SETTING THE STAGE

The University of Louisville women's soccer team will be back in action this weekend as they make a road trip down south for two matches. On Friday the Cardinals will face UAB at 6:30 p.m. EST before facing Ole Miss on Sunday afternoon at 1 p.m. EST.

Louisville enters the weekend with an overall record of 2-2-1, coming off a 2-0 win over Southeast Missouri State on Monday evening at Lynn Stadium. Sophomores Shelby Cohen and Alison Price both scored their first goals of the season and junior goalkeeper Paige Brown recorded her first shutout of the season. For the year, seven Cardinals have scored a goal while senior Rachel Avant leads the team with two assists. Junior goalkeepers, Paige Brown and Taylor Bucklin, have both seen time in goal with the two combining for 16 saves. Brown has started the last three for the Cardinals and owns a 0.93 goals against average.

Head coach Karen Ferguson-Dayes is in her 16th season with the Cardinals. She has guided Louisville to four NCAA Tournament appearances, including a Sweet 16 appearance in 2011.

SCOUTING UAB

UAB enters Friday's matchup with an overall record of 1-3 and is currently on a three-game losing streak after winning their season opener. On Sunday, UAB fell 3-1 to Coastal Carolina.

Kasey Johnson leads the Blazers with two goals while Jessica Do, Marin Carter, and Alanna Dineen each have scored a goal. Keepers Kelsey Daughtery and Angelica Jimenez have split time in goal with the two of them combining to record nine saves.

Harold Warren is in his fifth year as the head soccer coach at UAB. Warren currently owns a 24-46-5 record after four years with the Blazers

SCOUTING OLE MISS

Ole Miss enters the weekend with an overall record of 4-0-2. The Rebels will face Kentucky on Friday night before wrapping up their seven game homestand when they host the Cardinals on Sunday afternoon. The Rebels are coming off a 1-0 victory over Little Rock when freshman forward Cece Kizer scored the game-winning goal six minutes into overtime for the victory.

Reigning SEC Freshman of the Week Kizer leads the Rebels and the SEC with six goals on the season. Junior Addie Forbus adds three goals and assist for seven points while junior Danielle Gray also adds seven points (two goals and three assists). Redshirt freshman keeper Marnie Merritt boasts a 0.50 goals against average and has 11 saves on the season.

Matt Mott is in his sixth season as the head soccer coach at Ole Miss. Mott currently owns a 52-40-12 record through five years at the school.

THE SERIES

The Blazers lead the series with the Cardinals 7-2 with the last four matchups being shutouts. The Blazers defeated the Cardinals 1-0 in 2005. Louisville's last victory against UAB was in 2004 when they snapped a six game losing streak with a 1-0 win at UAB.

The Cardinals and Rebels will meet for the second time in history this weekend. The only time the Cardinals and Rebels met previously was the 2014 season opener and first game ever play at Dr. Mark and Cindy Lynn Stadium. The Cardinals took a 1-0 victory behind Chatham DeProspero's goal in the 57th minute off a pass from Keri Weinland.

LAST TIME OUT

The University of Louisville women's soccer team defeated Southeast Missouri State 2-0 at Dr. Mark and Cindy Lynn Stadium. The Cardinals took the lead early, Sophomore Shelby Cohen scored an unassisted goal from about 30 yards out in the eighth minute. Cohen's shot sailed in the upper left corner over the Redhawks' keeper, giving the Cards a 1-0 lead.

Louisville continued to dominate possession in the first half. A foul inside the box earned the Cardinals a penalty kick in the 25th minute. Hannah Konermann's took the kick but it sailed over the crossbar.

Louisville held a 7-3 shot advantage at the half while SEMO held a 1-0 corner kick advantage. Cardinal keeper Paige Brown finished the first half with one save while the Redhawks' Kindra Lierz finished with three saves.

