The Game

The University of Louisville football team opens the 2015 season on Saturday, Sept. 5, when it takes on Auburn in the Georgia Dome in Atlanta. The Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game will mark the first time the teams have met on the gridiron since 1974. The game will be televised nationally on CBS with kickoff set for 3:30 p.m. Verne Lundquist will serve as the play-by-play announcer, with Gary Danielson at his side as the color analyst. The two will be joined by sideline reporter Allie LaForce.

Looking for Sixth-Straight Nine-Win Season Under Petrino

Head coach Bobby Petrino is the winningest coach in school history, with his 50-13 career record entering his sixth season at the helm of the Cardinals. Petrino's teams have posted five-straight nine-win seasons during his tenure, after posting a 9-4 overall record last season. Petrino's teams have never won less than nine games during his first five seasons with the Cardinals.

Preseason Rankings

Louisville opens the 2015 season unranked in both polls, while Auburn is tabbed sixth in the AP poll and seventh in the Coaches' poll.

Auburn

The Tigers are coming off an 8-5 record in the 2014 season, including a 4-4 mark in the SEC. Under the direction of third-year head coach Gus Malzahn, the Tigers are 20-7 during his tenure, including a national championship appearance in 2013. Auburn enters the season with 13 starters returning and 42 letterwinners.

Series

Louisville and Auburn have met only one time in school history before the Chick-fil-A Game on Sept. 5. Auburn defeated the Cardinals 16-3 at home in 1974. The Cardinals are 15-35-1 all-time against schools from the SEC, which included a 44-40 win over Kentucky and a 37-14 loss to Georgia in the Belk Bowl last season.

Next Game

Louisville opens its home slate on Sept. 12, on the ACC Network. The Cardinals and Cougars will meet for the second time in three years after Louisville posted a 20-13 victory in Louisville in 2013. Former Conference USA members and American Athletic Conference foes, Louisville owns an 8-7 series advantage.

Louisville Head Coach Bobby Petrino

The architect of one of the greatest runs in school history from 2003-06 returned last season to take over the program he helped build during his first head coaching stint.

Leading the Cardinals from Conference USA to the BIG EAST, Petrino guided the Cardinals to a 41-9 overall record, two conference titles, and the school's first BCS Bowl appearance during that four-year stretch.

In 2014, Petrino, who returned to the Derby City after an eight-year absence, was faced with a bigger challenge of taking the Cardinals into the Atlantic Coast Conference.

As had been the case in his first four years, Petrino took the challenge head on and guided the Cardinals to their fifth-straight nine-win season.

The Cardinals went 9-4 overall, 5-3 in the ACC, with a big win over Miami in the inaugural ACC game, and wins at Boston College and Notre Dame, and closing the year with a come-from-behind victory over Kentucky. Louisville advanced to its fifth-straight bowl appearance and the fifth overall under Petrino.

After an eight-year hiatus from Louisville, University of Louisville Vice President/Director of Athletics Tom Jurich announced on Jan. 9, 2014, Bobby Petrino as the Cardinals' football coach for the second time in his career. The Cardinals' head coach from 2003-06, Petrino led UofL to unprecedented success in four seasons on the sidelines.

However, during his return this time, the Cardinals made a step up, joining the Atlantic Coast Conference. That didn't matter to Petrino, directing his team to a 9-4 overall record and a 5-3 mark in the ACC. The three losses came by a total of 19 points and to a pair of ranked foes in No. 25 Clemson and No. 2 Florida State.

Petrino, who owns a 50-13 mark overall at Louisville and a 92-34 record all-time as a collegiate coach, directed the Cardinals to their fifth-straight bowl appearance and a post-season berth in his first five seasons as the leader of the Cardinals.

During his first stint at Louisville, Petrino directed the program to a bowl game each year, but more significantly, guided the school to its first BCS victory - a 24-13 win over Wake Forest in the FedEx Orange Bowl. The 41 wins over that four-year span were the most in school history and featured an average margin of victory of 26.0.

He also showed the ability to develop players, as Petrino had 14 selected in the NFL Draft, including Amobi Okoye, who was the 10th overall selection in 2007 by the Houston Texans. Eric Wood, who was recruited by Petrino, was the 28th selection by the Buffalo Bills in 2009. Michael Bush, a fourth-round pick by the Oakland Raiders, amassed 2,514 rushing yards in three-plus seasons with the Cardinals.

Coupling his success at Louisville and Arkansas, Petrino has led his teams to eight bowl games in 10 years, including both

Louisville's and Arkansas' first BCS bowl games. His programs have achieved four 10-win seasons along with top-10 finishes nationally three times. His 2006 Louisville squad and 2011 Arkansas team concluded with No. 5 rankings in the Associated Press polls.

Petrino directed the Cardinals to their first BIG EAST title in 2006, Louisville's second year in the league. He guided that squad to a 12-1 record, which tied the 2013 squad for the most wins in school history. The Cardinals ended the year with their highest national ranking in school history, finishing No. 5 in the Associated Press poll and sixth in the USA Today poll. The Cardinals opened the year going 8-0, including a win over third-ranked West Virginia, and catapulted to as high as No. 3 in the nation.

Hired for the first time at Louisville in 2003, Petrino took the reins of a program that finished 7-6 a year prior and drove the school to a 9-4 mark that resulted in an appearance in the GMAC Bowl. Petrino became the first Louisville head coach to win nine games in their first season.

By the end of his first year, Petrino's team led the league and ranked among the nation's best in total offense, rushing, and scoring. The Cardinals ranked fifth in the nation in total offense (488.9), 10th in rushing (228.2), and 15th in scoring offense (34.6). Louisville set six Conference USA records, including the mark for total yards after the Cardinals racked up 779 yards, including 445 rushing yards, in a 66-45 win over Houston.

The 2004 campaign was one of the best in school history, with Petrino leading the Cardinals to an 11-1 record that culminated in a Conference USA title and a 44-40 Liberty Bowl over 10th-ranked Boise State. The Cardinals led the nation in total offense (539.0) and scoring offense (49.8), scored 50 or more points seven times and set an NCAA record by scoring 55 or more points in five straight games.

