SATURDAY'S MATCHUP

Saint John's started its 109th season two weeks ago (Sept. 7) with a 14-7 non-conference win at Wisconsin-Stout. The Johnnies erased a 7-0 deficit with 14 points over a 2:02 span in the third quarter. The defense, meanwhile, posted seven sacks, 12 tackles for loss and three second-half interceptions in the victory. Gustavus Adolphus moved to 2-0 with a 41-31 win last Saturday (Sept. 14) at Stout. The Gusties scored two touchdowns in the final four minutes of the second quarter to gain a 28-17 halftime lead. The Blue Devils out-gained the Gusties 393-377 but threw three interceptions, including two in the fourth quarter.

WHAT A YEAR



Senior **Jackson Erdmann** (*left*; Rosemount, Minn.) recorded one of the best, if not *the* best, seasons by a Saint John's quarterback in 2018. He won the 2018 Gagliardi Trophy as the most outstanding football player in NCAA Division III, just the second junior to accomplish the feat in the award's 26-year history, and was named the D3football.com Offensive Player of the Year. Erdmann was a consensus (AFCA, AP, D3football.com) first-team All-American, played only five of the 13 games to completion and led NCAA Division III in three statistical categories: passing efficiency (189.8), passing touchdowns (47) and points responsible for (290). He also finished third in yards per pass attempt (10.03), fourth in passing yardage (3,450) and ninth in

yards per completion (15.40). The 2018 MIAC Most Valuable Player, Erdmann set single-game program records last fall for passing yards (470 on Oct. 13 vs. St. Thomas) and passing touchdowns (7 on Nov. 10 vs. Thomas More). Erdmann also set a single-season school record for passing touchdowns and yards of total offense (3,626), and fell 39 passing yards short of Tom Linnemann's '00 school record of 3,489 set in 2000 (15 games). He currently (through Sept. 14) has a career .628 completion percentage and 177.8 pass-efficiency rating (94 touchdowns to 20 interceptions in 734 pass attempts).

CLIMBING SJU'S CHARTS

Although senior quarterback **Jackson Erdmann** is poised to surpass Alex Kofoed's school record for passing touchdowns, it will take an all-world season in 2019 to dethrone him atop the lists for attempts, completions and yards. Erdmann moved up in the other four passing categories listed below in last Saturday's win at UW-Stout: he passed Ryan Keating (2000-03) for third passing yards, Tom Linnemann (1996-00) for fourth in completions, Linnemann for fifth in attempts and moved into a tie with Keating for fourth in wins as a starting quarterback.

SEASON-OPENING SUCCESS

Saint John's football is now 78-28-3 (.729) all-time in season openers, including a 7-0 record under the direction of head coach **Gary Fasching**. The Johnnies have won each of their last 15 season openers, 16 of their last 17, and 32 of their last 36 (since 1984).

ANOTHER NON-CONFERENCE WIN

SJU is now 31-4 in regular-season, non-conference games since 2002 (the first season without Macalester in the MIAC, which created the need for two non-conference games in the regular-season schedule). All four losses were to UW-Eau Claire (2002, 2004, 2010 and 2011), including two in overtime on the road (2002 and 2010) and another decided by two points (30-28 in 2004). The Johnnies wrap up their 2019 regular-season schedule with the final of two non-conference games Nov. 16 against Rose-Hulman (Ind.) in Collegeville.

SERIES HISTORY

Saturday's game is the 86th meeting between SJU and Gustavus. The Johnnies are 50-32-3 all-time against the Gusties, including a 26-11-1 record - with nine straight wins - in Collegeville. SJU has won 30 of the last 32 meetings overall. The 23-20, double-overtime win for Gustavus in 2013 was the first for the Gusties at home, in the series, since Oct. 11, 1986 (28-20).

MIAC OPENERS

The Johnnies are 66-24-7 (.716) all-time in their first MIAC game of the season, including a 31-10-4 (.733) record in Collegeville and a 4-3 record against Gustavus (2-0 in Collegeville and 2-3 in St. Peter). It took SJU until its 11th season in the MIAC to win its first conference game of the season, a 7-0 home shutout of Hamline on Oct. 3, 1931. SJU was 0-6-4 in its first 10 conference openers and is 66-18-3 (.776) since.

