SATURDAY'S MATCHUP

Saint John's overcame an early 7-0 deficit with 28 points in the second quarter and held on for a 35-28 Homecoming win over Concordia-Moorhead last Saturday (Oct. 1). Junior quarterback **Aaron Syverson** (Minnetonka, Minn.) set career highs in passing yards (360) and touchdowns (5), while junior wide receiver **Jimmy Buck** (Orono, Minn.) caught five passes for 111 yards, including a 60-yard touchdown. SJU forced CC into a 6-for-20 showing on third down and eight three-and-outs, the most against the Johnnies since Nov. 17, 2018 (10 by Martin Luther in the NCAA Division III Playoffs). Augsburg fell at St. Olaf, 41-36, last Saturday in an offensive battle. The Auggies took over on their own 43-yard line and drove to the Oles' 12 with 1:00 remaining, but turned the ball over on downs. STO out-gained AUG 460-448 and scored points on its first seven possessions.

SYVERSON & WOZNIAK EARN MIAC WEEKLY HONORS



Junior quarterback **Aaron Syverson** (left) and senior defensive lineman **Michael Wozniak** (New Hope, Minn./Robbinsdale Armstrong) were named the MIAC Football Offensive and Defensive Athletes of the Week, respectively, on Monday (Oct. 3) for their performances in last Saturday's Homecoming win over Concordia.

Syverson set career highs in passing yards (360) and passing touchdowns (5), and joined **Jackson Erdmann** '19 and **Kurt Ramler** '97 as the only SJU quarterbacks to throw for 300 passing yards in three consecutive games. The five-touchdown game was also the first by a Johnnie quarterback not named Erdmann since Alex Kofoed '07 in 2007 (Oct. 13 at Gustavus Adolphus). Syverson is currently second in the MIAC in passing yards (1,271).

The weekly honor is the second of the season for Wozniak, who tied for the team lead in tackles with 10 (six solo) and added 2.5 tackles for loss, 2.0 sacks and two quarterback hurries in Saturday's win. The Cobbers lost a collective 14 yards on the 10 tackles Wozniak was a part of. Eight of the 10 plays Wozniak was a part of resulted in no gain or negative yards.

3 STRAIGHT 300-YARD PASSING GAMES

As mentioned above, junior quarterback Aaron Syverson joined **Jackson Erdmann** '19 and **Kurt Ramler** '97 as the only SJU quarterbacks to throw for 300 passing yards in three consecutive games. Erdmann accomplished the feat twice, including a four-game stretch, during the 2019 season (see below).

4 TOUCHDOWN PASSES IN A QUARTER

Junior quarterback **Aaron Syverson** joined **Jackson Erdmann** '19, **Kurt Ramler** '97, **Willie Seiler** '94 and **Pat Mayew** '92 as the only SJU quarterback to pass for four touchdowns in a single quarter. All but one of the six instances - Ramler in 1994 against Macalester at the Metrodome - occurred in Collegeville.

WHOA WOZ

Senior defensive lineman **Michael Wozniak** currently leads the MIAC in tackles for loss (8) and sacks (5.0), and has 14.5 tackles for loss and 8.5 sacks over his last six games going back to the 2021 season. He takes the field Saturday with 26 tackles for loss and 15.5 sacks in 24 career games. Wozniak needs six sacks to tie **Phil Trier** '01 for 10th on SJU's all-time list and nine tackles for loss to join the tie between two more 2001 graduates, **Beau LaBore** '01 and **Brian Zirbes** '01 for 10th.

WINS IN FIRST 8 SEASONS, FIRST 100 GAMES

SJU's Gary Fasching is off to the best start, in regard to wins, by any head coach in the program's history. That history includes the likes of college football's all-time wins leader, John Gagliardi. Fasching also has John's number in regard to their respective first 100 games coached at SJU.

A NOT SO SPOOKY OCTOBER

Saint John's is a perfect 31-0 during the month of October under the direction of head coach **Gary Fasching** '81. The Johnnies are 297-118-15 (.708) all-time in October, including a 193-61-3 record (.757) in 60 seasons under the direction of **John Gagliardi**. Joe Benda compiled a 32-19-6 record (.614) during the month across his three stints as head coach, thanks to a 18-6-6 in his first stretch from 1930-36 despite a 0-3-1 mark his first season.

SERIES HISTORY

Saturday's game is the 83rd meeting between SJU and Augsburg. The Johnnies are 71-9-2 all-time against Augsburg, including a 34-4-2 record in Minneapolis. SJU has out-scored the Auggies 327-30 over the last seven meetings.

