The University of Cincinnati

C The Cincinnati College and the Medical Center of Ohio were founded in 1819. The University of Cincinnati was established in 1870 and absorbed those earlier institutions, becoming a state university in 1977.

C UC's research grants and contracts exceeded \$320 million in 2004 and its patent income ranked 28th nationally. Ranked No. 46 in the nation in research and development by the National Science Foundation, UC is one of just 102 Research I category universities in the country.

C The first cooperative education program in the United States was offered at UC in 1906. Today more than 3,000 UC co-op students work in over 30 states and 12 foreign countries.

C A focal point for the university's community involvement is UC's Medical Center, one of the largest facilities for teaching and research in the country.

C UC's library is ranked No. 45 in the U.S. and Canada by the Association of Research Libraries.

Cincinnati Firsts

UC has been the source of many contributions to society, including:

- the first electric organ
- the first oral polio vaccine
- the first observations of the National Weather Service
- the first safe anti-knock gasoline
- the first antihistimine
- the first use of lasers to remove brain tumors
- the first bachelor's degree program in nursing and first emergency medicine residency program
- the first degree program offered via satellite

Cincinnati Sports Firsts

- Cincinnati hosted one of the first night football games in the U.S. in 1923.
- George Smith, captain of the 1934 football team, wore a device to protect a facial injury, a fore-runner of the facemask.
- In 1961, Hank Hartong became college football's first soccer-style kicker.
- UC was the first school to make five consecutive appearances in the men's basketball Final Four, 1959-1963.

Academic Excellence

At the University of Cincinnati, excellence is a hallmark of the academic program. *U.S. News & World Reports* ranks 10 UC programs among the top 10 in the country, while another 21 programs are ranked among the top 50 in the nation.

Money Magazine's *Elite Values In Higher Education*, Kaplan's *Unofficial, Unbiased Insider's Guide to the 320 Most Interesting Colleges*, Octameron's *College Match: A Blueprint for Choosing the Best School for You* and Yahoo's *Internet Life* have all ranked the University of Cincinnati's programs among the best in the nation.

Undergraduate students in any college may apply to the University Honors Scholars Program. If selected as an Honors student, the rewards for being an outstanding student include smaller classes, honors housing, special advising and scholarships worth up to \$60,000 over four years.

UC's cornerstone scholarship program is Cincinnatus, which awards more than 1,400 scholarships totaling more than \$11 million.



A Look at the University

- ◆ In fiscal year 2004, UC earned more than \$320 million in grants and contracts. Research funding has quadrupled in the past 20 years, and the university's National Science Foundation ranking has climbed from a placement of 76th to 46th.
- ◆ UC's annual endowment is \$987.8 million, ranking 51st in the U.S. and 12th among public universities.
- ◆ UC offers 98 doctoral degree programs, 170 master's degree programs, 167 bachelor's degree programs and 139 associate degree programs.
- ◆ The Carnegie Commission has designated UC as a Research I university.

◆ The University of Cincinnati has an economic impact of over two billion dollars annually on the state's economy.

◆ The University of Cincinnati is the home of cooperative education. The first co-op program in America was offered at UC in 1906, and UC's co-op program is now the second largest in the country.

◆ The University of Cincinnati is the Greater Cincinnati area's fourth-largest employer with 9,000 employees (not counting student workers).

◆ UC's library system contains over three million books, and subscriptions to 39,787 periodicals—rank-

The University of Cincinnati athletic department is nationally recognized as one of the most comprehensive Division I athletic programs in the nation. UC offers 18 intercollegiate sports, 10 for women and eight for men.

Under the leadership of Director of Athletics Bob Goin, UC has celebrated unprecedented successes over the past eight years. Some of the impressive numbers include:

C-USA Co-Athlete of the Meet Jo Young (left) and Renee Hein became the first pair of UC women to reach the NCAA Outdoor Championships in the same year.



Jason Maxwell earned his second-straight All-Conference USA second team honor and led UC to a 14th consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance before becoming a first-round draft choice of the Detroit Pistons.

Anne Stephens led the Bearcats in scoring to become UC's first Conference USA Sixth Player of the Year winner in women's basketball.

A seven-time Conference USA champion, Ann Degenstein was named C-USA Swimmer of the Year after placing 11th and 14th at the NCAA Championships.



