QUICKLY: The TCU Horned Frogs look to derail the 17th-ranked Louisville Cardinals from a perfect conference season as the two schools get together on the gridiron for the first time in history on Friday, November 23. The game will be televised nationally by ESPN. TCU, playing in its first season in C-USA, is 4-5 overall and 2-3 in conference play. The Frogs have dropped two straight games and three of their last four contests. After opening the season with a 21-7 setback at fourth-ranked Nebraska in the Pigskin Classic, the Frogs logged consecutive wins at North Texas (19-5) and at SMU (38-10) before falling by a 27-24 count in overtime to Division I-AA Northwestern State in their home opener to finish the non-conference slate with a 2-2 mark. The Frogs had their September 15 game vs. Marshall cancelled due to the national tragedies and will not reschedule that game this season. TCU won its conference lidlifter at Houston on September 29 by a 34-17 score, dropped a 48-22 decision at Tulane on October 13, came back with a 38-20 victory over Army on October 20, then had a dramatic second half rally fall short to East Carolina on October 30, 37-30, before losing a 38-17 decision at UAB on November 10. The Horned Frogs spent the past five years in the Western Athletic Conference, recording back-to-back conference titles in 1999 and 2000. The Frogs are playing in their 105th season of intercollegiate football. They own an all-time record of 488-490-57.

PATTERSON'S POINTS: *On the UAB game:* "I thought we played hard for 60 minutes. UAB is a good team that plays well at home. You have to go in and take things away from them. We didn't do that. It comes down to three things - turnovers, big plays on defense and tackling. That's been our nemesis all year. We knew we would struggle running the football. I thought we did a decent job protecting the passer." *On the mood of the team:* "Obviously we're not happy with the loss. You can't turn the ball over and give up big plays. We still have a chance to win the last two games and be in bowl contention. A lot of teams in the conference have a chance to finish at 6-5." *On Conference USA:* "On a week-to-week basis, the talent level is better in Conference USA than in the WAC. There's not a lot of 'rah-rah' - they just get ready to play. We're still figuring that out." *On Louisville:* "They have a big game on Thursday at East Carolina this week. Dave Ragone is a good football player, but their strength lately has been their defense. Their two defensive ends are very good and their secondary has played well. They've also forced a lot of turnovers."

FROGS NEED TWO WINS: The Horned Frogs need to win each of their last two games, this week vs. Louisville and their season-finaletion. The Frogs have reached the post-season in each of their last three seasons, the first time in school history that TCU has appeared in three straight bowl games.

SO LONG SENIORS: This is the final home contest for 10 TCU Horned Frog seniors. The list of seniors includes linebacker Chad Bayer, running back Andrew Hayes-Stoker, free safety Jason Higham, defensive end Joe Hill, defensive end Chad McCarty, weak safety Charlie Owens, cornerback Kendrick Patterson, offensive guard Victor Payne, tight end B. J. Roberts and tight end Matt Schobel.

THE LAST TIME OUT: TCU dropped its second straight game for the first time this season when they came up on the short end of a 38-17 decision at UAB on November 10. The Horned Frogs actually held a slight advantage in total yards, outgaining the Blazers 330-327, but turned the ball over three times to UAB's one. Playing without the services of tailback **Corey Connally** (groin), the Frogs were limited to just 20 yards on the ground in 34 rushing attempts by the UAB defense. Quarterback **Casey Printers** completed 22-of-36 passes for 310 yards and a pair of scores. It was his second straight 300-yard passing day, the first two of his career. **Adrian Madise** was on the receiving end of six passes for 104 yards, his second straight 100-yard receiving game. Redshirt freshman strong safety **Marvin Godbolt** recorded his first career interception.

