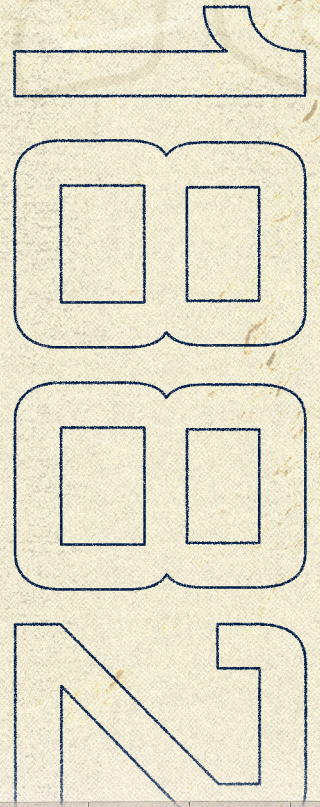

RICHARDSON STADIUM



The original Richardson Stadium was located on what is now Tindall Field and Mackintosh-Corry Hall on Queen's campus, and was a gift of James Armstrong Richardson, Queen's Chancellor from 1929 to 1939. The stadium is named after Richardson's brother, George Taylor Richardson (BSc 1909), who was a prominent athlete at Queen's in both football and hockey. George Richardson was killed in combat on February 10, 1916 in France during the First World War.

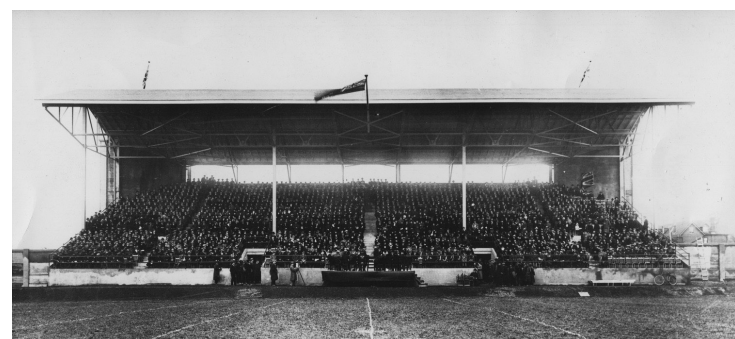
The first ever game at Richardson Stadium was played more than 100 years ago, a 9-5 win over Toronto on Oct. 8, 1921, played in front of 3,500 fans. Bill Campbell scored the first touchdown at the stadium.

The original Richardson Stadium was also host to Queen's victory in the 10th Grey Cup, their first of three straight Grey Cup wins, on Dec. 12, 1922. Led by Canadian Football Hall of Famers Harry "Red" Batsone and Frank "Pep" Leadley, Queen's defeated Edmonton 13-1 in front of 4,700 fans.

Eighteen Yates Cup winning teams and one Vanier Cup winning team called Richardson Stadium home over 50 seasons from 1921-1970.

Richardson Stadium moved to its current location on West Campus in 1971, with much of the new stadium constructed using pieces of the original stadium, including the upper portion of the east bleachers. The new stadium had seating for more than 10,000 fans.

Queen's teams that played in the new Richardson Stadium have



added another four Yates Cups, seven Dunsmore Cups, and three Vanier Cups. The most recent championship came in 2009, when Queen's went 7-1 in the regular season, including a perfect 4-0 at

home, and captured the Yates Cup and Mitchell Bowl at home before winning the program's fourth Vanier Cup at Laval.

Richardson Stadium was revitalized in 2016, thanks to the generous support of Kim (Artsci'76) and Stu Lang (Sc'74), who pledged \$10 million, the Richardson Foundation, who pledged, \$5 million, and other donors who brought the total amount raised to more than \$17 million.

The revitalization brought to Richardson Stadium artificial turf field, a state-of-the-art scoreboard, and bowl-seating.

And Richardson Stadium was completed in 2023 with the Lang Pavillion, which completely enclosed the field and brought the seating capacity up to 10,000.

Richardson Stadium was the venue for the 58th and 59th Vanier Cups in 2023 and 2024, respectively. The two recent Vanier Cups were the third and fourth time a Canadian university football title game is played in the city, dating back to the 1920 and 1929 Canadian Intercollegiate Rugby Football Union (CIRFU) title games..

QUEEN'S FOOTBALL: PLAYING FOR KINGSTON SINCE 1882

For more than 140 years, Queen's Football has stood as a pillar of tradition, excellence, and community spirit, representing Kingston with pride since its first official game in 1882. Generations of student-athletes have donned the Tricolour, forming a storied program that blends rich history with an unwavering commitment to compete at the highest level.

From its earliest days, Queen's Football built something meaningful for the university, the community, and the countless alumni and supporters who rally around the team season after season. That connection between Queen's Football and the Kingston community is as strong today as it has been throughout the history of the program.

