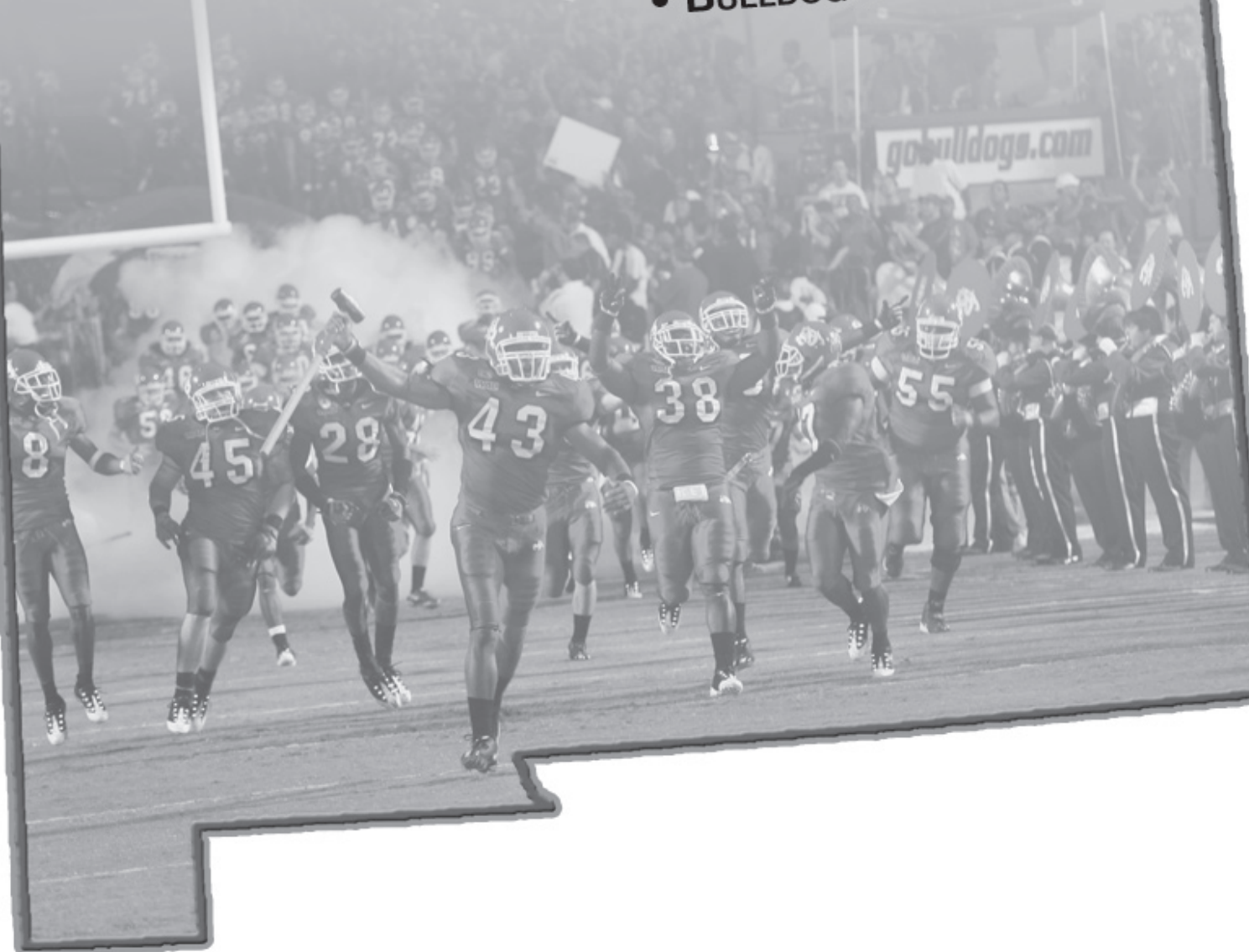

Dogs Earn 22nd Bowl Appearance, Play in New Mexico Bowl

The Bulldogs enter the New Mexico Bowl with a two-game winning streak and have won seven of their last eight games ... Fresno State is making its ninth bowl appearance this decade and 10th in the last 11 seasons under head coach Pat Hill. The Dogs have won four of their last six bowl games ... The Dogs are 11-10 in their bowl games while the Pokes are 5-6 in 11 bowl appearances ... this marks the second straight year Fresno State has opened the college bowl season by playing in the New Mexico Bowl. It's also the third straight year the Dogs have played in Mountain Time Zone bowl game. This is the earliest Fresno State has played in a bowl game since Dec. 18, 1999, the Las Vegas Bowl against Utah ... The Bulldogs own an all-time record of 12-5 in the state, winning in Las Cruces earlier this season ... this marks the third time in school history the Dogs are making a return visit to the same bowl game. They played in four California Bowl games at Bulldog Stadium in Fresno and the first four Silicon Valley Football Classic games (2000-03) ... this is the seventh meeting between Wyoming and Fresno State and the series is tied 3-3. The teams traded home wins as fellow WAC members (1992-97). The Bulldogs won the last meeting, 24-7, in 1997 at Bulldog Stadium ... Wyoming is making its first bowl appearance since 2004 ... there are eight California natives on the Wyoming roster ... head coach Pat Hill is coming off his 100th career victory and has agreed to a contract extension at the school. The details of the agreement will be released after the first of the year ... sophomore defensive end Kenny Borg suffered a knee injury against Illinois and will miss the game. Borg started all 12 regular season games ... Fresno State is making its 68th national television appearance this decade.

Mathews Dominates NCAA in Rushing, Record Books Assault On

Bulldog running back Ryan Mathews continues to prove he's the nation's most exciting and explosive running back. For 10 straight weeks he's led the nation in rushing at 151.3 yards per game. He leads No. 2 Toby Gerhart of Stanford (144.7) by nearly 7 yards per game and nearly 1.2 more yards per carry. He has two of the NCAA's top 15 rushing performances this season. He's powering a Fresno State ground game that ranks seventh in the NCAA in rushing yards. He moved into second place on the Bulldog career rushing yardage list (see page three for updated list) and is the single-season rushing record holder with 1,664 yards. The most impressive part is that he's done it against good competition. His career-high 234 rushing yards against No. 5 Boise State was amazing considering he alone has accounted for 16% of the entire rushing yards the Broncos have allowed this season (1,507) through 12 games. He set a school-record streak of consecutive 100-yard games with nine. He's put up these numbers despite not many fourth quarter carries. In his last seven games combined, he's only had 29 carries in the final quarter, and didn't play in the fourth in either the Hawaii, New Mexico State or Nevada games. He had two carries in the fourth against San Jose State. He's the only back in the nation with 100-yard rushing performances against No. 4 Cincinnati, No. 6 Boise State and No. 14 Wisconsin. He's combined for 484 yards against those three teams, and averaged 6.4 yards per carry.

Harris a Campbell Award Finalist

Senior safety Moses Harris was one of 16 finalists for the National Football Foundation's William V. Campbell Award, also known as the "Academic Heisman". As a finalist, Harris has been awarded an \$18,000 postgraduate scholarship which will allow him to finish his MBA in the Craig School of Business. Harris was honored at the NFF Hall of Fame and Awards Banquet in New York City on Dec. 8 at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel. Florida quarterback Tim Tebow won the award.

Head Coach Pat Hill

All of the credit for the resurgence of Bulldog football can be traced to head coach Pat Hill. Hill took over a declining program and within three years won a championship and guided his team to a bowl game. More importantly, Hill infused academic integrity to the program.

In Hill's third season, the Bulldogs earned a share of a WAC title, made their first bowl appearance since 1993 and produced a league-best six first-team All-WAC players. In addition, Fresno State led the WAC in academic scholars with 14 and produced the school's first Academic All-American. That was just a start. Since then, Fresno State's NCAA Academic Progress Rate ranks in the top 10 percent of all Division I FBS public schools and is the 8th-highest of all schools in the west.

Under his direction, Fresno State built a new football practice facility that rivals any NFL franchise. One of the most visible signs of improvement has been in the Duncan Building training room, offices and locker room, which was modified providing all student-athletes with a state of the art complex.

Fresno State's has been in bowl games in nine of the last 10 seasons, one of the most consistent bowl participants in the West. He has done it playing one of the most aggressive non-conference schedules in the nation.

Since coming to Fresno State, Hill has continued his reputation as an outstanding recruiter. His first recruiting class produced four NFL draft choices – including the No. 1 overall pick David Carr – and four other players who signed NFL free agent contracts. In all, 23 of Hill's players have been drafted into the NFL.

He has the fourth-most wins of any coach in the history of the Western Athletic Conference, and only one WAC coach – BYU's LaVell Edwards has more.

BCS Wins

Fresno State's 15 wins against schools in BCS conferences since the 2000 season are the most in the nation (tied with Utah). Here are few nuggets about Fresno State vs. the BCS.

- *Fresno State has won five of the last seven games against teams from BCS conferences (Kansas State, Georgia Tech, Rutgers, UCLA and Illinois). The loss were to No. 10 Wisconsin 13-10 in 2008 and a double-overtime loss to the Badgers earlier this season.*
- *After losing the first nine games against BCS schools under Hill, Fresno State is 15-15 in the last 30 games against BCS conference schools. Only five of those games have been played at Bulldog Stadium.*
- *Fresno State is 4-1 against BCS conference teams in bowl games under Hill.*
- *Of the last 14 losses to BCS Conference foes, 10 of those teams were ranked in the Top 25, three in the Top Five (1. USC, 1. Oklahoma, 5. LSU), one Top 10 (10. Wisconsin). Another, Cincinnati, was ranked No. 14 when they played and is currently ranked No. 4.*

Season To Date..

• Fresno State had two players named to the ESPN the Magazine Academic All-America teams, junior guard Anderw Jackson was a first-team selection and senior punter Robert Malone was second team. Jackson, one of five juniors to make the squad, is the first Bulldog ever to be named first team Academic All-America and the first from the Western Athletic Conference since the 2002 season. Penn State was the only school in the nation with more Academic All-Americans than Fresno State.

• Moses Harris was selected as a finalist for the 2009 National Football Foundation Campbell Award, also known as the Academic Heisman Trophy. As a finalist, Moses has been awarded an \$18,000 postgraduate scholarship. Moses is the second Bulldog to win such a prestigious honor, joining 2001 winner Vernon Fox. Fresno State has produced more NFF Scholar-Athlete Award winners this decade than the four California Pac-10 schools (Cal, Stanford, UCLA and USC) have combined.

• Three seniors, Seyi Ajirotutu, Robert Malone and Lonyae Miller, have been selected to play in the 2010 East-West Shrine Game in Orlando, Fla. The game will be played Jan. 23 and televised live on ESPN2.

• In all 10 Bulldogs were named to the All-WAC first or second team honors, of those seven are underclassmen. Earning first team honors were: RB Ryan Mathews, RG Andrew Jackson, P Robert Malone, K Kevin Goessling, DE Chris Carter and LB Ben Jacobs. Those on the second team were: WR Seyi Ajirotutu, RT Kenny Wiggins, FS Lorne Bell, and SS Moses Harris. Malone, Ajirotutu and Harris are the only senior Bulldogs in the group.

• Ryan Mathews enters the bowl season leading the NCAA in rushing yards. He's looking to become the first player in school history to ever accomplish that feat.

Fresno State Honor Roll

14 Dogs Earn Academic All-WAC

Fresno State once again led the WAC with the most Academic All-WAC selections as a record 14 players made the team. Since Hill became head coach, Fresno State has produced a total of 123 Academic All-WAC selections, more than any other program in the WAC. Prior to his arrival, Fresno State had just nine academic All-WAC selections. Here are the 2008 Academic All-WAC student-athletes: Tom Brandstater, Kevin Goessling, Anthony Harding, Bryce Harris, Moses Harris, Zak Hill, Andrew Jackson, Ben Jacobs, Drew Lubinsky, Robert Malone, Darren Newborn, Vince Pascoe, Shawn Plummer, and Bobby Shepard. Twelve of the 14 members of the team are back for the 2009 season.

Leading the Academic All-WAC Pack

Since the hiring of Hill, the Bulldogs lead the WAC with 123 Academic All-WAC selections. Prior to Hill's hiring, Fresno had just nine academic All-WAC student-athletes. Here's what's happened this decade.

The WAC Standard for Academic Excellence

Fresno State has produced more Academic All-WAC players (123) in the last 12 years (Pat Hill era) than former WAC charter members Utah, Wyoming, New Mexico and Colorado State did during their membership years (1962-99). With five more Academic All-WAC selections, Fresno State will have more in just Hill's tenure than any school in the 47-year history of the WAC.

APR Ranking

Fresno State's Academic Progress Rate (APR) score ranks among the best in the nation. Compared to Division I football programs in the Western U.S., the Dogs have the fourth-highest score among public institutions. The Patch

This season 36 Bulldogs will be wearing **Academic Achiever** patches on their jerseys. Student-athletes earn a patch by either posting a 3.0 GPA or higher last year or by setting a new GPA personal record for the year.

Hill: A Rock of Stability

Pat Hill has the longest coaching tenure of any WAC coach, with six full seasons more at Fresno State than Chris Ault at Nevada. After that, no other current WAC coach has been in his position for more than four consecutive years. Since Hill got his first head coaching job at Fresno State in 1997, there have been 17 WAC head coaching changes. Of coaches in the West, none have been at the same school longer. As a comparison, no coach in the Big 12 Conference has been there longer than Hill's been at Fresno State. Three different coaches have been at Stanford in the time Hill's been at Fresno State. Dennis Franchione, a former WAC coaching opponent of Hills', coached at two other schools - Alabama and Texas A&M - and its now out of coaching since the two coaches last met as WAC foes. The same for Dennis Erickson, who held coaching jobs with the San Francisco 49ers, Idaho and Arizona State, since he last brought a team to Fresno while at Oregon State in 2002.

Who's Watching?

During this decade, the Bulldogs have made 67 national television appearances, and with each game averaging over three hours, that equates to approximately 200 hours of live nation-wide exposure for the school and the Valley. Fresno State has become a favorite of ESPN, landing on one of the networks' channels (ABC, ESPN, ESPN2 or ESPNU) 52 times.

Fresno State Facts

Bulldog Stadium at Jim Sweeney Field

Since taking over Bulldog Stadium in 1980, Fresno State has one of the best home records in college football. One of the most beautiful stadiums in the Western Athletic Conference, Bulldog Stadium underwent a two-phase expansion project in 1991, increasing seating by 10,000 – to a capacity of 41,031 – and adding 22 sky suites. Jim Sweeney was Fresno State's head coach (1976-77, 1980-96) who won eight conference championships, five bowl game titles and guided the Bulldogs to a 143-75-3 record and won 200 games as a college coach, 16th most in NCAA history.

Academic Gameplan

Since Pat Hill took over the Fresno State program, the Bulldogs have become national leaders in academic success. One of Hill's first tasks was hiring John Baxter as associate head coach. Baxter's trademarked Academic Gameplan is a proven winner across the nation. In the third year of Academic Gameplan, the football program produced a WAC-best 14 scholar-athletes, the school's first Academic All-American and the number of honored athletes at the annual Kiwanis Torch of Excellence dinner grew from four to 33. The team's GPA was raised from 2.12 to 2.77 in three seasons. Academic Gameplan has been featured in many publications, including the Dec. 20, 1999, issue of *Sports Illustrated*. Academic Gameplan is used by Oregon, Washington State, Southern Miss and Notre Dame. Since 1997, the Bulldogs have produced 123 Academic All-WAC performers, more than any team in the league during that period. Fresno State's Academic Progress Rate (APR) of 948 is the 8th-highest among schools in the west. Only Stanford, Cal and USC had better scores among California schools.

"V" is for Valley

Fresno State prides itself on being the "Valley's team." This pride can be seen in the form of a large green V on the back of the Bulldog helmets as a symbol to the agricultural community of Central Valley of California. The San Joaquin Valley is the world's richest agricultural valley in export dollars.

The Bulldog Foundation

This volunteer organization raises over \$8 million annually for the Fresno State Athletics Department. The monies raised by the BDF Annual Fund go towards scholarships.

Fresno State Identification

The official name of the school is California State University, Fresno. For athletics department purposes, the University prefers to be called simply **Fresno State** – never Fresno State University and never shorten to Fresno. For graphics or abbreviations, we ask that you please use **FS** – not FSU, CSUF or Fresno.

Other acceptable abbreviation: Fresno St.

Fresno State Best at Blocking Kicks

It's no surprise that Fresno State's kick-blocking prowess is the best in the nation over the last eight seasons. The Dogs lead Texas by seven blocked kicks for most in the nation since the 2002 season. Ben Jacobs leads the team with four blocked kicks, while Andrew Jackson has three and Moses Harris two, respectively.

