SATURDAY'S MATCHUP

Saint John's forced two turnovers, including a 35-yard fumble return for a touchdown by senior defensive lineman Metoriah Faoliu (Wildomar, Calif./Vista Murrieta) early in the game, and held Gustavus Adolphus to 12 yards of offense on 16 plays (6:01 of possession) in the second half for a 41-27 win last Saturday (Oct. 22) in Collegeville. Junior quarterback Aaron Syverson (Minnetonka, Minn.) passed for 272 yards and four touchdowns, including two to senior tight end Alex Larson (Woodbury, Minn./East Ridge) in the third quarter. St. Scholastica led St. Olaf by one, 28-27, after the Saints rallied from a 24-7 third-quarter deficit to take the lead with 3:33 remaining. The Oles, however, covered 70 yards on 12 plays - capped by a one-yard plunge from Jordan Embry with 21.7 seconds remaining - to take the lead. Embry carried the ball a program-record 51 times for 270 yards and three touchdowns in the win for STO.

SJU'S FOURTH CAMPBELL TROPHY FINALIST



Senior defensive lineman **Michael Wozniak** (*left*; New Hope, Minn./Robbinsdale Armstrong) was selected as one of the 15 finalists for the William V. Campbell Trophy on Oct. 26. Each of the 15 finalists will receive an \$18,000 postgraduate scholarship as a member of the National Football Foundation (NFF) National Scholar-Athlete Class. The finalists will travel to Bellagio Resort & Casino in Las Vegas for the 64th NFF Annual Awards Dinner on Dec. 6. At the Dec. 6 event, one member of the class will be declared the winner of the 33rd William V. Campbell Trophy and have his postgraduate scholarship increased to \$25,000.

Nominated by their schools, which are limited to one nominee each, candidates for the awards must be a senior or graduate student in their final year of eligibility, have a GPA of at least 3.2 on a 4.0 scale, have outstanding football ability as a first-team player or significant contributor and have demonstrated strong leadership and citizenship. The class is selected each year by the NFF Awards Committee, which is comprised of a nationally recognized group of media, members of the College Football Hall of Fame and athletics administrators. Since 1995, 21 Johnnies have been nominated for the Campbell Trophy. SJU is the lone program out of the 672 NCAA schools to have nominated a Campbell Trophy scholar-athlete each of the past 20 seasons.

The 15 finalists were selected from the 156 semifinalists from all divisions of play, who were nominated by their schools as the best all-around student-athletes on their respective teams. Wozniak is one of three finalists from the NCAA Division III level, joining Chicago (III.) running back Nicholas D'Ambrose and Johns Hopkins (Md.) offensive lineman J.R. Woods. The other 12 finalists consist of one from NCAA Division II, four from the Football Championship Subdivision (formerly Division I-AA) and seven from the Football Bowl Subdivision.

Wozniak is the fourth Johnnie to be named a Campbell Trophy finalist and first since linebacker **Carter Hanson** '17 in 2016. Linebacker **Matt Hawn** '06 earned the honor in 2005 and wide receiver **Chris Palmer** '96 achieved the distinction in 1995. Hanson and Palmer also earned the Gagliardi Trophy as seniors.

An accounting major with a 3.86 GPA, Wozniak was selected to the 22-man, 2022 Allstate American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Good Works Team Sept. 19 and earned College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) Academic All-America first-team honors last fall. The three-time Academic All-MIAC honoree (minimum 3.5 GPA) was a 2022 *Lindy's* Preseason All-America and a 2021 D3football.com All-America first-team selection. Wozniak has 28 tackles (15 solo), including 10 for a loss and seven sacks, as well as two forced fumbles and four quarterback hurries in seven games this fall. Wozniak has 16.5 tackles for loss and 10.5 sacks over his last nine games going back to last season, and 28 tackles for loss and 17.5 sacks in 27 career games. Wozniak needs four sacks to tie **Phil Trier** '01 for 10th on SJU's all-time list and seven tackles for loss to join the tie between two more 2001 graduates, **Beau LaBore** '01 and **Brian Zirbes** '01 for 10th.

