THE MATCHUP

Saint John's held then-No. 18 Bethel to just one touchdown and 233 yards as the Johnnies scored 27 unanswered points in a 27-7 win last Saturday (Sept. 23) in Collegeville. The home team out-gained BU by a 426-233 margin - 160-89 on the ground and 266-144 through the air - and held the Royals to a 2-for-13 showing on third down (1-for-4 on fourth), Augsburg, meanwhile, earned a 33-31 win last Saturday at Gustavus Adolphus thanks to a 34-yard touchdown pass from Cade Sheehan to Tyrone Wilson with one second remaining in the game. Sheehan finished 20 of 25 passing for 274 yards and five touchdowns, and also rushed for 69 yards on 11 carries.

SYVERSON AN NFF CAMPBELL TROPHY SEMIFINALIST



Senior quarterback **Aaron Syverson** (Minnetonka, Minn.) was named one of 201 semifinalists for the 2023 William V. Campbell Trophy and is a candidate for the 2023 National Football Foundation (NFF) Scholar-Athlete Awards, presented by Fidelity Investments. The NFF and College Football Hall of Fame made the announcement Sept. 27. Since 1995, 22 Johnnies have been nominated for the Campbell Trophy. SJU is the lone program out of 674 NCAA schools that play football to have nominated a Campbell Trophy scholar-athlete each of the past 21 seasons.

The award recognizes an individual as the absolute best football scholar-athlete in the nation and up to 14 of the candidates will be named recipients of the prestigious NFF National Scholar-Athlete Award. Nominated by their schools, which are limited to one nominee each, candidates for the awards must be a senior or graduate student in their final year of eligibility, have a GPA of at least 3.2 on a 4.0 scale, have outstanding football ability as a first-team player or significant contributor and must have demonstrated strong leadership and citizenship.

Launched in 1959, the NFF National Scholar-Athlete program awards \$18,000 scholarships that can be used for the honorees' postgraduate education. SJU has produced four NFF National Scholar-Athlete Award winners: defensive lineman Michael Wozniak '22 (2022), linebacker Carter Hanson '17 (2016), linebacker Matt Hawn '06 (2005) and wide receiver Chris Palmer '96 (1995). The class is selected each year by the NFF Awards Committee, which is comprised of a nationally recognized group of media, members of the College Football Hall of Fame and athletics administrators.

The NFF will announce 12-15 finalists on Oct. 25. Each of them will receive an \$18,000 postgraduate scholarship as a member of the NFF National Scholar-Athlete Class Presented by Fidelity Investments. One of the finalists will be named the winner of the 34th Campbell Trophy during the 65th Annual NFF Awards Dinner Presented by Las Vegas on Dec. 5 at the ARIA Resort & Casino and have his postgraduate scholarship increased to \$25,000.

An accounting major with a 3.69 GPA, Syverson earned College Sports Communicators (formerly CoSIDA) Academic All-District honors last fall and is expected to receive his second Academic All-MIAC (minimum 3.5 GPA) distinction in January.

A 2022 All-MIAC selection, Syverson has completed 61.6 percent of his passes (69 of 112) for 808 yards and 11 touchdowns, with only two interceptions, through the season's first three games this fall. He started all 12 games and ended the 2022 season sixth in all of NCAA Division III in passing yards (3,302) and seventh in passing touchdowns (34). Syverson has a 19-3 record as a starting quarterback and is currently tied for fourth in program history in 300-yard passing games (5); tied for fifth in completions (451); sixth in passing touchdowns (62), passing yards (5,878) and total offense (6,013 yards); and seventh in pass attempts (701).

Off the field, Syverson was a member of SJU's Student-Athlete Advisory Committee in 2021-22 and is a three-year member of SJU Football's Leadership Council. He is in his third year raising money for St. Jude Children's Research Hospital as part of the SJU Football team, which raised over \$47,000 in 2022 and has already surpassed \$62.000 this fall.

Syverson was named SJU's 2022-23 NovaCare Comeback Athlete of the Year. Honorees must have suffered a substantial injury and be known to SJU's NovaCare Rehabilitation on-campus, physical therapy professionals. NovaCare is the preferred physical therapy and athletic training services provider for Saint John's University. Syverson passed for 1,768 yards and 17 touchdowns, while leading his team to a 7-0 start during the 2021 season. But Syverson's first season was cut short when he suffered a season-ending leg injury, a broken fibula with torn ligaments, during the Johnnies' 37-7 win on Oct. 23 at Gustavus Adolphus.

