THE OPENING KICK

■ Louisville returns home for only the second in the last six weeks to face Syracuse on Saturday, Nov. 7, at 12:30 p.m. The game will be televised by the ACC Network with Tim Brant, Dave Archer and Roddy Jones.

■ After an 0-3 start, the Cardinals evened their record at 4-4 overall and 3-2 in the ACC after a 20-19 win at Wake Forest on Friday night in Winston-Salem, N.C. The Cardinals recorded four interceptions and four sacks to limit the Demon Deacons to 266 yards of total offense.

■ Syracuse dropped a 45-21 decision on the road to No. 17 Florida State on Saturday to fall to 3-5 overall and 1-3 in the ACC.

■ Junior Trevon Young recorded three more sacks in the win over Wake Forest to give him 6.0 in the last two games and 9.0 for the year, which is tied for seventh in the country.

■ Junior wide receiver Jamari Staples established new career-highs with 10 receptions for 133 yards and two scores against Wake Forest. He is second on the team with 20 receptions for 307 yards and two scores this season.

THE STORYLINES

■ Since starting the year 0-3, the Cardinals have won four of their last five games to even their record at 4-4 and 3-2 in the ACC. The defense has spearheaded the change, limiting opponents to 55.0 yards on the ground and 256.3 yards of total offense in the last five games.

■ The Cardinals will honor **Elvis Dumervil's** No. 58 jersey during the game on Saturday. Dumervil, a defensive end for the Baltimore Ravens, is one of the most dominating pass rushers to ever play for the Cardinals. The former winner of the Bronko Nagurski Award set the school record with 20.5 sacks in 2005 under head coach Bobby Petrino, including a school-best 6.0 in a 31-24 victory at Kentucky. A fourth-round selection of the Denver Broncos, Dumervil is second all-time in school history with 32.0 sacks.

■ After being held to 3.0 sacks through the first three games, the Cardinals have exploded with 21.0 sacks over the next five contests, including four last week in the win over Wake Forest. Junior **Trevon Young** has eight sacks in the last three games, posting 3.0 sack in the last victories over the Demon Deacons on Friday and Boston College on Oct. 24.

■ Senior kicker **John Wallace** looks to break the school record for career field goals this week against Syracuse. The native of Elizabethtown, Ky., tied Art Carmody's last week for field goals with 60 when he booted two versus Wake Forest.

LOUISVILLE HEAD COACH BOBBY PETRINO

The architect of one of the greatest runs in school history from 2003-06 returned last season to take over the program he helped build during his first head coaching stint.

Leading the Cardinals from Conference USA to the BIG EAST, Petrino guided the Cardinals to a 41-9 overall record, two conference titles, and the school's first BCS Bowl appearance during that four-year stretch.

In 2014, Petrino, who returned to the Derby City after an eight-year absence, was faced with a bigger challenge of taking the Cardinals into the Atlantic Coast Conference.

As had been the case in his first four years, Petrino took the challenge head on and guided the Cardinals to their fifth-straight nine-win season.

The Cardinals went 9-4 overall, 5-3 in the ACC, with a big win over Miami in the inaugural ACC game, and wins at Boston College and Notre Dame, and closing the year with a come-from-behind victory over Kentucky. Louisville advanced to its fifth-straight bowl appearance and the fifth overall under Petrino.

After an eight-year hiatus from Louisville, University of Louisville Vice President/Director of Athletics Tom Jurich announced on Jan. 9, 2014. Bobby Petrino as the Cardinals' football coach for the second time in his career. The Cardinals' head coach from 2003-06, Petrino led UoFL to unprecedented success in four seasons on the sidelines.

However, during his return this time, the Cardinals made a step up, joining the Atlantic Coast Conference. That didn't matter to Petrino, directing his team to a 9-4 overall record and a 5-3 mark in the ACC. The three losses came by a total of 19 points and to a pair of ranked foes in No. 25 Clemson and No. 2 Florida State.

Petrino, who owns a 50-13 mark overall at Louisville and a 92-34 record all-time as a collegiate coach, directed the Cardinals to their fifth-straight bowl appearance and a post-season berth in his first five seasons as the leader of the Cardinals.

During his first stint at Louisville, Petrino directed the program to a bowl game each year, but more significantly, guided the school to its first BCS victory - a 24-13 win over Wake Forest in the FedEx Orange Bowl. The 41 wins over that four-year span were the most in school history and featured an average margin of victory of 26.0.

He also showed the ability to develop players, as Petrino had 14 selected in the NFL Draft, including

Amobi Okoye, who was the 10th overall selection in 2007 by the Houston Texans. Eric Wood, who was recruited by Petrino, was the 28th selection by the Buffalo Bills in 2009. Michael Bush, a fourth-round pick by the Oakland Raiders, amassed 2,514 rushing yards in three-plus seasons with the Cardinals.

Coupling his success at Louisville and Arkansas, Petrino has led his teams to eight bowl games in 10 years, including both Louisville's and Arkansas' first BCS bowl games. His programs have achieved four 10-win seasons along with top-10 finishes nationally three times. His 2006 Louisville squad and 2011 Arkansas team concluded with No. 5 rankings in the Associated Press polls.

Petrino directed the Cardinals to their first BIG EAST title in 2006, Louisville's second year in the league. He guided that squad to a 12-1 record, which tied the 2013 squad for the most wins in school history. The Cardinals ended the year with their highest national ranking in school history, finishing No. 5 in the Associated Press poll and sixth in the USA Today poll. The Cardinals opened the year going 8-0, including a win over third-ranked West Virginia, and catapulted to as high as No. 3 in the nation.

Hired for the first time at Louisville in 2003, Petrino took the reins of a program that finished 7-6 a year prior and drove the school to a 9-4 mark that resulted in an appearance in the GMAC Bowl. Petrino became the first Louisville head coach to win nine games in their first season.

By the end of his first year, Petrino's team led the league and ranked among the nation's best in total offense, rushing, and scoring. The Cardinals ranked fifth in the nation in total offense (488.9), 10th in rushing (228.2), and 15th in scoring offense (34.6). Louisville set six Conference USA records, including the mark for total yards after the Cardinals racked up 779 yards, including 445 rushing yards, in a 66-45 win over Houston.

The 2004 campaign was one of the best in school history, with Petrino leading the Cardinals to an 11-1 record that culminated in a Conference USA title and a 44-40 Liberty Bowl over 10th-ranked Boise State. The Cardinals led the nation in total offense (539.0) and scoring offense (49.8), scored 50 or more points seven times and set an NCAA record by scoring 55 or more points in five straight games.

After a 9-3 season in 2005, Petrino took Louisville to an unprecedented level the following season, finishing with a 12-1 record and a 24-13 victory over

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (AP) - Bobby Petrino wore a satisfied look after his latest victory - another defensive masterpiece for Louisville's offensive guru.

Brandon Radcliff ran for 110 yards and two touchdowns, and Louisville had two interceptions and two safeties in a 28-6 victory over Syracuse, the Orange's third straight loss.

The Cardinals (5-1, 3-1 Atlantic Coast Conference) moved to 4-0 against Syracuse under Petrino. With a grueling schedule ahead, Syracuse (2-3, 0-1 ACC) began ACC play with a thud, getting just a pair of field goals from Cole Murphy, one in each half.

Louisville entered the game leading the nation in rush defense, allowing only 58.2 yards per game and 1.95 yards per carry, and maintained its stifling play. Syracuse, which was averaging 245 yards rushing a game and 5.7 per carry, gained 27 yards on 13 carries in the first half and fell behind 12-3.

The Orange finished with 59 yards rushing on 25 carries and 255 yards total on offense.

Entering the game, the series was tied 6-6, the Orange evening the count two years ago in the Carrier Dome when the teams were Big East members. Syracuse rolled to a 45-26 victory over the Teddy Bridgewater-led Cardinals to snap a three-game losing streak in the series. It was No. 11 Louisville's first loss that season after nine wins and served as motivation for the Cardinals coming into Friday night.

Radcliff scored on a 14-yard run late in the third quarter, and his 29-yard catch-and-run set up freshman quarterback Reggie Bonnafon's 4-yard touchdown pass to Gerald Christian midway through the fourth as the Cardinals pulled away.

Quarterback Terrel Hunt, a dual threat and the Orange's leading rusher at 74.8 yards per game the key to the offense, finished with 8 yards on five carries and was 17-of-32 passing for 196 yards before leaving the game late with a leg injury.

Bonnafon, making his second straight start, was efficient on a night he had to be, completing 12 of 22 passes for 174 yards and shaking off three sacks.

The Cardinals also were ranked third in total defense (225.2 yards per game) and fifth in turnovers gained (13). James Sample nabbed Louisville's 11th interception, tops in the nation, to set up John Wallace's career-best 51-yard field goal late in the first half.

