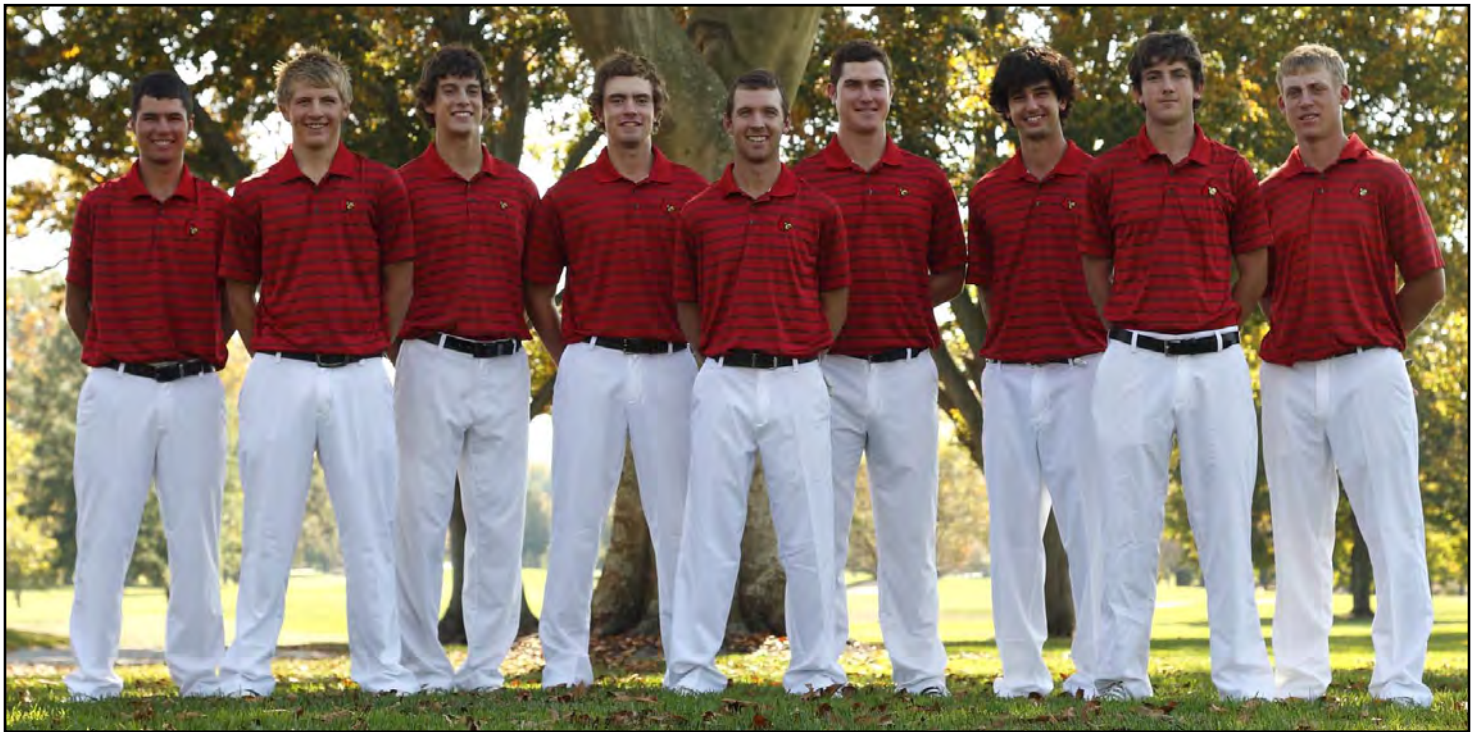

The Tom Musselman Golf Center

One of the final pieces in the Cardinals' rise to national prominence is in place for the University of Louisville men's and women's golf programs, as the Tom Musselman Golf Center officially opened on Tuesday, April 17, 2007 at the Cardinal Club. The facility is state-of-the-art and instrumental in making the Cardinals one of the top golf programs in the country.

The Tom Musselman Golf Center, which was built at a cost of \$600,000, is an indoor practice facility that houses both the U of L men's and women's golf programs. The 5,500 square foot golf center has three indoor hitting bays, video equipment with swing analysis capability, men's and women's locker rooms, an indoor putting green, coaches' offices and a players' lounge. There's also an 8,000-square foot outdoor putting green.

"We appreciate Tom Musselman and his family for what they have meant to the university and the community," said Vice President of Athletics Tom Jurich. "The success of our golf programs is synonymous with the Musselman family. Both of our golf programs will benefit greatly from this facility and we're excited to see the positive impact the golf center will have on our programs."





Anchored by a veteran duo in seniors **Chris Biuso** and **Justin Dorward**, head coach **Mark Crabtree** the University of Louisville men's golf teams enters the 2011-12 season with high expectations.

Coming off a second place showing at the BIG EAST Championship, the Cardinals return five lettermen from the 2010-11 squad, who posted five top five finishes.

However, the Cardinals did lose their most consistent player from last year's squad in Karsten Clements, runner-up at the BIG EAST Championship, one of three top 10 finishes for the then-senior. Clements amassed six rounds under par and fired par six times.

Dorward was named to the 2011 All-BIG EAST Men's Golf Team and posted three top 10 finishes while Biuso was tabbed with conference honors in 2010.

Dorward and Biuso have combined for 11 career top 10 finishes and 14 rounds in the 60s during their storied careers at the University of Louisville. The veterans have been a mainstay in Crabtree's lineup over the past three seasons and through 2011 fall competition the duo has amassed 171 rounds in 70 tournaments for the Cardinals.

Last season, Dorward put forth one of the most consistent seasons in program history. The senior averaged 73.57 strokes per round which ranks 10th in program history amongst individuals with at least 30 rounds. The then-junior was the only member of the 2010-11 squad who started all 11 tournaments and finished in the top 20 six times.

Biuso qualified for the 2011 U.S. Amateur Championship after firing a two-round total of 140 and clinching a one-hole playoff. Last season, Biuso averaged 74.8 strokes per round and made nine starts for Crabtree. The then-junior fired four rounds under par and had 15 rounds with scores of 75 or better.

