SATURDAY'S MATCHUP

Saint John's trailed Aurora (Ill.) on four separate occasions, including by two scores halfway through the fourth quarter, but rallied with two rushing touchdowns from senior running back **Kai Barber** (Minneapolis, Minn./Totino-Grace) in the game's final six minutes to pull out a 51-47 win last Saturday in the first round of the NCAA Division III Playoffs. Chapman, believe it or not, had a wilder game than the Johnnies as the Panthers advanced with a 68-65 win over Linfield (Ore.) in three overtimes. The game had eight lead changes, over 1,100 yards of offense and 19 touchdowns.

Based out of Alexandria, Minn., KOOL-TV will again produce tape-delayed broadcasts of all Saint John's home football games, as well as the "Gary Fasching Coaches' Show," for the fifth consecutive season in 2019. The 30-minute show airs at 6:30 p.m. each Tuesday night during the football season, followed by the tape-delayed home broadcast. MORE RECORDS FALL FOR ERDMANN



Senior quarterback **Jackson Erdmann** (left; Rosemount, Minn.) finished 30 of 42 passing for 481 yards and four touchdowns to cross the 10,000-yard passing mark in his collegiate career and broke SJU's single-season passing mark in the process, last Saturday. The performance was his eighth 300-yard passing game of the season and 12th of his career. Erdmann currently leads Division III in passing yards (3,833), is second in both passing yards per game (348.5) and total offense (358.9 ypg.), third in yards per pass attempt (10.71) and sixth in passing efficiency (184.0) and yards per completion (16.52). Among the NCAA's active career leaders (all divisions), Erdmann is third in pass-efficiency rating and fourth in touchdown

passes (see below).

CLIMBING SJU'S CHARTS

Senior quarterback **Jackson Erdmann** surpassed a pair of school records in the win over Aurora. He now holds the single-season SJU passing record with 3,833 yards, previously held by Tom Linnemann '00 (3,489 yards in 2000), and became SJU's career leader in total offense with 10,824 yards (10,818 by Alex Kofoed '07). Erdmann became SJU's all-time leader in career passing touchdowns, breaking the previous record of 100 (Kofoed), Sept. 22 at Carleton. He currently boasts 128 and is approaching a number of other SJU records.

ERDMANN IN CONFERENCE PLAY

Senior quarterback **Jackson Erdmann** ended his MIAC career with four league records in conference play. He broke his own single-season record for pass-efficiency rating (190.14) and tied the record for 300-yard passing games - set by Augsburg's Jordan Berg in 2007 and 2008 - with six. Erdmann also set career records for completion percentage (.640) and multi-touchdown games (23).

38 STRAIGHT WITH A TD

Senior quarterback **Jackson Erdmann** has thrown a touchdown pass in 37 consecutive starts and 38 straight games overall. In fact, there is only one game in Erdmann's career (42 appearances) in which he did not throw a touchdown...for the Johnnies. On Oct. 22, 2016, Erdmann entered the game in the third quarter at Gustavus Adolphus ahead 42-7 and went 0-for-2 passing, including a 17-yard interception return for a touchdown on his first attempt.

GAGLIARDI TROPHY SEMIFINALIST x 2

Senior quarterback **Jackson Erdmann** was named one of the 12 semifinalists for the 2019 Gagliardi Trophy, which is awarded to the most outstanding football player in NCAA Division III by Jostens and the J-Club of Saint John's University. Nov. 26. Announcement of the finalists for the 27th annual Gagliardi Trophy will be made the first week in December. The recipient's university will host an award presentation at a later date and details will be handled at the time of the announcement. The semifinalists include six quarterbacks, four running backs, a defensive linemen and a wide receiver. The final 12 semifinalists were selected by the J-Club Board of Directors.

Nominations were submitted by colleges across the country, and the semifinalists were selected by the J-Club Board of Directors. The Gagliardi Trophy national-selection committee is comprised of 16 Division III coaches (four from each NCAA region), four Division III administrators (one from each region), eight regional notable voters (two from each region), and eight national voters with Division III backgrounds. A fan vote, which runs until Dec. 9, is live on D3football.com.

The 2018 Gagliardi Trophy recipient, Erdmann was a consensus (AP, AFCA, D3football.com) All-American, the D3football.com National Offensive Player of the Year and MIAC Most Valuable Player last fall. He owns the MIAC and SJU record for passing touchdowns (128), as well as the school record for touchdowns responsible for (132), passing yards in a game (496), touchdown passes in a game (7), touchdown passes in a season (47), passing yards in a season (3,833), yards of total offense in a game (563), yards of total offense in a season (3,948), yards of total offense in a career (10,824) and most 300-yard passing games (12). Erdmann is second in school history in career pass attempts (1,057), career pass completions (673), career passing yards (10,432), career yards of total offense (10,824) and wins as a starting quarterback (35).