AND ON THE GOOD WORKS TEAM

Senior defensive lineman **Michael Wozniak** was one of 22 student-athletes across all divisions of college football named to the 2022 Allstate American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Good Works Team on Monday (Sept. 19). This year marks the 31st anniversary of the award, which was established in 1992 to recognize a select group of college football players who have made a commitment to service and enriching the lives of others. A fan vote is running until Nov. 22 at www.ESPN.com/Allstate to decide this year's Allstate AFCA Good Works Team Captain. Fans may cast one vote per device each day. Wozniak is one of four honorees from the NCAA Division III level – joining Matthew Feldick of Bethel, Alan Gorny of Johns Hopkins (Md.) and Matt Lilja of Mount Union (Ohio) – and one of six defensive linemen.

Wozniak is the sixth Johnnie to be named to the Allstate AFCA Good Works Team and the fifth in the last six seasons: quarterback **Chris Backes** '21, offensive lineman **Ben Bartch** '20, quarterback **Jackson Erdmann** '19 and wide receiver **Will Gillach** '19. Defensive end **Kevin McNamara** '07 was the first SJU student-athlete to receive the honor in 2006.

Off the field, Wozniak is in his fifth year raising money for a pair of SJU football's initiatives, St. Jude Children's Research Hospital and Tackle Cancer. He was also a member of the Johnnies' Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, which holds an annual Kids Fighting Hunger meal-packing event every March, for two academic years (2020-21 and 2021-22). Wozniak also helped organize a swim meet for local Special Olympians in Spring 2022 in Collegeville. Back home, Wozniak volunteered to coach 2nd- and 3rd-grade youth football for the Armstrong Cooper Youth Football Association.

MIAC DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK



Senior defensive lineman **Metoriah Faoliu** (*left*) earned his second MIAC Football Defensive Player of the Week honor of the season Oct. 24. He gave SJU an early lead with a 35-yard fumble return for a touchdown with 13:21 left in the first quarter of Saturday's win against Gustavus Adolphus and finished with six tackles, including 2.5 for a loss and a sack. The 35-yard fumble return for a touchdown against was the 103rd defensive score in SJU history and the longest since the memorable 99-yard, scoop-and-score by now-assistant coach **Max Jackson** '19 on Oct. 13, 2018, against St. Thomas. The last Johnnie defensive lineman to score a touchdown was **David Burns** '10 – an 89-yard interception return – on Sept. 15.

2007 vs. Augsburg. Like last Saturday, both plays occurred in Clemens Stadium. Faoliu currently leads the MIAC with 11.5 tackles for loss and is second, behind teammate **Michael Wozniak** (seven), with six sacks.

21 POINTS IN THE 1ST HALF

The 21 points scored by Gustavus Adolphus in the first half last Saturday against Saint John's was the most by the Gusties through the game's first two quarters against the Johnnies since Oct. 4, 1980, when the home team jumped out to a 24-7 halftime lead en route to a 24-16 win over SJU in St. Peter. With the win, the Johnnies improved to 53-32-3 (.619) all-time against the Gusties, including a 28-11-1 record in Collegeville (11 consecutive home wins). SJU has won 33 of the last 35 meetings overall.

KICKING INTO SJU'S TOP 10

Sophomore kicker **Conor Murphy** (*right*, Sioux Falls, S.D./O'Gorman) made two field goals (34 and 24 yards), all five of his PAT's and averaged 61.9 yards on eight kickoffs with three touchbacks last weekend against Gustavus. He now has 10 touchbacks on 24 kickoffs over his last three games. Saturday's performance enabled Murphy to crack into SJU's top-10 lists for career PAT's (95, tied for ninth) and career field goals made (9, tied for 10th).



SERIES HISTORY

Saturday's game is the fifth meeting between SJU and St. Scholastica, and the first in Duluth. The Johnnies swept a two-game, home series in 2016 (49-7) and 2017 (98-0), and prevailed with a 35-7 score in the first meeting, a first-round game in the 2014 NCAA Division III playoffs. SJU posted an 81-0 win last fall in the first conference game as MIAC members.