The Bulldogs have thrust themselves into the nation's elite in blocking punts and kicks since Pat Hill took over in 1997. With blocks in three games, a field goal by Andrew Jackson vs. Hawaii, a punt by Antyhony Harding against San Jose State, and a FG by Kenny Wiggins, the Dogs have accumulated 83 blocked kicks in the Pat Hill era. That's an average of one block every other game. Here is a breakdown of Fresno State's kick blocking prowess since 1997:

"Can't Ice the Goose"

Those were the words Pat Hill said after Fresno State's All-WAC sophomore kicker Kevin Goessling made his second "make or lose" field goal of his young career earlier this season in a 30-28 win over Louisiana Tech as time expired. Goessling made a school-record 58-yard field goal at Utah State as time expired in a 2008 game. In both cases, the opposing coaches call timeouts to try to "ice" Goessling. Goessling enters the bowl game with a school record streak of 15 consecutive field goals made, converting of 15 of his 16 attempts this season and has made all 51 of his PAT attempts. He ranks 16th in the nation among active kickers for best field goal percentage (30-38, .790).

Fresno State – "Quarterback University"

The Bulldogs currently have three quarterbacks in the NFL and is one of two schools (USC is the other) to have had two quarterbacks taken in the top 10 picks of the NFL draft since 1990. Here are some other QB University Notes (since 1990):

- Three of Pat Hill's two starting quarterbacks are in the NFL (Billy Volek, David Carr, Tom Brandstater). Paul Pinegar, signed a free agent contract with Jacksonville.
- Three of Pat Hill's senior starting quarterbacks were selected first-team All-WAC: Billy Volek in 1999, David Carr in 2001 and Paul Pinegar in 2005.
- Fresno State is one of four schools (Washington State, Tennessee and USC are the others) to have one quarterback taken as the No. 1 overall pick in the NFL Draft and another selected in the top 10.
- Fresno State is one of six schools (Tennessee, Washington State, Oregon, USC and Houston are the others) to have two QB's selected among the top 10 NFL Draft picks.
- Fresno State's Trent Dilfer was the first top 10 drafted quarterback since 1990 to win a Super Bowl.
- There have been 21 quarterbacks taken in the top 10 picks of the NFL Draft since 1990, and Fresno State has produced two of them.
- Of the last five quarterbacks taken as NFL No. 1 overall pick, only Fresno State's David Carr started the first game of his rookie season.
- Fresno State is one of five schools to produce two quarterbacks (Kevin Sweeney and Paul Pinegar) who threw for more than 10,000 career passing yards. Here are the others: Louisiana Tech (Luke McCown & Tim Rattay); Marshall (Bryon Leftwich & Chad Pennington); USC (Carson Palmer & Matt Leinart); and Hawaii (Timmy Chang and Colt Brennan).
- Since 1982, a Bulldog quarterback has been selected first-team all-conference nine times: Jeff Tedford, Kevin Sweeney [twice], Mark Barstotti, Trent Dilfer [twice], Billy Volek, David Carr, Paul Pinegar. Of those, five (Tedford, Sweeney, Barsotti, Dilfer and Carr) were the conference offensive players of the year.

Hill and the NFL

Pat Hill's experience in the NFL has been a staple of Fresno State's continued success of sending players to the professional ranks. Hill gained fame as one of the top personnel evaluators in the NFL during his five-year tenure with the Cleveland Browns and Baltimore Ravens. Hill's NFL experience is chronicled below:

- Recruited and coached 2002 NFL No. 1 Draft Pick David Carr and 2005 first-round pick Logan Mankins.
- Three of Hill's three senior starting quarterbacks are in the NFL (Carr, **Billy Volek**, San Diego Chargers and **Tom Brandstater**, Denver Broncos).
- Has produced **39** NFL players and 23 NFL draft picks, both figures are best in the WAC.
- 29 former Bulldogs were on NFL rosters in 2009.
- Former Hill assistants with time in the NFL include: Oakland Raiders head coach Lane Kiffin; Cincinnati Bengals assistant Kevin Coyle, Cleveland Browns assistant Cory Undlin, Oakland Raiders assistant Kelly Skipper, Houston Texans assistant coach Jethro Franklin and NY Jets assistant coach Kerry Locklin.

'Dog Bones (Team Notes and Trends)

- Fresno State has produced a 1,000-yard rusher in 12 of the last 15 seasons.
- Under Hill, Fresno State is 11-2 in WAC openers. Six of the Bulldogs' last seven conference lid-lifters have come on the road.
- FS has thrown 287 touchdowns and 131 interceptions since Pat Hill became head coach.
- The Bulldogs have not been shutout in the last 169 home games dating back to Oct. 25, 1980, vs. Utah State (14-0).
- FS is 52-15 under Pat Hill when the Bulldogs throw more touchdown passes than their opponents.
- FS is 66-7 under Pat Hill when the Fresno State has less turnovers than their opponents.
- Fresno State is +45 in turnover margin since Pat Hill became head coach.
- Fresno State has produced 18 first-team All-WAC defensive players over the last seven seasons, including juniors Chris Carter and Ben Jacobs in 2009.
- The Bulldogs have led the WAC in scoring in four of the last 12 years, including a nation's best 40.5 average in 1992. The 'Dogs averaged 40.2 points per game in 2004, which ranked fifth in the nation in scoring offense.
- FS has produced three quarterbacks (Trent Dilfer, Billy Volek and David Carr) who set NCAA records in the last 10 years. All have been starters in the NFL, Dilfer most recently with the San Francisco 49ers, Volek with the San Diego Chargers and Carr with the New York Giants.
- Three of Pat Hill's four starting quarterbacks (Billy Volek, David Carr and Paul Pinegar) were selected first-team All-WAC by the end of their career and all four (including Tom Brandstater) advanced to the NFL.
- FS has produced three first-team All-WAC punters (Robert Malone, 2009; Jason Simpson, 2001; Jeff Roberts, 1998) since 1998.
- FS has produced three WAC Defensive Players of the Year since 2001 (Alan Harper 2001, Garrett McIntyre 2005 and Marcus Riley 2007)
- The Bulldogs have dominated the All-WAC kicking awards recently with four first-team all-league picks (, Kevin Goessling, 2009; Asen Asparuhov, 2001 and 2002; Jeff Hanna, 1999) and one second team All-WAC selection (Brett Visintainer, 2003) since 1999.
- Fresno State is 60-14 in its last 74 games when the starting running back scores a touchdown.
- The Bulldogs are 43-16 in their last 59 games when scoring first. The Bulldogs have won 21 of their last 30 games when scoring first.
- Pat Hill's 100 victories as head coach of Fresno State ranks second all-time in program history. Only Jim Sweeney, 143 wins, has more.
- The Bulldogs have blocked a kick eight of 13 season openers under Pat Hill, including in 2009 vs. UC Davis. The Dogs have 83 in the Pat Hill era.
- The Dogs own 15 wins over schools from BCS conferences this decade, tied with Utah for most of any non-BCS school.
- 18 of the last 28 Bulldog games have been nationally televised.
- Fresno State is 19-4 in games when Ryan Mathews scores a touchdown, having won 19 of the last 21 (the Boise State loss snapped a 13-win streak).
- Under Hill, Fresno State has produced five of the WAC's Top 10 career sack producers: Garrett McIntyre (23.5), Nick Burley (22), Tyler Clutts (21.5), Alan Harper (18), Bryce McGill (17).
- The Dogs were picked third in the 2009 WAC preseason coaches and media polls.
- The Dogs travel 23,354 miles in 2009 regular season, more than another other mainland school. Fresno State played in five of six U.S. Time Zones this season. The only time missing is Alaska, which doesn't have any schools with college football programs.
- Fresno State ranks 10th in the nation in net punting, 38.7 yards per punt. Senior Robert Malone is averaging 44.5 yards per punt, which would rank eighth nationally if he had enough attempts.

The Wyoming Cowboy Football program gained a dynamic and innovative new leader on Dec. 1, 2008, as University of Wyoming Athletics Director Tom Burman announced that Dave Christensen, Assistant Head Coach and Offensive Coordinator at Missouri since 2001, had been selected as the new head coach of the Cowboys. He becomes the 31st coach in Wyoming Football history.

Christensen was named the 2007 National Offensive Coordinator of the Year by Rivals.com and was also runner-up for the 2007 Frank Broyles Award, which honors the top assistant coach in the nation each season.

He helped lead the Missouri Tigers to the Big 12 Championship game in both the 2007 and 2008 seasons as champions of the Big 12 North.

In 2008, Mizzou ranked No. 4 in the NCAA in passing offense (330.4 yards per game), No. 6 in scoring offense (42.2 points per game) and No. 8 in total offense (484.1 yards per game). The Tigers concluded the 2008 season ranked No. 16 in the final USA Today Coaches' Poll, No. 19 in the final Associated Press Media Poll and were No. 21 in the final BCS Rankings entering the college bowl season. Missouri defeated Northwestern, 30-23, in the 2008 Valero Alamo Bowl.

The 2007 season saw Missouri conclude the season ranked No. 4 in the final Associated Press ranking. That was the highest season-ending ranking in school history for the Tigers.

STRONG FINISH EARNS DOGS 10TH BOWL APPEARANCE UNDER PAT HILL

Despite fielding one of the youngest teams he's had in many years, Fresno State head coach Pat Hill led his team to seven wins over its final eight games and locked-up a bowl invitation for the 10th time in his 13 seasons as a head coach.

The Bulldogs will play Wyoming in the New Mexico Bowl, Fresno State's third straight appearance in a bowl and the 10th in the last 11 years.

Hill and his troops overcame a rough start, winning just one of their first four games which at the time was rated the most difficult schedule in the nation. That schedule led to three straight tough losses to teams ranked in the top 25, Wisconsin (37-34 2OT), Boise State (51-34) and Cincinnati (28-20) in consecutive games. Two of those teams went on to be undefeated and earned BCS bowl appearances, and all three teams were ranked in the final BCS standings.

Hill found out a lot about his team's character when coming off those three losses, the Dogs faced their longest road trip of the season, at Hawaii, where they don't win very often. The Bulldogs rolled to a 42-3 lead after three quarters and had one of the dominating wins ever in Honolulu.

That win began a dominating WAC five-game winning streak, in which Fresno State's offense emerged as one of the most productive in the nation.

Led by NCAA rushing leader Ryan Mathews and quarterback Ryan Colburn, who rose from 61st in the NCAA in passing efficiency after four games into the top 10 late in the year, the Bulldog offense scored 30 points or more in 10 of 12 games, and put up 50 twice with a season-high 53 at Illinois in the season finale. The Dogs were ranked in the top five in the nation in rushing, top 10 in total offense and top 20 in scoring.

Fresno State finished the regular season with an 8-4 record, 6-2 in the WAC for third place. Along the way,

there were several accomplishments by members of the team.

Mathews was a strong candidate for the Heisman Trophy and Doak Walker Award as the nation's best running back. Kicker Kevin Goessling was a semifinalist for the Lou Groza Award.

From an Academic standpoint, Fresno State had its most successful year ever. Junior guard Andrew Jackson became the first Bulldog to earn first team Academic All-America honors, and senior punter Robert Malone was a second-team Academic All-American. Penn State was the only school in the country with more Academic All-Americans than Fresno State. In all, Fresno State had five players named to the Academic All-District team, more than any other school.

Senior safety Moses Harris was selected a finalist for the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame William V. Campbell Award, also known as the Academic Heisman. Harris is the second Bulldog in this decade to be selected a finalist, giving Fresno State more than the four California Pac-10 schools (Cal, Stanford, UCLA, USC) have combined.

On the field, the Bulldogs placed six players on the All-WAC first team, five of them juniors or sophomores.

The lone senior on the team was punter Robert Malone. Joining Malone was Goessling, who enters the bowl game with a school record 15 consecutive field goals made, Jackson and Mathews. On defense, juniors Chris Carter (end) and leading tackler Ben Jacobs, a linebacker, were selected to the first team.

Harris and fellow safety Lorne Bell, a junior, were second-team All-WAC selections on defense. On offense, senior receiver Seyi Ajitotutu and junior tackle Kenny Wiggins were named to the second team.

FRESNO, CALIF. - In an electric and energizing season opener, seven different Bulldogs scored touchdowns as Fresno State smothered the visiting UC Davis Aggies 51-0 on Saturday night before a packed house surrounding Jim Sweeney Field.

Junior Ryan Colburn made his debut as Fresno State's starting quarterback and scored the night's first touchdown on a 1-yard dive for an early 7-0 lead.

Another junior, running back Ryan Mathews, scampered for a 60-yard dash later in the first quarter to put the Dogs in control of the non-conference contest and never looked back. Mathews led the Dogs with 106 yards rushing on 11 carries for an average of 9.6 per touch.

In a night of an array of firsts, linebacker Nico Herron snatched a Greg Denham pass early in the second quarter and sprinted 94 yards to the south endzone for his first touchdown at any level as the defense showcased a rejuvenating and unrelenting presence before 37,267 loud fans.

Colburn highlighted the air attack by zipping a 92-yard strike to Marlon Moore with 4:05 left before the break.

Head coach Pat Hill used all three of his talented quarterbacks. Redshirt freshman Ebahn Feathers effectively directed a late first half drive that ended with Feathers running to the left pylon for a 20-yard score to put the Bulldogs up 35-0 at halftime.

Colburn finished his evening with 161 passing yards and played only one series in the second half to pave the way for Feathers and true freshman quarterback Derek Carr to shared time under center during the second session. Both of them calmly managed Hill's run-focused approach for the game that allowed for six different halfbacks to touch the ball.

Even with strong depth in the backfield, true freshman running back Robbie Rouse made himself a household name as a shifty and nearly impossible to tackle game-changer. He danced and juked his way to 75 yards on 10 carries and scored on a 5-yard carry, his first Fresno State touchdown, as one of the two Bulldog rushing scores in the third quarter. The other came when senior tailback Lonyae Miller plowed in from three yards off the goaline.

The scoring ended when freshman Tris Okpalaugo recorded a safety in the fourth quarter to cement the 51-0 victory.

The Bulldogs amassed 511 yards of total offense, including 310 on the ground to win their season opener, which also marked the first meeting between Fresno State and UC Davis since 1952, before starting a tough span where they face the Big Ten's Wisconsin, nationally ranked Boise State and the Big East's Cincinnati.

Junior Loren Bell led the Bulldog defense with seven tackles, including a monster hit which was one of his four solo tackles. Also highlighting the stifling defensive showcase were fellow linebackers Ben Jacobs and Nico Herron, who recorded six and five tackles, respectively.

Fresno State posted its first shutout since a 30-0 victory over San Jose State on Oct. 20, 2007, and it was the Aggies' most lopsided defeat since a 54-0 loss to Cal in 1934. The last time the Aggies were shutout was in 1990.

UC Davis quarterback Greg Denham finished 18 of 41 for 188 yards and an interception. The Aggies managed just 43 rushing yards on 20 attempts.

This is the sixth consecutive year the Bulldogs opened the season 1-0.

MADISON, WIS. - Every year the Fresno State football team and the Wisconsin Badgers meet it is always an entertaining football game. Saturday afternoon, in front of a sell out crowd of 80,353 fans at Camp Randall Stadium, was no different. Despite a strong effort by the Bulldogs, the Badgers pulled out a 34-31 double overtime victory.

Ryan Colburn passed for 289 yards and four touchdowns and Devon Wylie caught five passes for 114 yards and one touchdown, a 70 yard reception on the first play of the second quarter.

The Bulldogs racked up 468 yards of total offense and Ryan Mathews rushed for 107 yards on 19 carries. Ben Jacobs led Fresno State defensively with 15 tackles and one tackle for loss.

The 'Dogs jumped out to a 14-0 lead after Colburn hit Chastin West for a 13-yard touchdown pass and Wylie for the 70-yarder. The Badgers cut the Bulldog lead to 14-7 with 11:35 left in the second quarter. Seyi Ajirofutu then caught a 14-yard pass from Colburn to extend the lead to 21-7 with 7:01 to play in the half.

The Badgers came within four points at halftime at 21-17 after Philip Welch connected on a 57-yard field goal as time expired.

Wisconsin took a 24-21 lead with 5:45 to play in the game on a John Clay 72-yard run on the first play of the possession. The Bulldogs battled back and Kevin Goessling sent the game into overtime on a 41-yard field goal with 16 seconds left in regulation.

Wisconsin safety Chris Maragos came up with an interception in the second overtime, and Philip Welch kicked a 22-yard field goal to give the Badgers the win.

Scott Tolzien threw a 6-yard touchdown to Nick Toon to take the lead on the Badgers' first overtime possession. But Fresno State quarterback Colburn hit Ajirofutu in the back of the end zone to force a second overtime.

Maragos then picked off Colburn in the end zone, and the Badgers drove for the decisive field goal.

GAME 3 • SEPT. 18, 2009

FRESNO, CALIF. - Junior Ryan Mathews sprinted for another breakout night with 234 rushing yards, the third highest single-game mark in school history, and three touchdowns of more than 60 yards in Fresno State's high-scoring battle with No. 10 Boise State that ended in a 51-34 defeat for the home team on Friday night.

The entertaining evening of explosive plays turned into a truly wild WAC shootout.

