SATURDAY'S MATCHUP

Saint John's clinched its 22nd 10-win season with a 63-23 non-conference win over Thomas More (Ky.) last Saturday in Collegeville. The frigid, 17-degree weather with snow throughout failed to hinder SJU's passing attack. Junior quarterback **Jackson Erdmann** (Rosemount, Minn.) set an SJU record with seven passing touchdowns on the afternoon, including six in the first half. The Johnnies made their fourth consecutive appearance in the NCAA Division III playoffs and ended the season ranked No. 14 nationally with a 9-2 (7-1 MIAC) record last fall. Martin Luther closed out a perfect 8-0 UMAC record with a 47-18 home win over Crown last weekend. The Knights tied for sixth in the UMAC with a 4-5 record (5-5 overall) in 2017.

TUNE IN

Saturday's game can be heard live on WBHR-660 AM across central Minnesota; WDGY-740 AM, 92.1 FM, 103.7 FM and 107.1 HDZ in the Twin Cities; and KOWZ-1170 AM and 106.3 FM in Waseca, which covers most of southern Minnesota and into western Wisconsin. Mark Lewandowski, Bryan Backes, Mike Carr and Charlie Carr will call all the action, beginning with Johnnies Magazine at 11 a.m. and the pre-game show at 11:30 a.m. The game will also be broadcast on the SJU football website via Stretch Internet. This is the 22nd season SJU football can be heard worldwide over the internet.



SAME NIGHT, SAME PLACE FOR FOOTBALL WEEKLY

Tune in to Football Weekly during the football season this fall, each Thursday from 7-8 p.m., at the Blue Line Sports Bar & Grill in Sartell. Guests include head coach Gary Fasching, an SJU assistant coach, an SJU football student-athlete and a local high school head coach each week. The radio show airs live on WBHR-660 AM and gojohnnies.com via the Stretch Internet portal.

JOHNNIES, FASCHING AGAIN ON KOOL-TV

Based out of Alexandria, Minn., KOOL-TV will again produce tape-delayed broadcasts of all Saint John's home football games, as well as the "Gary Fasching Coaches' Show," for the fourth consecutive season in 2018. The 30-minute show airs at 6:30 p.m. each Tuesday night during the football season, followed by the tape-delayed home broadcast. Viewers outside the KOOL-TV broadcast area can watch the coaches' show and home-game broadcast as they air Tuesday nights on www.kooltv-mn.com. Neither broadcast will be archived online for future viewing. KOOL-TV and SJU extended the contract through the 2020 season in July 2018. SERIES HISTORY

Saturday's game is the first meeting between SJU and Martin Luther. As noted in the series notes below and in the chart on page 3, SJU is 11-2-1 all-time against current members of the Upper Midwest Athletic Conference (UMAC), including a 9-0-1 record in Collegeville. The Johnnies are 42-23 (.646) all-time in postseason games, including a 21-5 record in Collegeville (13-1 in first-round games).

ERDMANN'S SECOND SINGLE-GAME RECORD OF 2018



Junior quarterback **Jackson Erdmann** (*left*) set an SJU record with seven passing touchdowns, including six in the first half, in the Johnnies' 63-23 win last Saturday over Thomas More (Ky.). He completed his first 13 passes and finished 18 of 23 for 255 yards despite the frigid, 17-degree weather with snow throughout the game. Erdmann was named the MIAC Football Offensive Player of the Week, his third of the season and fourth of his career, Nov. 12. The Johnnies' previous record for single-game passing touchdowns, six, was recorded three times: Pat Mayew '92 vs. St. Olaf (Oct. 26, 1991); Willie Seiler '94 vs. St. Thomas (Oct. 23, 1993); and Seiler again at UW-La Crosse in the NCAA playoffs (Nov. 27, 1993). Seiler's six-

touchdown game against the Tommies was the lone instance of the three in which the Johnnie quarterback tossed six touchdowns in a half. Erdmann set a school record with 470 passing yards, on 28 of 53 passing, and three touchdowns in the 40-20 win Oct. 13 over then-No. 3 St. Thomas.

