RICHARDSON STADIUM



The first game ever at Richardson Stadium was played more than 100 years ago, a 9-5 win over Toronto on Oct. 8, 1921, played in front of 3,500 fans. Bill Campbell scored the first touchdown at the stadium.

The original Richardson Stadium was located on what is now Tindall Field and Mackintosh-Corry Hall on Queen's campus, and was a gift of James Armstrong Richardson, Queen's Chancellor from 1929 to 1939. The stadium is named after Richardson's brother, George Taylor Richardson (BSc 1909), who was a prominent athlete at Queen's in both football and hockey. George Richardson was killed in combat on February 10, 1916 in France during the First World War.

The original Richardson Stadium was also host to Queen's victory in the 10th Grey Cup, their first of three straight Grey Cup wins, on Dec. 12, 1922. Led by Canadian Football Hall of Famers Harry "Red" Batsone and Frank "Pep" Leadley, Queen's defeated Edmonton 13-1 in front of 4,700 fans.

Eighteen Yates Cup winning teams and one Vanier Cup winning team called Richardson Stadium home over 50 seasons from 1921-1970.

Richardson Stadium moved to its current location on West Campus in 1971, with much of the new stadium constructed using pieces of the original stadium, including the upper portion of the east bleachers. The new stadium had seating for more than 10,000 fans.

Queen's teams that played in the new Richardson Stadium have added another four Yates Cups, seven Dunsmore Cups, and three Vanier Cups. The most recent championship came in 2009, when Queen's went 7-1 in the regular season, including a perfect 4-0 at



home, and captured the Yates Cup and Mitchell Bowl at home before winning the program's fourth Vanier Cup at Laval.

Richardson Stadium was revitalized in 2016, thanks to the generous support of Kim (Artsci'76) and Stu Lang (Sc'74), who pledged \$10 million, the Richardson Foundation, who pledged, \$5 million, and other donors who brought the total amount raised to more than \$17 million.

The revitalization brought to Richardson Stadium artificial turf field, a state-of-the-art scoreboard, and bowl-seating.

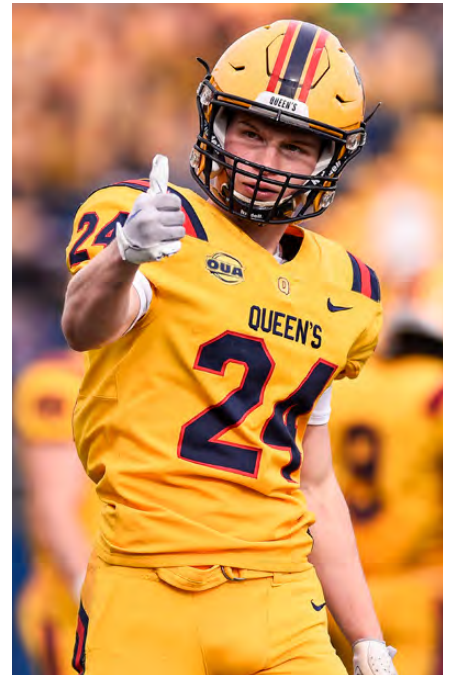
And Richardson Stadium was completed this summer with the Lang Pavillion, which completely encloses the field and brings the seating capacity up to 10,000. More on the Lang Pavillion on pages 28-29.

Richardson Stadium will be the venue when Queen's hosts the 2023 and 2024 Vanier Cup. The 58th edition of the Vanier Cup will be held Saturday, Nov. 25, 2023, and will be the first Vanier Cup game in Kingston, and the third time a Canadian university football title game is played in the city, dating back to the 1920 and 1929 Canadian Intercollegiate Rugby Football Union (CIRFU) title games.