Even when things went right for the Orange, they failed to take full advantage. After Hunt hit wide receiver Ben Lewis for 48 yards to the Louisville 1 on the first possession of the second half, Syracuse had to settle for a 24-yard field goal by Murphy after getting called for penalties on consecutive trick plays.

BACK TO A BOWL

- With the win over Wake Forest, the Cardinals are just two wins away from qualifying for a post-season appearance, extending their streak to six-straight bowl appearances.
- Including last season's appearance in the Belk Bowl and run to the Elite Eight in men's basketball, Louisville has qualified for a bowl game and earned an NCAA men's basketball tournament appearance for the fifth-straight season, behind Wisconsin's streak of 13 years, Michigan State's eight years and San Diego State, who is tied with Louisville with five-straight.

STAFF SNAPSHOT

- Head coach Bobby Petrino returned his entire staff in 2015. Offensive coordinator Garrick McGee and offensive line coach Chris Klenakis followed Petrino from their days together at Arkansas, while wide receivers coach Lamar Thomas, running backs coach Kolby Smith and defensive line coach came to Louisville from Western Kentucky.
- Defensive coordinator Todd Grantham, linebacker coach Tony Grantham, safeties coach Greg Brown and cornerbacks coach Terrell Buckley didn't have previous coaching ties with Petrino.
- Louisville's staff includes two former Cardinals players: running backs coach Kolby Smith and defensive line coach L.D. Scott.

DOMINANT DEFENSE

- The Cardinals have held five of their eight opponents to 20 points or less.
- Louisville has allowed just 18 touchdowns this season, giving up six on the ground and 12 through the air, which is tied for 20th nationally.
- Against Boston College on Oct. 24, only one of eight second-half drives ended in Louisville territory. The Eagles had a blocked punt for a touchdown and another touchdown drive was a six-yard drive. The Eagles had 65 yards in negative yardage.

STOP ON RED

- Louisville has allowed opponents to reach the red zone just 15 times in eight games, ranking the Cardinals in a tie with Wisconsin for second nationally in terms of fewest red-zone chance. Only Michigan (12) has allowed fewer red-zone trips.

A TOUGH SLATE

- Louisville's schedule is rated the 12th-most difficult in the country by Sagarin.
- Louisville's 2015 schedule features seven teams who played in bowl games a year ago as Auburn played in the Outback Bowl (L, 34-31 to Wisconsin); Florida State played in the Rose Bowl (L, 59-20 to Oregon); NC State appeared in the St. Petersburg Bowl (W, 34-27 over UCF); Boston College played in the Pinstripe Bowl (L, 31-30 to Penn State); Clemson competed in the Russell Athletic Bowl (W, 40-6 over Oklahoma); Houston and Pittsburgh played in the Armed Forces Bowl, with the Cougars winning 35-34.
- The 2015 schedule features three opponents who are currently ranked in the Top 25 nationally — Clemson, Florida State and Houston. Auburn began the season ranked sixth in the country.
- The Cardinals played Samford for the first time in school history and will also make their first trip to BB&T Field in Winston-Salem on Oct. 30.

ROSTER NOTES

- The Cardinals' roster features players from 16 states and a set of brothers who were born in Japan. There are 30 native Kentuckians on the squad, followed by 23 Florida natives and 14 from Georgia.
- Louisville features 64 underclassmen, including 33 freshmen and 31 sophomore. The upperclassmen totals 32 junior and 14 seniors.
- Five Cardinals will serve as captains for the 2015 season. The group includes two players on offense (offensive tackle Aaron Epps and running back Brandon Radcliff) and three on defense (linebackers James Burgess and Keith Kelsey and defensive end Sheldon Rankins).
- True freshman Geron Christian is the brother of former UoFL tight end and seventh-round draft pick of the Arizona Cardinal Gerald Christian.
- Prior to the end of camp, head coach Bobby Petrino surprised seven walk-ons with full scholarships for the 2015 season. Wide receiver Donte Byrd, offensive lineman Toriano Roundtree, running back Malin Jones, defensive lineman Aaron Ahner, fullback Griffin Uhl, running back Darius Skinner and long snapper Colin Holba were awarded scholarships by Petrino in late August.

ACADEMIC NOTES

- Five Cardinals are playing this season as graduate assistants. Linebackers James Burgess and Keith Brown, while offensive tackles Aaron Epps and Kelby Johnson, and kicker John Wallace.
- The team recorded a 2.83 grade-point average for the spring semester, the highest registered GPA in the program's history. Overall, the Cardinals had one perfect 4.0 GPA, and saw 36 student-athletes post a 3.0 or higher and 70 athletes over a 2.5 GPA. For the year, the Cardinals had 24 student-athletes receive their degrees.

the smallest margin of victory in Petrino's career at Louisville. His previous mark came last week in the 17-14 win over Boston College. He had four-points wins over Kentucky last season and Boise State in the 2004 Liberty Bowl.

■ The 20 points was the second-lowest scoring total in a win under Bobby Petrino. The lowest scoring output in a win came versus Boston College on Oct. 24 in the 17-14 win.

■ The Cardinals are 14-23 all-time in one-point games during their history.

YOUTHFUL EXPERIENCE & FRESHMEN STARTERS

■ Louisville had a strong 2015 recruiting class and many of the newcomers wasted little time making an impact during preseason camp. Eleven true or redshirt freshmen are listed on the depth chart heading into the Syracuse contest.

■ The Cardinals ended up with three freshmen starters in their opening lineup versus Auburn: TE Micky Crum, QB Lamar Jackson and OT Geron Christian.

■ Freshmen continue to make an impact as Lamar Jackson has started six games at quarterback. He leads the team in rushing with 484 yards and a team-high six touchdowns, while also passing for 1,342 yards and eight touchdowns. He became the third (Chris Redman and Kyle Bolin) freshmen to pass for 300 yards in a game when he passed for 307 yards versus Florida State. Jackson set the school record for most total offense by a freshman when he totaled 396 yards versus Samford on Sept. 26.

■ Louisville might not have one of the youngest teams in the nation, but most of its contributors are youngster leading the offense. The Cardinals have played nine true freshmen and four redshirt freshmen through the first eight games, but nine of the rookies have appeared in games on the offensive side of the ball.

■ Against Florida State, the Cardinals started five freshmen on the offensive side of the football. Jaylen Smith, a true freshman, is third on the team with 18 receptions for 252 yards, while Traveon Samuel, another rookie, is sixth with 15 catches for 139 yards.

LOOKING BACK AT WAKE FOREST

■ Jamari Staples had career highs in receptions and yards with 10 catches for 133 yards. He is the Cardinals' first receiver with double-digit catches since Eli Rogers caught 10 passes against UCF on Oct. 18, 2013. His 14-yard touchdown in the second quarter was his first TD as a Cardinal. He added a 22-yard TD reception with 22 seconds remaining in the first half.

■ John Wallace's 39-yard, third quarter field goal was the 60th of his career, tying the career school record shared by Art Carmody (2004-07). His 37-yard field goal in the second quarter provided the Cardinals' first points of the game.

■ Reggie Bonnafon made his first start as a running back for the Cardinals. WR Javonte Bagley gained his first career start. Fourteen different players have started for the Cardinals' offense this season.

■ Freshman QB Lamar Jackson improved to 4-2 as a starter while connecting on 19-of-26 passes for 207 yards and two touchdowns. In his last five starts, Jackson has completed 79-of-135 passes for 1,059 yards and five touchdowns. He was 6-of-8 for 89 yards on third down.

■ RB Jeremy Smith's 22-yard run in the fourth quarter was the second-longest of his career. He finished with a season-best 58 yards on three carries.

■ Wake Forest's safety after sacking Lamar Jackson was the first time an opponent scored a safety against the Cardinals since it occurred in a 36-9 victory over Miami on Dec. 28, 2013 in the Russell Athletic Bowl.

■ The Cardinals had a season-best four interceptions, all in the second half by four different players (UofL had three picks vs. Auburn and Samford). Freshman safety Dee Smith had his first career interception in the third quarter, the Cardinals' first pick in three games. Louisville had an interception in 17 consecutive games prior to the recent stretch. UofL has 13 interceptions this season.

■ Chucky Williams and Trumaine Washington each had an interception, the team-leading third interception for both players. Shaq Wiggins grabbed his second interception of the season.

■ With three sacks versus Wake Forest, Trevon Young has six sacks in his last two games (also vs. Boston College) and eight in his last three games. His third sack caused a fumble with under two minutes remaining. He had a career-best 3.5 tackles for loss.

■ The Cardinals' defense had four sacks on the night. Louisville had eight sacks from five different players against Boston College on Oct. 24.

OFFENSE NOTES

■ The Cardinals have won a pair of ACC games this season when totaling less than 325 yards of total offense. Louisville was held to 317 yards in the win over Wake Forest and 306 in the win two weeks ago in a 17-14 victory over Boston College. The Cardinals are averaging 378.5 yards of total offense this season.