Crabtree is looking forward to watching newcomer **Max Walz** this season. He is likely to be the Cardinals number one player this season after coming over to the United States from Germany. Walz was a member of the German National team and finished in the top 20 at the German championship.

Crabtree also returns juniors **Chris Malec** and **Daniel Iceman** along with sophomore **Charlie Macneal**.

Malec was the Cardinals' top finisher at the Furman Intercollegiate and placed second on the team in two additional spring events. He averaged 75.6 strokes per round over 10 events and fired four rounds under par.

Iceman averaged 76.8 strokes per round while competing in four events. Over the summer, Iceman qualified for the United States Public Links Amateur, one of the most prestigious tournaments to play in as an amateur. Iceman took home medalist honors by five strokes

in qualifying after firing 70-74=144 on the Miami Whitewater course in Cincinnati, Ohio. It was a 46-player field with only two qualifying spots available.

Macneal, a spring newcomer, averaged 76.1 strokes per round and was the Cardinal's second highest finisher at the Furman Intercollegiate. Macneal appeared in four events and had four rounds with a score of 75 or better.

In addition to returning five golfers from a season ago, the Cardinals welcome two junior transfers in **Kyle Blackston** and **Nick Umholtz** and three freshmen in **Greg Smail** and **Henry Tomlinson** and **Max Walz** to the program.

Blackston was a Florida Junior Golf Champion in his prep days and was a top 40 finisher in the Optimist International Tournament. He also placed third at the TPC Sawgrass SJGT Tournament.

Umholtz comes to Louisville after a standout career at South Mountain Community College where he was part of a national championship team in 2010 and a runner-up squad in 2011.



Umholtz captured medalist honors twice during his junior college career and became the youngest individual state champion in Colorado history at the 4A level after capturing the state title as a freshman at Greeley Central High School.

Smail joins the Cards from Musselburgh Scotland after being a British Homes Nations Champion. Smail was a seven year member of the Musselburgh Grammar School golf team.

Tomlinson joins this year's squad from Lancashire, England after qualifying for the Faldo Series Grand Final in 2010 and 2011. Tomlinson also qualified for the British Open Local Final qualification missing the tournament by six strokes.

If a consistently high level of achievement over a long period of time is the measure of a successful program, then Louisville's Mark Crabtree would meet those high standards.

Beginning his 13th season as the head coach of the University of Louisville men's golf program, Crabtree has guided the Cardinals to two BIG EAST titles, five regional appearances and two trips to the NCAA Championships.

When University of Louisville Vice President for Athletics/Athletics Director Tom Jurich hired Crabtree he knew he had someone who would eventually take the Cardinals' men's golf program to the next level, and that's exactly what Crabtree has done.

Crabtree has the Cardinals on the national scene and the Hall of Fame coach isn't satisfied with what his program has accomplished to date.

The 2010-11 Cardinals posted the fifth-lowest team stroke average in school history and Karsten Clements ended his collegiate career with a runner-up finish at the BIG EAST Championship. Clements and Justin Dorward were named to the 2011 All-BIG EAST Men's Golf Team.

Riley Wheeldon capped off the 2009-10 season by being tabbed as the BIG EAST Men's Golfer of the Year while Chris Biuso also was selected to the All-BIG EAST Men's Golf Team.

The Cardinals won their second BIG EAST title in 2009 and advanced to the NCAA Regionals for the fifth straight year. For his effort, Crabtree was named the BIG EAST Coach of the Year for the second time.

Crabtree saw then-senior Adam Hadwin take home medalist honors at the BIG EAST Championship and set the school record for single-season stroke average at 71.79. Crabtree also guided freshman Riley Wheeldon who was named the BIG EAST Newcomer of the Year.

Hadwin continues his career on the Canadian Tour and was recently named the Male Professional of the Year by the Golf Journalists Association of Canada. Hadwin was a full-time member of the Canadian Tour in 2011 and thrilled Canadians from coast to coast. Hadwin tied for 31st at the U.S. Open at Congressional before tying for fourth at the RBC Canadian Open in Vancouver. He closed the year as the highest ranked Canadian golfer on the Official World Golf Rankings at 214.

In 2007-08, the Cardinals posted their best

finish in school history — a tenth-place finish at the NCAA Championships at Purdue University. Playing one of the toughest courses in the country, the Cardinals were in contention for most of the tournament and had their highest finish at the event when Adam Rainaud tied for 13th overall.

The Cardinals also won a pair of tournaments and finished second at the BIG EAST Championships. Derek Fathauer closed out his outstanding career with two tournament wins and also finished 69th at the United States Open. He became the first U of L player to make the cut at the US Open.

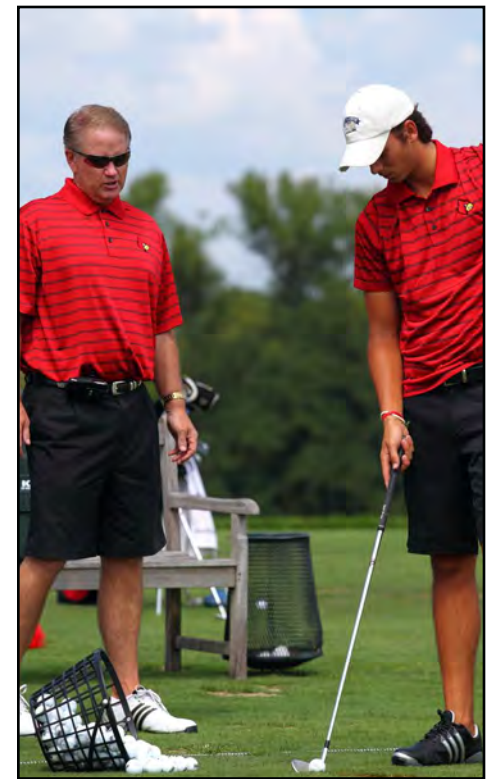
That season also saw Hadwin become an All-American Academic Scholar and Fathauer and Rainaud earned All-American accolades.

