Up Next

Fresno State will make its sixth consecutive bowl appearance, and 19th overall, on Dec. 27 when it takes on 18th-ranked Virginia at 11 a.m. PT in the MPC Computers Bowl at Bronco Stadium in Boise, Idaho. The Bulldogs (8-3, 5-3 WAC) finished the regular season on the best roll in program history, winning their last five while averaging 56 points per game and becoming just the sixth team in NCAA history to rack up 50-plus points in four games in a row. The Cavaliers (8-3, 5-3 ACC) were ranked as high as sixth at one point this year and enter the bowl as Fresno State's first ranked postseason opponent since No. 17 Colorado in the 1993 Jeep Aloha Bowl. The MPC Computers Bowl will be televised nationally by ESPN, the Bulldogs' fifth national TV game of the season.

Fresno State All-Time in Bowl Games

The Bulldogs are 10-8 all-time in bowl games, including victories in the last two, both over BCS Conference-affiliated competition. This year's contest will mark Fresno State's sixth consecutive appearance in a bowl, the longest streak among schools in the western United States. The Bulldogs have played a BCS team in a bowl four years in a row, making them the only non-BCS school to do so. Fresno State's current bowl streak spans the 1999 Las Vegas Bowl and the 2000-03 Silicon Valley Football Classics. Last year, the Bulldogs knocked off UCLA 17-9, and in 2002 defeated Georgia Tech 30-21.

Fresno State All-Time vs. Virginia

The MPC Computers Bowl will be the first ever matchup between the Bulldogs and Cavaliers. In fact, Fresno State has never played a team from the state of Virginia until this bowl game.

Offensive Minded

During the final five games of the regular season, Fresno State's offense clicked as well as it ever has in program history, and as a result the Bulldogs currently rank fifth nationally in scoring offense, averaging 40.5 points per game. But what the team accomplished down the stretch was simply crazy. During its current five-game winning streak, Fresno State is averaging 56 points per game, and it surpassed the 50-point mark in the last four, becoming just the sixth team in NCAA history to accomplish that. The last time the Bulldogs were close to this potent offensively was in 2001 when they averaged 40.0 points per game and racked up a school record 560 points. But it's important to note that team played 14 games (13 regular season plus a bowl game), two more than the maximum number this year's team could play. In addition, compared to 2001, which featured a David Carr-led offense slanted toward the pass, the 2004 offense has been very balanced. Fresno State is averaging 399.7 yards per game – 228.0 on the ground and 171.1 through the air.

Head Coach Pat Hill

All of the credit for the resurgence of Bulldog football can be traced to head coach Pat Hill. Hill took over a declining program in 1997 and within three years had won a championship and guided his team to a bowl game. More importantly, Hill infused academic integrity to the program, lifting the program from a 2.21 GPA to a 2.77.

Now in his eighth season at the helm, Hill once again has Fresno State receiving national attention as one of the nation's top non-BCS programs. The Bulldogs have been selected to win the WAC title by most national publications, including ESPN.com and collegefootballnews.com.

It took Hill just three seasons to turn around a program that had sagged since the glory days of the early 1990's. In 1999, the Bulldogs earned a share of a WAC championship, made their first bowl appearance since 1993 and produced a league-best six first-team All-WAC players. In addition, Fresno State led the WAC academic scholars with 14 and produced the program's first Academic All-American, Payton Williams.

Since arriving, money has been raised to build a new football facility, improvements to the Duncan Building's training room, expansion to the football offices and a new academic center that will benefit all student-athletes at Fresno State.

Last year, Hill completed his seventh season as head coach and 13th overall, having spent six seasons as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator (1984-89) under Jim Sweeney when the Bulldogs were among the nation's most successful teams. Fresno State posted a 53-16-1 overall record during those six seasons.

Since arriving at Fresno State, Hill has built a reputation as a strong recruiter. In addition to landing the Bulldogs in five consecutive bowl games, Hill has helped produce 13 players on NFL rosters entering the 2003 season, the third-highest total of any non-BCS school.

Hill Moving Up Career Victory List

Fresno State's five-game run of success did more than move the team up in the WAC standings. It also increased Pat Hill's win total with the Bulldogs to 63, the second-most in program history. Only Jim Sweeney, for whom Hill was an assistant from 1984-89, has more wins. The legendary Sweeney, who served as Fresno State's head coach from 1976-77 and 1980-96, had 143.

Going Bowling...Again

What is becoming a staple of any Pat Hill team – a strong November finish – helped Fresno State put itself into a bowl game for a program-record sixth consecutive year. The Bulldogs six bowl appearances in a row is the longest streak among western U.S. schools. Entering this year, Oregon, with eight, had made more postseason appearances consecutively than Fresno State. However, with the Ducks not being bowl eligible this year, and the Bulldogs playing in the MPC Computers Bowl, Fresno State will now have the longest bowl streak among western schools.

Bulldogs Named FedEx Orange Bowl National Team of the Week

Fresno State's 45-21 victory over then-No. 13 Kansas State on Sept. 11 led the team to be named the national team of the week by both the FedEx Orange Bowl and the College Sports Report. It was the first ever honor for the Bulldogs, who are now 3-1 with back-to-back road wins over BCS Conference schools Washington and KSU and a home victory against Portland State.

