Tradition

Harvard boasts one of the oldest and most successful college football programs in America, with numerous national and Ivy League Championships in its history. Since helping inaugurate intercollegiate competition more than 150 years ago, Harvard has become synonymous with excellence in athletics and academics.

Success

Over the past 12 years, Harvard has won five Ivy League championships (four outright) and had two undefeated seasons while posting the Football Championship Subdivision's second-highest winning percentage this decade.

The Crimson has finished with at least seven wins in each of the last eight years, becoming the only program in Ivy League history to have such a stretch of success.

Recognition

Harvard has had at least one All-American in each of the last 10 years. In 2009, Tim Murphy has already seen four of his players earn preseason All-America honors by three different publications. Additionally, Harvard had a league-best nine players earn preseason All-Ivy League mention.

Academics

Harvard is universally regarded as the top academic institution in America and also has the highest graduation rate (approximately 98 percent). Harvard student-athletes pursue a wide range of academic courses along with their peers. Over the past two seasons alone, the football team graduated an award-winning opera singer

Athletic Program

Harvard fields the largest Division I athletic program in America with 41 Division I varsity sports. *Sports Illustrated* placed Harvard in the top 45 of "America's Best Division I Sports Colleges," the only Ivy League school to appear in the top 50.

Facilities

Harvard's football facilities are as thorough and impressive as any in the nation. Stately Harvard Stadium has been improved with a new FieldTurf playing surface, a state-of-the-art lighting system, a new video board and sound system and a removable all-weather bubble. Harvard also boasts a pro-style football locker room and a strength and conditioning complex that is second to none in college football.

Harvard Stadium is one of only three college football venues recognized as a National Historic Landmark.

Diversity

Harvard students are regular kids, who come from all corners of the country. With its diverse student body and metropolitan environment, *Black Enterprise* ranks Harvard as one of the nation's top colleges and universities for African-Americans.

NFL

Over the past 11 years, Harvard has seen 20 players move on to professional careers, including All-Pro Matt Birk '98 (Baltimore Ravens) and Jamil Soriano '03, who won a Super Bowl ring with the New England Patriots. Quarterback Ryan Fitzpatrick '05 (Buffalo Bills) started 13 games for the Cincinnati Bengals in 2008.

Boston/Cambridge

Boston is the unrivaled "College Town, USA" with more colleges and universities than any metropolitan area in the country. *The Sporting News* dubbed the city the nation's best sports town in 2002, 2004 and 2005.

Offense

A system that has smashed numerous school and Ivy League records and annually ranks among the top-performing units in the nation. Harvard became the first school in Ivy history to average over 500 yards per game in Ivy League play, when it did so in the 2000 season. Dating back to the start of the 2003 season, Harvard is 39-1 when leading at halftime.

Defense

Harvard employs an attack style of defense that helped the Crimson rank among the nation's leaders last season. It is an exciting, aggressive approach that has been a key component of Harvard's success.

Tim Murphy

Coach Tim Murphy has demonstrated leadership and success, winning championships as head coach at Maine, Cincinnati, and, for the past 15 seasons, at Harvard. Every four-year player that Coach Murphy has recruited to Harvard has graduated and played on an Ivy championship team.

The Game

The Harvard-Yale Game stands as one of the top rivalries in all of college football with the excitement and pageantry to go with it. This is, by far, the biggest game with the biggest crowd in the Ivy League.

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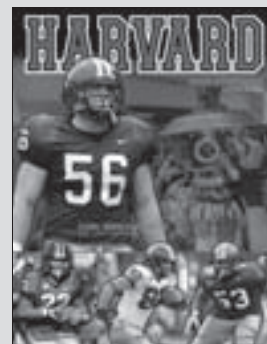

COVERING THE CRIMSON

Harvard University welcomes coverage of its football program by accredited writers, broadcasters and photographers.

Media Credentials

All credential requests to cover Harvard football should be directed to Kurt Svoboda in the Office of Athletic Communications at least five days in advance of the game. Requests may be made via mail, phone or e-mail. Harvard reserves the right to accept or reject credential requests for any reason. Credentials will be issued only to accredited members of the working media.

Credentials will be mailed if time permits or may be picked up at the Murr Center ticket office, which opens two hours before kickoff. Press passes are non-transferrable.

Access to the press box level is at Gate M, which is located at the open end of Harvard Stadium, adjacent to Section 37.

Press Box Services

The Harvard Office of Athletic Communications will provide a game program, current press release, pregame statistics, flip card and the Ivy League weekly report prior to the game. Information will be available on the second level of the press box.

Working press and radio crews are assigned space in the press box. Seating charts will be located throughout the facility. Wireless internet access is available in the press box.

Quickie statistics will be provided to all media members at the end of each quarter. Cold beverages are available throughout the game.

Postgame Procedures

Following each home game, a postgame press conference will be held in the Murr Center Lounge, located on the third floor of that facility. The lounge is easily accessible by the external staircase located below the stadium scoreboard. The press conference is open only to credentialed media members.

Writers may file stories from the Murr Center East Conference Room, located adjacent to the lounge. Phone lines and wireless internet connections will be provided.

Final statistics packets, including a scoring summary, individual and team statistics, drive charts and play-by-play, will be delivered to the postgame press conference and made available in the media room.

Postgame procedures for road games are dictated by the host institution.

Harvard maintains a strict closed locker room policy both at home and on the road.

Interviews

Interviews with student-athletes, other than those immediately following a contest, must be arranged through Harvard's Office of Athletic Communications, so as not to interfere with the students' academic schedules.

Please note that student-athletes' telephone numbers and email addresses will not be released to the media per Department of Athletics policy. If a telephone interview is necessary, arrangements will be made for the student-athlete to call the requesting outlet. Game-day interviews will not be granted until the conclusion of the contest.

Harvard football practices are open to the media, provided the outlet makes prior arrangements with the Office of Athletic Communications. Weekday practices are generally held from 4 to 6 p.m.

New England Football Writers Luncheon

Harvard is proud to once again serve as host to the weekly New England Football Writers Luncheon, the oldest media gathering of its kind.

Head coaches and sports information directors from all divisions of college football in New England meet each Wednesday from Sept. 2 to Nov. 18 at noon with the local and regional media at Harvard's Dillon Fieldhouse, located next to the Murr Center and Lavietes Pavilion near Harvard Stadium.

Media members do not need to make reservations to attend the luncheons but should be aware of the cost of \$10 per person.

Harvard head coach Tim Murphy speaks at each luncheon and is available for individual interviews following the sessions.

Radio Broadcasts

Stations wishing to broadcast Harvard football games must make arrangements through the athletic communications office at least two weeks in advance of the requested game.

There are two analog phone lines available for visiting stations, and a maximum of four



credentials will be provided for any broadcast crew. Please note that ISDN lines are not available in Harvard Stadium.

Photographers/Television Crews

Arrangements should be made with the Office of Athletic Communications for anyone who wishes to shoot Harvard football games. Sideline passes will be mailed if time permits or left at the Will Call window at the Murr Center box office. Only credentialed media members will be permitted on the sideline.

Parking

Parking is extremely limited in the vicinity of Harvard Stadium. Parking passes can be mailed if the credential request is granted five working days prior to the game.

Media members who are issued season-long credentials will be given access to Lot 6M, which sits adjacent to Harvard Stadium at North Harvard Street. Other media members will have access to Lot 175, which is located next to the Soldiers Field athletic complex at North Harvard Street and Western Avenue.

Television production trucks should make arrangements with Harvard's athletic events office (617-496-6767) to schedule arrival times at the designated location.



Harvard Football receives regular and extensive coverage in a top-five media market and has been featured in national outlets such as Sports Illustrated, NBC Sports and ESPN.



On The Radio

Harvard football will once again enjoy season-long coverage on AM 1510 The Zone, Boston's only 24-hour live all-sports station.

The radio signal, powered by a 50,000-watt transmitter in Waltham, Mass., gives the Crimson a broadcast reach in metro-Boston, north into New Hampshire, west to Worcester and south to Rhode Island and Connecticut.

The station also has been the flagship for the Boston Celtics radio network and has aired Harvard and Boston University hockey.

Bernie Corbett, author of *Harvard Football* and *The Only Game That Matters* (chronicling the Harvard-Yale rivalry), returns for his 12th season of providing play-by-play. Former Harvard football great Mike Giardi '94 enters his 15th year as color analyst.

Fans can tune in for the Harvard Football pregame show, which features interviews with head coach Tim Murphy and a preview of the day's game. Following the contest, the Harvard Football wrap-up show brings listeners 20 minutes of college scores and highlights and a recap of the Crimson game just completed.

Student-run WHRB (FM 95.3) will once again broadcast all 10 Harvard football games this season. Fans outside the listening area may listen on that station's website www.whrb.org.

On The Web

All 10 Harvard football games will be available on the web at Harvard's official athletic department site (GoCrimson.com).

In addition to carrying the live and archived videocasts of all 10 football games, GoCrimson.com also will contain regular audio clips of head coach Tim Murphy, including pregame interviews and postgame press conferences.

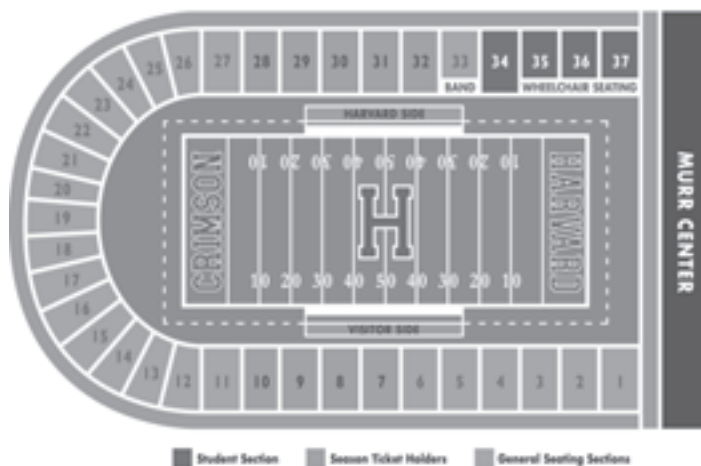
Fans may also access Harvard's weekly football press releases from the site and may follow the live statistics of Crimson home games.

On Sirius

In addition to carrying at least one football game per week, Sirius also is the satellite radio home of Ivy League basketball.

On Television

The 126th playing of The Game is scheduled to be carried live on television with time and channel yet to be announced.

Directions to Harvard Stadium

From the West

Take Interstate 90 East to Exit 18 (Allston/Cambridge). Pay the toll and bear left at the fork toward Allston, onto Cambridge Street. Turn right at the second set of lights onto North Harvard Street. Proceed approximately one mile until you approach Harvard Stadium. The entrance to 175 North Harvard Street is on the left, just beyond the intersection with Western Avenue before the Stadium. The entrance for Gate 6 is on the left, at the closed end of the Stadium. Parking attendants will direct you to the media lot.

From the North

Take Interstate 93 South to the Storrow Drive exit. Take Storrow Drive West for approximately five miles to the Harvard Square/North Harvard Street exit. Turn left at the top of the ramp onto North Harvard Street. The entrance for Gate 6 is on the right, at the closed end of the Stadium. The entrance to 175 North Harvard Street is farther down on the right, just beyond the outdoor track. Parking attendants will direct you to the media lot.

From the South

Take Interstate 95 North to Interstate 93 North into Boston. Take Exit 20 onto Interstate 90 West. Take Exit 20 (Allston/Cambridge). Pay the toll and bear left at the fork towards Allston, onto Cambridge Street. Turn right at the second set of lights onto North Harvard Street. Proceed approximately one mile until you approach Harvard Stadium. The entrance to 175 North Harvard Street is on the left, just beyond the intersection with Western Avenue. The entrance for Gate 6 is on the left, at the closed end of the Stadium. Parking attendants will direct you to the media lot.

Since its founding days more than 360 years ago, Harvard has stood as a leader in all aspects of higher education



A Broad Curriculum

At the foundation of Harvard's lofty reputation is a liberal arts curriculum taught by some of the world's great scholars. Nobel laureates and Pulitzer Prize-winning authors teach introductory and Core courses, and all faculty are readily available for students.

Now equally well-known for its professional schools, Harvard originally received recognition as the country's first and finest undergraduate institution. It has long been committed to reforming college curricula and, in fact, the whole elective system began here over a century ago. Today, Harvard maintains its strong commitment to the undergraduate with one of the broadest programs in existence. Students may concentrate in any of 44 fields, including Afro-American studies, computer and environmental sciences, government, classics, and folklore and mythology. The majority of courses offered at Harvard have fewer than 20 students, and most departments feature a "tutorial" system of teaching and learning. Tutorials are directed study courses in a student's field of concentration, taught either in small groups or individually.

Harvard has a graduation rate of over 97 percent, and over 70 percent of students graduate with honors. Nine out of 10 undergraduates who apply succeed in gaining admission to a medical school, with similar rates for other graduate schools.

Contributing to these figures are first-class facilities such as a 12 million-volume library that is the largest university library in the world, numerous art and cultural museums, and 25 science/laboratory centers.

The Harvard Student

While Harvard has long been a leader among universities, it is equally committed

to developing leaders among people. Thus, its enrollment is not comprised of 6,700 "geniuses." Instead, the University prides itself on attracting the best all-around young individuals—those with the energy, innovation and creativity to enliven a classroom.

Some students show unusual academic promise through experiences or achievements in study or research. Others are more "well-rounded" and have contributed in many different ways to the lives of their schools or communities. Still others could be called "well-lopsided," with demonstrated excellence in one particular endeavor. And many students bring perspectives formed by unusual personal circumstances or experiences.

The end result is an undergraduate population drawn from every state and many

foreign countries, one that brings together a grand diversity of social, ethnic and economic backgrounds.

Student Life

Both academically and residentially, Harvard College is fully coeducational. The centers of campus life are the residential houses. The house system, established in 1930, provides a small college atmosphere within the university.

Each house has several faculty members and a staff of residential tutors associated with it, as well as dormitories, dining halls, libraries, intramural athletic teams and a number of social events. There are 12 residential houses, while a 13th unit, Dudley House, provides a parallel life for the students who live off-campus.

All freshmen live in or next to Harvard Yard. "The Yard" is the center of the university, and the hub of Harvard's activity. Resident adult advisers help students explore the academic and non-academic opportunities of their first year. A wide range of programs are designed especially for first-year students—in the arts, intramural athletics and Freshman Seminars.

Students run nearly 200 organizations and programs on campus. Last year, 80 plays and musicals were produced and directed by students. There are men's, women's and mixed voiced choruses, plus over half a dozen a cappella groups. Two major orchestras, smaller ensembles, chamber groups and rock bands also thrive. There are two student newspapers and numerous political, feminist, ethnic, cultural and religious journals. A majority of students participate in community service by the time of their graduation, both through the Phillips Brooks House Association and the House and Neighborhood Development (HAND) program.



Faculty

Harvard's faculty is large, diverse, and by any measure, an accomplished group of women and men.

Each faculty member is both a noted teacher and scholar, for first-rate scholarship is an essential ingredient of great teaching. Harvard students learn in classrooms and labs from professors who are leading authorities in their fields. In this academic community, all members of the Faculty of Arts and Sciences, including the most prominent scholars, expect to teach undergraduates as well as graduate students.

Faculty members also instruct students outside the classroom. In addition to professors' weekly office hours, students often spend time with their professors before or after class. There are also many occasions when professors take meals in Harvard's residential dining halls, attend gatherings in the residences of House Masters, who are themselves senior faculty members, and participate in other programs and special events.

Over the course of a year, hundreds of students work closely with faculty members on their own or their professors' research. The opportunities for formal and informal relationships with Harvard faculty are plentiful and rewarding, resulting in lifelong friendships as well as professional collaborations that can enrich students' lives and careers.

Facilities

Beyond the mentorship of a faculty actively involved in undergraduate life, Harvard students have access to other extraordinary academic resources.

By a wide margin, Harvard's library system, with about 100 central and auxiliary collections and nearly 14 million volumes, is the world's largest university library. More than two dozen university buildings are used exclusively for scientific research, including laboratories for astronomy; biology; biochemistry; chemistry; computer science; electrical; computer, and systems, and mechanical engineering, geology, as well as physics and applied physics.

Harvard's computing facilities are likewise extensive and state-of-the-art. A fiber-optic data network links labs, libraries and faculty and administrative offices. Students can connect to Harvard's high-speed data network, the library's online catalog, the Internet and the rest of the world from ethernet connections in their rooms.

Finally, the university's many museums include one of the world's most distinguished university art collections and a natural history museum whose scope and importance make it similarly renowned.

The Undergraduate Program

Harvard offers students everything necessary for a liberal education in virtually every imaginable field.

The sheer number of curricular choices — the catalog includes about 3,500 courses — opens doors for the exploration of widely disparate fields and also for concentration in special areas

of interest.

Harvard's philosophy has long been that an undergraduate education ought to have structure and coherence while allowing for maximum flexibility and individual choice.

Each student takes four courses in both the fall and spring semesters. Harvard students spend, on average, 12 hours per week in class and enjoy wide latitude in setting priorities for study and free time.

Course choices are made in close consultation with an academic adviser over a week-long shopping period at the start of both semesters. Over the four-year undergraduate program, each student will fulfill the requirements of a field of concentration (on average, half of a student's total coursework) and the Core Curriculum (about one-quarter of the plan of study).

The remaining quarter of a student's coursework is chosen freely from courses offered throughout the university. These three

components of the undergraduate program together fulfill the fundamental aims of a liberal arts education.

There is no firm distinction in the Faculty of Arts and Sciences between undergraduate and graduate courses. Students may progress in the curriculum as rapidly as their preparation permits and may enroll in graduate-level courses in the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences.

Most of Harvard's 10 graduate schools allow students to cross-register and to participate in special programs. A reciprocal arrangement with MIT, our Cambridge neighbor, also permits Harvard students to cross-register in courses offered there.

While some of Harvard's most popular courses are taught in grand lecture halls to accommodate significant student interest, the majority of courses are taught in more intimate settings of 20 or fewer students.

assets are its students. Although they come from many different places and backgrounds and have a striking variety of talents, ambitions and convictions, all possess a passion for learning.

That energy can be felt in and out of the classroom. At least as much learning occurs in dorms and dining halls as in labs and course lectures. Because undergraduate enrollment is comparatively small, there are many opportunities to get to know fellow students well. Late night talks and dinner table debates are very much part of the daily experience of the women and men at Harvard College.

Postgraduate Plans

Harvard is committed to providing whatever guidance or assistance students may need. Given the university's extraordinary resources, students' needs are met swiftly and fully.

Perhaps as a result, Harvard's graduation rate is 97 percent, among the very highest in the nation. Similarly high percentages of graduating seniors and alumni express their satisfaction by stating in surveys that they would attend Harvard if they had to choose a college again.

Although Harvard's academic programs are not "preprofessional" in the sense that they provide vocational training, Harvard students are very well prepared for admission to professional schools (business, law and medicine) and graduate programs. Our students enjoy an extraordinarily high rate of admission to graduate and professional schools of their choice. And Harvard College is almost always the best-represented undergraduate institution at

Harvard's graduate schools.

