JOAN SNYDER PROGRAM OF EXCELLENCE UNIVERSITY OF CALGARY WOMEN'S HOCKEY

ON MARCH 15, 2011, THE UNIVERSITY OF CALGARY ANNOUNCED THE CREATION OF THE JOAN SNYDER PROGRAM OF EXCELLENCE IN WOMEN'S HOCKEY.

The transformational gift of \$500,000 from Calgary philanthropist Joan Snyder created the Program of Excellence, a first of its kind in Canada. The gift will take the Dinos through the 2015-16 season with significantly enhanced financial resources.

The donation will allow the program to enhance four key pillars: coaching excellence, elite competition, sport services, and scholarships to student-athletes. Head Coach Danielle Goyette will hire a full-time assistant coach, home games will be moved to Father David Bauer Arena from the Olympic Oval, and more operating funds will be available for equipment, sports medicine, academic advising, and community outreach.

"The leadership of Danielle Goyette and the excellent team building that has resulted is what really attracted me to the Dinos women's hockey program," said Snyder. "It is my hope that this gift will enable the program to retain and attract top coaching talent, assist in boosting the team to national excellence, and inspire young girls to take up hockey – which players like Hayley Wickenheiser are already doing."

"Having that support from Joan is pretty amazing," said Goyette. "Things like having a full-time assistant coach will be very big for this program. It will also allow us to play more exhibition games to see how we stack up against some of the best teams in Canada and give us an idea of what we need to do to become champions."

In August 2011, the Dinos hired Tara Hammer as the program's first full-time assistant coach. And for the first time, the program's home games were played at Father David Bauer Arena in 2011-12.

Snyder's mother, Phoebe, began playing hockey in the 1920s and pursued her enthusiasm for the sport through the hardships of the Great Depression, and it was that pioneering spirit that inspired Joan to make this donation. A lifelong fan of hockey, Snyder says sport has taught her many lessons that can be applied to business and other areas of life.

"Participating in athletics teaches good sportsmanship, fair play, and the ability to learn, and I've always felt it's better to be a team booster than a knocker," she said. "Above all, have fun in striving for excellence."

Snyder's generosity has touched other community organizations like the Agape Hospice, Calgary Humane Society. She has donated more than \$9 million to the Faculty of Medicine, creating the Calvin, Phoebe, and Joan Snyder Chair in Critical Care Research along with the Calvin, Phoebe, and Joan Snyder Institute of Infection, Immunity, and Inflammation in honour of her parents, who she credits with teaching her the value of philanthropy.

It is another step forward in the development of women's hockey in Calgary. Led by Goyette and Canadian Interuniversity Sport player of the year Wickenheiser, the Dinos made their first appearance in the Canada West playoffs in more than a decade in 2010-11. In their second season back in CIS competition after a seven-year stint in the Alberta Colleges Athletic Conference, the Dinos posted a record of 16-6-2 and 34 points in 2010-11, more than doubling their point tally (16) from the previous season. And in 2011-12, they improved on that, finishing first overall with a 20-4 record

"Having people like Joan supporting this program means a lot, not just to me but to the players as well," said Goyette. "When you feel that support behind you, it makes you want to do more – not just for the team but for the community. When you don't have to worry about raising money, it opens up time we can use to give back to the community and grow the sport of women's hockey."



COACHING STAFF



DANIELLE GOYETTE, Head Coach

Danielle Goyette was named the fifth head coach of the Dinos women's hockey program on May 9, 2007, bringing immediate success to the team.

In her first year as a head coach at any level, Goyette led the Dinos to a record of 12-6-4 in 2007-08, coming just one win shy of the ACAC title. From there, she led her team to the ACAC title in 2009, a return to Canada West in 2010, a playoff appearance in 2011, and a first-place finish in 2012.

Few athletes in any sport can match Goyette's accomplishments at the international level after an outstanding 16-year career with Canada's national women's hockey team. She is a two-time Olympic gold medalist (2002, 2006) and captured a silver medal in 1998 in addition to eight World Championship titles – the most recent coming in Winnipeg in 2007. She has represented Canada at international competitions more than any other hockey player in history – male or female – and has more than 100 goals to her credit in international play.

Her Olympic accomplishments extend outside medals – she was the leading goal scorer in the 1998 tournament in Nagano, ranking second overall in points. The greatest honour of her career came at Torino 2006 when she was selected to carry Canada's flag into the opening ceremonies.

The forward also won three gold medals each with Team Alberta and Team Quebec at the Esso Women's Nationals. She has been part of the NWHL and the WWHL with the Calgary Oval X-Treme since 1999, helping the team win three league championships.

