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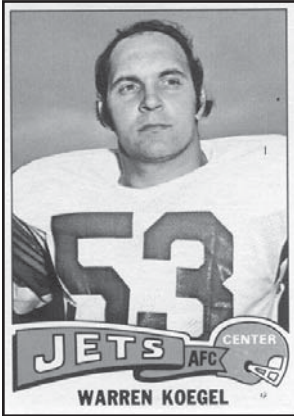


Warren D. "Moose" Koegel is starting his seventh year as the Director of Athletics at Coastal Carolina University. President Ronald R. Ingle introduced Koegel as the Chanticleers' fifth Athletic Director since 1986 on October 6, 2000.

In Koegel's years at the helm of the Coastal Carolina Athletic Department, the Chanticleers have flourished both on and off the fields of play. In his tenure to date, Coastal has been represented in NCAA Championships in men's soccer, men's and women's cross country, women's tennis, men's golf, women's golf, softball, baseball, women's indoor track and field, and men's and women's outdoor track and field. Coastal Carolina also has won the prestigious George F. "Buddy" Sasser Cup four times, including their third consecutive award in 2005-06, awarded annually to the top athletic department in the Big South Conference. In addition to the work in their sport, Coastal's almost 400 student-athletes combined for just over a 3.0 grade point average during the 2005-06 academic year.

Coastal Carolina's 17 current NCAA Division I sports continue to flourish, including the most recent addition to the Chanticleers' athletic department — football. Football, which kicked off with the 2003 season and won its first Big South championship in 2004 in just its second year of play, competes at the NCAA Division I-AA level. Coastal completed construction on a 6,408-seat state-of-the-art stadium in 2003, which is expanding by almost 1,000 seats for the 2006 season. A new athletic facility which will house the football program, as well as other parts of the department, is also slated for the near future. The new athletic facility will include an expanded weight room, training room, team meeting rooms, locker rooms for football, offices for all football coaches and staff, and several conference rooms. The facility will also become the new home for the Coastal Carolina University Buddy Sasser Athletic Hall of Fame.

Koegel came to Coastal Carolina from the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga, where he had served as an associate athletic director from 1998-2000. At Chattanooga, Koegel helped manage a \$5.2 million budget for 16 NCAA Division I sports. His other administrative responsibilities included business operations, athletic scholarships, marketing and serving as the liaison to the coaching staff. He also served on the steering committee for the NCAA I-AA National Championship Football Game.

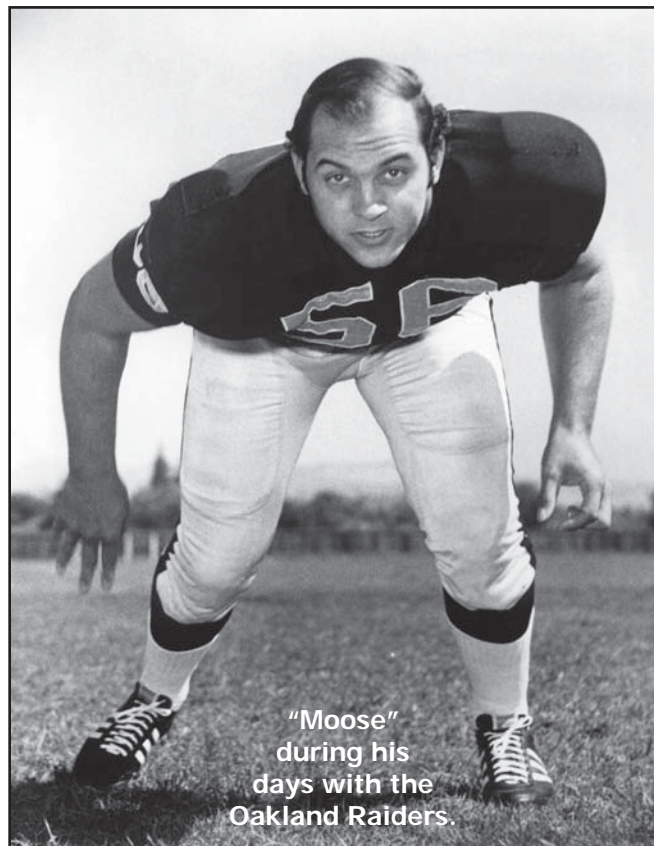


Prior to his stint at Chattanooga, he had served on the football coaching staffs at the University of Connecticut, Rutgers University and the University of Wyoming. During his tenure on the football coaching staff at the University of Connecticut from 1992 to 1997, he was recruiting coordinator and defensive line coach as well as interim head coach in 1993. Koegel was an assistant football coach at Rutgers University from

1984 to 1990 and Wyoming University from 1977 to 1983.