Richardson Stadium Fun Facts

- Home field for Queen's Football and Queen's Men's and Women's Soccer. (Queen's Football is 18-10 overall at home since the stadium's revitalization in 2016).
- Hosted the 1922 Grey Cup between Queen's and Edmonton (13-1 win for Queen's).
- Played host to the 2008 Churchill Cup (Rugby).
- Canada defeated the USA by a score of 4-0 at Richardson Stadium in an International Friendly prior to the U20 Men's Soccer World Cup in 2007.
- Hosted a pair of Men's Soccer World Cup Qualifying matches in 2004, with Canada defeating Belize twice by identical 4-0 scores.
- Ranked No. 1 stadium in the OUA by 13th Man Sports in 2022.
- Hosted JUNO Award-winning rock band The Glorious Sons concert in front of nearly 14,000 people in 2019.

ANTHONY SOLES ON HIS SUMMER SUMMITTING MOUNTAINS FOR A GOOD CAUSE

Running back Anthony Soles is coming off an incredible season with Queen's Football in 2022. The native of Pointe Claire, Que. led the OUA in touchdowns with 11, before adding another four scores on the ground in the playoffs.

Ahead of the 2023 season, Soles spent part of his summer hiking and summitting mountains across North America. The trip, which Soles endeavoured on with his friend William Stone-Barney, was also to raise money and awareness for ALS.

Soles lost his father to the disease in 2021, and the cause was inspired by an email Soles received from his father before he passed.

"We were trying to find different plans and finally we came to the idea (of hiking and summitting mountains), which was based off an email I had re-discovered, that was sent to me by my dad before he passed, telling us to seize the day. The one thing that he regretted was not traveling enough and suggesting whenever you have the chance, to travel and really see the world.

"We decided to do a month-long trip across North America, into the U.S. and back through Canada, spreading awareness (of ALS) and also conquering some of our personal goals, climbing some mountains that

were very difficult, very tall. I had the opportunity to see how beautiful North America is while pushing ourselves to new limits."

The trip was a month-long and Soles and Stone-Barney summitted four mountains in total, including Mount Shasta and Mount Whitney, the highest mountain in the contiguous United States at 14,505 feet, both in California.

Looking back on the whole experience, and why he embarked on it to begin with, Soles said it really meant a lot to him.

"It was huge. I lost my dad two years ago and I never really talked about it, I kind of pushed it aside. This was a chance for me to talk about what happened and show my support.

"It felt great to be able to have a strong voice. And I think my dad would be super proud. Just the fact that I was able to do this for myself and also for such a great fundraiser, it really meant everything."

Soles and Stone-Barney nearly quadrupled their initial fundraising goal of \$5,000, raising more than \$19,000 for ALS Quebec, and also raised awareness about the disease at every stop along the way of their adventure.



"On the hikes, for the ones that were appropriate, we would wear lime green ALS t-shirts, which were for the disease we're fundraising for. We'd have around 10 to 15 people stop us on every hike, asking us about the t-shirts. We talked to them about the fundraiser, explained the whole thing, explained the whole trip, and really made some bonds with people."

Soles was also able to connect with his father at his family's piece of land out west. Soles said one of his favourite memories of the trip was visiting family just off Vancouver Island.

"The family I went to go see in Vancouver, it was my great uncle, who was my dad's uncle. And growing up, my dad would go there every summer and he would work, they have a little spot on Salt Spring Island where it's a little community. My dad grew up going to work there and he'd spend all his summers there. And honestly, it was his favourite spot in the world. I got to spend some meaningful time out on that island and see all that he helped build. I got to spend time in one of his favourite places in the world, so that was really meaningful."

Soles said his family at Queen's Football was also very supportive of his trip and the cause he was fundraising for. Teammate Eric Colonna, through his popular Instagram account pick6athletics, provided Soles work outs and stretches to keep him from getting sore in between hikes and climbing. And many of his teammates, as well as some opponents throughout U SPORTS, helped spread the word in Soles' fundraising efforts.