She is an accomplished skills coach, having worked with numerous bantam and midget boys' teams in skill and skating development as well as with a variety of hockey schools across Canada. In 2012, she was named as an assistant coach for Team Canada at the upcoming World Championships.

ASSISTANT COACHES

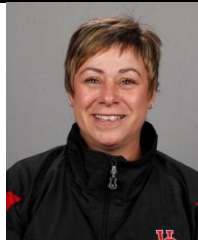


TARA HAMMER became the Dinos' first full-time assistant coach in 2011. She played three seasons at Mount Royal before transferring to the Dinos in 2003, recording 14 goals and 21 points in 20 games. She went on to play five seasons in the WWHL with Edmonton and Strathmore. Hammer completed her BKin in 2006 and a BEd in 2008, spending three years as a teacher in the Calgary Board of Education while working for several different female hockey organizations as a coach and administrator.

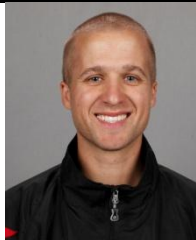


KELLY BECHARD is a former Dino and Olympic gold medalist in 2002 in Salt Lake City. A graduate of the University of Calgary with a Bachelor of Commerce, Bechard played on the first-ever Dinos women's hockey team in 1998, where she was a first team All-Canadian. As a teammate with Danielle Goyette on the national team, Bechard won four world championship titles in addition to Olympic gold in 2002. She played several seasons in the WWHL with the Calgary Oval X-Treme and the NWHL's Brampton Thunder and Mississauga Aeros. Bechard joined the coaching staff in the 2010-11 season.

DINOS SHUT OUT PANDAS TO WIN FIRST-EVER CONFERENCE TITLE



CALGARY – The University of Calgary Dinos are headed to the CIS women's hockey championship in Edmonton as the Canada West champions.

The Dinos shut out the Alberta Pandas 2-0 Saturday night to sweep their best-of-three Canada West final series and lifted the championship trophy for the first time in school history at the Markin MacPhail Centre at Canada Olympic Park.

Iya Gavrilova scored what turned out to be the game-winner late in the first period – her seventh goal of the playoffs – while Erin Davidson added some insurance in the third for the Dinos. Amanda Tapp made 17 saves for the shutout.

The Dinos outshot the Pandas 23-17 on a night when scoring chances were hard to come by as both teams bottled up the area in front of the goal effectively. Calgary was able to take advantage of its opportunities, while the Pandas missed a couple of wide open chances that could have drastically changed the momentum of the game.

Gavrilova's goal at the 16:51 mark was a perfect example of being in the right place at the right time. The puck took a funny bounce off the end boards and came into the goal mouth with Alberta netminder Kaitlyn Chapman hugging the opposite post. Jenna Smith poked the puck through a maze of skates, and Gavrilova slid it into the open net to give the Dinos the 1-0 advantage heading into the second.

Shots were just 6-5 Calgary in a tightly-played second period. Neither team was able to light the lamp again until Calaine Inglis entered the zone on the left wing just over six minutes into the third. Inglis carried the puck behind the Alberta goal before throwing out a centering pass, which Davidson poked between the legs of Chapman to give the Dinos a 2-0 lead.

The Pandas poured it on from there, and had a couple of their best chances of the night despite getting only five shots on goal in the third. Tapp made her biggest stop of the night in the final minutes as she stoned Alannah Kedra point-blank in front to preserve the shutout.

Alberta had a couple of great opportunities on two-on-one rushes, but Tapp made some key saves while one set-up pass skipped over the forward's stick with a gaping cage in front of her.

Tapp allowed just one goal in the series and just two through four games in the Canada West playoffs, recording a .974 save percentage and a 0.50 goals-against in the postseason.

Chapman allowed two goals on 23 shots on the night for the Pandas in a losing cause. Neither team was able to convert on the power play on the night, with Alberta going 0-for-2 while the Dinos were held scoreless on their four power play opportunities.

Both teams had already earned their spots at the national championship tournament, which the Pandas host. They will return to action when the CIS championship rolls into Clare Drake Arena in Edmonton March 8-11.

DINOS DRAW FIRST BLOOD IN CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES



CALGARY – A pair of goals 96 seconds apart midway through the third period proved the difference as the No. 3 University of Calgary Dinos captured Game 1 of the Canada West women's hockey championship series with a 3-1 victory over the Alberta Pandas Friday night at Canada Olympic Park.

With the score tied 1-1 and just over 12 minutes to play, Hayley Wickenheiser found Iya Gavrilova, who made a sensational move to the backhand to beat Alberta netminder Kaitlyn Chapman to give Calgary the lead. And just over a minute and a half later, Wickenheiser herself beat Chapman with a 15-foot wrister to add some insurance.

