The Thames River will be closed to all traffic beginning at approximately 7:45 a.m. on race day and will remain closed until 15 minutes after the conclusion of the varsity race. If boats are allowed to transit the race course, they shall travel only downstream, between races, under Coast Guard escort and at no wake.

College sports' oldest rivals and a pair of Eastern Sprints varsity grand finalists take part in their 152nd head-to-head clash at the Harvard-Yale Regatta. Yale (6-0 in duals) is looking to complete its second-straight perfect dual season. Harvard, which posted a 6-0 record in its dual races, is looking to best Yale for the 15th time over the last 17 years. This rivalry dates back 165 years to a two-mile race, won by Harvard, held August 3, 1852 on Lake Winnepesaukee in New Hampshire. To this day, it is the longest running intercollegiate rivalry and one of the richest in tradition.

While most races are 2,000 meters in length, the Crimson and Eli varsities depart from that "sprint" distance to battle along a four-mile playing field which presents a true test of each oarsman's endurance, character and strength. The varsity race is the longest of its kind in America and three times the distance of a normal race. (Each crew will take approximately 700 strokes to complete the course). The two-mile combination and freshman/third varsity races and three-mile second varsity contest are nearly as exhausting.

This year's racing will be held in June for the fifth-straight year and to the upstream course on the Thames River for the fourth-consecutive time. The combination event is slated for Friday evening, and Saturday's first race pits Harvard against Yale in the first, second and third varsity boats.

Varsity Season Recap

Heading into the IRA National Championships, the Elis are looking to build off their third-straight EARC Sprints Championship, a first in program history, while Harvard is hoping to improve on a second-place finish at Easterns and post a strong showing at the national championship regatta. In preview to the HY Regatta, the Bulldogs held off Harvard in 0.4 seconds, winning the 1V8 in 5:30.7 to 5:31.1. The Crimson's first varsity returns three rowers and its coxswain from the 2016 crew -- James Johnston, Alexander Richards and Sam Hardy and Cole Durbin. Yale returns six athletes from the 2016 boat, five of whom also rowed with the first varsity in 2015. Harvard has two seniors—Vincent Breet and James Johnston, as well as three juniors, three sophomores and one freshman on the squad. For the second-straight year, Yale will have three seniors, three juniors, a sophomore and two freshman on its varsity boat.

Harvard owns a 6-0 dual record and finished a narrow second at Sprints. The Crimson has won nine duals in a row dating back to April 2016. This marks the fourth-straight year

that Yale is undefeated heading into the IRA National Championships. The Elis have not dropped a dual race since the Crimson won the 149th Regatta on June 7, 2014. Since then, Yale has rattled off 19-consecutive victories.

The Varsity Race

A year ago, following the successful completion of the second and third varsity races, the varsity eights lined up for the four-mile excursion. Yale took the early lead, but the large waves continued to attack and the Harvard crew took on enough water to sink by the half mile mark. The referee raised the red flag and blew the horn, indicating that the race had been stopped, and both crews stopped rowing. The Elis stopped momentarily, but ultimately crossed the finish line. It was the first time that a Harvard or Yale varsity boat swamped and had to stop racing. And it was the first time since 1874 that both boats didn't cross the finish line. In Saratoga, New York, that spring, the Yale boat became disabled after colliding with the Harvard vessel.

The Second Varsity Race

After Yale won the second varsity event in 2015, for the first time since 2007, Harvard edged the Bulldogs in last year's race 18:03.67 to 18:11.67. The Crimson used the first 90 seconds to create a length lead on the Elis. Yale did its best to stay within that length, but by the first mile Harvard's second varsity had created a full length of open water. When the crews reached the midway point a half mile later, the Harvard advantage was at two lengths and increased to greater than three at the two-mile marker. Yale did its best to close the gap over the final mile, but Harvard concluded the three-mile course eight seconds ahead of its rival.

Harvard's 2V owns a 5-1 dual record this season and finished fourth at Sprints. Yale, which posted a 6-0 overall record, was second at the EARC Sprints.

The Freshman/Third Varsity Race

The Crimson has won 10 straight H-Y freshman/third varsity races and 14 in 15 seasons. Last year's race saw the Crimson sprinting away from Yale in the early stages and finishing a tremendous race in the two-mile affair. After a rolling start, the Crimson created an open-water advantage by the half mile mark. The Harvard lead had turned into multiple boat lengths by the mile mark, with the Crimson holding nearly a 20-second advantage. Harvard continued to widen the margin over the final mile, crossing in 11:39.78, over 40

Race-Day Flutters

- Today's race is the 152nd of the series and the 129th on the Thames. Harvard leads the rivalry, 95-55, including a 78-50 edge in New London.

- Harvard swamped at approximately first half mile mark with Yale well ahead. Referee stopped race with no official result declared. Yale ultimately crossed finish line and disputed result.

- The last non-New London race occurred on May 18, 1974, on Boston's Charles River.

- This is the 72nd-consecutive year Harvard and Yale are facing each other. The last time the teams didn't meet was 1945, during World War II.

- Both Harvard's Charley Butt and Yale's Steve Gladstone were once head coaches of the Crimson lightweights.