'Dog Data

Bulldogs on KMJ Radio 580

Every Fresno State football game is broadcast live throughout the San Joaquin Valley on KMJ (AM 580). Veteran sportscaster Bill Woodward returns for his 33rd season behind the microphone handling play-by-play duties. Former Bulldog standout quarterback Mark Barsotti will be the analyst while Ron Shapley will serve as sideline reporter. KMJ's gameday coverage begins with "Dog Talk," a two-hour call-in show. That is followed by a half-hour pregame show. A one-hour "Postgame 'Dog Talk" follows each broadcast.

Novembers to Remember

When the calendar turned from October to November, the smiles on the faces of the Fresno State players were easy to see. The Bulldogs went 1-3 in October, with consecutive losses to Louisiana Tech, UTEP and Boise State. However, as has been their custom under Pat Hill, the team played very well in November, winning all four of their games in blowout fashion. Since 2000, Fresno State is 20-2 in post-October regular season games, including wins in 19 of the last 20 overall and nine in a row on the road. Best in the West

Pick Parade

Fresno State has built a reputation as one of the most proficient teams in the nation at intercepting passes, and the team was up to its old tricks in 2004. On the year, the Bulldogs intercepted 16 passes, the third-best total in the WAC and tied for 13th-most in the nation. And when the passes are picked off, the secondary is doing something with the returns. On the year, Fresno State is averaging 28.2 yards per interception return and have taken back four INTs for touchdowns. The Bulldogs also boast one of the nation's best pass defenses. Fresno State's pass efficiency total of 97.9 is fourth-best in the country.

Bulldogs' Two-Headed Backfield Monster

The way Bryson Sumlin and Wendell Mathis played toward the end of the season, they entered any conversation about the best running back tandems in the nation. Each went over 100 yards in each of the last three games and four times on the year. Sumlin finished up the regular season with 1,008 rushing yards, ranking him fourth in the WAC and 34th in the nation while Mathis ranks sixth (and 39th in the nation) at 869 yards. In eclipsing 1,000 yards, Sumlin became the 12th player in program history to surpass that plateau. However, never in the program's annals have two running backs both achieved 1,000 yards in the same season.

Fresno State Miscellany

Bulldog Stadium at Jim Sweeney Field

Since taking over Bulldog Stadium in 1980, Fresno State has one of the best home records in college football. One of the most beautiful stadiums in the Western Athletic Conference, Bulldog Stadium underwent a two-phase expansion project in 1991, increasing seating by 10,000 – to a capacity of 41,031 – and adding 22 sky suites. Jim Sweeney was Fresno State's head coach (1976-77, 1980-96) who won eight conference championships, five bowl game titles and guided the Bulldogs to a 143-75-3 record and won 200 games as a college coach, 16th-most in NCAA history.

Academic Gameplan

Since Pat Hill took over the Fresno State program, the Bulldogs have become national leaders in academic success. One of Hill's first tasks was hiring John Baxter as associate head coach. Baxter's trademarked Academic Gameplan is a proven winner across the nation. In the third year of the Gameplan, the football program produced a WAC-best 14 scholar-athletes, the school's first Academic All-American and the number of honored athletes at the Kiwanis Torch of Excellence dinner grew from four to 33. The team's GPA was raised from 2.12 to 2.77 in three seasons. Academic Gameplan has been featured in many publications, including the Dec. 20, 1999, issue of *Sports Illustrated*. Academic Gameplan is used by Oregon, Washington State, Southern Mississippi and Notre Dame. Since 1997, the Bulldogs have produced 49 Academic All-WAC performers, more than any team in the league during that period. Fresno State had a WAC-best 10 Academic All-WAC selections in 2002, marking the third consecutive year of leading the conference in academic picks.

"V" is for Valley

Fresno State prides itself on being the "Valley's Team." This pride can be seen in the form of a large green V on the back of the Bulldog helmets as a symbol to the agricultural community of the San Joaquin Valley. The Valley is the world's richest agricultural area in export dollars.

The Bulldog Foundation

Fresno State's famous Bulldog Foundation has been the No. 1 fundraising organization in the nation for 17 consecutive years. This volunteer group raises over \$7 million annually for the Fresno State Athletics Department. The BDF is headed by Executive Director Pat Ogle, the 1996 National Fundraiser of the Year. The monies raised by the BDF go towards scholarships, recruiting and special needs of the department.

When Identifying Fresno State...

The official name of the school is California State University, Fresno. For athletics department purposes, the University prefers to be simply called Fresno State. **Please do not refer to the school as Fresno State University or FSU.** For graphics or abbreviations, we ask that you please use FS – not FSU or CSUF.