LAST YEAR'S MEETING (SJU 45, GAC 13)

Then-No. 9 Saint John's returned from its bye week to defeat Gustavus Adolphus 45-13 in last year's MIAC opener on Sept. 15 (2018) in St. Peter. The game, played under the lights at St. Peter High School's field due to MIAC weather regulations, quickly became a high-scoring affair as SJU raced out to a 24-13 halftime lead. Senior quarterback **Jackson Erdmann** completed 13 of 20 passes for 231 yards and three touchdowns, all of which came in the first half. He connected with three veterans - Jared Streit '19 (30-yard), Tommy Auger '19 (18-yard) and Joey Eckhoff '19 (42-yard) - for touchdowns to finish the first half 10 of 15 passing for 170 yards and the three scores.

Will Gillach '19 led the Johnnies with four receptions for 66 yards, including two catches for 50 yards in the second half. Junior running back **Kenneth Udoibok** (St. Paul, Minn./ Cretin-Derham Hall) rushed seven times for 45 yards and two second-half touchdowns to extend the lead. The Johnnies' special teams provided a huge boost in the fourth quarter as Ted Kalina '19 blocked a 25-yard field-goal attempt and senior safety **Ryan LaCasse** (Mountlake Terrace, Wash.) returned it 92 yards for a touchdown with 13:12 remaining.

THE LAST GAME

Saint John's 14, at UW-Stout 7

The Johnnies erased a 7-0 deficit with 14 points over a 2:02 span in the third quarter and the SJU did the rest in the 2019 season opener two weeks ago (Sept. 7). SJU tied the



game with a 9-play, 79-yard scoring drive that ended with a 3-yard touchdown pass from senior quarterback **Jackson Erdmann** to junior running back **Kenneth Udoibok** (*left*) with 4:30 left in the third. The Johnnie defense forced a three-and-out and the offense wasted no time to take the lead, as Erdmann connected with sophomore running back **Henry Trost** (Lindstrom, Minn./Chisago Lakes) on a 46-yard touchdown pass on SJU's first offensive play of the drive.

SJU's defense stepped up all day long, posting seven sacks, 12 tackles for loss and three second-half interceptions in the victory. Stout's second offensive possession was a 12-play, 77-yard scoring drive that ended on a 4-yard touchdown pass - on third-and-goal - with 4:25 left in the opening frame. The Blue Devils mustered only 100 yards of offense in the other 12 possessions.

STEPPING IN FOR THE LEGEND

A 1981 SJU graduate, Fasching became the 16th head coach in the 102year history of Saint John's University football following the 2012 season. He succeeded John Gagliardi, who announced his retirement following 60 seasons at SJU, after serving 17 seasons as an assistant football coach and recruiting coordinator at SJU. Fasching was a three-year starter for Gagliardi and the Johnnies at linebacker during the 1978 and 1980-81 seasons. A knee injury held him out of the 1979 season.

AS AN ASSISTANT

The Johnnies posted a 164-39 record (120-22 MIAC) with 10 conference titles and 12 postseason appearances (22-11 playoff record), including the 2003 national championship, 2000 national runner-up performance and four national semifinal games during his tenure as an assistant coach. He also coached SJU's throwers as an assistant track and field coach from 1996-2011.

AT ST. CLOUD CATHEDRAL

Prior to joining the Johnnies' coaching staff, Fasching served as the head football coach at St. Cloud Cathedral High School from 1986-95, where he led the Crusaders to the State Class B title in 1992 and 1993.

SJU'S RECORD LINDER HEAD COACH GARY FASCHING

The season opener was not smooth, at least early, for the reigning Gagliardi Trophy recipient and D3football.com National Offensive Player of the Year. Erdmann threw an interception, while in the grasp of a defensive player, on his second pass attempt of the season and finished 2 of 8 passing for 23 yards and the pick in the first quarter (6 of 15 for 62 yards in the first half). He finished 20 of 35 passing for 235 yards and was sacked three times.