"One of the great things about coming to Queen's is really embracing the city of Kingston and the beautiful surrounding area, the city has a unique culture shaped around a love for university football, Canadian history, proximity and access to the water and of course the incredible restaurants," said Queen's Football Head Coach Steve Snyder.

"For our student-athletes being a beacon for sport to the community in particular youth athletes is a responsibility they take very seriously, ultimately we are trying to enhance the quality of life for Kingstonians by providing a great sports entertainment product. We are proud to call Kingston home, for our players

who move on after graduation, they know they can always come back to Kingston, their home away from home."

Over the decades, Queen's Football has built a remarkable championship pedigree. With eight national championships (four Vanier Cups, three Grey Cups, and one Dominion Cup) and 30 league championships (23 Yates Cups, seven Dunsmore Cups), the program has consistently been one of the most successful in Canadian university football.

Last year, Queen's Football reached another historic milestone, securing the 500th win in program history with a road victory over the Ottawa Gee-Gees. The win underscored Queen's Football's status in U SPORTS history and the milestone was a celebration of every player, coach, and supporter who helped shape the program over the past 140-plus years.

"Playing in Kingston is amazing. To bring it back to the recruiting aspect, it's hard for me to recruit guys sometimes because I love Kingston and I love Queen's so much that it almost sounds fake," said Queen's Football linebacker Justin Pace.

"I tell them how great this is and how fun this is, and it just sounds like I'm just selling them a dream. But I strongly believe that Queen's is the best place in Canada to play a football. There is nothing better

than being a Golden Gael and running out of the tunnel at Richardson Stadium in a packed house.”

This fall, Queen’s is once again honouring its proud past by inducting a new class into the Queen’s Football Hall of Fame. Among the honourees is the inaugural team, the squad who took to the field in 1882 and laid the foundation for all that would follow. Their inclusion is a tribute to the program’s longevity and evolution.

Other inductees to the Queen’s Football Class of 2025 include players Joel Dagnone (1989-93), Ryan Granberg (2008-13), Cam Innes (1968-70), Osie Ukwuoma (2005-11), Tim Pendergast (1988-92), Sam Sabourin (2010-13), Dan Village (2006-11), and Derek Wiggan (2010-14); and builders Ron Augustine (1999-2019), Frank Halligan (1994-2000), Pat Sheahan (2000-18), Pat Tracey (2000-13), and Max Jackson, Doug Jefferies, Mike Postovit, and Claude Scilley (Media).

Queen’s Football is more than just the players and coaches—it’s about the fans who have stood by the

team through generations as well. Later in this year’s Yearbook, readers can look forward to a special feature on Lois Hazlett, a long-time supporter whose devotion to Queen’s Football exemplifies the passion that lives in the heart of the program. Lois, who has been a Queen’s Football season ticket holder for 69 years, will be honoured as part of the Hall of Fame celebration with the Legacy Fan of Distinction recognition.

“It’s something you can’t really put into words, but to have the community support and hopefully win it all this year in front of a great student base, a great community, that’s the goal,” said Queen’s Football receiver Russell Weir.

As the 2025 team embarks on another season, it does so with the inspiration of history behind it. Every time Queen’s Football runs onto the field at Richardson Stadium, they represent not just today’s players, but every class that came before them. They play for Queen’s and for the community, and are building on a legacy that began in 1882 and continues to thrive.

STEVE SNYDER - HEAD COACH



Steve Snyder, in his sixth year coaching the Gaels, led Queen's Football to a 5-3 regular season record last season before advancing to the semifinals in the OUA Playoffs.

Snyder led Queen's Football to two straight appearances in the Yates Cup - 2021, 2022.

Queen's finished the regular season fifth in the OUA with a 7-1 record before advancing to the 114th Yates Cup with playoff wins over Toronto and Ottawa in 2022. Snyder was named the U SPORTS Coach of the Year and was also awarded the David 'Tuffy' Knight Award as OUA Coach of the Year in 2021 after guiding Queen's Football to an undefeated 6-0 regular season and the 113th Yates Cup.

Snyder joined the Gaels ahead of the 2019 season and finished with a 3-5 record in his first season on the sidelines at Queen's. After starting the season with three losses, Snyder and the Gaels went 3-2 down the stretch. The 2020 season was cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Prior to his time with Queen's, Snyder spent two seasons as the Offensive Coordinator for the Western Mustangs, helping the program earn the top-ranked offence in U SPORTS in 2017 and 2018, two Yates Cup victories, back-to-back Vanier Cup appearances, and the Vanier Cup title in 2017.

He also served three seasons as the Offensive Coordinator for the St. Francis Xavier X-Men and two seasons as the Special Teams Coordinator for the Windsor Lancers at the U SPORTS level. Snyder also has experience coaching at the high school, Ontario Varsity Football League, provincial, and national level in Canada, and professionally in Germany.

RUSSELL WEIR: FROM QUARTERBACK TO RECEIVER

Heading into last season, Queen's Football fans knew Russell Weir for his work behind centre, after the third year Economics major finished the 2023 season starting five games at quarterback and throwing for 670 yards, regular season and playoffs combined.