UNDER 25 RUSHING YARDS IN A WIN

Saint John's rushed for -8 yards on 32 carries, thanks in large part to five sacks (for -34 yards) and two kneel downs for -11 yards at the end of the game, in last Saturday's Homecoming win over Concordia. The total was SJU's fewest rushing yards in a game, regardless of the result, since it mustered -12 yards on 12 carries in the 34-33 win at Wheaton (Ill.) on Dec. 7, 2019, in the NCAA Division III quarterfinals. The Johnnies have now won seven games since 1994 in which they rushed for less than 25 yards, including twice this season (*see below*).

FOLLOWING THE LEGEND

A 1981 SJU graduate, Fasching became the 16th head coach in the 102-year history of Saint John's University football following the 2012 season. He succeeded John Gagliardi, who announced his retirement following 60 seasons at SJU, after serving 17 seasons as an assistant football coach and recruiting coordinator at SJU. Fasching was a three-year starter for Gagliardi and the Johnnies at linebacker during the 1978 and 1980-81 seasons. A knee injury held him out of the 1979 season.



AS AN ASSISTANT

The Johnnies posted a 164-39 record (120-22 MIAC) with 10 conference titles and 12 postseason appearances (22-11 playoff record), including the 2003 national championship, 2000 national runner-up performance and four national semifinal games during his tenure as an assistant coach. He also coached SJU's throwers as an assistant track and field coach from 1996-2011.

AT ST. CLOUD CATHEDRAL

Prior to joining the Johnnies' coaching staff, Fasching served as the head football coach at St. Cloud Cathedral High School from 1986-95, where he led the Crusaders to the State Class B title in 1992 and 1993.

Junior running back **Troy Feddema** (*left*, St. Cloud, Minn./Tech) provided a spark, a 64-yard kick return, in the first quarter of Saturday's win over Concordia. Although the big return set up a drive that ended on a missed field goal, it was SJU's longest since the first round of the 2016 NCAA Division III Playoffs (Nov. 19, 2016); **Evan Clark's** '17 82-yard return for a touchdown in the 32-31 win over UW-Platteville. The

longest kick return between that date and last Saturday was a 42-yarder by **Maguire Petersen** '22 in 2019 at Carleton.

THREE IN A ROW FOR BUCK

Junior wide receiver **Jimmy Buck** (*right*) caught five passes for 111 yards, including a 60-yard touchdown in the second quarter, in last Saturday's win over Concordia. He became the eighth SJU receiver to record three consecutive 100-yard receiving games and the first since **Evan Clark** '17 in 2016 (*see chart below*). Buck has 21 receptions for 373 yards (17.8 avg.) and two touchdowns over the three-game stretch.

WOZNIAK NAMED TO GOOD WORKS TEAM



Senior defensive lineman **Michael Wozniak** (*left*) was one of 22 student-athletes across all divisions of college football named to the 2022 Allstate American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Good Works Team on Monday (Sept. 19). This year marks the 31st anniversary of the award, which was established in 1992 to recognize a select group of college football players who have made a commitment to service and enriching the lives of others. A fan vote will run from now until Nov. 22 at www.ESPN.com/Allstate to decide this year's Allstate AFCA Good Works Team Captain. Fans may cast one vote per device each day. Wozniak is one of four honorees from the NCAA Division III level – joining Matthew Feldick of Bethel, Alan Gorny of Johns Hopkins (Md.) and Matt Lilja of Mount Union (Ohio) – and one of six defensive linemen.

Wozniak is the sixth Johnnie to be named to the Allstate AFCA Good Works Team and the fifth in the last six seasons: quarterback **Chris Backes** '21, offensive lineman **Ben Barch** '20, quarterback **Jackson Erdmann** '19 and wide receiver **Will Gillach** '19. Defensive end **Kevin McNamara** '07 was the first SJU student-athlete to receive the honor in 2006.

A 2022 *Lindy's* Preseason All-American and a 2021 D3football.com All-America first-team selection, Wozniak started all 12 games and finished with a team-leading 15.5 tackles for loss and 10.5 sacks, including 6.5 tackles for loss and 3.5 sacks in two NCAA playoff games, last fall. He totaled 30 tackles (20 solo), five quarterback hurries, a fumble recovery and a pass breakup. He returned to the field in 2021 after suffering a season-ending hand injury on the first defensive play of the 2019 season – a tackle for loss – at UW-Stout.