HE'S CRUISING

Jackson Erdmann is now 68 of 100 passing for 999 yards and 20 touchdowns, a 217.92 pass-efficiency rating, since his last interception thrown in the second quarter of SJU's 40-20 win Oct. 13 over St. Thomas.

4 TOUCHDOWNS FOR GILLACH



Senior wide receiver **Will Gillach** (*left*, Lindstrom, Minn./Chisago Lakes) caught four of Erdmann's seven touchdown passes and finished with nine receptions for 167 yards. He became the first Johnnie to record four receiving touchdowns in a game since Jeremy Loretz '95 caught five against Macalester 24 years to the date - Nov. 10, 1994 - at the Metrodome. Gillach is averaging 18.1 yard per catch (54 receptions for 975 yards and 13 touchdowns) and needs 25 receiving yards to become the first Johnnie to reach 1,000 in a season since Brian Weber '07 (1,031 yards) in 2007.

JOHN GAGLIARDI, 1926-2018

Saint John's mourns passing of its legendary football coach John Gagliardi, who achieved national attention for his success both on and off the field. Gagliardi passed away on Oct. 7, 2018, at the age of 91. Here are a few "notes" about Gagliardi's 60-season coaching career at SJU:

- 4 national championships (1963, 1965, 1976, 2003)
- 27 conference championships (30 overall)
- 24 postseason appearances (a 39-19 record)

NO STRANGER TO THE POSTSEASON

The 2018 postseason appearance is the Johnnies' 29th (25th at the NCAA Division III level) and fifth consecutive. SJU is third in NCAA Division III history in both postseason appearances and playoff wins. The Johnnies made four other postseason appearances: three in the NAIA (1963, 1965, 1982) and one showing at the Mineral Water Bowl (1969).

HE'S DEFINITELY NO STRANGER

Which Johnnie has been part of each NCAA postseason appearance for SJU, dating back to 1976? Defensive coordinator **Jerry Haugen** '76, who is in his 43rd season on the Johnnies' coaching staff. Saturday's game is his 60th NCAA postseason contest. Meaning, he has coached six additional seasons in playoff games alone. Haugen's first NCAA playoff game was the aforementioned trip to Augustana (Ill.) in 1976 (*see Series History*). The Johnnies have posted a 378-91-5 (.803) overall record and a 290-58-4 (.830) MIAC record with Haugen as a defensive coach. Since 1978, his defense has finished in the top two of the MIAC in total defense 21 times, including 11 of the past 17 seasons, and in scoring defense 26 times, including 18 of the past 23 seasons. As a player, Haugen was a four-year starter and gained All-MIAC honors as a defensive back in 1975. He ranks second on the school's career interception list with 15 (first place without postseason games).

HAUGEN JUMPS BOWDEN

Last Saturday's win was also the 378th with **Jerry Haugen** as an assistant football coach at SJU. Bobby Bowden, a member of the College Football Hall of Fame and long-time (1976-2009) head coach at Florida State, has the fourth-most wins in college football history with a 377-129-4 record. All told, Haugen has been a part of 1,455 wins (2,396 games) at SJU as a player and coach, as well as 33 conference championships (including three MIAC Playoff titles in baseball) and 39 postseason appearances.

Saint John's has a 337-97-13 all-time record (.768) at Saint John's Field/Clemens Stadium (est. 1997), including a 21-5 record (.808) in the NCAA Division III Playoffs. In its last 184 games dating back to 1987, SJU has a record of 159-25 (.864) in Collegeville. The Johnnies have won 12 of their last 13 NCAA Playoff games at home, outscoring their opponents 467-208.