- After sweeping seventh-straight Regattas from 2008-14, Harvard won the 2V8 and 3V8 a year ago. Yale had wins in the V8 and 2V8 in 2015.

- Yale last swept the Regatta in 1996 but came close in 2007, taking the varsity race with a dramatic sprint. The Bulldogs won in 19:57.5, just a half-second ahead of Eastern-champion Harvard, and the Eli second varsity eight completed the course in 15:27 to beat the Crimson by 18 seconds. Harvard won the freshman race by a 10-second margin.

- Harvard leads the second varsity series, 76-38, and won by over 17 seconds last year.

- With freshmen now eligible for varsity competition, the 2013 Harvard freshman boat was the last to compete in the race. The Crimson rookies blasted the Eli 3V by over 31 seconds. Last year, each team entered a third varsity boat, as Harvard won by just over three seconds. The Crimson now leads the freshman/combination rivalry 73-39-1.

- Yale had taken the last two downstream races, in 1996 and '99, until Harvard's wins in 2009 and '12. Harvard has won five of the last six upstream events and leads the upstream series, 42-24.

- The Crimson holds the upstream course record with its time of 18:41.9 in 1995. Yale's fastest upstream time (18:45.5) was also posted that year. Harvard set the downstream—and Thames River course—record of 18:22.4 in 1980.

- Some of the closest finishes in Regatta history have gone Yale's way. The Elis recorded a 0.2-second win in 1914, captured the 1962 contest by one second and took 2007's race by a half-second.

The Crimson 3V8 are a perfect 6-0 this spring. At Sprints, Harvard earned the gold medal, besting the event with a mark of 5:37.03. The Yale 3V holds a 6-0 overall record and finished second to the Crimson at Sprints, coming in with a time of 5:39.0.

Global Affair

Seven countries and four continents are represented in the Harvard and Yale varsity eights, and four of 16 oarsmen are from the Southern Hemisphere. The United States are also well represented, as four states make up the varsity eight boats, from as close as Old Lyme, Connecticut, to as far as Hinsdale, Illinois.

Follow the Action

All the Harvard-Yale Regatta action will once again be streamed live on the Ivy League Digital Network. Charlie Hamlin and Andy Card are scheduled to announce, giving viewers insight from on the water.



Head Coach
Steve Gladstone
Seventh season • Syracuse '64

Steve Gladstone, regarded as one of the premier rowing coaches in the United States, was named the head coach of Yale's heavyweight crew in 2010 and his first spring racing season was 2011. Yale Heavyweight Crew has risen to new heights under his leadership, and Gladstone was rewarded with a 2015 USRowing Medal while being named Ivy League Coach of the Year in 2015 and 2016.

In 2014-15, the varsity saw its best finishes in nearly a decade, taking the Eastern Sprints and beating Harvard at the 150th Yale-Harvard Regatta. The varsity went on to defeat national champion Washington in the final of the Ladies' Challenge Plate at the Henley Royal Regatta.

The Yale heavyweight varsity eight went on to take the 2015 Head of the Charles and then the 2016 Eastern Sprints before finishing second at the national championships. The Elis captured the EARC Sprints title in 2017, the program's first three-peat in Worcester.

"I could not be more pleased to be coaching the heavyweight men at Yale," Gladstone said when he was hired. "To be a part of Yale's storied rowing tradition is indeed an honor."

Gladstone led the University of California men's crew program to six IRA championships during two coaching stints with the Golden Bears and also served as the director of rowing operations at Brown where he won four Eastern Sprints titles. More recently, he was a director at the California Rowing Club, helping develop post-graduate oarsmen for the U.S. National Team.

Gladstone's 11 IRA championships place him three behind Charles "Pop" Courtney of Cornell (1901-15) for the most varsity eight titles in the history of collegiate rowing. In all, Gladstone's Cal crews medaled at the IRA regatta 11 times in his 12 seasons since 1997 - five gold and six bronze - an unprecedented achievement in the long history of the championship. Over that same period, he directed Cal to seven of 12 Pac-10 championships.

During his first term at Cal from 1973-80, Gladstone guided the Bears to three undefeated dual-race seasons, an IRA title in 1976 and a Pac-10 championship in 1979.

As the director of rowing operations at Brown from 1981-94, Gladstone's crew triumphed four times at the Eastern Sprints, five times at the IRA regatta and twice at the National Collegiate Rowing Championships.

He returned to Cal in 1997, taking over a program that finished as high as third at IRAs just once since his 1980 departure. The Bears saw immediate success, capturing a bronze medal at the national regatta in 1997 and running off a string of four consecutive championships from 1999-2002.

From 2001-04, Gladstone added the director of athletics role to his duties at Cal, overseeing a department that placed ninth in the Directors' Cup for overall excellence in 2003 and 2004 and won five national team championships.

Gladstone began his coaching career in 1966 as freshman coach at Princeton for three years. He then took over as varsity lightweight coach at Harvard, leading the Crimson to four straight undefeated seasons, four titles at the Eastern Sprints and victories in the 1971 Thames Challenge Cup and Wyfold Challenge Cup at the Henley Royal Regatta in England. During his tenure at Harvard, he served as the U.S. National team coach (1969 and 1973) and was a selector for the 1972 U.S. Olympic team.