Junior quarterback **Aaron Syverson** (*left*) finished the day 22 of 38 passing for 272 yards and four touchdowns (with one interception) in last Saturday's 41-27 win over Gustavus Adolphus. Syverson now has a 170.11 pass-efficiency rating (84 of 136 passing for 1,197 yards, 16 touchdowns and three interceptions) over his last four games. In all games, Syverson leads the MIAC or is tied for the lead in passing yards (2,113) and passing touchdowns (22), and his 17 passing touchdowns in conference play also lead the league.

He was named to the D3football. com National Team of the Week Oct. 25 for the performance. The stat totals enabled Larson to climb past the tie between **Mike Ramler** '90 and **Brett Saladin** '09 for fifth on SJU's all-time list for tight ends with 76 career receptions, as well as move him above **Tom Ramboldt** '92 for seventh with 1,016 receiving yards. Larson now

has 17 receiving touchdowns, which are two behind SJU's record for tight ends, 19, held by **Nate Kirschner** '01. He currently leads the MIAC with nine receiving touchdowns, which are eighth-most in NCAA Division III this season. Larson is second on the team in both receptions (41) and receiving yards (540).

Senior running back **Henry Trost** (*left*; Lindstrom, Minn./Chisago Lakes) led the Johnnies' ground game with 76 yards on 16 carries, but was held out of the end zone for just the third time this season last Saturday against Gustavus Adolphus. He has six rushing touchdowns this fall, 39 in his career and 44 total touchdowns as a Johnnie (39 rushing, five receiving). He is one touchdown behind **Rick Bell** '83 for fourth-most in SJU history (*see charts below*). Trost's 39 rushing touchdowns are nine behind the tie between **Sam Sura** '16

and Matt Malmberg '95 for the program record.

Trost has scored 41 touchdowns, including 37 rushing, over his last 32 games played and has 1,927 rushing yards on 341 career attempts (5.7 avg.) and 2,529 yards from scrimmage on 381 career touches (6.6 avg.).

FOLLOWING THE LEGEND

A 1981 SJU graduate, Fasching became the 16th head coach in the 102-year history of Saint John's University football following the 2012 season. He succeeded John Gagliardi, who announced his retirement following 60 seasons at SJU, after serving 17 seasons as an assistant football coach and recruiting coordinator at SJU. Fasching was a three-year starter for Gagliardi and the Johnnies at linebacker during the 1978 and 1980-81 seasons. A knee injury held him out of the 1979 season.

AS AN ASSISTANT

The Johnnies posted a 164-39 record (120-22 MIAC) with 10 conference

titles and 12 postseason appearances (22-11 playoff record), including the 2003 national championship, 2000 national runner-up performance and four national semifinal games during his tenure as an assistant coach. He also coached SJU's throwers as an assistant track and field coach from 1996-2011.

AT ST. CLOUD CATHEDRAL

Prior to joining the Johnnies' coaching staff, Fasching served as the head football coach at St. Cloud Cathedral High School from 1986-95, where he led the Crusaders to the State Class B title in 1992 and 1993.

The momentum swung back-and-forth throughout the first half. The Gusties took their only lead of the game when freshman running back Tanner Rennie caught a 4-yard touchdown pass from Sandven to make the score 21-17 with 2:05 to play in the first half.

But SJU responded with an eight-play, 65-yard scoring drive capped by a 13-yard touchdown pass from junior Aaron Syverson to classmate Jimmy Buck (Orono, Minn.) that put the Johnnies on top 24-21 at halftime. Larson helped SJU sustain the momentum in the third quarter, recording touchdown passes of 4 and 6 yards to expand his team's lead to 38-21. The Gusties cut the gap to 38-27 when the Johnnies fumbled a punt, giving Gustavus the ball at the SJU 3 and setting up Rennie for a 3-yard touchdown run.

