SATURDAY'S MATCHUP

Saint John's returns to competition following its bye week and after the Johnnies earned their second consecutive win over a top-20 team with a 37-34 win over fast-paced, then-No. 19 UW-River Falls on Sept. 10 in Collegeville. SJU passed for 329 yards and built a 37-19 lead before the Falcons scored 15 points in the game's final 3:30. Bethel, like SJU, also had its bye last weekend but suffered a different fate - a 10-7 road loss at UW-Platteville -Sept. 10. BU was without its starting quarterback, Jaran Roste, who sufferent an injury to his non-throwing arm during the opening drive of the 2022 season (Sept. 3's season opener vs. Pacific Lutheran, Wash.). Saturday's game is the first between the two programs since SJU's thrilling, 29-28 win in the 2021 MIAC championship game on Nov. 13 in Arden Hills. The Johnnies trailed 21-8 at halftime.

WOZNIAK NAMED TO GOOD WORKS TEAM



Senior defensive lineman **Michael Wozniak** (*left*; New Hope, Minn./Robbinsdale Armstrong) was one of 22 student-athletes across all divisions of college football named to the 2022 Allstate American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Good Works Team on Monday (Sept. 19). This year marks the 31st anniversary of the award, which was established in 1992 to recognize a select group of college football players who have made a commitment to service and enriching the lives of others. A fan vote will run from now until Nov. 22 at www.ESPN. com/Allstate to decide this year's Allstate AFCA Good Works Team Captain. Fans may cast one vote per device each day. Wozniak is one of four honorees from the NCAA Division III level —

joining Matthew Feldick of Bethel, Alan Gorny of Johns Hopkins (Md.) and Matt Lilja of Mount Union (Ohio) – and one of six defensive linemen.

Wozniak is the sixth Johnnie to be named to the Allstate AFCA Good Works Team and the fifth in the last six seasons: quarterback **Chris Backes** '21, offensive lineman **Ben Bartch** '20, quarterback **Jackson Erdmann** '19 and wide receiver **Will Gillach** '19. Defensive end **Kevin McNamara** '07 was the first SJU student-athlete to receive the honor in 2006. The full list of SJU's honorees and nominees is below.

A 2022 Lindy's Preseason All-American and a 2021 D3football.com All-America first-team selection, Wozniak has nine tackles (five solo), including 4.5 for a loss and three sacks, as well as a forced fumble through the season's first two games. He totaled 3.5 tackles for loss, three sacks and the forced fumble in the Johnnies' 24-10 win over then-No.-4 Wisconsin-Whitewater Sept. 3 and was named MIAC Football Defensive Player of the Week for the performance. Wozniak has 11 tackles for loss and 6.5 sacks in his last four games going back to last season, and 22.5 tackles for loss and 13.5 sacks in 22 career games.

Wozniak started all 12 games and finished with a team-leading 15.5 tackles for loss and 10.5 sacks, including 6.5 tackles for loss and 3.5 sacks in two NCAA playoff games, last fall. He totaled 30 tackles (20 solo), five quarterback hurries, a fumble recovery and a pass breakup. He returned to the field in 2021 after suffering a season-ending hand injury on the first defensive play of the 2019 season - a tackle for loss - at Wisconsin-Stout.

Off the field, Wozniak is in his fifth year raising money for a pair of SJU football's initiatives, St. Jude Children's Research Hospital and Tackle Cancer. He was also a member of the Johnnies' Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, which holds an annual Kids Fighting Hunger meal-packing event every March, for two academic years (2020-21 and 2021-22). Wozniak also helped organize a swim meet for local Special Olympians in Spring 2022 in Collegeville. Back home, Wozniak volunteered to coach 2nd- and 3rd-grade youth football for the Armstrong Cooper Youth Football Association. In addition to his exemplary athletic performance and community service experience, Wozniak is also a decorated student. He was named to the 2021 College Sports Information Directors of America Academic All-America first team and is a two-time Academic All-MIAC honoree (minimum 3.5 GPA) with a 3.86 GPA in accounting.