But on Queen's Football's home opener against the McMaster Marauders last year, fans got their first glimpse of the versatility Weir would showcase throughout the 2024 season when he returned a punt 25 yards, helping the Tricolour to a 27-22 win.

Weir's 2024 versatility led to a full-time position change for this season, with the quarterback set to line up at receiver, while also contributing on special teams, the majority of the time moving forward.

Weir detailed how the position change came about ahead of the season.

"It was a battle all offseason between Alex [Vreeken], Anthony [Lio], and I, [at quarterback]. All three of us were playing, I'd say, very good football. Camp ended and I was in a spot where coaches said, 'we want you

to play, but it's not looking like it's going to be at quarterback.'

"I'd say [the position change] was my idea at first, but they were totally on board. It really started in Week 2 against McMaster. I started returning in practice. Originally, I was still playing quarterback and just doing a little bit of returning to see how that went. Then the returning started. All the guys were super helpful - obviously, I was doing it for the first time - but I've always been an athletic kid. I'm more of a running quarterback, so it came pretty naturally.

"I started returning, and from there, it was the coaches' idea, I believe, to start taking a couple of reps at receiver. I started taking those in Week 4 and from there, I fell in love with it right away."

Since Weir's first punt return against the Marauders early last season, the Oakville, Ont. native racked up 313 all-purpose yards off 112 kick return yards, 103 punt return yards, and 92 rushing yards.

Always known as an elusive quarterback, Weir said his athletic ability has helped with the position change.

"Changing direction was the biggest thing. That's something I've always thought I've been good at - quick on my feet, things like that. Obviously, moving to receiver wasn't easy and still isn't easy right now, but I think I was able to pick it up relatively fast.

"Speed is obviously another one. Even though I was a quarterback, I was always doing a ton of speed training, which I think definitely helped make the transition a bit easier."

Weir added that his quarterback background helps him connect with QBs in his new role. With experience seeing the field from behind centre, he better understands how to get open and make things easier for the quarterback delivering the ball.

"Definitely. I mean, you'd have to ask Alex and Anne or anybody, but I'd say that's definitely a strength of mine, just knowing their perspective and what they're looking for on a play. I've been in their shoes, and I know it's definitely not an easy position to play. So, making that transition, I understand what they're looking for and where I need to be and when."

While Weir is still relatively new to the position, his progress has been noted across the country. Weir was selected to participate in the 2025 U SPORTS East-West Bowl this past spring, an annual showcase of the top Canadian university football players eligible for the next CFL Draft.

Weir, who joined Queen's Football teammates Steven Kpehe, Justin Pace, and Alex Vreeken, took part in the weeklong event as a receiver, which featured several practices and culminated in a showcase game. He spoke highly of the experience.

"It was unreal. I was obviously very grateful to be able to go, especially since I'd never played the position. It was definitely a surprise, and I was very grateful to be selected for it. There was no pressure, it was just learning from all the great coaches and other receivers who were there. It was a 100 per cent great group of guys that I got to go with.

"As for Alex, Steven, and Justin, it was a great time together. We all loved it and feel like we improved a lot."

And with Weir entering his first full season at the receiver position, he said he picked up some invaluable lessons over the week that he can bring into the 2025 season with Queen's Football.

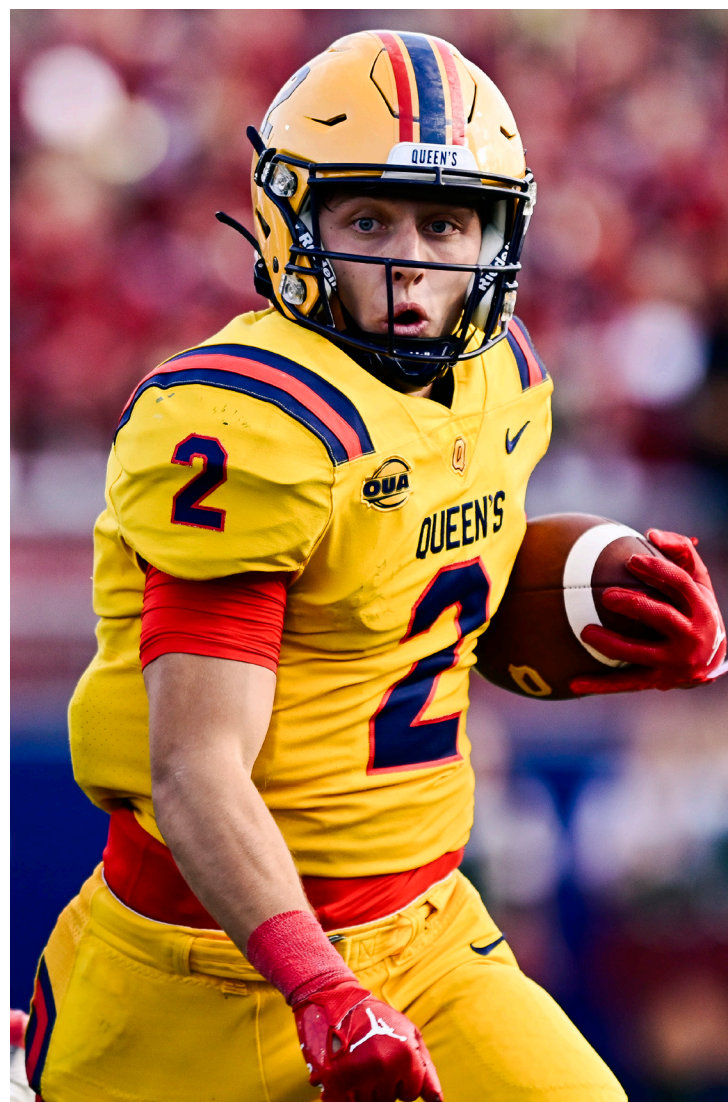
"It was a massive week for development, especially when it came to technique. We had three very good receiver coaches, and just talking with the receivers