While some students select fields of concentration commonly associated with certain careers, many discover they can study in areas of intellectual rather than professional interest and still be superb candidates for jobs and graduate schools.

At Harvard, students can concentrate in history and go to medical school, or study engineering and earn a graduate degree in law.

Admission and Financial Aid

There is no formula for gaining admission to Harvard. Academic accomplishment in high school is important, but the Admissions Committee also considers many other criteria such as community involvement, extracurricular activities and work experience. Last year's freshman class of 1,650 was culled from an applicant pool of 20,972.

Strength of character, ability to overcome adversity, and other personal qualities often play a part in admissions decisions.

Grades and test scores are relied on to help assess academic promise, but they are by no means relied on exclusively. Evidence that you are willing and able to take on academic challenges or that you possess strengths not fully revealed in objective information is also of interest to the Admissions Committee.

Believing that cost should not play a primary role in the selection of a college, Harvard has worked for many decades to attract students from all economic backgrounds.

Our faculty is committed to admissions and

financial aid policies that help us attract a truly diverse student body. We make admissions decisions without regard to a student's financial circumstances or citizenship, and we meet the full financial need of each student who qualifies for aid.

The Committee on Financial Aid determines aid packages — in the form of scholarships, loans, and term-time jobs — based solely on need using a full range of family income and asset information.

Over the past several years, Harvard has launched two major financial aid initiatives to benefit all students. As a result, students with financial need will now face less educational debt on graduation and will have more time to concentrate on academic and extracurricular opportunities.

These initiatives have featured significant annual increases in the undergraduate scholarship budget, reduced loan and term-time job obligations, and an outside award policy which allows students to use the full amount of their outside awards to reduce loans.

Together, with the College's longstanding commitment to need-blind admissions and need-based aid, these plans will continue to keep a Harvard education accessible to students from all economic backgrounds.

Student Housing

Harvard guarantees every student College housing for four years, and nearly all students choose to live on campus for their full undergraduate careers.



All 1,650 first-year students live in or adjacent to Harvard Yard. The Freshman Dean's Office assigns roommates carefully among 17 freshman dorms. Numerous proctors (adult residential advisors) and deans live among first-year students to help them explore Harvard's broad academic and extracurricular opportunities.

One highlight of freshman year is dining in Annenberg Hall, where all first years gather to eat. Each house has several faculty members and a staff of residential tutors associated with it, as well as dormitories, dining halls, libraries, intramural athletic teams and social events.

As sophomores, students move from the Yard to one of the 12 Houses — small residential communities of 330 to 450 students. Each House has its own dining hall, library, common rooms, rehearsal spaces and other resources.

Houses also provide students with a wide range of extracurricular programs. A senior faculty member serves each House as a Master. Masters make each House a home by hosting frequent open houses in their private residences and by selecting an extensive staff of both resident and nonresident tutors and faculty fellows. Together, Masters and House staff set the tone for the House in its activities and in its functioning as a close-knit community within the context of a larger college and university

Life Outside the Classroom

Extracurricular opportunities at Harvard are virtually unlimited. There are more than 300 official student organizations at the College, and

the number and nature of organizations change constantly as students' interests evolve.

Casual beginners to accomplished masters find opportunities at all levels. You do not have to study music in order to play in an orchestra, nor must you have had experience in drama or journalism to act in a play or write for a student publication.

College facilities include concert halls, theaters with large stages and others with more intimate surroundings, dance studios, rehearsal spaces and practice rooms. Creative students may enjoy the visual arts as a satisfying hobby or a serious academic pursuit.

There are plenty of opportunities at Harvard to become a journalist, poet, disc jockey, or editor. Several campus newspapers have a wide readership, and there are political, academic, and literary journals to complement the humor magazines, yearbook, and radio stations.

Cultural and Ethnic Initiatives

There are more than 50 cultural, ethnic, and international student organizations at Harvard, as well as communities representing nearly every major religion.

The Harvard Foundation for Intercultural and Race Relations sponsors many activities during the year that celebrate the ethnic and cultural diversity at Harvard. One of the most anticipated events is Cultural Rhythms, a festival that highlights the talents of Harvard students and offers ethnic foods from around the world. The "Cultural Artist of the Year," emcees the event,

and past hosts have included Queen Latifah, Jackie Chan, Andy Garcia, and Halle Berry.

Cambridge, Boston, and New England

Cambridge combines the attractions of a cosmopolitan city with the charm of a New England town. Organized around traditional town greens, tree-lined squares, and the grassy banks of the Charles River, Cambridge is one of metropolitan Boston's vital urban centers.

One-of-a-kind shops, international restaurants, bookstores, street cafés, and cavernous music stores occupy the streets surrounding the College. Sporting events, theater concerts, and colorful street performers also draw neighbors and visitors to Harvard Square.

While Boston is full of history and colonial charm, with its cobblestone streets and colonial church spires, it is also a modern city whose liveliness is apparent in its ranging architectural styles, thriving industries, diverse cultures, and important arts centers.

Boston Harbor, famous for its Revolutionary War "tea party," is home to many new and busy waterfront restaurants and shops. The waterfront also boasts a world-renowned aquarium, science museum, and numerous opportunities to walks through historic districts or cruises to its many islands and recreational areas.

Within easy reach of Boston and Cambridge are the beaches of the Atlantic, cozy seaside villages from Cape Cod to Maine, ski slopes, forests, and historical sites recalling America's past.



ATHLETICS AT HARVARD

Leadership and Competitive Excellence in Division I Athletics

In parallel to Harvard's educational opportunities, the university provides the student-athlete with the infrastructure and facilities to excel at the highest competitive level.

A pioneer of intercollegiate athletics — Harvard and Yale rowed in the nation's first college sporting event in 1852 — Harvard offers 41 varsity sports and has nearly 1,500 student-athletes, more than any other Division I school.

The position given athletics within the University framework is both idealistic and realistic. Harvard is a member of the Ivy League, along with Brown, Columbia, Cornell, Dartmouth, Penn, Princeton and Yale. Under the League's founding document, the Presidents' Agreement of 1954, there are no athletic scholarships. Financial aid to student-athletes — as with all students — is based solely on need.

This structure has allowed Harvard teams to succeed both within the Ivy League and on a national level. Harvard has won a total of 138 national collegiate championships in 18 different sports, beginning with the men's track and field title of 1880 and extending to the 2006 NCAA crown in fencing.

Alumni of Harvard's athletics programs have gone on to succeed in Major League Baseball, the

National Football League, the National Hockey League, the National Basketball Association, Major League Soccer and professional tennis tours (WTP, ATP). Still more compete in the Olympic Games, while countless others move on to ownership and management roles in amateur and professional athletics.

2008-09 In Review

Harvard continued to remain at the forefront of Division I athletics in a 2008-09 season that saw a return to glory for some teams, while others continued their long legacies of success.

Seven Harvard teams won Ivy League championships, while 19 others either qualified individuals or received at-large invitations to their respective NCAA or other postseason fields. Sixteen Harvard teams finished the season ranked among the national top 25 in their sport.

The fall season saw both Harvard soccer teams remain in the national spotlight, as the men were nationally ranked throughout the season and the women collected the Ivy league championship, each competing in their respective NCAA Championship. The women boasted the league's rookie of the year for the second consecutive season in Melanie Baskind.

The men meanwhile, featured All-Americans Andre Akpan and Michael Fucito (Seattle FC Sounders) who were named as the nation's most exciting scoring combination.



Harvard won its second straight Ivy League championship, 13th overall and fifth under head coach Tim Murphy.



In 2008, Melanie Baskind became the second consecutive Harvard women's soccer player to earn Ivy League Rookie of the Year honors and helped the Crimson to its seventh Ivy League title.

Ranked 14th nationally by year's end, the football team capped a second straight Ivy League championship with a 10-0 victory over Yale in the 125th playing of The Game. Harvard romped its way to a 9-1 record behind 18 All-Ivy League selections and three All-Americans.

Highlighting the winter season was the Crimson women's ice hockey team, which again won the Ivy title and the ECAC regular season crown.

On the hardwood, women's basketball earned a berth in the WNIT, while men's basketball made headlines with a convincing victory over 17th-ranked Boston College and an array of other impressive victories, including home triumphs against Santa Clara and Cornell and a road victory at Penn.

In the pool, a dominant women's swimming & diving program cruised to Ivy league and ECAC championships as well as a top 25 national ranking while the men finished an 8-1 dual campaign ranked 20th nationally.

In the spring, women's golf put together a masterful season in which the Crimson won seven of the eight tournaments in which it competed and finished second in the other. The team won a second straight Ivy crown and competed in the NCAA tournament behind three of the league's top players including rookie of the year Christine Cho.

Women's tennis surged from seventh in 2008 to a co-championship in 2009 behind league player of the year Beier Ko. The men's team also boasted the league's player of the year, Chris Clayton.

All told, 13 Harvard athletes were recognized as the top player of rookie in the Ivy League or other organization.

Among the players of the year were: Sara Vaillancourt, who earned top player honors in both the Ivy and ECAC, Ko and Clayton in tennis, and Chris Pizzotti in football. Pizzotti went on to sign with the New York Jets as one of three Harvard players to sign professional contracts.

Named Ivy League rookies of the year were: Baskind (women's soccer), Brogan Berry (women's basketball), Rachel Brown (softball), Cho (women's golf), Nirasha Guruge (women's squash), Anne Carroll Ingersoll (women's volleyball) and Matthew Hanson (football). Jeff Coehn was named New England's top rookie in lacrosse and Devan Kennifer was the Northern Division rookie of the year in water polo.

There were also 19 All-America selections, and an impressive 84 athletes were named to an all-academic team. Football's Andrew Berry was named the scholar-athlete of the year by the Football Championship Subdivision Athletic Director's Association.

ATHLETIC FACILITIES



Harvard supports its varsity student-athletes with a wide range of playing, practice, training and strength and conditioning facilities.

The majority of the athletic facilities are located in the Soldiers Field complex, located on the Boston side of the Charles River, a short walk from most of the Houses. The facilities range from the oldest — and according to many, the finest — college football stadium in the nation to a relatively new indoor squash and tennis center.

Beren Tennis Center

The Beren Tennis Center is the outdoor home of Harvard's men's and women's tennis programs. Following the facility's renovation in 2000, the Beren Center is among the finest outdoor facilities in college athletics.

The center boasts 18 courts, including six that feature stadium seating, a two-tiered pavilion with locker rooms, a media center, offices and court-viewing areas.

The Beren Center is a perennial site for NCAA tournament competition, including the first two rounds of both the men's and women's tournaments in 2004 and the women's tournament in 2005.

The facility is named for Robert M. Beren '47 MBA '50, who was instrumental in both the creation of the center in 1983 and its recent renovation.

Blodgett Pool

Blodgett Pool was a gift of the late John W. Blodgett, Jr. '23. Regarded among the finest collegiate swimming facilities in the nation, it serves as the home of Harvard's varsity swimming and diving and water polo teams.

The pool has permanent spectator seating for 1,200, and there is room on the pool deck to accommodate 500 swimmers, coaches and officials.

Bright Hockey Center

The Alexander H. Bright Hockey Center has been home of the Crimson men's and women's hockey programs since 1979. Its pro-style locker

rooms were completely renovated in 2007.

Named for former Harvard hockey player Alec Bright '19, the facility seats 2,800 people, with additional space for some 500 standees. The skating surface is 204 feet long by 87 feet wide.

Dillon Field House

Dillon Field House is one of Harvard's most recognized buildings. It has served the Harvard Athletics community for more than 70 years.

The facility houses Harvard's varsity equipment room and sports medicine center as well as locker rooms and offices for a number of men's teams, including football, baseball and men's ice lacrosse.

The second floor of the facility features the Dillon Lounge, a multipurpose function room that overlooks the athletic quad.

Gordon Indoor Track & Tennis Center

The Albert H. Gordon Track and Tennis Center is one of the foremost indoor track facilities in the nation.

The track is a six-lane banked oval with an adjacent 80-yard sprint straight. Inside the track are two long and triple jump pits, a pole vault runway, and multiple high jump aprons.

Adjacent to the oval are two throwing circles and a weightlifting cage.

Gordon Track has recently been the site of both the Heptagonal Championships as well as the ECAC and IC4A Championships.

Harvard Stadium

The centerpiece of Harvard's outstanding athletic facilities is Harvard Stadium, which has stood as a Boston landmark for more than a century.

Harvard Stadium was constructed in 1903 and hosted its first game Nov. 14 of that year. Since then, the Stadium has hosted

more than 600 Harvard football games as well as hundreds of other athletic and non-athletic events, including Olympic soccer, NFL football, rock concerts, pro lacrosse and political rallies.

The Stadium is a horseshoe containing architectural elements of a Greek stadium and Roman circus and is considered an engineering marvel. It was the world's first massive reinforced concrete structure and the first large permanent arena for American college athletics.

With a seating capacity of 30,323, Harvard Stadium is praised for its outstanding sightlines.

The Stadium was upgraded in 2006 with the addition of a FieldTurf playing surface, permanent lighting and a removable all-weather bubble which allows for use of the facility throughout the calendar year.

Jordan Field

One of Harvard's newest intercollegiate facilities, Jordan Field was built in 2000 and serves as the home of Harvard's field hockey and men's and women's lacrosse teams.

The facility was given by Gerald Jordan '61, a former Crimson football player.

The synthetic turf playing surface allows for an inclement weather practice option for Harvard's other varsity programs. The turf was completely replaced for the 2006-07 academic year.

Jordan Field has a permanent seating capacity of 900, with room for portable bleachers as well. A press box can accommodate up to 12 working media members.

Laviestes Pavilion

The Ray Laviestes '36 Pavilion at the Briggs Athletic Center is the home of Harvard's men's and women's basketball programs. It was dedicated solely for basketball in 1982.

The seating capacity of Laviestes Pavilion is 2,050 with fan seating close to the action. The facility was completely refurbished prior to the 1995-96 season, and more improvements and amenities were added in 2002-03.



Malkin Athletic Center

Located on the Cambridge side of the Charles River, just outside of Harvard Square, the Malkin Athletic Center is the home of Harvard's varsity volleyball, wrestling and fencing teams.

The main gymnasium can accommodate 1,400 spectators for volleyball and wrestling, while the fencing programs compete in a facility that is considered one of the best in the world.

Built in 1930 and renovated in 1985, 2004 and again in 2008, funding for the initial improvements came from Peter L. Malkin '55.

McCurdy Track

The McCurdy Outdoor Track & Field, which was completed in 1996, provides Harvard's varsity athletes with a magnificent complement to the Gordon Indoor Track.

Enclosed by a wind screen, the facility includes eight running lanes which encompass double runways for long and triple jumps, throwing circles for the shot, discus and hammer, a javelin runway and a multidirectional high jump apron.

Newell Boathouse

The elder statesman among Charles River boathouses, Newell Boathouse has maintained its charm, beauty and practicality for more than a century.

The home of Harvard's renowned men's rowing programs, Newell was built in 1900 and named for Crimson rower and football star Marshall Newell 1894. It was a gift of the Harvard Club of New York.

The facility contains two indoor rowing tanks and modern practice equipment, a video room, space to house all the crews' shells, a workshop, meeting rooms and locker facilities.

Murr Center

The Murr Center opened in May 1998 and serves as the home of Harvard's state-of-the-art indoor squash and tennis facilities.

The Murr Center services the entire intercollegiate athletics program. It is a centrally located home for the department's administration



and also houses a newly revamped strength and conditioning facility with a golf simulator that serves as an indoor training ground for the Crimson's golf programs.

The showpiece of the Murr Center is the Lee Family Hall of Athletic History, which features a timeline of Harvard's long and rich athletic tradition with free-standing displays of trophies and memorabilia of the nation's oldest college athletics program.

O'Donnell Field

Set behind historic Harvard Stadium, O'Donnell Field is as fine a playing facility as exists in New England. Harvard has played baseball on the site since 1898.

The field is named for Joseph J. O'Donnell '67, MBA '71, a longtime supporter of Harvard baseball who also played a large role in implementing the Harvard Stadium bubble..

O'Donnell Field was renovated in the summer of 2004 with new dugouts and a new backstop. The facility seats 1,600 spectators.

Ohiri Field

Ohiri Field is the home of Harvard's prominent men's and women's soccer teams. The facility is named for Chris Ohiri '64, a soccer and track standout who succumbed to cancer while attending classes at Harvard Business School.

The Ohiri Field complex consists of two separate 120-yard by 75-yard natural grass fields. One pitch is used as the game field, while the other serves as a practice site.

Meticulously maintained and groomed for a high level of play, Ohiri Field has been host to a number of NCAA tournament matches in both men's and women's soccer.

Sailing Center

Located near the lower basin of the Charles River on Memorial Drive, Harvard's sailing center supports the Crimson's coed and women's varsity sailing teams.

The center features the unique hanging boat storage system that enables solo launchings, a large meeting facility, an instruction room and a fleet maintenance shop.

Soldiers Field

Soldiers Field has been the home of Harvard's softball program since its inception in 1981.

Located in the shadow of Harvard Stadium, the field has undergone several renovations in recent years, making it one of the finest facilities in New England.

The most recent renovation was completed when spacious new dugouts were added for the 2006 spring season.

Weld Boathouse

Weld Boathouse, which serves as the home of Radcliffe's varsity crews, was donated and built by the George Walker Weld family in 1906. It is an architectural highlight of Harvard and part of the rowing legacy of the Charles River.

Weld also hosts Harvard's recreational sculling and intramural house crew programs. It is located just a short walk from campus and serves as an integral part of the University's landscape.





DREW GILPIN FAUST

President of Harvard University

Drew Gilpin Faust, an eminent historian and the founding dean of the Radcliffe Institute for Advanced Study, became the 28th president of Harvard University July 1, 2007.

Under Faust's leadership, Radcliffe emerged as one of the nation's foremost centers of scholarly and creative enterprise, distinctive for its multidisciplinary focus and the exploration of new knowledge at the crossroads of traditional fields.

Since coming to Harvard, Faust has continued to write and lecture on the history of the American South and the Civil War. Her sixth book, *This Republic of Suffering*, forthcoming in 2008, considers the impact of the Civil War's enormous death toll on the lives of 19th-century Americans. Her fifth book, *Mothers of Invention: Women of the Slaveholding South in the American Civil War* (1996), was awarded the Society of American Historians' Francis Parkman Prize, honoring the year's best nonfiction book on an American theme.

As dean of Radcliffe, Faust has been an influential member of Harvard's Academic Advisory Group, which brings together the president, provost and deans to consider matters

of university policy. A devoted teacher and mentor, she is currently leading an undergraduate seminar on the Civil War and Reconstruction. In the spring of 2005, she oversaw the work of Harvard's Task Forces on Women Faculty and on Women in Science and Engineering. In 2004, she served on the Allston Task Force on Undergraduate Life.

Before coming to Harvard, Faust served for 25 years on the faculty of the University of Pennsylvania. She was appointed as assistant professor in the Department of American Civilization in 1976, associate professor in 1980 and full professor in 1984. She was named the Stanley Sheerr Professor of History in 1988, then served as the Annenberg Professor of History from 1989 to 2000. She chaired the Department of American Civilization for five years, and was director of the Women's Studies Program from 1996 to 2000. She was twice honored at Penn for her distinguished teaching, in 1982 and 1996.