STEPPING IN FOR THE LEGEND

A 1981 SJU graduate, Fasching became the 16th head coach in the 102-year history of Saint John's University football following the 2012 season. He succeeded John Gagliardi, who announced his retirement following 60 seasons at SJU, after serving 17 seasons as an assistant football coach and recruiting coordinator at SJU. Fasching was a three-year starter for Gagliardi and the Johnnies at linebacker during the 1978 and 1980-81 seasons. A knee injury held him out of the 1979 season.



AS AN ASSISTANT

The Johnnies posted a 164-39 record (120-22 MIAC) with 10 conference titles and 12 postseason appearances (22-11 playoff record), including the 2003 national championship, 2000 national runner-up performance and four national semifinal games during his tenure as an assistant coach. He also coached SJU's throwers as an assistant track and field coach from 1996-2011.

AT ST. CLOUD CATHEDRAL

Prior to joining the Johnnies' coaching staff, Fasching served as the head football coach at St. Cloud Cathedral High School from 1986-95, where he led the Crusaders to the State Class B title in 1992 and 1993.

MIAC LEADERS

The Johnnies led the MIAC in three offensive statistical categories in league play this fall: total offense (488.9 ypg., first time since 2010); passing offense (283.8 ypg., first time since 2010); and scoring offense (47.5 ppg., first time since 2005). Individually, junior quarterback Jackson Erdmann led all MIAC quarterbacks in completion percentage (.651, 125-192); touchdowns (23) and pass-efficiency rating (185.4) in conference play. Senior kicker **Zach Barwick** (Littleton, Colo./Dakota Ridge) led the league in field goals made (6) and scoring, among kickers (62 points). Defensively, senior defensive end **Nathan Brinker** (Avon, Minn./Holdingford) led the MIAC with 13.5 tackles for loss in conference games, while his counterpart, senior defensive end **Ted Kalina** (Bloomington, Minn./Jefferson), led the league with 8.5 sacks. Junior cornerback **Chris Harris** (Lake Elsinore, Calif./Elsinore) tied for the league lead with four interceptions.

NATIONAL STATS

The Johnnies are currently in NCAA Division III's top 20, statistically, in 11 categories:

-Offense: second in pass efficiency (191.66), fourth in turnover margin (+1.80), fifth in fewest tackles for loss allowed per game (3.60), sixth in scoring offense (47.0 ppg.), 10th in yards per pass completion (16.20) and 16th in total offense (472.3 ypg.).

-Defense: fourth in takeaways (32), sixth in scoring defense (9.3 ppg.); 10th in sacks (3.80 spg.); 16th in pass-efficiency defense (94.89); and 20th in tackles for loss (8.3 tflpg.).

Individually, junior quarterback **Jackson Erdmann** ended the regular season ranked second in NCAA Division III in both passing efficiency (195.8) and passing touchdowns (34), fourth in yards per pass attempt (10.29), 10th in passing yards per completion (15.53), 12th in points responsible for (210) and 16th in completion percentage (.662). Senior wide receiver **Will Gillach** is ninth in receiving touchdowns (13).

Martin Luther, meanwhile, is third in Division III in interceptions (21), fourth in turnover margin (+1.80), eighth in takeaways (30) and 13th in fewest penalty yards (382). Senior wide receiver Josh Arndt (32 catches for 843 yards and nine touchdowns) is second in yards per reception (26.34), while his younger brother, Ben (sophomore cornerback), is seventh in both interceptions per game (0.7) and passes defended per game (1.9).

FIRST-HALF POINTS

SJU has exhibited quite a scoring frenzy in the first half of its games over the last three seasons. The Johnnies have out-scored their opponents by a 314-47 margin in the first half this fall.

2018 AFCA GOOD WORKS TEAM HONOREE

Jackson Erdmann was named one of 22 student-athletes, across all divisions of college football, to the 2018 Allstate American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Good Works Team Sept. 13. This year marks the 27th anniversary of the award, which was established in 1992 to recognize a select group of college football players who have made a commitment to service and enriching the lives of others. The 2018 Allstate AFCA Good Works Team will be invited to New Orleans to participate in a special community service project ahead of the 2019 Allstate Sugar Bowl, where the entire team will also be recognized on the field at halftime on New Year's Day.