Off the field, Wozniak is in his fifth year raising money for a pair of SJU football's initiatives, St. Jude Children's Research Hospital and Tackle Cancer. He was also a member of the Johnnies' Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, which holds an annual Kids Fighting Hunger meal-packing event every March, for two academic years (2020-21 and 2021-22). Wozniak also helped organize a swim meet for local Special Olympians in Spring 2022 in Collegeville. Back home, Wozniak volunteered to coach 2nd- and 3rd-grade youth football for the Armstrong Cooper Youth Football Association.

AND A CAMPBELL TROPHY SEMIFINALIST

Senior defensive lineman **Michael Wozniak** was named one of the 156 semifinalists for the 2022 William V. Campbell Trophy and is a candidate for the 2022 National Football Foundation (NFF) Scholar-Athlete Awards, presented by Fidelity Investments. The NFF and College Football Hall of Fame made the announcement Sept. 28. Wozniak is one of 29 student-athletes from NCAA Division III and the lone nominee from the Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (MIAC) for the Campbell Trophy. Since 1995, 21 Johnnies have been nominated for the Campbell Trophy. SJU is the lone program out of the 672 NCAA schools to have nominated a Campbell Trophy scholar-athlete each of the past 20 seasons.

The award recognizes an individual as the absolute best football scholar-athlete in the nation and up to 14 of the candidates will be named recipients of a prestigious NFF National Scholar-Athlete Award. Nominated by their schools, which are limited to one nominee each, candidates for the awards must be a senior or graduate student in their final year of eligibility, have a GPA of at least 3.2 on a 4.0 scale, have outstanding football ability as a first-team player or significant contributor and demonstrated strong leadership and citizenship.

The class is selected each year by the NFF Awards Committee, which is comprised of a nationally recognized group of media, members of the College Football Hall of Fame and athletics administrators. Launched in 1959, the NFF National Scholar-Athlete program awards \$18,000 scholarships that can be used for the honorees' postgraduate education. SJU has produced three NFF National Scholar-Athlete Award winners: linebackers **Carter Hanson** '17 (2016) and **Matt Hawn** '06 (2005), and wide receiver **Chris Palmer** '96 (1995).

The NFF will announce 12-14 finalists on Oct. 26 and each of them will receive an \$18,000 postgraduate scholarship as a member of the NFF National Scholar-Athlete Class Presented by Fidelity Investments. One of the finalists will be named the winner of the 33rd Campbell Trophy during the 64th NFF Annual Awards Dinner Presented by Las Vegas on Dec. 6 and have his postgraduate scholarship increased to \$25,000.

An accounting major with a 3.86 GPA, Wozniak earned College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) Academic All-America first-team honors last fall and will be a three-time Academic All-MIAC honoree.

LARSON ON THE SJU LISTS

Senior, 6-foot-7 tight end **Alex Larson** (*right*; Woodbury, Minn./East Ridge) is currently in the top 10 in a number of Saint John's receiving categories, among tight ends. The 2021 All-American is tied with **Josh Overman** '11 for sixth in SJU history in receiving touchdowns (see chart below), is eighth in receiving yards (865) and ninth in receptions (64). He leads the Johnnies in receptions with 29 (for 389 yards and three touchdowns) this fall. Larson caught 33 passes for 476 yards and eight scores in 11 games in 2021.

Senior running back **Henry Trost** (*left*; Lindstrom, Minn./Chisago Lakes) is currently second in SJU history with 36 career rushing touchdowns and is sixth with 41 total touchdowns (36 rushing, five receiving).

Trost has scored 38 touchdowns, including 34 rushing, over his last 29 games and has 1,719 rushing yards on 295 career attempts, an average of 5.8 yards per carry, and 2,312 yards from scrimmage on 333 career touches (6.9 avg.).

THE LAST GAME

at No. 6/9 Saint John's 35, Concordia-Moorhead 28 (Oct. 1)

Jimmy Buck and the rest of his teammates on the Saint John's University football team didn't get off to a very good start last Saturday afternoon. The ending wasn't all that great either. But what happened in between was enough to lift SJU past Concordia 35-28 in MIAC action before a Homecoming crowd of 8,277 in Clemens Stadium. SJU put up 195 yards of total offense during a second quarter in which the Johnnies outscored the Cobbers 28-0, overcoming an early 7-0 deficit and taking a lead they would not relinquish despite giving up three unanswered touchdowns down the stretch in the fourth quarter.

The Johnnies managed just 43 yards of offense in the first quarter and fell behind when Cobber quarterback Cooper Mattern - a sophomore transfer from SJU - connected with Jake Evans on a 1-yard touchdown pass. The Johnnies had a chance to score late in the quarter, but a 26-yard field goal attempt hit the left upright.