Louisville continued to keep possession through much of the second half and was able to extend the lead. Sophomore Alison Price scored her first goal of the season in the 80th minute. Price took a cross from Rachel Avant and slipped it past the keeper for a 2-0 Louisville lead.



The Cardinals finished the match with a 16-5 shot advantage. Louisville finished with five shots on goal while SEMO finished with two. The Cardinals also finished with a 2-1 corner kick advantage. Brown finished with two saves while Lierz finished with three.

CARDINALS QUICK HITS

- Senior Rachel Avant started 15 games for the Cardinals last season in the backfield. This season Avant has moved to play primarily in the midfield.
- Senior Casey Whitfield returns for her senior season after sitting out last season with an achilles injury. Whitfield was hurt in the preseason and missed all of the 2014 season with the Cardinals.
- This season the Cardinal roster has four international players. Returners Inger Katrine Bjerke is from Norway while Isabella Habuda is from Ontario. Joining the Cardinals this season is Tina Marolt from Slovenia and Nina Suter from Switzerland.
- Louisville has a new face on the coaching staff. Rade Tanaskovic joined the Cardinals this fall as the goalkeepers coach. Tanaskovic comes from Columbus State University where he spent the last two seasons.

CARDINALS IN OVERTIME

The Cardinals are 0-0-1 in overtime games this season. The Cardinals played their first overtime game against Kent State on Aug. 28. The game ended in a 2-2 draw, for the first tie of the season.

HOME GROWN TALENT

The Cardinals roster featured five players from the state of Kentucky. Three players are from the city of Louisville, Casey Whitfield, Hannah Konermann and Clare Andres. Freshman Shelby Cohen is from LaGrange and Hannah Harris is from Danville. Three of the five players have started in every game for the Cardinals this season. Whitfield plays in the attack while Cohen and Konermann start in the backfield.

NEWCOMERS MAKE AN IMPACT

Transfers Aubrey Baker and Taylor Bucklin have made an immediate impact in the Cards' starting lineup. Baker has started every game in the midfield for Louisville. She has eight shots on the year and four on goal. Bucklin has started two games in goal for the Cardinals. She has a 1-1-0 record and has a 1.50 goals against average along with eight saves.

FAB FRESHMEN

Freshmen Gabrielle Vincent and Isabella Gutierrez have cracked the starting lineup this season. Vincent scored a goal in her first start of the season off a header against Wright State. Gutierrez has started three games at centerback for the Cardinals.

PRESEASON CRYSTAL BALL

The Louisville women's soccer team was chosen to finish 10th in the Atlantic Coast Conference in a vote by the league's head coaches. Florida State was chosen to repeat as the Atlantic Coast Conference women's soccer champion. The Seminoles received 12 first-place votes en route to 193 total points, followed by Virginia (one first-place vote, 178 points) and North Carolina (one first-place vote, 170 points). CARDINALS HAVE SIX TV APPEARANCES

The Cardinals are scheduled to have six matches on ESPN3, starting with the Sept. 4 game at Kentucky. The ACC home opener against Miami on Sept. 24 will be the first televised home match starting at 7:00 p.m. ESPN3 will also televise four consecutive Cardinal matches, starting with the Oct. 11 match in Lynn Stadium against the Duke Blue Devils at 1:00 p.m. The Cardinals will then host the defending national champions Florida State on Oct. 17 for an ESPN3 Televised match at 7:00 p.m.

Louisville will then appear on ESPN3 in two away matches, starting with the Oct. 22 match at Virginia at 7:00 p.m. The Cards' match at NC State on Oct. 25 will also be televised on ESPN3 at 1:00 p.m.

Overall, fans will have access to more contests involving league teams than ever before as the ACC's media rights holders will distribute at least 169 events live this fall, surpassing the previous record of 122 set last year. In addition to the 122 events announced Wednesday as part of the ACC's Olympic Sport conference package, 54 women's soccer games will be broadcast, including the ACC semifinals on ESPN3 and the championship game on ESPNU.