Senior wide receiver **Andrew VanErp** (Battle Lake, Minn./Ottertail Central) caught a career-high seven passes for 78 yards, while Trost totaled 115 all-purpose yards: 37 yards on nine carries, 56 yards on three receptions and a 22-yard kick return. Senior linebacker **James Inman** (Bismarck, N.D./Shiloh Christian) posted 10 tackles (three solo) and junior linebacker **Danny Pietruszewski** (South St. Paul, Minn.) recorded two sacks.

Gustavus Adolphus 41, at UW-Stout 31

The visiting Gusties erased a 17-14 deficit with 27 straight points to top Stout 41-31 last Saturday (Sept. 14). GAC surrendered nearly 400 yards of offense (393) but recorded three interceptions, including two in the fourth quarter. Senior quarterback Michael Veldman went 18 of 28 passing for 249 yards and three touchdowns, and added 43 yards and two more scores on eight carries. Senior wide receiver Josh Kirk caught eight passes for 114 yards and two touchdowns, while senior wide receiver Brice Panning had six catches for 94 yards and one score.

A SLOW START FOR THE OFFENSE

Despite a victory over UW-Stout two weeks ago, the Johnnies did not start the season as well as they would have liked. A few stat lines confirmed the performance's rarity.

- Senior quarterback **Jackson Erdmann's** interception on the second play of the game was SJU's first turnover on an opening drive since Sept. 24, 2016 vs. St. Thomas (a fumble, also on the game's second offensive play).
- The last time SJU was held scoreless in the first half was Nov. 18, 2017 at North Central in Illinois (a 17-7 loss in the first round of the NCAA Division III Playoffs).
- The 14 points scored was the lowest total for the Johnnies in a season opener since Sept. 1, 2001 (a 25-10 home loss to UW-Eau Claire).

EARLY ROAD GAMES AT WIAC OPPONENTS

The Johnnies are no strangers to drama in season openers on the road. In their last eight road openers (non-conference), SJU holds a 5-2 record. However, six of those matchups were decided by 7 points or less, including both losses. In fact, the Johnnies trailed by as many as 21 points in five of those games. Season openers aside, SJU's early-season road games at members of the Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (WIAC) tend to be close (and nerve-racking). The most dramatic finish came in the 2013 season opener at UW-River Falls, head coach **Gary Fasching's** first game at the helm. Trailing 14-7 in the fourth quarter, the Johnnies converted on fourth-and-11 to set up a 2-yard touchdown run by Jake Essler '13 with 0:55 remaining. SJU held the Falcons to one yard on their next three plays, which burned only 32 seconds off the clock, and a 39-yard completion from Nick Martin '15 to Ben Krebsbach '13 put the Johnnies on UWRF's 23-yard line. **Alexi Johnson** '16, now an assistant coach for the Johnnies, converted the 40-yard, gamewinning field goal with 0:02 on the clock.

PRESEASON ALL-AMERICANS

To very little or no surprise, two Johnnies earned preseason All-America honors over the summer. Senior quarterback Jackson Erdmann and senior guard Dan Greenheck (St. Paul, Minn./Cretin-Derham Hall) were named first-team All-Americans by D3football.com and a pair of magazines, Lindy's and Street & Smith's. Both were consensus (AFCA, AP, D3football.com), first-team All-Americans last fall. A two-time All-American, Greenheck has started each of the Johnnies' last 24 games at right guard. SJU averaged 47.5 points per game and SJU's offense averaged 491.8 yards per contest (192.2 rushing and 299.5 passing) last fall. The 491.8 yards per game were the second-most in an SJU season (495.2 average in 1993) and the 299.5 passing yards per game were the most since the school record set in 1994 (314.5 avg.).

ALL-MIAC RETURNERS

SJU returns eight Johnnies that earned All-MIAC recognition last fall, including four of the 10 first-team honorees: senior quarterback Jackson Erdmann, junior guard Dan Greenheck, junior center Nick Neumann (Inver Grove Heights, Minn./Cretin-Derham Hall) and junior linebacker Danny Pietruszewski. Senior running back Kai Barber (Minneapolis, Minn./Totino-Grace) and senior offensive tackle Ben Bartch (Dayton, Ore./Blanchet Catholic) earned All-MIAC second-team honors, while senior safety Ryan LaCasse and senior wide receiver Andrew VanErp were All-MIAC honorable mention.