A global business leadership major with a 3.27 GPA, Erdmann earned a Fulbright English Teaching Assistant award, sponsored by the Department of State and the J. William Fulbright Foreign Scholarship Board, and will teach English in Malaysia starting in January 2020. He declined it, however, pending his possible professional football endeavors this winter/spring.

A member of the 2018 Allstate American Football Coaches' Association (AFCA) Good Works Team, Erdmann is no stranger to community service. He currently teaches and tutors advanced math students ranging from grades 5-8 at All Saints Academy in nearby St. Joseph, Minn., for an hour each weekday. Erdmann was one of three student-athletes (the lone student-athlete from Division III) on the NCAA working group appointed by the NCAA president and Board of Governors that examined issues highlighted in recently passed federal and state legislation related to student-athlete name, image and likeness.

He taught English as a Secondary Language (ESL) classes one night a week last fall and has participated in SJU's Kids Fighting Hunger meal-packing event each of the last four years. Erdmann helped the SJU football team raise money for Tackle Cancer and the "Up Till Dawn" campaign, collecting donations for St. Jude Children's Research Hospital since 2016. Erdmann went on an 18-day service trip to Thailand in January 2018, where he worked with various organizations that fight child sex trafficking. He spent his spring break in 2017 working at the Breaking Free House in the Twin Cities, which is a safe place for victims of sex trafficking and prostitution to recover from their experiences.

SERIES HISTORY

Saturday's game is the first meeting between SJU and Chapman. As noted in the series notes below and in the chart (*above right*), SJU is 3-1 all-time against current members of the Southern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (SCIAC), which consists of Cal Lutheran, Chapman, Claremont-Mudd-Scripps, La Verne, Redlands, Occidental, Pomona-Pitzer and Whittier.

The Johnnies are 1-1 all-time in the state of California. The first trip was a special one, the 1963 Camellia Bowl, which also served as the NAIA national championship game. SJU visited Sacramento and defeated Prairie View A&M 33-27 for the first of four national titles. The second was a 28-10 loss in Los Angeles to Occidental in the first round of the 1985 NCAA Division III Playoffs.

ALL ABOUT CHAPMAN

Chapman University, which was originally named Hesperian College, was founded in Woodland, Calif., in 1861. The school relocated to Orange, Calif., in 1954, just 15 miles from the beach. The school currently enrolls 8,542 students, offering a variety of academic programs across 110 areas of study (49 majors and 61 minors). The Panther football program returned to competition in 1994 following a 52-year hiatus. Although SJU has never faced Chapman in football, the schools have met on two occasions in two other sports (*see below*).

FAMILIAR TERRITORY

Saturday's game will be a homecoming of sorts for a number of Johnnies. Fifteen Johnnies on the 2019 roster hail from California, the second-largest contingent aside from Minnesota. Five will be in uniform Saturday: sophomore wide receiver **Ravi Alston** (Lake Elsinore, Calif./Vista Murrieta), junior offensive lineman **Ravon Chambers** (Bellflower, Calif./Valley Christian), junior defensive back **Jacob Christian** (Paso Robles, Calif./Mission College Prep), sophomore defensive lineman **Metoriah Faoliu** (Wildomar, Calif./Vista Murrieta) and senior cornerback **Chris Harris** (Lake Elsinore, Calif.). In addition to the Californians, senior defensive lineman **J.W. Windsor** (Mesa, Ariz./Chandler) will bring SCIAC experience to the field Saturday. He was a D3football.com All-West Region honoree for Cal Lutheran in 2018 and posted seven tackles (four solo), including 2.5 for loss and a sack, in the Kingsmen's 33-29 loss to Chapman last October.

FIRST-ROUND SUCCESS

Saint John's is now 45-24 (.652) all-time in postseason games, including a 40-23 record in the NCAA Division III Playoffs and a 24-5 (.828) mark in Collegeville. The Johnnies have won 15 of their last 16 NCAA Playoff games at home and are 19-4 in the first round overall.

COMBINED POINTS

Last Saturday's 51-47 win tied SJU's record for the most combined points in a game, 98, set in the Johnnies' 98-0 win over St. Scholastica in 2017. The 47 points allowed were the third-most scored by an opponent in Collegeville and the most in an SJU win.

STEPPING IN FOR THE LEGEND

A 1981 SJU graduate, Fasching became the 16th head coach in the 102-year history of Saint John's University football following the 2012 season. He succeeded John Gagliardi, who announced his retirement following 60 seasons at SJU, after serving 17 seasons as an assistant football coach and recruiting coordinator at SJU. Fasching was a three-year starter for Gagliardi and the Johnnies at linebacker during the 1978 and 1980-81 seasons. A knee injury held him out of the 1979 season.

AS AN ASSISTANT

The Johnnies posted a 164-39 record (120-22 MIAC) with 10 conference titles and 12 postseason appearances (22-11 playoff record), including the 2003 national championship, 2000 national runner-up performance and four national semifinal games during his tenure as an assistant coach. He also coached SJU's throwers as an assistant track and field coach from 1996-2011.