Bulldogs vs. the BCS Schools

Under Pat Hill, Fresno State has scheduled aggressively in the non-conference season, playing as many games against BCS Conference opponents as any other school. The Bulldogs have enjoyed success against those teams as of late, going 9-6 in their last 15 contests against BCS schools, the most victories of any non-BCS team. The year's schedule started no differently, and Fresno State was more than up to the challenge, knocking off Washington and 13th-ranked Kansas State, both on the road. Below is a look at Fresno State's last 15 games against BCS opposition. Note that of the Bulldogs' last 12 games against BCS teams, only one has come at home (Oregon State in 2003):

Bulldog Block Party

In 2003 the Bulldogs totaled nine blocked kicks, the most since 2000 and just one shy of the school record, set in 1999. The kick-blocking prowess was in evidence in the last five games, which saw Fresno State block three punts (vs. SMU, at Rice, at San Jose State). Of those three, Jaron Fairman had two, including in the regular season finale against SJSU. The Bulldogs have thrust itself into the nation's elite in blocking punts and kicks since Pat Hill took over in 1997. Under Hill, Fresno State has blocked 53 kicks and are averaging one block every 1.9 games. Following is a breakdown of Fresno State's kick blocking prowess since 1997:

Making Every Carry Count

When starting running back Dwayne Wright went down with a season-ending knee injury against Kansas State in early September, the big question was whether Fresno State would be able to survive such a loss. Those questions can now be considered answered. Behind RBs Bryson Sumlin and Wendell Mathis, the Bulldogs are averaging 5.4 yards per carry on the ground, the seventh-best number in the nation. Fresno State has also posted 36 rushing TDs, making the team one of only five in the nation to score at least 35 touchdowns on the ground. The Bulldogs rushing TD total is the fourth-best in the country, trailing only Boise State (46), Louisville (44) and Texas (37).

Many Happy Returns

Fresno State's special teams have established themselves as one of the nation's best units. Not only are the Bulldogs exceptional at blocking kicks, but they are also a threat to put points on the board every time they take the field. Since Pat Hill took over in 1997, Fresno State has scored 17 touchdowns on special teams and has racked up three safeties. Below is a breakdown of the Bulldogs' special teams scoring history:

- 8 punt returns for TDs (last: Nov. 6, 2004, by Clifton Smith at Rice)
- 3 kickoff returns for TDs (last: Sept. 27, 2003, by Nate Ray vs. Portland State)
- 6 blocked punts/FGs returned for TDs (last: Nov. 15, 2003 vs. San Jose State)
- 3 team safeties (last: Oct. 4, 2002, vs. Colorado State)

Getting Defensive

It wasn't only the Fresno State offense that was producing during the team's season-finishing five-game winning streak. Defensively, the Bulldogs played very well down the stretch, allowing only 16.0 points per game. Fresno State ranks first in the WAC and 26th nationally in scoring defense despite playing teams ranked second, eighth, 16th, 35th and 43rd in the nation in scoring offense. The team's scoring defense average of 19.9 is on pace to be the best for an entire season since 1991, when Fresno State held opponents to 19.6 points per game. Here is a look at the best Bulldog defenses in the last 15 years:

Starting Fast

A staple of the Fresno State offense in the final five games was the ability to come out of the gates red hot. Thanks to the Bulldogs' incredible efficiency, each contest was a laughter by halftime. Of the team's 34 first half possessions in the last five games, 26 resulted in touchdowns while another three ended in a made field goal. During its current five-game winning streak, Fresno State is outscoring its opponents by a combined 186-31 in the first half. And in their eight victories, the Bulldogs are leading at the half by a combined 248-59, an average of 31-7. In the regular season's final three games, running back Bryson Sumlin totaled 410 rushing yards in first halves alone, including 210 against Hawaii on Nov. 12.

Tracking Pinegar

Junior quarterback Paul Pinegar has already established a resume that fits right in with some of the great Bulldog quarterbacks of the past. He has an 23-8 record – including 2-0 in bowl games – as a starter, and he is moving up the career charts in passing yards, total offense and touchdown passes. His season-high 228 passing in the regular season finale against San Jose State, he surpassed Billy Volek (1996-99) to move into fifth on the school's all-time passing yardage list. He is also surpassed Volek on the school's all-time total offense list, as well. With two touchdown passes in the bowl game, Pinegar will move into fifth place all-time in that category. Here is a look at where the 2002 WAC Freshman of the Year stands in the program's record book:

Fresno State – “Quarterback University”

The Bulldogs currently have three quarterbacks in the NFL, tying Michigan and Florida State for the most of any college. However, neither Michigan nor Florida State have had a quarterback taken in the top 10 picks of the NFL draft since 1990, while Fresno State has produced two. Here are some other QB University Notes (since 1990):

- Both of Pat Hill’s two starting quarterbacks are in the NFL (Billy Volek and David Carr).
- Fresno State is one of three schools (Washington State and Tennessee are the others) to have one quarterback taken as the No. 1 overall pick in the NFL Draft and another selected in the top 10. Of those, only Fresno State’s quarterbacks are both still active.
- Fresno State is one of five schools (Tennessee, Washington State, Oregon and Houston are the others) to have two QB’s selected among the top 10 NFL Draft picks. Of those, only Oregon and Fresno State’s are still active.
- Fresno State’s Trent Dilfer is the only top 10 drafted quarterback since 1990 to win a Super Bowl.
- There have been 17 quarterbacks taken in the top 10 picks of the NFL Draft since 1990, and Fresno State has produced two of them.

