▶ After a two-game road trip, the No. 5 University of Louisville football team returns home for its ACC finale when it takes on Wake Forest at 7 p.m. The game will be broadcast by ESPN2. The Demon Deacons are 6-3 and 3-2 overall after a 27-20 win over Virginia.

▶ Saturday's match-up will be the fourth in the series, with the Cardinals winning the three previous encounters — including a 20-19 win in Winston-Salem last season.

▶ The Cardinals — 4-0 at home this season — will look for their ninth-straight win at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium dating back to last season. Louisville has dominated the opposition, out-scoring opponents 211-61 this season and have scored 50 or more points in three of the four home contests.

▶ In one of the most dominating performances of the season, the Cardinals' offense and defense combined to crush Boston College in a 52-7 lopsided win on the road. The offense scored 50 or more points for the sixth time this season on 515 yards of total offense, while the defense held the Eagles to 207 yards of total offense.

▶ Sophomore quarterback **Lamar Jackson** accounted for seven touchdowns (4 passing and 3 rushing) to extend his school record for touchdowns responsible for to a national-best 45. The talented signal caller rushed for 185 yards — racing for two touchdowns of over 50 yards — and threw for 231 yards and four scores — two going to senior wide receiver **James Quick**.

▶ Jackson has 19 rushing touchdowns this season — four short of tying the school record — and needs one to equal the ACC record for rushing touchdowns by a quarterback with 20, which would tie 2012 record set by Tevin Washington of Georgia Tech. With 45 touchdowns through nine games, Jackson is two touchdowns shy of tying DeShaun Watson's league record of 47 touchdowns responsible for.

▶ The Cardinals have dominated the first quarter this season as evident by out-scoring the opposition 129-17 in the first nine games. Louisville raced out to a 14-0 lead in the first six minutes and added another touchdown with 48 seconds remaining the opening quarter. The 21 points were the third time this year the Cards scored 21 or more points in the first period — also scoring 28 versus Charlotte on Sept. 1 and 28 against Syracuse on Sept. 9.

▶ The defense held Boston College to one touchdown and just 207 yards of total offense — allowing just 57 yards on the ground. It was the third-straight game the Cards have yielded less than 100 yards on the ground.

▶ In only its third year in the ACC, the Cardinals improved to 6-1 in league play and have won four-straight conference games since the loss to Clemson on Oct. 1. At 8-1 overall, the Cardinals are off to their best start since 2013. It's the third time head coach Bobby Petrino has guided his Louisville team to wins in eight of its first nine games. The 2004 and 2006 teams were both 8-1.

▶ After being one of the most penalized teams in the country, the Cardinals weren't penalized in the 52-7 win over Boston College. It marked the first time the Cards weren't whistled for a penalty since 1979.

▶ Entering the game fourth in the nation against the run and seventh in total defense, the Cardinals scored the Boston College defense — picking up 210 yards on the ground and 515 yards of total offense. It was the eighth time in nine games that the Cards amassed more than 500 yards of total offense this season.

▶ The Louisville offense picked up 515 yards on just 65 plays — averaging 7.9 yards per play in the game. Running just three fewer plays at 62, Boston College recorded just 207 yards of offense — a total of 3.3 yards a play. Completing just 12 passes, Jackson threw for 231 yards — averaging 9.13 yards a completion. The team passed for 305 yards and totaled a 16.1 average per completion.

▶ After giving up 201 yards on the ground in the 42-36 loss to No. 2 Clemson on Oct. 1, the Cardinals have allowed just 66.3 average over the last four games — holding the last three opponents to under 100 yards on the ground. Entering the game last weekend, Boston College totaled 170.1 yards per game on the ground, and were held to 57 yards on 47 carries — an average of 1.5 yards per attempt. The Cards are ranked seventh in rushing defense this season.

▶ Needing just four yards to become the first quarterback in school history to rush for over 1,000 yards in a season, Jackson blew past that by rushing for 185 yards and three touchdowns to give him 1,181 yards on the ground. He becomes the 14th different player to reach 1,000 yards in a season — the first since Bilal Powell ran for 1,405 yards in 2010.

▶ PLAYER QUICK NOTES**QUARTERBACKS**

- **LAMAR JACKSON** has thrown a touchdown pass in 12-straight games and tossed 26 this season.
- Leads the nation with 19 rushing touchdowns and is seventh with 1,181 rushing yards. He needs four yards to break Tyler Murphy's ACC record for rushing yards by a quarterback with 1,184.
- Recorded his fourth 300-yard passing game and posted his third contests with four or more touchdown passes.
- Averaging 315.7 yards passing per game in the last three contests.
- Has recorded six 100-yard rushing games and 11 for his career.

RUNNING BACKS

- **BRANDON RADCLIFF** ranks 10th in the nation with an average of 7.12 yards per carry.
- Second on the squad with three 100-yard rushing games and owns six in his career.
- Became the 14th player in school history to rush for over 2,000 yards (2,111) in his career.
- **JEREMY SMITH** is second on the team with seven rushing touchdowns
- Scampered for an 80-yard touchdown run versus Duke — the longest since Bilal Powell raced 85 yards for a TD in 2010.
- Rushed for a career-high 97 yards versus Duke.
- Carried a season-high 14 times for 51 yards versus NC State

WIDE RECEIVERS

- **JAMES QUICK** ranks 10th in the ACC at 17.2 yards a catch.
- Tied his career-high for receptions in a game in two of the last seven games — catching seven versus Florida State and Clemson.
- Owns two of the team's five 100-yard receiving games and is first on the team with 601 yards receiving.
- Has caught 116 passes for 1,864 yards in his career
- **JAMARI STAPLES** is second on the team with 557 receiving yards and is third with 30 receptions.
- Second on the team with a 18.6 yards per catch average.
- Posted his second 100-yard game this season and fourth of his career with 120 yards against Virginia.
- **JAYLEN SMITH** has caught a pass in 14-straight games and is tied for the lead with six TDs. He caught a 29-yard pass with 13 seconds left to win the game versus Virginia. He averages a team-best 23.6 yards per catch. He totaled his first career 100-yard game last week at Boston College with six receptions for 123 yards.

TIGHT ENDS

- **COLE HIKUTINI** has caught 27 passes — including a career-high seven versus Clemson — for 408 yards and four touchdowns in the last six games. Tied for first on the squad with a career-best 35 receptions for 500 yards.

OFFENSIVE LINE

- **GERON CHRISTIAN** will make his 23rd-straight start at offensive tackle when the Cards face Wake Forest on Saturday.

DEFENSIVE LINE

- **DEANGELO BROWN** ranks second on the squad with 6.5 tackles for loss.

LINEBACKERS

- **JAMES HEARNS** is first in the nation and first in the ACC with five forced fumbles.
- Totaled a career-high seven tackles versus Duke.
- Team leader with 6.0 sacks.

- **KEITH KELSEY** is looking to lead the team in tackles for the second-straight season.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

- One of the top punt returners — averaging 12.3 yards a return and one touchdown.

► Head coach Bobby Petrino will make his first appearance on Nov. 12 as head coach of the Cardinals, but did beat Tennessee 49-7 in 2011 as head coach of Arkansas.

► LAST TIME VERSUS WAKE FOREST**2015 • Louisville 20, Wake Forest 19**

Lamar Jackson threw two touchdown passes and Louisville forced five turnovers in the second half in a 20-19 victory over Wake Forest. Jackson was 19 of 26 for 207 yards with scoring throws covering 14 and 22 yards to Jamari Staples for the Cardinals. John Wolford was 6 of 19 for 131 yards with a 58-yard touchdown pass to Tabari Hines for the Demon Deacons (3-6, 1-5), but he threw three of his team's four second-half interceptions. John Wallace kicked field goals of 37 and 39 yards, the latter coming after Chucky Williams' serpentine interception return and giving Louisville a one-point lead with 1:25 left in the third. Wake Forest's Tylor Harris blocked Wallace's 36-yarder with 5:22 left and recovered at the Louisville 45, but Shaq Wiggins intercepted Wolford's deep pass for K.J. Brent with 3:31 to play. The Demon Deacons forced a punt with 1:42 remaining but lost 13 yards in four plays. Trevon Young stripped the ball from Kendall Hinton, Devonte' Fields recovered at the Wake Forest 5 and the Cardinals ran out the clock. Staples had 10 catches for 133 yards for the Cardinals, who gained 317 total yards and held the Demon Deacons to 266 - 40 yards on the ground - in winning their second straight and fourth in five games.

2014 • Louisville 20, Wake Forest 10

Brandon Radcliff ran for two touchdowns and 129 yards and the Louisville defense held firm in 20-10 win over Wake Forest. Listed fourth on the depth chart, Radcliff's first career 100-yard effort on 17 carries was much needed as Louisville overcame three lost fumbles and 11 penalties. The Cardinals defense kept Wake Forest to minus-22 yards rushing and had three takeaways, setting up both touchdowns. Louisville also had eight sacks. Wake Forest scored first on Mike Weaver's 43-yard field goal late in the first quarter and retook the lead at 10-7 with 8:32 remaining in the third quarter following nose tackle Tylor Harris's fumble recovery in the Louisville end zone for a touchdown. Radcliff's 16-yard score with less than 12 minutes left followed his 29-yard second-quarter touchdown. Fourth-quarter field goals of 31 and 34 yards from kicker John Wallace sealed the Louisville win in front of the crowd of 51,463.

NOTING THE BOSTON COLLEGE GAME

▶ The Cardinals are 8-1 overall for the first time since the 2013 season and the first time under Bobby Petrino since the 2006 campaign. It's the third 8-1 start at Louisville for Petrino (2016, 2006 and 2004).

▶ Louisville improved to 6-1 in the ACC for the first time in its third year in the league.

▶ The Cardinals scored a touchdown on their opening drive for the sixth time in nine games this season.

▶ Louisville, which has scored 129 first-quarter points this season, tallied 21 or more first-quarter points for the third time this season — tallying 28 versus Charlotte and Syracuse.

▶ The Cardinals totaled 515 yards of total offense — the eighth time in nine games this season UofL has gained 500 yards. It was the 11th straight game amassing over 400 yards.

▶ With the win over Boston College, head coach Bobby Petrino moved to 19-4 in the month of November as head coach of the Cardinals. Dating back to 2011 as head coach of Arkansas, the head coach has won 15 of the last 16 games during the calendar's 11th month.

▶ The Cardinals' 52 points marked their sixth game surpassing 50 points this season.

▶ With one interception versus Boston College, the Cards have recorded an interception in eight straight games.

▶ Boston College entered the game fourth in the nation in rushing defense, allowing 93.6 yards per game, and seventh in total defense (298.5 per game). The Cardinals had 127 rushing yards and 320 yards of total offense in the first half.

▶ Sophomore quarterback Lamar Jackson raced 69 yards on the opening drive — his second rush for a touchdown of over 60 yards. He had a 72-yard scoring run versus Syracuse on Sept. 9. It was his fifth run of over 60 yards in 21 career games.

▶ Jackson, who has accounted for 45 touchdowns this season, was responsible for five in the first half — the fourth time this season he accomplished such a feat. He had seven touchdowns for the game (3 rush, 4 pass) and has 68 touchdowns in 21 career games, ranking fifth at UofL and tied for 16th in ACC history.

▶ With three rushing touchdowns, Jackson is tied for third in school history for rushing touchdowns in a season and one short of the ACC record for a quarterback. He has 30 in his career, which is tied for third all-time in school history.

▶ Jackson became the first UofL quarterback to rush for 1,000 yards in a season and the first player to rush for 1,000 yards in a season since Bilal Powell ran for 1,405 yards in 2010. He has gained 1,181 yards on the ground this season, three short of the ACC record rushing total for a quarterback.

▶ Jackson rushed for 185 yards — the 11th 100-yard game of his career, which is tied with Frank Moreau for third all-time and the sixth this season, which is tied for fourth. It was Jackson's fourth game this season and sixth of his career with over 150 yards on the ground, both feats tied for second best at UofL in 150 yard rushing games for a season and career.

▶ Jackson has thrown at least one touchdown pass in 12-straight games. His four TD passes today marked the fourth time this season he has had three or more TD passes and the fifth of his career.

▶ Entering the game with 18 touchdown passes this season, Jackson has 22 for the season, which is ninth on the school's single-season list and 34 for his career, which ties him for eighth.

▶ With seven touchdowns, Jackson extends his school record for touchdowns responsible for to 45 this year and 68 for his career. His touchdowns this season are two short of the ACC record for a single season. The 68 career TDs is tied for 16th in ACC history.

▶ With 416 yards of total offense today, Jackson has 3,934 yards on the season, which ranks as the fourth-most at UofL for a single season. He is 114 yards short of the school-record total of 4,048 achieved by Teddy Bridgewater in 2013.

▶ Jackson's 2,141 rushing yards in two seasons is 12th in career rushing at UofL.

▶ Four of Jackson's first eight completions against BC went for touchdowns.

▶ WR **Jaylen Smith** recorded his first 100-yard game of his career by totaling a career-best six receptions for 123 yards and one touchdown. He has 20 receptions for 472 yards and is tied for the team lead with six touchdown receptions.

▶ LB **James Hearn**s forced a fumble in the second quarter to give him five this season, which ties him with Calvin Pryor (2012) for the second-most in a season.

▶ S **Chucky Williams** picked off his third pass of the season and the sixth of his career in the second quarter.

▶ K **Blanton Creque** booted a 26-yard field goal in the second quarter, connecting on his ninth-straight attempt, but later missed a 32-yard field to snap his streak. He has connected on 10-of-12 field goals this season.

▶ LB **Stacy Thomas** led the Cardinals Saturday with six tackles, his fifth game this season with six or more stops.

▶ LB **Isaac Stewart** produced his first sack of the season in the third quarter.

▶ WR **James Quick** scored two touchdowns last Saturday and is tied for the team lead with six touchdown receptions. His 14 career TDs is the 11th highest all-time for the Cardinals.