Koegel played in the National Football League from 1971 to 1976, spending time with the Oakland Raiders, St. Louis Cardinals and New York Jets. He starred at Penn State University under legendary football coach Joe Paterno. He was co-captain of the Nittany Lions his senior season and earned a bachelor's degree in 1971. During his college career, he was a Third Team All-American as a senior and played on two Orange Bowl champion teams. He also played in the Hula Bowl, East-West Shrine Game and the College All-State Game. Koegel received Penn State's Dedicated Player and Outstanding Senior Awards.

Koegel and his wife Elaine have one daughter, Kathryn.

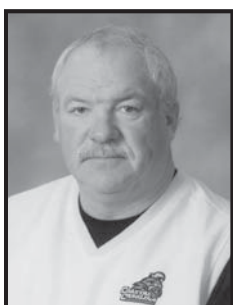
DWAYNE BEAM Head Athletic Trainer

Dwayne Beam is in his first year as the Head Athletic Trainer at Coastal Carolina University, with primary responsibility for the men's basketball. In his sixth year in the department, he spent the previous five as an assistant athletic trainer.

A member of the National Athletic Trainers' Association and Mid-Atlantic Athletic Trainers' Association, the 34-year-old Beam served as the head athletic trainer at Longwood (VA) University for the 2000-01 school year. Prior to that, he was the head athletic trainer at Belmont Abbey College from 1997-2000. He also served as an adjunct instructor at Belmont Abbey for three years, teaching athletic training courses for the internship program.

A native of Shelby, North Carolina, Beam received his master's of arts and education degree from East Carolina University in 1997, during which he served as a graduate assistant, working primarily with football. Prior to that, he received his bachelor's of science degree from Appalachian State University in 1994.

Beam and his wife Stacey reside in Myrtle Beach with their daughters, Hannah and Lindsay.



JESS DANNELLY Associate Athletics Director-Facilities/Head Softball Coach

Jess Dannelly is entering his 15th year as the Associate Athletic Director for Facilities and Game Management at Coastal Carolina University. He also is the head coach of the CCU softball program, as he starts his 19th season in that position.

During his tenure as softball coach, Dannelly has led the Lady Chants to four Big South Conference Championships and trips to the 1998, 2000, and 2001 NCAA Regionals. With his 612-432 (.586) career record, he is also one of Coastal Carolina's all-time winningest coaches in any sport and ranks 31st among active NCAA softball coaches in victories. Dannelly recorded his 600th career victory at Coastal Carolina on April 11, 2006, when the Lady Chanticleers downed Elon, 6-3.

Dannelly first came to Coastal in 1984 as an Assistant A.D. for Facilities and assistant baseball coach on the then-head coach Bobby Richardson's staff. Following the 1984 season, he left Coastal to coach high school baseball for one season, but returned to Coastal to resume his assistant coaching duties with the baseball team prior to the 1986 season. He held that position until 1988, when he accepted the head coaching position of the Lady

Chanticleers' softball program.

Dannelly attended USC-Salkehatchie from 1970 to 1972 and graduated from the University of South Carolina in 1974 with a bachelor of arts degree in health and physical education. He returned to USC-Salkehatchie as the head baseball coach in 1975 and posted a 273-214 (.561) record over nine seasons.

He and his wife, Wendy, live in Conway and have two sons, McKewn and Travis.



LISA DONALDSON Assistant Compliance Coordinator

Lisa Donaldson is starting her first year as the Assistant Compliance Coordinator at Coastal Carolina University, having joined the staff in October 2006.