After a 9-3 season in 2005, Petrino took Louisville to an unprecedented level the following season, finishing with a 12-1 record and a 24-13 victory over Wake Forest in the Orange Bowl. The 12 wins were the most in school history, besting a previous high of 11 set during Petrino's second season.

During that particular 2006 season, Cardinals averaged over 37 points per game offensively, ranking fourth nationally in that category, while still limiting opponents to just over 16 points per game. Petrino's offense ranked second in the nation in total yards per game (475.3), while leading the Big East in passing offense (290.0) and first downs (296). Louisville jumped as high as No. 3 in the national polls during the season, finishing the year ranked sixth in the AP poll, posting three wins over top-15 teams, including third-ranked West Virginia en route to the program's first Big East title.

The Auburn Series

- Auburn won the only meeting between the two schools, winning 16-3 in Auburn, Ala., during the 1974 season.
- The Cardinals are 15-35-1 all-time against current schools from the Southeastern Conference after splitting a pair of meetings last year. Louisville defeated Kentucky 44-40 in the 2014 regular-season finale at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium and dropped a 37-14 decision to Georgia in the Belk Bowl in Charlotte, N.C.

SEC Familiarity

- Louisville will play a member of the Southeastern Conference for the 22nd straight season.
- The recent streak of games against SEC members began in 1993 when the Cardinals played Tennessee during the regular season. Louisville and fellow SEC member Kentucky have played every season since 1994.
- Louisville has played 10 different SEC schools, compiling a 15-35-1 record against the conference.
- Louisville head coach Bobby Petrino is certainly familiar with the level of competition within the SEC. Petrino spent four seasons at Arkansas (2008-11), where his teams went 17-15 in league play.
- The Cardinals are 2-1 versus the SEC in neutral-site games, defeating Alabama in the 1991 Fiesta Bowl and Florida in the 2013 Sugar Bowl. UofL fell to Georgia last season in the 2014 Belk Bowl.

Versus Alabama Opponents

- Louisville has a 4-3 record all-time against teams from the state of Alabama. The Cardinals' last match-up with a team from Alabama was a 41-21 win over UAB at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium in 2002.

Neutral-Site Openers

- The Cardinals will open the season at a neutral-site location for the first time in school history when they take on Auburn in the 2015 Chick-fil-A Game.
- This will be the first time the Cardinals haven't opened the season at home since playing at Kentucky in 2005 — a 31-24 win over the Wildcats at Commonwealth Stadium.

Season Openers

- Louisville is 52-38-6 all-time in season openers, including a 10-4 record since 2000. Louisville opened the 2014 season with a 31-13 win over Miami at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium.
- The Cardinals have won their last four season openers, with the last loss coming in 2010 — a 23-16 defeat versus Kentucky at home.
- Dominique Brown's 15-yard touchdown run in the third quarter and Gerald Christian's 10-yard TD catch late in the fourth backed Louisville's big defensive performance that helped beat Miami 31-13.
- Head coach Bobby Petrino has won 10-straight season openers as a head coach, including a 5-0 record at Louisville.
- Petrino's teams have scored 30 or more points in the last five season openers, averaging 41.8 points per game during that span.
- The last time a Petrino-coached team failed to score 30 or more points in an opener was a 28-24 win over Western Illinois as the head coach of Arkansas in 2008.

Louisville Has Seven Bowl Teams On Its 2014 Schedule

- Louisville's 2015 schedule features seven teams who played in bowl games a year ago as Auburn played in the Outback Bowl (L, 34-31 to Wisconsin; Florida State played in the

Rose Bowl (L, 59-20 to Oregon); NC State appeared in the St. Petersburg Bowl (W, 34-27 over UCF); Boston College played in the Pinstripe Bowl (L, 31-30 to Penn State); Clemson competed in the Russell Athletic Bowl (W, 40-6 over Oklahoma); Houston and Pittsburgh played in the Armed Forces Bowl, with the Cougars winning 35-34.

• The bowl teams on Louisville's schedule had a combined record of 60-32 last season.

Cards Face No. 6 Auburn in Kickoff Off Game

- The nation's longest-running kickoff game, the annual Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game matches Louisville and No. 6 Auburn in a Bowl-style neutral-site game in Atlanta's Georgia Dome to open the college football season.
- This marks Louisville's first Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game appearance, while this marks Auburn's second Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game appearance - the first a 2012 loss to Clemson.
- The Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game has attracted teams with national rankings of No. 1, No. 2, No. 5 (twice), No. 6, No. 7, No. 9, No. 14, No. 16, No. 18 (twice), No. 19, No. 24 (twice) and No. 25 (twice).

Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game Match-Ups

• **2008: Alabama vs. Clemson** - Alabama's 34-10 victory over No. 9 Clemson in the Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game moved the Crimson Tide up 11 spots in the polls and helped propel them to an eventual No. 1 national ranking and a BCS bowl berth.

• **2009: Alabama vs. Virginia Tech** - The No. 5 Crimson Tide's 34-24 victory over No. 7 Virginia Tech solidified their position as the nation's top team and started their national championship run.

• **2010: LSU vs. North Carolina** - No. 16 LSU's 30-24 win over No. 18 UNC gave the Tigers a boost in the national rankings and started a seven-game winning streak for an eventual 11-2 season that ended with a win in the Cotton Bowl.

• **2011: Boise State vs. Georgia** - No. 5 Boise State defeated No. 19 Georgia 35-21, leading the Broncos to an eventual 12-1 finish and top-10 final ranking for the fourth-straight year.

• **2012 (Game 1): Tennessee vs. NC State** - In the first matchup of these two teams since 1963, Tennessee quarterback Tyler Bray passed for 333 yards and two touchdowns to lead the Volunteers past the Wolfpack, 35-21.

• **2012 (Game 2): Auburn vs. Clemson** - No. 14 Clemson defeated No. 24 Auburn 26-19 in front of a record 75,211 fans, jump starting an 11-win season, including a victory against No. 8 LSU in the 2012 Chick-fil-A Bowl.