NEWS AND NOTES FROM THE CARDINAL SIDELINE

▶ Head coach Bobby Petrino's teams have always been great road teams at Louisville — owning a mark of 26-11 in true road games. Over the last two seasons, the Cards have won six of their last nine games after falling to Clemson on Oct. 1

▶ The Cards are tied with Oklahoma for first-nationally in road wins since 2011 by Power 5 teams with 24 wins — Alabama has 23 and Stanford have 23, while Florida State owns 22 and Ohio State, Clemson, TCU and Virginia Tech have 20.

▶ The Cardinals are averaging 30.0 points per game in the first half alone this season thanks in part to six games where Louisville has reached the 30-point mark before the break. The Cards scored 56 points at the break versus Charlotte; 44 against NC State; and 35 points on four occasions.

▶ Louisville tallied 21 first-quarter points last weekend in the win over Boston College, marking the third time this season of scoring 21 or more points in the opening stanza — also tallying 28 points versus Charlotte and Syracuse.

▶ Louisville has scored in double digits in 20 of the 36 quarters this season — totaling 10 or more points in all four quarters against Florida State, and three quarters versus Boston College, NC State and Clemson.

▶ Louisville has recorded touchdown drives of 70 or more yards 33 times already this season, including a season-long 94-yard drive in the 24-14 win over Duke on Oct. 14.

▶ Saturday's game will be the first weekend night ACC game in school history.

▶ The Cardinals lead the ACC in turnovers gained with 20 this season and have registered 46 over the last two season — recording at least one forced miscue in 19 of the last 22 games dating back to last season.

▶ The Cards continue to lead the nation in scoring offense (50.2) and total offense (593.4) through the first nine games of the season. Louisville has tallied 50 or more points in six games this season and eight contests of over 500 yards of total offense after registering 515 yards last weekend against Boston College.

▶ Defensively, the Cardinals have moved up to seventh in the country in rushing defense, yielding only 106.0 yards per game and are tied (Alabama, Ohio State and Michigan) for the national lead by allowing just three rushing touchdowns all season. Louisville hasn't permitted a touchdown on the ground in the last 18 quarters (since the second stanza versus Clemson.)

▶ Under head coach Bobby Petrino, the Cards are 7-0 when leading at the half and after three quarters this season, while also posting a 61-7 and 60-5 mark, respectively, throughout his UofL career.

▶ The Cards have only used a pair of true freshmen this season in linebacker **Malik Staples** and wide receiver **Seth Dawkins**. Staples has appeared on special teams, while Dawkins has caught five passes for 106 yards and one touchdown.

▶ The Cardinals have won eight-straight at home dating back to last season — the last loss a 20-17 decision to Clemson. With a win on Saturday over Wake Forest, the Cards will own a nine-game winning streak, which would be tied for the fifth-longest streak in school history.

▶ Louisville has 28 receiving touchdowns this season — among 10 different receivers — while also having three players with five or more this season for the first time since 2010 when Cameron Grahman, Josh Bellamy and Josh Chichester all finished the season with five receiving touchdowns apiece. This season, wide receivers **Jaylen Smith** and **James Quick** are tied for the team lead with six, while tight end **Cole Hikutini** has five this year.

▶ Junior linebacker **James Hearn**s leads the country after forcing his fifth fumble of the season, which leads the country in that category. His five forced fumbles are tied for the second-most in school history — equaling himself with Calvin Pryor in 2012.

▶ The Cards are the only school in the FBS averaging over 50 points per game at 50.2. Louisville has scored 50 or more points this season on six occasions, which is the most of any team in the country.

▶ The Cardinals scored a touchdown on their opening drive for the sixth time in nine games this season when they opened the game with a three-play, 75-yard drive that was capped with a **Lamar Jackson** 69-yard run.

▶ Wide receiver **Jaylen Smith** notched his first career 100-yard receiving game with a career-best six receptions for 123 yards and a 44-yard touchdown reception. Smith has caught 20 passes this year and six have gone for touchdowns this season. The Pascagoula, Miss., native ranks third in the country with a 23.6 yards per catch average. In just 22 career games, Smith has 49 receptions for 848 yards and seven scores, while averaging 17.3 yards a reception.

▶ The Cardinals have four receivers with 20 or more catches and three with 30 or more through nine games. Seniors **James Quick** and **Cole Hikutini** are tied for the team lead in receptions with 35, while senior **Jamari Staples** has added 30 and Smith chips in with 20. The team also has three receivers with over 500 yards — Quick with a team-best 601, while Staples has 557 and Hikutini has a career-high 500.

▶ With an eight-game home winning streak, the Cardinals' streak is tied for the sixth-longest in the country. Clemson has won 21 in a row, while Navy has a 14-game streak and Houston is third at 13 games. San Diego State has a 10-game home streak, while Alabama has won nine straight, and USC and Louisville have won eight

▶ Clemson was the second top-five opponent the Cards faced this season. It was first time in school history that the Cards have matched up against a pair of top-five foes in the same season — not too mention two times in three weeks. At this points, the Cardinals are scheduled to face their third-ranked foe on the year, when they travel to face Houston on Nov. 17.

▶ Louisville is 3-30-1 on the road against AP Top-25 teams, while head coach Bobby Petrino is 3-12 on the road versus ranked opponents — going 0-5 at Louisville and 3-7 at Arkansas.

▶ Louisville's last win over a Top-25 opponent on the road came in 2013 when the Cardinals dropped No. 23 Cincinnati. The Cardinals are 16-47-1 all-time versus ranked opponents in school history.

▶ Louisville is 20-1 at home when ranked No. 16 or higher in the AP poll, including 11-0 under Bobby Petrino. Three of Bobby Petrino's 11 wins came against ranked opponents.

WELCOME FRESHMEN

▶ A total of 17 freshmen have made their Cardinal debut this season.

▶ True Freshmen (2): Seth Dawkins and Malik Staples.

▶ Redshirt Freshmen (13): Mason King, Evan O'Hara, Trey Smith, Blanton Creque, Jonathan Greenard, Khane Pass, Chandler Jones, Tyler Haycraft, Nathan Scheler, G.G. Robinson, Damien Smith, Anthony Floyd, Ethan Horton.

▶ In addition, junior-college transfers Ronald Walker and Chris Williams have also made their debuts for the Cards this season.

NON-CONFERENCE NOTABLES

▶ Since 2003, head coach Bobby Petrino's first year at Louisville, to now, UofL has won 48 of its 61 (.787) regular-season non-conference games. Under Petrino, Louisville is 27-10 in those contests — including a 15-9 mark on the road.

▶ At home, the Cardinals have been victorious in 28 of the last 34 (.824) non-league games, while Petrino has guided his teams to wins in 12 of 13 non-conference games at home, with the lone loss coming last season in a 34-31 defeat to Houston.

▶ Louisville has finished the non-conference portion of its schedule undefeated six of the last 13 seasons.

▶ Dating back to the 2010 campaign, the Cardinals are 22-7 against non-conference opponents during the regular season and have won four-straight against non-conference foes.

▶ The Cardinals are 2-0 against non-league opponents this season — defeating Charlotte 70-14 to open the season on Sept. 1 and beating Marshall 59-28 on Sept. 24. The Cardinals have non-conference games remaining versus Houston on Nov. 17 and Kentucky on Nov. 26.

CARDS IN THE ACC

▶ The Cardinals are in their third full season in the ACC after officially joining the league in 2014. During their time in the league the Cardinals have an overall record of 16-7 — after identical 5-3 records in 2014 and 2015. This season, the Cards are off to a 6-1 record in the league — the best mark since joining the league.

▶ At home, the Cardinals have posted an 9-2 record and have won six-straight ACC games after the 54-13 victory over NC State on Oct. 22. The last loss at home in league play was a 20-17 defeat against Clemson on Sept. 17, 2015.

▶ The Cardinals are 7-5 on the road since in the ACC after the 52-7 win over Boston College last weekend. The Cards fell to Clemson on Oct. 1. The Cards have won five of their last eight league games away from home dating back to the 2015 season.

ALWAYS REMEMBER NOVEMBER

▶ While the Cardinals have posted 21 wins in the month of September under Petrino, the Cardinals' best winning percentage comes in November where the Cards have won 82.8 percent of their games — posting an 19-4 record after the 52-7 victory over Boston College last weekend

▶ Louisville has won seven of its last eight games in November dating back to last season. The only loss was a 45-34 decision last season at Pitt on Nov. 21.

▶ Over the course of his collegiate coaching career, Petrino owns a 28-7 record in his three coaching stops. Dating back to 2011, Petrino's teams have won 14 of the last 16 games. His teams are 7-1 in November since returning to the Cardinals in 2014.

CARDS OWN BIG HOME ADVANTAGE

▶ Louisville has rewarded the loyalty of its fans with great success at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium — especially under head coach Bobby Petrino. The Cardinals have won eight in a row at home dating back to last season (last loss was a 20-17 defeat to Clemson on Sept. 17, 2015).

▶ Head coach Bobby Petrino improved to 35-4 at home after the 54-13 win over NC State on Oct. 22.

▶ Of those 35 wins, the Cardinals have scored 60 or more points eight times, 50-plus points six times, and 40 points 20 times.

▶ Petrino is 23-3 all-time in conference games at home — 9-2 at home in ACC play and 14-1 in Conference USA and the BIG EAST.

▶ UofL is 89-29 (.754) at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium since the facility was constructed in 1998.

▶ Louisville's most recent perfect home season occurred in 2006 — going 6-0 that year.

▶ Louisville is 4-0 at home in 2016 and are 9-2 in ACC home games since joining the league in 2014.

▶ The Cardinals had a 20-game winning streak from Nov. 22, 2003 to Sept. 6, 2007 — until it was snapped on Sept. 22, 2007 in a 38-35 loss to Syracuse.

▶ Over the course of its history, Louisville is 312-186-6 (.624) all-time at home — including a 133-88-2 (.601) mark at Cardinal Stadium. Louisville has played its games at six different stadiums over the course of its history (Maxwell Field, Parkway Field, Manual Stadium, Cardinal Stadium and Papa John's Cardinal Stadium).

PETRINO VS. ACC TEAMS

- ▶ Bobby Petrino is 24-10 overall against ACC teams since he became the Louisville head coach in 2003.
- ▶ The Louisville head coach has faced 12 different ACC teams since he became head coach in 2003 after defeating NC State 54-13 on Oct. 22. Petrino has a winning record against every ACC team with the exception of Clemson, Virginia Tech and Florida State. Six of his 10 losses against ACC teams have been against those three schools. He is 0-3 against Clemson, 1-2 against Florida State and 0-1 against Virginia Tech.
- ▶ Petrino is 23-5 vs. the combinations of Boston College, 3-0; Duke 1-0; NC State, 3-0; North Carolina, 1-0; Pitt, 2-1; Syracuse, 6-0; Miami, 2-1; Virginia, 2-1; and Wake Forest, 3-0.

LOUISVILLE TO PLAY ALABAMA IN 2018

- ▶ The University of Louisville and Alabama will open the 2018 season in the Orlando Citrus Bowl as part of an annual series of Orlando Kickoff games.
- ▶ The 2018 match-up, announced Aug. 6, 2015, is the second publicized game in a multi-year agreement between Florida Citrus Sports (FCSports) and ESPN Events, a division of ESPN, to host major neutral-site, regular-season college football games in the Orlando Citrus Bowl. The Orlando Citrus Bowl is already home to the Buffalo Wild Wings Citrus Bowl, Russell Athletic Bowl, and Florida Blue Florida Classic games. Neither school has played in the stadium since its near-complete reconstruction a year ago.
- ▶ The Cardinals and Crimson Tide have met three previous times on the gridiron, with Alabama holding a 2-1 series advantage. In the last meeting in 1991, the Cardinals defeated the No. 25 Crimson Tide 34-7 in the 1991 Fiesta Bowl.

CARDINALS CONTINUE SCORING STREAK

- ▶ Louisville has tallied points in 208 consecutive games dating back to the 2000 season.
- ▶ The scoring streak has endured 124 conference games, including 89 true road games and 15 neutral-site contests.
- ▶ In addition, Louisville has not been held scoreless in 177 consecutive home games dating back to 1987— a 25-0 loss to Cincinnati.

ON THE ROSTER

- ▶ Louisville welcomes back 17 starters from last year's team that went 8-5 overall, won eight of its last 10 games, and claimed a win over Texas A&M in the Music City Bowl. UofL's starting returnees consist of 10 on offense and seven on defense.
- ▶ Of the 41 players who started at least one game for Louisville in 2015, 30 return this season.
- ▶ With 44 total freshmen (27 true freshmen, 17 redshirt freshmen) among 113 players, freshmen represent 38.9 percent of Louisville's 2016 roster. The junior class is the largest on the team with 28 members, while there are 22 seniors on the squad.

FOR STARTERS

- ▶ In 2016, the Cardinals have 34 players who have one game or more of starting experience.
- ▶ Tops on the list are linebacker **Keith Kelsey** (34), center **Tobijah Hughley** (31) and wide receiver **James Quick** (27).
- ▶ Nine Cardinals earned their first career starts during the 2016 season: DT **Drew Bailey**, WR **Seth Dawkins**, LB **Jonathan Greenard**, LB **James Hearn**, OL **Khalil Hunter**, DT **De'Asian Richardson**, S **Dee Smith**, LB **Stacy Thomas** and RB **Malik Williams**.

CARDINALS REACH 500

- ▶ The 2016 season marks the 98th season of intercollegiate football at the University of Louisville, dating back to 1912.
- ▶ It is the 71st-consecutive year in which Louisville has competed on the gridiron. The University did not field a team from 1943-45. Louisville is 53 games over the .500 mark with an all-time record of 503-450-17. The Cardinals secured their 500th career win with the 24-14 victory over Duke.

