## THE OPENING KICK

► After picking up its first win of the season last Saturday versus Samford, the Cardinals hit the road for their first road game of the year, traveling to NC State on Saturday, Oct. 3, for a 12:30 p.m. kickoff. The game will be televised on the ACC Network with Tim Brant and Dave Archer calling the action with Roddy Jones on the sideline.

► The Cardinals improved to 1-3 overall with a 45-3 win over Samford on Saturday at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium. Freshman **Lamar Jackson** set a school record for rushing yards by a quarterback with 184 and two scores in his second collegiate start also totaled the most total yards by a freshman with 396. The product of Pompano Beach, Fla., also completed 15-of-22 passes for a career-high 212 yards and a touchdown. The defense yielded just 201 yards of total offense and intercepted three passes as the Cards held the Bulldogs to just a field goal to secure their first win of the year.

► Playing in their first season in the ACC last year, the Cardinals went 2-2 on the road with victories at Syracuse (28-6) and Boston College (38-19), while dropping decisions to Virginia (21-23) and Clemson (17-23). Louisville dropped two road games by a total of eight points.

► NC State improved to 4-0 overall with a 63-13 win at South Alabama on Sept. 26 behind 104 yards and three touchdowns by running back Matthew Hayes and two touchdown throws by quarterback Jacoby Brissett.

## THE STORIES

► The Cardinals will play their first true road game of the season at NC State this week. Head coach Bobby Petrino, whose teams are 28-4 all-time at home, are also 27-8 on the road. Last season, the Cardinals went 4-2 away from home in their first season in the league.

► Head coach Bobby Petrino's teams are 2-3 in road conference openers during his tenure at Louisville, including a 23-21 loss to Virginia in UofL's ACC road opener last season.

► Quarterback **Lamar Jackson** ranks seventh in school history for rushing touchdowns by a quarterback in a single season with four after only four games. Jackson needs four more to tie Benny Russell's school record of eight rushing

## Rushing Yards By Quarterback

True freshman **Lamar Jackson** set the school record for rushing yards for a quarterback at Louisville with 184 yards in the Cardinals' 45-3 victory over Samford on Saturday. Jackson carried 18 times and scored on runs of 13 and 14 yards.

**RECAPPING SAMFORD**

► **Lamar Jackson** had 396 yards of total offense, the most by a freshman in school history. He finished the game with 212 yards passing and 184 on the ground.

► Jackson connected with James Quick on a 36-yard pass for a touchdown in the third quarter, Jackson's second career passing score. He ran in the first and second touchdowns of the game.

► Louisville's interception early in the game extended the Cardinals' streak of games with a pick to 17, the longest active streak in the nation.

► Jackson is the 10th quarterback in UofL history to rush for two scores in a game. He is the first since Reggie Bonnafon ran for two against Notre Dame in 2014.

► Jackson set the school's rushing record for a quarterback, carrying the ball 18 times for 184 yards. He passed Jim Wagoner, who ran for 162 yards against Drake in 1974.

► **Lukayus McNeil** made his first collegiate start at offensive guard versus Samford.

► Jackson had a 73-yard run in the first quarter, the longest run by a UofL player since Dominique Brown went 77 yards against Florida International in 2013.

► **Lamar Jackson** and **Reggie Bonnafon** combined to connect with 12 different receivers during the game, the most since 12 receivers caught a pass against Murray State on Sept. 6, 2014.

► **John Wallace** connected on a 50-yard field goal in the second quarter, the second of at least 50 yards in his career. He hit a 51-yarder last year against Syracuse.

► **Brandon Raddcliff's** touchdown toward the end of the first quarter marked his first score of the season, 14th of his career.

► As a team, Louisville compiled 328 yards in the first half, the most since registering 357 last season against Murray State.

► Louisville's defense had three interceptions in a contest for the second time this season, first achieving the feat against Auburn. Last year, the unit had at least three interceptions in a game on three occasions (3 vs. Wake Forest; 3 vs. Florida State; 4 vs. Boston College).

► The Cardinals' run defense in the red zone has been stout since the season-opener. Opponents have been held without a rushing touchdown since Auburn scored a pair in the Chick-Fil-A Kickoff Game.

► **Keith Kelsey** recovered his second career fumble on Samford's third offensive play of the game. The fumble was forced by **Trumaine Washington**, the first of his career. He had an interception, the second of his career, later in the game.

► Louisville held Samford to 71 yards rushing after the Bulldogs entered the game averaging 182.3.

► Samford managed just 201 yards of total offense in the game, the fewest yards since Wake Forest gained only 100 last season.

**SCOUTING NC STATE**

► NC State set a new school record with seven rushing touchdowns, as the Wolfpack wrapped up a 4-0 non-conference slate with a 63-13 win at South Alabama. The margin of victory for the Wolfpack was the most since NC State downed Murray State 65-7 in 2009.

► The Pack's rushing attack accounted for 330 yards, with **Shadrach Thornton** (111 yards) and **Matthew Dayes** (104) both going over the century mark. As an offense, the Pack had 586 yards, the ninth-most in school history and the most since at Clemson in 2012.

► NC State has now won seven consecutive games dating back to last season - the final three last year and the first four this season. The last time NC State won that many consecutive games was when the Pack won the first nine games to start the 2002 season.

► For the fourth straight game, Dayes went over 100 yards rushing. He is the first NC State running back since Joe McIntosh in 1981 to have four straight 100-yard rushing games.

► Quarterback **Jacoby Brissett** leads the nation in completion percentage, completing 77.9 percent of his throws and has passed for 809 yards and six touchdowns through four games.

► NC State ranks 16th in the country in rushing average with 259.0 yards per game, with Matt Dayes standing 17th nationally with 454 yards and leads the country with nine rushing touchdowns.

► NC State is yielding just 49.5 yards per game on the ground and 205.8 yards of total offense, which stands third nationally in both categories.

### Louisville Head Coach Bobby Petrino

The architect of one of the greatest runs in school history from 2003-06 returned last season to take over the program he helped build during his first head coaching stint.

Leading the Cardinals from Conference USA to the BIG EAST, Petrino guided the Cardinals to a 41-9 overall record, two conference titles, and the school's first BCS Bowl appearance during that four-year stretch.

In 2014, Petrino, who returned to the Derby City after an eight-year absence, was faced with a bigger challenge of taking the Cardinals into the Atlantic Coast Conference.

As had been the case in his first four years, Petrino took the challenge head on and guided the Cardinals to their fifth-straight nine-win season.

The Cardinals went 9-4 overall, 5-3 in the ACC, with a big win over Miami in the inaugural ACC game, and wins at Boston College and Notre Dame, and closing the year with a come-from-behind victory over Kentucky. Louisville advanced to its fifth-straight bowl appearance and the fifth overall under Petrino.

After an eight-year hiatus from Louisville, University of Louisville Vice President/Director of Athletics Tom Jurich announced on Jan. 9, 2014, Bobby Petrino as the Cardinals' football coach for the second time in his career. The Cardinals' head coach from 2003-06, Petrino led UofL to unprecedented success in four seasons on the sidelines.

However, during his return this time, the Cardinals made a step up, joining the Atlantic Coast Conference. That didn't matter to Petrino, directing his team to a 9-4 overall record and a 5-3 mark in the ACC. The three losses came by a total of 19 points and to a pair of ranked foes in No. 25 Clemson and No. 2 Florida State.

Petrino, who owns a 50-13 mark overall at Louisville and a 92-34 record all-time as a collegiate coach, directed the Cardinals to their fifth-straight bowl appearance and a post-season berth in his first five seasons as the leader of the Cardinals.

During his first stint at Louisville, Petrino directed the program to a bowl game each year, but more significantly, guided the school to its first BCS victory - a 24-13 win over Wake Forest in the FedEx Orange Bowl. The 41 wins over that four-year span were the most in school history and featured an average margin of victory of 26.0.