■ Freshman Lamar Jackson raised his record to 4-2 as a starter after going 19-of-26 for 207 yards and two touchdown passes in the 20-19 win over Wake Forest on Friday. He has thrown for 1,342 yards and eight touchdowns this season.

■ Jackson has accounted for 14 touchdowns this season — six rushing and eight passing. He has three touchdown runs of 10 yards or longer and is averaging 17.3 yards on his touchdown runs, including a 68-yarder versus Samford. His eight touchdown scoring throws have averaged 19.8 yards per touchdown throw.

■ Since returning from injury, junior wide receiver James Quick has been the player everyone thought he would be after being so heavily-recruited out of Trinity High School. Quick has caught 20 passes for 337 yards and four touchdowns during that span. Over those five games, Quick is averaging a team-high 16.9 yards a reception.

■ Quicks leads the team with four receiving touchdowns in only six games played. All four of his scores have come on passes of over 18 yards, including a pair of 30-yard strikes. The speedster from Louisville is averaging 28.0 yards on his touchdown receptions.

■ The Cardinals need to get their running game going after struggling the last two weeks. In picking up a pair of wins in the last two weeks, the Cardinals are averaging just 2.3 yards per carry in those wins.

Louisville was held to 68 yards rushing in the 20-19 win over Wake Forest on Friday night. It's the first time the Cards recorded a win when rushing for less than 100 yards since totaling 83 in the 44-40 victory over Kentucky last season.

■ Junior wide receiver Jamari Staples is averaging 5.0 receptions and 76.8 yards receiving per game since entering the lineup after missing the first four games. He recorded the team's second 100-yard receiving game with a season-high 133 yards receiving in the win over Wake Forest.

■ Lamar Jackson completed a career-best 73.1 percent of his throws in the win over Wake Forest on Oct. 30. The product of Pompano Beach, Fla., is completing 57.9 percent of his throws this season.

DEFENSE NOTES

■ The Cardinals have moved up to 16th in the nation in rushing defense giving up 111.6 yards per game. The Cardinals have yielded 13.0 yards rushing in their last two wins, holding Boston College to -14 yards and 40 yards against Wake Forest.

■ Louisville limited Wake Forest to 3-of-16 on third down conversions. The Cardinals held Boston College to 1-of-14 on third downs last week. The Cardinals have stopped opponents on 26 of the last 30 third-down conversions.

TOUGH SLEDDING

■ To date, Louisville has played five of the top 50 defenses in the FBS with Boston College ranked second, Clemson fourth, Florida State 27th, Wake Forest 35th and Houston 43rd.

■ The Cardinals gained the second-most yards against Boston College, who allows only 217.1 yards per game, allowed 365 yards in the 17-14 loss to the Cardinals. Louisville's 406 yards of total offense was also the second-most yards the Seminoles had allowed all season.

■ The 31 points scored against Houston was the most the Cougars have allowed all season.

CARDS TO PLAY ALABAMA IN 2018

■ The University of Louisville and the University of Alabama will open the 2018 season in the Orlando Citrus Bowl as part of an annual series of Orlando Kickoff games.

The 2018 matchup, announced Thursday, is the second publicized game in a multi-year agreement between Florida Citrus Sports (FCSports) and ESPN Events, a division of ESPN, to host major neutral-site, regular-season college football games in the Orlando Citrus Bowl. The Orlando Citrus Bowl is already home to the Buffalo Wild Wings Citrus Bowl, Russell Athletic Bowl, and Florida Blue Florida Classic games. Neither school has played in the stadium since its near-complete reconstruction a year ago.

■ The Cardinals and Crimson Tide have met just three previous times on the gridiron, with Alabama holding a 2-1 series advantage. In the last meeting in 1991, the Cardinals defeated the No. 25 Crimson Tide 34-7 in the 1991 Fiesta Bowl.

SCORE FIRST=WINS

■ Head coach Bobby Petrino likes to take the ball first, and with good reason. Louisville has won its last four games when scoring first and seven of the last eight contests. The last time the Cardinals scored first and lost came last season when the Cardinals raced out to a 21-0 lead versus Florida State.

■ Petrino's team are 38-7 at Louisville when scoring first in a game and are 35-4 when leading after the first quarter. Louisville led Boston College 7-0 on Oct. 24 en route to the 17-14 win over the Eagles.

■ Heading into the half, Petrino's teams are just as invincible. Louisville is 53-7 when leading at the half and are 49-5 when leading after three quarters. Louisville held a 17-7 lead against Boston College on Oct. 24 and held on for a 17-14 win.

FIRST-QUARTER DEFICIT

■ The Cardinals got in an immediate hole last week versus Wake Forest, trailing 10-0 in the first 11:24 of action. It was the worst first-quarter deficit in a win since the Cardinals trailed Rutgers 21-3 in the regular-season finale of the 2007 season. The Cardinals came back to win 41-38 under head coach Steve Kragthorpe.

TELLING IN WINS

■ The Cardinals opened the season with three-straight losses, but the have responded with wins in three of the last four games. When you look at the stats, it's easy to see why the Cardinals have turned their season around. The Cardinals have shown improvement on both sides of the football. The Cardinals are averaging 25.5 points and 173.5 yards on the ground in their four wins, including 214.8 yards passing and 387.3 yards of total offense. On defense, the Cardinals are allowing 12.2 points per game and 35.5 yards per game on the ground.

■ On the flip side, in the losses, the Cardinals were only averaging 23.2 points per game and were allowing 31.5 points per game. On the ground, Louisville averaged 106.5 yards on the ground and were allowing 187.8 yards. Louisville was held to less than 100 yards rushing in three of the losses — rushing for 70 yards versus Houston, 19 against Clemson and 99 versus Florida State.

PETRINO 29-4 AT HOME

■ Head coach Bobby Petrino improved to 29-4 at home after the 17-14 win over Boston College on Oct. 24.

■ Petrino's teams had won 22 straight games at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium before losing to Florida State on Oct. 30, 2014.

■ Of those 22 wins, the Cardinals have scored 60 or more points six times, 50-plus points three times and 40 points five times.

■ During the previous 22-game home streak, the Cardinals had recorded wins of 20 or more points 17 times.

■ The lowest output during this span came in the 20-10 win over Wake Forest on Sept. 27, 2014. The 17 points scored on Sept. 17 versus Clemson was the lowest output at home under Petrino.

WINNING CLOSE GAMES

■ The Cardinals are 10-10 in one-possession games in head coach Bobby Petrino's six seasons at the helm of the UofL football program. With the 20-19 win over Wake Forest on Oct. 30. Louisville is 3-3 in one-possession games this season after the win over Wake Forest. The Cardinals had a 17-14 victory over Boston College on Oct. 24 and with a 20-13 win over NC State on Oct. 3.

■ The Cards had close losses this season to Auburn (31-24), Houston (34-31) and Clemson (20-17).

■ Petrino's teams were 2-2 last season in one-possession games after losing to Virginia (23-21) and Clemson (23-17), and recording wins over Notre Dame (31-28) and Kentucky (44-40).

ON THE ROAD IN THE ACC

■ The Cardinals are 4-3 in the ACC on the road since joining their new league in 2014, with a 2-1 mark this season and a 2-2 record in 2014. The Cardinals defeated Wake Forest 20-19 last Friday and won their ACC road opener 20-13 at NC State on Oct. 3. Louisville dropped a 41-21 decision at Florida State on Oct. 17.

■ Last season, the Cardinals picked up road wins at Syracuse and Boston College, while dropping decisions at Virginia and Clemson.

■ Louisville's dropped two of the three games by less than a touchdown on the road, falling to Virginia 21-23 and 17-23 to Clemson. The average margin of defeat on the road in the ACC is 9.3 points per game.

■ Petrino's teams are 4-2 at home in league play, with wins last year over Miami, Wake Forest and NC State. The Cardinals dropped their ACC opener at home this season 20-17 versus Clemson.

PETRINO VERSUS NON-CONFERENCE FOES

■ Louisville improved to 22-6 in non-conference games after the 45-3 win over Samford on Sept. 26. Louisville's only six non-conference losses under Bobby Petrino came against Houston, Auburn on Sept. 5, Georgia in the 2014 Belk Bowl, against Virginia Tech in the 2006 Gator Bowl, versus Miami (Fla.) during the 2004 season and against Miami (Ohio) in the 2003 GMAC Bowl.

■ Of the 22 wins under Petrino against non-conference opponents, three have come against Top 25 teams, 16 have come by double-digits and Louisville has scored 40 or more points in nine of the 28 games.

■ Petrino is 19-3 versus in regular-season games versus non-conference foes.

Wake Forest, Smith carried a career-high 12 times for a career-best 58 yards. He had the game's longest run when he scampered 22 yards versus the tough Wake Forest defense.

■ Coming off the bench versus Boston College on Oct. 24, Smith carried eight times for a career-best 51 yards against the nation's top rushing defense. Smith tallied the biggest run by a running back this season when he scampered for 49 yards.