But fortunes certainly shifted after the quarter break. First, junior quarterback **Aaron Syverson** connected with freshman wide receiver **Dylan Wheeler** (St. Paul, Minn./Mounds View) on a 28-yard touchdown pass to tie the score. Then he found senior tight end **Zach Jungels** (Rochester, Minn./Lourdes) for a 3-yard scoring strike that put his team on top 14-7. That scoring drive was set up when senior safety **Ethan Stark** (Sartell, Minn./Sartell-St. Stephen) picked off a Concordia pass and returned it to the Johnnies' 48.

And the Johnnies weren't done yet. Syverson – who threw for 360 yards and five touchdowns in all - connected with senior wideout **Darian Washington** (St. Cloud, Minn./Tech) on a 47-yard touchdown pass with 3:19 remaining in the first half (*right*), then found Buck for a 60-yard touchdown that put SJU up 28-7 at halftime. Washington finished with career highs in catches (3) and receiving yards (91), and the second-quarter touchdown.



Another touchdown catch by Jungels – this one a 20-yarder – followed in the third quarter. But that was where the SJU highlights ended.

Instead, the Cobbers seized back the momentum, scoring three unanswered touchdowns – two on runs of 5 and 1 yards by Peyton Mortenson, then another on a 5-yard pass from Mattern to Dawson Schaffer with 53 seconds left to cut the gap to just seven.

That final touchdown was set up when junior Mitchell Sullivan picked off a pass at the Johnnies' 35. But the ensuing onside kick attempt went out of bounds and SJU held on for the win.

at St. Olaf 41, Augsburg 36 (Oct. 1)

In a game where the two teams combined for more than 900 yards of total offense, St. Olaf held off a late Augsburg rally to hand the Auggies a 41-36 defeat last Saturday in Northfield. The two teams combined to score on 13 of their 20 possessions in the game, with St. Olaf outgaining Augsburg by a 460-448 margin.

St. Olaf scored on its first seven possessions (five touchdowns and two field goals) to take a 41-29 lead with 14:09 left in the game. Augsburg used a seven-play, 66-yard drive to cut the lead to 41-36 on a two-yard touchdown run from sophomore running back D.J. Monroe with 2:21 left to play. After forcing a three-and-out, Augsburg gained the ball at its own 43-yard line with 1:47 left. The Auggies drove to the St. Olaf 12-yard line, but could not complete a pass on fourth down, ending its drive with 1:00 remaining.

Monroe also scored on a two-yard touchdown run in the second quarter, rushing 14 times for 69 yards to lead the Auggies. Sophomore quarterback Cade Sheehan completed 22 of 38 passes for 321 yards and two touchdowns against one interception. He completed a six-yard touchdown pass to sophomore wide receiver Dominic Smith in the third quarter and a 23-yarder in the third to another sophomore wideout, Braden Tretter. Smith caught six passes for 92 yards and Tretter caught six passes for 63 yards in the game. Freshman Tyrone Wilson caught three passes for 100 yards, including a 58-yarder that helped set up Augsburg's final touchdown of the day.

THE LAST MEETING

at Saint John's 50, Augsburg 0 (Oct. 9, 2021)

Senior running back **Henry Trost** rushed for four, first-half touchdowns as the Johnnies posted a 50-0 shutout of the Auggies before a Homecoming crowd of 9,891 at Clemens Stadium last Oct. 9 (2021). Trost (*right*) scored on touchdown runs of 7, 6, 38 and 1 yard as SJU opened up a 36-0 lead at halftime. He finished the game with 11 carries for 107 yards and a two-point conversion, and his four rushing touchdowns were one shy of tying a single-game school record.



The Johnnie defense, meanwhile, recorded its second-straight shutout and five Augsburg turnovers, including three interceptions. The defense also recorded two sacks and stopped the Auggies on fourth down three times.

Senior wide receiver **Matt Mohr** (Chisago City, Minn./Chisago Lakes) returned from an injury suffered in the season opener and caught seven passes for 110 yards, including a 40-yard touchdown that ended the starting offense's day in the first series of the second half.

A week after SJU's defense held Concordia to 163 yards through the air in Oct. 2's (2021) 49-0 shutout in Moorhead (the Cobbers entered the contest eighth in NCAA Division III in passing offense at 345.0 yards per game), the Johnnies came through once again against a nationally ranked offense. Augsburg quarterback Cade Sheehan, the reigning MIAC Offensive Player of the Week at the time, started the day fifth nationally in both total offense (345.2 ypg.) and passing touchdowns (18). Sheehan finished 13 of 27 passing for 128 yards and two interceptions, and eight yards rushing on 11 attempts.