ANOTHER MIAC-OPENING WIN

With last Saturday's win over Bethel, Saint John's is now now 69-25-7 (.718) all-time in its first MIAC game of the season, including a 34-10-4 (.750) record in Collegeville and a 6-1 record against BU (4-0 in Collegeville and 2-1 on the road). It took SJU until its 11th season in the MIAC to win its first conference game of the season, a 7-0 home shutout of Hamline on Oct. 3, 1931. The Johnnies were 0-6-4 in their first 10 conference openers and are 69-19-3 (.775) since.

BU IN COLLEGEVILLE

SJU is now 36-10 all-time against Bethel on the football field, including a 21-3 record in Collegeville. The Johnnies have out-scored the Royals 157-63 over the last six meetings in Clemens Stadium, all SJU wins.

YAGGIE VS. BETHEL



Junior linebacker **Cooper Yaggie** (*left*; Breckenridge, Minn.) seems to have big games against Bethel. He led SJU with 12 tackles (seven solo), a pass breakup and an interception that he returned 24 yards in the third quarter. Yaggie intercepted two passes, including one that he returned 61 yards for a touchdown, in a 28-10 win over the Royals last November for the MIAC championship. Not only that, but he led SJU with 11 tackles (six solo), including two for a loss and one sack, while adding a pass breakup and a quarterback hurry. Yaggie currently leads SJU in solo tackles (16), is tied for the team lead with senior defensive lineman **Joe Akoh** (Hugo, Minn./Cretin-Derham Hall) in tackles for loss (4.0) and is second in total tackles (29).

THIRD-DOWN DIFFICULTY

Both teams struggled on third down last Saturday in Collegeville. Bethel finished just 2-for-14 on third-down conversions (and 1-for-4 on fourth down), while SJU finished 4-for-16. The opposition went 17-for-24 on third down against SJU in the season's first two games.

NO BJORK UNTIL AFTER HALFTIME

Senior linebacker **Erik Bjork** (*right*, Mahtomedi, Minn.), the Johnnies' leading tackler each of the past two seasons and with 31 (12 solo) through three games this fall, will miss the first half of Saturday's game at Augsburg due to a targeting penalty called in the fourth quarter of last weekend's home win over Bethel. SJU's appeal was unsuccessful. Bjork made seven tackles (three solo) in the victory, which pushed the two-time All-MIAC selection over 200 for his career. He now has 204 and and needs 57 to catch assistant coach **Tom Wicka** '90 for 10th (261) on SJU's all-time list.



BIG PLAYS

The Johnnies were sparked with a pair of lengthy offensive plays last Saturday against Bethel. Senior wide receiver **Nick VanErp** (Battle Lake, Minn./Ottertail Central) caught a short crossing route from senior quarterback **Aaron Syverson** (Minnetonka, Minn.) and turned it into a 74-yard touchdown to give SJU a 20-7 lead with 2:52 left in the third quarter. The reception was SJU's longest since Nov. 2, 2019, when **Ravi Alston**



'21 hauled in a 79-yard catch from **Jackson Erdmann** '19 at home against Concordia (a 19-18 loss in overtime). After the Johnnies forced a turnover on downs on their own 14-yard line in the fourth quarter, senior running back **Devin Vouk** (*left*; Sartell, Minn./Sartell-St. Stephen) took the first-down handoff and sprinted 77-yards to the BU nine-yard line. The run was the Johnnies' longest since **Henry Trost** '22 scored on an 80-yard gallop in a 57-7 home victory over St. Olaf on Oct. 20, 2018.

SERIES HISTORY

Saturday's game is the 84th meeting between Saint John's and Augsburg on the football field. The Johnnies are 72-9-2 all-time against the Auggies, including a 35-4-2 record in Minneapolis (see chart on right). SJU has out-scored Augsburg 372-30 over the last eight meetings.

SCOUTING THE AUGGIES

Augsburg ended the 2022 season with a 6-4 record overall and 3-1 record in the Skyline Division. The Auggies had a chance to upset Bethel and win the Skyline division, but fell just short when a two-point conversion for the late lead was picked off in the end zone and returned for two points in the 30-27 BU win. The Auggies return four All-MIAC players this fall: senior wide reciever Braden Tretter, senior defensive end Shaquille Young, senior running back D.J. Monroe and senior quarterback Cade Sheehan. Junior wide receiver Dominic Smith was All-MIAC honorable mention. Sheehan has passed for 719 yards and 10 touchdowns, to one interception, and is the team's second leading rusher behind Monroe (197 and two touchdowns on 42 carries) with 172 yards on 25 attempts. Tretter has 18 catches for 261 and two touchdowns, while Smith is right behind with 16 receptions for 239 yards and six scores.