A 1964 Syracuse graduate, Gladstone has served on the Board of Directors of the National Association of Amateur Oarsmen and has also been a member of the Men's Olympic Rowing Committee. In 1984, he served as ABC's analyst for rowing events at the Los Angeles Olympics. He worked in the same capacity for NBC at the Seoul Olympic Games in 1988.

Head Coach

Charley Butt

Fourth season • Rutgers '83



Charley Butt was named the Bolles-Parker Head Coach for Harvard Men's Heavyweight Crew on August 13, 2013. Butt begins his 32nd season with the Harvard rowing program in 2016-17, having previously served as the Friends of Harvard Lightweight Rowing Coach for Men's Lightweight Crew for 28 years.

The ninth coach in Harvard heavyweight crew history, Butt assumed his role after the passing of the legendary Harry Parker, who guided the Crimson for 51 seasons. Butt becomes just the fourth coach to lead the Crimson since 1946.

The Crimson posted a 7-1 finish in 2016, ranking fourth at the Eastern Sprints and fifth at the IRA National Championships. In 2015, Butt led Harvard to a 6-2 dual season, finishing fifth at the Eastern Sprints and IRA National Championships.

The Crimson posted a perfect 8-0 record in 2014 during its dual season, including a sweep of Yale in the 149th Harvard-Yale Regatta. Harvard also won the EARC Sprints for the fifth time in as many years, as the varsity eight took home the inaugural Harry Parker Cup. Butt led the team to a fifth-place finish at the IRA National Championships.

Butt led Harvard's lightweight program for nearly 30 seasons, steering the Crimson to 15 Eastern crowns and nine national championships, including the 2012 and 2013 IRA National Championships.

Consistently among the nation's best, Butt's crews posted winning dual records in 25 of his 28 seasons at the helm.

Harvard also won the Head of the Charles Regatta for the first time since 1975 during the fall of 2012.

An outstanding oarsman himself, Butt rowed on the United States lightweight entry in the 1980 world championships, finishing fourth. He was a member of the winning four with coxswain at the 1979 IRA Championship and later that year was selected as an alternate on the national lightweight team.

Butt graduated from Rutgers in 1983. In 1985, he was a silver medalist for the lightweight eight at the world championships in Belgium. In 1986, Butt was part of the Wyfold Cup championship crew at Henley.

As a coach, Butt's experience extends well beyond Harvard, including four stints as a United States Olympic coach, a position he continues to hold. Andrew Campbell, a junior Harvard oarsman and Butt's pupil, became the first American to win gold as a single sculler at the 2013 World Rowing Under 23 Championships.

At the 2008 Olympics in Beijing, Butt helped Radcliffe alumna, Michelle Guerette '02, earn a silver medal in the women's single sculls. He served as her coach at the 2005 World Championships, where she won bronze medal in the single sculls.

Four years earlier at the 2004 Olympics in Athens, Butt and associate heavyweight coach Bill Manning worked with former Crimson rowers Artour Samsonov '02, Henry Nuzum '99 and Greg Ruckman '96 in the pair, double and lightweight double.

At the 2000 Games, he coached the men's lightweight double, a boat that included Greg Ruckman '96. He also coached a pair featuring former Crimson oarsman Adam Holland '94 and a bronze-medalist lightweight single sculler at the 2002 world championships in Seville. At the 1996 Atlanta Olympics, he coached the men's pair, a tandem which included Holland. He coached Holland's pair again in 1997 and '98 when they were third and a very close fourth, respectively, at the world championships.

Butt previously coached the U.S. men's quad that captured the silver at the 1991 Pan Am Games in Havana, was an assistant coach for men's sweep rowing (4+) at the 1993 world championships in the Czech Republic and coached the coxed four to silver at the 1994 world championships. That boat featured three Harvard oarsmen: Holland, Bill Cooper '93 and Chris Swan '92.

The Summer of Reckoning

The Yale Heavyweight Crew class of 2017 arrived at Gilder Boathouse with great expectations for their first year of collegiate rowing. An undefeated dual sprints season along with a top seed at EARC Sprints was just what the nine newcomers had in mind when they came to row for Steve Gladstone, the Craig W. Johnson '68 Yale Head Coach. However, for the young Bulldogs of 2017, the fairytale beginning to their first season quickly turned into a disaster.

"We came in with huge promise," said current captain Robert Hurn, who figured Yale's day had finally come. "Then we took three huge knocks in a row."

The first boat finished sixth at the Eastern Sprints, the worst result from the top seeded crew in the competition's history. A late-season lineup change brought some improvement, but could not reverse the crew's fortunes. They went on to take sixth at the IRA National Championships, before falling emphatically to Harvard on the Thames. "We were beaten like a drum," said Hurn.