Crabtree has orchestrated a remarkable string of successful seasons for the Cardinals. Crabtree has guided his program to four straight regional appearances, two straight visits to the NCAA Championships and a BIG EAST title.

In just over 13 seasons at U of L, Crabtree's Cards have posted a top five team, a top seven individual, the top 10 career stroke averages in school history and placed numerous players in the U.S. Amateur tournament.

The Cardinals won a school record seven tournaments, which included their first BIG EAST Championship and advanced to the NCAA Championships, where they finished 27th overall in 2006-07.

Hosting the BIG EAST Championship for the first time, the Cardinals dominated play, as



the Cardinals had four players finish in the top five.

In its first season in the BIG EAST in 2005-06, the Cardinals tied for the league title, but fell in a tight playoff to Notre Dame. It was Crabtree's highest finish in a league championship since taking over at the University of Louisville.

Despite the loss, the Cardinals advanced to the NCAA Regionals for the second straight season. Louisville finished 22nd in the NCAA

West Regional in Tucson, Ariz.

The 2005-06 season was one of the best in school history, as the Cardinals won a pair of tournaments and finished in the top three in seven other tournaments.

Under Crabtree's direction in 2004-05, the Cardinals finished 15th in the NCAA Regional, just missing advancing to the NCAA Championships. Louisville also recorded 13 top 10 finishes, 12 top 20 finishes and won a school record four tournaments that season.

While Jurich had complete confidence in Crabtree's ability to build a strong program on his own, he went a step further, as he has done with virtually every sport across the board, and ensured that his new coach would have facilities that could rival any program across the country. The Cardinal Club, the luxurious state-of-the-art home course of the Cardinals, opened in the fall of 2001 and with it began a new chapter for both the men's and women's golf programs. The Tom Musselman Golf Center opened in 2007 and has all the amenities for the men's and women's golf programs.

Success follows winners and it certainly followed Crabtree to U of L as his Cardinals have gained momentum with each passing season.

Under Crabtree's direction, the Cardinals have raised the bar each campaign, rewriting the U of L record book at a frenzied pace.

In 2003, Crabtree saw the Cardinals produce their first ever NCAA individual participant, as Brett Jones made the field.

During the 2001-02 campaign, Crabtree's young but talented squad notched a 291.5 col-

lective stroke average, nearly six strokes better than the school record of 297.49 posted by the 1999-00 squad in Crabtree's first season in Louisville.

With one of the nation's top freshmen classes and senior Grant Sturgeon in the lineup, the Cards swung their way to one of the top seasons ever at U of L. Sturgeon broke the individual season stroke record established the previous year by Chris Campbell, who twice earned All-Conference USA accolades under Crabtree, while also setting a new standard for career stroke average.

Following his playing days at U of L, Sturgeon took his game to the pro ranks and promptly claimed victories in each of his first two pro events, including the 2002 Kentucky Open. Sturgeon spent the '03 season playing on the Hooters Tour.

Prior to his arrival in the Derby City, Crabtree spent nine seasons as the head coach at Colorado State University. There, he saw the Ram program go from a non-scholarship program into a top 25 team and NCAA Championship contender.

CSU qualified for four consecutive NCAA West Regionals under his guidance and qualified for its first NCAA Championship appearance in 1999. The Rams finished tied for 24th at the '99 championships held in Chaska, Minn.

Traditionally known as a cold-weather school, Colorado State entered the MasterCard Collegiate Golf Top 25 for the first time in 1998, finishing at No. 23. The Rams also sent their first individual, Nigel Spence, to the

NCAA Finals. As a result, Crabtree earned NCAA District VII Coach of the Year honors in '98.

Along the way, Crabtree put together one of the nation's most competitive schedules, taking his program to elite tournaments in Honolulu, San Diego, Phoenix and San Francisco.

Ram golfers responded to the challenge, posting 11 top 10 team finishes in 15 competitions in 1998-99, including a second consecutive team title at the prestigious Stanford Invitational. The Rams knocked off then-No. 1 Georgia Tech on their way to the '97 title, marking the first time in school history a team had defeated the nation's top-ranked team in any sport.

CSU's road to the top 25 and the NCAA Championships was not an easy one.

His first class of Rams were homegrown and talented, leading CSU to four team championships, 27 top-five showings and two runner-up finishes at the WAC Championship.

Crabtree, who played collegiately at the University of Colorado, was a four-time state champion and captured six Colorado Golf Association amateur titles. He also has been a qualifier for both the United States Golf Association Public Links and National Amateur Championships. He was selected to the Colorado Golf Hall of Fame in 2006.

Crabtree is married to the former Janie Huffman. They are the parents of Joshua (13) and Lauren (11).



Assistant Coach Andrew Tredway

Andrew Tredway begins his second season as an assistant coach with the University of Louisville men's golf program.

Tredway has spent the last three seasons as the head coach at Mercer University, guiding the Bears to unprecedented success. Under his direction, the Bears climbed to its first top 100 ranking in one year and Tredway landed three straight top 25 recruiting classes from 2008-11.

He helped lead the Bears to its first at-large bid (individual bid) to the NCAA postseason in school history (2008-09), and also guided his squad to a third-place finish in the league, its best-conference standing in 16 years. During his tenure, he coached five Academic All-Americans and was one of only five conference sports to have every member of the team on the All-Academic squad.

"I'm pleased to have Andrew join our program," said Mark Crabtree. "He had the ability to grow a couple programs that he inherited and he really understands how to develop players. His strengths are working with players and he understands all facets of running a program. He is a good teacher and has a tremendous passion for college golf."

Before coming to Mercer, Tredway spent three seasons as the head coach at Texas Pan-American, where he guided his teams to two tournament titles and sparked the program to its highest ranking in the program's history.