ON AN ACC ROLL

- ▶ The Cardinals have won four-straight league games since falling to Clemson 32-26 on Oct. 1. Since dropping a heart-breaker to the Tigers, the Cardinals have put up huge numbers on each side of the football in racing out to an 8-1 record.
- ▶ On offense, the Cardinals are averaging 40.5 points per game — putting up 30 or more points in three of the four contests. The Cardinals are out-scoring their opponents 47-0 in the second quarter of the last four contests.
- ▶ The running game has been solid, averaging 202.0 yards after rushing for 210 yards last week versus Boston College and 288 yards versus Duke on Oct. 14.
 - ▶ Through the air is where the Cards have been putting up big numbers, averaging 309.2 yards per game and scoring 12 touchdowns — eight coming in the last two games.
 - ▶ On defense, the Cardinals have stifled the opposition— holding them to less than 14 points in three of the four games and an average of 14.8 points per game. Virginia scored 25 in the Cards' 32-25 win over the Cavaliers on Oct. 29, but the other three opponents have been held to 11.3 points per game.
 - ▶ The Cards have been dominant against the run — holding three of the four opponents to less than 100 yards. After Duke rushed for 110 yards, the last three opponents have combined to average just 51.7 yards per game.
 - ▶ The Cardinals held the Wolfpack to 54 total yards of total offense in the first half — their lowest output of the season. NC State also totaled -1 yards in the first quarter.
 - ▶ Allowing 322 yards of total offense, the Cardinals are holding opponents to an average of 254.5 yards per game in the

last four games. Duke was held to 239 yards of offense and Boston College could muster just 207 yards in its 52-7 loss.

DRAMA KINGS

- Since 2008, Louisville is 24-20 in games decided by seven points or less after the 32-25 win over Virginia on Oct. 29, 2016.
- Head coach Bobby Petrino is 13-11 at Louisville in games decided by seven points or less and 26-19 during his coaching career after the loss to the Tigers.
- The Cardinals are 5-5 all-time in overtime games since the NCAA instituted the rule in 1996. Petrino is 0-2 in overtime games at Louisville.

CARDS LOOKING FOR THIRD SEVEN WIN CONFERENCE SEASON

- With a win in the ACC regular-season finale against Wake Forest, the Cards are looking for just their third season with seven or more conference wins. If the Cards win on Saturday, they will end their third ACC campaign at 7-1 — the top mark in their new league.
- On two other occasions throughout their history, the Cards had only two seasons with seven or more league wins. The 2013 squad, which finished 12-1 overall, finished the year at 7-1 in the American Athletic Conference. The only other season came in 2004 when head coach Bobby Petrino's 2004 squad won Conference USA with a perfect 8-0 record.

SIX COLLEGE GRADUATES ON THE ROSTER

- Six current Louisville players have already earned their undergraduate degree at the university. Fullback **Lamar Atkins**, defensive tackle **DeAngelo Brown**, long snapper **Colin Holba**, center **Tobijah Hughley**, placekicker **Anthony George** and running back **Brandon Radcliff** graduated in spring 2015 and are seniors on the 2015 football squad.
- Atkins earned his degree in sport administration, while Brown earned his degree in health and human performance and Holba graduated with a degree in finance. Hughley, an all-ACC academic selection, was a sports administration graduate, while George owns a biology degree and Radcliff picked up a degree in communications.

NFL TALENT

- Former defensive end Sheldon Rankins was selected with the No. 12 overall pick in the first round of the 2016 National Football League Draft by the New Orleans Saints. Rankins was the Cardinals' fifth first-round pick over the last three drafts and 13th first-round selection in school history. In 2014, safety Calvin Pryor, outside linebacker Marcus Smith, and quarterback Teddy Bridgewater all went in round one, while wide receiver DeVante Parker went in the opening round last season.
- Under the watch of head coach Bobby Petrino, the Cardinals have placed three players in the first round: Rankins, Parker, and Amobi Okoye. Former center Eric Wood was a first-round selection in 2008, but played for Petrino from 2004-07. Petrino has coached 32 Cardinals who were selected in the NFL Draft under his guidance.
- The Cardinals are just one of seven teams who have had a first-round pick for the last three seasons. Alabama leads the way with a first-rounder for the last eight seasons, while Texas A&M has one in the last year years. Clemson, Florida State and Florida have a first-round pick in four-straight years, and Louisville and Michigan State have had first-round selections over the last three seasons.

GROUP OF 21 SENIORS PROVIDE LEADERSHIP FOR LOUISVILLE

- Louisville has the benefit of a 21-member senior class. It is the second-largest largest senior class that Bobby Petrino has had since he became head coach three years ago. 11 of those seniors are listed as starters on the 2016 preseason depth chart.
- FB **Lamar Atkins**, DT **DeAngelo Brown**, OL **Matt Cohen**, LB **Devonte' Fields**, RB **Malin Jones**, K **Anthony George**, S **Josh Harvey-Clemons**, TE **Cole Hikutini**, LS **Colin Holba**, OL **Tobijah Hughley**, OL **Khalil Hunter**, LB **Keith Kelsey**, OL **Kiola Mahoni**, DB **Marcus Mays**, WR **Gio Pascascio**, WR **James Quick**, RB **Brandon Radcliff**, WR **Jamari Staples**, S **John Stitch**, WR **Pat Thomas**, TE **Keith Towbridge**.

CARDS ON STRONG 16-GAME RUN

- Louisville's 8-1 start ties its best nine-game record in the past four years. Louisville also opened 8-1 in 2006, 2004, 2001, 1972 and 1957. The Cards will look for its first 9-1 start since 2013 when they finished the season at 12-1.
- Combined with a 6-1 finish to the 2015 campaign, the Cardinals have won 14 of their past 16 games. After it's 2-4 start a year ago, the Cards responded by winning six of the last seven games and have won eight of nine to open the 2016 season.
- Louisville's 14-2 record over a 16-game span is the fourth-best nationally with Michigan, Ohio State, and West Michigan. Alabama is a perfect 16-0 over that span, while fellow ACC member Clemson and San Diego State are 15-1 since 2015.

▶ Louisville saw DE Sheldon Rankins drafted in the first round with the No. 12 pick overall by the New Orleans Saints — the fifth first-rounder for the Cards since 2014. The Cards are one of seven teams that have had a first round selection over the last three seasons. Here is how it breaks down: Alabama (8), Texas A&M (6), Clemson (4), Florida State (4), Florida (4), Louisville (3), and Michigan State (3).

YOUR 2016 LOUISVILLE TEAM CAPTAINS

▶ As selected by their teammates, the captains for the 2016 Cardinals are senior center **Tobijah Hughley**, senior running back **Brandon Radcliff**, sophomore quarterback **Lamar Jackson**, linebacker **Keith Kelsey**, and senior defensive tackle **DeAngelo Brown**, and sophomore wide receiver Devante Peete was tabbed a special teams captain.

LOUISVILLE A TOUGH OUT

▶ Over the last three seasons, the Cardinals have only dropped 10 games — losing four in 2014, five in 2015 and just one this season. Despite its 0-3 start last season, the Cardinals were competitive in each of the losses, losing all three games by a total of 13 points — falling 31-24 to Auburn, 34-31 to Houston and 20-17 versus Clemson.

▶ Since 2014, when head coach Bobby Petrino was re-hired, six of those 10 losses came by a touchdown or less, with only two losses by more than 20 points (41-21 last season to Florida State and 37-14 against Georgia in the 2014 Belk Bowl). Louisville has two losses by 12 or fewer points to Florida State in 2014 and 11 to Pitt last season.

▶ Louisville's lone loss this season was a 42-36 decision at Clemson, but the Cardinals were stopped inside the 15-yard line on the final possession. In 2014, the Cards dropped a 23-17 game to the Tigers with the ball on the two-yard line on fourth down.

OUT-OF-THE LOCKERROOM DOMINANCE

▶ Not only are the Cardinals getting off to a fast start in the first quarter, out-scoring the opposition 129-27, but they are also great coming out of the locker room at the half. Louisville is dominating opponents 89-41 in the third quarter.

▶ The Cardinals have scored on five of the nine second-half drives coming out of the locker room, including on Oct. 14 when Jeremy Smith went 80 yards for a touchdown to put the Cards up 17-7 in the win over Duke on Oct. 14.

▶ The Cardinals have held eight of the nine opponents without a touchdown on the opening drive of the second half — after Virginia went 69 yards on its first possession of the second half.

CARDS IN THE TOP FIVE

▶ The Cardinals remained in the top five in Associated Poll after the win over Boston College on Nov. 5 — their 11th-straight week in the rankings. It marks the fifth week this season that the Cardinals sit in the top five of a major poll. Louisville was as high as third this season before losing to Clemson on Oct. 1.

▶ This will be only the eighth week in school history that the Cards sit in the top five of a

major poll — and the first time since Sept. 18 and Sept. 25 this season when Louisville was ranked No. 3 in the Associated Press Poll.

▶ The last time the Cards were No. 5 came on Oct. 30, 2006 when Louisville moved to 7-0 after a 28-13 win over Syracuse.

▶ The Cards own a 7-2 mark when ranked as a top-five team — defeating Marshall this season and West Virginia in 2003, while losing to Clemson on Oct. 1 and dropping a 28-25 decision to Rutgers in 2006.

ANOTHER EIGHT-WIN SEASON

▶ Head coach Bobby Petrino has averaged 9.4 wins during his seven seasons at Louisville — capturing eight or more wins in each of those seasons on the sidelines.

▶ With the win over Boston College last weekend to move to 8-1 — it marked the seventh-straight season of at least eight wins as head coach of the Cardinals and the sixth in a row dating back to 2009. The only time his teams haven't won at least eight games came in 2008 — going 5-7 in his first season at Arkansas.

▶ The Cardinals picked up another big win with a 52-7 win over Boston College on Nov. 5. It was the 24th win of Bobby Petrino's 66 career victories that came with a margin of 30 or more points.

▶ The average margin of victory in those wins is 43.3 points.

▶ Petrino's teams are 24-2 in games decided by 28 or more points.

▶ The Cardinals are 12-0 under Petrino when scoring 60 or more points.

▶ Under head coach Bobby Petrino, the Cardinals are 37-1 when scoring 40 or more points. The only loss came in 2005 when the Cardinals fell 46-44 in triple overtime at West Virginia.

▶ Since 2000, the Cardinals are 59-1 when hitting the 40-point plateau.

SCORING AT RECORD PACE

▶ In producing eight wins in the first nine games, the Cardinals are producing points at a record pace. Louisville leads the nation in scoring at 50.2 points per game — scoring over 60 points in three of the nine games this season and over 36 in seven contests. The NCAA record for scoring per game was 56.0 by Army in 1944.

▶ The Cardinals have scored 452 points — the fifth most points in a season by a UofL team — with at least four games remaining. The Cardinals are 146 points shy of breaking the school record for points in a season. The 2004 team — coached by Bobby Petrino — holds the school record for points with 597.

▶ Staying on their current pace, the Cardinals are on track to score 652 points, which would shatter the school record. In nine games this year, Louisville has already tallied more points than the 374 points scored in 2015. Louisville averaged 28.7 points per game a year ago.

▶ The Cardinals have scored 59 touchdowns this year, which is tied with Washington for the most touchdowns scored this season. Louisville is one of 11 schools to score 50 or more touchdowns this year.

▶ The Cardinals' scoring average is up 21.5 points from last year's team that averaged 28.7 points for the entire season. No Louisville team has averaged 50.0 per game — the closest being 49.8 in 2004 under head coach Bobby Petrino. Only three teams have averaged more than 40 points in a season.

ON RECORD RUSHING PACE

▶ With 2,354 yards rushing through nine games, the Cardinals are on pace to shatter the school record for rushing yards in a season. The Cards need 652 yards to break the school mark of 3,005 yards set during the 2004 season — the second-year for head coach Bobby Petrino. The 2016 total thus far is just 219 yards from moving into fifth place in the record books at Louisville.

▶ The Cardinals' early-season rushing success has already resulted in nine individual 100-yard rushing efforts this season in nine games this season — one short of ten set by the 1957 team. Under coach Bobby Petrino, the Cardinals are 36-6 when a Cardinal hits the century mark. In addition, the Cardinals hold a 35-0 record when the team rushes for 100 or more yards and holds the opponent below 100 yards on the ground.

▶ For the 18th time in school history, the Cardinals produced multiple 100-yard rushers in the same games as **Lamar Jackson** (146) and **Brandon Radcliff** (118) versus Florida State on Sept. 17. It marked Jackson's eighth 100-yard contest and Radcliff's seventh.

▶ The Cards are 10th nationally in rushing yards per game at 261.5 after totaling 210 yards on the ground in the win over Boston College — the seventh time this season that the Cards totaled 200 or more yards in a game.

▶ Louisville totaled 414 yards on the ground on Sept. 9 in a 63-28 win over Syracuse — the sixth-highest single-game total in school history and the second 400-yard game under head coach Bobby Petrino.

▶ The Cardinals had rushed for over 270 yards in eight-straight games for the first time in school history and over 200 yards in eight-consecutive contests for the first time since 2004, before the streak was snapped against NC State.

▶ The Cardinals are one of just 15 teams averaging better than 250 yards on the ground this season. After totaling an average of 305.6 yards on the ground in the first six games, the Cards have been held to 173.3 yards in the last three wins.

- ▶ Louisville has rushed for 30 touchdowns, which is tied for the fourth-most nationally. The Cards need 17 more rushing scores to tie the school record of 47 rushing touchdowns in a season, which was set in 2004 when the Cards ended the year at 12-1.
- ▶ The Cardinals are third in the country with 83 rushes of 10 or more yards and second with 18 runs of over 30 yards.
- ▶ The Cardinals are ranked third in the nation with an average of 6.41 yards per carry., while **Lamar Jackson** is eighth with his 7.3 yards an attempt.