"It was really great. When I posted the whole thing on my Instagram, it was amazing to see all my teammates started reposting it and even other players from other teams who I only know as opponents, they also started posting as well."

"It really showed how strong our community was and was able to reach out to all of their own communities and it just helped it grow so much."

Soles is now back on the field after his tremendous year last season. A He tied Queen's Football's single-game touchdown record with four in the team's Week 5 win over the Guelph Gryphons, and his 11 scores on the season sit tied for seventh all-time in single-season touchdowns in Queen's Football history.

When asked to reflect on those numbers, Soles said he was happier for the team's success in 2022.

"We were doubted going into that season, with COVID dividing the league into two conferences in 2021. People doubted our actual strength as a team."

"Being able to prove to them that, although we still didn't get the results we wanted, we aren't a team you want to mess with. We are a great team, and we are continuing to build that."



Soles was one of several running backs that experienced success on the field for Queen's Football in 2022. While he led the team in rushing with 847 yards (regular season and playoffs combined), five other Queen's players finished the year with more than 100 yards rushing, including three running backs in Jared Chisari (657 yards), Yann Longa (397 yards), and Jaden Blackman (160 yards), while Greg Jones-Sealy and Jayden Kerr also made impacts on the field.

Soles said the running back room at Queen's is an extremely tight-knit group.

"It's as tight as you can get, three of them are my roommates," Soles said of his fellow running backs. "Since we've gotten here, we've been as close as you could be. We don't exclude, we're a very big community. At the end of the day it is somewhat a competition to be playing, but there's no spite. They earned it, we all understand that, and we're all proud of each other."

And if another running back breaks a long run while Soles is on the sideline, he said he's always one of the loudest cheering for it.

"I would say so. If you look on the tape, you will see us being the first ones to run to them, be cheering

the most, and be jumping up and down the most and really be thrilled for each other, just seeing each other thrive."

Looking ahead, the team-oriented Soles said all of his goals for the 2023 season are connected to the team's overall success.

"I don't have any individual goals, to be honest. It'd be great to have a lot of rushing yards touchdowns and match what I was able to do last year, but really my goal is to be able to contribute as well as I can to reach our team goals."

And as for off-the-field goals, Soles went back to the email he received from his father that inspired his trip this past summer and sparked a passion for travel. He said he has his sights set on his next bucket list item in that regard.

"Definitely Scotland. We didn't know our heritage for a long time, and finally my sister did an ancestry test and we found out that we are like 40 per cent Scottish. It would be a dream place for me to go."

STEVE SNYDER - HEAD COACH



Steve Snyder is in his fifth season with Queen's Football, and has helped the team become perennial contenders in the OUA since returning from the COVID-19 pandemic cancelled 2020 season.

Snyder led Queen's Football to their second straight appearance in the Yates Cup last year. Queen's finished the regular season second in the OUA with a 7-1 record before advancing to the 114th Yates Cup with playoff wins over Toronto and Ottawa.

Snyder was named the U SPORTS Coach of the Year and was also awarded the David 'Tuffy' Knight Award as OUA Coach of the Year in 2021 after guiding Queen's Football to an undefeated 6-0 regular season and the 113th Yates Cup.

Snyder joined the Gaels ahead of the 2019 season and finished with a 3-5 record in his first season on the sidelines at Queen's. After starting the season with three losses, Snyder and the Gaels went 3-2 down the stretch. The 2020 season was cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

During his three seasons with Queen's Football, nine players have been named U SPORTS All-Canadians and 18 players have been OUA All-Stars. Queen's Football has also had 61 players recognized as U SPORTS Academic All-Canadians since 2019 with Snyder as Head Coach.

Prior to his time with Queen's, Snyder spent two seasons as the Offensive Coordinator for the Western Mustangs, helping the program earn the top-ranked offence in U SPORTS in 2017 and 2018, two Yates Cup victories, back-to-back Vanier Cup appearances, and the Vanier Cup title in 2017.

