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PANDEMIC DISRUPTS CAMPUS LIFE

The COVID-19 pandemic began by canceling the ACC Men's Basketball Tournament in March, and its effects will be felt for quite some time

TIMELINE

- **December 31, 2019** -- Duke sends international travel notice via email to several Duke officials advising that health authorities were closely monitoring 27 cases of a mysterious pneumonia-like illness in Wuhan, China, that may be of viral origin.
- **January 21, 2020** -- Duke posts its first story on Duke Today about the novel coronavirus that had begun to spread in China and other countries, including the first case in the United States from a Washington State man who had returned from travel to Wuhan.
- **January 22, 2020** -- Duke convenes a Coronavirus Committee, a subset of the University's Emergency Management Committee. The following day, Duke issued its first campus-wide message advising anyone returning from China with a fever, a cough and shortness of breath to seek medical care immediately.
- **January 26, 2020** -- Duke announces the suspension of all classes and programs at Duke Kunshan University (DKU) in China, which also serves as an academic partner for Wuhan University.
- **February 7, 2020** -- Duke begins daily leadership briefings for President Vincent Price and members of the senior administration.
- **February 27, 2020** -- East House, a residence hall on East Campus, identified a location where it could safely isolate those who may have a potential exposure or symptoms related to COVID-19.
- **March 7, 2020** -- Duke hosts North Carolina in men's basketball in front of a capacity crowd at Cameron Indoor Stadium. For the game, precautions were taken to alert fans to wash hands, while increasing the presence of hand-sanitizer stations in and around the facility.
- **March 10, 2020** -- Duke announces an extension of spring break for a week and suspends all on-site classes for the rest of the semester. The expanded week for spring break allowed faculty and the Office of Information Technology to prepare to transition classes to a virtual delivery model.
- **March 12, 2020** -- Duke announces the suspension of all athletic activities, which covered all sports, all competitions and all practices. The ACC Men's Basketball Tournament was canceled on the same day that the World Health Organization later declared COVID-19 a pandemic. The next day, the NCAA also canceled all winter and spring championships, including March Madness.
- **March 16, 2020** -- Duke announces that all faculty and staff who can work remotely or are not needed on-site to support critical operations should stay home. The following day, Duke logged 20,500 meeting participants on Zoom as people engaged in new ways to connect remotely.
- **March 20, 2020** -- Duke Athletics begins weekly briefings with senior administration and head coaches.
- **March 27, 2020** -- Duke Athletics holds first virtual press conference as sophomore men's basketball player Tre Jones met with the media via Zoom to discuss the abrupt end to the season and the pandemic. A number of other press conferences were conducted via Zoom over the summer months.
- **April 24, 2020** -- Duke Athletics establishes internal planning committees charged with formulating a COVID-19 Continuity Plan for the department, focused on the creation of guidelines and practices for resumption and recovery. Planning committees are focused on Employee Operations, Sport Program Operations, Event Operations, Innovation, and Financial Planning.
- **May 1, 2020** -- Duke Athletics hosts a department-wide Town Hall to review vision and direction of Duke Athletics internal planning committees in the creation of the Duke Athletics COVID-19 Continuity Plan and steps along the path to a return to work and play.
- **May 29, 2020** -- Duke University announced changes to the 2020-21 academic calendar with fall classes beginning a week earlier, the spring semester beginning a week later and Commencement for the Class of 2021 on May 9.
- **June 29, 2020** -- Duke Athletics employees return to on-campus work to begin Duke Athletics Return to Work.
- **June 30, 2020** -- President Vincent Price updated the Duke community on safety and health plans for the fall semester, reporting that Duke would continue on the path to resuming residential activity and outlining the changes in student and campus life that will enable students to safely return to classes on campus.



DUKE DOCTOR NAMED CHAIR OF ACC'S COVID-19 ADVISORY GROUP

- The Atlantic Coast Conference announced its COVID-19 Medical Advisory Group that includes one representative from each of its 15 institutions. The Medical Advisory Group's charge is to provide timely updates on the status of, and forecast for, COVID-19 impacts on the higher education community. Its advice will assist with the league's discussions surrounding return-to-play options.
- The ACC's Medical Advisory Group is chaired by Dr. Cameron Wolfe who is a member of the infectious disease division at Duke University Medical Center and is an associate professor of medicine. The full Medical Advisory Group will meet on a regular basis, and Dr. Wolfe will also participate in regular calls with other Autonomy 5 conference medical chairs.

DANOWSKI, DALE HOST VIRTUAL COACHING CLINICS

- Led by Duke men's lacrosse head coach John Danowski and Director of Sports Psychology and Leadership Greg Dale
- The popular weekly clinics were held via Zoom and open to all coaches from all levels of sports
- Clinics discussed all things coaching and applicable for coaches, parents, and athletes
- Branched out to bring on special guest coaches from both Duke and other athletic programs

- Thirty-three Blue Devils garnered All-America honors during the 2019-20 sports season.
- Duke swimmer Max St. George was awarded a Fulbright Scholarship. A 2019 graduate, St. George will be using the scholarship to take the opportunity to teach English in Malaysia as part of the English Teaching Assistant Program.
- Duke placed an ACC-record 572 student-athletes on the 2019-20 ACC Academic Honor Roll. Duke has paced the conference in ACC Honor Roll selections in 32 of the past 33 years. Among the 572 were five five-time ACC Honor Roll selections -- Quentin Harris (football), Kyra Lambert (women's basketball), Sammi Steele (field hockey), Turner Uppgren (men's lacrosse) and Sheridan Wilbur (track & field). The Honor Roll is comprised of varsity student-athletes who registered a grade point average of 3.0 or better for the full academic year.
- A total of 15 Duke teams achieved a 100 percent GSR: men's basketball, women's cross country/track & field, men's fencing, women's fencing, field hockey, men's golf, women's golf, women's lacrosse, rowing, men's soccer, women's soccer, men's swimming and diving, men's tennis, women's tennis, and volleyball.
- Nationally, the Duke football program ranked second among FBS schools with its 96 percent rate behind only Northwestern (100). Within the ACC, Duke's 96 percent rate was the highest and one of two schools in the 90 percent range.
- Ten of Duke's athletic programs were honored with NCAA Public Recognition Awards for finishing among the top 10 percent of their respective sports based on the most recent multiyear Academic Performance Rate (APR) - men's golf, men's lacrosse, men's soccer, women's cross country, women's fencing, women's soccer, women's swimming and diving, women's tennis, women's track and field and volleyball. Nine of those teams - men's golf, men's soccer, women's cross country, women's fencing, women's soccer, women's swimming and diving, women's tennis, women's track and field and volleyball - registered a perfect score of 1000.
- In men's basketball, Duke tied for the national lead with its 100 percent GSR rate.
- Blue Devils pitcher Bryce Jarvis was drafted 18th by the Arizona Diamondbacks in the first round of the 2020 Major League Baseball First Year Player Draft. As the 18th pick, he became the highest selection in Duke baseball history.
- Seven Blue Devils were named CoSIDA Academic All-Americans - Jaravee Boonchant (women's golf), Chandler Eaton (men's golf), Eoin Gronningsater (men's fencing), Nathaniel Hernandez (men's swimming and diving), Bryce Jarvis (baseball), Daniele Proch (men's soccer) and Michael Rothenberg (baseball).
- Duke had five student-athletes garner postgraduate scholarships. Brittany Aveni, Eoin Gronningsater, Nathaniel Hernandez and Daniele Proch each were named Weaver-James-Corrigan Award recipients. Gronningsater, the ACC Fencing Scholar Athlete of the Year, also was one of 21 male student-athletes in the country to earn an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship.
- Two Blue Devils - Alyssa Marsh (women's swimming and diving) and Meible Chi (women's tennis) were among the nominees for the 2020 NCAA Woman of the Year Award.
- Senior Cassie Martin and junior Erin Marsh captured ACC Indoor Track and Field titles in the high jump and pentathlon, respectively, at the 2020 ACC Indoor Championship. Marsh's 4,186 points rank second all-time at Duke.
- In the latest Princeton Review, Duke ranked 12th on the Best Career Placement list. The US News and World Report placed Duke 10th among all national universities and No. 8 on its Best Value Schools list. College Consensus ranked Duke No. 8 among all universities and tabbed it the best alumni networks, Duke placed No. 8. The rankings were originally formed from the Council for Advancement and Support of Education (CASE) Circle of Excellence Awards, which recognized alumni association staffs. The CASE awards provided a baseline. The rankings were then placed in order of Consensus Score, which brought together published reviews from experts and real student reviews.
- After 30 seasons on the coaching staff at Duke University, Director of Track & Field Norm Ogilvie announced his retirement, effective in July. Ogilvie had served as the Head Coach of the men's cross-country and track & field teams for the past 20 years, and had directed the track & field program since 2003. - On July 13, 2020, Kara Lawson was officially introduced as the fifth Duke women's basketball head coach. Lawson, who enjoyed an All-American career at the University of Tennessee, came to Duke after serving as an assistant coach for one season with the Boston Celtics -- the first female assistant in franchise history.