• **2013: Alabama vs. Virginia Tech** - In their first meeting since the 2009 Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game, two-time defending National Champion and No. 1 ranked Alabama defeated Virginia Tech 35-10.

• **2014 (Game 1): Ole Miss vs. Boise State** - No. 18 Ole Miss defeated Boise State 35-13 in an offensive battle that broke or tied more than 20

records and led the Rebels to an appearance in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl vs. No. 6 TCU.

• **2014 (Game 2): Alabama vs. West Virginia** - In the teams' first-ever meeting, No. 2 Alabama defeated West Virginia 33-23 kicking off a 12-2 season that included an SEC Championship and College Football Playoff appearance.

News and Notes...

- Head coach Bobby Petrino and John L. Smith are the only coaches in school history to lead Louisville to bowl eligibility in each of their first five seasons as head coach.
- The Cardinals have scored 28 or more points in nine of their last 12 season openers.
- The Cardinals will open away from home for the first time since opening the 2005 season at Kentucky.
- The senior class will open the 2015 season with a 32-7 overall record during their time with the Louisville program. They are looking to reach a bowl game for the fourth straight season. The only other senior classes in school history to play in four straight bowls were members of the 2001, 2002, 2003, 2004, 2005, 2006, 2013 and 2014 senior classes.
- Louisville is 26-4 in the last four seasons when attempting at least 35 rushes in a game.
- Louisville is 50-9 when scoring 20 points or more under Bobby Petrino and 46-5 when leading after three quarters over his five seasons at UofL.
- Senior **John Wallace** has made 11 of his last 13 field goals to bring his career total to 51, which is second in school history, just nine away from Art Carmody's school record of 60.
- Bobby Petrino's team are 35-7 when scoring first and 49-5 when taking a lead into the locker room at halftime.
- The Cardinals are 24-4 under Bobby Petrino when a running back rushes for over 100 yards in a game and 50-9 when totaling more than 300 yards of total offense.
- Louisville has had at least three sacks in eight of the 13 contests last season.
- Louisville led at halftime in 10 of the 13 games last season.
- Ten of **James Quick's** 36 receptions went for at least 30 yards or more last season, including receptions of 74 yards for a touchdown against FIU and a 73-yard reception in a loss to Clemson.
- Louisville scored 20 or more points in a quarter four times in 2014 — scoring 21 and 24 points versus Murray State, 21 versus Florida State and 21 against Kentucky.
- The Louisville defense allowed Miami to convert just one third down on 13 attempts in the 2014 season opener. They also held Wake Forest and Clemson to 2-of-16 attempts on third down last year.

2015 Schedule Notes

- The Cardinals will have only one bye week this year, coming on Oct. 10 after opening the season with five-straight games. Louisville will play four games during the month of September, including three within a span of 13 days.
- The 2015 Cardinals will face seven teams that appeared in bowl games last year (Auburn, Houston, Clemson, NC State, Florida State, Boston College and Pittsburgh).

the year and its first season in a new conference with a 31-13 victory over Miami at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium. Louisville went on to win five of its first six games, including ACC wins over Syracuse, Wake Forest and NC State. After a loss to No. 2 Florida State, the Cardinals closed the regular season with three-straight wins, including road wins at Boston College and a thrilling 31-28 win at historic Notre Dame. The Cardinals won their ninth game of the season with an exciting 44-40 home win over rival Kentucky, the first time the game was played as the finale.

- Wide receiver DeVante Parker tied a school record for career touchdown receptions with 33 when he tallied three versus the Wildcats.
- The Cardinals advanced to the post-season for the fifth-straight year, falling to No. 13 Georgia in the Belk Bowl.
- Safety Gerod Holliman tied an NCAA record with 14 interceptions, was the school's first Jim Thorpe Award winner and a consensus All-American.
- The Cardinals closed a remarkable year by having a school record 10 players selected in the NFL Draft.

NFL Stadiums

- The Cardinals will play their 26th game in an NFL Stadium when facing Auburn in the Georgia Dome in the 2015 Chick-Fil-A Kickoff Classic. Playing in the Georgia Dome for the first time in school history, the Cardinals are 14-11 all-time in games in NFL facilities.
- Louisville dropped a 37-14 decision to Georgia in Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte, N.C. — home of the Carolina Panthers.

Petrino with Auburn Ties

- Head coach Bobby Petrino's team will open the season versus Auburn, where he once served as the offensive coordinator in 2002 for Tommy Tuberville. The Tigers went 9-4 that year dropped a 13-9 decision to Penn State in the Capital One Bowl.
- Petrino's offense was one of the tops in the SEC, scoring 30 or more points in seven of 13 games. The Tigers were 25th nationally in rushing offense averaging 203.7 yards per game, while scoring an average of 29.9 points per game.

Opening Day Notes

- Louisville has scored 40 or more points in a season-opener 15 times, including a 73-10 victory over Murray State on Aug. 30, 2007. That was the school record for most points in the first game of the season.

- Head coach Bobby Petrino typically names his captains during the first team meeting when the players officially report, and the sixth-year leader held true to form on Aug. 5 when he named five captains for 2015.
- In a vote by the players, running back **Brandon Radcliff** and offensive tackle **Aaron Epps** were selected as the offensive leaders.

- On defense, defensive end **Sheldon Rankins** was selected for the second-straight year, while linebackers **Keith Kelsey** and **James Burgess** were also honored.

Louisville at Home in a Dome

- Louisville will be making its 14th overall appearance in a domed stadium against Auburn in the 2015 Chick-fil-A game.
- Louisville is 10-4 all-time in domed stadiums, which includes a 6-1 mark at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome, a 4-3 record at the Carrier Dome.
- The Cardinals will be making its first appearance in the Georgia Dome.

Petrino versus Non-Conference Foes

- Louisville brings a 21-4 record in non-conference games into the Auburn opener. Louisville's only four non-conference losses under Bobby Petrino came against Georgia in the 2014 Belk Bowl, against Virginia Tech in the 2006 Gator Bowl, versus Mi-

ami (Fla.) during the 2004 season and against Miami (Ohio) in the 2003 GMAC Bowl.