He also showed the ability to develop players, as Petrino had 14 selected in the NFL Draft, including Amobi Okoye, who was the 10th overall selection in 2007 by the Houston Texans. Eric Wood, who was recruited by Petrino, was the 28th selection by the Buffalo Bills in 2009. Michael Bush, a fourth-round pick by the Oakland Raiders, amassed 2,514 rushing yards in three-plus seasons with the Cardinals.

Coupling his success at Louisville and Arkansas, Petrino has led his teams to eight bowl games in 10 years, including both

Louisville's and Arkansas' first BCS bowl games. His programs have achieved four 10-win seasons along with top-10 finishes nationally three times. His 2006 Louisville squad and 2011 Arkansas team concluded with No. 5 rankings in the Associated Press polls.

Petrino directed the Cardinals to their first BIG EAST title in 2006, Louisville's second year in the league. He guided that squad to a 12-1 record, which tied the 2013 squad for the most wins in school history. The Cardinals ended the year with their highest national ranking in school history, finishing No. 5 in the Associated Press poll and sixth in the USA Today poll. The Cardinals opened the year going 8-0, including a win over third-ranked West Virginia, and catapulted to as high as No. 3 in the nation.

Hired for the first time at Louisville in 2003, Petrino took the reins of a program that finished 7-6 a year prior and drove the school to a 9-4 mark that resulted in an appearance in the GMAC Bowl. Petrino became the first Louisville head coach to win nine games in their first season.

By the end of his first year, Petrino's team led the league and ranked among the nation's best in total offense, rushing, and scoring. The Cardinals ranked fifth in the nation in total offense (488.9), 10th in rushing (228.2), and 15th in scoring offense (34.6). Louisville set six Conference USA records, including the mark for total yards after the Cardinals racked up 779 yards, including 445 rushing yards, in a 66-45 win over Houston.

The 2004 campaign was one of the best in school history, with Petrino leading the Cardinals to an 11-1 record that culminated in a Conference USA title and a 44-40 Liberty Bowl over 10th-ranked Boise State. The Cardinals led the nation in total offense (539.0) and scoring offense (49.8), scored 50 or more points seven times and set an NCAA record by scoring 55 or more points in five straight games.

After a 9-3 season in 2005, Petrino took Louisville to an unprecedented level the following season, finishing with a 12-1 record and a 24-13 victory over Wake Forest in the Orange Bowl. The 12 wins were the most in school history, besting a previous high of 11 set during Petrino's second season.

During that particular 2006 season, Cardinals averaged over 37 points per game offensively, ranking fourth nationally in that category, while still limiting opponents to just over 16 points per game. Petrino's offense ranked second in the nation in total yards per game (475.3), while leading the Big East in passing offense (290.0) and first downs (296). Louisville jumped as high as No. 3 in the national polls during the season, finishing the year ranked sixth in the AP poll, posting three wins over top-15 teams, including third-ranked West Virginia en route to the program's first Big East title.

**2015 SEASON NOTEBOOK**

► Louisville has won at least nine games each of the past three seasons. Head coach Bobby Petrino has guided the Cardinals to five-straight nine win seasons during his first five seasons as the Cardinals' head coach.

► The 2015 season marks the 20th anniversary of Louisville's 1991 Fiesta Bowl championship team. The Cardinals finished the season at 10-1-1 and defeated No. 25 Alabama in the biggest bowl game at the time. The team was honored on Sept. 12 in the loss to Houston.

► The 2015 season marks the 96th football season at Louisville. The Cardinals hold an all-time record of 488-447-17.

► Entering the sixth year in the Bobby Petrino era, the Cardinals are looking for their sixth-straight winning season. During that span, the Cardinals have won 46 games since starting the trend in 2010. Louisville won seven games in both 2010 and 2011 improving to 11 in 2012, 12 in 2013 and last year's total of nine.

► The last losing season came in 2009 when the Cardinals finished the year at 4-8.

► In 2015, the Cardinals will begin their second season in the Atlantic Coast Conference after going 5-3 last season. Louisville spent 2005-2012 in the BIG EAST and 2013 in the American Athletic Conference.

**ROSTER NOTES**

► The Cardinals' roster features players from 16 states and a set of brothers who were born in Japan. There are 30 native Kentuckians on the squad, followed by 25 Florida natives and 14 from Georgia.

• Louisville features 64 underclassmen, including 33 freshmen and 31 sophomore. The upperclassmen totals 32 junior and 14 seniors.

• Five Cardinals will serve as captains for the 2015 season. The group includes two players on offense (offensive

tackle **Aaron Epps** and running back **Brandon Radcliff**) and three on defense (linebackers **James Burgess** and **Keith Kelsey** and defensive end **Sheldon Rankins**).

► True freshman **Geron Christian** is the brother of former UofL tight end and seventh-round draft pick of the Arizona Cardinal Gerald Christian.

► Prior to the end of camp, head coach Bobby Petrino surprised seven walk-ons with full scholarships for the 2015 season.

► Wide receiver **Dontez Byrd**, offensive lineman **Toriano Roundtree**, running back **Malin Jones**, defensive lineman **Aaron Ahner**, fullback **Griffin Uhl**, running back **Darius Skinner** and long snapper **Colin Holba** were awarded scholarships by Petrino in late August.

**SCHEDULE NOTES**

► Louisville's 2015 schedule features seven teams who played in bowl games a year ago as Auburn played in the Outback Bowl (L, 34-31 to Wisconsin; Florida State played in the Rose Bowl (L, 59-20 to Oregon); NC State appeared in the St. Petersburg Bowl (W, 34-27 over UCF); Boston College played in the Pinstripe Bowl (L, 31-30 to Penn State); Clemson competed in the Russell Athletic Bowl (W, 40-6 over Oklahoma); Houston and Pittsburgh played in the Armed Forces Bowl, with the Cougars winning 35-34.

► The Cardinals will play five-straight weeks before they receive their first and only bye week of the season.

**ACADEMIC NOTES**

► Five Cardinals are playing this season as graduate assistants. Linebackers **James Burgess** and **Keith Brown**, while offensive tackles **Aaron Epps** and **Kelby Johnson**, and kicker **John Wallace**.

• The team recorded a 2.83 grade-point average for the spring semester, the highest registered GPA in the program's history. Overall, the Cardinals had one perfect 4.0 GPA, and saw 36 student-athletes post a 3.0 or higher and 70 athletes over a 2.5 GPA. For the year, the Cardinals had 24 student-athletes receive their degrees.

► The Louisville and NC State will meet for the sixth time in school history, with the Cardinals owning a 4-1 series advantage, including a 30-18 win over the Wolfpack last season at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium.

► **Michael Dyer** ran for 173 yards and one score and **Will Gardner** threw for 203 yards and two scores. NC State quarterback **Jacoby Brissett** threw for 223 yards and a pair of scores in a losing effort.

► The Pack's lone victory in the series was a 31-24 decision in the 2011 Belk Bowl in Charlotte, N.C. Mike Glennon threw for 264 yards and David Amerson returned an interception 65 yards for a touchdown as the Pack held off a furious UofL comeback.

► Louisville's last trip to Carter-Finley Stadium came in 2007 when the Cardinals took home a 29-10 win. Louisville forced five Wolfpack turnovers and Brock Bolen rushed for a career-high 112 yards and a touchdown for the Cardinals.

**CARDS ON THE ROAD**

► Head coach Bobby Petrino hasn't lost many games during his career, and his teams have been especially tough on the road going 23-8 during his six years at Louisville.

► The Cardinals have currently won their last two road games, beating Boston College (38-19) and Notre Dame (31-28), and averaged 28.2 points per game last season away from home.

► Louisville has won 10 of its last 13 games on the road with Petrino on the sidelines, which dates back to the 2005 season.

**AT PAPA JOHN'S CARDINAL STADIUM**

► The Cardinals are 305-186-6 (.620) all-time at home and are 82-29 all-time at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium.