Donaldson joined the staff after obtaining her master's degree in sports management from Eastern Michigan University in 2005. While there, she interned with the NCAA Compliance Coordinator at EMU and was the head gymnastics coach for three years at Pioneer High School, leading them to the conference championship in 2004.

The 31-year old Donaldson earned her undergraduate degree in management and exercise science from Arizona State University in 2002. She started her collegiate career at North Carolina State University, spending two years on the Wolfpack gymnastics squad on scholarship from 1993-95. After leaving N.C. State, she worked in private industry for five years before returning to school.

A native of Ann Arbor, Mich., Donaldson graduated from Community High School in 1993. She resides in Myrtle Beach.



KEN FAIRCLOTH Athletic Ticket Manager

Ken Faircloth is in his fourth year as the Athletic Ticket Manager at Coastal Carolina University. Faircloth previously worked in the human resources department at Coastal.

The 44-year-old Faircloth has been involved in college athletics on a different level, umpiring collegiate baseball since 1988. He has worked in the Big South and Peach Belt Conferences and was selected to umpire in the 1997 NCAA South Atlantic Regional.

Faircloth earned his bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of South Carolina. He earned his bachelor's in political science in 1984 and followed it with his master's in public administration in 1988. A native of Georgetown, S.C., he graduated from Conway High School in 1980.

Faircloth and his wife, Kathy, live in Conway with their sons Daniel and Karl.

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BRIAN GABRIEL **Head Strength & Conditioning Coach**

Brian Gabriel is in his first year at Coastal Carolina University as the Head Strength & Conditioning Coach.

Certified by the National Strength & Conditioning Association, Gabriel arrived in Fall 2006 from Columbia University, where he had been the Assistant Strength Coach and Director of Football Strength and Performance for the past four years. There he developed and implemented a comprehensive strength and speed program for individual teams, concentrating on position-specific athletes.

Prior to his time at Columbia, Gabriel had spent one year at Trinity (Texas) University as the Head Strength and Conditioning Coordinator, as well as one year in the same position with the Detroit Dogs of the American Basketball Association, who won the ABA's World Championship that year.

WALTER GOFFIGAN **Student-Athlete Academic Advisor**

Walter Goffigan is starting his first year as a Student-Athlete Academic Advisor at Coastal Carolina University.

Joining the Coastal staff in August 2006, Goffigan has an extensive background with student-athletes, having spent the last three years at Kansas State University as the Program Director for Diversity and Life Skills Education. There, he directed and managed a comprehensive program to enhance the development of all student-athletes in the KSU Athletic Department and served as the Director of the Student-Athletes Advisory Committee.

Goffigan is a candidate for his master's degree in sports administration from Florida State University. While at FSU, he served as an academic counselor for the football program and assisted with the NCAA Life Skills program. He also worked as a volunteer coach at Laramie High School and the University of Wyoming, as well as serving as an academic advisor in the College of Arts and Sciences at Wyoming for one year and the athletic department for two years. He has also worked several years as a counselor and on numerous community service projects over the last 15 years.

Goffigan started his collegiate career at Wyoming as a football player from 1980-84. While there, he was a four-year starter at running back and set the school record for career rushing yards, while earning All-Western Athletic Conference honors three times and *Sporting News* Second Team All-American honors once. He earned his bachelor's in liberal arts from Wyoming in 1997.

Goffigan and his wife Julie have four children - Ryan (20), Joshua (18), Alyssa (17) and Spencer (14).



BRUCE GREGORY **Director of Athletic Compliance**

Bruce Gregory is in his fourth year as the Director of Athletic Compliance at Coastal Carolina University. He came to Coastal from Eastern Michigan University, where he had previously served as the Assistant Director of Compliance for one year. Prior to that, he spent two years on the EMU football coaching staff and three years as the Director of Football Operations.

Gregory joined the EMU football staff in 1998 after spending the 1997 season as an assistant coach at the University of New Haven, the NCAA Division II runners-up with a 12-2 record.

The 45-year-old Gregory previously worked at Bowling Green State University as an assistant football coach twice, from 1986-88 and again from 1992-95. In addition, his father, Jack Gregory, is a former Bowling Green athletics director.