throughout the week was really helpful. They obviously knew I had just made the position change, so they were all very supportive. We watched each other and got to learn from each other's strengths and weaknesses, which was great."

Weir also capped East-West Bowl Week by being selected as a team captain, a recognition of his effort and leadership among top players and peers from across the country. He called it a great honour and a meaningful way to close out the week.

"It definitely meant a lot. I've always thought of myself as a leader, but being selected as a captain for a game like that was a great feeling. There were definitely a lot of guys who could have been chosen, so I was lucky the Bishop's coach selected me. It was definitely an honour and something I'm proud of."

Heading into the 2025 season, Weir's main goal remains the same, to help Queen's Football score points and win games, but this year, he'll do it from a new perspective.

THOMPSON MCCALLUM ON FOOTBALL OPS EXPERIENCE WITH REDBLACK

Defensive backs coach and Queen's Football alumnus Thompson McCallum talks about his experience in the Scouting/Football Ops department with the Ottawa Redblacks this past spring as part of the CFL's Diversity in Football Program.

Can you sum up your experience with the Ottawa Redblacks this spring?

Thompson McCallum: Hard to sum it up in just a few sentences, but obviously a really great learning experience, a great opportunity that I was able to take part in.

I think the biggest takeaways I had was just the amount of extra work and all hands on deck it really is within a pro sports environment. The Redblacks definitely do a really good job of developing that culture all the way from the top.

All the way down throughout the whole organization, every single person involved was super passionate about what they're doing. However they could help the team, very dedicated with their job. So not just the coaching staff and the personnel staff and the players, but all the support staff as well. Trainers, equipment staff, video staff—everybody really was a true expert in their field and super dedicated. Always trying to go that step beyond to help the organization.

Walk me through a day in training camp with the Redblacks.

Thompson McCallum: On the personnel side, we'd still have breakfast and meals with the players at the same time. It was good to have those periods where everybody comes together.

In between meals and practices, there's a lot of time

in our office setup, reviewing practice film every day. On the personnel side, we're taking a 360 degree view, looking at the whole team, not just one position group. We'd always watch the practices together as a staff to go over position battles or players that were showing well throughout camp.

After we got through our practice film, one thing I was really impressed by was how well the other scouts knew not just their own team, but every other team in the league. Especially during training camp, there are a lot of transactions. You can see players getting injured, teams bringing in free agents. I was impressed with their ability to know when a player got picked up, at least one scout could recall the report from when they were drafted. They already knew the skill sets those players had.

That was a big part of it, watching transactions and evaluating our own roster to see if we needed to bring someone in because of injury or to upgrade a position.

Scouting and personnel is really year-round. You're always looking for ways to improve the team. A big part of it is anticipating moves other teams might make too, so you can plan ahead for future matchups.

How does scouting and football operations differ from coaching?

Thompson McCallum: In terms of evaluating players, it's a little bit different. In the pros, you're looking more for players who can help right away. There's a bit of thought about whether a guy is younger or older, if they still have room to develop, but it's really about the next game and the season. It's hard to pick someone up just for them to develop.

Whereas at the university level, development is a huge part of any player you bring in. In recruiting, you're looking for top players, but also projecting what they could be in two or three years in your system.

The biggest difference to me was that, as a university football coach, you're doing both - you're handling personnel and recruiting, and you're coaching and developing the players. You have your hands on both sides. At the pro level, it's much more separated. You have a personnel department focused on scouting and player acquisition full time, and the coaches focus on the players they already have. They don't need to think as much about roster building.

There are a lot of advantages to that. Having a smaller scope means you can become more of an expert. But there's also something special about the university model - bringing in a player and overseeing their full development. In the pros, with more people and more resources, they're able to be really efficient with everything they do.

Is scouting and football ops something you'd be interested in pursuing?