A 1981 SJU graduate, Fasching became the 16th head coach in the 102year history of Saint John's University football following the 2012 season. He succeeded John Gagliardi, who announced his retirement following 60 seasons at SJU, after serving 17 seasons as an assistant football coach and recruiting coordinator at SJU. Fasching was a three-year starter for Gagliardi and the Johnnies at linebacker during the 1978 and 1980-81 seasons. A knee injury held him out of the 1979 season.



AS AN ASSISTANT

The Johnnies posted a 164-39 record (120-22 MIAC) with 10 conference titles and 12 postseason appearances (22-11 playoff record), including the 2003 national championship, 2000 national runnerup performance and four national semifinal games during his tenure as an assistant coach. He also coached SJU's throwers as an assistant track and field coach from 1996-2011.

AT ST. CLOUD CATHEDRAL

Prior to joining the Johnnies' coaching staff, Fasching served as the head football coach at St. Cloud Cathedral High School from 1986-95, where he led the Crusaders to the State Class B title in 1992 and

HALL OF FAMER & COACH OF THE YEAR

Fasching was inducted into the Minnesota Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame in April 2022 and and St. Cloud Cathedral's Athletic Hall of Fame in February 2022. He is a six-time MIAC Coach of the Year, including each of the past five seasons: 2014, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2021 and 2022.

BUCK MAKES 2023 GOOD WORKS TEAM

Senior wide receiver **Jimmy Buck** (*right*) was named one of 22 student-athletes across all divisions of college football to the 2023 Allstate American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Good Works Team on Sept. 12. This year marks the 32nd anniversary of the award, which was established in 1992 to recognize a select group of college football players who have made a commitment to service and enriching the



lives of others. A fan vote will run from now until Nov. 22 at www.ESPN. com/Allstate to decide this year's Allstate AFCA Good Works Team Captain. Fans may cast one vote per device each day.

Buck is one of four honorees from the NCAA Division III level – joining offensive lineman Evan Ginter of Bethel, safety Cameron Bannister of Central (lowa) and running back Spencer Uggla of Johns Hopkins (Md.) – and one of just two wide receivers (Georgia's Ladd McConkey). Over the summer, sports information directors from Division I, Division II, Division III and NAIA schools across the country submitted nominations of players they felt best embodied the spirit of the Good Works Team award. A voting panel was faced with a list of 136 nominees that was narrowed down to the 22 student-athletes and an honorary coach, Maryland's Mike Locksley, named to the team.

Buck is the seventh Johnnie to be named to the Allstate AFCA Good Works Team and the sixth in the last seven seasons: defensive lineman Michael Wozniak '22, quarterback Chris Backes '21, offensive lineman Ben Bartch '20, quarterback Jackson Erdmann '19 and wide receiver Will Gillach '19. Defensive end Kevin McNamara '07 was the first SJU student-athlete to receive the honor in 2006. The 2023 Allstate AFCA Good Works Team will be invited to New Orleans to participate in a special community service project ahead of the 2024 Allstate Sugar Bowl, where the team will also be recognized on the field at halftime on New Year's Day.

A 2022 All-MIAC selection, Buck started all 12 games last fall and tied for the team lead in receptions (68). He was second in receiving yards (899) and receiving touchdowns (8). He totaled 35 catches for 560 yards (16.0 avg.) and three touchdowns over a five-game stretch.

Buck started his senior season with 101 catches for 1,450 yards (14.4 avg.) and 15 touchdowns in 24 career games at SJU. He suffered an injury in the first half of the season-opening win over Trinity (Texas) Sept. 2 and aims to return soon.

Off the field, Buck is in his second year serving as the president of the College of Saint Benedict and Saint John's University's St. Jude Children's Research Hospital Club on campus. The club holds bi-weekly meetings and contacts businesses to partner with for fundraising events. He is also the president of SJU Football's St. Jude committee and has set a record fundraising goal of \$50,000 for 2023. The team raised over \$47,000 in 2022 and already surpassed \$62,000 this fall. Buck was introduced to St. Jude's as a teen committee member in high school, where he was a named a top teen fundraiser in Minnesota in 2018 and 2019.