Mankins Serving Up Pancakes

Senior left tackle Logan Mankins has enjoyed a season that may rank as the very best in program history. A first-team All-WAC honoree, Mankins has been downright overwhelming on the line, totaling 82 “pancake” blocks in the last three games in which the Bulldogs averaged 365.0 rushing yards. On the year, Mankins racked up 82 pancake blocks, an average of 7.5 per game. Although official records are not kept on “pancake” blocks, offensive line coach Mark Weber did say Mankins’ 15 pancake blocks against Hawaii was one of the highest totals – if not the highest total – he had ever seen. A UCLA offensive line coach for seven years, Weber said about Mankins, who is expected to be a high NFL Draft choice: “It takes a great player playing very hard to get that many knockout blocks in just three quarters.” Thanks to Mankins, the Bulldogs currently average 228.0 rushing yards per game, the 15th-best mark in the nation. Thriving in the Red Zone

Fresno State’s red zone offense finished the regular season really clicking on all cylinders. To put it in more specific terms, in the past seven games, the Bulldogs were nearly perfect inside the 20-yard line, scoring 31 touchdowns on the 33 times they have entered the red zone. On the only two occasions they did not score a TD in that span, Brett Visintainer nailed field goals. In fact, because of the team’s success, Visintainer only attempted six field goals in the past seven games. Here is a look at how Fresno State has fared inside the red zone thus far in 2004:

Fresno State Facts

Bulldogs Post Eight Year GPA High

Fresno State's athletics department has posted 2.91 cumulative GPA for the 2003-04 academic year, the highest mark in eight year. The Bulldog Athletic department encompasses 18 teams and nearly 600 student-athletes.

Facility Improvements

Fresno State's athletics department held a ceremonial ground breaking March 4 for the soon to be constructed Ricchiuti Academic Center and the expansion to the Duncan Building. The \$5 million project began construction March 8 is expected to be completed in October. The Ricchiuti Academic Center will provide study tables, tutorial and computer labs, plus new coaching offices for the women's soccer team. The Duncan Building expansion will include new coaching offices, team meeting rooms, a new Bulldog locker room and a theatre-style auditorium.

FS Tagged as Nation's 32nd-Best Program

Fresno State was rated the 32nd-best college football program in the nation by the College Football News, which last summer completed a three-year analysis designed to see which program has been the strongest over that period of time. The rankings were based on winning, academic accomplishments, and NFL productivity.

Ranking the Losses

Of Fresno State's last 23 losses dating back to 1999, 22 have come to teams that have either been nationally ranked, played in a bowl game or were bowl eligible. Of Fresno State's five losses last year, all five came to teams who were ranked during the season and went to a bowl game. Fresno State played six teams that made an appearance in the national polls in 2002. Since 1999, the Bulldogs' only loss to a non-ranked, non-bowl team came Oct. 14, 1999, a 24-14 defeat at the hands of SMU at the Cotton Bowl. Pat Hill has only lost four games in his career to teams with losing records.

Bulldogs in the NFL

Fresno State's football program is among the national leaders in National Football League players. The NFL tabulated the information from players on active rosters for the 2004 season opening games. A total of 15 former Bulldogs were on NFL rosters on the opening weekend, the most in the WAC and second-highest total of any non-BCS school. Southern Mississippi led the non-BCS schools with 16, while BYU and San Diego State each had 14. Fresno State leads all WAC schools with the most NFL players. Hawaii ranks second with nine and Louisiana Tech is next with eight. Among western non-BCS schools, Fresno State, BYU and San Diego State were the top, followed by Utah and Colorado State. Down farther on the list were UNLV, New Mexico and TCU. The Bulldogs' total is tied or better than several notable BCS programs, such as Oregon, Virginia, Arkansas, Clemson, North Carolina State, Oregon State, Oklahoma State, Minnesota, Texas Tech, Iowa State, Missouri and Kentucky.

A Suddenly High-Powered Offense

After consecutive losses to Louisiana Tech, UTEP and Boise State, Fresno State's offense was having so much trouble, simply completing a forward pass was a difficult task. During the losing streak, the Bulldogs averaged only 20.3 points and 295.0 yards per game and bottomed out in a 33-16 loss to Boise State that saw the offense register only 191 total yards. Paul Pinegar was a key figure in the team's struggles, throwing six interceptions compared to only three touchdowns. But in the last five games, Fresno State, and most notably Pinegar, have undergone monumental changes, and the offense is clicking off points at record levels. Thanks in large part to 50-point performances in the last four contests, the Bulldogs are now averaging 40.5 points per game, the fifth-highest total in the nation. That is the highest they have been in that category since finishing 2001 No. 4 in the NCAA, and during their five-game winning streak, the team averaged 56.0 points. The current run of four consecutive 50-point games makes Fresno State just the sixth team ever to accomplish that feat. Here is a look at where the Bulldogs rank offensively:

Cutting Offenses Down to Size

Fresno State's offense was so dominating late in the year that it overshadowed the team's backbone – a very good defense. Despite playing in the WAC, which features seven offenses ranked in the top 50 nationally, the Bulldogs still rank 25th in the nation in scoring defense at 19.9 per game, including just 16.0 points over the final five contests. Pinegar Among Program Best

Fresno State has been blessed with some outstanding signal callers who have produced in many ways. One way a quarterback is judged is how effective a leader he is and in how he helps his team win. Junior Paul Pinegar is in excellent company in that regard, winning 74.2 percent of the games he has started, the second-best number in program history. Pinegar has several quality wins, including No. 13 Kansas State, No. 22 Colorado State, Washington, Georgia Tech and UCLA, the latter two coming in bowl games. In fact, Pinegar is 2-0 in bowl games and 5-3 against BCS opponents, including three wins in a row. Here are Fresno State's best quarterbacks in terms of winning percentage in games started:

Rocket Richard

Richard Marshall is making a habit out of making big plays on defense. The sophomore cornerback had a 100-yard interception return against Rice on Nov. 6, the second time this year he took back an INT for a score. Marshall now has three interception returns for touchdowns in his career, already a program record. His two TDs scored place him fourth on Fresno State in that category. In addition, Marshall has totaled 55 tackles, the fourth-best number on the team, as well as three interceptions, tied with James Sanders for tops among Bulldogs. Marshall's 205 interception return yards this season is a single-season record, and his career total of 288 is within shouting distance of the program record of 340, set by Rod Webster (1984-87). Finally, Marshall's career interception return average is 47.5, the best in program history.