Two-time first team All-Conference USA selection Steve Cole helped UC to a Fort Worth Bowl victory before being selected in the fifth round of the NFL Draft by the Philadelphia Eagles.

Winner of consecutive Conference USA Player of the Year awards, Adie DuPont concluded his career as a two-time AFCA All-American and three-time CoSIDA Academic All-American.

Cincinnati - Home of Champions



Men's basketball won its eighth Conference USA regular season title and fourth tourney championship in 2004.



Women's soccer claimed its second straight Conference USA tourney title in 2002 and fourth in seven years.

The tenure of Bob Goin will go down as one of the most successful eras ever at the University of Cincinnati. Bearcat teams have compiled a winning percentage over .600 in the eight years under his direction.

As the chart below illustrates, four of the most successful years in Bearcat history have taken place since Goin was hired, including a .677 mark in 1999-2000, the highest percentage in 39 years.

In 2005 Ben Haber became the sixth Bearcat in the 10 years of Conference USA to win the C-USA decathlon title.



Volleyball won its fourth league title in five years in 2003.



UC football made its 8th bowl appearance in eight years in 2004, defeating Marshall in the Fort Worth Bowl, 32-14.



Men's soccer claimed the 2003 Conference USA regular season title, its first league championship in its history.



Richard E. Lindner Varsity Village

Another milestone in the growth and development of the University of Cincinnati's athletic facilities will occur in 2005-06 with the opening of the Richard E. Lindner Athletic Center. The eight-level building, taking form between Nippert Stadium and Fifth Third Arena at Shoemaker Center, will become the new hub of UC's facilities complex as its location might suggest.

Within the building's unique architecture will provide centralized administrative and coaching offices for UC's entire intercollegiate program. Included in the new center are:

- Reception and meeting space for all programs
- A museum detailing the history of the university and athletics.
- An academic services center
- Easily-accessed ticket office for all events
- Locker and meeting room facilities
- Centralized sports medicine training/rehabilitation suite
- Practice gymnasium
- New facilities for UC's Student Health Services
- A Faculty Club and Restaurant

The new athletic center will be accessed from Fifth Third Arena by a below-plaza connection.

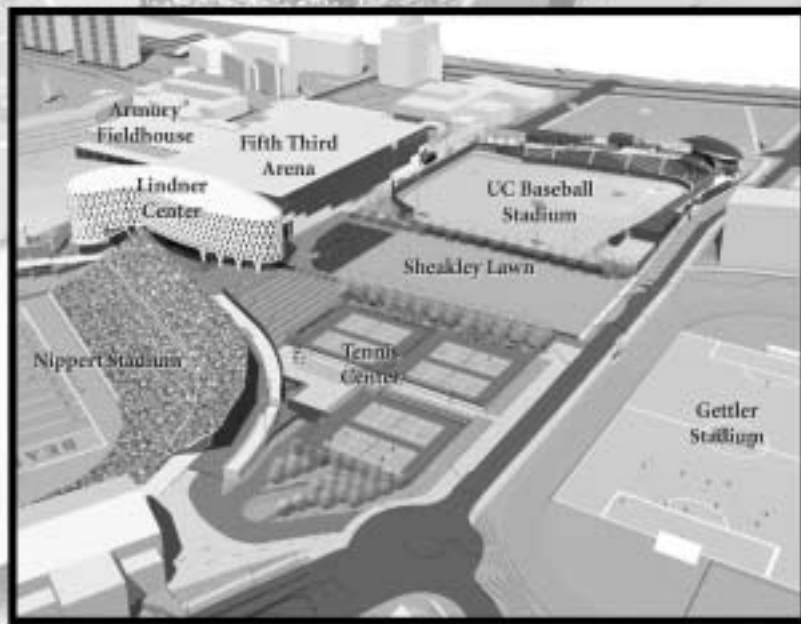
Existing recreational space in the Shoemaker Center will be rebuilt for varsity athletics. The most-noted improvement will be a new 18,000 square foot strength and condition center, doubling the size of the current weight room.

The Lindner Athletic Center is the crown jewel of the Richard E. Lindner Varsity Village, a vision for UC's athletic complex to improve current facilities and address future needs in providing the support to allow Cincinnati's teams and individuals to compete among the elite.