Since September 2022, Buck has served as a student ambassador for Neolth, which is an external company, not associated with CSB+SJU, that creates programs and appbased tools for teens/young adults to manage stress and promote mental health. He was named a top Neolth ambassador in 2022. Buck and his family volunteered 10-15 times each year from 2013-2020 at St. Stephen's Human Services (now known as Agate Housing and Services) in downtown Minneapolis. The family purchased food, prepared and served it for the homeless at the shelter.

A psychology major (pre-medicine emphasis), Buck interned (unpaid) this past summer with Touchstone Mental Health in Minneapolis. Touchstone is a non-profit that provides mental health resources via residential treatment, community services and housing programs for people aged 55+.

TIED WITH TOM

Senior quarterback **Aaron Syverson** finished 18 of 34 passing for 266 yards and three touchdowns last Saturday against Bethel. The 18 completions enabled him to tie Tom **Linnemann** '00 for fifth all-time. Syverson is currently sixth in both passing yards (5.878) and passing touchdowns (62), and seventh in pass attempts (701).

Not counting the 2020-21 season that was ravaged by COVID-19, D3football.com has published 251 national polls since the ranking was established in 2003. SJU has been ranked in the top 25 in 196 of those, including 83 in the top five, 158 in the top 10 and 183 in the top 20.

THE LAST MEETING

Saint John's 45, at Augsburg 0 (Oct. 8, 2022)

Saint John's rushed for four touchdowns in the first and second guarters - including two from running back Henry Trost '22 and a 58-yard scamper by senior quarterback Aaron Syverson - then kept its foot on the gas en route to a 45-0 win over the Auggies last Oct. 8 (2022) at Edor Nelson Field.

While the defense recorded SJU's first shutout since an 81-0 win over St. Scholastica on Oct. 30, 2021, and forced four turnovers, the offense turned in a balanced performance. The Johnnies finished with 485 yards of total offense – a season-best 259 of it coming on the ground. Trost finished with 11 carries for 53 yards and two touchdowns.

Senior Troy Feddema (St. Cloud, Minn./Tech) had eight carries for 59 yards and one

touchdown. But it was Syverson who led the way with five carries for 78 yards. Of course, the bulk of that total came on his 58-yard touchdown run on the final play of the first quarter that put the Johnnies on top 21-0 (right).

The run was the longest of his career (surpassing the previous mark of 29 yards) and was the Johnnies' longest rush by a



later a receiver and returner), sprinted for a 60-yard touchdown on that date at Carleton. A pair of SJU quarterbacks, Ryan Koob '22 (Oct. 26, 2019 at St. Olaf) and Nick Martin '16 (Sept. 29, 2012 vs. St. Olaf), recorded career-long runs of 57 yards each.

Syverson also threw for 214 yards and two touchdowns before exiting the game late in the third quarter with his team in front 42-0. Senior wide receiver Jimmy Buck led SJU's air attack with seven catches for 94 yards and a touchdown in the win. The 94 yards was six short of enabling Buck to become the fourth Johnnie to record four consecutive 100-yard receiving games. The last Johnnie to accomplish the feat was Blake Elliott '03 in 2003 (final two games of the 2002 season, first two games of 2003).

THE LAST GAME

at Saint John's 27, Bethel 7 (Sept. 23)

Saint John's held then-No. 18 Bethel to just one first-half touchdown en route to a 27-7 victory before a Family Weekend crowd of 11,321 last Saturday in Clemens Stadium. The performance came on the heels of a tough outing at UW-Whitewater on Sept. 9 when SJU gave up five unanswered second-half touchdowns and allowed the Warhawks - ranked No. 4 nationally - to rush for 280 yards. On Saturday, the Royals managed just 89 yards on the ground (with only one run of longer than 10 yards) and only 233 yards of total offense.

Bethel took a 7-0 lead on a 1-yard run by quarterback Alex Call in the second quarter. But that score was set up when linebacker Isaac Call returned an interception to the SJU 37. After that, the Royals didn't score again. Bethel turned the ball over on downs three times in Johnnies' territory, including at the SJU 33 on the drive following Call's touchdown run, and at the Johnnies' 14 trailing 20-7 in the fourth quarter.