► Samford was the 49th different opponent to play at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium since it was built in 1998.

► The Cardinals, who have dropped their first two home games this season, have never lost three-straight games at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium.

► Head coach Bobby Petrino is 10-1 all-time against non-conference opponents at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium after the 45-3 win over Samford on Sept. 26.

► Two of the four losses at home under Bobby Petrino have been by a combined six points, dropping a 34-31 decision to Houston and 20-17 versus Clemson this season.

► Head coach Bobby Petrino is 28-4 all-time at home and have out-scored those opponents 1,353-602 (42-19 average). He won 22-straight games at home since a 37-7 loss to Memphis in 2003 to the 42-31 defeat against Florida State in 2014.

► Louisville is 3-2 in ACC play at home under Petrino.

**BOBBY PETRINO IN OCTOBER**

► Louisville is 13-5 in games played in October under Bobby Petrino dating back to 2003. Louisville went 2-2 last year in October, securing a 28-6 win over Syracuse and a 30-18 win over NC State. The Cardinals dropped a 23-17 decision to Clemson and a 42-31 loss to Florida State.

**ABOUT THE 2015 CARDINALS**

- ▶ The Cardinals return only 18 full or part-time starters return this season. The 2014 leaders in rushing, passing, field goals, tackles for loss and sacks all return.
- ▶ The program welcomed an incoming class of 24 that is comprised of 16 high school student-athletes, seven junior college transfers and one four-year transfer. Eight of the 24 newcomers enrolled in the program in January for spring workouts - CB **Jaire Alexander**, defensive lineman **Drew Bailey**, wide receivers **Jamari Staples**, **Alphonso Carter** and **Traveon Samuel**, tight end **Cole Hikutini**, offensive lineman **Khalil Hunter** and running back **Jeremy Smith**.
- ▶ Louisville's roster sports 47 upperclassmen and 64 underclassmen. Eleven players redshirted their first season on campus in 2014.
- ▶ Louisville's all-time record sits at 487-447-17 since the program started in 1912.

**STREAKS, STORYLINES, SIDELINES**

- ▶ The University of Louisville football team played its 97th season in 2015. The Cardinals' program dates to 1912.
- ▶ The Cardinals have played in a bowl game in a bowl game in five-straight seasons and 14 of the last 17 seasons.
- ▶ Louisville has won 74 games over the last nine years and 102 since 2003, the 24th-best total in the nation.
- ▶ The Cardinals have won at least nine games seven times in the last 12 years.
- ▶ Since 1985, UofL is 55-75-2 when committing three or more turnovers. They are 21-47-1 with four or more like they had vs. Houston on Sept. 12
- ▶ The Cardinals are in their 18th season in Papa John's Cardinal Stadium and 82-29 overall at home after the 45-3 win over Samford on Saturday.
- ▶ For the second-straight season, the Cardinals are leading the nation in interceptions. Louisville totaled 26 a year ago, which led the nation, and are once again tops in the country with nine. Six different players have recorded interceptions through the first four games this season.
- ▶ The Cardinals are +32 in turnover margin dating back to the 2012 season. Louisville is even through four games this season and were +17 in 2013.
- ▶ Through 67 games at Louisville, head coach Bobby Petrino's teams are 3-6 when rushing for fewer than 100 yards in a games, including 0-2 this season after rushing for 19 yards against Clemson on Sept. 17 and 70 against Houston on Sept. 12.
- ▶ The Cardinals enter the NC State game ranked seventh nationally with 10 turnovers gained through the first four games, totaling nine interceptions and one fumble. Louisville has totaled 40 turnovers over the last two seasons and have forced a turnover in 20-straight games dating back to 2013.
- ▶ The Cardinals are 23-2 at home when scoring 30 or more points under Petrino after securing a 45-3 win over Samford on Sept. 26.
- ▶ The senior class improved to 33-10 overall during their time with the Louisville program. They are looking to reach a bowl game for the fourth straight season. The only other senior classes in school history to play in four straight bowls were members of the 2001, 2002, 2003, 2004, 2005, 2006, 2013 and 2014 senior classes.
- ▶ Louisville is 51-11 when scoring 20 points or more under Bobby Petrino and 47-5 when leading after three quarters over his five seasons at UofL.
- ▶ Bobby Petrino's teams are 36-7 when scoring first and 50-6 when taking a lead into the locker room at halftime.
- ▶ The Cardinals are 25-4 under Bobby Petrino when a player rushes for over 100 yards in a game and 51-11 when totaling more than 300 yards of total offense.
- ▶ The Cardinals stopped a string of six-straight games of allowing 100-yard rusher, holding Samford to just 71 yards rushing on Sept. 26.

**STAFF RETURNS INTACT**

► Head coach Bobby Petrino will return his entire staff in 2015. Defensive coordinator Todd Grantham begins his second season as the defensive coordinator, and returns cornerbacks coach Terrell Buckley; defensive line coach L.D. Scott; inside linebackers coach Tony Grantham and safeties coach Greg Brown.

► On offense, offensive coordinator Garrick McGee remained with Petrino entering his second year, while running backs coach Kolby Smith; offensive line coach Chris Klenakis; wide receivers coach Lamar Thomas are all back.

**WHAT LOUISVILLE MUST REPLACE FROM 2014**

► The Cardinals must replace 14 players who were drafted or signed as NFL free agents. Louisville had a school record 10 players drafted in the seven rounds. The Cardinals must replace

► The Cardinals have to replace seven starters on defense in defensive end B.J. Dubose, outside linebacker Lorenzo Mauldin, outside linebacker Deiontrez Mount, safety Gerod Holliman, safety James Sample, cornerback Charles Gaines and cornerback Terrell Floyd.

► Louisville must replace five starters on offense in wide receiver DeVante Parker, tight end Gerald Christian, offensive linemen Jake Smith, John Miller and Jamon Brown.

**PETRINO VERSUS NON-CONFERENCE FOES**

► Louisville improved to 22-6 in non-conference games after the 45-3 win over Samford on Sept. 26. Louisville's only six on-conference losses under Bobby Petrino came against Houston, Auburn on Sept. 5, Georgia in the 2014 Belk Bowl, against Virginia Tech in the 2006 Gator Bowl, versus Miami (Fla.) during the 2004 season and against Miami (Ohio) in the 2003 GMAC Bowl.

► Of the 22 wins under Petrino against non-conference opponents, three have come against Top 25 teams, 16 have come by double-digits and Louisville has scored 40 or more points in nine of the 28 games.

► Petrino is 19-3 versus in regular-season games versus non-conference foes

**COHESION ON THE STAFF**

► For the first time since the 2012 and 2005 seasons, Louisville will have all 10 full-time coaches returning from one year to the next.

► Louisville has two coaches who played for the Cardinals in running backs coach **Kolby Smith** and defensive line coach **L.D. Scott**. Both coaches returned when head coach Bobby Petrino took over the program again in 2014. Smith played for the Cardinals from 2003-06, while Scott wore a UofL uniform from 2006-09.

**SCORING 30**

► Louisville has made scoring 30 points seem quite easy under Bobby Petrino. The squad has done so 47 times in the 67 games with head coach Bobby Petrino at the helm of the Cardinals. Over that span, the Cardinals are 43-4 when tallying more than 30 points in a game. Louisville went 7-1 last year when scoring better than 30 points in a game, but did fall 34-31 to Houston on Sept. 12 prior to the 45-3 win over Samford on Sept. 26.

► The Cardinals have lost only four games at home during his tenure at Louisville, but his last two losses have come when the Cards have scored more than 30 points. Louisville had won 22 straight games when scoring 30 or more points before losses to Florida State last season and Houston on Sept. 12. The Cardinals are 22-2 at home when scoring 30 or more points under Petrino.

► For comparison's sake, Louisville scored 30 or more points just 33 times over the seven years that Petrino wasn't coaching the Cardinals' program.