The nationally-ranked Broncos, only the third Top 10 school to play in Bulldog Stadium, jumped out to an early 24-3 midway through the second quarter, highlighted by an early 30-yard Winston Venable interception return for a touchdown and a 60-yard DJ Harper scamper.

But the Bulldogs, in front of a strong sea of white in Fresno State's first football "Wear White Night," relied on their powerful running game and talented offensive weapons to cut the deficit to 24-17 at halftime after Mathews recorded a pair of 60-plus yard runs to quickly jumpstart the Dogs' comeback bid.

Fresno State climbed back within a field goal with 11:39 left in the third quarter when the lightning-quick Devon Wylie grabbed a 21-yard touchdown pass from junior quarterback Ryan Colburn in the corner of the endzone to cut Boise State's lead to 27-24.

But the Broncos highlight reel plays proved to be too much to overcome.

Boise State's Jeremy Avery led his Broncos with 186 yards, with the longest coming on a 74-yard dash that Fresno State's A.J. Jefferson jarred loose at the goal line. The ball bounced straight into the hands of a trailing Titus Young for a critical Boise State score on a two-play drive immediately following the Wylie touchdown.

Mathews added his third touchdown just over a minute and a half into the fourth quarter on a 68-yard run to keep the Bulldogs fighting late in the game to climb back within a possession at 41-34.

Avery then answered with a 67-yard screen pass that restored Boise State's 14-point lead early in the fourth quarter and ended the Bulldogs valiant threat on a 69-yard run that set up a field goal. Avery finished with 186 yards on 11 carries, with 83 more yards receiving.

Colburn finished the night with 187 passing yards and converted two key fourth down conversions.

Bulldog safety Moses Harris led the Bulldog defense with 9 tackles, followed by A.J. Jefferson's eight tackles with six of them unassisted and one for a two-yard loss.

CINCINNATI - The Fresno State football team wanted to keep one of the nations leading offenses off the field. The strategy nearly was successful as the Fresno State offense was on the football field for 43:42 compared to 16:18 for No. 14 Cincinnati (4-0). Despite the time of possession difference the Bearcats still pulled out a 28-20 victory on Saturday afternoon at Nippert Stadium.

Ryan Mathews carried the ball a career-high 38 times for 145 yards, topping the 100-yard mark for the fourth straight game. He was the Bowl Subdivision's leading rusher coming in, averaging 149 yards per game. His ability to find holes behind 270-pound fullback Reynard Camp kept Cincinnati on the defensive all game.

Fresno State had the fourth-best running game in the nation, and showed it wouldn't be pushed around by churning out a 17-play drive that took more than eight minutes in the second quarter. Ryan Colburn's 21-yard touchdown pass to Jamel Hamler - uncovered in the middle of the field - cut it to 21-17 with 7 seconds left before halftime.

The Bulldogs had 443 yards of total offense to 357 for Cincinnati. Fresno State grounded out 290 yards on the ground. Colburn passed for 153 yards, one touchdown and had one interception.

The Bulldogs had a chance to take the lead in the third quarter as they had the ball on the Cincinnati six-yard line but on a fourth-and-two from the Bearcat six-yardline, quarterback Ryan Colburn was intercepted, ending a 14 play. 59 yard and 7:34 drive.

Cincinnati's offense had the ball for only one minute in the third quarter - a three-and-out drive that put the whole burden on the defense. Linebacker Craig Carey's first career interception on Fresno State's pivotal fourth-down pass helped the Bearcats improve to 25-0 under coach Brian Kelly when they open the fourth quarter with a lead.

Mardy Gilyard also caught an 11-yard touchdown pass in another career day. The senior receiver and returner had nine catches for a career-best 177 yards, giving him eight touchdowns in four games.

The Bearcats' no-huddle offense needed only 2:12, 1:43, 2:53 and 1:45 to zip down the field for its touchdowns, giving the defense little rest. The game was in the hands of that tired crew after Fresno State got the ball back at its 7-yard line following a punt with 3:55 to go.

Fresno State had one last shot to tie the game as they drove to the Cincinnati 38-yard line thanks to a Lonyae Miller 33-yard run. But the hopes for an upset victory ended when Colburn's fourth-down pass from the Cincinnati 37 was broken up by safety Aaron Webster with 39 seconds left, clinching it.

HONOLULU - Ryan Mathews, one of the nation's leading running backs, rushed for 149 yards and scored a touchdown as Fresno State beat Hawaii 42-17 in a rainy rout Saturday in Aloha Stadium.

It was the second win in the last three games at Aloha Stadium for the Bulldogs, who have not had much success against Hawaii in Honolulu. It was just the third win since 1965.

The Bulldogs scored the first 21 points of the game before UH answered with a field goal. The Dogs added 21 more points to take a 42-3 lead into the fourth quarter. It was one of the worst WAC home losses for the Warriors in recent history.

Fresno State quarterback Ryan Colburn threw two touchdown passes and completed 12 of 14 pass attempts for 120 yards for the Bulldogs (2-3, 1-1 Western Athletic Conference). Mathews entered the game averaging 148 running yards a contest, the second-most in the nation. He exceeded his average by one yard.

Hawaii (2-3, 0-2) broke its seven-quarter streak without a touchdown when Jon Medeiros recovered Greg Salas' fumble in the end zone in the fourth quarter.

Third-string quarterback Bryant Moniz, making his first career start after Greg Alexander suffered a season-ending knee injury in the Warriors' previous game, threw for 283 yards and two touchdowns.

FRESNO, CALIF- Ryan Mathews ran for 233 yards and one touchdown while Ryan Colburn threw two touchdown passes as Fresno State defeated San Jose State 41-21 on Saturday night in front of a crowd of 35,495 fans at Bulldog Stadium on Homecoming Night.

Mathews' night, which ended after three quarters, included a 59-yard touchdown that highlighted the Bulldogs' 24-point second quarter. It was the junior's sixth straight game with 100 or more yards., setting a new school record. The previous record was held by Wendell Mathis in 2005 with five straight 100 yard games.

Senior running back Lonyae Miller contributed 49 yards on seven carries and freshman Robbie Rouse added 32 yards on seven carries. As a whole, Fresno State gained 302 yards on the ground on 43 carries.

The Bulldogs were also efficient through the air. Colburn completed 7-of-12 passes for 117 yards, two touchdowns and no interceptions. Senior wideout Seyi Ajitotutu led Fresno State with four receptions for 61 yards on the night. Fellow Bulldog receiver Marlon Moore caught two passes for 27 yards, both of which were touchdowns.

Sophomore kicker Kevin Goessling was perfect on the night with two field goals of 40 yards or more (40, 46) and 5-for-5 on PATs.

Fresno State (3-3, 2-1 Western Athletic Conference) scored 34 unanswered points after San Jose State (1-5, 0-2) took an early 14-7 lead. The Bulldogs tied the game at 14 on a Rouse three-yard run and took the lead for good on a Moore 23-yard reception 5:21 left in the first half. The Bulldogs led 31-14 at halftime. The 31 points was the second most points scored in the first half this season. The Dogs scored 35 in the season opener against UC Davis.

Defensively the Bulldogs bottled up the Spartans top receiver Kevin Jurovich, limiting him to just one catch on the night for 13 yards.

Lamon Muldrow had 73 rushing yards for the Spartans, and quarterback Jordan La Secla completed 17 of 27 passes for 143 yards and a touchdown.

Bolstered by a strong ground game, Colburn completed 7 of 12 passes for 117 yards before giving way to backups Ebahn Feathers and Derek Carr.

FRESNO, CALIF- Ryan Mathews rushed for 185 yards, including a 10-yard touchdown with 4:53 remaining, to lead Fresno State to a 31-27 victory over Utah State Saturday afternoon at Bulldog Stadium.

After being limited to six carries for 40 yards through two quarters, Mathews exploded for 145 yards on 17 carries in the second half. Mathews, the nation's leading rusher, had two rushing touchdowns in the game, and quarterback Ryan Colburn added 256 passing yards and a touchdown as Fresno State (5-3, 4-1 Western Athletic Conference) overcame a 10-point half-time deficit.

Bulldog receiver Seyi Ajitotutu eclipsed the century mark with seven catches for 124 yards and a touchdown.

Fresno State defensive end Chris Carter led the defense with a season-high 10 tackles, 3.5 of which were for a loss. Bulldog Logan Harrell dropped Aggie quarterback Diondre Borel for a five-yard loss for the only sack of the game.

Kicker Kevin Goessling extended his streak of consecutive field goals without a miss to 10, with a 50-yard field goal in the second quarter.

Borel threw for 240 yards and rushed for 105 for Utah State (2-6, 1-3), which went scoreless in the second half.

Fresno State led 14-10 after the first quarter thanks to a Mathews nine yard run and an Ajitotutu 18-yard pass from Colburn with 4:21 to play in the first. Utah State then scored 17 second quarter points to lead 27-17 at halftime.

The Bulldog defense then held the Aggies scoreless in the second half as Mathews scored the go-ahead touchdown with 4:53 to play in the game to give Fresno State the victory.

MOSCOW, IDAHO - It only took nine seconds to make it apparent it would be a special night, as Fresno State running back Ryan Mathews busted free for the longest run of his career, a 77-yard touchdown on the first play from scrimmage. The play set the tone for the night as he led the Bulldogs to a 31-21 win over Idaho on Saturday in Moscow, Idaho.

Mathews ended the night with 143 yards, to give him his seventh-straight performance of 140 yards or more on the ground. He remained the leading rusher in the NCAA with 1,489 yards, 278 ahead of the next closest, Bernard Pierce of Temple. Mathews also matched a career-high with three touchdowns against Idaho.

The Bulldogs had one of their most efficient all-around offensive performances as junior quarterback completed all of his pass, going 14-for-14 for 159 yards and one touchdown.

Fresno State receivers Seyi Ajirotutu and Marlon Moore each gained more than 40 yards receiving. Ajirotutu caught four passes for 45 yards and a touchdown. Moore's sole reception, a 41-yard catch, was the Bulldogs' longest of the night.

Bulldog kicker Kevin Goessling continues to be automatic from nearly anywhere on the field. The sophomore from Placentia, Calif., connected on a 52-yard field goal to give the Bulldogs a 17-0 lead. The field goal was his 10th-straight field goal without a miss. He has two field goals of 50-yards or more on the season.

A strong first half carried the Bulldogs to the victory. Mathews' leaped over the pile for a touchdown on a crucial fourth-and-goal from the one with 1:07 remaining, giving the Bulldogs a 24-0 lead heading into halftime.

The Fresno State defense also did its job in the first half, as it held the Vandals to 118 yards of total offense, including just 2-for-10 passing for 29 yards.

In the third quarter, Idaho running back De'Maundray Woolridge found daylight with a 68 yard carry to the Fresno State 29-yard line. The Vandals finished the drive with a 14-yard touchdown pass from Brian Reader to Max Komar with 5:51 remaining in the third. The pass put Idaho on the scoreboard for the first time, trailing the Bulldogs 24-7.

Mathews' third touchdown of the night put the Bulldogs up 31-7 with 47 seconds remaining in the third, but the Vandals would make a final surge in the fourth quarter.

A four-yard Reader touchdown run and successful two-point conversion, cut the Fresno State lead to 31-15 with 12:21 remaining in the fourth. But the Vandals couldn't cross the goal line again until the final 25 seconds of the game on a 69-yard Maurice Shaw reception from Reader, but the two-point conversion was unsuccessful and the Bulldogs came out with a 31-21 victory.

Fresno State improves to 6-3 on the year and 5-1 in WAC play, while Idaho falls to 7-3 and 4-2 in the WAC.

RENO, NEV. - Ryan Colburn passed for a career-high 362 yards and two touchdowns for the Bulldogs (6-4, 5-2) but his two touchdowns were all the Dogs could muster against Nevada in a 52-14 loss.

He had a 57-yard strike to Jamel Hamler on the opening drive to give Fresno State a 7-0 lead and hit Seyi Ajitotutu from 3 yards out to make it 14-7.

Fresno State had five turnovers, including four fumbles in the second half that allowed he Nevada offense to build a commanding lead.

The Bulldogs also lost running back Ryan Mathews, the nation's leading rusher with 165.1 yards per game entering Saturday, to an injury in the second quarter. He carried eight times for 35 yards.

Fresno State rolled up 474 total yards in the game, mainly in the passing game as Colburn connected with Chastin West for a career-high seven catches for 77 and Marlon Moore for 103 yards, including a beautiful 61-yard bomb that set up Fresno State's second touchdown. Colburn was sacked six times by a Nevada defense that held the Dogs to a season-low 112 rushing yards and 14 points. The Dogs entered the game ranked fifth in the nation in rushing, seventh in scoring and 17th in total offense.

Jamel Hamler had four receptions for 98 yards in the game.

Lonyae Miller led the Dogs with 55 rushing yards on 10 carries in Mathews' absence.

FRESNO, CALIF. - - Kevin Goessling's 35-yard field goal on the game's final play lifted Fresno State to a 30-28 victory over Louisiana Tech on Saturday.

Ryan Colburn completed just 17 of 42 passes for 182 yards but marched Fresno State (7-4, 6-2 Western Athletic Conference) 68 yards in the final 2 minutes, 21 seconds to set up Goessling's winning kick.

Ross Jenkins threw four touchdown passes and Daniel Porter rushed for 137 yards for Louisiana Tech (3-8, 2-5).

Colburn completed 4 of 8 passes on Fresno State's winning drive, including a 19-yard toss to Chastin West on fourth-and-10 from the Louisiana Tech 46. A 9-yard completion to Jamel Hamler then moved Fresno into field-goal range.

Goessling's game-winner was the second of his young Bulldog career as he also kicked a 58-yarder last year to defeat Utah State by the same score of 30-28.

Robbie Rouse rushed for 75 yards for Fresno State in relief of the injured Ryan Mathews, sidelined with the concussion that knocked him out of last week's game against Nevada.

The first two quarters were highly entertaining. After Louisiana Tech scored the game-opening touchdown two plays into the game, Fresno State marched five plays and 41 yards in 1:24 to tie the game at seven on a Seyi Ajitutu 23-yard reception.

Ben Jacobs then recovered a fumble and ran it 21-yards for a touchdown to give Fresno State a 14-7 20 seconds later. After Louisiana Tech tied the game at 14, Lonyae Miller bulled in from five yards out to put Fresno State back on top, 21-14, early in the second quarter.

La Tech then scored on its ensuing possession when Jenkins hit Dennis Morris on a 39-yard pass with 10:44 to play until the break. Both teams were tied at 21 at halftime.

Going into the fourth quarter, Louisiana Tech led 28-24 but a 24-yard field goal by Goessling and his game-winner from 35-yards out was all the Bulldogs needed to earn their sixth WAC win this year. Goessling also connected on a 24-yarder in the third quarter.

CHAMPAIGN, ILL. - Offensive lineman Devan Cunningham caught a deflected pass with 2 seconds left and powered into the end zone for a 2-point conversion, giving Fresno State a wild 53-52 victory over Illinois on Saturday.

It was Fresno State's 15th win over a BCS Conference opponent this decade, tying Utah for most wins and it was Pat Hill's 100th of his coaching career. Hill ranks fourth in WAC history for most coaching wins. He was drenched with an ice bath by senior receiver Marlon Moore after the game.

It was also Fresno State's 81st win this decade, most by a Bulldog team for a decade in school history.

Ryan Colburn connected with Jamel Hamler from 19 yards to get the Bulldogs (8-4) within 52-51, and coach Pat Hill elected to go for the win rather than take his chances in overtime.

Colburn dropped back under heavy pressure and his pass was tipped, falling into the hands of the 350-pound Cunningham, who leaned into the end zone.

Ryan Mathews ran for 173 yards and three touchdowns for Fresno State, which had not led since early in the second quarter. Mathews improved on his NCAA rushing lead. He's averaging 151.3 yards per game. Colburn finished with 183 yards and two touchdowns passing.

Mikel LeShoure ran for 184 yards on 11 carries for Illinois (3-9). He scored three touchdowns.

OFFENSIVE – Louisiana Tech running back Daniel Porter, a senior from Baton Rouge, La. (Istrouma HS), rushed for a career-high 199 yards and three touchdowns on 28 carries in Louisiana Tech's 55-20 win over San Jose State. It was the first time a Bulldog back had rushed for three touchdowns in a game since Ryan Moats in 2004. He became the school's all-time rushing leader by just 10 yards, concluding his career with 3,352 yards.



DEFENSIVE – Louisiana Tech safety Tank Calais, a junior from Patterson, La. (Patterson HS), made nine tackles (4 solo), and his second career interception in the win over San Jose State. Calais picked off a pass at the Bulldog's 4-yard line in the fourth quarter and returned it a school-record 96 yards for a touchdown. He also had an assisted tackle for a loss in the game.