AT ST. CLOUD CATHEDRAL

Prior to joining the Johnnies' coaching staff, Fasching served as the head football coach at St. Cloud Cathedral High School from 1986-95, where he led the Crusaders to the State Class B title in 1992 and 1993.

THE LAST GAME

at Saint John's 51, Aurora (Ill.) 47

Saint John's trailed Aurora (Ill.) on four separate occasions, including by two scores halfway through the fourth quarter, but rallied with two touchdowns in the game's final six minutes to pull out a 51-47 win last Saturday in the first round of the NCAA Division III Playoffs. Senior quarterback **Jackson Erdmann** completed 30 of 42 passes for 481 yards and four touchdowns. Sophomore wide receiver **Ravi Alston** and **T.J. Hodge** (Miami, Fla./Doral Academy) each caught a touchdown and collected 216 and 103 receiving yards, respectively.

In a game where it felt as if whomever had the ball last was going to win, Aurora took over on its own 39-yard line with no timeouts and 1:43 to play. The Johnnies, however, recorded two sacks and the Spartans advanced to SJU's 22-yard line on the final play. Aurora quarterback Gavin Zimbelman ended the day 39 of 58 passing for 432 yards and six touchdowns. He opened the scoring with a 58-yard touchdown run on the Spartans' third offensive play.

at Chapman (Calif.) 68, Linfield (Ore.) 65 (3OT)

Chapman pulled out an exhilarating 68-65 win in triple overtime to advance to the second round. The game had eight lead changes, over 1,100 yards of offense and 19 touchdowns. The playoff win was the first for Chapman in program history. CU out-gained Linfield 577-547 without a turnover and had three takeaways. Running back Tanner Mendoza rushed for 173 yards and three touchdowns, including the game-winning, 13-yard score in the third overtime. Wide receiver Spencer Corona caught eight passes for 180 yards and a touchdown, while linebacker Dillon Keefe had a monumental day on both sides of the ball. He led the Panthers with 10 tackles, blocked an extra point, returned a fumble 21 yards for a touchdown, ran the ball twice for 10 yards and a touchdown, and threw a 25-yard touchdown pass. He also had one of Chapman's four sacks on the day.

SJU and Aurora recently signed a home-and-home series to play non-conference games in the 2020 and 2021 seasons. The deal was signed a few weeks before last Saturday's game was determined. The Spartans will return to Collegeville next season for the home opener Sept. 5, followed by a showdown in Illinois in 2021's first game.

ANOTHER 10-WIN SEASON

The Johnnies' 10-1 record so far in 2019 is their 23rd 10-win season in program history. No other MIAC program has even half of that total.

CAREER HIGHS FOR ALSTON

Sophomore wide receiver **Ravi Alston** (right) recorded career highs with 12 receptions for 216 yards, including a 12-yard touchdown 1:51 into the second quarter of SJU's wild 51-47 win over Aurora last Saturday. The 216 receiving yards tied for the fourth-most by a Johnnie in a single game, while both the number of catches and yards set new SJU sophomore records. He may have saved the game for SJU with his 14-yard reception on fourth-and-four from the Aurora 37-yard line with the Johnnies down 47-38 in the fourth quarter. In fact, all 12 of Alston's receptions went for first downs.



Alston surpassed 1,000 yards for the season in the victory and now leads the Johnnies in receptions (64), receiving yards (1,106) and receiving touchdowns (9). The 1,106 receiving yards are eighth-most in an SJU season.

APPROACHING TWO WITH 1,000



Sophomore wide receiver **T.J. Hodge** (left) currently has 59 catches for 852 yards and six touchdowns on the season. He finished with 103 yards on seven catches last Saturday for his fifth 100-yard game of the season. The Johnnies have only had two players with over 1,000 receiving yards in the same season once, in 1994: Jeremy Loretz (68 catches for 1,340 yards) and Chris Palmer (53 catches for 1,051 yards). SJU nearly had three in the national runner-up season of 2000: Nate Kirschner (64 catches for 1,106 yards), Jeremy Forsell (81 catches for 979 yards) and Blake Elliott (60 catches for 967 yards).

THERE'S A BARBER SHOP IN THE END ZONE

Senior running back **Kai Barber** scored three second-half touchdowns and gained 88 yards on 15 carries in last Saturday's first-round win over Aurora. His first touchdown, a nine-yard scamper, gave SJU its first lead at 35-34 with 7:45 to play in the third quarter. Barber found the end zone from two yards out to cut SJU's deficit to 47-45 with 5:47 to play and his one-yard touchdown run with 1:49 remaining proved to be the game-winning score. He currently leads the team in rushing yards (618), rushing touchdowns (10) and total touchdowns (13).

SECOND ELITE 22 AWARD FOR BACKES



Junior quarterback **Chris Backes** (left; St. Cloud, Minn./Tech) earned his second MIAC Elite 22 Award for football Nov. 25. Modeled after the NCAA Elite 90 Award, the MIAC Elite 22 Award for football is presented to the individual with the highest GPA among the conference's top two teams in the final standings. The honoree must be a sophomore, junior or senior and in at least his second season of competition with his current team.