Sheehan's favorite target, wide receiver Dominic Smith, was second in Division III in receiving touchdowns (9), third in receiving yards per game (136.8) and fourth in receptions per game (8.8). Smith was targeted 10 times and caught five passes for 59 yards.

As a team, the Auggies were ninth in the country on third down at 56.7 percent (34-for-60) but finished 3-for-11 (27.3 percent) against SJU.



Cornerback **Tommy Deters** '22 recorded the first of SJU's three interceptions in the game - the second of his career - with a nifty tip-toe near the sideline on the Auggies' opening possession of the game. Linebacker **Kyle Kornovich** '22 snagged his first career interception on the first play of the second quarter (left) and senior linebacker **Chad Mrachek** (Orono, Minn.) picked off his first pass with an athletic

play with 8:23 remaining. Mrachek batted Caleb Kasa's pass into the air and came up with the ball on the Auggies' 38-yard line.

PRESEASON HONORS

Senior defensive lineman **Michael Wozniak** and senior tight end **Alex Larson** were named to the D3football.com Preseason All-America team Aug. 15. Wozniak was named to the first team and Larson earned second-team honors. Both were named to *Lindy's* preseason All-America first team earlier this summer. Wozniak earned D3football.com All-America first-team honors last season (see *Wozniak's 2021 stats on page 6*) and Larson received fourth-team accolades.

The 6-foot-7 Larson played 11 of the 12 games and finished second on the team in receptions (33) and receiving touchdowns (8), and third in receiving yards (476) last fall for the Johnnies. The eight receiving touchdowns were the fourth-most by a tight end in SJU history. His biggest touchdown reception was the game-winning, three-yard score from Chris Backes '21 with one second remaining - as the Johnnies erased a 13-point deficit to win the MIAC championship with a 29-28 victory at then-No. 12 Bethel.

FOUR ALL-REGION RETURNEES

Saint John's followed a program-record eight D3football.com All-West Region honorees in 2019 with a new mark of nine - now labeled as Region 9 - in 2021. The Johnnies have had 49 All-Region honorees over the last seven full seasons. In addition to senior tight end **Alex Larson** and senior defensive lineman **Michael Wozniak**, senior defensive lineman **Metorah Faoliu** (right) and senior running back **Henry Trost** return out of the nine honorees in 2022.



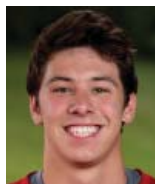
ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS

Three Saint John's football student athletes - offensive lineman **Tyler Johnson** '21, running back **Henry Trost** and defensive lineman **Michael Wozniak** were named College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) Academic All-Americans last winter. Johnson and Wozniak were named to the first team, while Trost earned second-team honors. The distinction was the second consecutive for Johnson, who was named to the 2020-21 Academic All-America second team in July 2021 (a timeframe due to the COVID-19 pandemic). The Johnnies have had 20 football Academic All-Americans in the last 18 seasons (34 overall). Nominees must be of a sophomore academic standing or better, with a 3.30 GPA or higher. The Academic All-District and All-America teams are voted upon and selected by registered members of CoSIDA.

FIVE JOHNNIES ACADEMIC ALL-DISTRICT

Five Johnnies were named to the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) Academic All-District VI football team last fall. The honor was the third consecutive for running back **Henry Trost** and the second for both cornerback **Tommy Deters** '22 and offensive lineman **Tyler Johnson** '21. A pair of defensive linemen, **Collin Franz** '21 and **Michael Wozniak**, earned their first Academic All-District distinction. SJU has had 51 Academic All-District selections in the past 17 seasons.

CISNEROS EARNS MIAC ELITE 22 AWARD



Junior safety **Mateo Cisneros** (left; Shoreview, Minn./Mounds View) earned the MIAC's Elite 22 Award for football last season. Modeled after the NCAA Elite 90 Award, the MIAC Elite 22 Award for football is presented to the individual with the highest GPA among the student-athletes who played in the MIAC Championship game. The honoree must be a sophomore, junior or senior and in at least his second season of competition with his current team. A biology major (pre-medicine emphasis) with a 3.93 GPA, Cisneros played all 12

games for the Johnnies in 2021, including starts in the last 10. He totaled 24 tackles (15 solo), an interception (Oct. 23 at Gustavus Adolphus) and a fumble recovery (Oct. 9 vs. Augsburg).