But those were the only points the Johnnies allowed in the second half. SJU got a 24-yard field goal from sophomore Conor Murphy in the fourth quarter to make the score 41-27. It was his second field goal of the game, having connected from 34 yards in the first half.

Syverson finished 22 of 38 passing for 272 yards and four touchdowns. Larson had six catches for 84 vards and the two scores. Junior running back Tony Underwood (right; Eagan, Minn./Cretin-Derham Hall) caught a career-high seven passes for 69 yards. Senior running back Henry Trost led SJU's ground game with 76 yards on 16 carries.



St. Olaf 33, at St. Scholastica 28 (Oct. 22)

St. Olaf's Jordan Embry carried the ball a program-record 51 times for 270 yards and three touchdowns, including the game-winning score with 21.7 seconds left, to carry the Oles to a 33-28 win last Saturday at St. Scholastica. Despite Embry's monster game, St. Olaf trailed St. Scholastica by one, 28-27, after the Saints rallied from a 24-7 third-quarter deficit to take the lead with 3:33 remaining. After Nick Schlender's go-ahead one-vard touchdown run, the Oles covered 70 yards on 12 plays, capped by the one-yard touchdown. Embry carried the ball 11 times on the 12-play drive and accounted for all 70 yards on the game-winning march.

With time winding down in the first quarter, the Saints struck for the first score of the game on a four-yard pass from Donald West to Ricky Weber with 30 seconds remaining. The Oles responded by outscoring the hosts by a 17-0 margin in the second quarter to take a 17-7 halftime lead, taking advantage of two short fields to score touchdowns.

On St. Scholastica's first possession of the third quarter, the St. Olaf defense forced a punt with a three-and-out before the special teams unit made a play to push the Oles' lead to 24-7. Noah Barrett blocked the ensuing punt and the ball bounced back towards the goal line, where Mark Thrower fell on it for a touchdown with 11:36 to go in the third quarter.

West ran for a two-yard touchdown late in the third quarter and found Wyatt Lahr for a 26-yard touchdown five minutes into the fourth to bring the Saints within a field goal at 24-21. St. Olaf nudged its lead back to 27-21 on a 23-yard field goal by Swan with 5:50 remaining, only for the Saints to cover 58 yards in eight plays to take the lead back on Schlender's score with 3:33 left, setting up the Oles' game-winning drive.

St. Scholastica got into St. Olaf territory in the final seconds, but Deonta Thomas intercepted West's desperation pass at the Oles' 14-yard line as time expired. West finished 17 of 37 passing for 190 yards, two touchdowns and two interceptions. Schlender totaled 70 rushing yards and the touchdown on 17 carries, while Weber caught six passes for 95 yards and a score.

THE LAST MEETING

at Saint John's 81, St. Scholastica (Oct. 30, 2021)

Quarterback Chris Backes '21 made his first collegiate start and threw for 155 yards and four touchdowns before taking a seat early in the second guarter as the Johnnies rolled past St. Scholastica 81-0 last Oct. 30 (2021) in Collegeville Then-No. 5 SJU used a total of six quarterbacks and finished with 643 yards of total offense and a single-game school record 41 first downs, while the defense recorded its fourth shutout of the season, holding the Saints to a total of (-2) yards in the first half.

WINS IN FIRST 8 SEASONS, FIRST 103 GAMES

Gary Fasching is off to the best start, in regard to wins, by any head coach in program history. That history, of course, includes the likes of college football's all-time wins leader, John Gagliardi. Fasching also has John's number in regard to their respective first 103 games coached at SJU.

PRESEASON HONORS

Senior defensive lineman Michael Wozniak and senior tight end Alex Larson were named to the D3football.com Preseason All-America team Aug. 15. Wozniak was named to the first team and Larson earned second-team honors. Both were named to Lindy's preseason All-America first team earlier this summer. Wozniak earned D3football.com All-America first-team honors last season and Larson received fourth-team accolades.

Wozniak started all 12 games and finished with a team-leading 15.5 tackles for loss and 10.5 sacks, including 6.5 tackles for loss and 3.5 sacks in two NCAA playoff games, last fall. He totaled 30 tackles (20 solo), five guarterback hurries, a fumble recovery and a pass breakup.