CASEY AT THE BAT: Junior quarterback **Casey Printers** turned in his second straight 300-yard passing day in the loss at UAB. In the last six quarters, Printers has completed 46-of-86 passes for 629 yards. He became just the third quarterback in TCU history to eclipse the 4,000-yard passing mark for a career. Printers, who has thrown for 4,091 yards, trails only Max Knake (7,370) and Steve Stamp (5,123) on the all-time TCU charts. Printers also tossed a pair of touchdown strikes at UAB, now has 33 career touchdown passes, tying Leon Clay for fourth on TCU's all-time list, just one behind Steve Stamp.

BACK-TO-BACK PART I: **Casey Printers** has recorded back-to-back 300-yard passing days. He is the first TCU quarterback to accomplish the feat since 1990 when **Matt Vogler** passed for 690 yards on November 3 vs. Houston and came back with a 419-yard passing day on November 10 vs. Texas Tech.

BACK-TO-BACK PART II: Junior wide receiver **Adrian Madise** has put together back-to-back 100-yard receiving games. He is the first TCU player to notch that feat since Stephen Shipley went three straight games with 100 yards worth of receptions during the 1990 season: 102 vs.

Rice on October 13, 106 vs. Baylor on October 27 and 154 vs. Houston on November 3.

MORE MADISE: **Adrian Madise** has recorded 40 catches for 526 yards this season. No Horned Frog has had more catches or more receiving yards in a season since **John Washington** hauled in 52 receptions for 699 yards in the 1995 campaign.

SIX-POINT SCHOBEL: Senior tight end **Matt Schobel** made the most of his three receptions at UAB, scoring twice on pass receptions from 29 and 8 yards out. Of Schobel's 10 receptions this season, three have gone for touchdowns. He is averaging 19.6 yards per reception.

MR. ROBERTS NEIGHBORHOOD: Senior tight end **B.J. Roberts** logged a career-high four pass receptions at UAB for 42 yards. He entered the game with just three catches on the season for 31 yards and, despite being a four-year starter, entered that game with just 16 career receptions.

TANDEM RECEIVERS: Junior wide receivers **LaTarence Dunbar** and **Adrian Madise** each had career best days vs. East Carolina. Dunbar caught a career-high 10 passes for a career-high 136 yards (the second 100-yard receiving day of his career) and a touchdown, while Madise also caught a career-high 10 passes for a career-high 109 yards (his first 100-yard receiving day) and a touchdown. *It was only the second time in TCU history that two receivers reached double figures in receptions in the same game.* The previous duo to accomplish the feat was Richard Woodley (15 catches for 124 yards) and Stephen Shipley (11 catches for 154 yards) vs. Houston in 1990.

(FOURTH) DOWN BUT NOT OUT: The Frogs were successful in 6-of-8 fourth down conversions vs. East Carolina and went 1-for-2 at UAB. For the season, TCU is 12-for-17 (71 percent) in fourth down situations, second in C-USA.

PENALTIES HURT: The Frogs were flagged for 11 penalties for 76 yards in the loss at UAB. It was the fifth time this season that TCU has been whistled for 10 or more penalties. The Frogs have racked up 85 penalties for 699 yards this season, compared to their opponents 56 penalties for 458 yards.

OFFENSE COMING AROUND: After being held to under 300 yards of total offense in each of the first four games this season including an average of just 192 yards in the first two games, the Horned Frogs have cranked up the numbers in their last five games. They gained 357 yards at Houston, went for 314 yards at Tulane, rolled up a season-high 485 yards in the win over Army and finished with 407 against East Carolina before logging 330 at UAB. During the current five-game stretch the Frogs have averaged 378.6 yards per game.



Head Coach Gary Patterson

"It's an honor to be named the head coach at TCU," said Patterson. "And to be able to carry on the tradition that many great coaches including my mentor, Dennis Franchione, have established here in Fort Worth. I'm proud to be a Horned Frog."

Patterson, who was named the head coach of the Frogs on December 8, 2000, has played a major role in the recent success on the gridiron at TCU.