Tredway worked with the No.1 golf instructor in the world, Hank Haney from 2003-05. Tredway was an instructor at a 15 full-week junior camps and provided instruction to almost 1,500 junior golfers ranging from 5-17.

Tredway spent one season as an assistant at the University of Alabama during the 2002-03 campaign.

As a player, Tredway won five times and holds five course records on United States mini-tours while playing on the Australasian PGA Tour.

Tredway, a 2000 graduate of the University of Oregon, was an outstanding golfer for the Ducks, guiding Oregon to an 18th-place finish at the NCAA Championships in 1999 and 28th in 1998. He earned Pac-10 All-Conference honors in 1999.



Volunteer Assistant Coach Ted Schulz

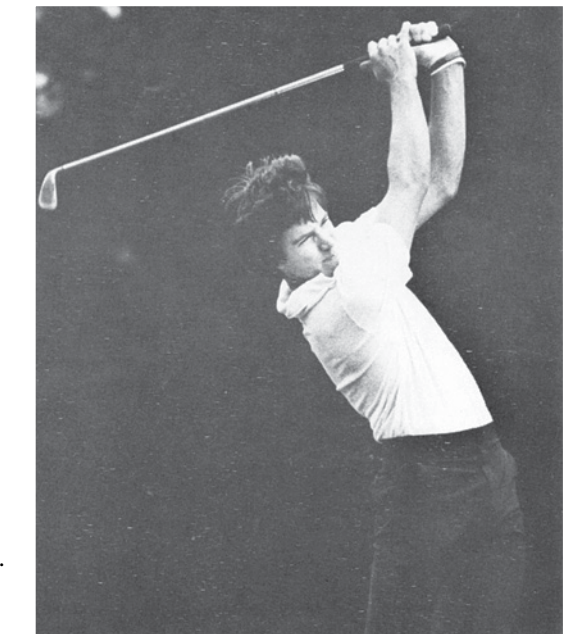
An 18-year veteran of the PGA, Nike and Asian Tours and a member of the University of Louisville Athletic Hall of Fame, Ted Schulz enters his second season working with the University of Louisville golf teams.

A Louisville native, Schulz joined the PGA Tour in 1984, three years after putting the finishing touches on a stellar four-year career at U of L. Over the next 18 years, Schulz played in 263 tournaments, including four Masters, three U.S. Opens, four PGA Championships and two Tour Championships.

On the PGA Tour, Schulz claimed three tournament wins ('91 Los Angeles Open, '89 Southern Open and '89 Chrysler Open) and finished as high as sixth place in the 1992 Masters. He finished the 1989 season ranked 30th on the money list and his victory in the Los Angeles Open vaulted him to a career-best 29th-place on the list in 1991.

With 15 career top 10 finishes under his belt, Schulz ranks 362nd on the all-time money list with earnings in excess of \$1.6 million.

Schulz, the director of golf instruction at The Cardinal Club, still resides in the Louisville area with his wife, Diane and three children.

The Louisville area owes its existence to the Falls of the Ohio, the only place where the 981-mile Ohio River flows over bedrock. The falls were really a rapids where the river dropped about 27 feet in three miles, usually blocking passage by boat.

Early explorers recognized the strategic importance of the Falls. George Rogers Clark established the first settlement there in 1778, to use as a base of his invasion of British territory in Southern Illinois and Indiana. Two years later that settlement became Louisville -- named for King Louis XVI of France, who was supporting the American Revolution.

Louisville quickly became a vital transportation center for the young nation. Ports were established above and below the Falls. Passengers and freight moved overland around the rapids. Trails and roads connected the ports to inland settlements in Kentucky and Indiana. The steamboat brought prosperity and growth to the area; by 1850, Louisville was the 10th-largest city in the nation.

In the decades that followed, railroads greatly improved connections with cities throughout the nation, and Louisville became known as the "Gateway to the South." Businesses and industries were attracted by the strong and convenient transportation network and Louisville became an industrial center.

In recent years, the economy of the Louisville area has shifted from a heavy reliance on industry to an increasing emphasis on services, including earning a worldwide reputation as a transportation and distribution center. Once again, location is a key factor. Louisville is located near the center of the eastern half of the contiguous 48 states, with nearly half of the nation's consumer markets within a 500-mile radius. The climate is mild enough that Louisville's airport is rarely closed because of weather.

Climate, location and a good transportation system helped convince United Parcel Service to establish its national hub in Louisville in the early 1980s. UPS, in turn, is attracting businesses that depend on fast

and efficient transportation of their goods to other parts of the nation and throughout the world.

The Kentucky Center for the Arts is one of the nation's premier performing arts facilities, housing three spacious theatres.

Sports, including U of L athletics, are an important facet of life in the Louisville area. Churchill Downs has hosted three Breeders' Cups and continues its traditional Run For The Roses -- the Kentucky Derby -- the first Saturday each May. The 1996 and 2000 PGA Championships were staged at Valhalla Golf Course in eastern Jefferson County, which was also the site of the 2008 Ryder Cup international competition. The Louisville Bats, the triple-A baseball team of the Cincinnati Reds, have drawn over 1 million fans to games in a single season with new Slugger Field stationed on the downtown riverfront. Over 140 public parks, 20 public golf courses and 226 public tennis courts also provide outdoor entertainment.

Yet even though Louisville has changed through the years, it still has the flavor and gentleness of a Southern town. The Belle of Louisville steamboat still paddles its way up and down the Ohio River daily, mint juleps are still served under an old oak tree during the hot and muggy summers and fishing in the many lakes and rivers of Louisville and surrounding counties is still a favorite pastime.

Another favorite in Louisville is trying to figure out the correct pronunciation of the city. So if you're a tourist, don't say Louie-ville or Lewis-ville. Natives claim it's Lou-a-vuhl. Either way, Louisville is still the same happy place.