► Getting to 40 points is even more decisive for the Cardinals, who are 30-1 under Petrino in such games.

- ▶ Since 2008, Louisville is 19-19 in games decided by seven points or less, and the Cardinals have lost three games by a total of 13 points to start the season. It's marks the first time since 2007 that the Cardinals have dropped two straight games by 10 points or less when they fell 40-34 to Kentucky and 38-35 to Syracuse.
- ▶ Head coach Bobby Petrino is 7-10 at Louisville in games decided by seven points or less and 21-18 during his coaching career after the 20-17 loss to Clemson on Sept. 17.
- ▶ The Cardinals are 5-5 all-time in overtime games since the NCAA instituted the rule in 1996. Petrino is 0-2 in overtime games at Louisville.

**PETRINO 28-4 AT HOME**

- ▶ Head coach Bobby Petrino owns a 28-4 all-time record at home after the 45-3 win over Samford on Sept. 26.
- ▶ Petrino's teams had won 22 straight games at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium before losing to Florida State on Oct. 30, 2014.
- ▶ Of those 22 wins, the Cardinals have scored 60 or more points six times, 50-plus points three times and 40 points five times.
- ▶ During the previous 22-game home streak, the Cardinals had recorded wins of 20 or more points 17 times.
- ▶ The lowest output during this span came in the 20-10 win over Wake Forest on Sept. 27, 2014. The 17 points scored on Sept. 17 versus Clemson was the lowest output at home under Petrino.

**CARDS VERSUS RANKED OPPONENTS**

- ▶ The Cardinals faced their fifth ranked opponent in the last two seasons when they dropped a 20-17 decision to No. 9/11 Clemson in the 2015 ACC opener on Sept. 17.
- ▶ No. 2 Florida State was the highest-ranked team the Cardinals faced last season, also playing versus No. 13 Georgia and at No. 25 Clemson.
- ▶ Since 2006, despite falling to Georgia, the Cardinals are 10-8 against ranked opponents and have won five of the last 10 games versus nationally ranked opponents after falling to Clemson.
- ▶ The Cardinals last win over a top-10 opponent was a 33-23 victory over No. 4 Florida in the 2013 Sugar Bowl.
- ▶ The highest ranked teams the Cardinals have defeated at home was third-ranked Florida State in 2002 and West Virginia in 2006.
- ▶ Head coach Bobby Petrino is 4-11 at Louisville versus ranked opponents after the loss to Clemson.
- ▶ Cards are 7-11 all-time at home against ranked foes, but have four of the last six encounters.

**PETRINO THIRD ALL-TIME IN WINS WITH 51**

- ▶ Bobby Petrino, who is in his sixth season as head coach of the Cardinals, has spearheaded Louisville to success during his second stint with the Cardinals. With a 51-16 (.761) record, the 54-year-old is just the third coach in school history to win 50 or more games. Petrino and Charlie Strong are the only two coaches in school history to post a winning percentage over .700.
- ▶ Petrino has led Louisville to five consecutive bowl games for the second time in school history while recording two bowl wins.

- Louisville finished the 2014 with a successful 9-4 season, and that translated to a school-record performance in the 2015 NFL Draft. The Cardinals had 10 players drafted, which was the most since six were taken in 2005.
- The 10 selections were the second-most in the nation, with Florida State leading the way with 11. Florida was third with eight selections and Alabama and Miami were fourth with seven picks.

**JURICH ANNOUNCES PLANS TO EXPAND**

- ▶ The expand Papa John's Cardinal Stadium for the second time in the last decade, a development which will enclose the north end zone, create multiple new fan amenities, and enlarge and enhance the training facilities for the football team.
- ▶ About 10,000 additional seats will be added with the expansion, creating a unique look in the end zone structure for the stadium and increasing the total seating capacity to approximately 65,000. The expansion will include 1,000 modern club seats, 65 new premium loge level boxes, and 10 exclusive field level suites, while adding 25,000 distinct square feet of space. The design will provide a connection between the east and west sides of the stadium. The stadium seating will continue to feature all chairback seating for fans, providing the only university-owned and operated stadium in the nation with that element.
- ▶ The Howard Schnellenberger Football Complex, which currently sits in the north end zone, will undergo a major expansion and facelift. The team's weight room and conditioning center will double in size, creating a total of 20,000 square feet of work space for training, conditioning, and therapeutic support. A spacious player's lounge, improvements for coaches' offices and the team locker room, and expansive theatre-style meeting areas will also be among the enhancements for student-athlete development.
- ▶ The project will cost approximately \$55 million, which will be raised through sponsorships, private donations, ticket sales, and other possible sources.

ability in the 45-3 win over Samford at home. Jackson rushed 18 times for a school-record for rushing yards by a quarterback with 184 yards and a pair of scores. He scored on runs of 13 and 14 yards to give the Cardinals a 14-0 lead and became the 10th quarterback in UofL history to rush for two scores in a game. He is the first quarterback since Reggie Bonnafon ran for two against Notre Dame in 2014.

► Rushing for 184 yards last Saturday, Jackson bested Jim Wagoner's former school mark of 162 rushing yards by a quarterback, which he set in 1974 versus Drake.

► Jackson's rushing total versus Samford was the third highest total by an ACC quarterback in history bettered on by Clemson's Woodrow Dantzler (220 vs. Virginia in 2000) and BC's Tyler Murphy (191 vs. Southern Cal last year).

► Jackson also had 396 yards of total offense in the win, the most by a freshman in school history. He finished the game with 212 yards passing and 184 on the ground, which bested Kyle Bolin's total of 387 yards against Kentucky last season.

► In just four career games, Jackson needs just 92 yards to break Stefan LeFors' school record of 405 rushing yards by a quarterback and needs only 442 yards to break LeFors' career record of 756 yards. Jackson has totaled 314 yards and four scores, which is already tied for the seventh most in a season by a quarterback.

► In the season opener versus Auburn, Jackson ran for 106 yards, becoming only the fifth UofL player to rush for over 100 yards against a top 10 opponent, and the first since Michael Dyer ran for 134 yards in the loss to Florida State last year. Jackson's 106 yards was the fourth-most by a player against a top 10 opponent in school history. Calvin Prince, Ron Davenport and Lionel Gates were the others to rush for over 100 yards against top 10 foes.

► In his first start at quarterback in the loss to Houston, Jackson went 17-for-27 for 168 yards with two interceptions, but did throw a touchdown pass and ran for another. He scored his second rushing touchdown on a one-yard run and threw his first career touchdown pass to Ja'Quay Savage to put the Cardinals ahead 14-10 at the half.

► Jackson joined Teddy Bridgewater as the only Louisville quarterbacks in the last 34 years to rush for a touchdown in their first career starts at the position.

► Jackson is the first true freshman in school history to rush for over 100 yards in a game and the second player in school history to total 100 yards on the ground in his first game. Eric Shelton ran for 151 yards in Louisville's 40-24 win over Kentucky in 2003 — the debut for head coach Bobby Petrino.

► Jackson is the third UofL quarterback to rush and pass for 100 yards in a game, along with Wagoner and Russell, who each threw for over 100 yards.



## YOUNGSTERS LEADING THE WAY

► With injuries sidelining three key players (**James Quick**, **Jamari Staples** and **Alphonso Carter**), a number of freshmen have stepped in and have provided a spark to the offense. Of the top four receivers, three of them are freshmen. Tight end **Micky Crum**, and wide receivers **Traveon Samuel** are all tied for the team lead in receptions with 13. Crum, who recorded the first 100-yard receiving game of the year with a career-best 103 yards versus Houston, is second on the team with 161 total yards and leads the squad with a pair of touchdowns. Samuel has caught 13 passes for 135 yards. **Jaylen Smith** leads the team with 214 receiving yards and is averaging 16.5 yards per reception, including a team-best 55-yard reception versus Clemson on Sept. 17 and a 40-yarder versus Samford. He caught three passes for a career-best 77 yards against Clemson.