Raised in Virginia's Shenandoah Valley, Faust went on to attend Concord Academy in Massachusetts. She received her bachelor's degree in history from Bryn Mawr College in 1968 and her master's degree (1971) and doctoral degree (1975) in American civilization from the University of Pennsylvania.

Faust has been active both as a member of

nonprofit boards and in a range of professional societies. She is a trustee of the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, the National Humanities Center and Bryn Mawr College, where she chaired the trustee committee on student life from 1998 to 2003. She also serves on the educational advisory board of the Guggenheim Foundation. She was president of the Southern Historical Association in 1999-2000, vice president of the American Historical Association from 1992 to 1996 and an executive board member of both the Organization of American Historians and the Society of American Historians from 1999 to 2002.

Faust has also served on numerous editorial boards and selection committees, including the jury for the Pulitzer Prize in history in 1986, 1990 and 2004. She is an elected member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, the American Philosophical Society and the Society of American Historians.

Faust is married to Charles Rosenberg, one of the nation's leading historians of medicine and science, who is Professor of the History of Science and Ernest E. Monrad Professor in the Social Sciences at Harvard.

Faust and Rosenberg live in Cambridge. They have two daughters, Jessica Rosenberg, a 2004 graduate of Harvard, and Leah Rosenberg, Faust's stepdaughter, a scholar of Caribbean literature.



ROBERT L. SCALISE

Nichols Family Director of Athletics

Robert L. Scalise was introduced as Harvard's Nichols Family Director of Athletics in July 2001 after five years as associate dean and senior executive officer of the Harvard Business School.

Scalise, the seventh person to hold the director of athletics post at Harvard, oversees the nation's largest Division I athletics program with 41 varsity sports, two dozen junior varsity teams, more than 1,500 intercollegiate athletes and a broad array of wellness and recreation programs and facilities.

In seven years as director of athletics, Scalise has seen Harvard win nine national team championships and 55 Ivy League titles. The 2008-09 season saw Harvard win seven Ivy League crowns.

Under Scalise, Harvard has played host to several high-level NCAA tournaments including the 2006 women's basketball Final Four at the TD Banknorth Garden as well as the 2008 and 2009 men's lacrosse championships at Gillette Stadium. Harvard will again play host to the lacrosse championships in the 2012 season.

Along with his business background, Scalise has extensive ties to Ivy League athletics as an All-America lacrosse player at Brown and later as head

coach of the Harvard men's lacrosse and women's soccer programs.

A 1971 graduate of Brown, Scalise was selected three times to the All-Ivy League lacrosse team and twice named All-America and All-New England. He led the nation in scoring (47 goals) as a junior, then co-captained the squad in 1971 when he set a New England record by scoring 11 times against Connecticut while helping the Bears advance to the inaugural NCAA men's lacrosse tournament.

As a senior, Scalise was also the recipient of the Brown University Sportsmanship Award and the *Sports Illustrated* Award of Merit, and was inducted into the Brown Hall of Fame in 1991. He entered the coaching ranks at Brown in the fall of 1971 as an assistant for the men's soccer and lacrosse teams.

Scalise was just 24 years old when he was named head coach of Harvard's men's lacrosse team in 1974. He led the Crimson to the 1980 Ivy League championship — the program's first league title in nearly two decades — and an accompanying NCAA tournament bid. He coached 17 All-America selections and completed his tenure in 1987 with a 98-79 overall record.

Scalise was also the first coach of Harvard's women's soccer program, which began varsity play in 1977. He led that team to Ivy League crowns in 1978, 1979 and 1981, and NCAA tournament berths in 1982 and 1984. In 1985, Scalise became

the nation's first women's collegiate soccer coach to amass 100 victories. He finished with a 113-38-11 overall record.

Scalise left coaching in 1987 to enroll in the Harvard Business School, where in 1989 he was awarded a Master in Business Administration. Later that year, he became director of MBA placement services, managing processes and products serving the Business School community. He held that post until 1992, when he accepted a position at Bain & Company to become director of recruiting, career development and alumni relations. While there, he developed strategic and operational initiatives to build people assets for the firm, and prepared and managed an operating budget of approximately \$4 million. Scalise returned to the Business School in 1995 as its executive director of MBA program administration before assuming his current post in the department of athletics.

The 55-year-old Scalise was born in New York City and graduated from Uniondale (N.Y.) High School in 1967. He is married to Maura Costin Scalise '80, an All-Ivy swimmer at Harvard who coached the Crimson women's swimming and diving team to Ivy League and national prominence during her tenure.

The Scalise family resides in Nahant, Mass., and includes four children: Michael (age 20), Mark (18), Matthew (15) and Rosemary (11).

A TIMELINE OF TRADITION

Harvard possesses one of the longest and proudest traditions in college football

May 14, 1874 — Football is born in Cambridge as Harvard accepts a proposal from McGill University for a two-game series at Jarvis Field. Harvard wins the opener, three goals to none. The schools battle to a 0-0 draw the following afternoon.

June 4, 1875 — Harvard plays its first intercollegiate game, facing Tufts. Just as historic is that the Crimson is outfitted in a football uniform, believed to be the first time a team has been so identified. The squad is adorned in the school colors, with a uniform of white shirts and pants, with crimson trimming and crimson hose.

November 13, 1875 — Harvard and Yale play for the first time. The Crimson wins this initial meeting, held at Hamilton Field in New Haven, with four goals and four touchdowns to no goals and no touchdowns for the Elis. A group of 150 Harvard faithful makes the journey on the evening train from Boston.

October 31, 1881 — Harvard plays the first East-West intersectional football game as it hosts Michigan at the South End Grounds in Boston. The Crimson takes a bite out of the Wolverines, 4-0, as part of a 6-1-1 season.

January 6, 1885 — Believing that the sport had degenerated into “modified mayhem,” the Athletic Committee presents a report to the Harvard faculty which bans football from campus for the coming fall.

November 3, 1886 — Rules changes allow football to return to Harvard in 1886. The Crimson rolls to a 156-0 win over Exeter, its highest single-game total. Harvard goes on to establish a national collegiate record for points, amassing 765 during its 12-2 campaign. The

record stood until the 2004 season, when Division II Pittsburg State (Kan.) scored 837 points in 15 games.

March 14, 1889 — Harvard holds what is believed to be the nation’s first-ever spring football practice when team captain Arthur J. Cumnock leads the team in drills on Jarvis Field.

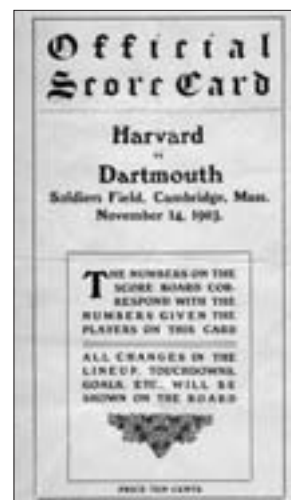
November 22, 1890 — Harvard captures its first of seven national championships. The Crimson finishes 11-0 and defeats Yale, 12-6, on the season’s final day.

November 30, 1893 — William H. Lewis becomes Harvard’s first black captain when he is elected for the honor prior to the Penn game. He replaces B. G. Waters, who was injured a week earlier against Yale. Lewis, enrolled in Harvard Law School, held a similar post while attending Amherst in 1891. Lewis goes on to be elected to the Cambridge City Council as a Republican in 1899, is elected to the Legislature in 1901 and is named Assistant United States Attorney for Boston in 1903. In 1910, Lewis is appointed by President Taft as Assistant Attorney General of the United States.

November 30, 1893 — The first football scoreboard is used. The Harvard Athletic Association unveils this invention of Arthur Irwin, a Bostonian and a professional baseball player and manager, in the Crimson’s 26-4 win over Penn on Thanksgiving.

October 1, 1898 — An 11-0 win over Williams starts the Crimson on a 32-game unbeaten streak (31-0-1) that continues until the final game of the 1900 campaign. Along the way, Harvard captures national titles in 1898 and 1899.

October 31, 1903 — Glenn S. “Pop” Warner, coach of the famed Carlisle Indians, introduces the hidden ball trick in a game against Harvard. The ploy is unleashed during the second half kickoff, and the resulting touchdown moves Carlisle ahead, 11-0. The Crimson delivers the Halloween day treat, however, winning 12-11.



November 14, 1903 — Harvard Stadium, the nation’s first permanent concrete stadium for athletics, opens when Harvard faces Dartmouth.

September 29, 1906 — Harvard plays its first game since the introduction of the forward pass. The rule change was necessitated by the increasingly brutal nature of football as a way to open up the game. The configuration of Harvard Stadium forced the rules committee to opt for this innovation rather than widen the field by 40 feet.

November 7, 1908 — The legendary Jim Thorpe and his Carlisle squad visit the Stadium. Thorpe is shut down and his squad blanked, 17-0, as part of Harvard's 9-0-1 season.

November 20, 1909 — Hamilton Fish, a two-time All-America pick in an era when only 11 players earned the distinction, completes his career at Harvard. The rugged 6-4, 200-pound tackle graduated cum laude in 1910 and rose to the rank of Major in the Fourth Division Infantry during World War I. He is elected to the United States Congress in 1920 as a representative from New York and serves until 1946.

November 18, 1911 — Harvard embarks on its school-record 33-game unbeaten streak with a 5-3 win over Dartmouth at the Stadium. The streak covers the entire 1912, 1913 and 1914

seasons as well as the first four games of 1915. The Crimson goes 30-0-3 before Cornell finally puts a halt to the streak with a 10-0 win Oct. 23, 1915.

November 21, 1914 — The great career of Charlie Brickley '15 comes to a conclusion with a 36-0 rout of Yale in New Haven. Hampered by an injury for part of the year, Brickley still adds one extra point to the cause and finishes his career with 215 points.

November 25, 1916 — Percy Haughton coaches his final game for the Crimson, as he and his entire staff enter the service for World War I. As head coach of the Crimson for nine years, Haughton posted an incredible 71-7-5 record. Harvard won three national titles in his tenure (1910, 1912, 1913).

January 1, 1920 — Harvard wins the Rose Bowl and its last of seven national championships. The Crimson finishes 9-0-1 by edging Oregon, 7-6, in the Tournament of Roses contest.

October 31, 1925 — Number one defeats number two as Harvard, the oldest college in America, tops William & Mary, the second-oldest, by a 14-7 count at the Stadium.

November 22, 1930 — Barry Wood '32 throws a pair of touchdown passes and plays the entire 60 minutes as Harvard finishes the season by blanking Yale, 13-0. In addition to being an All-America quarterback, Wood is a three-year letterwinner in hockey and baseball.

October 30, 1937 — Vernon Struck '38 sets a school single-game record by rushing for 233 yards in a 34-6 win at Princeton. The mark stands until 1991. He also scores a pair of touchdowns in the win.

National Championships

National collegiate champions in football have been selected every year since 1889. The choice was based on the Helms Athletic Foundation from 1889-1923, the Rissman Trophy winner from 1924-30, Knute Rockne Memorial Trophy winner from 1931-35, Associated Press poll of sportswriters from 1936 and the UPI poll of coaches from 1950. Since 1978, national champions in Division 1-AA have been determined through a play-off system. Harvard has won seven national championships.

November 20, 1943 — College football is again depleted because of war, but 45,000 fans turn out at the Stadium to see squads from Harvard and Boston College battle to a 6-6 draw. It is the first meeting between the schools in any athletic competition in 24 years.

October 11, 1947 — Chester Pierce '48, a standout tackle for the Crimson, becomes the first black to play against a white college in the South when Harvard meets the University of Virginia in Charlottesville.

November 22, 1947 — Ken O'Donnell makes his final of eight interceptions on the season to set a school record, which has been equaled twice, by Cecil Cox in 1985 and Steven Williams in 2008.

October 30, 1948 — Hal Moffie's school-record 89-yard punt return for a TD helps key a 20-13 Harvard win over Holy Cross at the Stadium.

November 17, 1951 — Tom Ossman rushes for five touchdowns, setting a school record in the Crimson's 34-21 win over Brown.

October 11, 1952 — Dick Clasby dashes for a 96-yard touchdown in the Crimson's 42-0 victory over Washington University of St. Louis, the longest run from scrimmage in school history.

October 31, 1953 — Quarterback Carroll Lowenstein throws for a school-record five touchdowns as Harvard routs Davidson, 42-6.

November 20, 1954 — Harvard wins its 500th game by tackling Yale, 13-9, at the Stadium.

October 13, 1956 — The Ivy League begins formal play in football as Harvard crushes Cornell, 32-7, in Ithaca.

November 7, 1959 — A 14-0 win at Princeton clinches the first winning season for head coach John Yovicsin. This begins a string of 10 straight winning years for the Harvard coach.

November 25, 1961 — Harvard earns its first share of the Ivy football title, finishing 6-1 in the League after topping Yale, 27-0. Columbia also claims a portion of the coveted crown.

October 14, 1967 — Placekicker Tom Wynne opens the scoring against Columbia with a school-record 51-yard field goal. The kick helps the Crimson to a 49-14 victory over the Lions.

November 23, 1968 — The now-legendary 29-29 "win" over Yale enables Harvard to finish the year at 8-0-1 — the school's first undefeated campaign since 1920. Harvard scores 16 points in the game's final 42 seconds to knot the score.

November 17, 1973 — By making 13 receptions, Pat McNally '75 sets a Harvard record that stands for nearly three decades, and makes a pair of touchdown grabs, in a 35-32 win against Brown. It is Harvard's 600th victory.



Harvard won the 1919-20 Rose Bowl and the last of its seven national championships by defeating Oregon, 7-6.

November 23, 1974 — Milt "Pineapple" Holt '75 leads the Crimson on a 95-yard touchdown drive over the game's final five minutes as Harvard surprises Yale, 21-16, to earn a share of the Ivy League title. Some observers still refer to this game as the most exciting in Harvard's history.

November 22, 1975 — Harvard wins its first outright Ivy championship. Mike Lynch '76-77 boots a 26-yard field goal in the final seconds to deliver a 10-7 victory over Yale at the Yale Bowl.

November 17, 1979 — Harvard is the final obstacle to a perfect season for Yale and spoils the Elis' bid with a 22-7 upset at the Bowl. Yale was allowing just 65 yards on the ground per game, but the Crimson sets the tone early by gaining 64 rushing yards on its first TD drive.

September 25, 1982 — Don Allard '83 throws for a then-school-record 358 yards against Massachusetts in a 31-14 season-opening win.

November 19, 1983 — It's the 100th edition of "The Game" and the Crimson comes out on top, taking a 16-7 win in New Haven to earn a share of the Ivy League title.

November 9, 1985 — Harvard erupts for 21 points in a 41-second span late in the fourth quarter to surprise host Holy Cross, 28-20.

November 21, 1987 — With temperatures hovering below zero at the Yale Bowl, Harvard freezes out the Elis, 14-10, to win the undisputed Ivy League championship. The Crimson finishes 8-2 overall and 6-1 in the Ivies, its best record under coach Joe Restic.

November 4, 1989 — Head coach Joe Restic wins his 100th game at Harvard, as the Crimson tops Brown, 27-14, in Providence.

October 13, 1990 — A nine-sack effort against Fordham is typical of the Crimson's defensive efforts, and leads the way to a 19-13 victory over the Rams. The Harvard defense finishes the fall with a school-record 49 sacks.

June 22, 1991 — Harvard Stadium hosts the first Japanese collegiate football game played in the United States. Keio University, coached by the Harvard staff, defeats Yale-led Waseda University, 21-19.

November 9, 1991 — Fullback Matt Johnson '92 rushes for a school-record 323 yards as Harvard defeats Brown, 35-29.

October 2, 1993 — Harvard wins its 700th game, defeating Lafayette, 21-17, at the Stadium.

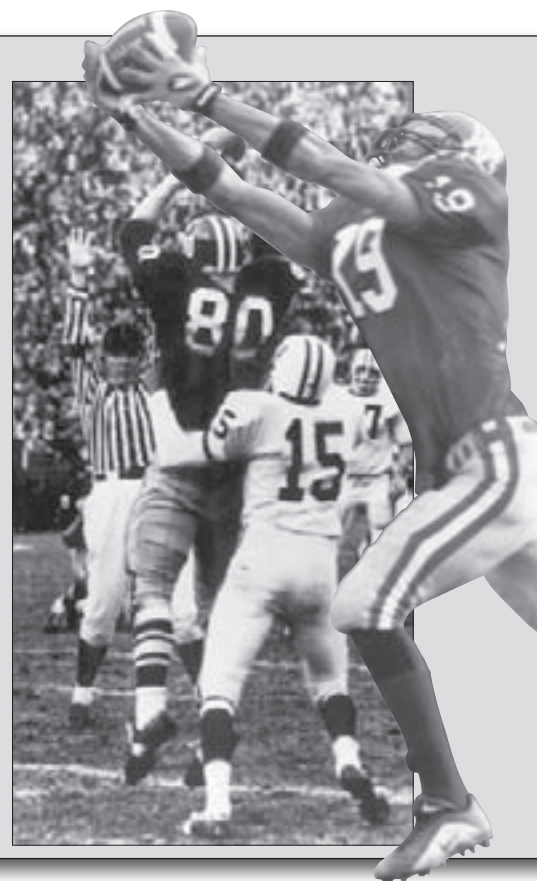
October 14, 1994 — Thomas F. Stephenson '64, MBA '66 endows Harvard football's head coaching position with a \$2.5 million gift. Tim Murphy becomes the first Thomas Stephenson Family Coach for Harvard Football.

Harvard's Greatest Catches

Two of the greatest catches in Harvard football history helped deliver Ivy League championships to the Crimson.

In 1968, tight end Pete Varney (left) caught a two-point conversion with no time left on the clock that completed Harvard's 16-point comeback in the final 42 seconds against Yale and gave the Crimson a 29-29 "win." Both teams finished the season undefeated at 8-0-1.

In 2001, Carl Morris's thrilling 62-yard catch and run for a touchdown came during a showdown of unbeaten teams against Penn as the Crimson rallied from a 14-point deficit to win, 28-21. The victory was part of Harvard's 9-0 campaign, the first perfect season for the Crimson in 88 years.



March 29, 1997 — Harvard plays an exhibition game against Japan's Kyoto University, after accepting an invitation to help celebrate the school's 50th anniversary of its football club. Team members take part in cultural exchanges throughout the week-long visit, then engage in an exciting match-up in front of 16,000 fans, where the Crimson pulls out a 42-35 victory.

November 22, 1997 — The Ivy League title returns to Cambridge as Harvard's 17-7 win at Yale secures the program's first 7-0 Ivy season. Tailback Chris Menick '00 sets the single-season rushing record (1,267 yards).

April 8, 1998 — Defensive end Tim Fleiszer '98 is the first overall selection in the Canadian Football League draft. The Montreal native is selected by the Hamilton Tiger-Cats. Later in the month, offensive lineman Matt Birk '98 becomes a sixth-round choice by the NFL's Minnesota Vikings.