A fan vote is running until Nov. 23 at www.ESPN.com/Allstate to decide this year's Allstate AFCA Good Works Team Captain, who will be recognized during the national ESPN broadcast of The Home Depot ESPNU College Football Awards in December. Erdmann is the third Johnnie to be named to the AFCA Good Works Team and the second consecutive. Senior wide receiver **Will Gillach** (Lindstrom, Minn./Chisago Lakes) was a member of last year's AFCA Good Works Team and All-American defensive lineman Kevin McNamara '07 was SJU's first Good Works Team honoree in 2006.

A global business leadership major with a 3.33 GPA, Erdmann volunteered with SJU's Kids Fighting Hunger meal-packing event each of the last three years and helped the SJU football team raise money for Tackle Cancer and the "Up Till Dawn" campaign, collecting donations for St. Jude Children's Research Hospital, the last two seasons. Last winter, Erdmann participated in an 18-day (Jan. 25-Feb. 11) service trip to northern Thailand, where he worked with various organizations that fight child sex trafficking. He spent a week with Courageous Love, which is an organization that rescues victims of sex trafficking or children that are a high risk of being trafficked. During the week, Erdmann and others cleared and worked on new land to build new safe houses for the children. The group also built a playground and interacted with the children, "which was a day I will never forget," Erdmann said. He intends to replicate the trip again this winter.



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Erdmann spent a day with Project Justice in an impoverished, mountain village. The village's children are frequently trafficked and/or use drugs. "We spent the day playing games, brought lunch for everyone, made balloon animals, gave the kids haircuts, and sang and danced with the kids," Erdmann said. Project Justice visits the village weekly and acts as positive role models for the kids. The group ended the service trip by spending five days with The Little Farm Thailand. Tasks included building fences and a goat house, gardening and chopping wood.

Erdmann spent 2017's spring break working at the Breaking Free House in the Twin Cities, which is a safe place for victims of sex trafficking and prostitution to recover from their experiences. Closer to home, Erdmann ran a church youth group last summer and served as a residential assistant in a freshman dormitory during the 2017-18 academic year. He volunteered weekly at the Dream Center in St. Cloud during 2016's spring semester, serving meals and interacting with the men in the house. The Dream Center provides services for men, ages 18 and older, that are struggling with mental health issues, chemical dependency issues, traumatic brain injury, learning disabilities and/or physical disabilities.

Another aspect of the student-athlete the Good Works Team recognizes is overcoming adversity, something that Erdmann unfortunately knows well. In high school, Erdmann was diagnosed with acute cerebellar ataxia - a condition that disrupts balance, coordination and muscle movement - after coming down with mononucleosis following his junior season. He was able to attend only five days of school in January and could not sit in a chair, stand or walk without falling. He had daily physical therapy for the remainder of the school year (February through May). Erdmann broke his fibula on the third play of the Class 6A quarterfinal game as a senior but bounced back to walk on at Division I Penn State in 2015, where he was redshirted. He suffered a second bout with acute cerebellar ataxia following a concussion suffered four games into his freshman season at SJU in 2016 and returned four weeks later.

RECORD BOOK WATCH

-Senior defensive lineman **Nathan Brinker** is fifth in school history with 48.5 career tackles for loss, 1.5 behind co-defensive coordinator **Brandon Novak** (1996-99) in fourth, and is sixth with 25 career sacks. He is one sack behind Steve O'Toole (1988-91) for fifth.

-Senior wide receiver **Will Gillach** (99 receptions for 1,643 yards and 22 touchdowns) is just outside SJU's top-10 lists in all three receiving categories. He needs one receiving touchdown to tie Evan Clark (2013-17) and Ben Sieben (1996-99) for 10th, 19 receptions to tie Dave Arnold (1969-71) for 10th and is 211 receiving yards shy of Ryan Murray (1990-93) in 10th.

