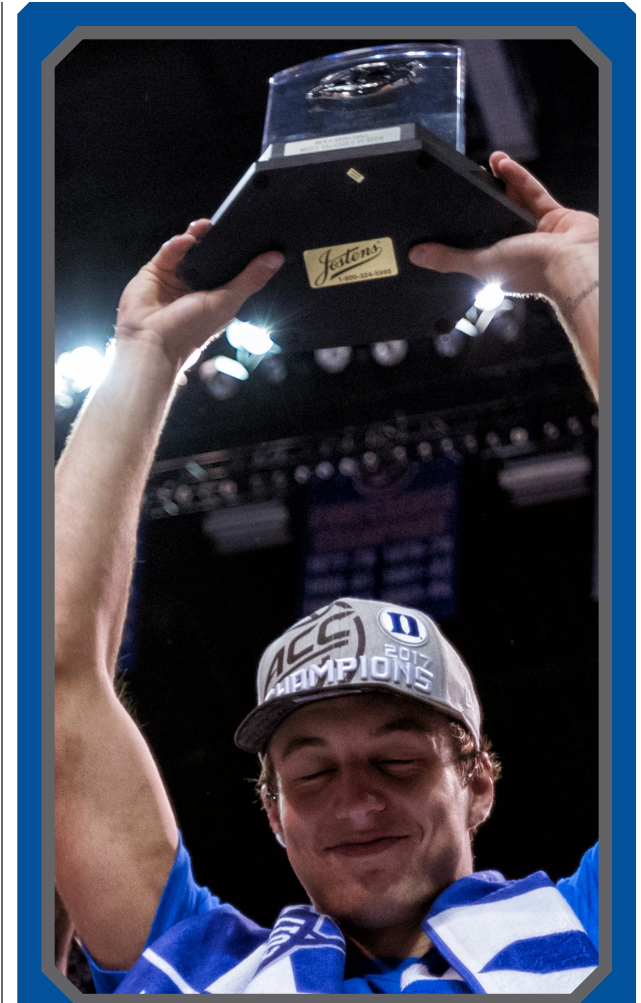

# HIGHLIGHTS

- The Blue Devils sent 29 different student-athletes to NCAA action, highlighted by a second-place finish in the women's golf individual competition by ACC Golfer of the Year and ANNIKA Award recipient Leona Maguire.
- Five Blue Devils captured a total of six ACC individual titles -- Pascual Di Tella (men's fencing, saber), Daniel Golubovic (men's outdoor track & field, decathlon), Madison Heath (women's indoor track & field, pole vault; women's outdoor track & field, pole vault), Leona Maguire (women's golf) and Nicholas Solfanelli (men's outdoor track & field, javelin).
- Duke had 13 former student-athletes drafted in their respective professional drafts, including first round selections Jeremy Ebobisse (MLS), Harry Giles (NBA), Luke Kennard (NBA) and Jason Tatum (NBA).
- Duke student-athletes logged approximately 2,000 hours of community service in 2016-17.
- A total of nine Blue Devil teams, third most in the ACC, achieved a perfect 1,000 score in the most recent Academic Performance Rate (APR) Report. Duke's nine programs that received the honor include women's cross country, men's fencing, women's fencing, football, men's golf, women's golf, men's lacrosse, women's lacrosse, women's soccer, women's track and field and volleyball.
- Duke posted a 97 percent Graduation Success Rate (GSR) with 13 teams achieving a perfect 100 Graduation Success Rate score: men's basketball, women's cross country/track and field, men's fencing, women's fencing, field hockey, men's golf, men's lacrosse, women's lacrosse, rowing, women's soccer, men's tennis, women's tennis and volleyball.
- Nationally, Duke was among four Football Bowl Subdivision institutions with an overall GSR total of 97 percent or better, joining Notre Dame (98), Stanford (98) and Northwestern (97).
- Duke's football program was tied for fourth among Football Bowl Subdivision schools with its 94 percent GSR rate and joins Stanford (99), Northwestern (97), South Carolina (95) and Rice (94) as the only programs with a 94 rate or better.
- In men's basketball, Duke tied for the national lead with its 100 percent GSR rate.
- A total of five Duke student-athletes received CoSIDA Academic All-America honors -- Lexie Brown (women's basketball), Imani Dorsey (women's soccer),

Christina Gibbons (women's soccer), Leona Maguire (women's golf) and A.J. Wolf (football).

- Lexie Brown of women's basketball, Pascual Di Tella of men's fencing, Christina Gibbons of women's soccer, Leona Maguire of women's golf and Rita Somogyi of women's fencing were named ACC Scholar-Athletes of the Year.
- Seven new members were enshrined into Duke Athletics Hall of Fame. The Class of 2016 included Shane Battier (basketball), Dan Brooks (coach), Mary Dinkins (administrator), Grant Hill (basketball), Ed Meadows (football), Virada Nirapathpongporn (golf) and Kelly Walbert Cagle (soccer).



## ► MAGUIRE FIRST TWO-TIME ANNIKA WINNER

- Junior Leona Maguire was named the 2017 winner of the ANNIKA Award Presented by 3M.
- The award honors the most outstanding female Division I collegiate golfer as voted by her peers, coaches and golf media.
- Maguire collected the second-lowest stroke average in NCAA history this past season with a 70.29 ledger.

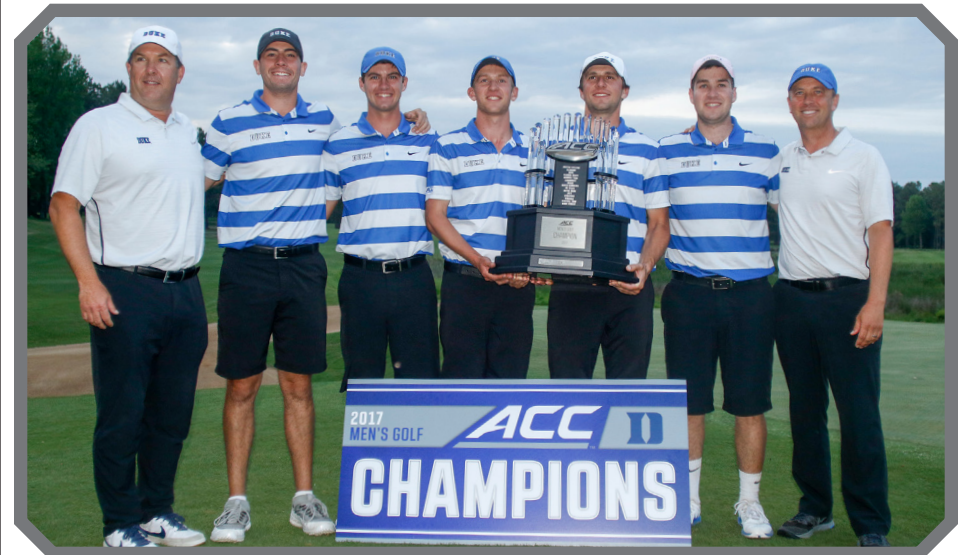
## ► MAGUIRE, DUKE CLAIM ACC WOMEN'S GOLF TITLES

- The Duke women's golf program won an ACC Championship for the 20th time in school history.
- The Blue Devils turned in a five-under-par 54-hole ledger of 859 to win by nine strokes at the 6,192-yard, par 72 The Reserve Golf Club in Pawleys Island, S.C.
- Junior Leona Maguire claimed individual medalist honors for the second time over the last three years as she carded a six-under-par, 210, to win by two strokes.
- It marked the 16th time Duke swept the team and individual titles.
- As a team, Duke registered rounds of 284, 286 and 289 over three days for an 859 ledger.
- The championship was the first for the Blue Devils since the 2014 campaign and second for the team's lone senior, Sandy Choi.
- All five Blue Devils finished in the top 17 of the individual listing - Choi (T4), Ana Belac (T14), Virginia Elena Carta (T17) and Gurbani Singh (T17).