SPECIAL TEAMS – Hawai'i punter Alex Dunnachie, a freshman from Heidelberg, Victoria, Australia (Marcellin College), punted six times for a 49.2-yard average in the game against Hawai'i. He had four punts of at least 55 yards including a season-best 66-yarder in the first quarter. Two of his punts were downed inside the 20-yard line and three were returned for a total of just eight yards.

coaches, Boise State quarterback Kellen Moore was named the Offensive Player of the Year, Nevada defensive end Dontay Moch earned Defensive Player of the Year honors, and Nevada wide receiver Brandon Wimberly was named the Freshman of the Year. Boise State's Chris Petersen was voted the WAC's Coach of the Year for the second straight season.

ALL-WAC TEAMS – Boise State led the league with seven first-team all-WAC honorees, while Fresno State placed six on the first team and Hawai'i, Louisiana Tech and Nevada each placed three. All nine schools were represented on the first team.. Hawai'i's John Estes made the first team for the third consecutive year. Other repeat first team all-WAC selections from last season include Nevada running back Vai Taua, Boise State defensive lineman Ryan Winterswyk, Louisiana Tech defensive lineman D'Anthony Smith, Boise State defensive back Kyle Wilson and San Jose State defensive back Duke Ihenacho. Nevada placed a WAC-high seven players on the second team while Boise State, Fresno State and Idaho had four apiece.

BOISE STATE WINS OUTRIGHT WAC TITLE – Boise State beat New Mexico State on Saturday, 42-7, to win the WAC's outright title. The Broncos have won six outright titles since joining the WAC in 2001 and shared a title with Nevada in 2005. Boise State was a perfect 8-0 in WAC play for the sixth time. From 1989-2001, only one WAC team was perfect in conference play (BYU in 1996). There have been seven perfect teams since 2002 (Boise State-6; Hawai'i-1).

BOISE STATE 6TH IN FINAL BCS RANKINGS – In the eighth and final BCS rankings, Boise State remained 6th. The Broncos had an average computer ranking of 6th as they were ranked 6th by Anderson & Hester, 6th by Billingsley, 7th by Colley, 7th by Massey, 7th by Sagarin and 6th by Wolfe. The BCS poll throws out the best and worst computer ranking to get the average and factors in the USA Today and Harris polls to calculate the BCS rankings. The Broncos' ranking of fourth in the first rankings this season was the highest a non-BCS team had ever been ranked (tied a couple of weeks later by TCU). WAC teams have been ranked in the final BCS poll seven times since the inception of the poll in 1998.

BRONCOS RANKED IN TOP 10 – Following the regular season, Boise State remained 6th in the three major polls. Boise State opened the season 14th in the AP poll, the highest a WAC team has been ranked in the preseason since Brigham Young was 10th in 1985 following its national championship season. The Broncos have been ranked in the top 25 at least once in each of the last eight seasons. At least one team from the WAC has been in the polls every week since Sept. 17, 2006 (61 consecutive polls).

BOISE STATE UNDEFEATED AGAIN – Boise State is one of five teams in the nation without a loss and one of two from non-automatic BCS qualifying conferences (TCU). The Broncos finished the regular season with a 13-0 record. Boise State has posted undefeated regular season records in four of the last six years (2004, 2006, 2008, 2009) and was the only undefeated team in the nation in 2006 following the bowl games.

2009 BOWL LINEUP – The WAC was affiliated with three bowl games this season. WAC teams will play in the New Mexico Bowl in Albuquerque, N.M., the Sheraton Hawai'i Bowl in Honolulu and in the Roady's Humanitarian Bowl in Boise, Idaho. The WAC also had a couple of backup agreements with the San Diego Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl and GMAC Bowl in Mobile, Ala.

WAC SIGNS DEALS WITH POINSETTIA AND EMERALD BOWLS – Beginning with the next four-year bowl cycle, the WAC has inked deals with both the San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl and Emerald Bowl. In 2010 and 2013, the WAC will send a team to the Emerald Bowl to play

against a Pac-10 team, while in 2011 and 2012, the WAC will be represented in the Poinsettia Bowl against the Mountain West. The WAC will have backup agreements in all four years should Army (2011-Emerald; 2013 Poinsettia) or Navy (2010-Poinsettia; 2012-Emerald) not be eligible in their respective years. The agreements give the conference four guaranteed bowl slots through the 2013 season.

BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES – Since 1997, the WAC has been an official part of the Bowl Championship Series. The WAC's champion will receive an automatic berth in one of the five BCS bowl games if ranked in the top 12 of the BCS Standings (and is the highest ranked team from a conference without an automatic bid) or if ranked in the top 16 of the BCS Standings and its ranking is higher than that of a champion of a conference that has an annual automatic berth in one of the BCS bowls. The BCS Standings are determined by a formula involving polls and computer rankings. This year's National Championship Game will be played in Pasadena, Calif. on Jan. 7, 2010.

IDAHO OWNS NATION'S SECOND BEST TURNAROUND – With seven victories this season, Idaho currently is second in the nation for the best turnaround. The Vandals were 2-10 last year and have recorded five more wins this year. SMU has recorded six more wins than last year. Idaho was picked last in the WAC preseason coaches' poll and finished fourth with a 4-4 record in conference play.

NEVADA, MATHEWS LEAD NATION IN RUSHING – Fresno State junior running back Ryan Mathews continues to lead the nation in rushing with 151.3 yards per game. Mathews leads Stanford's Toby Gerhart who is averaging 144.7 yards per contest. As a team, Nevada leads the nation in rushing with 362.3 yards per game, 55.1 yards per game better than the next best team, Georgia Tech (307.2). The WAC features two teams in the top 10 in rushing as Fresno State is seventh with 231.6 yards per contest.

MATHEWS, MOORE LOOK TO FINISH IN NATIONAL LEAD – Fresno State junior running back Ryan Mathews and Boise State sophomore quarterback Kellen Moore are trying to finish the season leading the nation in a couple of major statistical categories. Mathews' 151.3 rushing yards per game are tops in the nation. The last WAC player to lead the nation in rushing was Nevada's Chance Kretschmer in 2001 (157.5 yards per game). WAC running backs have led the nation in rushing six times previously. Moore leads the nation in passing efficiency with a 167.4 rating. The last WAC player to lead the nation in passing efficiency was Hawai'i's Colt Brennan in 2006. WAC quarterbacks have led the nation in passing efficiency six times previously.

NON-CONFERENCE – The WAC is 19-20 (.487) in non-conference games this season. WAC teams have competed against the Big East (0-1), Big Ten (1-3), Big 12 (0-2), Conference USA (1-1), Great West (4-0), FBS Independents (1-2), MAC (3-0), Mountain West (4-6), Pac-10 (2-3), SEC (0-2), Southland (2-0) and SWAC (1-0). The WAC is 1-8 versus AP top-25 non-conference opponents as Boise State beat No. 16 Oregon on Sept. 3, Utah State lost at No. 19 Utah on Sept. 3, Nevada lost at No. 23 Notre Dame on Sept. 5, San Jose State lost at No. 4 USC on Sept. 5, San Jose State lost to No. 17 Utah on Sept. 12, Fresno State lost at No. 14 Cincinnati on Sept. 26, Utah State lost at No. 20 BYU on Oct. 2, New Mexico State lost at No. 17 Ohio State on Oct. 31, and Louisiana Tech lost to No. 9 LSU on Nov. 14.

IUPATI NAMED AFCA ALL-AMERICAN – Idaho senior guard Mike Iupati was one of 24 players selected as an AFCA All-American. He is Idaho's first AFCA All-American since Ryan Phillips in 1995 and the Vandals' first since they moved up to the Football Bowl Subdivision (formerly Division I-A) in 1996. During Idaho's 7-5 regular-season campaign, Iupati played 807 snaps and had 49 knockdowns, 21 pancakes, allowed only five pressures and no sacks.

IUPATI NAMED OUTLAND TROPHY FINALIST – Idaho guard Mike Iupati was named one of three finalists for the Outland Trophy, awarded to the best interior lineman in the nation. Iupati joins Oklahoma State tackle Russell Okung and Nebraska defensive tackle Ndamukong Suh. The last WAC player to win the award was BYU's Mohammed Elewonibi in 1989. This year's winner will be announced on Dec. 10.

FRESNO STATE WITH TWO ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS – Fresno

State junior offensive lineman Andrew Jackson was named a first-team ESPN The Magazine's Academic All-America in early December. He is the first Fresno State player to ever be named to the first team and the first WAC player since Nevada's Erick Streebman in 2002. Jackson is a Business Administration Management major with a 3.92 Grade Point Average. Senior punter Robert Malone was named to the second team. Malone is a Kinesiology major with a 3.51 GPA. Malone is averaging 45.1 yards per punt this season, which would rank fifth in the NCAA statistics if he had enough punt attempts to qualify. Fresno State's net punt unit has been ranked in the top 10 in the NCAA for most of this season. To be eligible, a student-athlete must be a varsity starter or key reserve, maintain a cumulative grade point average of 3.30 on a scale of 4.00, have reached sophomore athletic and academic standings at their current institution and be nominated by the school's sports information director.

FOUR NAMED FINALISTS FOR RUDY AWARD – The WAC has four players named candidates for the Rudy Award which honors student-athletes who demonstrate exemplary character, courage, contribution and commitment as members of their collegiate football teams. The players are New Mexico State's Jamar Cotton, Utah State's Josh Flores, Nevada's Luke Lippincott and San Jose State's Phillip Knight. Three finalists will be selected and a winner chosen on Jan. 11.

MOORE ONE OF 10 FINALISTS FOR MANNING AWARD – Boise State sophomore Kellen Moore is one of 10 finalists for the Manning Award presented annually to the top quarterback in the nation. The winner will be announced on Jan. 14.

ESTES ONE OF SIX FINALISTS FOR RIMINGTON TROPHY– Hawai'i senior John Estes is one of six finalists for the Rimington Trophy which goes to the nation's top center. The winner of the Rimington Trophy will be selected by determining the consensus All-American center pick from four existing All-America Teams: AFCA, Walter Camp, The Sporting News and FWA.

HARRIS ONE OF 16 FINALISTS FOR THE CAMPBELL TROPHY – Fresno State safety Moses Harris was named to the NFF National Scholar-Athlete Class in late October. Each member of the class receives an \$18,000 post-graduate scholarship and becomes a finalist for the William V. Campbell Trophy which recognizes the top scholar-athlete in the nation.

PETERSEN, AKEY NAMED TO BRYANT WATCH LIST – Boise State's Chris Petersen and Idaho's Robb Akey were named to the Bryant Watch List, an award that goes to the national coach of the year. Petersen is a past winner of the award (2006).

HARSIN FINALIST FOR BROYLES AWARD – Boise State offensive coordinator Bryan Harsin was one of five finalists for the Broyles Award given annually to the top assistant coach in college football. Alabama defensive coordinator Kirby Smart won the award on Dec. 8.

ACADEMIC ALL-DISTRICT – A total of seven WAC football players were named to the 2009 first-team College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) Academic All-District teams. Members of CoSIDA voted on the selections. To be eligible for the teams, a player must have at least a 3.20 GPA and play in 50 percent of his team's games. Those named will now move on to the Academic All-American ballot which will be released later this month.

SJSU'S TOMEY ANNOUNCES RETIREMENT – San Jose State head coach Dick Tomey announced that he will retire effective January 15, 2010. The 71-year-old head coach – with 46 years in the coaching profession – made the announcement at the university's weekly football press conference on Nov. 9. Since Tomey took the Spartans' reins in December 2004, the team won the 2006

inaugural New Mexico Bowl, was bowl-eligible twice (2006, 2008), had the third best win-loss record in the Western Athletic Conference over a 39-game span from the end of 2005 through the 2008 season (22-17) and produced a .500 win-loss percentage in conference road games from 2006 to 2008. The Spartans also picked up their first win over a Pacific-10 Conference opponent, Stanford, in six years in 2006 and first victory in 31 years over San Diego State that same season. Tomey had a 25-35 win-loss record as San Jose State's head coach. Overall, Tomey completed a 29-year college football head-coaching career and had a coaching record of 183-145-7. A consistent winner, his teams never experienced two straight losing seasons. All 3354 games he has coached were with FBS schools: Hawaii (1977-1986), Arizona (1987-2000) and San Jose State (2005-2009). Tomey is the only coach who ranks in the top 10 in the WAC and Pac-10 for conference coaching victories.

COACHES MOVING UP RECORD LISTS – A couple of WAC coaches are working their way up the NCAA coaching record lists. Nevada head coach **Chris Ault** is in his 25th season as a head coach and is 206-95-1, the sixth winningest active coach in FBS. San Jose State's **Dick Tomey** is the seventh winningest active coach as he completed his fifth year with the Spartans and 29th overall with a record of 183-145-7. Tomey previously won 63 games at Hawai'i from 1977-86 and 95 games at Arizona from 1987-2000. Tomey coached 335 games, the fourth most among active coaches. In WAC games only, Fresno State head coach **Pat Hill** has 70 conference victories, the fourth most in league history while Tomey has 49 WAC wins, the sixth most.

WAC TRIO WITH 252 WINS – Boise State, Hawai'i and Fresno State have combined for 252 victories since the 2001 season. That total is the third most of any FBS conference's top trio.

There are 53 Division IA programs west of the Mississippi that include all of the teams from the WAC, Big 12, Mountain West and Pac-10 and several teams from the Big Ten, Conference USA, SEC and Sun Belt.

(6/6) Boise State Broncos (13-0, 8-0 WAC)

Sophomore QB Kellen Moore's 39 touchdown passes to three interceptions are on pace to set an NCAA record ratio ... he is 25-1 as a starter with a one-point loss against TCU as the only blemish ... Titus Young has caught a pass in 29 straight games, the longest active streak in the WAC ... its 48 wins since 2006 are the most in the nation ... has won 111 games this decade, the most by any team in any decade since 1900 ... has won 56 consecutive regular season home games ... its active 26-game home winning streak is currently the second longest in the nation ... has won 71 of its last 73 games (including bowl games) at home ... is the highest scoring team in the nation this decade averaging 40.82 points over 128 games.



Nevada Wolf Pack (8-4, 7-1 WAC)

Nevada has kicked off to begin every game this season ... had its school record (FBS) eight-game winning streak snapped against Boise State ... was held to 242 rushing yards, 120 below its season average ... has had five different players rush for more than 100 yards 22 times this season ... Luke Lippincott will miss the bowl game after undergoing surgery for a broken toe sustained in the game against New Mexico State ... both Colin Kaepernick and Lippincott have rushed for a touchdown, thrown a touchdown pass and caught a touchdown pass this season ... defensive linemen Dontay Moch and Kevin Basped have both recorded 40.5 career tackles for loss, the most of any active players in the WAC.



Fresno State Bulldogs (8-4, 6-2 WAC)

In the game at Illinois, following a Jamel Hamler receiving touchdown where he stretched across the goal line with two seconds remaining, offensive lineman Devan Cunningham caught a deflected pass for a two-point conversion giving the Bulldogs a 53-52 win ... the win was the 100th career victory for head coach Pat Hill ... Ryan Mathews scored his 36th career touchdown setting a new school record ... Kevin Goessling made one field goal at Illinois and has made a school-record 15 in a row (15-of-16 for the season) ... the Bulldogs have 48 blocked kicks since 2002, the most in the nation in that time ... has 15 BCS wins since 2000, the second most among non-BCS teams during that time ... the 'Dogs traveled 23,354 miles during the regular season.



New Mexico State Aggies (3-10, 1-7 WAC)

Junior Seth Smith rushed for 114 yards in the season finale at Boise State ... it was his fifth 100-yard rushing game of the season and gave him 1,016 for the season, the most for an Aggie since Chris Barnes had 1,131 in 2000 ... he became the fourth Aggie running back since 1967 to rush for 1,000 yards in a season ... quarterback Trevor Walls scored the team's only touchdown at Boise State on a one-yard run late in the fourth quarter ... it was the first points scored by the Aggies against Boise State in three games, getting outscored 149-7 in those three contests ... senior Tonny Glynn became New Mexico State's record holder for kickoff returns in a season (35) and kickoff return yardage in a season (778).



Hawai'i Warriors (6-7, 3-5 WAC)

Had its four-game winning streak snapped in the regular season finale against Wisconsin ... junior Greg Salas finished with 106 receptions (tied for the fourth most in a season in WAC history) and 1,590 receiving yards (fourth most in WAC history) ... he has caught at least one pass in 27 straight games ... C John Estes has started 54 straight games, the longest active streak in the nation ... UH is 25-0 when scoring 40 or more points since 2005 ... is second in the nation in punt return yardage defense (1.67-yard average on nine returns) ... celebrated its 100th anniversary of its first football team this season ... senior RB Inoke Funaki is one of 30 student-athletes selected to attend the NCAA Football Coaches Academy, Jan. 10-12.



San Jose State Spartans (2-10, 1-7 WAC)

Marquis Avery caught seven passes for 147 yards and two touchdowns in the season finale at Louisiana Tech ... he was the only Spartan to have two touchdowns receptions in a game this season and the 147 receiving yards were the most by a San Jose State player this year ... Kyle Reed was 12-of-12 for 97 yards and two touchdowns in the first quarter ... Lamont Muldrow rushed for 57 yards in the game while seven other backs combined for -30 ... senior WR Kevin Jurovich caught at least one pass in all 26 games he played in since switching from the defensive backfield prior to the 2007 season ... he is the school's all-time leader in pass receptions (160) ... head coach Dick Tomey is the president of the AFCA for 2009.



