAA championships again.

Other transfers that will make an immediate impact are juniors Stephen Knight (Mineral Wells, Texas) from Tyler Community College; John Gray (Vista, Calif.) from Palomar Junior College and Patrick Strandemo (San Diego, Calif.) from Saddleback Community College.

"With their experience I expect them [Knight, Gray and Strandemo] to come right in and play," Donovan said. They will have to grind out for those top five positions, but these guys have this phenomenal maturity level, are focused academically, understand time management and check their scores every time they play to see what they have to shoot. I'm not worried that they won't adapt and do well here at San Diego State.

Challenges that Lay Ahead

This year the Aztecs will be facing numerous top 50 ranked teams, including USC, Arizona State and recent addition to the Mountain West, TCU.

"What we really need to focus on is maintaining our confidence at level we need to, so that we will be able to compete with some of the teams we'll be playing this year," said Donovan. "We cannot go into these tournaments weary and unconfident. We need to take the confidence to every tournament we play and believe that we have a chance to win."

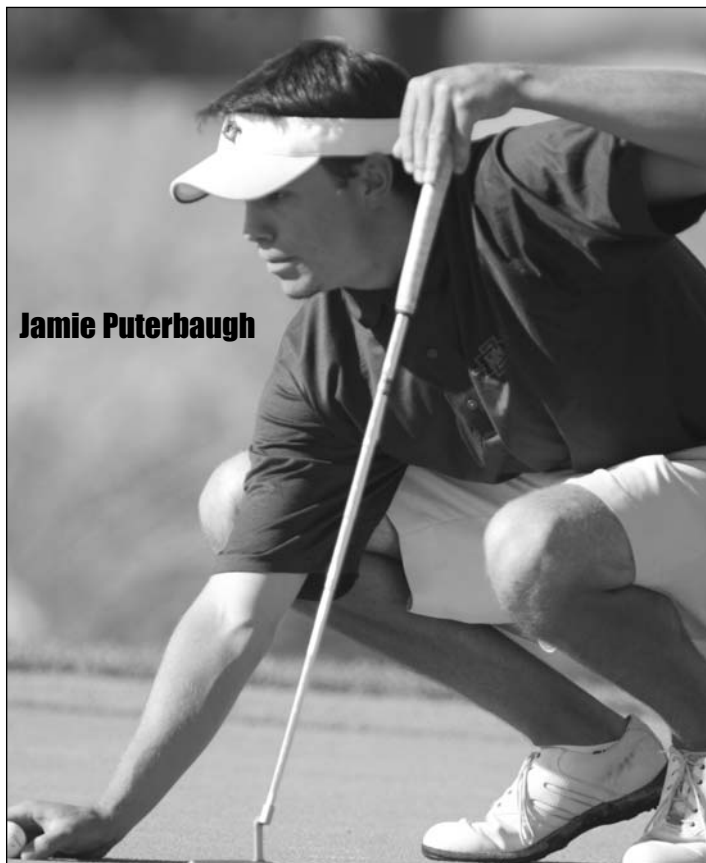

Each season the San Diego State men's golf program hosts one of the premier tournaments in the country during the fall, the Barona Collegiate Cup. The tournament is held on the 7,088 yard course at the Barona Creek Golf Course in Lakeside, Calif. The tournament boasts a field with national championship contenders on a challenging, world class golf course.

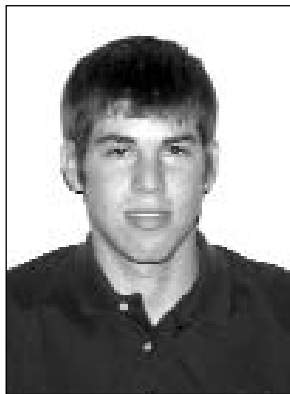
In 2004, a field of 14 teams, including BYU, Ohio State and Texas A&M, participated in the Barona Collegiate Cup. Four of the teams were ranked in the top 50, which included San Diego State, and nine were ranked in the top 100.

Brigham Young won the tournament with at 42 under, 822. BYU led all teams in the first and third rounds, shooting a 271 and 274, respectively. Denver and Texas A&M tied for second at 841. Oscar Alvarez of BYU took the individual title, shooting a 13 under 203.