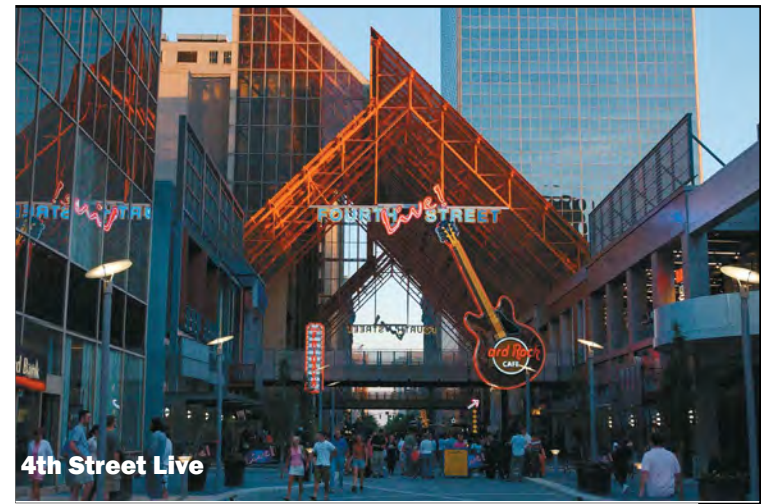

The University of Louisville attracts many of the nation's best and brightest young minds to its friendly, park-like campus in the heart of Kentucky's largest city.

Since 2003, 60 UofL students have won Fulbright awards, more than any other Kentucky university. This success is based in part on the fact that UofL faculty not only are some of the best in their fields, but that they take a personal interest in students and push them to do their best too.

Students at UofL are presented a wide range of study options — more than 170 fields in 11 schools and colleges — with many nationally ranked programs among them. UofL's location in an area of more than a million people is also an asset, giving students many opportunities to apply the critical thinking skills they hone in the classroom to relevant, hands-on experiences in the community.



UofL students benefit from superb facilities, including a library system ranked among the top 100 research libraries in North America and one of the nation's top clean rooms, where work in bioengineering, nanotechnology and other high-demand fields occurs.



UofL is committed to building a nurturing and challenging intellectual climate, a respect for diversity and a genuine understanding of how diversity enriches a vibrant metropolitan research university. One of the university's goals is to give every arts and sciences student the chance to study abroad at least once during his or her undergraduate career.

The university is also one of the fastest-growing research institutions in the nation, yielding many milestone discoveries. UofL faculty conducted the world's first successful implantation of a fully implantable artificial heart, developed the world's first 100-percent effective cervical cancer vaccine, conducted

the world's first FDA-approved clinical trial using adult cardiac stem cells to treat heart disease and completed the nation's first successful hand transplant. In 2009, UofL and the Commonwealth of Kentucky announced the establishment of the Conn Center for Renewable Energy Research and Environmental Stewardship. And UofL's School of Public Health and Information Sciences received \$2.3 million to lead research in preparation for, prevention of and communication during pandemics.

UofL also stands out in community service. The university's curricular engagement, outreach and partnerships recently earned it a Carnegie Community Engagement ranking, a designation held by fewer than 200 institutions nationwide. In one year alone, UofL students,

faculty and staff contributed more than \$25.1 million to charitable organizations through volunteerism and direct donations.

Among the university's many outreach programs is the Signature Partnership, working with community organizations and businesses to improve the social, cultural, educational, health care and economic development services in a historically underserved area of Louisville.

UofL was environmentally minded long before "green" became a buzzword, cofounding the Partnership for a Green City several years ago with the city of Louisville and the local public school system to reduce waste, increase energy efficiency and improve the health and education of area children.

UofL is a major player in the downtown arts scene, too, helping bring fine arts programming to Louisville to create a more vibrant city center. The Cressman Center for the Visual Arts is just one result of this effort. It features a glass hot shop, coldworking, metal and woodworking studios and three galleries

open daily to the public.

But the greatest way in which UofL is making its mark is through the contributions its students make to society.

They graduate to become valuable citizens such as current Republican Leader and U.S. Sen. Mitch McConnell;

U.S. Sen. and recent presidential candidate Christopher Dodd;

Sirius/XM Radio personality Bob Edwards;

best-selling author Sue Grafton; and Sharon Darling, founder and



president of the National Center for Family Literacy.

They truly help demonstrate that UofL's slogan, "It's Happening Here," isn't just a marketing tagline. It's a way of life.





Growth, innovation, achievement, excellence and a desire to stay on the cutting edge have been the trademarks of Tom Jurich's tenure as the Vice-President for Athletics at the University of Louisville for the last 12 years.

Jurich's unyielding desire to succeed has driven him to the pinnacle of college athletics and has put the University of Louisville on the national scene.

Since coming to the Derby City in 1997, Jurich has been the man behind the continued development of the university's entire athletic program, especially when it comes to building facilities.

Jurich's desire and vision for the University of Louisville has led the division to unprecedented development and accomplishment. For his efforts, he was selected as the Street & Smith's Sports Business Journal/Sports Business Daily Athletic Director of the Year in 2007.

From facilities to gender equity, from community involvement to national leadership, Jurich's actions prompted one state media outlet to recently write that "It all shows yet again that the hiring of Tom Jurich, the architect of this Louisville emergence, as U of L AD in the fall of 1997 stands as one of the most significant events in our state's modern sports history." After just eight years working his constructive efforts, he was inducted into the state of Kentucky Athletic Hall of Fame in 2006.

U of L took a dramatic step toward maintaining that upward trend by signing Jurich to an unprecedented contract extension in December of 2006 that will keep him with the Cardinals through 2023. U of L President Dr. James Ramsey enhanced Jurich's contract again last year. In an unprecedented appointment, he was named Vice President for Athletics at U of L in 2003.

Since Jurich was named Director of Athletics for the Cardinals on Oct. 21, 1997, there has been an unmatched flurry of activity on the U of L campus and Louisville area since his arrival.