MIAC PLAYERS OF THE WEEK (SEPT. 12)



Senior defensive lineman **Metorian Faoliu** (*left*; Wildomar, Calif./Vista Murrieta) and sophomore kicker **Conor Murphy** (Sioux Falls, S.D./O'Gorman) were named the MIAC Football Defensive and Special Teams Players of the Week, respectively, last Monday (Sept. 12). Faoliu totaled 11 tackles (eight solo), including 3.5 for a loss, 1.5 sacks and a quarterback hurry in the win over UW-River Falls and was also named to D3football.com's National Team of the Week for the performance. He currently leads the team in solo tackles (10), is second in total tackles (15) and has 4.5 tackles for loss, 2.0 sacks and three hurries in two games this season. Murphy, meanwhile, went 4-for-4 on his PAT attempts and made a 39-yard field goal,

the Johnnies' longest since 2017, in the victory.

NON-CONFERENCE WINS

The Johnnies are now 35-4 (.897) in regular-season, non-conference games since 2002, including an 18-0 record under the direction of head coach **Gary Fasching**, and 35-14 against members of the Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (WIAC).

GOOD FROM 39 YARDS OUT

As mentioned above, the 39-yard field goal off the foot of sophomore **Conor Murphy** Sept. 10 was the Johnnies' longest since Sept. 16, 2017, when Zach Barwick '19 made a 39-yarder in the 56-7 road win at St. Olaf. The distance is tied for the fifth-longest during head coach **Gary Fasching's** tenure (*see below*). The top-three distances during that time are held by assistant coach **Alexi Johnson** '17, while the program record of 52 yards is a tie between **Russell Gliadon** '10 (set in 2009) and another assistant coach, **Jimmie Mattson** '13 (set in 2011).

IN THE POLLS

Saint John's stayed at No. 2 in the latest D3football.com Top 25 poll released Sunday night (Sept. 18) and debuted at No. 2 in the first American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Top 25 poll of the 2022 season posted Monday (Sept. 19). The Johnnies climbed two spots to No. 2 in the D3football.com poll following their second win over a nationally ranked opponent - then-19 UW-River Falls - Sept. 10. The ranking is SJU's highest since it was No. 2 in the week nine and 10 polls by the AFCA. The last time the Johnnies were ranked No. 2 and/or received first-place votes by D3football.com both occurred in the 2004 preseason poll (nine months after the program's fourth national championship in December 2003). Bethel moved up one spot to No. 20 by D3football.com and received votes in the AFCA's first set of rankings.

SERIES HISTORY

Saturday's game is the 44th meeting between Saint John's and Bethel going back to 1978. The Johnnies are 34-9 all-time against the Royals, including a 14-6 record in Arden Hills. SJU won the first 20 meetings in the series before BU won nine of the next 15 from 1999-2013. The Johnnies, however, have responded with eight straight victories by a 228-117 margin.

FAMILIAR FOES

Following 17 years as an assistant to **John Gagliardi**, Saint John's head coach **Gary Fasching** is certainly familiar with Bethel head coach Steve Johnson, but the familiarity goes back even further. Fasching assisted Johnson while he was the head coach at nearby St. Cloud Cathedral High School from 1982-85. Johnson taught physical education, while Fasching taught social studies. Fasching later replaced Johnson as head

coach in 1986 after he left Cathedral to be a graduate assistant coach at the University of Minnesota. Johnson spent one year with the Gophers and two more at Montana State before taking over at Bethel in 1989. Fasching (*right*), meanwhile, led the Crusaders to the State Class B title in 1992 and 1993 and collected a 57-46 career record over 10 seasons from 1986-95, the most wins and longest tenure in school history.