San Diego State ended the tournament tied in seventh place with Fresno State. Josh Warthen led the Aztecs with a 15th place finish, shooting a 210. Linus Nilsson, who played unattached, scored a 211 to end up at 18th.

Past champs include Colorado State who won the tournament during the 2003 season after carding a team 836. During the 2002, San Diego State won its home tournament by carding a 846. That same year, San Diego State's John Lepak tied for first with a 206 one of the lowest 54 hole individual scores in Aztec history.

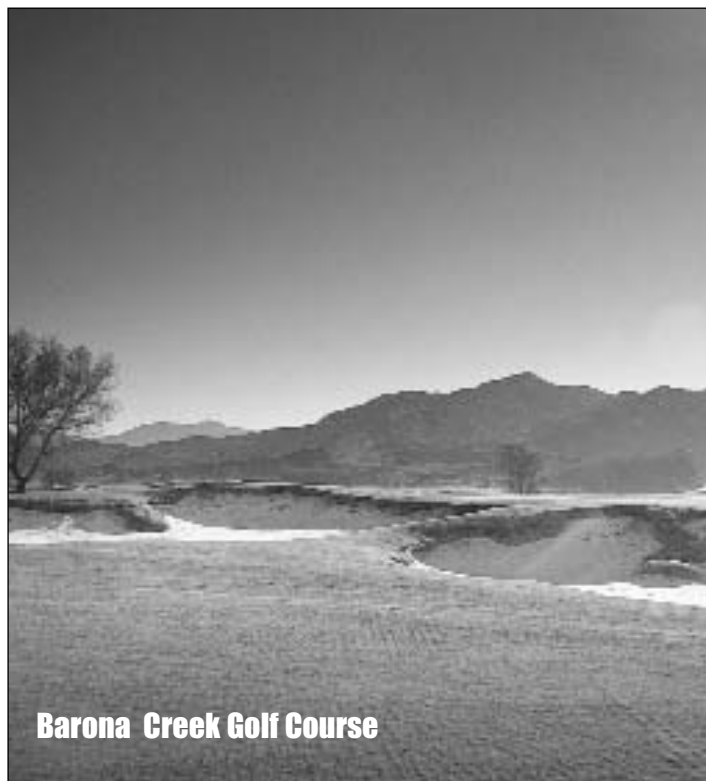

Ryan Donovan is entering his third year as head coach at his alma mater. Donovan, who previously served as an assistant coach under Dale Walker, was promoted to interim head coach after the conclusion of the 2003 fall season and led SDSU through the entire 2004 spring campaign.

Since becoming the head coach, Donovan has led the Aztecs to 10 top five tournament finishes, 16 top 10 tournament finishes, one team title and two NCAA championship appearances.

Last year, Donovan led the Aztecs to their second appearance in an NCAA championship series in three years, as well as leading the

Aztecs to eight top 10 regular season individual tournament finishes, six of which were back to back top five team finishes.

Donovan finished his first season as head coach with four of his players finishing with eight top five individual tournament finishes collectively, and two tournament wins both by then freshman Aaron Goldberg.

Prior to coaching at SDSU, Donovan was a four year member of the Aztec golf program and returned to his alma mater after a stint in the professional ranks.

Donovan competed for the Aztecs from 1997 to 2001. His most successful season came as a junior when he posted five top 30 finishes. During his senior season, Donovan shot a career best four under 212 at the Aztec Invitational finishing second overall and helping SDSU to the tournament title.

Dale Walker is entering his sixth year at San Diego State and his second as the director of golf operations. Walker was the Aztecs' head men's golf coach from 2000-03.

A former San Diego State golfer, Walker took the helm of the Aztec men's golf program just prior to the 2000-01 campaign, and the Aztecs hardly missed a beat.

Walker guided San Diego State to eight top three finishes, including four team titles, during his inaugural campaign. The Aztecs also placed second at the Mountain West championships, advanced to the NCAA West Regional, and were ranked in *Golfweek's* top 25 throughout the year.

In 2001-02, SDSU began the spring with three consecutive team titles in a season that totaled nine top five results. Walker and the Aztecs fell just shy of advancing to the NCAA championships, falling in a playoff to Texas Tech for the final berth out of the west regional.