Mr. Lindner is president of REL Group, Inc., a Greater Cincinnati-based holding company, and is former owner, chairman of the board and CEO of Thriftway,

Inc. He has been a long-time supporter of UC athletics and his gift to this project of \$10.2 million is the largest gift from an individual to a project in school history.

Structured as part of the university's master plan for its facility improvement, Varsity Village will enhance currently sound facilities such as Nippert Stadium and Fifth Third Arena at Shoemaker Center and provide new facilities to address deficient areas.



A Vision for the Future

The term "village" is aptly applied because the concept is to provide ease of use and access to services similar to that of a small town.

The first phase of Varsity Village was completed in the spring of 2004 with the opening of the new UC Baseball Stadium. Last fall, the Gettler Soccer and Track Stadium re-opened following extensive renovations sporting new permanent seating, a press box, a new FieldTurf playing surface and a standard field size for soccer.

A new tennis center and pool complex will be created while a new practice gym will provide state of the art accommodations.

Varsity Village addresses the needs to attract quality student-athletes to all of Cincinnati's sports programs and provide an environment in which they can succeed, academically, athletically and physically.

In relation to national trends, it represents a shift not just to current facilities, but to the forefront of comprehensive integrated department planning.



Keating Natatorium



The University of Cincinnati is set to open the new Keating Natatorium in early 2006. The new pool will feature an eight-lane, 50-yard swimming course with an integrated diving well. Located in the new student recreation center adjacent to Varsity Village, Keating Natatorium was designed to create very fast times. It is 25 yards wide and includes a moveable bulkhead.

The student recreation center, as well as the natatorium, was designed locally by KZF Design, Inc., working with internationally renowned architect Thom Mayne of Morphosis, based out of Santa Monica, Calif. It is being built by Turner Construction, and will feature a leisure pool as well as the varsity pool, a six court gymnasium, locker rooms, recreation offices, a food court, a juice bar overlooking the gym, a study lounge, administrative offices, weight/fitness areas and a climbing wall.

Bearcat Athletic Facilities

The Myrl H. Shoemaker Center is the hub of the University of Cincinnati's athletic facilities. The 15-year old structure is a mecca for athletes and fans alike with its electric atmosphere and versatility.

The focal point of the Shoemaker Center is the 13,176-seat Fifth Third Arena. The home to UC's basketball and volleyball teams was renamed in 2003 due to Fifth Third Bank's generous support of UC's facilities improvement campaign.





Academics and Student Services

The University of Cincinnati is committed to the total development of its student-athletes, and its comprehensive programs for Academic Services and Student Services is evidence of that commitment.

The Academic Services Office works with coaches, faculty and administrators to help make the student-athlete's academic and athletic experience as enriching and rewarding as possible. The office serves to help student-athletes keep abreast of the eligibility requirements of their particular colleges, assists with the coordination of class schedules and monitors their progress in their respective programs and toward graduation.

Weekly meetings with athletic academic advisors are set up for all first-year student-athletes to better monitor their academic progress and assist with adjustment to college. Tutoring and educational assistance are also readily accessible.

The UC TEAM Approach

To help new student-athletes adjust to college life, Cincinnati utilizes a mentorship program which pairs new student-athletes with members of the local community who are committed to helping the student-athletes enjoy their first year college experience.

UC TEAM, an acronym for University of Cincinnati Together in Excellence for Athletes through Mentoring, familiarizes student-athletes with UC's academic culture, helps them focus on responsibilities, and ultimately enriches their personal development and experience at the university.

Academic Services Center

The Academic Services Center provides UC student-athletes with a comfortable environment in which to study and also has many modern amenities to aid the learning process.

The 3,300 square-foot facility features a large study room, which is furnished to accommodate a variety of study habits. Student-athletes may choose from a relaxed study lounge area for casual reading to more formal individual study carrels or group study in the tutor room.

A computer center, equipped with 21 work stations, provides a wide-range of computer and word-processing activities, and access to the internet.

In the future, the center will also contain a resource room, private study and tutoring rooms and rooms for group study. The center is staffed to allow for nearly round-the-clock access.