- Of the 21 wins under Petrino against non-conference opponents, three have come against Top 25 teams, 15 have come by double-digits and Louisville has scored 40 or more points in 11 of the 25 games.

Louisville in Neutral Site Games

- Louisville brings a 3-3 record in neutral site games under Bobby Petrino.
- The Cardinals' five neutral-site games have come in bowl games, where UofL is 2-3 in those contests.
- Louisville's only neutral-site contest in the regular season was a 44-17 win over Middle Tennessee played in Nashville during the 2006 season.

Cohesion on the Staff

- For the first time since the 2012 and 2005 seasons, Louisville will have all 10 full-time coaches returning from one year to the next.
- Louisville has two coaches who played for the Cardinals in running backs coach **Kolby Smith** and defensive line coach **L.D. Scott**. Both coaches returned when head coach Bobby Petrino took over the program again in 2014. Smith played for the Cardinals from 2003-06, while Scott wore a UofL uniform from 2006-09.

Georgia Cardinals

- A total of 14 Cardinals will be returning to the state of Georgia when the Cardinals take on Auburn in the 2015 opener in the Georgia Dome in Atlanta, Ga.
- The total of number of players from the Peach State is the third-most on the team, next to Kentucky and Florida.
- Wide receiver **Pat Thomas** hails from Atlanta, Ga., while cornerback **Shaq Wiggins** and wide receiver **Ja'Quay Savage** both attended Sandy Creek High School in Tyrone, Ga.

Short on Seniors

At the start of training camp, Louisville has just nine scholarship seniors on the roster in 2015.

- Louisville has just one senior starter on offense – OT Aaron Epps – and three on defense – LB James Burgess, DE Sheldon Rankins and DT Pio Vatuvei. Senior defensive back **Jermaine Reve** also is likely to see significant action and could challenge for a starting position.
- Louisville's opening day training camp roster of 105 players included a staggering 32 juniors and 31 in the sophomore class.
- The training camp roster was comprised of 33 freshmen and 32 sophomores, 32 juniors and 14 seniors.

Cards Open Season With Top 25 Foe

- For just the second time in school history, the Cardinals will open the season with an opponent ranked in the Top 25 of the football polls, but the first time versus a Top 10 foe.
- Louisville last opened the season versus a Top 25 opponent when they dropped a 20-19 decision to 17th-ranked Ohio State in Columbus, Ohio, in 1992.
- Auburn opens the season ranked sixth in the Associated Press and seventh in the Coaches Poll to open the 2015 season.

Petrino in September

- Head coach Bobby Petrino has had a lot of success during his collegiate career, but he has been stellar during the month of September in guiding the Cardinals. Petrino takes a career 16-2 September record into the Sept. 5 contest versus Auburn.
- Petrino has won his last two September games before losing at Virginia on Sept. 13 of last season. His only other September loss was a 45-14 defeat at USF in 2005.
- During his collegiate career, Petrino is 26-10 during the month of September. He posted a 10-8 record in stops at Arkansas and Western Kentucky.

Scoring 30

- Louisville has made scoring 30 points seem quite easy under Bobby Petrino. The squad has done so 45 times in the 63 games with head coach Bobby Petrino at the helm of the Cardinals. Over that span, the Cardinals are 42-3 when tallying more than 30 points in a game. Louisville went 7-1 last year when scoring better than 30 points in a game.
- For comparison's sake, Louisville scored 30 or more points just 33 times over the seven years that Petrino wasn't coaching the Cardinals' program.
- Getting to 40 points is even more decisive for the Cardinals, who are 29-1 under Petrino in such games

Cards Start Three Different QBs in 2014

- Louisville started three different quarterbacks in junior **Will Gardner** and sophomores **Reggie Bonnafon** and **Kyle Bolin**.
- Gardner started seven games before suffering a knee injury, posting a 5-2 mark, while Bonnafon made five starts as a true freshman. A Louisville native, Bonnafon was 4-1 as a starter with wins on the road at Syracuse and Notre Dame.
- Bolin made his first career start in Louisville's 37-14 loss to Georgia in the 2014 Belk Bowl.

Drama Kings

- Since 2008, Louisville is 19-16 in games decided by seven points or less, and the Cardinals have won the last two games by a total of seven points.
- Head coach Bobby Petrino is 7-7 at Louisville in games decided by seven points or less and 21-15 during his coaching career after the 44-40 win over Kentucky on Nov. 29.
- The Cardinals are 5-5 all-time in overtime games since the NCAA instituted the rule in 1996. Petrino is 0-2 in overtime games at Louisville.

Nine True Freshmen Saw Action in 2014

- Head coach Bobby Petrino played three true freshmen in the season-opening win over Miami on Sept. 1.
- He upped that total to nine when five more made their collegiate debuts versus Murray State on Sept. 6.
- Petrino played eight in 2003, six in 2004, three in 2005, four in 2006, and the same pattern held up in Louisville's 2014 opener versus Miami, where he trotted out just three.

Petrino 27-2 at Papa John's

- Head coach Bobby Petrino owns a 27-2 all-time record at home after suffering his second loss at home on Oct. 30 versus Florida State.
- Petrino's teams had won 22 straight games at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium before losing to Florida State on Oct. 30.
- Of those 22 wins, the Cardinals have scored 60 or more points six times, 50-plus points three times and 40 points five times.
- During the previous 22-game home streak, the Cardinals had recorded wins of 20 or more points 17 times.
- The lowest output during this span came in the 20-10 win over Wake Forest on Sept. 27, 2014.

Cards versus Ranked Opponents

- The Cardinals will face their fourth ranked opponent in the last two seasons when they face No. 7 Auburn in the 2015 opener.
- No. 2 Florida State was the highest-ranked team the Cardinals faced last season, also playing at No. 13 Georgia and No. 25.
- Since 2006, despite falling to Georgia, the Cardinals are 10-6 against ranked opponents and have won five of the last eight games versus nationally ranked opponents.
- The Cardinals last win over a top-10 opponent was a 33-23 victory over No. 4 Florida in the 2013 Sugar Bowl.
- The highest ranked teams the Cardinals have defeated at home was third-ranked Florida State in 2002 and West Virginia in 2006.
- Head coach Bobby Petrino is 4-9 at Louisville versus ranked opponents after the loss to Georgia.