BARTCH NAMED TO GOOD WORKS TEAM



Senior offensive lineman Ben Bartch (left) was was named one of 22 student-athletes, across all divisions of college football, to the 2019 Allstate American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Good Works Team Sept. 12. A fan vote will run from now until Nov. 22 at www.ESPN.com/Allstate to decide this year's Allstate AFCA Good Works Team Captain, who will be recognized during the national ESPN broadcast of The Home Depot ESPNU College Football Awards in December. The 2019 Allstate AFCA Good Works Team will be

invited to New Orleans to participate in a special community service project ahead of the 2020 Allstate Sugar Bowl, where the entire team will also be recognized on the field at halftime on New Year's Day.

Bartch is the fourth Johnnie to be named to the Allstate AFCA Good Works Team and the third consecutive. The player whose blind side Bartch protects, senior quarterback Jackson Erdmann, was named to the 2018 Allstate AFCA Good Works Team. Wide receiver Will Gillach '19 was a Good Works Team honoree in 2017 and defensive end Kevin McNamara '07 was SJU's first to achieve the distinction in 2006.

A 2018 All-MIAC second-team selection, Bartch started all 13 games at left tackle (695 snaps) in 2018. He played tight end his first two seasons as a Johnnie and caught four passes for 43 yards (10.8 avg.) and a touchdown in eight games in 2017. He switched to offensive tackle during the offseason and started on the left side immediately. His athleticism and size (6-foot-6, 305 pounds) have already attracted attention from NFL scouts.

Off the field, Bartch studied abroad in South Africa (right) during spring 2019, where he served as a computer lab tutor for children ages kindergarten-seventh grade at Seyisi Primary School. He organized and implemented daily plans to teach the children how to use computers and tutored them as they used applications for writing, reading, mathematics and learning English.



He volunteered with Catholic Charities' Meals on Wheels last fall in nearby St. Joseph and served as an after-school tutor for a sixth-grade student at All Saints Academy in St. Joseph during the 2017-18 academic year. At SJU, Bartch helped raise money for a pair of SJU football's initiatives, St. Jude Children's Research Hospital and Tackle Cancer. He also serves as treasurer for the Johnnies' Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC), which holds an annual Kids Fighting Hunger meal-packing event every March. He volunteered at Newman, the Roman Catholic parish at the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire's Ecumenical Religious Center, in 2017 and 2018 when visiting his grandmother during breaks in the academic year.

In spring 2017, Bartch volunteered at the St. Joseph Community Kitchen and at the All Saints Academy's fish fry. Bartch also volunteers for the Order of Saint Benedict sisters as a cross holder and Eucharistic minister at the Sacred Heart Chapel in St. Joseph. A psychology major, Bartch shadowed licensed psychiatrist Dr. Jon Bowar last fall at the St. Cloud Hospital's Psych Ward and will resume his visits next week into fall semester.

40-YARD DASH TIMES

For the second consecutive season, junior wide receiver **Blake Patrick** (St. Stephen, Minn./Holdingford) clocked SJU's fastest laser-timed, 40-yard dash time, 4.47 seconds, when the team conducted testing Aug. 15. He recorded a time of 4.63 seconds as a sophomore last season. Junior linebacker **Kyle Kornovich** (Rogers, Minn.) followed in second (4.57) and sophomore wide receiver **Matt Mohr** (Chisago City, Minn./Chisago Lakes) was third (4.64). Two other receivers, sophomore **T.J. Hodge** (Miami, Fla./Doral Academy) and freshman **Maguire Petersen** (Hutchinson, Minn.), tied for fourth (4.65).

LEADING RUSHER, NATIONAL THROWER

Senior running back **Kai Barber** had quite the 2018-19 academic year. Last fall, he led SJU with 587 rushing yards on 91 carries (6.5 avg.) and 7 touchdowns. As a member of SJU's track and field team in the spring, Barber qualified for the NCAA Division III Indoor Championships in the shot put and finished 10th out of 20 throwers with a PR mark of 16.29 meters, the third-best distance in SJU indoor history. He then finished ninth in the shot put, 0.13 meters (5.25 inches) from eighth place and All-America honors, two months later at the NCAA Outdoor Championships. The multi-talented Barber played junior hockey for the NA3HL's Peoria Mustangs in 2014-15 before he enrolled at SJU.