The SJU offense, meanwhile, started a bit sluggish, but picked up the pace as the game went along. Senior quarterback **Aaron Syverson** connected with sophomore **Dylan Wheeler** (St. Paul, Minn./Mounds View) for a 28-yard touchdown pass on 4th-and-12 to tie the score 7-7 with 3:40 to go in the second quarter (*right*), then a 33-yard field goal by junior **Conor Murphy** put the Johnnies on top 10-7 at halftime.



Murphy connected on a 35-yard field goal in the third quarter to extend the lead to 13-7 before a short pass from Syverson to senior wideout **Nick VanErp** - who was returning to action after sitting out the Whitewater game with a groin injury - turned into a 74-yard touchdown connection to make the score 20-7. VanErp finished with five catches for 83 yards.

Syverson and the offense capitalized in a big way after the defense stopped the Royals on downs at the 14. A 77-yard run by senior running back **Devin Vouk** set up an 8-yard touchdown pass from Syverson to senior tight end **Alex Larson** that put the game out of reach.

Augsburg 33, at Gustavus Adolphus 31 (Sept. 23)

Quarterback Cade Sheehan threw a game-winning, 34-yard Hail Mary touchdown pass to wide receiver Tyrone Wilson with one second remaining in the game to give Augsburg a 33-31 victory at Gustavus Adolphus last Saturday.

Augsburg held the lead for most of the contest, until the Gusties went ahead on a 23-yard touchdown pass from George Sandven to Caden Kleinschmidt with 22 seconds remaining in regulation. D.J. Monroe returned the ensuing kickoff 25 yards, giving the Auggies the ball at their own 43-yard-line with 14 seconds left. Sheehan then completed a 23-yard pass to tight end Michael Ims, giving the Auggies the ball at the Gustavus 34 with seven seconds left. After an Augsburg timeout, Sheehan heaved a pass to the front right corner of the end zone, where Wilson leaped between two Gustavus defenders to catch the ball for the score, his fourth touchdown reception of the season and seventh of his career.

Gustavus had one final play from its 25-yard line, but on a catch and series of laterals, the final lateral was picked off by Augsburg's Hamsa Kahin, ending the game and giving the Auggies the victory on Gustavus' Homecoming day.

Sheehan finished 20 of 25 passing for 274 yards and five touchdowns, and also rushed for 69 yards on 11 carries. Three of Sheehan's touchdown passes went to Dominic Smith - scores of 10 and 13 yards in the first quarter, and a 16-yarder in the third quarter. He caught four passes for 57 yards in the game. Wilson added a 17-yard touchdown reception early in the fourth quarter, giving him three catches for 65 yards and two scores. Braden Tretter caught five passes for 69 yards. Monroe rushed for 51 yards on 14 carries.

Linebacker Hamsa Kahin led the Auggies with seven tackles (six solo), including two sacks, two of Augsburg's four sacks in the game. He also had two fumble recoveries and a pass breakup, and was named the MIAC Defensive Player of the Week for his performance.

PRESEASON HONORS

Senior tight end **Alex Larson** was named to the D3football.com Preseason All-America team Aug. 8 and senior punter **Spencer Ell** (Morristown, Minn./Bethlehem Academy) was named to *Lindy's* preseason All-America second team earlier this summer. The preseason honor was the second-consecutive for Larson, who was named to the second team prior to the 2022 season. He earned D3football.com All-America fourth-team distinction in 2021 and was a consensus first-team All-American last fall (AFCA, Associated Press and D3football.com).

The 6-foot-7 Larson started all 12 games at tight end and broke SJU's record for career receiving touchdowns by a tight end (22) in 2022. He is currently third in program history in receptions (103) and fourth in receiving yards (1,333) at the position. He led SJU with 14 receiving touchdowns, which were good for fifth-most in NCAA Division III and the sixth-most by a Johnnie in a single season, and tied for the team lead in receptions (68) and was second in receiving yards (899) last fall. Larson recorded three 100-yard receiving games, missed another by two yards and had three others over 84 yards each.

Ell (*right*) earned D3football.com All-Region 6 third-team honors last fall and was the first Johnnie punter to be named All-MIAC since Charlie Carr '03 in 2001. He averaged 38.7 yards on 46 punts, including 17 that landed inside the opposition's 20-yard line, and led the MIAC in punting average (38.9) and punts inside the 20-yard line (12) in conference play. Ell's career average of 38.7 yards per punt is currently second in program history, behind the program record of 41.7 held by two-time All-American Phil Barry '00.



