SATURDAY'S MATCHUP

Saint John's won its MIAC-record 36th conference championship and earned the league's automatic bid to the 2022 NCAA Division III playoffs with a 28-10 win over Bethel last Saturday (Nov. 12) in Collegeville. The Johnnies' defense recorded five interceptions and held the Royals to 49 yards rushing in the victory. Senior cornerback **Cayden Saxon** (Minnetonka, Minn./Hopkins) and sophomore linebacker **Cooper Yaggie** (Breckenridge, Minn.) intercepted two passes each. Offensively, junior quarterback Aaron Syverson (Minnetonka, Minn.) finished 30 of 43 passing, the sixth-most completions by a Johnnie in a game, for 323 yards and two touchdowns. Northwestern, meanwhile, clinched the UMAC championship outright with a 31-9 win over Martin Luther last Saturday at home. The Eagles outgained the Knights 525-167, including a 284-53 margin on the ground, and held the ball for 37:38 of the game. UNW is making its second appearance in the Division III playoffs and first since 2016.

SJU'S FOURTH CAMPBELL TROPHY FINALIST



Senior defensive lineman **Michael Wozniak** (left, New Hope, Minn./Robbinsdale Armstrong) was selected as one of the 15 finalists for the William V. Campbell Trophy on Oct. 26. Each of the 15 finalists will receive an \$18,000 postgraduate scholarship as a member of the National Football Foundation (NFF) National Scholar-Athlete Class. The finalists will travel to Bellagio Resort & Casino in Las Vegas for the 64th NFF Annual Awards Dinner on Dec. 6. At the Dec. 6 event, one member of the class will be declared the winner of the 33rd William V. Campbell Trophy and have his postgraduate scholarship increased to \$25,000.

Nominated by their schools, which are limited to one nominee each, candidates for the awards must be a senior or graduate student in their final year of eligibility, have a GPA of at least 3.2 on a 4.0 scale, have outstanding football ability as a first-team player or significant contributor and have demonstrated strong leadership and citizenship. The class is selected each year by the NFF Awards Committee, which is comprised of a nationally recognized group of media, members of the College Football Hall of Fame and athletics administrators. Since 1995, 21 Johnnies have been nominated for the Campbell Trophy. SJU is the lone program out of the 672 NCAA schools to have nominated a Campbell Trophy scholar-athlete each of the past 20 seasons.

The 15 finalists were selected from the 156 semifinalists from all divisions of play, who were nominated by their schools as the best all-around student-athletes on their respective teams. Wozniak is one of three finalists from the NCAA Division III level, joining Chicago (Ill.) running back Nicholas D'Ambrose and Johns Hopkins (Md.) offensive lineman J.R. Woods. The other 12 finalists consist of one from NCAA Division II, four from the Football Championship Subdivision (formerly Division I-AA) and seven from the Football Bowl Subdivision.

Wozniak is the fourth Johnnie to be named a Campbell Trophy finalist and first since linebacker **Carter Hanson** '17 in 2016. Linebacker **Matt Hawn** '06 earned the honor in 2005 and wide receiver **Chris Palmer** '96 achieved the distinction in 1995. Hanson and Palmer also earned the Gagliardi Trophy as seniors.

An accounting major with a 3.86 GPA, Wozniak was selected to the 22-man, 2022 Allstate American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Good Works Team Sept. 19 and earned College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) Academic All-America first-team honors last fall. The three-time Academic All-MIAC honoree (minimum 3.5 GPA) was a 2022 *Lindy's* Preseason All-America and a 2021 D3football.com All-America first-team selection. Wozniak has 40 tackles (18 solo), including 13.0 for a loss and nine sacks, as well as two forced fumbles, six quarterback hurries and a blocked kick in 10 games this fall. Wozniak has 19.5 tackles for loss and 12.5 sacks over his last 12 games going back to last season, and 31 tackles for loss and 19.5 sacks in 30 career games. Wozniak needs two sacks to tie **Phil Trier** '01 for 10th on SJU's all-time list and four tackles for loss to join the tie between two more 2001 graduates, **Beau LaBore** '01 and **Brian Zirbes** '01 for 10th.

AND ON THE GOOD WORKS TEAM

Senior defensive lineman **Michael Wozniak** was one of 22 student-athletes across all divisions of college football named to the 2022 Allstate American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Good Works Team on Monday (Sept. 19). This year marks the 31st anniversary of the award, which was established in 1992 to recognize a select group of college football players who have made a commitment to service and enriching the lives of others. A fan vote is running until Nov. 22 at www.ESPN.com/Allstate to decide this year's Allstate AFCA Good Works Team Captain. Fans may cast one vote per device each day. Wozniak is one of four honorees from the NCAA Division III level – joining Matthew Feldick of Bethel, Alan Gorny of Johns Hopkins (Md.) and Matt Lilja of Mount Union (Ohio) – and one of six defensive linemen.