LYNN STADIUM OPENING

After 14 seasons at Cardinal Park, the Louisville soccer programs officially opens its new home in 2014 with the debut of Dr. Mark and Cindy Lynn Stadium. The Cardinals played their final official match at Cardinal Park on Nov. 16, 2013 when they hosted Illinois State in a first round match in the NCAA Championship. Playing host to some of the program's most memorable matches, Cardinal Park remains as the home to the Louisville track and field program. Located across from Papa John's Cardinal Stadium just south of Cardinal Park on Floyd Street, Lynn Stadium is a state-of-the-art stadium featuring a capacity of more than 5,300 as well as a 15,500-square-foot training center. The Cardinals' move into the highly competitive ACC this season is aided by arguably the nation's best soccer facility.

RECORD BREAKING CROWDS

Louisville shattered the previous attendance record with 5,100 at the Dr. Mark and Cindy Lynn Stadium debut. The record crowd witnessed the Cardinals defeat Ole Miss 1-0 on Aug. 29, 2014. The previous record was 2,643 in the Cards' win over Kentucky on Sept. 9, 2010 in Cardinal Park. The following weekend the second best crowd in school history (4,166)packed Lynn Stadium to watch the Cards take on Kentucky. So far this season the Cardinals are averaging 2,406 fans a match.

- The Cardinals currently ranked fifth in the nation in average attendance last season. Louisville averaged 2,406 fans a match. Louisville ranked behind Texas A&M with 2,953, South Carolina with 2,923, Portland with 2,918 and BYU 2,640.

- The Cardinals record breaking crowd of 5,100 against Ole Miss ranked as the fifth largest crowd to see a women's soccer game last season.

Karen Ferguson-Dayes

In her 15 seasons, Karen Ferguson-Dayes has taken a soccer program at the University of Louisville and molded it into a team that has finished near the top of the conference and advanced to the NCAA Tournament four times. The winningest coach in Cardinal history, she has improved the team's record nearly every season she has been at the helm and rewritten the record books.

During her tenure, Ferguson-Dayes has guided the Cardinals to not only their first NCAA Tournament berth, but multiple trips to the dance. She has also seen the Cardinals through the transition into the nation's toughest soccer conference in the ACC and into their new state-of-the-art facility at Dr. Mark and Cindy Lynn Stadium.

A season after leading Louisville to its best season in school history with a school record 14 wins, a first ever BIG EAST National Division title and its first ever NCAA Sweet 16 appearance in 2011, Ferguson-Dayes led the Cardinals double-digit wins for the third straight season and the seventh time.

The 2011 BIG EAST Coach of the Year, she has coached three All-Americans including Christine Exeter in 2011, Joanna Haig in 2007 and Jamie Craft in 2006 and a pair of Academic All-Americans in Haig (2007) and Amy Seng (2006). She also coached multiple player of the year winners as Exeter was selected as BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Year in 2011 while Charlyn Corral was BIG EAST Midfielder of the Year in 2012. The superlatives are nearly too numerous to list completely. Needless to say Ferguson-Dayes has been the most successful coach in UofL women's soccer history and is one of the top coaches in the nation.

In 2013, Louisville earned its fourth NCAA Tournament appearance after finishing second in the AAC with a 7-1-0 record. The Cardinals had two players earn player of the year honors with Corral and Exeter earning midfielder and offensive player honors for the second time in their careers.

In 2012, Louisville had four players earn All-BIG EAST honors with Corral, who was also an NSCAA All-Region honoree, leading the way with her First Team selection. Midfielder Angelika Uremovich was named Second Team All-BIG EAST while Exeter and goalkeeper Chloe Kiefer earned Third Team honors.

During the record-setting 2011 season, the

Cardinals also advanced to their first ever BIG EAST Tournament title game and ended the season ranked 24th overall in the final NSCAA coaches' poll. Along with Exeter's league honors, Jennifer Jones was a Third Team All-BIG EAST selection in 2011 while Erin Yenney was named to the conference's All-Rookie Team.