A year later, the Aztecs had a solid 2002-03 campaign, highlighted by a first place finish at the 2002 Barona Collegiate Cup and in the spring, returned to the NCAA championships, its first appearance since 1984.

Driven by his goal to make San Diego State golf the premiere program on the West Coast, Walker developed a knack for driving his players to be the most well prepared participants in each event. To accomplish this, he relied on his past experience at both the collegiate and professional levels, which allowed him to offer his expertise to Aztec golfers with the mechanics of their swing, as well as the mental aspect of competition.

Walker's vision, however, is not limited to the course. He has been the driving force behind the San Diego State Golf Association whose purposes is to

provide the financial and human resources to ensure a successful future for San Diego State golf.

Walker's aim is to raise two million dollars for the men's and women's golf programs, an endowment that would make each program self funding.

Walker is the father of two sons, Colton and Carson. In his free time, he enjoys white water river rafting and riding dirt bikes with his kids and of course, playing golf.

Individually, Aztec junior Josh Warthen recorded his first top 10 finish of the season. He shot a 75 in the final 18 holes and ended the championships at 2 over par and tied for ninth place. Warthen, who started the final round in a third place tie, finished 10 strokes behind the individual medalist, Brigham Young's Nick Becker.

Senior Linus Nilsson ended the tournament in a tie for 12th at 3 over par, while senior Aaron Choi and junior Andrew Scott were both 6 over par in the three day event. Gilberto Rodriguez rounded out the Aztec line up with a 54 hole total of 9 over par.

San Diego State's team total of 875 is the fifth lowest total for an Aztec team at a 54 hole conference tournament.

Following the championship, Choi and Scott were named to the 11 member all conference team.

SDSU Men's Golf Earns Berth in National Championships

STANFORD, Calif. The San Diego State men's golf program has earned a berth in the 30 team NCAA national championships.

The Aztecs shot a final round four over par 284 on the last day of play and finished in seventh place at the NCAA West Regional Championships at the Stanford Golf Course in Stanford, Calif. By finishing the 54 hole, three day tournament in the top 10, the Aztecs qualified for the 30 team NCAA National Championships, June 1-4 at the Caves Valley Golf Club in Owings Mills, Md.

Riding the strong play of senior Gilberto Rodriguez, San Diego State used its best round of the tournament to hold off a tightly bunched group in the 27 team field vying for the final qualifying spots.

Late in the final round with SDSU in a three way tie for ninth place, Rodriguez was nothing short of amazing, firing a back nine 31 that featured birdies on 10, 11, 15, 16 and 18. His final round 67, gave him a three day total of even par and placed him in a tie for sixth place.

Junior Andrew Scott helped the team's cause with his second consecutive 1 over par 71. After bogeying three out of four holes on the back nine, Scott was solid down the stretch, playing the final four holes at 1 under par. He finished the championships at 5 over par.

Junior Josh Warthen produced a final round 73. Like Scott, Warthen steadied his play down the stretch after a rough couple of holes on the back nine. Following four consecutive bogeys on 11-14, he played the final four holes at 1 under par to help the Aztecs clinch an NCAA championship bid.

Coming off a disappointing second round, senior Linus Nilsson produced a final round 73 that featured three birdies. He bettered his second round score by six strokes.

The Aztecs will make their 18th all time appearance in the NCAA Men's Golf National Championships. This marks the third time since regional play began in 1989 that SDSU has advanced to the championships, having done so in 1999 and 2003.

Aztecs Season Ends After Third Round Of The NAAs

OWING MILLS, Md. The San Diego State men's golf team saw its 2005 season come to an end as the Aztecs remained in 23rd place overall after carding a third round 26 over 306 in rainy conditions at the 2005 NCAA championships. SDSU fell 10 strokes shy of making the cut for the final 18 holes, which will include just the top 15 schools at the par 70, 7,131 yard Caves Valley Golf Club in Owings Mills, Md. The Aztecs ended the event at 53 over 893 through 54 holes.

Aztec senior Aaron Choi finished out his career with his best performance of the tournament, logging a 2 over 72 with three birdies. Choi's 72 tied for eighth best on the day in the field of 156 golfers, vaulting him from 118th to 68th place at 13 over 223.

Junior Andrew Scott tied Choi for 68th place with a 223, including a 77 in the third round. Scott logged the team's second lowest score each of the three days of the tournament.