■ Smith is third on the squad with 183 yards rushing and two scores in his first season with the Cards. A product of Hammond, La., Smith is averaging 4.2 yards per carry this season.

JACKSON THIRD ON FRESHMEN TOTAL OFFENSE LIST

■ Freshman quarterback Lamar Jackson has enjoyed a solid freshman campaign. He leads the team in rushing (484) and passing (1,342). He leads the team in total offense with 1,826 yards and 228.2 yards per game.

■ Jackson's 1,826 yards of total offense ranks second in school history for a freshman, trailing only (Teddy Bridgewater (2,195 in 2011). Jackson needs only 303 yards to break Teddy Bridgewater's school record of 2,129 yards.

RARE FRESHMAN 300-YARD GAME

■ Lamar Jackson is one of three freshmen at Louisville to pass for 300 yards in a game, joining only Chris Redman and Kyle Bolin to accomplish the feat. Jackson completed 20-of-35 passes for a career-high 307 yards and three touchdowns in the loss to Florida State on Oct. 17. Jackson's 307 yards passing ranks as the fourth-highest passing total by a freshman.

■ Redman threw for 400 yards against Southern Mississippi in and 325 against Michigan State in 1996, while Bolin passed for 381 versus Kentucky and 300 versus Georgia.

■ Jackson's 1,342 yards passing total is now third in freshman passing yards at UofL, trailing Teddy Bridgewater's total of 2,129 yards in 2011 and Redman's 1,773 yards in 1996.

SCORING 30

■ Louisville has made scoring 30 points seem quite easy under Bobby Petrino. The squad has done so 47 times in the 70 games with head coach Bobby Petrino at the helm of the Cardinals. Over that span, the Cardinals are 43-4 when tallying more than 30 points in a game. Louisville went 7-1 last year when scoring better than 30 points in a game, but did fall 34-31 to Houston on Sept. 12 prior to the 45-3 win over Samford on Sept. 26.

■ The Cardinals have lost only four games at home during his tenure at Louisville, but his last two losses have come when the Cards have scored more than 30 points. Louisville had won 22 straight games when scoring 30 or more points before losses to Florida State last season and Houston on Sept. 12. The Cardinals are 22-2 at home when scoring 30 or more points under Petrino.

■ For comparison's sake, Louisville scored 30 or more points just 33 times over the seven years that Petrino wasn't coaching the Cardinals' program.

■ Getting to 40 points is even more decisive for the Cardinals, who are 30-1 under Petrino in such games.

NO COMBINATION LOCK

■ A year after fielding the same offensive line for most of the year, the Cardinals have seen a different starting combination in five of the eight games this season.

■ The only constant has been true freshman Geron Christian, who has started all eight games this season in his rookie season. Another true freshman, Kenny Thomas has started the last four games, while redshirt freshman Lukayus McNeil has made five-straight starts.

■ Tobijah Hughley, who has started six games this season, is the most experienced player on the offensive line with 18 starts.

■ Through the first eight games, the Cardinals have started at least 10 different offensive linemen this year. Christian is the only player who has started all eight games this year. Other players who have started this season are: Hughley, T.C. Klusman, McNeil, Sylar Lacy, Pedro Sibiea, Thomas, Aaron Epps, Kiola Mahoni and Kelby Johnson.

DRAMA KINGS

■ Since 2008, Louisville is 20-19 in games decided by seven points or less, and the Cardinals have lost three games by a total of 13 points to start the season. It's marks the first time since 2007 that the Cardinals have dropped two straight games by 10 points or less when they fell 40-34 to Kentucky and 38-35 to Syracuse.

■ Head coach Bobby Petrino is 9-10 at Louisville in games decided by seven points or less and 23-18 during his coaching career after the 20-19 win over Wake Forest last week.

■ The Cardinals are 5-5 all-time in overtime games since the NCAA instituted the rule in 1996. Petrino is 0-2 in overtime games at Louisville.

TARGET PRACTICE

■ In all, 15 different players have caught a pass for Louisville this season: 8 wide receivers (James Quick, Jamari Staples, Jaylen Smith, Traveon Samuel, Ja'Quay Savage, Devante Peete, Javonte Bagley, Emonee Spence; 4 tight ends (Micky Crum, Cole Hikutini, Keith Towbridge, Charles Stanberry; 4 running backs (Reggie Bonnafon, L.J. Scott, Brandon Radcliff, Jeremy Smith).

■ The freshmen class has been leading the way this season, totaling 56 receptions for 705 and three touchdowns. Jaylen Smith is leading the way with 18 receptions for 252 yards, while Traveon Samuel has 15 receptions for 139 yards. Devante Peete has one of the three touchdown receptions from the freshmen class, while tight end Micky Crum has the other two touchdown receptions.

■ Redshirt freshman Micky Crum is the top tight end with 13 receptions for 161 yards and a pair of scores. He recorded his first reception versus Auburn when he caught two passes for 19 yards, and had his biggest game with a 103-yard performance and six catches versus Houston.

■ After missing four games, Jamari Staples has caught 20 passes for 307 yards and two scores over the last four contests. In a one-point win over Wake Forest on Oct. 30,

Staples posted his best performance, totaling 10 receptions for 133 yards and two scores. The 10 receptions were the most by a wide receiver since Ei Rogers recorded 10 versus UCF in 2013. Staples caught a 14-yard touchdown pass and a 22-yarder right before the half.

■ Junior James Quick continues to lead the team in receiving with 24 receptions for 365 yards and four touchdowns. Appearing in six games, Quick has caught at least three passes each game, including a season-best five receptions for 130 yards and a career-high three touchdowns versus Florida State on Oct. 17.

■ After catching two passes for 18 yards as a freshman in 2014, Javonte Bagley has seven receptions for 88 yards this year, while quarterback Reggie Bonnafon has also caught seven passes for 88 yards.

JACKSON SHATTERING RUSHING MARKS

■ Freshman quarterback Lamar Jackson was born to run to steal a phrase from Bruce Springsteen. Jackson owns three of the top 10 school marks for rushing games by a quarterback, tallying a school-best 184 yards versus Samford. He also owns the third-best mark with 121 yards against NC State and 106 yards versus Auburn, which is fifth-best.

■ A native of Pompano Beach, Fla., Jackson holds the school record for rushing yards in a season with 484 and needs just 273 yards to break the school's career mark of 756 set by Stefan Lefors (2001-04).

■ There is a telling stat that has shown up in wins and losses for the Cardinals, and it surrounds the running talent of freshman quarterback Lamar Jackson. The native of Pompano Beach, Fla., has been productive running the ball in the four wins, and not so in the four losses. Jackson is averaging 80.5 yards in the four wins this year, totaling 184 yards versus Samford and 121 against NC State. In those four victories, Jackson is averaging 5.3 yards per carry, including a 73-yard run versus Samford.

■ In the four losses this year, Jackson has been stymied in the running game. He is averaging 40.5 yards per game in those contests, being held to 16 yards against Houston, eight versus Clemson and 32 on Oct. 17 against Florida State. He is averaging just 3.2 yards per carry in the four losses.

JACKSON BECOMING BETTER PASSER

■ True freshman quarterback Lamar Jackson has been throwing the football better over the last three games. After going just 10-of-27 against NC State, Jackson has gone 54-for-86 (.628) for 744 yards and five touchdowns. He had a career-best completion percentage last week versus Wake Forest, completing 73.1 percent of his passes.

■ Jackson recorded his second multiple-touchdown game last week versus Wake Forest tossing a pair of scores to wide receiver Jamari Staples. Jackson found him for a 14-yard touchdown strike and a 22-yarder that brought the Cards to within 19-17.

■ Jackson, a product of Boynton Beach High, Jackson has thrown for over 200 yards in each of his last three games. He passed for a career-high 307 yards and three touchdowns in a loss to Florida State, and had 230 yards against Boston College and 207 last week versus Wake Forest.

QUICK REACHES 1,000 CAREER YARDS

■ After being sidelined late in the fourth quarter of the season-opening loss to Auburn, junior wide receiver James Quick has been a big lift to the offense since returning to the lineup. In four games since his return, Quick has caught 20 passes for 337 yards and four touchdowns.

■ In the loss to Florida State, Quick recorded a career-high three touchdown receptions after totaling five receptions for 130 yards — the third 100-yard game of his career. Quick's three receiving scores, which is tied for the third-most in school history, are the most since DeVante Parker totaled three against Kentucky last season. It's the 10th time in school history that a player totaled three or

■ The Trinity High product registered two 100-yard games last season when he totaled a career-best 174 yards in a win over FIU and had 101 yards against Clemson.

■ Quick leads the team with 24 receptions for 365 yards, despite missing games versus Houston and Clemson.

■ Quick returned to action versus Samford, and made an immediate impact in the 45-3 victory on Sept. 26. The product of Trinity High School caught three passes for 69 yards, including a 36-yard touchdown reception.