-Senior kicker **Zach Barwick** is sixth in school history with 114 career PAT's, six behind Jimmie Mattson (2010-12) in fifth. He is also tied with Bob Nasby (1969-71) for eighth with 10 career field goals, one behind Joe Rotondi (1997-00) in seventh. Barwick's 56 PAT's this fall are the ninth-most in SJU history, one behind the 57 he made last season.

MIAC CHAMPIONSHIP, PLAYOFF TICKET PUNCHED

SJU clinched a share of its MIAC-record 33rd conference title (*see below*) and earned the league's automatic bid to the NCAA Division III Playoffs with a 42-14 win Oct. 27 at Concordia-Moorhead and secured the title outright Nov. 3. The NCAA appearance is the 29th (25th in Division III) for the Johnnies and their fifth consecutive. The last time SJU made five straight postseason appearances was 2005-09.

ALL-MIAC RETURNERS

SJU returns six Johnnies that earned All-MIAC recognition last fall. Senior defensive lineman **Nathan Brinker**, junior quarterback **Jackson Erdmann**, junior offensive guard **Dan Greenheck** (St. Paul, Minn./Cretin-Derham Hall) and senior safety **Max Jackson** were named to the first team. Senior wide receiver **Will Gillach** and sophomore linebacker **Danny Pietruszewski** were named to the second team. Pietruszewski, a preferred walk-on who redshirted at Division I Minnesota in 2016, ended his first season as a Johnnie tied for first on the team with six sacks and second in total tackles (62) and tackles for a loss (9.5).

FINDING THE END ZONE ON DEFENSE



St. Thomas was inches from making it a one-score game early in the fourth quarter Oct. 13, but junior linebacker **Alex Sais** (Los Lunas, N.M./St. Pius X) forced a fumble on the one-yard line and All-American safety **Max Jackson** (left) scooped it up for a 99-yard return for a touchdown. The momentum-shifting fumble return for a touchdown tied the longest in school history. James Schafer returned a fumble 99 yards in a similar fashion (also along the near sideline, from the other end zone) in the Johnnies' 34-0 shutout of fifth-ranked Bethel on Oct. 27, 2001, in Collegeville. The defensive touchdown was Jackson's school-record fourth of his career (see below).

NATIONALLY RANKED DEFENSE

The Johnnies' defense ended the 2017 regular season ranked in the top 12 in NCAA Division III in a number of categories: second in total defense (196.5 ypg.), scoring defense (8.3 ppg.) and pass-efficiency defense (82.17); third in passing defense (121.7 ypg.); fourth in first downs allowed (115); fifth in third-down defense (21.5 percent); ninth in defensive touchdowns (4); and 12th in rushing defense (74.8 ypg.).

SUCCESS ON THE GRIDIRON & THE DIAMOND

The football field isn't the only sporting venue where a pair of Johnnies and two assistant coaches have found success. Defensive coordinator Jerry Haugen '76 doubles as SJU's head baseball coach, where he is also assisted by receivers coach Josh Bungum '16. Last season, Haugen was named the MIAC Coach of the Year as the Johnnies ended the 2018 season with a 33-8 record and won the MIAC regular-season championship, the program's 14th and first since 1998, with a 16-4 mark in conference play. SJU made its ninth consecutive appearance in the MIAC Tournament and finished second with a 2-2 record. SJU set school records for wins (33), fielding percentage (.974), ERA (2.73) and WHIP (1.18) last spring.