► Crum caught a career-best six passes and his first career touchdown reception against Houston on Sept. 12. — a 29-yarder from **Kyle Bolin** in the fourth quarter. Samuel also set a new career-best with six catches for 55 yards versus Houston, while Smith grabbed five passes for 60 yards.

► Another freshman, **DeVante Peete** has caught seven passes for 127 yards this season and is averaging 18.1 yards a reception, which is high on the team.

## QUICK RETURNS TO THE LINEUP

► After being sidelined late in the fourth quarter of the season-opening loss to Auburn, junior wide receiver **James Quick** returned to action versus Samford, and made an immediate impact in the 45-3 victory last Saturday. The product of Trinity High School caught three passes for 69 yards, including a 36-yard touchdown reception. Quick has caught seven passes for 97 yards and one score in two games this season.

## 10 NEW OFFENSIVE STARTERS

- ▶ The Cardinals lost a lot of talent on offense in wide receiver DeVante Parker, offensive linemen John Miller, Jamon Brown and Jake Smith, and running backs Dominique Brown and Michael Dyer.
- ▶ Louisville had five new offensive starters on Sept. 5 versus Auburn and added another versus Houston. True freshman **Lamar Jackson** started in the backfield, while wide receiver **JaQuay Savage**, tight end **Micky Crum** and offensive linemen **Pedro Sibiea** and **Geron Christian** also started upfront. Wide receiver **Traveon Samuel** was a new starter on offense versus Houston.
- ▶ In the win over Samford last Saturday, the Cardinals added four new offensive linemen in running back **Jeremy Smith**, offensive guard **Lukayus McNeil**, center **T.C. Klusman** and offensive tackle **Kelby Johnson**.

## SAMUEL DOING IT ALL

- ▶ True freshman **Traveon Samuel** is making a big impact on the football team in his first four collegiate games., and almost led an upset of No. 9 Clemson on Sept. 17. In the 20-17 loss to the Tigers, Samuel tied for the team lead with four receptions for 41 yards and also returned a kickoff 100 yards for a touchdown — the eighth player in school history to accomplish the feat.
- ▶ He leads the team with 348 all-purpose yards after his best game versus Clemson with 141 yards, including a 100-yard kickoff return. He is one of 12 players in the country with a return for a touchdown and ranks sixth in the country with a 36.0 return average.
- Samuel has caught at a pass in each of the first four games, including a career-high six passes for 55 yards in the 34-31 loss to Houston on Sept. 12. He also returned four kicks for 80 yards in the loss.

## THE LINE-UP

- ▶ The Cardinals lost over 115 career starts on the offensive line with the graduation of Jamon Brown, John Miller and Jake Smith, and have had to use eight different starters on the line through the first four games of 2015.
- ▶ True freshman **Geron Christian** and **Skylar Lacy** are the only two players who have started all four games, while **Tobijah Hughley**, **Pedro Sibiea** and **Aaron Epps** started the first three games. **T.C. Klusman**, **Lukayus McNeil** and **Kelby Johnson** were first-time starters last week against Samford.
- ▶ Hughley is the most the experienced player on the offensive line with 15 starts, while Epps has nine career starts and Lacy has five.

## NEED TO RUSH FOR 200

- ▶ It's no secret head coach Bobby Petrino wants his offense to be balanced, but he emphasizes his team's ability to run the football.
- ▶ Entering his sixth season as head coach of the Cardinals, Petrino's teams are an incredible 31-3 when his teams rush for over 200 yards in a game after rushing for 288 yards versus Samford on Sept. 26. It's the most rushing yards since UofL tallied 325 yards last year in the win over Murray State. The Cardinals were 6-1 in 2003 during Petrino's first season when rushing for over 200 yards in a game, with the only loss coming to Miami (Ohio) in the GMAC Bowl. The only other loss was a 41-38 loss at third-ranked in 2004.
- ▶ The Cardinals had won 20-straight games when they rushed for over 200 yards under Petrino before losing to Auburn on Sept. 5. The Cardinals won their last six games that season when rushing over 200 yards, and went 6-0 in 2005, 5-0 in 2006 and 3-0 last year.
- ▶ On the flip side, the Cardinals are 3-6 when they fail to rush for over 100 yards as a team, including 0-2 this season. Louisville was held to 70 yards in the loss to Houston on Sept. 12 and 19 yards versus Clemson.

## THIRD-DOWN STRUGGLES

- ▶ For the Cardinals to be successful on offense they need convert on third down and run the football, and Louisville hasn't been successful in either of those categories. Louisville ranks 67th in the nation in third-down conversion percentage, converting 22-of-55 attempts after a 7-of-14 performance versus Samford.
- ▶ In two losses to Clemson, the Cardinals have converted only 3-of-31 attempts on third down.
- ▶ In the last seven losses over the two seasons, the Cardinals have converted 27-of-97 attempts on third down, which is just 27.8 percent. The Cardinals were 1-of-11 against Florida State and 4-of-14 versus Virginia last season, as well as, the 1-for-17 versus Clemson last year.
- ▶ On the other hand, in the ten wins over that same span, the Cardinals have converted on 48 percent of their third-down attempts.

## THE MICK

- ▶ After redshirting last season, freshman tight end **Micky Crum** has made four starts to begin his playing career,

and continues to be extremely productive. Through four games, Crum has caught at least one pass in each of those games and is tied for the team with 13 receptions for 161 yards and a team-high two scores.

► Crum is averaging 12.4 yards per catch this season and leads the team with four receptions of 20 or more yards. He caught a 23-yard pass versus Clemson and a career-best 29-yard touchdown pass versus Houston on Sept. 12.

► Starting at tight end in the 34-31 loss to Houston, Crum registered his first 100-yard receiving game of his career with six catches for 103 yards and a 29-yard touchdown — the first of his career.

► Crum recorded his first 100-yard game in just his second career game becoming the fastest tight end in school history to register a 100-yard receiving game. Four-time All-Conference USA tight end Ronnie Ghent totaled 100 yards in his third game.

► Crum became the first freshman to record a 100-yard receiving game since Eli Rogers in 2011.

► A native of Hamilton, Ohio, Crum made his collegiate debut versus Auburn with two receptions for 19 yards in the 31-24 loss to the Tigers.

► Crum was just the 12th tight end in school history to record a 100-yard receiving game and the first since Josh Chichester recorded 100 yards in a game. Here is a list of tight ends with 100-yard receiving games: Jim Zamberlan

## A&amp;M TRANSFER MAKES IMPACT

► After catching one pass for two yards on Sept. 5 against Auburn, sophomore wide receiver **Ja'Quay Savage** made a big impact in the 34-31 loss to Houston on Sept. 12. The native of Tyrone, Ga., led the Cardinals with seven receptions for 79 yards and his first career touchdown with the Cardinals, but second of his career.

► Savage is second on the team in receptions with 12 for 135 yards through four games after he caught four passes for 71 yards in 2013 as a member of the Aggies.

► Making his second start, Savage registered his first touchdown right before the end of the half when **Lamar Jackson** connected with him on a six-yard reception to go ahead 14-10.

► Savage also recorded a career-long 28-yard reception, which is the second-longest pass reception of the season.

## CARDS START FOUR QUARTERBACKS IN FOUR GAMES

► Head coach Bobby Petrino has always been a believer in stability at the quarterback position, but the sixth-year coach has had four different starting quarterbacks in the last 17 games, including three different starters in the first four games this season. **Will Gardner**, **Reggie Bonnafon**, **Kyle Bolin** and **Lamar Jackson** have each started games over the last two seasons. Jackson made his team-leading second start in the 45-3 win over Samford.

► Bolin became the third different quarterback to start a game this season when he was under center to begin the game versus Clemson. Starting for the second time in his career. Bolin was 19-of-34 for 238 yards and two interceptions in the 20-17 loss to the Tigers. Jackson earned the start versus Houston and went 17-of-27 for 168 yards and a score in the 34-31 loss, while Bonnafon went 8-of-13 for 67 yards in the loss to Auburn to open the season.