FOUR ALL-REGION RETURNEES

Saint John's had seven D3football.com All-Region 6 honorees last season and four return in 2023: senior punter **Spencer EII**, senior offensive lineman **Joe Jaeger** (Lakeville, Minn./North), senior tight end **Alex Larson**, senior cornerback **Cayden Saxon** (Minnetonka, Minn./Hopkins). The Johnnies have had 56 All-Region honorees over the last eight full seasons. Jaeger started all 12 games this fall, the first five at right tackle before moving to right guard. He served as the team's starting right tackle for the first six games of the 2021 season before he suffered a season-ending injury. SJU led the MIAC in total offense (452.0 ypg.) for the fourth consecutive season, and scoring offense (40.4 ppg.) for the second-straight year in conference play.

2022 ALL-MIAC HONORS

Defensive lineman Michael Wozniak '22 was named the MIAC Defensive Player of the Year, Gary Fasching '81 was named the MIAC John Gagliardi Coach of the Year for the fifth straight season (and sixth time in his 10-year tenure) and 15 Johnnies earned 2022 All-MIAC honors. Of the 15 All-MIAC honoress, 10 return: senior linebacker Erik Bjork; junior wide receiver Jimmy Buck; senior punter Spencer Ell; senior offensive lineman Joe Jaeger; senior tight end Alex Larson; junior kicker Conor Murphy; senior safety Ethan Stark (Sartell, Minn./Sartell-St. Stephen), senior quarterback Aaron Syverson; and junior linebacker Cooper Yaggie. The All-MIAC honor was the second-consecutive for Bjork and Larson. Senior wide receiver Nick VanErp was named All-MIAC honorable mention.

MIAC LEADERS

The Johnnies led the MIAC in four statistical categories in league play last fall, two each on offense and defense: total offense (452.0 ypg., fourth consecutive year); scoring offense (40.4 ppg., second season in a row); total defense (298.5 ypg., third straight season); and scoring defense (15.6 ppg., third consecutive season). Individually, senior tight end **Alex Larson** led the MIAC in receiving touchdowns (10); junior **Conor Murphy** in points scored (59) among kickers; senior **Spencer EII** in punting, both in average (38.9) and punts inside the 20-yard line (12); defensive lineman **Michael Wozniak** '22 in quarterback sacks (6); senior cornerback **Cayden Saxon** in interceptions (5) and passes defended (10); and junior linebacker **Cooper Yaggie** tied in fumble recoveries (2).

8 ACADEMIC ALL-DISTRICT HONOREES

Eight Johnnies were named to the College Sports Communicators (formerly College Sports Information Directors of America, CoSIDA) Academic All-District IV men's football team in 2022: senior linebacker Mateo Cisneros (Shoreview, Minn./Mounds View), senior offensive guard Joe Jaeger, cornerback John Kohler '23, offensive tackle Cameron Murphy '23, junior kicker Conor Murphy, senior quarterback Aaron Syverson, running back Henry Trost '22 and defensive lineman Michael Wozniak '22. A new format for the 2022-23 academic year, each institution may nominate up to six student-athletes for Academic All-District recognition. Nominees must be a sophomore or better with a 3.5 cumulative GPA or higher.

WINS IN FIRST 9 SEASONS, FIRST 111 GAMES

Gary Fasching is off to the best start, in regard to wins, by any head coach in program history. That history, of course, includes the likes of college football's all-time wins leader, John Gagliardi. Fasching is also ahead of Gagliardi's pace when it comes to their first 111 games coached at SJU (see below).

A PLAYOFF REGULAR

The 2022 NCAA berth was SJU's 32nd postseason appearance in program history and the 28th at the Division III level. The Johnnie defense recorded its second consecutive shutout after blanking Gustavus Adolphus 36-0 the week before in Collegeville.

1972 vs. St. Thomas (W, 14-10): The Johnnies overcame seven turnovers - five fumbles and two interceptions - to earn a 14-10 win over St. Thomas on Homecoming Day 51 years ago. The game's offense left much to be desired as the Johnnies totaled 202 yards on 68 plays to the Tommies' 226 yards on 72 plays. Running back Marty Cella rushed for half of SJU's offense - 101 yards - on 31 carries. Linebacker Dick Humphrey blocked a Tommie punt on the UST 49-yard line and defensive end Tom Dailey picked it up 44 yards downfield and carried it five yards for what proved to be the game-winning touchdown in the fourth quarter.