Under Patterson's tutelage, the 2000 Horned Frogs' defense ranked first in the nation in total defense, allowing just 245.0 yards per game, and in scoring defense, surrendering just 9.6 points per game. They also led the Western Athletic Conference in both rushing defense (84.4) and passing defense (160.6). They posted two shutouts and held six of their 11 regular-season opponents to seven points or less.

Each of TCU's 11 opponents were held below their season average in yards per game. The TCU defense allowed just 10 passing touchdowns, intercepted 15 passes and recorded a school record 43 sacks, breaking the previous mark of 37, which was set in 1999. Five of his players earned first team all-conference recognition, including defensive end Aaron Schobel, who was named the WAC Defensive Player of the Year.

The Frogs finished the regular season with a 10-1 record and earned a share of the WAC title. Patterson served as head coach in the 2000 Mobile Alabama Bowl, a 28-21 loss to Southern Miss. TCU ended the season ranked 18th in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches poll and 21st in the Associated Press poll. In addition, the Frogs were 14th in the final BCS rankings.

Patterson's 1999 TCU defense ended the season ranked fifth in the country in total defense, allowing only 284.5 yards per contest. They posted two shutouts and led the WAC in every major

defensive category. In 1998, the Horned Frogs scored a school-record six defensive touchdowns, intercepted 12 passes and allowed only 19.6 points per game - the fewest points per game in over 30 years.

Patterson's defenses have been even more spectacular in bowl games. In the 1998 Sun Bowl, TCU held USC to minus-23 yards rushing. One year later, in the 1999 Mobile Alabama Bowl, TCU held East Carolina to minus-16 yards rushing.

Patterson came to TCU following a two-year stint as the defensive coordinator and safeties coach at New Mexico. In 1996, UNM's defense accounted for 22 total takeaways including a dozen pass interceptions and chalked up three defensive touchdowns. A year later, the Lobo defense followed that up with 29 total takeaways, including 16 interceptions.

Patterson arrived at the University of New Mexico campus after having made a similar sudden impact in just one season as the secondary coach at Navy. In the 1995 Division 1-A statistics, the Midshipmen ranked 18th nationally in total defense, 17th in scoring defense and 28th in defensive pass efficiency.

A native of Rozel, Kansas, Patterson received his bachelor's degree in physical education from Kansas State in 1983. He played strong safety and outside linebacker for the Wildcats in 1980-81, and KSU led the nation in pass defense in 1981. Patterson earned his master's degree in educational administration from Tennessee Tech in 1984.

Considered to be one of the brightest, rising young stars in college football, Gary Patterson is in his first season as the head football coach at TCU. He is the 30th head coach in TCU history and is one of 17 head coaches at Division I schools that takes over a program with no previous Division I coaching experience.

Patterson, a finalist for the Frank Broyles National Assistant Coach of the Year award, has served as a college assistant coach for 18 years, including the last three as TCU's defensive coordinator and safeties coach.

Quarterback Casey Printers

122 yards and one touchdown in the season opening loss at Nebraska... TD pass was a 67-yard completion to Matt Schobel after scrambling first to his right, then back across the field to his left... hit on 10-of-16 attempts for 92 yards and one touchdown in the win at North Texas... completed 9-of-16 passes for 74 yards in the rout at SMU... completed 18 passes in 32 attempts for 263 yards, including three touchdowns in the loss to Northwestern State... it was the best statistical game of his career to that point... had his best rushing game of the season at Houston, carrying a season-high 10 times for a season-high 45 yards with one touchdown... also completed 12-of-22 passes for 89 yards vs. the Cougars... completed 3-of-4 passes for 25 yards before leaving the game at Tulane with a bruised right shoulder... did not play in the win over Army... has thrown 15 touchdown passes in his last 10 regular season games... has either thrown a touchdown pass or run for a touchdown in 12 of his last 14 regular season games, accounting for 21 TD's in that span...was one of 30 players mentioned on the preseason watch list for the 2001 Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award, given annually to the nation's top college quarterback... the O'Brien Award is named in honor of the late Davey O'Brien, the All-American and Heisman Trophy-winning quarterback for TCU who led the Horned Frogs to the 1938 national championship.