## ► ACC MEN'S GOLF TITLE RETURNS TO DURHAM

- In absolutely dominating fashion, Duke reclaimed its status as tops in the ACC after finishing the championship with a 12-stroke lead.
- Shooting a collective 850 (-14), the Blue Devils secured their eighth conference title, and first since 2013.
- Rounding out the tournament as just one of two teams under par, Duke showed a great deal of mastery on the grounds of the Musgrove Mill Golf Course thanks to four Blue Devil efforts in the red.
- Sophomore Alex Smalley led the way for Duke, shooting an overall 212 (-4) for the event.
- Coming in at the number two spot for Duke was Jake Shuman, who entered the championship fifth for the Blue Devils' lineup.
- Having already won the ACC title in 1954, 1959, 1961, 1962, 1966, 2005 and 2013, Duke can now add 2017 to the list with an exclamation point following the convincing victory.





# HIGHLIGHTS

## ► DUKE TOPS NOTRE DAME FOR 20TH ACC MEN'S BASKETBALL TITLE

- Duke won its first ACC Tournament championship since 2011 and its 20th overall, most in league history, and the 14th under coach Mike Krzyzewski.
- Jayson Tatum took over in the final three minutes, making key plays all over the floor, and No. 14 Duke became the first team to win the event with four victories in four days by rallying past No. 22 Notre Dame 75-69 on Saturday, March 11.
- The Blue Devils came from double digits down in the second half to beat both No. 10 Louisville and No. 6 North Carolina to get to the finals at Barclays Center and then came from eight back with 11:35 left to defeat the Irish.
- Luke Kennard had 16 points for Duke and was selected tournament MVP, but it was really Tatum's time to shine. He averaged 22 points and 7.5 rebounds in four games.

# HIGHLIGHTS

## ► HARRIS RETIRES AS VOICE OF THE BLUE DEVILS

- After a 41-year run as Duke's play-by-play announcer for football and basketball, Bob Harris closed out his Hall of Fame career as the Voice of the Blue Devils in the spring of 2017. Harris, a four-time North Carolina Sportscaster of the Year honoree in 1988, 1991, 2011 and 2016, announced his retirement from the post on July 5, 2016.

Harris closed his football broadcasting tenure at Duke having called 471 consecutive games. The streak began on September 11, 1976, with Duke's season-opener at Tennessee and concluded on November 26, 2016, with the season finale at Miami. He called six postseason bowl games (1989 All American, 1994 Hall of Fame, 2012 Belk, 2013 Chick-fil-A, 2014 Hyundai Sun & 2015 Pinstripe) along with Duke's appearances in the Coca Cola Bowl against Clemson on November 30, 1991, in Tokyo, Japan, and the Dr Pepper ACC Championship Game versus Florida State on December 7, 2013, in Charlotte, N.C.

Harris completed his remarkable career having called 1,392 Duke basketball games. His tenure with the Blue Devils featured 13 NCAA Final Four events while calling 10 championship games including all five of Duke's national titles in 1991 (Indianapolis), 1992 (Minneapolis), 2001 (Minneapolis), 2010 (Indianapolis) and 2015 (Indianapolis). Harris also broadcast 16 ACC Tournament championship game victories for the Blue Devils in 1978, 1980, 1986, 1988, 1992, 1999, 2000, 2001, 2002, 2003, 2005, 2006, 2009, 2010, 2011 and 2017.

A native of Albemarle, N.C., Harris retired as the longest-tenured play-by-play announcer in the history of the Atlantic Coast Conference. He is a member of the North Carolina Sports Hall of Fame (inducted in 2006) and the Stanly County Sports Hall of Fame (1993).

In 2009, Harris was honored with the Atlantic Coast Conference's prestigious Skeeter Francis Award, an honor presented annually to individuals for distinguished service to the league. In 2016, Harris received The Order of the Long Leaf Pine, an honor conferred by the Governor of North Carolina for exemplary service to the State of North Carolina and its communities.

## ► CHESSON RETIRES AS DUKE FOOTBALL ANALYST

- After serving 36 seasons alongside Bob Harris as an analyst for Duke football games, former All-ACC wide receiver Wes Chesson joined his partner in retirement from the airwaves following the 2016 gridiron campaign.

"For the past 36 football seasons, there hasn't been a better person to share the broadcast booth with than Wes Chesson," said Bob Harris. "On top of being a great analyst of the game, Wes has been a terrific friend. He's simply the best."

Chesson, who caught 164 passes for 2,399 yards and 10 touchdowns between 1968-70 for the Blue Devils, is a member of the Duke Athletics Hall of Fame. In 1970, he established the Duke single-season record for pass receptions with 74. Chesson went on to play for the NFL's Atlanta Falcons and Philadelphia Eagles.

## ► DUKE FOOTBALL FACILITY HONORED FOR SAFETY

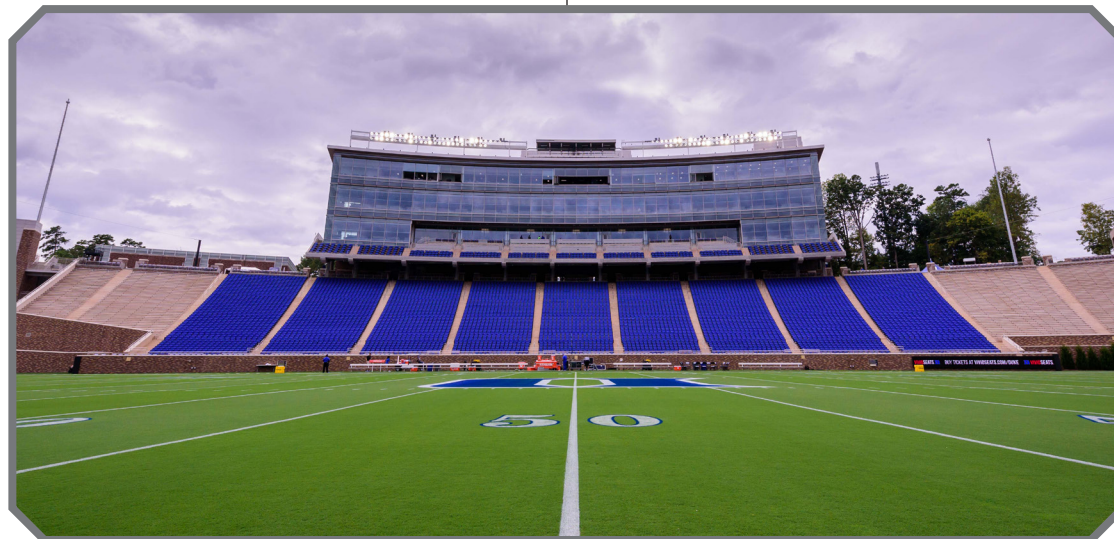
- Duke University's Brooks Field at Wallace Wade Stadium will be honored with a 2017 Facility of Merit Award as part of the National Sports Safety and Security Conference and Exhibition on July 11-13 in Orlando, Fla.