Fresno State Football at a Glance

Anybody, Anywhere, Anytime

In seven years, Fresno State has played 25 bowl opponents, including 14 the past two seasons. All 10 losses since 2002 came to teams which played in a bowl game, were ranked at the time or spent time during that year in the national polls. But more important are the victories. Since 2000, the Bulldogs have defeated nine BCS Conference opponents, the most of any non-BCS team. The Bulldogs are also the only non-BCS school to own consecutive bowl victories over BCS schools.

Academic Success

Hill kept his promise when we was hired to shore up the team's academic woes. One of the first projects he brought to the table is well underway with positive results coming in droves. Here is a look at some of those results:

- 57 Academic All-WAC Selections (second-most in the WAC).
- Payton Williams named Academic All-American in 1999, becoming the first Bulldog football player in school history to ever receive that honor.
- Vernon Fox received a National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame postgraduate scholarship in 2001.
- The team GPA has risen from 2.21 to 2.87.
- Four Bulldogs - Jermaine Jamison, Tyrone Culver, Juan Bautista and Adam Jennings - selected Arthur Ashe, Jr., Sports Scholar-Athletes.
- 49 players selected for Kiwanis Torch of Excellence Dinner in 2003, most in school history.
- No players on the team with less than a 2.0 cumulative GPA.

Building and Growing

Under Hill's guidance, the Duncan Building training room has been expanded and improved, a new practice facility constructed, and now he has spearheaded the new Ricchiutti Academic Center, which will benefit all student-athletes at Fresno State. In addition, another Duncan Building expansion is underway. It will include a new locker room, coaching offices, team meeting rooms and an auditorium style theater.

Taking it to Another Level

Here is a brief look at what the Fresno State has been able to accomplish under Pat Hill, who took over in 1997.

- Five consecutive bowl appearances, including victories over Georgia Tech and UCLA in each of the last two bowl games.
- A No. 8 national ranking in 2001, the highest ever by a Fresno State team.
- Highest national ranking by non-BCS team since 2001.
- School-record 11 wins in 2001.
- 28 wins since 2001, sixth-highest total in the nation.
- Seven wins over BCS since 2001, most of any non-BCS school.
- Produced at least one All-American in four of the last five years.

Lingua's Leg Leads Bulldogs

One of the more astounding numbers on the Fresno State statistical sheet is in the category of opponent's punt returns. Thanks to the incredible hang time punter Mike Lingua gets on nearly every punt, only 10 of his 44 punts have been returned this year. And of those 10 punt returns, they've been returned for a grand total of 27 yards. That puts the Bulldogs' punt return yardage defense at 2.70 per return, the top number in the nation, ahead of Arkansas (3.48) and Tennessee (4.09). Fresno State's net punt of 35.8 is also third in the WAC. Of Lingua's 44 punts, 13 have been fair caught and 16 have been downed inside the 20. The longest punt return the Bulldogs have allowed this year is 10, which came Nov. 6 against Rice. And thanks for Fresno State's offensive display at the end of the year, Lingua only attempted seven punts in the final four contests.

J. Sanders Making Big Plays

After big performances in nationally televised victories over Washington and Kansas State to begin this year, the nation got up to speed with just how special strong safety James Sanders is. The junior finished tied for the team lead with three interceptions, and against the Huskies he got the Bulldogs on the board with an INT return for a touchdown. Against KSU, he had one of the biggest plays of the game – an interception at the goal line at the end of the first half that put to rest any hopes of a Kansas State comeback. Sanders is third among Bulldogs in tackles with 56 and has also notched 6.5 tackles for loss, two fumble recoveries, a forced fumble and one bone-crushing sack of Washington quarterback Casey Paus that was so ferocious it actually left a mark on the QB's uniform. He has also blocked a kick this year and has three blocks in his career.

Fresno State in the Rankings

Fresno State's dominating five-game run at the end of the regular season moved the team higher and higher in the national rankings. Heading into the MPC Computers Bowl, the Bulldogs are receiving votes in both the ESPN/USA Today coaches' and Associated Press polls. Fresno State was ranked as high as 17th nationally after three games but plummeted after consecutive losses to Louisiana Tech, UTEP and Boise State. However, the team's recent impressive efforts – all blowout wins – has moved the Bulldogs up to 27th in the coaches' rankings and 31st in the AP. Two other WAC teams appear in the rankings – Boise State is 10th while UTEP is receiving votes.