JACKI SILAR RETIRES; CLOSES 40-YEAR DUKE CAREER

Following four decades of exemplary service as both a coach and administrator at Duke University, Jacki Silar retired from her position as Senior Associate Director of Athletics on June 30, 2020.

"I am grateful and thankful for the opportunity to be a part of Duke University, specifically, the athletics department," said Silar. "Each day, I strived for excellence for our student-athletes both in the classroom and on the playing field. I loved supporting and working with the best of the best - our student-athletes, coaches and staff.

"I want to thank Duke University, former head women's basketball coach Debbie Leonard, who hired me to be her assistant coach to start my career here, as well as the three athletic directors with whom I had the privilege of working with - Tom Butters, Joe Alleva and Kevin White. Duke University will always have a special place in my heart, and I look forward to cheering on the Blue Devils. Go Duke!"

Silar is the lone Senior Woman Administrator in Duke Athletics history, holding the post since its inception in 1995. She will be preceded by Heather Ryan, whose promotion to Associate Director of Athletics/Academic Services & Senior Woman Administrator was announced in June.

"To be sure, no one has represented the welfare of Duke University's student-athletes, coaches and staff in a more profound and supportive manner than Jacki Silar," said White. "In addition to being a pioneer in women's college athletics administration, her name is synonymous with excellence in leadership. Jacki has been a cornerstone of success within Duke Athletics and will be greatly missed, but we commend her on an exceptional career and wish her well in retirement."

Upon her arrival at Duke on September 1, 1979, Silar served as an assistant women's basketball coach for 14 seasons alongside Leonard. Silar helped the Blue Devils to their first NCAA Tournament berth in 1987 and, one season later, mentored the program's first All-America selection, Chris Moreland.

Silar also spent 15 seasons (1981-95) as Duke's head field hockey coach. She earned ACC Coach of the Year honors twice (1990 & 1992), led the Blue Devils to the program's first NCAA Tournament appearance (1992) and continues to be the program's all-time leader in coaching victories (162).

Following her transition into athletics administration, Silar served Duke, the Atlantic Coast Conference and the NCAA in a variety of capacities, most notably as the primary sport supervisor for many Blue Devil programs. Most recently, she has spearheaded Duke's student-athlete development division along with leadership programming.

In addition to working alongside Butters, Alleva and White, she served in an administrative capacity with 24 head coaches.

As an administrator, Silar has been a part of eight NCAA championship teams with the women's golf (1999, 2002, 2005, 2006, 2007, 2014 & 2019) and women's tennis (2009) programs.

Silar's vast service on conference and national committees is headlined by stints on the NCAA Division I Field Hockey Committee and the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Committee. She served as the Chair of the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Committee in 2008-09.

In addition to her athletics department duties, Silar has worked as an academic advisor for first year and sophomore students, taught in the department of Physical Education and served Duke on a variety of committees including the Harassment Grievance Board, Equity Committee, President's Commission on the Status of Women, Campus Culture Initiative Steering Committee and Sexual Misconduct Task Force.

A native of Pottstown, Pa., Silar played both basketball and field hockey at High Point College before graduating in 1974. She went on to earn a master's degree in education from the University of North Carolina, where she was an assistant field hockey coach.

NINA KING NAMED CHAIR OF 2020-21 WOMEN'S BASKETBALL SELECTION COMMITTEE

Nina King, Duke's Senior Deputy Director of Athletics for Administration/Legal Affairs and Chief of Staff, served as vice chair of the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball committee for the 2019-20 campaign and will assume chair duties in 2020-21.

As chair, King will oversee the 10-member committee responsible for selecting the 32 best at-large teams for the 2021 NCAA Women's Basketball Championship and seeding the 64-team field that will be vying for a national championship.

Vice President and Director of Athletics Kevin White completed his five years on the Division I Men's Basketball Committee as the chairman of the committee last season.



DUKE CONTINUES ZERO WASTE INITIATIVE; ACHIEVES 80% DIVERSION RATE IN 2019

Duke Athletics reached its highest single-season percentage with an 80 percent diversion rate during its season-long Zero Waste initiative for home football games.

Zero Waste is achieved when 90 percent of waste is diverted from landfill.

For the season, a total of 52,703 pounds of waste were collected with 20 percent (10,669 pounds) transported to landfill. The remaining waste was diverted through composting and recycling efforts. The Blue Devils achieved an average of 80 percent diversion during the 2019 season, including five games with greater than 80 percent.

Duke registered a season-best Zero Waste game on Oct. 5, 2019 against Pittsburgh when 6,706 pounds of waste were collected and only 909 pounds went to landfill for a 86 percent diversion rate.

The goal is to continue the zero-waste success that began during the 2014 season. The program, which is organized by Athletics Facilities, Game Operations and Championships, and supported by Sustainable Duke and Duke Facilities Management, has led to more than 83,500 pounds composted and more than 194,000 pounds recycled during home events.

The Zero Waste Game Day initiative began in 2014 with the athletic department teaming with Liza Schillo, a graduate student attending the Nicholas School for the Environment at Duke, Arwen Buchholz from Duke Sanitation and Recycling and Tavey Capps from Duke Sustainability. With Buchholz, Capps and Schillo's assistance, a plan was formulated to divert waste generated in the stadium away from the landfill through recycling, composting and source reduction.

DUKE LANDSCAPE SERVICES TEAM HONORED

Koskinen Stadium Named Sporting Grounds of the Year



The landscape services team, spearheaded by Superintendent of Sports Fields and Grounds Scott Thompson, recently was recognized for its work on the playing surface of Koskinen Stadium. The crew was awarded the 2019 Sporting Grounds of the Year from the SportsTurf Managers Association.

The field at Koskinen Stadium, home to the Duke men and women's soccer and lacrosse programs, underwent significant improvements over the summer to make it one of the premier playing surfaces in the country.

"In my 19 years at Duke University I have never had more comments on the great condition of our playing surface than during this past season," said women's soccer head coach Robbie Church. "One of the visiting teams even pulled me aside and asked if they could play all of their games on the surface. It is a testament to work put in by the landscape services team over the summer. Truly first class and we are grateful."