SJU led the conference with six All-MIAC selections, one of which was senior safety and centerfielder, **Max Jackson**. Jackson started all 41 games and batted .373 with 39 runs scored, 34 RBI and a team-leading 13 stolen bases en route to All-Region honors. The All-MIAC honor was the second consecutive for Jackson, who recorded a .963 fielding percentage with four outfield assists last spring. He reached 100 career hits in the season opener and begins his senior season third in school history in walks (60), sixth in runs scored (100), seventh in hits (151) and eighth in stolen bases (28). Senior tight end and pitcher **Tommy Auger** posted a 4-1 record on the mound in 2018 with a 3.25 ERA, two complete games and 24 strikeouts in 36 innings pitched.

40-YARD DASH TIMES

Sophomore wide receiver **Blake Patrick** (St. Stephen, Minn./Holdingford) recorded the team's fastest laser-timed, 40-yard dash time, 4.63 seconds, when the team conducted testing Aug. 11. He ran a time of 4.75 seconds, which was fourth-best on the team, as a freshman last season. Patrick made his presence, and speed, known with a 48-yard reception Sept. 1. Senior defensive back **Sam Marshall** (Marshall, Minn.), a former running back, followed in second at 4.7 seconds. Junior wide receiver **Andrew VanErp** (Battle Lake, Minn./Ottertail Central) was third at 4.74 seconds. He is currently second on the team with 25 catches for 427 yards (17.1 avg.) and two touchdowns in eight games this season.

PRESEASON ALL-AMERICANS

Three Johnnies earned preseason All-America honors over the summer. Senior defensive lineman **Nathan Brinker** and junior offensive lineman **Dan Greenheck** were named to *Lindy's* All-Division III first team, while senior safety **Max Jackson** was named to the All-Division III second team. Greenheck was named to D3football.com's preseason All-America first team July 30, while Brinker and Jackson were named to the second team.

A two-time All-West Region and All-MIAC first-team honoree, Brinker started all 11 games and led SJU with 11.5 tackles for loss, finished third in sacks (5.5) and tied for fourth in total tackles (43). In conference play, Brinker tied for second in tackles for loss (9.5) and fourth in sacks (5).

Greenheck was named to the D3football.com All-America third team last season after starting all 11 games at right guard for an SJU offense that averaged 411.1 yards per game, including 211.8 yards on the ground. He was also named to the *College Football America Yearbook's* 26-man, NCAA Division III starting lineup over the summer.

Jackson was D3football.com All-America honorable mention last fall. He started all 11 games and finished third on the team with 47 tackles (21 solo) and returned two interceptions and a fumble for touchdowns. He returned a fumble 73 yards for a touchdown in the season opener against St. Scholastica and found the end zone on interceptions in back-to-back weeks, 44 yards Oct. 7 against Augsburg and 55 yards Oct. 14 at Carleton.

EFFICIENCY WITH, AND AGAINST, THE PASSING GAME

SJU again excelled in the passing game, both offensively and defensively, in 2017. The Johnnies ended the season second out of 242 NCAA Division III teams in pass-efficiency defense (82.72) and fifth in pass efficiency (174.86). **Jackson Erdmann** finished ninth nationally at 172.1. Senior **Ben Alvord** (St. Joseph, Minn./St. Cloud Apollo) would have led the country by nearly 22 points in 2016 with a 212.3 pass-efficiency rating, but he did not meet the NCAA's minimum of 15 attempts per game. Nick Martin '16 led NCAA Division III with a 191.4 pass-efficiency rating in 2016. He was the third Johnnie to lead Division III in pass-efficiency rating: Pat Mayew '92 in 1991 (181.0) and Willie Seiler '94 in 1993 (224.6). Seiler's mark of 224.6 is the 2nd-best in Division III history.