ALL-MIAC HONORS

Nineteen Johnnies earned 2021 All-MIAC honors, including 11 on the first team, and SJU swept all three major conference awards last fall. Of the 19 honorees, 10 return to the field in 2022. Wide receiver **Ravi Alston** '22 was named the Jim Christopherson MIAC Most Valuable Player, defensive lineman **Seth Morem** '21 shared the MIAC's Mike Stam Award with Gustavus Adolphus' Zach Jakes as the conference's most outstanding lineman, and head coach **Gary Fasching** was named the MIAC John Gagliardi Coach of the Year for the fourth consecutive season, and fifth time in his nine-year tenure.

Senior linebacker **Erik Bjork** (right; Mahtomedi, Minn.), senior defensive lineman **Metorah Faoliu** (Wildomar, Calif./Vista Murrieta), tight end **Alex Larson**, senior wide receiver **Matt Mohr** (Chisago City, Minn./Chisago Lakes), running back **Henry Trost** and defensive lineman **Michael Wozniak** were named to the first team. Junior wide receiver **Jimmy Buck**, senior offensive lineman **T.J. Duerr** (Buffalo, Minn./St. Michael-Albertville) and senior defensive back **Ethan Stark** (Sartell, Minn./Sartell-St. Stephen) were named to the All-MIAC second team. Sophomore kicker **Conor Murphy** (Sioux Falls, S.D./O'Gorman) was All-MIAC honorable mention.

IN THE NCAA DIVISION III PLAYOFFS

The 2021 postseason appearance was the Johnnies' 31st (27th at the NCAA Division III level) and seventh consecutive. SJU is second in NCAA Division III history in postseason appearances and third in playoff wins. The Johnnies are 10-2 all-time on October 8: 1927 at Macalester (L, 0-32); 1937 at Moorhead State (W, 19-6); 1938 at St. Olaf (W, 19-14); 1955 vs. Hamline (W, 33-21); 1960 vs. St. Thomas (W, 34-14); 1966 vs. St. Thomas (W, 21-0); 1983 at Gustavus Adolphus (W, 23-16); 1988 vs. Bethel (W, 42-7); 1994 at St. Thomas (W, 35-34); 2005 at Bethel (W, 30-9); 2011 vs. Bethel (L, 20-41); and 2016 at Augsburg (W, 49-0).

1955 vs. Hamline (W, 33-21): Halfback Jim Lehman ran for four touchdowns and made two extra-point conversions for a total of 26 points for the Johnnies in the win. Al Jirele scored the final touchdown for SJU with a 52-yard run. An obscene stat line at the time, Hamline quarterback Jerry Foley ended the afternoon 33 of 62 passing for 283 yards, including 18 completions to Dick Donlin.

1994 at St. Thomas (W, 35-34): SJU fought back from a 15-point deficit in the first half to defeat the Tommies 35-34 in St. Paul. After the Johnnies thwarted UST on a first-and-goal situation from the five, SJU's Brian Deters blocked an 18-yard field goal attempt with 3:07 remaining to preserve the win. Jeremy Loretz caught eight passes for 167 yards and two touchdowns, one of which was a 13-yarder from fullback Matt Malmberg.

2016 at Augsburg (W, 49-0): Then-No. 11 SJU scored touchdowns in all three facets of the game in a 49-0 shutout of Augsburg on this date six years ago in Minneapolis. The Johnnies scored five offensive touchdowns (one passing and four rushing), blocked a punt for a score and returned an interception for another in the victory. SJU scored 21 points in the first 9:45 of the game, out-gained the Auggies by a 436-128 margin and recorded a season-high six quarterback sacks. Quarterback Ben Alvord connected with wide receiver Evan Clark (right) for a 54-yard touchdown pass on the Johnnies' first offensive play of the game. Running back Dusty Krueger found the end zone twice, one after recovering his own blocked punt in the end zone and another on a three-yard run, to give SJU a 21-0 first-quarter lead. Clark scored on a 16-yard jet sweep on the Johnnies' opening drive of the second half and ended the day with three catches for 109 yards. Running backs Adam Essler and Derek McLaughlin sandwiched linebacker Parker Anderson's one-yard interception return for a touchdown with a rushing score each to end SJU's scoring. Alvord ended the afternoon 12 of 15 passing for 190 yards and the touchdown. Defensive lineman Nathan Brinker posted six tackles (five solo), including four for a loss, three sacks and a forced fumble.