"We are grateful for the support, leadership and resources provided by the Board of Trustees, President Brodhead, Dr. Tallman Trask, Kyle Cavanaugh, Chief John Dailey and Dr. Kevin White," said Bob Weiseman, Duke's Assistant Director of Athletics for Facilities, Game Operations and Championships. "No improvements to game day safety and security are possible without complete administrative buy-in and commitment. Furthermore, we are humbled by the efforts of so many groups and individuals to design, construct and implement these improvements and put Duke in position to be recognized in this fashion. Duke Police, Duke Emergency Management, Durham Police, Staff One Services, Inc., Rhino-SES, CEIA, Duke NROTC, Duke OIT, Venue Solutions Group and our outstanding game operations staff under the leadership of Becca Wilusz all were instrumental in this process."

Home to Duke's football program, Brooks Field at Wallace Wade Stadium is one of three NCAA gridiron facilities to receive the honor for leadership in addressing safety and security issues, joined by Vaught Hemingway Stadium (Ole Miss) and Ryan Field (Northwestern). Ten total facilities were recognized including professional venues Bridgestone Arena (NHL's Nashville Predators), Progressive Field (MLB's Cleveland Indians) and Levi's Stadium (NFL's San Francisco 49ers).

The presentation of the 2017 Facility of Merit Awards is sponsored by Axis Communications, a market leader in video network. The presentation will take place on the second day of the eighth annual conference, which is hosted by the National Center for Spectator Sports Safety and Security (NCS4) at The University of Southern Mississippi.

"The Facility of Merit Award is to allow professional leagues, NCAA member institutions and marathon and endurance organizations to honor outstanding facilities that have gone above and beyond for their sports safety and security," said NCS4 Director Dr. Lou Marciani. "These contributions involve enhancing safety and security at their venue beyond what is normally required, and setting an example for other facilities to follow."





## DUKE ATHLETICS HALL OF FAME

- Seven new members were enshrined into Duke Athletics Hall of Fame on Friday, September 9, during a banquet held in historic Cameron Indoor Stadium. The Class of 2016 included Shane Battier (basketball), Dan Brooks (coach), Mary Dinkins (administrator), Grant Hill (basketball), Ed Meadows (football), Virada Nirapathpongorn (golf) and Kelly Walbert Cagle (soccer).
- Battier, a native of Birmingham, Mich., was a two-time All-America pick while helping the Blue Devils to four ACC regular season titles, three ACC Tournament crowns and the 2001 NCAA championship. The National Player of the Year choice by nine outlets as a senior in 2001, his list of accomplishments also includes three National Defensive Player of the Year citations, two first team Academic All-America credentials and the 2001 NCAA Final Four Most Outstanding Player award. For his 146-game career, Battier averaged 13.6 points and 6.1 rebounds per contest while his jersey No. 31 was retired into the rafters of Cameron Indoor Stadium on February 21, 2001. Following his collegiate career, Battier was the No. 6 overall pick in the 2001 NBA Draft by the Memphis Grizzlies and enjoyed a 13-year professional career that included two world championships with the Miami Heat in 2012 and 2013.
- Brooks, a native of Baker City, Ore., and 1981 graduate of Oregon State University, was named Duke's head women's golf coach on Aug. 12, 1984, and has guided the Blue Devils to unparalleled success - including 125 total tournament titles, 18 ACC championships and six NCAA crowns - over the past three-plus decades. Brooks, a 14-time ACC Coach of the Year selection and six-time National Coach of the Year choice who was enshrined into the National Golf Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2001, has mentored three NCAA individual medalists, 17 ACC individual medalists, 24 All-America picks and 17 Academic All-America selections. On October 23, 2005, Brooks won his 92nd career tournament to break the previous NCAA Division I record of 91 victories set by Mark Gale of San Jose State. With Brooks at the helm, Duke captured NCAA championships in 1999, 2002, 2005, 2006, 2007 and 2014.
- Dinkins, a native of Plymouth, N.C., and 1972 graduate of Duke University, began her affiliation with the athletic department nearly five decades ago as an undergraduate work study student. Hired by then head coach Mike McGee, she enjoyed a 22-year stint in the Blue Devil football office before transitioning into the role of Director of the Varsity Club in 1994, where she served as the liaison for all former Duke student-athletes and parents before retiring in April of 2016. In addition to her service to Duke, Dinkins has been the school's representative on the executive board and a past president of the Bill Dooley Chapter of the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame.

## DUKE ATHLETICS HALL OF FAME

- Hill, a native of Reston, Va., was a three-time All-America pick while helping the Blue Devils capture NCAA championships in both 1991 and 1992. A member of three conference regular season title teams, he was a three-time All-ACC, three-time All-ACC Tournament, two-time NCAA All-Final Four team choice. As a senior, Hill received ACC Player of the Year honors while guiding Duke to its third NCAA Final Four appearance in four seasons. In 129 career games, the 1993 National Defensive Player of the Year honoree averaged 14.9 points and 6.0 rebounds per outing and had his jersey No. 33 retired on February 27, 1994. The No. 3 overall selection in the 1994 NBA Draft by the Detroit Pistons, Hill played 18 professional seasons, was the co-recipient of the 1995 NBA Rookie of the Year award with Jason Kidd, earned All-NBA accolades following five seasons, was selected to seven NBA All-Star Games and three times was honored with the NBA Sportsmanship Award.
- Meadows, a native of Oxford, N.C., was a two-time first team All-America selection on the gridiron in 1952-53. In his two seasons, Meadows helped the Blue Devils to an overall ledger of 15-4-1 with a pair of league championships (Southern Conference in 1952; Atlantic Coast Conference in 1953) and final Associated Press national rankings of No. 16 in 1952 and No. 18 in 1953. He also was named to the Silver Anniversary All-ACC team and represented Duke in the Senior Bowl prior to being a third round selection of the Baltimore Colts in the 1954 NFL Draft. Meadows will be enshrined posthumously after passing away in 1974.
- Nirapathpongporn, a native of Bangkok, Thailand, was the first four-time first team All-America honoree in Duke women's golf history who helped the Blue Devils to four ACC crowns as well as the 2002 NCAA championship. A four-time All-ACC and three-time All-American Scholar selection, she earned individual medalist honors at the 2001 ACC Championships and, in 2002, earned both ACC and National Player of the Year honors while claiming the individual title at the NCAA Championships. On August 10, 2003, Nirapathpongporn became the first Duke player to capture the U.S. Women's Amateur championship with a 2&1 victory over Jane Park at the Philadelphia Country Club. In addition, she competed on the LPGA Tour from 2006-08 and captured two tournament victories on the Symetra Tour.
- Walbert Cagle, a native of Tucson, Ariz., garnered All-America accolades three times - including twice as a first team choice - while helping the Blue Devils to a four-year ledger of 60-23-7 with one ACC regular season championship and four NCAA Tournament berths from 1992-95. A three-time all-league and three-time all-region selection, she was the ACC Player of the Year as a senior in 1995 and later earned a spot on the ACC's 50th Anniversary Team. Cagle, who started a school record 90 consecutive games in her career, continues to hold Duke records for goals in a season (18 in 1994), game-winning goals in a season (9 in 1994), goals in a career (47), game-winning goals in a career (20) and total points in a career (117). Following graduation, Cagle played professionally in the WUSA before embarking on a college coaching career that included stints at Texas (1996; Assistant Coach), Wake Forest (1997-01; Assistant Coach) and Virginia Tech (2003-10; Head Coach [76-70-15 record]).