GAME-WINNING DRIVE FIRST SINCE 2012

- ▶ Trailing 25-24 with 1:57 left in the game, the Cardinals took the play and went eight plays and 75 yards for the game-winning touchdown — a 29-yard pass from quarterback **Lamar Jackson** to **Jaylen Smith** with 13 seconds remaining in the contest.
- ▶ The touchdown on the final drive was the first to win the game since 2012 when Teddy Bridgewater directed the same type of drive — an 8-play, 75-yard drive that took 10 seconds longer — which ended with a Bridgewater 11-yard pass to Eli Rogers with 1:35 to play in a 27-25 victory over USF.
- ▶ The win in the final 20 seconds was the third in school history — Oct. 15, 1988, when the Cards beat Virginia 30-28 on a Ron Bell 34-yard field goal at 0:10 and Oct. 16, 1999, when UofL won at Memphis 32-31 on an 18-yard pass from Chris Redman to Lavell Boyd at 0:06.

RUSHING TOUCHDOWNS IN 32 OF 35 GAMES

- ▶ Louisville's rushing game had produced a touchdown in 12 consecutive games dating back to 2015 before being shutout versus Virginia on Oct. 29. The last time the Cards were held without a rushing touchdown came on Oct. 30, 2015 — a 20-19 win over Wake Forest on the road.
- ▶ The Cardinals have now scored a rushing TD in 32 of 35 games coached by Bobby Petrino since his return in 2014.

RED-ZONE OFFENSE

- ▶ The Cardinals have been one of the top offenses in the nation this season, and that has resulted in great numbers inside the red zone. Louisville is second in the country with 38 red-



- ▶ zone touchdowns this season — one fewer than Michigan, which leads the nation with 39.
- ▶ Louisville has converted its last 16 of 17 attempts in the red-zone — 10 of which have resulted in touchdowns and six field goals.
- ▶ The Cardinals' 57 attempts inside the opponents 20-yard line is also the most in the country. Louisville averages 6.3 attempts per game in the red zone.

JACKSON 28TH PLAYER WITH 2,000 YARDS PASSING AND 1,000 RUSHING

- ▶ Sophomore quarterback **Lamar Jackson** is putting together a real special season statistically. With 185 yards rushing, Jackson became the first Louisville quarterback in school history to rush for 1,000 yards when he finished with 1,181 yards — just four yards short of breaking Tyler Murphy's (Boston College) record for rushing yards in a season with 1,184.
- ▶ Jackson became the 15th player (18th time overall) to rush for 1,000 yards in a season at Louisville. With 185 yards in the win over Boston College, it was Jackson's 11th 100-yard game of his career, which is tied with Frank Moreau for third all-time and the sixth this season, which is tied for fourth. It was Jackson's fourth game this season and sixth of his career with over 150 yards on the ground, both feats tied for second best at UofL in 150 yard rushing games for a season and career.
- ▶ With 2,753 yards passing and 1,181 yards on the ground, Jackson is the 28th player in NCAA history to pass for over 2,000 and rush for over 1,000 yards in the same season — the first since Clemson's Deshaun Watson and Houston's Greg Ward accomplished it last season.

JACKSON NEARS RUSHING RECORDS

- ▶ Sophomore quarterback **Lamar Jackson** is closing in on a pair of records for the Car-

dinals with four games remaining. With 1,181 rushing yards, which is fifth nationally, the Pompano Beach native needs 249 yards to break the school record of 1,429 yards rushing set by Howard Stevens in 1971. Jackson is on pace to run for 1,705 yards this season, which would shatter the school mark that's lasted for 45 seasons.

- ▶ With 19 rushing scores, Jackson needs two more to break the ACC record of rushing touchdowns by a quarterback of 20, held by Georgia Tech's Tevin Washington in 2012. However, Jackson is eight shy of the league mark for rushing touchdowns, which is 26 by James Conner of Pitt in 2014. Jackson leads the nation with those 19 rushing touchdowns — two ahead of Western Kentucky's Anthony Wales.

- ▶ The NCAA record for rushing touchdowns by a quarterback is 31 by Navy's Keenan Reynolds in 2013.
- ▶ Jackson owns six 100-yard rushing games this season and has 11 in his career — tying him for third on the school's all-time list and needs four to tie the school record of 15 held by Walter Peacock.
- ▶ At Louisville, Jackson has shattered the school record for rushing touchdowns by a quarterback, but the sophomore is four shy of the school mark for rushing touchdowns in a season, which is held by Michael Bush, who scored 23 in 2005.
- ▶ Jackson's 2,141 rushing yards in two seasons ranks 12th on career rushing at UofL — just 1,063 yards from tying the school record of 3,204 yards, which is held by Nathan Poole (1972-75). Jackson's 30 career rushing touchdowns is 12 short of the school's career mark of 42, which Lenny Lyles (1954-57) currently hods.

QUICK LEADS A DEEP WIDE RECEIVERS CORPS

- ▶ Thanks to six 100-yard receiving games this season, the Cardinals have arguably one of the deepest and most-talented wide receiver groups in the country, and throw in tight end senior **Cole Hikutini** — the Cards are one of the most explosive teams in the country. Seniors **James Quick** and **Jamari Staples** each have a pair of 100-yard receiving games, while Hikutini and sophomore **Jaylen Smith** each have one this season.
- ▶ The trio of Quick, Hikutini and Staples have combined to catch 100 passes for 1,658 yards and 13 touchdowns in the first nine games of the season — an average of 16.6 yards per catch. Quick has a team-high 35 receptions for 601 yards and is tied with Smith for the team lead with six touchdowns. One of the top tight ends in the country, Hikutini second on the squad with 35 receptions for 500 yards and one touchdown. Staples has 30 receptions for 557 yards and two touchdowns.
- ▶ The foursome of Quick, Staples, Hikutini and Smith have combined to record 37 receptions of over 20 yards, including nine that have gone for touchdowns. Quick and Smith have four scores of over 20 yards this year, while Hikutini has one. They have combined to catch 19 of the 28 touchdown receptions this season.
- ▶ Of Smith's 20 receptions, nine have gone for over 20 yards this year, and the sophomore ranks third nationally with a 23.6 yards per catch average.
- ▶ Quick is the lone receiver on the squad to reach the 100-career catch plateau with 116 career receptions for 1,869 yards. He needs 131 yards to become just the 11th player in school history to register 2,000-career receiving yards.
- ▶ The product of Trinity High School has tied his career-high for receptions in a game three times with seven — equaling a career-best against the Tigers. He also caught seven for 122 yards versus Florida State — the fifth 100-yard receiving game of his career and needs one more to move into a tie for 10th place on the school's all-time list.
- ▶ Over the last six games, Quick has 30 receptions for 461 yards and four touchdowns — averaging 76.8 yards per game.
- ▶ Quick is only one of four players to record two receptions for over 70 yards this season — scoring on a 71-yard pass against Marshall and a 72-yarder versus Syracuse on Sept. 9.
- ▶ Including junior **Reggie Bon-**

nafon, the Cardinals have four players with four or more touchdown receptions. Smith has caught a pass in 14-straight games, including a streak of four consecutive games with a touchdown reception.

TOTALLY OFFENSIVE

► Sophomore quarterback **Lamar Jackson** has developed one of the most dangerous dual-threat weapons, having the ability to hurt teams with his ability to run and pass. Jackson is second in the country in total offense, averaging 437.1 yards per game, which is second to Patrick Mahomes of Texas Tech, who is averaging 457.9 yards per game.

► With 416 yards of total offense versus Boston College, Jackson has 3,934 yards on the season, which ranks as the fourth-most at UofL for a single season. He is 114 yards short of the school-record total of 4,048 achieved by Teddy Bridgewater in 2013.

► Averaging 437.1 yards of total offense through nine games, Jackson is on pace to break the ACC mark of 5,209 yards of total offense, which is held by Deshaun Watson in 2015. Jackson needs 64 yards to crack the league's top 10 list.

► Responsible for 45 touchdowns this season, Jackson also needs two touchdowns to tie Watson's single-season mark for touchdowns responsible in a season with 47. Jackson's 45 touchdowns — 19 rushing and 26 passing touchdowns. Jackson averages 5.0 touchdowns per game, and is one pace for 63 touchdowns this year, which would tie the NCAA mark set by Hawaii's Colt Brennan in 2006.

► Jackson is the only player in the FBS who averages over 300 yards passing and 100 yards rushing this year. The 6-foot-3 sophomore is 12th in the nation at 315.3 yards passing per game and ninth in rushing at 124.5.

► Jackson is averaging 8.52 yards per play this year, which ranks sixth in the country, as does his 360 plays.

► Jackson is sixth in the nation with 37 plays from scrimmage of 10 yards or more and is third nationally with three passing plays of over 70 yards and fourth with eight passes of 50 or more yards.

PROLIFIC IN THE PASSING GAME

► Entering the 10th game of the season, the Cardinals have developed one of the most potent passing games in the country — ranking 12th in the country at 331.9 yards per game through the air.

► After throwing for over 250 yards in just five games in 2015, the Cardinals have passed for over 250 yards in seven of the first nine games — including a season-high 431 against Syracuse and 417 versus Marshall.

► Jackson has thrown for 2,753 yards, which is just out of the top 10 on the school's single-season list, and is 12th in the nation. The sophomore signal caller is averaging 16.2 yards a completion, which is tops in the country, and ranks third with 47 completions of 20 or more yards and tied for seventh with eight receptions of over 50 yards.

► Ranking 52nd in the country last season with 21 touchdown passes, the Cardinals

have surpassed that total with 28 this season, which ranks ninth in the country. Jackson has tossed 26 touchdown strikes, which is ninth nationally. Jackson's 26 touchdowns are the seventh-most in school history for a season, and needs just six more to break Teddy Bridgewater's school record of 31 touchdown throws in 2013.

► The Cardinals are fifth nationally in passing yards per completion at 15.9 yards and have already totaled 50 passing plays of over 20 or more yards, which is third in the country and seventh with 23 pass play of over 30 yards. Louisville also is eighth in the country with eight receptions of over 50+ yards and have three catches of over 70 yards this season. Last season, the Cards averaged 3.9 receptions of over 20+ yards for the season, while Louisville is averaging 5.6 through the first nine games of 2016.

► In 21 career games, Jackson is already sixth in school history with 38 touchdowns and is first currently in passing yards per completion at 15.1 yards. The sophomore has thrown for for 4,593 yards — 60 yards short of cracking the school's career passing list. In 535 career passes, Jackson has only thrown 14 interceptions.

► The Cardinals have three touchdown receptions of over 70 yards — two coming from senior wide receiver **James Quick**, who scored from 72 yards versus Syracuse and 71 against Marshall, and one last week from sophomore **Jaylen Smith**, who scored from 74 yards out on the longest pass from sophomore **Lamar Jackson**.

► Senior wide receiver **Jamari Staples** is averaging 18.6 yards a reception and leads the team with 11 receptions of over 20 yards. The group has totaled six 100-yard receiving games after Staples totaled 120 yards at Virginia and Smith recorded his first 100-yard game with 123 yards at Boston College.

MULTIPLE SCORING THREATS

► A total of 14 different Louisville players have scored either a rushing or receiving touchdown this season. In addition 16 players have made a catch, while 14 players have made multiple receptions, and 10 have caught touchdown passes this season.

► Sophomore quarterback **Lamar Jackson** leads the way with 19 touchdowns, while running back **Jeremy Smith** has scored eight times. Wide receivers **Jaylen Smith** and **James Quick** lead the receiving corps with six touchdowns, and **Cole Hikutini** have added five-scores, while wide receiver **Reggie Bonnafon** has four scores and running back **Brandon Radcliff** has crossed the goal line on three occasions.

HIGH-OCTANE LOUISVILLE OFFENSE RANKS AS NATION'S BEST

► Through nine games this season, Louisville has once again proved it has one of the nation's top offenses. Backed by the play of quarterback **Lamar Jackson**, a talented group of running backs and depth at wide receiver, the Cardinals lead the country in total offense (593.4) and scoring offense (50.2), while ranking fourth in first down offense (250) and fifth in passing yards per completion (15.9).

► Louisville scored at least 50 or more points in six games, which is the most since the 2004 team put up seven games of 50 or more points in its 11-1 season. Louisville has scored 50 or more points 21 times in Head coach Bobby Petrino's 85 games on the sidelines.

► Between **Lamar Jackson** and **Kyle Bolin**, the Cardinals have thrown for 2,987 yards and are on pace to throw for approximately 4,300 yards, which would be the second-best total in school history. The school record for passing yards in a season is 4,498 yards by the 1998 team.

► Part of Louisville's offensive success comes from its success on third downs. The Cards rank 40th in the country, converting 44 percent of their conversions, which is also fourth-best in the ACC.

► Another part of their success stems from their balance. Jackson and Bolin have found 10 different receivers for touchdowns, five of which have scored multiple touchdowns. Four different rushers have found the endzone this season, led by Jackson's 19 touchdowns. Jackson, who had a career-high four rushing touchdowns twice this season, leads the nation in rushing touchdowns.

► In 85 games as head coach, Bobby Petrino has guided the Cardinals offense to at least 500 yards of total offense 35 times during his tenure, including eight of the nine games this season. Louisville leads the country with 593.4 yards of total offense.

► Jackson ranks among the nation's top passers, sitting 12th in the country with 2,753 yards and ninth in passing touchdowns with 26. The Pompano Beach native is leading the country in points responsible for with 272 and points responsible per game with 30.2.

- ▶ Louisville boasts one of the most accurate place kickers in **Blanton Creque**. The redshirt freshman has found the uprights in 83.3 percent of his kicks (10-of-12) this season, which is 21st nationally and tops in the ACC. He connected on 10 in a row before missing from 32 yards against Boston College.
- ▶ The Cardinals totaled a school record 845 yards of offense versus Syracuse on Sept. 9.
- ▶ Under Petrino's guidance, the Cardinals led the nation in scoring offense (49.4) and total offense (539) in 2004.
- ▶ Louisville led the nation in total offense once (2004) and finished in the top 10 on four different occasions during Petrino's tenure (2003, 2004, 2005, 2006).