A native of East Stroudsburg, Pennsylvania, Gregory went on to earn his bachelor's degree from Western Maryland College in 1984. After graduation, Gregory started his college coaching career at BGSU and from there he served Boston University (1988-91), BGSU a second time, and in 1996 he was the offensive coordinator at Hofstra University. He was part of the 1992 BGSU staff that helped lead the team to the MAC championship and a victory in the Las Vegas Bowl.

Gregory and his wife, Tracy, have a daughter, Megan and a son, Brian.



MATT HOGUE **Associate Athletics Director-Public Relations**

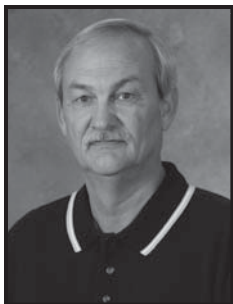
Matt Hogue is in his 10th year on the athletics staff at Coastal Carolina University, currently serving as the Associate Athletics Director for External Affairs. Hogue has been the "Voice of the Chanticleers," for CCU baseball, basketball and football, as well as serving as secretary of the Sasser Athletic Hall of Fame and assisting in baseball operations. He has also been the play-by-play talent for the Big South Conference's football and basketball television packages. He recently completed his MBA from Winthrop University.

The 35-year-old Hogue was promoted in 2004 to Associate A.D. after being the Assistant Athletics Director for Marketing for four years. He started at CCU as the Assistant Sports Information Director, working in that capacity for two years. Hogue has also spent extensive time in freelance broadcasting, working for Fox Sports Net, Comcast Sports South and other regional networks, calling football, basketball and baseball. BARRY LIPPMAN **Assistant Athletic Trainer**

Barry Lippman is starting his first year as an Assistant Athletic Trainer at Coastal Carolina University, with primary responsibility for CCU's baseball program.

A member of the National Athletic Trainers' Association, Lippman joined the CCU staff in August 2006 from UNC Wilmington, where he was the Head Men's Athletic Trainer and directly handled the baseball and women's soccer teams from January 2005 until his arrival in Conway. Prior to his tenure at UNCW, Lippman worked with the National Football League's Detroit Lions from June 2004 through January 2005, assisting with the daily medical coverage of NFL football players.

Lippman spent two years at Georgia Tech, earning his master's degree in sports medicine in 2004. While there, he was also a graduate assistant athletic trainer, working with the football, baseball and men's and women's tennis teams. GINA MARKLAND **Associate Athletics Director-Academics/Senior Woman**

Gina Markland is in her 21st year on the Coastal Carolina University Athletics staff, and her ninth as Senior Woman Administrator as well as assisting with student-athlete academics. She was promoted to Associate Athletics Director after spending eight years as an Assistant A.D. and Senior Woman Administrator. She is the coordinator of Coastal's CHAMPS/Life Skills Program and works with the Student-Athlete Advisory Council.

During her administrative career, Markland has worked on a variety of projects for both Coastal Carolina and the NCAA. She has served on the NCAA Management Council and Academics/Eligibility/Compliance Cabinet and on several Division I Certification Peer Review Team.

A member of the National Association of Collegiate Women Athletic Administrators, the 49-year-old Markland (11-15-56) originally came to Coastal as the head women's basketball coach in 1986, serving in that capacity for 11 years. She was the 1989 Big South Coach of the Year after leading the Lady Chants to a 14-14 record, a seven-win improvement over the previous season. Prior to that, she served one year as the assistant women's basketball coach at Western Carolina University during the 1985-86 season and was a basketball, volleyball and track coach at T.C. Roberson High School, her alma mater, from 1981-85.

A native of Asheville, North Carolina, Markland received her bachelor's degree from Appalachian State in 1979, where she played basketball for four years and volleyball for one. She then earned her master's degree at UNC Greensboro in 1985.

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JOHN MARTIN **Assistant Athletics Director-Media Relations**

John Martin is starting his fifth year as the Assistant Athletics Director for Media Relations at Coastal Carolina University. Martin joined the Coastal Carolina athletics staff in December 2002, after serving as the assistant sports information director at Eastern Michigan University for the previous four years. There, he was responsible for the many of the program's 21 sports and the department's web site.