The 6-foot-7 Larson played 11 of the 12 games and finished second on the team in receptions (33) and receiving touchdowns (8), and third in receiving yards (476) last fall for the Johnnies. The eight receiving touchdowns were the fourth-most by a tight end in SJU history. His biggest touchdown reception was the game-winning, three-yard score from Chris Backes '21 with one second remaining - as the Johnnies erased a 13-point deficit to win the MIAC championship with a 29-28 victory at then-No. 12 Bethel.

FOUR ALL-REGION RETURNEES

Saint John's followed a program-record eight D3football.com All-West Region honorees in 2019 with a new mark of nine - now labeled as Region 9 - in 2021. The Johnnies have had 49 All-Region honorees over the last seven full seasons. In addition to senior tight end Alex Larson and senior defensive lineman Michael Wozniak, senior defensive lineman Metoriah Faoliu and senior running back Henry Trost return out of the nine honorees in 2022.

ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS

Three Saint John's football student athletes - offensive lineman Tyler Johnson '21, running back Henry Trost and defensive lineman Michael Wozniak were named College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) Academic All-Americans last winter. Johnson and Wozniak were named to the first team, while Trost earned second-team honors. The distinction was the second consecutive for Johnson, who was named to the 2020-21 Academic All-America second team in July 2021 (a timeframe due to the COVID-19 pandemic). The Johnnies have had 20 football Academic All-Americans in the last 18 seasons (34 overall). Nominees must be of a sophomore academic standing or better, with a 3.30 GPA or higher. The Academic All-District and All-America teams are voted upon and selected by registered members of CoSIDA.

FIVE JOHNNIES ACADEMIC ALL-DISTRICT

Five Johnnies were named to the College Sports Information Directors of America (Co-SIDA) Academic All-District VI football team last fall. The honor was the third consecutive for running back Henry Trost and the second for both cornerback Tommy Deters '22 and offensive lineman Tyler Johnson '21. A pair of defensive linemen, Collin Franz '21 and Michael Wozniak, earned their first Academic All-District distinction. SJU has had 51 Academic All-District selections in the past 17 seasons.

CISNEROS EARNS MIAC ELITE 22 AWARD



Junior safety Mateo Cisneros (left; Shoreview, Minn./Mounds View) earned the MIAC's Elite 22 Award for football last season. Modeled after the NCAA Elite 90 Award, the MIAC Elite 22 Award for football is presented to the individual with the highest GPA among the student-athletes who played in the MIAC Championship game. The honoree must be a sophomore, junior or senior and in at least his second season of competition with his current team. A biology major (pre-medicine emphasis) with a 3.93 GPA, Cisneros played all 12

games for the Johnnies in 2021, including starts in the last 10. He totaled 24 tackles (15 solo), an interception (Oct. 23 at Gustavus Adolphus) and a fumble recovery (Oct. 9 vs. Augsburg).

ALL-MIAC HONORS

Nineteen Johnnies earned 2021 All-MIAC honors, including 11 on the first team, and SJU swept all three major conference awards last fall. Of the 19 honorees, 10 return to the field in 2022. Wide receiver Ravi Alston '22 was named the Jim Christopherson MIAC Most Valuable Player, defensive lineman Seth Morem '21 shared the MIAC's Mike Stam Award with Gustavus Adolphus' Zach Jakes as the conference's most outstanding lineman, and head coach Gary Fasching was named the MIAC John Gagliardi Coach of the Year for the fourth consecutive season, and fifth time in his nine-year tenure.

Senior linebacker Erik Bjork (Mahtomedi, Minn.), senior defensive lineman Metoriah Faoliu (left), tight end Alex Larson, senior wide receiver Matt Mohr (Chisago City, Minn./ Chisago Lakes), running back Henry Trost and defensive lineman Michael Wozniak were named to the first team. Junior wide receiver Jimmy Buck, senior offensive lineman T.J. Duerr (Buffalo, Minn./St. Michael-Albertville) and senior defensive back Ethan Stark (Sartell, Minn./Sartell-St. Stephen) were named to the All-MIAC second team. Sophomore kicker Conor Murphy (Sioux Falls, S.D./O'Gorman) was All-MIAC honorable mention.