■ The junior from Louisville, Ky., has 66 receptions for 1,004 yards and seven touchdowns in his career.

14 NEW OFFENSIVE STARTERS

■ The Cardinals lost a lot of talent on offense in wide receiver DeVante Parker, offensive linemen John Miller, Jamon Brown and Jake Smith, and running backs Dominique Brown and Michael Dyer.

■ Louisville had five new offensive starters on Sept. 5 versus Auburn and added another versus Houston. True freshman Lamar Jackson started in the backfield, while wide receiver Ja'Quay Savage, tight end Micky Crum and offensive linemen Pedro Sibiea and Geron Christian also started upfront. Wide receiver Traveon Samuel was a new starter on offense versus Houston.

■ In the win over Samford on Sept. 26, the Cardinals added four new offensive personnel in running back Jeremy Smith, offensive guard Lukayus McNeil, center T.C. Klusman and offensive tackle Kelby Johnson. Offensive tackle Kenny Thomas started for the first time versus NC State on Oct. 3.

■ Three new offensive starters made their first starts of the season versus Florida State on Oct. 17 in tight end Cole Hikutini, wide receiver Jamari Staples and guard Kiola Mahoni. Wide receiver Javonte Bagley made his first career start against Wake Forest.

NEED TO CONTROL THE BALL

■ It's easy for the Cardinals. If they hold the ball, they will win the game. In all four wins, the Cardinals have dominated the time of possession, holding a 35:38 advantage. The Cards rank 46th nationally in time of possession averaging 31:19 per game this season.

■ In the 20-19 win over Wake Forest, the Cards had an advantage of 9:40 and had a season-best 11:54 in the 17-14 victory over Boston College on Oct. 24. Louisville also had the ball 6:08 longer than NC State did in a 20-13 victory on Oct. 3.

■ In three of the four losses, the Cardinals were on the wrong end of time possession except for the season-opening loss to Auburn, where they held a 1:40 advantage over the Tigers.

NEED TO RUSH FOR 200

■ It's no secret head coach Bobby Petrino wants his offense to be balanced, but he emphasizes his team's ability to run the football.

■ Entering his sixth season as head coach of the Cardinals, Petrino's teams are an incredible 32-3 when his teams rush for over 200 yards in a game after rushing for 288 yards versus Samford on Sept. 26 and 203 yards in the win over NC State on Oct. 3. The 288 yards are the most rushing yards since UofL tallied 325 yards last year in the win over Murray State. The Cardinals were 6-1 in 2003 during Petrino's first season when rushing for over 200 yards in a game, with the only loss coming to Miami (Ohio) in the GMAC Bowl. The only other loss was a 41-38 loss at third-ranked in 2004.

■ The Cardinals have won 22 of their last 23 games when they rush for over 200 yards under Petrino with the only loss coming to Auburn on Sept. 5. The Cardinals won their last six games that season when rushing over 200 yards, and went 6-0 in 2005, 5-0 in 2006 and 3-0 last year.

■ On the flip side, the Cardinals are 4-7 when they fail to rush for over 100 yards as a team, including 1-3 this season after being held to 68 last week against Florida State. Louisville was held to 70 yards in the loss to Houston on Sept. 12 and 19 yards versus Clemson.

500 YARDS IS A GOOD NUMBER

■ The Cardinals' offense got back on track versus Samford on Sept. 26. Tallying 45 points, the most since a 44-40 win over Kentucky in the regular-season finale, the Cardinals were able to run the ball for a season-best 288 yards and throw for 274 yards. The Cardinals totaled a season-high 562 yards of total offense in the 45-3 win over the Bulldogs. It was only the second time in the last 17 games that the Cardinals recorded over 500 yards of total offense — the last was against Murray State last season when the Cardinals totaled 603 yards of total offense.

■ During Petrino's tenure with the Cardinals, his teams are 23-2 when his offense totals more than 500 yards of total offense on a game.

STAPLES NOTCHES FIRST 100-YARD GAME

■ Looks like wide receiver Jamari Staples is all the way back after his best performance since joining the program this season. Staples had his biggest game in a UofL uniform in the win over Wake Forest on Friday night. He caught a career-high 10 passes for 133 yards and his first two touchdowns. He scored on a 14-yard reception and added a 22-yarder right before the half to trim Wake's lead to 19-17.

■ Staples is second on the team with 20 receptions for 307 yards and a pair of touchdowns.

■ Staples recorded his first 100-yard receiving game at Louisville and the second of his career — recorded 103 yards versus Tulsa in 2013. The Lineville, Ala., product totaled just the third 100-yard receiving game by a Louisville receiver, joining James Quick and Micky Crum. Quick totaled 130 yards versus Florida State and Crum added 103 against Houston.

■ Staples tied his previous career-high with four receptions for a career-best 96 yards in the victory over Boston College. Staples led the Cardinals with those four catches, and also recorded a career-best 53-yard reception.

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■ After missing the first four games of the season, wide receiver Jamari Staples made his Louisville debut in the 20-13 win over NC State on Oct. 3. Hurting his knee on Sept. 2 in practice before the season opener against Auburn, Staples, a transfer from UAB, caught two passes for 22 yards against the Wolfpack. He came back on Oct. 17 against the Seminoles to total four receptions for 56 yards, which are all highs in his Louisville career. NEED TO KEEP SACKS DOWN

■ The Cardinals have a problem — sacks. Louisville ranks 126th out of 127 teams in sacks allowed in the country, allowing 4.13 per game. Through the first eight games of the year, the Cardinals have been sacked four or more times in six different games, including a season-high seven versus Boston College. They were also sacked four of more times versus Auburn, Clemson, NC State, Florida State and Wake Forest.

■ Last year, the Cardinals were sacked 3.0 times a game en route to a 9-4 mark. In those four losses, the Cardinals were sacked 12 times including four in the loss to Georgia in the Belk Bowl loss.

BAGLEY SHOWS PROMISE

■ Sophomore Javonte Bagley emerged in the 17-14 win over Boston College on Oct. 24. The wide receiver from Vero Beach, Fla., caught a career-high three passes for 69 yards, including a career-long 39-yard reception. Bagley has caught seven passes for 88 yards this season. He caught two passes for nine yards in the loss to Clemson and had receptions Samford and Florida State.

■ Bagley caught two passes for 18 yards as a true freshman last season.

■ Sophomore Reggie Bonnafon is adapting to his new role in the UofL offense. After starting five games at quarterbacks last season and the opener versus Auburn in 2015, Bonnafon is being used out of the backfield. He had his best in his new role in the 17-14 win over Boston College, carrying 10 times for a team-high 56 yards and also catching two passes for 18 yards.

■ Seeing extensive action at running back versus Florida State, Bonnafon's production was evident. In the 41-21 loss to Florida State, Bonnafon carried three times for 20 yards, including a run for nine yards. Out of the backfield, he caught a career-high three passes for 31 yards, including a career-best 23-yard reception.

■ Bonnafon is fourth on the team in rushing with 146 yards and is averaging 4.4 yards per carry. He has also caught seven passes for 88 yards this season.

■ Bonnafon was 8-of-13 for 67 yards as the starting quarterback in the season-opening loss to Auburn on Sept. 5.

RANKINS NOT JUST RECORDING SACKS

■ Senior defensive end Sheldon Rankins has been the Cardinals' most prolific pass rushers over the last two seasons. However, the 6-foot-2, 300-pounder has showed an ability to make big plays. Rankins picked up a fumble and raced 46 yards for his first career touchdown in the win over Boston College on Oct. 24.

■ Last season, Rankins recorded his first two interceptions, picking off passes versus Wake Forest in the 20-10 win and also had another one in the 38-19 victory over Boston College on the road.

YOUNG ON A TEAR

■ Junior outside linebacker/defensive end Trevon Young has been a terror over the last three weeks in leading the Cardinals to a 2-1 record.

■ With three sacks versus Wake Forest, Young has six sacks in his last two games (also three vs. Boston College) and eight in his last three contests. His third sack caused a fumble with under two minutes remaining. He had a career-best 3.5 tackles for loss in the 20-19 win over the Demon Deacons.

■ A product of Iowa Western Community College, Young leads the Cardinals with 8.0 sacks, which is the same total led Sheldon Rankins had all of last season. Young leads the ACC and is tied for seventh nationally with 1.0 sacks per game, while sitting 91st in the nation with 8.5 tackles for loss.

■ Young was named the ACC Defensive Lineman of the Week in the win over Boston College. As a team, the Cardinals recorded a season-high eight sacks, but it was Young who stole the show. Young registered a career-high 3.0 sacks, including a sack on fourth down on the Eagles' final possession.

NEW INTERCEPTION STREAK STARTED

■ Louisville's interception streak of 17 games came to an end against North Carolina State on Oct. 3 — a 20-13



win for the Cardinals, and were held without an interception for the last three games until they exploded versus Wake Forest.