CAREER DAY FOR BUCK



Junior wide receiver **Jimmy Buck** (*left*; Orono, Minn.) recorded career highs in receptions (9) and receiving yards (149) two weeks ago in the Johnnies' win over nationally ranked Wisconsin-River Falls. Four of his nine catches converted third downs: 23 yards (3rd-12), 11 (3rd-9), 8 (3rd-4) and 16 (3rd-8). Buck has 15 catches for a team-leading 196 yards so far this fall. He is averaging 16.8 yards per catch (20 receptions for 336 yards) with two touchdowns over his last five games going back to last season, when he played all 12

games and snagged 33 passes for 551 yards and seven scores.

A 1981 SJU graduate, Fasching became the 16th head coach in the 102year history of Saint John's University football following the 2012 season. He succeeded John Gagliardi, who announced his retirement following 60 seasons at SJU, after serving 17 seasons as an assistant football coach and recruiting coordinator at SJU. Fasching was a three-year starter for Gagliardi and the Johnnies at linebacker during the 1978 and 1980-81 seasons. A knee injury held him out of the 1979 season.

AS AN ASSISTANT

The Johnnies posted a 164-39 record (120-22 MIAC) with 10 conference

titles and 12 postseason appearances (22-11 playoff record), including the 2003 national championship, 2000 national runner-up performance and four national semifinal games during his tenure as an assistant coach. He also coached SJU's throwers as an assistant track and field coach from 1996-2011.

AT ST. CLOUD CATHEDRAL

Prior to joining the Johnnies' coaching staff, Fasching served as the head football coach at St. Cloud Cathedral High School from 1986-95, where he led the Crusaders to the State Class B title in 1992 and

THE LAST GAME

at No. 4 Saint John's 37, No. 19 UW-River Falls 34 (Sept. 10)

Then-No. 4 Saint John's defeated its second consecutive nationally ranked opponent, then-No. 19 UW-River Falls, by a score of 37-34 two weeks ago (Sept. 10) in Collegeville. UWRF gave SJU all it could handle, piling up 460 yards of total offense (the most surrendered by the Johnnies since a victory over Aurora, III. in the first round of the 2019 Division III playoffs) and taking an early 7-0 lead on a 1-yard touchdown run in the first quarter.

The Falcons then pulled ahead 19-14 after a nine-yard touchdown run by quarterback Kaleb Blaha and a 17-yard touchdown catch by Luke Kush with 1:44 remaining in the first half. In all, Blaha threw for 283 yards and three touchdowns and rushed for 122 yards and another in UW-River Falls' effective hurry-up offensive scheme.

But SJU - which had led 14-7 after a 20-yard touchdown catch by senior tight end Alex Larson in the first quarter and a 1-yard touchdown run by senior running back Henry Trost (Lindstrom, Minn./Chisago Lakes) in the second - regained the lead just before

halftime when junior quarterback Aaron Syverson connected with senior wide receiver Nick VanErp on a 30-yard touchdown pass (right). The score, VanErp's first of his career, came on a fourth-and-10 play. The ensuing two-point conversion attempt failed, but SJU led 20-19 going into the locker rooms. Syverson threw for 329 yards - his first 300-yard passing game - and two touchdowns.



The Johnnies suffered a big loss when Trost left the game with an apparent ankle injury in the second quarter. He did not return, meaning juniors Tony Underwood (Eagan, Minn./Cretin-Derham Hall) and Troy Feddema (St. Cloud, Minn./Tech) carried the load the rest of the way in a running back corps already without **Devin Vouk**, a key contributor from last year who was injured this summer and will miss the entire season. Feddema, especially, answered the call - rushing for two big second-half touchdowns sandwiched around a 39-yard field goal by sophomore Conor Murphy that helped SJU pull away. The touchdowns were the first and second of Feddema's collegiate career.

The Falcons scored a pair of touchdowns late in the fourth quarter to trim an 18-point Johnnies' lead to just three with 20 seconds remaining. But SJU recovered an onside kick to close things out.

at UW-Platteville 10, No. 11 Bethel 7 (Sept. 10)

Then-No. 11 Bethel suffered a 10-7 loss at UW-Platteville two Saturdays ago (Sept. 10). The Pioneers out-gained the Royals 262-162 (205-41 in the first half), though BU held UWP to 57 yards of offense in the final 30 minutes, including only 16 yards of offense in the fourth quarter.