SDSU junior Josh Warthen completed action with a 78 to end in 57th place at 14 over 224, while seniors Gilberto Rodriguez and Linus Nilsson were at 16 and 19 over for the tournament, respectively.

San Diego State's 23rd place finish is its highest in the last four NCAA appearances since also taking 23rd at the 1983 championships.

With an enrollment of more than 33,000 students, SDSU has grown into the largest institution of higher education in the San Diego region and one of the largest in California.

- San Diego State currently grants bachelor's degrees in 81 academic areas, master's degrees in 72 and doctoral degrees in 16.
- One in seven adults in San Diego holds a degree from San Diego State.



- SDSU is No. 15 in the nation for bachelor's degrees conferred to ethnic minorities according to the June 2004 edition of Black Issues in Higher Education.
- SDSU's undergraduate international business program was ranked No. 7 in the nation in August 2004 by U.S. News & World Report. SDSU was also ranked No. 26 in entrepreneurship among best graduate programs in April 2005, by the same magazine.
- SDSU is No. 9 in the nation and No. 4 in California for bachelor's degrees awarded to Hispanics according to the May 2005 issue of Hispanic Outlook in Higher Education.
- The School of Accountancy was the first and one of only four accredited accounting programs in California. Student test scores on the CPA exam consistently rank among the top five in the nation.
- The SDSU College of Business Entrepreneurial Management Center is a Nasdaq Center of Excellence, which places it among the top eight such programs in the nation.
- Increasingly recognized for innovative research, San Diego State University has achieved the prestigious Doctoral/Research University Intensive designation. This is granted by the Carnegie Foundation to the top 6.7 percent of the nation's research conducting universities. Since 2000, SDSU faculty and staff have attracted more than \$600 million in



grants and contracts for research and program administration. SDSU ranks among the top 100 public universities nationwide in research expenditures, and SDSU's research funding has doubled from a decade ago.

- In 2002, SDSU was ranked among the 31 hottest and trendiest universities in the nation according to Kaplan's Annual National High School Guidance Counselor Survey.
- Recently completed facilities, totaling more than \$200 million in value, include Cuicacalli, a dining and residence complex; the Chemical Sciences Laboratory, a showcase of leading edge laboratories and infrastructure; a 2,458 space parking structure, the largest in the California State University system; and the Aztec Athletics Center, housing coaches' offices, training facilities and the Wise Foundation Hall of Fame. This past July also marked the long awaited completion of the SDSU trolley station and tunnel, part of the Metropolitan Transit Development Board's Mission Valley East extension of the San Diego Trolley system.

SDSU'S Aztec Heritage

From the early decades of its history, San Diego State has identified itself with the Aztecs, one of the most sophisticated and distinctive societies in the history of the Western Hemisphere. A fitting choice for a university committed to internationalism and diversity, the Aztec identity evokes great pride in Mexico, as well as among many people in the United States, and certainly within the SDSU community. Consequently, San Diego State strives to honor the Aztec people by enhancing awareness, understanding and appreciation of Aztec culture and achievements.

Aztec History

Aztec civilization dates back at least to the 12th century A.D. The precise location is still debated by scholars, but tradition tells us of a place somewhere north of modern day Mexico City known at that time as Aztlan, which meant "the place of the cranes" or "the place of the herons." The people who lived in this land were called Azteca meaning "those of Aztlan."

The Azteca eventually left their homeland and became known as the Mexica. Native folklore attributes this name change to the instructions of the people's patron deity, Huitzilopochtli (Hummingbird on the Left).

Around 1325, the Mexica settled on an island in Lake Texcoco, an area that is now the heart of Mexico City, and named it Tenochtitlan or "the place of the fruit of the cactus." A century

later, the Mexica and two other Nahuatl speaking city states, Texcoco and Tlacopan, combined to create an entity popularly known as the Aztec Empire. Boasting a strong military force, this new alliance commanded a sphere of influence that stretched across much of present day Mexico.