■ The Cardinals had a season-best four interceptions, all in the second half by four different players (UoFL had three picks vs. Auburn and Samford). Freshman safety Dee Smith had his first career interception in the third quarter, the Cardinals' first pick in three games. It was the first four-interception game since Louisville totaled four last year in a 38-19 win over the Eagles.

■ The Cardinals rank sixth nationally in interceptions with 13 through eight games this year, with safety Chucky Williams and cornerback Trumaine Washington leading the way with three.

■ After recording 35 interceptions over that span, the Cardinals were held without a pick for the first time since Louisville's 36-9 win over Miami in the 2013 Russell Athletic Bowl.

■ Seven different players have registered interceptions this season.

TOUGH AGAINST THE RUN

■ Through eight games, Louisville's defense ranks 16th nationally in yards per game (111.6) and 13th in yards per carry (3.1), but those numbers don't effectively tell the entire story:

■ The Cardinals are facing plenty of opportunities as opponents are averaging 36.2 rushing attempts per game.

■ Louisville is tied for 12th nationally having allowed only six rushing touchdowns this season and are tied for 10th in the country having yielded only four runs of over 20 yards (the long is 54).

■ The Cardinals completely shut down the Boston College running game as the Eagles were held to -14 yards on 30 carries and Wake Forest, who was held to 40 yards rushing on 32 carries. NC State was limited to 45 yards. Samford was limited to 71 yards in Louisville's 45-3 win on Sept. 26.

▶ The -14 yards rushing was the seventh-fewest total in school history and was the lowest since holding Wake Forest to -22 yards rushing in last season's 20-10 win over the Demon Deacons.

THIRD DOWN TOUGHNESS

▶ Opponents haven't had a lot of success converting third-down plays against the Cardinals in 2015.

▶ Louisville ranks 40th nationally in third-down defense, allowing the opposition to convert just .345 percent of the time

▶ Boston College was held to 1-of-14 on third down last week, which was the lowest percentage on the year, and Wake Forest was limited to 3-of-16 conversions.

▶ In a 20-13 win over NC State on Oct. 3, the Cardinals limited the Wolfpack to 5-of-15 third-down attempts.

▶ The Cardinals are a little behind last year's pace when they held the opposition to a 32.0 percent conversion rate.

INTENSE PRESSURE

▶ With 18 sacks over the last four games, the Cardinals are rounding into form that saw them as one of the top teams at pressuring the quarterback.

▶ The Cardinals got off to a slow start with six sacks in their first four games, but have responded over the last four games, where they recorded a season-best eight in the win over Boston College. It was the biggest total since registering eight last season versus Wake Forest.

▶ The Cardinals registered four sacks versus Wake Forest and a pair of sacks versus Florida State and four in the win on the road against NC State on Oct. 3.

▶ Junior Trevon Young has been dominating over the last three games, recording 8.0 sacks. He entered the season with 1.0 sack, but has totaled 8.0 in the last three games. He was credited with 3.0 sacks last week against Wake Forest and Boston College, while being credited with two in the loss to Florida State on Oct. 17.

■ Senior Sheldon Rankins is second on the team with 4.0 sacks and junior Keith Kelsey is third with 3.0 sacks.

■ Over the last two seasons, the Cardinals are 10-2 when recording three or more sacks in a game.

NEW STREAK STARTED

■ The Cardinals had been one of the best in the country at forcing turnovers during the last couple of seasons as was evident by their 21-game turnover streak that was stopped in the 41-21 loss to Florida State on Oct. 17. The Cardinals started a new streak last when they recorded two fumble recoveries in the win over Boston College. One of the returns resulted in a 46-yard fumble return for a touchdown by Sheldon Rankins.

■ Since being held without a turnover in the loss to Florida State on Oct. 17, the Cardinals have forced six in the last two contests, including a season-high in the 20-19 victory over Wake Forest on Friday night. It was the most miscues forced since turning over Connecticut five times in a 31-10 win in 2013.

NO BIG DRIVES

■ The Cardinals held Boston College to just 79 yards of total offense in the 17-14 win on Oct. 24. It was the lowest output since the Cardinals held Wake Forest to 100 yards of offense in last season's 20-10 victory over Wake Forest.

■ The Eagles had 16 possessions in the game on Saturday and had only one drive that ended in points. Boston College scored on a six-yard drive when they picked up a fumble in Louisville territory. Louisville forced eight three-and-outs and didn't allow a drive that amassed more than 29 yards. Seven drives resulted in negative yards and the longest possession was a six-play drive on the first possession in the contest.

■ Boston College was forced to punt 12 times in the game.

BURGESS EIGHTH IN THE ACC

■ Senior linebacker James Burgess has been a steady force in the middle of the defense for the last three seasons. Appearing in 43 games, including 38 starts, the native of Homestead, Fla., has 235 career tackles during that span after having 14 stops versus Houston on Sept. 12 and 10 in the win over Boston College on Oct. 24. He tallied eight more versus Clemson and Samford. He is second on the team with 65 tackles after the first eight games of the season and ranks eighth in the ACC with 8.1 tackles per game.

■ He totaled his fifth double-digit tackle game against the Boston College, totaling 10 stops, but his career-high came this year versus Houston when he registered 14. His previous high was 11 last season in a 23-17 loss to Clemson last season and also was credited with 10 stops versus Georgia in the Belk Bowl. He ranks sixth in the ACC in tackles with an average of 8.7 per game.

■ Burgess totaled 71 tackles in 2013 and 2014, finishing third on the team in tackles with 71. He recorded five or more tackles in seven games last season.

■ He led the linebackers in tackles for loss with 10.0 and recorded three interceptions.

■ Burgess owns seven career interceptions after recording a pick in the 20-17 loss to Clemson on Sept. 17.

KELSEY SIXTH IN THE ACC

■ Junior linebacker Keith Kelsey has developed into a leader as was evident by being named one of the team's captains, and the Gainesville product is coming off the biggest game of his career. Kelsey totaled a career-high 15 tackles and registered two sacks and four tackles for loss in the 34-31 loss to Houston on Sept. 12. He followed that up with his second consecutive double-digit tackle game versus Clemson, recording 10 tackles in the 20-17 loss on Sept. 17.

■ Kelsey leads the team in tackles with 68 and ranks 48th in the nation and is sixth in the ACC.

■ In his first year as a starter in 2014, Kelsey, who started all 13 games last year, finished second on the team in tackles with 87, ranking 17th in the ACC. He totaled eight stops in the loss to Auburn on Sept. 5.

■ Kelsey has led the team in tackles twice this season, with his 15 versus Houston and 10 against Clemson,

GRANTHAM TEACHES TAKEWAYS

■ Under the direction of defensive coordinator Todd Grantham, the Cardinals' defense has been very opportunistic through his first two seasons leading the defense. The defense has forced 48 turnovers over the last 21 games with Grantham leading the defense.

■ Louisville finished first in the ACC in turnovers forced in 2014 with 30 and have already forced 18 this year. The 30 turnovers forced were the most since 2001 when that team forced 2001 miscues en route to an 11-2 record and a Conference USA title.

■ Louisville has forced multiple turnovers in 16 of the last 21 games dating back to last season, including a season-high five versus Wake Forest last Friday night.

■ Louisville held a +5 turnover margin in its nine wins last season and are +6 in the four victories this season.

NEW SECONDARY STEPS UP

■ Heading into last season, the Cardinals had to replace both starting safeties in Calvin Pryor and Hakeem Smith, and were still able to excel. This year, the Cardinals have to replace the entire secondary as all four starters, who were in NFL training camps, need to be replaced in Charles Gaines and Terrell Floyd at cornerback and James Sample and Gerod Holliman at safety.

■ The Cardinals lost a lot of production as 21 of the 26 interceptions are gone off the roster. Holliman led the nation with 14 and Sample totaled four.

■ The Cardinals, who entered the year with zero career starts in the secondary, saw Shaq Wiggins and Trumaine Washington start at cornerback, while Josh Harvey-Clemmons and Chucky Williams started at safety in each of the eight games this season.

■ The four players have totaled 10 interceptions in the first eight games, with Williams and Washington each leading the team with three apiece.

BELOW THE 300-YARD MARK

■ The Louisville defense is starting to round into form from the 2014 season when it was sixth in the country in total defense. The Cardinals have played their best defense the last two games of the season, holding Boston College to 79 yards of total offense and Wake Forest to 266 yards, which has elevated the Cardinals to 16th in the nation in total defense allowing 309.3 yards per game. The 79 yards of total offense was the fourth-lowest total in school history and the fewest yards allowed since Wake Forest was limited to 100 yards in last season's win over the Demon Deacons.

■ Louisville held Boston College to -14 yards rushing, which was the seventh-lowest total in school history and the lowest since Wake Forest rushed for -22 yards last season.

■ The Cardinals played outstanding defense in four of their last five games, with the lone exception being Florida State, who scored the most points since the 'Noles scored 42 in last season's win.