Among the improvements made were the removal of four inches of sand to increase drainage and adding in 600 feet of drainage installed by the Landscape Services team. The group worked for over 1,000 hours on the improvements and the work is deeply appreciated by the coaching staffs and student-athletes.

"When I looked at the playing field in Koskinen Stadium at the end of the spring, I was afraid that it would never be playable again without digging the whole thing up and starting from scratch," said Deputy Director of Athletics Chris Kennedy. "But the professionals on the landscape services crew have done an unbelievable job of, not only restoring the playing surface, but of addressing the drainage problems. And it didn't just happen—I was out there every day seeing how much hard, hard work went into this project. All the soccer and lacrosse coaches and players are profoundly grateful."

The Learfield IMG College Directors' Cup rankings were not compiled for the 2019-20 season as the NCAA winter and spring championships were canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic

SUMMARY

- "The Learfield IMG College Directors' Cup program is our premier institutional award, so fairness is essential when evaluating scores. With the cancellation of some winter and all spring championships, it did not seem just to award champions for the year based solely off the fall standings. While we are disappointed we will not be able to crown champions across the five divisions this year, we look forward to reinstating the Directors' Cup program for the next full athletics season," stated NACDA Chief Executive Officer Bob Vecchione.
- With 1,001.00 total points, the Blue Devils surpassed the 1,000-point plateau for the fifth time. Duke finished third among ACC schools in 2018-19, trailing only Florida State's 1,046.25 and Virginia's 1,037.50. Duke was the third-leading private institution behind Stanford and USC.
- The Learfield Directors' Cup was developed as a joint effort between the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) and *USA Today*. Points are awarded based on each institution's finish in NCAA Championships. Nineteen total teams can earn points for the final standings, four of which must be baseball, men's basketball, women's basketball and volleyball.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

SUMMARY

- The University's academic support oversight committee continued to review and discuss "best practices" for providing academic support to the student-athlete population while analyzing student-athlete data related to Independent Study registrations, course enrollment limits, course withdrawals, underloads, majors and grade point average.
- Seven Duke student-athletes - Jaravee Boonchant (women's golf), Chandler Eaton (men's golf), Eoin Gronningsater (men's fencing), Nathaniel Hernandez (men's swimming & diving), Bryce Jarvis (baseball), Daniele Proch (men's soccer) and Michael Rothenberg (baseball) - earned CoSIDA Academic All-America honors.
- Brittany Aveni (women's track & field), Eoin Gronningsater (men's fencing), Nathaniel Hernandez (men's swimming & diving) and Daniele Proch (men's soccer) received ACC Postgraduate Scholarship recognition.
- Eoin Gronningsater (men's fencing) earned an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship.
- 10 Duke varsity athletics programs were honored by the NCAA for placing among the top 10 percent in their respective sports nationally in the latest multi-year APR report. The Blue Devils' men's golf, men's lacrosse, men's soccer, women's cross country, women's fencing, women's soccer, women's swimming & diving, women's tennis, women's track & field and women's volleyball programs were among those listed by the NCAA. Duke's women's fencing and men's golf programs have earned the honor in all 15 years of the NCAA's academic program.
- Nine Duke University varsity athletics programs registered a perfect 1000 score in the most recent multi-year (2015-19) Academic Progress Report (APR) data. In all, Duke totaled the highest APR score among ACC institutions in 11 of the league's sports - men's golf (1000), men's lacrosse (998), men's soccer (1000), wrestling (991), women's cross country (1000), women's fencing (1000), women's soccer (1000), women's swimming & diving (1000), women's tennis (1000), women's track & field (1000), volleyball (1000).
- Duke made history in 2019-20 for the second year in a row, setting an ACC record with 572 ACC Academic Honor Roll selections. The Blue Devils have led the conference in honorees for 32 of the previous 33 years. The Honor Roll is comprised of varsity student-athletes who registered a grade point average of 3.0 or better for the full academic year.



HEIDRICK SCHOLARSHIPS AWARDED

Recent Duke student-athletes Araad Fisher and Nathaniel Hernandez were named recipients of the Heidrick Family Leadership Post Graduate Scholarships.

The Heidrick Family Leadership Post Graduate Scholarships were established through a generous gift by Bob Heidrick and his family. The recipients are chosen not only for what they have contributed to the leadership community within Duke Athletics but also by who they are as people, how they have grown in the area of leadership and how they have used their leadership development to enhance the community during their undergraduate career at Duke University.

The selection is viewed as an investment in the individual rather than on the athletic accomplishment of the individual. It is the investment in the excellence of his/her character, in the qualities of leadership possessed by the individual, commitment to others and the potential for service through outstanding leadership in the future.

Two Scholarships will be awarded in the amount \$10,000 each to two graduating Duke student-athletes. The funds are to be applied toward the continuation of their academic endeavors at the graduate or professional school level. Funds must be used within three years of each recipient's graduation from Duke University.

Fisher was one of the most dedicated members of the Duke wrestling team over his four seasons. A Durham, N.C., native, he did whatever was best for the team, including wrestling up a weight class his senior campaign to fill the empty spot at heavyweight. Fisher went 9-12 in his first two campaigns and 0-2 as a junior before competing at heavyweight in his final season. A regular on the Dean's List, Fisher also took part in the ACE program, traveling to South Africa in 2017. He graduated with a degree in political science.

A five-time CSCAA All-America selection, Hernandez enjoyed a storied career on the Duke diving boards. The Southlake, Texas native was a four-time NCAA qualifier, four-time ACC Diver of the Week and finished his career second all-time at Duke in all three diving events. Academically, Hernandez was a four-time All-ACC Academic and two-time First Team CSCAA Scholar All-America selection. In addition, he was an active member of ATHLETE ALLY, a three-year ACTION mentor for freshmen, a two-year SAAC representative and participated in the Rubenstein-Bing Student-Athlete Civic Engagement Program after his sophomore year.

Hernandez will make use of the scholarship as he continues his education while beginning a PhD program in Pharmacology at Duke in the fall.

Highlighted by biomechanical assessments, thorough evaluations, and manual therapies, every athlete will receive a compressive plan of care where they are educated and actively involved in their recovery.
- As an integral part of maintaining and improving the care we provide, we are committed to the continued professional growth of our staff by staying current in fields of research, technology, and pursuing continual education. We strive to enhance the student-athlete experience by returning athletes to play as quickly and safely as possible through values of respect, privacy, integrity, and diversity.

DUKE SPORTS SCIENCE INSTITUTE

- The James R. Urbaniak, MD, Sports Sciences Institute, located on the Center for Living campus, has been a national leader in the treatment of athletic injuries and the health care provider for Duke Athletics. Under the leadership of Chief Medical Officer Dr. Annunziato Amendola and Head Medical Team Physician Dr. Jeff Bytowski, the group of physicians at Duke Sports Science Institute continues to provide the highest standard of health care and meet the immediate needs of Blue Devil student-athletes.

ATHLETIC MEDICINE COMPREHENSIVE CARE

- The Duke Athletic Training Department offers an individualized multidisciplinary approach to care for each student-athlete on Duke's 21 varsity teams. BEHAVIORAL HEALTH MISSION STATEMENT

- The mission of the Duke Athletics Behavioral Health Department is to foster an environment that promotes mental wellness in sports, academics and life. In addition to providing direct care, we are committed to changing the conversation around mental health, eradicating the stigma, and helping student-athletes focus on mental health and wellness.

SERVICES OFFERED

- The Duke Athletics Behavioral Health Department meets with student-athletes in individual and group settings to provide support to their mental health. We work in conjunction with other support areas such as Athletic Medicine, Sports Nutrition, Sports Performance, Academics and Student Athlete Development to provide comprehensive, integrated care for the student athletes. We also consult with coaches and other Athletic Department staff, providing guidance and tools to support each other in addition to the student athletes.