Platteville missed a 21-yard field goal on its opening possession, but got on the board first marching in from seven yards out to cap a 12 play, 83-yard drive. George Bolt's second interception of the day set up UWP to gain a 10-0 lead thanks to a 49-yard field goal with 4:29 left before halftime.

The Royals cut the deficit to three points when Bolt connected with Micah Niewald for a 19-vard touchdown reception in the third quarter. With just over four minutes remaining in the game, Hugo Cifuentes' 41-yard, field-goal attempt fell short. The Pioneers gained two yards on fourth-and-one and ran out the rest of the clock for the win.

THE LAST MEETING

Saint John's 29, at Bethel 28 (Nov. 13, 2021)

The Johnnies won a wild, 29-28 last-second victory over Bethel in the MIAC championship game last Nov. 13 (2021) in Arden Hills. Senior tight end Alex Larson hauled in a three-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Chris Backes '21 on fourth-and-goal with one second left on the clock. That touchdown - and the extra-point by sophomore Conor **Murphy** that followed – gave Saint John's the lead for the first time in a matchup in which they had trailed by 14 early and 21-8 at the half.

The Johnnies turned the ball over on downs twice in the fourth quarter with Bethel leading by six points - once at the Royals' 6 with just under six minutes to go, then again at their own 34 with 2:59 remaining. Yet, when the defense stopped Bethel on downs at the Johnnies' 29 with 1:59 left on the clock, the offense got one last chance. And this time, Larson and company made it count, marching 72 yards in eight plays.

The win provided SJU with its 35th MIAC title and 24th 10-win season. The NCAA berth was SJU's 31st postseason appearance in program history and the 27th at the Division III level. The bid was also the seventh consecutive under the direction of head coach Gary Fasching, which broke his tie for the MIAC record held by former head coach John Gagliardi.

But it didn't seem like the Johnnies' day in the first half as Bethel roared out to a 14-0 lead on a pair of touchdown passes from Jaran Roste – the first a 48-yarder to Joey Kidder and the second a 23-yard connection to Micah Niewald.

SJU cut the gap to 14-8 on a 1-yard touchdown run by Backes with 12:05 to play in the second quarter, but a 22-yard touchdown pass from Roste to Gabe Ante sent the Royals into the locker room leading 21-8. SJU, however, did not allow an offensive touchdown in the second half. Bethel's only score came with 3:46 left in the third guarter when – after a 3-yard touchdown run by SJU senior running back Henry Trost cut the gap to six - BU linebacker David Brandt returned a blocked punt 10 yards for a touchdown to make the score 28-15.

The Johnnies again pulled within six on a 1-yard touchdown run by Trost (who finished the day with 23 carries for 93 yards) with 11:46 remaining. But SJU couldn't follow up on its next possession which ended when Backes was stopped for no gain on 4th-and-one at the Bethel 6.

The defense stepped up and forced the Royals to punt the ball away, but the Johnnies gained only two yards before three-straight incompletions meant Bethel got the ball back on downs at the SJU 34 with less-than-three minutes to go. The Royals - with backup quarterback George Bolt in for an injured Roste - managed to gain just five yards before

A 36-yard pass from Backes to junior wide receiver Jimmy Buck put SJU at the Bethel 35 (left). Then Backes carried for a gain of 25 to make it first-and-goal at the 10. But three plays later, the Johnnies were still only at the Bethel 3 and the clock had run down to the final seconds. That's when Backes fired off a final pass

to Larson at the pylon on the SJU side of the end zone. Backes threw for 151 yards and a touchdown while rushing for 103 yards and another score – the first time a Johnnie quarterback crossed the 100-yard rushing mark in a game since Ken Pletcher ran for 104 yards on four carries at Macalester on Oct. 30, 1993.