Cards Put 10 in NFL Draft

- Louisville finished the 2014 with a successful 9-4 season, and that translated to a school-record performance in the 2015 NFL Draft. The Cardinals had 10 players drafted, which was the most since six were taken in 2005.
- The 10 selections were the second-most in the nation, with Florida State leading the way with 11. Florida was third with eight selections and Alabama and Miami were fourth with seven picks.
- Jake Smith (Cincinnati), Terrell Floyd (Atlanta), Eli Rogers (Pittsburgh), Kai DeLa Cruz (Miami) and Michael Dyer (Oakland) all signed free-agent deals with NFL clubs.

Getting Started

- Louisville has won four consecutive season openers dating back to 2011, scoring 30 or more points in the last three. The Cardinals opened at home with a 31-13 win in the ACC opener over Miami last season.
- UofL's last loss in season opener was a 23-16 loss at the hands of Kentucky in the 2010 debut of former head coach Charlie Strong.
- Head coach Bobby Petrino is 5-0 in openers as the head coach of the Cardinals, averaging 37.8 points per game in those contests.

Cards Sell Allotment of Tickets

- The University of Louisville has sold out of its allotment of tickets to the 2015 Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game versus Auburn on Sept. 5 in the Georgia Dome. The Cardinals sold over 30,000 total tickets to this neutral-site contest, which is the first national neutral-site game of 2015 to sell out. Peach Bowl, Inc. and university officials also today announced both teams have completely sold through their allotments of and no tickets remain for public sale.
- The Cardinals, ranked 25th by CBS, will make their first appearance in the Chick-fil-A Game, while Auburn will play for the second time in a game that features two preseason top-25 teams for the second time.

Under Construction

- Construction has begun on the south end of the stadium on the Thorntons Academic Center of Excellence, which will be located beneath the Norton Terrace at the south end of the Papa John's Cardinal Stadium and is expected to be completed within the next 14 months.
- The \$18 million state-of-the-art Thorntons Academic Center of Excellence will house academic operations and provide a central location for all student-athletes and academic staff, further assisting UofL student-athletes to excel in the classroom. The 40,000-square-foot center will feature tutorial areas, a high-performance training table to feed the student-athletes, computer laboratories, and office and classroom space that will serve over 750 student-athletes across the Cardinals' 23 sports on a daily basis.

Cards to Expand for Second Time in Five Years

- The expand Papa John's Cardinal Stadium for the second time in the last decade, a development which will enclose the north end zone, create multiple new fan amenities, and enlarge and enhance the training facilities for the football team.
- About 10,000 additional seats will be added with the expansion, creating a unique look in the end zone structure for the stadium and increasing the total seating capacity to approximately 65,000. The expansion will include 1,000 modern club seats, 65 new premium loge level boxes, and 10 exclusive field level suites, while adding 25,000 distinct square feet of space. The design will provide a connection between the east and west sides of the stadium. The stadium seating will continue to feature all chairback seating for fans, providing the only university-owned and operated stadium in the nation with that element.
- The Howard Schnellenberger Football Complex, which currently sits in the north end zone, will undergo a major expansion and facelift. The team's weight room and conditioning center will double in size, creating a total of 20,000 square feet of work space for training, conditioning, and therapeutic support. A spacious player's lounge, improvements for coaches'

offices and the team locker room, and expansive theatre-style meeting areas will also be among the enhancements for student-athlete development.

- The project will cost approximately \$55 million, which will be raised through sponsorships, private donations, ticket sales, and other possible sources.

Going for Sixth-Straight Winning Season

- Entering the sixth year in the Bobby Petrino era, the Cardinals are looking for their sixth-straight winning season. During that span, the Cardinals have won 46 games since starting the trend in 2010. Louisville won seven games in both 2010 and 2011 improving to 11 in 2012, 12 in 2013 and last year's total of nine.
- The last losing season came in 2009 when the Cardinals finished the year at 4-8.
- Petrino, who has 50 wins during his career, has posted five-straight nine win seasons after going 9-4 in 2014, his first year back since 2007.

Petrino Shows Improvement in Year Two

- Bobby Petrino has been a proven winner, but his track record has shown he gets better during his second season. He coached at Louisville from 2003-06 and returned in 2014. He also was head coach at Arkansas from 2008-11 and at Western Kentucky in 2013.
- During his first stint with the Cardinals, Petrino opened his collegiate coaching career by going 9-4 in 2003. He followed that up with an 11-1 mark in 2004, and a win over No. 10 Boise State in the Liberty Bowl. His squad finished ranked seventh in the USA Coaches Poll and sixth by the AP.
- After finishing 5-7 in 2008 at Arkansas, the Razorbacks came back in 2011 and won six consecutive games to close the year, to finish 8-5, including a win over East Carolina in the Liberty Bowl.

Seven Added on Scholarship

- Prior to the end of camp, head coach Bobby Petrino surprised seven walk-ons with full scholarships for the 2015 season.
- Wide receiver **Dontez Byrd**, offensive lineman **Toriano Roundtree**, running back **Malin Jones**, defensive lineman **Aaron Ahner**, fullback **Griffin Uhl**, running back **Darius Skinner** and long snapper **Colin Holba** were awarded scholarships by Petrino in late August.

Transfers Make Their Way To Louisville

Petrino's teams are an incredible 30-2 when his teams rush for over 200 yards in a game. The Cardinals were 6-1 in 2003 during Petrino's first season when rushing for over 200 yards in a game, with the only loss coming to Miami (Ohio) in the GMAC Bowl. The only other loss was a 41-38 loss at third-ranked in 2004.

- The Cardinals have won 20-straight games since the 2004 loss to Miami. The Cardinals won their last six games that season when rushing over 200 yards, and went 6-0 in 2005, 5-0 in 2006 and 3-0 last year.