Wozniak is the sixth Johnnie to be named to the Allstate AFCA Good Works Team and the fifth in the last six seasons: quarterback **Chris Backes** '21, offensive lineman **Ben Barch** '20, quarterback **Jackson Erdmann** '19 and wide receiver **Will Gillach** '19. Defensive end **Kevin McNamara** '07 was the first SJU student-athlete to receive the honor in 2006.

Off the field, Wozniak is in his fifth year raising money for a pair of SJU football's initiatives, St. Jude Children's Research Hospital and Tackle Cancer. He was also a member of the Johnnies' Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, which holds an annual Kids Fighting Hunger meal-packing event every March, for two academic years (2020-21 and 2021-22). Wozniak also helped organize a swim meet for local Special Olympians in Spring 2022 in Collegeville. Back home, Wozniak volunteered to coach 2nd- and 3rd-grade youth football for the Armstrong Cooper Youth Football Association.

BIG DAY FOR YAGGIE



Sophomore linebacker **Cooper Yaggie** (left) had quite the stat line in last Saturday's win over Bethel for the MIAC title. He intercepted two passes, including one that he returned 61 yards for a touchdown. Not only that, but he led SJU with 11 tackles (six solo), including two for a loss and one sack, while adding a pass breakup and a quarterback hurry. Yaggie was named the MIAC Football Defensive Player of the Week on Monday (Nov. 14) and to the D3football.com National Team of the Week on Tuesday (Nov. 15) for the performance. He is the fourth Johnnie to make the national team this season and the second consecutive: senior cornerback **John Kohler** (Birchwood, Wis./Rice Lake) on Nov. 8, senior tight end **Alex Larson** (Woodbury, Minn./East Ridge) on Oct. 25 and senior defensive lineman **Metorah Faoliu** (Wildomar, Calif./Vista Murrieta) on Sept. 13.

SERIES HISTORY

Saturday's game is the sixth meeting between Saint John's and Northwestern. The Johnnies are 5-0 all-time against the Eagles, including a 4-0 record in Collegeville. SJU has outscored UNW by a 247-24 margin in the five games.

FIRST-ROUND SUCCESS

Saint John's takes the field Saturday with a 48-25 (.658) record in postseason games, including a 43-25 record in the NCAA Division III Playoffs. The Johnnies are 20-4 in the first round with a 2-0 mark against then-members of the Upper Midwest Athletic Conference (UMAC): Nov. 22, 2014 vs. St. Scholastica (W, 35-7) and Nov. 17, 2018 vs. Martin Luther (W, 84-6).

ALL ABOUT NORTHWESTERN

Northwestern was established in 1902 as Northwestern Bible and Missionary Training School by William Bell Riley, a pastor at First Baptist Church of Minneapolis. In 1951, the school began offering baccalaureate programs and became the University of Northwestern, from Northwestern College, on July 1, 2013. Noted evangelist Billy Graham served as the school's second president from 1948-52. The school bought its current campus, the former Roman Catholic Nazareth Hall Preparatory Seminary, from the Archdiocese of St. Paul and Minneapolis in 1971 for \$1.1 million.

SCOUTING THE EAGLES

Northwestern bounced back from an 0-4 start to the season with a perfect 6-0 record in the Upper Midwest Athletic Conference (UMAC) this fall. Two of the Eagles' losses were to similar opponents as SJU: Sept. 3 vs. Augsburg (L, 15-23) and Sept. 17 at UW-River Falls (L, 27-63). Freshman quarterback Caden Cantrell has a .623 completion percentage (144-for-231) with 1,778 passing yards and 16 touchdowns (to eight interceptions) this fall. Junior Jeremiah Staten (155-622, six touchdowns) and freshman Sivert Klefsaas (82-486, three touchdowns) have combined for 1,108 rushing yards. Senior tight end Damon Clapper leads the air attack with 65 catches for 769 yards and nine touchdowns, while sophomore wideout Beau Burk has 53 receptions for 732 yards and five scores.

Head coach Matt Moore is in his sixth season as head coach and served as defensive coordinator for over a decade before taking over for Kirk Talley. Moore has also coached collegiately at Greenville (Ill.), East Texas Baptist and Bethel. He graduated from Northwestern in 1999 and was an all-conference defensive lineman during his playing days from 1995-98.