TROST TOUCHDOWNS



Senior running back Henry Trost (left) ended the 2021 regular season 10th in NCAA Division III in scoring (11.6 ppg.), 11th in rushing touchdowns (17) and 13th in both points scored (102) and total touchdowns (17).

Trost is currently tied for third in SJU history with 34 career rushing touchdowns, thanks in large part to a 13-touchdown season in 2019 and 18 more in 2021 (see chart below). His 39 total touchdowns are

eighth all-time, one behind Chris Moore '01 and Chris Palmer '96 in a tie for sixth.

Trost has scored 36 touchdowns, including 32 rushing, over his last 27 games and has 1,596 rushing yards on 265 career attempts, an average of 6.0 yards per carry, and 2,189 yards from scrimmage on 303 career touches (7.2 avg.).

PRESEASON HONORS

Senior defensive lineman **Michael Wozniak** and senior tight end **Alex Larson** were named to the D3football.com Preseason All-America team Aug. 15. Wozniak was named to the first team and Larson earned second-team honors. Both were named to *Lindy's* preseason All-America first team earlier this summer. Wozniak earned D3football.com All-America first-team honors last season (*see Wozniak's 2021 stats on page 2*) and Larson received fourth-team accolades.

The 6-foot-7 Larson played 11 of the 12 games and finished second on the team in receptions (33) and receiving touchdowns (8), and third in receiving yards (476) last fall for the Johnnies. The eight receiving touchdowns were the fourth-most by a tight end in SJU history. His biggest touchdown reception was the game-winning, three-yard score from Chris Backes '21 with one second remaining – as the Johnnies erased a 13-point deficit to win the MIAC championship with a 29-28 victory at then-No. 12 Bethel.

ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS

Three Saint John's football student athletes - offensive lineman Tyler Johnson '21, running back **Henry Trost** and defensive lineman **Michael Wozniak** were named College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) Academic All-Americans last winter. Johnson and Wozniak were named to the first team, while Trost earned second-team honors. The distinction is the second consecutive for Johnson, who was named to the 2020-21 Academic All-America second team in July 2021 (a timeframe due to the COVID-19 pandemic). The Johnnies have now had 20 football Academic All-Americans in the last 18 seasons (34 overall).

Nominees must be of a sophomore academic standing or better, with a 3.30 GPA or higher. The Academic All-District and All-America teams are voted upon and selected by registered members of CoSIDA.

FIVE JOHNNIES ACADEMIC ALL-DISTRICT

Five Johnnies were named to the College Sports Information Directors of America (Co-SIDA) Academic All-District VI football team last fall. The honor was the third consecutive for running back **Henry Trost** and the second for both cornerback **Tommy Deters** '22 and offensive lineman **Tyler Johnson** '21. A pair of defensive linemen, **Collin Franz** '21 and **Michael Wozniak**, earned their first Academic All-District distinction. SJU has now had 51 Academic All-District selections in the past 17 seasons.

CISNEROS EARNS MIAC ELITE 22 AWARD



Junior safety **Mateo Cisneros** (*left*; Shoreview, Minn./Mounds View) earned the MIAC's Elite 22 Award for football last season. Modeled after the NCAA Elite 90 Award, the MIAC Elite 22 Award for football is presented to the individual with the highest GPA among the student-athletes who played in the MIAC Championship game. The honoree must be a sophomore, junior or senior and in at least his second season of competition with his current team.

A biology major (pre-medicine emphasis) with a 3.93 GPA, Cisneros played all 12 games for the Johnnies in 2021, including starts in the last 10. He totaled 24 tackles (15 solo), an interception (Oct. 23 at Gustavus Adolphus) and a fumble recovery (Oct. 9 vs. Augsburg).

FOUR ALL-REGION RETURNEES

Saint John's followed a program-record eight D3football.com All-West Region honorees in 2019 with a new mark of nine - now labeled as Region 9 - in 2021. The Johnnies have had 49 All-Region honorees over the last seven full seasons.