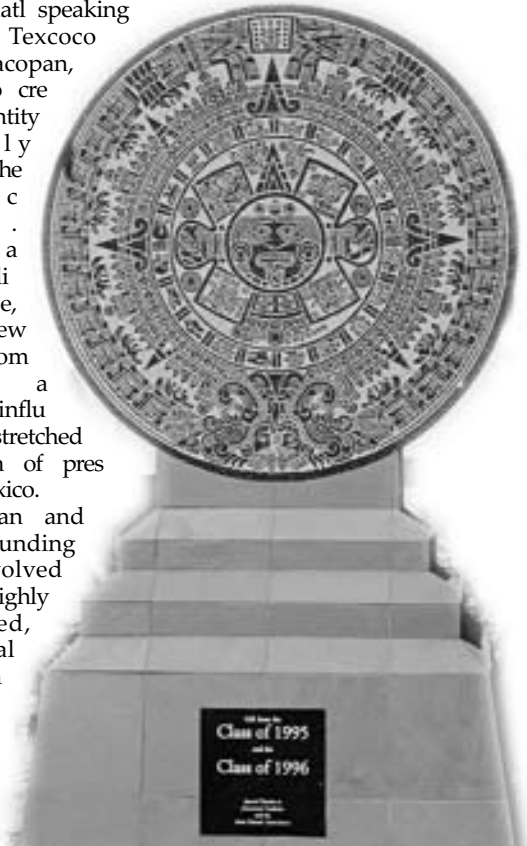
Tenochtitlan and its surrounding valley evolved into a highly sophisticated, multicultural and multilingual city state of several million inhabitants. At this same

time, major European cities numbered only 30,000 to 40,000 in population. A cradle of innovation, the Aztec Empire developed advanced systems of trade, science, politics, religion, education and agriculture. The Aztecs also enjoyed sports and built grand ballcourts to accommodate team events.

Aztecs and SDSU

San Diego State University first adopted the Aztec name in the 1920s as a nickname for the college's sports teams. In 1925, the student newspaper followed suit, changing its name from The Paper Lantern to The Aztec. Since that time, San Diego State's celebration of Aztec heritage has permeated the campus. In 1936, a Donald Hord sculpture of Montezuma II, the last Aztec emperor, became a welcoming campus icon. With the passing years, Aztec themes echoed in the names, colors and architectural elements of new campus buildings. And Aztec culture became the subject of more than a dozen university courses.

In 1941, Monty Montezuma, a character based on Montezuma II, debuted at San Diego State athletic events as a symbolic personification of the Aztecs. Over time, the Montezuma character's look and activities have evolved from a sports mascot into a more dignified and accurate representation of the historical emperor. Montezuma now serves as the university's ambassador of Aztec culture, charged with the responsibility of informing and educating the San Diego community about Aztec civilization. SDSU continues to take pride in its affiliation with Aztec culture and to celebrate the Aztec virtues of strength, valor and intellectual achievement.

If you haven't seen San Diego State lately you haven't seen San Diego State. Gone are the days in which Aztec coaches were forced to play with a short stick in a crowded office on a congested corner of campus.

In place now on The Mesa are arguably some of the finest facilities in the United States and San Diego State certainly tops the charts on the west coast.

The Athletic Department is now housed in the \$20 million, 130,000 square foot Aztec Athletics Center. The new centerpiece of the department, which was dedicated in February of 2002, is located just across the street from Cox Arena and just east of Tony Gwynn Stadium. On the south, the center is buffered by the new Sports Deck, where San Diego State's track and soccer teams compete. On the north side, it is connected to Peterson Gym, the home of Aztec volleyball. The west exit of the building opens onto three 100 yard practice fields. One of the fields is natural grass and two utilize field turf, providing San Diego State daily options for its workouts.

All of SDSU's new facilities, including the athletics center, Cox Arena, Tony Gwynn Stadium and the Sports Deck, have opened since 1995. The buildings are not just sparkling new, but they are already postseason tested. Cox Arena, the 12,400 seat basketball facility, has served as a site for the NCAA Men's Basketball Division I Championship (first and second rounds) as well as the NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball National Championship.

The Sports Deck has already hosted the Mountain West Conference championships, as has Tony Gwynn Stadium. And the building isn't stopping anytime soon, as San Diego State has plans for a new tennis stadium and a recently opened softball facility located just west of Tony Gwynn Stadium.

Tony Gwynn Stadium and the Aztec Athletics Center were constructed thanks to donations by San Diego Padres owners John and Becky Moores.