1989 vs. Augsburg (W, 54-6): With 12 seconds left in the first half, Tom Ramboldt threw a 30-yard touchdown to his brother, Mick, to give the Johnnies a 28-0 lead. Craig Hawley scored a 96-yard kick return for a touchdown, the second-longest return in school history, in the fourth quarter and, six seconds later, SJU recorded a safety. The Johnnies' defense finished the day with 10 sacks.

2006 vs. Carleton (W, 29-19): Then-No. 3 Saint John's earned a 29-19 Homecoming win over Carleton on this date 17 years ago. SJU took a 14-12 lead into halftime and scored 15 points in a span of 6:02 in the third quarter to put the game away. All four Carleton drives in the third quarter were halted within its own 30-yard line and was forced to punt. Michael Crees finished 8 of 17 passing for 174 yards and a touchdown in his first collegiate start. Wide receiver Kyle Gearman led SJU with five catches for 113 yards and a touchdown. Linebacker Jamie Steffensmeier (*right*) led the Johnnies' defense with 11 tackles (3 solo), while senior Kevin



McNamara added 10 tackles (4 solo), including 3.0 tackles for a loss and a sack. Senior Mike Burtzel led an active Johnnie secondary with 9 tackles (5 solo) and 5 pass breakups.

IN THE NCAA DIVISION III PLAYOFFS

The 2022 postseason appearance was the Johnnies' 32nd (28th at the NCAA Division III level) and eighth consecutive. SJU is second in NCAA Division III history in postseason appearances and third in playoff wins (*see charts below and right*). The Johnnies made four other postseason appearances and have a 48-26 (.649) record overall: three in the NAIA (1963, 1965, 1982) and one showing at the Mineral Water Bowl (1969).

CONTINUING TO LEAD THE MIAC

The Johnnies' 31-7 victory at Concordia-Moorhead on Nov. 12, 2016, was the program's 450th in MIAC play. SJU ended the 2022 regular season with the MIAC's best winning percentage in conference play, .723 (487-180-22), which is even better when broken down by eras: modern history, since 1946 (.779); during John Gagliardi's tenure, 1953-2012 (.780); and during the 21st century, since 2000 (.848).

LEADING IN ATTENDANCE

Collegeville was the place to be for NCAA Division III football in 2022, as Saint John's attracted a division-best 57,715 fans to Clemens Stadium last fall. The cumulative total was greater than three Football Bowl Subdivision teams (Akron, Northern Illinois and Massachusetts), 114 Football Championship Subdivision teams and all but one of the 165 Division II programs (Grand Valley State). SJU finished second nationally in Division III with an average of 7,214 spectators over eight games, including two in the NCAA playoffs. Whitewater hosted five contests last fall and led Division III with an average of 10,934 fans per game. UWW's home game vs. Wisconsin-Oshkosh boasted 18,951 spectators on Oct. 14, the fourth-largest crowd in Division III history and the largest for an on-campus venue.

NO STRANGER TO THE POSTSEASON

Trivia question: Which Johnnie has been part of each NCAA postseason appearance, dating back to 1976? The answer is **Jerry Haugen** '76, who is in his 48th season on the Johnnies' coaching staff in 2023. He has coached in 70 NCAA postseason football games, which accounts for nearly seven additional seasons in playoff games alone. The Johnnies have posted a 415-98-5 (.806) overall record and a 313-60-4 (.836) mark in



the MIAC with Haugen as a defensive coach. Since 1978, his defense has finished in the top two of the MIAC in total defense 26 times, including 16 of the past 21 seasons, and in scoring defense 31 times, including 23 of the past 27 seasons. As a player (*left*), Haugen was a four-year starter and gained All-MIAC honors as a defensive back in 1975. He ranks second on the school's career interception list with 15 (first place without postseason games included).