An economics major with a 4.0 GPA, Backes has appeared in all 11 games this season as the Johnnies' holder for field goals and extra-point attempts. He also serves as SJU backup quarterback, and took snaps under center in five games this fall. Backes is 14 of 16 passing for 122 yards and two touchdowns, including an 8-for-8 performance for 113 yards and two touchdowns in the 56-10 win Sept. 28 at Carleton. He also capped the scoring in a 61-6 win over Augsburg Oct. 5 with a 5-yard touchdown run and has 121 rushing yards on 20 carries (6.1 avg.) this season.

An early interception by senior cornerback **Chris Harris** (right) may have been the difference in Saturday's shootout. On Aurora's second drive, Harris picked off a deep throw by Aurora on the SJU 3-yard line. It was the only drive in the first half in which the Spartans failed to score. Harris now leads the team with seven interceptions, the most by a Johnnie since Bobby Fischer '13 did it in 2012. Harris also blocked an extra point after Aurora scored to open the second half.



2019 MIAC AWARDS

Sixteen Johnnies earned All-MIAC honors, including a school-record 11 on the first team, as SJU claimed two of the league's three major conference awards Nov. 26. Senior offensive tackle **Ben Barch** (Dayton, Ore./Blanchet Catholic) earned the MIAC's Mike Stam Award as the conference's most outstanding lineman and head coach **Gary Fasching** '81 was named the MIAC John Gagliardi Coach of the Year for the third consecutive season, and fourth time in his seven-year tenure.

Barch is the ninth Johnnie in program history to win the MIAC's Mike Stam Award, the second consecutive (defensive lineman Nathan Brinker '19) and the first SJU offensive lineman since the Johnnies' first recipient, Burt Chamberlin '94, in 1992. Fasching to its MIAC-record 34th conference title and 30th postseason appearance (26th in Division III) this fall. The NCAA appearance the program's sixth consecutive, which tied the MIAC record held by former head coach John Gagliardi.

Barch, sophomore wide receiver **Ravi Alston**, senior running back **Kai Barber**, senior linebacker **Richard Cariveau** (Rice, Minn./Sauk Rapids-Rice), senior quarterback **Jackson Erdmann**, senior guard **Dan Greenheck** (St. Paul, Minn./Cretin-Derham Hall), senior cornerback **Chris Harris**, senior safety **Ryan LaCasse** (Mountlake Terrace, Wash.), junior center **Nick Neumann** (Inver Grove Heights, Minn./Cretin-Derham Hall), junior linebacker **Danny Pietruszewski** (South St. Paul, Minn.) and senior defensive tackle **J.W. Windsor** were named to the first team.

Sophomore wide receiver **T.J. Hodge** and senior defensive end **Nick Jensen** (Sartell, Minn./Sartell-St. Stephen) were named to the All-MIAC second team. Senior defensive end **Kyle Borgeson** (Rochester, Minn./Lourdes), senior linebacker **James Inman** (Bismarck, N.D./Shiloh Christian), senior linebacker **Alex Sais** (Los Lunas, N.M./St. Pius X) were All-MIAC honorable mention. Senior wide receiver **Andrew VanErp** (Battle Lake, Minn./Ottertail Central) was named to the MIAC All-Sportsmanship team.

NO STRANGER TO THE POSTSEASON

The 2019 postseason appearance is the Johnnies' 30th (26th at the NCAA Division III level) and sixth consecutive, which ties its own MIAC record (1998-2003). SJU is tied with Washington & Jefferson (Pa.) for second in NCAA Division III history in postseason appearances and fourth in playoff wins. The Johnnies made four other postseason appearances and have a 44-24 (.647) record overall: three in the NAIA (1963, 1965, 1982) and one showing at the Mineral Water Bowl (1969).

MIAC LEADERS

The Johnnies led the MIAC in five offensive statistical categories in league play this fall, two on offense and three on defense: total offense (563.3 ypg., second year in a row); passing offense (366.3 ypg., second year in a row); total defense (250.6 ypg.); passing defense (160.0 ypg.); and scoring defense (11.6 ppg.). Individually, senior **Jackson Erdmann** led all MIAC quarterbacks in passing yards (2,809); yards per game (351.1); yards per attempt (11.3) and pass-efficiency rating (190.1) in conference play.

STRONG PASSING GAME

The Johnnies are currently second in NCAA Division III in passing offense with an average of 359.8 yards per game, which is good for fifth across all divisions of NCAA football. SJU is also fifth in Division III in total offense (525.1) and seventh in passing efficiency (184.23 rating).