MIAC TITLE NO. 35

The Johnnies' comeback win in the 2021 MIAC Championship game at Bethel clinched the program's MIAC-record 35th conference title and the conference's automatic bid to the NCAA Division III Playoffs.

CONTINUING TO LEAD THE MIAC

The Johnnies' 31-7 victory at Concordia-Moorhead on Nov. 12, 2016, was the program's 450th in MIAC play. SJU ended the 2021 regular season with the MIAC's best winning percentage in conference play, .721 (480-179-22), which is even better when broken down by eras: modern history, since 1946 (.777); during John Gagliardi's tenure, 1953-2012 (.780); and during the 21st century, since 2000 (.847).

IN THE NCAA DIVISION III PLAYOFFS

The 2021 postseason appearance was the Johnnies' 31st (27th at the NCAA Division III level) and seventh consecutive. SJU is second in NCAA Division III history in postseason appearances and third in playoff wins. The Johnnies made four other postseason appearances and have a 48-25 (.658) record overall: three in the NAIA (1963, 1965, 1982) and one showing at the Mineral Water Bowl (1969).

NO STRANGER TO THE POSTSEASON

Trivia question: Which Johnnie has been part of each NCAA postseason appearance, dating back to 1976? The answer is **Jerry Haugen**, who is in his 47th season on the Johnnies' coaching staff. He has coached in 68 NCAA postseason football games, which accounts for nearly seven additional seasons in playoff games alone. The Johnnies have posted a 409-96-5 (.807) overall record and a 309-60-4 (.834) MIAC record with Haugen



as a defensive coach. Since 1978, his defense has finished in the top two of the MIAC in total defense 25 times, including 15 of the past 20 seasons, and in scoring defense 30 times, including 22 of the past 26 seasons. As a player (*left*), Haugen was a four-year starter and gained All-MIAC honors as a defensive back in 1975. He ranks second on the school's career interception list with 15 (first place without postseason games).

A LOT OF GAMES, A LOT OF WINS

The Johnnies' NCAA second-round win in 2018 was also the 380th with **Jerry Haugen** '76 as an assistant football coach at SJU. The late Bobby Bowden, a member of the College Football Hall of Fame and long-time head coach at Florida State (1976-2009), has the fourth-most wins in college football history with a 377-129-4 record. All told, Haugen has been a part of 1,578 wins (2,568 games) at SJU as a player and coach across four different sports, as well as 36 conference championships (including four MIAC Playoff titles in baseball) and 42 national postseason appearances.

BLAKE ELLIOTT '03 ON HALL OF FAME BALLOT

Former Saint John's student-athlete **Blake Elliott** '03 was named to the College Football Hall of Fame ballot for the 10th consecutive year in June 2022. Elliott, who played wide receiver for the Johnnies from 2000-03, is one of 176 former student-athletes on the ballot, including one of 96 from the NCAA divisional and NAIA ranks. The announcement of the 2023 inductees will be made in January and those selected will be inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame during the 65th NFF Annual Awards Dinner Dec. 5, 2023, and enshrined at the Chick-fil-A College Football Hall of Fame in Atlanta.

Elliott (right) excelled for four years and ended his career as the recipient of the Gagliardi Trophy and a national championship in 2003; a season that included **John Gagliardi's** recordbreaking 409th career victory. He owns three NCAA playoff records, two MIAC records and 29 SJU receiving records. Elliott was a three-time All-American, a two-time MIAC Player of the Year, a Gagliardi Trophy finalist as a junior and



nd was invited to play in both the AFCA Aztec Bowl and Hula Bowl following the 2003 season.