Services Provided For Student-Athletes

Academic Advising: The UC Academic Services staff provides information regarding policies, procedures, course selection, selection of major and minor areas of study as well as NCAA and university guidelines for adequate academic progress.

Priority Registration: Student-athletes meet with an advisor in their college in order to obtain a checksheet and a graduation plan. The student-athlete then meets with an athletic academic advisor during priority registration in order to register for the quarter. Priority registration allows student-athletes to register for classes around practice and competition schedules.

Counseling: Individual work is done with student-athletes with specific concerns such as decision-making, adjustment to college, communications, relationships, test-anxiety and necessary study skills. Appropriate referrals are made to other campus resources.

Monitoring Academic Progress: Progress reports are used to gather classroom performance information from professors. This information is shared with the student-athlete and his/her coach so everyone can keep abreast of the current academic progress.

Tutorials: Services are provided for one-on-one and small group tutoring. Student-athletes may submit requests for a tutor assignment in most courses.

Career Development and Placement: The interests and strengths of each student-athlete are continually measured to prepare the student-athlete for a career beyond college. In addition to aiding career exploration and placement, this program provides assistance in securing vacation employment opportunities and internships.

Bearcats Enter Year of Transition in 2005-06

The University of Cincinnati swimming and diving teams will experience a year of transition in the 2005-06 season. The Bearcats will begin competition in the BIG EAST Conference and will open a new natatorium in January.

Keating Natatorium is right on the heart of campus and will be an excellent training venue for the Bearcats. Varsity Village and the new pool will help UC with recruiting, bringing in the best swimmers out of high school and keeping the Cincinnati prep swimmers close to home.

The move to the BIG EAST will impact the squad this year and for years to come. Due to the depth of the BIG EAST, swimmers must qualify for the championship meet during the regular season, which will enhance dual meet competition. For the first time in four years, the Bearcats will be a part of a conference that sponsors men's swimming. Prior to UC's four-year stint in Conference USA, which sponsored only women's swimming, the Bearcat men's team was the dominant program at the National Independent Championships on an annual basis, winning five titles in nine years between 1992 and 2000.

Men's Outlook

A mix of experienced upperclassmen and talented youngsters lead the balanced men's squad. Seniors David Gustavsson and Ryan Yearwood each won Conference USA Invitational titles last season, as did sophomore Marcel Kleiner.

Gustavsson and Yearwood, both College Swimming Coaches Association of America Academic All-Americans last season, were NCAA Provisional qualifiers in 2004-05, and have a very good shot at making the national championships this year. Kleiner, also a CSCAA Academic All-American during his freshman campaign, won the 100 freestyle at the C-USA Invitational and swam legs on four school record-setting relay squads. He will look to make the NCAA meet in the sprint freestyles.

Senior Steve Marshall, who sat out the 2004-05 season, has returned in the best shape of his career and will be the Bearcats' main contributor in the breaststrokes. The Akron native also has the ability to score in the individual medley events and the freestyles.

A large group of freshmen will make their mark on the Bearcat squad this season. Jakub Carda, a native of the Czech Republic, and Bjorn Mates,

of Germany, may have the biggest impact. Carda, a Czech National Champion in 2005, will score in the individual medleys and the freestyles. A member of the German National Team, Mates can be a BIG EAST scorer in the IM, backstroke, and butterfly.

Fellow freshmen Shawn King and Jeff Kaemmerlen will add depth to the Bearcat freestyle, IM, and backstroke events. Eric McComas and Zach Czaplak will also help in the freestyles.

Women's Outlook

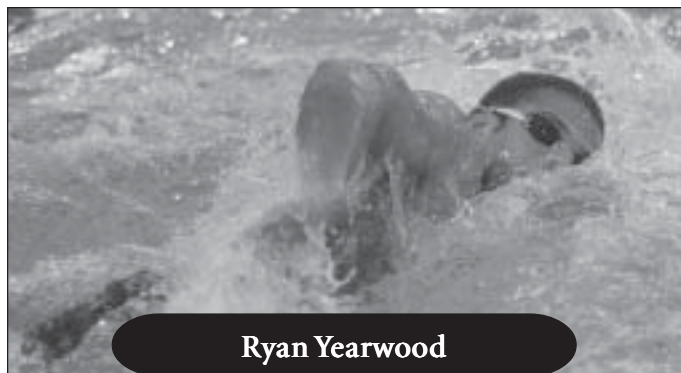
The women's team will again be led by NCAA-qualifier Ann Degenstein. The senior from The Woodlands, Texas, finished 11th and 14th in the 100 and 200 butterfly events, respectively, at the NCAA Championships last season. Degenstein, the 2004-05 Conference USA Swimmer of the Year and Olympic Trials qualifier, will shore up the butterfly events and will score in freestyles and the individual medley events.