October 23, 1999 — Eight school records are broken or tied in a 63-21 win over Dartmouth. Most notable are tailback Chris Menick, who becomes the all-time leading rusher, and flanker Terence Patterson '00, who sets the career receptions mark. Menick will finish his career with 3,330 yards; Patterson ends with 146 catches.

April 22, 2000 — Linebacker Isaiah Kacyvenski '00, Harvard's all-time leading tackler, becomes the program's highest NFL draft pick when he's taken in the fourth round by the Seattle Seahawks.

September 23, 2000 — Quarterback Neil Rose '02-03, in his first collegiate start, throws for a Harvard-record 412 yards as the Crimson defeats Brown, 42-37.

November 10, 2001 — A battle of undefeated teams takes center stage as Harvard hosts Penn with the Ivy title on the line. After spotting the Quakers a 14-0 lead, the Crimson rallies to claim a 28-21 victory. Neil Rose throws three touchdown passes on the day, two of them to Carl Morris.

November 17, 2001 — With a crowd of 52,000 looking on at the Yale Bowl, Harvard clinches its first perfect season in 88 years by topping the Bulldogs, 35-23. The Crimson wins its 10th Ivy League title, and second under head coach Tim Murphy.

November 2, 2002 — Numerous school records fall in the Crimson's 31-26 win at Dartmouth. Neil Rose throws for 449 yards and 36 completions, with Carl Morris catching 21 of those passes for 257 yards.

November 16, 2002 — Harvard's "Ivy Title" game at Penn is the backdrop for ESPN's College Gameday program. The telecast marks the first time a Division I-AA game is featured and attracts the most viewers in the history of the program.

October 25, 2003 — Harvard celebrates the 100th anniversary of Harvard Stadium with one of the facility's most exciting games as the Crimson takes a 43-40 overtime win against Princeton.

September 25, 2004 — Harvard overcomes a 21-0 first-quarter deficit and a 31-10 halftime margin to rally past Brown, 35-34, in Providence in both teams' Ivy League openers.

November 13, 2004 — Harvard clinches a share of its 11th Ivy League championship with a 31-10 win against Penn at Franklin Field — the Crimson's first win in Philadelphia in 24 years.

November 20, 2004 — Harvard completes its best season in more than 100 years with a 35-3 win against Yale at a sold-out Harvard Stadium to finish 10-0. Two explosive plays spark the Crimson as All-America Brian Edwards '05 scores on a 53-yard punt return and Ricky Williamson '05 returns an interception 100 yards for a TD. Harvard finishes as the only unbeaten school in Division I-AA and ends the season unbeaten and untied for the seventh time in school history.

December 10, 2004 — Tailback Clifton Dawson is named to the Walter Camp Foundation All-America first team, becoming the first Harvard offensive back to achieve first team status since Barry Wood in 1931.

April 24, 2005 — Quarterback Ryan Fitzpatrick '05 is chosen by the St. Louis Rams in the seventh round of the NFL draft. He becomes the first Ivy League signal-caller to be drafted since Columbia's John Witkowski in 1984.

April 30, 2005 — A national television audience gets an offseason look at Harvard Football when the Crimson-White Spring Game is broadcast by ESPNU.

October 15, 2005 — Harvard's 24-17 win at Lafayette gives the Crimson wins over the eventual Ivy (Brown) and Patriot League

champions in the same season for the first time.

November 19, 2005 — Harvard defeats Yale for the fifth straight year by rallying from a 21-3 second-half deficit to prevail, 30-24, in three overtimes. It marks the first triple-overtime game in Ivy League history and the first Harvard-Yale game to go to extra periods. Harvard forces three Yale turnovers in overtime before Clifton Dawson '07 ends the game with a two-yard touchdown run.

November 11, 2006 — The Ivy League's most hallowed record falls by the wayside as Clifton Dawson breaks loose for a 55-yard run against Penn to surpass former Cornell great Ed Marinaro as the Ancient Eight's all-time rushing leader. Dawson runs for 119 yards against the Quakers to finish the game with 4,781 yards, bettering Marinaro's longstanding mark of 4,715. Dawson would finish his spectacular career with 4,841 rushing yards and 60 rushing touchdowns, both Ivy League records.

September 22, 2007 — The first night football game at Harvard Stadium takes place in front of 18,898 fans. The Crimson scores the first touchdown under the lights on its opening drive, going 80 yards in eight plays with Liam O'Hagan connecting with Corey Mazza on a 21-yard scoring pass. Harvard then uses three fourth-quarter interceptions to hold off Brown, 24-17.

November 17, 2007 — In just the fourth meeting between two teams with undefeated Ivy records in the final week of the season, Harvard defeats Yale, 37-6, in front of 57,248 fans at the Yale Bowl. The Elis, looking for their first unblemished season in 47 years and first outright Ivy title in 26 years, enter the game ranked 11th and leading the nation in rushing offense and passing defense. Harvard limits them to just 66 rushing yards and 109 total yards and holds Yale QBs to only 43 yards on 22 attempts. Harvard QB Chris Pizzotti throws for 316 yards and four touchdowns as the Crimson hands Yale its worst loss to Harvard at the Bowl since 1914.

HARVARD STADIUM

The home of the Crimson since 1903 remains the best venue in college football



When it was built, there were doubters who thought it would never withstand the weight of a large crowd, let alone the brutal cold of a New England winter.

But more than a century later it still stands proud, the “aristocrat of American sports amphitheaters” as one writer put it, and is celebrated for saving football as well as for its timeless charm and fabulous sightlines for fans.

Harvard Stadium turns 106 years old this fall, and the nation’s oldest permanent concrete structure for intercollegiate athletics has never looked better. First opened Nov. 14, 1903, for a game against Dartmouth, the Stadium has since hosted over 650 Harvard football contests as well as hundreds of other athletic and non-athletic events, including Olympic and professional soccer, rock concerts and political rallies.

In March of 1903, it was announced that the Class of 1879, in honor of its 25th anniversary, would present the university with a stadium seating 40,000 spectators. The plans provided for a horseshoe-shaped structure of steel, similar to the stadium at Athens, with seats of stone and concrete for 27,000 persons. An additional 15,000 temporary seats were to be added whenever the demand made it necessary. Its total cost was \$310,000.

It would be a much-needed addition to the Harvard athletics landscape. The football and

baseball teams had played for several years at Soldiers Field, where fans jammed into decaying, unsafe wooden bleachers to cheer on the Crimson. Work on the Stadium began shortly after the completion of the 1903 baseball season, and the foundations were dug in early July. Even when the Stadium opened some four-and-a-half months later, it was far from a finished product. Much of the seating on its eastern side was of a temporary wood nature and capacity stood at just 20,000.

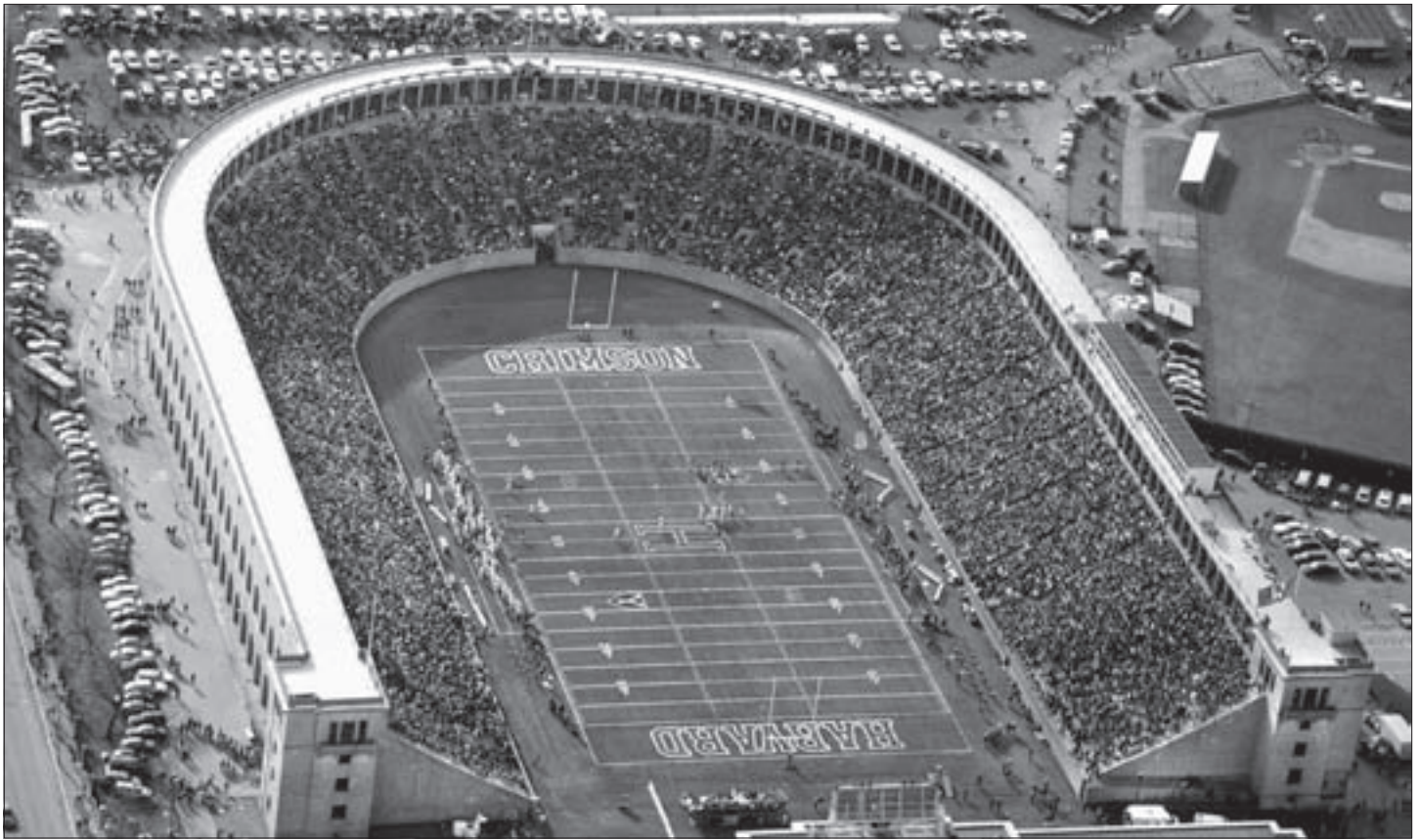
The Stadium marked the first use of reinforced concrete on a large scale, and skeptics abounded who were certain the building would not be safe. To allay those fears, the construction superintendent walked beneath the stands while spectators took their seats on opening day.

In those days, football was a running and kicking game. But as the sport became increasingly violent, some colleges were dropping it in favor of rugby, so in 1906 U.S. President Theodore Roosevelt stepped in to save the game. He organized the Intercollegiate Football Conference — a collection of 28 colleges and universities and the forerunner of the NCAA — and demanded it adopt rules changes to make the sport safer. Some suggested widening the field, but the permanent nature of the stands at Harvard Stadium made it impractical for the school to endorse this plan.

Concerned that eliminating football at Harvard might mean the end of the sport on a national level, the committee instead approved the forward pass, though it did its best to minimize its effect on the sport. In 1906, the penalty for an incomplete pass was for the offensive team to lose possession (the rule was “softened” in 1907 to a loss of 15 yards). Other rules changes were also implemented, including giving the offense just three downs instead of five to gain a first down and shortening games from 70 to 60 minutes with a mandatory 10-minute rest between halves. In hindsight, however, it was the adoption of the forward pass that curtailed the sport’s violence and led to the surge in popularity that remains to this day.

The Stadium colonnade was added in 1910, and the press box was also built to accommodate growing media interest. When the press box burned down in 1981, it was rebuilt at a cost of \$375,000, more than the price tag for the entire Stadium some 80 years earlier. The Stadium’s seating area was refurbished two years later.

Today, Harvard Stadium remains one of the great venues in all of organized football. Sports fans from across the nation visit the Stadium to experience the rich tradition, and Harvard’s student-athletes are quick to talk about the unique experience of playing in one of the sport’s true treasures.



The First & The Finest

Nestled in a spectacular setting next to the Charles River and with the Boston skyline on the horizon, Harvard Stadium ranks among the nation's finest college football facilities.

Built in 1903, it is also the nation's oldest stadium. Harvard Stadium is a horseshoe containing architectural elements of a Greek stadium and Roman circus and is considered an engineering marvel, as it was the world's first massive reinforced concrete structure and the first large permanent arena for American college athletics. With a seating capacity of 30,323, Harvard Stadium is praised for its outstanding sightlines for fans.

Harvard Stadium once accommodated as many as 57,166 spectators when steel stands were built in the north end zone. Those stands were removed in 1951.

It Changed The Game

The close proximity of the stands to the field at the Stadium led to one of the most successful innovations in football history. In 1906, debate raged about the sport's roughness and several colleges had dropped football in favor of rugby. When the football rules committee met to discuss changes, Walter Camp proposed widening the field by 40 feet. However, that idea would require considerable alterations to the Stadium. Ultimately, the committee adopted the forward pass.

National Recognition

Harvard Stadium is recognized as a National Historic Landmark and is one of just three athletic arenas to be so designated. The Yale Bowl (built in 1914) and the Rose Bowl (built in 1922) are the other two.

A Gift From The Class of 1879

The Stadium, a 25th-anniversary gift of the Class of 1879, and was constructed in four-and-a-half months at the cost of just \$310,000.

Prior to the Stadium's opening, Harvard played its home football games at a number of sites. Jarvis Field, where the Littauer Center now stands, was the setting for the Crimson's inaugural contest against McGill (1874) and its first intercollegiate game against Tufts (1875).

After several seasons of playing home games at the South End Grounds, Harvard returned to Cambridge in 1881 and played at Holmes Field, now the site of Langdell Hall. Football, and most of the school's outdoor teams, moved to Soldiers Field in 1894.

All-Time Record

Harvard has played 658 games in Harvard Stadium since Nov. 14, 1903 (an 11-0 loss to Dartmouth). The Crimson's all-time Stadium record is 410-214-34 (.649).

More Than Harvard Football

Track and field, rugby, lacrosse, soccer, professional football and even ice hockey have also been played at Harvard Stadium, which is also home to the Crimson men's and women's lacrosse programs.

The then-American Football League Boston Patriots called Harvard Stadium home for two years from 1960-61.

The Stadium also hosted Olympic soccer competition in the summer of 1984 (Cameroon, Canada, Chile, France, Iraq, Norway and Qatar all competed), and was the site for the university's 350th anniversary celebration in 1986.

The U.S. track and field Olympic trials were held here in 1916 and 1920.

Historic, Yet Modern

The last major renovation of the Stadium infrastructure took place in 1984, and recent structural testing confirms that Harvard Stadium will be as functional well into the 21st century as it was in the early 20th.

In recent years, the playing field was recentered to improve the view for fans seated in the closed end and accommodate the 1998 construction of the Murr Center.

Perhaps the most dramatic change to Harvard Stadium took place as part of a 2006-07 upgrade to the facility that included replacing the natural grass surface with FieldTurf, the addition of lights to allow for nighttime use of the field and the installation a removable dome-like "bubble," that allows for year-round use of the facility.

In 2007 the Crimson hosted Brown in the first night game in program history at the Stadium, and 2008 saw the addition of a video board and updated public address system.



Though it turns 106 years old this fall, Harvard Stadium is still one of the more modern college football facilities in the nation, thanks to a \$5 million upgrade to the storied landmark.

The 2006 season marked the first in which the Harvard Stadium playing surface was equipped with FieldTurf — the synthetic grass-like material that has become one of the more popular surfaces in professional and college football.

In addition to the changes to the playing surface, the Stadium has benefited from the installation of permanent lighting across the top of the colonnade section. Coupled with the playing surface, the efficient, yet high-powered illumination system allows for extensive use of the facility by Harvard's football team as well

as the university's other intercollegiate, club and intramural groups. The first night game in Harvard's history was played Friday, Sept. 21 against Brown.

The improvements to the Stadium were done with careful consideration of the facility's status as a National Historic Landmark. No changes to the Stadium's exterior have been made, while the lighting system was integrated into the existing fencing across the top of the facility to preserve the look of the structure.

The Bubble

Perhaps the most radical change to Harvard Stadium takes place when football season is complete, with the installation of a removable dome-like "bubble," that allows for the year-round use of Harvard Stadium.

The bubble completely covers the playing surface from November until the spring, which gives the Crimson a fully functional home for spring football practice. The bubble takes approximately four hours to inflate once it's anchored to the Stadium infrastructure.

Entrance to the facility is through a revolving door to maintain proper air pressure within the bubble, and the temperature is controlled at approximately 65 degrees.

In addition to providing a permanent home for the Crimson football team, the bubble, along with the new artificial surface, has opened Harvard Stadium to a wide range of users. All of Harvard's varsity programs that compete outdoors have access to the Stadium as a practice facility, while the upgrade exponentially increases the number of club sport, intramural and recreational offerings available to the campus community.



FOOTBALL FACILITIES

Harvard's football players are provided with a wide range of top-notch facilities designed to keep the Crimson at the top of its game each Saturday.

Harvard and head coach Tim Murphy have a number of options available when it comes to practice facilities. The resurfacing of Harvard Stadium with FieldTurf has allowed for the Crimson to use its game field as its everyday practice facility.

The football team also has regular access to Jordan Field, the university's Astroturf facility, and Cumnock Field, a spacious natural grass locale that allows for practice for any road games that are played on those surfaces.

All of Harvard's practice facilities are lighted for evening use, allowing the players the necessary time to tend to their studies during the day.

Off the field, Harvard's players and coaches find comfortable surroundings in the completely renovated football office and locker room wing located in Dillon Field House.

The first phase of the renovations included a comprehensive display of photos and newspaper clippings of the great history of Harvard Football. The suite's Wall of Champions contains framed portraits of Harvard's seven national championship teams and 13 Ivy League championship squads.

A separate wall is dedicated to Harvard's current NFL players and the Crimson's career record holders. Interspersed among the suite are custom-framed accounts of the greatest games in Harvard's history containing original documents, photos and newspaper clippings.

In addition, a beautiful trophy and display case houses a flat-screen television as well as a collection of historic trophies and cherished footballs from the great moments in Harvard's history.

The second phase of the renovation included a reconstruction of the squads's meeting space as well as construction of modern offices for members of the coaching staff.

The third phase saw a complete renovation of Harvard's locker room to better suit the needs of today's student-athlete. The locker room contains two spacious areas, each with its own projection technology, televisions, couches and entertainment systems. In addition, the Crimson equipment room, which sits adjacent to the locker room in Dillon Field House, was redesigned and modernized with new furnishings to make serving the football team more efficient.

Harvard's student-athletes also take advantage of state-of-the-art strength training and sports medicine facilities, along with professionally trained staff in both areas who ensure the physical well-being of every player. The sports medicine area, completely overhauled in the summer of 2006, is located in Dillon Field House, just steps from the Crimson locker room. It consists of more than 5,000 square feet and is equipped with various modalities, a hydrotherapy room and rehabilitation and cardiovascular equipment.