Prior to that, the 36-year-old Martin had been on the staff at the University of Detroit Mercy for two-and-one-half years, serving the final year and a half as the assistant sports information director. He also was the director of basketball operations for the Oklahoma City Cavalry of the Continental Basketball Association from 1994-96 and also spent two years with that team as an intern.

Erin Miller is starting her first year as an Assistant Athletic Trainer at Coastal Carolina University.

Miller arrived in Conway following two years at the University of Nebraska, where she served as a graduate assistant athletic trainer. While at Nebraska, she worked with the track and field, softball and cheerleading teams, handling primary trainer duties for the softball squad. She also served as a camp trainer for the Nebraska wrestling camps. While in Lincoln, Miller worked on her master's degree in nutrition, with expected graduation in December 2006.

Miller started her collegiate career at Baylor University, where she was a student athletic trainer from 2000-2004. She worked with the football, track and field and women's tennis teams during her four years in Waco, while earning her bachelor's degree in education with a focus on health, fitness, recreation and athletic training.

Pounds came to Coastal from Davidson College, where he served as an assistant athletic trainer and the head football athletic trainer from 1998-2002. Prior to that, he was a staff athletic trainer for Healthworks Rehab and Fitness in Morgantown, West Virginia and the head athletic trainer at Fairmont (WV) Senior High School.

A member of the National Athletic Trainers' Association and Mid-Atlantic Athletic Trainers' Association, Pounds has extensive experience in athletic training, working various camps, including for the NBA's Sacramento Kings. He also served as the host athletic trainer for the 1999 and 2000 NCAA Men's Soccer Final Fours in Charlotte, North Carolina.

Originally from Petaluma, California, the 33-year-old Pounds earned his master's of science degree from West Virginia University in 1998. Prior to that, he received his bachelor's degree from Sacramento State University in 1996. During his collegiate career, he played two years of baseball at Santa Rosa (CA) Junior College. KENT REICHERT Assistant Athletic Media Relations Director

Kent Reichert is in his fourth year as the Assistant Sports Information Director at Coastal Carolina University, with primary responsibility for women's soccer, women's basketball and baseball.

Reichert joined the staff from Kent State University, where he served as the Assistant Sports Information Director since November 2000. There, he served as the primary media contact for KSU's nationally-ranked field hockey and men's golf programs, as well as women's basketball, wrestling and softball. He also assisted with gameday duties for football and men's basketball.

Reichert earned his bachelor's in public relations in 1999 and master's in sports administration in 2001 from Kent State, during which time he served as a student assistant and graduate assistant in the sports information office. MARK ROACH Senior Associate Athletics Director

Mark Roach is in his fourth year as the Senior Associate Athletics Director at Coastal Carolina University.

Roach came to Coastal in May 2003 after serving as the Athletics Director for the Horry County Schools for the previous five years. He was named to that position after spending one year as the Athletics Director at Carolina Forest High School.

Prior to that, the 45-year-old Roach served as the head baseball coach at Socastee High School for three years. He also was the head baseball coach at Sumter High School from 1986-94. There, he led his team to the Lower State finals in 1992 and the State Championship game in 1993. He was named the South Carolina AAAA Coach of the Year in 1993, as his team was ranked sixth in the nation by USA Today, while his final squad in 1994 opened the year ranked 19th in the country.

Born in Duluth, Georgia, Roach earned his bachelor's degree in physical education from Coastal in 1984, playing on the 1982-83 basketball and 1983 baseball squads. He later earned his master's degree in sports administration from the U.S. Sports Academy in 1994. CARI ROSIEK Event Operations Coordinator

Cari Rosiek is in her third year as the Athletics Event Operations Coordinator at Coastal Carolina University, but is very familiar with CCU.