The Johnnies ended the regular season in NCAA Division III's top 20, statistically, in 12 categories: **OFFENSE**: second in passing offense (347.7 ypg.), fifth in total offense (521.7 ypg.), ninth in passing efficiency (182.36), 17th in yards per pass completion (16.02), 18th in first downs (237), 19th in completion percentage (.652) and 20th in scoring offense (41.0 ppg.). **DEFENSE**: fifth in scoring defense (11.4 ppg.), 12th in total defense (246.6), 18th in pass-efficiency defense (100.79), 19th in first downs allowed (142) and 20th in passing defense (156.9 ypg.).

HE'S DEFINITELY NO STRANGER

Which Johnnie has been part of each NCAA postseason appearance for SJU, dating back to 1976? Defensive coordinator **Jerry Haugen** '76, who is in his 44th season on the Johnnies' coaching staff. Saturday's game is his 64th NCAA postseason contest. Meaning, he has coached six additional seasons in playoff games alone. The Johnnies have posted a 390-93-5 (.804) overall record and a 297-59-4 (.831) MIAC record with Haugen



as a defensive coach. Since 1977, his defense has finished in the top two of the MIAC in total defense 23 times, including 13 of the past 19 seasons, and in scoring defense 29 times, including 20 of the past 24 seasons. As a player, Haugen was a four-year starter and gained All-MIAC honors as a defensive back in 1975 (*left*). He ranks second on the school's career interception list with 15 (first place without postseason games).

A LOT OF GAMES, A LOT OF WINS

The Johnnies' NCAA second-round win last fall was also the 380th with **Jerry Haugen** as an assistant football coach at SJU. Bobby Bowden, a member of the College Football Hall of Fame and long-time head coach at Florida State (1976-2009), has the fourth-most wins in college football history with a 377-129-4 record. All told, Haugen has been a part of 1,499 wins (2,456 games) at SJU as a player and coach across four different sports, as well as 35 conference championships (including four MIAC Playoff titles in baseball) and 41 postseason appearances.

THREE JOHNNIES ACADEMIC ALL-DISTRICT



Three Johnnies were named to the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) Academic All-District VI football team Nov. 14. Senior defensive lineman **Kyle Borgeson**, senior linebacker **Alex Sais** (left) and sophomore running back **Henry Trost** (Lindstrom, Minn./Chisago Lakes) all earned the honor. The distinction was the second consecutive for Sais. Nominees must be of a sophomore academic standing or better, with a 3.30 GPA or higher. The Academic All-District teams are voted upon and selected by registered members of CoSIDA. The three are now eligible for CoSIDA Academic All-America honors, which will be announced Wednesday, Dec. 11.

The Johnnies have now had 43 Academic All-District selections in the past 15 seasons, including a linebacker in each of the last eight: Maze Thompson (2012), Drake Matuska (2013), Carter Hanson (2014-16), David Franta (2017) and Sais (2018-19).

BARTCH HEADED TO THE SENIOR BOWL

Senior offensive tackle **Ben Bartch** has accepted an invitation to play in the 2020 Reese's Senior Bowl, which is scheduled for 1:30 p.m. Saturday, Jan. 25, at Ladd Peebles Stadium in Mobile, Ala. The game will be broadcast live on the NFL Network, as will the practices on Tuesday through Thursday (Jan. 21-23). The Wednesday and Thursday (Jan. 22-23) practice will also be covered live on ESPN. The NFL Network will produce hour-long recap shows each evening.



The Reese's Senior Bowl is college football's premier senior showcase event. It annually features the country's best senior collegiate football players and top NFL draft prospects on teams representing the North and South. The teams are coached by the entire coaching staffs of two National Football League teams. Only college seniors and fourth-year junior graduates are eligible for the game. Fourth-year junior graduates must have graduated by the December prior to the game to be eligible.

A 2018 All-MIAC second-team selection, Bartch has started each of the Johnnies' last 23 games at left tackle over the past two seasons (through Nov. 16). He played tight end his first two years as a Johnnie and caught four passes for 43 yards (10.8 avg.) and a touchdown in eight games in 2017. He switched to offensive tackle during the 2018 offseason and started on the left side immediately. His athleticism and size (6-foot-6, 305 pounds) have attracted scouts from all 32 NFL teams this fall.

Wide receiver Blake Elliott '03 was the last Johnnie football student-athlete to participate in a prestigious all-star game alongside Division I prospects. He played in the 2004 Hula Bowl, with former head coach John Gagliardi serving as an assistant to head coach Jim Tressel of Ohio State, following his record-breaking 2003 season.

BUT FIRST, NEW ORLEANS FOR THE SUGAR BOWL



Senior **Ben Bartch** (left) was named one of 22 student-athletes, across all divisions of college football, to the 2019 Allstate American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Good Works Team Sept. 12. A fan vote is running until Nov. 22 at www.ESPN.com/Allstate to decide this year's Allstate AFCA Good Works Team Captain, who will be recognized during the national ESPN broadcast of The Home Depot ESPNU College Football Awards in December. The 2019 Allstate AFCA Good Works Team will be invited to New Orleans to participate in a special community service project ahead of the 2020 Allstate Sugar Bowl, where the entire team will also be recognized on the field at halftime on New Year's Day.