Jurich continues to push U of L to the forefront of college athletics. While diligently working to keep the Cardinals on the cutting edge nationally, Jurich has turned heads while quickly guiding major changes in the face of Cardinal Athletics including:

- Engineering U of L's historic move to the Big East Conference, which has a long-term relationship with the lucrative Bowl Championship Series and sits in one of the best media markets in the country.
- Attracting eighth-year men's basketball coach Rick Pitino to U of L, a move many deemed impossible. Pitino's arrival has energized the Cards' tradition-rich program and quickly restored it to a position among the nation's top teams. U of L capped a 33-5 record in 2004-05 by returning to the Final Four for the first time in 19 years and advancing to the Elite Eight in 2007-08 and again last season. The Cardinals are also scheduled to move into the new 22,000-seat Downtown arena in 2010.

• Taking a major step in achieving gender equity, upgrading funding and support staff for existing women's programs while adding four new sports — softball, golf, rowing and lacrosse (in 2008).

Jurich's efforts also moved field hockey, women's soccer and baseball to fully-funded programs. He received the Citizens for Sports Equity 2000 Sports Leadership Award and was honored as the Louisville of the Year in 2005 by the Louisville Urban League Guild.

- Under the direction of head coach Jeff Walz, the women's basketball program has become one of the hottest programs in the country. Walz guided the Cardinals to their first-ever Final Four and an appearance in the national title game against Connecticut in 2009.

- Rapidly building the football program from the ground up. The Cardinals reached the school's first BCS Bowl berth in 2006, defeating Wake Forest, 24-13. Renovations continue on the expansion of Papa John's Cardinal Stadium, which will be completed for the 2010 campaign, and will be one of the finest venues in the country.

- Addressing multiple facility needs, including an extensive sports park to serve as a front lawn for the University. Owsley B. Frazier Cardinal Park features Ulmer Stadium (softball), Trager Stadium (field hockey artificial surface field), a soccer field surrounded by a state-of-the-art track, fitness trail, outdoor basketball and sand volleyball courts and a playground. Three new facilities opened in 2005: Jim Patterson Stadium (baseball), Ralph Wright Natatorium and the Trager Center indoor Practice Facility. The YUM Center Practice Facility was finished two years ago and is one of the finest facilities in the country that houses the men's basketball and women's volleyball and lacrosse programs.

- Strengthening U of L's athletic administration by enlarging the compliance department with the school's first associate athletic director for compliance and adding the school's first female associate athletic director/senior woman administrator.

- Placing U of L on the cutting edge of sports medicine with a comprehensive partnership with Louisville's world-renowned Jewish Hospital.

- Bolstering the community outreach arm of U of L athletics, developing L-Care to promote student-athlete community involvement.

- Academic success has risen dramatically during Jurich's watch as well.

The 2008 Big East Football All-Academic team had 11 members this year, and the department continues to strive to further develop academic success. In the fall of 2008, 275 of 514, including spirit groups, managers and trainers, recorded a grade point average of 3.0 or higher.

A total of 281 student-athletes earned a 3.0 average or higher in the spring. A recorded 173 student-athletes were Red and Black Scholar-Athletes, who had GPA's of 3.25 or higher.

Jurich's high energy, community and family-minded approach has been contagious, infecting the university, city and U of L fans everywhere

with a positive outlook for the future of Cardinal Athletics. It is a formula that has provided a trail of success in each situation Jurich has touched.

Jurich has been active in the scope of college athletics on a national level, within conference issues, and in his local community. He served three years as a member of the NCAA Management Council, one of the top legislative bodies of the NCAA, and the NCAA Division I Baseball Committee. He sits on the Board of Directors for Republic Bank and American Heart Association.

Jurich recently received the Louisville of the Year Award by the Louisville Advertising Federation and the Dan Mangeot Memorial Award, for contributions to the advancement of tourism and hospitality.

Guiding Colorado State University as its athletics director for the four years prior to his arrival at U of L, Jurich oversaw not only one of the most successful time periods in the school's history in terms of on-field competitiveness, but he was the driving force behind a successful capital campaign drive that included facility renovation.

Prior to his constructive efforts at Colorado State, Jurich operated as director of athletics for eight years at his alma mater, Northern Arizona University. When appointed at NAU, he was the youngest director of athletics at the NCAA Division I level at the age of 29.

He became athletic director at Northern Arizona in 1988, after previously serving as co-director (1986-88) and assistant director ('84-86). He was inducted to the NAU Sports Hall of Fame in 1989.

Jurich is among the finest football players in Northern Arizona history. A punter, placekicker and backup quarterback for the Lumberjacks, Jurich earned first-team Kodak All-America honors in 1977 — the first collegiate kicker to make the Kodak honor list — and also received All-America acclaim from The Sporting News. He is the only kicker in Big Sky Conference history to be named the league's offensive player of the year (1977).

A 10th-round NFL draft pick of the Pittsburgh Steelers, Jurich later played with the Minnesota Vikings before a brief coaching stint at the University of Minnesota.

He and his wife, Terrilynn, a former Miss Wyoming, have four children: sons Mark and Brian; and twin daughters, Haley and Lacey, who are playing field hockey at the University of Louisville.



As University of Louisville President James Ramsey has commented on many occasions, "The University of Louisville is an institution with a great history and tradition. Our job is to build on that history and tradition going forward."

There is no question that during Dr. Ramsey's seven-year tenure the University of Louisville is a very changed institution. Under Dr. Ramsey's leadership the quality of UofL's freshman class has improved each year, with an average ACT score today for incoming freshmen of 24.4, well above the national average of 21.2, and the state average of 20.8. What's more, students coming to the University of Louisville are having greater success than ever

Graduation rates over the last six years have improved over 33%. UofL students continue to receive a significant share of the nation's most prestigious academic honors, including seven UofL students receiving Fulbright scholarships in both 2008 and 2009. During the last seven years, UofL's research programs have continued to grow — for example, the University of Louisville, for the five-year period 2002-2007, experienced the most rapid growth of any institution in the country in National Institutes of Health (NIH) funding. Today the University of Louisville's dental school ranks 14th nationally among all institutions in funding; new drugs are in various phases of clinical trials; new clinical procedures are improving health care for people of our community and state; UofL's Rapid Prototyping Lab in the Speed School of Engineering is coming up with new advanced manufacturing systems to make Kentucky manufacturers more competitive. The Conn Center for Renewable Energy Research and Environmental Stewardship, launched in 2009 with a \$21 million gift from Henry and Rebecca Conn, will lead Kentucky's efforts in renewable energy.