HAPPY AT HOME

Saint John's has a 357-99-13 all-time record (.775) at Saint John's Field/Clemens Stadium (est. 1997), including a 25-6 record (.806) in the NCAA Division III Playoffs. In its last 206 games dating back to 1987, SJU has a record of 179-27 (.869) in Collegeville. The Johnnies have won 16 of their last 18 NCAA Playoff games at home, out-scoring their opponents 716-330.

IN THE NCAA DIVISION III PLAYOFFS

The 2022 postseason appearance is the Johnnies' 32nd (28th at the NCAA Division III level) and eighth consecutive. SJU is second in NCAA Division III history in postseason appearances and third in playoff wins (*see charts on right*). The Johnnies made four other postseason appearances and have a 48-26 (.649) record overall: three in the NAIA (1963, 1965, 1982) and one showing at the Mineral Water Bowl (1969).

FOLLOWING THE LEGEND

A 1981 SJU graduate, Fasching became the 16th head coach in the 102-year history of Saint John's University football following the 2012 season. He succeeded John Gagliardi, who announced his retirement following 60 seasons at SJU, after serving 17 seasons as an assistant football coach and recruiting coordinator at SJU. Fasching was a three-year starter for Gagliardi and the Johnnies at linebacker during the 1978 and 1980-81 seasons. A knee injury held him out of the 1979 season.



AS AN ASSISTANT

The Johnnies posted a 164-39 record (120-22 MIAC) with 10 conference titles and 12 postseason appearances (22-11 playoff record), including the 2003 national championship, 2000 national runner-up performance and four national semifinal games during his tenure as an assistant coach. He also coached SJU's throwers as an assistant track and field coach from 1996-2011.

AT ST. CLOUD CATHEDRAL

Prior to joining the Johnnies' coaching staff, Fasching served as the head football coach at St. Cloud Cathedral High School from 1986-95, where he led the Crusaders to the State Class B title in 1992 and 1993.

CONTINUING TO LEAD THE MIAC

The Johnnies' 31-7 victory at Concordia-Moorhead on Nov. 12, 2016, was the program's 450th in MIAC play. SJU ended the 2022 regular season with the MIAC's best winning percentage in conference play, .723 (487-180-22), which is even better when broken down by eras: modern history, since 1946 (.779); during John Gagliardi's tenure, 1953-2012 (.780); and during the 21st century, since 2000 (.848).

FINAL REGIONAL RANKINGS

Saint John's ended the season as the top-ranked team in the final NCAA Region 6 rankings. The Johnnies entered last Saturday's MIAC Championship game third, behind Linfield (No. 1) and Bethel (No. 2), but vaulted to No. 1 following the win. SJU (.637) had the second-toughest schedule in NCAA Division III this fall, behind Hope (Mich.) at .670. Hope defeated Northwestern 56-7 on Sept. 24 in Roseville.

NO. 1 SEED

Saint John's earned one of the four No. 1 seeds in the 2022 NCAA Division III Playoffs for the second-consecutive season. The No. 1 seed is SJU's fifth, and 14th in the top two, in the 25 NCAA appearances since 1985: 1991 (lost in the semifinals at Dayton, Ohio); 2003 (won the national championship); 2009 (lost to Coe, Iowa in the first round); and 2021 (lost to Linfield, Ore. in the second round). Turnovers spelled defeat for SJU in the previous three losses as the No. 1 seed. The Johnnies committed 10 turnovers in a 19-7 loss to the Flyers (which went Division I in 1993) in 1991 and six miscues, two of which occurred in the red zone and were returned for touchdowns, in the 34-27 loss to the Kohawks in 2009. SJU committed three turnovers, which Linfield turned into 17 points, in a 31-28 loss last Nov. 27 (2021).

SYVERSON UP TO 8TH



Junior quarterback **Aaron Syverson** (*left*) finished 30 of 43 passing, the sixth-most completions by a Johnnie in a game, for 323 yards and two touchdowns in Saturday's win over Bethel. The 300-yard passing game was the fifth of the season for Syverson, who has a 169.43 pass-efficiency rating (146 of 223 passing for 1,936 yards, 24 touchdowns and five interceptions) over his last seven games. In all games, Syverson ended the regular season second in the MIAC in passing yards (2,854) and passing touchdowns (30). Both totals (2,256 yards and 25 touchdowns) were also second in the MIAC in conference play.

Senior running back **Henry Trost** (*left*, Lindstrom, Minn./Chisago Lakes) took his only rushing attempt in for a 13-yard touchdown last weekend against Bethel. He has eight rushing touchdowns this fall, 41 in his career and 46 total touchdowns as a Johnnie (41 rushing, five receiving).