LEADING THE COUNTRY IN ATTENDANCE...AGAIN

For the 16th time in the last 17 seasons and 21st time overall, Saint John's University led NCAA Division III in on-campus football attendance in 2017. SJU averaged 6,092 fans per game over the course of the season, with a six-game total of 36,553 fans. Collegeville was the premier location for Division III, beating out second-place Emory & Henry (Va.) by an average of 1,306 spectators per on-campus game. The closest MIAC team to SJU was Concordia-Moorhead, which finished fourth nationally with an average of 4,429 fans per on-campus game. The "official" attendance of 53,082 for St. Thomas included the Sept. 23 game played at the Minnesota Twins' Target Field, which attracted 37,355 spectators. UST totaled 15,677 fans, an average of 2,612 per contest, in six on-campus games this fall. SJU's cumulative total of 36,553 fans was greater than 64 Football Championship Subdivision teams and 157 of the 169 Division II programs.

-SJU returns seven of last year's 16 Academic All-MIAC (minimum 3.5 cumulative GPA) honorees in 2018: Brandon Beranek, Brady Buckentine, Will Gillach, Tyler Hartigan, Max Jackson, Sam Marshall and Sam McNamara. The Johnnies have had totaled 81 Academic All-MIAC recipients in Gary Fasching's first five seasons, the most in the MIAC during that span (Bethel is next with 66 honorees since 2013).

-The Johnnies have had 15 football Academic All-Americans in the last 14 seasons, including linebacker David Franta '18 last fall, and 29 in the program's history.

-Franta earned SJU's second consecutive Stein-Fallon Scholar-Athlete Award from the Minnesota chapter of the National Football Foundation in May 2018. Fellow linebacker Carter Hanson '17, a childhood friend and high-school teammate of Franta, won the 2017 Stein-Fallon Scholar-Athlete Award. The award is given to a senior football student-athlete from a Minnesota college/university who demonstrates outstanding academic achievement, football leadership and community citizenship.

On This Date in Johnnie Football History

The Johnnies are 2-0 all-time on November 17: 2001 vs. St. Norbert, Wis. (W, 27-20) and 2007 vs. Redlands, Calif. (W, 41-13).

2001 vs. St. Norbert, Wis. (W, 27-20): SJU jumped out to a 27-6 halftime lead and held on to defeat St. Norbert (Wis.) 27-20 in the first round of the 2001 NCAA Division III football playoffs. SJU rushed for 216 yards, as Josh Nelson carried the ball 29 times for 108 yards and a touchdown. Quarterback Ryan Keating rushed 72 yards and a touchdown, and passed for 172 yards on 14 completions. Wide receiver Blake Elliott caught six passes for 64 yards and a touchdown. Defensive end Jeremy Hood had 2.5 sacks, while defensive tackle Ryan Weinandt led SJU with 14 tackle, including four for a loss.

2007 vs. Redlands, Calif. (W, 41-13): The Johnnies used an offensive flurry of 17 unanswered points in the final 1:49 of the first half to defeat Redlands 41-13 in the first round of the NCAA Division III playoffs in Collegeville. Safety John Cloeter intercepted Redlands' first offensive play and returned it for a touchdown, only to have the score called back due to a penalty. Four plays later, quarterback Alex Kofoed ran into the end zone from four yards out to give the Johnnies an early 7-0 lead. With 1:49 remaining in the first half, Kofoed hit wide receiver Brian Weber on a 61-yard touchdown strike to give SJU a 14-6 lead. The Johnnies then recovered a fumble on the Redlands 29-yard line and scored on a 14-yard pass from Kofoed to running back Mike Patnode five plays later. On the very next offensive play for Redlands, Cloeter intercepted a pass for the second time and returned it to the Bulldogs' 24-yard line with 23 seconds left. SJU moved to the 9-yard line before Russell Gliadon booted a 26-yard field goal to give the Johnnies a 24-6 halftime lead. Kofoed ended the game 17 of 34 for 244 yards, four touchdowns (five total) and two interceptions. Patnode led the Johnnies' ground attack with 113 yards on 24 carries (4.7 avg.) and added six receptions for 67 yards and two touchdowns. Weber caught five passes for 102 yards and a touchdown. Defensively, linebacker Ryan Wimmer (*above*), in his first game back from dislocating his elbow on Nov. 27, led the Johnnies with 11 tackles (five solo). Senior safety Kevin Boegel (Mahtomedi, Minn.) made nine tackles (three solo) and added an interception.