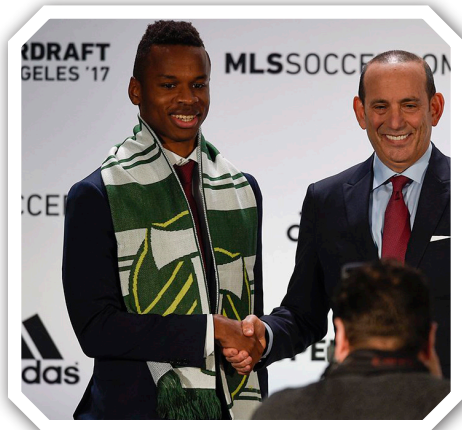

# DUKE IN THE DRAFTS

- Duke had 13 former student-athletes drafted in their respective professional drafts, including first round selections Jeremy Ebobisse (MLS), Harry Giles (NBA), Luke Kennard (NBA) and Jason Tatum (NBA).
- Jack Bruckner was one of four Blue Devils selected in the Major League Lacrosse Draft. Bruckner was taken 39th, while Thomas Zenker was 62nd and Kyle Rowe and Ian Yanulis went 67th and 68th.
- Duke men's basketball matched a school record with four selections in the 2017 NBA Draft. Freshman Jayson Tatum (3rd overall | Boston Celtics), sophomore Luke Kennard (12th overall | Detroit Pistons) and freshman Harry Giles (20th overall | Denver Nuggets) were each first-round picks, while freshman Frank Jackson (31st overall | New Orleans Hornets) was the first pick in the second round.
- Jeremy Ebobisse became the 18th Blue Devil to hear his name called in the MLS SuperDraft when the Portland Timbers selected him fourth overall in the 2017 draft.
- Ebobisse was the second top five pick in the MLS SuperDraft to play under head coach John Kerr. Andrew Wenger was the league's top pick in 2012.
- Duke baseball had three current Blue Devils selected in the 2017 Major League Baseball Draft. Junior first baseman Justin Bellinger (Cincinnati Reds) and senior pitcher James Ziemba (Los Angeles Angels) were both selected in the 22nd round, while sophomore outfielder Jimmy Herron (New York Yankees) was selected in the 31st round.

# ACC CHAMPIONSHIPS

## ► MEN'S BASKETBALL

No. 14 Duke became the first team to win the ACC Championship with four victories in four days by rallying past No. 22 Notre Dame 75-69 March 12 in Brooklyn. Luke Kennard had 16 points for Duke and was selected Tournament MVP, while Jayson Tatum averaged 22 points and 7.5 rebounds in four games.

## ► WOMEN'S GOLF

Duke won the ACC Championship for the 20th time in school history as the Blue Devils turned in a five-under-par 54-hole ledger of 859 to win by nine strokes at the 6,192-yard, par 72 The Reserve Golf Club in Pawleys Island, S.C. Leona Maguire claimed individual medalist honors to mark the 16th time Duke has swept the team and individual titles.

## ► MEN'S GOLF

Duke reclaimed its status as tops in the ACC, finishing the championship with a 12-stroke lead. The Blue Devils secured their eighth conference title, and first since 2013, shooting a collective 850 (-14). Alex Smalley led the way, shooting an overall 212 (-4) for the event.

## ► PASCUAL DI TELLA

### *Men's Fencing (Saber)*

Pascual Di Tella won gold in the ACC Men's Fencing Saber Championship, posting an 11-2 pool play record before winning both knockout round matches as the No. 1 seed. Di Tella dominated the final bout to defeat No. 2 seed and reigning champion Joanh Shainberg of Notre Dame 15-6.

## ► DANIEL GOLUBOVIC

### *Men's Outdoor Track & Field (Decathlon)*

Daniel Golubovic claimed ACC Championship gold with 7,493 points in the decathlon. Golubovic took first in the discus and the javelin while claiming second in the 110m hurdles and the pole vault.

## ► MADISON HEATH

### *Women's Indoor Track & Field (Pole Vault)*

### *Women's Outdoor Track & Field (Pole Vault)*

Madison Heath claimed the first of her two ACC titles, clearing 13-11.25 in the pole vault at the ACC Indoor Championships, giving Duke its third straight ACC indoor women's pole vault champion. At the ACC Outdoor Championships, Heath cleared 13-10.50 (4.23) for her first outdoor ACC title after capturing bronze the year prior.

## ► LEONA MAGUIRE

### *Women's Golf*

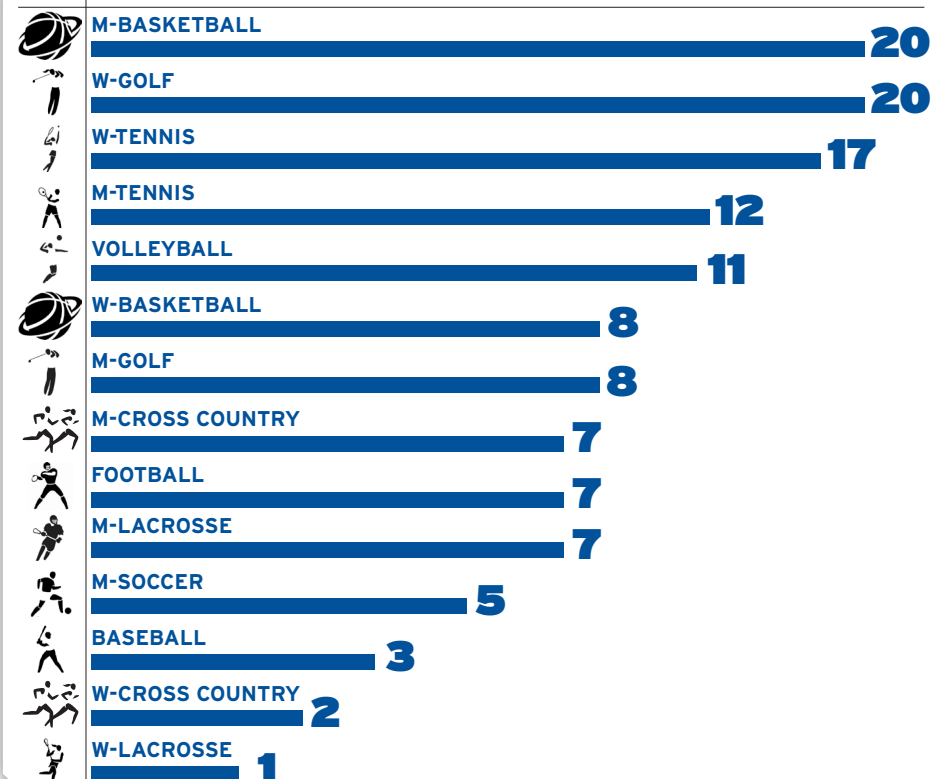

# THE DIRECTORS' CUP

- Bolstered by NCAA quarterfinal appearances from women's field hockey and women's soccer, as well as top-10 showings at the NCAA Championships by men's and women's fencing, Duke finished 32nd with 679.50 total points in the final 2016-17 Learfield Sports Directors' Cup Standings, released by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA).
- The Directors' Cup rankings measure an athletic program's comprehensive sports success by totaling points based on a team's finish in national competition. Overall, Duke ranked sixth among private institutions with 679.50 points.