Idaho Vandals (7-5, 4-4 WAC)

Lost four of its last five games after a 6-1 start ... in its regular season finale against Utah State, trailed 31-7 in the second quarter, took the lead, 42-38, before losing 52-49 ... Nathan Enderle returned to action after missing two games and was 16-of-25 for 262 yards with three touchdowns ... he re-injured his shoulder and Brian Reader came in to throw for 113 yards and two touchdowns ... Max Komar caught five passes for 110 yards and two touchdowns ... it was his fifth 100-yard receiving game of the year ... his 1,036 receiving yards are the most for a Vandal since Chris Lacy had 1,045 in 2001 ... has seven wins against FBS schools in the same season for the first time since 1998 ... won three road games for the first time since 1999.



Utah State Aggies (4-8, 3-5 WAC)

Won its most games since going 4-7 in 2002 ... has increased its win total by one in each of the past three years since winning one game in 2006 ... scored 52 points against Idaho in its season finale, the most for the Aggies against an FBS opponent since beating Idaho, 63-17 in 1997 ... sophomore RB Robert Turbin's five TDs against Idaho matched the school-record set in 1956 by Jack Hill ... the Aggies rushed for 2,311 yards on the season, the most since gaining 2,364 in 1962 ... set a new school-record for total offense with 5,272 yards ... was 3-2 at home this year, the Aggies' first winning record at home since 2003 (3-2) ... named the field in Romney Stadium 'Merlin Olsen Field' to honor one of its most decorated football players in school history.



Louisiana Tech Bulldogs (4-8, 3-5 WAC)

Scored 31 points in the second quarter against San Jose State ... senior RB Daniel Porter's 199 rushing yards against San Jose State gave him 3,352 for his career, setting a new school record by just 10 yards ... Deon Young returned an interception 55 yards for a touchdown against SJSU, giving him his 10th career interception ... senior DB Antonio Baker's 352 career tackles are the most of any active player in the WAC and seventh most in the nation ... junior Phillip Livas has scored multiple TDs four different ways: reception (4), rush (3), kickoff return (3) and punt return (3) ... Derek Dooley is the only individual to hold the dual role of both athletic director and head football coach in the FBS.

POLL EXPLANATION & ABOUT THE BCS:

The Harris Interactive Poll, USA Today Coaches Poll and computer rankings each comprise one-third of the BCS Standings. To derive the three percentages, each team is assigned an inverse point total (25 for No. 1, 24 for No. 2, etc.) The two poll percentages are calculated by dividing each team's point total by a maximum 2850 possible points (Harris) and 1475 possible points (USA Today). The computer rankings percentage is calculated by dropping the highest and lowest ranking for each team and then dividing the remaining total by 100 (the maximum possible points). The BCS Average is calculated by averaging the percentage totals of the Harris Interactive Poll, USA Today Poll, and computer rankings. The teams' BCS Averages are ranked to produce the BCS Standings. The six computer ranking providers are Anderson & Hester, Richard Billingsley, Colley Matrix, Kenneth Massey, Jeff Sagarin and Peter Wolfe. Each computer ranking provider accounts for schedule strength within its formula.

The BCS is a five-game arrangement for post-season college football that is managed by the 11 Football Bowl Subdivision (formerly Division I-A) conferences and institutions. Its purpose is to match the top two teams a bowl game and to create exciting matchups in four other games. The No. 1 and No. 2 teams in the Dec. 6 BCS standings will play in the Citi BCS National Championship on Jan. 7, 2010 in Pasadena, Calif. PAT HILL

HEAD COACH • 13TH SEASON

With great vision, an unparalleled work ethic, and passion for the Valley, Pat Hill's stamp on the Fresno State football program is undeniable. After 12 years, the Bulldog program is nationally recognized for its success in all areas: wins and bowl games appearances, academic achievement, and character of the young men who've come through the program.

Under Hill, the program has received national attention and is recognized as a premier program. He is recognized as an elite coach, having been selected to coach in college all-star games twice in the last five years. The success stories are many, but what's most impressive is the consistent and unwavering commitment to the principles he established over a decade ago. The Dogs continue to play a rigorous non-conference schedule, play a tough "hard nosed" brand of football on the field, recruit Valley high school players, and set an "Academic Gameplan" that sees student-athletes through to graduation.

Hill's program has grown accustomed of being in the national spotlight. Never was it brighter than in 2001, when Hill guided the program to unprecedented heights - 11 wins, a bowl invitation, a top 10 ranking, wins over Wisconsin, Colorado and Oregon State, another record-setting attendance mark and a Sports Illustrated cover story. With nearly 70 national television appearances this decade, college football fans from around the country know about the Bulldog program.

Despite these lofty achievements, Hill is still adamant this is just an indication of greater things to come. His motto of "Building a New Tradition on a National Level" is stronger now than ever, especially after winning 15 games against BCS teams since 2000 - the highest of any non-BCS teams in the country. Among those victories are four recent bowl wins against Georgia Tech (twice), UCLA and No. 18 Virginia.

Hill has also taken the Bulldogs to new heights in the Western Athletic Conference. His overall league record of 73-30 is one of the best in the WAC as he is the dean of WAC football coaches.

The 58-year-old Hill was the Bulldogs' recruiting coordinator from 1984-89, a six-year period in which Fresno State was 53-16-1, averaged nearly nine wins per season, captured three league titles and won three bowl games. During that six-year stint as the recruiting coordinator and line coach under former head coach Jim Sweeney, Hill contributed at a championship level. In addition to the conference crowns and bowl victories, the Bulldogs saw 14 players drafted by NFL teams, including the likes of J.D. Williams, Ron Cox, Michael Stewart and Aaron Craver. Fresno State's 1985 team was the only unbeaten Division I-A squad in the country, finishing the season 16th in the polls. Hill's offensive line also provided the pass protection and run blocking for an offensive unit that averaged 32 points per game over those six seasons, including a nation-leading 41 points per game in '85.

Success continued for Hill when he moved on to the University of Arizona as Dick Tomey's offensive coordinator and offensive line coach in 1990 and '91. In just his first season, the Wildcats went 7-5 and played in the Aloha Bowl. Both seasons, the 'Cats finished in the top five of the Pac-10 in rushing offense, averaging nearly 200 yards per game on the ground. Four players earned first-team All-Pac-10 honors in his two seasons, and offensive lineman John Fina was a first round NFL draft choice.

When he left Arizona, he did so to realize another career goal -- coaching in the National Football League. Hill joined the Cleveland Browns in 1992 and spent five seasons in the organization, coaching tight ends and offensive line in addition to working in the personnel department evaluating players. While there, he formed a life-lasting friendship with Bill Belichick, whom Hill credits for teaching him with a structure that has proven successful. Hill would have been happy to remain in the NFL had the Fresno State job not opened a possibility for him.

Hill began his coaching career as offensive line coach at Los Angeles Valley College from 1974-76, helping the Monarchs to a state junior college championship in 1975. He then served as offensive line coach at Utah from 1977-80 under Wayne Howard; was offensive line coach and offensive coordinator at UNLV from 1981-82 under Tony Knapp; and was offensive coordinator with the Calgary Stampeders of the CFL in 1983 under Jack Gotta.

The list of players recruited and signed by Hill at the collegiate level is impressive. Under his leadership, such greats as David Carr, Richard Marshall, Logan Mankins, James Sanders, Alan Harper, Rodney Wright, Randall Cunningham, Tracy Rogers, Ron Cox, Aaron Craver, Marquez Pope, Lorenzo

Neal, Jethro Franklin, Tony Brown, J.D. Williams, Mike Withycombe, Michael Stewart, John Fina and Tedy Bruschi all were inked to letters of intent.

A 1973 graduate of UC Riverside, Hill was a three-time all-conference center, earning All-America honors as a senior. He was inducted into the UC Riverside Hall of Fame in 1989. It was at UC Riverside where he crossed paths with Ron McBride, then a UCR assistant and formerly the Utah head coach, who helped steer Hill into a football coaching career.

Hill and his wife, Cathy, have three children. Their eldest, Michael, is a recent graduate of Fresno State. Zak is a sophomore safety on the Bulldog squad and Matt, who played at Cal Poly until a career-ending injury, is a college student in southern California. Hill was born Dec. 17, 1951, in Los Angeles.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

Hill kept his promise when he was hired to shore up the team's academic woes. One of the first projects he brought to the table is well underway with positive results coming in droves. Academic Gameplan, the brainchild of John Baxter, Hill's associate head coach, was touted early in the building stages in the program, not as a quick fix-all to placate university professors, but instead to make sure academics are first priority. He has accomplished much in a short time. The team GPA has risen from a 2.21 to a 2.87. He produced the first Academic All-American in the program's history in 1999, senior cornerback Payton Williams. In 12 years, the program has produced 123 Academic All-WAC selections, most in the conference during that time. Prior to Hill's arrival, Fresno State had produced a total of nine Academic All-WAC selections. In four of the last five years, Fresno State has led the WAC in Academic All-WAC selections, producing an all-time high of 16 in 2007.

- Lineman Kevin Cooper was selected the 2006 President's Medal Winner as the top graduating senior at Fresno State.
- Kicker Clint Stitser was selected the 2007 Dean's Medal Winner from the Craig School of Business as the top graduating senior, was a semifinalist for the Draddy Award (Academic Heisman) and a finalist for the Wuerffel Trophy, which honors athletic, academic and community service.

ANYBODY, ANYTIME, ANYWHERE

Hill's accomplishments are remarkable, considering the rigorous non-conference schedule Fresno State has played since his arrival. In the last eight years, Fresno State has played 38 bowl opponents, including 18 the past three seasons. Of the team's 28 losses since 2002, 24 were to teams which played in a bowl game or were nationally ranked. But more important are the victories. Since 2000, the Bulldogs have defeated 14 BCS Conference opponents - California in 2000 and Colorado, Wisconsin and Oregon State (2001 and 2003), Georgia Tech (2002 and 2007), UCLA (2003 and 2008), Washington, Kansas State and Virginia in 2004, Kansas State and Rutgers in 2008 and Illinois this season. In the case of the Buffaloes, Huskies, Wildcats and Badgers, Fresno State defeated them on the road. As for the victories over the Yellow Jackets, Bruins and Cavaliers, those wins came in bowl games. Fresno State's 15 wins over BCS schools in the last seven years ranks is tied with Utah for most of any non-BCS school. The Bulldogs are also the only non-BCS school to own three consecutive bowl victories over BCS schools. "We could win a lot of games if we schedule ourselves that way," Hill says. "Our program has to play the best and beat the best to be considered the best. That's how we are building our entire program, to reach that level of respect and success."

BUILDING AND GROWING

Hill talks of adding seats to Bulldog Stadium and continuing to take on the toughest non-conference teams in the nation. By looking at what he has accomplished in this decade, one has to believe he can achieve anything. Under Hill's guidance, the Duncan Building training room has been tripled in size with additional taping stations, rehabilitation pools and a private doctor's office. Also constructed were two lighted practice fields and an adjacent weight room, which provides the Bulldogs with a facility that rivals any NFL training facility. A tireless worker, Hill has been a productive fundraiser. He has spearheaded capital projects on campus, including the new Ricchiutti Academic Center, which benefits all student-athletes at Fresno State, and the Duncan Building expansion, which includes a new football locker room, coaching offices, team meeting rooms and an auditorium style theater. Hill has championed the Green V Society, a new fundraising level in the Bulldog Foundation designed to generate funds for the athletics department.

TAKING IT TO ANOTHER LEVEL

When Hill was hired, he promised to win games and championships. He has done that. After taking over a program that hadn't won more than five games the three previous seasons, Hill won six games his first season and won a share of the WAC Championship and received a berth in the EA Sports Las Vegas Bowl in year three. He has done this while playing some of the top programs in the nation. With perennial bowl teams UCLA, Colorado, Wisconsin, No. 1 Oklahoma, Tennessee, Ohio State, No. 1 USC, No. 3 LSU, Kansas State, Oregon, Oregon State, Washington and Colorado State, the Bulldogs have played as tough a schedule as anyone. Fresno State has played the most BCS opponents of any non-BCS school since the 2001.

- Set a school record with seven consecutive bowl appearances, including victories over Georgia Tech, UCLA and Virginia.
- A No. 8 national ranking in 2001, the highest ever by a Fresno State team and at the time, the highest by a non-BCS school.
- A year-end national ranking of No. 22 in 2004, the first time Fresno State ended the season in the national polls since 1993
- 14 wins over BCS schools since 2001, second-most of any non-BCS school

- School-record 11 wins in 2001
- 10 bowl appearances in the last 11 seasons.
- Produced at least one All-American in seven of the last 10 years
- Produced 23 NFL draft picks

JOHN BAXTER

**ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH/TIGHT ENDS/SPECIAL TEAMS/
ACADEMICS • 13TH SEASON**

COACHING CAREER:

In 13 years John Baxter has put his stamp on the Bulldog football program on and off the field. As the associate head coach he oversees the special teams and tight end positions. In his first five seasons and in 2003 he coached the tight ends and in 2002 and 2004-08 he coached the receivers. Baxter has become well-known nationally for his expertise in the area of special teams and has been a featured clinician at many of the nations biggest and finest football clinics. Baxter and Head Coach Pat Hill were assistant coaches together at Arizona in 1990-91. Hill and Baxter were selected as the Co-Citizens of the Year for the city of Clovis in 2006.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

Along with his coaching duties, Baxter is the author of the highly successful program, "Academic Gameplan." His academic plan has been featured in Sports Illustrated and many other publications. His Academic Gameplan has been the main reason for the academic success of the football program during Pat Hill's tenure, which has produced a league-best 123 Academic All-WAC players, the only three Academic All-Americans in school history and two National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete award winners. The Bulldogs NCAA APR score ranks nearly 20 Percentage points higher than the national average for college programs and is in the top five for public schools in the west and second among California public schools. Since the inception of the program, more than one-third has earned at least a 3.0 grade point average each semester and the Bulldogs graduation rates and APR have improved significantly. He has co-authored the program, "Where There's a Will There's an 'A,'" which has been featured nationally on cable television.

SPECIAL TEAMS SUCCESS

BLOCKED KICKS

Since coming to Fresno State Baxter has turned the Bulldog special teams unit into one of the top units in the country. In 12 seasons the Dogs have blocked 83 kicks and scored 39 special teams touchdowns. Since 2002 the 'Dogs have blocked a nation's best 48 kicks.

SPECIAL TEAMS TOUCHDOWNS

Under Baxter's watch A.J. Jefferson led the NCAA in kickoff return average and former Bulldog Clifton Smith set NCAA and school records for punt returns, including five career returns for touchdowns. Smith was named to the 2009 NFL Pro Bowl as a rookie for Tampa Bay as he scored twice on two long returns.

In 2008, the 'Dogs were the only team in the country to have four different players score a touchdown via punt or kickoff return as Rashad Evans, A.J. Jefferson, Chastin West and Marlon Moore all ran back kicks. Baxter's special teams unit also ranked in the top 15 in the NCAA in kick return and punt return average in 2008.

Since 1997, Fresno State has returned 11 punts, six kickoffs and eight blocked punts/field goals for 24 total touchdowns along with three safeties. Fresno State was also deadly on punt returns, finishing tops in the WAC and fifth in the nation in 2001.

KICKING SUCCESS

Kicking has been a successful part of the Bulldogs special teams unit. In 2008, Kevin Goessling made the longest field Goal to win or lose a game this decade, 58 yards vs. Utah State as time expired. Goessling and punter Robert Malone were both named first-team All-WAC in 2009.

Clint Stitser, a three-year starter, was selected as a Lou Groza Award semi-finalist. In 2004 and 2005, the Dogs led the NCAA in fewest punt return yards allowed, with a low of 27 yards in 2004 and 40 yards in 2005. In addition, the kickoff coverage team allowed just 17.4 yards per return in 2004. In 2004, placekicker Brett Visintainer kicked two game-winning field goals (Oregon State, Rice) and was named second-team All-WAC while punter Mike Lingua displayed flashes of brilliance in just his first year.

Baxter has coached five kickers/punters, four of which earned first-team All-WAC honors: punter Jeff Roberts (1997), kicker Jeff Hanna (1999), punter Jason Simpson (2001) and kicker Asen Asparuhov (2002). Asparuhov was also a semifinalist for the Lou Groza Award twice and became the first Bulldog in history to score 100 points in consecutive seasons. Under Baxter's watch, punter Jason Simpson became one of the nation's best, improving his average nearly nine yards over 2000. In 2001, Simpson finished with a 43.5 average and was a first-team All-WAC pick. He was then a second-team All-WAC selection in 2002. Simpson was the first WAC punter ever from a school at an elevation under 5,000-feet to lead the league in punting in consecutive seasons.