STRONG STARTS ON OFFENSE & DEFENSE

The Johnnies scored points on 15 (13 touchdowns and two field goals) of their 26 opening possessions, to start the game or the second half, in 2018. The opposition, meanwhile, scored points on five of the 26: vs. St. Thomas (both opening drives); at Concordia (second half); vs. Thomas More, Ky. (second half); at Mary Hardin-Baylor, Texas (first half). SJU forced a three-and-out in nine of the 26 drives and either forced a punt (not a three-and-out) or caused a turnover on 10 other possessions.

NATIONALLY RANKED DEFENSE

The Johnnies' defense ended the 2018 season ranked in NCAA Division III's top 10 percent in a number of categories: third in takeaways (35), ninth in points allowed (11.1 ppg.), 16th in interceptions (18), 17th in sacks per game (3.54) and 24th in both defensive touchdowns (3) and pass-efficiency defense (100.77 rating).

A LOT OF GAMES, A LOT OF WINS



The Johnnies' NCAA second-round win last fall was also the 380th with **Jerry Haugen** (*left*) as an All-MIAC defensive back in 1975) as an assistant football coach at SJU. Bobby Bowden, a member of the College Football Hall of Fame and long-time head coach at Florida State (1976-2009), has the fourth-most wins in college football history with a 377-129-4 record. All told, Haugen has been a part of 1,490 wins (2,446 games) at SJU as a player and

coach across four different sports, as well as 34 conference championships (including four MIAC Playoff titles in baseball) and 40 postseason appearances.

PASSING WITH EFFICIENCY

SJU once again excelled in the passing game last fall, as it led all 247 NCAA Division III teams in pass-efficiency rating (186.59). Individually, senior quarterback **Jackson Erdmann** became the fourth Johnnie to lead Division III in passing efficiency with a rating of 189.8 (*see below*). His rating was third, behind Alabama's Tua Tagovailoa (199.4) and Oklahoma's Kyler Murray (199.2), across all divisions of college football. Willie Seiler's '94 mark of 224.6 set in 1993 is still the second-best in Division III history (NCAA statistical champions consisted of regular-season stats only until 2002).

NO. 18 AMONG ESPN'S TOP 50 FOOTBALL PROGRAMS

Saint John's was ranked No. 18 out of ESPN's top 50 programs over the last 150 years in August. The ranking formula took into consideration a program's number of national championships and various winning percentages: dominance (best 50 seasons in program history), since integration (1969-2018), early modern (1919-1968) and pre-modern (1869-1918).

ESPN noted: "It is not true that the Johnnies' late head coach, John Gagliardi, coached against Frank Leahy. But it is true that Gagliardi became head coach at Saint John's in 1953, the last season that Leahy coached at Notre Dame, and didn't retire until 2012, after 60 seasons and 465 victories. Saint John's, according to our metrics, had one of the 10 most successful programs of the past 100 years. That's another way of saying Gagliardi won 27 conference titles and four national championships."

Alabama claimed the top spot, followed by Notre Dame, Ohio State, Oklahoma and Southern California. North Dakota State was ranked No. 10 and Minnesota was listed at No. 29. Other NCAA Division III programs included were Mount Union (No. 16), Wittenberg (No. 27), UW-Whitewater (No. 31) and Linfield (No. 35).

LEADING THE COUNTRY IN TOTAL ATTENDANCE

Collegeville was the place to be for NCAA Division III football in 2018, as Saint John's University attracted a division-best 47,297 fans to Clemens Stadium last fall. That cumulative total was greater than 98 Football Championship Subdivision teams and all but one of the 167 Division II programs (Grand Valley State's total of 67,865).