He also served three seasons as the Offensive Coordinator for the St. Francis Xavier X-Men and two seasons as the Special Teams Coordinator for the Windsor Lancers at the U SPORTS level. Snyder also has experience coaching at the high school, Ontario Varsity Football League, provincial, and national level in Canada, and professionally in Germany.

NICO KWEMO ON GROWING UP AND PLAYING SPORTS WITH BROTHERS NELKAS AND SAKHIA

Queen's Football receiver Nico Kwemo is the third Kwemo brother to play for Queen's Football after Nelkas, a linebacker, suited up for the Tricolour from 2014-17, and Sakhia, a receiver, played for Queen's from 2017-21, overlapping with Nico in 2021. Nico chatted about growing up playing football – and all sports – with his brothers.

With your two older brothers having played here, how many games did you see at Richardson Stadium?

I came through a lot. I had an older brother already playing here and before that another older brother was playing for Queen's so I got a taste of the Queen's tradition long before I even took part in it. 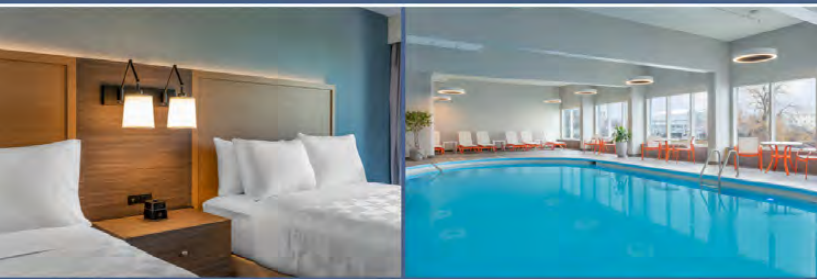
What was it like growing up playing football – or maybe soccer – with your brothers? Was it ever ultra competitive?

You have guys where they're four-year guys, and you're in year one, so I'm playing with my brothers. First time I got on the same team as my brother was in 2021 after the COVID year. I never got to play with them on a team before, but it was definitely new experience.

How close are you and your brothers and do you bond over football?

Super close. A lot of people think that football is what brings us closer but honestly, it's the last element of the puzzle. I have to be grateful for my parents for making sure that we stay close because I know a lot of families that's not the case. My siblings and I, we're really, really close; those are my best friends. We share everything and times apart where we're all doing our own things, that happens when you grow up, it gets a bit harder, but we're super close.