The win gives Calgary a 1-0 lead in the best-of-three series, with Game 2 set for Saturday night at 8 p.m. MT. The Dinos will be looking to close out the Pandas and win their first-ever Canada West title, while the Pandas, looking for their 12th, will hope to send the series to a deciding game on Sunday. CanadaWest.tv has live streaming coverage of the series.

Dinos head coach Danielle Goyette praised her team, which battled through a stifling Alberta defence through the neutral zone all night and got a great effort from its penalty killers.

"The first period we played well, we were disciplined, and we knew what we had to do," said Goyette, the five-year Calgary bench boss. "In the second we were undisciplined, and it changed the momentum of the game. Credit to our PK tonight, they had a lot of ice time and they really did well."

Gavrilova opened the scoring with her fourth goal of the playoffs at 19:05 of the first with the Dinos on the power play. The Russian national teamer set up in the slot and one-timed a feed from Wickenheiser with a bullet to the top corner.

Alberta's Sarah Hilworth tied it up for the Pandas just over a minute into the second period, also on a power play. With Dinos netminder Amanda Tapp having made the initial save and prone on the ice, Hilworth grabbed the loose puck and lifted it into the gaping cage.

The Pandas had some great chances to take the lead late in the second and early in the third with a pair of abbreviated 5-on-3 opportunities, but they were never able to set up effectively in the Calgary zone and the Dinos managed to kill off both two-man advantage situations.

The score remained tied until the 7:57 mark of the third when Gavrilova took the Wickenheiser feed, skated around the defenceman, and made a great move to slide the puck past Chapman's left skate.

With her three-point performance, Wickenheiser now has a goal and eight assists through three postseason games, while Gavrilova easily leads all playoff players with six goals.

Chapman made 24 saves in the loss for Alberta, while Tapp turned aside 19 Pandas shots. Calgary held the edge on the shot clock 27-20, while both teams scored on one of their power play opportunities: Calgary went 1-for-7, while the Pandas scored once on their eight power play opportunities.

DINOS PUNCH TICKET TO NATIONALS AFTER SWEEPING HORNS

CALGARY – For the first time since 2001, the No. 3-ranked University of Calgary Dinos are headed to the CIS championship after disposing of the Lethbridge Pronghorns 7-1 Saturday night at the Markin MacPhail Centre at Canada Olympic Park.

The big win gives the Dinos their first-ever Canada West playoff series win and sends them to the conference final, where they will host the Alberta Pandas in a best-of-three series next weekend. And because of Alberta's sweep of Saskatchewan in the other conference semi-final, Calgary is guaranteed to join the host Pandas at the national championship at Clare Drake Arena in Edmonton March 8-11.

It's Calgary's second trip to the national tournament, the first since 2001 when the Dinos hosted the event, and the first since the program rejoined Canada West and CIS competition following a seven-year stint in the Alberta Colleges Athletic Conference.

The Dinos won their 13th consecutive game with an overpowering effort in what head coach Danielle Goyette called "one of the fastest games we've played all season."

Just like game one, a 3-0 Dinos victory, the Pronghorns were able to cement some early pressure in the Dinos' end, but again Lethbridge's problem was getting the puck on net. At one point the shots read 2-1 in favor of Lethbridge, but it never got better than that and by the time intermission came, Calgary held a 13-7 lead in shots.

At the 13:44 mark Hayley Wickenheiser came in from the right shot where she wired a quick shot on net. Crystal Patterson made the stop, but Iya Gavrilova was on the doorstep to register her third goal of the series.

Following the Dinos' first goal, the home team received their first power play of the game and didn't waste any time capitalizing on it. Tanya Morgan jumped on a rebound off another Wickenheiser shot to give Calgary a 2-0 lead at 14:20. The Dinos carried that lead into the break.

Lethbridge started the second period by making a goaltending change as Shauntelle Parsons came in to relieve Patterson, who was injured late in period one.

Calgary's third goal came 11:56 into the middle stanza as Calaine Inglis' shot from the top of the zone found its way through a maze and into the back of the net.

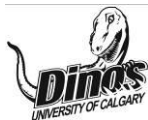

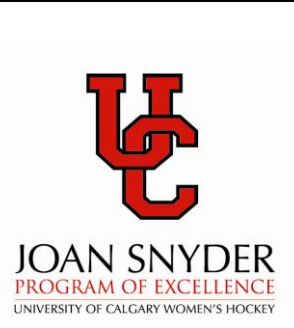