However, the distasteful end to their first season as Bulldogs provided strong motivation for the class of 2017. Nate Goodman went home to New Jersey and trained relentlessly, coming back to Yale a minute faster over 6000m on the Concept 2 ergometer. Oliver Wynne-Griffith returned home to the UK and was selected to the GB National Team to compete at the 2014 World U23 Championships in Italy. Hurn spent two to three hours a day on the bike at home in Australia and also joined an Olympic weightlifting club, returning to the Yale squad a significantly stronger athlete.

"Coming off a disappointing racing season in 2014, I was excited to go home and train for the U23 British National team. I was lucky enough to gain selection for the U23 World Championships that summer. It gave me the opportunity to get another two months of full-time training in as well as a chance to test myself on the world stage," said Wynne-Griffith. "I learned a lot from being on the national team that year. It also allowed me to put in to practice a lot of things that Coach Gladstone had asked me to work on for the following season."

I was motivated to be a better athlete simply by wanting to win. My freshman year here was not as successful as I would have liked and



I was motivated to change that and win races. Essentially, it was just hours on the water; put in the hours and the results will come."

"I was unhappy with my results freshman year. I realized that if I wanted to win more I would have to row better and become more fit," said Goodman. "I worked out specific goals in the single and on the ergometer. Every day I sculled and erged 10 kilometers each, which helped me return a stronger and more able oarsman."

The class of 2017's summer of rededication was not part of a class plan, cooked up at the end of their unsuccessful first season. Rather, it was born from a collective desire to deliver what they had come to Yale to do, and that was to take the program to the top of US collegiate rowing.

"We didn't discuss this, it just happened," Hurn. "It made an enormous difference... to the speed of the boats and to the morale of the program. We had given our shirts to Harvard twice that year. We decided that wasn't how we were going to define our time at Yale." After that transformative summer, the class of 2017 never looked back. Since 2014, they have helped propel the program to three consecutive Sprints championships, and have also been a part of the first Yale crew to win at Henley, San Diego and the Head of the Charles. Despite this success, the class continues to set the bar even higher.

"Our most important [dual] race is Harvard and we love racing them. But our team has improved to the point where we can realistically set our sights on being the best in the country," said Hurn. "That's why we were so gutted at finishing second last year at the IRA."

There are six seniors between the top two Bulldog boats, including Stephan Riemekasten (Berlin, GER), the stroke seat of the 1V, John Risbergs (Islip, N.Y.) in the No. 5 seat of the 2V, while Peter Tortora (Fairfield, C.T.) locks down the bow of the 2V.

Riemekasten, who also plays the violin and piano and played the





drums in a rock band, made the Germany-wide final in the “Emergenza” Band contest and has played in clubs all over Berlin. Despite his musical pedigree, the only engaged member of the Yale program has his sights set on more rowing.

“I will start training professionally after Yale, getting paid through a program with the German Army, but will also enroll in medical school to continue my academic career. The 2020 Olympics in Tokyo are my main goal though for the immediate future,” said Riemekasten, a neuro-psych major who has learned to speak both French and Spanish at Yale and who took his sophomore spring off from Yale to row for the German National Team.

He met his fiancé, Sophia, through his band during high school. She came to the states to study at Columbia and then she interned at Yale. They are planning a June 2018 wedding, which all the boys will attend.

It’s ironic that Peter Tortora, who grew up 20 minutes from Yale, might feel like a foreigner on this squad. The Fairfield native originally came to Yale as part of the lightweight team, with whom he won an Eastern Sprints title as a freshman. He joined the heavies during his sophomore year, and through his fierce competitive spirit, coupled with a large engine, has made his presence felt within the team. This season, Peter, alongside John Risbergs, has led the 2V to an undefeated

dual racing season and a silver medal at the Eastern Sprints.

Finally, seniors James Barnett (Dallas, Texas) and Robin Molen-Grigull (Sydney, Australia) have both rowed in the 4V this season.

Molen-Grigull, who earned Yale’s Amanda Walton Award for “spirit and courage in transcending unforeseen challenges,” has been quite an inspiration for Eli rowers. He broke several vertebrae in his back and was partially paralyzed from the waist down after a January 2016 skiing accident. Molen-Grigull slowly regained use of some leg muscles and returned to campus moving gingerly. The Yale coaches were surprised enough that he returned to New Haven, but they were blown away when he showed up at practice in August of 2016, unwilling to accept that his days as a varsity athlete were over. Robin’s refusal to quit, no matter the circumstances, is a constant source of inspiration for his teammates.

Over the last four years, the commitment of these seniors has taken the Yale Crew program to new heights. However, the success of the Yale program has not been merely the result of strong individual dedication. Mental maturation and handling challenges have also helped Elis progress to this point.

“I was smarter about how I approached my rowing, and kept a more level head through the inevitable ups and downs of the training cycle,” said Goodman about his transition to sophomore year. “This maturity has been helpful in overcoming the challenges of my career, like Yale’s disappointing finish at the IRA in 2015, or the poor performance that I had with the US Under-23 Team last summer at the World Championships. I understand that those experiences, while deeply unpleasant, are valuable, and they will help me achieve success in the future. That lesson is the key behind my advancement at Yale.”

Last year’s seniors appropriately called themselves the Phoenix Class because they helped the program “rise from the ashes.” The current veterans made sure that Yale’s national ranking remained among the top few, but now they are focused on the finishing touch.