Bartch is the fourth Johnnie to be named to the Allstate AFCA Good Works Team and the third consecutive: senior quarterback **Jackson Erdmann** was named to the 2018 Allstate AFCA Good Works Team, wide receiver Will Gillach '19 in 2017 and defensive end Kevin McNamara '07 was SJU's first to achieve the distinction in 2006.

Off the field, Bartch studied abroad in South Africa during spring 2019, where he served as a computer lab tutor for children ages kindergarten-seventh grade at Seyisi Primary School (right). He organized and implemented daily plans to teach the children how to use computers and tutored them as they used applications for writing, reading, mathematics and learning English.

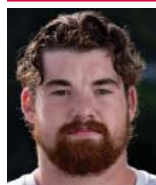


He volunteered with Catholic Charities' Meals on Wheels last fall in nearby St. Joseph and served as an after-school tutor for a sixth-grade student at All Saints Academy in St. Joseph during the 2017-18 academic year. At SJU, Bartch helped raise money for a pair of SJU football's initiatives, St. Jude Children's Research Hospital and Tackle Cancer. He also serves as treasurer for the Johnnies' Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC), which holds an annual Kids Fighting Hunger meal-packing event every March. He volunteered at Newman, the Roman Catholic parish at the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire's Ecumenical Religious Center, in 2017 and 2018 when visiting his grandmother during breaks in the academic year. In spring 2017, Bartch volunteered at the St. Joseph Community Kitchen and at the All Saints Academy's fish fry. Bartch also volunteers for the Order of Saint Benedict sisters as a cross holder and Eucharistic minister at the Sacred Heart Chapel in St. Joseph. A psychology major, Bartch shadowed licensed psychiatrist Dr. Jon Bowar last fall at the St. Cloud Hospital's Psych Ward.

WHAT A YEAR

Senior **Jackson Erdmann** recorded one of the best, if not *the* best, seasons by a Saint John's quarterback in 2018. He won the 2018 Gagliardi Trophy as the most outstanding football player in NCAA Division III, just the second junior to accomplish the feat in the award's 26-year history, and was named the D3football.com Offensive Player of the Year. Erdmann was a consensus (AFCA, AP, D3football.com) first-team All-American, played only five of the 13 games to completion and led NCAA Division III in three statistical categories: pass efficiency (189.8), passing touchdowns (47) and points responsible for (290). He also finished third in yards per pass attempt (10.03), fourth in passing yardage (3,450) and ninth in yards per completion (15.40). The 2018 MIAC Most Valuable Player, Erdmann set single-game program records for passing yards (470 on Oct. 13 vs. St. Thomas) and passing touchdowns (7 on Nov. 10 vs. Thomas More). He also set a single-season school record for passing touchdowns and yards of total offense (3,626), and fell 39 passing yards short of Tom Linnemann's '00 school record of 3,489 set in 2000.

PRESEASON ALL-AMERICANS



To very little or no surprise, two Johnnies earned preseason All-America honors over the summer. Senior quarterback **Jackson Erdmann** and senior guard **Dan Greenheck** (left) were named first-team All-Americans by D3football.com and a pair of magazines, *Lindy's* and *Street & Smith's*. Both were consensus (AFCA, AP, D3football.com), first-team All-Americans last fall. A two-time All-American, Greenheck has started each of the Johnnies' last 24 games at right guard. SJU averaged 47.5 points per game and SJU's offense averaged 491.8 yards per contest (192.2 rushing and 299.5 passing) last fall. The 491.8 yards per game were the second-most in an SJU season (495.2 average in 1993) and the 299.5 passing yards per game were the most since the school record set in 1994 (314.5 avg.).

PASSING WITH EFFICIENCY

SJU once again excelled in the passing game last fall, as it led all 247 NCAA Division III teams in pass-efficiency rating (186.59). Individually, senior quarterback **Jackson Erdmann** became the fourth Johnnie to lead Division III in passing efficiency with a rating of 189.8 (see below). His rating was third, behind Alabama's Tua Tagovailoa (199.4) and Oklahoma's Kyler Murray (199.2), across all divisions of college football. Willie Seiler's '94 mark of 224.6 set in 1993 is still the second-best in Division III history (NCAA statistical champions consisted of regular-season stats only until 2002).

NO. 18 AMONG ESPN'S TOP 50 FOOTBALL PROGRAMS

Saint John's was ranked No. 18 out of ESPN's top 50 programs (see chart on right) over the last 150 years in August. The ranking formula took into consideration a program's number of national championships and various winning percentages: dominance (best 50 seasons in program history), since integration (1969-2018), early modern (1919-1968) and pre-modern (1869-1918). ESPN noted: "It is not true that the Johnnies' late head coach, John Gagliardi, coached against Frank Leahy. But it is true that Gagliardi became head coach at Saint John's in 1953, the last season that Leahy coached at Notre Dame, and didn't retire until 2012, after 60 seasons and 465 victories. Saint John's, according to our metrics, had one of the 10 most successful programs of the past 100 years. That's another way of saying Gagliardi won 27 conference titles and four national champion-

On This Date in Johnnie Football History...