The football lounge area includes a widescreen television and new furnishings, serving as a testament to the rich history of Harvard Football.



The spacious football locker room was completely renovated during the summer of 2008 and makes for a comfortable home for more than 100 Crimson players.

PALMER DIXON STRENGTH & CONDITIONING CENTER

The Palmer Dixon Strength and Conditioning Center is one of the premier strength and conditioning facilities in the country.

Few, if any, facilities can match Palmer Dixon's ability to accommodate large teams in such a variety of strength training and conditioning areas with top-of-the-line equipment.

Since its completion in March 2007 Harvard student-athletes have enjoyed training with the new state-of-the-art equipment in the spacious 24,000-square-foot facility.

The Palmer Dixon Strength and Conditioning Center is set up for full-service training for each athlete and team. The layout of the building is designed so that every aspect of training is housed in the center.

Training amenities include:

- 24 all-rubber Olympic weightlifting platforms by Sorinex.
- 24 full bumper plate sets by Uesaka.
- 24 nine-foot Power Racks with built-in three-way chin-up bars by Power Lift.
- 24 Olympic benches adjustable from 0-90 degrees by Sorinex.
- 24 full sets of iron plates by York.
- 24 18-inch step-up plyometric boxes.
- 24 dip and chin-up belts.
- 2 full sets of dumbbells, ranging from three to 130 pounds.
- Three Hammer Strength Jammers.
- A 21,000-square-foot all-purpose turf floor.
- 12 40-yard lanes with cross-lanes every five yards located in the middle of the facility. Athletes engage in footwork, dynamic warmup, dynamic flex, speed and agility training, interval conditioning and dynamic strength training, all in the strength and conditioning center.
- 12 pulling sleds for speed training and dynamic strength by Power Systems.
- Speed and agility training equipment storage space.
- Indoor and outdoor medicine ball walls measuring 40 feet wide by eight feet high.
- 50 medicine balls ranging from one to 20 pounds.
- 24 stability balls and stability pads.
- A 3,000-square-foot loft filled with 30 pieces of indoor conditioning equipment such as Spinner, Airdyne and stationary bikes as well as treadmills, ellipticals and stairsteppers.
- Men's and women's locker rooms.
- Strength and Conditioning offices.

Located in the Soldiers Field Athletic Complex, the Palmer Dixon Strength and Conditioning Center sits adjacent to Dillon Field House, which houses the Harvard football locker room. The facility is just steps away from Harvard Stadium and the team's other playing and practice facilities.

The facility and the entire strength and conditioning program are managed by a highly trained staff of four full-time coaches. Director of strength and conditioning Craig Fitzgerald, himself a former Division I football player, oversees the facility along with assistant directors Dan Perlmutter and Tim Mullen and assistant strength and conditioning coach Emily Saul.

The Palmer Dixon Center had served as an indoor squash and tennis facility before it was converted to Harvard's varsity athletics training center in 2007. It is named for William Palmer Dixon '25, who was a two-time national squash champion, a former president of the Harvard Varsity Club and a longtime supporter of Harvard's athletics program.

Thomas Stephenson Family Head Coach for Harvard Football

By any measure, Tim Murphy has led Harvard's storied football program to its most prosperous and successful era since

the early 20th century — a trend he hopes to continue into 2009 as he enters his 16th year as the Thomas Stephenson Family Head Coach for Harvard Football.

One of the game's finest teachers and motivators, Murphy took charge of the Harvard program prior to the 1994 season and has since led the program to a dominant state within the Football Championship Subdivision.

He is the first Harvard coach since the legendary Percy Haughton to lead the Crimson to two unbeaten, untied seasons in his tenure. The 2008 season culminated in Harvard's fifth Ivy League championship under Murphy (13th overall), its second consecutive Ivy crown, and the third in five seasons. The 2008 Crimson finished the year ranked 14th in the FCS Coaches Poll and continued a tradition of winning never before seen in the storied Ivy League.

After accumulating a 9-1 overall record last season, Harvard continued its stretch as the first and only team in Ivy League history to record eight consecutive seasons with at least seven victories. Harvard's current stretch is the program's best eight-year run since a 28-year stretch of seven-plus win seasons came to an end in 1911. The team's eight-year win total of 63 is one shy of its output from 1908-1915.

Just the fourth head coach to man the Harvard sideline in the last 56 years, Murphy enters the 2009 season with an 97-52 record with the Crimson. His overall head coaching record stands at 129-97-1 through 22 years, including five seasons as head coach at Cincinnati and two at Maine. He is an impressive 88-32 in his last 120 games with the Crimson and 57-12 in the last seven seasons, marking Harvard's best seven-year run since the 1910-16 seasons.

Equally as impressive, every four-year player recruited by Murphy to Harvard has both graduated from the university and been part of at least one Ivy League championship team.

Murphy enters the 2009 season ranked second in school history in total wins, trailing only the legendary Joe Restic (who won 117 games with the Crimson) on the all-time chart. The two coaches are closely linked and remain close. In the spring of 2008, Murphy joined Restic as Harvard coaches to be honored with the National Football Foundation Eastern Chapter's Ron Burton Distinguished America Award, given to a former football player who has carried the lessons learned on the field to his larger community.

Murphy has guided the Crimson to four outright Ivy League, and five overall, titles in the

past 12 years. The 2001 Harvard squad posted its first undefeated, untied campaign since 1913, while the 2004 team went a step further by going 10-0 to mark the first perfect season with at least 10 wins since 1901. Murphy's 1997 Crimson also won the Ivy title, which was Harvard's first in 10 years. In a game that will go down in history as one of equal importance and dominance, the 2007 championship season was capped by a 37-6 victory at Yale against a previously undefeated Bulldog team that was highly ranked in both total offense and defense.

The 2006 season saw Murphy's Harvard squad set another program first as the Crimson registered wins against the Ivy League and Patriot League champions for the first time in the same season in school history.

The 2004 season, meanwhile, still stands as arguably the Crimson's finest in more than 100 years. The Crimson went 10-0 on the year and had an average margin of victory of 20.5 points. Harvard scored at least 31 points in nine of the 10 games, had a double-digit winning margin in eight games, held its last six opponents to 14 points or less, dealt two shutouts and allowed just one touchdown in the last three games.

Harvard finished the year as the only undefeated school in the FCS and one of just five unbeaten in all of college football (along with Southern California, Auburn and Utah from the FBS and Linfield from Division III). The Crimson finished the season ranked No. 13 in the final Sports Network Division I-AA national poll and the ESPN/USA Today poll, marking Harvard's highest finish in the national rankings since the formation of the Division I-AA polls. Harvard's final Sagarin Rating stood 37th among the 239 Division I football schools, ahead of Minnesota, Brigham Young, Clemson, Stanford, Maryland, Alabama, Nebraska, Syracuse, Michigan State and Penn State, among others.

Murphy saw two Harvard players achieve All-America status and one earn Academic All-America recognition in 2004, while the Crimson had 15 players — the most in school history — named All-Ivy League. Harvard's starting quarterback, Ryan Fitzpatrick '05, was tabbed as the league's player of the year and went on to play in the East-West Shrine Game and the Hula Bowl.

Murphy himself was named the American

Football Monthly Division I-AA national coach of the year and was a finalist for the Eddie Robinson Award. He was named the New England Division I-AA coach of the year for the fourth time in his career.

Murphy's 2001 Harvard squad finished 9-0 overall and 7-0 in the Ivies, and was ranked No. 19 in the final Sports Network poll. Harvard committed just nine turnovers, averaged 445.0 yards in offense, and scored at least four touchdowns in every game. Murphy was both New England Division I-AA coach of the year and Grid Iron Club of Boston I-AA coach of the year, and received AFCA District I coach-of-the-year honors. He was also a finalist for the Eddie Robinson Award.

Previously, Murphy led Harvard to the 1997 Ivy championship, when his squad finished 9-1 overall and 7-0 in League play. It marked the first time in school history that the Crimson had posted a perfect Ivy record. Murphy was named the Scotty Whitelaw ECAC Division I-AA coach of the year and New England coach of the year.

Since 1994, Harvard has had 64 first team All Ivy selections, four Ivy rookies of the year, four Ivy players of the year, six first team All-Americans and sent 11 players on to pro football, including five-time All-Pro Matt Birk '98 of the Baltimore Ravens. In addition, 10 of his players have received national academic recognition (either CoSIDA Academic All-America or the FCS All-Academic Team). Before sending two players to the 2008 CoSIDA Academic All-



American team in 2008, Harvard had a national-best six players recognized on the All-District One team.

Murphy, past president of the FCS (Division I-AA) Coaches Association and a member of the Division I-AA Football board of trustees, is Harvard's first endowed coach. In October 1994, Thomas F. Stephenson '64 M.B.A. '66 established a \$2 million endowment fund that supports the head football coach in much the same way that an endowed chair supports a professor. Stephenson chose to name the fund for members of his family, who have been active participants in the Harvard community for four generations.

Murphy was named head football coach at Harvard Dec. 6, 1993. He came from the University of Cincinnati, where that fall he had directed the Division I-A Bearcats to their finest record in 17 years. Murphy's first head coaching position was at the University of Maine, where, in 1987, he led the Black Bears to their first NCAA Division I-AA playoff berth.

At Cincinnati, Murphy led the Bearcats to an 8-3 record in 1993, their first winning campaign since 1982 and the school's best overall mark since 1976 (9-2). Cincinnati was the fourth-most improved team in Division I-A (an increase of five wins over 1992), and finished the regular season ranked 27th in the country in the USA Today/CNN poll and 28th in the AP poll. It was the program's highest ranking in school history.

This success came after Murphy inherited a program that had a condemned stadium, no practice facilities, and the loss of 19 scholarships after being placed on probation for infractions incurred by the previous coaching staff. He attained all of his short-term goals, including: NCAA compliance, an improved graduation rate, reconstructing the strength and conditioning program and development of a successful major college team. When Murphy took over at Cincinnati in 1989, he was only 32 years old and was the youngest Division I head coach in the nation (along with Dave Rader at Tulsa).

While improvement was consistent throughout his tenure, it all came together in 1993. In that summer, Cincinnati was recognized by the College Football Association for being one of only 20 Division I schools to graduate a minimum of 70 percent of its most recent recruiting class. On the field, the Bearcats had their third-highest point total in school history (302), and set school marks for offensive plays, first downs and fewest turnovers. In addition, Cincinnati won that year's Independent Football Alliance championship (which included then-independents Memphis, East Carolina, Tulsa and Southern Mississippi).

Murphy started his head coaching career at Maine — in 1987 and 1988 — when he became the youngest head coach in the country (at age 30) upon succeeding current Dartmouth head coach Buddy Teevens. His first team finished with an 8-4 record (the Black Bears' finest record in 23 years), shared the Yankee Conference title, and advanced to the NCAA Division I-AA tournament for the first time in school history. For those accomplishments, Murphy was named Division I-AA New England coach of the year and was the AFCA Northeast Region coach of the year.

Murphy also has extensive experience as an assistant coach. He was the offensive coordinator at Maine in 1985 and 1986, when the Black Bears both rushed and passed for more than 2,000 yards in the same season for the first time in school history. He was the offensive line coach at Boston University for three seasons, from 1982 through 1984, and helped the Terriers to Yankee Conference titles and NCAA Division I-AA

playoff berths each year. Murphy was also the defensive line coach at Lafayette (1981), where he worked under Bill Russo when the Leopards posted their best record in school history (9-2), just one season after the squad went 1-10.

Murphy began his coaching career as a part-time assistant at Brown in 1979, and was promoted to assistant varsity offensive line coach the following season. A native of Kingston, Mass., Murphy graduated from Silver Lake High School in 1974. He then attended Springfield College, where he became a four-year starter and was a small college All-New England linebacker as a senior, and graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in 1978. Murphy earned his M.Ed. from Springfield the following year, did additional postgraduate work at Boston University and was accepted to the J.L. Kellogg Graduate School of Business at Northwestern and the Colgate Darden School of Business at Virginia.

Murphy was chosen to sit on the board of trustees of the American Football Coaches Association in January 2005 and was named to Springfield's All-Decade Team in 2006. In October, 2007, the night following Harvard's 27-10 victory over Princeton, Murphy was inducted into the Springfield College Athletic Hall of Fame.

Murphy resides in Wayland with his wife, Martha Kennedy Murphy, and the couple's three children: Molly Kennedy; Conor Timothy; and Grace Katharine.

JOEL LAMB

*Offensive Coordinator
Quarterbacks Coach*

Joel Lamb — a 1993 Harvard graduate and former Crimson quarterback — returned to Cambridge in 2006 as the program's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. He enters his third season in that role with his alma mater.

Lamb oversees the Crimson's recruiting efforts in Massachusetts as well as the Midwest states including Ohio, Illinois, Michigan, Indiana, Minnesota and Wisconsin.

During his time on the Harvard coaching staff, Lamb has helped the Crimson to rank among the nation's leaders in offense each season. In 2008, Harvard ranked 18th nationally in passing offense and led the Ivy League in total offense. Chris Pizzotti was named the Ivy's Player of the Year and was signed by the New York Jets. For his efforts, Lamb was named the Assistant Coach of the Year by the Gridiron Club of Greater Boston.

Lamb returned to Harvard following nine years as the quarterbacks coach at Yale. He was the Bulldogs' offensive coordinator for three seasons, during which time Yale twice led the Ivy League in passing offense. His 2003 unit led the Ivies in passing offense, scoring offense and total offense.

Lamb helped Yale to the 1999 Ivy League championship, which was the Bulldogs' first league title in 10 years. He coached three of the four most prolific quarterbacks in Yale history in all-time passing leader Alvin Cowan, runner-up Joe Walland and Peter Lee, who ranks fourth in school history. Lamb's 2005 quarterback, Jeff Mroz, finished second on Yale's single-season passing chart and tied Cowan's school record with 22 touchdown passes before signing with the Dallas Cowboys.

Before joining the staff at Yale, Lamb had been the quarterbacks coach and passing game coordinator at Amherst College for four years.

Lamb was a four-year member of Harvard's football program as an undergraduate and was the 1992 winner of the team's Henry N. Lamar Award, which recognizes dedication to the program, concern for his fellow man and contributions to Harvard football.

He went on to play competitively in England in 1994 with the Leeds Cougars of the British American Football Association.

A native of Natick, Mass., Lamb was a three-sport captain at Natick High School and was an all-state quarterback. He also was a standout in baseball and basketball. Lamb graduated from Harvard in 1993 after concentrating in psychology. He holds a master's degree in sports management from the University of Massachusetts.

Lamb's father, Tom, is the longtime athletic director and head football coach at Natick High, while Joel's wife, Ainslee, is the head field hockey coach at Boston College. They have a daughter, Brooklyn.



SCOTT LARKEE

*Defensive Coordinator
Linebackers Coach*

Scott Larkee — a 1999 Harvard graduate who was an All-Ivy League player with the Crimson — returned to his alma mater in 2007 for his second tour of duty as an assistant coach. In 2007 he worked with the team's running backs while serving as the program's recruiting coordinator. In 2008 he assumed the team's special teams coordinator position and also worked with the linebackers. In 2009 Larkee will serve as the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach.

Larkee is responsible for recruiting the western United States including California, Arizona, Colorado, Hawaii, Nevada, Idaho, Alaska, Utah, Oregon and Washington.

Larkee is hardly a stranger to Harvard as he previously served as an assistant coach for the Crimson's 2001 Ivy League championship team. He also was a standout linebacker as an undergraduate at Harvard.

Before returning to his alma mater, Larkee had been a graduate assistant at Boston College, helping the Eagles to back-to-back bowl appearances.

Larkee had a brief stint as a defensive assistant at Columbia, which came on the heels of a three-year tenure as an assistant at Division III Bates College. He served as the Bobcats' special teams coordinator, linebackers coach, and strength and conditioning coordinator from 2002-04.

Larkee's first year on the Harvard coaching staff was in the 2001 season, when he served as the positional coach for Harvard's outside linebackers and helped the Crimson to a 9-0 season and an outright Ivy League title.

Larkee also has served as an assistant at Bowdoin College for the 1999 & 2000 seasons and was a player coach with Les Cougars de St. Ouen l'Aumone (a French Club Team) in 2001.

Larkee graduated from Harvard in 1999 in third place on the Crimson's career tackles chart (243). He was a second-team All-Ivy League selection as a senior, making 98 tackles with six pass breakups, and was a starter on Harvard's 1997 Ivy League championship team. Larkee also was the winner of the team's Henry N. Lamar Award, given to the Harvard football senior who, through dedication to the program and concern for his fellow man, has made a unique contribution to the team.

Larkee holds a bachelor's degree in anthropology from Harvard, while he has completed course work toward an advanced degree in education at Boston College.

Larkee and his wife, former Crimson field hockey All-American Judy (Collins) Larkee '99, live in Norwood, Mass., with their daughter Shea (2) and son Sam (1).





TONY RENO

*Special Teams Coordinator
Defensive Backs Coach*

Tony Reno begins his first season with the Harvard Crimson in 2009. Reno will serve as the Crimson's defensive backs coach and special teams coordinator.

Reno will recruit the Atlantic Coast section of the United States including Georgia, Florida, North Carolina, South Carolina and Tennessee.

Reno completed his sixth season with the Bulldogs in 2008, working with the team's defensive backs for five of those seasons. Promoted to assistant head coach in 2007, Reno guided the team to its standing as one of the nation's top-ranked passing defenses ranking third in both 2007 and 2008. Yale ranked just behind Harvard's nation-leading pass defense in 2007 and was three spots ahead of the Crimson this past season.

Reno coached 15 All-Ivy student-athletes at Yale including five this past season.

Prior to working in the defensive secondary with Yale, Reno worked with the wide receivers and is also a former defensive coordinator and secondary coach at his alma mater, Worcester State College (Mass.). There, Reno helped transform a 1-9 team into the ECAC Northeast Champions three years later. In 2002, Reno was honored with AFLAC National Assistant Coach of the Year Award.

His first coaching job came at King's College (Pa.), where he served as a defensive ends coach.

A 1997 graduate of Worcester State, Reno earned a degree in history before completing a master's of science in health education from WSC in 2000. As a player at WSC, Reno was a three-year starter at free safety, and his team was league champion both his junior and senior years.

Reno, his wife, Toni, and his sons, Dante and Vince, and daughter, Angelina, live in Sturbridge, Mass.



CARLTON HALL

Defensive Line Coach

Carlton Hall begins his third year as an assistant coach at Harvard in 2009. He will continue to work with the Crimson's defensive line and will recruit the southern United States with a focus on Texas, Alabama, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana, Louisiana, New Mexico and Mississippi.

Additionally, Hall serves as the Crimson's professional liaison and works closely with professional scouts.

Hall brings experience at the highest levels of collegiate and professional football to the Crimson. He most recently served as the defensive line coach at Georgetown, after three seasons as an assistant in various capacities at Columbia.

Hall worked with Columbia's linebackers after the 2005 season and oversaw that position through the 2006 spring workouts. He was the Lions' defensive line assistant during the 2005 season and served as wide receivers coach for the 2003 and 2004 campaigns.