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Last Saturday's rushing touchdown broke the tie between Trost and **Rick Bell** '83 for fourth-most in SJU history. Trost's 41 rushing touchdowns are seven behind the tie between **Sam Sura** '16 and **Matt Malmberg** '95 for the program record (see charts below). Trost has scored 43 touchdowns, including 39 rushing, over his last 34 games played and has 2,018 rushing yards on 354 career attempts (5.7 avg.) and 2,620 yards from scrimmage on 394 career touches (6.6 avg.).

MIAC LEADERS

The Johnnies led the MIAC in four statistical categories in league play this fall, two each on offense and defense: total offense (452.0 ppg., fourth consecutive year); scoring offense (40.4 ppg., second season in a row); total defense (298.5 ppg., third straight season); and scoring defense (15.6 ppg., third consecutive season).

Individually, senior tight end **Alex Larson** led the MIAC in receiving touchdowns (10); sophomore **Conor Murphy** in points scored (59) among kickers; junior **Spencer Ell** (Morristown, Minn./Bethlehem Academy) in punting, both in average (38.9) and punts inside the 20-yard line (12); senior defensive lineman **Michael Wozniak** in quarterback sacks (6); senior cornerback **Cayden Saxon** in interceptions (5) and passes defended (10); and sophomore linebacker **Cooper Yaggie** tied in fumble recoveries (2).

THE LAST GAME

at No. 5/6 Saint John's 28, No. 9/12 Bethel 10 (Nov. 12)

Saint John's won its MIAC-record 36th conference championship, and fourth consecutive, to earn the league's automatic bid to the 2022 NCAA Division III playoffs with a 28-10 win over Bethel last Saturday in Clemens Stadium. The Johnnies' defense recorded five interceptions and held the Royals to 49 yards rushing in the victory. Senior cornerback **Cayden Saxon** and sophomore linebacker **Cooper Yaggie** intercepted two passes each. Yaggie recorded perhaps the game's biggest play - a 61-yard interception return for a touchdown - with 3:33 remaining in the first half (left). The Johnnies led 14-10 at the time, but had just fumbled, giving the Royals the ball back at their own 43. Yaggie's touchdown expanded that margin to 21-10 at halftime.

Offensively, junior quarterback **Aaron Syverson** finished 30 of 43 passing, the sixth-most completions by a Johnnie in a game, for 323 yards and two touchdowns. Senior wide receiver **Nick VanErp** caught 10 passes for 147 yards and a touchdown, while senior tight end **Alex Larson** totaled 10 receptions for 98 yards and a score.

SJU struck first when senior running back **Henry Trost** scored on a 13-yard run early in the first quarter. But Bethel cut the gap to 7-3 when sophomore Hugo Cifuentes hit a 29-yard field goal, then took a 10-7 lead on a 68-yard touchdown pass from senior Jaron Roste to sophomore Micah Niewald with 14:04 remaining in the first half. The Johnnies answered back with a 5-yard touchdown pass from Syverson to VanErp that put them back on top. Then came Yaggie's huge interception return.

The Royals suffered a big blow when Roste - who entered the game banged-up - left after a hit late in the second quarter. He did not return, finishing the day with 173 yards passing, a touchdown and two interceptions. Junior George Bolt came on in relief and finished with 125 yards passing and three interceptions.

The Johnnies added a final touchdown in the third quarter on a 2-yard catch by Larson.

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at Northwestern 31, Martin Luther 9 (Nov. 12)

Northwestern clinched the UMAC championship outright with a 31-9 win over Martin Luther last Saturday at home. The Eagles outgained the Knights 525-167, including a 284-53 margin on the ground, and held the ball for 37:38 of the game.

Freshman quarterback Caden Cantrell finished 19 of 36 passing for 241 yards and four touchdowns. He made up for an interception by laying a hit on the returning Knight, forcing a fumble that was recovered by the Eagles. Two of his passing touchdowns went to senior tight end Damon Clapper. Senior wide receiver Mike Bostrom led UNW with 106 receiving yards in the win, including a 43-yard touchdown early in the second quarter. Freshman running back Sivert Klefsaas rushed for 196 yards on 24 carries.

THE LAST MEETING

at Saint John's 52, Northwestern 7 (Sept. 1, 2012)

SJU amassed 586 yards of total offense and scored touchdowns on all six of its trips to the red zone in a 52-7 season-opening win over Northwestern the last time these two programs met on Sept. 1, 2012, in Collegeville.

Running back **Nick Schneider** '14 (right) scored each of the Johnnies' first three touchdowns on the afternoon. The first was a 13-yard scamper on fourth-and-three with 3:44 left in the first quarter and the second was an eight-yard plunge at the 10:20 mark of the second quarter. He then caught a 12-yard touchdown pass from quarterback **Connor Bruns** '14 with 5:36 left in the first half.