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH DURING COVID-19

- During this unprecedented time, we have seen a greater emphasis on mental health not just for student-athletes, but for everyone. Some helpful reminders during this time include:
 - **CONNECT:** Get some actual Face (or Zoom) Time with a friend at least every other day. Tell each other one new thing that's happened (could be something you ate, watched, person you talked to, thing you read) since the last time you talked.
 - **SLEEP:** Solidify your sleep schedule; quantity, quality, and timing are the keys. While your sleep schedule may have been disrupted, it is essential to maintain a schedule during this time to aid in overall wellness.
 - **STAY IN THE NOW:** Uncertainty has been the name of the game for the last few months. And, we're still in a space where we don't know how the future will unfold (nor do we ever, technically). Challenge yourself to be where your feet are. We fool ourselves thinking we can wish or worry our desired future into existence. What we can control is the now - what we're focused on, what actions we're choosing to take, and who we're choosing to connect with.
 - **MAXIMIZE YOUR MOTIVATION:** Try to simulate what your body and mind already know -- create a daily schedule Monday through Friday (or whatever your typical week looks like, whether that's for school, work, or otherwise). Break up the day with a variety of tasks or areas of focus, have a to-do list (or several - for example, one for work, one for school, one for personal life), and make it a goal to work on two or three things from your to-do list each day.

COMPLIANCE

SUMMARY

- Duke University is committed to operating all aspects of its Department of Athletics with integrity and in a manner that is consistent with the letter and spirit of NCAA, ACC, and University rules and regulations. The Office of Compliance is tasked with ensuring institutional control through coordination, monitoring, and verifying compliance. This includes education of Department of Athletics personnel and appropriate institutional faculty and staff regarding NCAA, ACC, and University policies and procedures.
- Throughout the spring of 2020 as events were canceled and NCAA rules and recruiting regulations became fluid, the Duke compliance office maintained consistent lines of communication despite not having direct access to coaches and staffs. They extended their annual compliance education sessions virtually to all areas of the athletic department, creating a virtual online game to promote education.
- The Office of Compliance maintains an open-door policy and fields questions from coaches, athletics department personnel, student-athletes, boosters, and members of the community at-large. The Office of Compliance is dedicated to institutional control by providing educational programs and interpretive support to ensure that all coaches, staff, student-athletes, and other individuals involved with the athletics program understand and adhere to the NCAA, ACC, and University's compliance expectations.
- The Office of Compliance has implemented monitoring procedures and educational programs that provide guidance on how the Department of Athletics can operate within the rules and expectations of the NCAA, ACC, and University. Each individual within the Department of Athletics is obligated to maintain competency in knowledge of rules, to act within his or her realms of responsibility while maintaining full compliance with the rules, and to report any information concerning possible violations of NCAA and ACC legislation or institutional policy to his/her supervisor, the Office of Compliance, or other senior administrative staff, including the Faculty Athletics Representative, in a prompt manner.
- The Office of Compliance is staffed by the Senior Associate Director of Athletics/ Compliance, Executive Director of Compliance, Assistant Director of Compliance, Compliance Coordinator and Compliance Assistant. The Office of Compliance can be reached at duke-compliance@duke.edu.




MISSION STATEMENT

Through a combination of communication, education, and consistent monitoring, the Office of Athletics Compliance is committed to ensuring that all those involved with Duke Athletics uphold the rules of the NCAA, the ACC and the University.

EXTERNAL AFFAIRS

BLUE DEVIL NETWORK

- Featured live and on-demand videos and audio content across various platforms including ESPN, ACC Network, GoDuke.com, YouTube and other social media platforms from all 28 Duke varsity sports.
- Produced 29 linear events from Duke control rooms for ESPN, up from seventeen during the 2018-19 year despite total number being cut short due to COVID-19 cancellations.
- Achieved 100 percent compliance with ESPN broadcast thresholds for equipment.
- Played a critical role in increasing fan engagement across Duke Athletics' social media channels with creation of original video content.
- Produced nearly 150 live events, including 10 ACC matchups for Duke Men's Basketball.
- Successfully managed all video board operations for Duke home games at Cameron Indoor Stadium, Wallace Wade Stadium, Durham Bulls Athletic Park, & Koskinen Stadium.



DIGITAL MEDIA

- Partnered with campus outlets and SIDEARM Sports to achieve full WCAG 2.0 AA accessibility compliance on the official website and social media platforms of Duke Athletics.
- Teamed with OIT on projects related to predictive modeling and augmented reality to help drive revenue and improve our fan experience.
- Completed total migration of GoDuke.com from SIDEARM to Neulion.
- Redesigned web pages for Athletic Medicine, Hall of Fame, Camps, Gameday Hospitality, Premium Amenities and the Iron Dukes.
- Created the GoDuke.com audio vault to house all Athletics radio and podcast content.
- Collaborated with University archives to document the effect of COVID-19 on Athletics and our student-athletes.
- Worked with OIT to transition Athletics email marketing to Emma.

LEARFIELD IMG COLLEGE

- Learfield IMG College is the unquestioned leader in college multimedia rights.
- Duke University Athletics signed a 12-year extension with Learfield IMG College, the Blue Devils' exclusive multimedia rights holder. Duke Athletics and Learfield IMG College have been partners since July 2009 and their recently agreed upon contract extension expires June 30, 2032.
- The partnership bundles media, sponsorship, in-venue advertising and technology rights into one contract and grows sponsorship revenue for Athletics. The local Learfield IMG College team enjoyed a fourth consecutive record-setting year at Duke in 2019-20.

SPORTS INFORMATION

- Implemented and managed highly-effective publicity and media strategies that yielded comprehensive media attention in print, electronic, and broadcast media.
- Authored more than 5,000 pieces of unique content for GoDuke.com and media distribution lists including releases, game notes, and media guides for all sports.
- Helped managed each varsity team's social media presence, generating just shy of 40,000 combined Tweets, Facebook posts, and Instagram pictures across 60 social media platforms aided by custom sport graphics.
- Coordinated countless interviews for Duke coaches and student-athletes with national, regional and local media as well as broadcast outlets.
- Facilitated the production of numerous live broadcasts, including major television networks (ESPN, ESPN2, ESPNU, CBS, TBS, ABC, RSN, Fox), ACC Network and ACC Network Extra, as well as radio broadcasts, coaches shows and video feature content.
- Compiled 100 percent of in-game statistics.

SOCIAL MEDIA

- Took over day-to-day operations of Twitter, Instagram and Facebook sport-specific accounts and worked with Sports Information and Blue Devil Network to enhance each sports social media presence.
- Started the @DukeAthletics TikTok account and starting in the month of May took the follower count from 149 to 62.1K (average of nearly 15,000 a week growth) off the success of a video that has reached 2.5 million views and nearly 570,000 likes. Account averages over 207,000 views per post.
- Continued the growth of the @DukeAthletics Snapchat account, averaging around 1,000 new subscribers every month to push the total subscriber count to 80,500+.
- Worked with Instagram to verify student-athletes ahead of making the jump to the professional ranks.
- Partnered with Opendorse to share social content directly with current student athletes, coaches and alumni and launched several campaigns, including one engaging former Duke football players ahead of the annual showdown against North Carolina.
- Helped plan and create the #TogetherDuke campaign to provide resources and assistance to those in the Duke and Durham community during the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Alongside SID, BDN and other departments, planned and executed a number of other campaigns as well, including Mental Health Awareness Month and Giving Day 2019.
- Experienced exponential growth of the majority of sport-specific Instagram accounts. Fifteen sport-specific accounts experienced a 20% or more follower growth, led by @DukeVB (+70.55%), @DukeTFXC (+53.64%), @DukeMGOLF (+53.00%) and @DukeWGOLF (+48.83%).