Gerdien de Jong, a native of the Netherlands, will be the Bearcats' most consistent scorer in the sprint freestyles. She returns this season fit and strong and is expected to have a breakout season. A versatile swimmer, Karen Brasier, will be looked upon for points in the butterfly and freestyle events. She will help in the relays and should be a top performer individually.

Randi Vogel, who sat out last season following her transfer from Tennessee, has a good chance to qualify for NCAA competition in the backstroke. Vogel is a very versatile swimmer, able to score points in the backstroke, IM and nearly all distances in the freestyles.

Annelie Jonsson will be expected to fill a void in the breaststroke. The freshman from Sweden will also contribute in the butterfly, backstroke and the IM. Elyse Perez and Paola Rivas will be looked upon to score points in the distance freestyle events. Both swimmers have a strong chance to score at the BIG EAST Championships.

Senior Akvilina Vaicaityte has blossomed into a versatile swimmer over the last few years, adding the freestyle events to her resume. She will be looked upon for consistent scoring in the backstroke.

Monty Hopkins Head Coach

The University of Cincinnati swimming and diving program has reached national prominence under the tutelage of former Bearcat standout Monty Hopkins. He guides the program into its first season in the competitive BIG EAST Conference.

In his 18th year as head coach of the men's and women's teams, Hopkins has used his wealth of competitive and coaching experience to annually produce conference champions and NCAA qualifiers. Owning a 194-170 dual meet record as the Bearcats' mentor, Hopkins has established himself as one of UC's most successful swim coaches.

Hopkins has coached two NCAA Champions, 15 All-Americans, 12 Academic All-Americans, and five Olympians during his tenure at UC.

His 2004-05 teams had one NCAA qualifier, Ann Degenstein, who narrowly missed All-American honors after finishing 11th and 14th, respectively, in the 100 and 200 butterfly. Four Bearcats earned Academic All-America honors in that season, and the men's and women's programs each finished 10th nationally in combined grade point average.

Hopkins directed the 2003-04 men's and women's teams to fourth-place finishes at the Conference USA Championships. Louise Gowens finished 32nd in the 200 butterfly at the NCAA Championships. UC's women's team was named a 2004 Academic All-American Team by the College Swimming Coaches Association of America.

UC, under Hopkins, claimed two Conference USA Swimmer of the Year awards in 2002-03. Scott Davison qualified for his third consecutive NCAA Championship and was named C-USA Men's Swimmer of the Year after setting a school record in the 500 freestyle with a time of 4:24.82, nearly a full second faster than the old mark. Ann Degenstein was named C-USA Freshman Swimmer of the Year after winning the 200 butterfly, setting a new C-USA record of 2:01.50.

The 2001-02 women's team captured the first-ever Conference USA Championship. For his efforts, Hopkins was named C-USA Coach of the Year. Four swimmers qualified for the NCAA Championships, with Ryan McNally and Maria Oberg each earning All-America honors.

In 2000-01, Hopkins directed the women's team to its fifth-straight National Independent Conference (NIC) title and the men to a second-place finish. The teams combined to take home nine individual conference titles, and three Bearcats participated in the NCAA Championships.

The 1997-98 campaign proved to be one of the most distinguished in the school's history. The men's and women's teams both claimed

conference titles, with the men finishing 23rd at the NCAA Championship and the women 25th.

Hopkins' 1995-96 women's team left its mark when the Bearcats placed 16th at the NCAA Championships. Becky Ruehl became UC's first female national champion in any sport when she captured the 10-meter platform diving competition. She was named NCAA Diver of the Year for her efforts.