An interception and 22-yard return by safety **Ian Goldsmith** '13 set up SJU's next touchdown, a two-yard run from **Colin Moynihan** '14 with 1:34 left in the first half to make it 28-0 in favor of SJU. Following a Northwestern three-and-out to start the second half, SJU pounded out a 10-play, 50-yard scoring drive that ended on a one-yard leap (literally, five yards into the end zone) from **Stephen Johnson** '13. The Eagles responded with a quick two-play, 75-yard scoring drive to erase the shutout. Quarterback Josh Balzer connected with Brian Lecheler on first down for a 69-yard gain, followed by a six-yard touchdown run from Josh Sinnen.

Kicker **Jimmie Mattson** '13 connected on a 49-yard field goal with 3:41 left in the third quarter to give the Johnnies a 38-7 lead. Mattson missed a 47-yarder on the next drive, his first miss as a Johnnie in 17 attempts (16-for-17). All seven of his kickoffs, however, went for touchbacks (65.0 avg.). Quarterback **Nick Martin** '16 hit **Ben Krebsbach** '14 for a 95-yard touchdown pass, the longest pass in school history, to give the Johnnies a 45-7 lead. The touchdown strike broke the 24-year-old record of 93 yards, set by quarterback **John Lahti** '89 and wideout **Todd Fultz** '91, at Gustavus Adolphus on Sept. 17, 1988. Running back **Sam Sura's** '16 first career carry covered 59 yards, which set up a six-yard touchdown run by **Jake Essler** '14 on the very next play to end the scoring for both teams.

Bruns ended the afternoon 15 of 22 passing for 208 yards and a touchdown. Tight end **Taylor Freely** '13 caught five passes for 76 yards, while Krebsbach tallied his first career 100-yard receiving performance with 103 yards on two receptions. Sura ended the game as the Johnnies' leading rusher (59 yards on one carry). Johnson and Schneider added 52 yards each on 11 and 10 carries, respectively, while Moynihan collected 44 yards on eight carries. SJU gained 254 yards on 45 carries (5.6 avg.) as a team.

Wide receiver **Josh Bungum** '16 accumulated 75 yards from scrimmage on seven touches (22 yards on three carries and 53 yards on four catches). In addition to his 95-yard touchdown pass, Martin averaged 42.7 yards on three punts.

Gary Fasching is off to the best start, in regard to wins, by any head coach in program history. That history, of course, includes the likes of college football's all-time wins leader, **John Gagliardi**. Fasching also has John's number in regard to their respective first 106 games coached at SJU.

PRESEASON HONORS

Senior defensive lineman **Michael Wozniak** and senior tight end **Alex Larson** were named to the D3football.com Preseason All-America team Aug. 15. Wozniak was named to the first team and Larson earned second-team honors. Both were named to *Lindy's* preseason All-America first team earlier this summer. Wozniak earned D3football.com All-America first-team honors last season and Larson received fourth-team accolades.

Wozniak started all 12 games and finished with a team-leading 15.5 tackles for loss and 10.5 sacks, including 6.5 tackles for loss and 3.5 sacks in two NCAA playoff games, last fall. He totaled 30 tackles (20 solo), five quarterback hurries, a fumble recovery and a pass breakup.

The 6-foot-7 Larson played 11 of the 12 games and finished second on the team in receptions (33) and receiving touchdowns (8), and third in receiving yards (476) last fall for the Johnnies. The eight receiving touchdowns were the fourth-most by a tight end in SJU history. His biggest touchdown reception was the game-winning, three-yard score from Chris Backes '21 with one second remaining – as the Johnnies erased a 13-point deficit to win the MIAC championship with a 29-28 victory at then-No. 12 Bethel.

FOUR ALL-REGION RETURNEES

Saint John's followed a program-record eight D3football.com All-West Region honorees in 2019 with a new mark of nine – now labeled as Region 9 – in 2021. The Johnnies have had 49 All-Region honorees over the last seven full seasons. In addition to senior tight end **Alex Larson** and senior defensive lineman **Michael Wozniak**, senior defensive lineman **Meteoriah Faoliu** (right) and senior running back **Henry Trost** return out of the nine honorees in 2022.



FIVE JOHNNIES ACADEMIC ALL-DISTRICT

Five Johnnies were named to the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) Academic All-District VI football team last fall. The honor was the third consecutive for running back **Henry Trost** and the second for both cornerback **Tommy Deters** '22 and offensive lineman **Tyler Johnson** '21. A pair of defensive linemen, **Collin Franz** '21 and **Michael Wozniak**, earned their first Academic All-District distinction. SJU has had 51 Academic All-District selections in the past 17 seasons.

ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS

Three Saint John's football student athletes – offensive lineman **Tyler Johnson** '21, running back **Henry Trost** and defensive lineman **Michael Wozniak** were named College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) Academic All-Americans last winter. Johnson and Wozniak were named to the first team, while Trost earned second-team honors. The distinction was the second consecutive for Johnson, who was named to the 2020-21 Academic All-America second team in July 2021 (a timeframe due to the COVID-19 pandemic). The Johnnies have had 20 football Academic All-Americans in the last 18 seasons (34 overall). Nominees must be of a sophomore academic standing or better, with a 3.30 GPA or higher. The Academic All-District and All-America teams are voted upon and selected by registered members of CoSIDA.

ALL-MIAC HONORS

Nineteen Johnnies earned 2021 All-MIAC honors, including 11 on the first team, and SJU swept all three major conference awards last fall. Of the 19 honorees, 10 return to the field in 2022. Wide receiver **Ravi Alston** '22 was named the Jim Christopherson MIAC Most Valuable Player, defensive lineman **Seth Morem** '21 shared the MIAC's Mike Stam Award with Gustavus Adolphus' Zach Jakes as the conference's most outstanding lineman, and head coach **Gary Fasching** was named the MIAC John Gagliardi Coach of the Year for the fourth consecutive season, and fifth time in his nine-year tenure.

Senior linebacker **Erik Bjork** (right, Mahtomedi, Minn.), senior defensive lineman **Meteoriah Faoliu**, tight end **Alex Larson**, senior wide receiver **Matt Mohr** (Chisago City, Minn./Chisago Lakes), running back **Henry Trost** and defensive lineman **Michael Wozniak** were named to the first team. Junior wide receiver **Jimmy Buck** (Orono, Minn.), senior offensive lineman **T.J. Duerr** (Buffalo, Minn./St. Michael-Albertville) and senior defensive back **Ethan Stark** (Sartell, Minn./Sartell-St. Stephen) named to the All-MIAC second team. Sophomore kicker **Conor Murphy** was All-MIAC honorable mention.



A PLAYOFF REGULAR

The 2022 NCAA berth is SJU's 32nd postseason appearance in program history and the 28th at the Division III level. The bid was also the eighth consecutive in 10 seasons (including the 2020 non-season due to COVID-19) under the direction of head coach **Gary Fasching**. He broke the tie for the MIAC record held by former head coach **John Gagliardi** (1998-2003) in 2021.

PROGRAM WIN NO. 650

The 47-14 win over Rose-Hulman (Ind.) on Nov. 16, 2019, enabled SJU to become the eighth program in Division III history to reach 650 victories. NO STRANGER TO THE POSTSEASON

Trivia question: Which Johnnie has been part of each NCAA postseason appearance, dating back to 1976? The



answer is **Jerry Haugen**, who is in his 47th season on the Johnnies' coaching staff. He has coached in 68 NCAA postseason football games, which accounts for nearly seven additional seasons in playoff games alone. The Johnnies have posted a 412-96-5 (.808) overall record and a 312-60-4 (.835) MIAC record with Haugen as a defensive coach. Since 1978, his defense has finished in the top two of the MIAC in total defense 25 times, including 15 of the past 20 seasons, and in scoring defense 30 times, including 22 of the past 26 seasons. As a player (left), Haugen was a four-year starter and gained All-MIAC honors as a defensive back in 1975. He ranks second on the school's career

interception list with 15 (first place without postseason games).

A LOT OF GAMES, A LOT OF WINS

The Johnnies' NCAA second-round win in 2018 was also the 380th with **Jerry Haugen** '76 as an assistant football coach at SJU. The late Bobby Bowden, a member of the College Football Hall of Fame and long-time head coach at Florida State (1976-2009), has the fourth-most wins in college football history with a 377-129-4 record. All told, Haugen has been a part of 1,581 wins (2,571 games) at SJU as a player and coach across four different sports, as well as 37 conference championships (including four MIAC Playoff titles in baseball) and 43 national postseason appearances.

On This Date in Johnnie Football History...

The Johnnies are 4-1 all-time on November 19: 1933 at St. Thomas (W, 7-6); 1977 vs. Wabash, Ind. (L, 9-20); 1994 vs. La Verne, Calif. (W, 51-12); 2005 vs. Monmouth, Ill. (W, 62-3); and 2016 vs. UW-Platteville (W, 32-31).