He ended his career second all-time in all NCAA divisions in catches (327) and second in NCAA Division III in touchdown receptions (56). Elliott posted 369 receptions for 4,826 yards and 63 touchdowns in his career, as well as 744 rushing yards and eight touchdowns on 109 carries. Elliott was just as dangerous on special teams as he was on offense, totaling 3,065 yards and seven touchdowns on 195 total returns. His NCAA all-divisions record for consecutive games played with a reception (47) ended in 2008.

To be eligible for the ballot, players must have been named a first-team All-American as recognized and utilized by the NCAA for its consensus All-America teams; played their last year of intercollegiate football at least 10 years prior; played within the last 50 years and cannot be currently playing professional football. From the coaching ranks, 226 individuals have achieved Hall of Fame distinction, including Gagliardi (Class of 2006).

SINCE 2018

The Johnnies entered the 2022 season with a 35-4 record since 2018: 2018 (12-1), 2019 (12-2) and 2021 (11-1). All four losses were decided by three points or less. SJU is one of 11 NCAA Division III teams to record 30 wins or more during that span, 10 of which reached the mark without the use of the unpredictable, COVID-19 season of 2020-21 that SJU did not compete in.

Saint John's attracted the second-most spectators in NCAA Division III, both overall (51,945) and per game (6,493), over eight home games in 2021. The cumulative total (51,945) was greater than 107 Football Championship Subdivision teams and all but one of the 167 Division II programs (Grand Valley State's total of 76,334). SJU finished second nationally in Division III with an average of 6,493 spectators over eight games, including two in the NCAA playoffs. The Johnnies have finished in Division III's top two in per-game attendance 19 of the last 20 seasons.

On This Date in Johnnie Football History...

The Johnnies are 7-2-3 all-time on October 29: 1927 vs. Augsburg (L, 6-21); 1932 vs. Concordia (T, 0-0); 1937 at St. Thomas (L, 7-14); 1938 at Concordia (W, 33-6); 1960 at Gustavus Adolphus (T, 6-6); 1966 at Gustavus Adolphus (T, 7-7); 1977 at Gustavus Adolphus (W, 28-18); 1983 vs. Macalester (W, 22-17); 1988 vs. Carleton (W, 38-10); 1994 vs. St. Olaf (W, 49-15); 2005 vs. St. Olaf (W, 63-9); and 2011 vs. Carleton (W, 47-14).

1938 at Concordia (W, 33-6): The Johnnies clinched the 1938 MIAC championship for head coach George Durenberger with a 33-6 road win at Concordia on this date 84 years ago. SJU, which did not attempt a forward pass in the 6-0 shutout of Gustavus Adolphus the week prior, took to the air and passed for 158 yards and two touchdowns. Jim Roche started the game's scoring with a 40-yard touchdown run in the first quarter and caught a 32-yard touchdown pass from Jim Boyd in the second. In the third quarter, Dave Sieben connected with Fritz Schneider for a 26-yard pass to the Cobbers' 20-yard line, and he lateraled it to Boyd for the remaining 20 yards and a touchdown. SJU ended the scoring with a pair of touchdowns in the closing minutes, an 18-yard run from Edward Callanan - SJU's first football All-American that fall - and a 30-yard pass from Sieben to Schneider.

1988 vs. Carleton (W, 38-10): The Johnnies topped Carleton 38-10 in their final home game of the 1988 season. The Knights found the scoreboard first with 51-yard touchdown run by Mike Winston, but SJU's Joe Henry answered with a one-yard plunge to tie the game. Another one-yard score from Henry gave the home team a 14-7 lead at halftime. Steve Thein converted a 25-yard field goal and John Lahti hit Mike Ramler for an 11-yard touchdown strike to give the Johnnies a 24-7 lead at the end of the third quarter. Lahti was 13 of 21 passing for 239 yards on the afternoon. Carleton added a 29-yard field goal in the fourth quarter, but SJU's Henry scored again, this time on a 10-yard pass from receiver Dan Grant. With under one minute to play, Sharm Scheuerman scored on a seven-yard run to end the scoring. The Johnnie defense held Carleton quarterback and conference total offense leader Tim Nielson to 96 total yards, 183 yards below his season per game average.