Thompson McCallum: It was definitely very interesting. It's a different side of the game. It would be something I'd be interested in doing.

But one thing I really missed throughout the experience was the more hands-on interaction with the players. That was one of the big differences. As a coach, you're always interacting with the players, especially during training camp - you're with them for multiple hours every day, focused on helping them push themselves and get to the next level in their development.

That's the thing I've enjoyed the most post-playing career. If there were opportunities for me in scouting and to work in football that way, I'd definitely be interested. But I still think, for me, working with the players and being more hands-on is where my skill set shines more.

Being able to build a connection with the players has always been where I've felt the most enjoyment from coaching - seeing guys develop and helping them achieve their goals, whether that's in football or beyond. That's the most gratifying part of what I get to do.

Do you think having a scouting angle will help with coaching?

Thompson McCallum: Yeah, I definitely think it'll help. As coaches and players, especially once you get into training camp or the season, you're focused on the next task. You can't look too far forward. You're thinking about the plan for the week, this game, what we're going to achieve every day in practice. You have that short-term mentality because every

game is so important - you can't overlook the details.

But a lot of the things I learned in scouting will really help me identify players for recruiting, and also focus on skills that are important to develop in my players. The amount of detail they put into their evaluations really impressed me, and it's something I'm going to try to implement - more detailed ways to break down a player's skill set.

That way, if I scout a player and pass off the info to another coach, it's detailed enough that even without watching their film, they already have a good idea of the player's ability, playing style, strengths, and what they'll need to work on at the next level.

That level of detail is something we can translate to what we do here, it makes sharing information more seamless. One coach can put in the work, and others can build on it, instead of everyone doing their own thing and coming together with the same thoughts later.

Do you have any favourite moments or lasting memories from those couple of weeks with the team?

Thompson McCallum: There's a lot. One special moment was being with them for their first preseason game in Montreal. I got to travel with the team and be part of that experience. It's definitely different from coaching. On game day, as a coach, you're not on the field, but you're very involved. Hanging out with the scouts and GM during the game, you feel a little helpless. You're not calling plays or making adjustments; you're just watching and hoping the team you put together can be successful.

It's a different experience, but a really cool one. They're just as into it as a coach, when the team makes a big play, they get really excited. When the other team makes a play, they feel that pain the same way.

In terms of responsibilities, it's different - you can't impact the game the same way - but it was really fun.

Are you a Redblacks fan now?

Thompson McCallum: Being from Mississauga, I was an Argos fan (growing up). My dad is a season ticket holder with them. But after having that experience with the Redblacks and building personal connections with so many people, I'll absolutely be a fan of theirs for a while.

Just last week, I turned on the game and they showed shots of the sidelines. I knew all the players, all their names. But not just them - the athletic staff, equipment staff, video staff - I can put a name to every face.

So I'll definitely be cheering for them this year and hoping they have a ton of success.



ALEX VREEKEN ON QB INTERNSHIP WITH CFL'S OTTAWA REDBLACKS

Queen's Football quarterback Alex Vreeken attended training camp with the Ottawa Redblacks at Richardson Stadium as part of the CFL's QB Internship Program. Vreeken spoke about the experience ahead of the season.

Did you take home any advice from the Redblacks quarterbacks?

Alex Vreeken: The most beneficial part of the experience was the interaction with the quarterbacks. We had many conversations about all different parts of the game. From physical aspects like throwing mechanics, manipulating players with your eyes, and different drops they use for concepts.

But also, a ton of conversations about the mental side of playing the game and how I would read plays based on coverages compared to how they do it. I think seeing the game through their eyes has allowed me to speed through progressions based on different coverages, almost simplifying the game even more by gathering more information. I think they were also able to give advice on how they are off the field, with a leadership spotlight, along with managing game prep and off-season training.

Was it exciting to have this experience at a familiar venue – Richardson Stadium? (Did you get to sit in your same stall in the locker room)

Alex Vreeken: Having training camp located at Richardson Stadium was super convenient. Being familiar with the facilities was mindless and I settled into camp right away. I was lucky enough to get the privilege of sitting in star pass rusher Ollie Jackson's locker for the month. It was great being at Queen's, a bunch of the guys came out to watch practices and our coaching staff watched most days so when I spoke

about the playbook to them, they already had seen the Redblacks run some of the plays.

How did Redblacks training camp differ from Queen's Football training camp?

Alex Vreeken: The biggest difference with Redblacks training camp compared to Queen's training camp was how the day was laid out. At Queen's, we meet in the morning at 8 and then have a practice in the morning from 10:30 to noon. Then meet again at 2 and practice again 5-8pm.

The Redblacks never did two practices in one day. It was either a single practice from 8:30-11ish or a power practice from 8:30 until 12 with a small 15-minute break in the middle consisting of snacks and removing shoulder pads.

Any favourite moments or lasting memories from the whole experience?