## ACADEMIC SUCCESS

- The University's academic support oversight committee continued to review and discuss "best practices" for providing academic support to the student-athlete population while analyzing student-athlete data related to Independent Study registrations, course enrollment limits, course withdrawals, underloads, majors and grade point average.
- Duke football safety DeVon Edwards was one of 12 recipients of the 2016 National Football Foundation National Scholar-Athlete Award. Edwards was one of two representatives from the ACC.
- Five Duke student-athletes - Lexie Brown (women's basketball), Imani Dorsey (women's soccer), Christina Gibbons (women's soccer), Leona Maguire (women's golf), and A.J. Wolf (football) - earned CoSIDA Academic All-America honors. Both Wolf and Maguire were named first team Academic All-Americans.
- Robin Blazing (field hockey), Gibbons (women's soccer), Michael Miller (swimming), and Jordan Tucker (volleyball) received ACC Postgraduate Scholarship recognition.
- Twelve of Duke's programs were honored with NCAA Public Recognition Awards, which are presented annually to teams finishing among the top 10 percent of their respective sports based on the most recent multi-year Academic Performance Rate (APR). Duke's 12 programs include football, men's basketball, men's fencing, women's fencing, men's golf, women's golf, men's lacrosse, women's lacrosse, women's cross country, women's soccer, women's track and field and volleyball.
- Duke posted a 97 percent Graduation Success Rate (GSR) as a department. A total of 13 Duke teams achieved a 100 percent GSR: men's basketball, women's cross country and track and field, men's fencing, women's fencing, field hockey, men's golf, men's lacrosse, women's lacrosse, rowing, women's soccer, men's tennis, women's tennis and volleyball.
- In the 2016 fall semester, 27 of 27 teams had a 3.0 GPA or higher team average and in the Spring 2017 semester 26 of 27 teams had a 3.0 GPA or higher team average.
- Forty-eight Duke student-athletes made the Dean's List in the fall, while 54 received that honor in the spring. Twenty-one student-athletes earned Dean's List with Distinction in both the fall and spring.
- For the 29th time in the past 30 years, Duke led all ACC schools with 489 ACC Academic Honor Roll selections. The Honor Roll is comprised of varsity student-athletes who registered a grade point average of 3.0 or better for the full academic year.



### ▶ ACADEMIC PROGRESS REPORT

- Nine Duke University varsity athletics programs registered a perfect 1000 score in the most recent multi-year (2012-16) Academic Progress Report (APR). Duke ranked third among ACC schools with its nine programs achieving a perfect score.
- In all, Duke totaled the highest APR score among ACC institutions in 11 of the league's sports. Also, seven additional Duke programs ranked among the ACC's top five in their respective sports. The nine teams with the perfect score is tied for fourth among all FBS schools.
- Duke's 992 points in football ranked tied for fourth nationally among FBS programs, while the women's cross country, men's fencing, women's fencing, men's golf, women's golf, women's lacrosse, women's soccer, women's track and field and volleyball earned perfect scores.

### ► HORNE, WILSON WIN HEIDRICK SCHOLARSHIPS

Duke University student-athletes Elizabeth Horne (rowing) and Michael Wilson (men's track & field) have been awarded Heidrick Family Leadership Postgraduate Scholarships as announced Monday at the fifth annual Student-Athlete Talent and Recognition Show (STARS).

Established in 2015 through a generous gift from the late Bob Heidrick and his family, the scholarship seeks to recognize leaders within the student-athlete community at Duke. In particular, recipients are selected based upon demonstrated growth in the area of leadership and how they have used those skills to enhance the community around them. The scholarships are viewed as an investment in the recipients and their potential for service through leadership in the future.

Horne, who will earn a degree in neuroscience as well as minors in biology and psychology this spring, has represented Duke on the water, on the international stage and in the local community over the past four years. A native of London, Horne played a leading role for the 2V8 in 2016, helping it to a No. 3 seed at the ACC Championships. Horne was with the 2V8 during the NCAA Championships as it claimed the NCAA C Final title with a time of 6:34.803. The boat also placed first in the C/D Semifinals (6:41.080). Horne was a member of the ACC Crew of the Week after the Carolina Cup as the boat won its race in 6:37.6. So far this season, Horne has been a member of the V8 for each race. She was part of the ACC Crew of the Week after helping Duke win the Carolina Cup as the V8 captured its race. A team captain in 2017, Horne has the Blue Devils currently ranked No. 17 in the country.

Off the field, Horne has taken part in numerous service initiatives, including earning a Baldwin Scholars Program selection, mentoring first-year student-athletes through the Duke A.C.T.I.O.N. program, traveling to Cape Town, South Africa, with the ACE Civil-Engagement Service Learning Program and interning with the Duke University Medical Center. With the Baldwin Scholars Program, Horne was one of 18 women chosen in the fall of 2013 from Duke's class of 2017 for the female leadership program for personal and professional development. A member of the initial ACE class last summer, she directed sports camps and initiated projects to teach children at the local primary school about hygiene and health care.

Wilson, who will complete degrees in evolutionary anthropology and Spanish with a minor in psychology this spring, has been an active leader both on and off the track. He was selected by his teammates as a senior team captain and is a three-time ACC Academic Honor Roll member. He is a member of the outdoor school-record 4x400m relay and has posted relay times that rank on the Duke all-time list, including No.

3 4x400m indoor, No. 3 and No. 4 4x200m outdoor and No. 2 4x400m outdoor. Individually this season, Wilson currently ranks 19th in the ACC in the 400m hurdles.

In addition to his success with the Duke track & field team, Wilson has been an active member in various Duke programs, including Athlete Ally, One Love, PACT, A.C.T.I.O.N. and Reading with the Blue Devils. Wilson is an executive member of the Duke branch of the national organization Athlete Ally, with which he advocates equality in athletics, organizes meetings and campus events and encourages equality on and off the field. He also leads workshops with Duke Athletics, Durham High Schools and Duke Greek life as a One Love leader, fighting to end sexual assault and gender violence. As a PACT facilitator, Wilson works to address gender violence in athletics, what athletes can do to help prevent gender violence and how to be an active bystander for the better. As a first year A.C.T.I.O.N. mentor, Wilson teaches first-year student-athletes career networking, time management skills and various resources around campus. Wilson is an active volunteer with Reading with the Blue Devils as he reads to and encourages reading at Durham elementary schools.

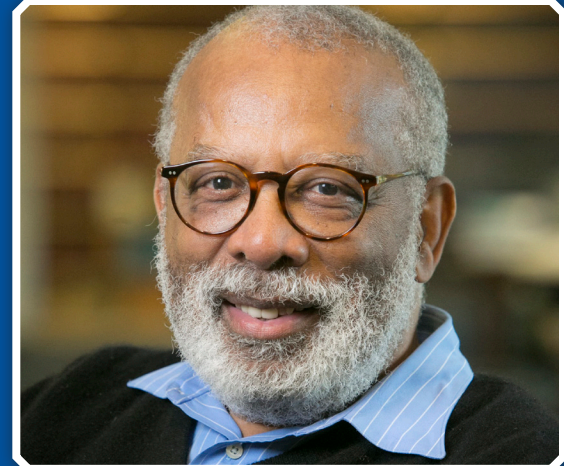

"At a top university or a top high school in this country, I think athletics is what rounds out the experience for the students and for the university. It allows people who are gifted athletically to work together, to be teammates, to perform at the very highest level, and I view it as the glue that holds the university community together. It's something that we can all embrace across the various disciplines in which we are involved as academics. It's something that makes us proud of our university and our students. And for the outside world, it's what they know about a university like Duke. They think Duke is an excellent university primarily because we have excellent athletic programs—particularly our basketball program—and they assume that the rest of the university is just as good and I think that's correct."