The Johnnies are 3-1 all-time on November 30, all in postseason games: 1963 vs. Emporia State, Kan. @ Metropolitan Stadium (W, 54-0); 1991 vs. UW-La Crosse @ Metrodome (W, 29-10); 1996 at UW-La Crosse (L, 30-37); and 2002 vs. Coe, Iowa (W, 45-14).

1963 vs. Emporia State, Kan. @ Metropolitan Stadium (W, 54-0): Played just eight days after the assassination of President John F. Kennedy, the NAIA Eastern division playoff game between SJU and Emporia State (Kan.) took place on this date 56 years ago. A chilly 26 degrees welcomed the squad from Kansas before an NAIA playoff record crowd of 12,438 fans at Metropolitan Stadium in Bloomington. Junior Jim Dey blocked an Emporia punt through the back of the Presbie end zone for a safety and an early 2-0 lead; an ominous sign of what was to come for the next three and a half quarters of football. The Johnnies amassed 494 yards rushing and 535 yards of total offense in the win to earn a trip to the aforementioned Camellia Bowl, where SJU claimed its first of four national championships with a 33-27 win over Prairie View A&M in Sacramento.

1991 vs. UW-La Crosse @ Metrodome (W, 29-10): The Johnnies topped UW-La Crosse 29-10 on this date 28 years ago. The game was originally scheduled to be played in La Crosse, Wis., but was moved to the Metrodome due to 10 inches of snow. Senior running back Jay Conzemius rushed for 119 yards and four touchdowns to lead SJU in the win.

2002 vs. Coe, Iowa (W, 45-14): SJU forced five turnovers in a frigid win (16 degrees, -1 wind chill) 17 years ago today. Senior running back Kent Crowley (*right*) rushed for 183 yards and three touchdowns on 21 carries (8.7 avg.) for SJU, which out-gained the Kohawks 453-323. Senior quarterback Ross Denne passed for 226 yards and three touchdowns, two of which went to sophomore wide receiver Lee Clintsman. Senior defensive lineman Josh Miller (2.5 sacks) and junior linebacker Nathan Brever (0.5 sack) led the SJU defense with three tackles for loss each. Coe running back Fred Jackson, who later played 10 seasons in the NFL (nine with the Buffalo Bills), totaled 150 yards and two touchdowns on 29 carries.

LEADING THE COUNTRY IN TOTAL ATTENDANCE

Collegeville was the place to be for NCAA Division III football in 2018, as Saint John's attracted a division-best 47,297 fans to Clemens Stadium last fall. That cumulative total was greater than 98 Football Championship Subdivision teams and all but one of the 167 Division II programs (Grand Valley State's total of 67,865). SJU finished second nationally in Division III with an average of 5,912 spectators over eight games, including two in the NCAA playoffs. The Johnnies have finished in Division III's top two in per-game attendance each of the last 18 seasons.

SJU Football in the Classroom

-SJU returns five of last year's 10 Academic All-MIAC (minimum 3.5 cumulative GPA) honorees in 2019: **Chris Backes**, **Jarod Fike**, **Collin Franz**, **Alex Sais** and **Andrew VanErp**. The Johnnies have had totaled 91 Academic All-MIAC recipients in Gary Fasching's first six seasons, the most in the MIAC during that span (Concordia is next with 86 honorees since 2013).

-The Johnnies have had 16 football Academic All-Americans in the last 15 seasons, including wide receiver Will Gillach '19 last fall. SJU leads the MIAC in with 30 football Academic All-Americans (as selected by CoSIDA).

-Gillach earned SJU's third consecutive Stein-Fallon Scholar-Athlete Award from the Minnesota chapter of the National Football Foundation in May 2019. Linebackers David Franta '18 (2018) and Carter Hanson '17 (2017) previously won the award, which is given to a senior football student-athlete who demonstrates outstanding academic achievement, football leadership and community citizenship.

-**Chris Backes** earned the MIAC's Elite 22 Award for football in 2018. Modeled after the NCAA Elite 90 Award, the MIAC Elite 22 Award for football is presented to the individual with the highest GPA among the conference's top two teams in the final standings. The honoree must be a sophomore, junior or senior and in at least his second season of competition with his current team. Backes is the 12th SJU student-athlete in all sports to receive the award and the second football player. Hanson won it in 2014 and 2016.

-For the 14th consecutive year, CSB and SJU were ranked among the top baccalaureate schools nationally for the total number of students who studied abroad. That was one of the findings of Open Doors 2018, the annual report on international education published by the Institute of International Education (IIE) in partnership with the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs last November.