Alex Vreeken: Some of my favourite moments and memories are:

I really enjoyed QB meetings and practices, watching tape and listening to the other QBs break down coverages and reads was super beneficial for me. I am lucky the QB room was welcoming and all of them took time to teach me and answer my questions on the field.

Having the opportunity to hangout everyday with my former teammate Pete Adjei was unreal. Pete was a fifth-year when I was a freshman at Queen's, so it was super cool to catch up again, and shows the Brotherhood runs deep at Queen's.

ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT: ERIC COLONNA AND PICK 6 ATHLETICS

Since graduating from Queen's after the 2023 season, Queen's Football alumnus Eric Colonna has been building his growing business and brand, Pick 6 Athletics.

Pick 6 Athletics is the brainchild of Colonna, a defensive back who spent six years with Queen's Football from 2018 to 2023, and, along with the Pick 6 Athletics app, Lockdown Academy, serve as platforms focused on defensive back training, camps, and clinics.

Popular both online and in person, Pick 6 Athletics features a strong social media presence, a dedicated website, and the Lockdown Academy app, while also offering hands-on camps and clinics designed to help defensive backs elevate their game.

And while Colonna is dedicated to the platforms fulltime now, he started the venture while still playing with Queen's Football when the COVID-cancelled 2020 season presented an opportunity.

"I started Pick 6 Athletics back in July 2020, and during that time, we weren't having a season with the lockdowns and everything going on. I figured that, since we weren't having a season, nobody in Canada really was, high school or anyone, there was a lot of opportunity for guys to develop that just wasn't happening. When you play a season, you get better, so I realized that I wanted to help athletes

continue to develop and keep improving their skills during that period where there probably would be a drop-off.

"The other thing was, we had a ton of free time. Normally during the football season, our schedule is super hectic with class, and with school being online, it made things a little easier. With football, we'd only have a few practices a week, and they'd be way shorter than normal. We had a ton of free time.

I had this idea about a year before, and I figured now was a good time to put it into action. Now that we had the time, it was a great opportunity to help athletes develop and learn. Those were the main two things—because there was all this time, and because guys weren't really improving, I felt like I had to take some action."

Pick 6 Athletics focuses on defensive back specific drills and training, incorporating everything from the basics to speed and precision movements, footwork, coverage essentials, and tackling. There is even information on weight lifting, injury prevention, and nutrition – all tailored to players in the secondary.

Colonna said the purpose of Pick 6 Athletics is to bridge the gap between high school and high end defensive back play.



“There is so much stuff I learned from our coaches [at Queen’s] and other players that I wish I learned at a younger age. It’s just not available at lower levels and until you go to a programme like Queen’s, it’s hard to actually learn about the technical side of the game. My goal was just help anyone who wants to learn and develop and if they’re willing to work hard, they could have kind of the shortcuts to success. That was my main motivation.”

While Colonna has recently brought in guest coaches, including some with professional playing or coaching experience, the majority of the content on Pick 6 Athletics and Lockdown Academy is created by Colonna himself.

When developing drills and training modules, Colonna said his focus is on helping athletes reach success more efficiently.

“My whole goal with it is I want to give the shortcuts to success. It’s not that you don’t have to work hard, but just knowing the right drills, knowing what to do, and how to progress it throughout a program can make all the difference.

“So much of what I create on there for my athletes is stuff I used to do all the time on the field. If footwork didn’t feel right, some drills I made up to get better footwork, agility, or coverage. A lot of it is just figuring out the best drills to use, whatever the specific skill is that I’m looking to improve.

“A lot of it is just drills I made up when I was playing

or training by myself. I spent thousands of hours on the field figuring out the best way to move.”

Among the many players Colonna works with, several U SPORTS schools are represented as well as some players in the Canadian Football League. Colonna said after initially training with some CFL defensive backs in 2024 when he was pursuing a CFL opportunity, they’ve since kept in contact to continue the training.

Along with Lockdown Academy’s strong roster of participants, Pick 6 Athletics has nearly 200 thousand followers on Instagram. Colonna said the growth of both platforms has been amazing to watch.

“It’s definitely been cool seeing it over the past five years. Whenever people ask for tips on how to grow a social media page, I’m always like, just stay consistent, try to make the posts a bit better, but really, as long as you’re posting consistently, the algorithm should help out. And if people are sharing your content, it’s more of a matter of time. As long as you have a good quality post.”

And the platforms have developed strong camaraderie among Colonna and the defensive backs he trains with. Colonna said that’s one of his favourite things Pick 6 Athletics has helped to create.



"We're all DBs, so we always want to see each other win. We're united against receivers," Colonna said with a laugh. "Always trying to build each other up. What I always try to encourage through my sessions, whether it's at camp, with a couple of guys, or however many, is just coaching each other up. Seeing what other guys are doing well, seeing what they're not, making sure we're watching all the reps to get mental reps, and just being vocal, bringing the energy."

"Kind of the same way we run a Queen's practice. I just want to keep it high pace. Everybody's focused, everybody's helping each other out, and we're all there to get better."