Mac's Attack

One of the great stories of Pat Hill's tenure, currently wrapping up its eighth season at Fresno State, is that of junior defensive tackle Garrett McIntyre. A linebacker at South Lake Tahoe (Calif.) High School, McIntyre went virtually unrecruited as a prepster, eventually landing with the Bulldogs as a walk-on. But he immediately made an impression on Hill by owning what Hill describes as, "a motor that doesn't stop." As a true freshman, McIntyre played in 12 games and was vital down the stretch during a year that Fresno State defeated Georgia Tech in the Silicon Valley Football Classic. Then last year, he started all 14 games, finishing with 12.5 tackles for loss and eight sacks. He capped his big season by being named the Defensive MVP of the SVFC win over UCLA. McIntyre's 2004 campaign has been even better. He was a first-team All-WAC honoree after racking up six sacks (sixth in the WAC) and 10.5 tackles for losses. McIntyre wound up the regular season fifth on the team with 44 tackles.

Jekyll and Hyde

It has truly been an up-and-down year for Fresno State. The Bulldogs started 3-0 and were ranked 17th nationally. Then, without warning, they plummeted into an inexplicable three-game losing streak during which the team's offense vanished. Since, however, Fresno State has played the best football of the Pat Hill Era, outscoring opponents by a combined 280-80. Following is a look at the Bulldogs vital statistics in wins and in losses:

More on Pat Hill

As head coach Pat Hill embarks on his eighth season at the helm of the Bulldogs, certain facets of his program have become familiar not only in the San Joaquin Valley, but nationwide as well. Here is a look at some of the more familiar aspects of Fresno State football:

Graduation Rates

When Pat Hill took over at Fresno State, the graduation rate for the football program was 25 percent. In 2002, Hill's first recruiting class – and first graduating class – had a graduation rate of 64 percent, which included all players (scholarship and walk-ons). Hill's first official graduation numbers for football's fall of 1997 class was 50 percent, or 17 percent higher than the previous year's. Here are some more facts about the football program and graduation:

- Of the five players who did not receive their degree last year, all are just one semester away from graduating.
- Of the group that did receive their degree, four were either partial or non-qualifiers.
- Three players currently on the roster have already graduated and four will receive their degrees after the fall semester.
- Over the last two seasons, 21 of 31 senior players graduated, with a couple more expected to graduate in the spring of 2003. That's a graduation percentage of 68 percent over a two-year period.

Scheduling Philosophy

In order to gain national respect, Hill will continue to select games against the nation's top programs, meaning the Bulldogs will play many games on the road in hostile environments. While scheduling is difficult, Fresno State will continue to play an aggressive schedule. This year, and in the coming years, non-conference games against Colorado State, Oregon, Oregon State, Washington, Kansas State and Wisconsin have already been scheduled.

Non-Qualifiers

A perception exists that the Bulldogs are comprised primarily of non-qualifiers, or "props," as they are commonly known. In actuality, nothing is further from the truth. In July, Fresno State instituted a new policy prohibiting the recruitment and signing of non-qualifiers beginning with the 2003-04 academic year. Here are some facts about Fresno State and its non-qualifiers:

- There were only eight non-qualifiers on the 2004 Bulldog roster.
- Only **four** freshmen non-qualifiers were accepted in the fall of 2003.

Building a New Tradition on the National Level

In the 1970's, Florida State was an emerging college football power. This is the model Pat Hill uses and talks about with his players. In the 1980's, Miami (Fla.) emerged on the national scene. Then in the 1990's, Virginia Tech rose from obscurity to become a national championship contender. Hill's goal is to make the Bulldogs the team of the 2000's. He will settle for nothing less than to become a perennial top 25 program and to be considered for a BCS bowl game. Over the last four years, Fresno State's seven wins over BCS opponents ranks best among non-BCS schools.

#99 Donyell Booker, 6-2, 305, Senior, Nose Tackle, Houston, Texas (Sociology)

(Last game: 1 tackle)

- Has started 24 of Fresno State's 25 games the past two years.
- Had his best game of the year at Boise State, racking up five tackles, including a sack.
- A first-team Junior College All-American who enrolled at Fresno State in January 2003.
- Had 15 sacks in 2002 for Reedley College, leading them to the state and national championship.
- Has drawn comparisons to 2001 WAC Defensive Player of the Year Alan Harper, a second-team All-American and fourth-round NFL Draft pick.

#36 Tyrone Culver, 6-1, 200, Junior, Free Safety, Palmdale, Calif. (Health Science)

(Last game: 9 tackles, a season-high)

- Had one of the best performances of his career against Nevada with seven tackles and a fumble recovery.
- Leads the team in tackles with 59 is second on the team in pass deflections.
- A smart player who is a strong candidate for academic honors, earning Academic All-WAC in '02 and '03.
- Ranked sixth on the team in tackles in 2003.
- Played an instrumental role in Fresno State's 70-14 win over Hawaii, holding the NCAA's No. 2 passing offense to 157 yards under its average.
- Selected honorable mention All-WAC

#79 Chris Denman, 6-6, 280, Sophomore, Offensive Tackle, Tehachapi, Calif. (undeclared)

(Last game: Started and played the first three quarters before giving way to reserves)

- Earned a scholarship with his hard work and steady play.
- Has started the past 18 games.

#27 Awan Diles, 5-8, 182, Junior, Cornerback, Tulare, Calif. (Communications)

(Last game: no tackles but played considerably)

- Saw limited time through eight games but was on the field more toward the end of the year.
- A tough player against the run with career highs of nine tackles against both Oregon State and Rice.
- Ranked fourth on the team in tackles in 2003 and has three career INTs.