Aztec Athletics Center Highlights:

► The entrance lobby of the center houses the 5,000 square foot Aztec Hall of Fame, presented by the Wise Foundation. The museum is the first permanent home of the Hall of Fame and features displays, informative kiosks, interactive video trivia games and a plaque commemorating the induction of each Hall of Fame member. Football players who are members of the Hall of Fame include Willie Buchanon, Haven Moses, legendary coach Don Coryell, and NFL MVPs Brian Sipe and Marshall Faulk.

► A state of the art weight room, encompassing more than 15,000 square feet, is also located on the first floor of the building. It includes a one lane running track for indoor timing.

► Each varsity sport has a plush locker room on the first floor of the building. The locker rooms include a lounge area and oak lockers.

► The sports medicine center and equipment operations are also located on the first floor and help provide incredible convenience to the locker rooms and weight room.

► A first floor auditorium that seats more than 200 has already been the site of major news conferences, watch parties and public forums.

► The academic center, complete with two lecture halls, private tutorial rooms, and a new computer lab, is housed on the third floor. That level of the building is also home to the athletic administration and the basketball staffs.

DR. STEPHEN WEBER



University President

Stephen L. Weber, the seventh president of San Diego State University, provides dynamic leadership to an institution that ranks among the largest in the nation and third largest in California. Educated as a philosopher, President Weber began his tenure at SDSU in July 1996 and shortly afterward initiated a broad based dialog intended to set the course for the University's future.

Under President Weber's guidance, students, faculty, alumni and community leaders participated in shaping this Shared Vision. SDSU is now moving boldly ahead toward goals set by those discussions: reinforcing academic excellence, nurturing students, honoring diversity and social justice, carefully stewarding resources and further developing global programs.

A champion of community involvement as well as academic excellence, President Weber has been an advocate for community service. Leading by example, he is immediate past chair of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities Board of Directors and co chairs Partners for K 12 School Reform. He also serves on the boards of governors of The Peres Center for Peace and the San Diego Foundation, and on the boards of directors of the San Diego Regional Economic Development Corporation, the San Diego Science and Technology Council, and the California Healthcare Institute. He co chairs the College Presidents Forum of the San Diego County Policy Panel on Youth Access to Alcohol.

In addition, President Weber is a member of the international advisory board for the Foundation for Children of the Californians, the advisory council of the San Diego Performing Arts League, and the honorary advisory board of the San Diego Science Alliance. He is a member of the San Diego Rotary Club, an honorary director of the Japan Society of San Diego and Tijuana, and a member of the advisory board for Bahcesehir University in Turkey.

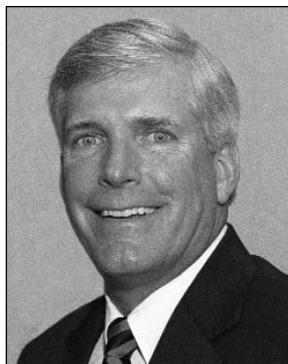
Born in Boston, President Weber is a graduate of Bowling Green University with a B.A. in philosophy. He received his Ph.D. in philosophy from the University of Notre Dame in 1969 and is the author of numerous articles on philosophy and higher education.

President Weber's many awards include an honorary degree from Beijing Capital Normal University. In 1997 he was named Headliners of the Year by the San Diego Press Club and, that same year the San Diego Mediation Center honored him with its Peacemaker Award. In 1999, President Weber received the Executive Directors Award from the San Diego Education Association and the Gold Key Award from the San Diego Hospitality Association. He was recognized as a Leader of Vision by the League of Women Voters of San Diego in 2000.

Before coming to SDSU, President Weber served as interim provost of the State University of New York (SUNY). He also served seven years as president of the SUNY Oswego campus. Prior to that he was vice president of academic affairs at St. Cloud State University in Minnesota, dean of arts and sciences at Fairfield University in Connecticut, and assistant to the president of the University of Maine.

President Weber is married to Susan Keim Weber, who shares his enthusiastic commitment to SDSU. They have two sons.

JEFF SCHEMME



Athletics Director

Jeff Schemmel, who brings a wealth of experience, a history of success and new expectations to Montezuma Mesa, was introduced as San Diego State's Director of Athletics on July 6, 2005.