CAREER:

One of the top quarterbacks in the nation... a candidate for preseason honors... possesses tremendous arm strength... honorable mention All-WAC selection by league head coaches in 2000... has started 29 games in his career, leading the Frogs to a 21-8 record as the starter... ranks third in TCU history with 4,091 career passing yards... 33 career touchdown passes ranks in a tie for fourth all-time... one of four quarterbacks to be featured on the cover of the 2001 edition of Dave Campbell's *Texas Football* magazine... in 2000 he finished first in the WAC and fourth in the NCAA in passing efficiency with a rating of 156.7... he completed 58% (102-176-6) of his passes for a career-high 1,584 yards... the passing yards total ranks ninth in TCU history, and the passing touchdowns tied for fourth... the 1,584 yards passing was the most for a TCU quarterback since 1995, when Max Knake threw for 2,237 yards.

DID YOU KNOW...: With still two games to play, Casey Printers has already surpassed his 2000 season totals for pass attempts and pass completions. Actually, he's accomplished that while playing in just seven games this season (he missed the second half of the Tulane game, all of the Army contest and the first half of the East Carolina tilt).

2001:

Has hit on 108 of 197 pass attempts (54.8 percent) with nine touchdown strikes for 1,294 yards... is just the second quarterback in TCU history to throw for over 1,000 yards in three consecutive seasons, joining Max Knake (1993-95)... has gone over the 300 yard mark in passing in each of the last two games, his first 300-yard passing days of his career... had the best passing game of his career numbers-wise in the loss vs. East Carolina... completed a career-high 24 passes in a career-high 50 attempts (18 more than his previous high) for a career-high 319 yards with a pair of touchdowns, all in the second half... came back with a 22-for-36 effort and 310 yards with a pair of TD passes at UAB... connected on 10 of 21 passes for

C-USA TELECONFERENCE: The Conference USA weekly football coaches' teleconference will be held every Monday. The teleconference will begin at 1:00 p.m. CT. TCU head coach Gary Patterson will occupy the final slot (2:17 p.m.) in the lineup. The coaches will be available for a seven-minute time period. The number to call to participate is (402) 220-4791.

INJURY UPDATE: The Frogs have had their share of injuries this season. Here is a list of those players who are currently on the shelf:

Defensive end **Bo Schobel** - torn ACL in right knee at Nebraska (out for the season).

Linebacker **Josh Goolsby** - torn ACL in right knee at North Texas (out for the season).

Wide receiver/kicker **Shane Hudnall** - broken right leg in practice on Oct. 16 (out for the season).

Wide receiver **Kevin Brown** - injured PCL in right knee vs. SMU. Has not played since.

Wide receiver **Reggie Harrell** - injured PCL in right knee prior to the start of the season and has not played.

Quarterback **Sean Stilley** - high left ankle sprain vs. East Carolina (likely out for the season).

Free safety **Jason Higham** - injured hamstring vs. East Carolina (likely out for the season).

NEXT IN LINE: With the probable season-ending injury to quarterback Sean Stilley, the Frogs are a bit thin at the position behind Casey Printers. Coach Patterson indicated that **Brandon Hassell** (redshirt freshman from Arlington), **Zack Moore** (true freshman from Weatherford) and **Tye Gunn** (true freshman from LaGrange) will get more reps in practice. None of the three have appeared in a college football game. According to Patterson, if something happens to Printers, Hassell would probably be summoned.

STAYIN' STEADY LIKE IT HAS BEEN: The Frogs have been consistently raising the bar when it comes to first downs. After moving the chains just six times vs. Nebraska, the Frogs have steadily increased their first downs, logging 15 at North Texas, 16 at SMU and vs. Northwestern State, 19 at Houston, 21 at Tulane and 24 vs. Army before notching a season-high 26 vs. East Carolina. The Frogs took a small step back at UAB, logging 20 first downs, but still had four more than the Blazers notched.