In addition to senior tight end Alex Larson and senior defensive lineman Michael Wozniak, senior defensive lineman Metoriah Faoliu and senior running back Henry Trost return out of the nine honorees in 2022.

ALL-MIAC HONORS

Nineteen Johnnies earned 2021 All-MIAC honors, including 11 on the first team, and SJU swept all three major conference awards last fall. Of the 19 honorees, 10 return to the field in 2022. Wide receiver Ravi Alston '22 was named the Jim Christopherson MIAC Most Valuable Player, defensive lineman Seth Morem '21 shared the MIAC's Mike Stam Award with Gustavus Adolphus' Zach Jakes as the conference's most outstanding lineman, and head coach Gary Fasching was named the MIAC John Gagliardi Coach of the Year for the fourth consecutive season, and fifth time in his nine-year tenure.

Senior linebacker Erik Bjork (right, Mahtomedi, Minn.), senior defensive lineman Metoriah Faoliu, tight end Alex Larson, senior wide receiver Matt Mohr (Chisago City, Minn./Chisago Lakes), running back Henry Trost and defensive lineman Michael Wozniak were named to the first team.



Junior wide receiver Jimmy Buck (Orono, Minn.), senior offensive lineman T.J. Duerr (Buffalo, Minn./St. Michael-Albertville) and senior defensive back Ethan Stark (Sartell, Minn./Sartell-St. Stephen) were named to the All-MIAC second team. Sophomore kicker Conor Murphy was All-MIAC honorable mention.

CONTINUING TO LEAD THE MIAC

The Johnnies' 31-7 victory at Concordia-Moorhead on Nov. 12, 2016, was the program's 450th in MIAC play. SJU ended the 2021 regular season with the MIAC's best winning percentage in conference play, .721 (480-179-22), which is even better when broken down by eras: modern history, since 1946 (.777); during John Gagliardi's tenure, 1953-2012 (.780); and during the 21st century, since 2000 (.847).

On This Date in Johnnie Football History...

The Johnnies are 5-8 all-time on September 24: 1932 vs. St. Paul Luther (W, 32-0); 1937 at Gustavus Adolphus (L, 12-13); 1938 at St. Norbert, Wis. (L, 6-28); 1948 at North Dakota (W, 14-0); 1960 at Concordia (L, 14-30); 1966 at Concordia (L, 6-13); 1977 vs. St. Thomas (W, 25-20); 1983 vs. St. Thomas (L, 14-41); 1988 vs. Concordia (L, 7-28); 1994 at Augsburg (W, 37-14); 2005 at Gustavus Adolphus (W, 41-14); 2011 vs. Augsburg (L, 31-32); and 2016 vs. St. Thomas (L, 21-33).

1932 vs. St. Paul Luther (W, 32-0): SJU's AI Ethen intercepted the first pass attempted by Phalen Luther and returned it for a touchdown to give the Johnnies an early 7-0 lead in the 1932 season opener, on this date 90 years ago. "Big George" Klasen galloped across the field for the second touchdown to give SJU a 13-0 lead at the half. In the third quarter, Si Ryan scored a pair of touchdowns on the ground, including a 55-yard jaunt. Bill Arth punched in the final touchdown with a short run to bring the final score to 32-0. The shutout was the first of 11 consecutive for SJU as the Johnnies went 4-0-1 in the MIAC (6-0-1 overall) to win their first conference championship.

1977 vs. St. Thomas (W, 25-20): The Johnnies drove 80 yards on their first possession with Jeff Norman scoring from the one-yard line to go ahead 7-0 on Homecoming Day. Despite the early lead, the Johnnies turned the ball over twice and UST took advantage borh times to take the halftime lead, 14-7. The Johnnies responded early in the third quarter when Tim Schmitz bolted down the field for a 52-yard touchdown to cut the deficit to 14-13. SJU re-gained the lead on its next possession with a 25-yard touchdown pass from Norman to Tom Hager. Schmitz increased the Johnnies' lead to 25-14 with an eight-yard run halfway through the fourth quarter. SJU gained 363-yards of offense, including 293 rushing-yards, to UST's 243. Schmitz gained 155 yards on 19 carries, while Mark McCullen added 117 yards on 21 attempts for SJU.