“It was last year’s class that created the path,” said Hurn. “We just brought in the bulldozers!”



Up The Boys

The “Frosh Closet” is much more than just a nickname for a locker room. For the Harvard University Class of 2017, it was where the odyssey towards the 152nd edition of “The Race” began. After disappointments over the last two years on the Thames, these seniors hope that the second Saturday in June is the positive culmination of four years of shared experiences.

Four seniors in particular, each of whom have had their own unique journey to Cambridge, will cherish their final time at Red Top as Harvard rowers.

Max Ferguson, a sociology concentrator from Miami Beach, Fla., didn’t pick up an oar until his junior year of high school. His grandfather was a rower in Cuba, and that helped set in motion Ferguson’s eventual time at Harvard. With only two years of experience at the high school level, Max showed enough potential to be offered a coveted spot with the Crimson.

“Rowing was kind of the thing that motivated me to really start looking for what’s next,” said Ferguson. “Rowing was always part of the conversation, and Harvard was the best for rowing and academics.”

Henry Kennelly, a history concentrator from Manchester, Massachusetts, had a shorter domestic journey to Cambridge. For Henry, there is also a strong lineage of Harvard rowers in his family, as both his father and grandfather were members of the Crimson crew.

“When I tried rowing in high school, I fell in love with the guys who did it more than the sport itself,” explained Kennelly. “The history of this program and the competitiveness I knew I’d encounter rowing [at Harvard] was greater than any other school I thought.”

James Johnston, an economics concentrator from Cape Town, South Africa, became the first member of his family to study in America when he agreed to come to Cambridge.



Johnston had rowing experience dating back to 2008, including time at the Junior World Championships in both 2011 and 2012.

“Through the international scene I was exposed to the coaches of the universities outside of South Africa,” said Johnston. “Studying outside of South Africa was never something I ever thought about.”

Juri-Mikk Udam, a mechanical engineering concentrator from Tallinn, Estonia, also had international experiences at the Junior World Championships in 2011 and 2012.

“I started rowing after the fall of 2008 after the Estonian double had won silver in the Olympics in Beijing,” said Udam. “I had just finished swimming, so I thought I should probably try out something new.”

It was in the fall of 2013 when these four, along with the rest of the class of 2017, formed their social and athletic network in the “Frosh Closet.”

“It was our own little changing room,” Kennelly aptly described of the locker room. “It was much nicer with only 12 guys in a room as opposed to one with 40.”

“The ‘Frosh Closet’ was something I leaned on heavily,” added Udam. “I was so lucky to have this group of guys to lean on from the beginning to show me the support when I needed it.”

Transitioning to the college life can prove difficult to some, and the relationships formed early on in the water and in the locker room aided these troubles.

“Rowing helped give me an early community,” explained Ferguson. “I got really close with Juri in my freshman year, and we had that peer support network.”

“The bonds that we developed as a freshmen crew were strong,” added Kennelly. “We were the last crew recruited by the old regime, so we’ve been here for the entire transition.”

The class of 2017 was the last full class recruited and brought to Cambridge by legendary head coach Harry Parker.

"I was definitely down on the fact that Harry passed before I got coached by him," said Ferguson. "It was an interesting transition, everything was new and it brought the team together as a whole."

"Our class has been the ones from freshman year to senior year that have been there every year with [head coach] Charley [Butt]," explained Udam. "Our belief in ourselves helped set the tone for the mentality of the team."

The class of 2017 hopes that the tremendous success of the 2016-17 season helps translate to a victory at the 152nd regatta against Yale.

"We're so privileged to have so much strong leadership in the class," said Ferguson. "I think that our leading by example and our love for the program through the hardest times has led to a successful season in senior year."

These seniors will experience the pomp and circumstance of Harvard versus Yale for a fourth time, but it still isn't easy to explain the feelings associated with it.

"It's so hard put into words the emotions and sensations you go through," Ferguson said of the yearly extravaganza with Yale. "There's racing, and then here's Harvard-Yale."

"Three of the most angry times of my life have been at the start of a Harvard-Yale race," explained Kennelly. "I expect the same from Yale."

For someone like Udam who had no prior exposure to the rivalry before arriving from Estonia, he couldn't understand how a dual race could be more important than the IRAs or national championships.



"Once I finally got there, I realized what it meant," said Udam. "I really do feel more intent at being my absolute best for Harvard-Yale, and I want the Yale crew to be at their absolute best."

"It's one of the highlights of my life regardless of outcome," Johnston added succinctly. "Given last year's event and Yale winning two years ago, this year is going to be quite something."

At the end of the day, Johnston's words ring true for each of these four seniors as they draw closer to the end of their time as Harvard oarsmen.

"It's been transformative, we've experienced a lot together," said Johnston. "I've certainly grown significantly as an athlete, person, and friend through my time here."

"Up the boys," Ferguson decreed. "It's just what we live by."