► Louisville is the only school in the nation to start three different signal callers to start the season. Fresno State and Syracuse have had two different starting quarterbacks this season through three games.

## 500 YARDS IS A GOOD NUMBER

► The Cardinals' offense got back on track last Saturday in the win over Samford. Tallying 45 points, the most since a 44-40 win over Kentucky in the regular-season finale, the Cardinals were able to run the ball for a season-best 288 yards and throw for 274 yards. The Cardinals totaled a season-high 562 yards of total offense in the 45-3 win over the

Bulldogs. It was only the second time in the last 17 games that the Cardinals recorded over 500 yards of total offense — the last was against Murray State last season when the Cardinals totaled 603 yards of total offense.

- ▶ During Petrino's tenure with the Cardinals, his teams are 23-2 when his offense totals more than 500 yards of total offense on a game.

## RUNNING AWAY

- ▶ Freshman quarterback **Lamar Jackson** enters Saturday's contest with NC State having accomplished something that no other Louisville quarterback has done in the 97-year history of the program can boast; rushing for 100-plus yard performances more than once in a career. Jackson has done it twice in the first four games of his career. Jackson totaled 184 yards last Saturday versus Samford and totaled 106 yards versus Auburn.

- ▶ There have only been two 100-yard rushing games by quarterbacks in the history of the school before Jackson's pair of 100-yard games this season. Jackson has rushed for 314 yards through the first four games this season and is on pace rush for over 900 yards this season, which would shatter the school mark of 405 yards by Stefan LeFors in 2003.

- ▶ Jackson ranks 22nd in the country and is fourth in the ACC with a 6.68 yards per carry average this season after averaging 10.2 yards a carry last Saturday, including a career-long 73-run, which was the longest since a 77-yard run versus FIU in 2013.

## RADCLIFF RUNNING

- ▶ After a slow start, Radcliff finished 76 yards and two touchdowns on a team-high 17 carries in the loss to Auburn. He became just the 36th running back to total 1,000 career rushing yards after running for 36 yards on six carries in the win over Samford on Saturday.

- Radcliff is one of 12 players in school history with 16 career touchdowns and a 5.0 or better career rushing average per carry. He needs four more scores to tie for 10th all-time in school history for rushing touchdowns in a career. He is second on the team in rushing with 200 yards and four touchdowns.

- The product of Miami, Fla., led the team in rushing with 737 yards and also topped the team with 12 touchdowns last year. He recorded a team-leading three 100-yard rushing games with a career-best 136 yards on 17 carries and a touchdown versus Notre Dame. Through two games this season, Radcliff is second on the team with 119 yards and two scores and is tied for the team lead at 4.4 yards per carry.

- ▶ Radcliff averaged a team-high 5.1 yards per carry last season and has posted seven games of 50 yards or more, including a trio of 100-yard games. He rushed for 129 yards versus Wake Forest and 110 yards and two scores versus Syracuse. He also totaled 97 yards in the win over Murray State on Sept. 6.

- ▶ In his first two career starts last year in the wins over Wake Forest on Sept. 27 and Syracuse on Oct. 3. Radcliff responded with consecutive 100-yard games in leading the Cardinals to a pair of wins.

- ▶ Radcliff led the team with five rushes for 20 or more yards last season and totaled eight plays from scrimmage of over 20 yards. He added a 22-yard run versus Auburn on Saturday.

## CHRISTIAN BROTHERS

- ▶ The Louisville football program has always been a family affair, and that was evident by the Christian brothers. Former Cardinal tight end **Gerald Christian** transferred to Louisville in 2012 and went on to play two seasons with the Cardinals before being the last pick in the NFL Draft this year, being selected by the Arizona Cardinals as "Mr. Irrelevant." Christian caught 60 passes for 810 yards and nine scores during his brief time with the Cardinals.

- ▶ Christian's youngest brother, **Geron Christian**, signed with the Cardinals in February. The 320-pounder is the No. 7 rated tackle in the state of Florida and Christian was the first true freshman to start since Jamon Brown and John Miller started as rookies in 2011. He is one of only two linemen to start all four games for the Cardinals this season.

## FAST STARTERS

- ▶ Head coach Bobby Petrino likes to take the football on the opening drive to try and get his offense going on the first possession.

- ▶ In 67 games as the head coach of Louisville, the Cardinals have scored 10 or more first-quarter points 25 times after scoring 21 versus Samford on Sept. 26.

- ▶ During those 67 games, the Cardinals have scored first in 44 of those contests, including seven of the 13 games last season. This season, the Cardinals have trailed in three of the four games this season. Louisville jumped out to a 21-0 lead in the first quarter versus Samford.

- ▶ While at Louisville, Petrino's teams have out-scored the opposition 559-323 during the first quarter in the six years as head coach of the Cardinals.

- ▶ For the first time this season, the Cardinals scored on their opening drive after picking up a turnover and driving 17 yards for a touchdown.

## CONSECUTIVE GAMES SCORING STREAK

- ▶ Louisville is currently riding a consecutive game scoring streak that spans 190 games dating back to the 2000 season.
- ▶ The streak ranks as the third longest in the ACC behind Virginia Tech (260) and Georgia Tech (225).
- ▶ The last time the Cardinals were shut out was a 31-0 loss at Florida State in 2000.

## GET BACK ON TRACK

- ▶ Head coach Bobby Petrino is widely considered one of the best offensive minds in the nation, and he has had the statistics to back it up. However, last year, the offense was up and down, and this year has been just as disappointing. Louisville is ranked 70th in the country with an average of 408.5 yards per game. Last season, the Cardinals ranked 72nd at 394.7 yards per game, which was the lowest in his career.
- ▶ While at Louisville, Petrino's offense were never ranked out of the top 10 nationally. The Cardinals were ranked fifth in 2003 in his first season at Louisville. His 2004 unit led the country, while his 2005 team was ninth and was second in 2006.
- ▶ While at Arkansas from 2008-11, Petrino's lowest ranking was 49th in 2008. His offense was 30th in 2013 — his lone season at Western Kentucky.

## CARDS EXTEND INTERCEPTION STREAK

- ▶ The Cardinals recorded three interceptions in the win on Saturday versus Samford, marking the 17th-straight game that the Cardinals recorded an interception in a game, which currently leads the country.
- ▶ Louisville totaled at least one interception in all 13 games last year and have totaled 35 picks over the last two seasons, a span of 17 games.
- ▶ The three interceptions were tied for the most this season when they picked off Auburn three times in the season opener.
- ▶ The three interceptions versus Samford marked the 11th time in 15 games that the Cardinals registered at least two interceptions in a game and the fifth time with at least three.

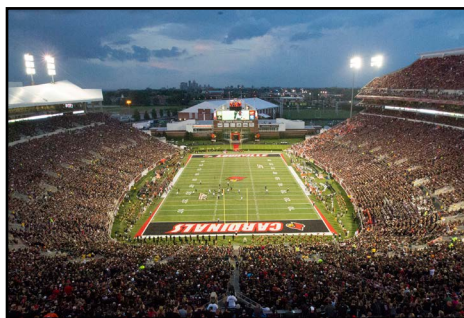
## SAFETIES LEAD THE WAY

- ▶ For the second straight season, the Cardinals were forced to replace their safeties. In May, the Cardinals lost Gerd Holliman and James Sample to the draft so the Cardinals searched for answers. They found their answers in junior **Josh Harvey-Clemons** and sophomore **Chucky Williams**. **Harvey-Clemons** has been advertised as one of the best safeties in the game after transferring from Georgia in 2014. After sitting out one year due to NCAA rules, Harvey-Clemons burst on the scene in a big way in the first four games of his career. He is tied for second on the team in tackles and ranks 34th nationally in tackles with 38. He is also tied for the team lead in interceptions after recording his first two career interceptions of his Louisville career and the third of his career in the 31-24 loss to Auburn on Sept. 5. I
- ▶ A native of Valdosta, Ga., has recorded nine or more tackles in three of the four games at Louisville. He totaled 14 in the opener versus Auburn, 10 against Houston and nine more in the loss to Clemson on Sept. 17.
- ▶ Williams has been just as productive, tying for the team lead in interceptions with two after notching one versus Samford on Saturday. Starting all four games to date, Williams has 16 tackles and is tied for the team lead with a pair of pass break-ups.