2005 at Gustavus Adolphus (W, 41-14): Then-No. 8 SJU started the scoring on its first drive, taking the ball 68 yards in 13 plays, capped by a 2-yard touchdown pass from Alex Kofoed to Casey Haugen. Just over two minutes later, Gustavus tied the game at 7-7 with a three-yard touchdown run. SJU, however, scored the game's next 13 points to gain a 20-7 lead. Anthony Schmidt connected on a 21-yard field goal with 11:29 left in the quarter and John Cloeter returned an interception 61 yard for a touchdown less than two minutes later. Schmidt made another field goal, this time from 35 yards out, but GAC scored a touchdown just before halftime. The Johnnies went on to score 21 unanswered points in the second half to secure the victory. SJU out-gained the Gusties 433-288 as Kofoed finished 26 of 39 passing for 331 yards. Defensively, Damien Dumonceaux had nine solo tackles, including one for a loss.

NO STRANGER TO THE POSTSEASON

Trivia question: Which Johnnie has been part of each NCAA postseason appearance, dating back to 1976? The answer is **Jerry Haugen**, who is in his 47th season on the Johnnies' coaching staff. He has coached in 68 NCAA postseason football games, which accounts for nearly seven additional seasons in playoff games alone. The Johnnies have posted a 404-95-5 (.807) overall record and a 305-59-4 (.834) MIAC record with Haugen



as a defensive coach. Since 1978, his defense has finished in the top two of the MIAC in total defense 25 times, including 15 of the past 20 seasons, and in scoring defense 30 times, including 22 of the past 26 seasons. As a player (*left*), Haugen was a four-year starter and gained All-MIAC honors as a defensive back in 1975. He ranks second on the school's career interception list with 15 (first place without postseason games).

A LOT OF GAMES, A LOT OF WINS

The Johnnies' NCAA second-round win in 2018 was also the 380th with **Jerry Haugen** '76 as an assistant football coach at SJU. The late Bobby Bowden, a member of the College Football Hall of Fame and long-time head coach at Florida State (1976-2009), has the fourth-most wins in college football history with a 377-129-4 record. All told, Haugen has been a part of 1,574 wins (2,563 games) at SJU as a player and coach across four different sports, as well as 36 conference championships (including four MIAC Playoff titles in baseball) and 42 national postseason appearances.

BLAKE ELLIOTT '03 ON HALL OF FAME BALLOT

Former Saint John's award-winning student-athlete Blake Elliott '03 was named to the College Football Hall of Fame ballot for the 10th consecutive year in June. Elliott, who played wide receiver for the Johnnies from 2000-03, is one of 176 former student-athletes on the ballot, including one of 96 from the NCAA divisional and NAIA ranks. The announcement of the 2023 inductees will be made in January. Those selected will be inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame during the 65th NFF Annual Awards Dinner Dec. 5, 2023, and permanently enshrined at the Chick-fil-A College Football Hall of Fame in Atlanta.

Elliott (*right*) excelled at SJU for four years and ended his career as the recipient of the Gagliardi Trophy and a national championship in 2003; a season that included Gagliardi's record-breaking 409th career victory. He owns three NCAA playoff records, two MIAC records and 29 SJU receiving records. Elliott was a three-time All-American, a two-time MIAC Player of the Year, a Gagliardi Trophy finalist



as a junior in 2002 and was invited to play in both the AFCA Aztec Bowl and Hula Bowl following the 2003 season. His NCAA all-divisions record for consecutive games played with a reception (47) ended in 2008.

He ended his career second all-time in all NCAA divisions in catches (327) and second in NCAA Division III in touchdown receptions (56). Elliott posted 369 receptions for 4,826 yards and 63 touchdowns in his career, as well as 744 rushing yards and eight touchdowns on 109 carries. Elliott was just as dangerous on special teams as he was on offense, totaling 3,065 yards and seven touchdowns on 195 total returns.