Hopkins became head coach at Cincinnati in 1989 after an 11-year club head coaching career, with stints as an assistant coach at Ohio State from 1981-83, Mission Viejo in 1985 and Louisiana State in 1988. He coached several world-class swimmers and national qualifiers, as well as over 40 junior national qualifiers in nine years as a USS head coach at Westerville Aquatic Club (Columbus, Ohio), Texas Aquatics (Ft. Worth, Texas) and perennial national power Lakeside Swim Team (Louisville, Ky.).

During his tenure at Lakeside, Hopkins coached a Pan-Am gold medalist and developed a 1988 Olympian. While at the Westerville Aquatic Club, he also coached the Westerville North High boys' team for two seasons and the girls' team for one year.

Hopkins, 48, was a four-year letterman and an NCAA qualifier for UC, serving as co-captain his senior season. A 1978 graduate of Cincinnati, Hopkins was a recipient of the Jimmy Nippert Award as the top UC male senior athlete. He earned all-state honors at Mariemont High School and was an AAU nationals and Olympic Trials qualifier with the Cincinnati Marlins before coming to UC.

Hopkins and his wife, Celeste, have a son, Daniel, and a daughter, Sarah.

Former UC swimmer Michael Hewitt enters his third year as a full time assistant coach after spending 2002-03 as a volunteer undergraduate assistant for the Bearcats. Hewitt assists head coach Monty Hopkins in every facet of the swimming program.

Hewitt competed in varying distances in the individual medley, breaststroke, freestyle and backstrokes as a Bearcat swimmer from 1998-2002. Hewitt's times were consistently among the top five on the team all four years. He posted the top time on the team as a senior finishing the 200 IM in 1:53.42, good for a top-five finish in the Conference USA Invitational. He was second on the team in the 200 breaststroke (2:06.82), placing fifth in the C-USA, and finished fourth in the 400 IM in a time of 4:02.59. He was also the president of C.P.A.W.S. his senior year.

Originally from the Cincinnati area, Hewitt was a four-year letterwinner at Lakota West High School in West Chester, Ohio. He set five school records while in high school, including individual records in the 100 breast and 200 IM and was a member of the recording holding 400 free, 200 free and 200 medley relay teams.

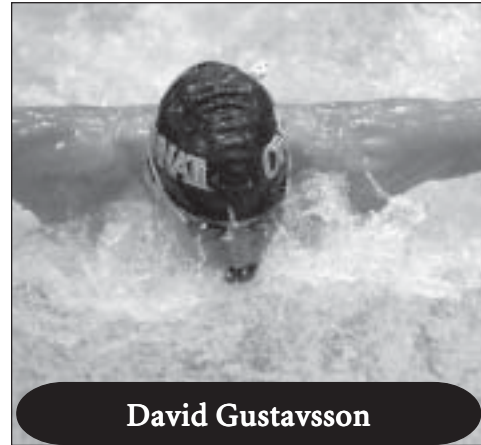

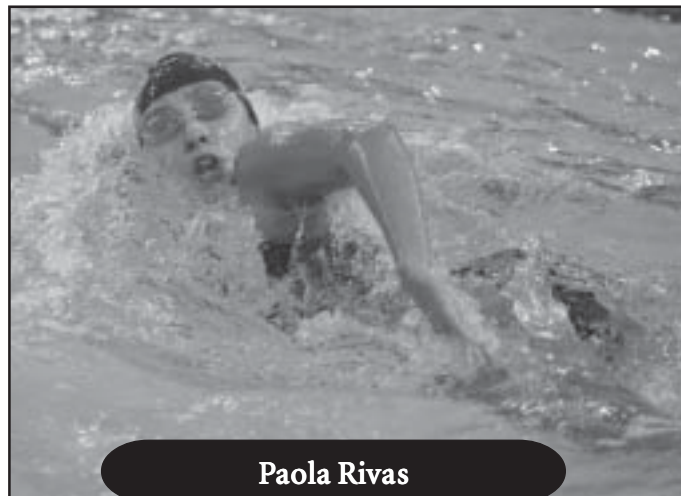

Bearcat Bios

The University of Cincinnati's athletic program takes a giant leap forward this year when the Bearcats begin play in the BIG EAST Conference.

That leap will be particularly evident in soccer, where UC will compete with three-time final four team St. John's. BIG EAST teams have made a total of 58 NCAA College Cup appearances in women's soccer with seven claiming spots in the final four. On the women's side, 57 teams have reached the NCAAs with eight earning final four spots.