SJU finished second nationally in Division III with an average of 5,912 spectators over eight games, including two in the NCAA playoffs. The Johnnies have now finished in Division III's top two in per-game attendance each of the last 18 seasons. Hampden-Sydney (Va.) hosted four home contests last fall and led Division III with an average of 7,716 fans per game. Two other MIAC schools cracked the top 10, as Bethel finished fourth (4,436 per game) and Concordia claimed ninth (4,007 per game). For the eighth straight season, and 13th time in the last 14 years, the Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (MIAC) attracted more fans to its football games than any other conference in NCAA Division III. A total of 146,077 fans attended the 50 football games hosted by the MIAC's nine football teams, an average of 2,922 spectators per game.

On This Date in Johnnie Football History...

The Johnnies are 8-2 all-time on September 21: 1940 vs. St. Cloud State (W, 14-6); 1945 vs. Bemidji State (L, 0-6); 1963 vs. Hamline (W, 38-14); 1968 at Gustavus Adolphus (L, 0-13); 1974 vs. St. Olaf (W, 51-21); 1985 at Carleton (W, 23-10); 1991 at Carleton (W, 56-7); 1996 vs. Augsburg (W, 28-20); 2002 vs. UW-Whitewater (W, 42-18); and 2013 at St. Thomas (W, 20-18).

1963 vs. Hamline (W, 38-14): The Johnnies won their conference opener by a score of 38-14 over Hamline on this date 56 years ago in Collegeville. Hamline answered a 2-yard touchdown run by junior Rich Froehle '65 in the first quarter with a 94-yard kick return for six. The Johnnies, unfazed, methodically scored twice more in the first quarter, a 3-yard run from senior end Ken Roering '64 and a 32-yard pass from senior quarterback Craig Muyres '64 to senior running back Bob Spinner '64 (*right*). SJU scored twice more in the second quarter to put the game away.



2002 vs. UW-Whitewater (W, 42-18): Saint John's built a 14-10 halftime lead, but quarterback Ryan Keating '03 shattered his forearm on the Johnnies' final play of the first half. No reason to worry, however, as senior tight end Ross Denne '03 took over and threw for 151 yards and two touchdowns as SJU posted a 42-18 win over UW-Whitewater. SJU amassed 480 yards of offense, including 355 yards and four touchdowns through the air. Junior wide receiver Blake Elliott '03 caught 10 passes for 139 yards and two scores, while junior defensive end Jeremy Hood '04 collected four tackles for a loss and two sacks in the contest. Whitewater's Chad Wurth ran for 200 yards, including a 54-yard scamper for a score late in the game, on 33 carries.



2013 at St. Thomas (W, 20-18): SJU upset second-ranked St. Thomas six years ago in St. Paul. The Johnnies forced five turnovers and St. Thomas missed a 32-yard field goal, wide left, on the game's final play. The victory snapped three UST win streaks: 18-game at home, 36-game regular-season and 27-game MIAC regular-season. Sophomore wide receiver Josh Bungum '15, now an assistant coach with the Johnnies, caught 12 passes for 104 yards and senior quarterback Connor Bruns '14 had an efficient day, completing 21 of 30 passes for 182 yards. Sophomore running back Sam Sura '15 (*left*) ran for 88 yards and a touchdown on 25 carries in his first collegiate start. He ended his illustrious career as

SJU's all-time leader in rushing attempts (730) and rushing yards (4,031), and tied the school record for rushing touchdowns (48).

BLAKE ELLIOTT '03 ON HALL OF FAME BALLOT

Former Saint John's University award-winning student-athlete Blake Elliott '03 was named to the College Football Hall of Fame ballot for the seventh consecutive year in June. Elliott, who played wide receiver for the Johnnies from 2000-03, is one of 177 former student-athletes on the ballot, including one of 100 from the NCAA divisional and NAIA ranks. The announcement of the 2020 inductees, including the players and coaches from both the Football Bowl Division and the divisional ranks, will be made in January 2020 in New Orleans. Those selected will be inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame during the 63rd NFF Annual Awards Dinner Dec. 8, 2020, at the New York Hilton Midtown and permanently enshrined at the Chick-fil-A College Football Hall of Fame in

Elliott (right) excelled for the Johnnies for four years and ended his career as the recipient of the Gagliardi Trophy and a national championship in 2003; a season that included Gagliardi's record-breaking 409th career victory. He owns three NCAA playoff records, two MIAC records and 29 SJU receiving

records. Elliott was a three-time All-American, a two-time MIAC Player of the Year, a Gagliardi Trophy finalist as a junior in 2002 and was invited to play in both the AFCA Aztec Bowl and Hula Bowl following the 2003 season. His NCAA all-divisions record for consecutive games played with a reception (47) ended in 2008.