- Created new pregame events targeting a new demographic of women's basketball fan base (Mental Wealth Day and Cancer Survivor Reception).

- Until COVID-19, were on pace for all Duke teams to receive more coverage in 2019-20 than any previous year.
- Integrated the services of multiple volunteers for taking and editing photos of athletics events.
- Continued to be an integral part of the recruiting process for numerous teams, providing photos of prospective student-athletes.

TICKET OFFICE

- Increased utilization of mobile ticketing.
- Executed operations for 91 regular season home games, including six home football games, 15 men's soccer games, 12 women's soccer games, 20 men's basketball games, 16 women's basketball games, six women's lacrosse games, four men's lacrosse games and 12 baseball games (between ticketed games at the Durham Bulls Athletic Park and Jack Coombs Field).
- Managed ticket operations for the Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game and NCAA Women's Soccer Championship First Round.
- Brought in over \$17 million in ticket revenue across all sporting events.

Annual gifts to the Iron Dukes Annual Fund afford outstanding student-athletes the opportunity to pursue a Duke education while competing at the highest level. With a single scholarship valued at more than \$82,000, Duke Athletics' expenditures add up quickly.

VARSITY CLUB

- Annual gifts to the Iron Dukes Varsity Club go directly to work for our 27 varsity sports. These gifts allow Duke coaches to provide resources that are not traditionally covered in the annual budget such as provide nutrition and recovery foods now allowable under NCAA guidelines, supplement in season and post season travel, purchase training and player development equipment and accomplish individual team projects. To be sure, Varsity Club gifts help us to enhance the Duke student-athlete experience and build champions.

CAPITAL PROJECTS & ENDOWMENTS

- To continue the quest for excellence both in the classroom and in competition, Duke must enhance facilities to meet or exceed the modern standards of an elite athletics program without compromising our history and tradition. Philanthropic gifts above and beyond Iron Dukes Annual Fund support makes these facilities possible. Endowment level gifts provide Duke student-athletes with benefits resulting from the perpetuity of the gift. These gifts ranging from \$100,000 - \$5,000,000+ provide long term sustainability for our athletic programs by funding scholarships and providing additional operating support.

PLANNED GIVING

IRON DUKES

LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT: STAFF & COACH

MIDDLE MANAGEMENT LEADERSHIP SERIES

- The focus of the Middle Management Leadership Series was to enhance the skills of Athletic Department staff at the middle management level who have program and staff oversight. Participants first focused on the strengths they bring to the workplace along with their most effective leadership, communication and motivation styles. Additional topics include identifying and developing leadership credibility, leading a team, multi-directional management, creating great workplace environments, bringing value and purpose to their departments, and handling change. This year saw the creation of a mentorship program for participants in which they were paired with a member of the Athletic Department's Senior Leadership staff to assist in their continue growth as leaders.

COACHES

- The focus of the leadership series for coaches was based on the Art of Coaching. The focus in the fall semester was on the art of balancing accountability and empathy. Coaches must hold athletes accountable, have high standards and produce results. However, they must also be able to demonstrate empathy when appropriate. It is a balancing act and coaches were challenged to examine their approach to coaching and where they might improve on this balance. In addition, the fall semester included discussion of the difference between respect and dignity. Coaches were asked to think about whether they are able to always treat athletes with dignity... regardless of whether respect has been lost. The focus in the spring was on priorities as a coach with emphasis on quality relationships with student-athletes. They were also challenged to embrace the concept that all student-athletes want to be part of something where they feel valued and it has a soul to it. The end of the school year provided unique challenges for coaches and we continued to have virtual meetings throughout the summer to help them share ideas for best leading during challenging times.

SENIOR STAFF

- The focus of the leadership series for senior staff leadership series centered around two major areas - defining purpose and effective sports supervision. We met with senior staff on a monthly basis and through large and small group discussions, assisted them in redefining their collective purpose as a team. Because effective communication and consistency of leadership from this group are paramount, redefining the collective purpose helped this group become more cohesive and consistent in these areas. The latter part of the year focused on sharing best practices for effective supervising sports within the athletic department. Through rich discussion, there was agreement for a need to have consistent practices among various sports. Discussions on this topic will continue into the upcoming academic year.

STAFF BOOK CLUB

- We reinstated the book club this year. Members of senior staff were given the opportunity to participate and we had fifteen people sign-up. The book we read together was, "Nine Lies About Work: A Free Thinker's Guide to the Real World." We read one chapter per month and met to discuss. This particular book helped stimulate significant discussion because of the differing perspectives on the content. It was a very effective exercise and all participants agreed they wanted to continue next year with another book.

LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT: STUDENT-ATHLETES

LEADERSHIP ENRICHMENT & DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM (L.E.A.D)

- The Duke Athletics L.E.A.D. Retreat was held both in the Fall and Spring semesters at Quaker Lake Camp in Climax, N.C. Ninety-nine student-athletes from winter and spring sports—a record number for the L.E.A.D. Retreat, took part in the program in August, and just over 50 student-athletes from fall sports participated in the bi-annual leadership experience in January. During the respective overnight excursions, each team explored their team's culture and the role of leadership within themselves and amongst each other. Duke Alumna and former Principal Deputy Director of National Intelligence, Sue Gordon, served as the keynote speaker. She shared with the student-athletes her three key elements through which leadership should be viewed. The LEAD program is made possible in part by a generous donation from the Bob Heidrick Family.

CAPTAIN'S PROGRAM

- The Captain's Program met three times each semester, with a couple in the spring turning into virtual Zoom sessions. The meetings focused on accountability versus empathy. Each meeting started with the captains sharing what strategies are currently working well for their respective team. In the third meeting of this semester, Dr. Kevin White, Vice President, Director of Athletics & Adjunct Professor of Business Administration, shared the four traits he looks for in leaders. He also shared how maintaining ongoing communication with coaches and student-athlete teammates is key for captains to be successful. In the spring, with the COVID pandemic creating unprecedented times, these virtual meetings allowed for some "on the spot" applicable discussions of checking in with self, mental health, leading through unexpected situations, and connecting with others in different ways.

ACC PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT ACADEMY

- Nine Duke student-athletes were part of the Atlantic Coast Conference's six-week Professional Development Academy, an interactive virtual program that engaged more than 130 current and former ACC student-athletes focused on enhancing personal and career goals.
- From the Blue Devils, Katie Calvo (lacrosse), Meera Chakrabarti (rowing), Joe Choo (fencing), Emmy Duerr (soccer), Shay Hollander (swimming & diving), Luca Keist (tennis), Naima Turbes (cross country), Raine Wilson (softball) and Aaron Wright (football) were Duke's participants as student-athletes from each of the ACC's 15 member institutions completed the program.
- The Academy's curriculum, designed and delivered by student-athlete development administrators from ACC member institutions, assisted participants in learning core values, identifying and developing circles of influence, establishing effective communication and leadership skills, and charting career plans.
- In addition to multiple educational sessions, the Academy featured guest speakers who shared personal stories and tips for success. The list included Victoria Garrick, former women's volleyball student-athlete at the University of Southern California and founder of The Hidden Opponent, an organization created to raise awareness for student-athlete mental health; Jay Bilas, ESPN men's basketball analyst and former Duke men's basketball student-athlete; Dion Williams, a national recruiter for NASCAR's Drive for Diversity Pit Crew Development Program and former Wake Forest football student-athlete; and Lamarr Pottinger, NCAA Associate Director of Leadership Development and former track student-athlete at Eastern Illinois.
- The seminar was launched to meet the needs of student-athletes whose summer plans were negatively affected by COVID-19.