CONTINUING TO LEAD THE MIAC

The Johnnies' 31-7 victory at Concordia-Moorhead on Nov. 12, 2016, was the program's 450th in MIAC play. SJU ended the 2021 regular season with the MIAC's best winning percentage in conference play, .721 (480-179-22), which is even better when broken down by eras: modern history, since 1946 (.777); during John Gagliardi's tenure, 1953-2012 (.780); and during the 21st century, since 2000 (.847).

NO STRANGER TO THE POSTSEASON

Trivia question: Which Johnnie has been part of each NCAA postseason appearance, dating back to 1976? The answer is **Jerry Haugen**, who is in his 47th season on the Johnnies' coaching staff. He has coached in 68 NCAA postseason football games, which accounts for nearly seven additional seasons in playoff games alone. The Johnnies have posted a 406-96-5 (.806) overall record and a 306-60-4 (.832) MIAC record with Haugen



as a defensive coach. Since 1978, his defense has finished in the top two of the MIAC in total defense 25 times, including 15 of the past 20 seasons, and in scoring defense 30 times, including 22 of the past 26 seasons. As a player (*left*), Haugen was a four-year starter and gained All-MIAC honors as a defensive back in 1975. He ranks second on the school's career interception list with 15 (first place without postseason games).

A LOT OF GAMES, A LOT OF WINS

The Johnnies' NCAA second-round win in 2018 was also the 380th with **Jerry Haugen** '76 as an assistant football coach at SJU. The late Bobby Bowden, a member of the College Football Hall of Fame and long-time head coach at Florida State (1976-2009), has the fourth-most wins in college football history with a 377-129-4 record. All told, Haugen has been a part of 1,575 wins (2,565 games) at SJU as a player and coach across four different sports, as well as 36 conference championships (including four MIAC Playoff titles in baseball) and 42 national postseason appearances.

BLAKE ELLIOTT '03 ON HALL OF FAME BALLOT

Former Saint John's award-winning student-athlete Blake Elliott '03 was named to the College Football Hall of Fame ballot for the 10th consecutive year in June. Elliott, who played wide receiver for the Johnnies from 2000-03, is one of 176 former student-athletes on the ballot, including one of 96 from the NCAA divisional and NAIA ranks. The announcement of the 2023 inductees will be made in January. Those selected will be inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame during the 65th NFF Annual Awards Dinner Dec. 5, 2023, and permanently enshrined at the Chick-fil-A College Football Hall of Fame in Atlanta.



Elliott (*right*) excelled at SJU for four years and ended his career as the recipient of the Gagliardi Trophy and a national championship in 2003; a season that included Gagliardi's record-breaking 409th career victory. He owns three NCAA playoff records, two MIAC records and 29 SJU receiving records. Elliott was a three-time All-American, a two-time MIAC Player of the Year, a Gagliardi Trophy finalist as a junior in 2002 and was invited to play in both the AFCA Aztec Bowl and Hula Bowl following the 2003 season. His NCAA all-divisions record for consecutive games played with a reception (47) ended in 2008.

He ended his career second all-time in all NCAA divisions in catches (327) and second in NCAA Division III in touchdown receptions (56). Elliott posted 369 receptions for 4,826 yards and 63 touchdowns in his career, as well as 744 rushing yards and eight touchdowns on 109 carries. Elliott was just as dangerous on special teams as he was on offense, totaling 3,065 yards and seven touchdowns on 195 total returns.

To be eligible for the ballot, players must have been named a first-team All-American by a major/national selector as recognized and utilized by the NCAA for its consensus All-America teams; played their last year of intercollegiate football at least 10 years prior; played within the last 50 years and cannot be currently playing professional football. From the coaching ranks, 226 individuals have achieved Hall of Fame distinction, including SJU's John Gagliardi (Class of 2006).

LEADING IN ATTENDANCE

Saint John's attracted the second-most spectators in NCAA Division III, both overall (51,945) and per game (6,493), over eight home games in 2021. The cumulative total (51,945) was greater than 107 Football Championship Subdivision teams and all but one of the 167 Division II programs (Grand Valley State's total of 76,334). SJU finished second nationally in Division III with an average of 6,493 spectators over eight games, including two in the NCAA playoffs. The Johnnies have finished in Division III's top two in per-game attendance 19 of the last 20 seasons.