In 1999, the Bulldogs held their opponents to 34.1 yards in net punting and limited the opponents to just 78 punt return yards for the season, fourth-best in the nation. He also coached 1997 All-WAC punter Jeff Roberts.

PREVIOUS COACHING STINTS

His college coaching experience includes stints at Tulane (1994-96), Maryland (1992-93), Arizona (1990-91, 1988), Maine (1989), Iowa State (1986-87) and Loras College (1981-85). Baxter has become well-known nationally for his expertise in the area of special teams and has been a featured clinician at many of the nations biggest and finest football clinics ... Baxter and Head Coach Pat Hill were assistant coaches together at Arizona in 1990-91... Hill and Baxter were selected as the Co-Citizens of the Year for the city of Clovis in 2006.

PERSONAL:

Born June 28, 1963, in Chicago ... married to the former Jill McBride, daughter of Ron McBride, the former University of Utah head coach and the current head coach at Weber State ... they have two daughters, Kelly and McKenzie ... Baxter earned his bachelor's degree in physical education from Loras College in 1985 and his master's in higher education from Iowa State in 1987.



DEREK FRAZIER

**RUN-GAME COORDINATOR/
OFFENSIVE LINE • 4TH SEASON**

COACHING CAREER:

In his fourth season as offensive line coach and first as the run-game coordinator ... directing one of the nation's top running attacks, led by All-American and NCAA rushing leader Ryan Mathews ... Fresno State is seventh in the NCAA in rushing, 19th in total offense ... has developed four players who have earned first-team All-WAC honors in consecutive seasons (Andrew Jackson, Bobby Lepori, Ryan Wendell and Chris Denman) ... directing in addition, sophomore Andrew Jackson developed into a second-team All-WAC selection in 2008 and junior Kenny Wiggins was second-team in 2009 ... Jackson became Fresno State's first –ever first-team Academic All-American ... in 2007, he juggled an offensive line hit hard by injuries, but saw the improvement to several young players including center Joe Bernardi and guard Andrew Jackson, both redshirt freshmen starters ... because of the blocking of the offensive line in the 2007 Humanitarian Bowl, the Bulldog offense was able to rack up 571 yards of total offense against ACC foe Georgia Tech ... **PASS-GAME COORDINATOR/
QUARTERBACKS • 3RD SEASON**

COACHING CAREER:

Enters his first season as the quarterbacks coach and passing game coordinator ... is call the plays for one of the nations' top offenses, the features All-American and NCAA rushing leader Ryan Mathews ... has worked to develop quarterback Ryan Colburn, who jumped from No. 61 in the nation in passing efficiency to a season-high of No. 9 ... Fresno State had two first team All-WAC players and two on the second teams in 2009 ... a former Fresno State quarterback, Grady joined head coach Pat Hill's staff as the Tight Ends coach in the spring of 2007 ... was a graduate assistant with the offense before becoming the tight ends coach ... in his first year as a full-time assistant, he developed a strong corps of tight ends, led by first-team All-WAC player and John Mackey Award candidate Bear Pascoe, who was drafted by the San Francisco 49ers ... Pascoe became the first Bulldog tight end in history to earn All-WAC honors and he caught six balls for 72 yards in the Humanitarian Bowl ... Pascoe set a Bulldog record for most touchdown receptions by a tight end with 10 in his career ... Pascoe garnered second-team All-WAC honors in 2008 ... in addition, Grady did an excellent job developing Jesus Tapia, Drew Lubinsky, Vince Pascoe and Isaac Kinter, who all contributed during the 2007 season ... Grady has developed into an outstanding recruiter for the Bulldogs.

PLAYING CAREER:

A four-year letterwinner, Grady played for the Bulldogs from 1999-03. He served as a highly capable backup to Billy Volek during Fresno State's run to the WAC title in 1999 and then to David Carr in the 2000 season ... In 2001, Grady was redshirted to ensure he would not lose a year of eligibility playing behind Carr, a senior who would go on to become the No. 1 overall pick in the NFL Draft. He entered 2002 as the team's starter at QB but was injured in the opener at Wisconsin and played the majority of the season as the backup to Paul Pinegar ... Grady also backed up Pinegar in 2002 but played a key role in one of the Bulldogs' biggest wins of that season. Against Oregon State in the home opener that year, Grady threw for 276 yards with a touchdown. But most importantly, he led Fresno State on a last-minute drive that helped set up a game-winning field goal that lifted the Bulldogs to a 16-14 victory.

He started out on the offensive side as tight ends and assistant offensive line coach ... in 2002, he was elevated to defensive line coach and was given the additional responsibilities of recruiting coordinator in 2003 ... while at Cal Lutheran, Plemons helped guide seven all-conference players, one of whom earned second-team All-America honors ... Plemons also had experience as a strength and conditioning coach from his time at Cal Lutheran.

He graduated in 1997, serving as a four-year starter for the Kingsmen. As a senior, he was named team captain and selected Most Inspirational and all-conference. He earned a master's degree in education in 2001.

Fresno State's secondary was one of the nation's best in 2004, as the Bulldogs ranked third in the nation in pass efficiency defense while allowing just nine touchdown passes all season,

the fifth-lowest total in the nation ... the Bulldogs led the WAC in scoring defense, pass defense, turnover margin and total defense while playing in one of the highest producing offensive conferences in the nation ... junior James Sanders was selected first-team All-WAC for the second straight season ... sophomore cornerback Richard Marshall was selected second team and junior Tyrone Culver was tabbed honorable mention All-WAC ... eight different Bulldog defensive backs had interceptions and three returned them for touchdowns ... in 2003, he guided a much-improved Fresno State secondary that by the end of the year was one of the best in the WAC ... his unit recorded 16 interceptions, the third-highest in the conference ... after finishing the 2002 season thin at safety and defensive back, the Bulldogs were deep with strong, young playmakers such as Awan Diles, Raymond Washington, Tyrone Culver, James Sanders and Richard Marshall ... all but Washington, who was injured for half of 2003, contributed significantly ... under Stewart, Fresno State ranked second in the WAC in 2003 in pass defense, allowing only 214.9 yards per game ... Sanders flourished under Stewart, earning first-team All-WAC honors after being selected second team all-league as a freshman in 2002... in his first year, Stewart turned Cameron Worrell from a walk-on to an All-WAC performer who last year played for the Chicago Bears ... worked with a young group that overcame multiple injuries, including one to starting cornerback Kendall Edwards ... he has also helped develop Marcus McCauley, Marshall, Culver, Diles and Washington, who help comprised one of the deepest secondaries in the league ... came to Fresno State from the University of California, where he served as the Golden Bears' defensive backs coach and recruiting coordinator for five years ... helped guide such players as Marquis Smith, a third round draft choice of the Cleveland Browns in 1999, and Deltha O'Neal, a first round draft pick of the Denver Broncos in 2000 ... under Stewart, California led the Pac-10 in defense in 1999 ... his recruiting prowess helped gain Cal the addition of quarterback Kyle Boller ... became the Bears' recruiting coordinator in 2000 ... joined the coaching ranks in 1980 at Boise State, where he served as special teams coach for two years ... in 1982, he became the Broncos' wide receivers coach ... moved to Cal Poly in 1987 and served as the Mustangs' linebackers and special teams coach, then as the school's secondary and special teams coach from 1988-91 ... moved to Nevada in 1992, where he coached the defensive backs for the Wolf Pack ... spent two years at Nevada, where he had two players - Forey Duckett and Brock Marion - drafted by the NFL ... moved to UNLV for the 1994-96 seasons, during which he served as the Rebels' secondary coach ... he helped the program to their first bowl berth in 11 years when UNLV won the 1994 Big West crown.

ATHLETICS CAREER:

An all-conference cornerback at Moorpark (Calif.) Junior College ... was all-conference at Moorpark ... also played at Boise State, leading his team in interceptions as a senior.

LOS ANGELES – In a benefit charity bowl aiding the Under Privileged Children's Milk Fund of Los Angeles, the Bulldogs spent Christmas day battling through a game filled with deadlocked scores, intricate passing and a strong running game.

Before 5,000 roaring fans in Gilmore Stadium, Los Angeles, the Fresno State College Bulldogs clinched a last second 27-26 victory over the Arkansas State College Teachers (ASU Bears) from Conway Arkansas.

Fresno State jumped out with an early 7-0 lead in the first period starting from the 47-yard line and scoring with an acrobatic catch by Toby Heeb from quarterback Ken Gleason. ASU answered, ending the first half 7-7.

The final half of the game started with a quick seven for ASU as Montgomery crossed into the endzone standing up after a nearly 35-yard drive.

Down by seven, the Bulldogs took the ball at the 17-yard line beginning an offensive attack that resulted in a seven point boost with a touchdown from Granville Holbrook and an extra point from Ray Sturgill.

Tied at 14-14 the fourth quarter opened with a 35-yard punt return placing the ball on Fresno's 41. The offense did not stop there as the Bulldogs ran the ball 59 yards to score. The extra point went wide putting Fresno State up 20-14.

The Bears yet again retaliated tying the game 20-20 with a 65-yard drive and an endzone trip by Turner. The extra point edged ASU once again on par with the Bulldogs.

Fresno State found their way on top scoring their fourth touchdown by Holbrook on a 33-yard run and successfully placing the extra point.

Arkansas State would not give up as the game minutes were diminishing. Returning the kickoff, Bears' Montgomery faked a pass to teammate Burnett and ran an 85-yard touchdown. Threatening to tie the game, the Bulldogs' Frank McClurg blocked the kick securing a one-point Fresno State lead that would determine the Bulldogs' first-ever bowl game victory.

HONOLULU – The Bulldogs traveled to Honolulu to play before 22,000 wind-blown and rowdy spectators in the Pineapple Bowl. Matching up against the Hawai'i Rainbows, the Bulldogs found the needed three-point difference early in the fourth quarter to seal the Fresno State victory.

The 'Dogs produced the three-point game spread off a Dale Mickelwait 18-yard field goal held by Lloyd Leest. The Pineapple Bowl game-winner marked the second time Mickelwait booted the Bulldogs to victory this season. He secured the extra point conversion against Nevada to push the Bulldogs to a 7-6 triumph.

The 3-0 score is a misleading summary of the game considering both teams had several empty scoring attempts and the Bulldogs and Rainbows gained at least 200 yards apiece. Both teams found themselves with penalty problems - Hawai'i lost 40 yards and the Bulldogs dropped 55, but fumble action was fairly clean as Hawai'i created the game's one and only loose ball. Hawai'i held the Bulldogs twice within their five-yard line before Fresno State broke the three-quarter scoreless streak.

FRESNO, Calif. – Ratcliff Stadium and the Fresno State Bulldogs played host to 10,000 fans and the Drake Bulldogs for the first-ever Raisin Bowl.

Fresno State led for most of the game entering the fourth quarter with a 12-6 spread over Drake. With only 6:30 remaining in the game the Bulldogs opted not to utilize their successful running game, but instead went to their passing game on the second down. To quarterback Mel Gustafson's dismay, the pass did not find Bulldog hands but was interrupted by Drake guard Ralph Gruben who advanced the ball to the FS 24-yard line.

The following play proved fatal for Fresno State as Drake's halfback Jake Coupe connected a pass to Charles McDowell who ran the ball in from the 1-yard line. Jim Baer converted for the final point need to defeat the Bulldogs 13-12.

Fresno State found six of their total points in the first half, but not until after the Drake 'Dogs sent their first seven to the scoreboard.

Down by six, the Bulldogs opened the second quarter with an impressive offensive drive. Jack Kelley produced a 19-yard running touchdown play on a double-reverse crossing into the endzone standing. With a failed field goal attempt the score stood at 6-6 heading into the half.

Opening the final period, FS scored when Louis Papac received a shallow Drake punt on the Drake 44. Papac pulled defenders to his right then reversed his motion to hustle the ball all the way to the Drake 1-yard line where Hobza knocked him out of bounds. Gustafson was credited with the TD bulldozing into the endzone to score. Taylor's kick soared wide, but the 'Dogs were on top again leading 13-7.

With less than seven minutes remaining, the game appeared to be wrapped up, but the Bulldogs could not foresee the fatal intercepted pass that would put the game away for good.

LOS ANGELES — In remembrance of the 17 Cal Poly football players killed in a plane crash following a Bowling Green vs. Cal Poly game a year earlier, Fresno State and Bowling Green matched up for the Mercy Bowl Classic to raise money for the surviving widows and children and to dedicate a memorial in their honor. Before a then record breaking crowd of 33,145, the Bulldogs and Falcons raised \$200,000 as they played what would become known as one of the greatest victories in Bulldog head coach Cecil Coleman's career.

Six point underdogs entering the game, the Bulldogs surprised everyone but themselves in a trouncing 36-6 victory over Bowling Green ending the Bulldogs' unblemished season with a 10-0 record.

With a passing attack that would not, or could not be stopped, the Bulldogs trailed only once in the game defeating what was known as the fourth ranked team in the nation in total defense with their relentless air-strike.

The Bulldogs scored the next five touchdowns, breaking numerous school records and grabbing six interceptions to soundly win the game.

Bulldog Bruce Seifert scored a TD on a 1-yard run to start the third period. Masich gained a Bulldog point on the conversion.

Ahead 17-6, the Bulldogs passed over the grounded Falcons, a 23-yard strike from Carter to Barrett in the endzone. Although the extra point failed, the 'Dogs moved further out of reach.

On a 4-yard run Carter scored the final TD of the 20-point third quarter. Masich's extra point pushed the Bulldog spread to 30-6.

Carter found himself on a final 8-yard scoring run for the 'Dogs in the fourth, his second TD for the game. With the failed extra point attempt the Bulldogs retired the game 36-6.

Blocking three Lumberjack kicks would generally predict a Fresno State win, but the Bulldogs' 12 turnovers, seven intercepted passes and five fumbles made up the difference. The California Collegiate Athletic Association champion Bulldogs' effort was stunted even more with out-of-service phone communication between the press box coaching staff and field staff.

Despite the confusion, the Bulldogs opened the scoring by Tony Welch blocking a Lumberjack punt. Welch recovered the ball and ran it to the Humboldt State 5 where Walt Jensen drove it in to score and Ken Casida nailed the extra point.

With a seven point deficit the Lumberjacks, 10-1 and Far Western Conference champions, capitalized on the Bulldogs' offensive glitches and phone service problems coming from behind to take a 16-7 lead heading into the half.

The second half was more of the first as the Bulldogs came out strong. Jack Olson intercepted a likely TD pass from Lumberjack Dennis Sommer and ran the length of the field to set the 'Dogs up on the Humboldt State 1-yard line. Jensen scored and Casida converted cutting the spread to Humboldt State 16, Fresno State 14.

The Lumberjacks avenged the Bulldog seven with a Costello pass to Don Del Grande who found the endzone. Casida converted for the 23-14 lead.

Humboldt was not finished yet however finding Sousa crossing into Fresno State territory on a 4-yard pass from Banducci. The extra point sailed wide cementing the final score Humboldt State 29, Fresno State 14.

ANAHEIM, CALIF. — Playing for the 14 surviving children of three Fullerton State assistant coaches and a pilot who died in an airplane crash only a month earlier, the Fullerton State Titans came from behind to take the 17-14 Mercy Bowl II victory over the Fresno State Bulldogs.

In the second bowl in Fresno State history played for plane crash victims (1961 Mercy Bowl), the 'Dogs were never able to find a rhythm that would disassemble the Fullerton State offense.

The Titans led for the greater part of the match heading into the second half with a 10-0 lead over the Bulldogs. With 3:21 remaining in the first period Titan Don Cotalic blocked a Bulldog punt scoring on a 22-yard run. Bare-foot kicker Craig Hiatt earned the extra point for the Titans finding the early 7-0 lead. Before the half ended Fullerton State capitalized on more Bulldog trouble as a wild pass from Bulldog center Harry Mestjian caused desperation kick from Atomic Torosian netting only five yards. Bulldog penalties moved Fullerton State to the nine-yard line where the shoeless Titan nailed a 25-yard field goal for the 10-0 lead.

The Bulldogs found their strength after halftime driving 66 yards in just six plays and scoring off a 12-yard strike from John Behrens to Ben Childers. Childers caught the pigskin at the three-yard line and barreled his way into the endzone with two Fullerton State defenders hanging on his shirttail. Luis Stoetzl secured the extra point cutting the Titan lead to only three.

Fresno State fed off the Bulldog momentum finding seven more points to send to the scoreboard from a Fullerton fumble recovery and a 54-yard rocket from Behrens to flanker Gene Austin. Stoetzl nailed the extra point giving the Bulldogs their first 14-10 lead of the game.

The Titans retaliated however finding their last seven on an 88-yard drive, 11-play, 5-yard pass TD with only 3:32 left to play

FRESNO, CALIF. — Fresno State kept its tradition of last minute wins intact trailing by three TDs with 15:42 to play and bouncing back with a 22-point fourth quarter to capture the 29-28 victory with just 11 seconds remaining.