With the addition of five new members — Cincinnati, DePaul, Louisville, Marquette and South Florida — there will be a definite emphasis on "Big" as the BIG EAST becomes the largest Division I-A conference in the nation with 16 outstanding academic and athletic institutions. The goal of the BIG EAST has always been to compete at the highest level and to do so with integrity and sportsmanship.

BIG EAST institutions reside in nine of the nation's top 33 largest media markets, including New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Washington, D.C., Tampa, Pittsburgh, Hartford, Milwaukee and Cincinnati. With the incoming members, the BIG EAST markets will contain almost one fourth of all television households in the U.S.

Since opening its doors in 1979, the league has won 25 national championships in six different sports and 123 student-athletes have won individual national titles. Last year the Notre Dame women's soccer team took the 2004 national title and Providence's Kim Smith won the NCAA women's cross country championship.

The BIG EAST has always been able to boast that some of its best students are also some of its best athletes. More

than 300 student-athletes have earned Academic All-America honors.

BIG EAST teams have won two football national championships. Over the last five years, the league boasts the best winning percentage of any BCS conference in postseason play.

While the membership has both increased and changed, the focus of the BIG EAST has not wavered. The conference reflects a tradition of broadbased programs, led by administrators and coaches who place a constant emphasis on academic integrity. The BIG EAST Conference has enjoyed a leadership role nationally. Its studentathletes own significantly high graduation rates and their record of scholastic achievement notably show a balance between intercollegiate athletics and academics.

Any successful organization needs outstanding leadership. Michael Tranghese, the league's first full-time employee, and for 11 years the associate to Dave Gavitt, moved into the Commissioner's chair in 1990. In his first year, he administered the formation of the BIG EAST Football Conference.

The league has long been considered a leader in innovative concepts in promotion and publicity, particularly regarding television. Those efforts have resulted in unparalleled visibility for BIG EAST studentathletes. The conference has enjoyed long-standing relationships with CBS, ESPN, Inc. and ABC.

While BIG EAST basketball games are regular sellouts at campus and major public arenas, including the annual BIG EAST Championship in Madison Square Garden, attendance figures also are significant at BIG EAST soccer, women's basketball and baseball games.

More than 500 BIG EAST athletes have earned All-America recognition and dozens have won individual NCAA national championships. The BIG EAST has been well represented in U.S. or foreign national and Olympic teams. Several athletes earned gold medals in each of the last five summer Olympiads.

The BIG EAST has its headquarters in Providence where the conference administers to more than 5,500 student-athletes in 23 sports.



The BIG EAST continues to thrive in the basketball arena. In 2003-04, Connecticut became the first school in NCAA history to win the men's and women's NCAA titles in the same season. With the Syracuse men and the UConn women grabbing NCAA crowns the previous year, the BIG EAST also became the first conference in NCAA history to win the men's and women's titles in consecutive seasons. In fact, the BIG EAST has won five of the last six women's basketball crowns and three of the last seven men's titles.

Whether it's the student-athletes or the league as a whole, moving proactively has been a consistent strategy for the conference that was formed in 1979. The Big East has continually turned challenges into opportunities to bolster its strength.

The BIG EAST became a reality on May 31, 1979, following a meeting of athletic directors from Providence College, St. John's, Georgetown and Syracuse Universities. Seton Hall, Connecticut and Boston College completed the original sevenschool alliance.

Bearcats Close Successful C-USA Run

The 2004-05 version of the University of Cincinnati swimming & diving teams posted a successful season, its final year as a member of Conference USA, continuing the rich tradition of swimming at UC. Head coach Monty Hopkins led the Bearcat men to nine C-USA event titles in 2004-05 and mentored his second C-USA women's Swimmer of the Year.

The dual meet records were not indicative of the level of success achieved by the 2004-05 Bearcats. Due to the construction of a new on-campus natatorium, the Bearcats were forced to practice at Keating Natatorium. The high school facility does not offer a diving area, and the Bearcats suffered, giving away points in dual meets and championships.

Three Bearcats Named To C-USA All-Decade Team

Two former University of Cincinnati swimmers and one current Bearcat were named to the Conference USA All-Decade team. Maria Oberg, Marien de Jong, and Ann Degenstein each earned a spot on the 10-person squad. Conference USA, celebrating its 10th anniversary during the 2004-05 season named a Team of the Decade for each of the conference's 19 sports.