Master of Protocol **Henry Kennelly**

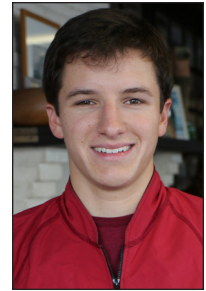
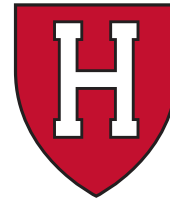

Kennelly, a native of Manchester, Massachusetts, graduates with a history degree.



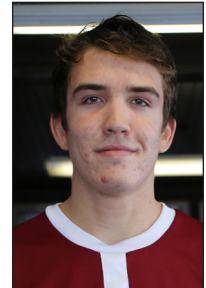

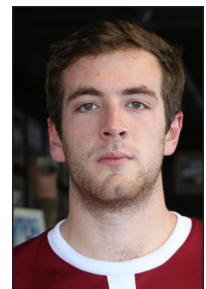

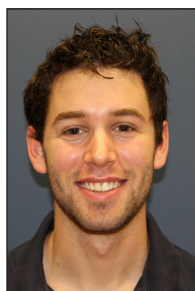

Robert Hurn, a four-year member of the first varsity boat, has helped the Elis win every dual sprints race since he arrived in New Haven. He is a two-time EARC Sprints Champion and the captain of the 2016-17 Yale team.

Hurn has held the No. 2 seat in the 1V the last three years while moving his oar well enough to enable the Elis to capture their first victories at the Henley Royal Regatta, the Head of the Charles and the San Diego Crew Classic. The Bulldogs, with the consistency of the No. 2 oar, took second place at the 2016 IRA nationals. He and the Elis are also motivated to earn a second straight win over Harvard.

The Brisbane, Australia, native, who was born in Glasgow, Scotland, had the seven seat and a silver medal with Great Britain in the U23 World Championships last summer in the Netherlands.

A Trumbull College resident at Yale who captained his high school rowing team, he is a physics major who will row at Cambridge while earning a masters in nuclear engineering. Off the water and outside the Payne Whitney Gym, he is most proud of his work with Yale professor of physics Charles Baltay as part of research group on dark energy.

Most of Hurn's energy has gone into rowing, and he aspires to compete for the UK at the 2020 Olympic Games.

There are many chapters in the history of the great Harvard-Yale rivalry. The first was written in the summer of 1852—on the waters of Lake Winnepesaukee in Center Harbor, N.H.—when crews from the two schools met in a two-mile race. As is the case with its football counterpart known as “The Game,” the Harvard-Yale crew race is a season unto itself, as victory will make any campaign a success, while defeat can spoil an otherwise spectacular spring. Sports Illustrated has called this the most venerable rivalry in all of college sports, and Yankee Magazine wrote a cover story on the race. We’re now into the third century of this race; let’s take the time to review some of the grand moments of the past 165 years.

Boat clubs at Harvard and Yale had existed since the early 1840s, but races against outside competition was rare. That all changed when Yale issued a challenge to Harvard “to test the superiority of the oarsmen of the two colleges.” Thus the oldest intercollegiate athletic event was born.

On August 3, 1852—in a two-mile race on the calm waters of Lake Winnepesaukee—Harvard and Yale battled like never before. Yale was represented by two boats, the Shawmut and the Undine, while Harvard rowed in the Oneida. Harvard won the inaugural race by about four lengths, earning a pair of black walnut oars as its prize. It seems that people right away knew this was going to be the start of something big, for among the distinguished observers was General Franklin Pierce, the Democratic Party nominee and native of nearby Hillsborough, who would be elected president later that year.

No further races were held between the schools until July 1855, when Yale issued another challenge. In a contest held on the Connecticut River in Springfield, Mass., Harvard made it two straight victories, winning by one minute and 38 seconds. Harvard and Yale met again in 1859 and 1860, but it wasn’t until 1864 that the Regatta became an annual event. Yale gained its first series win that year, taking the three-miler on Worcester’s Lake Quinsigamond by 42 seconds.

In 1876, the series’ first four-mile race was held as the crews met on the Connecticut River. Yale won the contest, which was the first since the inaugural one to use eight-oared shells, by 29 seconds.

The Regatta came to New London in 1878 and, with rare exception, has been held in the town originally known as Nameaug (“good fishing place”) ever since. Yale arrived 12 days prior to the June 28 race, settling in at Gales Ferry and taking quarters at a two-story house owned by Latham Brown. Harvard set up camp five days later, moving into a house owned by Charles Stoddard, about a mile south of Yale.

Fare in the special Trains HALF PRICE. The regular trains run as usual, giving persons from connecting roads an opportunity to witness the Regatta in the afternoon of each day.