# ATTENDANCE

- The Duke Athletic Ticket Office implemented digital ticketing, including mobile ticketing, at Brooks Field at Wallace Wade Stadium for football and at Cameron Indoor Stadium for men's and women's basketball, resulting in better data, and updated ticket policies for all games.
- Duke Football increased the average attendance by 13 percent, ranking as the third highest attendance percentage increase in the nation among all Power 5 schools.
- Over 2,000 fans watched Duke men's lacrosse beat Virginia on Easter weekend. Spearheaded by Duke Marketing Department's efforts, men's lacrosse donated a record \$15,000 to the Lead the Way Foundation as part of the halftime silent auction featuring their game-worn camo helmets.
- The marketing office created a Throwback Thursday series with women's basketball that resulted in the three highest student crowds in the past five seasons. They also increased Inferno student spirit group membership by over 68 percent, engaging more Duke students than ever before.



## ▶ THE CAMERON SELLOUT STREAK

- Duke men's basketball has sold out Cameron Indoor Stadium for every home game since Nov. 16, 1990 for a streak of 422 consecutive sellouts.
- Cameron Indoor Stadium has seen the Duke men post a 385-37 record during the sellout streak, including nine unbeaten seasons at home and a school-record home court win streak of 46 games from 1997-2000.
- Duke is 862-158 all-time in Cameron Indoor Stadium, including a 504-63 record under Coach K. The Blue Devils are 125-8 at home since the start of the 2009-10 season.



# COMMUNITY SERVICE

## ► DUKE ATHLETICS IN THE COMMUNITY

- Modeling the NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills program commitment to service learning projects and outreach, over 500 Duke student-athletes participated in approximately 2,000 hours of community service and leadership across various organizations in the Duke and Durham community during the 2016-17 academic year.
- Five Duke student-athletes and the entire Duke athletic department were honored by the ACC with the Top Six for Service Award.
- Duke student-athletes partnered with neighboring colleges for several projects, including the MLK Million Meals Event with NC Central University.
- Duke also partnered with several City of Durham organizations to work on projects such as Durham Public Schools, Durham Parks & Recreation, Urban Ministries of Durham, MLK Million Meals and In Service of Others Program (ISOO).

## ► READ WITH THE BLUE DEVILS

The Read With The Blue Devils program is intended to aid area teachers by providing reading incentives for third and fourth graders in Durham. By reading for 15 minutes for 12 nights, a youngster is able to reach various levels and earn Blue Devil gifts along the way. Among the prizes given out are autographed team photos, posters, t-shirts and chances to meet Duke student-athletes at various functions.

Duke student-athletes also visit local schools to read to groups of students and encourage their love of reading. **The goals of the Read With The Blue Devils program are to:**

- Show children that reading can be fun
- Provide incentives to get children to learn goal-setting skills, attain levels of achievement and improve reading skills and habits
- Reach teachers and parents to provide support to kids by encouraging reading



## COMPLIANCE

- Duke University is committed to operating all aspects of its Department of Athletics with integrity and in a manner that is consistent with the letter and spirit of NCAA, ACC, and University rules and regulations. The Office of Compliance is tasked with ensuring institutional control through coordination, monitoring, and verifying compliance. This includes education of Department of Athletics personnel and appropriate institutional faculty and staff regarding NCAA, ACC, and University policies and procedures.
- The Office of Compliance maintains an open-door policy and fields questions from coaches, athletics department personnel, student-athletes, boosters, and members of the community at-large. The Office of Compliance is dedicated to institutional control by providing educational programs and interpretive support to ensure that all coaches, staff, student-athletes, and other individuals involved with the athletics program understand and adhere to the NCAA, ACC, and University's compliance expectations.
- The Office of Compliance has implemented monitoring procedures and educational programs that provide guidance on how the Department of Athletics can operate within the rules and expectations of the NCAA, ACC, and University. Each individual within the Department of Athletics is obligated to maintain competency in knowledge of rules, to act within his or her realms of responsibility while maintaining full compliance with the rules, and to report any information concerning possible violations of NCAA and ACC legislation or institutional policy to his/her supervisor, the Office of Compliance, or other senior administrative staff, including the Faculty Athletics Representative, in a prompt manner.

The Duke Athletics department is founded on integrity. Through a combination of communication, education, and consistent monitoring, the Office of Athletics Compliance is committed to ensuring that all those involved with Duke Athletics uphold the rules of the NCAA, the ACC and the University.



## EXTERNAL AFFAIRS

### ► BLUE DEVIL NETWORK

- Featured live and on demand videos and audio content from all 27 Duke varsity sports.
- Opened its brand new 3,500 square foot production facility in Blue Devil Tower, including three control rooms, a studio, and offices/edit suites.
- Produced close to 200 live events, including the Duke vs. Marist men's basketball game that was the top school-produced event among all winter events, ranking 42nd overall with 82,000 unique views. The next school-produced event on the list ranked 79th with 51,000 unique views.
- Also produced the Duke vs. South Carolina women's basketball game that was the third highest school-produced event during the women's basketball season and the Duke vs. North Carolina wrestling match that was the fourth highest viewed ACC wrestling regular season event in 2016-17.
- Produced two pieces that were selected as finalists for the Sports Video Group College Sports Media Awards.
- Duke was involved in seven of the top eight most watched ACC basketball games on ACCN Extra.
- Successfully managed all video board operations for Duke home games at Cameron Indoor Stadium, Wallace Wade Stadium, Durham Bulls Athletic Park, Koskinen Stadium & Morris Williams Track.

### ► DIGITAL MEDIA

- Successfully negotiated a new five-year contract with NeuLion to host and develop the official Duke Athletics website and mobile apps. For the first time, this contract includes OTT (over-the-top) apps (Roku and Apple TV), free smartphone apps for iPhone and Android, custom development hours, email marketing, and guaranteed web accessibility compliance.
- Partnered with Emma on an email marketing solution to allow Iron Dukes to transition to paperless communication for the 2016-17 year.
- Transitioned paid smartphone apps to free versions. Mobile GoDuke.com traffic now exceeds desktop traffic.

- After signing on as an original partner with IMG Learfield Ticket Solutions in 2011, entered the fifth year of its contract. The agreement allowed for an active outbound season and group tickets program for football and women's basketball to supplement the ticket office, which is primarily responsible for sales, operations, and distribution, as well as all men's basketball ticketing.
- Named David Shumate as Director of Broadcasting for the Blue Devil IMG Sports Network. Shumate will serve as the play-by-play voice for Duke football and men's basketball, replacing Hall of Fame broadcaster Bob Harris.
- Former All-ACC offensive guard Dave Harding transitioned from the sideline to the broadcast booth as the lead analyst for Duke football on the Blue Devil IMG Sports Network.



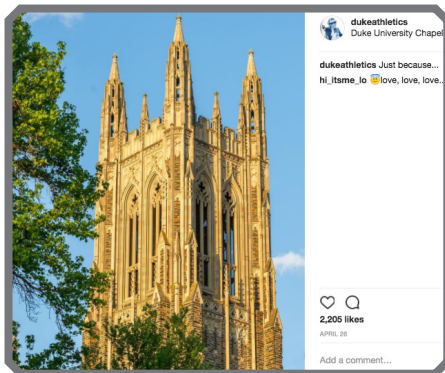

### ► ANNUAL FUND

Annual gifts to the Iron Dukes Annual Fund afford outstanding student-athletes the opportunity to pursue a Duke education while competing at the highest level. With a single scholarship valued at more than \$74,000, Duke Athletics' expenditures add up quickly.