Oberg, the Conference USA swimmer of the year and C-USA swimmer of the meet in 2002, was a five-time C-USA Champion. She was also a five-time NCAA All-American.

A 2002 NCAA Qualifier in three events, de Jong won three individual Conference USA titles (50, 100 Free & 100 Fly) that season. She set three conference records and led the Bearcats to the 2002 C-USA team championship.

Degenstein is a seven-time C-USA individual event champion. She holds C-USA records in the 100 and 200 yard butterfly and earned C-USA Freshman Swimmer of the Meet honors in 2003 while contributing to the C-USA-champion 400 freestyle relay team.

Bearcats Finish Fourth, Sixth at C-USA

The men's team earned nine event titles on its way to a fourth-place finish at the 2005 Conference USA Invitational. Ann Degenstein won two individual titles in leading the women's team to a sixth-place finish at the C-USA Championships.

The men garnered four relay crowns, setting school records in the 200 and 400 freestyle relays and the 200 and 400 medley relays. David Gustavsson, Enrique Bayata, Marcel Kleiner, and Ryan Yearwood each swam a leg in the relays. Gustavsson also earned the individual championship in the 200 IM. Yearwood and Kleiner won the 50 and 100 freestyle races, respectively. Senior Carlo Piccio captured two titles, winning the 400 IM for the third straight year and grabbing the 1650 freestyle title.

Degenstein captured her third straight 200 butterfly title, while also earning the 500 freestyle crown. She finished second in the 100 butterfly, but set the meet record in preliminary action.

The Bearcat men and women finished fourth at the C-USA Invitational and sixth at the C-USA Championships, respectively. The men set four school records in the relays at the C-USA meet. Ann Degenstein represented the women's team at the NCAA Championships, swimming in the 100 and 200 butterfly.

The Bearcats say goodbye to Conference USA and hello to the deeper BIG EAST in 2005-06, but the program's successful run in C-USA has left a mark on the conference. Eight of the conference's 18 women's swimming event records are currently held by Bearcats.

Bearcats 10th Nationally

In the annual Academic All-American report released by the College Swimming Coaches Association of America, the UC men's (3.18) and women's (3.44) teams each ranked 10th in the nation in team grade point average. Along with the team recognition, four individuals earned Academic All-America honors, including Ann Degenstein, who was named to the first team. David Gustavsson, Ryan Yearwood, and Marcel Kleiner each earned honorable mention recognition. The Bearcat men posted the best team GPA among all BIG EAST schools, topping perennial academic powers Notre Dame and Georgetown. The women were second among BIG EAST programs, trailing only Georgetown.

Fresh Face

Freshman Marcel Kleiner made an immediate impact during the 2004-05 season. Kleiner won the 100 freestyle at the C-USA Invitationals and was part of each of the four school record-setting relay champions. His time of 44.69 ranks third on UC's all-time performance list.

Degenstein Dominates

Junior Ann Degenstein is cementing her name in UC annals as one of its top women's swimmers. Degenstein won her third straight C-USA championship in the 200 butterfly, while also capturing the 500 freestyle title. Prior to the conference championships, she held top 10 times in six different events in C-USA, including the top marks in the 100 and 200 butterfly. Degenstein was named C-USA Swimmer of the Year after earning Freshman Swimmer of the Meet honors at the 2003 C-USA Championships. Degenstein qualified for NCAA Championship competition in three events, swimming in the 100 and 200 butterfly at the national meet. She finished 11th and 14th, respectively and, as the lone UC representative, earned a 33rd-place finish in the NCAA team rankings.

Degenstein earned C-USA Swimmer of the Week honors on Feb. 1, after winning three event crowns in a Jan. 29 dual meet at Kentucky. The accolades continued to roll in as the junior earned C-USA All-Decade honors prior to the C-USA Championships. After the season, Degenstein was named a first team Academic All-American by the CSCAA.

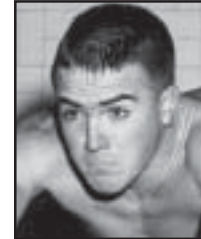