Three Offensive Starters Back

- The Cardinals lost a lot of talent on the offensive side of the football. Talented players like wide receiver DeVante Parker, offensive linemen John Miller, Jamon Brown and Jake Smith, and running backs Dominique Brown and Michael Dyer.

- Louisville returns just three starters on the offensive side of the football in center **Tobijah Hughley**, offensive tackle **Aaron Epps** and wide receiver **James Quick**.

- Hughley was a starter at 12 games at center, while Epps was inserted into the starting lineup for the final six games of the year. Quick was one of the team's top wide receivers.

- Running back **Brandon Radcliff** and quarterbacks **Reggie Bonnafon** and **Will Gardner** each started at least four games on offense.

- The Cardinals return just 51 career starts on the offensive line among all the players returning from last season. Hughley has the most starts under his belt with 12, while Quick is second among the returners with 10.

Quick All Alone

- Coming off a six-catch freshman season in 2013, junior **James Quick** was one of the most productive wide receivers in the rotation last year. A native of Louisville, Ky., Quick established career-highs for receptions (36), yards (566) and touchdowns (3) in 2014. Sophomore **Javonte Bagley** and him are the only returning players with a reception at Louisville.

- Quick caught at least one pass in 11 games and totaled three of more receptions in six contests, including a career-best seven catches for 174 yards and two scores in a 34-3 win over FIU.

- The product of Trinity High recorded a second 100-yard game in the 23-17 loss to Clemson, totaling five catches for 101 yards, including a 73-yard reception.

- Quick was second on the team with 12 catches of 20 or more yards and also was second with a 15.7 per catch average, which included two receptions of over 70 yards.

Radcliff Leads Rushing Attack

- Junior **Brandon Radcliff** earned the right to be the featured back last season with his hard work, and the hard-running back didn't disappoint. The product of Miami, Fla., led the team in rushing with 737 yards and also topped the team with 12 touchdowns. He recorded a team-leading three 100-yard rushing games with a career-best 136 yards on 17 carries and a touchdown versus Notre Dame.

- Radcliff averaged a team-high 5.1 yards per carry last season and has posted seven games of 50 yards or more, including a trio of 100-yard games. He rushed for 129 yards versus Wake Forest and 110 yards and two scores versus Syracuse. He also totaled 97 yards in the win over Murray State on Sept. 6.

- When Louisville took a 24-20 lead on the Irish in the third quarter, Radcliff carried five times for 45 yards and rushed three times for 62 yards on a score in the fourth quarter to put the Cards ahead to stay.

- In his first two career starts in the wins over Wake Forest

on Sept. 27 and Syracuse on Oct. 3. Radcliff responded with consecutive 100-yard games in leading the Cardinals to a pair of wins.

- Radcliff led the team with five rushes for 20 or more yards last season and totaled eight plays from scrimmage of over 20 yards.

- Radcliff scored on touchdown runs of 29 yards and his 16-yard score put the Cardinals ahead for good in the fourth quarter. The win over Wake Forest on Sept. 27 was the second two-touchdown game of his career, also rushing for a pair this season versus Murray State on Sept. 6.

- Radcliff has caught six passes for 84 yards, including a 20-yard reception last week versus Boston College.

- He had 10 runs of 15 or more yards this season and he led the team with 23 plays of 15 or more yards. He recorded a career-long 62-yard kickoff return against Syracuse on Oct. 3.

Bonnafon Finds Endzone

- True freshman quarterback Reggie Bonnafon has hurt opponents with his ability to run the football. He rushed for two touchdowns on Nov. 22 in the 31-28 win at Notre Dame to give him five this season. It was the second game this season that Bonnafon that rushed for a pair of scores, scoring twice in the 66-21 win over Murray State on Sept. 6. Bonnafon scored on runs of 12 and eight yards versus Notre Dame.

- Bonnafon's five rushing touchdowns last season is tied for third in school history with John Madeya (1970), Wally Oyler ((1967, 1968) for the most rushing scores by a quarterback. Dave Ragone (2000) is second with six and Benny Russell holds the school mark with eight set in 1965.

Don't Call it A Comeback

- Junior quarterback **Will Gardner** has battled through a lot of adversity during his Louisville career. Three knee surgeries have slowed his progress and his career, but it hasn't stopped him from continuing to battle for the starting job.

- Gardner is coming off his best season last year when he threw for 1,669 yards and 12 touchdowns in seven games as a starter. In his initial start, Gardner was 20-of-28 for 206 yards and a pair of scores in 31-13 win over Miami in the 2014 opener.

- The native of Douglas, Ga., threw for a career-high 330 yards in a 42-31 loss to Florida State, and tossed at least two touchdowns in five games.

Bolin Ready When Called Upon

- Sophomore quarterback **Kyle Bolin** played well in the

first extensive playing time of his career after replacing an injured starter **Reggie Bonnafon** in the regular-season win over Kentucky. Appearing in two games prior to relieving Bonnafon in the win over the Wildcats, Bolin entered the game with the Cardinals trailing 13-0 before rallying for a 44-40 win.

- Bolin went 21-for-31 for 381 yards and three touchdowns in the win, including a 45-yard touchdown pass on his first play of the game.

- A native of Lexington, Ky., Bolin made his first career start in the Belk Bowl loss to Georgia, going 20-for-40 for 300 yards and a touchdown.

Christian Brothers

- The Louisville football program has always been a family affair, and that was evident by the Christian brothers. Former Cardinal tight end **Gerald Christian** transferred to Louisville in 2012 and went on to play two seasons with the Cardinals before being the last pick in the NFL Draft this year, being selected by the Arizona Cardinals as "Mr. Irrelevant." Christian caught 60 passes for 810 yards and nine scores during his brief time with the Cardinals.

- Christian's youngest brother, **Geron Christian**, signed with the Cardinals in February. The 320-pounder is the No. 7 rated tackle in the state of Florida, Christian is working toward being the first offensive lineman to start as a true freshman since John Miller started as a rookie in 2011.

