COACHING STAFF



MARK HOWELL, Head Coach

Mark Howell was appointed the eighth head coach in Dinos Hockey history on June 3, 2009.

Howell joined the Dinos with extensive experience as both a coach and general manager at the junior and midget levels, most recently with the Westside Warriors of the British Columbia Hockey League (BCHL).

Howell played three seasons in the Western Hockey League with the Seattle Thunderbirds and Medicine Hat Tigers before moving to Red Deer College, where he played for Mike Babcock. He spent one season with the University of Alberta Golden Bears, winning the 1992 University Cup title, before injuries forced him to retire.

The Red Deer native began his coaching career at the midget level while working as an officer with the Calgary Police Service, working with the Calgary Buffaloes. He spent two seasons as an assistant with the SAIT Trojans before eventually taking over as head coach of the Calgary Midget 'AAA' Flames for the 1999-2000 and 2000-01 seasons. From there he moved to Brandon to become an assistant coach with the WHL's Wheat Kings for two seasons.

In 2003 Howell moved to Drayton Valley to become head coach and general manager of the Alberta Junior Hockey League's Thunder, where he posted a .625 winning percentage in three seasons. In 2006 he became the first head coach of the Westside Warriors, adding GM duties in 2008. The Warriors posted a franchise-best 40-17-3 (.635) record in the 2007-08 season, reaching the BCHL's Interior Conference final.

Howell also has experience at the provincial and national team levels, including a stint as head coach of Team Alberta for the 2007 Canada Winter Games, winning a bronze medal. He was an assistant/video coach with the Canadian men's national team at the 2000 IIHF World Championships, fulfilling the same role for Hockey Canada at three consecutive World Junior Championships in 2000, 2001, and 2002.

In his first season with the Dinos, Howell led them to a 13-9-6 record and a playoff appearance. In 2010-11, the Dinos finished in second place at 17-8-3, hosted the Canada West semi-final for the first time since 1997, and made the program's first CIS University Cup appearance since 2000. Howell was named the Canada West coach of the year.

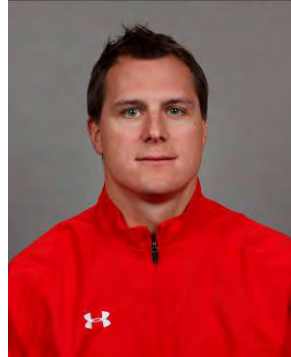

ASSISTANT COACHES



CORY CROSS played varsity hockey at Alberta with Mark Howell in the early 1990s. After a three-year varsity career, Cross spent three seasons with the Atlanta Knights of the IHL before making his National Hockey League debut with Tampa Bay in the 1993-94 season. He stayed with the Lightning until 1999 before moving to Toronto for three seasons. He also made stops in New York, Edmonton, and Pittsburgh before playing his final NHL season with Detroit in 2005-06. After a year in Germany, Cross retired and moved to Kelowna, where he became a partner in an oil and gas servicing company.



BRAD ISBISTER retired from professional hockey after spending the 2008-09 season with Zug in the Swiss league. A native of Edmonton, the 6-foot-4 left winger broke into the National Hockey League with the Phoenix Coyotes in 1997. His longest stint came with the New York Islanders from 1999 until 2003, when he was traded to his hometown Oilers. After single seasons with Boston and the New York Rangers, Isbister saw his last NHL action in 2007-08, playing 55 games with the Vancouver Canucks. In 541 career NHL games, Isbister scored 106 goals and 222 total points.

BEARS CLAIM CONFERENCE TITLE WITH MAULING OF DINOS

EDMONTON – A five-goal second period broke open a 2-1 game as the University of Alberta Golden Bears captured their 49th Canada West men's hockey championship with an 8-1 shellacking of the Calgary Dinos Saturday night at Clare Drake Arena.



Alberta wins the best-of-three Canada West championship series 2-0 after Friday night's 3-0 win and advances to the CIS University Cup as the top seed out of Canada West. Despite the loss, the Dinos will also travel to Fredericton for the national championship tournament March 24-27, their first appearance since the 1999-2000 season.

The Bears got off to another quick start Saturday, with Derek Ryan scoring shorthanded just 55 seconds into the game after the Dinos had worked hard on the opening shift to draw a penalty. At the 6:27 mark J.P. Szaszkiwicz tipped in a wristler from the slot to make it 2-0 Alberta, and it looked like things would get out of hand quickly. But just 14 seconds later, Joel Eisenkirch scored just his second goal of the season to put the Dinos on the board and, though they were outplayed and outshot by an 18-5 margin, Calgary headed into the locker room down just one.

And that's when it started to deteriorate. Sean Ringrose scored 43 seconds into the second period on the power play, and Szaszkiwicz added his second just 53 seconds later and all of a sudden it was 4-1. The Bears would add three more goals in the second period and one more for good measure in the third to hand the Dinos the 8-1 defeat.