POSSESSION IS 9/10ths OF THE LAW: The Frogs have been a bit of a ball hog when it comes to possession time. In the last three games, TCU has held the ball for 36:05 (vs. Army), 37:53 (vs. East Carolina) and 30:01 (at UAB). The Frogs have held over a five minute time of possession advantage in four of their last five games and have held an advantage in seven of their nine games. For the year, TCU owns a 32:07-27:52 lead in time of possession, best in Conference USA.

C-USA HONORS: The Horned Frogs have been awarded Conference USA Player of the Week honors five times this season. Placekicker **Nick Browne** was named the Special Teams Player of the Week for September 1 after tying a school record with four field goals against North Texas. **Charlie Owens** was honored following TCU's 38-10 win at SMU on September 8. In that contest the senior free safety recovered a fumble and returned it 36 yards for a touchdown, then intercepted a pass and returned it 21 yards to the one-yard line, setting up another TCU score. **Corey Connally** and **Charlie Owens** were selected as the Conference USA Offensive and Defensive Player of the Week for their efforts in the Frogs' 34-17 win at Houston on September 29. Connally carried 30 times for 199 yards, including an 80-yard touchdown burst, in his first collegiate start. Owens was credited with three forced fumbles leading to 13 points. Junior quarterback **Sean Stilley** was selected as the Conference USA Offensive Player of the Week following his standout performance in TCU's 38-20 win over Army. He completed 21-of-29 passes for 273 yards and three touchdowns without an interception in his first career start.

WAITING IS THE HARDEST PART: The Frogs have plenty of time to think about their opponents this season. After opening with games in three consecutive weeks, TCU (along the rest of the county) had an unexpected off week September 15, giving them two weeks to get ready for Northwestern State. They also had two weeks to prepare for Tulane. After the game with Army, TCU had 10 days to prepare for East Carolina, 11 days to prepare for UAB, 13 days to prepare for Louisville and two full weeks to prepare for Southern Miss, a game that has been moved back to December 7. From its season-opening clash at Nebraska in the Pigskin Classic on August 25, TCU squeezes an 11-game schedule into a 16-week calendar.

SEEING RED: The Frogs have scored in 26 of 31 possessions this season when getting inside the opponents 20-yard line, including 19 touchdowns. They came away empty in the overtime vs. Northwestern State when a field goal attempt was blocked, were denied once at Houston on an intercepted pass, had the clock run out at the end of the Tulane game and were stopped on downs twice against East Carolina while in the redzone.

NICK GETS HIS KICKS: TCU sophomore placekicker **Nick Browne** is well on his way to a "double-double" in scoring. On the gridiron, he is TCU's top scorer with 57 points, converting 24-of-25 extra point attempts and hitting on 11-of-14 field goals. Five of his 11 field goals have come from 40 yards or beyond, including a career-long 47-yarder vs. East Carolina. He also was the leading scorer on the TCU soccer team this fall with five goals and three assists for 13 total points.

BIASATTI'S BIG BOOTS: Junior punter **Joey Biasatti** has bounced back from a broken leg last season to enjoy an excellent campaign this year. He has punted 53 times for an average of 43.2 yards per punt (26th in the country), including a 52.8 yard per punt average at Tulane, the third best single-game punting in TCU history. In that contest, he boomed one punt a season-best 71 yards. 17 of his 53 punts have pinned the opponents inside the 20. The opposing team is averaging just 5.3 yards on its punt returns. The Frogs net punting average is 39.1 yards, 13th in the nation.