A major focus of Dr. Ramsey during his tenure has been on the community of which the university is a part. The University of Louisville has been a major player in an award-winning Partnership for a Green City with Jefferson County Public Schools and Louisville Metro government. The university has launched the Signature Partnership Initiative, an effort to improve education, health care, social services and economic opportunity in a traditionally underserved area in west Louisville.

The University of Louisville's partnership with UPS has been an important part of UPS' continued commitment to the local and state economy. As a result of Metropolitan College and UofL's Logistics & Distribution Institute, UPS has continued to grow and is today the

state's largest employer. Under Dr. Ramsey's leadership, a \$2.5 billion plan has been approved for expanding and building the Health Sciences Campus with new research, clinical, and educational facilities in a Downtown Research Park. As part of this initiative, UofL received approval for a \$350 million Tax Increment Financing (TIF) from the state of Kentucky and Metro government.

The mandate given to Dr. Ramsey when he began at the University of Louisville in 2002 was to continue to move the university forward with the implementation of the strategic plan — "The Challenge for Excellence — 1998-2008." With the successful completion of the "Challenge," the university has now stepped forward with a new strategic plan — "The 2020 Plan," a blueprint that will guide the university through the milestone date set in the Postsecondary Education Reform Act of 1997.

At the same time, the university has begun the silent phase of its next major capital campaign and has undertaken a new branding effort — It's Happening Here.

A strong commitment to serving the community and commonwealth is nothing new for Ramsey. Before assuming UofL's top post, he served as senior policy advisor and state budget director for the Commonwealth of Kentucky and senior professor of economics and public policy at UofL.

He also has held several other positions in state government, serving as interim commissioner of the Office of the New Economy and special advisor to the chairman of the Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education.

On the academic side, he has served as vice chancellor for finance and administration at both University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and Western Kentucky University. He has been associate dean, assistant dean and director of public administration in the College of Business Administration at Loyola University and a research associate for the University of Kentucky's Center for Public Affairs.

He has served on the faculties of UNC, WKU, UK, Loyola University and Middle Ten-

nessee State University.

A frequent national speaker and writer on economic issues in the public sector, Ramsey received the National Governors Association's Outstanding Public Service Award in 2001 and was named Kentucky's Distinguished Economist of the Year in 1999.

Business First newspaper named Ramsey Louisville's Business Leader of the Year in December 2007. In September 2008, the Volunteers of America of Kentucky awarded him its Volunteer Spirit Award for outstanding leadership and contributions to the community. Ramsey was recognized for the Cardinal Covenant, a program he founded to ensure Kentucky's low-income students could afford to attend the university, and for the Signature Partnership.

A Kentucky native, he holds a bachelor's degree in business administration from Western Kentucky University and master's and doctoral degrees in economics from UK.

Sharing his commitment to public service is his wife, Jane Ramsey, who is involved in a host of community activities and organizations. She heads an effort to beautify UofL's Belknap Campus and revitalize its surrounding South Louisville neighborhood. That effort is highlighted by the upcoming renovation of Stansbury Park, which borders the Belknap Campus. That Olmsted-designed park is being restored to its former glory thanks to partnerships among the university, Louisville Metro Government and the Olmsted Conservancy.

The Ramseys have two daughters. Jenny, an Auburn University graduate with a degree in Zoology, is a graduate of UofL's School of Nursing. Jacque is a senior at UofL and is actively engaged in campus, intramurals, and Chi Omega.

Tom Musselman, 1956-59

Musselman was a four-time letterwinner for legendary head coach John Dromo. During that span, the Cardinals posted an impressive 48-16 record in dual match competition.

Following graduation, Musselman captured numerous amateur golf titles and has served as the chairman of the Kentucky Junior Golf Foundation since 1975, promoting youth golf in the Commonwealth.

Along with numerous charitable endeavors, Musselman serves as the chairman of the Jefferson County Metro Parks and its nine public golf courses.

Musselman remains active with the Cardinal golf community serving as the head of the Cardinal Club steering committee which opened in 2001.

A successful local businessman, Musselman is also a founding member of the Master Cards, a booster group developed solely for the advancement of the Cardinal men's golf program.



Jim Ferriell, Jr., 1961-64

A 1964 graduate of U of L, Jim Ferriell, Jr., began his professional career immediately after graduation and, in almost four decades as a pro, he has accumulated many honors.

Along with being a member of the U of L Athletic Hall of Fame, Ferriell was inducted into the Indiana Golf Association's PGA Hall of Fame in 1995.

Ferriell, Jr. began a relationship with Crooked Stick Golf Club in 1978 and has been a fixture at the historic course for more than 20 years.

As a professional, Ferriell, Jr., captured 28 championships and qualified for 24 national and major championships including the U.S. Open, the PGA Championship and the Senior PGA.

Ferriell, Jr., and his wife Sherry reside in Indianapolis and have two daughters, Katie and Jenny.