### ► VARSITY CLUB

- Annual gifts to the Iron Dukes Varsity Club go directly to work for our 27 varsity sports. These gifts allow Duke coaches to provide resources that are not traditionally covered in the annual budget. Varsity Club gifts help recruit and retain the best coaches, provide nutrition and recovery foods now allowable under NCAA guidelines, supplement in season and post season travel, purchase training and player development equipment and accomplish individual team projects. To be sure, Varsity Club gifts help us to enhance the Duke student-athlete experience and build champions.

### ► CAPITAL PROJECTS & ENDOWMENTS

- To continue the quest for excellence both in the classroom and in competition, Duke must enhance facilities to meet or exceed the modern standards of an elite athletics program without compromising our history and tradition. Philanthropic gifts above and beyond Iron Dukes Annual Fund support makes these facilities possible. Endowment level gifts provide Duke student-athletes with benefits resulting from the perpetuity of the gift. These gifts ranging from \$50,000-\$5,000,000+ provide long term sustainability for our athletic programs by funding scholarships and providing additional operating support.



### ► HERITAGE SOCIETY

- The Iron Dukes Heritage Society honors alumni and friends who have included Duke Athletics in their estate plans or have made some other type of planned gift to Duke Athletics. Members are invited to recognition events and are counted among the university's most valued supporters.

### ► YOUNG IRON DUKES & JUNIOR IRON DUKES

- For \$50, young adults ninth grade to 22 years old can enroll as Young Iron Dukes. For \$30, children 8th grade and younger will be enrolled as members of the Junior Iron Dukes. All Young Iron Dukes and Junior Iron Dukes members earn Iron Dukes priority points.

### ► LEGACY FUND

- The Duke Basketball Legacy Fund is a unique and intimate donor program established to endow the basketball program as well as finance basketball related projects. The Legacy Fund aims to establish a comprehensive endowment fund for players' scholarships and coaches' salaries, as well as building a capital fund to help enhance historic Cameron Indoor Stadium and meet the overall demands of the program well into the future.

## RECREATION & PHYSICAL EDUCATION

- Duke Recreation & Physical Education offers a wide range of programs that encourage healthy lifestyles through education and recreation.
- Daily operations include a diverse selection of activity and lecture P.E. courses as well as aquatics, group fitness, personal training, outdoor adventures, intramurals and sport clubs.
- The Special Events/Marketing group redesigned and launched a new department website and created two new special events: Amazing Race and Devils After Dark Fun Run.
- The department's outdoor adventures group supported a non-profit program run by a Duke alum called Girls on Outdoor Adventures for Leadership and Science by providing backpacking equipment to underserved teens in the Triangle for a summer trip to the Smoky Mountains.



### ► BY THE NUMBERS

- Nearly 1,300 students participated in 36 sports clubs, 23 of which qualified for regional/national competition and nine organized travel to Germany, Hungary, Puerto Rico, California, Montana and Florida.
- Outdoor adventures had 4,917 participants and 3,763 at the Rock Climbing Wall.
- 42,324 Group Fitness class participations, including 2,177 personal training sessions.
- 384,500 entries into the Wilson Recreation Center and 176,485 into the Brodie Recreation Center.



## SPORTS MEDICINE

### ► DUKE SPORTS SCIENCE INSTITUTE

- Located on the center for living campus, the Duke Sports Science Institute has been a national leader in the treatment of athletic injuries and the health care provider for Duke Athletics. Under the leadership of Dr. Claude T. Moorman III, the Duke Sports Science Institute continues to provide the highest standard of health care.

### ► ATHLETIC MEDICINE

- The Athletic Medicine Division is an integral part of the health care team and the staff of primary care team physicians, orthopedic team physicians, specialty consultants, 16 certified/licensed athletic trainers and four physical therapists provides a unique service, which is essential to the quality health care of varsity athletes at Duke. The staff will serve as an advocate for the student athlete when the athlete's health is an issue.
- The Philosophy of the Athletic Medicine Division is a commitment to athlete care with a focus on balancing injury with career athletic goals through relationships, communication and trust.
- Each individual should receive a thorough assessment of his/her problems by each staff member involved in his/her care. Each athlete should have a plan of care, which is coordinated by the physicians and meets the patient's needs. Each patient should be informed about his/her plan of care and should be involved in achieving his/her recovery of function returning to full health and activities. Each athlete should be encouraged to be responsible for his/her own health and care. Each encounter with one of the Athletic Medicine Training staff provides an opportunity for educating the athlete about health and care.





## SPORTS PERFORMANCE

- Duke Sports Performance aims to provide all 27 Duke Athletics teams with a competitive edge by empowering each athlete to achieve personal and athletic success through high-level, challenging sports performance plans.
- Olympic Sports Performance opened its operation in the Scott Family Athletic Performance Center August 1, 2016. This state-of-the-art facility features 13,000 square feet of training space for Duke's 24 Olympic Sports programs, including 35 training stations custom-designed by Sorinex Exercise Equipment specifically for Duke, each with mounted iPads for workout-monitoring and real-time video review of movement training. The facility houses a 50-yard-long, turf-covered running space, a Gatorade Fuel Bar with smoothie stations, fresh produce and yogurt, healthy snacks, a wide variety of grab-and-go items and all of Gatorade's pre and post-workout fueling products, as well as a Keiser performance area and a variety of additional training equipment from the top brands in the industry, including Iron Grip, Woodway, FreeLap and Run Rocket.
- The Scott Family Athletic Performance Center houses facilities for all Duke Olympic sports, while the Yoh Building services the Duke football team and the Michael Krzyzewski Center for Academic and Athletic Excellence is the training home of the men's and women's basketball teams. All are state-of-the-art facilities that feature top-of-the-line equipment.
- The Duke football team had its performance center in the Yoh Building renovated. Updates to the room included new flooring by Plae, as well as platforms that are set into the floor instead of being elevated. New weight racks were installed by Sorinex Exercise Equipment. The Gatorade Fuel Bar, which was installed in 2015, remains and enables players to make their own shakes with protein, fresh fruit and yogurt that help keep them nourished and aid in recovery following practice and weight training.





# STUDENT-ATHLETE DEVELOPMENT



- The student-athlete development program at Duke complements the University and Athletics Departments' commitment to excellence by enhancing interpersonal relationships in the lives of student-athletes, empowering student-athletes to make meaningful contributions to their communities, promoting respect for and appreciation of diversity and encouraging the development of leadership skills.
- Student-athlete development works to provide student-athletes with opportunities for personal growth, professional preparation and development, and involvement in community service.
- Programs supported by Student-Athlete Development include:
  - Personal Development
  - Community Service
  - Career Development
  - Leadership
  - Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC)
- The Rubenstein-Bing Student-Athlete Civic Engagement (ACE) Program is in its second year. This year 20 Duke students-athletes selected had their choice between four international sites - Vietnam, India, China or South Africa. The program provides one-time funding for student-athletes to engage in a three-week international service project. Ten teams from Duke Athletics will be represented in this year's edition of the ACE Program.
- During the 2016-17 Academic Calendar, over 120 sophomores, juniors and seniors participated in the inaugural semi-annual Leadership, Enrichment and Development program. Duke Athletics hosted the two-night leadership retreat in Climax, N.C. The program is focused on helping leadership groups of each team explore and understand their leadership potential.