FIRST YEAR ACTION LEADERSHIP PROGRAM

The A.C.T.I.O.N. Mentoring Program is a vital part of the transition to college for first-year student-athletes. With approximately 50 upperclass student-athletes co-leading small group discussions and serving as mentors, six first-year A.C.T.I.O.N. meetings were held this year (with the last two being virtual connections/messages due to COVID pandemic.). September's meeting served as a meet-and-greet, in which student-athletes met their fellow group members and were led through group activities by their upperclassmen mentors. During the second meeting, an ESPNW panel discussion was held on the topic of transitions, self-awareness and leadership. The third monthly meeting was led by the Director of Behavioral Health, Dr. Shawn Zeplin. The session focused on managing stress and giving first-year students tools to manage stress. In the spring, messages and programs included being conscientious of empathy and how you treat others and yourself. In February, Duke Alumna, and ONE LOVE FOUNDATION CEO, Katie Hood, visited with student-groups as well as coaches, and then helped in facilitating the Escalation Workshop to our first-year students, followed by a conversation on healthy relationships. The Student-Athlete Development Department has partnered with the One Love Foundation for the past five years.



RECREATION & PHYSICAL EDUCATION

- Duke Recreation and Physical Education offers a wide range of programs and services that encourage healthy active lifestyles through education and recreation.
- Daily operations include a diverse selection of Physical Education courses as well as programs through aquatics, group fitness, personal training, outdoor adventures, intramurals, and sport clubs.
- Duke celebrated the 20th Anniversary of Wilson Recreation Center by creating commemorative stickers, facilitating a scavenger hunt within the facility, and hosting a celebration reception during Homecoming in October 2019.
- Physical Education:
 - Introduced Real-Time Duke Rec, a live cardio equipment,
 - Found new opportunities for collaboration, like OLLIE and Yoga for Teen Oncology patients and families, that further extended partnership efforts within the University.
- Aquatics initiated a partnership with Drennen's Dreams Foundation to coordinate a drowning prevention seminar that was to be held in May 2020. Expanded the availability of this education for local aquatics professionals by collaborating with UNC Aquatics and other aquatics groups in the Raleigh-Durham area.
- Several new technologies were integrated to help better serve members:
 - Introduced Real-Time Duke Rec, a live cardio equipment, racquetball and squash court availability resource, allowing members to better plan their visits to Rec & PE facilities.
 - MyRec, an online platform that allows participants to register and pay for Duke Rec & PE programs and services, was launched in January 2020.
 - Duke Rec TV, an Augmented Reality application built in a collaboration with OIT and Duke students, opens opportunities for communication and program promotion outside of on-campus facilities.
 - Virtual Reality recreation opportunities were also piloted and provide alternative activity options that also promote physical activity.
- Quidditch and Ballroom Dancing were voted in as new Sport Clubs. Club Squash and Club Cycling represented Duke at their respective National Championships.
- Outdoor Adventures established the Women's Outdoor Adventure Program, which aims to include programming options such as climb nights, trips and workshops.
- In a continued partnership with DDA, Fitness & Wellness expanded upon Adaptive programming by incorporating yoga as a new offering.
- Incorporated Soccer, Tennis and Pickleball as new Intramural sports.
- Across the department, significant efforts were put forth to quickly pivot facility operations, programming and communication efforts in response to COVID-19:
 - Academic programs, including activity courses, were converted to synchronous and asynchronous online formats to complete the Spring 2020 semester.
 - Aquatics and Outdoor Adventures initiated participant newsletters to keep their communities connected and engaged.
 - Fitness & Wellness converted their Group Fitness offerings to a virtual format.
 - Intramurals offered virtual competitions such as Virtual App leagues and also used this as an opportunity to launch eSport leagues via the Mission Control platform.
 - The Duke Rec & PE YouTube was expanded to include live Group Fitness recordings, at-home workout demonstrations, wellness and safety tips.
 - Continued part-time staff engagement through virtual staff meetings and end of year celebrations.



> BY THE NUMBERS

- 1,400 students enrolled in 83 sections of activity and lecture classes during the academic year.
- Aquatics certified 315 individuals in various First Aid/CPR/AED/Lifeguard/Instructor courses and taught 1,902 group and private learn to swim lessons through March 15, 2020. Recorded 43,066 lap swimmers between Brodie and Wilson Recreation Centers through March 15, 2020.
- Intramurals had 3,963 unique participants in leagues and tournaments through March 12, 2020.
- Outdoor Adventures saw 212 total trip participants and recorded 7,186 climbs at the indoor climbing wall through February 2020.
- The Brodie Recreation Center averaged 471 visits per day while the Wilson Recreation Center averaged 1,304 for a total of 451,070 facility visits through March 12, 2020.
- Fitness & Wellness averaged 75 Group Fitness classes per week and totaled 26,992 participants through February 2020.
- 1,338 total Sport Club participants, 523 of which were First Year Students.
- Since moving to online programming in March 15, 2020:
 - 1,390 live Group Fitness participations through 37 classes.
 - 157 eSport league and 89 virtual app tournament participations.
 - 108 new YouTube followers, 5,752 views and 535.5 hours watched.

- Provided oversight & sales of incredible game day experience to sold out membership in Champions Club in Cameron Indoor Stadium for 2019-20.
- Streamlined the process with Blue Devil Premium Services & Trident Provisions for meeting, party and event rentals of premium athletic spaces. Worked closely with several campus entities to grow relationships for campus events.
- Enriched CLUB BLUE DEVIL brand centered around Duke Basketball games by maximizing the available space, staying open through halftime, accepting credit cards and creating enhanced environment. Revenue also climbed with new points of sale and consistent availability.
- Despite shortened calendar year, Blue Devil Hospitality achieved sales goal, increasing net revenue from previous year, for all sports' game day experiences.
- Oversaw and facilitated event set ups and space change overs, staffing, layouts, timeline for deliveries and set ups for premium areas in Blue Devil Tower and Champions Club.
- Negotiated and set up various agreements to allow for budget relief including agreements with Fairway Outdoor Advertising, Coca-Cola, and various media outlets to allow Duke Athletics marketing to promote ticket sales for various teams.
- Leveraged and expanded Gatorade partnership to secure a Gatorade Fuel Bar for Duke men's and women's basketball, making Duke the only school with three fuel bars within their athletics complex. The state-of-the-art areas now assists all student-athletes with their hydration, nutritional and strength and conditioning needs.
- Assisted with student-athlete training table in Blue Devil Tower, working closely with Duke Sports Nutrition, Blue Devil Premium Services, Trident Provisions, various coaching staffs and Duke Athletics compliance office. Olympic Sport training table fed 475 student-athletes Monday through Wednesday in the DeJoy Family Club with Duke Football feeding 100+ people each Sunday through Thursday on the Delta Suite Level.
- Maintained Courtesy Car/Dealer Program to support sports programs, operations & training staffs while continuing relationships with 23 dealers providing more than 34 vehicles; changing vehicles, ticketing/seating changes & parking.

SPORTS NUTRITION MISSION STATEMENT

- The mission of the Duke Sports Nutrition Department is to foster an environment that promotes optimal fueling for high-quality performance in sports, academics and life. Additionally, to support student-athletes in achieving lifelong health and wellness.