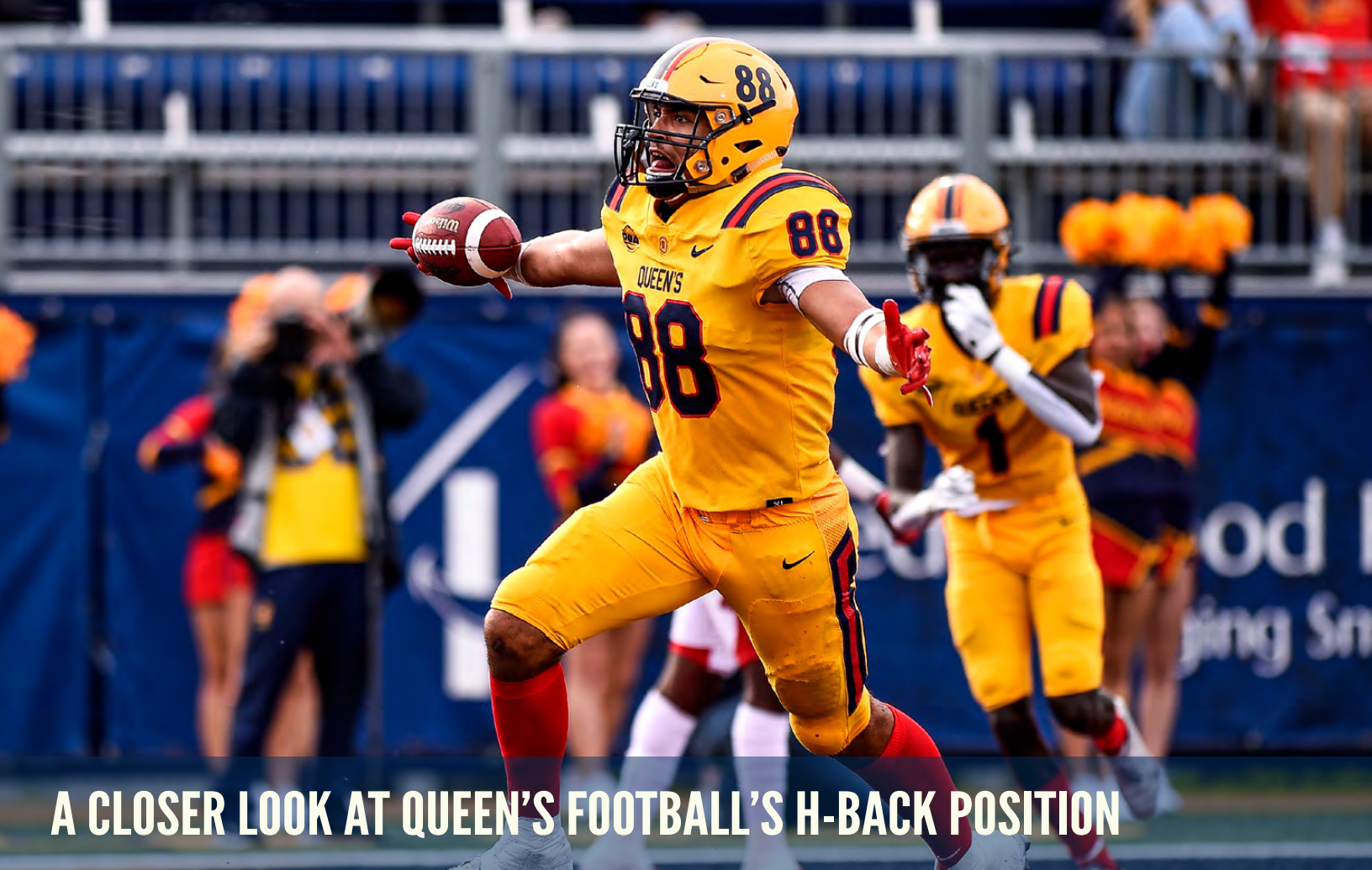

A CLOSER LOOK AT QUEEN'S FOOTBALL'S H-BACK POSITION

Late in the third quarter of Queen's Football's Week 6 win over the York Lions last season, Liam Silverson lined up along the offensive line as an inline blocker. Rather than staying on the line of scrimmage to help block, Silverson broke free and darted for the end zone where quarterback Alex Vreeken found him wide open for a four-yard touchdown pass to pad Queen's lead in the big win.

The play was one of several examples of the versatility that Silverson and Niklas Henning brought to the H-Back position for Queen's Football all season. The two helped Queen's Football add a useful tool to their offence at H-Back, a unique position that doesn't fit in just one box.

"The H-Back position at Queen's is the offensive position for hybrid athletes," Silverson said. "At Queen's, you have to be able to run and catch like a receiver and block like an offensive lineman. And so we're pretty versatile at Queen's. We're like the Swiss Army Knife of football players."

Silverson and Henning are easy to spot on the football field. Silverson is listed at 6'7 and Henning at

6'6, and the duo have a valuable combination of size and speed to be effective everywhere on the field.

"There are other teams that do have H-Backs listed on their roster, but they don't usually utilize them as much as we do," Henning said. "I think the primary reason for that is we just have the athletes for it. We have very tall, quick, strong, very versatile athletes that we can plug in wherever they need to be on the field."