New Crop of Wide Receivers

- The Cardinals lost a lot of experience at wide receiver from last season, with the departures of DeVante Parker, Eli Rogers, Gerald Christian, Kai DeLa Cruz and Michalee Harris.

- Junior **James Quick** is the lone starter back at wide receiver after registering 36 receptions for 566 yards and three scores. Sophomore **Javonte Bagley** caught a pair of passes last season for the only two returnees with a reception.

- **Jamari Staples**, a UAB transfer, **Ja'Quay Savage**, a Texas A&M transfer, while true freshman **Emonee Spence**, **Traveon Samuel**, **Devante Peete** and **Jaylen Smith** will be added to the mix this year.

Freshmen Offensive Linemen in the Mix

- Head coach Bobby Petrino isn't hesitant about throwing true freshmen into the mix, and he might have to do that on the offensive line this year. Offensive tackle **Geron Christian** and offensive guard **Kenny Thomas** have enjoyed a competitive fall camp and are in the mix on the offensive line. Red-shirt

freshman **Lukayus McNeil** is also in the mix on the offensive line.

- The Cardinals return just two starters on the line from last year in center **Tobijah Hughley** and tackle **Aaron Epps**. Hughley started 12 of 13 games, while Epps was a starter in six games.
- John Miller**, a third-round pick of the St. Louis Rams in 2015, was the last true freshman to start on the line when he started seven games in 2011.
- The Cardinals had two draft picks in Miller and offensive tackle **Jamon Brown** off last year's offensive line, and center **Jake Smith** was a free-agent signee of Cincinnati.

Fast Starters

- Head coach Bobby Petrino likes to take the football on the opening drive to try and get his offense going on the first possession.
- In 63 games as the head coach of Louisville, the Cardinals have scored 10 or more first-quarter points 24 times after scoring 14 versus Notre Dame on Nov. 22.
- During those 63 games, the Cardinals have scored first in 43 of those contests, including seven of the 13 games last season.
- While at Louisville, Petrino's teams have out-scored the opposition 531-309 during the first quarter in the five years as head coach of the Cardinals.

Consecutive Games Scoring Streak

- Louisville is currently riding a consecutive game scoring streak that spans 186 games dating back to the 2000 season.
- The streak ranks as the third longest in the ACC behind Virginia Tech (253) and Georgia Tech (219).
- The last time the Cardinals were shut out was a 31-0 loss at Florida State in 2000.

Transfers Provide Options at Wide Receiver

- Having lost 155 receptions at the wide receiver and tight end position to graduation, the Cardinals have to replace a lot of production. Head coach Bobby Petrino will rely on a trio of transfers in wide receivers **Jamari Staples** and **Ja'Quay Savage**, and tight end **Cole Hikutini** to stabilize this unit.
- Staples, a transfer from UAB, played two seasons with the Blazers before the program was terminated. Staples caught a career-best 31 passes for 458 yards and a 14.8 yards per reception average in 2013 and added nine receptions for 190 yards in 2014.
- Savage played one season at Texas A&M before coming to Louisville. Appearing in 10 games for the Aggies, Savage caught four passes for 71 yards, including two catches for 58 yards against Sam Houston State.
- Hikutini caught 21 passes and totaled five touchdowns at City College of San Francisco last year.

Red-Zone Alert

- Louisville was successful on 48-of-58 red zone chances last year, including a streak of 19 straight to open 2014.
- The Cardinals were ranked 68th in the country, converting 85 percent of their red-zone opportunities, but they were one of the best at scoring touchdowns. UofL was ranked 29th nationally by scoring 39 touchdowns in the red zone.
- During Petrino's tenure as head coach at UofL, his teams have converted 234 of 267 (87.6 percent) times in the red zone.

Get Back on Track

- Head coach Bobby Petrino is widely considered one of the best offensive minds in the nation, and he has had the statistics to back it up. However, last year, the offense was up and down. The Cardinals ranked 72nd at 394.7 yards per game, which was the lowest in his career.
- While at Louisville, Petrino's offense were never ranked out of the top 10 nationally. The Cardinals were ranked fifth in 2003 in his first season at Louisville. His 2004 unit led the country, while his 2005 team was ninth and was second in 2006.
- While at Arkansas from 2008-11, Petrino's lowest ranking was 49th in 2008. His offense was 30th in 2013 — his lone season at Western Kentucky.

Burgess Looks to Break 71

- Senior linebacker **James Burgess** has been a steady force in the middle of the defense for the last three seasons. Appearing in 35 games, including 30 starts, the native of Homestead, Fla., has 170 career tackles during that span.
- Over the last two seasons, Burgess totaled 71 tackles in 2013 and 2014, finishing third on the team in tackles with 71. He recorded five or more tackles in seven games last season.
- He led the linebackers in tackles for loss with 10.0 and recorded three interceptions.
- Burgess owns six career interceptions during his first three years at linebacker, totaling a career-best three in 2014.

Kelsey Jells into a Leader

- Junior linebacker **Keith Kelsey** has developed into a leader as was evident by being named one of the team's captains.
- In his first year as a starter in 2014, Kelsey, who started all 13 games last year, finished second on the team in tackles with 87, ranking 17th in the ACC.
- Kelsey led the team in tackles twice last season, first against Virginia on Sept. 13 when he tallied a career-best 11 in a 23-21 loss to the Cavaliers. He led the Cardinals with nine stops at Syracuse on Oct. 3. His other double-digit tackle game came versus Kentucky, when he registered 10 stops in the 44-40 win over the Wildcats.
- Playing on the inside, Kelsey recorded six sacks, which was third-best on the team.