RUNNING BACK TANDEM: The Frogs tail-back position has been split between a pair of sophomores in **Ricky Madison** and **Corey Connally**. Madison had the work early in the season with 61 carries for 215 yards through the season's first four games. An ankle injury allowed Connally to move to the front of the pack and he responded with 424 yards on 80 carries during the next three games, including a 199-yard effort at Houston. A groin injury put Connally back on the sideline, allowing Madison to carry the load in the last two games. For the season, Connally has carried 98 times for 444 yards, while Madison has rushed 119 times for 373 yards.

GOSS LEADS THE NATION: Junior **Jason Goss** has been the Frogs top cornerback this season. Goss has been at the top of the list both in the conference and nationally with 21 passes defended, an average of 2.3 passes defended per game. Goss also ranks third in punt returns in the conference with a 12.1 yards per return average, including a 50-yard return for a score vs. Tulane.

HILLIARD CLIMBS TO THE TOP: Junior **Kenneth Hilliard**, who moved from cornerback to free safety this season, had a monster game vs. Northwestern State, recording 20 tackles, including 13 solo stops. For the season, he is TCU's top tackler with 72 stops, including 50 unassisted tackles.

DEFENSE SCORES: The Frogs defense has come up with three touchdowns this season. The defense scored twice at SMU as **Charlie Owens** recovered a Mustang fumble at the 36-yard line and rambled in for six and **LaMarcus McDonald** recovered an SMU fumble at the one and fell into the endzone for another TCU score. The Frogs nearly got a third defensive score in that contest when Owens picked off a pass and returned it 21 yards to the SMU one-yard line. At Houston, Owens caused a fumble in the endzone which was recovered by **Joe Hill** for a touchdown. Ironically, the 2000 TCU defense, which was the top-ranked defense in the country, did not account for a touchdown all season.

FINISH STRONG: TCU has won its last two regular season games in each of the last three seasons.

GODBOLT MINISTERS THE "D": Redshirt freshman **Marvin Godbolt**, who recorded his first interception of his career at UAB, burst onto the collegiate scene in a big way in the Pigskin Classic. The Frogs' strong safety from San Antonio made seven tackles, five behind the line of scrimmage for a total of 37 yards in losses in the Frogs' season opener at Nebraska. He was honored for his performance by being named the TCU MVP on ABC-Sports, receiving a \$5,000 scholarship. He ranks among the leaders in both tackles for loss and sacks for freshmen.

MCDONALD SHINES AS WELL: Junior linebacker **LaMarcus McDonald** has been impressive as well. The Waco product is second on the squad with 67 tackles, including 17 for losses totaling 61 yards.

THE BAYER FACTS: Senior linebacker **Chad Bayer** has developed from a walk-on player into an all-league candidate. The 5-11, 231-pounder from Smithville led the Frogs in tackles with 107 in 2000, including 71 solo stops. He was one of 69 players across the country named to the Butkus Watch List. The prestigious Butkus Award, named for Hall-of-Famer Dick Butkus, is given annually to the nation's best linebacker. He has picked up the pace of late, racking up a dozen tackles at Tulane and 11 more at UAB. He is currently third on the team with 59 tackles, nine of which have been for lost yardage.

OWENS OPERATES AT HIGH LEVEL: **Charlie Owens** always seems to be around the action. The senior safety is fourth on the squad with 57 tackles, including six for loss. In addition he has one interception, two fumble recoveries and has been credited with a pair of forced fumbles. His efforts have twice earned him Conference USA Defensive Player of the Week honors.

NOVEMBER SUCCESS: Despite the loss on at UAB, the Frogs have had their share of success recently during the month of November. TCU was 3-1 in November of 2000, 3-0 in November of 1999 and 2-1 in November of 1998.

VICTOR BRINGS THE PAYNE: He's the only returning starter of "The Big Uglies," TCU's offensive line, but Victor Payne is a good one. The strongest player on the squad with an 800-pound squat to his credit, Payne has made 33 collegiate starts. No other offensive lineman made a collegiate start prior to the 2001 season. Last season, the five "Big Uglies" combined for 169 career starts. At six-foot and 305 pounds, Payne was named the Best Blocker in Conference USA by *The Sporting News*. The magazine says, "Payne is aptly named. Truly a bull Frog, Payne is a defender's nightmare when he is pulling and barreling around the edge with a full head of steam."