Hall spent the summer of 2004 with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as part of the NFL Minority Coaching Fellowship, where he worked with that team's wide receivers and assisted in offensive quality control.

He spent four seasons as an assistant coach at Asheboro (N.C.) High School, including three as the school's defensive coordinator.

Hall enjoyed a standout playing career as an undergraduate, earning All-Southeastern Conference honors at Vanderbilt. He was a four-year letterwinner and three-year starter for the Commodores, leading the SEC in tackles as a senior. He received the football team's Wade-Looney Award for perseverance and was chosen to play in the prestigious East-West Shrine Game in San Francisco as a senior.

Hall went on to sign a free agent contract with the San Diego Chargers in 1998.

Hall graduated from Vanderbilt in 1998 with a degree in human and organizational development. He is an active member of the American Football Coaches Association and the Black Coaches Association.





JOE VILLAPIANO

*Running Backs Coach
Recruiting Coordinator*

Joe Villapiano is in his fifth season as a member of the Crimson coaching staff in 2009. He will work with Harvard's running backs for a third season after spending two years as the team's defensive backs coach. The team's recruiting coordinator, Villapiano recruits the New England section of the United States as well as New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Canada.

All four of Harvard's defensive backs were named All-Ivy League in 2007 with three of them — Steven Williams '08, Andrew Berry '09 and Doug Hewlett '08 — earning first team status. Last season, three Crimson earned all-league accolades while cornerback Matthew Hanson earned Rookie of the Year honors.

Williams would set his name apart as Harvard's all-time interceptions leader. His eight picks in 2007 tied a single season record for the Crimson and gave him sole possession for first place on the all-time list with 16. Named first team All-America by the American Football Coaches Association, Williams went on to represent his home state in the Texas versus The Nation All-Star game in El Paso, Texas.

Berry meanwhile, capped an All-America career by twice being named an Academic All-American while also earned the FCS Scholar-Athlete of the Year award as a senior and graduating with two degrees in just four years.

Villapiano came to Cambridge in 2005 after spending two years on the staff at the University of Connecticut, where he coordinated the offensive scout team and analyzed game video of opponents' offenses.

Villapiano joined the staff at Connecticut following his four-year playing career in Storrs. He caught five passes for 47 yards in his career and holds the distinction of having scored the final Connecticut touchdown in Memorial Stadium, the team's former home facility.

He earned the team's Student-Athlete Award as a senior.

Villapiano earned a bachelor's degree in math education from Connecticut in 2002 and added a master's degree in education in 2005. His uncle, Phil, was a four-time All-Pro linebacker with the Oakland Raiders and was a member of Oakland's Super Bowl XI championship team.

In addition to his work with the Crimson football program, Villapiano and his former high school teammates are active in the formation of a company called iB-LIEVE, which is designed to empower individuals and teams using belief, positive attitude and positive action.



RON CROOK

*Offensive Line Coach
Director of Football Operations*

Ron Crook enters his seventh season as Harvard's offensive line coach in 2009. He also serves as the team's director of football operations.

Since joining the Crimson staff in 2003, Crook has seen his offensive line provide the foundation for the Ivy League's all-time rushing leader in Clifton Dawson '07, while seven of Crook's players have achieved first-team All-Ivy League status a combined nine times. Tackle James Williams '10 is a two-time All-America and first team All-Ivy selection while the Crimson has had a total of nine players earn all-league honors in the past two seasons alone.

Tackle Brian Lapham '06 and Will Johnson '06 were both two-time first-team picks, while center Frank Fernandez '07 was chosen for the 2007 Hula Bowl in 2006.

Crook has 20 years of collegiate experience, including stints at Illinois, West Liberty State, Clarion and Cincinnati.

At Illinois, Crook helped coach the offensive line and worked with All-Big Ten players Dave Diehl and 2001 All-America Tony Pashos, who were both selected in the 2003 NFL draft.

Crook is currently in his second tour of duty with Harvard head coach Tim Murphy. He was a graduate assistant on Murphy's staff at Cincinnati, when the Bearcats finished an impressive 8-3 in the 1993 season and won the IFA championship.

At West Liberty State, Crook was first an offensive line coach and then offensive coordinator. The Hilltoppers won the 2000 WVIAC Championship, while the 2001 team ranked first in the conference in three offensive categories and second in three others. A decade earlier, Crook broke into the coaching ranks at West Liberty State. He spent the 1989 season as a student assistant working with the tight ends and the 1990-92 seasons as an assistant coach with the offensive line.

Crook has also coached at West Virginia Tech (1999), Glenville State (1997-98) and Clarion (1994-96). He was part of NCAA Division II playoff teams at Glenville State and Clarion.

Crook is a 1989 graduate of West Liberty State, where he earned a degree in physical education. He and his wife, Stacy, reside in Watertown, Mass., with their sons, Andrew and Cian, and their daughter, Kenley.





DAVE BORGONZI

*Assistant
Secondary*

Dave Borgonzi is in his second season as an assistant with the Harvard football program. He assists with the Crimson defensive secondary.

Borgonzi recruits the atlantic section of the United States including Washington, D.C, Virginia, Maryland, Delaware, Missouri and Iowa. He also assists with recruiting efforts in Iowa, Kansas, Nebraska, Kentucky, West Virginia, Wyoming, Montana, North Dakota and South Dakota.

Last year Harvard ranked sixth nationally in pass efficiency defense with three players being named all-league and cornerback Matthew Hanson earning Rookie of the Year honors.

Prior to arriving in Cambridge, Borgonzi spent two seasons as a graduate assistant coach at Syracuse where he worked as the Orange's assistant defensive line coach while also assisting the program's recruiting and special teams efforts. While at Syracuse, Borgonzi worked towards an advanced degree in education.

Borgonzi was a three-year starter while an undergraduate at Amherst College. Named a team captain in his senior year, Borgonzi graduated with a degree in law, jurisprudence and social thought.

Borgonzi currently resides in Everett.



EVAN LORING

*Assistant
Wide Receivers*

Evan Loring enters his first season as an assistant with the Harvard football program in 2009 where he will work with the wide receivers.

Loring spent the last six seasons at the University of New Hampshire where he graduated in 2006 with dual degrees in business administration and political science. Loring was a three-time Academic All-Colonial Athletic Association selection. He was named to the National Football Foundation's Honor Society following his senior season. As an assistant coach with the nationally-ranked Wildcats, Loring earned a master's degree in business.

Working with UNH's wide receivers, Loring was part of a coaching staff that enjoyed a 35.6 scoring average in 2008. He coached all-league and 1,000-yard receiver Mike Boyle and also assisted with punt protection on special teams.



MICHAEL HORAN

*Assistant Defensive
Line Coach*

Michael Horan enters his first season as an assistant with the Harvard football program in 2009 where he will work on the defensive side of the ball.

Horan has coached at three colleges and one high school since graduating from Bates College in 2004. After one season at Stoughton high School, Horan coached the tight ends at Curry College and recruited the New England area. He moved onto the U.S. Merchant Marine Academy in 2007 where he worked with the inside linebackers and was responsible for video editing.

Last season, he worked at Wagner College with the defensive backs and also coordinated academic performance and strength & conditioning activities.

At Bates, Horan was a senior captain and a two-time All-NESCAC selection as well as an All-ECAC pick in 2004.

JAMES FRAZIER

Director of Strength & Conditioning

James Frazier started his role as the Crimson's Director of Strength & Conditioning in February, 2009.

Frazier oversees all strength & conditioning aspects for the nation's largest Division I athletic department with roughly 1,500 student-athletes.

The Palmer Dixon building host the Strength & Conditioning staff and boasts 24,000 square feet and the capability to accommodate large teams under one roof. The building is named for William Palmer Dixon '25, who was a two-time national squash champion, a former president of the Harvard Varsity Club and a longtime supporter of Harvard's athletics program.

Frazier came to Harvard from the University of Iowa where he served with the Hawkeyes' football program for two seasons while earning a master's degree in administration from Central Michigan University.

No stranger to the Ivy League, Frazier is a 2006 graduate of Brown University where he earned a degree in business economics and human biology. Frazier was a four-year football letterman at Brown, where he served as team captain as a senior while helping his team to a 9-1 record. Frazier played defensive end as a junior, earning all-conference honors. He moved to linebacker as a senior and repeated as a first team all-conference selection.

Prior to his stint at Iowa, Frazier served as a strength and conditioning intern with the NBA's Chicago Bulls. He is a member of the National Strength and Conditioning Association.

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

The Harvard strength and conditioning department is committed to providing the highest level of athletic preparation for all varsity student-athletes. The primary goal is to maximize the potential of each individual student-athlete throughout his college career. Every student-athlete matters.

Each of Harvard's 41 varsity teams receives comprehensive support and effort from the strength and conditioning staff during its designated training times. The strength and conditioning staff works closely with each sport's head coach to implement the most effective year-round training for each team.

Through the guidance of strength coaches, student-athletes develop skills such as discipline, perseverance, goal-setting, teamwork, mental toughness and work ethic. These instill habits that will lead students to better and healthier lives.

The cornerstones of Harvard strength and conditioning are intensity and consistency.

Harvard runs a full-service program, focusing on strength, power, speed, agility, conditioning, flexibility, recovery, nutrition and injury prevention and management. Strength training emphasizes multi-joint, multi-plane movements such as power cleans, squats and upper-body presses. Rotational movements, balance and stability, unilateral exercises and core training are also priorities. All programs are specialized to match team goals at given times of the year. Speed, agility and conditioning are tailored to the needs of each sport. Flexibility, recovery, nutrition and injury prevention are incorporated into all team training programs.

Harvard strength and conditioning is committed to the idea of sound mind, sound body. The program honors the values of the university, and support the principles of the Ivy League and the NCAA.

GARY GEISSLER

Clinical Director of Rehabilitation

Gary Geissler has been the Clinical Director of Rehabilitation for Harvard's sports medicine team since 1991.

Geissler provides clinical consultations and treatments for student athletes with complicated or unresolved orthopedic dysfunction to include implementing and directing appropriate treatment plans. His primary sports assignments include Crimson football, M & W cross country and M&W track & field teams. Geissler also serves as the Continuing Education Coordinator the sports medicine group, outlining and scheduling lectures, workshops, in-services and journal club.

Geissler has a lengthy list of affiliations with world-class athletes, both at Harvard and on the national and international circuits. He has been the head athletic trainer and sports physical therapist for the U.S. national track and field team at the World Championships and was a member of the athletic training and physical therapy staff or the U.S. team at the 1996 Olympic Games in Atlanta. He was a volunteer athletic trainer during the 1994 FIFA World Cup and has worked as an athletic trainer at a number of high-level ice hockey, basketball and wrestling events as well.

Before coming to Harvard, Geissler served as director of physical therapy at SportsMedicine Boston and as head athletic trainer at Hellenic College. He also spent three years as an athletic trainer at Boston University.

Geissler is a 1981 graduate of Boston University where he also obtained a Master's in Physical Therapy in 1986. He has recently been awarded his Doctorate in Physical Therapy from The Massachusetts General Hospital Institute of Health Professions in Boston.

Geissler is an Assistant Professor at the MGH IHP where he teaches Sports Physical Therapy and has served as a Clinical Lecturer and Laboratory Instructor for Boston University's Sargent College of Rehabilitation Sciences.



BRANT BERKSTRESSER

Head Athletic Trainer

Brant Berkstresser began his second year at Harvard in 2009 and works primarily with the football team. Berkstresser came to Harvard after spending five years as Georgia Southern's head athletic trainer and assistant athletic director for sports medicine.

While at GSU, Berkstresser oversaw a staff of 11 certified athletic trainers and 24 student assistants in the care of roughly 400 student-athletes. Berkstresser served as the ATC for the football team in addition to managing the office and serving as a clinical instructor in the CAATE approved undergraduate athletic training program.

Prior to joining Georgia Southern, Berkstresser served at the University of Maryland as assistant athletic trainer from 1997-2003, working as the Terrapins' football athletic trainer and conducting rehabilitation and treatment.

Berkstresser previously spent four years as assistant athletic trainer at Kansas State and was the Wildcat men's basketball program's top athletic trainer while also assisting in the athletic training efforts during football season. He also oversaw efforts in one of the school's three athletic training rooms.

From 1991 to 1993, he earned an appointment in KSU's graduate assistant program while working on requirements for a master's degree. During the summer of 1990, Berkstresser completed an internship with the New York Jets.

A native of State College, Pa., Berkstresser earned a bachelor's degree in education with an emphasis in athletic training from West Virginia University in 1991 and then earned his master's degree in kinesiology from Kansas State in 1993.

Berkstresser is married to the former Gretchen DeForest and resides in Salem, N.H.





SEASON OUTLOOK

SEASON OUTLOOK

Now entering its 136th season of football, Harvard looks to put an exclamation point on a decade that has seen the Crimson dominate. Under the tutelage of Tim Murphy, the Thomas Stephenson Head Coach for Harvard Football, the Crimson has posted a 69-20 record this decade with two perfect seasons and four Ivy League championships including two straight and three in the last five years.

Coming off its second consecutive championship, Harvard returns 15 starters with eight on the offensive side, five on defense and

Championship Subdivision and seventh highest in all of Division I. Over the past five seasons, Harvard is 41-9. Harvard is 36-6 at Harvard Stadium dating back to 2001 while winning 16 of its last 17 games there.

The Crimson has registered at least seven wins in each of the last eight years, making Harvard the first team in the history of Ivy League football to post such a string of successful seasons. Two years ago, Harvard became the first Ivy team to post a string of seven such seasons together. The current stretch is the Crimson's best eight-year

ranked sixth nationally in pass efficiency defense and 11th nationally in scoring defense. In all, Harvard finished the season ranked among the nation's leaders in six different statistical categories including turnover margin (10), total defense (17), passing efficiency (17) and passing offense (18).

Despite the overwhelming success, the Crimson will be looking to fill several key positions with the loss of an unprecedented 12 All-Ivy League performers (six on each side of the ball) to graduation — a number that includes

both of its special teams' specialists.

A year ago, Harvard maintained its own record-setting pace for supremacy within the Ancient Eight. Harvard (9-1, 6-1 Ivy) became just the eighth team in history of the Ivy League to come back from a loss in its league opener to win the championship. The championship marks Harvard's second consecutive Ancient Eight Championship and its first title repeat since 1982-83. The Crimson has now won three league titles in the past five seasons and four in the last eight seasons. Harvard finished the season ranked 14th in the Football Championship Subdivision Coaches Poll.

Since 2000, Harvard has posted the second-highest winning percentage (.775) in the Football

run since a 28-year streak of seven-plus win seasons came to an end in 1911. The program has won 64 games over the past eight seasons for the best stretch since a stretch from 1908-1915 when the program also won 64 games.

Looking back on its success, Harvard has reached double figures in points 61 straight games and 98 of its last 99. The Crimson is 39-1 when leading at halftime since the 2003 season and 265-5-1 all-time when scoring 30 or more points. Harvard is 32-10 in its last 42 road games, dating back to the 2000 season, and 24-7 in Ivy League road games during that span.

The Crimson defense, which has been ranked near the top of Division I in each of the past five seasons, was no different in 2008. Harvard

two All-Americans and four All-New England honorees. All told, Harvard returns 28 Major H award recipients with 13 on each side of the ball and two special teamers but 26 letterwinners left to graduation.

"One thing I really stress is success in the past is no indication of success in the future," says Murphy. "We know there are expectations. We embrace them."

Offense

Harvard has five returning All-Ivy selections back on the offensive side of the ball including two-time All-America lineman James Williams.

The story on offense will certainly center on Harvard's signal caller. Last season, Harvard enjoyed the rare situation of having two

all-conference quarterbacks on its roster. The graduation of Chris Pizzotti and Liam O'Hagan is glaring as each signed a professional contract in the offseason. Pizzotti was the 2008 Ivy League player of the year who as a starter had a 20-2 career record.

Still, Harvard has experience in the wings with junior Collier Winters, who played in six games as a true freshman before missing last season due to injury. Blessed with impressive scrambling ability, Winters is a good fit for Harvard's spread attack. His surrounding talent is impressive — especially at wide receiver where the Crimson boasts five players who have started games.

Harvard's wide receiving corps is the arguably

the nation's deepest with Matt Luft, Marco Iannuzzi, Chris Lorditch, Levi Richards, Adam Chrissis and Mike Cook all looking to make impacts. Luft is the most decorated of the bunch with a pair of all-Ivy mentioned but each member of the group has started a game in his career while combining for 229 receptions for 3,405 yards (14.9 ypr) and 23 touchdowns despite missing a combined 22 games due to injury including Cook who missed all of 2008.

Harvard also welcomes back a trio of talented backfield runners with all-leaguers Cheng Ho and Gino Gordon being joined by Ben Jenkins, who started six games a year ago thanks to a breakthrough spring game of 2008.

Williams continues to earn notoriety as an elite offensive tackle with his selection as a pre-season All-America. He will be joined on the front line by strong man Alex Spisak who earned all-league accolades in his first year as the team's center in 2008. John Paris and Ben Sessions have both started games during their careers.

Defense

On defense, tackle and former all-leaguer Carl Ehrlich is the 136th captain, and he provides the cornerstone of what has consistently been one of the toughest defenses in the FCS. He will be aided on the front line by the return of Chucks Obi — an intimidating all-league defender who

missed the 2008 season. Ryan Burkhead also returns after he collected three sacks a year ago.

The Crimson graduated six all-leagues last season but returns an impressive defensive backfield in all-league selection Collin Zych, Ryan Barnes, two-year starter Derrick Barker and Ivy Rookie of the Year Matthew Hanson. A shut down corner, Hanson led the team with four interceptions and tied for second in passes defended with 10. Harvard has boasted three All-Americans and eight All-Ivy Leaguers in its defensive backfield since 2006.

Joining those four in the secondary will be a trio of athletic and versatile covermen. JB

Monu played in seven games a year ago; John Fahrenstiel has been a key contributor on special teams since his freshman year; while Anthony Spadafino played in all 10 games last year and recorded 19 tackles with a fumble recovery.

Barker earned notice as a pre-season All-American this year after leading Harvard with 11 passes defended. Barnes had a tremendous season that saw him record 50 tackles and 10 pass breakups despite missing two games with injuries. All three of his interceptions came against Penn — two of them in the end zone — in a 2008 victory. Zych meanwhile, had a breakthrough season as a hard-hitting safety as

he ranked second on the team with 72 tackles including 48 solo stops.

Conor Murphy quietly returns as one of the team's top defenders and he will anchor the linebacking corps. Murphy started every game a year ago and collected 33 stops with three for a loss. He will be joined in the rotation by fellow seniors Sean Hayes, Nick Hasselberg and Jon Takamura while junior letterwinners Anthony Rotio and Ben Graeff also figure on playing time.

Special Teams

Harvard again figures to be in good shape with its kicking game in 2009, thanks to the return of two talented players.

Senior Patrick Long was named All-Ivy League in 2008 after tying a single season school record with 13 made field goals. He also led the league in kickoff average and touchbacks to help set the stage for the defense.