Bulldog flanker Vince Wesson caught a 2-yard pass from Jeff Tedford in the endzone to tie the game 28-28. The Bulldogs pushed ahead 29-28 when kicker Scott Darrow sent fans into a victory frenzy booting the extra point through the uprights.

The dramatic ending was the result of a slow Bulldogs start as the 'Dogs went scoreless until the third quarter. The Falcons however had no trouble jumping into the lead finding the endzone twice before the first half ended.

Trailing by 21, the Bulldogs awoke to the roar of Fresno State fans and proceeded to find their mark on the scoreboard. With an 11-yard pass to Stephone Paige from Jeff Tedford and the extra point from Scott Barrow, the 'Dogs cut the Falcon lead to 14.

The Falcons did not let the 'Dogs back in the game without a fight scoring another goal off a fumble recovery by Potts before the third period expired. The quarter is not the only thing that expired however, so had the Falcon scoring summary.

The remaining 15-minutes contained a Bulldog scoring spree beginning with an 80-yard series resulting in a four-yard run by Paige into the endzone. With the score now Bowling Green 28, Fresno State 14, the 'Dogs set out to find two more TDs.

Setting up on the Falcon 27-yard line, Tedford connected with Paige up the middle who evaded defenders and scored. Playing the odds, the 'Dogs completed a two-point conversion off a pass from Tedford to Terry Carter.

Trailing now by six, with game time steadily dropping from 3:16, the 'Dogs went into what would come to be a 44-yard series of seven plays, a Bowling Green facemask penalty and a Fresno State win with only 11 seconds remaining.

Paige set a school record with 246 yards receiving and tied another with 15 receptions. Tedford tied a school record with 373 yards in passing and set a single game record with 31 completions.

FRESNO, CALIF. — With a reputation as the highest scoring team in the nation, Fresno State dismantled Bowling Green, the Mid American Conference champion 51-7 in a rematch of the 1982 Cal Bowl II. The 'Dogs finished the season as the nation's only unbeaten Division I team in standing-room only Bulldog Stadium.

Quarterback Kevin Sweeney helped Fresno State's cause throwing for three touchdowns and the Bulldog running game churned out 225 yards, not to mention the Bulldog defense recovering five fumbles and intercepting three passes. The Falcons, stunned by the Bulldog strength, stood by watching their undefeated season and 14-game winning streak, the longest in the nation, come to an end.

The Bulldogs ended the first quarter with only seven of their to-be 51 points off a touchdown from James Williams on a 10-yard run down the center. Barry Belli nailed the extra point.

The Bulldogs 14-point second period boosted a 21-0 lead over the then-nationally ranked Falcons with an Anthony Mosley 1-yard run resulting from a Bulldog fumble recovery on the Bowling Green 12-yard line. Then, with 6:59 left in the half Bulldog Sweeney connected a 33-yard strike to Gene Taylor in the endzone. Belli secured both extra points.

The second half was simply more of the first with the Bulldogs scoring 23 points before time dissolved. Five minutes into the third quarter, Sweeney found Taylor alone on the sideline who scored on a 53-yard touchdown pass. Then, after an official timeout due to crowd noise, the Bulldogs marched 73 yards up the field scoring from a Kelly Skipper 29-yard run. Once again Belli completed the extra point pushing the score to 37-0 entering in the final period of play.

Sweeney connected a 40-yard pass with double-teamed Stephan Baker standing in the endzone. Then with 5:57 left in the game and the Bulldogs setting up on the 13-yard line, Skipper ran the ball through a wide gap down the center to seal the Fresno State California Bowl V victory. The 51-7 scoring margin ranks in Bulldog records as the highest bowl game spread and scoring game in Fresno State history.

FRESNO, CALIF. — Big West Conference champion Fresno State captured its third California Bowl title in seven years, before 31,272 fans in Bulldog Stadium.

The 'Dogs jumped out to an early 7-0 lead over the Broncos of Western Michigan when Mark Barsotti connected a 55-yard pass to Andre Alexander and Steve Loop nailed the extra point attempt.

The touchdown pair struck again in the second period when Barsotti found Alexander covering 38 yards, ball-in-hand, entering the endzone. Loop's extra point hit the target carrying the 'Dogs to a 14-0 lead.

The Broncos, silent through the first quarter, and the first minutes of the second, awoke to stun the Bulldogs with two consecutive touchdowns before the half dissolved. Robert Oliver crossed the line dragging a Bulldog defender off a 31-yard pass from Tony Kimbrough. John Creek gave the Broncos the extra point closing in on the Bulldog lead.

Less than two minutes passed before the Broncos landed in the endzone again. Setting up on the WMU 49-yard line, Rob Davis found an open tunnel through the defense and traveled into the endzone. Creek sent the extra point to the scoreboard tying the game 14-14.

Before time ran out, Bronco's Creek nailed a 29-yard field goal leaving the Bulldogs on their heels trailing 17-14 at the half for the first time at home during the '88 season.

The Bulldogs countered the Bronco lead in the second half with a ferocious running attack. On the Fresno State 35, Darrell Rosette located a hole in WMU defense and motored the ball 65-yards to score. Loop secured the extra point putting the Bulldogs again in the lead 21-20.

WMU responded with a touchdown by Davis only minutes later, but the Bulldogs held the momentum scoring on a 80-yard drive and a 4-yard run by Rosette.

Ahead 28-24, the Bulldogs relentlessly pushed the Broncos tallying seven more points before the third quarter closed. Bulldog Myron Jones, handled the ball on the WMU 26-yard line, faked hitting the middle and veered to the corner to run it in and score.

Fresno State's senior running back Darrell Rosette earned the Cal Bowl Most Valuable Player award after rushing for a career-high 149 yards, 101.

FRESNO, CALIF. — With the coin flip landing in Ball State favor the Bulldogs kicked off the last Fresno State football game of the decade unaware that the game would result in a 27-6 victory over Ball State, an 11-1 winning season, the second consecutive California Raisin Bowl victory and the Bulldogs' fourth California Raisin Bowl title in eight years ('82, '85, '88, '89).

With 31,610 Fresno State fans packing Bulldog Stadium the 'Dogs led the Ball State Cardinals through a scoreless first period. The second quarter brought 10 more minutes of empty scoreboard windows until the Bulldogs took control of the game kicking a 33-yard field goal by Steve Loop.

The three point Ball State deficit did not hold as Ball State drove 73 yards, following a failed 44-yard Bulldog field goal attempt, to threaten Fresno State from 1-yard line. Cardinal Tom Barbee snuck into the endzone, but the extra point soared wide to the left putting Ball State ahead 6-3.

The Bulldogs retaliated in full force with a completed pass from Mark Barsotti to Stephen Shelley who ran the ball unscathed into the endzone for a 91-yard touchdown. Loop's extra point sent the 'Dogs into halftime with a 10-6 lead.

The third quarter of play continued to boost the Fresno State Red Wave moral. Loop nailed a field goal through the uprights from 27-yards pushing the Bulldog spread to 13-6.

The final minutes of play cemented the Bulldog win as Fresno State pulled away with two more touchdowns, holding the Cardinal to the original six points they found in the second quarter.

Less than a minute into the fourth quarter Ron Cox, a junior All-American, intercepted a BSU desperation pass and ran the ball 58 yards into the endzone. Loop sent another extra point to the scoreboard that now displayed a 20-6 Fresno State lead.

The contest was put to an end with an easy touchdown pass from Eric Buechele to wide-open Curt Thornton standing alone in the endzone. Loop rocketed his third successful extra point of the game tallying the 27-6 Fresno State California Raisin Bowl victory.

Cox received Most Valuable Player of the game.

FRESNO, CALIF. — Bowling Green ended Fresno State's hope for a fourth California Raisin Bowl championship since 1982 on Bowling Green's 3-yard line, holding on for a 28-21 victory over the Bulldogs before a record bowl crowd of 34,877.

The Bulldogs, the Big West Conference champions who ended their season with a 10-2 record, needed to drive 99 yards inside the final three minutes for the game-tying touchdown. Behind senior quarterback Mark Barsotti, who was playing for the first time since breaking his leg on Oct. 19, Fresno State set up on Bowling Green's 3-yard line with 19 seconds to play. The Falcon defense played tight forcing Barsotti into three consecutive incomplete passes preserving the Bowling Green win.

Fresno State never ceased the relentless Bulldog attack entering the game as a two-touchdown favorite. The Falcons bolted out to leads of 14-0, 21-7 and 28-14 behind the passing combinations of quarterback Erik White and receiver Mark Szlachcic.

The Bulldogs cut the spread to 28-21 on a Barsotti TD pass to tight end Marty Thompson, then once again put themselves in position for the final drive on the Bowling Green 3-yard line after cornerback Tony Brown intercepted a White pass at the Fresno state 1-yard line.

The Bulldogs out-gained the Falcons 484-383, but the 'Dogs were constantly set back by costly penalties. Fresno State was flagged 11 times totaling 86 lost yards.

ANAHEIM, CALIF. — Fresno State pulled the bowl season's biggest and most talked about upset with a stunning 24-7 win over Southern Cal in the Freedom Bowl IX held in Anaheim Stadium. The Bulldogs dominated the Trojans in every facet of the game, most notably in total offense, where Fresno State enjoyed a 405-183 advantage.

Offense is what took Fresno state to the Freedom Bowl, but defense is what won the game that Bulldogs' head coach Jim Sweeney said was the "biggest game in Bulldog history."

The 'Dogs stole four turnovers from the favored Trojans and allowed only one third-down conversion in nine attempts. USC quarterback Rob Johnson found only seven completions in the Bulldogs' secondary and threw three interceptions. Those defensive numbers, plus a Fresno State offense that ran 84 plays created chaos for the tradition-packed Trojans.

In the second, the always-responsive Bulldogs answered an early Trojan touchdown with an 11-play, 70-yard drive resulting in a 1-yard plunge by game MVP Lorenzo Neal. Four mid-range passes by Trent Dilfer, including a 10-yarder to Tydus Winans on fourth down at the USC 33, energized the drive.

Derek Mahoney added a field goal in the third quarter to give the 'Dogs the lead, but two fourth quarter touchdowns sent the 30,000 Red Wavers in attendance back home with a win. Eight runs for 32 yards helped set up a 22-yard pass from Dilfer to Winans that put Fresno State at the USC two-yard line with just under six minutes to play. From there, Anthony Daigle took the ball across the goal line.

Big runs of 32 yards by Ron Rivers and 17 by Daigle moved the 'Dogs up the field while using most of the remaining time on the clock. It took only five plays for Fresno State to travel 56 yards and get the game-clinching score on a 5-yard dash up the middle by Rivers.

HONOLULU — Before 44,009 fans Trent Dilfer passed for a career-best 523 yards and two touchdowns, but it was not enough for the Bulldogs to overcome 17th-ranked Colorado which dealt the Bulldogs a 41-30 setback at Aloha Stadium in the 12th annual Jeep Eagle Aloha Bowl on Christmas Day.

The Bulldogs, who finished second nationally in the turnover margin, turned the ball over an uncharacteristic five times in the game which led directly to 24 Colorado points. The Buffaloes, Big Eight runner-up, led the entire game, once by as many as 18 points, but were never able to put the Bulldogs away.

Fresno State trailed 20-3 with one second left in the first half, but before time could run out Jamie Christian and Malcolm Seabron combined on an 81-yard kickoff return for a touchdown pulling the Bulldogs within 10 (20-10) heading into the second half.

The remaining 30 minutes were filled with scoring as the Buffaloes connected for 21 more points including a 40-yard run by Buffaloes' Salaam and a 28-yard fumble return by Leomiti. The Bulldogs contributed to the excitement closing in on the Buffaloes scoring three touchdowns of their own. Daigle found the endzone on a 1-yard carry in the third quarter followed by two Tydas Winans' TDs near the end of the third quarter and again at the conclusion of the fourth.

The Bulldogs, who came into the contest ranked 20th nationally in rushing (221.6 ypg), were held to just three net yards in the bowl contest. The Bulldogs out-gained the Buffaloes in total yards, 526-395.

LAS VEGAS – In their first bowl appearance since the 1993 season, the Bulldogs battled the Utah Utes of the Mountain West Conference in one of the best games of the bowl season. The was highlighted by the running of Mike Anderson, who ran for a game-record 254 yards and two touchdowns. Cletus Truhe kicked a 33-yard field goal with five minutes left as Utah beat Fresno State 17-16.

Fresno State went ahead 16-14 on the first play of the fourth quarter, but Colby Knight blocked Jeff Hanna's extra point attempt, setting the stage for Truhe's game winner. The game-winning kick was vindication for Truhe, whose first two field goal tries were blocked by Fresno's Terence Brown. The first block was returned 75 yards for a touchdown by Payton Williams.

Anderson scored on runs of 34 and 5 yards, the latter giving Utah (9-3) a 14-10 third-quarter lead. Fresno State answered with Derrick Ward's 2-yard TD run as the fourth quarter opened, giving the Bulldogs a 2-point lead.

Utah dominated the ball, gaining a bowl-record 334 yards rushing. Despite outgaining Fresno State 331 yards to 103, the Utes managed only a 7-all tie at halftime, the score coming on Anderson's 34-yard run with 3:51 left in the first quarter.

The Bulldogs went ahead 10-7 on Hanna's 27-yard field goal with 9:24 remaining in the third quarter.

The Utes regained the lead when Anderson finished a 68-yard drive with a 5-yard scoring run, breaking three tackles en route to his second touchdown of the night.

With Anderson breaking off key gains, the Utes drove 70 yards to the Bulldogs 14 before Truhe came on to kick the game-winning field goal with 5:03 remaining.

SAN JOSE, CALIF. — After being down 34-7 at halftime, many thought the Bulldogs would be in for a rout, but Fresno State responded only to come up 33 yards short with 14 seconds remaining as Air Force defeated Fresno State 37-34 in the inaugural bowl game at Spartan Stadium.

David Carr threw five touchdown passes for the Bulldogs, who nearly pulled it off. With 14 seconds left, Fresno State brought in Asen Asparuhov for a 33-yard field-goal attempt to tie it.

But holder Jason Simpson pulled a fake, aiming for Giachino Chiaramonte in the end zone. The pass fell incomplete.

Trailing 19-0 late in the first quarter, Fresno State finally got on the board with a 71-yard touchdown pass from Carr to Paris Gaines with 23 second left in the opening quarter. It was the longest reception of Gaines' career.

Carr completed 22 of 33 passes for 391 yards.

Thiessen's pass to Chris Jessop gave Air Force a 34-7 lead in the first half.

Fresno State mounted a comeback in the second half. The Bulldogs took a chance on fourth-and-2 in the third quarter and Carr's completion to Alec Greco in the end zone made it 34-14.

After Dave Adams booted his 24-yard field goal for Air Force, Carr threw an 8-yard scoring pass to Donnell Burch to narrow the margin to 37-20.

Adams attempted a 30-yard field goal with 10:47 left in the game, but Fresno State's Terence Brown blocked the kick. That set up a scoring drive that ended with Carr's 47-yard pass to Bernard Berrian.

Berrian caught a 51-yard pass from Carr a little more than three minutes later, and the crowd - mostly Fresno State fans - went wild.

SAN JOSE, CALIF. — Charles Rogers set a Michigan State record with 270 yards receiving - and he wasn't even the most prolific pass-catcher on the field at the Silicon Valley Football Classic.

It was that kind of a day in San Jose, as Rogers caught two of Jeff Smoker's three touchdown passes during the Spartans' phenomenal first half in a 44-35 victory over Fresno State on Monday.

In a matchup of two potent offenses that combined for 1,146 total yards, Smoker and Rogers outdueled Fresno State's high-profile combo of David Carr and Rodney Wright, who finished with 13 catches for a school-record 299 yards and two TDs.

After an inconsistent season in which they finished eighth in the Big Ten and barely qualified for a bowl, the Spartans (7-5) gained 405 yards and scored 37 points before halftime.

Carr threw for 531 yards to Smoker's 376, but the Spartans' big early lead proved too large to overcome. After Fresno State (11-3) pulled within two points in the final minutes, the Spartans made one last scoring drive to clinch their second bowl victory under coach Bobby Williams.

T.J. Duckett rushed for 184 yards and two scores as Michigan State overwhelmed the Bulldogs, whose high-octane offense was expected to dominate the game. Instead, Fresno State ended its breakout season with its first loss in four games against teams from BCS conferences.

Carr, who won the Johnny Unitas award as the nation's top senior quarterback, ended his prolific career with another amazing game, but he couldn't play defense. Fresno State fell to 0-3 in bowl games during Pat Hill's otherwise successful tenure.

After the teams exchanged handshakes, Michigan State defensive end Nick Myers, the game's defensive MVP, planted the school flag at midfield.

Trailing 37-28 with 6:52 left, Fresno State's Bryce McGill blocked Craig Jarrett's punt and returned it to the Spartans 16. Two plays later, Paris Gaines caught a screen pass and ran through several blocks for a TD.

But Michigan State came alive once again for a 77-yard drive. After a 43-yard reception by Rogers, Smoker hit Ivory McCoy for a 5-yard TD with 1:59 left.