1933 at St. Thomas (W, 7-6): The Johnnies pulled off the upset to prevent the heavily-favored Tommies from gaining a share of the conference title. After a scoreless first half, the Tommies struck first when their captain recovered a blocked punt in the end zone. SJU pulled ahead in the fourth quarter after quarterback Ken Bloms lofted a touchdown pass to receiver Lawrence Iten, who pulled the ball in over two Tommie defenders in the end zone. The Johnnies gained the advantage when Gus Luckemeyer drilled the point-after kick, something the Tommies were unable to do after their score.

1994 vs. La Verne, Calif. (W, 51-12): SJU blasted La Verne in the first round of the 1994 Division III playoffs in Collegeville behind a record-setting, offensive performance. Kurt Ramler went 20 of 31 passing for 412 passing yards and four touchdowns. He connected most often with receiver Chris Palmer, who hauled in nine catches for 206 yards and three touchdowns. SJU tallied 659 yards of offense, which set a Division III record at the time. The Leopards entered the contest averaging over 446 yards of offense but only mustered 305 against SJU.

2005 vs. Monmouth, Ill. (W, 62-3): SJU earned a first-round win with a dismantling of Monmouth, 62-3. Running back Mike Lofboom tallied five touchdowns (two rushing and three receiving) and 169 total yards to pace the Johnnies. Defensively, SJU was led by defensive end Kevin McNamara, who set a Division III record with 7.5 sacks. Overall, the Johnnies held Monmouth to only 115 yards, including -3 rushing yards on 44 carries.

2016 vs. UW-Platteville (W, 32-31): Running back Dusty Krueger scored from 1 yard out on fourth down with no time remaining, lifting then-No. 9 SJU to a 32-31 win over then-No. 12 UW-Platteville in the first-round of the Division III playoffs six years ago in Collegeville. Krueger's short run capped a 14-play, 80-yard drive (3-for-3 on fourth down) with no timeouts remaining to rally the Johnnies, who erased a 31-20 deficit in the fourth quarter. SJU trailed 31-20 after the Pioneers scored a touchdown with 12:02 remaining. The score was set up when SJU snapped the ball over punter Griffin Toomey's head, giving UWP possession at the SJU 13. Following the ensuing kickoff, the Johnnies drove 65 yards in 10 plays, capped by Jackson Erdmann's 19-yard pass to running back Zack Sundly with 8:10 to play in the game. That cut the gap to 31-26 following a failed two-point conversion try. SJU got the ball back with 4:56 to play, but Erdmann's pass was intercepted by safety Josh Mackie with 2:48 to play, his second of the day. SJU's defense, however, held UWP and forced a punt, which barely crossed the goal line for a touchback. Erdmann completed 18 of 33 passes for 235 yards and two touchdowns. Linebacker Carter Hanson had a team-high 11 total tackles and an interception. The Johnnies limited the Pioneers, who had been averaging 497 yards of offense per game, to 311 yards in the contest.

BLAKE ELLIOTT '03 ON HALL OF FAME BALLOT

Former Saint John's student-athlete **Blake Elliott '03** was named to the College Football Hall of Fame ballot for the 10th consecutive year in June 2022. Elliott, who played wide receiver for the Johnnies from 2000-03, is one of 176 former student-athletes on the ballot, including one of 96 from the NCAA divisional and NAIA ranks. The announcement of the 2023 inductees will be made in January and those selected will be inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame during the 65th NFF Annual Awards Dinner Dec. 5, 2023, and enshrined at the Chick-fil-A College Football Hall of Fame in Atlanta.

Elliott (*right*) excelled for four years and ended his career as the recipient of the Gagliardi Trophy and a national championship in 2003; a season that included **John Gagliardi's** record-breaking 409th career victory. He owns three NCAA playoff records, two MIAC records and 29 SJU receiving records. Elliott was a three-time All-American, a two-time MIAC Player of the Year, a Gagliardi Trophy finalist as a junior and was invited to play in both the AFCA Aztec Bowl and Hula Bowl following the 2003 season.



He ended his career second all-time in all NCAA divisions in catches (327) and second in NCAA Division III in touchdown receptions (56). Elliott posted 369 receptions for 4,826 yards and 63 touchdowns in his career, as well as 744 rushing yards and eight touchdowns on 109 carries. Elliott was just as dangerous on special teams as he was on offense, totaling 3,065 yards and seven touchdowns on 195 total returns. His NCAA all-divisions record for consecutive games played with a reception (47) ended in 2008.

To be eligible for the ballot, players must have been named a first-team All-American as recognized and utilized by the NCAA for its consensus All-America teams; played their last year of intercollegiate football at least 10 years prior; played within the last 50 years and cannot be currently playing professional football. From the coaching ranks, 226 individuals have achieved Hall of Fame distinction, including Gagliardi (Class of 2006).