Rosiek was a four-year letterwinner for Jess Dannelly's nationally-recognized softball program from 1996-99, starting every possible game of her career, a mark that reached 227. As a starter on the 1998 squad, she helped lead the Lady Chanticleers to the Big South Conference Tournament title and the school's first-ever berth in the NCAA Tournament. She currently ranks in the top-10 in four single-season categories, including the top mark in sacrifice hits, and also ranks in eight career categories for the Lady Chanticleers. She graduated from CCU in 1999 with a bachelor's degree in physical education.

Most recently, she was an operations manager for part of the Burroughs and Chapin Corporation for four years. There, she handled budgetary issues as well as supervising a 90-member staff for one of Burroughs and Chapin's properties.

CCU SPORTS MEDICINE

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The Coastal Carolina Sports Medicine program consists of four NATA certified staff athletic trainers, five interns, thirteen affiliated team physicians, and many local allied health care providers and specialists.

Athletic trainers are educated and highly skilled allied health care professionals. In cooperation with physicians and other allied health care providers, athletic trainers function as members of the athletic health care team. Athletic trainers are required to maintain Continuing Education Requirements by their national certifying body (NATA Board of Certification) and the State of South Carolina.

Athletic Trainers are certified by the National Athletic Trainers' Association Board of Certification and in South Carolina by the Department of Health and Environmental Control (DHEC). These bodies require written and oral examinations that test skills in the five domains of athletic training once a degree program has been completed.

- Assessment and evaluation
- Acute care of injury and illness
- Pharmacology
- Therapeutic modalities
- Psychosocial intervention and referral
- Health care administration
- Professional development and responsibility
- Provide therapeutic exercise for general medical conditions and disabilities

NCAA COMPLIANCE

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THE INITIAL ELIGIBILITY & AMATEURISM CLEARINGHOUSE

What is the Initial Eligibility Clearinghouse?

If you intend to participate in Division I athletics as a freshman, you must register with and be certified by the NCAA Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse. Your high school counselor should provide you with the student-release form and a red brochure titled, "Making Sure You Are Eligible to Participate in College Sports."

What does the Clearinghouse need to certify me?

After graduation and before school closes for the summer, your high school must send the Clearinghouse a copy of your final transcript that confirms graduation from high school. You must also have your ACT or SAT scores sent to the Clearinghouse.

How do I have my test scores sent to the Clearinghouse?

Test scores must be sent directly from the testing agency. You can accomplish this by marking code 9999 as one of the institutions to receive your scores, or submit a request for an "Additional Score Report" to the appropriate testing agency.

What is the Amateurism Clearinghouse?

Beginning in the Fall of 2006, all prospects who will be entering a Division I or II collegiate institution for the first time in the Fall of 2007 will also need to be certified by the NCAA Amateurism Clearinghouse. NCAA President Myles Brand authorized the creation of this branch in response to the NCAA membership's concerns about amateurism issues related to international and domestic prospective and transfer student-athletes (prospects).

How do I register with these entities?

To register with the Initial Eligibility Clearinghouse, complete the Student Release Form and mail the top (white) copy of the form to the Clearinghouse along with the required registration fee or register online at www.NCAAClearinghouse.net. You should apply for certification after your junior year in high school if you are sure that you wish to participate in intercollegiate athletics as a freshman at a Division I or II institution. If you fail to submit all required documents, your incomplete file will be discarded after three years, requiring you to register again.

Your registration fee will cover certification of initial eligibility and amateur status. The Amateurism Clearinghouse operates through online registration only and is also located at www.NCAAClearinghouse.net. All prospects will be required to complete a questionnaire about their athletics participation prior to full-time collegiate enrollment at a Division I or Division II institution. Prospects will not be permitted to participate in intercollegiate competition until initial eligibility and amateurism certifications are completed.

14-Core Course Rule

For prospective student-athletes first entering a collegiate institution, you must meet the 14-core course rule. The core requirements are:

- 4 years of English
- 2 years of Mathematics
- 2 years of Natural/Physical Science
- 1 year of additional English, Math or Natural/Physical Science
- 2 years of Social Science
- 3 years of additional courses (from above or foreign language, non-doctrinal religion, or philosophy)

Effective August 1, 2008, you will need to meet a 16-core course requirement.