2005 vs. St. Olaf (W, 63-9): SJU clinched an automatic bid to the NCAA playoffs and at least a tie for the MIAC title with a 63-9 romp over St. Olaf 17 years ago in Collegeville. The Johnnies scored 35 points in the second quarter, while only holding the ball for only 5:20 of the frame. On the second play of the second quarter,

quarterback Alex Kofoed threw a 25-yard touchdown pass to running back Mike Lofboom to give the Johnnies a 7-3 lead. With 8:08 left in the quarter, Kofoed teamed-up with wideout Kyle Gearman for a 17-yard touchdown pass to increase SJU's lead to 14-3. Gearman (#19, right) caught six passes for 150 yards in the win. The Johnnies then tallied two rushing touchdowns in the final 1:26 of the half as Kofoed scored on a one-yard keeper and sophomore running back Craig Luberts found the end zone from six yards out to make the score 35-3 at intermission. SJU made the score 49-3 with 9:49 left in the third when junior tight end Phil Giesen caught an eight-yard touchdown pass from



Kofoed, his fifth touchdown pass of the game. Kofoed ended the day 21 of 33 passing for 375 yards. SJU punted once, totaled 672 yards of offense and scored 63 points despite going 6-for-9 in the red zone.

BEST RECORD SINCE 1990, NCAA DIVISION III

The Johnnies entered the 2022 season with the third-best winning percentage (.827) in NCAA Division III football since 1990 and the third-most wins (303) (among programs with 200 games played or more).

A JOHNNIE WITH THE JAGUARS



Offensive tackle **Ben Bartch** '20 became the 10th Johnnie to be drafted in the NFL when he was selected by the Jacksonville Jaguars with the 10th pick of the fourth round (No. 116 overall) in the 2020 NFL Draft. He appeared in 13 games for the Jaguars, including one start at left guard, and totaled 219 offensive snaps (47 on special teams) in 2020. Bartch followed that with 11 starts and right guard and 704 offensive snaps (43 on special teams) in

2021. Bartch was the lone NCAA Division III attendee at the 2020 Reese's Senior Bowl in Mobile, Ala. Although he did not play in the game, Bartch received rave reviews during the three days of practices leading up to the event. He attended the 2020 NFL Scouting Combine that February, but did not participate in the drills or measurements due to the injury suffered during the final Senior Bowl practice. A D3football.com first-team and Associated Press second-team All-American in 2019, Bartch started all 14 games at left tackle in 2019. He made 27 straight starts at tackle after he switched from tight end during the 2018 preseason. Through a combination of hard work in the weight room and repeated consumption of a now-famous (or infamous) protein shake recipe (ingredients included scrambled eggs, cottage cheese, quick grits, peanut butter, bananas and Gatorade), Bartch gained over 50 pounds and started on the line's left side immediately.

A JOHNNIE IN VIENNA

Quarterback Jackson Erdmann '19 has had quite the post-graduate path in football following his senior season in 2019. He participated in The Spring League during Fall 2020 and followed that by leading the Wild Aces to Fan Controlled Football's championship in the inaugural season. Now, Erdmann led the Vienna Vikings to a 10-2 record and defeated the Hamburg Sea Devils Sept. 25 for the European Football League's cham-



pionship. A 2019 Gagliardi Trophy finalist and the award's recipient in 2018, Erdmann earned his third consecutive All-MIAC first-team honor and led NCAA Division III in passing yards (5,040) - 28 yards shy of the Division III single-season record of 5,068 set by Joe Callahan of Wesley (Del.) in 2015 - as a senior in 2019. He owns MIAC and SJU records for passing touchdowns (139) and passing yards (11,639), as well as the school record for season pass attempts (489), season pass completions (313), career touchdowns responsible for (143), game passing yards (496), touchdown passes in a game (7), touchdown passes in a season (47), season passing yards (5,040), yards of total offense in a game (563), yards of total offense in a season (5,100), yards of total offense in a career (11,976), 300-yard passing games in a season (11) and 300-yard passing games in a career (15).