NEW IN 2019-20

- The Sports Nutrition Department continued to grow and advance the services offered to Duke student-athletes. A new initiative, which was successfully launched through the combined efforts of Sports Nutrition and Behavioral Health, was the Duke Body First (DBF) positive body image workshop. DBF is a workshop series designed to support female student-athletes efforts to engage in healthy approaches and practices to better manage appearance pressures, with the ultimate goal of improving overall wellness and performance.
- Duke was one of 10 host sites in the country for the Gatorade Sports Nutrition Immersion Program (SNIP). The Gatorade SNIP is a prestigious program matching veteran sports dietitians with an entry-level sports RD looking for mentorship and growth within the field. Beth Miller had the opportunity to mentor Megan Stanley for the year as Megan served as a fifth sports dietitian working within the department.

SPORTS PERFORMANCE

- Duke Sports Performance aims to provide all 27 Duke Athletics teams with a competitive edge by empowering each athlete to achieve personal and athletic success through high-level, challenging sports performance plans.
- Olympic Sports Performance opened its operation in the Scott Family Athletic Performance Center August 1, 2016. This state-of-the-art facility features 13,000 square feet of training space for Duke's 24 Olympic Sports programs, including 35 training stations custom-designed by Sorinex Exercise Equipment specifically for Duke, each with mounted iPads for workout-monitoring and real-time video review of movement training. The facility houses a 50-yard-long, turf-covered running space, a Gatorade Fuel Bar with smoothie stations, fresh produce and yogurt, healthy snacks, a wide variety of grab-and-go items and all of Gatorade's pre and post-workout fueling products, as well as a Keiser performance area and a variety of additional training equipment from the top brands in the industry, including Iron Grip, Woodway, FreeLap and Run Rocket.
- The Scott Family Athletic Performance Center houses facilities for all Duke Olympic sports, while the Yoh Building services the Duke football team and the Michael Krzyzewski Center for Academic and Athletic Excellence is the training home of the men's and women's basketball teams. All are state-of-the-art facilities that feature top-of-the-line equipment.
- Renovations for the Duke football team's performance center in the Yoh Building were completed in June, 2017. Updates to the room included new flooring by Plae, as well as platforms that are set into the floor instead of being elevated. New weight racks were installed by Sorinex Exercise Equipment. The Gatorade Fuel Bar, which was installed in 2015, remains and enables players to make their own shakes with protein, fresh fruit and yogurt that help keep them nourished and aid in recovery following practice and weight training.

Following the panel, 100 female student-athletes engaged with the panelists during a breakout session in which they asked questions about career paths and words of wisdom.

SEASON SUMMARY

The Duke men's cross country team concluded the 2019 season with five first-place team finishes and eight top-ten finishes in 10 total races. The Blue Devils took the top spot in four of their first five events, led off by a strong performance at the Elon Opener on Aug. 30. At the Cavalier Classic two weeks later, junior CJ Ambrosio finished second overall, marking the first of four times that he would pace the Duke team throughout the season. Duke went on to capture three consecutive first-place team finishes, earning victories at the Roy Griak Invite, the Great American Cross Country Festival and the Pirate Invite. The ACC Cross Country Championships yielded several notable performances, highlighted by Sam Rivera finishing 37th overall and first among true freshmen, making him Duke's first cross country runner to earn ACC Freshman of the Year honors. The campaign concluded at the NCAA Southeast Regional Championships in Charlottesville, Va., where the team placed sixth overall to notch its best postseason finish since 2015. Ambrosio once again led the way for the Blue Devils, taking 24th overall and garnering All-Region honors. Zach Kinne picked up two conference freshman of the week recognitions during the season - one on Oct. 2 following a 10th-place finish at the Roy Griak Invite, and the other on Oct. 23, coming off a team-best finish at the Pre-National Invitational. In Norm Ogilvie's 21st and final season as head coach of the men's team, the Blue Devils posted a 99-35 overall record and 17-13 mark in the ACC.

SEASON SUMMARY

The Duke women's cross country team wrapped up the 2019 campaign with three top-five finishes in five scored races, including a fifth-place showing at the NCAA Southeast Regional Championship. The Blue Devils kicked off the season at the Elon Opener on Aug. 30, where the team finished fourth out of 10 teams. Junior Sara Platek led the way for Duke, placing second in the field with a 4K time of 14:11.0. Head Coach Rhonda Riley's squad followed that performance with a second-place finish at the Virginia Tech Invitational. At the ACC Championships in November, junior Michaela Reinhart paced the Blue Devils for the third year in a row, finishing 22nd in the field. Two weeks later, the Duke runners posted several impressive times at the Southeast Regional, with four placing in the top 50 in a field of over 250 competitors. The Blue Devils put up 154 team points to earn a top-five finish for the second-straight season. Reinhart and Platek finished 11th and 18th, respectively, to garner All-Southeast Region honors, marking back-to-back years that the duo achieved All-Region status.

Duke's 2019 team finished the season with a 5-7 record, including three straight wins scoring 40-plus points. The Blue Devils missed going to a bowl game by one win, marking just the second time in the last eight years in which Duke failed to make a bowl appearance.

The Blue Devils finished the season ranked third in the ACC in pass defense and fifth in pass defense efficiency rating. Individually, eight Duke players received All-ACC honors, led by TE Noah Gray, DE Victor Dimukeje and WR/Specialist Damond Philyaw-Johnson, who earned second team nods.

Gray (Walter Camp Football Foundation) and Philyaw-Johnson (Phil Steele) also garnered All-America accolades, joining defensive end Chris Rumph II who received All-America praise by Pro Football Focus and Sports Illustrated. Jalon Calhoun and Eli Pancol were tabbed to the Pro Football Focus Freshman All-America team as well to close out Duke's top honors.

Off the field, the Blue Devils had numerous award winners and finalists as Koby Quansah was named to the AFCA Good Works Team and a semifinalist for the Jason Witten Collegiate Man of the Year Award. 

SEASON RECAP

Duke went 6-3 this spring before the cancellation of the 2020 season due to COVID-19 concerns. The Blue Devils finished the season ranked No. 18 in the IWLCA polls, including a 16-10 win over No. 12 Virginia on March 7. Duke head coach Kerstin Kimel became the seventh active Division I head coach to reach 300 career wins with Duke's 20-5 win over Wofford on Feb. 13. Kimel's squad boasted a balanced and powerful offense, scoring 17.67 goals per game (fifth among Division I schools) and was the only ACC team with eight student-athletes with 10 or more goals on the season. Freshman Caroline DeBellis led the squad in points with 32 on 13 goals and 19 assists and was named to the All-ILWomen Rookie Team. Katie Cronin led the team in goals, including five scores against Virginia to earn Duke's lone ACC Offensive Player of the Week honor this year. Third team All-America honoree Callie Humphrey's 16 caused turnovers led the Duke defense that averaged 12.33 per game. Maddie Jenner was among the national leaders in draw controls per game, leading the team with 96 and earning first team All-America recognition. Sam DeBellis transitioned from player to student-assistant coach after medically retiring and was named a finalist for the One Love/ TYR Unsung Hero Award.

SEASON SUMMARY

The Duke rowing team came into the 2019-20 campaign with high expectations after taking silver at the ACC Championship and making an appearance at the NCAA Championships in the spring of 2019. The squad would ultimately compete in four events, with two being scored, before the season was cut short by the COVID-19 pandemic. During the fall, the club 4+ boat that featured five freshmen - Ginger Del Real, Alice Elworthy, Emilie Lijesen, Lauren Sizemore and Caeley Tierney - took first place out of 56 teams at the Head of the Charles regatta in Boston, Mass. The group clocked a time of 18:37.474, just under eight seconds faster than second-place Tennessee. After a tune-up scrimmage against Virginia at Lake Michie in February, the Blue Devils headed to Clemson, S.C., for the spring season-opening Carolina Cup. Competing against Clemson and North Carolina, Duke claimed the trophy for the fourth consecutive year, posting 99 team points. The team won all five races on the morning, including the varsity-8+, where Duke's top boat finished more than 16 seconds ahead of second-place Clemson.