RECRUITING REGULATIONS

When do I become a prospective student-athlete?

When you start ninth-grade classes. Before the ninth grade, you become a prospective student-athlete if a college gives you (or your relatives or friends) any financial aid or other benefits that the college does not provide to all prospective students.

When is a college considered to be recruiting me?

If any coach or representative of the college's athletics interests approaches you (or any member of your family) about enrolling and participating in athletics at that college.

Who can recruit me?

Only university coaches and staff. Alumni and friends of the university are NOT permitted to contact prospective student-athletes in any way.

OFFICIAL VISITS

How many official visits am I allowed to take? Beginning when?

Each prospective student-athlete is limited to five official visits which may be taken following the opening day of classes of your senior year of high school.

What must the school have from me before I take an official visit?

The recruiting institution must already have a high school or a college transcript and ACT or SAT test scores on file.

UNOFFICIAL VISITS

Can I pay my own way to visit a college campus? Starting when?

You may visit an institution's campus at your own expense an unlimited number of times before your senior year of high school and continuing in your senior year. This is an unofficial visit.

What can the school give me when I go on an unofficial visit?

A maximum of three complimentary admissions to a campus athletic event in which that school's team is competing, issued through a pass list only. Such complimentary admissions are for the exclusive use of the prospect and those persons accompanying him on the visit. They can be issued only on an individual game basis.

PHONE CALLS & CONTACTS

Who can call me on the phone? When? How often?

Faculty members and coaches are permitted to call you once during the month of March of your junior year (all sports other than football). Football may call you once during the month of May of your junior year. Additional calls may be made after July 1 of your junior year (all sports other than football and basketball), June 21 for basketball and September 1 for football. After that date, a coach or faculty member can call you or your parents or legal guardian once a week. Boosters are not permitted to call.

In sports other than football, it is permissible to make one in-person, off campus recruiting contact with you during the month of April of your junior year, then again once per week after July 1 during a contact period, limited to three. Football is permitted to do so beginning September 1 and is limited to six during a contact period.

When are coaches or faculty members allowed unlimited calls to me?

At the following times: During the five days immediately before your official visit to that university; on the day of a coach's off-campus contact with you; during the time beginning with the initial National Letter of Intent (NLI) signing date in your sport through the two days after the signing date.

Can I call coaches collect or toll free? When?

Yes. You may call coaches or universities collect or use a toll-free (1 800) number. They may receive calls on or after July 1 after you complete your junior year of high school.

CORRESPONDENCE AND RECRUITING MATERIALS

From whom can I receive letters? Beginning when?

Coaches, faculty members and students (but not boosters) can send you letters, starting September 1 of your junior year in high school. (at the conclusion of sophomore year for men's basketball)

What can a university send me?

A Division I institution may provide you with the following material: general correspondence, including letters, U.S. Postal Service postcards and institutional note cards, and materials printed on plain white paper with black ink; business cards; e-mail and instant messages; NCAA educational information; pre-enrollment information subsequent to signing a National Letter of Intent with the university; one athletic publication (media guide or recruiting guide) which may include only one color printing inside; schedule cards.

Can they send me anything prior to my junior year?

Only questionnaires and summer camp brochures.

Can any other materials be mailed to me?

No. Game programs, which may not include posters, can be provided only during official or unofficial visits to the school's campus. The same restrictions apply to student-athlete handbooks.

SUMMER JOBS

Can a university I have signed with help me get a summer job? Beginning when?

After you sign a National Letter of Intent, the school you signed with may arrange summer employment for you. That employment may begin AFTER you graduate from high school.

Are there payment regulations for summer employment?

Yes, all earnings from summer employment must be at a rate of pay that is comparable with the going rate for that type of work performed. You should be paid by check for hours actually worked.

Can I accept transportation from my employer?

Transportation cannot be provided unless transportation is provided to all employees. An employer cannot provide you with any benefit or privileges that are not provided to all employees.

Can I be paid for teaching or coaching sport skills?

You cannot be paid for teaching or coaching sport skills in your sport on a fee per lesson basis. However, you can be employed by a community agency or club to teach sport skills as long as you have other duties or responsibilities.