Louisville earned an at-large berth into the 2011 NCAA Championship and was selected as a host for the first time in the post-season tournament. The Cardinals delivered on the opportunity to play in front of the home fans earning a dominating 2-0 victory over Dayton for the program's first ever NCAA Championship win. They followed that with an impressive 2-0 road triumph over No. 5 Memphis in the second round before falling to ninth-ranked Florida State in the Sweet 16.

In 2010, the Cardinals were led by Exeter, who was selected as the BIG EAST Rookie of the Year, and Uremovich, who was named to the league's All-Rookie Team. UofL opened the season with a school record seven straight wins, which included victories over No. 13 South Carolina and rival Kentucky, and then closed the season by advancing to the BIG EAST Championship for the fifth time in six seasons.

Prior to a disappointing 2009 season where injuries limited the Cardinals' success on the field, the 2008 season served as a learning experience for a team that featured only three seniors. Even with the loss of All-American goalkeeper Joanna Haig and three other key starters, UofL advanced to the quarterfinals of the BIG EAST Tournament for the third straight season and won nine games overall against one of the toughest schedules in the nation.

Seniors Jessica Mello and Shannon Smyth earned Third Team All-BIG EAST honors and were joined by senior Mallory Lampson as NSCAA Academic All-Region selections.

In 2007 a trip to the BIG EAST semifinals was a new plateau of success for the program, as were the five players honored on All-BIG



EAST teams. In tying the school record with 13 wins and advancing to the NCAA's for the second consecutive season, the team collectively posted a 3.416 GPA in the classroom.

Haig established five school records, and finished the season third in the nation in save percentage (0.893) and fifth in GAA playing in Ferguson-Dayes' defensive brand of soccer.

The 2006 squad became the first in school history to earn a national ranking, peaking at 15th in the nation. It was also the first team to advance to the coveted plateau that is the NCAA Tournament. Success was not limited to the field, as the team set marks in the classroom with the second-highest team GPA, a record number of Red and Black Scholars and members of the AD Honor Roll, as well as the first Academic All-American in school history (Amy Seng). Six players earned All-Region honors, three found their name on the All-BIG EAST squads and two players were named All-American (Jamie Craft and Joanna Haig), just the second and third such honored in Cardinal history. Craft moved on to a career in professional soccer, enjoying a solid season with the W-League Boston Renegades.

The fall of 2005 meant the first foray into the BIG EAST, a conference that Ferguson-Dayes had spent seven years in as a player and assistant coach. With the jump into one of the elite conferences, it was expected that the Cardinals might stumble in making the jump,

but under the guidance of Ferguson-Dayes, the team notched double figure wins for the second consecutive season. Three team members were honored by the BIG EAST, led by junior Jamie Craft, a first-team selection who was also named to two difference All-Region teams.

Ferguson-Dayes' appointment and success here at Louisville has not gone unnoticed.

University of Louisville Director of Athletics Tom Jurich knew who he wanted to lead the then-struggling women's soccer team when Ferguson-Dayes was hired to be the eighth head coach of the UofL women's soccer team in 2000.

"Her name kept rising to the top during our national search and she came to us with incredible recommendations," noted Jurich.

Nobody believed the process of turning the Louisville women's soccer program into a winner is one that would occur overnight, as evidenced by the tough first season for Ferguson-Dayes and staff, but growth and success wasn't measured by wins and losses. Not initially. Now the ante has been upped as the program continues its rise with upcoming move to the Atlantic Coast Conference.

"The University has provided us with the resources we feel are necessary to become an elite program, and that is our goal," said Ferguson-Dayes.

Her tenure is the longest in the program's history. She has already watched assistant coaches Jen Mead and Carmelina Moscato move on to pursue a career in professional soccer, former assistant Carole Dutchka is now the athletic director at Louisville's Presentation Academy, and former assistant Tim Nowak departed for a head coaching opportunity.