POST-SEASON FOR PAYNE: TCU offensive guard **Victor Payne** has been issued an invitation to participate in the Rotary Gridiron Classic presented by Tyco. The all-star game features college seniors from around the United States against Team Florida, composed of athletes who either played college football in Florida or have other ties to the Sunshine State. The game will be played on Saturday, January 26th at 2 p.m. (EST) at the Orlando Citrus Bowl.

AND FOR OWENS: Senior safety **Charlie Owens** has been invited to play in the annual East-West Shrine Football Game.

TEXAS FLAVOR: The Frogs certainly have a Texas flavor on their roster. Of the starting 22 players on the depth chart, all 22 are from the Lone Star State. In fact, the Frogs only have six players on their roster who are not from the state of Texas. The interlopers include Chase Johnson, Jon Muther and Andrew Calovich, all from the Kansas City area, Chris Wingate (Tucson, Ariz.), Bobby Blankenship (Calaebasas, Calif.) and Anthony Gilliam (Tulsa, Okla.).

MEDIA LUNCHEON: Coach Patterson and selected TCU players can be joined every Tuesday during the football season in the Special Events room at the Justin Center beginning at noon.

FROG TALK: TCU Head Football Coach Gary Patterson joins the "Voice of the Frogs," Brian Estridge every Thursday from 6:00-7:00 p.m. at Fox and Hound English Pub & Grille in the Cityview Shopping Center (I-20 and Bryant Irvin Road) for Frog Talk. SCOUTING THE LOUISVILLE FOOTBALL CARDINALS:

Louisville has dominated most of their opponents this season, averaging over 30 points per game while allowing just 14 points per contest. Junior quarterback Dave Ragone is one of the nation's top signal callers. He has completed nearly 60 percent of his pass attempts for over 240 yards per game, with 17 touchdowns and just six interceptions. His top target is senior wide receiver Deion Branch, who averages over 16 yards a reception. Branch is also an excellent punt returner. Defensive end Dewayne White leads the conference in tackles for loss.

TCU'S DEFENSE BY THE NUMBERS: The Frogs have had 563 plays run against them this season. 316 of the 563 (56.1 percent) have been for 2 yards or less. 98 of the 563 (17.4 percent) have gone for 10 or more yards. Here's the complete breakdown:

IN THE BOOTH: The Frogs send offensive coordinator Mike Schultz, defensive coordinator Chuck Driesbach, safeties coach Chad Glasgow and quarterbacks coach Dan Lounsbury to the press box during the game, while offensive line coach Eddie Williamson, assistant head coach David Bailiff, wide receivers coach Jarrett Anderson, cornerbacks coach Willie Mack Garza and special teams coach Dan Sharp are on the sidelines.

RANKED OPPONENTS: The Frogs have faced eight top 25 opponents since the Southwest Conference disbanded after the 1995 season. TCU is 2-6 in those contests, defeating #20 East Carolina, 28-14 in the 1999 Mobile Alabama Bowl and topping #23 Air Force, 35-34 in 1998. They played three ranked opponents in 1996, falling to #24 Kansas, 52-17; #24 Utah, 21-7; and #15 BYU, 45-21. They were on the short end of a 31-10 decision to #5 North Carolina in 1997, lost a 35-31 verdict to #15 Arizona in 1999 and fell to #4 Nebraska in Lincoln to open the 2001 campaign.

LOOKING AHEAD: The Frogs will have two weeks to prepare for their final regular season game. In a rematch of last year's Mobile Alabama Bowl, the Frogs will travel to Hattiesburg to face Southern Miss on Friday, Dec. 7. Game time is set for 7:00 p.m. The contest will be televised on ESPN2.