BIG RED BALANCE

- ▶ The Louisville offense is showing outstanding balance in its seventh season under Bobby Petrino and co-offensive coordinators Lonnie Galloway and Chris Klenakis. The 2016 success comes a year after Louisville was fifth in the ACC in total offense and sixth in passing offense, while finishing eighth in scoring offense. This season, the Cards are first in the league in scoring and total offense, while standing second in passing.
- ▶ Louisville made a powerful running game and a balanced offense primary goals for 2016, and have produced solid results.
- ▶ Louisville is averaging 261.4 rushing yards per game to rank first in the ACC. UofL had a season-high 414 rushing yards at Syracuse and has rushed for at least 200 yards seven times in 2016.
- ▶ The Cards are among the nation's most balanced offensive attacks. The Cardinals average 331.9 passing yards per game and 593.4 total yards per game, which ranks second and first in the ACC, respectively. The Cardinals are the only team in the nation, who are averaging more than 260.0 yards per game on the ground and 300.0 yards passing this season.
- ▶ Louisville's 15.9 yards per completion ranks fifth in the nation.
- ▶ Louisville has gained at least 500 yards of total offense in nine of its past 10 games overall.
- ▶ The Cards have topped 27 points in 13 of its past 14 games, and has scored at least 30 points in five of six home games dating back to 2015
- ▶ Louisville is averaging 50.2 points per game in 2016 to rank first in the nation and the ACC. The 70 points against Charlotte were tied for the most in the Bobby Petrino.
- ▶ Louisville topped the 300-yard passing mark for the sixth time in nine games this year, with a season-high 431 yards against Syracuse.

PETRINO KNOWS POINTS

- ▶ In his 12 seasons as a head coach, Bobby Petrino's teams have been able to put up points at a pretty consistent basis. The Cardinals lead the country in scoring offense at 50.2 points per game — having put up 50 points in six of the nine games this season.
- ▶ During his seven seasons with the Cardinals, Louisville has scored 40 or more points 38 times, including six times this season.
- ▶ Petrino's squads have averaged 36.09 points per game during his time as a head coach, which is the ninth-highest point total among active head coaches in the FBS.

the fifth player in FBS history to pass for 20 and rush for 20 touchdowns in a season — joining Cam Newton (Auburn), Tim Tebow (Florida), Colin Kaepernick (Nevada) and Johnny Manziel (Texas A&M).

THREE TIMES IS IMPRESSIVE

▶ Sophomore quarterback **Lamar Jackson** leads the nation with 272 points responsible for — accounting for 45 (19 rushing and 26 passing) touchdowns and a two-point conversion. He also leads the country with an average of 30.2 points per game.

▶ Jackson accounted for seven touchdowns for the third time this season versus Boston College in the 52-7 win. It marked the third game this season that the 6-foot-3 second-year player has been responsible for seven or more touchdowns in a game. He tied an ACC record with eight scores in the season opener versus Charlotte and added seven more against Syracuse the following week.

▶ The Florida native smashed the school record for touchdowns responsible in a season, which was 33, and is approaching the career mark of 87 set by Chris Redman from 1996-99. Jackson has 68, which is the fifth-most in school history.

MAGIC NUMBERS

▶ Head coach Bobby Petrino owns a 60-5 overall record when leading after three quarters of play. In addition, his teams hold a 61-7 overall mark when holding a lead after the first half.

▶ Petrino's offenses have been known for putting up outstanding numbers through the air, but also having success on the ground. His teams own a 42-3 overall record when rushing for at least 200 yards. On the flip side, Petrino holds a 4-8 overall record when his teams do not run for at least 100 yards.

▶ On the defensive side of the ball, Petrino holds a 41-1 overall record when his teams hold their opponents to less than 20 points. In addition, his squads own a 38-1 when holding opponents to less than 100 yards rushing.

LOUISVILLE KNOWS OFFENSE

▶ Louisville is currently riding a consecutive game scoring streak that spans 208 games dating back to the 2000 season — a 31-0 shutout against Florida State.

▶ Louisville has posted 325-plus yards of total offense in 17-consecutive games after being held to 306 yards of offense in the 20-13 win over NC State last season.

▶ Louisville is one of only four teams (Texas Tech, Louisiana Tech and Oklahoma) to be ranked in the top 10 in total offense and scoring offense.

▶ The Cardinals, who lead the nation in offense at 593.4, have three games of over 600 yards of total offense, including a school record 845 yards of offense versus Syracuse on Sept. 9. The Cards also totaled 663 yards in the opener versus Charlotte and 690 yards in a 59-28 victory over Marshall on Sept. 24.

▶ In 85 career games, head coach Bobby Petrino's teams have totaled 500 or more yards of total offense 35 times, including in eight of the nine games this season.

▶ The Cardinals are second in the country, averaging 7.83 yards per play and have averaged 6.0 yards per play in eight of the nine games this season (held to 5.7 versus Clemson). Of the 682 plays run this season, the Cardinals have 356 plays of over 10 yards, which is 52.2 percent of their total plays. The Cards are first in the country in plays of over 10 yards with 198; second with 75 plays of over 20 yards; second with 42 plays of over 30 yards; ninth with 18 plays of over 40 yards; third with 13 plays of over 50 yards; fifth with eight plays of over 60 yards and fourth with five plays of over 70 yards.

▶ The Cards lead the nation in total offense, but they rank 35th in the number of plays — 114 fewer plays than Texas Tech, which is second nationally in total offense per game.

▶ In 85 games, the Cards have tallied 40 or more points 38 times and have scored over 50 points on 21 occasions.

PUTTING UP MONSTER NUMBERS

▶ The Cardinals totaled a school-record 845 yards in the win over Syracuse on Sept. 9 — breaking the old mark of 779 yards versus Houston in 2003, which was Bobby Petrino's first season as a head coach of the Cardinals.

▶ It marked the sixth time in school history that the Cards recorded more than 700 yards of offense in a game — four coming with Petrino on staff.

▶ As the offensive coordinator in 1998, Petrino's offense totaled 769 yards in a 63-45 win over East Carolina and added 742 yards in a 62-19 win over Cincinnati. Four of the top five total offensive performances have come with Petrino leading the offense.

RECORD-BREAKING OFFENSE

- ▶ Head coach Bobby Petrino has coached four of the most prolific offenses in Louisville history. The 2004 team set school marks for most points (597), points per game (49.8), and touchdowns (74). The previous highs of 521 points and 65 touchdowns were set in 2005 — Petrino's third season. In 2004, the Cardinals led the nation in total offense (539.0) and points per game (49.8), while also finishing eighth in rushing offense (250.4) and ninth in passing offense (288.6). The Cards finished third in the nation in scoring in 2005 (43.4) and fourth in 2006 (37.8).
- ▶ Petrino's first season as head coach in the Derby City came in 2003 when his team totaled 450 points (fifth all-time) and 2,966 rushing yards (second all-time). His 2006 squad, which tied a school record with 12 wins, tallied 491 points (third most) and 57 touchdowns (fourth most). Nationally, the Cards were second in total offense (475.3), seventh in passing offense (290.0), and 12th in rushing offense (185.3).
- ▶ Louisville posted 845 yards of total offense on Sept. 9 versus Syracuse - the 10th time under Petrino's guidance as a head coach, and the 14th time at Louisville (was offensive coordinator at UofL in 1998).
- ▶ His offenses have totaled more than 500 yards of total offense 34 times in 84 games — registering a 31-3 mark in those games.

36-6 WHEN A BACK REACHES 100 YARDS

- ▶ Louisville is 36-6 under Bobby Petrino when a running back reaches 100 yards in a game. Of the running backs and quarterbacks who make up the 2016 roster, Louisville has 20 career 100-yard games to its credit as quarterback **Lamar Jackson** leads the way with 11 while running backs **Brandon Radcliff** also had eight, while **L.J. Scott** has logged one.
- ▶ As a freshman in 2015, Jackson totaled 226 yards versus Texas A&M, 186 at Kentucky, 121 at NC State, 184 versus Samford and 106 in his first game against Auburn.
- ▶ Radcliff has three 100-yard games this season, which equals the three he had in 2014. Last season, Radcliff added two 100-yard games. Scott had his lone 100-yard game during his freshman season — rushing for 126 yards against Murray State in 2014.

WHEN WINNING THE TURNOVER BATTLE

- ▶ Louisville is 34-4 under Bobby Petrino when winning the turnover battle after securing a +1 margin in the win over NC State on Oct. 22.
- ▶ Against ranked teams under Petrino, Louisville is 4-3 when having fewer turnovers than its opponent, with three victories coming in 2006 and Sept. 17 in the victory over Florida State. Louisville defeated No. 17 Miami 31-7, and forced two Hurricanes' turnovers while only committing one. The Cardinals forced three turnovers in wins over No. 3 West Virginia and No. 15 Wake Forest in the Orange Bowl.
- ▶ The four losses for the Cardinals under Petrino when having fewer turnovers than their opponent have come against Clemson on Oct. 1, Auburn in the 2015 season opener, versus Florida State in 2014, and South Florida in 2003.
- ▶ In Petrino's tenure at Louisville, the Cardinals have a combined turnover margin of +27 Louisville was +11 in 2004 and +6 in 2005. The only time the Cardinals were negative under Petrino was last season when they finished at -1.

FIRST-QUARTER STRIKES

- ▶ The Cardinals have scored 28 first-quarter points each in wins over Charlotte and Syracuse this season — matching a school record for first-quarter points. Louisville scored 28 points in the 2007 opener versus Murray State and tied it the following week against Middle Tennessee State.
- ▶ The 28-0 lead versus Charlotte was the largest after one quarter besting the previous school mark of 27 — set in a 79-0 win over Ogden in 1926. Louisville was up 28-7 over Murray State in 2007 and 28-21 over Middle Tennessee.
- ▶ Including the victory against Boston College, over the last 11 games, the Cardinals have totaled 156 points in the opening quarter — also scoring 20 against Texas A&M in the Music City Bowl and 17 last week against NC State.
- ▶ Louisville, which has scored 129 first-quarter points this season, has scored seven or more points in the first stanza in five the last six games. The Cardinals have scored 21 or more points in the opening stanza three times this season.

HIKUTINI'S A TOP TARGET

- ▶ Senior tight end **Cole Hikutini** has become a top target in the offense as a senior in one of the nation's top offenses. Heading into Saturday's game versus Boston College, Hikutini is tied for first on the squad with 35 receptions for 500 yards, and has already surpassed his total reception and yardage total from 2015. As a junior last season, Hikutini caught 19 passes for 348 yards and three touchdowns.
- ▶ The Sacramento, Calif., native is coming off one of his top games as a Cardinal — catching a career-best seven passes for 84 yards in the loss to Clemson on Oct. 1.
- ▶ Hikutini recorded his second career 100-yard receiving game with a career-high 118 yards versus NC State — including a career-long 67-yard reception. He totaled 103 yards in the bowl-game win over Texas A&M last season.

- ▶ In two seasons, Hikutini owns eight touchdown receptions — which ties him for eighth-place on the school's career receiving touchdowns lists by a tight end. With 848 yards receiving during his career, he needs 48 yards to tie for 10th all-time for receiving yards by a tight end.

10+ YARD PLAYS

- ▶ One of the keys to Louisville's success on offense is its ability to produce plays that result in 10 or more yards from the line of scrimmage. The Cardinals have manufactured 180 plays that gained at least 10 or more yards this season, which is first nationally. Louisville, which is second in the country with 68 plays of over 20 yards, is also second in the nation with an average of 7.82 yards per play and are one of nine teams in the country averaging better than 7.0 yards per play this year.
- ▶ Last season, the Cardinals were 27th in the nation with 220 plays of 10 or more yards, which ranked third in the ACC.

STAPLES HAS BEEN A FIND

- ▶ Senior wide receiver **Jamari Staples** has been a big-time addition since transferring from UAB in 2015. In only 16 games, Staples has caught 67 passes for 1,195 yards and five touchdowns after recording his fourth 100-yard game versus Virginia on Oct. 29. He caught seven passes for 120 yards, including a 15-yard touchdown reception. On Sept. 24 in the win over Marshall, Staples added five receptions for 94 yards.
- ▶ In the first nine games, Staples has caught 30 passes for 557 yards — an 18.6 yards per catch average. In the opener versus Charlotte, Staples caught four passes for 83 yards.
- ▶ In two seasons with the Cards, of Staples' 67 career receptions, 23 have gone for 20 or more yards.
- ▶ Despite missing his first four games last season, his first year with the Cardinals, he caught 37 passes for a team-high 638 yards and three scores, averaging 17.2 yards a reception. He caught 10 passes for 133 yards versus Wake Forest last season and nine passes for 194 yards in a loss at Pitt.

PASSING IT DOWN THE FIELD

- ▶ The Cardinals have opened up the play book this season, and it's shown by the number of big plays, especially in the passing game. The Cardinals are fifth in the country with 45 passing plays of 20+ yards and 20 of over 30 yards. The Cards have three passing plays of over 70 yards this year — two going to wide receiver **James Quick** for touchdowns and one touchdown pass to **Jaylen Smith**.
- ▶ Jackson ranks fifth nationally with 29 pass plays of over 20 yards and seventh nationally in passing plays of 30 or more yards (14)
- ▶ One of the reasons for the number of big plays has been the emergence of quarterback **Lamar Jackson**. The Pompano Beach, Fla., native ranks second nationally in yards per pass attempt at 9.2.
- ▶ Jackson has tossed 22 touchdown passes this year, which have averaged 24.3 yards per score — including a 74-yarder to James Quick versus Syracuse and a 71-yard on Sept. 24 Marshall. Of Jackson's 22 touchdown passes this season, six have been over 30 yards.
- ▶ The Cardinals are averaging 15.9 yards per completion, which ranks fifth in the country, while Jackson is second at 15.8 yards a completion.
- ▶ Louisville has three players averaging over 16.0 yards per reception: **Jaylen Smith** 24.9 ypc, **Jamari Staples** at 18.8 and **James Quick** at 16.3 ypc.