He was named the Ivy League Special Teams Player of the Week after kicking a pair of field goals and averaging over 65 yards per kickoff in a 25-24 win over Holy Cross in the opener. Long recorded career-long field goals on successive kicks at Lafayette, kicking a 41-yarder in the first half and a 45-yarder in the fourth quarter to make the longest field goal at Harvard since 1993. He also earned honor roll accolades after

converting field goals of 34 and 30 yards in a win at Dartmouth. His record-tying 13th field goal of the year came against Yale in a 10-0 victory.

Fourth-year man Thomas Hull is the incumbent punter. He averaged 35.2 yards per punt for the season. Hull had a 53-yarder in a win at Dartmouth and a 57-yarder at Penn as part of two 50+ kicks in the win. In tough conditions, Hull placed two kicks inside the 20 against Yale.

Harvard will search for a replacement as holder for the twice-graduated Andrew Berry. On kickoffs, Marco Iannuzzi and Adam Chrissis figure to see the bulk of the action as return men.

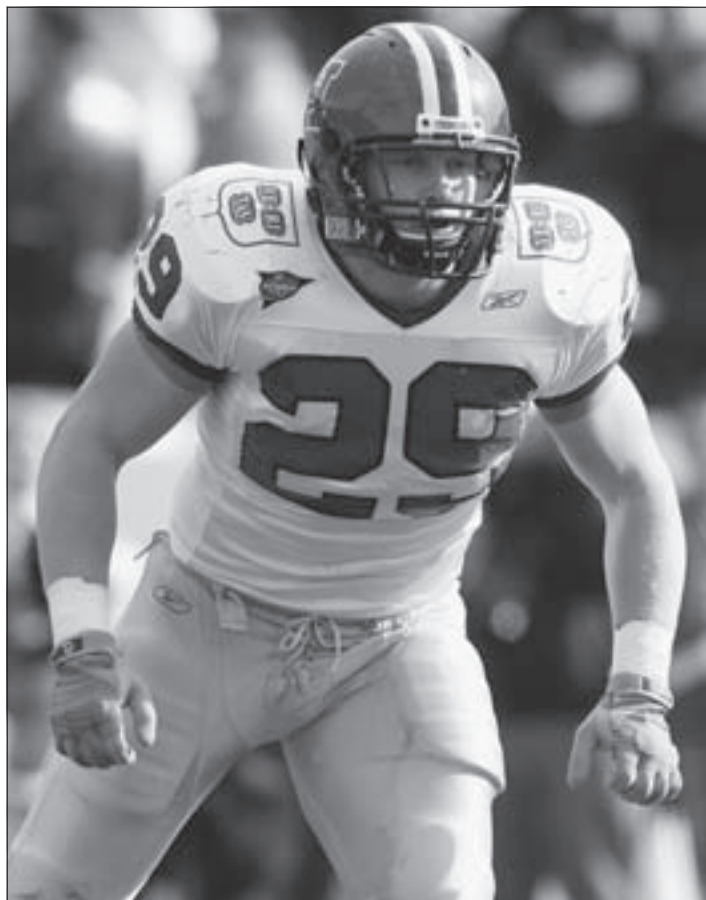
The Schedule

Fans will note that Harvard's 2009 schedule consists of the same opponents that the Crimson faced in each of the last four years.

Seven of the 10 games will be against Ivy League opponents as the Ancient Eight continues to see the gap between the league champion and the last-place schools tighten. The three nonleague games, meanwhile, are against the consensus choices as the top three teams in the Patriot League, including the season-opener at a Holy Cross squad that has been tabbed as that conference's favorite by some prognosticators.

After fighting through swirling winds, single-digit temperatures and first-half miscues, Harvard emerged with a commanding 10-0 victory over the Yale Bulldogs for the program's 13th Ivy League Championship in the 125th edition of 'The Game' ... The title, shared with Brown, is the Crimson's second consecutive Ancient Eight Championship, and its first title repeat since 1982-83. With the victory, Harvard (9-1, 6-1 Ivy) became just the eighth team in history to come back from a loss in its league opener and still win the championship ... The Crimson defense held McLeod to 65 yards on 21 rushing attempts and the Bulldog offense to just 90 total yards - the fewest Harvard has allowed since last year's game, when Yale was held to 123 yards ... The Harvard offense, though it did not find the end zone more than once, moved the ball and controlled the clock throughout. The Crimson possessed the ball for 39:15 while netting 370 yards of offense, 261 of those coming on the ground ... Sophomore running back Gino Gordon led the ground attack with 39 touches for 168 yards and the lone touchdown. The 168 rushing yards by Gordon mark the top day for a Harvard back against Yale since 2003 when Clifton Dawson ran for 174 on 32 carries, and the most rushing attempts since 1998, when Eion Hu also racked up 177 yards on the ground via 40 carries en route to a 26-21 Harvard victory. Chris Pizzotti, in his final game in a Crimson uniform, had an effective day in 30 mile-per-hour winds, finishing 12 of 21 passing for 109 yards. He also ran 16 times for 74 yards.

THE IVY LEAGUE

Sponsoring conference championships in 33 men's and women's sports, and averaging more than 35 varsity teams at each school, the Ivy League provides intercollegiate athletic opportunities for more men and women than any other conference in the country. All eight Ivy schools are among the top 20 NCAA Division I schools in number of sports offered for both men and women.

The most diverse intercollegiate competition in the country for both men and women is also among the best. In recent years, the Ivy League has been synonymous with national excellence in men's and women's soccer, lacrosse, rowing, fencing and squash, and individual Ivy athletes have regularly excelled as well in football, track and field, wrestling and swimming. Ivy teams have enjoyed significant success in the opening rounds of the NCAA Division I basketball championships.

This successful competition in Division I national athletics is achieved by approaching athletics as a key part of the student's regular undergraduate experience: with rigorous academic standards, the nation's highest four-year graduation rates (the same as those for non-athletes) and without athletics scholarships. Ivy athletic programs receive multi-million-dollar institutional support as part of each institution's overall academic programs, independent of win-loss or competitive records and together with extensive programs of intramural and recreational athletics.

Since 2000, the Ivy League has produced 11 NCAA team championships and 47 NCAA individual/event champions while 204 competitors at the five Olympic Games (2000, 2002, 2004, 2006 and 2008). Those 204 athletes collected 81 medals, including 28 gold. At the 2008 Summer Olympics in Beijing, China, the League boasted 42 athletes who took home 14 medals (five gold, seven silver and two bronze). The League also has sent hundreds of athletes into the professional ranks in that time, including dozens of NFL players.

COACHING RECORDS



Percy Haughton 1899 (1908-16)

Harvard enjoyed its most prosperous era of the early 20th century when Percy Haughton, a member of the Crimson's 1898 championship team, took over as the team's head coach. Prior to Haughton's hiring, it was customary for colleges to change head coaches every year or two, regardless of the team's record. In nine years along the Crimson sideline, Haughton's teams went 71-7-5, won three national championships and finished unbeaten five times. Known for his brilliant schemes that utilized

deception and power, Haughton coached the Crimson until he joined the service during the first World War.



John Yovicsin (1957-70)

Arriving at Harvard in 1957 with a somewhat limited coaching background — some years as a high school coach in Pennsylvania before five years as the mentor at Gettysburg College — John Yovicsin guided Harvard through the early years of formal Ivy League competition and delivered three Ivy championships to Cambridge. He went on to win 78 games in 14 years, and his .644 winning percentage stood as the best by a Harvard coach with more than five years on the sideline since 1926.

Joe Restic (1971-93)

The man who came to define Harvard Football through three decades, Joe Restic coached more games and won more games than any head coach in Crimson history. Restic and his trademark multiflex offense helped Harvard win five Ivy League championships, including a pair of outright titles and back-to-back crowns on two occasions. In 23 years along the Harvard sideline, Restic finished with 117 wins — 39 more than anyone else in Harvard's history — and 92 victories against Ivy

League opponents, good for third in conference history.



Tim Murphy (1994-Present)

Harvard has seen its football record book rewritten under current head coach Tim Murphy. With five Ivy League championships and two undefeated seasons to his credit, Murphy and his signature no-huddle, multiple-formations offense have made the Crimson at least a contender for the championship every year. Murphy's 1997 team made history as the first Harvard squad to go unbeaten and untied in Ivy League play, while his 2001 and 2004 teams stand among best in school history. The

2001 team went 9-0 overall and 7-0 in the league to finish with a perfect record for the first time in 88 years, while the 2004 squad went 10-0 for the Crimson's best record since 1906.

In a 2007 season marked its fourth undefeated league season since 1997, Harvard became the first program in the storied history of the Ivy League to record at least seven victories in seven consecutive seasons with a total of 54 wins from 2000-07.

The Crimson continued the pace in 2008 with its 13th league championship. The Crimson became just the eighth team in Ivy history to win the title after losing the league opener. An undefeated non-conference schedule propelled the Crimson to a 9-1 mark with four players being selected All-America.

THE HARVARD-YALE RIVALRY

It was the first rivalry in all of college athletics. Today, 156 years later, Harvard-Yale still stands as one of the best series in the world of sports.

These schools are familiar with being first and foremost. Yale fields 35 varsity sports and Harvard has 41, the most of any Division I school in the nation.

Harvard teams have won 138 national titles in sports ranging from crew to football and lacrosse to fencing. Yale has 104 national titles to its credit, including several in football, swimming and diving, squash and golf.

The schools have combined to capture more than 460 Ivy League championships since the circuit was formed in 1956 and combined to win seven League titles last season. Yale won three Ivy championships (women's volleyball, women's heavyweight crew, men's ice hockey), while Harvard claimed seven (football, women's swimming and diving, women's basketball, women's ice hockey, women's tennis, women's soccer, women's golf) in 2008-09.

Former Harvard football coach Joe Restic, who guided the Crimson for 23 seasons until his retirement in 1993, quipped, "Each year, we're friends for 364 days and rivals for just one."

While he was primarily assessing his relationship with his legendary Yale counterpart

Carm Cozza, those words apply across the board.

Harvard-Yale is as much a debate as it is a feud. Think Lincoln-Douglas, not Hatfield-McCoy, though it should be noted the two schools jousted some eight years before the 1860 presidential candidates squared off on opposite podiums.

Yet a rivalry doesn't grow in stature by accident. Both schools have played major roles in advancing and shaping college athletics.

In 1843, Yale started the first college boat club in America; in 1884, Eli runner Charles Sherrill first demonstrated the four-point crouch for sprinters; in 1890, Yale introduced "cheerleaders" at a football game, a first in college sports; in 1896, the first intercollegiate ice hockey game featured Yale and Johns Hopkins (a 2-2 tie); and in 1897, Yale men's basketball played in the country's first 5-on-5 game.

Harvard, founded in 1636, has the distinction of being the nation's first college. Among its athletics firsts are: in 1877, the first baseball catcher's mask was used in a Harvard game, a fencing mask adapted by inventor Fred Thayer for Alexander Tyng; in 1896, Harvard freshman James B. Connolly became the first gold medalist of the modern Olympics (winning the hop, hop and jump); in 1901, women's field hockey



was first introduced to America on the Harvard (Radcliffe) campus; in 1903, Harvard Stadium, the nation's oldest football stadium, was built; in 1905, Harvard played in the first intercollegiate soccer match (falling to Haverford, 1-0); and in 1947, Chester Pierce '48 became the first African-American footballer to play against a white college in the South when the Crimson met the University of Virginia in Charlottesville.

The football rivalry, however, is arguably the most revered. Harvard and Yale have met 125 times on the gridiron since November 13, 1875 in New Haven (a 4-0 Harvard win). The series is the third-most-played in college football history and is now referenced around the country simply as "The Game." And, while combining for 18 national championships and 27 Ivy crowns, the annual contest still attracts sellout crowds to Cambridge and over 50,000 fans to the Bowl in New Haven.

Yet it was football that nearly splintered relations between these two schools. In 1894, following a game known as the "Springfield Massacre" when seven players were carried off the field in "dying condition," Harvard and Yale broke off relations. Each blamed the other for the contest's unprecedented brutality.

Historian George Sullivan wrote, "So savage was combat on a neutral Springfield gridiron ... that newspapers printed a casualty summary similar to those listing victims of a disaster. The game's violence appalled the world and ignited a national uproar about football ferocity-outrage that threatened the sport's future."

And the rivalry's as well. The schools didn't meet in football for two seasons, while the baseball, crew and track and field teams avoided each other for one. But the allure of competition was too great, and by 1897, the schools were back at it. Harvard's student newspaper, *The Crimson*, welcomed the resumption: "forgetting the past and resolving a generous open-handed rivalry for the future, Harvard joins hands with Yale and welcomes her heartily and joyfully to her old place as Harvard's nearest and dearest foe."

By 1898, the football game had relocated to its now-familiar and permanent perch as the final one on each school's docket.

Football has also generated the most lore. The notorious flying wedge, the brainchild of

Harvard assistant Lorin Deland, was introduced in the 1892 H-Y game. Harvard coach Percy Haughton is purported to have choked a bulldog to fire up his troops for the 1908 game (although just a story, whatever he did worked as the Crimson won 4-0). In 1923, Yale's T.A.D. Jones told his players, "Gentlemen, you are now going out to play football against Harvard. Never again in your whole life will you do anything so important."

The 1930s had the majestic Barry Wood (Harvard)-Albie Booth (Yale) battles. It was also the era when a Harvard illustrator drew a game program cover of a pilgrim unceremoniously sitting on Yale's famous captain's fence. Some Eli alums were so outraged that a suspension of the series was briefly discussed, before cooler heads prevailed (Harvard's 1995 football captain, Justin Frantz, became the first Harvard athlete invited to sit on the fence, and his picture with Yale captain Tony Mazurkiewicz graced that year's program).

The 1952 Game is remembered for the "ultimate insult" when Yale's football team manager, Charlie Yeager, was put in the game to catch a two-point conversion that culminated a 41-14 Eli blowout at the Stadium. More than

half a century later, that one still hurts.

Harvard's 1968 "win" over Yale is still rated as one of the top college football games ever played. Both schools entered *The Game* owning identical 8-0 records, but Yale appeared well on its way to victory and a perfect season as thousands silently streamed out of *The Stadium* as the clock counted down. That's before Harvard miraculously scored 16 points in the final 42 seconds to "defeat" the Elis, 29-29. An extra edition of *The Crimson*, issued just five minutes after the final gun, carried the now famous headline, "HARVARD BEATS YALE, 29-29." Some joke that Harvard's greatest "win" was actually a tie, but none of those people were wearing Crimson that afternoon.

Another memorable day came in 1982, when a group of MIT frat boys exploded a balloon out of the Stadium turf — at midfield, no less — during Harvard's 45-7 triumph.

More recently, Yale rallied to win successive thrillers in 1998, 1999 and 2000. Harvard has had the edge through the early 21st century, however, as the Crimson won an unprecedented five straight against the Bulldogs from 2001-05. The 2005 Game immediately joined the ranks of the greatest in the history of the series as the Crimson rallied to force overtime before prevailing, 30-24, in the third extra session of the longest game in Ivy League history.

Another memorable moment was written in 2007 when the teams met at Yale Bowl in front of 57,248 fans with the Bulldogs ranked 11th and Harvard 25th. The teams were undefeated in Ivy play, marking just the fourth time in league history that two unbeaten teams had met in the final game of the year.

For Yale, a victory would also mean its first 10-0 season in 47 years and its first outright league championship in 26. Instead, the previously 9-0 Bulldogs were whipped, 37-6, marking Harvard's most lopsided victory at the Yale Bowl since a 35-6 win in 1959. Had it not been for a late punt return for a touchdown by the Eli's, Harvard would have had its most uneven victory since a 36-0 victory in 1914.

Last season, Harvard limited Yale to just 90 yards of offense on a bone-chilling day at the Stadium as Harvard, which finished ranked 14th nationally, cruised to a 10-0 win. The victory gave Harvard its second-straight Ivy championship.

All About The Game

126 And Counting

With its 126th playing this year, the Harvard-Yale rivalry is the third-most played series in college football. Only Lehigh-Lafayette (144 meetings) and Princeton-Yale (131) have played more often.

Instant Classic

Harvard's 30-24 triple-overtime win in 2005 stands as the longest football game in Ivy League history.

Familiar Faces

Harvard assistant coaches Joel Lamb and Tony Reno are former Yale assistants.

The Last In Line

In every formal season since 1898, Harvard's final opponent has been Yale. There is only one exception, as the 1919 campaign was completed with a 7-6 Rose Bowl victory over Oregon. Harvard got there with a 10-3 decision over the Elis.

Double Duty

Wayne Johnson, Jr. (Harvard A.B. '44, L.L.B. '48) is the only player to have lettered for both Harvard and Yale in football. In 1942, Johnson played fullback for the Crimson and, against Yale, dropped a critical pass in a 7-3 defeat to the Elis. Soon after, he joined the Marines, where the Corps assigned him to Yale in a program that permitted undergrads to continue their studies while preparing for a commission. He played just one game for the Elis before an injury ended his season but was still awarded a letter.

Home Field Advantage?

Harvard is 23-22-1 at the Yale Bowl; Yale is 25-23-3 at Harvard Stadium. The visiting team has won 14 of the last 22 Games.

On The Charts

The Harvard-Yale rivalry was tabbed as the sixth-best rivalry in college athletics, according to *Sports Illustrated On Campus*. Alabama-Auburn was first on the list, followed by Duke-North Carolina, UCLA-USC, Army-Navy and Cal-Stanford.



In 2007, then-11th-ranked Yale entered *The Game* leading the nation in rushing but mustered just 106 yards of total offense in a 37-6 drubbing.

Frederick Greeley Crocker Award

HARVARD PLAYERS IN PROFESSIONAL FOOTBALL

Harvard football has seen a tremendous resurgence in the number of graduates who have gone on to the professional ranks. Over the past 11 years, 19 Crimson players have been drafted or signed professional contracts. Six Harvard players are on active National Football League rosters heading into the 2009 season, while two more alums are on Canadian Football League rosters.

Recent history has seen Harvard alumni thrive in professional football. Former Crimson great Isaiah Kacyvenski '00 became the third Harvard alum to play in a Super Bowl when his Seattle Seahawks won the 2005 NFC championship and faced the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Meanwhile, Ryan Fitzpatrick '05 was the talk of the league following his amazing performance off the bench for the St. Louis Rams.

Fitzpatrick entered the 2005 season as the Rams' third-string quarterback, but was called into action after injuries sent St. Louis' top two signal-callers to the sidelines. He played in his first NFL game Nov. 27, 2005, coming off the bench to lead the Rams from a 24-3 halftime deficit to a 33-27 overtime win, throwing for 310 yards and three touchdowns, including a 56-yard TD pass for the game-winner.

Fitzpatrick became one of just five NFL players to pass for 300 yards in his debut, joining Otto Graham, Ed Rubbert (a replacement player during the 1987 NFL players strike), Mark Rypien and Peyton Manning.

On the same day that Fitzpatrick's heroics captured the U.S. storylines, Tim Fleiszer '98 was making waves north of the border. Fleiszer's Edmonton Eskimos took a 38-35 overtime win against the Montreal Alouettes in the Grey Cup in what was called the greatest championship game in CFL history.