After just two seasons, this unassuming lower-tier bowl game is building a reputation for exciting, bizarre football. Last season, the Bulldogs overcame a 27-point deficit, but lost the inaugural game to Air Force when a superbly executed fake field goal failed in the closing seconds.

Though Spartan Stadium was dominated by thousands of red-clad fans who made the two-hour drive from Fresno, Michigan State had a large rooting section of transplanted Michiganders and thousands of fans who made the trip for the bowl and the Michigan State basketball team's game against Stanford last Saturday.

Fresno State opened the frenzied first half by driving 63 yards in four plays for the first TD just 59 seconds in. Less than eight minutes later, Michigan State replied with a 72-yard TD pass from Smoker to Rogers.

Offensive milestones fell faster than snow in East Lansing on a surprisingly warm, dry day after a week of rain in the San Francisco Bay area.

In the first quarter alone, the Spartans had the longest rush in the school's bowl history, the second-longest pass in their bowl history, their longest field goal of the season and their first defensive touchdown of the year.

With a 69-yard TD pass to Rogers 3:05 before halftime, Michigan State went ahead 37-21. The teams combined for 752 total yards in the first half.

SAN JOSE, CALIF. — Rodney Davis rushed for 153 yards and two touchdowns and Fresno State's defense forced seven turnovers as the Bulldogs — playing with a depleted roster — defeated Georgia Tech 30-21 at Spartan Stadium.

The Bulldogs (9-5) had not won a postseason game since beating USC in the 1992 Freedom Bowl, a string of four losses in a row.

And they were even more proud they did it with a roster missing some of the team's best players. Fresno State suited only 45 players and was missing five starters.

"This win was for the guys who couldn't make it," Davis said.

A new Western Athletic Conference rule requires athletes to pass at least six credits to play in a bowl game, and seven didn't meet the requirement. They may have had incompletes or grades that had not yet been finalized, for example.

"For the nation to think we played with ineligible players is a misconception," coach Pat Hill said. "We were playing with non-certified players. ...I'm so proud of this football team. We had some adversity this week and this season."

Three seniors stayed home, some because their grades weren't posted.

"That drives me nuts," Hill said. "But we persevered."

Asen Asparuhov kicked a 33-yard field goal with 3:43 left, one of his three in the game, and Davis clinched the victory with a 28-yard TD run just more than a minute later for the Bulldogs.

And the Fresno State defense did an impressive job after halftime of weathering a strong second-half comeback attempt by Georgia Tech freshman backup quarterback Damarius Bilbo.

Bilbo passed for a touchdown and ran for another after replacing the ineffective A.J. Suggs, but Bilbo also threw four interceptions as the Yellow Jackets (7-6) committed seven turnovers.

Georgia Tech was the only team in the ACC to throw more interceptions (14) than touchdowns (13) this season.

"I'm disappointed with the execution," coach Chan Gailey said. "Obviously, you have to be able to stop the run and you have to be able to execute on offense, and we didn't do either well."

The game turned into a muddy mess after hard rain fell Monday night. It took only a few plays for Georgia Tech's gleaming white uniforms to turn a dull brown, and there were plenty of slips and missed plays.

In a lackluster first half, the teams struggled to take advantage of their scoring opportunities, with Fresno State leading 13-7 at halftime.

Dee Meza's 48-yard interception return for a touchdown with 14 seconds left in the second quarter highlighted the half.

Fresno State was playing in the Silicon Valley Classic for the third consecutive year, and Bulldogs fans took up the majority of the seats at Spartan Stadium.

SAN JOSE, CALIF. — Pat Hill used to watch Rodney Davis grind out yards in the snow and mud in high school - so Fresno State's coach knew the star senior would be well suited for the conditions Tuesday night.

Davis rushed for 77 yards to win his second straight Silicon Valley Classic offensive MVP award in Fresno State's 17-9 victory over UCLA on a messy field at Spartan Stadium. Nearly one year ago, Davis rushed for 153 yards and two TDs -- the last being the game-clincher -- in Fresno State's victory over Georgia Tech.

"I just had to fight through it and stick with it," Davis said. "I've played on fields like this for a long time. The mud is no problem."

It sure seemed to be bad for the Bruins.

Though even a dry field might have caused them problems the way their offense has been performing.

UCLA (6-7) lost its last five games to turn what once was a promising season into a disappointment under first-year coach Karl Dorrell. The inefficient offense was again the culprit, going 2-for-14 on third-down conversions.

Bryson Sumlin made his first career touchdown catch and also ran for a score for Fresno State (9-5), which made its school-record fifth straight bowl appearance and fourth in a row in this game. Sumlin, a sophomore backup who began his Fresno State career as a cornerback, capitalized on two big chances to score and helped the Bulldogs beat the Bruins for the first time in six meetings. And once again, the Bulldogs seized the opportunity to spoil things for a bigger, more prominent program in a game dominated by defense.

Paul Pinegar passed for 133 yards, but Fresno State didn't exactly need a prolific offense to beat the inept Bruins, who managed just 164 total yards - 97 in one series shortly before halftime.

Manuel Sanchez intercepted Bruins quarterback Drew Olson with 2:42 left and several Bulldogs celebrated their win by sliding face-first through the mud.

"Our defense just played awesome the whole game," Hill said.

Fresno State seemed to be in control until a drive midway through the third quarter in which a series of mistakes left the Bulldogs facing fourth-and-37. Asi Faoa blocked the ensuing punt in the end zone for a UCLA safety.

Later in the quarter, Pinegar fumbled when he attempted to throw and left Fresno State stranded at its own 1. But the Bruins bailed out the Bulldogs by roughing punter Mike Lingua, and UCLA never mounted another significant drive.

The Bruins swore they were happy with their less than glamorous bowl destination, but they sure didn't play that way. UCLA seemed disinterested and disorganized, struggling to stop Fresno State's offense and failing to move the ball through the air or on the ground while falling behind 17-0 early in the second quarter.

After Fresno State stopped UCLA on fourth-and-1 late in the first quarter, Pinegar completed a 44-yard TD pass to Sumlin, who also had a 1-yard scoring run earlier in the period.

When Fresno State downed a punt inside the 3 shortly before halftime, the Bruins briefly woke up. UCLA went 97 yards in just seven plays, with Craig Bragg making a spectacular 27-yard diving catch in the corner of the end zone 20 seconds before halftime for the Bruins' first score.

Fresno State lost the first two Silicon Valley Classics, including a thrilling last-second defeat on a failed fake field goal in the inaugural game. The Bulldogs beat Georgia Tech in the game last season, overcoming several injuries for the school's first bowl victory since 1992.

BOISE, IDAHO — Paul Pinegar shrugged off midseason criticism and kept throwing for touchdowns.

Pinegar had five TD passes, including the game-winning 25-yarder to Stephen Spach in overtime, as Fresno State beat No. 18 Virginia 37-34 in the MPC Computers Bowl on Monday.

"Winning feels great, especially against a Virginia team that has a great defense," Pinegar said.

He was fabulous, completing 23 of 36 passes for 235 yards without an interception, helping the Bulldogs (9-3) erase a 21-7 second-quarter deficit and notch another win against a big-name team.

Fresno State, the third-place team in the Western Athletic Conference, added the Cavaliers (8-4) of the Atlantic Coast Conference to a list of victims that has included Colorado, Oregon State, Wisconsin, Washington and Kansas State in recent years.

"We've got a lot of great teams in the WAC: Boise State, Hawaii, UTEP," Pinegar said. "We've showed that we definitely can compete with some of the best teams in the nation."

His five touchdown passes were a record for the game, formerly known as the Humanitarian Bowl.

Virginia got the first possession of overtime, taking a 34-31 lead on a 26-yard field goal by Connor Hughes.

It didn't take Pinegar long to end it, though. He froze the defense with a play-action call and zipped a pass inside the 5 to Spach, who fought off a pair of would-be tacklers and dropped into the end zone.

"We ought to be able to cover a post pass when we know it's a post pass situation," Virginia coach Al Groh said.

The Bulldogs stormed off the sideline in celebration while the Cavaliers were left dazed.

"When you catch the ball in that situation, you're just looking for the end zone," Spach said. "You just keep on running. I knew I was really close."

Virginia had things in hand after Wali Lundy followed his big blockers and rumbled across the blue turf at Boise State's home field on a 20-yard TD run that put the Cavaliers up 31-24 with 6:20 remaining.

But Pinegar wasn't finished. He started on the 17, turning to the ground game and working the clock to give Fresno State a chance to tie.

Wendell Mathis ran 22 yards to Virginia's 25 and Bryson Sumlin reached the 15 on a 6-yard burst. On third-and-6 at the 10, Pinegar threaded a 7-yard pass into double coverage to tight end Duncan Reid, then spiked the ball to stop the clock at 28 seconds.

That put the ball at the 3, but soon the Bulldogs faced fourth-and-goal. Pinegar rolled right and connected with Jaron Fairman for a TD with 11 seconds to go.

"My last option was to tuck it and run, but that would have been tough sledding to get in," Pinegar said. "Jaron made a great catch. After he caught it, they swiped at his arm but he did a great job to hold on."

Brent Vinsintainer added the point after, and it was tied at 31.

"We never panicked when we were down 14 points," said Pinegar, who was harshly criticized when Fresno State lost three straight games after a 3-0 start. "We knew we just needed to stop making mistakes."

"He's 24-8 now. I've always believed," Bulldogs coach Pat Hill said. "Everybody always wants to change things. I know one thing about him: He wins. I feel very, very comfortable with Paul at quarterback."

Pinegar is now 3-0 in bowl games as Fresno State's quarterback.

Mathis ran for 126 yards on 15 carries, and Sumlin added 94 yards on 21 attempts. The Bulldogs established a second-half ground game after being outplayed by the bigger Cavaliers in the first half.

"In the first half, we were just a little bit out of sync," Hill said. "It was a feeling-out process. I felt we were capable of moving the ball. At halftime, we talked about playing a physical game."

Virginia quarterback Marques Hagans also had a great game, throwing for 162 yards on 18-of-30 passing with one TD. He ran for 85 yards and a TD, and his team's best play was often a drop-back pass that morphed into a long scramble.

"A very good quarterback," Bulldogs defensive tackle Garrett McIntyre said. "He's the best scrambler I've ever gone against. He's a running back who's playing quarterback."

MEMPHIS, TENN. — Paul Smith ran four yards for the winning touchdown with 2:55 remaining and Tulsa's defense had two key fourth-quarter interceptions in a 31-24 victory over Fresno State in the Liberty Bowl on Saturday.

Smith, the game's MVP, finished 18-of-27 passing for 234 yards with a 54-yard touchdown pass to Ashlan Davis, but made his biggest play on the ground when he scrambled around three Fresno State defenders and into the end zone to secure Tulsa's first bowl victory since 1991.

Defensive back Anthony Germany set up that play by picking off Paul Pinegar's pass with just under 7 minutes remaining. Smith then led Tulsa on the decisive eight-play, 52-yard drive.

Fresno State (8-5) had one final chance to force overtime and Pinegar drove the Bulldogs to the Tulsa 42 before his pass toward the sideline was picked off by linebacker Nelson Coleman.

The Golden Hurricane (9-4) then ran out the clock and celebrated their first bowl victory since they beat San Diego State in the Freedom Bowl in 1991.

Tulsa had to come from behind to beat its former WAC rival in Fresno State, which was ranked as high as No. 16 in the nation back in November. Fresno State took a 24-17 lead on Pinegar's 21-yard touchdown pass to Joe Fernandez on the second play of the quarter.

The Golden Hurricane tied it at 24-24 two possessions later when Smith found Davis streaking behind the secondary for a 54-yard TD pass.

Tarrison Adams led Tulsa with 102 yards rushing, but most of that came on a 63-yard touchdown burst in the second quarter. That scoring run gave Tulsa its first lead at 14-7 and came about 4 minutes after teammate Uril Parrish tied it by running 22 yards for the Golden Hurricane's first touchdown.

Pinegar finished 19-of-30 passing for 213 yards with one touchdown and two interceptions, while Wendell Mathis had 117 yards rushing and his WAC-best 15th rushing touchdown of the season for Fresno State.

Pinegar also was denied in his attempt to become the first quarterback to go 4-0 as a starter in bowl games.

The former WAC rivals traded field goals in the second and third quarters, with Brad DeVault kicking a 41-yarder on the final play of the first half to give Tulsa a 17-14 halftime lead. Fresno State tied it at 17 on Kyle Zimmerman's 27-yard field goal early in the third.

Fresno State backup Bryson Sumlin had a 25-yard TD run late in the first half.

BOISE, IDAHO — Fresno State capped a terrific season by adding Georgia Tech - again - to their list of conquests from BCS conferences.

Clifton Smith rushed for 152 yards and two touchdowns, Tom Brandstater threw for a score and ran for another and the Bulldogs beat Georgia Tech 40-28 in the Humanitarian Bowl.

It's Fresno State's second bowl win over Georgia Tech, after beating the Yellow Jackets 30-21 in the 2002 Silicon Valley Football Classic, and it made the Bulldogs 3-0 against the ACC in bowls. Fresno State has won four of its last five bowl games, all four wins coming against teams from the six conferences with automatic bids to the Bowl Championship Series.

Fresno State scored 27 consecutive points after Tech jumped ahead 7-0, and rolled up 571 yards of total offense, the most allowed by the Yellow Jackets this season. Georgia Tech, which led the country in sacks with 47, never got to Brandstater.

Brandstater was Tech's biggest problem early on, before Smith took over with 135 yards rushing in the second half and both of his TDs. Brandstater even added a 24-yard TD run in the third quarter, behind an escort from tight end Bear Pascoe.

But it was his first half that was most impressive, when Brandstater directed scoring drives of 82, 90 and 91 yards, and the Bulldogs scored 17 points in the second quarter, including 10 in the final 2 minutes.

Brandstater, who finished 23 of 30 passing, threw a 3-yard TD pass to Drew Lubinsky with 1:54 left in the half, the first catch of the junior's college career.

Georgia Tech drove to the Fresno State 47, but on fourth down with 23 seconds left, quarterback Taylor Bennett was sacked. Brandstater then completed three straight passes and Clint Stitser kicked a 39-yard field goal, his second of the half, to give the Bulldogs a 20-7 lead. Smith then started the second half with a 43-yard TD run to give Fresno State a 27-7 lead.

Backup quarterback Calvin Booker, in for injured starter Taylor Bennett, threw a towering jump ball that D.J. Donley wrestled from Fresno State defensive backs Moses Harris and Damion Owens, pulling the Yellow Jackets within six with 13:06 left.

Brandstater tried to answer, leading the Bulldogs inside the Tech 10. But wide receiver Marlon Moore, who scored on a 6-yard run in the first half, fumbled on a hit by safety Joe Gaston. After Darryl Richard recovered, the Bulldogs' defense held and Smith capped his career-best day with a 32-yard sprint with 1:50 remaining.

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. -- Fresno State had two backs each rush for 100 yards and two touchdowns, but Bulldog miscues in the final quarter saw Colorado State outscore the Bulldogs 20-7 and win 40-35.

The Dogs couldn't find an answer for Ram back Gartrell Johnson, who rushed for a career-high 285 yards and scored two touchdowns.

The Rams (7-6) took their first lead at 33-28 when Billy Farris threw a 69-yard TD to Rashaun Greer with seven minutes left. Fresno State cornerback Sharrod Davis took a big chance but whiffed on his attempt to bat the ball. Greer made the catch at the 30 and went untouched into the end zone.

The loss also spoiled big rushing efforts by Anthony Harding and Lonyae Miller, who each scored twice. Harding finished with 120 yards rushing, and Miller added 113. Fresno State got within 40-35 with 55 seconds to go when Tom Brandstater threw a 7-yard pass to Ryan Skidmore. But Colorado State's Kyle Bell had no trouble fielding the ensuing onside kick.

The loss capped a rough season for the injury-depleted Bulldogs (7-6), who talked in fall workouts about a possible Bowl Championship Series run. They led 28-20 early in the fourth quarter.

Johnson was named most valuable offensive player in front of 24,735 fans.

This was the second bowl game of the bowl season.

He broke a 57-yard run in the first quarter and went another 57 yards on a shovel pass from Farris in the second, leaving defenders reaching for the dreadlocks tumbling out of his helmet.

Johnson, who averaged 99 yards rushing this season, had 97 by the end of the first quarter. He went wild against a young Fresno State defense that had allowed 197 yards rushing per game.

The Rams trailed 21-20 after 6-foot-6 Kory Sperry caught a perfectly placed ball from Farris and beat two defenders in the corner of the end zone with two seconds remaining in the first half.

The Bulldogs played without six starters--four on defense--who were lost for the season. But they were in control most of the way. Miller scored Fresno State's first TD on a 1-yard plunge. Then he bounced outside for a 69-yard TD run to put the Bulldogs up 21-13 late in the second quarter.

The Bulldogs were playing in their ninth bowl game in the last 10 years. Only 16 other schools playing in bowl games this season have been as successful.