QUICK STRIKES

- ▶ Sophomore quarterback **Lamar Jackson** has been responsible for 45 touchdowns, but the signal caller likes to do it quickly. Of his 45 touchdowns this season, 36 were on drives under three minutes and have averaged 5.2 plays.
- ▶ The Cardinals have scored on 40 of 59 offensive touchdowns this season in less than three minutes — including one versus Clemson.
- ▶ The Cardinals had a season-high 15-play drive versus Marshall on Sept. 24, and had two drives of 11 or more plays versus Clemson, and added two scoring drives against Duke of over 10 plays. This season, Louisville has enjoyed 12 drives of 10 or more plays that led to scores.
- ▶ The Cardinals won the Virginia game with an 8-play, 75-yard drive that lasted only 1:47. Jackson was 2-for-4 on the final drive for 34 yards, including a five-yard pass to **Cole Hikutini** on 4th-and-3. The talented quarterback accounted for 54 of the 75 yards on the drive.

PENALTIES A BIG PROBLEM

- ▶ If the Cardinals are going to make a run to the College Football Playoffs, they must cut down on the penalties. Louisville ranks 123rd in penalty yards per game at 71.78 and stand 114th at 7.8 penalties per game — ranking 13th and 11th, respectively in the ACC.
- ▶ The Cardinals were victimized by 11 infractions for 104 yards in the 42-36 loss to Clemson on Oct. 1 and 12 in the win over NC State on Oct. 22. Over the last five games, the Cardinals have committed 46 penalties (9.2 ppg.) for 441 yards (88.2 ypg.). Louisville committed a season-low four penalties for 32 yards in the win over Duke on Oct. 14.
- ▶ Louisville has recorded nine or more penalties in five of nine games this season — including a season-best 12 for 143 yards versus Marshall.

► The Cardinals had a penalty-free game against Boston College. It was the first time the Cards didn't commit a penalty since a 22-19 win over Cincinnati in 1979.

A FEW FIRST-QUARTER STRIKES

► Offensively, the Cardinals have dominated the opposition, scoring 108 points after adding 17 to the total in the win over NC State on Oct. 22. On the flip side, the Cardinals have yielded just two first-quarter touchdowns and a field goal.

► The Cardinals have allowed three first quarter touchdown passes this season — one versus Syracuse on Sept. 9, one versus Duke on Oct. 14 and one last week against Virginia.

► Louisville hasn't allowed a first-quarter rushing touchdown since the Music City Bowl win over Texas A&M.

► On opening drives, the Cardinals have forced the opposition to punt in eight of the nine games, with the only score coming in the 24-14 win over Duke.

OFFENSIVE AND DEFENSIVE BALANCE

► The Cards have been one of the top offensive teams in the country in scoring offense and total offense, but teams are figuring out that the Cardinals can play a little defense as well. The Cardinals are the only team in football with an offense and defense ranked in the top 14 in the country.

► Louisville is ranked eighth in the country in total defense, allowing 293.1 yards of total offense this season and have held seven of the nine opponents to less than 300 yards of total offense.

► After giving up 507 yards of total offense in the loss to Clemson, the Cards have tightened up — allowing an average of 254.5 yards in the last four games.

CARDS REMAIN TOUGH AGAINST THE RUN

► The Louisville defense entered 2016 with a goal of making big improvements in pass defense and pressuring the quarterback. The Cardinals also look to duplicate their 2015 success in stopping the opponent run game. UofL has been strong against the run in 2016, holding six foes to less than 140 rushing yards, including 14 yards by NC State and 57 yards last week by Boston College.

► Opponents are gaining 106.0 yards rushing per game to rank first in the ACC and seventh in the country. In 2015, the Cardinals allowed opponents to rush for 120.2 yards per game, second in the ACC Big Ten and 14th nationally.

► Since the start of the 2015 season, Louisville has limited eight opponents to less than 90 rushing yards, including six coming from schools in the ACC.

OPPOSING PASSERS FINDING IT ROUGH

► Louisville ranked 10th against the pass in 2015, and entered the season looking to limit big plays through the air. Louisville is vastly improved defending the pass in 2016 and

has made a habit of taking the ball away.

► Nebraska has intercepted 12 passes to rank in a tie for 12th in the nation. The Cards also rank 34th nationally in pass efficiency defense with a 119.35 rating.

► Louisville is allowing 187.1 passing yards per game. Last season, the Cardinals allowed 212.5 passing yards per game.

► The Cards have limited five opponents to less than 200 yards passing, including 59 yards by Marshall. Last season, four of the last six opponents all topped 225 passing yards.

► The Cardinals have allowed 21 passing touchdowns in nine games.

POINTS TOUGH TO COME BY

► Opponents have had a difficult time putting points on the board in 2016. Louisville 21.2 is allowing points per game to rank fifth in the ACC and 21st nationally in scoring defense.

► Louisville has limited five foes to 20 or fewer points. Last season, Louisville held six three opponents all season to less than 20 points.

► The Cardinals have held three of their last four ACC opponents to 14 or fewer points.

► In the red zone, the Cardinals have yielded only 22 trips this season, an average of 2.4 per game.

TURNOVER TICKER

► The Cardinals didn't force a turnover for the first time this season in the win over Duke on Oct. 14 — the only time all season the Cards didn't force a miscue. The Cardinals have forced an opponent miscue in 32 of 35 games under the third-year coordinator, and forced three in the win over NC State, two at Virginia and three last week at Boston College.

► Under Grantham's tutelage, the Cards have forced 76 turnovers over the last three seasons, including 20 in the first nine games in 2016. Over the 35 games with Grantham leading the charge, the Cardinals have enjoyed multiple turnover games 25 times and have forced three or more miscues on 12 times. The Cards turned Clemson over a season-high five times in the 42-36 loss on Oct. 1.

DON'T GIVE UP THE BIG PLAY

► The Cardinals' defense prides themselves on not giving up the big play. Through nine games, the Cardinals ranks sixth nationally in average yards per play allowed (4.40) and have allowed just 33 plays of 20 or more yards. The Cardinals rank eighth in the nation in total defense, allowing 293.1 yards per game and are seventh against the run by allowing just 106.0 yards per game.

► The Cardinals have limited six of the first nine opponents to less than 300 yards of total offense after limiting Boston College to 207 yards on Nov. 5. Grantham's defense has held 19 of the 35 opponents to less than 300 yards of

offense since arriving in 2014.

▶ The Cardinals yielded 332.8 yards last year and a low of 308.5 under defensive coordinator Todd Grantham in 2014.

▶ In finishing with a top-20 defense a year ago, Todd Grantham's unit allowed an average of 4.82 yards per play, which ranked 16th nationally.

300 IS NOT THE NORM

▶ Giving up passing yards to Clemson quarterback Deshaun Watson isn't a crime when the Cardinals' allowed 306 passing to the 2015 Heisman Trophy finalist. The 306 yards allowed were the most since giving up 307 yards in the Music City Bowl win over Texas A&M last season. The Cards also allowed 377 to Florida State last year and 401 to the Seminoles in 2014.

▶ The Cards rank 15th in the country allowing just 187.1 yards per game and also forcing the opposition to complete only 53.4 percent of their throws — which ranks 21st nationally. Opponents are averaging 17.1 completions per game, but have tossed 21 touchdown passes, which ranks 120th nationally.

▶ The Cardinals, who have 55 interceptions since 2011, have 12 picks this season — tied for 12th nationally.

HARVEY-CLEMONS LEADS THE SECONDARY

▶ Senior **Josh Harvey-Clemons** was third last season in tackles with 88, but the safety is looking to make sure he leads the squad in 2016. The product of Valdosta, Ga., is second on the team with 56 tackles after the first nine games of the season.

▶ Harvey-Clemons matched a season-high with 11 tackles versus Duke. It was the sixth time in the last 10 games that he has recorded seven or more tackles.

▶ A starter in 22-straight games, Harvey-Clemons has totaled 144 tackles since transferring from Georgia.

PICK IT OFF

▶ The Cardinals have 12 interceptions through nine games and have totaled 55 since 2014 — the most among FBS teams during that span. The Cardinals have registered at least one interception in 27 of the last 35 games dating back to 2014.

▶ Six different Cardinals have totaled interceptions in **Chucky Williams, Jaire Alexander, Trumaine Washington, Jonathan Greenard** and **Devonte Fields**, who recorded his first career interception. Alexander picked off a pair of passes in the loss to Clemson and Oct. 29 versus Virginia to give him five this season, which ranks second in the ACC and the nation.

▶ Louisville ranks 12th nationally with 12 interceptions after nine games.

TOP 20 DEFENSE

▶ Under defensive coordinator Todd Grantham, the Cardinals have elevated themselves into the top echelon of defensive teams in the nation after finishing in the top 20 in each of his three seasons as the defensive coordinator. This season, the Cardinals are among the national leaders — standing eighth after nine games — yielding just 293.1 yards per game.

▶ The Cardinals are allowing an average of 4.40 yards per play, and are 30th in total plays, having been on the field for 538 total plays. Syracuse ran a season-high 93 plays against the Cardinals on Sept. 9 — the sixth-most ever by an opponent.

▶ The Cardinals have allowed only 24 touchdowns this season — three on the ground and 21 through the air. The three rushing touchdowns allowed are tied for first nationally.

▶ Last season, Louisville closed the year at 18th in the nation after allowing 332.8 yards per game en route to an 8-5 record and was sixth in 2014 at 308.8 yards per game.

▶ Louisville joined Wisconsin, Alabama and Florida as the only four schools in the nation to finish in the top 20 nationally in total defense over the last three seasons.

GOING BACK-TO-BACK

▶ Senior linebacker **Keith Kelsey** is attempting to become only the 13th player in school history to lead the Louisville defense in tackles in consecutive years after registering a career-best 107 last season. The Gainesville, Fla., native is looking to become the first player to achieve the feat since Preston Brown — a two-year linebacker for the Buffalo Bills — led the program in 2012 and 2013. He leads the Cards this season with 61 stops, which ranks 19th in the ACC.

▶ For his career, Kelsey has 277 stops — posting over 80 in each of his last two seasons and owns seven games of 10 or more tackles, including five last year. He was credited with a career-high 15 tackles and 4.5 tackles in a loss to Houston and totaled 11 stops and a career-best 5.0 tackles for loss in a win over Boston College. He totaled six in the win over Charlotte on Sept. 1.

▶ Kelsey has produced six or more tackles in nine of his last 12 games, and 15 of his last 22 games over the last two seasons — after recording eight against NC State last weekend.

MR. VERSATILITY

▶ Sophomore **Jaire Alexander** showed why he is one of the top young overall players in the game. Named the ACC Defensive Back for his two interceptions in the win over Virginia, leads the Cardinals with five picks and already has a career-best 32 tackles this season.

▶ The Charlotte, N.C. native has developed as one of the top cornerbacks in the country and becoming a top punt returner in country. Alexander leads the team with five interceptions after recording a career-best two on Oct. 29 versus Virginia and a pair in the loss to Clemson on Oct. 1. He also recorded a pair of tackles and forced a fumble.

▶ A true sophomore, Alexander ranks second nationally with five interceptions in nine games.

▶ As a punt returner, Alexander is averaging 12.1 yards, which is 14th in the country, and is one of 22 players in the country to return a punt for a touchdown — returning one for a touchdown against Florida State on Sept. 17.

▶ Alexander leads the FBS with two punt returns of over 60 yards this season. He had two punt returns of over 60 yards in the win over the second-ranked Seminoles.

▶ Despite being a sophomore, Alexander ranks eighth in school history with 416 return yards in just 20 games.

THIRD-DOWN DOMINANCE

▶ The key to any good defense is the ability to get off the field on third down, and over the last three seasons, the Cards have been on the top programs in the country. During that span, the defense has held the opposition to just 170-of-531 on the "money down" — ranking 35th in the country last season and 10th in 2014.

▶ This season has been no different as the Cardinals are fifth in the country, holding opponents to just 37-of-133 for a 27.2 percent conversion rate.

▶ In the wins over Florida State and Marshall, the Cards held both offenses to a combined 4-of-28 in a pair of wins — limiting Florida State to just 2-of-13 on Sept. 17 and Marshall to 2-of-15 on Sept. 24.

FUMBLE!!

▶ Junior linebacker **James Hearn**s has emerged as one of the team's top pass rushers with a team leading 6.0 sacks, which ranks 37th in the country. He has a sack in six of the nine games this season, and has a career-best 36 tackles and a team-high 9.0 tackles for loss.

▶ Hearn, who caused a fumble last weekend at Boston College, leads the country with five forced fumbles, which is tied with Calvin Pryor for the second-most in school history.

WINNING TRADITION

- ▶ Bobby Petrino, who is 66-19 as the Cardinals' leader, owns the top winning percentage in school history behind a 77.6 career mark. His 66 wins are the second-most in the Louisville annals.
- ▶ He won more games in his first four seasons (41) than any other coach in the history of the program. Petrino went 41-9 in his first stint at UofL.
- ▶ He is the first UofL head coach to end the season with eight or more wins in six consecutive seasons on the sidelines.
- ▶ Impressively, Petrino owns a 34-4 record at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium — including a school-best 18-game home streak from 2003-06.
- ▶ He is the only coach in school history to post two top-10 finishes in the final Associated Press poll — closing at No. 6 in 2004 and 2006. His UofL teams have finished in the top 25 on four occasions.

- ▶ He led the Cardinals to a school-record 12 wins in 2006 (later matched in 2013).
- ▶ Picked up a win over No. 2 Florida State 63-20 on Sept. 17, 2016 — his second home win over a top-5 opponent.

CONFERENCE SUCCESS

- ▶ Guided the Cardinals to a Conference USA title in 2004 and a BIG EAST championship in 2006.
- ▶ Took the Cardinals to their first BCS Bowl appearance, capturing the 2007 Orange Bowl with a win over Wake Forest.
- ▶ Owns a 36-13 conference record as the head coach of the Cardinals.
- ▶ Defeated third-ranked West Virginia as head coach of UofL in 2006.

PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

- ▶ Petrino has directed 106 players to the National Football League during his outstanding career as the head coach at Louisville, Arkansas, and Western Kentucky.
- ▶ As the head coach of the Cardinals, Petrino has produced 32 NFL Draft selections, including a school-best 10 in 2015.
- ▶ First UofL head coach to end the season with eight or more wins in six consecutive seasons on the sidelines.
- ▶ Coached four first-round draft selections at Louisville (Sheldon Rankins, 2016; DeVante Parker, 2015; Eric Wood, 2009; Amobi Okoye, 2007).
- ▶ Saw Gerod Holliman win the Jim Thorpe Award (2014), Art Carmody be named the Lou Groza Award (2006) winner, and Elvis Dumervil take home the Bronko Nagurski Award (2005).

THE WORD ON JACKSON

- ▶ Sophomore quarterback Lamar Jackson has burst on the scene this year as one of the most dynamic and exciting players in the game. With one rushing and passing TD versus Duke, Jackson became the first player in ACC history with 15 rushing and passing touchdowns in the same season. He now needs one rushing touchdown to become fifth player in FBS history to total 20 rushing and 20 passing touchdowns in a season.
- ▶ Jackson owns a 13-3 record as a starter and has won eight of nine starts dating back to last season (last loss came versus Clemson on Oct. 1).
- ▶ Jackson has rushed for 2,141 yards and thrown for 4,593 yards in his Louisville career.
- ▶ The sophomore set a school record for total plays in a game with 75 in the loss to Clemson on Oct. 1 — rushing a career-high 31 times and attempting 44 passes for the second-straight week.
- ▶ He has been responsible for 68 touchdowns during his career with the Cardinals — 30 rushing and 34 passing. He has been responsible for a touchdown in 17 of 21 games.
- ▶ He ranks first in the nation in points responsible (272), points responsible per game (30.2), and first in rushing touchdowns (19) and second in scoring per game (12.2).
- ▶ In six of the last 10 games, Jackson has passed for at least 200 yards and rushed for over 100 yards.
- ▶ Jackson threw multiple touchdown passes for the seventh in his career, with four versus Boston College .
- ▶ The sophomore QB ranks 13th in the country in passing yards (2,522) and 10th with 22 passing touchdowns. The Pompano Beach, Fla., product is 11th in passing efficiency and first in passing yards per completion.
- ▶ He had his consecutive 100-yard rushing game streak stopped at five games, which was the second-longest in school history.
- ▶ The of native Florida has three games of seven or more touchdowns (8 vs. Charlotte, 7 vs. Marshall and Boston College) — the first FBS player to post multiple seven or more touchdowns in a game since 2003.
- ▶ In 21 career games, Jackson owns 11 100-yard rushing games and already has six this season after totaling five as a true freshman. His 100-yard rushing contests knotted him with Victor Anderson (2008) for the most 100-yard rushing games by a freshman.
- ▶ The sophomore is the first Louisville quarterback to rush for four touchdowns in back-to-back games. (Old record: 3 TDs by Benny Russell vs. Dayton, Oct. 9, 1965, 34-0 win.).

- ▶ Jackson set an ACC record with 610 yards of total offense in the win over Syracuse on Sept. 9 - breaking Miami's Stephen Morris' mark of 568 set in 2012. Jackson tied an ACC record by accounting for eight touchdowns on Sept. 1 — tying Clemson's Tajh Boyd, who was responsible for eight scores against NC State in 2012.
- ▶ The 6-foot-3 signal caller was named the Most Valuable Player in the Music City Bowl after rushing for a game record 226 yards and a pair of scores. His 226 yards on the

ground were the seventh-best total in school history and became only the third quarterback in bowl history to pass and rush for over 200 yards in the postseason.

- ▶ In 12 games in 2015, including seven as a starter, Jackson set the single-season mark for rushing yards (960) and touchdowns (11) by a quarterback.
- ▶ In the 38-24 come-from-behind win over Kentucky last season, Jackson accounted for 316 yards and three touchdowns as Louisville erased a 24-7 halftime deficit with 31 unanswered points. Jackson accounted for 171 in the third quarter alone — finishing with 186 yards rushing and TDs of 16 and 13 yards on 17 carries. He also threw for 130 yards, including a 35-yard TD to James Quick.
- ▶ As a passer, Jackson has thrown for 4,593 yards and 38 touchdowns in just 21 career games. He tied a school record for touchdown passes in a game when he threw six touchdown passes in the first half of the win against Charlotte and passed for a career-best 417 yards in the win over Marshall on Sept. 24.
- ▶ In the win over Marshall, Jackson completed a career-high 24 passes on a career-best 44 attempts.
- ▶ Jackson passed for over 200 yards in 12 games — passing for a career-high 417 yards versus Marshall and 307 yards and three touchdowns in a 41-21 loss to Florida State last season. He found James Quick for all three scores — hitting him from 18, 19 and 39 yards in Tallahassee, Fla.
- ▶ He completed a career-best 80.9 percent of his throws — going 12-of-17 for 231 yards and four touchdowns in the win over Boston College.

PAPA JOHN'S CARDINAL STADIUM

The University of Louisville football team plays all of its home games in Papa John's Cardinal Stadium, which was renovated after the 2009 season and is now widely considered one of the premier, on-campus college football stadiums in the country. It's scheduled to undergo its third major renovation in the next couple of years when 10,000 seats will be added, along with 12 field suites and over 100 premium boxes.

■ Named after the iconic pizza company headquartered in Louisville, Papa John's Cardinal Stadium will play host to its 18th season of Cardinal football in 2015 and has served as one of the best home field advantages in the country.

■ Since 1998, the Cardinals are 89-29 at home and owned a school record 20-game-home winning streak, which was snapped in 2007. Under head coach Bobby Petrino the Cardinals lost one home game from 2003-2006.

■ Papa John's Cardinal Stadium, which opened with a capacity of 42,000 was expanded in 2009 to the present capacity of 55,000. Approximately 12,000 additional chair back seats were added to a second deck on the east side of the stadium. Forty-five luxury suites and 2,000 premium loge seats also were added to the east side.

■ A 60-foot wide terrace was added at the top of the south end zone, connecting the east and west sides of the stadium. The area includes concessions, tables, and restrooms.

■ The PNC Club also was built in 2009, and is a 20,000-square-foot, glass-enclosed area that stretches from end zone to end zone at the loge level on the east side of the stadium.

■ The temperature-controlled club features a full-service bar, concessions, large-screen televisions, lounge seating and tables. It also has more than 1,700 outdoor seats under cover with heaters and fans.

■ In addition to being available during football games, the PNC Club is used for other community and campus events throughout the year

■ The opening of the state-of-the-art facility in September of 1998 concluded a decade's worth of private fund-raising and commitment to the dream of giving Louisville an on-campus football stadium, which is second to none in the nation.

■ Papa John's Cardinal Stadium allows an up-and-coming professional city to become a college town on Saturdays every autumn as the Cardinals play host to a number of national-caliber opponents.

■ The opening of the facility in 1998 allowed UofL to play seven home games for the second time in 51 years during the 2000 campaign and a school-record eight in 2008.

■ Fans are treated to a one-of-a-kind feature in PJCS with all 55,000 seats being of the chairback variety. No other university-owned and operated stadium in the nation can make that claim.

■ The structure, which sits on the south end of the metropolitan campus, is constructed with the ability for future expansion to more than 80,000 seats.

■ Along with the most modern press facilities, which accommodated many ESPN national television broadcasts over the last four seasons, PJCS holds the impressive Brown and Williamson Club.

■ The B&W Club runs 100 yards in length and 20 yards in width and gives the stadium the ability to play host to a number of indoor banquets and parties. A new and improved Howard Schnellenberger Football Complex stands in the north end and provides student-athletes with a number of world-class facilities.

■ After initially installing SportGrass in PJCS, the Cardinals enter their 12th season with a new, artificial playing surface in FieldTurf.

■ The stadium's multi-usage came into play in May of 1999, as the George Strait Country Music Festival invaded PJCS and entertained more than 51,000 concert goers. Kenny Chesney and Sugarland played at PJCS in May 2011 and again in 2016. The PJCS pitch also played host to the 1999 World Cup Champion United States women's soccer team as part of a trio of facilities to house the U.S. Cup.

■ With its state-of-the-art construction and fan-friendly environment, Papa John's Cardinal Stadium is one of the finest in the nation.

■ The Howard Schnellenberger Football Complex, which honors the former Cardinal head coach, also sits inside the stadium area and houses the team's coaches, staff, training room, strength and conditioning area and academic services.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) - Lamar Jackson accounted for a school-record eight touchdowns and 405 offensive yards by halftime to help No. 19 Louisville dismantle Charlotte 70-14 on Thursday night in the season opener for both teams.

Jackson broke Chris Redman's 1998 record for combined rushing and passing TDs and he tied Redman's mark for passing TDs. He seemed poised to add a few more before exiting without taking a snap in the second half.

He completed 17 of 23 passes for 286 yards and rushed 11 times for 119 yards, including a 36-yard TD run on Louisville's opening drive. Louisville gained 663 yards overall.

Jackson's performance was an impressive follow-up to his breakout freshman season in which he combined for 2,800 yards and 23 TDs - including 960 rushing to break Louisville season and career marks by a QB. His final game last season was a 453-yard, three-TD combined effort in a Music City Bowl win over Texas A&M that earned MVP honors.

That showing raised expectations for this year, and the 6-foot-3, 204-pound Jackson quickly delivered for a sellout crowd of 53,127.

Charlotte pressured Jackson at the start, twice forcing him out of the pocket to run for 26 combined yards. That got Louisville past midfield on its opening drive.

The 49ers barely touched him several plays later as he broke through a left-side hole and barreled for the first of eight TDs on nine first-half possessions.

Jackson weaved a 1-yard TD run between a run of powerful throws that broke the game open. He hit six receivers with touchdowns long and short, and the 49ers could do nothing to stop them.

Jeremy Smith caught a swing pass out of the backfield for a 24-yard score down the right sideline, while L.J. Scott turned a 20-yarder into another TD on the left side.

Jackson's best TD throw came late in the first half when he hit senior James Quick in the back of the end zone, a play initially ruled out of bounds. Replays showed Quick pulling in Jackson's pinpoint pass with little room to spare as his feet dragged past the end line; the call was reversed to the delight of a red-clad crowd as the score broke Redman's mark.

Given another scoring opportunity as seconds ticked down toward halftime, Jackson positioned Louisville with a 6-yard run to the 1 before coaches called timeout with nine seconds remaining. H-back Cole Hikutini then took Jackson's short pass for a 1-yard TD reception four seconds later, capping the record-setting night.

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (AP) - Lamar Jackson continued his early season onslaught, throwing a long touchdown pass and running for four more scores to help No. 13 Louisville rout Syracuse 62-28 on Friday night in the Atlantic Coast Conference opener for both teams.

Jackson, the national offensive player of the week for his performance in the opener against Charlotte, a 70-14 victory, picked up right where he left off. He hit a wide-open James Quick for a 72-yard score on the game's first play from scrimmage to put the Orange defense on its heels, and it stayed there during a first-quarter blitz by Jackson and company.

The elusive Jackson also hit Jaylen Smith for 61 yards and Jamari Staples for 55 in the opening spree.

Jackson, who was rarely pressured by a Syracuse defense that was content to lay back, scored on runs of seven, 72 and 13 yards to give Louisville a 28-7 lead after one quarter. He had 108 yards rushing and 207 yards passing as the Cardinals (2-0) outgained the Orange 352-98 in the period, then tacked on a 9-yard scoring run in the second for a 35-7 lead. That was one for the highlight reels, with Jackson displaying hurdler-like ability with a leap over defender Chauncey Scissum at the goal line.

Jackson finished with 199 yards rushing on 21 carries and was 20 for 39 for 411 yards with one in-terception as the Cardinals set a school record and came within 13 yards of the ACC record with 845 yards offensively. It was the most ever allowed by Syracuse, eclipsing the mark of 654 by West Virginia in 1993.

Eric Dungey was 25 for 51 yards for 255 yards passing and scored on a 1-yard run late in the third quarter for the Orange.

Syracuse (1-1) tried to claw its way back into it with a pair of scores late in the second, both by wideout Amba Etta-Tawo in the final three minutes of the period. On a 47-yard catch-and run, Etta-Tawo broke two tackles and slipped another on his way into the end zone and capped the rally with a four-yard catch in the final minute.

In the opener against Charlotte, Jackson accounted for eight touchdowns and 405 yards in the first half, then sat the second. No breather on this hot night inside the Carrier Dome.

Louisville halted the Orange rush with another score early in the third quarter, capped by a 21-yard end around by wideout Traveon Samuel for a 42-21 lead.

The Cardinals moved up six spots in the AP poll after their lopsided victory over Charlotte. Jackson accounted for a stunning 405 yards and eight touchdowns, six passing in the first half of that game. Another jump is on the way next week.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. – In their comeback victory over Ole Miss two weeks ago, Florida State's script followed a familiar pattern of scoring before halftime, getting the ball back to start the third quarter and then scoring again.

So maybe the surest sign that things would be different here at Louisville's Papa John's Cardinal Stadium came when Louisville, not the Seminoles, scored the momentous touchdown at the end of the second quarter. And it was Louisville, not FSU, that scored the decisive blow early in the third.

By then, the Seminoles trailed by 32 points and their hopes for yet another jump-off-the-mat rally were gone. This time, the hole was too far deep as No. 2 FSU fell prey to a Heisman-worthy performance by Louisville quarterback Lamar Jackson in a 63-20 defeat.

Louisville's Jackson cemented his status as college football's preeminent rising star with a 372-yard, five-touchdown performance that kept the FSU defense guessing all day.

The Seminoles, meanwhile, never could find a groove on offense and, save for a few moments after cutting their deficit to 14-10 early in the second quarter, never gave the Cardinals much of a scare.