A LOT OF GAMES, A LOT OF WINS



The Johnnies' NCAA second-round win in 2018 was also the 380th with **Jerry Haugen** as an assistant football coach at SJU. The late Bobby Bowden, a member of the College Football Hall of Fame and long-time head coach at Florida State (1976-2009), has the fourthmost wins in college football history with a 377-129-4 record. All told, Haugen has been a part of 1,607 wins (2,615 games) at SJU as a player and coach across four different sports, as well as 37 conference championships (including four MIAC Playoff titles in baseball)

The 47-14 win over Rose-Hulman (Ind.) on Nov. 16, 2019, enabled Saint John's to become the eighth program in Division III history to reach 650 victories. AMONG ESPN'S TOP 50 FOOTBALL PROGRAMS

Saint John's was ranked No. 18 out of ESPN's top 50 programs over the last 150 years in August 2019. The ranking formula took into consideration a program's number of national championships and various winning percentages: dominance (best 50 seasons in program history), since integration (1969-2018), early modern (1919-1968) and premodern (1869-1918). ESPN noted: "It is not true that the Johnnies' late head coach, John Gagliardi, coached against Frank Leahy. But it is true that Gagliardi became head coach at Saint John's in 1953, the last season that Leahy coached at Notre Dame, and didn't retire until 2012, after 60 seasons and 465 victories. Saint John's, according to our metrics, had one of the 10 most successful programs of the past 100 years. That's another way of saying Gagliardi won 27 conference titles and four national championships."

BLAKE ELLIOTT '03 ON HALL OF FAME BALLOT

Former Saint John's student-athlete **Blake Elliott** '03 (*right*) was named to the College Football Hall of Fame ballot for the 11th consecutive year in June 2023. Elliott, who played wide receiver for the Johnnies from 2000-03, is one of 179 former student-athletes on the ballot, including one of 101 from the NCAA divisional and NAIA ranks. The announcement of the 2024 inductees will be made in January and those selected will be in-



ducted into the College Football Hall of Fame during the 66th NFF Annual Awards Dinner Dec. 10, 2024, and enshrined at the Chick-fil-A College Football Hall of Fame in Atlanta.

Elliott excelled for four years and ended his career as the recipient of the Gagliardi Trophy and a national championship in 2003; a season that included **John Gagliardi's** recordbreaking 409th career victory. He owns three NCAA playoff records, two MIAC records and 29 SJU receiving records. Elliott was a three-time All-American, a two-time MIAC Player of the Year, a Gagliardi Trophy finalist as a junior and nd was invited to play in both the AFCA Aztec Bowl and Hula Bowl following the 2003 season.

He ended his career second all-time in all NCAA divisions in catches (327) and second in NCAA Division III in touchdown receptions (56). Elliott posted 369 receptions for 4,826 yards and 63 touchdowns in his career, as well as 744 rushing yards and eight touchdowns on 109 carries. Elliott was just as dangerous on special teams as he was on offense, totaling 3,065 yards and seven touchdowns on 195 total returns. His NCAA all-divisions record for consecutive games played with a reception (47) ended in 2008.

To be eligible for the ballot, players must have been named a first-team All-American as recognized and utilized by the NCAA for its consensus All-America teams; played their last year of intercollegiate football at least 10 years prior; played within the last 50 years and cannot be currently playing professional football. From the coaching ranks, 226 individuals have achieved Hall of Fame distinction, including Gagliardi (Class of 2006).

A JOHNNIE WITH THE JAGUARS



Offensive tackle **Ben Bartch** '20 became the 10th Johnnie to be drafted in the NFL when he was selected by the Jacksonville Jaguars with the 10th pick of the fourth round (No. 116 overall) in the 2020 NFL Draft. He appeared in 13 games for the Jaguars, including one start at left guard, and totaled 219 offensive snaps (47 on special teams) in 2020. Bartch followed that with 11 starts at right guard and 704 offensive snaps

(43 on special teams) in 2021. In 2022, Bartch started the Jaguars' first five games at left guard, totaling 293 offensive plays and 19 on special teams, before he suffered a season-ending knee injury. He opened training camp this summer on the PUP (physically unable to perform) list and started at left guard in all three of the Jaguars' games in 2023.

Bartch was the lone NCAA Division III attendee at the 2020 Reese's Senior Bowl in Mobile, Ala. Although he did not play in the game, Bartch received rave reviews during the three days of practices leading up to the event. He attended the 2020 NFL Scouting Combine that February, but did not participate in the drills or measurements due to the injury suffered during the final Senior Bowl practice. A D3football.com first-team and Associated Press second-team All-American in 2019, Bartch started all 14 games at left tackle in 2019. He made 27 straight starts at tackle after he switched from tight end during the 2018 preseason. Through a combination of hard work in the weight room and repeated consumption of a now-famous (or infamous) protein shake recipe (ingredients included scrambled eggs, cottage cheese, quick grits, peanut butter, bananas and Gatorade), Bartch gained over 50 pounds and started on the line's left side immediately.