-CSB and SJU are ranked No. 2 among baccalaureate schools with 365 students who studied abroad in mid-length study abroad programs during the 2016-17 academic year, the most recent data measured by the IIE. The IIE defines mid-length study abroad programs as lasting one semester or one or two quarters (CSB and SJU operate under the semester system). CSB and SJU are No. 3 nationally among baccalaureate schools with 555 students who studied abroad during the 2016-17 school year. CSB and SJU have been ranked among the top six schools nationally in this category for the past 14 years. Before graduating, it is estimated that 65.5 percent of all CSB and SJU students will participate in a study abroad program, according to the IIE. CSB and SJU annually offer students 18 semester-long programs, 14 of which are faculty-led, and 14 short-term study abroad programs.

BLAKE ELLIOTT '03 ON HALL OF FAME BALLOT

Former Saint John's University award-winning student-athlete Blake Elliott '03 was named to the College Football Hall of Fame ballot for the seventh consecutive year in June. Elliott, who played wide receiver for the Johnnies from 2000-03, is one of 177 former student-athletes on the ballot, including one of 100 from the NCAA divisional and NAIA ranks. The announcement of the 2020 inductees will be made in January 2020 in New Orleans. Those selected will be inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame Dec. 8, 2020, at the New York Hilton Midtown and permanently enshrined at the Chick-fil-A College Football Hall of Fame in Atlanta.

Elliott excelled for the Johnnies for four years and ended his career as the recipient of the Gagliardi Trophy and a national championship in 2003; a season that included Gagliardi's record-breaking 409th career victory. He owns three NCAA playoff records, two MIAC records and 29 SJU receiving records. Elliott was a three-time All-American, a two-time MIAC Player of the Year, a Gagliardi Trophy finalist as a junior in 2002 and was invited to play in both the AFCA Aztec Bowl and Hula Bowl following the 2003 season. His NCAA all-divisions record for consecutive games played with a reception (47) ended in 2008. He ended his career second all-time in all NCAA divisions in catches (327) and second in NCAA Division III in touchdown receptions (56). Elliott posted 369 receptions for 4,826 yards and 63 touchdowns in his career, as well as 744 rushing yards and eight touchdowns on 109 carries (prior to the 2002 season, the NCAA did not recognize playoff-game stats in season or career totals). Elliott (*right*) was just as dangerous on special teams as he was on the offensive side of the ball, totaling 3,065 yards and seven touchdowns on 195 returns, kickoff and punt combined.



To be eligible for the ballot, players must have been named a first-team All-American by a major/national selector as recognized and utilized by the NCAA for their consensus All-America teams; played their last year of intercollegiate football at least 10 years prior; played within the last 50 years and cannot be currently playing professional football. Of the 5.33 million individuals who have played college football since the Princeton-Rutgers game on Nov. 6, 1869, only 1,010 players have earned induction into the College Football Hall of Fame, or less than two one-hundredths (.0002) of one percent of those who have played the game during the past 150 years. From the coaching ranks, 219 individuals have achieved Hall of Fame distinction, including SJU's John Gagliardi (Class of 2006).

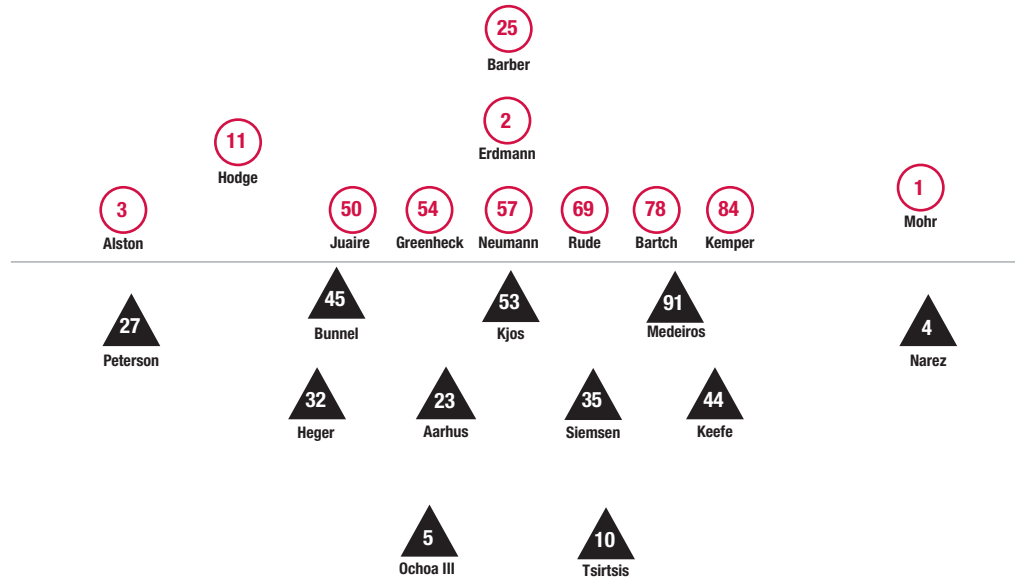