Both Silverson and Henning were used often in Queen's Football's offence last year, with Head Coach Steve Snyder and Offensive Coordinator Tom Flaxman utilizing the two in successful packages. Silverson finished last year with four receptions for 62 yards and a touchdown and the pair played a big role in helping Queen's reach their second straight Yates Cup Championship. The team often found a way to use their versatility to an advantage.

"The most important skills I bring to the position is my ability to run like a receiver, block like offensive lineman," Silverson said.

"I create a lot of mismatches for the defence because of my size. It creates a lot of opportunities for our offence."

"What sets me apart is that I have the size and the strength to almost act as an extra offensive lineman," Henning said. "That opens up our run game because if I can match up with defensive ends, it completely opens up the field because all of a sudden there's six linemen on the field as opposed to five."

And while Silverson finished with more offensive stats last season, he agreed that blocking is one of his favourite tasks of the position.

"I love blocking," Silverson said. "I love hitting people. Catching the ball and scoring touchdowns is nice, but I really love just physically dominating people and being a menace. I love it."

Silverson's touchdown grab against York was highlighted by everyone in the stadium, but among the players in the H-Back position group, it's the things not all fans notice that get as much love and respect on the sidelines during games.

Henning said the position group is extremely tight-knit, and root for everyone to impress equally.

"It's a very close group. We all watch each other get reps and I think that's why we do develop so much as a group, everyone's so invested in the other reps that other people are taking in, not just their own, and everyone's happy to see everyone else succeed too."

Neither Silverson nor Henning came to Queen's with the expectation to play H-Back.

After playing tight end at Holy Cross in Kingston, under Queen's Football alumni and Vanier Cup Champions Tim Pendergast and Patrick Corbin, Silverson joined Queen's ahead of the 2020 season as a receiver.

"It wasn't until the season was over and our exit meetings that the coaches brought up me potentially being an H-Back. And I loved the idea because it was more of what I was doing in high school, and I loved what I was doing in high school, so I was super excited to play."

And Henning didn't originally have football in his plans when he arrived at Queen's. A high school tight end, defensive end, and kicker, Henning contacted

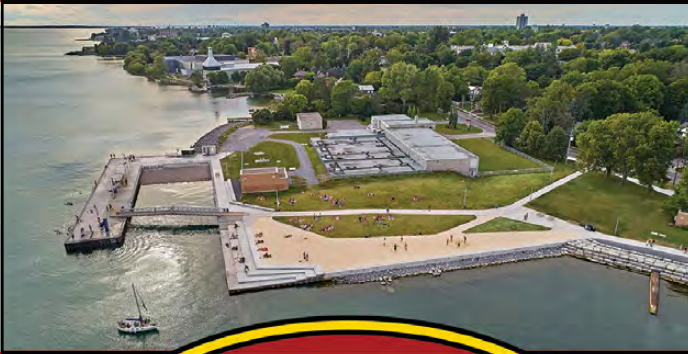
Snyder ahead of training camp, and very quickly found his spot on the team.

"In late July or August, I messaged Snyder saying, 'I am interested in the team. Is there a possibility that I try out' and in that email I mentioned I played tight end and defensive end. They accepted me and I showed up to training camp and they're like, 'Yeah, you're with the H's.'"

Both players have now found a home at the position they love playing, and give Queen's Football an added dimension to their potent offence.

QUEEN'S TO HOST VANIER CUP AS PART OF TRICOLOUR CHAMPIONSHIP

U SPORTS announced earlier this year that Queen's University will host the 2023 and 2024 editions of the Vanier Cup at Richardson Memorial Stadium.

The 58th edition of the Vanier Cup will be held Saturday, Nov. 25, 2023, at 1 pm ET.

The 2023 championship is the first Vanier Cup game in Kingston, and the third time a Canadian university football title game is played in the city, dating back to the 1920 and 1929 Canadian Intercollegiate Rugby Football Union (CIRFU) title games. Kingston is the eighth city to host the championship since its inception in 1965, with Toronto hosting on 41 occasions, Quebec City seven times, Hamilton five and once in London, Montreal, Saskatoon and Vancouver.