■ After holding its first seven opponents to less than 300 yards of total offense last season, the Cardinals allowed each of their first three opponents to break the 300-yard plateau, coincidentally losing all three games. Since those losses, the Cardinals are allowing 256.8 yards of total offense in the last five games.

■ Over the last two seasons, the Cardinals are 12-2 when the defense holds opponents to less than 300 yards of total offense.

■ The Cardinals gave up a season-high 510 yards in

the loss to Florida State, only the second time under Todd Grantham that the Cards had given up more than 500 yards of total offense in the last two seasons (505 vs. Georgia).

CARDS MOVE UP THE SACKS LADDER

■ One of the reasons why the Cardinals were so productive on defense last year was because of the pressure they put on the quarterback. Louisville finished 12th in the country in sacks averaging 3.15 per game.

■ However, this season the Cardinals' got off to a slow start, but have started to rack up the sacks in the last four games. Louisville stands 14th in the nation with a 3.0 average, but have averaged 4.5 sacks in its last four contests.

■ The Cardinals totaled only three sacks in the first three games, but the Cardinals have totaled 18 sacks in the last four games, including eight versus Boston College on Oct. 24. Louisville totaled three sacks in the 45-3 win over Samford on Sept. 26 and four in the 20-13 victory over NC State on Oct. 3.

■ Over the last two seasons, the Cardinals are 10-2 when recording three or more sacks in a game.

NO RUSH TO SCORE

■ While the Cardinals are yielding 111.6 yards on the ground through the first eight games of the season, opponents have also totaled six rushing touchdowns, which ranks 12th in the country. After giving up two rushing touchdowns in the season opener to Auburn, the Cardinals have yielded just four in the last four games.

■ Under the tutelage of defensive coordinator Todd Grantham, the Cardinals have allowed just 18 rushing touchdowns over the last 21 games.

■ Overall, the defense has allowed just 16 total touchdowns (six rushing and 12 passing) and 140 total points, which stands at just 17.5 points per game. Louisville has allowed two special teams score and an offensive touchdown this season.

FIELDS ROUNDING INTO MID-SEASON FORM

■ The Cardinals added a big-play defender when they signed outside linebacker DeVonte Fields in February. After eight games, Fields is creating havoc in the backfield. The native of Fort Worth, Texas, is third on the team with 8.5 tackles for loss and has 2.5 sacks. Fields is tied for fifth on the team in tackles with 35 through eight games at outside linebacker.

■ He made his first career start for the Cardinals in the loss to Auburn on Sept. 5. Fields totaled five tackles and 0.5 tackles for loss from his outside linebacker position as the Cardinals fell 31-24.

■ Fields had his best game as a Cardinal with eight total tackles and 2.5 tackles for loss in the 20-19 win over Wake Forest. He had six stops and a tackle for loss against Clemson. He totaled his first full sack last week in the win over Boston College.

■ Fields attended Trinity Valley Community College where he was rated as the No. 2 JUCO recruit in the country, totaling 61 tackles and 6.5 sacks in one season at Trinity Valley.

■ He started collegiate career at TCU, where he was selected as the AP Big 12 Defensive Player of the Year and Defensive Newcomer of the Year in 2012.

■ Fields was voted by conference coaches as the Big 12 Defensive Freshman of the Year, where he posted 53 tackles, including 34 solo stops. He led the team with 18.5 tackles for loss and 10 sacks... was first in the Big 12 at

1.42 tackles for loss per game and third in the league with 0.77 sacks per game. His 10 sacks tied for the fourth-most in a season in TCU history and were the most by a freshman.

DEANGELO BROWN REACHES CAREER-HIGH

■ Junior defensive tackle DeAngelo Brown has emerged as a big-time run stopper during the 2015 season. The native of Savannah, Ga., has recorded a career-high 30 tackles this season, which bests his previous high of 20 he recorded a year ago.

■ Brown tallied six tackles in the season opener versus Auburn and tallied four tackles in four other games during the season. The 308-pounder, who entered the year with 3.0 tackles for loss and 1.5 sacks, has tallied a career-best 5.5 tackles for loss and 2.0 sacks.

RANKINS UP THE SACKS

■ Senior defensive end Sheldon Rankins has emerged as one of the top defensive ends in the nation. Over the last two seasons, the native of Covington, Ga., has totaled 12.5 sacks. He produced a career-high 8.0 last season to lead the team, and has totaled 4.0 this season.

■ Rankins registered a season-high two sacks in the 45-3 win over Samford on Sept. 26 and added another one versus NC State on Oct. 3. Through eight games, Rankins is fourth on the team in tackles with 37 and is fourth with 8.0 tackles for loss.

■ Rankins has 16 career sacks and needs one more to tie Carl Powell (1995-96) for tenth place on the school's all-time sacks list.

■ Rankins had a solid first game versus Auburn, totaling seven tackles, just one off his career-best of eight, which he set last year versus FIU in a 34-3 win. He tied his career-high for tackles in the 34-31 loss to Houston when he tallied eight tackles and added eight more in the loss to Clemson.

■ Rankins was fourth on the team in tackles with a career-high 53, the highest among the UofL defensive linemen. A starter in all 13 games, Rankins registered sacks in eight games, including 1.5 in a win at Boston College.

■ The Covington, Ga., native, who was a third-team All-ACC selection last season, led the Cardinals in sacks (8.0) and tackles for loss (13.5) and was a disruptive force on the line.

ATLANTA- Will Muschamp's defense made a couple of huge plays early for No. 6 Auburn to offset three interceptions by Jeremy Johnson, and the Tigers held off Louisville and surprise quarterback Lamar Jackson for a 31-24 victory.

The Tigers' first touchdown in the season opener was set up by an interception. Justin Garrett returned a fumble 82 yards to make it 14-0.

Not that it was smooth sailing for the Tigers, who led 17-0 at halftime and seemed to be up comfortably 31-10 after a touchdown with just over 10 minutes remaining.

Jackson, a freshman who got the bulk of the playing time over three more experienced quarterbacks, led the Cardinals to a couple of late touchdowns that made Auburn sweat it out.

Bonnafeon played into the second quarter before giving way to Jackson for good. The freshman was 9 of 20 passing for 100 yards. He also led the Cardinals in rushing with 106 yards on 16 carries, including a 10-yard touchdown late in the third quarter for Louisville's first TD.

The biggest play came midway through the second quarter when Louisville was driving. Bonnafeon fumbled an attempted handoff, Garrett scooped it up at the 18, and off he went the other way for the touchdown, Muschamp running with him nearly stride for stride along the sideline.

Johnson was picked off twice in the first half by former Georgia safety Josh Harvey-Clemons, who sat out last season after transferring to Louisville. The Auburn quarterback was also intercepted by Trumaine Washington in the third quarter, foolishly trying to force a pass into coverage. That led to Jackson's TD run that made it 24-10.

LOUISVILLE- Forget any possible quarterback controversy for the Louisville Cardinals, whose biggest concern right now is figuring out how to just win. The odds don't look great with No. 12 Clemson coming in Thursday, especially for an 0-2 team struggling on both sides of the ball after Saturday's 34-31 loss to Houston.

This latest loss ended with sophomore Kyle Bolin at quarterback after starting the fourth quarter in relief of struggling freshman Lamar Jackson. Bolin did his best in rallying the Cardinals twice with fourth-quarter scoring drives including his 29-yard scoring pass to Micky Crum with 6:25 remaining. Louisville rallied four times overall, but Bolin couldn't complete a fifth comeback as the Cardinals fell to 0-2 for the first time since 1998. Bolin was 10 of 18 passing for 157 yards and led a touchdown drive ending with Jeremy Smith's 4-yard run for a 24-20 lead early in the fourth.

Jackson was 17 of 27 for 168 yards and a TD in his first start but threw two deep interceptions, one of which led to Kyle Bullard's 21-yard field goal for Houston. The Cardinals were outgained 462-395 and recorded four turnovers, including two interceptions by Jackson. They allowed a game-tying 100-yard kickoff return touchdown to Brandon Wilson right after John Wallace's 36-yard field goal seemed to swing momentum their way.

LOUISVILLE- Deshaun Watson threw two touchdown passes, Wayne Gallman ran for 139 yards and No. 11 Clemson held off Louisville 20-17 on in the Atlantic Coast Conference opener for both schools.

Despite ragged stretches including two interceptions by Watson, Clemson followed up routs of Wofford and Appalachian State with a solid conference win. The sophomore was spot on when needed, finding Hunter Renfrow and Jordan Leggett wide open down the middle for TD passes of 32 and 25 yards, respectively.

Louisville started its third quarterback in three games with Kyle Bolin, and used freshman Lamar Jackson and sophomore Reggie Bonnafon behind center in a search for offensive consistency. The combination kept the Cardinals within reach of Clemson long enough to have a last shot at a win, but Bolin's desperation pass was intercepted by Jadar Johnson in the final seconds.