"I'm extremely disappointed with the effort tonight," said Calgary head coach Mark Howell. "Mentally we weren't sharp, and if we can take anything out of tonight it's to learn from them. Their level of compete, their level of try was at a different level tonight. They wanted to win, and they're the champions because of it. We have to learn from that – and we still have a chance to go to nationals and play some very meaningful games, but we have to learn to be mentally sharp for every second of every shift because it matters all the time."

Calgary starter Kris Lazaruk, who came in to relieve Dustin Butler in the third period Friday night, was yanked by Howell after 21:36 of playing time and four goals against. Butler didn't fare much better against the Bears' shooting gallery as the home side thrilled a big crowd of nearly 3,000 with 43 shots on goal against just 16 for the Dinos.

Fifth-year forward Chad Klassen had a five-point outing for the Bears with a goal and two assists, while Johnny Lazo joined Szaszkiwicz with a two-goal night. Canada West scoring champion Derek Ryan added two assists to his opening shorthanded goal to finish with three points.

"I don't know if it was pressure, but we've stressed details and habits all year," said Howell. "The big thing we talked about coming into the third was continuing with those habits and details and the structure that we have and getting that back in our game."

Calgary last won the Canada West title in 1996 and was making its first appearance in the conference championship series since that season.

MUCHA SHUTS OUT DINOS AS BEARS DRAW FIRST BLOOD

EDMONTON – Kurtis Mucha stopped 32 shots and conference MVP Derek Ryan scored a pair of goals as the Alberta Golden Bears took the opener of the 2011 Canada West Men's Hockey Final by a 3-0 score over the Calgary Dinos at Clare Drake Arena Friday night.



Making their first appearance in the conference championship series since 1996, the Dinos fell victim to a slow start and turnover woes as the Bears scored twice in 52 seconds in the first five minutes of the game, grabbing momentum and leaving it up to their rookie goaltender, former Kamloops Blazer Mucha.

Alberta takes a 1-0 lead in the best-of-three series and will look to take their 10th Canada West title in the past 11 seasons in Game 2, which is slated for a 7:30 p.m. face-off Saturday night. Game 3, if necessary, goes Sunday night at 7 p.m. Both teams have already qualified for the CIS University Cup March 24-27 in Fredericton, N.B.

The Dinos had some good an even dominant play at times after the Bears went up 2-0, but momentum never really swung the visitors' way with a big crowd behind the home side.

"I don't think mentally we were ready to play," said coach Mark Howell of the Dinos. "Both goals they scored in the first were direct results of turnovers in our end with our defencemen not ready to make hard plays. When you have those guys on the ice – and it's not just Ryan and (Chad) Klassen, but (Sean) Ringrose and other guys too – they're quick on the puck and when you turn it over on your own face-off dot, it's going to end up in a dangerous situation."

Ryan's first of the night was a beauty. After the Calgary turnover deep, Klassen skated behind the net and fired it out front to Ryan, who one-timed it past Calgary starter Dustin Butler's glove to give the Bears the lead at the 3:53 mark of the opening period. Moments after that goal was announced, the Bears struck again when Ringrose took a couple of whacks at it from the side of the net before finally beating Butler. The two goals came in a span of 52 seconds and put the Dinos behind the eight-ball less than five minutes into the contest.

The Dinos had a chance to get right back in it when they had 50 seconds of five-on-three power play time, but despite territorial advantage Calgary couldn't hit pay dirt. Their best chance came when Aaron Richards snapped a shot from the right face-off circle that beat Mucha but clanged off the post, and the Bears were able to kill the rest of their disadvantage.

From there, it was all Mucha. Calgary's play improved significantly and the Dinos showed flashes of brilliance in the second and third periods, but none of their 32 shots found its way into the net. The Dinos outshot the Bears by a 13-9 margin in the second period and had some opportunities in front of the net, but the bounces just didn't go their way. Calgary had three power play advantages in the second and the Dinos moved the puck well but didn't get any solid chances.

Ryan iced the game at the 7:24 mark of the third period from virtually the same spot on the ice as his first goal, wristing a nice feed from Klassen top shelf over Butler to make it 3-0. The goal chased Butler from the net after he gave up three goals on 24 shots, and Kris Lazaruk went the rest of the way in goal for the Dinos.

Both teams went 0-for-5 on the power play on the night, and both had extended two-man advantage situations but were unable to capitalize. Calgary outshot Alberta 32-29 in the affair.

DINOS GET CRACK AT CONFERENCE, NATIONAL CROWNS

CALGARY – With a great burst of energy to start the game, and a gutsy effort to finish it, the University of Calgary Dinos are headed to the Canada West Finals and the University Cup with a 4-1 victory over the Saskatchewan Huskies, winning the deciding game of the best-of-three semifinal series.