Schemmel immediately becomes one of the most accomplished sitting athletic directors in the country. He is a former practicing attorney, directed a Final Four, served as a senior administrator at Big 10 and Big 12 schools, and played a part in what might be the biggest football turnaround in college athletics.

Schemmel arrived at San Diego State from Conference USA, where he had served as associate commissioner for governance and legal affairs since October of 2004. During his stay in Dallas, he helped the league negotiate television contracts with ESPN and College Sports Television that exceeded more than \$100 million in revenue, and he served as a member of the NCAA Division I Management Council.

From February of 2004 to October of 2004, Schemmel was the senior vice president and executive director of development for the Arizona State University Foundation, where he oversaw that school's fundraising efforts while supervising approximately 135 employees across the Tempe campus.

Schemmel was an administrator at the University of Minnesota from 1991 to 2003. During his stay in the Twin Cities, he advanced from associate athletic director for compliance to senior associate athletic director and chief operating officer for Gopher athletics.

Along with his departmental duties, Schemmel directed the school's efforts in hosting NCAA Championship events, including the 2001 Final Four, one of America's fastest growing events.

He also supervised and implemented a \$3 million capital improvement campaign, and was heavily involved in the hiring of football coach Glen Mason and men's basketball coach Dan Monson, both of whom have revitalized programs in Minneapolis.

From 1988 to 1991, Schemmel was an administrator at his alma mater, Kansas State. He served as the school's assistant athletic director for development and later was the associate athletic director for compliance while supervising the school's Olympic sports.

Schemmel was part of the management team that hired Bill Snyder as the Wildcat head football coach. Under Snyder's direction, Kansas State executed what is considered one of the greatest turnarounds in college football history.

Schemmel was a decorated runner at K State and was named the 1976 outstanding student athlete at the school. As a Wildcat, he was a four time track and field All American, a five time Big 8 Conference champion, was a member of a national championship distance medley relay team and won the Big 8 Conference Medallion.

He also served as an ABC Television and Time Magazine correspondent for the 1976 Summer Olympics in Montreal.

After earning his undergraduate degree in political science, Schemmel earned his law degree at Washburn University in Topeka, Kan. He began his professional career as an attorney and later was a partner in his own firm, specializing in business and sports law.

Schemmel and his wife, Lori, have been married for 28 years. They have two adult sons, Justin, and Jon, who plays minor league baseball in the New York Mets organization.

The dual role of student and athlete can be a daunting challenge for any person at the Division I level. Recognizing that academic challenge, the Student Athlete Academic Support Services program has been developed at San Diego State to assist all student athletes in achieving academic excellence.

It is a source of pride within San Diego State athletics that the department has developed one of the most comprehensive academic support programs in the country.

The Staff

The SAASS staff includes a learning specialist, four academic advisors, the department's director of compliance, an eligibility coordinator, a financial aid coordinator as well as a recruitment coordinator.

In addition to the full time staff, the department employs more than 20 mentors and tutors.

Collectively, they operate a program that



enhances each student's satisfactory progress toward graduation.

The Services

Throughout the academic year, advisors offer a variety of services to aid individuals in the development of their personal goals and the blueprint for pursuing those goals.

All new student athletes are invited to an orientation that helps lay the foundation for future successes. Each advisor teaches a section of the University's Freshman Success course (General Studies 100), which deals with specific transition issues for student athletes. Topics include time management, study skills and test taking.

In addition, the course also introduces new students to services such as the Love Library, University Advising Center, Career Services, Health Services and the counseling center.

The Resources

In the fall of 2001, the academic unit joined the rest of the athletic department in moving into the new \$30 million, 130,000 square foot Aztec Athletics Center. The academic staff is located on the third floor of the complex and includes a new 40 station computer lab, individual study rooms and two lecture rooms.

The Commitment

San Diego State's annual Scholar Athlete Awards Banquet honors students with a grade point average in excess of 3.2. In 2004, 199 student athletes, the most in school history, were honored at the Scholar Athlete Awards Banquet and attended a San Diego Padres baseball game at PETCO Park.

Life Skills

To further increase the opportunities for success, San Diego State is part of the NCAA's CHAMPS/Life Skills Program. The curriculum of Aztec Pride (Promoting Responsibility, Integrity, Diversity, Education) offers a wide range of programs and activities that enhance the educational experience. Special emphasis is placed on the areas of personal development, community service and career development.