## TURNOVER STREAK CONTINUES

- ▶ The Cardinals have been one of the best in the country at forcing turnovers during the last couple of seasons. Louisville has forced 10 turnovers this season, turning over Auburn three times, Houston once, two more in the loss to Clemson on Sept. 17 and four more last Saturday against Samford.
- ▶ Safety **Josh Harvey-Clemons**, **Trumaine Washington** and **Chucky Williams** leads the team with a pair of in-

terceptions, while cornerbacks **Shaq Wiggins** and **Jaire Alexander** and linebacker **James Burgess** each have one.

► The Cardinals have recorded at least one turnover in the last 20 games dating back to the 2013 season. The last time Louisville didn't force a miscue came on Nov. 16, 2013, in a 20-13 win over Houston at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium.

## BURGESS OFF TO HIS BEST START

► Senior linebacker **James Burgess** has been a steady force in the middle of the defense for the last three seasons. Appearing in 39 games, including 34 starts, the native of Homestead, Fla., has 204 career tackles during that span after having a huge game versus Houston and eight more versus Clemson and Samford. He is third on the team with 34 tackles after the first four games of the season.

► He totaled his fourth double-digit tackle game against the Cougars, totaling a career-high 14 tackles. His previous high was 11 last season in a 23-17 loss to Clemson last season and also was credited with 10 stops versus Georgia in the Belk Bowl. He ranks sixth in the ACC in tackles with an average of 8.7 per game.

► Over the last two seasons, Burgess totaled 71 tackles in 2013 and 2014, finishing third on the team in tackles with 71. He recorded five or more tackles in seven games last season.

► He led the linebackers in tackles for loss with 10.0 and recorded three interceptions.

► Burgess owns seven career interceptions after recording a pick in the 20-17 loss to Clemson on Sept. 17.

## KELSEY LEADS ACC

► Junior linebacker **Keith Kelsey** has developed into a leader as was evident by being named one of the team's captains, and the Gainesville product is coming off the biggest game of his career. Kelsey totaled a career-high 15 tackles and registered two sacks and four tackles for loss in the 34-31 loss to Houston on Sept. 12. He followed that up with his second consecutive double-digit tackle game versus Clemson, recording 10 tackles in the 20-17 loss.

► Kelsey leads the team in tackles with 40 and ranks 19th in the nation and is tied for first in the ACC. He stands 16th nationally with two recovered fumbles after totaling one and returning it 20 yards in the win over Samford.

► In his first year as a starter in 2014, Kelsey, who started all 13 games last year, finished second on the team in tackles with 87, ranking 17th in the ACC. He totaled eight stops in the loss to Auburn last Saturday.

► Kelsey led the team in tackles twice last season, first against Virginia on Sept. 13 when he tallied a career-best 11 in a 23-21 loss to the Cavaliers. He led the Cardinals with nine stops at Syracuse on Oct. 3. His other double-digit tackle game came versus Kentucky, when he registered 10 stops in the 44-40 win over the Wildcats.

► Playing on the inside, Kelsey recorded six sacks, which was third-best on the team.

## TURNOVER TABLES

► Louisville finished first in the ACC in turnovers forced in 2014 with 30, also finishing +4 in turnover margin, which was sixth in the ACC.

► The 30 turnovers forced were the most since 2001 when that team forced 2001 miscues en route to an 11-2 record and a Conference USA title.

► The 30 turnovers forced represented an increase from 2013, when UoFL forced 27 turnovers.

► Louisville has forced multiple turnovers in 13 of the last 17 games dating back to last season, including a season-high four versus Samford last weekend.

► Louisville held a +5 turnover margin in its nine wins last season, but are -2 in the three losses, and were +2 in the notching its first victory of the season.

## NEW SECONDARY STEPS UP

• Heading into last season, the Cardinals had to replace both starting safeties in Calvin Pryor and Hakeem Smith, and were still able to excel. This year, the Cardinals have to replace the entire secondary as all four starters, who are on NFL rosters, need to be replaced in **Charles Gaines** and **Terrell Floyd** at cornerback and **James Sample** and **Gerod Holliman** at safety.

• The Cardinals lost a lot of production as 21 of the 26 interceptions are gone off the roster. Holliman led the nation with 14 and Sample totaled four.

• The Cardinals, who entered the year with zero career starts in the secondary, saw **Shaq Wiggins** and **Trumaine Washington** start at cornerback, while **Josh Harvey-Clemons** and **Chucky Williams** started at safety in each of the four games this season.

• The four players have totaled six interceptions in the first four games, with Harvey-Clemons, Williams and Washington each totaling a pair this season.

- ▶ Defense coordinator Todd Grantham had quite a first-year for the Cardinals in leading the team to a top 10 finish in total defense, holding its first seven opponents to less than 300 yards of total offense, going 5-2 in those contests.
- ▶ This year with a number of starters lost to the NFL Draft, the Cardinals haven't up the same numbers as the first three opponents have each totaled better than 300 yards of total offense. Louisville held Samford to 201 yards of total offense last Saturday, the lowest output for an opponent since holding Clemson to 229 yards of offense in a 23-17 loss to the Tigers.
- ▶ Opponents were also hurting the Cardinals running the football after the first three opponents recorded more than 190 yards in each game on the ground. Louisville held Samford to 71 yards in the win, the eighth time in 17 games that the Cards held an opponent to less than 100 yards on the ground.
- ▶ It was eighth time in 14 games that Grantham's defense has held the opposition to less than 200 yards through the air.

**CARDS REGISTER THREE SACKS; NUMBERS DOWN**

- ▶ Defense coordinator Todd Grantham likes to put pressure on the quarterback. Last year, the Cardinals finished 12th in the country in sacks averaging 3.15 per game. However, this season the Cardinals' sacks numbers have been down. Coming into Saturday's game versus Samford, the Cardinals totaled only three sacks in three games. Louisville doubled that number in the 45-3 win over Samford, totaling three sacks — two by **Sheldon Rankins** and another by teammate **DeAngelo Brown**.
- ▶ The Cardinals recorded their first two sacks of the season with a pair versus Houston, as linebacker **Keith Kelsey** totaled a career-high two sacks in the three-point loss to the Cougars.
- ▶ Coming into this season, the Cardinals had totaled 40 sacks last season and 43 in 2013. Louisville is on pace to register 18 sacks, which would be the lowest since the 2012 season when they totaled 22.

**CARDS LEAD THE COUNTRY**

- ▶ Defensive coordinator Todd Grantham has put his secondary in position to make plays despite having to replace the secondary over the last two seasons. After leading the country in interceptions last season with 26, the Cardinals are up to their old tricks again this season. After the first four games, the Cardinals are tied for first in the nation again with nine. Louisville is tied with Florida Atlantic, California and West Virginia for the lead nationally.