While his defensive back training business is his present, Colonna said he looks back at his time with Queen's Football fondly. Colonna joined the program in 2017 and played five seasons on the field, starting in 2018 through to 2023, with the

COVID cancelled 2020 season in between.

Colonna finished his Queen's Football career appearing in 43 games, regular season and playoffs combined, while also helping Queen's finish the 2021 season with an undefeated 6-0 regular season record and advance to two straight Yates Cup OUA Championships (2021, 2022).

Colonna added he's still connected to the program and keeps a close eye on their success. He said he thinks the team could have a strong 2025 season.

"I definitely have high expectations. Whoever the group is. Some of those guys I've played with for three or four years. And there's a lot of talent, a lot of athleticism, a lot of high-IQ guys back there. I definitely have very high expectations for the DB unit and for the team as a whole."

JUSTIN PACE ON GOALS, LEADERSHIP, AND CAMARADERIE ON QUEEN'S FOOTBALL

Do you have any personal goals heading into the 2025 season?

Justin Pace: On the personal side, I feel like last year I exceeded the goals that I had set for myself. We had some great coaching and great defensive line play that let me get the amount of tackles that I got.

For going into next year, I feel like the only personal thing that I really need to complete now in my football career at Queen's is winning the President's Trophy, which is awarded every year to the best defensive player in the OUA and also the best defensive player in Canada.

That's something that I feel I could have had last year, but things went differently. It's all right, it's more important how the team played. My goal for this season is to bring back a President's Trophy at Queen's.

On a group standpoint, I feel like we have some very good players coming back and a lot of good development from the younger guys.

I think we just got to regroup as a team and we know we have the players that can do it all this year.

So it's going to be very important for the boys to work hard this summer, keep doing what they're doing. I feel like we're a couple steps ahead of where we were in the last two summers, so that's definitely something that I feel is going to be huge.

I'm very confident in the group that we have right now, and I feel like the goal is always the same - being in Regina (for the Vanier Cup) when November comes around. I feel like we are definitely ahead of where we've been in the past. And like I said, the goal's always the same.

Can you talk about your leadership role both on the field and off the field?

Justin Pace: I felt like it came very naturally. I'm a pretty

vocal guy on the field, so once I started playing and produced pretty well, I feel like guys started listening a bit more. A lot of guys tend to rotate around the guys who are louder on the field. So that's pretty much what I was in '23 - vocal leader and emotional leader.

I feel like the more time has gone, the more I get comfortable in taking that kind of big brother position on the team. I really appreciate when I came in, we had Walter and Wells Karabin, who were exceptional leaders. For me, it's very important to replicate, if not do better than what they did. And don't get me wrong, they were great, but I'm always trying to be even better than the past.

Fans can see the camaraderie after a big play, how tight is the linebacking corps for Queen's Football?

Justin Pace: Oh yes, it is. The offensive line might tell you different, but I strongly believe that we are the tightest group on the team. We have our group chat that's active every single day. We have our linebacker dinners before games during the summer when everyone's in town. We make sure that the fourth and fifth years hang out with the first and second years.

We all have the same mindset. Linebacker's a very physical but mental job, so you have to be very smart, but you also have to have something loose up there, if you know what I mean. Every single play, to run five yards downfield and try to hit someone - that's either a 230-pound running back running full speed or a 300-pound o-lineman - every single play. We're all like-minded guys in this group.

A FAN FOR THE AGES: LOIS HAZLETT'S 69-YEAR QUEEN'S FOOTBALL JOURNEY

Lois Hazlett attended her first Queen's Football game in the fall of 1956. The Golden Gaels were taking on their historic rivals, the Toronto Varsity Blues. Hall of Fame Head Coach Frank Tindall was on the sideline, and the Tricolour came away with a victory.

Hazlett recalled of that first season of fandom, "I remember there was a lot of noise. That was the old stadium down on Union Street. We were on the covered side, the students were on the other side, and it was just good football."

That win nearly seven decades ago marked the beginning of a remarkable streak. Fast-forward 69 years, and Hazlett is still attending every Queen's Football game, unless it's raining.

Since that first game in the '50s, Hazlett has witnessed a number of big moments in Queen's Football history. The program has gone on to capture multiple Vanier Cups and Yates Cups, and celebrated its 500th all-time win last season.

The 1978 Vanier Cup was extra special for Hazlett. Her son Paul played for that team, helping the Tricolour earn their sixth national championship at the old Alumni Stadium in Toronto, a game they attended.

Later Hazlett's grandson would continue the tradition and don the Tricolour, suiting up for Queen's in the 2000s and earning OUA All-Star honours.

And Hazlett's impressive games attended streak extended to the Athletics and Recreation Centre (ARC)

from 2012-17, when her granddaughter Emily played for Queen's Women's Basketball. Hazlett saw Emily earn two OUA silver medals and two trips to the nationals, which she of course attended as well.