SEASON RECAP

The Blue Devils got off to a great start in 2019, winning their first four games and climbing to as high as No. 2 in the United Soccer Coaches national rankings. However they were unable to maintain that momentum, finishing the season with a 7-9-2 overall record and 2-5-1 mark against ACC foes.

Duke captured its fourth consecutive John Rennie Nike Invitational title with fifth-year graduate transfer Hassan Pinto garnering MVP honors.

The following weekend was Daniele Proch leading the charge as he recorded braces in each of Duke's victories against Princeton and Harvard. The senior was rewarded with the ACC Offensive Player of the Week honor as well as being named to the Team of the Week by College Soccer News and Top Drawer Soccer.

Duke dropped its next three contests to a trio of top 25 programs before rebounding with a thrilling comeback victory over rival North Carolina in Chapel Hill. Trailing 2-0, Brandon Williamson and the Blue Devils charged back to score three unanswered for the 3-2 win. It was Duke's first road win against the Tar Heels since 1999.

The Blue Devils, ranked 18th nationally heading into October, struggled in the final month of the regular season, going 2-5-2 to finish 12th in the ACC after tiebreakers. Duke concluded its campaign with a 2-1 setback to NC State in the ACC Quarterfinals.

Proch was at times a one man offensive show, finishing the season with 12 goals and 29 points overall - having a hand in 61 percent of Duke's goals. He garnered All-ACC first team honors and All-South Region second team recognition and was the team's MVP. Off the field he was a CoSIDA Academic All-America first team pick as well.

SEASON RECAP

Before the season was cut short due to COVID-19, Duke softball was having its best season in program history with a 23-4 record while cracking into the Top 25 in a national poll for the first time. The Blue Devils also defeated their first ranked opponent since starting the program as Duke shut out No. 4 Texas, 1-0, in Austin.

Duke finished the year ranked 25th in the final ESPN.com/USA Softball Collegiate Top 25 Poll while finishing just outside the rankings in the USA Today/NFCA D1 Top 25 Coaches Poll with 49 votes.

The Blue Devils broke numerous records in 2020, including home runs in a season (26) while Caroline Jacobsen broke the single-season mark with nine. Duke's pitching staff combined for a 1.61 ERA and was led by Brianna Butler at 0.95.

SEASON RECAP

Duke enjoyed a successful 7-2 season before the cancellation of the NCAA Championships due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Blue Devils recorded 20 times that were in the top-5 of school charts over the course of the season. Duke boasted at least three individual All-America selections in back-to-back years for the first time since three in 2010 and four in 2011. Senior Alyssa Marsh led Duke, setting four school records (50 and 100 freestyle, 100 butterfly and 200 medley relay) on her way to earning five All-America honors. OGILVIE RETIRES FROM DUKE ATHLETICS

After 30 seasons on the coaching staff at Duke University, Director of Track & Field Norm Ogilvie has announced his retirement, effective in July. Ogilvie has served as the Head Coach of the men's cross-country and track & field teams for the last 20 years, and has directed the track & field program since 2003.

"To be sure, we are deeply appreciative of Norm's dedication and commitment to foster a spirit of collegiality and excellence relative to 'all things' Duke University, notwithstanding, Duke Athletics," Director of Athletics Dr. Kevin White said. "Moreover, we are indeed grateful for Norm's unqualified integrity, and per his unwavering effort to provide the very best possible student-athlete experience. Wishing Norm all the very best in his coaching retirement, as well as per the next chapter."

Ogilvie, who was named the men's cross-country head coach in 2000, led the Blue Devils to an ACC Championship in his first season - their first title since 1977 - while being named the ACC Coach of the Year. He has since guided the team to six NCAA Championship appearances and four IC4A championships while coaching 28 All-East selections, 25 All-Southeast Region honorees and 22 All-ACC selections. In all, Ogilvie's career record as a head coach against Division I teams in men's cross-country was 1,642 Wins, 639 losses and three ties.

A 1981 graduate of Drake University, Ogilvie spent three seasons as Head Coach of the Blue Devils men's track team before being promoted to Director of Track & Field in June of 2003. In more than two decades at the helm, Ogilvie has coached 418 All-East selections, 102 All-America honorees, 68 ACC individual champions, 284 All-ACC picks, 64 ECAC champions and 12 IC4A champions. He was instrumental in helping a trio of Blue Devils become NCAA champions, as Shannon Rowbury was victorious in the women's indoor mile in 2007 before Juliet Bortoff won the women's outdoor 10,000m in 2011 and Curtis Beach captured the men's indoor heptathlon in 2012 and 2014.

Ogilvie has also worked closely with three Team USA Olympians who competed at a total of seven summer games - Curt Clausen (2000 & 2004), Jillian Schwartz (2004 & 2012) and Shannon Rowbury (2008, 2012 & 2016). Additionally, he helped influence decorated sprinter Randy Jones to try out for the U.S. Bobsled team, whom he won a silver medal with at the 2002 winter games and again competed for in 2006.

The track & field program's record book has been nearly rewritten during Ogilvie's tenure. Indoors, student-athletes coached by Ogilvie have accounted for 42 of 45 all-time marks among both men's and women's events. Of the 55 total outdoor records, 42 have been accomplished under Ogilvie, including in all 18 field events.

Prior to arriving at Duke in 1991, Ogilvie spent three semesters on the University of Colorado staff, assisting with distance runners.

With Ogilvie's retirement in July, Associate Head Coach Shawn Wilbourn will be named Interim Head Coach of the track & field program, while Assistant Coach Rhonda Riley will serve as the Interim Head Coach of the cross-country program.

SEASON RECAP

After losing nearly its entire starting lineup from the previous year due to graduation or redshirt, Duke wrestling welcomed 10 newcomers to its roster in 2019-20. For the 12th-straight season, the Blue Devils found themselves with at least one competitor at the NCAA Wrestling Championships. Unfortunately, the postseason was cut short by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Redshirt Mason Eaglin was set to represent Duke at the 2020 NCAA Championships as the No. 32 overall seed in the 174-pound bracket. He was scheduled to wrestle the No. 33 seed Phillip Spadafora of Maryland in the pigtail match for a chance to take on top-seeded Mark Hall of Penn State. Eaglin would have made his NCAA Championship debut after earning an at-large bid on the strength of a 21-12 regular season record that included a 9-8 mark during duals matches. The Port Orchard, Wash., native also finished the tournament season with an 11-2 record, while going 3-3 against ranked opponents.

Benjamin Anderson added to Duke's cause throughout the season as well. After bouncing back from early season injuries, Anderson went 4-1 over his five duals to start the month of February, dropping his lone loss during that stretch to No. 9 Tanner Skidgel of Navy by a hard-fought 5-3 decision. In ACC tournament action, Anderson ran into two nationally ranked foes in No. 12 Jake Wentzel of Pittsburgh and No. 10 Thomas Bullard of NC State. The Pleasant Grove, Utah, native dropped both bouts by way of 8-1 and 3-2 decisions, respectively, to close out his season.

Academically, the Blue Devils continued to excel. Eaglin was named to the NWCA Scholar All-America team, while Anderson, Vincent Baker and Jonah Niesenbaum each joined Eaglin on the All-ACC Academic team. Nationally, Duke finished 24th in team GPA.