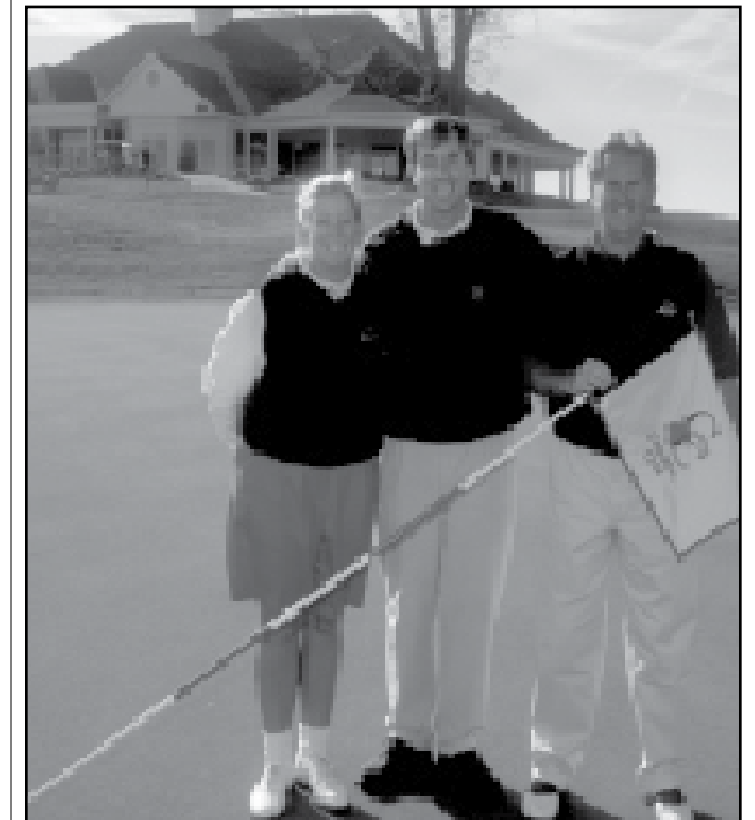
Ted Schulz, 1978-81

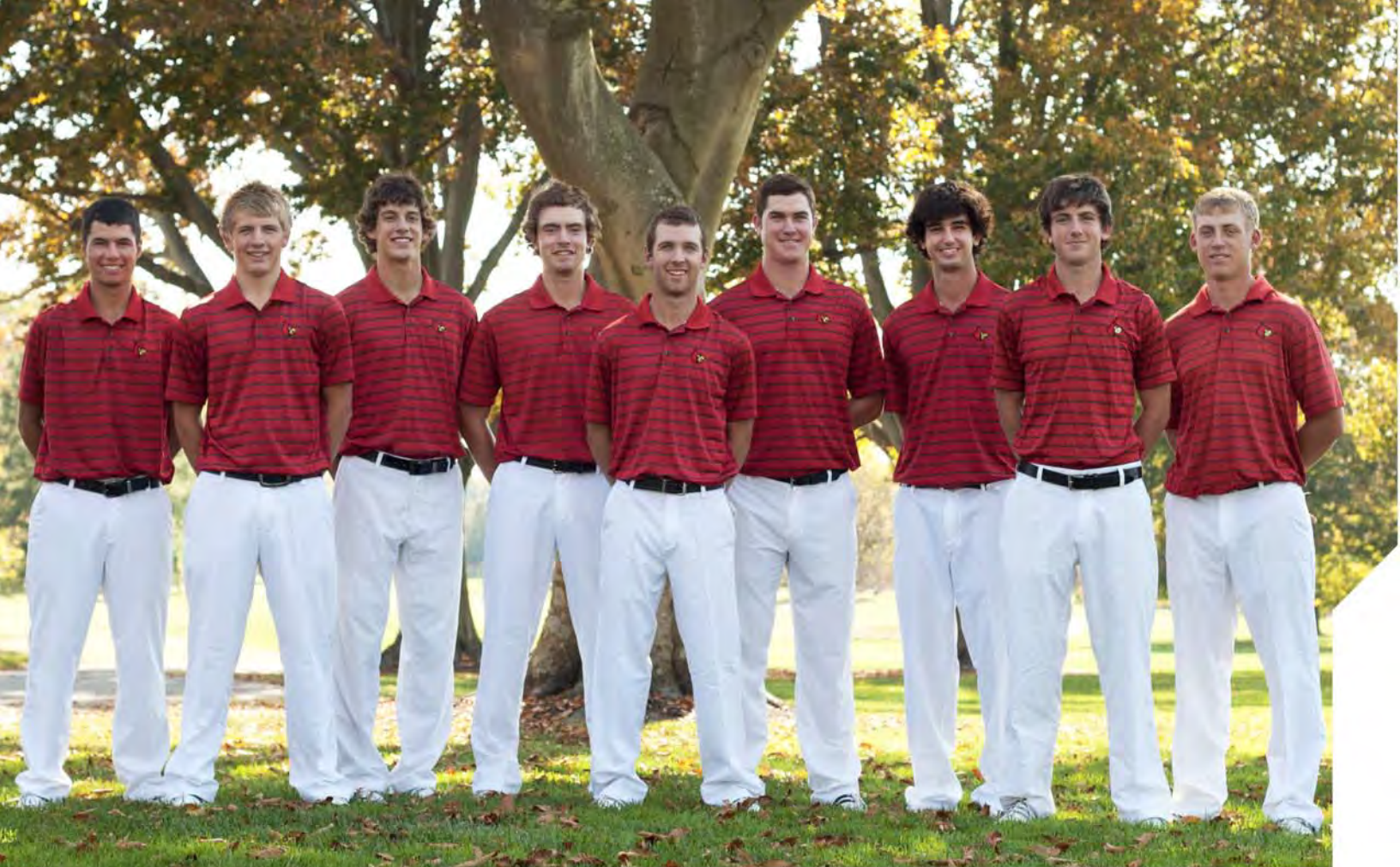
A Louisville native, Schulz joined the PGA Tour in 1984, three years after putting the finishing touches on a stellar four-year career at U of L. Over the next 18 years, Schulz played in 263 tournaments, including four Masters, three U.S. Opens, four PGA Championships and two Tour Championships.

On the PGA Tour, Schulz claimed three tournament wins ('91 Los Angeles Open, '89 Southern Open and '89 Chrysler Open) and finished as high as sixth place in the 1992 Masters. He finished the 1989 season ranked 30th on the money list and his victory in the Los Angeles Open vaulted him to a career-best 29th-place on the list in 1991.

With 15 career top 10 finishes under his belt, Schulz ranks 176th on the all-time money list with earnings in excess of \$1.6 million.

Schulz, the director of golf instruction at The Cardinal Club, still resides in the Louisville area with his wife, Diane and their three children.