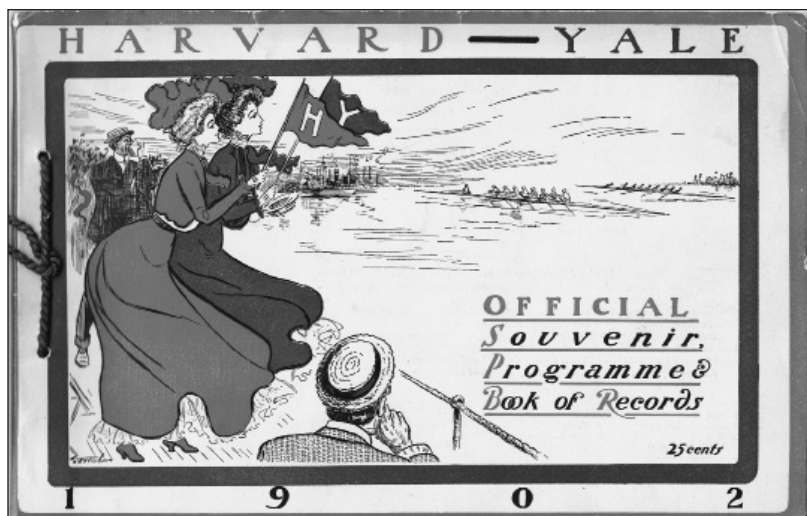
In anticipation of the race, a huge grandstand — seating approximately 3,000 fans — was erected. A crowd of 25,000 showed up. Harvard led the entire way and took victory with its time of 20:44.75, an American record. One casualty on the day was the press boat, which struck a tugboat midway through the race and missed the ending.

The Regatta wasn't held in 1896 because of a breakdown in relations between the two schools, but the rivalry was renewed in 1897 with a three-boat race in Poughkeepsie, N.Y., that included Cornell.

President Theodore Roosevelt was in attendance for the 50th anniversary Regatta and saw a 13-second Yale victory. This came during a dominant streak for the Elis, who were in the midst of winning 17 races in 19 years.

The 1911 race marked the first appearance of an airplane on the Regatta course. The flier was H.W. Atwood, a noted aviator who set a record time for a flight from Boston to New London. By today's standards, his travel time would barely qualify him for the breakdown lane on I-95, as he completed the 135-mile flight in two hours, 12 minutes. Harvard won the race easily, as Yale's stroke was taken from the shell at the three-mile mark.

Just three years later came the closest race in Regatta lore. Yale won by an official count of one-fifth second—the smallest fraction measured on stopwatches of the time—but



the true margin was even closer. The 1914 Regatta also marked the inaugural junior varsity eight-oared race, replacing the varsity substitute fours.

Then, in 1925, a crowd estimated at 100,000 along the shoreline and two packed observation trains of 32 cars witnessed history as, for the first time, a crew trailing by open water at the mile mark came back to win. Yale roared back from its deficit to gain victory with a record-breaking upstream clocking of 20:26.

In 1934, President Franklin D. Roosevelt, a Harvard alumnus, was among the spectators. His son, Franklin, Jr., was a member of the Crimson's junior varsity that year. Roosevelt didn't do much cheering, as Yale swept the day's races and set a downstream record with a time of 19:51.8. With Roosevelt in attendance again the following year, Yale scored a second straight victory.

But in 1936, Harvard initiated a 10-year winning streak that was the longest in the rivalry at that time. And the 1938 season marked an unprecedented triumph by the Crimson, as Harvard earned its first quadruple sweep since the combination race was added in 1920.

The Regatta was not held from 1943-45 because of World War II, and the 1946 race, the shortest in history, was held on the Charles River. When the crews reappeared in New London the following spring, they saw the new highway bridge that had been completed above the Thames. But the result was the same: Harvard won the race by six seconds.

In 1952, the schools went to New London in June then ventured to Lake Winnepesaukee in August to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the first Regatta. The race followed the original script, with Harvard winning by 2.7 seconds.

Yale won five races in a row starting in 1954, culminating with a 13-second upstream victory. That win pulled the Elis within 48-46 in the all-time series.

Since that year, however, Harvard has seized the upper hand. The Crimson won 21 of the next 22 races—including 18 in a row to start Harry Parker's coaching tenure. The only Eli breakthrough came in 1962, one year before Parker's arrival. The 1963 combination race set the tone, as one of the great comebacks in Regatta history occurred when the Crimson—after trailing by as much as three lengths—burst through Yale in the final strokes to win by a half-length. The varsity had an easier time the next day, winning by 28 seconds. Harvard's final win in that 18-year run saw the Crimson establish a course record that still stands, with a time of 18:22.4 in its two-length victory.

The Elis bounced back to win four straight between 1981 and 1984, starting with an 11-second upstream win. But Harvard answered with an 11-year Regatta streak that ran from 1985 until 1995. In the 1995 contest, both crews smashed the upstream record. Harvard's winning time of 18:41.9 and Yale's clocking of 18:45.5 both bettered the previous standard. Yale returned to the winner's circle in 1996 and again in 1999 in downstream races, victories sandwiched around a pair of Harvard sweeps.

The Crimson had swept the Regatta four of the previous six seasons and won seven straight varsity races entering the 2007 regatta. Yale, which closed the gap against the Crimson at Sprints, won the second varsity eight and then pulled ahead in the final strokes to defeat Harvard in the varsity eight. Harvard got revenge with a sweep in 2008 and followed with six more in the six years following. The Elis finally overcame the Crimson with an upstream course record in 2015, walking away with an open-water win in 2015. In the following year's edition of the Regatta, Harvard won the second and third varsity races, but the Crimson's first varsity boat took on water during that event, prompting the referee to call a "no race."