## ▶ SEASON RECAP

Duke finished the season with a 30-28 (12-18 ACC) overall record, marking the program's fourth straight 30-win campaign. With wins over No. 14 Clemson and No. 10 Virginia, the Blue Devils earned a spot in the ACC Championship semifinals. Sophomore outfielder Griffin Conine earned second team All-ACC honors after leading the Blue Devils in slugging percentage, on base percentage, RBI, home runs, total bases and walks. The first Blue Devil with 50-plus RBI in a season since 2009 and the first Blue Devil with double digit homers in a season since 2010, Conine was selected to the 2017 College Home Run Derby in Omaha, Neb. July 1. Duke had three players selected in the 2017 Major League Baseball Draft in junior first baseman Justin Bellinger (Cincinnati Reds), redshirt junior pitcher James Ziemba (Los Angeles Angels) and sophomore outfielder Jimmy Herron (New York Yankees).

## ► SEASON RECAP

Duke finished 28-9 in 2016-17, becoming one of three schools nationally to reach the 25-win mark in each of the last 10 seasons. The Blue Devils made history at the ACC Tournament in Brooklyn as the first team to win four games in as many days to capture the championship, defeating three consecutive ranked teams along the way. The automatic bid earned in Brooklyn was Duke's 22nd consecutive NCAA Tournament berth and its NCAA-record 33rd under head coach Mike Krzyzewski. Luke Kennard earned consensus second-team All-America honors and was the only unanimous first-team All-ACC selection after leading the team with an average 19.5 points per game and shooting .438 from outside the arc. Kennard was also the MVP of the ACC Tournament, during which he averaged 20.0 points per contest. Three Duke players - Grayson Allen, Amile Jefferson and Kennard - all reached the 1,000-point milestone for their careers during the 2016-17 season, giving the Blue Devils three 1,000-point scorers on the same team for the first time since 2010.

## ► SEASON RECAP

The women's basketball team moved back into the national spotlight in 2016-17 as the Blue Devils collected a 28-6 overall record and advanced to the NCAA Tournament second round. Duke totaled a 13-3 mark in the ACC, which tied for second. ### ► SEASON RECAP

The Duke fencing team placed ninth at the 2017 NCAA Championships, marking the seventh time in the past eight seasons that the Blue Devils have placed in the top 10. Duke sent a program-best eight athletes to the NCAA Championships. ## ► SEASON RECAP

The Duke football team turned in a 4-8 record and 1-7 ACC mark while playing its best football in the second half of the season and capturing two of the most exciting wins in program history. Despite trailing 14-0 in the first quarter, the Blue Devils registered a 38-35 victory at Notre Dame as freshman AJ Reed kicked a game-winning 19-yard field goal with 1:24 left in the game. Two months later, Duke held off No. 15 North Carolina 28-27 to return the Victory Bell to Durham. With the win against the 15th-ranked Tar Heels, Duke has recorded at least one victory against a ranked opponent for four consecutive years, a first for the program since 1955-60. Duke also tallied its first win against a team ranked No. 15 or higher since downing No. 13 Virginia 28-25 on November 5, 1994. Redshirt freshman Daniel Jones established 12 Duke freshman single-season passing records while earning four ACC Freshman of the Week accolades. Redshirt senior defensive tackle A.J. Wolf repeated as a CoSIDA First Team Academic All-America selection, giving Duke a first team representative for four straight years, the longest streak in the country.

## ► SEASON RECAP

The women's golf team turned in yet another outstanding season in 2016-17 winning three tournaments. ## ► SEASON RECAP

Featuring a young and inexperienced squad, Duke got off to a 2-2 start in 2017 before finishing the year 13-5 and advancing to the NCAA quarterfinals.

Head coach John Danowski made history in 2017, becoming Division I men's lacrosse wins leader. The three-time NCAA Champion coach picked up his 375th win in a 15-7 victory over No. 12 Loyola to tie the record and scored his 376th victory two days later against Jacksonville. He is on pace to become the first Division I head coach to 400 wins.

Justin Guterding spearheaded the offense with 97 points. He became the fifth different player in ACC history to lead the conference in goals (51), assists (46) and points (97). His 97 points are tied for second at Duke with Matt Danowski, while his 51 goals and 46 assists also rank in the top 10 in Duke single season history.

Guterding garnered All-America second team honors, while Brad Smith and Cade Van Raaphorst picked up third team accolades. Jack Bruckner, Danny Fowler, Kyle Rowe and Tommy Zenker were honorable mention.

Prior to her time at Fairfield, Valentino was a four-year letterwinner with the Hofstra University softball team as a designated player, infielder and catcher and was a part of the two winningest seasons in program history (45 wins in both 2008 & 2010). Valentino started 84 games over her final two seasons, helped NFCA All-America pitcher Olivia Galati establish school single-season records for wins (29), shutouts (17) and strikeouts (348) and capped her career by earning a spot on the NFCA Scholar-Athlete Team and garnering the Hofstra University Outstanding Senior Athlete award.

## ► WALDROP JOINS STAFF

The 2014 USA Softball Collegiate Player of the Year while at Florida State, Lacey Waldrop joined the Duke softball program as an assistant coach in July.

Waldrop recently finished a stint as a graduate student manager at Oklahoma, which won the 2017 Women's College World Series with a two-game sweep of Florida.

Waldrop played for the Seminoles from 2012-15 and was a three-time All-American, three-time All-ACC First Team honoree and twice named the ACC Pitcher of the Year. She was chosen No. 3 overall in the 2015 NPF Draft by the Chicago Bandits, for whom she has played the past three seasons.

The Chester, Va., product graduated from Florida State with a editing, writing and media major.

## ► SEASON RECAP

Duke returned to the NCAA Team Championship after missing the event in 2016 and finished 2017 with a 16-10 record. The Blue Devils reversed their ACC record from the year before, going 8-4 after posting a 4-8 ledger in 2016. Duke had one representative in the NCAA Doubles Tournament, with freshmen Nick Stachowiak and Spencer Furman earning one of 20 at-large bids. Furman (77), sophomore Catalin Mateas (106) and junior Nicolas Alvarez (58) finished as the squad's ranked players in the Oracle/Intercollegiate Tennis Association slate while Furman and Stachowiak stood 23rd in the doubles ledger. Furman (second team), Mateas (third team) and senior TJ Pura (third team) were named to the All-ACC Teams for the first time in their careers. Pura, who was also the ITA Carolina Regional Most Improved Player, finished the ACC season with an 11-0 record, setting the program mark for consecutive ACC wins in a year and tying the record for most ACC victories in a single season. Stachowiak was tabbed the team's Charles Hamilton Hargrave Most Valuable Player after leading the Blue Devils in singles (32) and doubles (27) victories. Head coach Ramsey Smith became the third Duke coach to reach 175 career victories.

## ► SEASON RECAP

The Blue Devils advanced to the NCAA Team Championship Round of 16 for the sixth time in the past eight seasons. Duke compiled a 22-6 ledger and went 13-1 in ACC matches to claim a share of the regular season title. The squad went 14-0 at home, tying the 2012 squad for the most home victories in a season. There were a host of memorable performances for the Duke wrestling team throughout the 2016-17 season with Jacob Kasper's run to All-America honors serving as the highlight. The Blue Devils finished the year with a 4-9 record, which included a trio of narrow setbacks. Seniors Jake Faust and Connor Bass went out in style as they qualified for the NCAA Championships. Faust battled through tough injuries during the year and gritted his way to one of the four bids at 157 pounds, while Bass landed on the podium at the ACC Championships with a third-place showing at 174 pounds. Kasper, the ACC runner-up at heavyweight, had a memorable year in going from unranked to becoming Duke's third wrestling All-American in program history with a sixth-place finish at the NCAA Championships.