The victory assures the Dinos a berth at the University Cup on March 24-27 in Fredericton, N.B., and a chance to win the conference crown next weekend in Edmonton against the Alberta Golden Bears. The Bears defeated the Manitoba Bisons in straight games in their semi-final series, and are looking to make it four Canada West titles in a row against Calgary next weekend.

It marks the first time since 1996 that the Dinos have gone to the Canada West championship, a series in which they defeated the Alberta Golden Bears to advance to the University Cup. Calgary had another shot at the national tournament in 2000 as a wild-card entry, but has not been since. The Dinos have no CIS banners to their credit in their history, and are 7-13 all-time at the national stage.

Jevon Desautels scored the game-winning goal midway through the first period on a nifty move to get it onto teammate's Matt Isbister's stick. Banging home Isbister's subsequent rebound, the fifth-year scored his second goal of the playoffs from his spot on the fourth line, making it 2-0 Dinos, which would be all they would need.

Brock Nixon was sensational all night long, using his speed to generate chances, blocking shots and feeding his teammates. Kodie Curran's game-opening goal was a result of a well-timed pass from Nixon to get the rookie defenceman open, while Aaron Richards was the beneficiary of another Nixon pass in a remarkably similar play midway through the third. Both goals were on the man-advantage, where Calgary was two for four.

Walker Wintoneak iced the game with one of the more exciting empty-net goals in recent memory at Father David Bauer. With the Huskies pressing hard down two, the puck was turned over in the neutral zone and trickled slowly over the blue-line towards the empty Huskies net.

The closest players to the puck, Wintoneak and Saskatchewan defenceman Jason Wagar, both knew what was at stake, and each lunged for the puck. Wintoneak got to it first by sprawling out on to the ice, pushing it into the net for the late 4-1 advantage which sparked mayhem both on the Calgary bench and in the stands.

Dustin Butler was rock-solid, stopping 32 shots with just one goal against. Kyle Ross beat him for the fourth time in the postseason for the lone Huskies goal of the game, batting in his own rebound. David Reekie made 20 saves in the loss.

Head Coach Mark Howell commented on the win and looked ahead to the Canada West finals.

"I thought we came out with great energy, we were excited to make amends for last night," said Howell. "We had waves throughout the game, but to win in the playoffs you need great goaltending, and Butler was phenomenal for us.

"The boys do know they get to go to Nationals, but it's not just about going to the dance," said Howell. "They want a trophy, and they want to go in as Canada West Champions. We'll be ready to go and energized when we get up to Edmonton."

With the loss, the Canada West season is now finished for the Saskatchewan Huskies despite a 17-11-0 record and a third place finish in Canada West. It also marks the last game for fifth year forward Jason Wagar.

CALGARY – Desperation was in the air on the Saskatchewan Huskies side, and they played as such, scoring on their first shot of the game and holding on for the 3-2 victory over the host Calgary Dinos in game two of the Canada West semi-finals.

The best-of-three series is now tied at one, setting the table for an entertaining game three on Sunday. The winner will move on to the Canada West Finals and then the University Cup on March 24th. The loser will go home with nothing, adding a touch more of intensity to an already pressure-packed situation.

Kyle Ross put his Saskatchewan troops on the board first on Saturday, converting on a short pass right in front of Dustin Butler on an early power play with Colton Grant in the penalty box. Ross was a man possessed in the first period, firing four quality shots on Butler, who ended up with 10 saves in the period.

Butler would pay for a rare miscue in the second period while trying to handle the puck outside of the crease. LATE SURGE DRIVES DINOS TO GAME 1 WIN

CALGARY – In just 90 seconds, the Calgary Dinos ripped back momentum in game one of the best-of-three Canada West Semi-Finals, scoring three consecutive goals in the third period to stun the visiting Saskatchewan Huskies by a final score of 4-2.

The three quick strikes effectively snuffed out any steam the Huskies may have gained in a second period where they out-shot the Dinos 19-10. This included a 17-3 advantage in the early parts of the frame, which they parlayed into the early 2-1 advantage.

In the victory, the Dinos own a 1-0 series lead and now have two chances to close the Huskies out at home. The winner of the semi-final series will play the winner of Alberta and Manitoba next weekend for the title of Canada West champion. Both teams in the conference finals will earn a berth at the University Cup in Fredericton, N.B., which goes March 24-27.

Alberta was victorious in game one of their series with Manitoba, defeating the Bisons in a 4-0 result.

Tyler Swystun's hard work set-up fifth-year senior Jevon Desautels for the one-timer on the tying goal in the third, just 19 seconds before Aaron Richards banged home his own rebound to take the 3-2 lead. 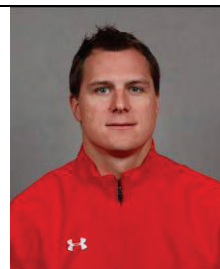