To be eligible for the ballot, players must have been named a first-team All-American by a major/national selector as recognized and utilized by the NCAA for its consensus All-America teams; played their last year of intercollegiate football at least 10 years prior; played within the last 50 years and cannot be currently playing professional football. From the coaching ranks, 226 individuals have achieved Hall of Fame distinction, including SJU's John Gagliardi (Class of 2006).

LEADING IN ATTENDANCE

Saint John's attracted the second-most spectators in NCAA Division III, both overall (51,945) and per game (6,493), over eight home games in 2021. The cumulative total (51,945) was greater than 107 Football Championship Subdivision teams and all but one of the 167 Division II programs (Grand Valley State's total of 76,334). SJU finished second nationally in Division III with an average of 6,493 spectators over eight games, including two in the NCAA playoffs. The Johnnies have finished in Division III's top two in per-game attendance 19 of the last 20 seasons.

AMONG ESPN'S TOP 50 FOOTBALL PROGRAMS

Saint John's was ranked No. 18 out of ESPN's top 50 programs over the last 150 years in August 2019. The ranking formula included a program's number of national titles and various winning percentages: dominance (best 50 seasons in program history), since integration (1969-2018), early modern (1919-1968) and pre-modern (1869-1918). ESPN noted: "It is not true that the Johnnies' late head coach, John Gagliardi, coached against Frank Leahy. But it is true that Gagliardi became head coach at Saint John's in 1953, the last season that Leahy coached at Notre Dame, and didn't retire until 2012, after 60 seasons and 465 victories. Saint John's, according to our metrics, had one of the 10 most successful programs of the past 100 years. That's another way of saying Gagliardi won 27 conference titles and four national championships."

A JOHNNIE WITH THE JAGUARS



Offensive tackle **Ben Bartch** '20 became the 10th Johnnie to be drafted in the NFL when he was selected by the Jacksonville Jaguars with the 10th pick of the fourth round (No. 116 overall) in the 2020 NFL Draft. He appeared in 13 games for the Jaguars, including one start at left guard, and totaled 219 offensive snaps (47 on special teams) in 2020. Bartch followed that with 11 starts and right guard and 704 offen-

sive snaps (43 on special teams) in 2021. Bartch was the lone NCAA Division III attendee at the 2020 Reese's Senior Bowl in Mobile, Ala. Although he did not play in the game, Bartch received rave reviews during the three days of practices leading up to the event. He attended the 2020 NFL Scouting Combine that February, but did not participate in the drills or measurements due to the injury suffered during the final Senior Bowl practice.

A D3football.com first-team and Associated Press second-team All-American in 2019, Bartch started all 14 games at left tackle in 2019. He made 27 straight starts at tackle after he switched from tight end during the 2018 preseason. Through a combination of hard work in the weight room and repeated consumption of a now-famous (or infamous) protein shake recipe (ingredients included scrambled eggs, cottage cheese, quick grits, peanut butter, bananas and Gatorade), Bartch gained over 50 pounds and started on the line's left side immediately.

Quarterback Jackson Erdmann '19 has had quite the post-graduate path in football following his senior season in 2019. He participated in The Spring League during Fall 2020 and followed that by leading the Wild Aces to Fan Controlled Football's championship in the inaugural season. Now, Erdmann has led the Vienna Vikings to a 10-2 record and face the Hamburg Sea Devils Sept. 25 in the European Football League's championship game.



A 2019 Gagliardi Trophy finalist and the award's recipient in 2018, Erdmann earned his third consecutive All-MIAC first-team honor and led NCAA Division III in passing yards (5,040) - 28 yards shy of the Division III single-season record of 5,068 - as a senior in 2019. He owns MIAC and SJU records for passing touchdowns (139) and passing yards (11,639), as well as 12 other school passing records.