"U SPORTS is thrilled to partner with the Queen's University to present this 58th edition of the Vanier Cup," said Lisette Johnson-Stapley, U SPORTS Chief Sport Officer. "Kingston is one of Canada's premier university sports cities, and Queen's has a long track history of hosting great U SPORTS championships. We know that the teams and fans travelling to the

2023 Vanier Cup will have a memorable experience, and we can't wait for kickoff on Nov. 25!"

Queen's University is one of Canada's premier post-secondary institutions, and its athletics programs are a vital part of the university experience for students.

"Queen's University is delighted to be hosting the Vanier Cup in 2023 and 2024," says Principal Deane. "Queen's is home to many traditions, and among our most beloved and celebrated is Queen's Football, which dates back to 1882. We look forward to welcoming the student-athletes and coaches, as well as fans from across the country to Richardson Stadium, our campus, and city."

Queen's Athletics dates to its founding in 1873, with its football program beginning on October 11, 1882. The program has won four Vanier Cups (1968, 1978, 1992, 2009), three Grey Cups (1922, 1923, 1924) and 30 provincial championships. The legacy of Queen's football is a part of Kingston's cultural fabric, and the long-standing community support of the university athletics is why the 2023 and 2024 championships are heading to Frontenac County.

“Queen’s Athletics & Recreation is thrilled to be awarded the 58th and 59th Vanier Cups. In tandem with the 2023 U SPORTS Women’s Soccer Championships and the 2024 U SPORTS Men’s Volleyball Championships, we are looking forward to our campus and city becoming a hub for the best student-athletes in Canada,” said Linda Melnick, Executive Director, Queen’s Athletics & Recreation. “When the revitalization of Richardson Stadium began in 2014, the vision was for a venue capable of bringing the Vanier Cup to Kingston, and with the completion of the Lang Pavilion this summer we feel there’s no better stadium in Canada to host this championship. We are incredibly grateful to our community partners within the City of Kingston, the support of the National and Provincial football organizations, Queen’s University and our own Queen’s Football program for their support of our bid. We are excited to welcome fans and alumni from across Canada to Richardson Stadium for a celebration of Canadian Football in November 2023 and 2024.”

U SPORTS also unveiled the Vanier Cup championship logo that integrates a local landmark into the visual identity of the championship. The emblem features historic Kingston City Hall, a national historic site. The building, completed in 1844, was built to reflect the city’s status as the Capital of the Province of Canada (1861-1864) and features a distinct neoclassical look designed by legendary architect George Browne.

The 2023 Uteck and Mitchell Bowl U SPORTS national semifinals take place Saturday, Nov. 18, with the winners advancing to the Vanier Cup. The Uteck Bowl pits the Ontario University Athletics (OUA) Yates Cup champions against the host Réseau du sport étudiant du Québec (RSEQ) Dunsmore Cup champions. At the same time, the 2023 Mitchell Bowl will see Atlantic University Sport (AUS) Jewett Trophy winners travelling to face the Canada West (CW) Hardy Cup champions.

The 2023 Vanier Cup will air on CBC Television (English) and TVA Sports (French) and be available on both broadcasters’ digital platforms.

Queen's Football had three players selected in the 2023 Canadian Football League Draft Tuesday night. Offensive linemen Theo Grant and Evan Floren, and receiver Richard Burton all heard their name called in the annual draft.

Grant (Halifax, N.S.) was selected in the fourth round, 32nd overall, by the Montreal Alouettes.

Burton (Ottawa, Ont.) was selected in the sixth round, 47th overall, by the Toronto Argonauts.

Floren (Ancaster, Ont.) was selected in the seventh round, 57th overall, by the Saskatchewan Roughriders.