#84 Joe Fernandez, 5-10, 165, Sophomore, Wide Receiver, Morgan Hill, Calif. (Pre-Law)

(Last game: 1 rec., 25 yards)

- Has been Fresno State's top WR this year, recording 33 catches for 474 yards and four TDs, all team highs.
- Recorded a TD catch in two of the last five games.
- Is the son of former Oakland/Los Angeles Raiders wide receiver Mervyn Fernandez.
- One of the team's more sure-handed receivers.
- Selected honorable mention All-WAC

#6 Jermaine Jamison, 6-3, 200, Junior, Receiver, Carson, Calif. (Pre-Business)

(Last game: 2 rec., 19 yards and a 7 yard touchdown)

- Returns as the team's most experienced player at the position.
- Grabbed his first TD pass at Boise State.
- Top freshman WR in the WAC in 2002, named fourth-team Freshman All-America by *The Sporting News*.
- Led the team in receiving yards in five games, with a season-best 102 vs. Tulsa in 2002.
- Scored on a 77-yard pass play in the final minutes to beat Rice 31-28 in 2002.
- Had seven catches over 30 yards in 2002, including four over 40 yards, but none this year.
- An Academic All-WAC pick in 2002 and '03.

#5 Adam Jennings, 5-10, 175, Junior, Receiver, Granite Bay, Calif. (Health Science)

(Last game: 1 reception for 54 yards and a TD, 1 KO return for 52 yards and two punt returns for 29 yards)

- Before the last four games, he had just one career touchdown catch but has four in the last four games.
- Serves as the team's punt and kickoff returner.
- Had his best game of the year against San Jose State, recording 135 all-purpose yards.
- Ripped off a 57-yard run on an end around against Hawaii last year, setting up a Bulldog touchdown.
- An Academic All-WAC pick in 2002 and '03.

#37 Mike Lingua, 6-0, 190, Sophomore, Punter, Canyon Country, Calif. (Undeclared)

(Last game: (1 punts, 28.0 avg.)

- Only nine of his 44 punts have been returned thanks to his tremendous hang time.
- In just his second year as a punter after being a soccer player most of his life.
- Boomed a 68-yarder against Oregon State in 2003, just one yard shy of the Bulldog Stadium record.
- Has helped guide Fresno State's net punting total into the No. 3 spot in the league.
- A key to the Bulldog special teams allowing just 27 punt return yards all season, the least in the nation.
- Punted 44 times this year for an average of 36.4 one year after tying the school-record for punts with 84.

#74 Logan Mankins, 6-4, 305, Senior, Offensive Tackle, Catheys Valley, Calif. (Agricultural Education)

(Last game: Started and played the first three quarters before giving way to reserves)

- First-team All-WAC selection and a probable high-round NFL Draft selection.
- First offensive lineman in Bulldog history to be selected team MVP.
- Selected to the Outland Trophy Award Watch List prior to the 2003 season.
- Suffered a knee injury in full camp before the 2003 season and missed the year.
- Has started all 37 games for which he has suited up (he missed all of 2003 with a knee injury).
- A walk-on who earned first-team Freshman All-America honors in 2001 as the left tackle.
- Protected David Carr's blindside in 2001 and helped set school records for offensive productivity.
- In 2001, Fresno State became the only offense ever to produced a 4,000-yard passers, two 1,000-yard receivers and a 1,000-yard rusher.
- Has recorded a team-high (and possible program record) 82 pancake blocks on the year and has graded out at over 90 percent for the season; 80 percent is considered the benchmark for success.
- Singled out by ESPN's Mark May for his outstanding play against Kansas State, against which he had an All-America-type performance. He was so good, he was the team's pick for WAC Player of the Week.

Hill and the NFL

Pat Hill's experience in the NFL has been a staple of Fresno State's continued success of sending players to the professional ranks. Hill gained famed as one of the top personnel evaluators in the NFL during his five-year tenure with the Cleveland Browns and Baltimore Ravens. Hill's NFL experience is chronicled below:

- Recruited and coached NFL No. 1 Draft Pick **David Carr**.
- Fresno State had a WAC leading four NFL picks in 2002. Four other players signed NFL free agent contracts that year.
- Hill's two senior starting quarterbacks are in the NFL (Carr and **Billy Volek**, Tennessee Titans).
- In his seven seasons, he has produced **24** NFL players.
- In his seven seasons, he has produced eight NFL draft picks.
- Two members of his coaching staff have NFL coaching experience, offensive coordinator **Frank Cignetti** and running backs coach **John Settle**.

#24 Richard Marshall, 5-11, 190, Sophomore, Cornerback, Los Angeles, Calif. (Undeclared)

(Last game: 3 tackles, 2 pass deflections)

- Has three career INTs returned for touchdowns, including a 100-yarder last week at Rice. He has already set Fresno State's single-season record for interception return yardage with 205.
- Averaging 47.5 yards per interception return in his career.
- Selected second-team All-WAC in 2004.
- Fourth on the team with 55 tackles.
- Filled in well last year when CB Raymond Washington went down with a season-ending injury.
- His cover skills were instrumental in Fresno State's 70-14 win over Hawaii, holding the NCAA's No. 2 passing offense to 157 yards under its average.
- A physical player who finished 12th on the team in tackles in 2003.
- Is tied for first on the team with three interceptions and tied for second with four pass breakups.
- Owns the school record for interceptions returned for touchdowns with three.