**FIELDS SOLID IN START WITH CARDINALS**

- ▶ The Cardinals added a big-play defender when they signed outside linebacker **DeVonte' Fields** in February. He made his first career start for the Cardinals in the loss to Auburn on Sept. 5. Fields totaled five tackles and 0.5 tackles for loss from his outside linebacker position as the Cardinals fell 31-24.
- ▶ The native of Fort Worth, Texas, had his best game as a Cardinal with six total tackles and one tackle for loss in the 34-31 defeat against Houston on Sept. 12 and tied his season-best with six stops and a tackle for loss against Clemson. Fields is tied for fifth on the team in tackles with 20 and is tied for the team lead with 4.0 tackles for loss through four games at outside linebacker.
- ▶ Fields attended Trinity Valley Community College where he was rated as the No. 2 JUCO recruit in the country, totaling 61 tackles and 6.5 sacks in one season at Trinity Valley.
- ▶ He started collegiate career at TCU, where he was selected as the AP Big 12 Defensive Player of the Year and Defensive Newcomer of the Year in 2012.
- ▶ A native of Fort Worth, Texas, Fields was voted by conference coaches as the Big 12 Defensive Freshman of the Year, where he posted 53 tackles, including 34 solo stops. He led the team with 18.5 tackles for loss and 10 sacks... was first in the Big 12 at 1.42 tackles for loss per game and third in the league with 0.77 sacks per game. His 10 sacks tied for the fourth-most in a season in TCU history and were the most by a freshman.

**RANKINS STANDS TOP 30 IN SACKS**

- ▶ Senior defensive end **Sheldon Rankins** is off to a fast start to his senior season after registering a season-high two sacks in the 45-3 win over Samford on Saturday. Through four games, Rankins is fourth on the team in tackles with 28 and leads the squad with 3.0 sacks. His 28 tackles is tops among defensive linemen in the country and is also tied for 30th in sacks with 0.75 per game.
- ▶ Rankins has 15 career sacks and needs two more to tie Carl Powell (1995-96) for tenth place on the school's all-time sacks list.
- ▶ Rankins had a solid first game versus Auburn, totaling seven tackles, just one off his career-best of eight, which he set last year versus FIU in a 34-3 win. He tied his career-high for tackles in the 34-31 loss to Houston when he tallied eight tackles and added eight more in the loss to Clemson. Rankins is fourth on the team and 11th in the ACC with 23 tackles after the first three games of the season.
- ▶ Rankins was fourth on the team in tackles with a career-high 53, the highest among the UofL defensive linemen. A starter in all 13 games, Rankins registered sacks in eight games, including 1.5 in a win at Boston College.



- ▶ The Covington, Ga., native, who was a third-team All-ACC selection last season, led the Cardinals in sacks (8.0) and tackles for loss (13.5) and was a disruptive force on the line.

#### SEVEN NEW STARTERS ON DEFENSE

- ▶ The Cardinals one of the best defensive teams in the nation last season, and had to replace at least six starters from a top 10 defense. In the 31-24 loss to Auburn on Sept. 5, the Cardinals featured six new starters on a defense that held Auburn to 327 yards of total offense, its fewest total since being held to 292 yards against Georgia last season.
- ▶ **Zykiesis Cannon**, **Josh Harvey-Clemons** and **Chucky Williams** were new starters at safety, while **Shaq Wiggins** and **Trumaine Washington** were first-time starters at cornerback. Outside linebackers **Keith Brown** and **DeVonte Fields** also were new starters on the 2015 defense.

#### FRESHMEN PROVIDE SPARK IN RETURN GAME; SAMUEL LEADS ACC

- ▶ Freshmen punt returner **Jaire Alexander** and kick returner **Traveon Samuel** are going to be special as returners as they progress during their careers. Receiving his first opportunity to return punts in the last two games, Alexander is averaging 12.3 yards a punt return. Alexander returned a punt 24 yards into Houston territory in the 34-31 loss on Sept. 12 and 17 yards in the loss to Clemson on Sept. 12.
- ▶ After four games, Samuel is second in the ACC in kick return average at 36.0 yards a return. In the 20-17 loss to Clemson on Sept. 17, Samuel tied a school record with a 100-yard kickoff return, becoming the eighth player and fifth freshman to register a 100-yard return in school history.

#### APPLEBY CONTINUES IMPROVEMENT

- ▶ Senior punter **Josh Appleby** hasn't had many opportunities to showcase his talents, but has had a coming out party during his senior season. After playing sparingly in his first three seasons, Appleby is having a great senior season. After four games, Appleby is 45th in the country and seventh in the ACC in punting average at 42.4.
- ▶ He shined in the 34-31 loss to Houston on Sept. 12. Appleby averaged 46.5 yards a punt, which was the best during his career. He booted a career-best 54 yard punt and placed a pair of punts inside the Houston 20-yard line.

#### WALLACE BOOTS SECOND 50-YARDER

- ▶ Senior kicker **John Wallace** showed his leg in the win of Samford last Saturday. Leading 21-3, Wallace kicked a 50-yard field goal in the second quarter of the xx-xx win over the Bulldogs. It was the second field goal of more than 50 yards in his career. He booted a career-long 51-yd field goal last year against Syracuse.
- ▶ Wallace is now 2-of-6 on field goals of more than 50 yards during his career.

#### WALLACE CLOSES IN

- ▶ Senior kicker **John Wallace** has had an outstanding career entering his final eight games of his career. He stands in second place all time with 320 career points, hitting 55 career field goals, which is just six shy of the school record held by Art Carmody.
- ▶ Wallace is 55-of-72 on field goal attempts for his career and is likely to break the school mark for career attempts. He needs just two attempts to break the school mark of 73 set by Art Carmody.
- ▶ Wallace has connected on 67-straight extra-point attempts, which is the third-best streak in school history.

**ATLANTA-** Will Muschamp's defense made a couple of huge plays early for No. 6 Auburn to offset three interceptions by Jeremy Johnson, and the Tigers held off Louisville and surprise quarterback Lamar Jackson for a 31-24 victory.

The Tigers' first touchdown in the season opener was set up by an interception. Justin Garrett returned a fumble 82 yards to make it 14-0.

Not that it was smooth sailing for the Tigers, who led 17-0 at halftime and seemed to be up comfortably 31-10 after a touchdown with just over 10 minutes remaining.

Jackson, a freshman who got the bulk of the playing time over three more experienced quarterbacks, led the Cardinals to a couple of late touchdowns that made Auburn sweat it out.

Bonnafeon played into the second quarter before giving way to Jackson for good. The freshman was 9 of 20 passing for 100 yards. He also led the Cardinals in rushing with 106 yards on 16 carries, including a 10-yard touchdown late in the third quarter for Louisville's first TD.

The biggest play came midway through the second quarter when Louisville was driving. Bonnafeon fumbled an attempted handoff, Garrett scooped it up at the 18, and off he went the other way for the touchdown, Muschamp running with him nearly stride for stride along the sideline.

Johnson was picked off twice in the first half by former Georgia safety Josh Harvey-Clemmons, who sat out last season after transferring to Louisville. The Auburn quarterback was also intercepted by Trumaine Washington in the third quarter, foolishly trying to force a pass into coverage. That led to Jackson's TD run that made it 24-10.

**LOUISVILLE-** Forget any possible quarterback controversy for the Louisville Cardinals, whose biggest concern right now is figuring out how to just win. The odds don't look great with No. 12 Clemson coming in Thursday, especially for an 0-2 team struggling on both sides of the ball after Saturday's 34-31 loss to Houston.

This latest loss ended with sophomore Kyle Bolin at quarterback after starting the fourth quarter in relief of struggling freshman Lamar Jackson. Bolin did his best in rallying the Cardinals twice with fourth-quarter scoring drives including his 29-yard scoring pass to Micky Crum with 6:25 remaining. Louisville rallied four times overall, but Bolin couldn't complete a fifth comeback as the Cardinals fell to 0-2 for the first time since 1998. Bolin was 10 of 18 passing for 157 yards and led a touchdown drive ending with Jeremy Smith's 4-yard run for a 24-20 lead early in the fourth.

Jackson was 17 of 27 for 168 yards and a TD in his first start but threw two deep interceptions, one of which led to Kyle Bullard's 21-yard field goal for Houston. The Cardinals were outgained 462-395 and recorded four turnovers, including two interceptions by Jackson. They allowed a game-tying 100-yard kickoff return touchdown to Brandon Wilson right after John Wallace's 36-yard field goal seemed to swing momentum their way.