Hazlett has been a part of Queen's Football for 69 of the program's 143 years—nearly half of its storied history. While much has changed over that time, some traditions have endured. The Queen's Band still plays from the stands, and students still sing the Oil Thigh after every touchdown. Hazlett has seen the team move from the original Richardson Stadium on what is now Tindall Field to the current venue on West Campus, and she's been there every step of the way.

Hazlett said what has stood out to her throughout the years is the camaraderie of the players on Queen's Football. "It's the companionships that they all make throughout the years. And I think every one of them would say the same thing about becoming good friends and knowing that there are people you can depend on."

Hazlett and her incredible commitment to Queen's Football will be commemorated this year as part of Queen's Football's Hall of Fame celebrations. She was presented earlier this year the Fan of Distinction Award by Head Coach Steve Snyder, and will be recognized at the Homecoming Game in October, another game she surely won't miss.

"I enjoy the games. It's a nice time of year to be outside and to support Queen's."

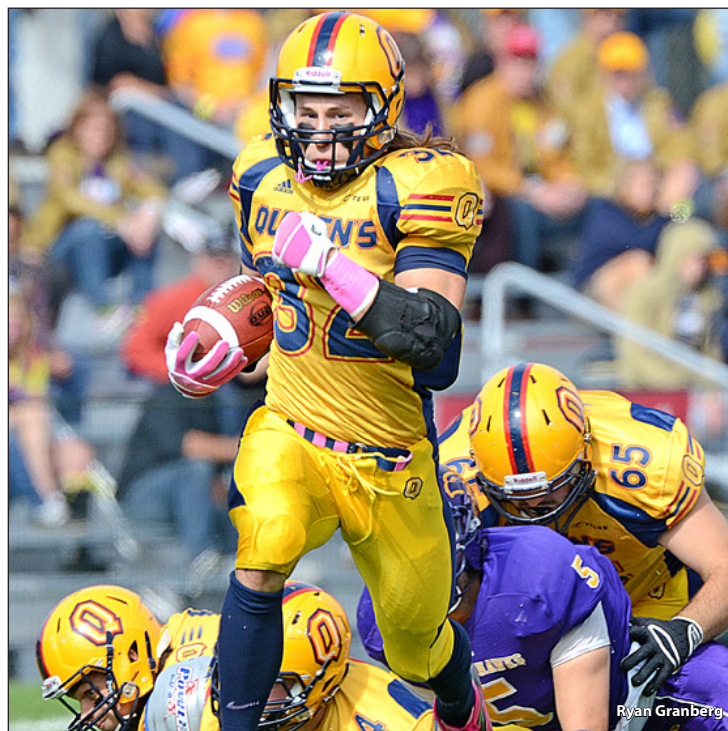

NEWELL, HUBERT, AND MILLER-MELANCON SELECTED IN 2025 CFL DRAFT

The 2025 edition of the Canadian Football League (CFL) Draft took place Tuesday night with three Queen's Football players being selected.

Darien Newell (Philosophy) led the way for Queen's, being picked up with the tenth overall pick by the Edmonton Elks.

The 6-foot-3 defensive lineman entered the draft ranked No. 8 on the CFL Scouting Bureau's final Top 20 prospects list, rising from No. 13 in the winter edition. Across 37 games in the tricolour, the stat line reads 92 total tackles, 27.5 tackles for loss, 18 sacks, and one forced fumble. Newell's consistency and dominance earned multiple accolades, including two U SPORTS First Team All-Canadian selections, a second-team nod in 2022 and a three time OUA First Team All-Star recognition.

Hubert (Environmental Studies) joins fellow Defensive Lineman Newell in Edmonton, being called with the 31st overall pick by the Elks.

The Norwood, Ont. native concluded a standout career at Queen's tallying 85 total tackles (47 solo, 38 assisted), 15 sacks, and a touchdown in 33 appearances.

Miller-Melancon (Arts & Science) rounded things out for Queen's, getting called by the Calgary Stampeders with the 65th overall pick in the draft.

Suiting up for 40 games in the tricolour, the veteran defensive back recorded 150 total tackles (108 solo, 42 assisted) and 16 interceptions. Miller-Melancon's impressive statline earned the Montreal, Que. native great honours and multiple accolades including a former U SPORTS First Team All-Canadian, three-time OUA All-Star, OUA All-Rookie and a U SPORTS Top 8 Academic All-Canadian for the 2022-23 season.

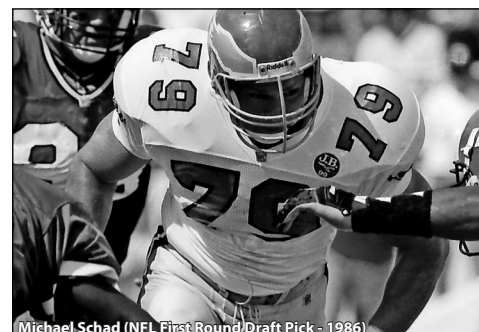