In 2008, Fitzpatrick started 12 games for the Cincinnati Bengals, completing nearly 60 percent of his passes and averaging over five yards per carry. He was rewarded with a free agent contract from the Buffalo Bills.

Most prominent among Harvard's current NFL contingent is Matt Birk '98, the starting center for the Minnesota Vikings who was named to the NFL's All-Pro Team in 2000, '01, '04, '05 and '07. In 2009 he was a finalist for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award and recently signed a free agent contract with the Baltimore Ravens.

Birk enters the 2009 season with the Ravens as a veteran of 146 NFL games over 11 seasons, including 123 starts, and six Pro Bowl appearances. He is generally considered among the top centers in professional football.

The 2003 NFL season saw two Harvard players join the professional ranks as Jamil Soriano '03 earned a spot on the practice squad of the Super Bowl champion New England Patriots, while Carl Morris '03 was signed to the Miami Dolphins practice squad. Jack Fadule '03,

meanwhile, was signed by the Patriots in February 2004.

In April 2000, Kacyvenski was taken in the fourth round (119th overall) by the Seattle Seahawks. He went on to play six seasons in Seattle, where he was named a team captain and stood at midfield for the coin toss during Super Bowl XL. He has since enjoyed stints with the St. Louis Rams and Oakland Raiders.

Classmate and 1999 Harvard captain Chris Eitzmann '00 played four preseason games with the New England Patriots in 2000 and later signed contracts with the Cleveland Browns, Green Bay Packers and Patriots.

Two years earlier, Fleiszer became the first overall pick in the Canadian Football League draft when he was selected by the Hamilton Tiger-Cats. He played for Hamilton's 1999 Grey Cup championship team before going on to play for his hometown Montreal Alouettes, winning a second Grey Cup in 2002. He then played two seasons with the Ottawa Renegades before joining the Edmonton Eskimos for the 2005 season, when he won his third Grey Cup.

That same year, Birk was a sixth-round pick by the Vikings, while Jeff Compas '98 signed with New England and was invited to preseason camp. Mike Sands '00 is another recent player to have signed a pro contract. He was with the Pittsburgh Steelers and played in NFL Europe in 2000.

Perhaps the best known of the Crimson's pros is Pat McNally '75, an All-America split end who went on to star for the Cincinnati Bengals at both receiver and punter. He played in Super Bowl XVI against the San Francisco 49ers and was an All-Pro choice a year later.

While McNally wasn't fortunate enough to play on the winning side in a Super Bowl, another Harvard graduate did earn an NFL championship ring. John Dockery '66 played on one of the most famous Super Bowl

teams, the Joe Namath-led New York Jets, who won the 1969 classic over Baltimore.

Dan Jiggetts '76, who captained the Crimson's first outright Ivy championship team in 1975, played eight seasons with the Chicago Bears before retiring in 1983. He went on to announce NFL games for CBS and worked with former Harvard basketball great James Brown '73 in 1987 to form the first all-African-American broadcasting team at a major sporting event. He was also calling the Harvard-Yale game in 2007 when the Crimson pulled off a 37-6 victory in the Yale Bowl, winning the league title and dashing Yale's chance at a perfect season.

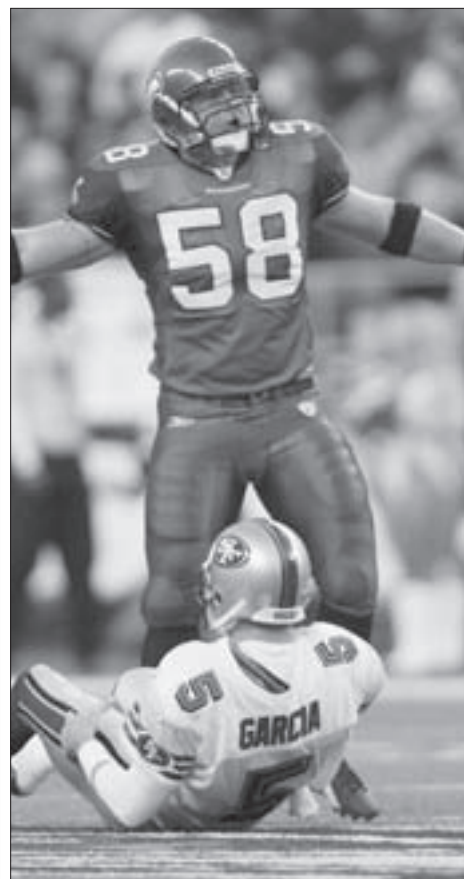

1890

Harvard won its first national championship in overwhelming fashion as the Crimson went 11-0 and outscored its opponents by a combined margin of 555-12. The Crimson's success can, in part, be attributed to the appointment of George Stewart 1884 and George Adams 1886 as Harvard's first full-time football coaches. The only close game among the 11 wins was a 12-6 win against Yale, which ended a 15-year winless streak against the Bulldogs. Five players were named to the Walter Camp All-America first team, including tackle Marshall Newell 1894, who earned the first of four straight first team All-America selections.

Coached by W. Cameron Forbes 1892, who would later go on to serve as governor general of the Philippines and United States ambassador to Japan, Harvard finished 11-0 for the second time in the program's history. A determined Crimson eleven, motivated by a tie with Yale and a loss to Penn to close the 1897 season, registered shutouts of those two squads, including a 17-0 win against Yale in the finale. The 1898 season also saw the annual Harvard-Yale game take its place as the final game of the year for both schools. Halfback Ben Dibblee 1899, quarterback Charley Daly 1901 and end Jack Hallowell 1901 were named to the Walter Camp All-America team.

Harvard won its second straight national title despite a coaching change that saw Cam Forbes step down after he was thrown from a horse and badly injured. Ben Dibblee 1899, who had captained the Crimson's 1898 championship team, stepped in as head coach, with Forbes acting as a consultant. Things did not look promising early as the Crimson returned just five players from the previous season. Still, Harvard finished the season with a 10-0-1 record, which included an incredible 10 shutouts, and was led by All-America quarterback Charley Daly (who, incidentally, would later play against Harvard as a member of Army's 1901 squad). The Crimson's bid for a third 11-0 season was denied in the season finale when Harvard and Yale played to a scoreless tie.

1910

Harvard football entered a new era in 1908 with the hiring of head coach Percy Haughton 1899. Under Haughton, the Crimson enjoyed what is considered the Golden Age of Harvard football, with three national titles in Haughton's nine-year coaching career. A noted perfectionist, Haughton's 1910 squad nearly achieved complete perfection -- only a scoreless tie against Yale kept Harvard from an unbeaten, untied season, and a touchdown by Cornell marked the only points that Harvard allowed all year. Harvard placed three players on the All-America team in tackle Bob McKay '11, guard Bob Fisher '12 and halfback Percy Wendell '13.

1912

Harvard won the first of back-to-back championships in 1912 as part of a 33-game unbeaten streak, which stands as a school record to this day. Harvard survived close calls against Maine (7-0), Vanderbilt (9-3) and Dartmouth (3-0) before rolling to a 20-0 win against Yale in New Haven to complete a 9-0 season. Prior to the Yale game, the Harvard Crimson editorialized that, "Never has there been a more critical moment in Harvard's athletic career than will be marked by the game of tomorrow afternoon. A victory tomorrow will prove to all that the rejuvenation of football at Harvard is a permanent matter and not a mere flash in the pan." All-America selections included end Sam Felton '13, halfback Charlie Brickley '15 and guard Stan Pennock '15.

Harvard steamrolled through the 1913 schedule, allowing only two touchdowns on the season, to finish 9-0 for the second straight year and capture its sixth national championship. The highlight of the season was a 3-0 win against Princeton (which was led by legendary two-sport standout Hobe Baker), marking the Crimson's first win against the Tigers in the Garden State. Charlie Brickley '15 was once again named to the All-America team along with guard Stan Pennock and halfback Eddie Mahan '16.

1919

Harvard competed informally in football in 1917 and 1918 as the first World War consumed the nation for those two years. When varsity play resumed in 1919, Percy Haughton had decided not to return as head coach, and Bob Fisher '12 took over. Harvard ran roughshod through its first six opponents, winning all six games by an aggregate score of 179-0, before settling for a 10-10 tie against Princeton. The Crimson regrouped to defeat Tufts and Yale, resulting in an invitation to play in the Rose Bowl on New Year's Day. Harvard entered that game as a slight favorite, a prognostication that proved correct as the Crimson defeated Oregon, 7-6.

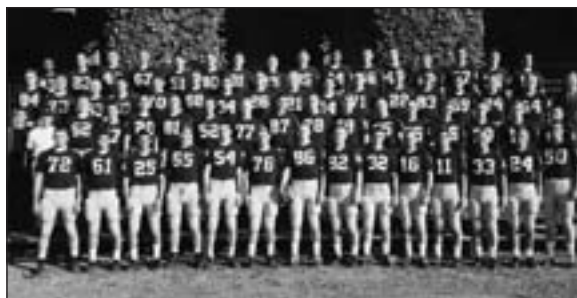

Harvard won its first Ivy League championship in 1961 in somewhat surprising fashion under head coach John Yovicsin. After the favored 1960 squad settled for a third-place finish in the Ancient Eight, preseason forecasts for the following year had Harvard in seventh place. As the season began with three losses in the first four games, there seemed to be little reason for optimism. But the Crimson finished the year with five straight wins, including a 27-0 decision against Yale which left Harvard tied with Columbia at 6-1 in the Ivy League.

Bobby Leo '67, called "the greatest back I ever coached" by John Yovicsin, led a strong Harvard ground game to the Crimson's second Ivy League title and an 8-1 season. Only a loss to Princeton kept Harvard from an unbeaten season — the Tigers marched 93 yards for the go-ahead score in the fourth quarter. As it was, Harvard shared the Ivy title with Dartmouth and Princeton, as Leo went on to win the George Bulger Lowe Award as the top player in New England before enjoying a two-year professional career with the Boston Patriots.

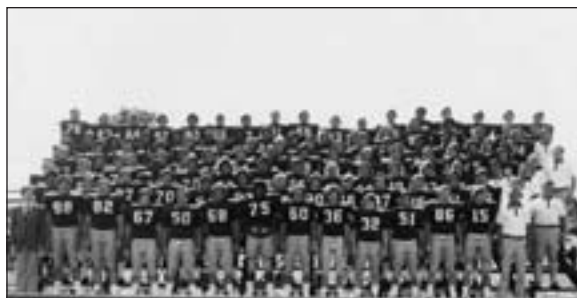
Perhaps the best known of Harvard's Ivy League championship teams is the 1968 squad, which gained a share of the league title by scoring 16 points in the last 42 seconds of the season finale against Yale to forge a 29-29 tie and give both squads 6-0-1 Ivy records. Both Harvard and Yale had reeled off eight wins to set the stage for what stands as arguably the greatest finish in the history of Harvard Stadium. Yale appeared to have the outright Ivy title in hand with a 29-13 lead in the final minute, but the Crimson scored two touchdowns and a pair of two-point conversions to ignite a festive celebration at the Stadium. The headline of the Harvard Crimson said it best: "Harvard Beats Yale, 29-29."



1974 (7-2, 6-1 Ivy)

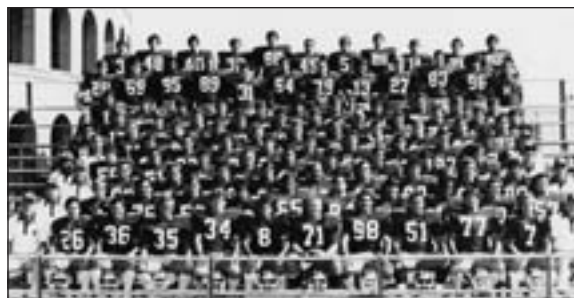
While the finish to the 1968 Harvard-Yale game stands as the most exciting, the 1974 matchup between the two rivals was nothing short of extraordinary. Quarterback Milt "Pineapple" Holt '75 engineered a 90-yard scoring drive in the final five minutes to lift Harvard, coached by Joe Restic, to a 21-16 win and allow the Crimson to share the Ivy League title with the Bulldogs. Yale had entered the game 8-0 overall and 6-0 in the Ivies, while Harvard was 5-1 in the Ancient Eight and needed a win to earn a tie for the championship. Harvard finished the season 7-2 overall, and Pat McNally '75 was a first team All-America selection.



1975 (7-2, 6-1 Ivy)

Harvard made history with its first outright Ivy League title in 1975, but it wasn't easy. To the surprise of no one, the Ivy title chase came down to the final game of the season against Yale. A Harvard win would leave the Crimson as the sole champion of the Ancient Eight, while a Bulldog victory would create a tie between the schools for the second straight year. As Harvard and Yale celebrated the 100th anniversary of their first meeting, Mike Lynch '76-'77 kicked a 26-yard field goal with 38 seconds left to lift the Crimson to a 10-7 victory in New Haven.

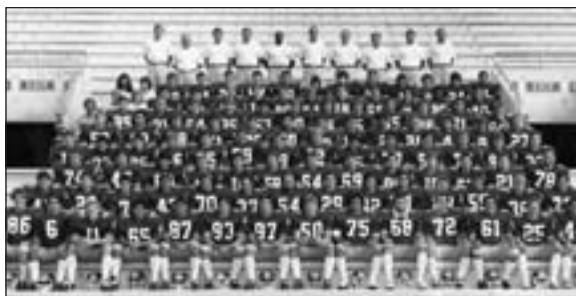

Harvard had been shut out by Yale in each of the two previous seasons, but in 1982, with a chance to grab a share of the Ivy League championship, the Crimson left little doubt that it belonged on top. The Crimson took a 45-7 win against the Bulldogs at the Stadium to forge a tie with Penn and Dartmouth for the Ancient Eight championship, Joe Restic's third as Harvard's head coach. Michael Corbat '83 was a first team All-America selection.

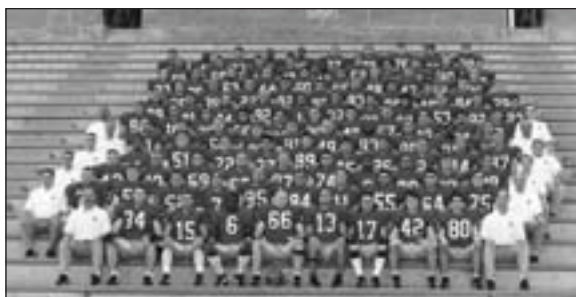
Harvard won back-to-back Ivy League championships for the second time in its history when the 1983 squad went unbeaten in its last five games to share the title with Penn. Led by a defense that allowed just 14 points per game, a motivated Harvard squad registered a 28-0 win against the Quakers to set the Crimson up for an Ivy title split the following week against Yale. The win against Penn came just one year after a controversial Quaker victory that accounted for the three-way tie for the 1982 championship.

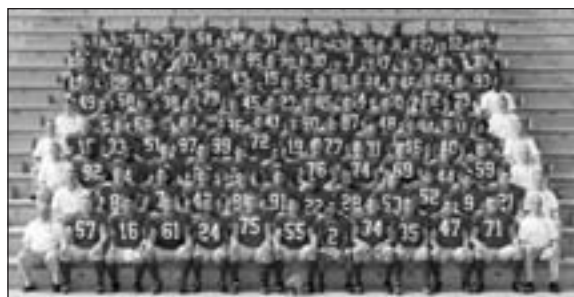

Defensive end Don Peterson '89 was named a first team All-America selection.

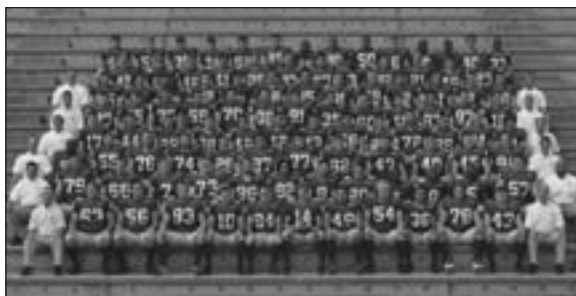
Harvard ran the table in the Ivy League for the first time by going 9-1 overall and 7-0 in the league to capture its third outright Ivy championship. Paced by an offense that averaged better than 30 points per game and a defense that allowed just four touchdowns to league opponents, Harvard gave head coach Tim Murphy his first title with the Crimson. Running back Chris Menick '00 set the team's single-season rushing record with 1,267 yards.



2001 (9-0, 7-0 Ivy)

Staking its claim among the best teams in Harvard Football history, the 2001 squad became the first Crimson eleven to finish with a perfect season in 88 years. Having knocked off Penn in a battle of unbeaten teams in the second-to-last week of the season, Harvard took a 35-23 win against Yale in front of 52,000 for its 10th Ivy championship and second under current head coach Tim Murphy. The Crimson was led by wide receiver Carl Morris '03, who won the first of two consecutive Asa S. Bushnell Cups as the Ivy League player of the year.

Harvard registered its second perfect season in four years and finished with its best record in 103 years as the Crimson went 10-0 and captured its fifth outright Ivy title. Just two games were decided by fewer than 10 points, and the Crimson completed the perfect year with a 35-3 decision against Yale at a sold-out Harvard Stadium. Ryan Fitzpatrick '05 was unanimously chosen as the winner of the Asa S. Bushnell Cup as the Ivy League's player of the year. The Crimson offense scored at least 30 points in all but one game, while the defense dealt two shutouts and held the last six opponents to 14 points or less.

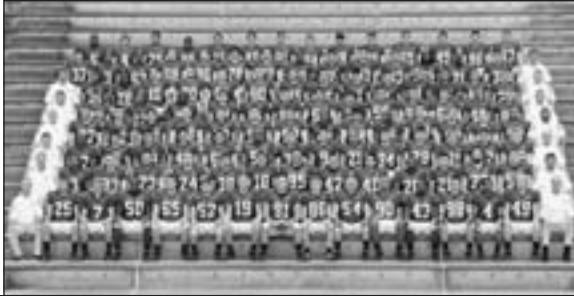


2007 (8-2, 7-0 Ivy)

Harvard started the year at 1-2 following two last-second road losses but the team rebounded in tremendous character, streaking through the Ivy League season behind backup quarterback Chris Pizzotti '08-09 who would go on to be named first team All-Ivy as one of an astounding 20 team representatives for the Crimson. In the 124th playing of The Game, undefeated league teams met for just the fourth time in Ivy history with an 11th-ranked and 9-0 Yale team vying for its first unblemished season since 1960. The Crimson dashed those hopes early in a 37-6 victory in front of 57,248 fans at Yale Bowl as the Harvard defense, keyed by its four all-Ivy defensive backs, held Yale to 109 yards.

A solid offense and a defensive unit that made timely stands allowed Harvard to become just the eighth team in Ivy League history to win the championship after losing in its league opener. The 14th-ranked Crimson finished the season at 9-1 overall, capped by a 10-0 blanking of Yale. All-American Chris Pizzotti '07-08 earned the Asa Bushnell Cup Player of the Year honors and was a finalist for the Walter Payton Award. He finished his career with a 20-2 record as a starter, while leading the Crimson to its first back-to-back titles since 1982-83. Andrew Berry '09, Matt Curtis '09 and James Williams '10 also garnered All-America honors and were three of Harvard's league-high 18 all-Ivy selections.