LEADING IN ATTENDANCE

Saint John's attracted the second-most spectators in NCAA Division III, both overall (51,945) and per game (6,493), over eight home games in 2021. The cumulative total (51,945) was greater than 107 Football Championship Subdivision teams and all but one of the 167 Division II programs (Grand Valley State's total of 76,334). SJU finished second nationally in Division III with an average of 6,493 spectators over eight games, including two in the NCAA playoffs. The Johnnies have finished in Division III's top two in per-game attendance 19 of the last 20 seasons.

A JOHNNIE WITH THE JAGUARS



Offensive tackle **Ben Bartch '20** became the 10th Johnnie to be drafted in the NFL when he was selected by the Jacksonville Jaguars with the 10th pick of the fourth round (No. 116 overall) in the 2020 NFL Draft. He appeared in 13 games for the Jaguars, including one start at left guard, and totaled 219 offensive snaps (47 on special teams) in 2020. Bartch followed that with 11 starts and right guard and 704 offensive snaps (43 on special teams) in

2021. Bartch was the lone NCAA Division III attendee at the 2020 Reese's Senior Bowl in Mobile, Ala. Although he did not play in the game, Bartch received rave reviews during the three days of practices leading up to the event. He attended the 2020 NFL Scouting Combine that February, but did not participate in the drills or measurements due to the injury suffered during the final Senior Bowl practice. A D3football.com first-team and Associated Press second-team All-American in 2019, Bartch started all 14 games at left tackle in 2019. He made 27 straight starts at tackle after he switched from tight end during the 2018 preseason. Through a combination of hard work in the weight room and repeated consumption of a now-famous (or infamous) protein shake recipe (ingredients included scrambled eggs, cottage cheese, quick grits, peanut butter, bananas and Gatorade), Bartch gained over 50 pounds and started on the line's left side immediately.

A JOHNNIE IN VIENNA

Quarterback Jackson Erdmann '19 has had quite the post-graduate path in football following his senior season in 2019. He participated in The Spring League during Fall 2020 and followed that by leading the Wild Aces to Fan Controlled Football's championship in the inaugural season. Now, Erdmann led the Vienna Vikings to a 10-2 record and defeated the Hamburg Sea Devils Sept. 25 for the European Football League's championship. A 2019 Gagliardi Trophy finalist and the award's recipient in 2018, Erdmann earned his third consecutive All-MIAC first-team honor and led NCAA Division III in passing yards (5,040) - 28 yards shy of the Division III single-season record of 5,068 set by Joe Callahan of Wesley (Del.) in 2015 - as a senior in 2019. He owns MIAC and SJU records for passing touchdowns (139) and passing yards (11,639), as well as the school record for season pass attempts (489), season pass completions (313), career touchdowns responsible for (143), game passing yards (496), touchdown passes in a game (7), touchdown passes in a season (47), season passing yards (5,040), yards of total offense in a game (563), yards of total offense in a season (5,100), yards of total offense in a career (11,976), 300-yard passing games in a season (11) and 300-yard passing games in a career (15).

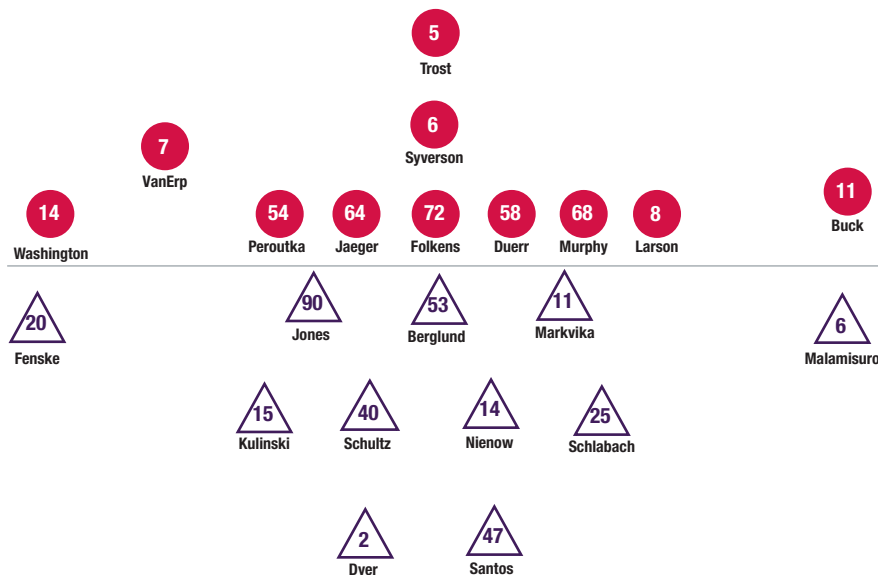