Achieving at a high level is not something new for Ferguson-Dayes, who has previously worked as the ODP Girls 1993 age group head coach and the Region II liaison for the US Soccer National Teams in charge of tracking and following the progress of members of the US Soccer Youth National Team system. She served as an assistant coach of the USA U-21 team for their 2004 season.

During the summer of 2003 she served as an assistant coach for the U-19 Adidas Youth Team and she has also served as the head coach of the Region II 87 girls' team, which competed in the Adidas ESP event and the November Interregional event in Boca Raton, Florida.

In 2003 she worked with the Region II

girls U-15 team, and accompanied the team to numerous interregional events.

Prior to accepting her position at Louisville, she was the assistant coach at the University of Connecticut for three seasons. The Huskies were 60-12-2 during the three years she spent as an assistant, advanced to the final eight twice (1998 and '99), and were national runner-up in 1997.

A 1993 graduate of UConn, Ferguson-Dayes coached under and played for legendary soccer coach Len Santiris who has not missed the NCAA Division I soccer tournament during his tenure. Before coaching at UConn, Ferguson-Dayes served as an assistant at Boston University during its first two seasons of soccer where the team was an astonishing 24-7-2 overall.

In her playing career at UConn as a midfielder, she was named first team All-America in '91, '92 and '93. The Huskies were 63-24-3 during her four-year career and she tallied 53 points (18 goals and 17 assists.)

In 1990 as a freshman, the Huskies competed in the national semifinal where she was named to the NCAA All-Tournament team. Soccer America Magazine selected her as a Team MVP in 1992, an award given to 11 players nationally.

Ferguson-Dayes' playing career was not limited to the collegiate level. She played for the U.S. National Team in 1992 and 1993.

While at UConn, she was involved in the Connecticut Olympic Development Program and served as staff coach in Region One. Ferguson-Dayes holds an NSCAA Advanced National Soccer license, as well as a USSF B license.

A native of Holbrook, N.Y., and a graduate of Sachem High School, Ferguson-Dayes is married to Hylton Dayes and the couple has one son, Brandon.

1 - Virginia is the No. 1 team in the nation for the second straight week in the NSCAA Poll.

3 - The ACC has three student-athletes who were named candidates for the 2015 Senior CLASS Award - Florida State's Isabella Schmid, North Carolina's Paige Nielsen and Notre Dame's Cari Roccaro.

3 - Reigning ACC Champion Florida State was selected as the preseason favorite by the league's head coaches. The Seminoles won their third ACC Women's Soccer Championship in the last four years in 2014.

4 - ACC teams recorded four non-conference wins over ranked opponents last weekend, including Florida State topping No. 3/15 Texas A&M, Virginia winning at No. 14/9 UCLA, and Duke and North Carolina both defeating No. 15/13 USC. ACC teams combine for nine wins over Top 25 teams.

5 - The ACC boasts five unbeaten teams entering games this week, and one that is unbeaten and untied.

6 - The ACC has had at least six teams selected to the NCAA Tournament each of the last 16 seasons. The ACC set the record for most teams selected from a single conference with nine in 2011 and 2012.

7 - The ACC has seven teams ranked in this week's NSCAA and Soccer America polls, including three in the top four, led by No. 1 Virginia.

8 - The ACC has eight players on the MAC Hermann Trophy Watch List, the most of any conference. An ACC player has won the MAC Hermann Trophy each of the last three seasons and 12 times overall.

25 - Current ACC membership combines for 25 NCAA Division I Women's Soccer Championships. North Carolina owns 21 titles and Florida State owns one, while Notre Dame won three prior to joining the league in 2013.

44 - The ACC has 44 appearances in the College Cup - the most of any conference (the next closest conference is the Pac-12 with 20 appearances). Current membership combines for 56 appearances.