Defense Ranked in the Top 10 Again

- The Cardinals have always been one of the top offensive teams in the country, especially under Bobby Petrino. However, the last two seasons, the Cardinals have been one of the more dominant units in the nation. Louisville was the top defensive unit in the country in 2013, yielding an average of 251.5 yards per game.
- The Cardinals finished 10th in the nation in total defense last season, the second-straight year they finished in the top 10 nationally. In 2014, the Cardinals yielded 309.9 yards per game, which ranked sixth nationally. The Cards led the nation in total defense in 2013 by holding opponents to an average of 251.5 yards per game.
- Last season, the Cardinals were consistently one of the top defensive units in the country all year long. Louisville opened the year by holding their first seven opponents to less than 300 yards of total offense. In the opener versus Miami, the Cardinals limited the Hurricanes to 244 yards.
- Wake Forest was held to 100 yards in a 20-10 win over Wake Forest and FIU was stopped to 205 yards in a 34-3 win.
- Against the run, the Cardinals also finished in the top 10, by finishing 10th by limiting the opposition to 108.5 yards per game. Seven of the 13 opponents were held to less than 100 yards rushing in a game, including a season best -22 yards in a win over Wake Forest.

Turnover Tables

- Louisville finished first in the ACC in turnovers forced in 2014 with 30, also finishing +4 in turnover margin, which was sixth in the ACC.
- The 30 turnovers forced are the most since 2001 when

that team forced 2001 miscues en route to an 11-2 record and a Conference USA title.

- The 30 turnovers forced represented an increase from a year ago, when UofL forced 27 turnovers.
- Louisville forced multiple turnovers in 10 of 13 games last season, including a season-high four in a road win over Boston College.
- Louisville held a +5 turnover margin in its nine wins last season.

Defensive TDs Scored During Petrino Era

- Louisville has scored nine defensive touchdowns since Bobby Petrino took over as head coach in 2003. He coached from 2003-06 before returning to the Cardinals in 2014.

Replacing the Secondary

- Heading into last season, the Cardinals had to replace both starting safeties in Calvin Pryor and Hakeem Smith, and were still able to excel. This year, the Cardinals have to replace the entire secondary as all four starters, who are on NFL rosters, need to be replaced in **Charles Gaines** and **Terrell Floyd** at cornerback and **James Sample** and **Gerod Holliman** at safety.
- The Cardinals lost a lot of production as 21 of the 26 interceptions are gone off the roster. Holliman led the nation with 14 and Sample totaled four.
- The Cardinals will start the year with zero career starts in the secondary, but do have a pair of Georgia transfers in the mix for starting roles this year. Cornerback **Shaq Wiggins** made eight starts at Georgia in 2013, while safety **Josh Harvey-Clemons** also started 11 games in 2013.

Holding Opponents Under 300

- Defense coordinator Todd Grantham had quite a first-year for the Cardinals in leading the team to a top 10 finish in total defense.
- The Cardinals limited opponents to under 300 yards of total offense seven times last season or 58.3 percent of the time. Louisville went 5-2 in games where the opposition was held to less than 300 yards of total offense.

Getting After the Quarterback

- Defense coordinator Todd Grantham had quite a first-year for the Cardinals in leading the team to a top 10 finish in total defense.
- The Cardinals limited opponents to under 300 yards of total offense seven times last season or 58.3 percent of the time. Louisville went 5-2 in games where the opposition was held to less than 300 yards of total offense.

Tough Sledding on the Ground

- Louisville has allowed only three rushing touchdowns through 13 games of the 2014 season, which is the fewest in the nation (UCF, 8). The Tide lead the nation in allowing the fewest rushing touchdowns since the start of the 2005 season, surrendering only 71. Since head coach Nick Saban arrived in 2007, the Crimson Tide has allowed 53 rushing touchdowns. Ohio State is No. 2 in that category, giving up 83 since 2007

Staying Under 100

- Despite giving 305 yards on the ground in the Belk Bowl loss to Georgia, the Cardinals finished 10th in the nation against the run giving up an average of 109.9 yards per game.
- For most of the year, the Cardinals were tough to run on, holding seven opponents to less than 100 yards on the ground. Louisville held Miami and Duke Johnson, a third-round NFL draft pick, to 70 total yards in the season opener.
- In a 20-10 win over Wake Forest, the Cardinals limited the Demon Deacons to -22 yards on the ground and held Syracuse to 44 yards the following week.
- Louisville ranked 13th nationally holding the opposition to just 3.3 yards per carry and stood 10th in touchdowns allowed on the ground with 12.

Cards Add TCU Transfer

- The Cardinals added a big-play defender when they signed outside linebacker **DeVonte' Fields** in February.
- Fields attended Trinity Valley Community College where he was rated as the No. 2 JUCO recruit in the country, totaling 61 tackles and 6.5 sacks in one season at Trinity Valley.
- He started collegiate career at TCU, where he was selected as the AP Big 12 Defensive Player of the Year and Defensive Newcomer of the Year in 2012.
- A native of Fort Worth, Texas, Fields was voted by conference coaches as the Big 12 Defensive Freshman of the Year, where he posted 53 tackles, including 34 solo stops. He led the team with 18.5 tackles for loss and 10 sacks... was first in the Big 12 at 1.42 tackles for loss per game and third in the league with 0.77 sacks per game. His 10 sacks tied for the fourth-most in a season in TCU history and were the most by a freshman.

High Rankins

- Senior defensive end **Sheldon Rankins** looks to build off a big season where he was named third-team All-ACC in 2014. The Covington, Ga., native led the Cardinals in sacks (8.0) and tackles for loss (13.5) and was a disruptive force on the line.
- Rankins was fourth on the team in tackles with a career-high 53, the highest among the UofL defensive linemen. A starter in all 13 games, Rankins registered sacks in eight games, including 1.5 in a win at Boston College.

Interceptions Leader

- The Cardinals were definitely ballhawks in 2014, tying Louisiana Tech and TCU for the national lead in interceptions with 26 — the most since 1966. Safety Gerod Holliman led the nation with a school record 14 picks in 2014.
- Last season, the Cardinals recorded at least one interception in all 13 contests, and registered multiple picks in nine different games. Louisville totaled a season-best four interceptions in a 39-18 win at Boston College.
- Linebacker **James Burgess** is the leader returning with three interceptions, while the Cards lost a total of 21 interceptions from players who left from last year's squad.

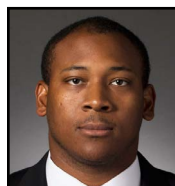