AMONG ESPN'S TOP 50 FOOTBALL PROGRAMS

Saint John's was ranked No. 18 out of ESPN's top 50 programs over the last 150 years in August 2019. The ranking formula took into consideration a program's number of national championships and various winning percentages: dominance (best 50 seasons in program history), since integration (1969-2018), early modern (1919-1968) and pre-modern (1869-1918). ESPN noted: "It is not true that the Johnnies' late head coach, John Gagliardi, coached against Frank Leahy. But it is true that Gagliardi became head coach at Saint John's in 1953, the last season that Leahy coached at Notre Dame, and didn't retire until 2012, after 60 seasons and 465 victories. Saint John's, according to our metrics, had one of the 10 most successful programs of the past 100 years. That's another way of saying Gagliardi won 27 conference titles and four national championships."

A JOHNNIE WITH THE JAGUARS



Offensive tackle **Ben Bartch '20** became the 10th Johnnie to be drafted in the NFL when he was selected by the Jacksonville Jaguars with the 10th pick of the fourth round (No. 116 overall) in the 2020 NFL Draft. He appeared in 13 games for the Jaguars, including one start at left guard, and totaled 219 offensive snaps (47 on special teams) in 2020. Bartch followed that with 11 starts and right guard and 704 offensive snaps (43 on special teams) in

2021. Bartch was the lone NCAA Division III attendee at the 2020 Reese's Senior Bowl in Mobile, Ala. Although he did not play in the game, Bartch received rave reviews during the three days of practices leading up to the event. He attended the 2020 NFL Scouting Combine that February, but did not participate in the drills or measurements due to the injury suffered during the final Senior Bowl practice.

A D3football.com first-team and Associated Press second-team All-American in 2019, Bartch started all 14 games at left tackle in 2019. He made 27 straight starts at tackle after he switched from tight end during the 2018 preseason. Through a combination of hard work in the weight room and repeated consumption of a now-famous (or infamous) protein shake recipe (ingredients included scrambled eggs, cottage cheese, quick grits, peanut butter, bananas and Gatorade), Bartch gained over 50 pounds and started on the line's left side immediately.

A JOHNNIE IN VIENNA

Quarterback Jackson Erdmann '19 has had quite the post-graduate path in football following his senior season in 2019. He participated in The Spring League during Fall 2020 and followed that by leading the Wild Aces to Fan Controlled Football's championship in the inaugural season. Now, Erdmann led the Vienna Vikings to a 10-2 record and defeated the Hamburg Sea Devils Sept. 25 for the European Football League's championship.



A 2019 Gagliardi Trophy finalist and the award's recipient in 2018, Erdmann earned his third consecutive All-MIAC first-team honor and led NCAA Division III in passing yards (5,040) - 28 yards shy of the Division III single-season record of 5,068 - as a senior in 2019. He owns MIAC and SJU records for passing touchdowns (139) and passing yards (11,639), as well as 12 other school passing records.

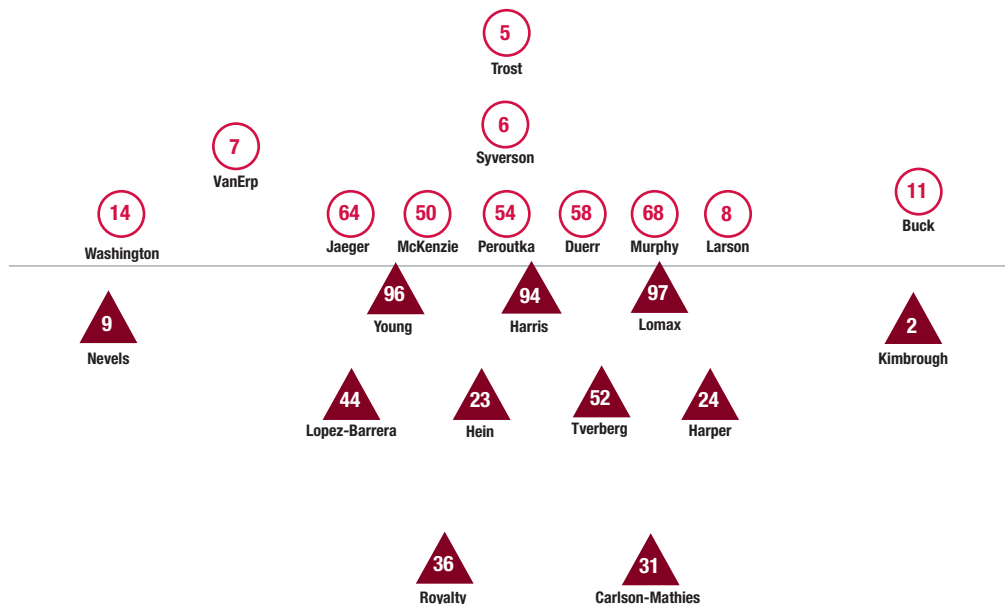