Playing in his first true road environment, redshirt freshman quarterback Deondre Francois completed seven of 18 passes for 101 yards and a touchdown. But he also threw an interception and mishandled an exchange with running back Dalvin Cook that led to another turnover.

And Francois was sacked five times by a Louisville defense that, afforded a big lead, could be relentless in its pass rush.

Cook didn't fare much better, carrying 16 times for just 54 yards.

Behind a balanced effort through the air and on the ground, Louisville outgained FSU 530-284 despite conceding a time-of-possession advantage to the Seminoles.

Matthew Thomas had 10 tackles to lead the FSU defense, which was playing shorthanded with safety Derwin James sidelined while recovering from knee surgery.

With James out and a handful of other FSU defenders hit by injuries throughout the game, the Cardinals struck for seven plays of more than 20 yards. The Seminoles had just one.

Florida State's day perhaps could best be summed up by Louisville's fateful drive at the end of the second quarter.

Leading 28-10 with less than a minute to go in the half, Jackson threw a low pass toward the right sideline that appeared to bounce off the turf for an incomplection.

But it didn't. Instead, Cardinals receiver James Quick caught the ball between his knees and, in the ensuing confusion, gathered it in his arms and raced 44 yards to the FSU 2-yard line.

Three plays later, Jackson scampered into the end zone for a score that made it 35-10.

HUNTINGTON, W. Va. - The circumstances were special. Louisville, at No. 3, was the highest-ranked FBS team to ever visit Huntington. The sellout crowd, an over-capacity 40,592, was No. 2 in the 26-year history of Joan C. Edwards Stadium. Garet Morrell, a true freshman quarterback, made his first collegiate start for the home team.

That word – special – was used in post-game interviews by Marshall tight end Ryan Yurachek as he described the Cardinals’ defensive front seven. That word – special – was also used by MU coach Doc Holliday as he tried to capture the 479-yard, seven-touchdown performance by U of L’s Heisman candidate quarterback, Lamar Jackson.

In the end, it all stacked up to a 59-28 triumph for Louisville here Saturday night. The score looks lopsided, but here’s the spin: Marshall, with a rookie teenager behind center and what Holliday called a “limited” playbook, played one of the nation’s best college football teams closer than a pair of Atlantic Coast Conference schools, Florida State and Syracuse.

Louisville entered Saturday night’s game averaging 65.0 points and winning by an average of 44.3 points.

It was a pat on the back from a coach who had watched his team wallop then-No. 2 Florida State by 43 points a week earlier, but couldn’t find a two-score cushion against the Herd until a second quarter touchdown pass made it 14-0.

Louisville, which is off to a 4-0 start for the first time since 2013, held a 7-0 lead after the first quarter after outscoring its first three opponents 70-10 combined. The Cardinals’ first touchdown was a 71-yard strike from Jackson to James Quick, the first of five touchdown passes by Jackson. He added three of those TD passes in the second quarter as the lead swelled to 28 points, 35-7, by intermission.

Jackson finished 24 of 44 passing for 417 yards and five touchdowns. He added 62 yards on the ground on 12 carries, including scoring runs of 4 and 9 yards. The sophomore entered the game as the nation’s second leading rusher, but this was the first time a team held him under 100 yards. His total offensive output in Saturday’s game is the second-most by any visiting player in Marshall history, trailing only UTEP’s Trevor Vittatoe (517 yards in 2009).

Morrell, Jackson’s QB counterpart, finished 9 of 21 passing for 59 yards and two touchdowns against one interception. Morrell started in place of sophomore Chase Litton, who missed the game because of an undisclosed injury. Morrell connected with Yurachek for a 16-yard touchdown pass with 36 seconds left of the first half, and sophomore running back Keion Davis for a 12-yard catch and run for the score in the fourth quarter.

The Herd’s other offensive touchdown came from junior running back Tony Pittman, who bullied his way to a 13-yard scoring run with 2:41 left of the game. Pittman was the Herd’s leading rusher with 54 yards on seven carries.

Marshall also scored on defense, a 26-yard scoop-and-score by redshirt freshman defensive end Ty Tyler. The touchdown is Tyler’s second fumble return for a score this season.

Defensively, the Herd was led in tackles by senior safety Corey Neely (12). Sophomore linebacker Chase Hancock filled the stat sheet with eight tackles, his first career solo sack, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery.

CLEMSON, S.C. (AP) - Marcus Edmond tackled James Quick one yard shy of a first down at the three yard line on fourth down with 33 seconds left in the game, as No. 3 Clemson held on for a thrilling 42-36 win over No. 3 Louisville at Memorial Stadium.

Led by quarterback Deshaun Watson, who was 20-31 passing for 306 yards and five touchdowns, the Tigers (5-0, 2-0 ACC) came out on top of the back-and-forth matchup featuring electrifying offensive displays from both teams. Clemson also upped its home winning streak to 19, the longest active streak in the nation.

Defense was the story of the first quarter, as both teams struggled to manufacture any substantial drives. Clemson's pass rush was particularly effective and pressured Louisville quarterback Lamar Jackson throughout.

The Cardinals were the first to score, as Jeremy Smith capped an 82-yard drive with a one-yard touchdown run in the opening minute of the second quarter.

The remainder of the quarter was practically all Clemson, however, with the Tigers outscoring the Cardinals 28-3. Deon Cain made a big splash during that stretch, hauling in two touchdown receptions that covered 70 yards altogether.

Following a fumble by Louisville's Brandon Radcliff, which was the Cardinals' third consecutive drive with a turnover, Clemson struck again. Wayne Gallman, who totaled 110 yards on the ground, sprinted into the endzone on a 24-yard run. Later in the quarter, Watson and Cain connected to put the Tigers up 21-7. Cain finished with four catches for 98 yards and two touchdowns.

The Cardinals added a field goal with under a minute to play in the half, but the Tigers were able to answer with a frenetic scoring drive in just 26 seconds. Advancing 73 yards in four plays, Clemson increased its lead to 28-10 on a five-yard touchdown pass from Watson to Artavis Scott.

Louisville outscored Clemson 16-0 in the third quarter, capitalizing on two Tiger turnovers. Following a Watson interception, Jackson connected with James Quick for an eight-yard touchdown.

A Louisville field goal on its next possession pulled it to within nine points. After a Clemson fumble in Louisville territory, Jackson drove the Cardinals 77 yards and finished the drive off with a one-yard touchdown rush.

The Cardinals pushed their run to 26-0 by scoring the first 10 points of the fourth quarter by way of a field goal and an 11-yard Jackson scamper into the endzone. In the wake of the score by Jackson, Scott provided the Tigers with excellent field position via a 77-yard kickoff return, then Watson found Mike Williams for a 20-yard touchdown pass.

The Tigers regained the lead on their next possession, as Watson finished off an 85-yard drive with a 31-yard touchdown pass to Jordan Leggett, who also hauled in a Watson pass for the succeeding two-point conversion.

Trailing 42-36 late in the game, the Cardinals marched down the field. But after a crucial pre-snap penalty on fourth-and-7, which made it fourth-and-12, Jackson connected with Quick near the sideline. An alert Edmond forced Quick out of bounds at the three, one yard shy of a first down.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) - Lamar Jackson provided a cushion with a 2-yard touchdown run with 1:32 remaining and No. 7 Louisville held off Duke 24-14.

The Cardinals caught a break after Evan O'Hara's 46-yard field goal missed wide left as Duke's Breon Borders was called for roughing the kicker. The penalty moved the ball to the 14 and Jackson did the rest with a 12-yard run followed by the short score that Louisville (5-1, 3-1 Atlantic Coast Conference) sorely needed.

Jackson accounted for 325 yards of offense and two touchdowns, hitting Jaylen Smith with a 5-yard scoring pass on the opening drive. Jeremy Smith added an 80-yard TD run in the third quarter, and O'Hara kicked a 22-yard field goal as the Cardinals came off the bye and earned the program's 500th victory.

Duke (3-4, 0-3) remained winless in ACC play but gave Louisville more than it expected.

The Cardinals had sought a big bounce back after losing at Clemson, especially with a week off. The Cardinals' offense certainly looked refreshed from the break as they drove 80 yards in 10 plays with Jackson TD pass capping the drive.

Duke wasn't fazed and answered quickly as Daniel Jones hit Erich Schneider for a 9-yard TD to tie it and trail just 10-7 at the half.

Louisville played better in the third quarter as Smith's big run providing some space and Jackson adding a couple more highlight-reel runs to his impressive collection. Louisville just couldn't capitalize on its chances as Brandon Radcliff lost a fumble at the 5 and O'Hara missed a 42-yard field goal attempt.

The Blue Devils regrouped to close within three as Jones hit a 20-yard TD to Johnathan Lloyd with 6:34 remaining. But the penalty quashed their hopes of getting a final chance at an upset as Jackson took control for Louisville -- as usual.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) - Lamar Jackson broke a school single-season record with four first-half touchdowns, Louisville had three interceptions and the seventh-ranked Cardinals burst past North Carolina State 54-13 on Saturday.

Jackson passed for three touchdowns and ran for a 36-yard score on the opening drive, giving him 34 TDs with five games to play. Dave Ragone and Brian Brohm each had 33.

Jackson, a sophomore quarterback and Heisman frontrunner, had 359 of his 431 yards on offense by halftime. He threw TD passes of 74 yards to Jaylen Smith, 3 yards to Cole Hikutini and 16 yards to Jamari Staples.

Jeremy Smith ran for a pair of 1-yard TDs for Louisville (6-1, 4-1 Atlantic Coast Conference), which reclaimed its high-scoring ways a week after managing a season-low 24 points against Duke.

Blanton Creque had four field goals and six conversions to set a single-game school scoring record for a kicker with 18 points.

Whatever hope North Carolina State (4-3, 1-2 ACC) had of slowing the Cardinals and Jackson was quashed after kickoff.

Jackson's TD run capped a 72-yard, 93-second drive just as 55,218 were settling into their seats on homecoming. Louisville's next two scoring drives totaled 2:48 and the Cardinals might have had another if not for James Quick's fumble after a catch.

Jackson was just getting started making big plays.

His 67-yard pass to Hikutini - who finished with a career-best 118 yards receiving on six catches - set up Jeremy Smith's first touchdown run. Hikutini's TD catch capped the next drive and Staples grabbed his first scoring pass of the season. Louisville outgained the Wolfpack 553-250 and held them to just 14 yards rushing on 25 attempts.

All this against an N.C. State defense that last week forced four turnovers and returned an interception for a TD at then-No. 3 Clemson before falling in overtime. The Wolfpack managed two third-quarter touchdowns to avoid a shutout, but not the rout.

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. (AP) - When he trotted back onto the field with just over 2 minutes to play and No. 5 Louisville suddenly trailing Virginia 25-24, Lamar Jackson was well aware of what was at stake.

Jackson, as has been the case all season, did the most, engineering a 75-yard drive and capping it by floating a perfectly placed 29-yard touchdown pass to Jaylen Smith with 13 seconds remaining as the Cardinals survived, 32-25.

It was Jackson's fourth touchdown pass and kept the Cardinals (7-1, 5-1 Atlantic Coast Conference) in the College Football Playoff picture, and couldn't have hurt the Heisman Trophy frontrunner's candidacy.

Virginia (2-6, 1-3) had scored with 1:57 remaining and used a 2-point conversion to take a 25-24 lead, whipping the sparse crowd at Scott Stadium into a frenzy that could only have made the task more daunting. Not for Jackson.

He ran for 18 yards on the first play, hit Cole Hikutini in traffic for 5 yards on fourth-and-3, ran twice more for 16 yards before hitting Smith in the end zone with the pass over tight coverage by Juan Thornhill.

So did Smith, who had just one prior reception.

Jackson did not have one of his best days, getting sacked five times and turning the ball over twice, but still finished 24 of 41 for 361 yards. He ran 18 times for another 90 yards, and boosted his TD count to 38. His other TD tosses covered 15 yards to Jamari Staples, and 8 and 10 yards to Reggie Bonnafon.

The Cavaliers had driven 75 yards in 14 plays, getting a 30-yard pass from Kurt Benkert to Keon Johnson on fourth-and-7 to put the ball at the Cardinals 4. A TD throw to Doni Dowling on the next play and then Benkert's 2-point conversion pass to Albert Reid had put the Cavaliers ahead by a point with 1:57 left.

BOSTON (AP) - Lamar Jackson ran for three touchdowns and threw for four more in three quarters on Saturday to lead No. 5 Louisville to a 52-7 victory over Boston College.

Jackson ran for a 69-yard score on the game's third play and added rushing TDs of 13 and 53 yards in the second half. The Heisman Trophy favorite also threw for TDs from 30, 44 and 10 yards out on drives of five, four and one play to give the Cardinals a 28-0 lead just two snaps into the second quarter.

Despite leaving the game briefly in the first half with cramps, Jackson ran 15 times for 185 yards to become the first quarterback in school history to run for more than 1,000 yards in a season. He completed 12 of 17 passes for 231 yards.

It was the third time this season he has accounted for seven or more touchdowns. No other player in FBS has done it more than once.

Jackson went to the bench for the last two possessions of the first half with that coach Bobby Petrino said was forearm cramps but returned to start the second. He left after three quarters with the Cardinals (8-1, 6-1 Atlantic Coast Conference, No. 7 CFP) leading 52-7.

Tyler Rouse scored from 39 yards out on a screen pass from Patrick Towles to give Boston College (4-5, 1-5) its only score. The Eagles were coming off a victory over North Carolina State that was their first ACC win in almost two years.

"(Louisville) is one of the top three talented teams in America. That quarterback is electric," BC coach Steve Addazio said. "When you play a great football team, you can't have self-inflicted mistakes like we had."

Jackson had one shaky period, when he threw an interception with about five minutes left in the first half, then left with the arm injury. Petrino said Jackson complained about forearm cramps and numbness in his fingers and received intravenous fluids before returning for the second half.

He returned at the start of the third quarter but lost the ball while scrambling. But then he led the Cardinals on an eight-play, 77-yard drive that he finished with a 13-yard TD run.