Watson eventually settled down from a slow start that included James Burgess' one-handed interception of his first-quarter pass to direct Clemson's first touchdown drive early in the second. He had plenty of time to find Renfrow for the 36-yard strike with 13:12 remaining for a 7-0 lead.

Louisville's only first-half answer was John Wallace's 26-yard field goal set up by Bolin's 55-yard pass to Jalen Smith, a play that comprised nearly half of its 117 yards in the first 30 minutes. It also summed up the Cardinals' offensive struggle whether Bolin, Jackson or Bonnafon was on the field.

The Cardinals remained within reach and got to 20-17 in the fourth quarter on Traveon Samuel's 100-yard kickoff return touchdown with 9:41 left. Wallace's 38-yard attempt sailed wide left with 2:28 left, but Louisville still positioned itself to go for the win before Bolin's pass was picked off.

LOUISVILLE - Lamar Jackson threw one touchdown pass and ran for two more scores to lead Louisville to a 45-3 rout of Samford.

Jackson finished with 184 yards rushing, a school-record for a quarterback. He scored on keepers of 14 and 13 yards in the first six minutes of the game. His 73-yard run set up Brandon Radcliff's 2-yard touchdown run to make it 21-0. Jackson finished 15 of 22 for 212 yards passing, including a 36-yard touchdown to James Quick.

Louisville (1-3) used two early turnovers to setup scores. Cornerback Trumaine Washington forced a fumble on the second play from scrimmage and Jackson ran for a score two plays later. Washington then intercepted a Michael Eubank pass less than a minute later to spark an 80-yard drive that put the Cardinals up 14-0.

Anthony Pistelli kicked a 32-yard field goal for Samford (2-2).

Louisville, which entered averaging 109 yards per game on the ground, finished with 288 yards rushing.

Samford proved welcome relief from Louisville's tough early-season schedule that included close losses to Auburn, Houston, and Clemson that left the Cardinals 0-3 for the first time since 1984.

Quick played for the first time since injuring an ankle in the Auburn opener. He led Louisville receivers with three catches and 69 yards as 12 Cardinals caught passes.

John Wallace kicked a 50-yard field goal to give Louisville a 24-3 lead with 6:15 left in the first half.

Jackson broke the previous quarterback rushing mark set by Jim Wagoner's 162 yards in 1974. But an interception on the first play of the second quarter, and a fumble showed it wasn't a perfect night for Jackson.

Louisville had started a different quarterback in each of its first three games, the only team in the country to do so. Jackson started Louisville's second game after rushing for 106 yards and a touchdown against Auburn in relief of Reggie Bonnafon.

RALEIGH - Lamar Jackson ran and threw for touchdowns to help Louisville beat North Carolina State 20-13.

Jackson ran for 121 yards, including a 68-yard scoring sprint in the opening quarter, to lead a strong ground attack for the Cardinals (2-3, 1-1 Atlantic Coast Conference). He also threw for a 20-yard touchdown to Devante Peete in the second, giving the Cards a 14-0 lead on a day when they remained in firm control from the start.

The freshman quarterback completed just 10 of 27 passes, but the Cardinals ran for 203 yards against a defense that came in ranked third nationally by allowing just 205.8 yards.

Jacoby Brissett threw for a touchdown and Matt Dayes ran for one to lead the Wolfpack (4-1, 0-1), who managed just 228 yards and spent the entire game fighting uphill.

Louisville started 0-3 before last week's romp against Samford, with Jackson setting a school record for rushing yards (184) by a quarterback. Now the Cardinals have won two straight to build some momentum.

N.C. State carried plenty of impressive stats into its ACC opener, though playing four overmatched opponents - two picked sixth or lower in the Sun Belt, another picked next to last in its Conference USA division and a Championship Subdivision opponent - didn't reveal a lot about whether the team could make good on its goal of contending in the Atlantic Division.

The Wolfpack had a bumpy week, too, when coach Dave Doeren had to dismiss last year's leading rusher Shadrach Thornton from the team following another round of legal trouble with a midweek arrest.

N.C. State committed two big turnovers, the biggest coming in the opening quarter when Jumichael Ramos made a 48-yard catch and dragged a defender inside the 10 only to lose a fumble as he fell to the ground. Dayes also lost a fumble near midfield that the Cardinals converted into a field goal in the third.

The Wolfpack had committed one turnover through the first four games.

TALLAHASSEE - For the second straight season, Florida State is proving that it is a strong second-half team.

Trailing at halftime, the Seminoles broke open the game against Louisville with three third-quarter touchdowns in a 41-21 victory at Doak Campbell Stadium.

Everett Golson, who passed for 372 yards and three touchdowns, gave the Seminoles the lead for good with 8:05 remaining in the third quarter as he connected with Kermit Whitfield for a 70-yard touchdown up the right sideline. It is the eighth 300-yard passing game of Golson's career and his second since transferring to Florida State earlier this summer.

Golson completed passes to seven players. Whitfield set career highs for receptions (nine) and yards (172).

Dalvin Cook had his fourth 100-yard rushing game of the season with 163 yards on 22 carries and a pair of touchdowns. Cook's 54-yard touchdown, where he broke four Louisville tackles, gave the Seminoles a 13-7 lead early in the third quarter and marked his fourth score of 50-plus yards this season.

Louisville was able to stay with the Seminoles for two-and-a-half quarters, but two turnovers in the third quarter derailed any momentum. Lamar Jackson, who grew up in Pompano Beach, Florida, and came into the game with a 53.6 completion percentage, passed for a career-high 307 yards. James Quick had five receptions for 130 yards and three touchdowns.

The Cardinals had a 7-6 lead at halftime on a 18-yard touchdown pass from Jackson to Quick. Florida State's lone points in the first half came on a pair of Roberto Aguayo field goals.

LOUISVILLE - Louisville's defense had something to prove.

Still stewing from allowing 510 yards at No. 9 Florida State and somewhat overshadowed by Boston College and its top-ranked defense, the Cardinals showed their stinginess early, often and particularly the Eagles' final possession. A drive in which BC hoped would at least provide an opportunity to tie went backward and ended with Trevon Young's fourth-down sack of quarterback Troy Flutie for a 4-yard loss that preserved a hard-fought 17-14 victory on Saturday.

"(Defensive coordinator Todd) Grantham kept saying all week, 'the No. 1 defense is coming and we have to outplay them,'" Cardinals linebacker Keith Kelsey said. "We've got to out-physical them and outthrustle them."

The Cardinals (3-4, 2-2 Atlantic Coast Conference) did that and more.

That final stand and sack capped a dominant defensive effort for the Cardinals, who recorded a season-high eight sacks and held the Eagles to just 79 yards including minus-14 rushing. Louisville tied for the eighth-lowest yardage allowed since 1962 and provided the last word in the expected defensive battle.

Sheldon Rankins helped the effort with 46-yard fumble return in the second quarter for Louisville's second TD. The 303-pound defensive end looked pretty nimble when he scooped up Jeff Smith's fumble after being sacked by Trumaine Washington, leaping a defender as he raced down the left sideline.

Louisville allowed just one third-down conversion in 14 chances and tied their highest sack total since making eight against Wake Forest last season.

The performance offset a scoreless second half by Louisville, which gained 365 yards but allowed seven sacks and committed four turnovers. Harold Landry returned a third-quarter fumble 34 yards to set Jeff Smith's 8-yard touchdown, and Elijah Robinson's 12-yard touchdown return of a blocked punt proved BC's first TD.

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C.- Lamar Jackson threw two touchdown passes and Louisville forced five turnovers in the second half in a 20-19 victory over Wake Forest.

Jackson was 19 of 26 for 207 yards with scoring throws covering 14 and 22 yards to Jamari Staples for the Cardinals.

John Wolford was 6 of 19 for 131 yards with a 58-yard touchdown pass to Tabari Hines for the Demon Deacons (3-6, 1-5), but he threw three of his team's four second-half interceptions.

John Wallace kicked field goals of 37 and 39 yards, the latter coming after Chucky Williams' serpentine interception return and giving Louisville a one-point lead with 1:25 left in the third.

Wake Forest's Tylor Harris blocked Wallace's 36-yarder with 5:22 left and recovered at the Louisville 45, but Shaq Wiggins intercepted Wolford's deep pass for K.J. Brent with 3:31 to play.

The Demon Deacons forced a punt with 1:42 remaining but lost 13 yards in four plays. Trevon Young stripped the ball from Kendall Hinton, Devonte' Fields recovered at the Wake Forest 5 and the Cardinals ran out the clock.

Hinton finished 3 of 11 for 95 yards with an interception and a 78-yard catch-and-run touchdown throw to Cortez Lewis - Wake Forest's longest completion since 2011.

Staples had 10 catches for 133 yards for the Cardinals, who gained 317 total yards and held the Demon Deacons to 266 - 40 yards on the ground - in winning their second straight and fourth in five games.

They led 10-0 early and were up 19-17 after the opening half ended with three scores in the final 2:15.