#22 Wendell Mathis, 5-9, 185, Junior, Running Back, Merced, Calif. (Chicano Studies)

(Last game: 23 carries, 128 yds., 1 TD)

- Second on the team with 896 rushing yards, ranking fifth in the WAC and 44th in the nation.
- Second on the team and is tied for second in the WAC with 12 rushing TDs, seven coming in the last three games.
- Had a career-high 23 carries and three TDs against Hawaii as the Bulldogs set a school record with 503 rushing yards.
- Averaging 6.6 yards per carry, the top rushing averaging in the WAC.
- Had a career-high 191 yards in a loss against Louisiana Tech.
- Is a native of Merced who transferred to Fresno State from UCLA.
- Needs 131 rushing yards in the bowl game for 1,000 on the season. He has averaging 139 per game in the last three contests.

#71 Garrett McIntyre, 6-2, 250, Junior, Defensive End, South Lake Tahoe, Calif. (Pre-Business)

(Last game: 1 tackle in three quarters of action)

- A walk-on who had great success as a true freshman in 2002 and earned a scholarship in 2003.
- Selected first-team All-WAC in 2004 and second-team All-WAC in 2003.
- Practically took up residence in the Kansas State backfield on Sept. 11, helping Fresno State hold Heisman Trophy frontrunner Darren Sproles to just 37 rushing yards.
- Emerging as one of the best defensive linemen in the WAC, ranking fourth in the WAC in sacks (7-44 yards) and ninth in tackles for losses (11-61 yards).
- Began 2003 a relatively unknown walk-on and kicked off 2003 as a starter at end against Tennessee.
- A tough player, who suffered a knee injury against Oregon State but returned for the Oklahoma game.
- Wreaked havoc vs. UCLA and was named the Defensive MVP of the Silicon Valley Football Classic.
- Named to the *Sports Illustrated* All-Bowl team for 2003 with four tackles, two for losses, one sack and a pass deflection in the 17-9 win over the Bruins.

#55 Brian Morris, 6-2, 250, Senior, Defensive End, Moreno Valley, Calif. (Criminology)

(Last game: 3 tackles)

- Returned for a sixth season after being granted an extra year of eligibility by the NCAA for medical hardships.
- Selected second-team All-WAC in 2003, after ranking in the nation's top 10 for quarterback sacks with 11, the seventh-most in school history.
- Has recorded 29 tackles and is second on the team with three sacks.
- Missed the 2000 and 2002 seasons due to injuries.
- Played in 11 games in 2001, starting two, before missing the final four games with a knee injury.
- Has 17 career sacks and 25 tackles for losses.
- Picked up his first career TD in the win at Washington, returning a fumble for a score.

#13 Paul Pinegar, 6-4, 220, Junior, Quarterback, Woodland, Calif. (Health Science)

(Last game: 12-of-19, 228 yards, 3 TD, 1 INT)

- Has a 23-8 record as a starter, including 5-1 against BCS teams. It is the second-best winning percentage for a starting QB in program history.
- After being named the 2002 WAC Freshman of the year, he missed the first five games of last year with a torn right pectoral muscle but returned to guide the team to seven wins in their last nine games.
- Ranks seventh in career passing yards (6,566) and sixth in touchdowns (49) in Bulldog history.
- The top ranked freshman quarterback in the NCAA in 2002, and threw for more touchdowns (20) and yards (2,929) than any freshman quarterback in the country.
- Fourth-team Freshman All-America selection by The Sporting News
- Owns school freshman passing yardage record (2,929) breaking the old mark of Kevin Sweeney.
- Earned his first career start on 24 hours notice and guided Fresno State to a 16-14 win over San Diego State on Aug. 29, 2002. He completed 21-of-35 passes for 196 yards and one touchdown.
- Was Fresno State's first freshman starting quarterback since Trent Dilfer in the 1991 season.
- After the worst three-game stretch of his career, he rebounded to post very solid down the stretch, completing 57-of-86 passes (.663) for 949 yards with 12 TDs and three INT over the last five games.
- Despite 32 fewer passes attempts and 18 fewer completions, Pinegar threw for nine more yards than NCAA career passing yardage leader Timmy Chang in Fresno State's 70-14 win over Hawaii.

#47 Claude Sanders, 6-3, 240, Senior, Defensive End, San Diego, Calif. (Child Development)

(Last game: 5 tackles, 2 tackle for a loss and 1 sack)

- Missed most of the Kansas State game and all of the Portland State game with a knee injury. He returned to the starting lineup at Louisiana Tech and has played in each game since.
- Had his best game of 2004 at Rice, picking up seven tackles, including three for loss and a sack.
- Despite missing all of one game and most of another, his 39 tackles is the seventh-best total on the team.
- Has 10.0 tackles for loss, second-best among Bulldogs.
- His tackle of Robbie Beck on a 4th-and-1 play with under two minutes left gave Fresno State the ball back and a chance at the eventual game-winning FG in 2003.
- Excellent pass-rushing end who was selected honorable mention All-WAC in 2002, '03 and '04.
- A very good pass rusher, he has registered 15 career sacks.