He ended his career second all-time in all NCAA divisions in catches (327) and second in NCAA Division III in touchdown receptions (56). Elliott posted 369 receptions for 4,826 yards and 63 touchdowns in his career, as well as 744 rushing yards and eight touchdowns on 109 carries (prior to the 2002 season, the NCAA did not recognize playoffgame stats in season or career totals). Elliott was just as dangerous on special teams as he was on the offensive side of the ball, totaling 3,065 yards and seven touchdowns on 195 returns, kickoff and punt combined.

To be eligible for the ballot, players must have been named a first-team All-American by a major/national selector as recognized and utilized by the NCAA for their consensus All-America teams; played their last year of intercollegiate football at least 10 years prior; played within the last 50 years and cannot be currently playing professional football. Of the 5.33 million individuals who have played college football since the Princeton-Rutgers game on Nov. 6, 1869, only 1,010 players have earned induction into the College Football Hall of Fame, or less than two one-hundredths (.0002) of one percent of those who have played the game during the past 150 years. From the coaching ranks, 219 individuals have achieved Hall of Fame distinction, including SJU's John Gagliardi (Class of 2006).

SJU Football in the Classroom

-SJU returns five of last year's 10 Academic All-MIAC (minimum 3.5 cumulative GPA) honorees in 2019: **Chris Backes**, **Jarod Fike**, **Collin Franz**, **Alex Sais** and **Andrew VanErp**. The Johnnies have had totaled 91 Academic All-MIAC recipients in Gary Fasching's first six seasons, the most in the MIAC during that span (Concordia is next with 86 honorees since 2013).

-The Johnnies have had 16 football Academic All-Americans in the last 15 seasons, including wide receiver Will Gillach '19 last fall. SJU leads the MIAC in with 30 football Academic All-Americans (as selected by CoSIDA).

-Gillach earned SJU's third consecutive Stein-Fallon Scholar-Athlete Award from the Minnesota chapter of the National Football Foundation in May 2019. Linebackers David Franta '18 (2018) and Carter Hanson '17 (2017) previously won the award, which is given to a senior football student-athlete from a Minnesota program who demonstrates outstanding academic achievement, football leadership and community citizenship.

-Chris Backes earned the MIAC's Elite 22 Award for football in 2018. Modeled after the NCAA Elite 90 Award, the MIAC Elite 22 Award for football is presented to the individual with the highest GPA among the conference's top two teams in the final standings. The honoree must be a sophomore, junior or senior and in at least his second season of competition with his current team. Backes is the 12th SJU student-athlete in all sports to receive the award and the second football player. Hanson won the award twice, in 2014 and 2016.

-For the 14th consecutive year, CSB and SJU were ranked among the top baccalaureate schools nationally for the total number of students who studied abroad. That was one of the findings of Open Doors 2018, the annual report on international education published by the Institute of International Education (IIE) in partnership with the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs last November.

-CSB and SJU are ranked No. 2 among baccalaureate schools with 365 students who studied abroad in mid-length study abroad programs during the 2016-17 academic year, the most recent data measured by the IIE. The IIE defines mid-length study abroad programs as lasting one semester or one or two quarters (CSB and SJU operate under the semester system). CSB and SJU are No. 3 nationally among baccalaureate schools with 555 students who studied abroad during the 2016-17 school year. CSB and SJU have been ranked among the top six schools nationally in this category for the past 14 years. Before graduating, it is estimated that 65.5 percent of all CSB and SJU students will participate in a study abroad program, according to the IIE. CSB and SJU annually offer students 18 semester-long programs, 14 of which are faculty-led. CSB and SJU also conduct 14 short-term study abroad programs.