Harvard Lights Crowned Jope Cup Champions

For the first time since 2011, the Harvard lightweight varsity crew took home the Jope Cup. Harvard's 1V placed second at the grand final, while the second varsity claimed victory in its event.

The Crimson finished just behind Cornell in the first varsity grand final, coming in at 5:41.656, compared to the Big Red's time of 5:40.808. Yale placed sixth, crossing in 5:47.095.

The overall Sprints team victory capped a terrific regular season for Harvard. The Crimson went 9-1 in dual races and captured the Wales-Kirrane Cup against Columbia and Georgetown, the Biglin Bowl against Dartmouth and MIT, the Haines Cup against Navy and Delaware and the Goldthwait Cup against Yale and Princeton along the way. Harvard has now captured 22 Jope Cups, the most of any lightweight program.

Yale posted a 7-1 record in its dual season, with the lone defeat coming to Harvard in the Goldthwait Cup on the Charles River on April 29.

Yale Captures NCAA Bid, Radcliffe Wins Sprints

Yale earned bronze at the Ivy League Championships in the varsity eight grand final and took third overall in the point standings. The Bulldogs will head to their 15th NCAA Championship after earning an at-large bid to the field.

For just the fourth time in 21 years, Radcliffe did not reach the NCAA Championships, as the Black and White finished fifth at the Ivy League Championships in the first varsity eight and the overall team standings.

Earlier this season, Yale swept Radcliffe on the Charles River. The Black and White later won five gold medals at Sprints on April 30.

Eastern Champion Radcliffe Lightweights Seek Ninth IRA Title

Harvard-Radcliffe lightweight crew entered last weekend's IRA National Championships with a No. 3 national ranking and Eastern Sprints varsity titles. The Black and White won the varsity eight event by more than three seconds, 6:43.423 to 6:46.674, over No. 6 Wisconsin. No. 4 Princeton was a close third in 6:46.779.

The Sprints success followed a 4-2 dual season. Radcliffe added to its hardware during the regular season, bringing the Class of 2004 Cup and Class of 1999 Cup back to Weld. The Black and White fell only to No. 2 Boston University and No. 7 Georgetown in head-to-head competition.

Crew was the first—and it is annually the last—but it is far from the only rivalry between Harvard and Yale. In fact, including today's crew racing, Crimson and Bulldog teams will have squared off in head-to-head competition 46 times during the 2016-17 athletic season—and that number doesn't include any number of league championship events or individual tournament matches. Yale fields 35 varsity sports and Harvard has 42, the most of any NCAA school in the nation.

These schools are familiar with being first and foremost. Harvard teams have won 143 national titles in sports ranging from crew to football and lacrosse to squash. The most recent Crimson title came in 2016-17 after the women's squash team captured its 17th national title, and third in a row with a 7-2 win over Penn in February.

Yale has 106 national titles to its credit after two national championships two years ago in sailing. The Eli women's rowers captured NCAA varsity golds in 2007, '08 and '10.

The schools have combined to earn at least 614 Ivy League championships since the circuit was formed in 1956 and grabbed a combined 13 league titles in 2016-17: Yale in men's lacrosse and women's swimming & diving; Harvard in women's soccer, field hockey, women's cross country, men's hockey, men's swimming & diving, men's squash, women's squash, women's indoor track & field, men's golf, men's tennis and women's tennis.

Nowhere have Harvard and Yale teams met more often than on the baseball diamond, where this year's four games brought the total to 385. The series is amazingly close, with Harvard ahead, 200-184-1. These baseball affairs go back to July 25, 1868, when the first game was held as part of Regatta Day on Lake Quinsigamond in Worcester, a race-day tradition that continued into the 20th century.

Harvard and Yale have met 132 times in their famed gridiron rivalry, starting with a tilt on November 13, 1875 in New Haven (a 4-0 Harvard win). The series is the third most-played in college football history and is now referenced around the country simply as "The Game." One of the most exciting editions happened in 2014, as ESPN's College GameDay previewed the show live from the Dillon Quad at Harvard and the Crimson came out with a narrow 34-27 win after a Scott Peters' intercepted pass ended a potential game-tying drive by the Bulldogs. The Elis now lead the series, 66-59-8, after snapping a nine-game Crimson winning streak this past year.

In 1923, Yale's T.A.D. Jones told his players, "Gentlemen, you are now going out to play football against Harvard. Never again in your whole life will you do anything so important." And former Harvard football coach Joe Restic once noted, "Each year, we're friends for 364 days and rivals for just one."

The rivalry is alive and well in other parts of each school's boathouses as well. The Yale heavyweight women swept Radcliffe for the third-straight Case Cup this spring. The H150 topped the Bulldogs by 1.9 seconds in that sport's oldest continuing rivalry (dating back to 1922). Heading into last weekend's IRA regatta, the Harvard and Yale lightweight men had captured three of the last six national titles and had spent this season among the top five in the national poll.

Nowhere, though, is the rivalry more palpable than here on the Thames, where Harvard men and Yale men eat and sleep about 20 strokes from each other and today will compete side-by-side against their rival and against a course more trying than can be found in any Ivy League curriculum.