BLAKE ELLIOTT '03 ON HALL OF FAME BALLOT

Former Saint John's University award-winning student-athlete Blake Elliott '03 was named to the College Football Hall of Fame ballot for the sixth consecutive year in June. Elliott, who played wide receiver for the Johnnies from 2000-03, is one of 176 former student-athletes on the ballot. The announcement of the 2019 inductees will be made Monday, Jan. 7, in Santa Clara, Calif., in conjunction with the College Football Playoff National Championship Weekend. The Jan. 7 announcement will be carried live on www.footballfoundation.org. Those selected will be inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame during the 62nd NFF Annual Awards Dinner Dec. 10, 2019, in New York City.

Elliott excelled for the Johnnies for four years and ended his career as the recipient of the Gagliardi Trophy and a national championship in 2003; a season that included Gagliardi's record-breaking 409th career victory. He owns three NCAA playoff records, two MIAC records and 29 SJU receiving records. Elliott was a 3-time All-American, a 2-time MIAC Player of the Year, a Gagliardi Trophy finalist as a junior in 2002 and was invited to play in both the AFCA Aztec Bowl and Hula Bowl following the 2003 season. His NCAA all-divisions record for consecutive games played with a reception (47) ended in 2008.



He ended his career second all-time in all NCAA divisions in catches (327) and second in NCAA Division III in touchdown receptions (56). Elliott posted 369 receptions for 4,826 yards and 63 touchdowns in his career, as well as 744 rushing yards and eight touchdowns on 109 carries (prior to the 2002 season, the NCAA did not recognize playoff-game stats in season or career totals). Elliott was just as dangerous on special teams as he was on the offensive side of the ball, totaling 3,065 yards and seven touchdowns on 195 returns, kickoff and punt combined.

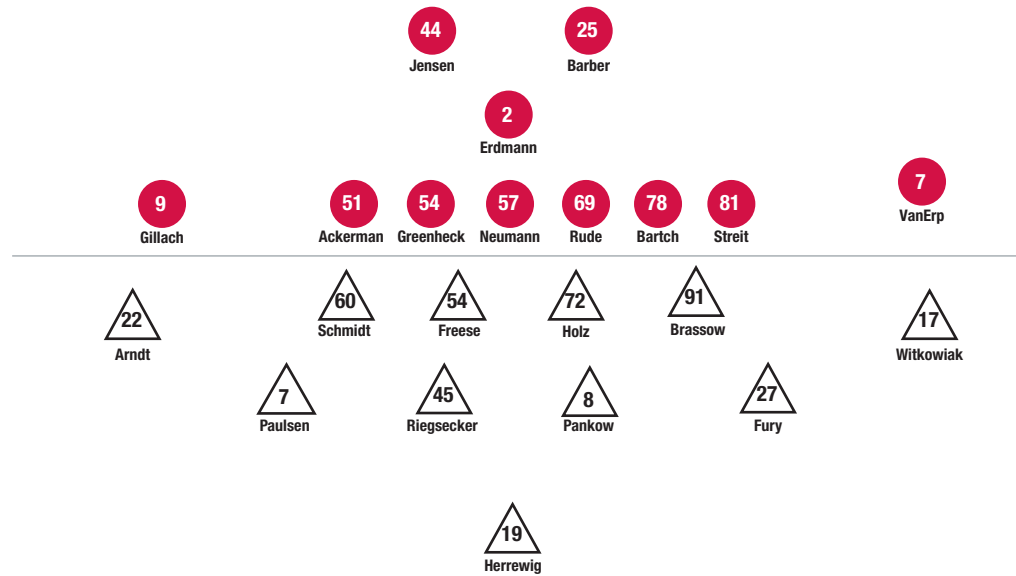
